3 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Members, please take your
10 seats. I note that the hour has
11 come and that a quorum of this
12 Council is present. I'm asking for
13 all visitors to please retire
14 outside the rails. But before
15 proceeding, I will ask all those
16 present to please set your cell
17 phones on silent and/or vibrate.
18 But most importantly, please take
19 all sidebar conversations outside
20 of the Council chambers.

21 How's everybody doing
22 today?

23 (Good.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

1 5/29/25 - STATED - INVOCATION

2 JOHNSON: To give our invocation
3 this morning, the Chair recognizes
4 Rabbi Eli Freedman of Rodeph
5 Shalom. He is here today as the
6 guest of Councilmember Rue Landau.

7 I will ask all members
8 and guests to please rise.

9 (Councilmembers, guests
10 and visitors rise.)

11 RABBI FREEDMAN: Good
12 morning. Thank you, Council
13 President Kenyatta Johnson and
14 esteemed members of City Council.
15 It's a privilege to honor this
16 invocation this morning on behalf
17 of Councilmember Rue Landau, who
18 had her bat mitzvah at our
19 congregation Rodeph Shalom just a
20 few years ago.

21 And to recognize Jewish
22 American Heritage, (inaudible) with
23 lifts up. The many ways Jewish
24 Americans have helped shape this

2 nation through civic leadership,
3 cultural creativity and moral
4 courage here in Philadelphia, that
5 story runs deep.

6 Just a few blocks from
7 this chamber is our very own
8 Weitzman National Museum of
9 American Jewish History, a landmark
10 that reminds us of immigrant
11 journeys, community resilience and
12 enduring contributions by Jewish
13 Americans, those like Rebecca
14 Gratz, born right here in 1781 who
15 spent her life advocating for
16 education and social welfare for
17 women and children. And that
18 spirit continues today.

19 And people like our
20 congregant Michael Solomonov who
21 has brought Jewish culture to the
22 national table, literally through
23 the food that tells the story of
24 memory, joy and resilience. But to

2 honor this heritage, honestly we
3 must acknowledge the moment that we
4 are in, even as we celebrate these
5 contributions.

6 Jewish communities face
7 a painful rise in antisemitism here
8 and across the country. We've seen
9 it in threats to synagogues and
10 schools and public rhetoric, in
11 acts of violence and fear. I am
12 proud to say that Philadelphia has
13 responded with resolve.

14 Our city and state
15 leaders have shown up not just in
16 statements, but in partnership and
17 in concrete actions. We are
18 grateful for the commitment shown
19 by this City Council to ensure that
20 Jewish Philadelphians feel safe,
21 heard and protected. And still, we
22 must be clear-eyed.

23 Antisemitism is not only
24 rising, it is also being

2 manipulated. Too often it's being
3 used as a political weapon, not to
4 protect Jewish communities but to
5 divide others. Not to build
6 bridges, but to burn them.

7 This is not solidarity.
8 It is opportunism and it undermines
9 the real work of justice. Jewish
10 tradition teaches tzedek, tzedek
11 tirdof; justice, justice you shall
12 pursue. The repetition is
13 intentional. It reminds us that we
14 are accountable not only for what
15 we stand for, but how we stand for
16 it.

17 In facing hate, we must
18 not mirror it. We must lead with
19 courage, not fear; with compassion,
20 not with contempt, with community,
21 not with division. Our tradition
22 teaches that every human being is
23 created B'tzelem Elohim, in the
24 image of God.

2 This sacred idea calls
3 us to recognize the divine spark in
4 each person and to build a society
5 rooted in dignity, responsibility
6 and care. In this chamber may that
7 truth not only be spoken but
8 enacted. May B'tzelem Elohim guide
9 our policies, shape our debates and
10 remind us that the work of justice
11 belongs to all of us, and
12 especially to those entrusted with
13 the power to lead. Amen.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

18 Council President, on the behalf of
19 the Minority party I would like to
20 request one leave of absence today

22 on the occasion of we might have a

3 JOHNSON: The Chair thanks the
4 Minority Leader and leave will be

6 The Chair now recognizes

15 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

16 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
17 Mr. President.

18 I move that any of the
19 following matters, if considered
20 today, may be added to the agenda
21 for this session of Council, and as
22 required by law, subsequently
23 published on an amended agenda

3 JOHNSON: It has been moved and
4 properly seconded that the
5 legislative matters stated by
6 Councilmember Majority Leader
7 Gilmore Richardson may be added to
8 the agenda for today should those
9 matters arise during the course of
10 this session of Council.

11 All those in favor will
12 signify by saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
19 motion carries.

20 The Chair will dispense
21 with the regular order of business
22 to recognize the guests and
23 visitors joining us in chambers
24 this morning.

2 On behalf of all members
3 of City Council, I welcome you to
4 our Council session. We appreciate
5 your taking the time to join us as
6 we attend to the legislative
7 affairs of our great city. We
8 certainly invite you to come again.

9 I want to take a moment
10 to acknowledge former staff member
11 of Councilmember Curtis Jones, who
12 is now the Chairperson of the
13 Philadelphia Delegation State
14 Representative Morgan Cephas.
15 Could you please stand please?

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilman Curtis Jones,
20 who will present a resolution
21 honoring the dynamic, outstanding,
22 hard-working, cool, outgoing
23 gentleman by the name of Tumar
24 Alexander.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: A dedicated public
5 servant on the occasion of his
6 retirement from Philadelphia city
7 government. Would Mr. Alexander
8 and those accompanying him please
9 join Councilmember Jones at the
10 podium.

11 Joining Councilmember
12 Curtis Jones is Councilmember and
13 Majority Leader Katherine Gilmore
14 Richardson, Councilmember Jim
15 Harrity, Minority Leader
16 Councilmember Kendra Brooks,
17 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young,
18 Deputy Whip Councilmember Cindy
19 Bass, Councilmember Jamie Gauthier,
20 Councilman Quetcy Lozada,
21 Councilmember Rue Landau,
22 councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad and
23 Appropriations Chairman
24 Councilmember Mark Squilla.

2 (Councilmembers, guests
3 and visitors approached podium.)

4 COUNCILMAN JONES:

5 Ladies and gentlemen,
6 Councilmembers, staff, supporters
7 of Tumar Alexander, before there
8 was Scandal and Olivia Pope in
9 Washington, D.C., there was Tumar
10 Alexander of City Hall.

11 Tumar survived four
12 mayors-and-a-half, eight years of
13 peace. The first time when he
14 left, you know, every eight years
15 there's a slaughter of staffers and
16 people wind up getting fired. And
17 Tumar didn't wait around for the
18 people to come around the hallway.
19 He said, I'm out of here. He went
20 to go work for City Blue --

21 MR. ALEXANDER:

22 Sneakervilla.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES:

24 Sneakervilla. I'm sorry. So Mayor

2 Nutter went down to the store where
3 he worked and offered him \$10,000
4 come-back-home bonus. I heard
5 about it, right, and a pair of
6 sneakers, right, to come back to
7 work, which he came back.

8 One of the telling
9 things about -- now, I pray that my
10 staff always do what you did. I
11 don't care what Mayor he worked
12 for. When he put that jersey on,
13 he was loyal. You couldn't talk
14 him out of it. He was 100% ten
15 toes down for that mayor.

16 So before we start the
17 actual -- bear with me,
18 Mr. President. There are two
19 stories I'm going to tell. The
20 first one was I'm a freshman --
21 statute of limitations ain't over.
22 The first one, there's a time,
23 colleague, when the administration
24 always comes up and says, tell me

3 priorities, which things do you

4 really want.

5 So I got the fixer here,

6 came in my office. And I was all

7 impressed because I've never

8 experienced that before. So we go

9 through and listen. And you know

10 how I am, Mr. President. It was

11 long as hell. I had world peace on

12 here, global warming, stop the wars

13 around the world. And this guy, he

14 looks, leans in and he's checking

15 things and he's asking questions.

16 I'm feeling good about my list.

17 And then he took the

18 list, and I'm going to tell you how

19 he -- he put it in his vest check

20 it like this. And I said --

21 you still got it?

22 MR. ALEXANDER: No.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: And

24 he said, we got you. So I ran down

2 to chambers, Harrity. I voted for
3 the bill. I voted for the budget.
4 And then when you get the details
5 of it, I'm looking for my stuff.
6 Nothing's on there except one
7 thing. And I ran to him, Tumar,
8 you told me you were going to take
9 care of every one of those pieces.
10 And he said, I am, but you didn't
11 think all in the first year, did
12 you. I said, he got me. All
13 right. So that was the first time.
14 Second time I've been a
15 little more seasoned. And every
16 year, like when you go into the
17 schoolyard, you look for the
18 schoolyard bully. One
19 department -- not you, the
20 department. You look for a
21 department that you're going to
22 make your bones on. I ask you the
23 hard questions until I get the
24 right answers. So Tumar got wind

2 of this. You remember this --

3 yeah, you remember.

4 And so, he pulled me
5 aside. He said, Councilman, can we
6 work this out outside of the mics.
7 We'll come down. I promise you
8 we're going to take care of that
9 department, your concerns. I'm not
10 going to say the department because
11 then you'll know the person. And I
12 trusted again Tumar. He's a fixer.
13 He's the Mayor's emissary.

14 So I said, all right.
15 I'm going to take this off. I'm
16 not going to ask any hard
17 questions. And he said, we'll get
18 right on it. A whole year goes by.
19 He don't come down. He's ducking
20 me. He doesn't come. So we get
21 back to budget cycle. I said, all
22 right, I'm going to do this.

23 He comes back in and
24 says, Councilman, can we work this

2 out? I'm still waiting for the
3 first meeting, but I did it -- I
4 actually did (inaudible) that. You
5 know who it is, and I've learned
6 how to ask questions. So at the
7 end of the day, before we read this
8 citation good things come from
9 North Philadelphia. Tumar
10 Alexander is an example of that.

11 And full circle, he's
12 going back to North Philadelphia to
13 make the next Tumars, the next
14 young leaders that will be -- he's
15 molding those young minds. Because
16 if you haven't created your
17 successor, you're negating your
18 job. And I'm so very proud to call
19 you my friend.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

22 RICHARDSON: Therefore, great
23 things come from North Philadelphia
24 and also from the Phi Beta Sigma

2 Fraternity, Inc. of which Tumar
3 Alexander is a member.

4 Today, the members of
5 Philadelphia City Council are
6 honoring and recognizing the career
7 of Tumar Alexander, a dedicated
8 public servant on the occasion of
9 his retirement from the city
10 government.

11 Whereas, Tumar Alexander
12 is a lifelong Philadelphian by way
13 of North Philadelphia, proud member
14 of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.,
15 seasoned public servant whose 24
16 years of dedicated service to the
17 City of Philadelphia have spanned
18 across four mayoral
19 administrations, exemplifying a
20 profound commitment to the city's
21 growth and well-being; and

22 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

23 Tumar, I promise I ain't telling no
24 stories, no stories. We started

2 out together in the Mayor's

3 administration for Street.

4 Actually, I don't want him telling

5 any stories.

6 Whereas, Tumar attended

7 William Penn High School and

8 Pennsylvania State University,

9 where he earned a degree in

10 Political Science, laying the

11 foundation for his distinguished

12 career in public service; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: I

14 first must reiterate good things

15 come out of North Philadelphia.

16 Whereas, throughout his

17 distinguished career, Alexander has

18 held key roles in operations,

19 policy, legislative and internal

20 Affairs, consistently demonstrating

21 leadership and vision in various

22 capacities that have directly

23 impacted the efficiency and

24 effectiveness of city government;

4 Whereas -- Mr. President, may I
5 take a point of personal privilege
6 for a second please?

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Yes, you may.

9 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: I've
10 never had an opportunity to do
11 this. And so, folks who do not
12 know it was October of 2003. I'm
13 walking into then Councilmember
14 Darrell Clarke's office. And I see
15 this guy sitting there just waiting
16 for me. I'm nervous. Don't know
17 what to do. This is my first
18 opportunity to work anywhere ever.

19 I'm a senior in high
20 school and I see this guy sitting
21 there waiting for me. His name is
22 Tumar Alexander. Like Tumar,
23 whatever. I mean, I was a high
24 school kid. I mean, you know. So

2 I meet Tumar. And so many years
3 later, Tumar has been my big
4 brother, my mentor, my friend, my
5 confidant. He paid for my seat
6 deposit for law school when I
7 didn't have it, and I didn't even
8 go to that law school, ended up
9 going somewhere else, right.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: So
12 I've never had the chance to
13 publicly do this because he's
14 always been in government, but he's
15 a year and four months out. I just
16 want to say thank you so much, Big
17 bro, because I would not be here
18 but for your leadership but for
19 your mentorship.

20 You look up mentor in
21 the dictionary, you will see Tumar
22 Alexander. He has mentored
23 countless, countless young people.
24 He has a tree of people all around

2 city government, in business and
3 nonprofit sector. This is the
4 definition of what a mentor is and
5 I would not be here but for his
6 guidance.

7 So, Big Brother, I want
8 to say thank you again and again
9 and again. And I know, you know,
10 when that happened last year, a
11 couple years ago, you were just
12 smiling from ear to ear, although
13 we couldn't talk about it.

14 But whereas, Alexander's
15 journey into public service began
16 with his volunteer work on former
17 Mayor John F. Street's campaign,
18 set the stage for his rise through
19 the ranks of Philadelphia politics;
20 and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
22 Well, this is just going to be a
23 long presentation because
24 everybody's got a Tumar story, I'm

2 not going to go into any Tumar
3 stories. But I will say, listen,
4 we thank you and we love you and
5 we're going to miss you.

6 And I can tell you one
7 of my key pieces of legislation is
8 stop-and-gos. You know, Tumar
9 helped me all the way through. I
10 just can't tell you how much I love
11 you and appreciate you so we're
12 going to miss you.

13 Whereas, Tumar Alexander
14 served with distinction as Chief of
15 Staff in the Managing Director's
16 Office during Mayor Street's
17 administration, demonstrating
18 exceptional leadership and a
19 commitment to this city; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
21 Whereas, during the administration
22 of former Mayor Michael Nutter,
23 Alexander served as Deputy Mayor
24 and as Chief liaison to City

2 Council, facilitating cooperation
3 and strengthening the relationship
4 between the executive branch and
5 the legislature; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

7 Whereas, in January 2016 Mayor Jim
8 Kenney hired Alexander to serve as
9 the Director of Legislative and
10 External Affairs for the Managing
11 Director's Office, where he played
12 a pivotal role in bridging the gap
13 between the executive branch and
14 key legislative and community
15 partners; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

17 Love you, Tumar. Whereas,
18 Alexander's outstanding performance
19 and leadership in this role led to
20 his promotion in January 2019 when
21 he was named First Deputy Managing
22 Director and Gladiator, taking on
23 an even greater level of
24 responsibility in managing the

2 City's operation and overseeing the
3 essential work of city departments;
4 and

5 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

6 Whereas, in October 2020 Alexander
7 assumed the role of Managing
8 Director, where he continued to
9 demonstrate exemplary leadership
10 and a steadfast commitment to
11 building sustainable infrastructure
12 within and across the city's
13 departments, ensuring the efficient
14 delivery of high-quality services
15 to the public; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

17 Whereas, through his various roles
18 in city government Alexander has
19 worked tirelessly to ensure that
20 the city operates effectively and
21 that its residents receive the best
22 possible services, making
23 significant contributions to the
24 operation and successes of the city

2 of Philadelphia; and

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

4 And, Tumar, I've been here since

5 your first day.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: And

8 I have to say I was over here

9 talking to Tumar, and I said, just

10 thank you. He always helped and he

11 always came through. And I don't

12 remember one time calling him where

13 it wasn't an emergency where I

14 couldn't figure out what to do and

15 Tumar took care of it, and that was

16 consistent. And, Tumar, you'll

17 really be missed.

18 Whereas, Tumar's

19 dedication, resilience and

20 unwavering focus on making

21 Philadelphia a better place for all

22 its residents has earned him

23 respect, admiration and gratitude

24 from this City Council, his

2 colleagues, the Mayor's office, and
3 the citizens he serves; now,
4 therefore, be it;

5 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

6 RICHARDSON: Resolved, by the
7 Council of the City of
8 Philadelphia, that it hereby honors
9 and recognizes the career of Tumar
10 Alexander, a dedicated public
11 servant on the occasion of his
12 retirement from city government;

13 And further resolve,
14 that an Engrossed copy be presented
15 to Tumar Alexander in admiration
16 and awe of this legislative body.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
20 Tumar Alexander for remarks.

21 MR. ALEXANDER: Thank
22 you. Thank you, Council President.
23 Thank you, Councilmembers. Two of
24 the stories Curtis told was not

2 true. I just want to tell you all
3 that from the start. The one that
4 is true is his freshman list of
5 about four pages long as I
6 remember. He actually signed it
7 for me after a few years.

8 But let me just start by
9 saying, first I just like to thank
10 God, my family, my grandmother, my
11 grandfather, people who are not
12 here to see this and see that this
13 kid from North Philly who tried to
14 just every day make my family
15 proud, make my mother proud, make
16 people I grew up with proud and
17 just come to city government and
18 serve people.

19 My first time in City
20 Hall was an internship with City
21 Commissioner Alex Talmadge after
22 meeting him at a workshop at my
23 high school when I think I was
24 10th, 11th grade. Sultan Ahmad,

2 who's now deceased, all of my
3 mentors, a lot of my mentors aren't
4 here with me so I'm just standing
5 on their shoulders and trying to be
6 an example. And also as
7 Councilmember Young said, trying to
8 lift up people along the way.

9 So I think you all know
10 I don't really like being in the
11 limelight or standing up here
12 hearing a long resolution, because
13 for me it ain't about none of that.
14 It's just about serving people and
15 working and kind of waking up every
16 day with a purpose and living that
17 purpose.

18 It was a few months ago
19 where I had to call the Mayor and
20 say to her, you know, I think it's
21 time for a change for me. And that
22 wasn't a call I took lightly. It
23 wasn't a decision I made lightly,
24 but it was a decision and I knew I

2 had to make for my growth, for my
3 family's growth.

4 We just welcomed -- I
5 have a baby girl, 1 year old.

6 (Applause.)

7 MR. ALEXANDER: My
8 girlfriend and I -- and they
9 couldn't be here because my baby
10 girl was a little under the
11 weather, but it was just time to
12 step back, take a break and figure
13 out what's next.

14 And lo and behold, I
15 kind of came a little bit full
16 circle. Jeff told you all about
17 meeting him when he was a high
18 school senior member at Girard
19 College. And now, I have an
20 opportunity to work at Girard
21 College as their Vice-president of
22 Operations.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. ALEXANDER: And for

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 the last three months, I've had the
3 pleasure of working with some of
4 the most amazing young people in
5 this city in I would say a little
6 place in North Philly, but actually
7 it's about 43 acres sitting in the
8 heart of North Philadelphia where
9 they're producing some amazing
10 young people and amazing scholars
11 each and every day. And I'm just
12 proud to be a small, small, small
13 spoke in the wheel to help that
14 support out.

15 In closing, I just want
16 to say I thank everybody. Of
17 course, the work of government
18 continues. Of course, I'm proud of
19 you all sitting in this Council and
20 the work that you do each and every
21 day for the citizens of Philly.

22 Curtis, I will say
23 you've been my big brother, but
24 you're also like a stepdad because

2 my work mom Ms. Jazelle Jones --

3 Jazelle, stand up.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. ALEXANDER: I try to

6 always make sure, Councilmember, we

7 kept the work relationship and your

9 So when I would talk to Jazelle

10 about that list, she kind of gave

11 you the priority of it. That's why

12 it took so long.

13 But I will say if you

14 think back to that list, we did

15 some amazing things together and

16 you did some amazing things in your

17 District, right, Wynne Ballroom,

18 Brith Sholom House and just a bunch

19 of other things. And that's just

20 indicative of you all and the work

21 that you all do.

22 So again, just thank

23 you. Thank you for this

24 opportunity, thank you for this

2 recognition. Me and my family
3 appreciate it.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Congratulations. Council
7 will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilmember Dr. Nina
12 Ahmad who will present a resolution
13 on my behalf of thanking A. Bruce
14 Crawley, founder of Millennium 3 --

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: Founder of Millennial 3
18 Management, the African American
19 Chamber of Commerce and a founding
20 member of Visit Philadelphia for
21 his decades of leadership and
22 invaluable contributions to the
23 business hospitality and political
24 communities in Philadelphia.

2 Will Mr. Crawley and all
3 those accompanying him please join
4 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad at the
5 podium. And joining Dr. Nina Ahmad
6 are the following individuals:

7 Deputy Whip Councilmember Cindy
8 Bass, Majority Leader Councilmember
9 Katherine Gilmore Richardson, Chair
10 of Labor Councilmember Jim Harrity
11 and Minority Leader Councilmember
12 Kendra Brooks.

13 (Councilmembers, guests
14 and visitors approach podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: This is like the original
17 revolutionary in the City of
18 Philadelphia.

19 So go ahead. Dr. Nina
20 Ahmad, the floor is yours.

21 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 Before I start, I just
24 want to take just a moment to

2 acknowledge the mentorship that I
3 have received from Bruce Crawley as
4 someone who doesn't have a long,
5 you know, I wasn't born in this
6 city. I didn't go to high school
7 here and this is someone who has

10 So I'm very grateful to
11 you, Bruce. And I just wanted to
12 make sure that we acknowledge you,
13 and I'm doing this on behalf of the
14 Council President as well. This is
15 his resolution.

16 So a resolution thanking
17 A. Bruce Crawley, founder of
18 Millennium 3 Management, the
19 African American Chamber of
20 Commerce and a founding member of
21 Visit Philadelphia for his decades
22 of leadership and invaluable
23 contributions to the business,
24 hospitality and political

2 communities in Philadelphia.

3 Whereas, A. Bruce

4 Crawley holds a Bachelor's of

5 Science in Marketing and Management

6 from St. Joseph's University and a

7 Master's Degree in Journalism from

8 Temple University, laying the

9 foundation for a distinguished

10 career in business, communications

11 and public service; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

13 RICHARDSON: And whereas, in 1989

14 Mr. Crawley founded Crawley Haskins

15 Sloan PR & Advertising and served

16 as President, further contributing

17 to the growth of the communications

18 and public relations industries;

19 and

20 Whereas, in 1993, he

21 founded the Philadelphia African

22 American Chamber of Commerce and

23 served as Chairman for 13 years,

24 significantly advancing the

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 economic interests of African
3 American businesses in the region;
4 and

5 Whereas -- I'm adding
6 this clause -- in 2000 I had the
7 opportunity to initially meet A.
8 Bruce Crawley while working for
9 former Councilmember Blondell
10 Reynolds Brown.

11 And whereas, in 2006 he
12 founded Millennium 3 Management,
13 Inc., a full service marketing and
14 communications firm where he
15 currently serves as President and
16 principal owner; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: It's
18 North Philly Day here today.
19 Whereas, Crawley has been deeply
20 involved in Philadelphia's
21 hospitality industry, serving as a
22 member of the Philadelphia
23 Convention and Visitors Bureau and
24 Chair of their Board for five

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 years. He co-founded the
3 Convention Bureau's Multicultural
4 Affairs Congress and is a founding
5 member of Visit Philadelphia,
6 demonstrating his commitment to
7 enhancing the city's tourism and
8 hospitality sectors; and

9 Whereas, Crawley also
10 served as a Campaign Manager and
11 Communications Consultant for
12 numerous state and local elected
13 officials and played a key role as
14 communications consultant for
15 former Mayor John F. Street from
16 his time as Philadelphia City
17 Council President, through his
18 first term as Mayor; and

19 Whereas, from 2006 to
20 2014 Crawley served as a member of
21 the Executive Committee, the Audit
22 Committee and as Chairman of the
23 Board Level Committee on Diversity,
24 Equity and Inclusion at

2 Independence Health Group, which is
3 the parent company of Independence
4 Blue Cross; and

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: And that was DEI he was
7 fighting for before it was the

10 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

11 Yes. Yes, very exciting. As I
12 said, living legend. I met Bruce
13 in the '90s. Man, yeah, what a
14 guy.

15 Whereas, he also served
16 as Chairman of the Collaboration
17 for IT and Communications
18 Excellence and organized providing
19 computer labs and IT training for
20 junior high school students in
21 disadvantaged rural regions of
22 Ghana, reflecting his commitment to
23 global education and development;
24 and

2 Whereas, Mr. Crawley

3 held several influential roles in

4 the nonprofit sector, including as

5 former Board member and Chair of

6 the Brand Management Committee for

10 Advisory Committee; and

11 Whereas, he served as a

12 trustee at St. Joe's Preparatory

13 School and for nine years on the

14 Board of Trustees at St. Joe's

15 University where he was a member of

16 the Executive Committee and Chair

17 of Enrollment and Marketing

18 Committee. He continues to serve

19 as a member of the Board of

20 Visitors for the Hobbs School of

21 Business at St. Joe's University;

22 and

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

24 Whereas, Mr. Crawley is a former

3 Philadelphia, former Board member
4 of the National Urban League,

10 Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.; and
11 Whereas, Mr. Crawley has
12 received significant recognition
13 for his exceptional contributions
14 in his field, including being
15 inducted into the Temple University
16 Klein College of Media and
17 Communications Alumni Hall of Fame
18 in 2004 and into the St. Joseph
19 University Hobbs School of Business
20 School Hall of Fame in 2014; and
21 Whereas, in recognition
22 of his remarkable achievements on
23 May 21, 2022, Mr. Crawley was
24 awarded an honorary Doctor of

17 world; now, therefore, be it;

18 Resolved, by the Council
19 of the City of Philadelphia, hereby
20 thanks A. Bruce Crawley for his
21 contributions to business,
22 hospitality and political
23 communities in Philadelphia;

24 Further resolve, that an

2 Engrossed copy of this resolution

3 be presented to A. Bruce Crawley as

4 a testament of the sincere

5 appreciation of this legislative

6 body. Thank you so much.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Before I acknowledge

10 Mr. Crawley for remarks, I want to

11 acknowledge joining him is the

12 President of the NAACP, President

13 Catherine Hicks. Thank you for

14 joining us.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: And I also want to

18 acknowledge one of his mentees that

19 said we had to make this happen.

20 If you've ever seen any of those

21 cool videos of me on Instagram and

22 watching me bang corners, it's the

23 work of this young lady who's the

24 Deputy Communications Director of

2 City Council, Ms. Meaghan

3 Washington. So I want to

4 acknowledge her as well.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: The floor is yours,

8 Mr. Bruce Crawley. The floor is

9 yours, sir.

10 MR. CRAWLEY: Thank you

11 very much. It's an honor to be

12 here. I want to begin my brief

13 remarks today by extending my most

14 sincere appreciation to each of the

15 members of the city's most

16 important legislative body. You

17 directly represent the interests of

18 each of the city of Philadelphia's

19 1.5 million residents and each of

20 its neighborhoods.

21 You introduce and passed

22 the laws that govern this great

23 city. It is you in City Council

24 who are responsible for approving

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 the Mayor's annual budget, which
3 amounted to \$6.4 billion this year.
4 So let me say, as a native of my
5 beloved North Central Philadelphia
6 and as a lifelong resident of this
7 city, that I am extremely humbled
8 that you somehow made time in that
9 demanding schedule to pass a
10 resolution thanking me for my
11 contributions to the Philadelphia's
12 political, business and hospitality
13 communities.
14 Your resolution covered
15 my leadership roles in the
16 business, hospitality and political
17 communities. But quite frankly, I
18 hope you don't mind if I choose not
19 to speak about any of that today.
20 Instead, I would rather talk about
21 the responsibilities we all must
22 share and what our predecessors
23 often described as "living through
24 interesting times."

2 When I was a young man,
3 I thought, like many of us did,
4 that the people who were saying
5 that they hoped you would live in
6 interesting times were wishing that
7 the people to whom they were
8 speaking would actually enjoy what
9 life would bring them in the
10 future. In fact, it was completely
11 the opposite.

12 That statement was
13 actually meant as a dismissive
14 curse. And in using the word
15 interesting, they meant times that
16 would be filled with challenge,
17 great difficulty, good difficulty,
18 turmoil, wars and strife.

19 I bring that up to
20 remind us all that we are right now
21 indeed living in interesting times,
22 and this has been by design. I was
23 fortunate to have seen a wonderful
24 movie years ago called Watch Dance.

2 Anybody here ever seen that movie?

3 It was about a popular
4 music company in the South and it
5 used residents in those communities
6 to define each musical genre that
7 the company produced, rock and
8 roll, jazz, et cetera. When it
9 came -- when I was younger, I would
10 memorize this whole thing. When it
11 came to the part when the movie
12 wanted to define what the musical
13 genre called the Blues was about,
14 the camera focused tightly on a
15 group of older Black men who were
16 clearly economically challenged.

17 At that point, one of
18 those men looked directly into the
19 camera and said and I quote, "I've
20 been down so long that getting up
21 don't even cross my mind." That
22 quote has stayed with me for my
23 entire life because it was a clear
24 political statement. He absolutely

2 recognized that those in power had
3 successfully worked over all his
4 years on earth to deprive him of
5 having fair, social and economic
6 opportunity. That had gone on for
7 so long that he had become resigned
8 to the belief that he and his
9 family were powerless to improve
10 their circumstances. So he just
11 stopped thinking about ways that
12 would make things better for his
13 family.

14 At the great risk of
15 sounding too political in these
16 bipartisan stately government
17 chambers, I feel obligated
18 nevertheless to say, since you
19 invited me, to say that in my
20 opinion the current federal
21 administration has been working
22 overtime since January of this year
23 to instill that kind of fear and
24 hopelessness into the vast majority

2 of Americans who happen not to be
3 billionaires or otherwise extremely
4 wealthy.

5 All the buttons are
6 being pushed. Every constitutional
7 right is being challenged or
8 ignored. Access to economic,
9 social and health care opportunity
10 is being erased with the stroke of
11 a pen. You know whose pen that
12 was. Immigration which brought the
13 Niña, Pinta, Santa Maria and hordes
14 of slave ships in North America,
15 has now been cast as an abominable
16 evil, and those who can't prove
17 that their ancestors were not born
18 in this country are no longer
19 welcome, but are being captured on
20 the streets of the United States en
21 masse, deported to maximum security
22 prisons in places like Salvador,
23 Guantanamo, Sudan and Rwanda.
24 That's not in any way normal.

2 People are suffering
3 unnecessarily and people are dying
4 as a result of these petty, racist
5 and class-based actions. You've
6 begun enough to recognize me and
7 others over the past years for
8 making contributions to society at
9 civic and community levels, yet
10 there seems to be precious little
11 interest and further encouraging
12 beyond these proclamations the kind
13 of community and grassroots
14 involvement that might bring
15 solutions to these larger,
16 insidious and anti-American
17 policies that we're seeing online
18 and virtually all of our
19 traditional media outlets every
20 day.

21 With that, I want to
22 sincerely thank you for today's
23 recognition. But I also want to
24 strongly encourage each of you to

2 do all in your great power to help
3 to restore fairness, equity and
4 opportunity to this country that
5 used to be known as the Land of
6 Opportunity. Please know if I can
7 help. Thank you very much.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: I also want to
14 acknowledge Business Manager of
15 Local 332 and Labor leader here in
16 the City of Philadelphia, Mr. Sam
17 Staten Jr., who's also joining us
18 for presentations.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Also joining us for
22 presentations is world-renowned
23 former Rockefeller recording artist
24 City of Philadelphia's Hip Hop

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Ambassador Philadelphia Freeway.

3 Thank you for joining us today as

4 well for presentations, sir.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Even though what we do is

8 wrong, still hustle till the sun go

9 down...better bundle up. Let me

10 keep it real.

11 At this time, I also

12 want to -- the Chair recognizes

13 Councilman Jeffrey Jay Young.

14 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank

15 you, Mr. President.

16 At this time, I just

17 want to acknowledge some 5th, 6th

18 and 7th graders from the Paul L.

19 Dunbar School in North

20 Philadelphia. Would y'all please

21 rise. Thank you guys for being

22 here so much.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 JOHNSON: That group is led by
3 William Mackey North Philly. And
4 as a young guy, got my start with
5 Mr. Mackey going to Washington,
6 D.C. to lobby for anti-violence
7 funds as a kid with the citywide
8 Youth Action Coalition. Let's give
9 Mr. Mackey another round of
10 applause please.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair
14 recognizes Councilmember
15 Dr. Anthony Phillips, who will be
16 presenting a resolution honoring
17 and celebrating Feliz Filadelfia
18 for its dedication to empowering
19 youth through recreation, education
20 and community development.

21 Would Jose Rivera and
22 those accompanying him please join
23 Dr. Phillips at the podium.
24 Joining Dr. Phillips will be

2 Councilmember Majority Leader

3 Gilmore Richardson, Councilmember

4 Brian O'Neill, Councilmember

5 Minority Leader Kendra Brooks,

6 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada and

7 Appropriations Chairman

8 Councilmember Mark Squilla.

9 (Councilmembers,

10 visitors and guests approached

11 podium.)

12 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

13 Well, thank you, Council President.

14 Today I'm excited to

15 recognize and lift up a name and a

16 mission that embodies the power of

17 community resilience and vision.

18 Feliz Filadelfia is not just a

19 youth athletic organization. It is

20 the heartbeat of Olney. It is hope

21 wrapped in leather gloves and

22 baseball cleats.

23 It is what happens when

24 one man decides that his

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 neighborhood and his children

3 deserve the very best. That man is

4 Jose Rivera. Born and raised in

5 Olney, Jose didn't wait for a

6 handout. He didn't ask for

7 permission to care. Instead he saw

8 the cracks in the system and became

9 the solution.

10 More than a decade ago,

11 he looked at Hammond Field in Olney

12 steps from his door and saw the

13 possibility where others saw

14 neglect. With his own hands and

15 his own dollars and with the

16 support of his neighbors, Jose

17 transformed that forgotten patch of

18 grass into a state-of-the-art

19 sanctuary for our youth.

20 Today Hammond Field is

21 more than a baseball diamond. It's

22 a launch pad, a place where young

23 people across our city find

24 purpose, discipline, teamwork and

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 joy. Feliz Filadelfia is producing
3 not just athletes, but scholars,
4 leaders and future changemakers.
5 This is what community power looks
6 like. This is what it means to
7 invest in our neighborhoods and
8 believe in our children.

9 Jose Rivera, you
10 represent and define the model of
11 an active community member. Just
12 the other day a member of our
13 community asked me, Councilmember,
14 can you find a way to come to my
15 neighborhood and sit on our --
16 organizer a block meeting. Now,
17 I've been doing that for a long
18 time throughout my entire tenure.
19 But one thing that I recognize that
20 makes Jose different from other
21 community members, he doesn't just
22 say, can you do something. He gets
23 involved with the process of
24 organizing, preparing things that

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 he wants to see done.

3 Congressman Boyle was
4 asked by Jose Rivera in partnership
5 to get thousands of dollars to fix
6 the Hammond Field. \$500,000 later,
7 there's a new field that's
8 resurfaced thanks to Jose Rivera's
9 advocacy and partnership.

10 Cherelle Parker asked
11 Jose -- Jose Rivera asked Cherelle
12 Parker as a Councilwoman to fix the
13 clubhouse at Hammond Field, and he
14 worked with the design and actually
15 the community process to really get
16 their community engaged in
17 redesigning that field.

18 And even today Jose
19 calls me and talks about issues
20 with graffiti, dumping, anything,
21 speed bumps, and he actively says,
22 I'm going to organize the meeting,
23 I'm going to organize the process,
24 but I want to see how you can help

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 me. He just doesn't ask for what
3 you can do. He says, I'm going to
4 be a part of it. And that's how I
5 was raised. That's how I
6 understood what active citizenship
7 looks like.

8 Even when Cherelle
9 Parker, years ago when I was in her
10 ward, I wouldn't have the nerve to
11 say to Cherelle, hey, I want you to
12 do this, I want you to do that. I
13 always said, how can I be a part of
14 it.

15 So when I organize
16 community block meetings in my
17 neighborhood, I organized it and
18 asked her to be a part of it and we
19 worked together in partnership.
20 When I wanted voter registration, I
21 worked with her with that.

22 Jose's being honored
23 because he understands what a model
24 active community citizen is. He

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 doesn't just complain. He finds a
3 way to be involved with the
4 solution, and that's why he's being
5 honored today here in front of City
6 Council.

7 So with that being said,
8 let's follow his lead. Let's keep
9 building and let's never forget the
10 future is on that field in Olney.
11 Even when his mother died a few
12 months ago, a couple months ago,
13 Jose took those children on that
14 field and kept practicing and
15 coaching. His mother loved him.
16 He was there at her bedside all the
17 time, but Jose understood his
18 commitment to the community and he
19 never stopped, never stopped
20 caring.

21 So, Jose Rivera and all
22 of you all who work with our
23 children at Feliz Filadelfia in
24 Olney, you are models of active

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 citizenship and one of the reasons
3 why I decided to be part of
4 Council. So I want to say thank
5 you so much.

6 Now, with that being
7 said, let's go to the resolution:
8 Honoring, celebrating Feliz
9 Filadelfia for his dedication to
10 empowering youth to recreation,
11 education and community
12 development;

13 Whereas, Feliz
14 Filadelfia, formerly known as Born
15 to Play, was founded in 2015 by
16 Jose Rivera with a mission to
17 provide recreational opportunities
18 in a safe environment for the youth
19 of Olney, Philadelphia and beyond;
20 and

21 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:
22 Whereas, Feliz Filadelfia's
23 flagship program, the Olney Angel's
24 Baseball Team, has become a

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 cornerstone of the community,
3 providing baseball, softball,
4 T-ball and flag football
5 opportunities for over 100 youth
6 from Olney, Hunting Park, North
7 Philadelphia, Lower Northeast
8 Philadelphia and surrounding areas;

9 Whereas, under the
10 leadership of founder Jose Rivera,

20 Rivera, founder and Executive

22 MR. RIVERA: Good

23 morning, everyone. Thank you for

24 having me here today. My name is

2 Jose Rivera. Obviously, I'm the
3 founder of Feliz Filadelfia, a
4 nonprofit organization based in the
5 heart of Olney dedicated to
6 empowering youth through sports,
7 mentorship and community.

8 I'm also proud to serve
9 as a committee man working to make
10 sure our neighborhood's voice is
11 heard and our youth are supported
12 both on and off the field. I'm
13 originally from Hunting Park, born
14 and raised there, where I spent
15 most of my life. I moved to Olney
16 about 10 years ago, and that move
17 changed everything.

18 One day my son, Jose,
19 Jr. -- where's my boy at, right
20 there -- we were walking the dog
21 through the neighborhood. We
22 walked into the fields at Hammond
23 Ave. We were amazed, not because
24 of how beautiful they were but

2 because nothing was happening. The
3 fields were abandoned, overgrown
4 and completely empty. The
5 clubhouse was just out of order,
6 and I remember thinking this place
7 deserves better. These kids
8 deserve better.

9 I will always remember
10 my son saying, "Dad, one day you
11 will run these fields." Not long
12 after that walk with me and my son,
13 I met State Rep. Anthony Bellmon
14 and the rest is kind of history.
15 What started as a dream, just a
16 safe place for kids to play
17 baseball, has grown into something
18 much bigger.

19 Feliz Filadelfia now
20 runs year-round programs in
21 baseball, softball, soccer, flag
22 football and basketball, serving
23 hundreds of youth in our community.
24 But what we offer goes beyond

2 sports. We offer hope, we offer
3 structure, and above all we offer a
4 safe environment where kids feel
5 seen, supported and inspired.

6 And it's not just about
7 the games. It's about the
8 community. Throughout the year we
9 host events that bring families
10 together, Easter egg hunts, bouncy
11 houses, clowns, back-to-school
12 giveaways, Thanksgiving turkey
13 distributions, Christmas toy drives
14 and plenty more. These moments
15 remind our kids and our
16 neighborhood that they matter.

17 I wish my mother was
18 here today to see this morning.
19 She passed away three months ago,
20 but I know, I ain't gonna get
21 emotional. I gotcha, but I know
22 she's watching over me and I know
23 she's proud of the work we're
24 doing. And of course, my son Jr.

2 and Kenyell works with me also,
3 continues to be a huge part of that
4 journey. They help keep our fields
5 maintained and teach the younger
6 kids the game of baseball.

7 I still remember when it
8 was just me and my son out there
9 cutting all three fields with a
10 regular lawn mower for hours just
11 so the kids could have a chance to
12 play. We didn't have much, but we
13 had heart.

14 Feliz Filadelfia is
15 growing fast. We sent teams to
16 Camden, Virginia, Reading and this
17 summer we're working hard to take
18 our 19U Puerto Rico team who won
19 two championships in a row, which
20 will be a once-in-a-lifetime Puerto
21 Rico experience for many of these
22 kids, take them out to Puerto Rico.

23 One of the things I
24 enjoy most is when I'm not

2 coaching, maybe I'm just at our
3 local Shop Rite and I run into a
4 parent or a former player, the look
5 in their eyes say it all. They
6 smile, they thank me. And in these
7 moments, I'm reminded why we do
8 this work.

9 And I'll never forget
10 something that the Madam Mayor
11 Cherelle Parker did before she
12 became Mayor. She would grab me
13 quietly -- she would see me quietly
14 working behind the scenes and she'd
15 grab me and say, stop hiding, stop
16 hiding back there, come to the
17 front lines, I see you, I know what
18 you're doing. That stuck with me.
19 Because sometimes when you're
20 focused on serving others, you
21 don't stop to think about being
22 seen. But she saw me and she saw
23 all of us.

24 And I have to recognize

3 right there, Anthony Phillips.
4 He's done such great work in our
5 community. And one thing that
6 really stood out was the
7 installation of speed humps on
8 Hammond Ave. That simple

10 made it safer for our kids and
11 families walking to our fields.

12 It may seem like a small
13 thing but was a big deal to us and
14 neighbors and we truly appreciate
15 him for it. I ain't got to get
16 bashed by Ms. Debbie anymore. None
17 of this would be possible without
18 support, especially from our
19 elected officials.

20 I want to thank Madam
21 Mayor Cherelle Parker, Councilman
22 Anthony Phillips, State Rep.
23 Anthony Bellmon and Congressman
24 Brendan Boyle for believing in our

2 mission and standing with us to
3 support the youth of Olney.

4 We've also partnered
5 with local schools, Parks & Recs
6 and small businesses to make this
7 work often with limited resources
8 and a whole lot of passion. So I'm

11 for believing in us, thank you for
12 believing in these kids and thank
13 you for recognizing the power of
14 community. We're not just building
15 athletes. We're building leaders.
16 And with their continued support.
17 We'll keep growing.

18 Guys, y'all heard -- I
19 heard Freeway might be here. Oh,
20 yeah. I quote you a lot. We got
21 to raise our kids while we're
22 living. And that stuck with me
23 since day one, and that's what
24 we're doing out here with Feliz

3 future, man. Let's keep it going.

19 African descent; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:
21 Whereas, the core values of The
22 Links, Inc. encompasses friendship,
23 integrity, honesty, service,
24 commitment, family relationships,

16 exceptional programs; and

18 Whereas, The Links Foundation, Inc.
19 has contributed more than \$27
20 million to charitable causes since
21 its founding. In 2022, The Links
22 Foundation, Inc. named its sixth \$1
23 million grantee the Obama
24 Presidential Center. Other

3 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

4 Thank you, Council President.

5 I move that the rules of
6 Council be suspended to permit
7 first reading this day of the bill
8 just read into the record by the
9 Chief Clerk.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

12 JOHNSON: Thank you very much. It
13 has been moved and properly
14 seconded that the rules of Council
15 be suspended to submit the
16 consideration of this bill just
17 read by the Chief Clerk at today's
18 session of Council.

19 All those in favor of
20 the motion will signify by saying
21 aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: The ayes have it. The
5 motion carries. This bill will be
6 placed on our First Reading
7 Calendar for today.

8 We are rocking and
9 rolling, Chief Clerk. We got this.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Sorry, my
11 apologies.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: It's all good. We got
14 this.

15 The Chair recognizes --
16 that's it for the Calendar. The
17 next order of business is the
18 consideration of the Calendar.

19 I note that the bills
20 just reported from the committees
21 with the suspension of the rules
22 have been deemed to have had a
23 first reading. These bills will be
24 placed on the Second Reading and

12 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

10 Richardson.

11 All in favor will
12 indicate by saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: All in favor indicate by
16 saying aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: The ayes have it. The
23 motion carries and we will consider
24 the Resolution Consent Agenda

2 shortly.

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson
5 for the purpose of calling up bills
6 and resolutions on the Second

9 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

10 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 The following bills and
13 resolutions are being called up
14 from the Second Reading and Final
15 Passage Calendars today: Nos.
16 250266, 250267, 250550, 250325,
17 250327, 250367, 250368, 250369,
18 250370, 250374, 250377, 250381 and
19 250382.

20 The following bills and
21 resolutions on the Calendar are
22 being held: 250273. And 250505 is
23 being withdrawn.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 JOHNSON: Thank you. Before
3 considering these bills and
4 resolutions, we will consider
5 public comment as follows: Your
6 public comment must concern matters
7 on the Second Reading and Final
8 Passage Calendars for possible
9 action at today's Council session.

10 All speakers must sign
11 up in order to testify. If you
12 have not already signed up for
13 today's session, please do so now
14 by giving your name to Ms. Hasson
15 at the table outside the rails to
16 my left. Once you have signed up,
17 you will be called in the order in
18 which your name appears on the
19 sign-up sheet.

20 Under ideal
21 circumstances, public commenters
22 will each have three minutes to
23 speak. However, this time limit
24 may vary from session-to-session.

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Today the time limit will be two
3 minutes. In order to be fair to
4 all those wishing to speak, I
5 intend to hold faithfully to the
6 two-minute limit.

7 When you begin speaking,
8 you will see a green light on the
9 podium. When there are 30 seconds
10 remaining to your time, the light
11 will turn yellow which is your
12 reminder to conclude your remarks.
13 Once two minutes have passed, the
14 light will turn red and the
15 Sergeant-at-Arms will disconnect
16 the microphone.

17 At that point, please
18 yield the podium to the next
19 speaker if you have not done so
20 already. I also reserve the right
21 pursuant to our rules of Council to
22 limit repetitious comments on the
23 same subject matter.

24 I will now ask the Chief

3 speaker.

4 CHIEF CLERK: We have
5 Freeway. Theresa Feo, (inaudible)
6 Lynn Hogbin, Jeremy Blatstein and
7 Elaine Lindy.

8 (Witnesses approached
9 podium.)

10 MR. PRIDGEN: Good
11 morning, everyone. Thanks for
12 having me and some artists from
13 Philadelphia. You know, I grew up
14 in Philadelphia. 1st, 2nd, 3rd,
15 4th grade music was my favorite
16 class. Music has always been a
17 part of me. Always had a love for
18 music.

19 Growing up in the city
20 of Philadelphia they say it's
21 something in the water. They say
22 it's that Schuylkill punch that
23 gives all the artists the talent
24 and the soul that comes from our

2 city. And I'm blessed. I'm one of
3 the ones that was able to make it
4 out, you know. And there's so many
5 other charted, talented artists in
6 our city. We run the music
7 industry.

8 Our artists go on tour
9 with everybody, you know, our
10 drummers, our keyboardists. You
11 can see us on tour with world-
12 renowned artists all over the
13 world. So me and my compadres feel
14 like it's time to make Philadelphia
15 an official music city, and that's
16 the reason why we're here.

17 I'm pretty sure everyone
18 feels the same way that I feel.
19 And I take my hat off to Suzann
20 Christine for putting this movement
21 together and sparking this
22 movement. And that's my time. I'm
23 going to let her speak to y'all.
24 Thank you.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: Thank you, Free.

5 MS. FEO: Good

6 afternoon, Council President and
7 Councilmembers. My name is Teresa
8 Feo, and I'm here to testify on
9 Bills 250266 and '267 regarding the
10 47th Street bike lane. I've
11 actually handed out -- they're
12 handing out some of my testimony
13 and some documents that support the
14 testimony with the number of
15 accidents and injuries that have
16 increased recently.

17 My testimony -- this
18 plan is not about safety. It's
19 about convenience for a few
20 affluent residents who want to feel
21 safe, "feel safe" biking to the
22 Schuylkill River Trail, but we're
23 asking what about the safety of the
24 Kingessing community and already

2 congested, low-income Black
3 neighborhood.

4 This plan reroutes
5 traffic to our streets, bringing
6 pollution, congestion and greater
7 danger for our residents and
8 children. As for 47th Street, it's
9 a pedestrian-heavy neighborhood of
10 disabled seniors, older residents
11 and vulnerable children in a
12 15-mile-per-hour school zone.

13 Until Philly can
14 regulate and enforce hazardous
15 e-bikes and scooters, a 13-foot
16 wide bicycle highway on our street
17 guarantees that bicycles, e-bikes
18 will speed even faster. Other
19 cities are already taking action.
20 In New York City, e-bikes are now
21 officially banned from the
22 boardwalk at Rockaway Beach during
23 the day after an alarming surge in
24 pedestrian injuries last year.

2 Central Park is

3 redesigning its bikeways to prevent

4 more cyclist conflicts. New York

5 legislators are working to pass

6 Priscilla's Law, named after a

7 69-year-old teacher killed by a

8 speeding cyclist as she crossed the

9 street. And she's not the only

10 fatality. Legislation is pending

11 in California, New Jersey,

12 Massachusetts, Boston, even London

13 after similar pedestrian deaths

14 caused by e-bike crashes. People

15 are dying from electric bicycles

16 and scooters, cyclists, as the bike

17 lobby demands more protection for

18 themselves by ignoring their own

19 unsafe behavior.

20 Council's job is to

21 ensure safety, to protect the most

22 vulnerable, not cater to the

23 convenience of the privileged few.

24 Please do the right thing. Vote no

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 on these bills and send them back
3 to the Committee on Streets to have
4 a sensible conversation about
5 safety for all, not just for
6 cyclists. Thank you.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

8 Thank you.

9 MS. HOGBIN: Lynn Hogbin
10 speaking in opposition to Bills
11 250266 and '267. These bills are
12 not needed to address the safety
13 hazard on 47th Street. 47th Street
14 is not a street that PennDOT has
15 found dangerous. OTIS's own maps
16 do not show a high number of
17 accidents on 47th Street and show
18 no bicycle accidents.

19 The issue is which
20 streets are appropriate for a
21 protected bike lane to the Grays
22 Ferry Bridge. OTIS now recognizes
23 that it does not know whether it
24 can make a bike lane on 47th Street

2 all the way to the bridge, and
3 these bills do not provide a bike
4 lane to the bridge. Given that the
5 bike lane likely cannot reach its
6 destination on 47th Street, it's
7 critical to consider whether use of
8 another street would create fewer
9 problems.

10 47th Street is uniquely
11 unsuitable for this bike lane for
12 four reasons: First, making 47th
13 Street a major roadway into a
14 one-way street will move its
15 substantial southbound traffic onto
16 other streets, burdening their
17 residents. Second, the bike lane
18 will create a blind intersection at
19 47th and Warrington that can lead
20 to two-vehicle accidents. Third,
21 47th Street has an unusually
22 congested intersection at
23 Springfield that OTIS did not even
24 study when it selected 47th Street.

2 This congestion means that the bike
3 lane will take out an excessive
4 amount of residential parking,
5 which would not occur with the bike
6 lane on another street.

7 Finally, 47th Street is
8 the sole entry for two residential
9 side streets that may be cut off by
10 reducing 47th Street to one lane.
11 The bike lane should be installed
12 to reach its intended destination
13 via streets that can properly
14 accommodate it without causing
15 other harms. I urge you to vote
16 against Bills 250266 and 250267 or
17 at a minimum, send them back to the
18 Streets Committee. Thank you very
19 much.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

21 Thank you.

22 CHIEF CLERK: May we
23 have Jeremy Blatstein, Elaine
24 Lindy, Marissa Tomas, Hannah

2 Sassaman and Dyana Williams also
3 make their way to the podium.

4 (Witnesses approached
5 podium.)

6 MR. BLATSTEIN: Good
7 afternoon. My name is Jeremy
8 Blatstein. I'm not here on behalf
9 of big bike but for safety over
10 everything. I'm here in support of
11 the bike lane bill, along with the
12 resolution honoring May as Jewish
13 American Heritage Month.

14 Imagine if Moses had a
15 protected bike lane. Maybe it
16 wouldn't have taken 40 years to get
17 through the desert. Turns out
18 infrastructure does matter and here
19 in Philly, we're still wondering
20 when it comes to safe streets how
21 many more people need to be hit,
22 injured or killed before we stop
23 treating bike infrastructure like a
24 luxury.

2 47th Street needs a
3 protected bike lane, not paying
4 protection. People biking to work,
5 to school, to the store shouldn't
6 have to gamble with their lives.
7 We say we care about Vision Zero.
8 Prove it. Build the bike lanes.
9 Protect 47th Street. Protect
10 Spruce Street. Protect Pine
11 Street.
12 The same goes for Jews
13 in Philadelphia. We need
14 protection too, especially now in
15 the face of rising antisemitism and
16 recent attacks. Your voice and
17 support matter. And that leads me
18 to the last thing we're talking
19 about today: SEPTA.
20 Raise your hand if you
21 rode SEPTA in the last week,
22 Council? Oh, look at the hands in
23 the audience but no members of City
24 Council riding. But we're

2 advocating. We're singing these
3 songs. We're going up to
4 Harrisburg. Transit is the heart
5 of the city. Without reliable,
6 well-funded public transportation
7 this city doesn't move, literally
8 or economically.

9 Ride the ride. Fund
10 SEPTA. Build the bike lanes. Grow
11 Philly to 2 millie. Thank you.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
13 Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK:
15 (Inaudible) Sassarman, Dyana
16 Williams. May Carrie Park, Suzann
17 Christine and Brianna Cervantes
18 also make their way to the podium.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MS. TOMAS: Good
22 afternoon. My name is Marissa
23 Tomas. I'm speaking on behalf of
24 my colleague Sophia (inaudible)

2 schedros and the IMPACT Melanoma
3 organization. Good morning -- good
4 afternoon. My name is Sophia
5 (inaudible). I'm a third-year
6 medical student at the Philadelphia
7 College of Osteopathic Medicine and
8 a representative of IMPACT
9 Melanoma, a national nonprofit
10 dedicated to skin cancer prevention
11 and early detection.

12 I'm here today to raise
13 awareness about melanoma, a
14 preventable but often deadly
15 disease. Simple proven prevention
16 measures like regular sunscreen
17 use, wearing protective clothing
18 and seeking shade during peak UV
19 hours can significantly reduce the
20 risk. Yet in Philadelphia many
21 residents remain unaware of these
22 strategies and lack access to basic
23 tools like sunscreen.

24 Between 2011 and 2015,

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Phillips reported over 4000
3 melanoma cases, 410 of those being
4 deadly. Even more concerning is
5 that nearly 20% of those cases were
6 diagnosed at late stages, when
7 treatment is often more difficult
8 and outcomes are worse. Racial
9 disparities further compound the
10 problem.

11 Black patients are more
12 likely to receive late stage
13 diagnosis and their five-year
14 survival rate is just 66%, whereas
15 94% for White patients. These
16 disparities are fueled by
17 misconceptions such as the belief
18 that darker skin doesn't need
19 protection and by structural
20 barriers to care and education.

21 In fact, 65% of Black
22 individuals report never using
23 sunscreen. Philadelphia's social
24 vulnerability index is .9465,

2 meaning that we have some of the
3 most underserved communities in the
4 nation. These are the exact places
5 where public health outreach is
6 most needed.

7 This is why I urge a
8 City Council to take the following
9 steps in conjunction with IMPACT
10 Melanoma: Number one, install free
11 public service sunscreen dispensers
12 in high-risk neighborhoods; number
13 two, fund sun safety education
14 campaigns; number three, partner
15 with dermatology clinics and public
16 health organization to expand
17 access free health care. Thank
18 you.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

20 Thank you.

21 MS. SASSAMAN: Good
22 afternoon, members of City Council.
23 My name is Hannah Sassaman. I'm
24 here to testify on the resolution

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 about Meta. I think that is

3 250550. And I'm with the Philly

4 Tech Justice Collective.

5 There's community

6 members from all over the city who

7 are focusing on issues of how

8 technology and surveillance impact

9 us and our neighbors. And one of

10 the reasons we're really supportive

11 of Councilmember Brooks' resolution

12 is because of all of the

13 mis/disinformation that's been

14 coming to our communities around

15 whether it's issues of the

16 election, whether it's issues of

17 the new administration, getting the

18 information we need from local

19 sources is really important in

20 order to be able to engage in our

21 neighborhoods and what they're

22 trying to be doing for the dignity

23 of all of our residents.

24 We're also very

2 supportive of the city getting a
3 lot more grounded in how issues of
4 AI and technology are impacting us
5 every single day. We are calling
6 on the Committee on Technology and
7 Innovation to hold hearings on city
8 uses of AI surveillance technology
9 that we're spending money on that
10 is giving data to billionaires
11 rather than investing in the
12 resources that we need. And we're
13 also hopeful that in the City
14 budget process that we can freeze
15 spending on surveillance
16 technologies that really don't help
17 us but really surveil and hurt us,
18 and to invest in technology that
19 does help us, things like digital
20 inclusion.

21 And so, we're hopeful
22 that after the passage of this
23 resolution we can really have a
24 deep dive on a city level about

2 these issues, and we're really
3 looking forward to listening to
4 multiple city residents who are
5 here today to say why having local
6 media, not consolidated technology
7 like Meta and surveillance
8 technology mediating our lives is
9 good for us and good for our
10 neighborhoods. Thank you so much.
11 Really appreciate it.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

13 Thank you.

14 MS. PARK: Good morning.

15 My name is Carrie Park, and I'm
16 here representing independent
17 venues, promoters and festivals on
18 behalf of the National Independent
19 Venue association as a proud
20 Philadelphian or my love for
21 Philadelphians is surpassed only by
22 my love of live music.

23 Before we go forward,
24 let's go back to the early 1800s.

2 Francis Frank Johnson, prolific
3 African American composer who led
4 the first American ensemble to
5 perform before Queen Victoria in
6 England and tour Europe, and where
7 was he from?

8 (Philadelphia.)

9 MS. PARK: That's right.

10 I'm here to enthusiastically
11 support the resolution presented by
12 Councilmember Thomas officially
13 declaring Philadelphia as the music
14 city we all know it to be. I want
15 to thank Councilmember Thomas and
16 his team for their dedication and
17 commitment to our industry and for
18 taking seriously both the impact
19 and the potential.

20 I also want to quickly
21 acknowledge Ms. Dyana Williams,
22 David Ivory, Sarah Lambert, Keisha
23 Blackstone, Frank Macos, Max
24 Wiesman and most recently, the

2 unwavering dedication of Suzann

3 Christine. Additionally, I want to

4 recognize the important work in

5 this lane being done right now by

6 Patty Aden at GPCA, Val Gay at

7 Creative PHL and Raheem Manning and

8 Sophie Hang at Department of

9 Commerce.

10 No matter the genre,

11 your decade, your connection to the

12 music ecosystem, from fan to

13 musician, institution to studio,

14 promoter to label, venue to radio,

15 the role that Philadelphia sound

16 has played for centuries in shaping

17 our city and the world is

18 undeniable. But it's not just

19 about where we've been, because

20 arguably what's more important is

21 where we are and where we're going.

22 Philadelphia's music

23 industry has a robust contribution

24 to our economy and the heartbeat of

2 our city culture. Declarations
3 matter, but we must also understand
4 that our impact cannot be taken for
5 granted and we have other music
6 cities to use as a cautionary tale
7 as to what happens when you do not
8 invest back in your ecosystem.

9 Let this be a catalyst
10 to the path to a dedicated director
11 role who wakes up every day
12 thinking only about supporting the
13 Philadelphia music industry and let
14 us back that up with specific
15 dedicated funding to honor the past
16 and support the future. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

19 Thank you.

20 MS. CHRISTINE: My name
21 is Suzann Christine. What city has
22 a music industry that has made
23 legendary worldwide moves and is a
24 city of many firsts of over two

2 centuries?

3 (Philadelphia.)

4 MS. CHRISTINE: What
5 city music industry generates 6.1
6 billion in economic output with
7 minimal music investment?

8 (Philadelphia.)

9 MS. CHRISTINE: Yes,
10 Philadelphia. I want to thank
11 Councilman Isaiah Thomas for
12 presenting this resolution
13 declaring us the Philadelphia
14 Original Music City. This is long
15 overdue, but it's happening in
16 divine timing.

17 The Philadelphia music
18 industry is the driving force
19 behind the image of our culture,
20 our work, travels, both land and
21 sea, touching lives worldwide, and
22 our gifts and talents are
23 celebrated far beyond our city
24 limits. But here at home, our

2 government and its citizens use our
3 voices, our talent and our
4 influence to uplift their causes
5 while we receive very little in
6 return.

7 Now, I want everyone in
8 this room to take a moment and
9 imagine a rally or a sports event
10 without your DJ. Imagine a
11 political event with no music.
12 Imagine a restaurant, a film or a
13 video game without the soundtrack.
14 That's a vision none of us should
15 have to ever tolerate.

16 So as you deliberate
17 amongst yourselves about where the
18 city dollars go, I urge you to
19 invest into this industry. Do not
20 forget about us. This industry is
21 not a hobby. It is an economic
22 engine, providing over 33,000 jobs
23 strong and we contribute millions
24 in taxes per year.

2 We've supported this
3 city and we've supported you. Now,
4 we need that support in return. We
5 need policies that include
6 affordable housing for music
7 artists. We need to increase the
8 creative PHL budget specifically
9 for music artist grants and to fund
10 music education for independent
11 artists.

12 We need to support a
13 music sightseeing tour or display
14 in live music spread amongst the
15 city of Philadelphia as we welcome
16 an influx of visitors for 2026.
17 This is a music city. We need to
18 act like it. It's time to treat
19 our industry and our artists
20 accordingly. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: May we
23 also have Brianna Cervantes,
24 Desiree Neal, Kate Perez, Devryn

2 Washington and Hannah Weinstein
3 also make their way to the podium.

4 (Witnesses approached
5 podium.)

6 MS. CERVANTES: Hi. My
7 name is Brianna Cervantes and I'm
8 giving comment on Bill 250550.
9 This is Brooks' resolution, which
10 is inexplicably linked to Bill
11 250273, Squilla's automated vehicle
12 noise enforcement bill that was
13 just tabled for today. For what
14 purpose? I don't know. Maybe my
15 email was convincing or maybe it's
16 a strategy to keep me from speaking
17 on it.

18 I'm not here to convince
19 you that the technology in
20 Squilla's bill enshrines -- I'm not
21 here to convince you that the
22 technology used in Squilla's bill
23 is earth shatteringly bad or novel.
24 But what I'm here to tell you is

2 that it is irresponsible and
3 ethically questionable to further
4 entrench the use of surveillance to
5 police Philadelphians and the rules
6 of Council should not be suspended
7 for any bill that does that.

8 I talked to the
9 Councilman yesterday over email,
10 and I can confirm that he has not
11 done his due diligence. He
12 admitted that he does not
13 understand how other agencies like
14 ICE could use the surveillance that
15 this bill bakes into PPA
16 enforcement. He admitted that he
17 had done no outreach to critical
18 stakeholders like tech justice
19 groups.

20 Ironically, Philadelphia
21 Tech Justice Collective is here
22 today to demand the City needs to
23 hold hearings with departments
24 where they ask them directly what

2 kinds of technology they are using
3 and how communities are impacted.
4 Please see that these two things
5 are tied together.

6 We cannot sneak
7 surveillance technology into bills,
8 suspend Council rules to push
9 surveillance onto Philadelphians.
10 We deserve better, we deserve due
11 diligence and we deserve smart,
12 resourceful and communicative
13 Councilmembers. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 MS. NEAL: Good
18 afternoon, fearless government
19 leaders, distinguished guests and
20 music heads alike. First giving
21 honor to God and music that
22 separately I would never have made
23 it. Thank you, Marvin Sapp.

24 I stand before you as a

2 gospel music ambassador for the
3 Recording Academy of Philadelphia
4 and a songstress in this great city
5 to which we deserve not only a day
6 but every year, and let alone the
7 city. Philly is undoubtedly the
8 music mecca. There is no artist
9 that has not come here to get BGVs,
10 background singers, musicians,
11 techs and a plethora of skilled
12 artists who only have moments,
13 sometimes 24 hours or less, to
14 provide a flawless performance of
15 which we always do, which is why
16 they continue to come back with
17 that minimal rehearsal time --

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

19 Ma'am --

20 MS. NEAL: Yes.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

22 Please state your name for the
23 record.

24 MS. NEAL: Desiree Dezzi

2 Neal.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

4 Thank you.

5 MS. NEAL: I ain't want
6 to go over my two minutes. Don't
7 count that time. As church and
8 state remain divided, God and music
9 never are divided. Every riff,
10 run, trill, vamp, bar, swell,
11 vibrato, crescendo, decrescendo and
12 et cetera has its root in gospel
13 music, and each and every artist
14 has had roots where they have sung
15 in a choir and worn that white top,
16 that black bottom or that choir
17 robe.

18 Please allow those
19 humble beginnings to indulge and
20 allow us to have a wonderful ending
21 of exclusively accepting all six
22 points that we have brought before
23 you today. Thank you in advance
24 for your support. We're not going

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to say you owe us, but you love to
3 hear us sing your play. To God be
4 the glory.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you.

8 MS. PEREZ: I'm Kate
9 Perez. It's May 29 and we just
10 watched America and Israel build a
11 concentration camp on the rubble of
12 Rafah with AI-face scanning
13 checkpoints, surrounded by armed
14 soldiers and sending people to
15 collect aid while still dropping
16 bombs on them.

17 Then we saw the Gazian
18 people tear it down with their bare
19 hands. They're starved to death
20 for 88 days' hands. Meta aims to
21 control the stories we're allowed
22 to see. Facebook and Instagram
23 have been caught consistently
24 deleting Palestinian journalist'

2 accounts. This genocide is the
3 most deadly in history for
4 journalists, medics and children,
5 with the occupation already killing
6 more than 180 journalists.

7 On May 12, it was
8 reported that 57 children have been
9 killed from malnutrition just since
10 this new blockade on March 2nd.
11 Gazian people are starving to death
12 and Philadelphia has a
13 responsibility to stop working with
14 the Occupation committing the
15 atrocities.

16 Just a few hours ago
17 they called on residents to collect
18 aid and then shot grenades and
19 bullets behind wire fences that our
20 tax dollars paid for. Whatsapp has
21 been accused of fueling the
22 Lavender AI used by the Occupation
23 to target Palestinian individuals,
24 tracking them based on what group

2 chats they join.

3 Without these

4 journalists, we would have missed

5 the massacres that haven't stopped

6 for even a second. With Israel

7 bombing a residential building two

8 hours ago, killing 25 people and

9 journalist Fidel Magari sharing the

10 video of a young boy sobbing in

11 front of the video in front of the

12 building where his father is still

13 trapped.

14 Meta continues to shadow

15 ban any creators who try to discuss

16 Palestine, stopping us from

17 discussing the country with the

18 most children amputees in the

19 world, whose limbs were torn off by

20 their primary arm dealer Dan

21 Zimmerman, who has a light-up sign

22 over our roads and still allowed to

23 sit in our city and get rich off of

24 a holocaust. The Occupation

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 announced plans to build 22 new
3 illegal settlements, stealing even
4 more Palestinian land and spitting
5 on international law.

6 Every surgery is
7 performed without medication.
8 American surgeon Dr. Sidhwa at the
9 U.N. shared, I did not see or treat
10 a single combatant during my five
11 weeks in Gaza. My patients were
12 6-year-olds with shrapnel through
13 their hearts and bullets in their
14 brain, pregnant women with their
15 pelvises obliterated and their
16 fetuses cut in two while still in
17 the womb. The Occupiers are our
18 sister city. Lift the blockade.
19 Stop doing business with an
20 apartheid state. Free Palestine.
21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: After
24 Devryn Washington, we have Hannah

2 Weinstein. May Hiruy Tirfe, Sister

3 Taliyah Taylor, Paul Birdsong,

4 Sierra Freeman and Kristen Wells

5 also make their way to the podium.

6 (Witnesses approached

7 podium.)

8 MR. WASHINGTON? Hello.

9 My name is Devryn Washington. I'm

10 here on behalf of Philly Tech

11 Justice Collective. I want to echo

12 Free Palestine, but I'm also here

13 in support of Resolution 250550,

14 because I do believe that we need

15 to be pushing the federal

16 government to hold Meta accountable

17 for the monopoly that it has.

18 The algorithms in

19 today's society is a powerful

20 thing. We've seen it generate

21 conflict between communities.

22 We've seen it impact our children's

23 mental health, right, with a lot of

24 youth committing suicide because of

2 things that are happening on social
3 media that seep into the classroom,
4 right.

5 And so, we think to
6 protect -- we believe that to
7 protect our communities these
8 monopolies like Meta need to be
9 broken up. And so, we do support
10 having the City of Philadelphia
11 sign on to this resolution or for
12 our Councilmembers to sign onto
13 this resolution.

14 But we also want City
15 Council to keep that same energy
16 when thinking about the technology
17 that their departments are using
18 against our communities. The
19 technology that we are purchasing
20 through the current budget, through
21 previous budgets that build out a
22 very, very strong and large
23 surveillance apparatus that the
24 city uses that during the budget

2 season -- during the police
3 department's budget hearing we also
4 heard that it's sharing data most
5 likely with ICE, right, while we
6 know that there are mass
7 deportations that are happening
8 that don't just impact undocumented
9 folks, but also Brown people who
10 aren't White enough, right.

11 So we think that this is
12 an opportunity, we know that this
13 is an opportunity for City Council
14 to show leadership and oversight
15 and protect our communities,
16 because we know that you want safe
17 communities, we want safe
18 communities. There's an
19 opportunity for us to get there
20 together. So thank you and fund
21 the people's budget at the Alliance
22 for Just Philly. Thanks.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 MR. HAGINS: Hello. I'm

4 Carvin Hagins. Quick question --

5 oh, my name is Carvin Hagins.

6 Where was the sound of neo soul's

7 birth?

8 (Philadelphia.)

9 MR. HAGINS: Yes. So

10 I'm Carvin Hagins. I'm from the

11 north side of Philadelphia. I grew

12 up as a homeless young man in

13 Philadelphia. Music saved my life.

14 What's amazing about music is that

15 I just recently got off a phone

16 call with the Executive Office of

17 the Music Commission of Saudi

18 Arabia. They were speaking to me

19 about the idea of oil and fossil

20 fuel dying, and they're finding

21 ways to diversify their economy and

22 music was one of the resources.

23 So what I learned from

24 that conversation was that every

2 music artist is like an oil well
3 waiting to be fracked. The wild
4 thing is that we have artists here
5 that are created here, that are
6 birthed here, that are building up
7 their whole reputation and looking
8 to be fracked in the city that they
9 love.

10 The problem is that this
11 city does not love us back. So
12 most of the artists, once they
13 become great and big artists, they
14 go somewhere else where the cities
15 are willing to embrace them and
16 give them the love that they need.

17 What we're asking you to
18 do is look to the new young artists
19 and begin to build in them and
20 begin to frack them and allow them
21 to stay in the city, because we
22 understand that there is influence
23 behind every artist. And the
24 beauty of it is, is that help

2 influencers will help influencers
3 help you. So, Philadelphia, we're
4 just asking for you to find a way
5 to help the influencers.

6 We need affordable
7 housing for the new influencers,
8 the music-makers of this town. We
9 actually need an office the same
10 way Saudi Arabia has an office of
11 Music Commission. We're asking
12 Philadelphia to do the same thing,
13 that you can help us help you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 MS. WEINSTEIN: Hello.
18 My name is Hannah Weinstein. I'm
19 here to support Councilmember
20 Brooks' resolution on Meta. Okay.
21 Hannah Weinstein in support of the
22 resolution on Meta, No. 250550.
23 Meta's products such as Facebook
24 and Instagram feel like the only

2 options for me to plug into what's
3 going on in my city.

4 Unfortunately, Meta is a
5 private company that doesn't
6 prioritize privacy and security.
7 Instead they sell our data in order
8 to make themselves richer. That
9 means in order to engage with my
10 community, I need to put my
11 personal data at risk and same with
12 my community members.

13 For example, in Philly
14 Thrive one of our members who is
15 like an elder had their WhatsApp
16 account compromised, and then there
17 was a hacker and a scammer
18 messaging everybody else in our
19 group asking for money on their
20 behalf.

21 When our data is
22 collected by Facebook or by the PPA
23 looking for noise violations or by
24 any other AI security surveillance

2 technology used in our city, it
3 creates more opportunities to
4 compromise our identities. This is
5 why we need oversight on these
6 activities.

7 I'm excited that the
8 Council is considering acting on
9 these issues with this resolution.
10 I hope that you will also address
11 how our city has been putting our
12 privacy at risk with drones and
13 surveillance cameras. We need City
14 Council to look out for our digital
15 safety by breaking up Meta and
16 holding hearings in the Information
17 and Tech Committee about how the
18 City's budget is being spent in
19 tech and AI. That's it.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

22 Thank you.

23 MR. TIRFE: Good

24 afternoon, City Council. My name

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 is Hiruy Tirfe from Philadelphia,
3 Pa. First things first, Adam
4 Blackstone, founder of Basic Black
5 Entertainment, is who you see
6 playing the bass at the Super Bowl
7 and many major award shows on
8 television. And where did he get
9 his education and start from?

10 (Philadelphia.)

11 MR. TIRFE: As stated
12 earlier, my name is Hiruy Tirfe.
13 I'm a jazz artist, composer,
14 arranger, educator with the School
15 District of Philadelphia and proud
16 member of Local 77 Musicians Union.
17 As Freeway stated earlier, our
18 musicians here in Philadelphia tour
19 over some of the top artists in the
20 music industry.

21 I'd like to humbly
22 consider myself as one of them.
23 I've toured all 50 states, Europe
24 and Canada multiple times with

2 people from the Roots, Patti
3 LaBelle, Tye Tribbett, Melvin
4 (inaudible) Bell, the list goes on
5 and on, but my foundation in jazz
6 and Black American music was built
7 right here in Philadelphia at the
8 Kimmel Center Youth Jazz Ensemble
9 Creative Music Program and the
10 legendary club, Club of Jazz and
11 Performing Arts.

12 For the past six years,
13 I've also worked closely with our
14 Musicians Union to create the
15 Philadelphia Musicians Coalition,
16 advocating for our freelance and
17 single engagement musicians,
18 demanding fair pay, production
19 support, professional respect,
20 ownership of our recorded work and
21 pension contributions when we're
22 hired to perform at some of these
23 venues because, as it stands today,
24 none of these things exist.

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm here today to
3 express my full support to declare
4 Philadelphia as the original music
5 city. With over 15 years in the
6 industry, I consistently meet
7 people who are fans of Philadelphia
8 past, present and rising musical
9 talent. Yet the question always
10 comes up, why doesn't Philadelphia
11 recognize itself in this way.
12 History's proven itself over and
13 over again that the city continues
14 to make a worldwide impact
15 socially, economically and
16 culturally. However, we do not
17 give ourselves the credit. In
18 short, no one will recognize us in
19 this way unless we do so.

20 So today not only do I
21 stand before you to support the
22 declaration, but also a call for
23 funding of a full-time music
24 industry manager position with city

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 government, someone who serves as a
3 coordinator, advocate and
4 coordinate for our music sector.
5 This role will help create
6 positive, economic and provide
7 opportunities for our youth, ensure
8 our artists today so they can
9 thrive and most importantly, stay
10 here in the city. Thank you for
11 your support.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

14 Thank you.

15 MR. BIRDSONG: I'm
16 Deputy Chairman, Paul Birdsong from
17 the Black Panther Party for Self-
18 Defense. I came here originally to
19 speak on 250527, the Panther Party
20 at every single one of its
21 community unity barbecues signs
22 children up for reading programs.
23 So we definitely want to get
24 involved in anything that the city

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 is doing to catch the children
3 before they are 8 years old,
4 between birth and 8 years old, to
5 get them into reading and things
6 that keep them off the streets and
7 keep their head in a book.

8 However, as I told City
9 Council President Kenyatta Johnson
10 earlier when I spoke to him, a
11 video was sent to my phone of a
12 SEPTA police officer punching an
13 unarmed Black woman in the head at
14 Frankford Terminal. I got that
15 video yesterday. I got it right
16 here on my phone. That needs to
17 stop. That officer needs to be
18 arrested.

19 The Panther Party for
20 Self-Defense demands the City
21 Council and the Philadelphia Police
22 Department to hold this officer
23 accountable. The woman was
24 unarmed, had her hand on her back.

2 The police officer punched her over
3 the top of the head, towering over
4 her. She was unarmed. This needs
5 to stop. If it doesn't stop, what
6 do you think is going to happen?
7 It's going to cause problems in the
8 community.

9 We already got all the
10 shooting happening between us with
11 each other. We don't need riots in
12 the street to add to it, but police
13 officers cannot brutalize unarmed
14 Black women in this community like
15 that. We will not stand for it.

16 So I want everybody,
17 everybody who's Black in this
18 community, to take inventory of
19 yourself and ask yourself will you
20 allow that to happen where you live
21 at, will you allow unarmed Black
22 women to be punched by the police
23 officers who are supposed to
24 protect this community or will you

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 stand up against it and hold these
3 people accountable. All power to
4 the people. Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you.

8 CHIEF CLERK: We have
9 Sierra Freeman, Kristen Wells. May
10 Richard Clark, Rodney Gardner,
11 Danielle Allen, Lorenzo Cannon
12 Umstead and Ramon Jones please make
13 their way to the podium.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 MS. WELLS: Good
17 afternoon. My name is Kristen
18 wells, though I am professionally
19 known as Kristen Curtis. I host
20 the Morning Show, and I am the
21 Assistant Music Director at WXPB, a
22 nationally recognized radio station
23 that is based here in Philadelphia,
24 committed to uplifting the

2 Philadelphia music scene and
3 playing hundreds of our artists
4 every single year.

5 2 billion people across
6 more than 100 nations were watching
7 the first U.S. city to host a live
8 aid simulcast concert in 1985.

9 What city was that?

10 (Philadelphia.)

11 MS. WELLS: That's
12 right. For centuries Philadelphia
13 has simultaneously cultivated
14 classical musicianship and
15 generated musical innovations. We
16 introduced the concept of music
17 videos with American Bandstand,
18 produced our own brand of soul in
19 recording studios that have
20 attracted artists from all over the
21 world, and we continue to foster a
22 vibrant do-it-yourself scene.

23 Today our music industry
24 generates \$1.6 billion in economic

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 output, brings in \$64 million in
3 tax revenue and supports over
4 30,000 jobs. Yet we still lack
5 dedicated city personnel to support
6 this vital part of our economy and
7 culture. Funding a full-time
8 affiliate music industry manager in
9 addition to declaring Philadelphia
10 as the original music city would
11 not just honor our past, it would
12 also build our future.

13 I saw this firsthand in
14 another city that has already taken
15 these measures, Austin, Texas,
16 where I spent part of my career
17 before I returned home to Philly.
18 I will never forget the first time
19 I got off a plane there and
20 encountered a concert on my way to
21 baggage claim, which instantly
22 reinforced their self-proclaimed
23 title as the Live Music Capital of
24 the World, which has fueled

2 population growth, helped the city

3 weather the 2008 recession and

4 streamlined event planning, which

5 made it possible to host major

6 awards and ceremonies like the

7 Country Music Awards when Nashville

8 wasn't available, and we can do the

9 same.

10 We support our music

11 professionals with affordable

12 housing initiatives, create tax

13 incentives for venues, hotels and

14 restaurants that uplift

15 Philadelphia's music scene. And

16 what I'm really saying is if a

17 younger, smaller city that's forced

18 to root for Dallas can do all of

19 this, surely Philadelphia can do

20 more. It's one thing to take a

21 wonderful measure of renaming

22 streets and putting names on the

23 Avenue of the Arts. It is another

24 to uplift our music scene and to

2 invest in its future. And music
3 has been putting Philadelphia on
4 the map for centuries and it's time
5 that we put Philadelphia music on
6 the budget. Thank you very much.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. CLARK: I'm Rick
9 Clark. I work with the
10 Philadelphia Youth Orchestra Music
11 Institute. So I'm the Development
12 Director there. We're in District
13 2, City Council. A truly world
14 class orchestra and ensemble music
15 education institution. We serve
16 over 700 talented youth musicians
17 every year across the tristate
18 area, much of which are from the
19 city of Philadelphia.

20 For more than eight
21 decades, we have been the
22 cornerstone of Philadelphia's music
23 excellence, preparing students for
24 success at the concert stage and in

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 life. Alumni, some of which are
3 among us here today, grace the
4 ranks of top orchestras around the
5 world, including the Philadelphia
6 Orchestra, performing Grammy-
7 winning ensembles, tour-renowned
8 productions, playing orchestra pits
9 of Broadway and represent this
10 music city with their work.

11 For the past 15 years,
12 Philadelphia Youth Orchestra Music
13 Institute's Tune Up Philly program
14 has provided high-quality tuition-
15 free, afterschool music instruction
16 to hundreds of students from
17 underresourced communities with
18 little or no arts access.

19 This vital initiative
20 demonstrates our deep commitment to
21 access and belief that every child
22 deserves a chance to experience the
23 transformative power of music. We
24 are honored to have recently

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 received an official citation from
3 Mayor Cherelle Parker recognizing
4 the positive and lasting impact of
5 our work throughout this city.

6 At PYO Music Institute,
7 we're proud to play a key role in
8 shaping Philadelphia's identity
9 along with the people you see her
10 today speaking, not just as a music
11 city but as one of America's great
12 music cities. As America's first
13 music city, Philadelphia has a rich
14 legacy and we are determined to
15 help carry it forward by nurturing
16 the next generation of musicians,
17 artists and cultural leaders.

18 And here, I have a small
19 fact to share with you today.
20 classic contralto Marian Anderson
21 was one of the first Black people
22 to receive Presidential Medal of
23 Freedom in 1963 from President
24 Lyndon B. Johnson. She also broke

2 the racial barrier in opera for
3 people of color, performing at the
4 Metropolitan Opera. Where is she
5 from?

6 (Philadelphia.)

7 MR. CLARK: Thank you
8 for the time.

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. ALLEN: Good
11 afternoon. My name is Danielle
12 Allen and I'm Vice-President of
13 Education and Community for the
14 Philadelphia Orchestra and Ensemble
15 arts.

16 First, I have a
17 question: Which orchestra made
18 movie history by performing the
19 soundtrack to Walt Disney's
20 legendary animated film Fantasia?

21 (Philadelphia.)

22 MS. ALLEN: That's
23 right. First, I'd like to
24 acknowledge Council President

2 Johnson for your leadership as a
3 member of our Board of Trustees,
4 Councilmember Thomas for presenting
5 this resolution, and last but not
6 least, as a lifelong resident of
7 the 8th District, my Councilperson
8 Cindy Bass.

9 So on behalf of the
10 Philadelphia Orchestra and Ensemble
11 Arts, I stand to express our full
12 support of Philadelphia receiving
13 an official music city designation.
14 Like Nashville, New Orleans,
15 Detroit, Seattle and other great
16 American cities, Philadelphia's
17 rich musical heritage and sonic
18 contributions should be formally
19 recognized and celebrated in a way
20 that affirms our city as a prime
21 destination for exceptional arts
22 and culture experiences. Our City
23 of Brotherly Love and Sisterly
24 Affection has birthed an undeniable

2 sound that spans multiple genres
3 and unites music lovers around the
4 world.

5 From the sound of
6 Philadelphia made famous by Philly
7 International Records to the songs
8 and dances that define teen culture
9 on American Bandstand to DJ Jazzy
10 Jeff and the Fresh Prince winning
11 the first ever Grammy for best rap
12 and hip hop performance to iconic
13 concerts and festivals like Live
14 Aid and the Roots Picnic,
15 Philadelphia artists continue to
16 shape culture. As our region's
17 largest performing arts presenter,
18 the Philadelphia Orchestra and
19 Ensemble Arts makes an annual
20 economic impact of \$455 million and
21 hosts more than 1 million visitors
22 each year.

23 And in 2024 we proudly
24 dedicated the home of our concert

2 hall for Marian Anderson.

3 Naturally, we have a vested

4 interest in amplifying Philadelphia

5 music. We support Philadelphia as

6 a music city and the investment in

7 a strategic plan that will curate

8 an experience for arts and culture

9 in Philadelphia. Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. JONES: Good

12 afternoon, everyone. My name is

13 Ramon Jones. I am the Executive

14 Director of the Philadelphia

15 Chapter of the Recording Academy,

16 which many of you might know,

17 produces the Grammy Awards which is

18 known as music's biggest night.

19 Thank you the legendary

20 Patti LaBelle, who was crowned as

21 the Godmother of Soul. Where is

22 she from?

23 (Philadelphia.)

24 MR. JONES: When we talk

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 about cities that have shaped music
3 globally, Philadelphia deserves a
4 prominent place in that
5 conversation. For decades,
6 Philadelphia's music recording
7 industry has been a powerhouse of
8 creativity, innovation and cultural
9 influence from the incredible music
10 recorded at the iconic Sigma Sound
11 Studios to the soulful sounds of
12 Philadelphia International Records
13 with Gamble and Huff, which
14 pioneered the birth of Philly soul.

15 This city has given the
16 entire world a sound that blended
17 lush instrumentals with deep,
18 social messages, music that has
19 transcended borders and shaped the
20 very fabric of genres such as R&B
21 and pop artists like Patti,
22 LaBelle, Teddy Pendergrass and the
23 OJs not only found their voices
24 here in Philadelphia, but they

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 found a global audience.

3 But Philadelphia

4 influence doesn't stop at neo soul.

5 The City helped ignite the rise of

6 hip hop, launching the careers of

7 Jazzy Jeff and Fresh Prince, as

8 mentioned, the Roots and Meek Mill.

9 The city's studios, producers and

10 engineers have worked behind the

11 scenes on music that has topped

12 international charts across every

13 genre, from jazz to rock, gospel to

14 electronic, classical to soul,

15 classical to folk. Beyond

16 entertainment, Philadelphia's

17 recording industry has been a

18 bridge connecting communities,

19 empowering youth and telling

20 stories that need to be heard.

21 It has contributed

22 billions to the economy, provided

23 thousands of jobs and fostered a

24 legacy of musical excellence that

2 continues to inspire artists across
3 the globe. Philadelphia is one of
4 only 12 cities in the United States
5 that has a Recording Academy
6 chapter. Our chapter not only
7 encompasses Philadelphia, but also
8 has Pennsylvania, Delaware and
9 South Jersey.

10 Many of those artists
11 and Grammy members are here in the
12 room today, so please make your
13 hands raised. There are so many
14 notable artists and Grammy winners
15 from Philadelphia and have strong
16 ties to the city. So when we talk
17 about the music that moves the
18 world, we must recognize
19 Philadelphia not only as the City
20 of Brotherly Love and Sisterly
21 Affection, but as a global capital
22 of sound. And for this, we support
23 our city being designated as the
24 Original Music City, and urge City

2 Council to designate funds to
3 support that infrastructure,
4 especially through 2026 with City
5 tourism and throughout. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: May we
8 have Tone Trump, Robin Chats,
9 Dwayne Murchison, Marquis D. Jordan
10 and Lynn Landes make their way to
11 the podium.

12 (Witnesses approached
13 podium.)

14 MR. CANNON UMSTEAD:
15 Free Palestine. We definitely need
16 more support for our Black women.
17 And much peace and power to our
18 Black musicians, Black Philadelphia
19 musicians here in chambers today.

20 To Council, Council
21 President, guests, workers and the
22 people of the city of Philadelphia,
23 good afternoon. My name is Lorenzo
24 P. Cannon Umstead. I am the

2 Northeast organizer of 205 People's
3 alliance and also represent the
4 Philly Tech Justice Collective of
5 the People's Tech Project. And I'm
6 here to support Councilmember
7 Brooks' resolution on Meta 250550.

8 At this point in our
9 city's time and place, it is not
10 wise to place the most marginalized
11 residents in our city in harm's way
12 of the harmful surveillance
13 technology that renders the people
14 of this country susceptible to the
15 selling of their personal
16 information for the profit gain of
17 a company that has roots in the
18 surveillance of people's identity.

19 There needs to be a line
20 drawn, a serious line drawn on how
21 much we seek to funnel personal
22 information of people of our city
23 at this time who are under the
24 threats of all levels -- who are

2 under the threats of all levels of
3 corporation and government. There
4 needs to be a closer look taken at
5 the complex algorithms and how we
6 are at risk and how to figure out
7 what all this even means.

8 Our people's safety is
9 being threatened at unprecedented
10 levels. We need city leaders to
11 respond and support our city's
12 people, not against. We're calling
13 for the federal government to break
14 up the Meta monopoly and we would
15 like to place pressure on its
16 legislative body to place
17 additional pressure on its city's
18 departments on how much we are
19 giving in to the corporations that
20 seek to make profit simply off of
21 our existences. Thank you all.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. DJORDAN: Hello,
24 everybody. My name is Markee Plex

2 Djordan and I want to first thank
3 City Council, Councilman Thomas for
4 having us here today. I really
5 appreciate that. I am a CEO of
6 Monster House Entertainment,
7 Executive Producer of the Philly
8 Hip Hop Awards and the Urban Film
9 Awards.

10 And let me start off by
11 saying we're not asking for a
12 handout. We're asking for
13 partnerships. And we understand
14 it's a business. Business is
15 predicated on the bottom line. You
16 want to know that your partners
17 know what they're doing and they
18 have experience. So let me talk
19 about experience real quick.

20 Time is an expensive
21 commodity that we can't get back.
22 That's the most expensive commodity
23 in life and we all have experience
24 here. By the show of hands of

2 everybody that's in the industry
3 right now, how many people been in
4 this industry for over five years?
5 Raise your hands.

6 (Hands raised.)

7 MR. DJORDAN: How many
8 have been in the industry over 10
9 years? Raise your hands.

10 (Hands raised.)

11 MR. DJORDAN: 20 years?
12 Raise your hands.

13 (Hands raised.)

14 MR. DJORDAN: Well,
15 not -- yeah. We got we got some
16 OGs here. 30 years. We got any 30
17 years?

18 (Hands raised.)

19 MR. DJORDAN: There we
20 go right there, 30 years. This is
21 telling you we have professionals
22 in this room right now that have
23 the time, professionalism and the
24 know-how to do anything you need us

2 to do as far as music and

3 entertainment in the city, anything

4 that's needed. We have it in this

5 room and all over the city. We can

6 do it for you. We just need the

7 city to meet us halfway. Thank you

8 very much for your time.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: We have

11 Lynn Landes. May Jordan

12 Brittingham, Myra Brown, Jennifer

13 Ross, Dyana Williams and David

14 Jenkins Alexander also make their

15 way to the podium.

16 (Witnesses approached

17 podium.)

18 MS. LANDES: Good

19 afternoon. I'm Lynn Landes of

20 Protocolsfordemocracy.org. While I

21 support Councilmember Brooks'

22 resolution to break up Meta, owner

23 of Facebook, Instagram and

24 WhatsApp, I question why

2 Councilmember -- why the
3 Councilmember has Facebook and
4 Instagram as well as Twitter on her
5 own City Council web page.

6 There is no good reason
7 for elected officials to require
8 their constituents to go to
9 privately-owned social media
10 companies in order to access their
11 photos, information and public
12 comments. Elected officials and
13 government agencies can put all
14 these things on their own websites.

15 Besides, many people
16 such as myself are not allowed to
17 rejoin social media companies such
18 as Facebook and Next Door due to
19 undisclosed reasons but suspected
20 political ones, in my case, my
21 anti-vaccine and anti-COVID
22 lockdown comments.

23 We need to free
24 ourselves from the grasp of social

2 media and take back our public
3 conversations to a more free and
4 fair public square, which is why I
5 strongly urge elected officials and
6 government agencies to put all
7 their content, including public
8 comments, on their own websites so
9 that anyone can at any time access
10 them. Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 MR. BRITTINGHAM: Hello.
13 My name is Jordan Brittingham. I
14 work for People's Tech Project, and
15 I'm a member of the Philly Tech
16 Council, Tech Justice Council. We
17 work specifically on tech issues
18 and we are here to support
19 Councilmember Brooks' Resolution
20 250550 to break up Meta.

21 Meta has become a
22 monopoly over our personal data and
23 become a key figure on spreading
24 misinformation since dropping their

2 fact checking at the assistance of
3 the current administration. Also,
4 with Mark Zuckerberg supporting
5 millions in the current
6 administration, the city and the
7 country need more competition when
8 it comes to news and media,
9 especially because Meta and others
10 like it utilize AI to target
11 minority communities and suppress
12 the voices of the disenfranchised.

13 This brings me to the
14 City of Philadelphia and the city's
15 use of surveillance (inaudible)
16 tech like drones and AI to detect,
17 for instance, loud music. The use
18 of this type of AI is
19 discriminatory and predatory. We
20 hope that this Council will not
21 allow AI to suppress the culture,
22 voices and music of Philadelphia's
23 Black and Brown people.

24 I thank you,

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Councilwoman Brooks, for standing
3 up to misinformation and protecting
4 our data. As a member of the Tech
5 Justice Collective, we hope that
6 the City Council will call hearings
7 regarding the purchasing and
8 utilization of tech by city
9 departments. Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: After
12 David Jenkins, Alexander, may we
13 have Reverend Greg Holston, Sam
14 Samore, Thomas Leishner, Emily
15 Leishner and Ogbonna Hagins make
16 their way to the podium.

17 (Witnesses approached
18 podium.)

19 MR. JENKINS:
20 (Inaudible).

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
22 JOHNSON: Try now. It's still off.
23 As soon as they started talking
24 that AI stuff, y'all done messed

2 the microphone up. Meta is
3 probably watching you somewhere.

4 COUNCIL TECH SUPPORT:

5 Check, check.

6 MR. JENKINS: Good
7 afternoon, Mr. President and
8 members of Council. David
9 Alexander Jenkins and I rise in
10 support of Resolution 250527, which
11 brings focus to the chambers of the
12 care and education of our youngest
13 residents.

14 Philadelphia has long
15 understood that if we want to
16 change the trajectory of poverty,
17 we must begin by investing in our
18 children, comprehensively,
19 compassionately, boldly. From
20 cradle to career, the city has
21 pioneered programs that reflect
22 this commitment.

23 It launched the PHLpreK
24 offering free high-quality for PreK

2 for thousands of children funded by
3 the Philadelphia beverage tax,
4 Philadelphia's Community School
5 initiative, transforming public
6 schools into neighborhood anchors,
7 offering food security, health
8 care, counseling, job training and
9 even music. It has offered Work
10 Ready, the Philadelphia Future
11 Track and literacy as liberation.
12 We are among the first major cities
13 to offer free breakfast and lunch
14 to every public school student
15 regardless of their income.
16 These are not just
17 programs. These are promises,
18 promises that say in this city
19 every child matters, every dream is
20 valid, every future is worth
21 fighting for. I come therefore
22 before this body to affirm a simple
23 yet powerful truth, the future that
24 we inherit is the one that we build

2 for our children.

3 I come to let it be

4 known that Philadelphia is not a

5 city where the dignity of

6 childhood, wellness and education

7 is a privilege but rather one where

8 it is a promise. I come to let it

9 be known that we have here cemented

10 the welfare of our children not as

11 a footnote in policy, but as the

12 foundation of it as we lift up

13 families through care and support

14 disarming poverty in our wake.

15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 REVEREND HOLSTON:

18 Reverend Gregory Holston, 57 Block

19 Coalition and the Tax Advisory

20 Committee for the Tax Reform

21 Commission. I'm here to support

22 the resolution from 250527, the

23 Special Committee on Early

24 Childhood Development.

2 And also, what really
3 brings me here is the events that
4 happened in Fairmount Park on
5 Memorial Day, the violence that
6 occurred, the two adults that were
7 killed, the 11 people that were
8 injured and a revelation that
9 probably our juvenile young people
10 were involved in this heinous act,
11 as our Mayor has indicated.

12 I've come before you now
13 for seven years and said to you
14 that we need to expend at least
15 \$100 million on gun violence
16 prevention. Part of what is
17 happening is that we're not really
18 spending enough to reach enough
19 young people to make a difference
20 in their lives.

21 I support this
22 resolution for early childhood
23 development because I'm hoping it
24 becomes an avenue for more

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 conversation around what our young
3 people are going through so that we
4 will invest more money in
5 prevention. The reality is that
6 our young people have been
7 traumatized most from the time they
8 were 4, 5, 6, 7 years old of what
9 they've seen, the violence they've
10 seen in the community. And I'm
11 afraid that so many who were there
12 at Lemon Hill on Memorial Day will
13 have seen that violence and they
14 will be traumatized as well.

15 The reality is that
16 trauma sometimes does not even come
17 back until you're 16, 17, 18 years
18 of age and you lose yourself, a
19 hardness of heart, a coldness of
20 heart, killing people in a cold way
21 because sometimes they want to kill
22 themselves.

23 So the reality is that
24 we need to invest more in our young

2 people, \$100 million in gun
3 violence prevention and that when
4 we cut taxes and take money out of
5 the budget, instead of putting
6 money and investing in our
7 children, we all lose, we all lose.
8 And in the long run, it's more
9 expensive for the cost that occurs
10 from children who have never been
11 taken care of, never been treated
12 for the trauma that they face.
13 Thank you so much.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: So we have
16 Sam Samore, Thomas Leishner, Emily
17 Leishner, Ogbonna Hagins and then
18 Anne Marie Dunn.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MR. SAMORE: Hi, City
22 Council. My name is Sam Samore.
23 I'm speaking in support of bills to
24 250266 and 250267. I live on 47th

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Street. I live at the corner of
3 Hazel and 47th. So I'm on the
4 street all the time. I ride my
5 bike on 47th, I drive my car on
6 47th and I walk on 47th.

7 Currently, I often don't
8 feel safe doing any of those
9 things. There's no space on the
10 street for cyclists and the road is
11 too narrow for two-way traffic. At
12 the intersection of 47th and
13 Baltimore especially, people drive
14 crazily. Remember the truck that
15 crashed (inaudible). So I think
16 the proposed changes would give
17 space to bicyclists and reduce the
18 amount of chaos and the traffic on
19 the street, making it safer for
20 all.

21 I also just want to
22 point out that the people who spoke
23 before me who said that bike lanes
24 only benefit the privileged aren't

2 telling the truth. It's not just
3 rich people who use bikes. It's
4 everyone. And I think we all know
5 that and we can see that when we
6 look around. So I hope you all
7 vote for 250266 and 250267.

8 Thanks.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 podium.)

11 MR. LEISHNER: Good
12 afternoon. My name is Thomas
13 Leishner, and I am also here to
14 speak in support of the two bills
15 regarding 47th Street. I live in
16 the 3rd District and for about the
17 past 15 years have mostly used a
18 bicycle to commute and get around
19 the city. And even though I'm not
20 really one to speak into
21 microphones, I'm here today because
22 this bill would be transformative
23 to the daily life of myself and my
24 neighbors.

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I go down 47th a lot to
3 go to Lee's Deli and (inaudible)
4 and to see neighbors, and it's also
5 been the place where I've had
6 multiple quite scary encounters
7 with drivers, including one just
8 about a month ago right before the
9 surface was removed in anticipation
10 to the repavement.

11 Especially with the
12 connector bridge that was just
13 opened connecting the Crescent
14 Trail with the Schuylkill River
15 Trail, I think this would be, yeah,
16 it would just transform how I move
17 through the city on a daily basis.
18 Thank you for your support.

19 MS. LEISHNER: Hi. Good
20 afternoon, everyone. My name is
21 Emily Jane Leishner, and I'm also
22 here today speaking in support of
23 Bills 250266 and 250267. I'm also
24 speaking to you today as a resident

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 of West Philadelphia where I moved
3 first in 2010 to 47th and Baltimore
4 Avenue, and I haven't lived outside
5 of that district, outside of 19143
6 the entire time I've been in the
7 city.

8 It's been a really
9 wonderful place to be a pedestrian
10 and to be a cyclist. I do not own
11 a car and biking is my primary mode
12 of transportation. I bike every
13 day to work in the city and
14 frequently use the Grays Ferry
15 Bridge to connect myself to the
16 rest of South Philadelphia.

17 I'm really familiar with
18 47th Street, both as a walker and
19 as a cyclist. And it's a really
20 scary street to be on. The street
21 is quite wide and allows for
22 traffic to move very quickly, and
23 visibility with traffic parked on
24 both sides makes it challenging for

2 me as a pedestrian and also for me
3 as a cyclist to see and watch out
4 for my neighbors and other
5 residents.

6 The proposed changes
7 would be really great for
8 connecting my ability to get to the
9 rest of the city of Philadelphia,
10 and I also believe it would really
11 improve the safety of residents in
12 my neighborhood. I think it would
13 slow down traffic, improve
14 visibility and protect pedestrians
15 and cyclists and all of those who
16 don't use a car on that street.
17 Anyway, so thanks very much to
18 members of City Council for
19 considering the passage of these
20 bills. Thanks.

21 MR. HAGINS: Ogbonna
22 Hagins, fourth generation chattel
23 slavery survivor and an American
24 Freedman. I rise today to support

2 Resolution 250300, honoring

3 Philadelphia Juvenile Justice

4 Service Center schools and the 20th

5 bi-annual Carpe Diem event.

6 That's a beautiful

7 thing, but we have to break these

8 words down, Juvenile Justice

9 Service Center. Juvenile means

10 young, our children. Justice means

11 fairness, repair and protection

12 under law. Service implies a duty

13 to help. And center a place of

14 focus where transformation should

15 happen. But I ask you, are we

16 delivering justice to our juveniles

17 in Philadelphia?

18 Justice is not just

19 honoring them with awards and

20 ceremonies after they've been

21 caught up in the system. Real

22 justice means ensuring they never

23 have to end up there in the first

24 place. The city is filled with

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 young people crying out for
3 justice, not only in detention
4 centers but in our neighborhoods,
5 on our corners and, yes, Lemon Hill
6 this past Memorial Day where
7 juveniles were shot, traumatized
8 and had to witness violence in real
9 time.

10 You have the blueprint,
11 your study, the Roadmap to Safer
12 Communities told you that the root
13 cause of gun violence is structural
14 racism. Solutions, large scale
15 investments in the areas that have
16 been decimated by crime, violence
17 and unemployment. And yet this
18 body has not moved legislation to
19 end structural racism. You have
20 not funded the solution. You have
21 not protected our youth in the way
22 of justice demands.

23 Our juveniles don't just
24 need a center. They need to be

2 centered in your policymaking.

3 They don't just need services.

4 They need systems that serve them.

5 The best way to honor our youth in

6 the Juvenile Justice Service Center

7 is to make sure no more youth have

8 to end up there.

9 Structural racism, the

10 Roadmap to Safer Communities, large

11 scale investments in the areas that

12 have been decimated by crime,

13 violence and unemployment. Don't

14 neglect your constitutional duty.

15 Over and out.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Council

18 President, there are no further

19 names for public com -- one more?

20 Okay.

21 (Witness approached

22 podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: The floor is yours, Anna

2 Marie.

3 MS. DUNN: Thank you.

4 My name is Anne Marie Dunn. I'm
5 here as -- I'm Deputy Commissioner
6 for Parks and Recreation here to
7 share Commissioner Slawson's
8 support of Councilman Anthony
9 Phillips' resolution seeking to
10 expand collaboration between youth
11 engagement and the Philadelphia
12 Parks and Recreation Department.

13 This resolution seeks to
14 strengthen youth leadership, civic
15 participation and cross-agency
16 coordination, thereby ensuring
17 youth voices are meaningfully
18 integrated into city decision-
19 making. Parks and Recreation has
20 already taken steps to ensure that
21 the youth feel involved in the city
22 process.

23 In response to teens not
24 having places to meet and

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 participate in outdoor activities,
3 PPR created Teen Takeover. For the
4 past two years, programming has
5 taken place with much success at
6 the Oval in East Fairmount Park,
7 and we plan to expand to more sites
8 in 2026.

9 Additionally, this
10 summer we are inviting youth back
11 to the Oval through our Touchgrass
12 Initiative. Touchgrass is
13 typically used to tell someone to
14 step away from their phone,
15 computer or other screens and
16 engage with the real world. Every
17 Thursday night PPR will invite
18 young people out for an assortment
19 of youth programming that will
20 allow them to take center stage and
21 make the stage their own.

22 This will include a
23 special night for selected youth
24 leaders to take center stage for

1 5/29/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 content creation and creativity
3 expression. This season PPR and
4 amplified voices of young leaders
5 through co-hosting opportunities
6 and creative content collaborations
7 with the PPR team. PPR intends to
8 work alongside the youth leaders of
9 Philadelphia to produce three to
10 five dynamic reels to feature
11 across PPR platforms, all driven by
12 youth voices, vision and vibe.

13 This initiative is a
14 pilot program that will kick off at
15 the Oval with the potential to grow
16 in neighborhoods throughout the
17 city. Applications will open on
18 Friday, May 30th. PPR is the
19 city's largest teen employer and we
20 are committed to helping
21 Philadelphia teens and young adults
22 find their path and their voice.
23 PPR has been working hard to
24 develop and identify youth leaders

2 so that young people will feel that
3 they are meaningfully contributing
4 to the civic process. Our youth
5 have demonstrated their goal is to
6 build a nonviolent Philadelphia.
7 Thank you.

22 bills that passed today, so I

23 wanted to take a moment to address

24 some of that. I pushed these bills

2 forward because I believe very
3 strongly that this is the right
4 decision for the overall safety of
5 all users on 57th -- or 47th
6 Street.

7 This is an especially
8 meaningful decision for me because
9 of the three elementary schools
10 along the street that draw hundreds
11 of West Philadelphia children every
12 single day and for the woman who
13 lost her life as a result of
14 injuries she suffered as a
15 pedestrian getting hit by a
16 speeding car last summer.

17 Any complicated
18 infrastructure project that crosses
19 multiple neighborhoods is going to
20 have disagreeing perspectives. I
21 accept that as an understandable
22 part of the engagement process, but
23 OTIS and my office did a lot of
24 engagement before introducing these

2 bills.

3 But what I will not
4 accept is pretending like a safety
5 problem doesn't exist because we
6 have a philosophical disagreement
7 on bike lanes or that we didn't
8 listen to community feedback or
9 that somehow reducing car traffic
10 is going to make problems worse on
11 an already bad street. That is not
12 true and that's why I put these
13 bills forward.

14 And lastly, I received a
15 letter from a young constituent
16 very neatly written on composition
17 paper that I'd like to share.

18 It says, Dear
19 Councilmember Gauthier, we should
20 keep the bike lane on 47th Street
21 because it will slow down traffic.
22 Also, grown-ups cannot ride their
23 bikes on the sidewalks. It will be
24 safer. Thank you. From Molly.

21 Avenue, to demand that Amazon
22 respects the vote of the workers
23 and honor that union and come to
24 the table.

3 first Whole Foods to unionize in
4 the country, and Amazon has been
5 using stall tactics to recognize
6 this union. They filed objections
7 with the National Labor Relations

11 were fired because they were pro
12 union. And we just want those
13 corporations to do right by the
14 workers and residents of the City
15 of Philadelphia and come to the
16 table to collectively bargain
17 because they deserve to be well
18 paid. They deserve the benefits.
19 They deserve the dignity that being
20 in the union can provide for them.
21 They voted for that. That's
22 something that they have the right
23 to do and the Amazon should respect
24 their rights.

16 preventable and when caught early,
17 it is treatable.

18 Yet far too many of our
19 constituents, particularly people
20 of color, are diagnosed too late
21 because of misinformation and lack
22 of access to dermatology care.
23 That must change. Raising
24 awareness saves lives. Promoting

3 community education is not just a
4 public health issue. It is an
5 issue of equity and justice. And
6 we must ensure that our residents

12 want to take a moment to honor one
13 of my mentors and one of
14 Philadelphia's giants, Bruce
15 Crawley. Bruce has dedicated his
16 life to uplifting our communities
17 through business, through advocacy
18 and through the relentless pursuit
19 of justice.

20 As a trailblazer in
21 marketing and public relations and
22 as a founder of the African
23 American Chamber of Commerce, Bruce
24 has always pushed us to think

3 guidance has been instrumental in
4 my own journey from community
5 advocate to public servant.

6 Bruce taught me that
7 authentic leadership requires
8 listening deeply, serving

11 recognize Melanoma Awareness Month
12 and reflect on the importance of
13 access, awareness and advocacy, I
14 can't think of a better example
15 than Bruce Crawley, a man who never
16 stopped fighting for what's right.

17 I also want to thank and
18 wish our young intern right behind
19 me, if he would stand up.

20 Rudrannahan(ph) Rudy Shahid, he has
21 been with us. He's a senior at
22 Masterman, and he's off to Cornell
23 to study economics, and he has been
24 a real asset to our office. Even

12 Women's Way expanded its impact,
13 championed civic engagement and led
14 vital racial equity initiatives

16 Philadelphia. But her leadership

18 other projects and businesses, she
19 has created pathways to
20 meaningful --

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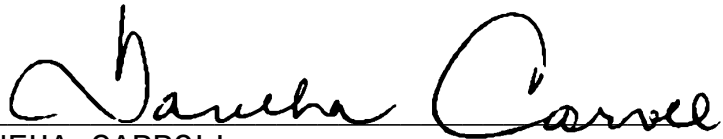
