2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Good morning, everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 And to my colleagues, good morning
10 again. I note that the hour has
11 come and that a quorum of this
12 Council is present. This Council
13 is now coming to order as members
14 will take their seats. Visitors
15 will retire to the seats outside
16 the rails.

17 We're asking for all
18 conversations to cease and/or take
19 outside the chambers. Before
20 proceeding, I will ask all those
21 present to please set your cell
22 phones to silent or vibrate. Thank
23 you.

24 To give our invocation this
25 morning, the Chair recognizes the

2 Reverend Jason Ferris. He is the
3 Pastor and Head of Staff of Old
4 Pine Street Presbyterian Church in
5 South Philadelphia, 1st
6 Councilmanic District. He is here
7 today as the guest of Councilmember
8 Squilla.

9 I would ask all members to
10 please rise as well as all guests.

11 (Councilmembers, visitors
12 and guests rise.)

13 REVEREND FERRIS: Thank
14 you. It is truly an honor to be
15 here. I just want to say a quick
16 word about the church I serve.
17 We're on the corner of 4th and
18 Pine. We were opened in 1768.
19 We're still in our same building.

20 And if you walk by our
21 churchyard, you'll see a number of
22 these little 13 star flags, over
23 200 of them. Those mark the graves
24 of men who fought in the
25 Revolutionary War. And I just

2 thought it would be a nice thing to
3 acknowledge today because it's the
4 80th anniversary of D-Day, that
5 what we're doing in this room, this
6 democratic experiment, never
7 happens perfectly but it was
8 important enough to a lot of people
9 to give their lives to.

10 And certainly, the people
11 in my church who fought believed
12 that the government should belong
13 to the people, not to a king and
14 that's why they gave their lives.
15 So it's an honor to be here. And I
16 would love if we could join our
17 hearts together in prayer.

18 Lord, make us instruments
19 of your justice. Where there is
20 hatred, let us so love. Where
21 there is harm, let us offer
22 forgiveness. Where there is doubt,
23 let us share faith. Where there is
24 despair, let us share hope. Where
25 there is darkness, let us share

2 light. Where there is sadness, let
3 us share joy.

4 O God, who made all things
5 and who makes all things new, grant
6 us the gratitude for this gift of
7 life that you've given us and give
8 us the courage to see your goodness

20 The Chair now recognizes

5 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

6 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 I move that any of the
9 following matters, if considered
10 today, may be added to the agenda
11 for this session of Council and, as
12 required by law, subsequently
13 published on an amended agenda
14 after the consideration of those
15 matters: resolutions authorizing

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 The ayes have it and the motion

7 carries.

8 The Chair recognizes

9 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

10 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Hey,
11 Council President. Just wanted to
12 make mention that former Councilman
13 Mariano was in the room, but he
14 walked back out. So I tried.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

16 Thank you very much.

17 The Chair will dispense
18 with the regular order of business
19 to recognize the guests and
20 visitors joining us in chambers
21 this morning. On behalf of all
22 members of City Council, we welcome
23 you to our Council session. We
24 appreciate you taking the time to
25 join us as we attend to the

3 We certainly invite you to come

5 At this time the Chair

6 recognizes Councilmember Cindy Bass

7 who will present a resolution

8 recognizing and honoring the

9 students of Imhotep Institute

10 Charter School STEM Program for

11 their dedication as change-makers

12 ready to tackle humanity's most

13 pressing challenges with

14 determination and innovation.

15 Would Shirley Posey,

16 Director of the STEM program at

17 Imhotep and those accompanying her

18 please join the Councilmember at

19 the podium.

20 The Chair recognizes

21 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

22 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: I'm

23 sorry. Again, Ricky came back in.

24 So, Councilman Mariano.

25 COUNCILMAN MARIANO:

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 (Inaudible).

3 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Yeah,

4 yeah, always a Councilman.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Joining Councilmember Bass is

8 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore

9 Richardson, Councilmember Quetcy

10 Lozada, Councilmember Jim Harrity.

11 (Councilmembers and guests

12 approach podium.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good

14 morning, everyone.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

16 Good morning.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good

18 morning. You know what, let's add

19 some energy into the room for these

20 young people from Imhotep Charter

21 High School who are really doing

22 some really extraordinary work.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: They

25 are doing extraordinary work not

2 just here in the City of
3 Philadelphia but around the globe,
4 and we're going to talk about that
5 really briefly. But I wanted to
6 say that I went to visit Imhotep a
7 few months ago and when I saw the
8 STEM program that they had and the
9 aquaponics -- listen, I learned a
10 whole lot from everything that was
11 done and was being built and
12 manufactured right there onsite at
13 the school, just amazing.
14 It brought tears to my eyes
15 because we hear so much about the
16 negativity around our young people.
17 When we talk about kids who are
18 doing it, they're doing it. I
19 mean, they are doing it. And so,
20 we need to recognize them and
21 applaud them and say, keep on
22 keeping on.
23 (Applause.)
24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: It's
25 going to be hard roads ahead. It's

2 going to be tough times ahead, but
3 you are on the right path and we
4 want to encourage you to keep doing
5 what you're doing because you're
6 making a difference not just here
7 in the City of Philadelphia but
8 really all across the world, all
9 around the world.

10 And so, I want to read to
11 you parts of our citation and
12 honoring and recognizing the
13 students of Imhotep Institute
14 Charter High School STEM Program
15 for their dedication as change-
16 makers, ready to tackle humanity's
17 most pressing challenges with
18 determination and innovation.

19 And whereas, Imhotep's STEM
20 program tackles real-world
21 environmental issues, particularly
22 those associated with climate
23 change. Starting in Jackson,
24 Mississippi where they design and
25 produce water filters to address

2 local water quality issues, they
3 have also used advanced 3D printing
4 technology to develop water
5 filtration systems to provide local
6 communities in need; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

8 RICHARDSON: Whereas, Imhotep's
9 impact extended beyond the local
10 boundaries, reaching international
11 destinations such as Ghana. Here
12 they embarked on an educational
13 odyssey, imparting knowledge about
14 water quality to over 3,000
15 students. This included hands-on
16 water testing and the introduction
17 of groundbreaking water filtration
18 technology.

19 Their scientific outreach
20 expanded further as the Gullah
21 Geechee community on Sapelo Island
22 sought their expertise to tackle
23 long-standing water quality
24 concerns overlooked by the state of
25 Georgia; and

3 Whereas, these STEM ambassadors
4 transcend crisis management. They
5 embody the principles of
6 sustainable development and promote
7 eco-friendly practices wherever
8 they go, currently donating 3D
9 printers to bolster their mission.

10 In Southeast Georgia, they
11 conducted a thorough analysis of
12 water quality at a local education
13 institution uncovering hazardous
14 conditions that promoted health
15 inspections and the revelation that
16 the water supply was unfit for the
17 consumption; and

18 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

19 Whereas, the students of Imhotep
20 STEM program ingeniously repurposed
21 plastic bottles from recycled bins
22 as raw material for filament
23 products, fueling their 3D printers
24 to create additional water
25 filtration systems and hydroponic

2 setups. They are cleaning up the
3 city with Project Heshima and
4 converting trash into STEM
5 treasures of water filters, pros --
6 that's one even bigger for me --
7 and hydroponics.

8 In Project NIA, they have
9 established the first hydrotech
10 farm in Philadelphia to provide a
11 solution for food deserts. Yeah,
12 man. The project has provided 2.5
13 acres of non-GMO pesticide-free
14 premium crop to the community and
15 has expanded to the community's
16 fridge. Their story emphasizes the
17 innovation and commitment in the
18 face of environmental and social
19 challenges.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Now,
21 therefore, be it Resolved, that
22 Philadelphia City Council hereby
23 recognizes and honors the students
24 at Imhotep Charter High School STEM
25 program. These young catalysts

2 stand as a testament to the power
3 of STEM, offering tangible
4 solutions to urgent challenges with
5 local and global implications.
6 Let's give them a round of
7 applause.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And I
10 did want to highlight their recent
11 trip to Ghana stands as a testament
12 to their commitment. During their
13 time in Ghana, the students and
14 faculty of Imhotep Charter High
15 School had a remarkable impact with
16 their clean water initiative where
17 they provided access to clean water
18 for over 1200 Ghanaians,
19 significantly enhancing the quality
20 of life and health in several
21 communities and their STEM
22 empowerment program where they
23 empowered over 500 Ghanaian
24 students with the knowledge and
25 skills of STEM, focusing on

2 sustainable solutions and
3 innovative thinking, and this is
4 the future and we're so proud.
5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 The Chair recognizes Shirley Posey.

9 MS. POSEY: Good morning.

10 (Good morning.)

11 MS. POSEY: Or as we like
12 to say at Imhotep Institute Charter
13 High School, hotep, which means
14 peace. So we're going to try this
15 again. When we say hotep, you all
16 say shemhotep. So hotep.

17 (Shemhotep.)

18 MS. POSEY: All right.

19 Thank you. So we would like to
20 thank and give recognition to the
21 Mayor, to Kenyatta Johnson,
22 Councilwoman Cindy Bass and her
23 office and to all the esteemed
24 members of the Council today. On
25 behalf of our CEO Baba Andre Noble,

2 our Board of Trustees and the
3 entire staff, family and the STEM
4 Ambassadors, we would like to thank
5 you for this prestigious honor.

6 When we talk about climate
7 change, there's something that
8 transcends, a common threat that
9 transcends past national borders
10 and that's climate change. Now,
11 the Mayor, we heard her speak
12 yesterday and she talked about two
13 types of people. One type of --
14 one group of people, they
15 articulate very well the problems
16 and another group of people who
17 articulate but also are creative
18 geniuses that look for solutions
19 and incorporate solutions.

20 Well, at Imhotep we have
21 solution providers. We have
22 cultivated a group of young people
23 that are making a real impact in
24 the world. When we went to Ghana
25 this year, not only did we go and

2 make an impact there but we united
3 two communities, here in
4 Philadelphia and in Ghana, whereas
5 trash is a very big problem here,
6 but with our resources and our
7 intellect our STEM Ambassadors were
8 able to collect this plastic waste,
9 use an engineering machine that we
10 have, convert it into monofilament,
11 use that monofilament in a 3D
12 printer to create water filters
13 that cleaned and saved lives.

14 So when we went there --
15 last year we went, arrived and we
16 had to take a canoe. But because
17 of climate change, we had to walk
18 the entire way because all of their
19 water had dried up. I want you to
20 picture that. Not only that, when
21 we went there the STEM Ambassadors
22 because we conduct studies as
23 scientists, we walked to their
24 drinking source which was a mile
25 away and the water that they were

2 drinking looked like this foam.

3 Through their innovation in
4 a matter of 30 minutes, they were
5 able to take water that looked like
6 this and that tested positive for
7 E. coli Clostridium and were able
8 to provide them with clean water.

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. POSEY: The children
11 literally were fighting over the
12 water because they said it tastes
13 sweet. Not only that, we were
14 trying to offer them candy or
15 treats. They said, no, no, no, we
16 want water. Not only that, we took
17 the 3D-printed material and made a
18 prosthetic limb for a villager,
19 being able to see these STEM
20 Ambassadors give somebody the
21 ability to walk through something
22 that is considered trash and
23 through their innovation.

24 So not only is our STEM
25 program at Imhotep

2 transformational, and just as
3 Councilwoman Cindy Bass talked
4 about how our city has a negative
5 light, right, from the homicide
6 cases, right, just like this phone,
7 this is the dirty drinking water
8 and the contamination our city
9 gets, but we have a light of clean
10 water, right. We have a light of
11 these STEM Ambassadors that are
12 changing the narrative of the City
13 of Philadelphia. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 Thank you.

17 Council will be at ease.
18 One second. I missed something in
19 my notes. One of our young people
20 from Imhotep just had a few remarks
21 at the podium. It's always about
22 the young people, y'all.

23 MR. WILSON: Hotep, family.

24 (Shemhotep.)

25 MR. WILSON: My name is

2 Mussah Wilson. I'm a senior from
3 the graduating class of 2024 and I
4 wanted to talk to you a little bit
5 about our STEM program. Our STEM
6 program is not simply an
7 afterschool program or an
8 extracurricular, but it's a tool,
9 it's a constellation of resources
10 that our young people use to solve
11 real-world problems in our
12 community.

13 Through our STEM
14 initiatives and our code of ethics,
15 we're able to transform
16 extraordinary students to
17 trailblazers and global changers,
18 people who actually change the
19 world. At Imhotep we have a
20 saying, it's called, Tep is the
21 standard. And I'm not saying that
22 just to say it. I say it because
23 it really is.

24 Tep is a standard because
25 we go to places like Jackson,

2 Mississippi and we assist in their
3 water crisis and the things that
4 they go through. Tep is a standard
5 because we go to places like
6 Savannah, Georgia and we get the
7 Public Health Department to shut
8 down schools that are deemed unsafe
9 for the school to be consuming the
10 water and things of that nature.

11 But most importantly, tep
12 is the standard because we answer
13 every call to action and we assist
14 our communities when they need it
15 most, and we just believe that
16 that's the best thing to do, the
17 right thing to do. So if you ever
18 need help in the City of
19 Philadelphia or anywhere globally,
20 you know where to call, Tep.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 Good job.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Oh,
24 wow.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Anybody need an intern real quick,
3 you know. You can sign him up.

4 Council will be at ease.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Chair recognizes Councilmember
8 Curtis Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
10 you so much, Mr. President.

11 With all this positivity of
12 young people, I'm inspired. But I
13 want to welcome to chambers
14 Ms. Philadelphia, Tynecia Wilson,
15 from a place called Simpson Street.
16 And for those of you who don't
17 know, a lot has happened on Simpson
18 Street. It's my ground zero in the
19 4th District, but she has managed
20 to rise above that street and
21 represent Philadelphia as our
22 Ms. America.

23 Can you stand and be
24 welcomed by Council?

25 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: A

19 non-privileged resolution

20 confirming the appointment of Tumar

21 Alexander as Regional Trustee for

22 the City of Philadelphia in

23 connection with the Pennsylvania

24 Opioid Misuse and Addiction

25 Abatement Trust.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 The ayes have it. A majority of
8 all members having voted in the
9 affirmative, the motion carries and
10 the vote by which Bill No. 240336
11 was passed has been reconsidered
12 and the bill will be placed on our
13 Second Reading and Final Passage
14 Calendar for our next session of
15 Council.

16 The next order of business
17 is the consideration of the
18 Calendar. I note that the bills
19 just reported from the Committees
20 with the suspension of rules have
21 been deemed to have had a first
22 reading. These bills will be
23 placed on the Second Reading and
24 Final Passage Calendar for the next
25 session of Council.

2 As there are no additional
3 bills on the First Reading
4 Calendar, the Chair recognizes
5 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson
6 for the purpose of calling up bills
7 and resolutions on the Second
8 Reading and Final Passage
9 Calendars.

10 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

11 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 The following bills and
14 resolutions are being called up
15 from the Second Reading and Final
16 Passage Calendars today: Nos.
17 240468, 240534, 240545, 240546,
18 240547, 240549, 240550, 240551,

21 The following bills and

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Thank you.

4 Before considering these
5 bills and resolutions, we will
6 consider public comment as follows:
7 Your public comment must concern
8 matters on the Second Reading and
9 Final Passage Calendars for
10 possible action at today's Council
11 session.

12 All speakers must sign up
13 in order to testify. If you have
14 not already sign up for today's
15 session, please do so now by giving
16 your name to Ms. Hassen at the
17 table outside the rails to my left.
18 Once you have signed up, you will
19 be called in the order in which
20 your name appears on the sign-up
21 sheet.

22 Under ideal circumstances,
23 public commenters each will have
24 three minutes to speak. However,
25 this time limit may vary from

2 session-to-session. Due to our
3 volume today, the time limit will
4 be two minutes. In order to be
5 fair to all those wishing to speak,
6 I intend to hold faithfully to the
7 two-minute limit.

8 When you begin speaking,
9 you will see a green light on the
10 podium. When there are 30 seconds
11 remaining to your time, the light
12 will turn yellow which is your
13 reminder to conclude your remarks.
14 Once two minutes have passed, the
15 light will turn red and the
16 Sergeant-at-Arms will disconnect
17 the microphone. At that point,
18 please yield the podium to the next
19 speaker if you have not already
20 done so. I also reserve the right
21 pursuant to our rules of Council to
22 limit repetitious comments on the
23 same matter -- I want to ask as we
24 move forward during the public
25 comment session and the rest of the

2 time of today's Council session, if
3 you have comments rather you're in
4 the chambers or in the balcony,
5 please take your conversations
6 outside the chambers. Thank you
7 very much.

8 I will now ask the Chief
9 Clerk to please read the name of
10 our first speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Steven
12 Sebastianelli. He has the
13 microphone -- okay.

14 MR. SEBASTIANELLI: Hello.
15 Thank you so much. I wanted to
16 thank everyone for letting me speak
17 today, this public comment. I also
18 wanted to express my appreciation
19 for the Council's efforts to
20 strengthen and protect against
21 housing for discrimination.

22 I also want to say how warm
23 I felt when reading over the bill
24 how it talked about disability
25 right alongside every other

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 discrimination. That really means
3 a lot. But -- oh, I'm sorry. I
4 just want to mention I have a
5 document for anyone in Council to
6 follow along with because I know
7 I'm hard to understand sometimes.

8 So, yes, I wanted to
9 comment on the challenge of
10 inaccessibility is discrimination.
11 I know it's not usually thought
12 about that way but -- hello, hello?
13 Is it cutting out? Am I good --
14 okay. Inaccessibility is
15 discrimination even though we don't
16 always think about it that way.

17 We often think what sort of
18 expense or financial deficit will
19 it be caused to accommodate and
20 make sure this discrimination is
21 not upheld. And I feel like with
22 every other lifting
23 indiscrimination, that would not be
24 a consideration we would ever make.
25 I understand there's challenges,

2 but I want you to take away from
3 this public comment the idea that
4 inaccessibility is discrimination.

5 I want to highlight -- is
6 it good? Hello. Okay. Sorry, it
7 keeps cutting out, I think. I
8 wanted to highlight the unique
9 challenges that people face who are
10 individuals with severe physical
11 disabilities like myself in finding
12 suitable housing. People with
13 disabilities are often stuck in
14 poverty due to financial limits set
15 up by the government to maintain
16 government benefits. These limits
17 are quite stringent, very limiting,
18 even down to saying that you cannot
19 earn a certain amount or save over
20 \$2,000, and it's really not a
21 sustainable way of living.

22 I want to talk about
23 wheelchair accessibility and what
24 that means. It means first floor
25 access or reliable elevators, open

2 floor plan, doorway design,
3 specific location for toilets next
4 to the shower to make sure a shower
5 chair can slide over. There's use
6 considerations and even more,
7 proximity to public transportation
8 for medical appointments and other
9 essential services, safety of area
10 and parking for nurses to continue
11 receiving services. And if they're
12 not safe, you don't have nurses.
13 If you don't have nurses, there's
14 no way to live in my situation.
15 You need additional rooms
16 because of medical storage
17 equipment and also the potential of
18 a living aide. You're not able to
19 have a roommate, which is a
20 standard solution for most people
21 who are low-income where you just
22 get a roommate and then split the
23 cost. However, trying to find
24 someone in a situation where they
25 have a three- or four-bedroom

2 apartment that they want to take
3 only one bedroom but then pay the
4 difference that I cannot afford, it
5 just is not an available option.
6 And even if it was, I wouldn't be
7 allowed to do that because it would
8 be counted as a gift.

9 You know, all these
10 considerations put housing cost
11 somewhere between \$2,000 to \$4,000
12 a month for suitable housing, and
13 that would be around \$90,000 a year
14 that you need to earn to be able to
15 afford housing if it was not based
16 on income-based housing programs.

17 Below you'll see a couple
18 sections, Section 9108-M, which
19 (inaudible) of refusing or
20 restraining housing -- sorry,
21 refusing or restricting housing
22 accommodations based on tenant
23 source of income. And I think this
24 could expand to include eligibility
25 discrimination based on disability-

2 related accommodations and
3 extending circumstances, things
4 like additional rooms for medical
5 storage, living aides, service
6 animals, emotional support animals,
7 installation of necessary
8 accessibility features.

9 Not allowing tenants to go
10 to college while they're living in
11 low-income housing, yes, that is a
12 thing. Imposing additional fees or
13 deposits on tenants because of
14 their disabilities and the
15 additional accommodations that they
16 need to live there.

17 And you can see in the next
18 page that I gave a possible way of
19 working in inclusion. Please look
20 at that over your leisure. Next is
21 Section 91108-I, which prohibits
22 false or misleading information
23 about the properties availability
24 or eligibility based on a tenant's
25 source of income. I think that

2 could also be expanded to include
3 elements of disability, talking
4 about their false advertisement of
5 accessibility, advertisement on
6 accessibility sites even though you
7 investigate and they say it's
8 accessible if you can go up two
9 flights of stairs to get into the
10 place. I've actually been told
11 that before, or people saying that
12 they do not use low-income housing
13 tax credit programs or other
14 flexible low-income programs even
15 though their advertisers are doing
16 so and they're on the list for
17 such.

18 And people ask why is this
19 not just an ADA regulation, why is
20 this something that we should talk
21 about in these bills. Well,
22 first -- kind of funny. I was told
23 I had to relate it directly to the
24 bills that we're talking about and
25 the amendments, so there we go.

2 However, there's a concept
3 of redundancy equals validity and
4 irrefutability. The concept that
5 when people are looking for laws
6 and things that have to be upheld,
7 they look for repeated working --
8 for repeated concepts. And if it's
9 only in one location, it can often
10 be overlooked or completely
11 disregarded.

12 I think it's an important
13 topic that we should discuss nor is
14 there really a better place to
15 bring it up. Perhaps this
16 discussion could lead to more act
17 reform somewhere in a specific
18 place, specifically talking about
19 disability and the way we can
20 include it into all legislation.

21 I wanted to just really
22 quickly go into my personal story
23 and ask for any help or any
24 understanding that could be
25 presented. I'm living in a

2 low-income housing tax credit
3 property. I've been there for 10
4 years. I moved in because I was
5 dating someone who worked at
6 Liberty Resources and they were
7 able to get me in as it was being
8 built. I'm not sure if that's
9 allowed to happen technically, but
10 it did and thank goodness because I
11 would have nowhere else to live
12 otherwise.

13 Now, it was really great
14 for a little bit under a year until
15 it started flooding with raw
16 sewage, every four months for
17 several years. It was horrible. I
18 had to keep going into hotels
19 spending upwards of two years in
20 hotels over the past 10 years as I
21 was working on trying to fix the
22 issue, trying to involve Congress
23 people, trying to involve Licenses
24 and Inspections, Water Department,
25 PHFA.

2 And over this time with
3 these constant floodings, I
4 suspected that mold was growing and
5 I was denied that information by
6 the apartment complex because
7 there's nothing that legally says
8 they have to tell you. So this
9 information was withheld or just
10 not revealed to me and they didn't
11 have the information supposedly.

12 However, this presence of
13 mold started causing a lot of
14 problems, increases in anxiety and
15 stress having to move back and
16 forth and dealing with landlords
17 that wanted to push down your
18 opinions, push down your emotions.
19 They wanted to make it so their
20 legal department would make you
21 stop talking to different people
22 being open about the challenges
23 they're experiencing, asking for
24 help on different social media
25 sites.

2 And on top of all that, on
3 top of that abusive practice which
4 I would call it abusive practice,
5 they did not understand that I was
6 getting worse and worse symptoms
7 every day that I live at this
8 apartment, that I'm still at, mind
9 you. Symptoms as severe as severe
10 migraines, gastrointestinal issues,
11 weight loss, worsening respiratory
12 conditions which is very bad for
13 someone who's already very
14 susceptible and compromised
15 respiratorily.

16 Diabetes-like symptoms
17 appearing, which was stopping me
18 from getting my nutritional
19 supplement causing weight loss.
20 Mind fog, greater weakness on top
21 of my already progressive
22 disability but at a much more
23 increased rate, chronic fatigue,
24 brain aneurysm developing, chronic
25 fatigue, taking 17-plus hours a day

2 sleeping to function.

3 It just was not okay, and I
4 tried for seven years to find
5 somewhere else to live. I found
6 nothing but long waiting lists,
7 things that they claim only are 3
8 to 15 years, but more accurately
9 cost a lifetime because people did
10 not want to move out.

11 There's a couple more
12 things that I'd like to mention.
13 However, I'm just going to say
14 please if anyone on Council would
15 like to hear more information as
16 they read more details, please
17 reach out to me. My phone contact,
18 my email is there. Come talk to me
19 afterwards. I appreciate any help
20 and I appreciate any more thoughts
21 regarding the situation on
22 accessibility. Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Tonya

3 McClary. May Kate Perez, Jordan

4 Yarborough and Glenn Bryan also

5 make their way to the podium.

6 Tanya McClary, Kate Perez.

7 (Witnesses approached

8 podium.)

9 MS. PEREZ: Hello. Okay.

10 My name's Kate Perez. The

11 ceasefire petition I emailed all of

12 you is now at 346 signatures that

13 all agree that Philadelphia is

14 complicit in genocide. I have 34

15 handwritten letters gathered at a

16 vigil where we mourn the loss of

17 more than 45,000 human beings, more

18 than 80,000 maimed and more than

19 25,000 children orphaned.

20 Actual death tolls are

21 unknown as Israel has

22 systematically wiped out

23 journalists, cut off an entire

24 country's Wi-Fi and decimated 80

25 percent of civilian infrastructure.

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 On 240280, I don't have faith in
3 our Philadelphia Police Department
4 to appropriately handle hate
5 crimes. It's a conflict of
6 interest as our own officers are
7 cross-trained by the well-
8 documented racist apartheid state
9 of Israel that's already been taken
10 to International Court on charges
11 of ethnic cleansing, collective
12 punishment, forced starvation and
13 more.

14 During the bill's public
15 meeting, the PPD representative
16 couldn't even produce
17 Philadelphia's hate crime
18 statistics when asked. As a
19 citizen, it feels like it's either
20 a lack of competence or they're
21 hiding the numbers. By Israel
22 indiscriminately killing
23 Palestinians and then increasing
24 our state war bonds, we are the
25 ones who are encouraging hate

2 crimes.

3 By staying silent, you are
4 telling the zionists back home that
5 it's okay to stab a 6-year-old to
6 death if they're Palestinian. By
7 saying nothing, you are empowering
8 Zionists to show up in the middle
9 of the night at the Swarthmore
10 encampment and shoot fireworks into
11 the tents.

12 Councilmembers say a
13 ceasefire resolution would be
14 performative but pass resolutions
15 every week begging Biden to fund
16 our social services and honor a
17 middle school class. By doing
18 this, we're ignoring the fact that
19 Israel has killed so many children
20 that Gaza had to cancel the 2024
21 school year and then they used all
22 of our Social Security money to buy
23 the bombs to drop on the schools.

24 Just yesterday they
25 murdered over 100 people sheltering

2 in a school in a refugee camp.
3 More than 15,000 children have
4 already been murdered and all of
5 them were ours. You can't condemn
6 Hamas for killing 1200 people and
7 then vote on street names while
8 trading cops and selling weapons to
9 the occupation that's burning
10 Palestinians alive right now.

11 A ceasefire is the bare
12 minimum. We're supposed to cut all
13 ties with Israel. Stop selling
14 them weapons. Stop funding war
15 crimes and free Palenstine.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Is Tanya
18 McClary here?

19 (Yes.)

20 (Witness approached
21 podium.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Okay. Will
23 Jordan Yarborough, Glenn Bryan,
24 Elise Betz and then Stephanie Renee
25 also make their way to the podium.

3 morning, members of Council.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Good morning.

6 REVEREND McCLARY: My name
7 is Reverend Tanya McClary and I am
8 the Executive Director of the
9 Citizens Police Oversight
10 Commission. Many people know us as
11 the CPOC as well as the newly-
12 appointed Pastor of Calvary Church
13 right here in the City of
14 Philadelphia.

15 I am here today to
16 enthusiastically support the
17 proposed amendment to CPOC's
18 ordinance. We are grateful to
19 Councilmember Jones for all his
20 support to our agency and for his
21 leadership in this process. Like
22 any fledgling agency, the necessity
23 of process changes becomes apparent
24 as experience is gained. And while
25 this is the first adjustment to our

2 founding legislation, it probably
3 won't be the last.

4 This amendment modifies the
5 removal mechanism for CPOC's Board
6 of Commissioners, allowing the
7 Commission to address serious
8 misconduct issues that should they
9 arise. Secondly, the amendment
10 provides important clarification of
11 the terms and the ordinance. These
12 changes will help our young agency
13 to continue to grow and fulfill the
14 important duties that we are tasked
15 with.

16 The ordinance's existing
17 removal mechanism applies only to
18 situations where a member of the
19 Commission is being removed for
20 cause. This means misconduct,
21 inability or failure to perform
22 required duties or ethical
23 violations. The ordinance also
24 required that any person being
25 removed have due process

2 protections, including notice and
3 the opportunity to be heard at a
4 hearing.

5 All of these important
6 provisions remain the same. And
7 under the existing process, only
8 City Council can remove a member of
9 the Commission employing a process
10 that can be time-consuming and
11 difficult to navigate given the
12 magnitude and the scope and the
13 volume of City Council's
14 responsibilities.

15 This amendment creates an
16 interim step that allows the Board
17 of Commissioners to address serious
18 misconduct by voting to remove a
19 member where necessary with the
20 same due process protections.
21 Furthermore, the removal will not
22 be finalized until you all, City
23 Council, has had the opportunity to
24 vote to supersede the removal.

25 The suspension mechanism

2 simply allows time to complete this
3 thorough investigation into the
4 alleged misconduct or allow time
5 for City Council to review board
6 removal. Suspension allows the
7 Commission to protect confidential
8 information during that process.
9 In addition, the amendment
10 clarifies the definitions which
11 include the Board of the Citizens
12 Police Oversight Commission and the
13 department, meaning the
14 Philadelphia Police Department.
15 Thank you for your time and
16 attention and I would be happy to
17 answer any questions.
18 (Applause.)
19 CHIEF CLERK: Jordan
20 Yarborough.
21 (Witness approached
22 podium.)
23 MR. YARBOROUGH: All right.
24 Give me a second. It's in my
25 phone. All right. I came to -- my

15 MR. YARBOROUGH: I came
16 here to talk about five different
17 bills and resolutions but when I
18 realize that you get two minutes to
19 go through everything that you
20 have, I don't think I'm going to be
21 able to talk about all five
22 different bills and resolutions
23 when it comes to two minutes a
24 piece.

25 So, yeah, I'm Jordan

2 Yarborough. I'm trying to be a
3 young politician. I'm at CCP for
4 liberal studies. If anybody -- I
5 made contact with a bunch of you
6 before we came here today. I would
7 love a minute of your time to talk
8 about bills and resolutions after
9 we get out of here. Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

11 You're welcome.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Glenn Bryan,
14 then Elise Betz, Stephanie Renee
15 and Mark Macyk.

16 (Witnesses approached
17 podium.)

18 MR. BRYAN: Hi. Good
19 morning. My name is Glenn Bryan
20 and I'm the Assistant Vice-
21 President of University of
22 Pennsylvania's Office of Government
23 and Community Affairs. I'd first
24 like to thank Council Councilmember
25 Gauthier and the members of city

2 Council for bringing forth a
3 resolution to recognize and
4 celebrate the remarkable
5 achievements of Dr. Gloria Twine
6 Chisum.

7 Dr. Chisum's academic
8 pursuits led her to the University
9 of Pennsylvania where she earned
10 her Ph.D. in 1960. This marked the
11 beginning of a historic career
12 characterized by pioneering
13 research and an enduring commitment
14 to public Service. Dr. Chisum's
15 work in psychology and aerospace
16 technology earned her numerous
17 awards, including the George
18 Washington Carver Scientific
19 Achievement Award, the Alumni Award
20 of Merit from the University of
21 Pennsylvania.

22 It was her love for Penn
23 where Dr. Chisum became the first,
24 the first, African American woman
25 to serve as a member of the Board

2 of Trustees that I'm especially
3 proud to speak about today. Her
4 leadership roles within the
5 University included chairing the
6 Boards of Advisors for the School
7 of Social Policy and Practice in
8 the Graduate School of Education.

9 Her and her late husband,
10 who I knew very well, gave generous
11 support, spanned multiple schools
12 and initiatives at Penn helping to
13 shape Penn into the institution
14 that it is today. Dr. Chisum's
15 dedication extended beyond Penn and
16 into the Heart of Philadelphia
17 through her leadership and
18 involvement with the Free Library,
19 William Penn Foundation, Pew
20 Charitable Trust, the American
21 Psychological Association and many,
22 many more.

23 In celebrating Dr. Gloria
24 Twine Chisum, we honor not only her
25 professional achievements but also

2 her profound impact on our
3 community and city. May her legacy
4 of service and dedication inspire
5 us all. Thank you for the
6 opportunity.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Elise Betz.

9 (Witness approached
10 podium.)

11 MS. BETZ: Good morning. I
12 am Elise Betz. I'm the Senior
13 Executive Director of Alumni
14 Relations at Penn. I'd like to
15 thank Councilmember Gauthier and
16 the members of City Council for
17 your service to our community and
18 for today recognizing the
19 extraordinary accomplishments of
20 Dr. Gloria Twine Chisum. I have
21 had the honor of knowing and
22 working with Dr. Chisum for 24
23 years and her beloved Jack until he
24 passed away.

25 The Drs. Chisum were

2 everywhere at Penn. Paging through
3 Penn photo albums, I found dozens
4 of pictures of the Chisums at
5 events, at board meetings,
6 literally everywhere. In
7 Dr. Chisum's 50 years of service as
8 a trustee at Penn, she has done
9 more in support of students, alumni
10 faculty and staff of color than any
11 of our 300,000 living alumni.

12 In 1993, Dr. Chisum founded
13 what was then called the Committee
14 on Minority Permanence at Penn and
15 is now the James Brister Society.
16 These alumni leaders by power of
17 their example support and promote
18 Penn's efforts to attract,
19 encourage and maintain a culturally
20 diverse community of faculty,
21 students, administrators, staff and
22 volunteers, enriching the
23 University as a whole.

24 Penn now has Black and
25 Brown leaders on every single one

2 of our boards where decisions are
3 made. Penn students see themselves
4 in our leaders. Daina Richie Troy,
5 who's sitting right over there, who
6 is a Penn alum, JBS member and
7 staff member said, Having someone
8 so accomplished extend themselves
9 to you when you don't yet know your
10 potential was truly impactful. She
11 invited us to think bigger, reach
12 farther and be confident in
13 ourselves and our right to share
14 our talents.

15 Michael Barrett, Penn
16 Trustee, Penn Alumni President and
17 James Brister Society Chair said,
18 Dr. Chisum is a history-maker.
19 Every Chair of the Brister Society
20 has sought her guidance and
21 leadership over the years. She is
22 our guiding light. Every Trustee
23 of color owes Dr. Chisum a huge
24 thank you for creating the
25 opportunities for us to follow her

2 lead and we are grateful to stand
3 on her strong and broad shoulders.
4 We are honored to have her as our
5 true north star.

6 (Timer beeped.)

7 MS. BETZ: That's
8 Dr. Chisum telling me to finish up.
9 Our north star, Penn's north star,
10 Dr. Gloria Chisum, you are our
11 beacon. Thank you and thank you,
12 City of Philadelphia.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Stephanie
15 Renee.

16 MS. RENEE: Good morning.
17 I'm not a native Philadelphian, but
18 just like John Coltrane, Nina
19 Simone and countless other
20 wonderful legends in music, I came
21 here to lay some roots and grow
22 professionally. And I volunteered
23 to lead Make Music Day Philly 2024
24 as a way to give back to the City
25 that's given me so much and

2 developed me as a professional.

3 I want to thank

4 Councilmember Landau, her staff,

5 Cheryl Carson and the good folks at

6 Smith Memorial Playground for

7 responding enthusiastically to our

8 call to make one day in

9 Philadelphia all about free musical

10 performance everywhere. But I have

11 to let you know that there are some

12 large institutions in this City who

13 receive millions of dollars in

14 endowments and grant monies who

15 were at best indifferent or just

16 said that they would not provide

17 staffing, the funding for staffing

18 for a few hours to have musical

19 performances at their venue.

20 So today I'd like to

21 challenge Philadelphia City

22 Council, Mayor Parker's

23 Administration, those institutions

24 and others throughout the City to

25 sign up, to be all in. If we're

2 the City of Brotherly Love and
3 Sisterly Affection with such an
4 indelible musical legacy, then we
5 need more people to step up for one
6 day.

7 June 21st is what we ask
8 annually to join 1,200 other global

10 live music and to uplift homegrown
11 talent. And so, I hope you all
12 will seek me out if you're
13 interested in joining the effort
14 this year or moving forward in the
15 future. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Mark Macyk.
18 May Donna Sields, Queen Judith
19 Robinson and Cathy Kaufman also
20 make their way to the podium.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 podium.)

23 MS. MACYK: Hi. My name is
24 Mark Macyk. I won the Lindback
25 Award for Distinguished Teachers

2 with my colleague Miya Benintende
3 who's over here. I teach at Edward
4 Steel Elementary School up in
5 Nicetown. And when I told my
6 students I was going to come here
7 to address the Council, I said what
8 should I say. And they said,
9 please tell everyone that we don't
10 like the food in the school.

11 And I said, okay, how about
12 something good. And one of my
13 students rose her hand and said,
14 say you have the best bilingual
15 student in the whole city. And I
16 do, and her name is Zuri Feliz
17 Diaz. And you guys will meet her
18 eventually on her way up I'm sure.

19 And then another kid said,
20 please tell them that we don't like
21 the food in the school. I said,
22 okay, but how about something good.
23 They said, tell them about us, tell
24 them about our homeroom. And this
25 is my homeroom in Nicetown where

2 they came and they filmed our class
3 as the way to train all the other
4 classes to show what reading should
5 be like. And I said, I'll tell
6 them about that. I'll tell them
7 about you guys, the nice kids from
8 Nicetown. And then they said,
9 okay, but please tell them we don't
10 like the food in the school. And I
11 said, okay.

12 And then one girl, she
13 threw her hands up and she said, I
14 knew this was going to happen.
15 You're going to become too famous
16 and you're going to leave us for a
17 good school. And I said, this is a
18 good school and why would I leave
19 here, Steel is my home. And the
20 thing is good teaching doesn't
21 happen in a vacuum. We have great
22 teachers. We have great students.
23 We have it all, but we can't do it
24 without support from City Council
25 from all the people because we do

2 have these wonderful students and
3 teachers in Nicetown at Steel. And
4 I just wanted to have the
5 opportunity to address you. Thank
6 you guys so much.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Donna Siels.
9 Then Queen Judith Robinson, Cathy
10 Kaufman and Jeremy Blatstein.

11 MS. SIELDS: Good morning,
12 City Council. My name is Donna J.
13 Siels. I currently live in
14 Southwest Philadelphia in Council
15 President Johnson's District.
16 Council President Johnson, I want
17 to thank you sincerely for
18 responding to my neighborhood's
19 needs and helping us repave our
20 driveways.

21 I'm here to testify on Bill
22 240370, which renames the West Oak
23 Lane Library the Dwight Evans
24 Library. I'm glad City Council is
25 honoring Representative Evans' work

2 and education and I hope

3 Councilmembers consider carrying on

4 his work by increasing the share of

5 property taxes going to the School

6 District to 60 percent.

7 I am a registered nurse in

8 the Philadelphia School District

9 and I serve nearly 800 students.

10 My colleagues and I are constantly

11 enduring hardships of numerous

12 students experiencing the loss of

13 parents, homelessness, assaults,

14 abuse, depression, isolation,

15 anxiety, unworthiness and identity

16 crisis.

17 As staff members required

18 to complete state-mandated

19 benchmarks, we do not possess the

20 bandwidth to support these students

21 through the traumatic experiences

22 which consume them and inhibit

23 their ability to thrive

24 academically. I graduated from the

25 School District of Philadelphia and

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I have experienced massive
3 detrimental effects due to the lack
4 of educational and recreational
5 resources that resulted from
6 chronic cuts and underfunding.

7 Although I overcame those
8 challenges, it took finding
9 organizations who poured into me as
10 an adult what I was lacking
11 throughout my childhood. We must
12 remain diligent and mindful of the
13 historical austerities which have
14 yet to provide equality throughout
15 our city, the family dichotomy
16 which was borne from ancestral
17 trauma.

18 We have to be fully vested
19 in seeing Philly students succeed
20 no matter what they've been
21 through. Only then will we see
22 true brotherly love. We can not
23 fund the District and expect the
24 student experiences will be better
25 than what I experienced. The

2 School District must have enough
3 resources and staff to help our
4 children.

5 We need more compassionate
6 counselors, productive social
7 workers, caring nurses and partner
8 organizations who hold the interest
9 of our students' passionate beliefs
10 and pursuits. We will not see the
11 change necessary for the betterment
12 of our society unless we invest in
13 our schools. Please increase the
14 share of property taxes going to
15 Philadelphia schools to 60 percent
16 where it used to be. Thank you.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Queen Judith
18 Robinson. Then Cathy Kaufman,
19 Jeremy Blatstein and Rebecca Jean
20 Murphy.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 podium.)

23 MS. ROBINSON: Yes. Good
24 morning. Queen Judith Robinson
25 here. Hold on. According to the

2 Philadelphia Gay News, survey says
3 racism, yes, deep-seated racism,
4 institutional racism is the number
5 one area of discrimination in
6 America and right here in
7 Philadelphia, number one area of
8 discrimination.

9 Regarding the Zoning
10 Board -- trying to hit all these
11 areas -- major conflict coming our
12 way. We can't have this recusing
13 and moving back and forth after
14 deals have been crafted. We have a
15 \$32 million police facility that's
16 being bullied down our throat in
17 North Philadelphia where
18 gentrification is in the midst,
19 okay, and people are coming on
20 board to rubber stamp.

21 We are challenging it now
22 saying hell no. We want you to
23 know that we have five different
24 police forces overpolicing us in
25 North Philly and we still have

2 murder and mayhem, so we need to
3 clarify what's going on with our
4 police department as it relates to
5 \$32 million. And our rec centers
6 and our libraries are in need of
7 repairs. We're getting painting on
8 outside and we have no repairs
9 inside. Legacy of former Council
10 President Darrell Clarke, shame on
11 the mess.

12 Housing Trust, if we don't
13 rein in PHA and this wheeling and
14 dealing going on, Housing Trust is
15 not worthy of trust. Firearms,
16 yes, I agree 87 percent, am I
17 correct, of the crimes were
18 committed in our great city with
19 these illegal unserialized firearms,
20 so whatever we could do to call the
21 ATF in. When we're asking the
22 President for something, remember,
23 no permanent enemies, no permanent
24 friends, just permanent agenda,
25 Black people. Ask for something

2 that can help us in our community.
3 Thank you very much for the time.
4 Thank you very much for your time.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Cathy
6 Kaufman.

7 MS. KAUFMAN: Good morning.
8 Can you all hear me? My name is
9 Cathy Kaufman. I live at Broad and
10 Pine in District 2, Council
11 President Johnson's District. And
12 I'm here on behalf of Bill 240370,
13 which renames the West Oak Lane
14 Library the Dwight Evans Library in
15 honor of Representative Evans'
16 supportive education.

17 I'm urging City Council to
18 continue his legacy by
19 strengthening educational
20 opportunities in Philadelphia.
21 Please expand Philadelphia PreK by
22 250 seats and increase the millage
23 rate going to the District to 60
24 percent. I lived and worked in
25 Lower Merion School District for 25

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 years. My children attended Lower
3 Merion public schools and had all
4 the resources and services they
5 needed at their fingertips, both
6 academic and enrichment.

7 Since retiring in 2022, I
8 serve on the Boards of First Up,
9 which is a nonprofit committed to
10 early childhood education, and
11 Reading Aloud, a literacy nonprofit
12 that provides specialized reading
13 instruction to underserved students
14 in Philadelphia. For the past
15 three years, Reading Aloud has
16 worked with General Meade
17 Elementary.

18 The difference between the
19 school in Lower Merion where I
20 taught and Meade Elementary is
21 striking. Meade has crowded
22 classes and the academic and
23 emotional needs of the kids are
24 profound without the resources to
25 adequately address them. The

2 principal and staff at Meade are
3 deeply committed to their students
4 and they do the best they can. But
5 I'm sad to say that if Reading
6 Aloud did not get the private
7 funding to work at Meade the
8 children there would not have
9 received the interventions they
10 need to even begin to advance their
11 reading proficiency.

12 You have a handout called
13 Now is the Time, which indicates
14 that 58 percent of students across
15 the City and in your Districts are
16 failing the reading PSSA. Without
17 supports like PreK and adequate
18 school funding, reading scores will
19 not improve. Right now just over
20 half of Philadelphia adults are
21 functionally illiterate and nearly
22 two-thirds are low literate.

23 If Philadelphia is to
24 become a city that people want to
25 move to, to pay taxes to, to raise

2 children in, then we need to start
3 investing in education. That's why
4 I'm asking City Council to expand
5 Philadelphia PreK by 250 seats and
6 to increase the millage rate going
7 to the School District to 60
8 percent.

9 PreK provides a strong
10 academic start and school funding
11 will ensure that these students
12 will not continue their journeys
13 underfunded, understaffed and
14 underresourced. To quote Mayor
15 Parker, we're not interested in
16 speeches. We're watching what you
17 do. Our students deserve the same
18 prospects as the students in
19 districts like Lower Merion. Thank
20 you.

21 (Applause.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
23 Blatstein. Can Rebecca Jean
24 Murphy, Connor Hogan and Jake
25 Zychick please also make their way

2 to the podium.

3 (Witnesses approached
4 podium.)

5 MR. BLATSTEIN: Good
6 morning. 10 minutes late, but
7 we'll let it slide. I'm Jeremy
8 Blatstein and I'm talking in
9 support of Resolution 240545
10 introduced by Councilmember Landau,
11 a resolution declaring the City of
12 Philadelphia's commitment to
13 protect the rights and equal
14 protections of all LGBTQ+
15 Philadelphians in light of the
16 recent increase in attempts to
17 restrict the rights of transgender
18 people.

19 It's really an amazing
20 thing, and I just really want to
21 acknowledge Councilmember Landau
22 for being the first openly member
23 of the LGBTQ+ community and the
24 impact that she has been doing for
25 the community to really fight for

1 6/6/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 their rights and really have their
3 voice.

4 I also want to just do a
5 quick mention of Stonewall for
6 those people who aren't aware of
7 that. It's a sports league for
8 people in the community. I've
9 participated as an ally and I
10 really think that it's something
11 that really brings new people to
12 the City of Philadelphia together
13 and I encourage you to pass that
14 along to your constituents.

15 And the last point that I
16 would like to make is in regard to
17 the increase on the Homestead
18 exemption that is going up by
19 \$20,000. And really what is the
20 impact that that is going to have
21 on the Philadelphia School
22 District? By my estimate, it's
23 probably \$10 million a year and
24 over 10 years that's \$100 million.

25 So similarly what people

3 we doing to either replace that
4 income or really look at that
5 because that's something that we
6 just took another \$250 million from
7 the School District over 10 years,
8 and that has been something that
9 just got put in that I don't

12 but I appreciate that and I hope
13 we'll be on time next week. Thank
14 you.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Rebecca Jean
16 Murphy, Connor Hogan, Jake Zychick
17 and Anthony McNeil.

18 (Witnesses approached
19 podium.)

20 MS. MURPHY: Good morning.
21 I'm Jean Murphy. Thank you to
22 everyone in this room for your
23 service to Philadelphia. I am the
24 manager for the Annual fund and
25 Leadership Giving at University of

2 the Arts. I'm also a member of the
3 UArts staff union with United
4 Academics of Philadelphia. Like
5 many of my colleagues, I heard
6 about UArt's closure through the
7 Inquirer article published in the
8 evening of May 31st.

9 Former President Kerry Walk
10 and the Board of Trustees did not
11 send us official communication
12 until an hour and a half later, and
13 this lack of transparent and prompt
14 communication with our community
15 has become the embarrassing
16 precedent in the wake of the
17 closure announcement. Faculty,
18 staff and students have been
19 showing up to campus so we can pick
20 up the pieces left after this
21 catastrophe and support one
22 another.

23 Where are our leaders
24 though? In addition to our leaders
25 not being on campus this week, we

2 have also not heard definitive
3 answers about what is expected of
4 us in this closure. I do not know
5 the details of my pay, my benefits
6 or even my employment status. I'm
7 speaking here in support of the
8 resolution to investigate the
9 unprecedented and heartbreaking
10 closure of UArts so we can hold the
11 Board of Trustees and all
12 responsible parties accountable.

13 I've worked at UArts for
14 less than two years, but in my time
15 I have felt the importance of this
16 institution in the Philadelphia
17 community. For it to be gutted
18 without notice will be felt for
19 years to come. On the same day
20 former President Walk resigned, the
21 University canceled impact
22 negotiation with the faculty and
23 staff unions and have yet to give
24 us a new date.

25 Yesterday, June 5th, our

2 union filed an unfair labor
3 practice charge in response to the
4 cancellation. Again, I'm here to
5 vocalize my support of the
6 resolution by Councilmember Squilla
7 to investigate the UArts closure
8 not only so this community can get
9 much needed answers but also to
10 prevent the situation from
11 happening in other communities.

12 UArts leaders have failed
13 our students, faculty, staff and
14 the entire UArts -- the entire
15 Philadelphia arts and culture
16 community. As leaders of the City,
17 I'm asking you to not fail us as
18 they have, to get answers to why
19 this is happening and to help us.
20 Thank you for your time and thank
21 you for your solidarity.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Connor Hogan,
24 Jake Zychick, Anthony McNeil and
25 then Lynn Landes.

2 MR. HOGAN: Good afternoon.

3 My name is Connor Hogan and I am an
4 Associate Adjunct Professor at the
5 University of the Arts. I'm also a
6 member of The UArts faculty union.
7 I'm here to speak in support of
8 Councilmember Squilla's resolution
9 to hold a hearing in the closure of
10 UAarts.

11 Last Friday evening I read
12 about the UArts closure from an
13 article in the Philly Inquirer like
14 my fellow faculty staff and over
15 1300 undergraduate students. We
16 learned from the media that on June
17 6th one week later our school's
18 doors would be closed. Email
19 communications from President Kerry
20 Walk and the Board of Trustees sent
21 over the weekend offered no clear
22 answers. On June 4th a town hall
23 that promised information on this
24 closure was canceled 10 minutes
25 before its scheduled time.

2 The United Academics of
3 Philadelphia, the union which I am
4 a proud member of, has been trying
5 to get negotiations scheduled on
6 this unheard of closure and its
7 impact on our union members. I
8 moved to Philadelphia in 2017 to
9 attain a Master's degree at the
10 UArts. In 2023 I had the great
11 honor to teach these brilliant
12 students who are now left stranded.

13 UArts is more than just my
14 livelihood. It's my community here
15 in Philly and its absence we felt
16 throughout the whole city. My
17 story is just one of many. With
18 this closure, faculty, staff and
19 students have found a frustrating
20 and enraging end to this
21 institution that has been a vital
22 part of the artistic ecosystem of
23 Philadelphia. The least we can get
24 from this loss is answers.

25 On Tuesday, the Board of

2 Trustees canceled our impact
3 negotiations again on short notice.
4 As of today, we have no detailed
5 information on pay, employment
6 status or benefits. Students have
7 yet to receive any information on a
8 teach-out plan. Staff have
9 received no directives and yet
10 still come in every day to get
11 their jobs done.

12 Former President Walk and
13 the Board have offered nothing but
14 useless sentimental messages and
15 canceled meetings. We need
16 answers. We need transparency. We
17 need City Council to hold the Board
18 of Trustees accountable for this
19 closure and its impact on the
20 community. I ask that you please
21 support the resolution to hold a
22 hearing on this closure. Thank
23 you.

24 (Applause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Jake Zychick.

4 (Witnesses approached
5 podium.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Hello. My
7 name is Jacob Zychick. I'm with
8 the American Heart Association and
9 thank you so much for having me
10 today. First off, I would like to
11 wish everyone a Happy Pride Month
12 this month. And then second off,
13 I'd like to thank Councilmember
14 Ahmad and the entire City Council
15 for honoring June 10, 2024 as a
16 centennial celebration of the
17 American Heart Association.

18 The American Heart
19 Association was founded in June
20 1924 and since its inception,
21 deaths have been cut in half by
22 cardiovascular disease. The
23 American Heart Association has
24 awarded over \$5.7 billion in
25 cardiovascular medical research,

2 making us only second to the United
3 States government.

4 I really want to talk about
5 the local impact that the American
6 Heart Association has had in
7 Philadelphia. We've trained nearly
8 60,000 individuals in life-saving
9 hands-only CPR, including 25,000
10 from CPR kiosks strategically
11 located all throughout the City at
12 centers like Enon Tabernacle
13 Baptist Church.

14 Just in 2023, we rewarded
15 \$20 million in research grants to
16 institutions based in the City of
17 Philadelphia and we continue to
18 partner with the School District of
19 Philadelphia in the City to improve
20 nutrition standards in schools,
21 early childhood education and
22 procurement. We've also worked
23 with the School District to improve
24 standards around water access in
25 schools and look to work more

2 towards physical activity.

3 So once again, I would like

4 to thank Councilmember Ahmad and

5 the entire City Council for

6 recognizing June 10, 2024 as a

7 centennial celebration of the

8 American Heart Association and

9 really look forward to working with

10 you all in the next year to address

11 cardiovascular health and stroke.

12 Just recall heart disease is still

13 the leading cause of death in the

14 City of Philadelphia so we have a

15 lot of work to do in the next

16 upcoming years, but thank you so

17 much for your time and have a great

18 rest of the day.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Anthony

21 McNeil, Lynn Landes, then William

22 Hendrick and Ogbonna Hagins.

23 (Witnesses approached

24 podium.)

25 MS. LANDES: Good

2 afternoon. My name is Lynn Landes,
3 founder of Sensicalsociety.org
4 regarding Resolution 240545 where
5 Philadelphia City Council is
6 protesting restrictions on the
7 rights of transgender people, many
8 others however are asking what
9 about the rights of girls and women
10 to participate in female sports and
11 not to be threatened by biological
12 males who want to compete as female
13 but who are stronger by nature and
14 who are breaking records in women's
15 sports as we speak.

16 What about girls' and
17 women's rights to privacy for males
18 and vice versa, in locker rooms,
19 showers, restrooms, sororities,
20 fraternities and even prisons?
21 What about the rights of women to
22 college scholarships, jobs,
23 contracts and other benefits? What
24 about parents' rights over their
25 minor children who may be

2 considering transitioning?

3 Already Philadelphia allows
4 children over 11 years old to get
5 certain vaccines without their
6 parents' knowledge or consent.

7 Will children be able to make
8 medical decisions about
9 transitioning as well? What about
10 books in public libraries that may
11 contain pornographic sections and
12 explicit drag performances that may
13 be inappropriate for children? Are
14 we supposed to say all of this is
15 okay?

16 The public appears to be
17 more than willing to accommodate
18 transgender people in their own
19 separate category and things such
20 as sports, but many do not support
21 violating the rights of males,
22 females and parents in the process.
23 There are commonsense solutions to
24 these issues, but this resolution
25 is only looking at this controversy

2 through the transgender lens.

3 Lastly, we should also be

4 focused on another extremely

5 important and related issue and,

6 that is, overexposure to female

7 hormones, otherwise known as

8 estrogen-mimicking hormones, that

10 development in all life forms.

11 Overexposure to female hormones

12 comes from fossil fuels,

13 medications and the foods we eat,

14 and this is an issue that Corporate

15 America does not want us to look

16 at, but it is an issue as with all

17 controversies that deserves our

18 attention and to be publicly

19 considered from all angles,

20 something this resolution does not

21 do. Thank you very much.

9 what I'm going to say because God
10 takes over my body and my heart
11 starts beating fast, I need to step
12 back and let God speak to all you
13 ladies and gentlemen.

14 And his message is, look at
15 each other and smile and be kind.
16 That's our purpose here on earth.
17 Your name is your purpose. It's
18 why you're here. Your ancestors
19 are here all throughout this
20 building looking down on all of
21 you, and the message is be the best
22 public servant.

23 Let me repeat that. God's
24 talking to you. The message is be
25 the best public servant on the

3 here, but God cancelled them
4 because it's more important that we
5 as human beings, residents of the

3 And for some reason, my bill is

5 I've had attorneys and

6 college professors read the bill

11 redevelopment in this City --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Mr. Hagins, how are you doing,

14 sir --

15 MR. HAGINS: I'm talking

16 about the redevelopment, brother.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Yeah, tell me a little bit about

19 the redevelopment, my brother.

20 MR. HAGINS: I'm talking

21 about right here, the redevelopment

22 and urban renewal of portions of

23 the New Kensington. You're messing

24 up my flow, Council President, so

25 I'm going to have to request more

2 time. Now, I know why -- I know
3 what's up with this City here.
4 It's the gross domestic product of
5 Philadelphia. It's the measure of
6 market value and the final goods
7 and services produced within the

10 million. It pains me to say this,
11 but the public has the right to
12 know. The City of Philadelphia
13 cannot economically afford losing
14 the domestic product of American
15 Freedman going to prison from its
16 overall market value, which means
17 this City has no political
18 intention of eradicating gun
19 violence.

20 Philadelphia must maintain
21 gun violence. They must maintain
22 this to keep the economy going.
23 Without American Freedman going to
24 prison, this City will be
25 economically bankrupt. So what I'm

2 calling for is this, what we have
3 here in the City fiscally
4 functioning without violating our
5 13th Amendment, this City cannot
6 function without violating the 13th
7 Amendment rights of American
8 Freedmen.

11 ACLU and the clergy to call for
12 placing the City of Philadelphia in
13 federal receivership for breach of
14 contract, breach of duty, security
15 fraud and repudiation of the 13th
16 Amendment. The Roadmap to Safer
17 Communities, the researchers wasn't
18 wrong. This City is structurally
19 racist to the core and no matter
20 what kind of programs you have, gun
21 violence is never going to end in
22 this City because you guys are
23 violating the American Freedmen's
24 13th Amendment Constitutional
25 rights.

19 Council supports sending public
20 dollars to public schools and not
21 to vouchers for private
22 institutions. Those of us who
23 attended public schools, who sent
24 our children to Philly public
25 schools and who have loved ones who

2 work in Philadelphia public
3 schools, we all know the truth that
4 came out in last year's Supreme
5 Court ruling. The state funding
6 for our school is so inadequate
7 that it is literally
8 unconstitutional.

9 Instead of directing all
10 available resources to right this
11 wrong and make up for decades of
12 underfunding, some folks feel that
13 resurrecting the idea of vouchers
14 will divert public funds, which
15 diverts public funds to private
16 institutions, exasperates
17 educational injustice that
18 undermines our public schools.

19 As a longtime parent
20 activist, I am very familiar with
21 education privatizers who pretend
22 to care about our communities so
23 they can sell appearance on the
24 fake promise of privatization. And
25 I want parents to know the truth.

2 Vouchers put public money in the
3 pockets of the rich while draining
4 resources from the public schools
5 in our communities.

6 Across the country we've
7 seen that the people who benefit
8 the most from the vouchers are
9 wealthy families who could already
10 afford to send their children to
11 private schools. Vouchers will not
12 benefit the children in our
13 communities or fix Pennsylvania's
14 unfair funding system. Instead
15 they will deepen the economic and
16 racial divides in Pennsylvania's
17 school system and widen the gap
18 between the rich and the rest of
19 us.

20 If you share my commitment
21 to supporting our public schools,
22 please consider joining me this
23 coming Monday, June 10th in
24 Harrisburg. I will be standing on
25 the steps of the Capitol with my

2 labor partners, allies in
3 Pennsylvania State House, community
4 leaders across the state and dozens
5 of Philadelphia parents and
6 students and teachers to say no to
7 vouchers and yes to full fair
8 funding of our public schools.

9 This coalition of public
10 education supporters has also
11 created a petition and nearly 3,000
12 people have already signed on. If
13 you support our public schools, you
14 can also add your name at
15 wfpus.com/novouchers. We need
16 Philadelphia public education
17 community to come together to
18 reject vouchers and defend our
19 public schools because when we
20 fight, we win.

21 And speaking of fighting
22 and winning, I also introduced a
23 resolution today of two amazing
24 educators from Edward T. Steel
25 School Elementary. As many of you

2 know, I got my political start as a
3 parent activist fighting against
4 the privatization of Edward T.
5 Steel and many other Philadelphia
6 public schools.

7 11 years ago people in my
8 community decided that we were not
9 going to hand over our neighborhood
10 schools to a privatizer. Nikki
11 Bagby, Charisma Presley and many
12 other parent activists in Nicetown
13 came together to defend our public
14 school against privatizers. We
15 fought and we won. And since then,
16 I heard a lot of ugly narratives
17 about our neighborhood public
18 schools, that they are places of
19 failure and violence and despair
20 and that the teachers don't care
21 and aren't motivated enough.

22 But the truth is that our
23 educators are often the ones
24 holding the schools together along
25 with parents despite severe lack of

2 resources. Until our neighborhood
3 public schools have all the
4 resources they need, all the
5 resources that the school and other
6 communities have been getting for
7 years, we'll never know how
8 successful they actually can be.

9 So today it brings me great
10 pride and joy to honor not one but
11 two educators from Edward T. Steel
12 Elementary School who have been
13 selected by the School District for
14 this year's Lindback Award of
15 Distinguished Teachers. And I want
16 to acknowledge the award winners --
17 we call her Ms. B -- but Miya
18 Benintinde and Mark Macyk.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: And I
21 want to recognize them for their
22 exceptional work to support and
23 educate and uplift Nicetown's young
24 people. And I want to thank you
25 for all you do to help hold our

4 I also introduced a
5 resolution today to declare this
6 week as National Garden Week in
7 Philadelphia. Over the past month
8 in this room, we've heard from
9 community gardens from dozens of

11 out to speak about our urban
12 agriculture plan and about the
13 Priority Bid legislation that we
14 successfully passed last week.

15 This week we celebrate the
16 hundreds of community gardens
17 across the City and the progress
18 we've made together to protect and
19 expand Philadelphia's green spaces.
20 Thank you so much.

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 I want to thank my
9 colleagues for giving final
10 approval to two parts of my Defying
11 Displacement Campaign. First, we
12 practiced good governance by
13 authorizing a ballot measure that
14 would amend the Home Rule Charter
15 to mandate that density bonus
16 payments go into the City's Housing
17 Trust Fund as intended.

18 The City Code already says
19 that payments in lieu of providing
20 affordable housing must go into the
21 Housing Trust Fund, but the truth
22 is that they usually end up in the
23 General Fund instead. This leads
24 to a spike of by-right multi-family
25 or commercial development in our

2 neighborhoods, but the size of the
3 buildings are greater than what
4 neighbors thought was allowed
5 without a variance. That's because
6 many developers gain additional
7 density on their projects through
8 zoning bonuses offered in the Code.

9 One of these bonuses allows
10 for denser by-right development if
11 you make a payment to the City,
12 which the Zoning Code says is to be
13 used for Housing Trust Fund
14 purposes. However, not once since
15 this payment-in-lieu option began
16 have these density bonuses led to a
17 proportionate increase in the
18 Housing Trust Fund.

19 As a result, we've been
20 underfunding affordable housing to
21 the tune of \$36 million over the
22 past four years and we so distrust
23 in our zoning process because
24 residents see overscaled
25 development with none of the

2 affordable housing benefits the
3 City and the developers have
4 promised them.

5 This Charter change would
6 ensure that we as a City make good
7 on a commitment that the Code
8 already says we make. So thank you
9 to my colleagues for giving our
10 constituents the power to compel
11 the City to follow through on this
12 promise for practicing good
13 governance and for recognizing the
14 importance of fully funding
15 affordable housing.

16 Today we also voted to
17 strengthen protection for residents
18 using housing vouchers. When my
19 best friend became a teenage mom
20 and needed somewhere to live on a
21 tight budget, she applied for and
22 received a housing voucher. Being
23 housing secure allowed her to focus
24 on her future. She earned multiple
25 Master's degrees and has been a

2 teacher ever since.

3 This story isn't an

4 anomaly. It's just one example of

5 the tens of thousands of Black and

6 Brown Philadelphians, many of whom

7 are single Black mothers, who have

8 lifted themselves out of poverty

9 because they had affordable housing

10 when they needed it the most. But

11 today landlords overwhelmingly

12 ignore the law and openly

13 discriminate against voucher

14 holders, preventing our neighbors

15 from accessing the safe, stable and

16 affordable homes that are crucial

17 for a successful life, healthy

18 communities and a vibrant city.

19 As a result, up to 1 in 3

20 voucher holders cannot put their

21 vouchers to use. That means

22 working families have no choice but

23 to surrender hundreds of dollars in

24 rental assistance each month, which

25 they are entitled to by law.

2 Housing vouchers represent some of
3 the largest and most direct means
4 we have to combat our City's
5 affordable housing crisis. And in
6 a climate where we are losing
7 hundreds of low-cost apartments
8 every year and gaining hundreds
9 more high-priced ones in their
10 stead, vouchers are one of our best
11 tools to level the playing field
12 for working families.

13 That's why I'm proud that
14 City Council will no longer turn a
15 blind eye towards rampant illegal
16 discrimination against families
17 using housing vouchers. I look
18 forward to working with you all on
19 the remainder of my Defying
20 Displacement package and I thank
21 you once again.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
25 Jones.

3 you so much, Mr. President,
4 colleagues.

5 It is my sad duty here
6 today to make this announcement:
7 Whether you're growing flowers,
8 whether you're raising puppies or

10 horses, you always can pick out one
11 that you know is going to be
12 special, but you know as they grow
13 you're not going to be able to keep
14 them all. Some of them have to
15 grow beyond the house, kids, and
16 you have to be willing when that
17 bike when you're running down the

19 balanced, eventually you got to let
20 it go.

21 Today I rise to announce we
22 have to let one go. And I didn't
23 want to wait until next week to do
24 it. I want to announce the
25 successful departure of one

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: As you
5 know, he was my, is my Legislative
6 Director, trained, handpicked by
7 Judge Samantha Williams. She put
8 her stamp of approval on him and he
9 has hit the ground running and has
10 not been a disappointment, the CPOC
11 legislation, carrying it to its
12 amendment, working on the Blueprint
13 for a Safer Philadelphia which
14 probably gave him his one gray
15 hair.

16 I want to announce today
17 proudly that he has decided to
18 choose Notre Dame Law School. So
19 in our office we call him Babyface
20 Nelson, because I try as a good
21 parent to raise liberal kids. He's
22 a blue dog Democrat. He's more
23 O'Neill than Jones. Grew up in the
24 Northeast and he is a very
25 conservative individual, but it

3 good policy. And we're proud to
4 have him.

5 He is going to be a lawyer.
6 He's not going to be a defender.
7 He will be a prosecutor. So you
8 lawyers that are in the room today

11 Glass come in as the prosecutor,
12 you lean forward, tell your client
13 take the deal.

14 We congratulate you,
15 Anthony. You cannot be replaced
16 but you will be missed, but your
17 presence has been felt by your
18 work. Thank you so much for being
19 with us.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 Congratulations. And just from my
23 lived experience young man, good
24 prosecutors also seek justice as
25 well. So always keep that in mind.

5 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
6 you, Mr. President.

7 Today I want to thank the
8 members of this body for passing a
9 resolution recognizing June as Gun
10 Violence Awareness Month. As we
11 know, gun violence is a uniquely
12 American epidemic, and guns are the
13 leading cause of death in young
14 people under the age of 19 years
15 old.

16 It's no secret that I've
17 lost loved ones to gun violence
18 here in this City. And I just want
19 to make sure that as we go into the
20 summer months we keep the pressure
21 on to make sure that we get these
22 illegal guns off our streets, we
23 provide our children with
24 opportunities to be successful and
25 opportunities to keep their mind

2 from being idle during the summer.

3 So I just want to thank my

4 colleagues for sponsoring and

5 supporting that resolution.

6 And also, this Saturday we

7 will be renaming the 2800 block of

10 attend the ceremony. It will begin

11 at 1:00 p.m. at the corner of 29th

12 and Girard, so please come out and

13 let's celebrate the legacy of

14 Ms. Ghee this Saturday at again

15 1:00 p.m. 29th and Girard.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 You're welcome.

19 The Chair recognizes

20 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

21 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank

22 you, Council President. I'll be

23 very brief.

24 I just wanted to rise to

25 thank my colleague Curtis Jones and

5 Brady. It's no secret that the
6 Congressman is, as we say, my
7 political father. I've been
8 working on and off for the

11 going to honor him and give him his
12 flowers why he's still here.

13 You know, Brady -- Bobby
14 takes a lot of heat. Not only does
15 he take heat for his own stuff, but
16 he always takes heat for our stuff
17 too, those of us that are part of
18 the party. And he gets beat up a
19 lot for different things, but
20 people never seem to say all the
21 good stuff that he's done over the
22 years as our Party Chairman, such
23 as making the first LGBT judge, the
24 first Asian judge, the first
25 Hispanic judge, our first LGBT

3 Pacific Islander Councilperson.

4 And personally, I need to
5 thank him for taking a chance on a
6 little Irish kid from Southwest
7 Philly giving him a shot. So I

10 for the Congressman. And I look
11 forward to seeing it all the way
12 through. Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 You're welcome.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 Chair recognizes Councilmember Nina
18 Ahmad.

19 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD: Thank
20 you, Council President.

21 I first want to thank you
22 and my colleagues for the good
23 humor and patience we exhibited
24 yesterday when we pulled our first
25 all-nighter for the people of

3 were able to pass the budget out of
4 Committee and I appreciate that.

5 I wanted to thank all my
6 colleagues also and others who
7 joined me in celebrating an
8 auspicious milestone, the 100th
9 anniversary of the founding of the
10 American Heart Association. We all
11 know AHA for asking us to dress up
12 in red for fundraisers and for the
13 tremendous amount of awareness they
14 have raised around heart health,
15 but most particularly women's heart
16 health, but that's just more recent
17 chapter in a century of many
18 breakthroughs in the ways we
19 prevent and treat heart disease,
20 understand the keys to
21 cardiovascular health, keep people
22 healthier and help them live
23 longer.

24 We have known for more than
25 half a century that limiting fat

2 and cholesterol are essential to
3 heart health because of the
4 American Heart Association. The
5 seeds of what we know about the
6 harms of tobacco use were planted
7 more than 65 years ago with the
8 scientific study published by the
9 American Heart Association and more
10 than half of the people in this
11 room know exactly what to do if
12 someone experiences sudden cardiac
13 arrest because of the American
14 Heart Association.

15 They have invested over \$5
16 billion into cardiovascular
17 research. Those investments led to
18 the awarding of 10 Nobel Prizes.
19 So I don't think it's a stretch to
20 say they have done more to deepen
21 our understanding of heart health
22 than any other organization on the
23 planet. Congratulations on 100
24 years of progress and improving our
25 collective vision of health and

2 hope. Thank you so much for all
3 that you do and I wish you many,
4 many years of health advocacy and
5 discovery in the future.

6 Thank you, Council
7 President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 You're welcome.

10 The Chair recognizes
11 Councilmember Phillips.

12 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Good
13 afternoon, Philadelphia.

14 I just want to say
15 something really briefly. I want
16 to thank our colleagues for passing
17 out of Committee this week and a
18 very important legislation is the
19 Encroaching Tree legislation. When
20 I first joined City Council, I made
21 it a priority to really find ways
22 to be in neighborhoods and listen
23 to our neighbors.

24 And one of our neighbors,
25 Phyllis, really spoke on the

2 importance of this tree that was
3 having an encroachment on her
4 property and other people's
5 properties and was causing quite a
6 danger, but the laws and policies
7 in the City did not allow for the
8 City to really take down that tree.

9 So now we are in a position

11 countless other trees are going to
12 be set to be favorably passed
13 hopefully next week to really,
14 really make sure that we are
15 successful with helping people want
16 to stay in Philadelphia because
17 we're taking care of quality-of-
18 life issues.

19 In addition to that, we did
20 a curfew bill in the Logan area
21 co-sponsored with Councilwoman
22 Cindy Bass and the Olney area and
23 so forth and also we did a curfew
24 bill in West Oak Lane and Mt. Airy
25 area, all because we want to make

3 neighborhoods. And I'm looking
4 forward to seeing how that bill
5 helps us bring the right businesses
6 and the right serenity into our
7 neighborhood.

8 And I just want to thank

11 that we could do the work of the
12 Lord for them. So we're looking
13 forward to continuing to support
14 all of our neighbors in the 9th
15 District. You call, you ask for
16 something, it happens because we
17 care.

18 Thank you so much, Council
19 President.

21 You're welcome.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Council
25 President, am I the last one?

17 one of the biggest festivals in the
18 entire country. It's an amazing
19 time. And on behalf of the Council
20 President, I just want to encourage
21 people to come out.

22 Since I have the mic, I do
23 want to just take a moment to thank
24 all of the Tech staff, the Council
25 President's staff, Sergeant-at-

10 smile and the same effort that we
11 expect. So I just want to say
12 thank you to everybody for that.

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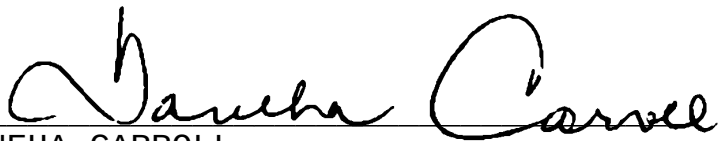
