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COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Good

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afternoon. Council's Committee on Public

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Health and Human Services will come to

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order. Let me establish that we have a

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quorum in the presence of Councilman

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Greenlee, Councilman Kenney, Councilman

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Squilla, and Chair Councilwoman Tasco.

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We ask the Clerk to please read

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the bill.

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THE CLERK: Bill No. 140452, an

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ordinance amending Title 6 of The

5 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: We will
6 have our first witness, Nan Feyler, Chief
7 of Staff, Department of Public Health.

8 (Witness approached witness
9 table.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MS. FEYLER: Good afternoon.

13 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Would you
14 state your name for the record and begin
15 your testimony.

16 MS. FEYLER: Certainly. My
17 name is Nan, N-A-N, Feyler, F as in
18 Frank, E-Y-L-E-R.

19 Shall I begin?

20 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Yes,
21 please.

22 MS. FEYLER: Thank you. Good
23 afternoon, Chairwoman Tasco and members
24 of the Committee. I am Nan Feyler, Chief
25 of Staff of the Philadelphia Department

2 of Public Health. Thank you for this
3 opportunity to present testimony today on
4 Bill No. 140452, introduced by Councilman
5 Squilla.

6 The purpose of this bill is to
7 respond to the growing number of
8 businesses in Philadelphia which are a
9 menace to public health because of their
10 activities related to selling,
11 distributing or prescribing controlled
12 substances in exchange for compensation,
13 in a manner that is not in accord with
14 responsible professional medical
15 principles. These entities are sometimes
16 referred to as "pill mills."

17 This bill defines these
18 entities as, quote, a "nuisance health
19 establishment," end quote, and provides
20 criteria by which the Department of
21 Public Health may determine if an
22 establishment meets this definition.
23 Should the Department of Health find that
24 a business is a nuisance health
25 establishment and it is not corrected and

2 abated at the Department's direction by
3 the person responsible for it, the
4 Department will notify the Department of
5 Licenses and Inspections, which has the
6 legal authority to revoke the entity's
7 Commercial Activity License and take all
8 necessary steps to terminate the business
9 operations of the nuisance health
10 establishment.

11 We believe that this
12 legislation will provide a substantial
13 tool for removing a truly abusive form of
14 establishment from the City's
15 neighborhoods.

16 I understand that some
17 amendments have been proposed that are
18 agreed to by the sponsor and the
19 Administration, and the Department of
20 Health believes these amendments will
21 help clarify the bill and facilitate its
22 enforcement and, therefore, we support
23 them.

24 Thank you for this opportunity
25 to testify. On behalf of the Department

2 of Public Health, I am happy to answer
3 any questions.

4 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you
5 very much for your testimony.

6 Let me recognize Councilwoman
7 Maria Quinones-Sanchez, who is a member
8 of this Committee.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Squilla.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
12 Ms. Chairman.

13 Thank you, Nan, for coming here
14 today and testifying. During the process
15 of this bill in meeting and discussing,
16 do you believe that the Health Department
17 will be able to actually enforce this
18 legislation on, quote, "pill mills" or
19 nuisance health establishments, and what
20 do you think would need to be done by the
21 Administration to enable that to happen?

22 MS. FEYLER: I do -- I am
23 confident that we have the capacity and
24 the expertise to enforce this bill,
25 particularly with our partners from the

2 Department of Behavioral Health and
3 Licensing and Inspections. Frankly,
4 we've begun to have meetings with our
5 enforcement unit and our sanitarians, who
6 enforce the food code, and actually they
7 tell me this is fairly analogous to
8 shutting down illegal tattoo parlors. So
9 we actually even have some experience
10 with this kind of more serious concern in
11 terms of activity.

12 So I do believe it will happen
13 and I do believe that it will be done
14 fairly, and we're going to take several
15 months to make sure that we have all of
16 the systems in place with the Law
17 Department and the other partnering
18 agencies.

19 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Now, also
20 knowing what has happened in society
21 today where we see so many people
22 addicted to prescription medications and
23 overdosing on prescription medications,
24 do you see this as an additive help on
25 trying to maybe wrap our hands around

2 that or maybe put a dent in the illegal
3 prescribing of these type of drugs?

4 MS. FEYLER: I do, and I
5 think -- my hope is that it will not only
6 eliminate or shut down, wherever
7 possible, these illegal activities, which
8 I think not only are bad for the
9 neighbors but are really bad for the
10 consumers, it's not -- it's sort of the
11 antithesis of good public health. I also
12 am hoping that it will help to support
13 the fact that we do have legitimate
14 providers and methadone agencies and
15 others that are doing a service and need
16 to be supported.

17 So I actually think by
18 targeting it as a nuisance as we have, we
19 are really providing a public health
20 service.

21 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you
22 very much.

23 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Kenney.

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2 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
3 Madam Chair.

4 Your testimony was a little bit
5 confusing to me. Who is going to shut
6 them down, L&I or Health?

7 MS. FEYLER: L&I.

8 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Why can't
9 Health do it? You can shut down a
10 restaurant, right?

11 MS. FEYLER: Well, we actually
12 frankly can't right now. So now we
13 don't -- we're actually in the process of
14 engaging in developing a memorandum of
15 understanding with L&I because, frankly,
16 we would like to have that to streamline
17 the authority, but right now as of today,
18 when we go to shut down a restaurant, for
19 example, we call L&I.

20 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Really?

21 MS. FEYLER: And they come and
22 I guess it's candy stripe.

23 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Yeah, the
24 candy stripe placard. I always
25 thought you guys had -- you should have

2 the authority.

3 MS. FEYLER: Thank you very
4 much. We agree and L&I agrees.

5 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: It's just
6 more people doing it.

7 MS. FEYLER: I agree. And we
8 really want to streamline the team that
9 goes out for that reason, because unlike
10 food establishments where we can give
11 somebody an opportunity to remediate the
12 health hazards, we anticipate that this
13 is not going to be a situation where
14 there's not much they can do, because
15 it's kind of their core operation. So we
16 want to have that authority if we see the
17 indicators of a pill mill.

18 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: How do you
19 anticipate building a case against a doc
20 that's writing bad scripts?

21 MS. FEYLER: I think under the
22 nuisance law, the primary -- and we
23 amended it to make this clear. You must
24 be a health establishment that is
25 dispensing controlled substances against

2 commonly accepted practices, and we are
3 going to have someone who is a specialist
4 in that field from the Department of
5 Behavioral Health who will actually be
6 looking at medical records and we will --
7 I anticipate, although I don't know for
8 sure, but I anticipate the Law Department
9 will be like a phone call away as we make
10 some decisions, and then there will be
11 evidence from the inspection.

12 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: For years,
13 I mean, we grew up in neighborhoods where
14 there were bad docs who were writing bad
15 scripts for people who you knew were
16 addicted, and it was just kind of an
17 ongoing thing. It kind of, I guess, kept
18 them calm or whatever. It was like
19 almost their therapy, but it was bad
20 therapy for everybody. And they were --
21 do you find it difficult -- are there any
22 other restrictions relative to a person
23 being a licensed physician that would
24 change the way in which you build a case
25 against -- because some of the folks who

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2 run programs are not necessarily
3 licensed. They may be supervised by
4 licensed physicians.

5 MS. FEYLER: Well, that's an
6 interesting point. We are talking about
7 whether we need regulations, and
8 certainly there will be guidelines. I
9 think it's a good point that or if
10 somebody is practicing medicine without a
11 license. Actually, I think the issue is
12 we do not as a city have authority over
13 licensing providers. So I actually may
14 have spoke too soon in terms of our legal
15 authority. That's why this is really
16 fashioned as a nuisance, because we do
17 have that authority. But in any case,
18 that would be one of the factors that we
19 would look at.

20 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: And,
21 finally, the one suggestion I would make
22 is to try to coordinate with the health
23 insurance providers, because they want to
24 know where these guys are too, so that
25 they can take what action they need to

2 take, whether it's Blue Cross or Aetna or
3 whoever else, whose network they're in to
4 get them out of the network permanently,
5 because you really would like to remove
6 them from the network because they're
7 wasting money and they're hurting
8 people's health. So I think that would
9 be a good coordination effort with them.

10 MS. FEYLER: I think that's an
11 excellent suggestion. I do believe
12 Dr. Schwarz has begun some of the
13 conversations when we talked to the
14 Councilman, but I think that that's an
15 important hook.

16 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Great.
17 Thank you.

18 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: The Chair
19 recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez.

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
21 you.

22 I wanted to piggyback on what
23 Councilman Kenney was saying. During the
24 budget process, I was asking Dr. Evans
25 and Behavioral Health the questions

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2 around the pharmacies in light of all of
3 these pharmacies that have been popping
4 up, that clearly they're part of this
5 business. One of the things that
6 concerned me and as you guys are thinking
7 and working at where you're going to get
8 data from is, no one monitors the script
9 from the perspective of the insurance
10 provider or even CBH for those scripts
11 that we pay for that are subsidized. So
12 that as part of this work that you're
13 doing, if there's a way for someone to
14 begin to monitor that. And I use
15 examples, I have 12 pharmacies between
16 Germantown Avenue and Kensington on
17 Lehigh Avenue, and some of them are just
18 open two hours a day, but their clients
19 know when they're open. No one else
20 does, but they do. And so to the extent
21 that we're monitoring the script coming
22 out of a particular business or at least
23 work with the state around how do we
24 track that, clearly that pharmacy is
25 requesting reimbursements from somebody,

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2 and somebody has to have that information
3 to see the patterns that kind of exist.

4 So I think this is a good first
5 step, and clearly we need it, but to the
6 extent that we're talking to the state
7 because we don't license them, they
8 license -- the state does and then they
9 fail to regulate them. And so we need
10 them to step up their game.

11 MS. FEYLER: I think that's a
12 really good suggestion. It sort of does
13 dovetail, and I think that will probably
14 be more conversations with Commissioner
15 Arthur Evans. This is complaint based.
16 And we're going to be meeting with the
17 police, first because we need their
18 support I think when we go out to these
19 folks, but also they may even want to be
20 complainants in some ways.

21 But what I will say is that the
22 state right now, there is a bill, I
23 believe, pending that would have a
24 registry of all controlled substances
25 that are prescribed. Other states have

2 that. My understanding from Dr. Schwarz
3 is that it's not particularly popular
4 with a lot of constituents, so I don't
5 know how soon that would happen. It
6 won't be in place. But I agree with you,
7 there needs to be more systemic checks,
8 not just us responding. But I hope this
9 will have a deterrent effect if the word
10 gets out. We'll see. I think we'll
11 learn a lot.

12 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'd like
13 us to take it a step further and push the
14 state to see what it is they're willing
15 to share, because they have to own this.
16 The only thing we have is the code
17 enforcement, and it's L&I, but if they're
18 licensing these pharmacies, many times we
19 oppose them because they're literally
20 setting up across the street from other
21 pharmacies and they still get zoned
22 because they're in commercial places.
23 Somebody has to monitor them.

24 So to the extent that when we
25 make them aware that we are taking this

2 step and asking for their cooperation,
3 I'd like to see where they're going to
4 be. At some point we may have to bring
5 them down here. Because, again, they
6 license them, but they don't regulate
7 them and then we're stuck with them in
8 neighborhoods.

9 MS. FEYLER: I think that's a
10 good observation, that this really isn't
11 an easy regulatory role. We do believe
12 this is very sound. And Dr. Schwarz has
13 spoken to many partners on the state
14 level and I'm sure will be happy to
15 follow up.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: We'd
17 like to see that maybe after a few months
18 as this is in place, if there's gaps or
19 other things we need to do.

20 MS. FEYLER: Yeah. I think
21 that's kind of -- and I was actually
22 talking to some of the providers that are
23 testifying and we've talked to the
24 Councilman, that we probably won't start
25 enforcement for several months, but that

2 we do want to really track it and really
3 look at what we are learning and what we
4 don't learn, how are we dealing with
5 repeat complaints in the same place, et
6 cetera, et cetera.

7 So I do think we'll learn -- I
8 was on a national phone call with other
9 city municipal lawyers, and they were all
10 very, very excited about this. So maybe
11 we're cutting edge, huh?

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Maybe.

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
14 you, Madam Chair.

15 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you
16 very much.

17 Councilman Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: I just
19 want to follow up on Councilwoman
20 Sanchez. When we tried to work with the
21 state about the new bill that was
22 introduced -- and I know Dr. Schwarz and
23 the Administration was up there to try to
24 get input to see if we could have access
25 to the data, and they will not

2 disperse -- they said they wouldn't amend
3 the bill to give any municipality access
4 to it. And this wasn't like we wanted
5 access to people getting prescriptions;
6 just what doctors were prescribing what
7 prescriptions.

8 And so I think it's a long haul
9 through the state. I mean, I think this
10 is just a start. I think it's something
11 new. It is pretty innovative in how to
12 go about enforcing it, and I think
13 everybody will be looking at it to see
14 how it works. But I think at the end of
15 the day, if we keep the lines of
16 communication open with the state, with
17 all of the doctor and medical professions
18 that we have here in the City of
19 Philadelphia and get help from everybody,
20 I think we could hopefully nail this down
21 and rid the City of this problem.

22 MS. FEYLER: I agree. And if I
23 could just maybe add that I think that we
24 also in working with the state when I've
25 talked with Dr. Schwarz, it's important

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2 that they're partners in enforcement as
3 both criminal enforcement and licensing
4 enforcement and controlled substance. So
5 I'm hoping that this will demonstrate the
6 need and the capacity, and as I said,
7 this is an issue nationwide, so I look
8 forward to keeping you posted.

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

10 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Any more
11 questions?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Thank you
14 very much for your testimony.

15 MS. FEYLER: Thank you.

16 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Next,
17 Dr. Curtis Miyamoto.

18 (Witness approached witness
19 table.)

20 DR. MIYAMOTO: Good afternoon.
21 My name is Curtis Miyamoto. I'm the
22 President of the Philadelphia County
23 Medical Society and the Chairman of
24 Radiation Oncology at Temple University
25 Hospital. I've been practicing medicine,

2 oncology, in the City now for over 20
3 years.

4 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Would you
5 speak into the mic.

6 DR. MIYAMOTO: Sorry. Is that
7 better? Do you want me to start over?

8 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: No.
9 That's fine.

10 DR. MIYAMOTO: I've been
11 practicing in the City for over 20 years
12 oncology, so this is an issue that is
13 particularly near and dear to my heart,
14 and I'm sure you'll have some questions
15 for me.

16 The Philadelphia County Medical
17 Society is a vibrant multi-specialty
18 county medical society with several
19 thousand members. Our members are not
20 only from the specialties, but also from
21 primary care. They encompass academic,
22 attending physicians, as well as private
23 practices. So we are pretty much a
24 representative of the physicians in the
25 City.

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2 Our members share a common
3 belief of the prime importance of the
4 physician-patient relationship to good
5 medical decision-making. We strive to
6 not only be a consensus voice for
7 physicians, and that's why I'm here, but
8 also to serve as a trusted information
9 source to our practitioners on the many
10 complex regulatory and health policy
11 issues that affect the way and sometimes
12 our ability to deliver healthcare.

13 On behalf of the Philadelphia
14 County Medical Society, we want to thank
15 you for the opportunity to comment and
16 support Bill 140452, the nuisance health
17 establishment ordinance introduced by
18 Councilman Squilla. This bill comes as a
19 recommendation that City Council shift
20 focus from using zoning overlay districts
21 to compliance as a more effective way to
22 address the growing problem of nefarious
23 pill mills and alternative approaches to
24 dealing with methadone clinics.

25 After the introduction of Bill

2 No. 140452 in May, the Philadelphia
3 County Medical Society has provided
4 additional comments that have now been
5 incorporated into the ordinance -- so it
6 does have physician support -- by the
7 City's Law Department that better defines
8 a nuisance health establishment. I would
9 add there that there's a little bit of
10 concern that came out after this document
11 was written about armed guards,
12 especially at emergency rooms and at
13 crisis centers, that they are going to be
14 there on a regular basis, and we would
15 ask for maybe a little of special
16 dispensation with the regulation here
17 about armed guards in those locations.

18 We support Bill No. 140452, as
19 amended, and feel it is constructed
20 narrowly enough to not be an impediment
21 to law-abiding medical practices and
22 physicians in the City.

23 We wish to thank you for the
24 opportunity to speak before you today.

2 very much. I was just getting a little
3 tidbit from my Councilmember here.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Squilla.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
7 and thank you for testifying. We
8 appreciate your support of the bill.

9 The one thing that the
10 amendment actually does is, if people are
11 working in the medical profession and
12 doing it by the standards of the medical
13 profession, the other instances and what
14 we call the B list of armed guards, cash
15 business, loitering never comes into
16 effect. So if you're properly giving out
17 prescriptions and doing what it is under
18 the guise of what an establishment does
19 for the medical field, you would never
20 have to worry about ever coming into the
21 armed guard situation or the paper cash
22 or loitering or drug activity outside
23 your facility.

24 DR. MIYAMOTO: Very good.

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Nan, is
4 that right?

5 MS. FEYLER: Correct.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

7 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you
8 so much for your testimony and we
9 appreciate you coming.

10 DR. MIYAMOTO: Thank you.

11 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Next we
12 have Dr. Anand Rao. I hope that's
13 correct.

14 (Witness approached witness
15 table.)

16 DR. RAO: Thank you,
17 Councilwoman Tasco. It's Anand Rao.

18 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Anand Rao.
19 Thank you.

20 DR. RAO: I want to thank the
21 members of the Committee for allowing me
22 to speak today. My name is Dr. Anand V.
23 Rao and I currently serve as a member of
24 the Board of Governors of the
25 Philadelphia County Dental Society and as

2 a member of the Board of Trustees of the
3 Pennsylvania Dental Association.

4 The Philadelphia County Dental
5 Society is a professional organization
6 founded in 1886 and composed of almost
7 600 member dentists practicing in
8 Philadelphia and committed to serving the
9 oral healthcare needs of the region. It
10 is a component dental society of the
11 American Dental Association, the nation's
12 largest dental association, representing
13 157,000 dentist members. The premier
14 source of oral health information, the
15 ADA has advocated for the public's health
16 and promoted the art and science of
17 dentistry since 1859.

18 I want to thank you for
19 allowing me to submit testimony today,
20 and I wish to thank Councilman Mark
21 Squilla for taking into consideration the
22 concerns we previously expressed about
23 zoning legislation he had been
24 considering that would create additional
25 barriers for new and expanding dental

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2 practices in his district.

3 New dentists who are making a
4 decision about where to practice are not
5 going to be willing to jump through the
6 hoops of seeking zoning variances when
7 they can go into the more affluent
8 suburbs and start a practice with lower
9 taxes and fewer uninsured patients.

10 Here in Philadelphia, access to
11 quality dental care has already become
12 more difficult. In 2009, there were 941
13 professionally active dentists in
14 Philadelphia, down 8.6 percent from 2000,
15 and 38 percent of those were aged 55 and
16 over. Meanwhile, dental emergencies are
17 filling our city's already strained
18 emergency rooms and health clinics.
19 Philadelphia must do more to attain and
20 retain dentists to its neighborhoods to
21 help break down the barriers to care that
22 drive people to emergency rooms. The
23 inability to surmount the barriers to
24 oral healthcare can result in delayed
25 diagnosis, untreated oral diseases and

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2 conditions, compromised overall health
3 status, and occasionally even death.

4 We applaud Councilman Squilla's
5 efforts to address the community's
6 concerns by amending Title 6 of The
7 Philadelphia Code by adding a new Chapter
8 6-1100, entitled "Nuisance Health
9 Establishments," and by amending Section
10 19-2602 ("Licenses"), providing for
11 identification and closure of nuisance
12 health establishments, under certain
13 terms and conditions. We hope that by
14 amending the Health Code Council will see
15 no further need to explore zoning changes
16 that would have a negative effect on
17 dentists who are considering opening new
18 practices in the City.

19 We thank Councilman Squilla,
20 his Council colleagues, our colleagues at
21 the Philadelphia County Medical Society,
22 and all those who participated in
23 crafting this legislation for their
24 thoughtful diligence in assuring that
25 there is a reasonable balance between the

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2 needs of the treatment facilities while
3 protecting the local community so that
4 Philadelphia's citizens will have access
5 to all of the health services they need.

6 Thank you, and if you have any
7 additional questions for me, I'd be happy
8 to answer them.

9 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Thank you
10 very much for your testimony. Thank you
11 for taking time to come out and share.
12 We appreciate it.

13 DR. RA0: Thank you.

14 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Thank you.
15 No questions.

16 DR. RA0: Wonderful. Thank
17 you.

18 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Thank you.
19 Ms. Kimberly Walker.

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Kimberly
22 Walker.

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Is there
25 anyone else here to testify on this bill?

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2 (No response.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Okay.

4 This closes our public hearing and we
5 will now go into our public meeting.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Squilla to offer an amendment to Bill
8 140452.

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.
10 I'd like to offer an amendment to Bill
11 No. 140452.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: It has
14 been moved and seconded that Bill No.
