18 reports out three bills with a favorable
19 recommendation.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, the motion carries, and we
8 will consider the Resolution Consent
9 Agenda shortly.

10 The Chair again recognizes
11 Councilwoman Parker for the purpose of
12 calling up bills and resolutions on the
13 regular Second Reading and Final Passage
14 Calendar today.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
16 you, Mr. President. In addition to the
17 resolutions being considered on the
18 Consent Agenda, the following resolutions
19 and bills are being called up from the
20 Second Reading and Final Passage
21 Calendars today. They are Nos. 210787,
22 210795, 210636. All other bills and
23 resolutions are being held,
24 Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you very much, Councilwoman.

3 Before we consider the agenda
4 today, we will proceed with the public
5 comment session. So we're going to take
6 a five-minute, maybe ten-minute break to
7 give our technology professionals an
8 opportunity to connect with the
9 individuals who wish to testify today.

10 We'll take a brief break.

11 Thank you.

12 - - -

13 (Short recess.)

14 - - -

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, and welcome back. We're going
17 to consider our public comment now, but
18 before we proceed, we will now take a
19 moment to go over the ground rules
20 relating to that.

21 So before we consider the
22 public comment, it will go as follows:
23 Public comment must concern matters on
24 the Second Reading and Final Passage
25 Calendars for possible action at a

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2 session of Council. A speaker on any of
3 those matters must sign up in order to
4 testify. You must call 215-686-3406 by
5 3:00 p.m. the day before the session to
6 sign up for the public comment.

7 When you call, we will take
8 your name, phone number, the number of
9 the legislative item you are commenting
10 on and whether you are in support of or
11 against the legislation, and add your
12 name to the list. We will then telephone
13 each person on the list during the
14 Council session and invite them to our
15 remote meeting.

16 Under ideal circumstances, we
17 would like to have three minutes. We're
18 going to ask -- it's a little on the edge
19 in terms of the volume, so we're going to
20 authorize three minutes, but we're going
21 to ask people to get as quickly as
22 possible through their testimony to
23 ensure that you're able to get all of
24 your testimony in in the time limit. But
25 from time to time, that may vary based on

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2 the volume.

3 In order to be fair, though, to
4 all those wishing to speak, I intend to
5 hold faithfully to the established time
6 limit. And once invited to the meeting
7 and asked to begin your testimony, a
8 timer will be started, and we will
9 monitor your remaining time throughout
10 your testimony. When there are
11 30 seconds remaining to your time, you
12 will be reminded of this, and once your
13 allotted time has passed, you will be
14 asked to conclude your remarks and
15 shortly thereafter you will be muted and
16 disconnected from the remote meeting.

17 I also reserve the right to
18 limit the number of speakers where
19 repetitious comments are being made on
20 the same subject matter. This may affect
21 callbacks (background noise) and public
22 comment at the meeting.

23 Please be aware that the public
24 meeting is being recorded, and because
25 the meeting is public, participants

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2 (background noise). So by continuing to
3 be in the meeting, you are consenting to
4 being recorded.

5 I will now ask Mr. Decker to
6 please call the first name on the list.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
8 is Sue Hoffman, commenting on 210787.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning. Please state your name for the
11 record and proceed with your testimony.

12 MS. HOFFMAN: Good morning. My
13 name is Sue Hoffman. I'm the Program
14 Manager for the Women in Nontraditional
15 Careers Project, known as WINC, and the
16 project is sponsored by Philadelphia
17 Works, the Philadelphia Workforce
18 Development Board.

19 I'm speaking in favor of
20 Resolution 210787 honoring Erin
21 O'Brien-Hoffmann -- we are not related --
22 for receiving a 2021 Tradeswomen Heroes
23 Award from NAB, to the North America's
24 Building Trades Unions. I want to
25 personally thank Councilwoman Katherine

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2 Gilmore Richardson for acknowledging Erin
3 and her work.

4 I've known Erin for three
5 years, since the beginning of the Women
6 in Nontraditional Careers initiative.
7 When WINC decided to start its first
8 Tradeswomen Readiness Program this past
9 summer, we chose Erin as the lead
10 instructor and program coordinator. Erin
11 went above and beyond to make sure she
12 organized field trips to introduce
13 aspiring tradeswomen to as many
14 apprenticeship programs as possible. She
15 personally counseled and connected the
16 graduates to opportunities in the union
17 building trades. So Erin really is a
18 true role model and a mentor for women in
19 the trades in the Philadelphia region.

20 Erin knows that women can
21 thrive in non-traditional employment and
22 earn great pay and benefits to take care
23 of their families. Through her work and
24 through WINC, together we are making it
25 possible for more women to succeed in the

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2 trades in the Philadelphia area.

3 So I want to thank Council for
4 honoring Erin O'Brien-Hoffmann with this
5 well-deserved recognition. She is truly
6 a hero.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much for your testimony.
10 We appreciate it.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Erin O'Brien-Hoffmann, commenting on
13 210787.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Before we start, could somebody mute
16 their mic. We're having a lot -- thank
17 you.

18 Ms. O'Brien?

19 MS. O'BRIEN-HOFFMANN: Yeah.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Please proceed with your testimony.

22 MS. O'BRIEN-HOFFMANN: My name
23 is Erin O'Brien-Hoffmann. I am the
24 Commercial Paint Instructor for District
25 Council 21, Local Union 2011. As Sue had

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2 mentioned, I also had the opportunity to
3 be the lead instructor for WINC, Women in
4 Nontraditional Careers, this past summer
5 for this very first cohort. And I'm
6 humbled and honored that I'm being
7 recognized, you know, in today's meeting.

8 And this is not a chore or a
9 job for me, and my career has come with
10 much pleasure and I get to be a
11 cheerleader every day for the women in
12 Philadelphia to enter the Philadelphia
13 union building trades. And while this
14 job may not be for every girl, it is for
15 any girl, and I hope that I can continue
16 to encourage women to follow their dreams
17 in regards of the non-traditional
18 workforce.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you very much for your testimony.
22 We appreciate it.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Pat Eiding, commenting on 210787.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

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2 morning, Mr. Eiding. Just state your
3 name for the record and please proceed
4 with your testimony.

5 MR. EIDING: Good morning. My
6 name is Pat Eiding. I am the President
7 of the Philadelphia Council of the
8 AFL-CIO, also Secretary/Treasurer of the
9 Philadelphia Building Trades Council.

10 It is my pleasure to speak to
11 President Clarke and the Councilmembers.
12 It's my pleasure to speak on behalf of
13 this resolution for Erin
14 O'Brien-Hoffmann. I have known Erin many
15 years and watched her as she took the
16 message of the great career that is
17 before young women in not only the City
18 of Philadelphia building construction
19 trades but nationally.

20 She's done a tremendous --
21 through her tremendous effort, many women
22 are now in the building construction
23 trades here in Philadelphia, but her
24 message and her hard work is not only
25 just with the Philadelphia building

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2 trades. Her effort in WINC, which is
3 Women in Nontraditional Trades, has been
4 over and above what we could expect
5 anywhere nationally, let alone here in
6 Philadelphia. I think Philadelphia is
7 the forefront of the women in the trades
8 because of Erin and the folks that she
9 works with.

10 I just am so proud to be able
11 to support this resolution for Erin and
12 the great work she's done and the great
13 work she's doing as she continues on with
14 training young women and young men
15 actually in the construction field.

16 It's a great career because of
17 her tenacity and caring. A lot of folks
18 who -- a lot of women who wouldn't think
19 that they would want this as a career
20 have moved forward, and I think it's just
21 to her credit.

22 The National has recognized
23 her, and I think it's only fitting that
24 the City of Philadelphia recognize her,
25 and I am proud to be able to speak for

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2 her and support this resolution.

3 Thank you very much.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony. We
6 appreciate it.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Cynthia Stinson, commenting on 210793.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning. State your name for the record
11 and please proceed with your testimony.

12 MS. STINSON: Hi. My name is
13 Cynthia Stinson. I'm in support of Bill
14 210794 [sic]. Dorothy Bolden made a
15 powerful quote in 1983, and I quote, she
16 cares about the families she works for as
17 she cares about her own. And yet she
18 has -- and yet she said domestic workers
19 have never been recognized as part of the
20 labor force.

21 This day is important, because
22 she's a hidden gem to most domestic
23 workers. She is a hidden gem to myself.
24 She is an advocate, and her story will
25 empower others to become an advocate for

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2 themselves in this industry.

3 Lastly, Dorothy Bolden is
4 important because this is one step closer
5 to closing the gap on overworked and
6 underpaid domestic workers.

7 I am a domestic worker. I am a
8 nanny. I am a professional. I deserve
9 to be treated as any other hardworking
10 individual.

11 Making October 13th Dorothy
12 Bolden Day would mean the world to me,
13 because I have been a domestic worker for
14 22 years now. And without domestic
15 workers, there would be no doctors, there
16 would be no lawyers, there would be no
17 nurses, because we are the foundation of
18 the working class.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Okay. Are you done?

21 MS. STINSON: Yes. I'm all
22 done.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Okay. Thank you. Thank you so much for
25 your testimony. We appreciate it.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
3 is Shanique Jones, commenting on 210793
4 and 210794.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning. State your name for the record
7 and please proceed with your testimony.

8 MS. JONES: Good morning. My
9 name is Shanique Jones and I'm an
10 organizer with the National Domestic
11 Workers Alliance and its "We Dream in
12 Black chesters (ph). I'm calling in
13 support of Bill 210794 [sic] to recognize
14 Dorothy Bolden and all Black domestic
15 workers and the 16,000 domestic workers
16 in the City.

17 So there is no America without
18 domestic workers. Since America has been
19 sectioned, Black women have done the work
20 that makes all other work possible and at
21 first for no pay at all.

22 So I stand in solidarity with
23 these amazing women like Cynthia, who
24 just spoke, who continue the beautiful,
25 yet unappreciated work, of care for your

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2 children, your elderly, for your
3 household. They deserve respect,
4 dignity, and recognition, and they are
5 powerful just as Dorothy Bolden.

6 So I'll end with a wonderful
7 quote from our own Jennifer Mount, who is
8 a caregiver in the City, and she said if
9 the film is good, let it be heard. The
10 most reliable way to predict the future
11 is to create it.

12 Today, Dorothy Bolden Day is a
13 creation for future domestic workers, and
14 we, the National Domestic Workers
15 Alliance and We Dream in Black, are
16 stronger than we know. Vote yes. Over
17 600 domestic workers and supporters have
18 signed the petition in support as well.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
22 really appreciate it.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Cynthia Vinson, commenting on 210794.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

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2 morning. Just state your name for the
3 record and proceed with your testimony.

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
6 Vinson?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 question is, is Ms. Vinson and Ms.
10 Stinson the same person? Because I
11 notice on our -- that's the same person.
12 Okay. She's already testified.

13 All right. Mr. Decker, move on
14 to the next name.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
16 is Whitney Brown, commenting on 210755.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning. State your name for the record
19 and please proceed with your testimony.

20 MS. BROWN: Good morning,
21 everyone. My name is Whitney Brown and I
22 am the Policy Associate at Women Against
23 Abuse. I'm honored to speak with you
24 today about Resolution 210755.

25 On behalf of Women Against

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2 Abuse, our sister agencies, and the
3 survivors of domestic violence that we
4 serve, I want to thank City Council for
5 recognizing October as Domestic Violence
6 Awareness Month in Philadelphia.

7 As we prepare for this month,
8 it was impossible not to reflect on the
9 violence that has plagued our community
10 over the last year. City Council is very
11 aware of this, and we join them with both
12 anger and compassion as we hear about
13 shooting after shooting and death after
14 death in our city.

15 On behalf of our clients and
16 this month especially, we come with a
17 plea that our city's plans for addressing
18 the current level of the violence
19 consider the impacts of domestic
20 violence, which is often overlooked in
21 anti-violence strategies.

22 So let's think about it. If
23 those who are experiencing violence and
24 those who are perpetrating it are coming
25 from homes where violence is a way of

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2 life, how can we expect to see something
3 different in the streets? So we see this
4 cycle, and we can stop it. So let's
5 consider the ways in which violent and
6 controlling behaviors that for centuries
7 has been happening behind closed doors is
8 impacting our communities, and let's
9 acknowledge that what we're seeing on the
10 news and in our streets is just a tip of
11 the iceberg of what some people are
12 experiencing in their own homes. So we
13 know this.

14 And as far as policy goes, I
15 ask you all to consider whether you're
16 prepared to acknowledge, address, and
17 respond to your neighbors who are
18 experiencing domestic violence who need
19 support, those victims and people acting
20 abusively.

21 For example, do you have
22 hotline cards? Are you aware of safe
23 housing options to suggest to them? What
24 about therapeutic supports? And that's
25 just one side of what's needed. The

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2 other side is prevention.

3 So we ask ourselves, are we
4 advocating for teen dating violence
5 education in our neighborhood schools so
6 that our young people can learn about the
7 warning signs of abusive relationships
8 before they enter into them, so that they
9 can be ready with healthy communication
10 strategies, feel confident in talking to
11 their peers about violence and also know
12 where to go to for support? And we see
13 this cycle here in City Council and the
14 young people do too, and we can work
15 together to stop this.

16 In closing, while today is an
17 important day to officially recognize
18 Domestic Violence Awareness Month in our
19 city, we must also remember that every
20 day thousands of Philadelphians are
21 experiencing domestic violence, and we
22 have to better understand the connections
23 between all types of violence if we want
24 to effect change in our community.

25 We need your leadership, and we

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2 know you're up for the challenge. So,
3 again, I thank you in proclaiming October
4 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and
5 I urge you all to make it count.

6 Thanks again, and have a great
7 rest of your day.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much. Thank you for your
10 testimony. We appreciate it.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Jane Golden, commenting 210788.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning. State your name for the record
15 and please proceed with your testimony.

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
18 Golden?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Modesto, is she connected?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Modesto?

25 COUNCIL SUPPORT: We're trying

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2 to connect her, Council President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
4 right. Can we move on to Ms. Bell and
5 come back?

6 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
7 is Linda Bell, commenting on 210636.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 morning. Just state your name for the
10 record.

11 MS. BELL: Hi. Yes. My name
12 is Linda Bell, CPI alum. My testimony
13 today is in support of Ordinance 210636.
14 However, I also put in my further
15 testimony to oppose Ordinance 210205,
16 which reads as "An ordinance amending
17 Chapter 9 of Subcode PM ('The
18 Philadelphia Property Maintenance Code')
19 of Title 4 of The Philadelphia Code,
20 entitled 'Additional Special
21 Requirements,' to establish a program in
22 which the City may perform certain urgent
23 repairs and bill the property owner; all
24 under certain terms and conditions."

25 My opposition is in the

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2 presentation of the ordinance as is
3 without further instruction as to how
4 these urgent repairs would be identified,
5 the property owner notified, how
6 qualified workmen will be determined, and
7 the billing amount determined. I am
8 further requesting public hearings to
9 discuss such concerns and proposed
10 remedies.

11 What plans are in place to
12 offer financial assistance to those
13 property owners to assure that these
14 repairs will not contribute to the loss
15 of property by owner.

16 As a recipient of shoddy work
17 through the Weatherization Program,
18 without remedy, I would also ask that
19 strict regulations and inspection be
20 exercised, that the repairs do not cause
21 additional damage to property, and that
22 the repairs are inclusive of proper and
23 complete closure of repair site; i.e.,
24 drywall and cement.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you very much for your testimony.
4 We'll ask our technical staff to look and
5 review what you just indicated in your
6 testimony. Thank you so much. We
7 appreciate it.

8 Modesto, did we get Ms. Golden
9 back yet?

10 COUNCIL SUPPORT: Yes. She is
11 in, Council President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 There you go.

14 Good morning. State your name
15 for the record and please proceed with
16 your testimony.

17 MS. GOLDEN: Yes. My name is
18 Jane Golden and I am the Executive
19 Director of the Mural Arts Program in
20 Philadelphia. Yay! And I'm just really
21 thrilled that Council is introducing a
22 resolution to declare this Mural Arts
23 Month. I'm really grateful, Council
24 President, to you and all your colleagues
25 for years and years and years of support.

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2 We believe deeply and
3 passionately and tenaciously that art
4 should be used in the service of all the
5 citizens of our city, and we try every
6 single day to stretch every single city
7 dollar that we get as far as it can go
8 and do work in criminal justice,
9 behavioral health, education, and
10 community development.

11 We're thrilled that
12 Philadelphia is known internationally as
13 the City of Murals, that people come from
14 all over, that there's huge interest in
15 our city because of our commitment to
16 artists, to public art, and communities.

17 And during this month of
18 October, we're shining a light on the
19 communities we work with, on our
20 participants, our stakeholders, and our
21 artists. We have film screenings. We
22 have dedications, exhibitions, and panel
23 discussions. And if people go to our
24 website, muralarts.org, I hope you'll
25 find out about it. I hope you'll

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2 participate, and please become part of
3 the Mural Arts family.

4 And I just want you to know how
5 deeply committed and passionate we are
6 about this work. We want to do our work
7 tirelessly on behalf of citizens. We
8 want to shine a light on the incredible
9 artist community that we have. We have
10 fabulous arts organizations in the City,
11 and we feel that Mural Arts is a really
12 interesting nexus of bringing together
13 artists, communities, the public sector,
14 the private sector, working all on behalf
15 to make our city a more beautiful,
16 healthy, wonderful place.

17 And at the end of the day, we
18 have a saying, and that saying is that
19 art ignites change, and I say that to all
20 of you with the utmost seriousness,
21 because we get to see those changes in
22 individuals and communities and, by
23 extension, there's a giant change in the
24 City of Philadelphia as we've turned this
25 city into an outdoor museum. And I do

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2 not take it lightly that we are able to
3 do what we do every day because of the
4 extraordinary civic leaders who support
5 our work.

6 So thank you. Thank you from
7 the bottom of my heart.

8 Councilmember Kathy Gilmore
9 Richardson, thank you. Thank you, thank
10 you, thank you for introducing this.

11 And, Council President, thank
12 you for 25 years of supporting us, and
13 all of you. You know, just my gratitude
14 is huge, and we won't let you down.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 yay to your testimony, and thank you so
18 much. We appreciate what you do.

19 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
20 other speakers on the public comment
21 list, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Decker.

24 That concludes our public
25 comment session.

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2 Before we proceed with our
3 Resolution Consent Agenda, the Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Brooks.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
6 you, Council President.

7 Today I'm grateful to have my
8 resolution commemorating October 13th as
9 Dorothy Bolden Day. It's going to be
10 passed today in City Council.

11 Dorothy Bolden was a leader in
12 the civil rights and labor movement and
13 one of the first women to elevate unfair,
14 unsafe, undignified working conditions
15 that domestic workers face every day.

16 As many of us know, domestic
17 workers and farm workers were excluded
18 from federal labor protections because
19 these roles were typically performed by
20 people of color after slavery was
21 abolished. Today these workers still
22 lack many basic protections that all
23 other forms of work are granted.

24 Dorothy Bolden was not only a
25 pivotal figure in the fight for racial,

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2 gender, and economic justice, she was a
3 proud domestic worker. Domestic labor -
4 cleaning, cooking, providing childcare,
5 providing emotional and physical support
6 for families, maintaining a home - is
7 some of the hardest, most necessary work
8 in our society. It is the kind of work
9 that makes all other forms of labor
10 possible. I know this because I've been
11 a domestic worker. I know what it's like
12 to work in other people's homes and feel
13 undervalued, underpaid, and overlooked,
14 and that's why we need to recognize bold,
15 courageous women like Dorothy Bolden who
16 rejected mistreatment and asserted their
17 own dignity and power.

18 Ms. Bolden founded the National
19 Domestic Workers Union and inspired
20 generations of domestic workers who were
21 left out of essential labor protections
22 to organize together, demand better for
23 themselves and for each other and to
24 harness their collective power.

25 I put forth this resolution in

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2 partnership with National Domestic
3 Workers Alliance, the PA Chapter, and
4 with the support of many of my
5 colleagues, because too often Black women
6 movement leaders are overlooked in
7 history.

8 Her work exemplified the
9 approach to organizing and to politics
10 that I fully believe in, where it's not
11 about any one person, it's about
12 uplifting those around you, activating
13 working people to fight for justice.

14 I'm honored to have this body
15 recognize Dorothy Bolden Day next week on
16 what would have been her 98th birthday.
17 Let her memory remind us that in times of
18 struggle and hardship, it is all even
19 more important that we stand up for
20 what's right and show up for each other
21 and envision a better world.

22 So thank you, Council
23 President, and thank you to all of my
24 colleagues for your support.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 We will now move to our Consent

18 trades, and advocating strongly for the
19 benefits of labor unions.

20 Erin is a proud journey worker
21 with International Union of Painters and
22 Allied Trades, Local 2011. I am so
23 thrilled to honor Erin and all of her
24 exemplary accomplishments, but I also
25 wanted to take a moment to take a page

out of her book and talk about why more women should join the trade.

There are many paths for women that lead to higher-paying, family-supporting and sustaining work without having to take on debt for advanced degrees, and that's something I know very, very well. Fewer than 10 percent of women go into non-traditional careers, but these careers provide paid workforce training, benefits, and guaranteed employment opportunities.

If you're a woman interested in joining the trades, I urge you to visit philaworks.org/winc and get connected to Women in Nontraditional Careers, an amazing initiative that can help you better understand and prepare for all of those incredible opportunities.

You can also view my apprenticeship guidebook, which is available on PHLCouncil.com. It is a one-stop resource for learning about

opportunities in the trades here in the City of Philadelphia. And the goal of the guidebook is to really help demystify the application process for people who may never see themselves in the trades.

4 time. I had to hurry up and get it in
5 there.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
7 was waiting, because I knew you were
8 going to have something to say.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: So last
10 night I returned from a day trip to DC
11 where activists and elected officials and
12 faith leaders and working people from
13 across the country came together to
14 demand action from Congress and call on
15 them to pass the Build Back Better plan.
16 Yesterday we rallied, we marched, and we
17 prayed together to tell the Senate that
18 our communities cannot wait for action on
19 climate care, education, healthcare, and
20 infrastructure.

21 As my colleague Councilmember
22 Gilmore Richardson eloquently outlined in
23 her recent op-ed, democrats have a
24 historic opportunity to seize this moment
25 and take action in this climate crisis.

2 For communities in Philadelphia
3 that have been plagued by decades of
4 disinvestment, austerity, and
5 environmental racism, communities like
6 mine, that isn't just a question of
7 politics, it's a question of survival.

8 When we talk about lead pipes,
9 toxic schools, blight, air pollution, and
10 exposure to extreme weather events, we're
11 already damaging our health and
12 threatening our lives. We need
13 investment into public infrastructure,
14 green public schools, neighborhood
15 safety, and sustainable green industries
16 today. Actually, yesterday.

17 And while we need to keep up
18 the pressure on the Senate to deliver the
19 funding that our constituents desperately
20 need, we also need to look at our local
21 level to ensure that we are doing
22 everything to address the climate crisis
23 and support our communities.

24 One area that we should focus
25 on is protecting and stewarding community

2 ownership of green spaces. Community
3 gardens detoxify land, empower neighbors,
4 and produce healthy food and beautify our
5 city. They are safe havens for gun
6 violence and give young people education
7 and employment opportunities. And they
8 are currently under imminent threat due
9 to an irresponsible decision made in the
10 '90s to sell off vacant lots using U.S.
11 Bank liens. In order to protect these
12 spaces, our city must take action to
13 protect these sites from sheriff sale.

14 I know so many of us on this
15 Council body have been active in these
16 discussions on how to preserve community
17 gardens. This is not a new issue, but it
18 demands that we act with some urgency.

19 I want to thank Councilmember
20 Quinones-Sanchez in particular for her
21 dedication to this issue that impacts so
22 many spaces in her district. And I'd
23 also like to thank my colleagues on this
24 renewed effort, Sheriff Bilal and my
25 colleagues, Council President,

2 Councilmember Gym and Gauthier, as we
3 work to push for solutions to this
4 longstanding issue.

5 We will be reaching out soon
6 with more about this work, and I hope
7 many of my colleagues will join with us
8 going forward.

9 The climate crisis is not a
10 target that we could slowly approach. It
11 is here. It wreaks havoc on most of our
12 vulnerable community members each day.
13 Given this, it is our collective
14 responsibility to do everything in our
15 power to seek our local and federal
16 solutions to ensure survival and safety
17 for all Philadelphians.

18 So thank you so much,
19 colleagues.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 The Chair recognizes, on behalf
23 of the majority, Councilwoman Maria
24 Quinones-Sanchez.

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

3 moment to highlight and thank
4 Councilmember Brooks for their renewed
5 commitment, particularly for at-large
6 members, as we work through some of these
7 district issues on the issue of the U.S.

10 broken record, and I am a broken record,
11 but it's always important to have new
12 energy, new voices, new spaces. And
13 finding the intersection between those
14 green spaces and our environment and
15 healthy environment in neighborhoods are
16 so important. So I thank you, and I look
17 forward to working through this process
18 and sharing the 14 years experience and
19 frustration up to now.

20 But I rise again, as I've been
21 doing all month, it's Hispanic Month.
22 Tomorrow we have a very important
23 occasion and, again, another point of
24 intersection. I want to highlight and
25 recognize all of the members of the

2 LGBTQIA community, who for many years
3 have been incredible supporters of the
4 memory and the legacy of Gloria Casarez,
5 and their leadership took it upon
6 themselves and tomorrow we will bestow
7 the first Latino marker in the City of

9 Executive Director of the LGBTQ office
10 here in the City of Philadelphia under
11 the Nutter Administration.

12 And so, again, I want to thank
13 another point of intersectionality
14 between Hispanic Month, LGBTQI issues
15 that are important social justice issues
16 for us.

17 I ask if any of my members are
18 downtown -- any of my colleagues and
19 members are downtown tomorrow around
20 noon, we will be by the flagpole. Please
21 join us for a moment to recognize a
22 valiant woman. I know we're recognizing
23 women, women of color, trailblazers in
24 this Council, and I hope that becomes the
25 new norm as we write this history. It's

2 her story. It's our story.

3 But I thank all of the folks
4 from the community, look forward to
5 seeing you tomorrow.

14 Quickly, I just wanted to thank
15 my colleagues Councilmember Brooks and
16 also Sanchez for their remarks. It is
17 true that our city will not be able to
18 curb the climate crisis without federal
19 support, and we know that President Biden
20 has put out a plan that will finally
21 invest directly in the families and
22 communities here in our city that need it
23 most.

24 So we are humbly asking,
25 requesting, demanding that the Build Back

3 it's time to meet this historic moment
4 with action that will really transform
5 our nation by investing in our people, in
6 our communities, and in our planet. So I
7 just wanted to thank my colleagues for
8 that.

9 And, lastly, I wanted to thank
10 Councilmember Brooks for introducing and
11 passing the Dorothy Lee Bolden
12 resolution. Dorothy Lee Bolden was the
13 founder of the National Domestic Workers
14 Union, and she was a domestic worker. It
15 was my honor to vote in favor of this
16 resolution because my mother, Lorraine
17 Jenkins-Gilmore, and my grandmother, Eva
18 Jenkins, were both domestic workers here
19 in the City of Philadelphia back in the
20 '50s and the '60s. And back then, the
21 stories my mom told me was that they
22 would clean houses and take care of
23 families on the other side of Girard
24 Avenue, because back in the '50s you
25 couldn't go past a certain side on Girard

2 Avenue as a Black person here in our
3 city.

4 So I just wanted to rise on the
5 occasion of the passage of this
6 resolution to honor the memory of my
7 mother, Lorraine Jenkins-Gilmore, my
8 grandmother, Eva Jenkins, and all the
9 women and Black women around the world
10 who have served as domestic workers.

11 Thank you very, very much,
12 Councilmember Brooks, and thank you to
13 the National Domestic Workers Alliance.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President.

20 Last week we all looked in
21 horror as an individual entered Jefferson
22 Hospital and took the life of another
23 worker there. That individual then went
24 to a nearby high school, High School of
25 the Future, began shooting in the air,

2 where he was bravely approached by
3 members of the Philadelphia Police
4 Department, where he began then to shoot
5 at them and struck one in the face.

6 We have fought the fight and
7 continue to fight the fight against gun
8 violence, so much so that we have passed
9 a law November 2019 where we have a thing
10 called Red Flag Laws, which says that if
11 you observe, whether you're a school
12 principal or a spouse or a family member
13 or a co-worker, someone exhibiting crisis
14 within the mental health aspect -- and,
15 no, nobody always knows when someone is
16 going through something, but sometimes
17 it's kind of obvious -- and they
18 demonstrate that they are a danger to
19 themselves or a danger to others, that we
20 can petition the courts to have firearms
21 removed from their property, and within
22 five days, they have a right to go before
23 a judge to argue the case that they
24 should have their firearms returned.

25 In the case last week, the

2 individual that is alleged to have
3 committed these shootings had his guns
4 taken from him because he exhibited those
5 kinds of mental health crises, but then
6 they were returned back to him.

7 When we put -- when we go
8 through the steps, Mr. President, and you
9 have faced these kinds of obstacles at
10 risk of being sued personally to put laws
11 on the books, we intend for them to be
12 enforced by those individuals that have
13 sovereignty over, meaning the courts.

14 So if we can -- if somebody
15 tells you that I'm a danger on Monday, we
16 should believe them on Tuesday and take
17 steps on Wednesday to safeguard them from
18 themselves and to protect the community
19 from them.

20 So we have to use the tools on
21 our tool belt, Red Flag Laws, that can
22 protect us from individuals who are often
23 crying out for help, often off of
24 medication or experiencing some type of
25 life crisis that has pushed them to that

2 edge.

3 We can't predict every murder.
4 We can't be on every crime scene, but we
5 have some red flags that can be exhibited
6 so we can take action to protect
7 ourselves. And confiscation of firearms
8 from someone who has stated or exhibited
9 that they're about to go to the next
10 level with violence, we should take heed
11 on what they say.

12 And I encourage us to take a
13 look at that process and say how many
14 people have had guns confiscated since
15 2019 and how many of them have been
16 returned and what was the process and
17 judgments by which they were returned.

18 Some things we can't predict.
19 Some things we can't prevent, but there
20 are others that give us clear signs where
21 we can step up to the plate, take the
22 laws that are on the books and use them
23 for public safety.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

2 Thank you, Councilman. You are right on
3 point with that one.

4 The Chair recognizes
5 Councilwoman Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
7 you, Council President Clarke.

8 I too want to lend my voice to
9 the choir and say a special thank you to
10 our colleague Councilmember Brooks for
11 her resolution recognizing Dorothy Lee
12 Bolden, founder of the National Domestic
13 Workers Unions of America. And when
14 Councilmember Brooks first introduced
15 this resolution, for those whose
16 matriarchs actually did this work, it
17 could not not remind you of what those
18 experiences were like.

19 With that being said, I want to
20 lift up Dorothy Mae Parker, Viola Reed,
21 and Mary Foster. They were my
22 grandmother and two great aunts. And
23 when they migrated from Manning, South
24 Carolina, a place that they told me,
25 Mr. President, is so small that if you're

2 in a car and you blink your eyes, you
3 will pass it. That's how small and rural
4 the town was.

5 But they did the best they
6 could with what they had, took care of
7 other families. And you know that they
8 had no dignity, because as my grandmother
9 and Aunt Vi and Aunt Mary would say, they
10 did multiple houses, were paid under the
11 table, and people don't recognize that
12 these private employers took them out of
13 the tax system, because they left the
14 brown envelope on the table. So after
15 they would do their three or four
16 clients, they will go pick up their
17 envelopes, but they had no healthcare and
18 they had no retirement security.

19 So after mommy and Aunt Vi and
20 Aunt Mary were too old to get on their
21 knees and scrub baseboards in somebody
22 else's house, they ultimately had to be
23 dependent on government, dependent on
24 government to take care of them.

25 For those people who don't know

2 what that means, and I'm going to take
3 somebody back, but it means money and
4 books that comes in colors, that you
5 stand in line in a supermarket, and what
6 I did -- I can't speak for anybody else.
7 And I remember not wanting people to see
8 me have to use that money. So I would
9 wait and let people with other carts get
10 in front of me, because I didn't have
11 cash. I had the purple, the brown, the
12 green. That's what I had, Mr. President.

13 I also had -- because my
14 grandmother, who was my primary
15 caretaker, had no healthcare, we had a
16 blue medical card for me that was mailed
17 to the house, and that also meant that I
18 had to go with her to something called --
19 and I know it's archaic now, but I just
20 want to remind people from a history
21 perspective. It was called the 3-2
22 Center, and it was at Cheltenham and
23 Ogontz Avenue, and we would catch the XH
24 on a good day.

25 And, Councilmember Brooks, when

2 you talk about dignity, those women were
3 forced to stand in line and take that
4 money, and my grandmother could be in
5 good spirits, and after she left
6 sometimes, she was deflated.

7 Why, Mr. President? Because
8 the people sometimes who were there, they
9 didn't respect the people who were
10 dependent on government. They weren't
11 bad. It wasn't because she was bad. She
12 wasn't lazy, just home, but because she
13 didn't have the dignity of retirement
14 security, healthcare, and, to be quite
15 frank, a living wage from the people she
16 was cleaning for, it resulted in her
17 having to go there.

18 So I'm going to be a friend of
19 this movement. I want to thank
20 Councilmember Brooks again for her
21 leadership, thank Councilmember Katherine
22 Gilmore Richardson for that anecdote and
23 sharing that, because when people see us
24 here, sometimes they just think we like
25 topsy-turvy just arrived, and people have

2 got to know that we come from where they
3 come from, Mr. President.

4 So thank you so very much for
5 your leadership, Councilmember Brooks.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8 I think that concludes our
9 speeches today on the minority and the
10 majority.

11 And with that, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilmember Jones for a
13 motion to adjourn.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
16 adjourned until Thursday, October 14th,
17 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

18 (Duly seconded.)
