18 purpose of calling up bills and
19 resolutions on the Second Reading and
20 Final Passage Calendar today.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. The following resolutions
23 and bills are being brought up from
24 Second Reading to Final Passage Calendars

5 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

6 Our next order of business will
7 be our public comment session. So before
8 considering these bills and resolutions,
9 your public comment must concern matters
10 on the Second Reading and Final Passage
11 Calendar today.

12 All speakers must sign up in
13 order to testify. If you haven't done
14 so, you may do so now at the table
15 outside of the Council Chambers with the
16 Sergeant-of-Arms.

17 When your name is called, you
18 will be called in the order in which you
19 signed up, and when your name is called,
20 you will go to the podium in the middle
21 of the Council Chambers. There's a
22 device on the podium. When the light on
23 the device turns green, it will be your
24 time to speak. When it turns yellow, you
25 will have 30 seconds to conclude your

10 government in action today. Thank you
11 very much.

12 And with that, Mr. Decker,
13 would you call the first name on the
14 list.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
16 today, Mr. President, is Tyrell Brown.

17 (No response.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Tyrell Brown,
19 commenting on 230692, a resolution
20 introduced by Councilwoman Brooks today.

21 (Witnesses approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MR. BROWN: Good morning. I am
25 Tyrell Brown. I'm the Executive Director

2 of Galaei, they/them pronouns. I'm
3 standing here with my Aunt Tammy. We are
4 an organization that serves the trans and
5 non-binary community and prioritizes
6 services for them, life-saving services
7 for our community 365 days a year.

8 At Galaei, in addition to
9 producing National Coming Out Day and
10 pride, we do linkage to care, resources
11 that are crucial life-saving services for
12 two-spirit community, for Black and brown
13 people as we serve the people that are
14 pushed furthest to the margins in our
15 community. We're located up in
16 Kensington in Philadelphia.

17 This weekend we have National
18 Coming Out Day. We are celebrating that
19 with a parade, the first ever in America.
20 We also have a resource festival there on
21 Sunday. We decided to coin our event
22 OURfest, which stands for Our Uniting
23 Resilience Festival, for a few reasons.
24 One, because we know all too often that
25 our stories aren't told. They aren't

2 seen and celebrated, but also OUR is an
3 acronym. It stands for Our Uniting
4 Resilience.

5 We are a community that despite
6 our vibrancy and joy that you all often
7 see is surviving disproportionate
8 homelessness, discrimination,
9 disproportionate economic oppression,
10 legislative attacks on our liberties,
11 disproportionate violence up to and
12 including murder, and all for us daring
13 to be out and proud and to be ourselves.

14 So the work of our community
15 and of our allies is not done. It did
16 not start with recognizing gay marriage,
17 and it certainly did not end with that.
18 It didn't start with TV shows and
19 visibility alone, and it certainly did
20 not end with that either.

21 The support and affirmation of
22 this legislative body is crucial in our
23 stand for justice, liberation, and the
24 freedom of LGBTQ people in the City of
25 Philadelphia and across the nation.

2 It is said that most of us grow
3 up in homes where we are shamed out of
4 our identities, that when we spend our
5 adult lives trying to recapture the
6 liberty that was taken from us when we
7 were children.

8 This citation is so deeply
9 important to us because it recognizes our
10 resilience as LGBTQ people and says
11 loudly that this governing body sees and
12 supports our journeys in this world,
13 starting with the revolutionary act that
14 we as queer, trans, lesbian, gay, and/or
15 bisexual people, the power that we take
16 when we come out and recognizes that
17 story, and it celebrates it.

18 I humbly ask for people today
19 in this body, people listening to look
20 upon others and see the humanity first
21 and others first and foremost and to also
22 know and understand that we are all
23 resilient. And, finally, that National
24 Coming Out Day is more than just a
25 festival that is deeply rooted in the

2 celebration of queer and trans joy,
3 survival and all of that in the face of
4 oppression, discrimination, and austerity
5 that is pushing our communities further
6 to the margin.

11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

16 is El Ali.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. ALI: Hi. Good morning,
21 Councilmembers. My name is El Ali, first
22 name E-L, last name A-L-I. I'm Cherokee
23 Freedmen, Chiricahua Apache, and Black
24 American, American Indian activist in the
25 City for about -- I'm 48, so probably

2 almost 20 years now. So I would just
3 like to comment briefly on the resolution
4 introduced by Councilman Jones supported
5 by members of Council celebrating the
6 13th Annual Philly Indigenous Peoples'
7 Day.

8 I think this is great and
9 honorable for us to do. We love to
10 create more substances, create more real
11 changes besides just a resolution. Just
12 for an example, when any indigenous
13 person, American Indian or indigenous
14 migrant gets arrested by the police,
15 there's only two categories on the police
16 reports and citations, only white and
17 Black. So we are put into categories
18 either to be able to be under white or
19 Black. It doesn't really reflective, and
20 you really can't count the data when you
21 don't have the ability to be able to
22 identify who you are, and then it becomes
23 more of a hassle to be able to go through
24 the courts to make those changes to let
25 them know that you're not white or Black

2 and that you're American Indian or
3 indigenous.

4 So those type of changes,
5 changes in housing to be able to help
6 indigenous migrants from Central and
7 South America who come here who are
8 unfortunately labeled as Hispanic and
9 Latino, but they don't identify as that.

10 So just looking to create more
11 changes in our city with public policy
12 and also with the departments in the City
13 to really be able to collect the data
14 that as we indigenous people need to be
15 able to create the change for our city
16 and to create a healing process for us,
17 because I feel also too that sometimes
18 we're relegated to just the "other," so
19 there's not a lot of concern for us. So
20 I'm hoping too with this resolution and
21 many others to create better public
22 policy for our city for American Indians
23 and indigenous migrants in the City.

8 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: She
9 declined.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Give
11 her the mic.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Tammy "Walking
13 Stick" Riley.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
15 on one second. Hold on one second.

16 Hold on one second. Is that
17 mic functioning? Just give her the other
18 mic.

19 Good morning.

20 MS. PAULINE HILTON: Good
21 morning. I honor the place in which the
22 entire universe dwells. I honor the
23 place in you that is love, light, peace,
24 and truth. When you're in that place in
25 you and I am in that place in me, then we

2 are one.

3 I ask that the creator open our
4 minds to understand each other better, to
5 open our eyes so that we can see things
6 more clearly, to open our ears so that we
7 understand the messages that are being
8 sent to us, and ask you to open our hands

10 more. I ask that you keep our feet in
11 the paths that are chosen for us, and I
12 ask you to open our hearts to love each
13 other more.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
17 testimony.

22 are Akeiff Staples and Brent Johnstone.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MS. RILEY: My name is Tammy
25 "Walking Stick" Riley.

3 morning.

4 MS. RILEY: Good morning. I
5 want to say thank you to you, President,
6 to Councilman Curtis, Councilman Johnson,
7 Councilman Squilla. I want to thank you
8 for the support that you have given the
9 indigenous community in Philadelphia.

10 My family in the 1970s was a
11 part of an organization called the United
12 American Indians of the Delaware Valley,
13 and then we were part of -- and,
14 Councilwoman Gauthier, I want to thank
15 you too. I don't know where she went.

16 But I want to just thank you
17 all, everyone in this room, for still
18 acknowledging that we are here, because
19 it's so often that people find us
20 invisible.

21 I want to thank El for the
22 fight. El continues to fight. We fight
23 along with him. And I don't mean fight
24 in a negative way. I mean the fight to
25 let people know that we are still here.

2 So I encourage everyone to help
3 our community, to support our community.
4 We are the original people. The land
5 that you stand on now is Lenapehoking.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Akeiff Staples
13 and Brent Johnstone.

14 (Witnesses approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MR. JOHNSTONE: My name is
18 Brent Johnstone from FathersRead365.

19 MR. STAPLES: And my name is
20 Akeiff Staples from FathersRead365.

21 MR. JOHNSTONE: We don't have a
22 lot of time, but what we're about to
23 speak about is very passionate to me, and
24 it's not often that I hear it spoken
25 about in public and, that is, early

2 literacy.

3 I'm 46 years old and I'm a
4 struggling reader. I've been a
5 struggling reader my whole life. I live
6 with dyslexia. And one of the reasons
7 why I personally jumped in on this
8 mission with FathersRead365 to address
9 early literacy, because I didn't find out
10 why I couldn't read until I was failing
11 out of college, drinking a pint of liquor
12 to go to class every morning, trying to
13 deal with something that could have
14 easily been addressed. And all
15 throughout life, I got report cards and
16 they all would say, Brent is struggling
17 with reading, but never once did any of
18 my teachers, any administrators, did
19 anyone ever come to me and say, Brent, we
20 understand what you're going through and
21 this is how we can help. Never got that
22 help.

23 And on my dad's dying death
24 bed -- Curtis knows my dad very well --
25 he said, son, make me a promise, and it's

2 the last thing my dad ever said to me.
3 He said, don't you ever stop talking
4 about dyslexia and going out there and
5 helping people, because after all these
6 years, I finally know what I lived with.

7 This man was 72 years old dying
8 and just realizing why he couldn't read,
9 and it was something that could have been
10 addressed. He was a lieutenant at Temple
11 Police. He was a very successful person,
12 and we all are and a lot of people are
13 who struggle with reading.

14 I say all of that to say
15 currently I keep an eye out, and since
16 May, we have networked over 100 daycare
17 centers in Philadelphia in the READY
18 First network. The READY First network
19 stands for Re-Empowers All Developing
20 Youth, and we want all our kids to go
21 into first grade on level.

22 And, guys, we've partnered with
23 a national screening service who can
24 screen any child at three years old for a
25 reading difference. We've partnered with

Lexia LETRS, who can teach any educator how to properly teach reading to kids at three and five years old where their brain is most active. We have partnered with a tutoring program who teaches Wilsons, who allow -- excuse me; who can in two years, they took my son, who was in third grade -- because in third grade, guys, 33 percent of our third graders read on level. That means 67 of them didn't. My son was part of that 67. I had to go to -- I had to sue his schools. I had to go to litigation to get my son the proper help that he needed, and he sits here today from going to be a kindergarten reader in third grade to being one of the top fifth grade readers in his school.

Stand up, Mason.

MR. JOHNSTONE: Guys, we have networked. We did all the work that we

6 work that we're doing in this nation. If
7 we as a city come together behind what

11 Thank you.

16 is Brujo de la Mancha.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. DE LA MANCHA: Hello,
19 everybody.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MR. DE LA MANCHA: Welcome.
23 Thank you. Thanks to the father, nature,
24 son, and thank you everybody to be here
25 in person.

2 Yeah. So many of you say
3 buenos tardes, buenos noches. I come
4 from Mexico, and we have a lot of native
5 population here in Philadelphia for the
6 last 20 years, maybe 25, 30, 40 for some
7 people, and this 13th Annual Philadelphia
8 Indigenous Day is very important for the
9 new generations of the new Americans born
10 here from this migration that has
11 happened from south of the border. So
12 even you're from Mexico, Puerto Rico,
13 Costa Rico, Peru, all that places, people
14 should have the right opportunity to
15 celebrate and come together and meet our
16 brothers and cousins from the whole
17 continent in this City of Philadelphia.

18 So please allow us to have
19 these celebrations to raise our flag, and
20 also give us a chance to keep our
21 language. We speak Spanish, si, but it's
22 not our language. Will you speak
23 English? Yes, but for most of us it's
24 not our language too.

25 So this good identity, this

2 good cultural awareness will help in the
3 future to avoid the classic gangs
4 problems or alcohol problem or drug
5 problem, because people will have
6 something to focus, something to come,
7 something to pray, something to feel
8 connected, not be wandering on the
9 streets and so on.

10 So it's very important. Please
11 support all for every other coming from
12 the new generations. Please don't take
13 this day away. Mark it. Make it
14 national. Make it our world.
15 Philadelphia is going to keep native
16 traditions alive from anywhere else.
17 We'll bring tourists, we'll bring
18 economy.

19 Thanks to the City of
20 Philadelphia for supporting for maybe
21 15 years different power, different
22 celebrations that we're having, gathering
23 and everything. To all the
24 Councilpeople, to all the foundations in
25 Philadelphia, to everything, we have to

2 come together and make our -- respect the
3 first nations of this continent living in
4 Philadelphia.

5 I don't know exactly how many
6 indigenous people from Mexico you have
7 here because the problem, no immigration.
8 And we know that maybe these people who
9 have a different ID, different way to be
10 treated, because they're part of this
11 continent. There are mistakes that are
12 made. They have different nationalities
13 than themselves, but some people, they
14 are not. You have a lot of indigenous
15 people that are trapped, and this
16 immigration problem can change, thanks to
17 the City to be a centralized city and
18 allow anybody from south of the border to
19 be here.

20 Thank you so much. Once again,
21 my name is Brujo de la Mancha. My native
22 name is Tletxayacoatl, must lay at the
23 snake with the face on fire.

24 And you all be happy. You all
25 keep going and working together for this

2 great and beautiful city, the Brotherly
3 Love of Philadelphia. Thank you with my
4 heart.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you. Thank you.

11 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
16 Lynn Landes, founder of wildfoodies.org.
17 I'm speaking in support of Resolution
18 210913, which is a resolution to sue the
19 City Administration for failure to
20 enforce the Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces
21 Act, which will end the use of toxic
22 pesticides on public lands.

23 Why is this so important?
24 Because we need to be able to use our
25 public lands to grow both wild plants and

2 cultivated crops for food, fiber,
3 medicine, and more, particularly in the
4 case of natural or manmade emergencies.

5 For instance, Washington Square
6 is full of plantain, or plantago, a
7 common weed, but plantain is also
8 nature's medicine cabinet, because it can
9 be used to heal the body in so many ways.
10 It grows there in Washington Square
11 because toxic chemicals are not used, but
12 they are used in other public lands in
13 Philadelphia.

14 Do residents know that they are
15 exposing themselves, their children, and
16 their pets to toxic chemicals? I doubt
17 it. The point is that we need safe and
18 healthy soil.

19 And speaking of safety, we also
20 need our streets to be safe. As the
21 founder of safeststreetsphilly.org, I
22 believe City Councilmembers are rightly
23 concerned about the lawlessness gripping
24 our city. However, our District
25 Attorney, who gave the green light to

2 this rampant crime, continues unchecked.
3 Councilmembers have suggested, among
4 other things, more mentoring of the young
5 is what's needed, and that is certainly
6 true, but those who are looting our
7 stores on a daily basis are often not
8 young at all. They are simply taking
9 advantage of the situation. As a result,
10 retail and food deserts are reoccurring,
11 the very problem that underserved
12 communities complained about for decades.

13 It's time to learn from history
14 and address the elephants in the room, a
15 City Administration and District Attorney
16 and their non-enforcement of local and
17 state laws, because maintaining a safe
18 and healthy city is our government's most
19 important job.

20 Thank you.

9 I'm here this morning with a
10 heavy, heavy heart. I'm here to express
11 that we have to get all hands on deck and
12 address this unnecessary, bad behavior.

13 My kids, my grand-kids, my
14 great grand-kids do not conduct bad
15 behavior. Why? Because they know their
16 grandfather will not allow it.

17 My grandson is seven years old,
18 had to go through drama this Sunday
19 because his place that he plays football
20 had to deal with gunfire. There's over
21 200 kids that play at that field, 11th
22 and Cecil B. Moore. It brings warmth to
23 my heart to see that many kids come
24 together, but a few jack rabbits want to
25 act out. And just like Councilman

2 Squilla was able to track down that bad
3 behavior in Center City, we should be
4 able to track down this bad behavior in
5 our various communities, not next week,
6 not next month, not when the new
7 Administration gets in. Right now.

9 has relatives own property in probably
10 50 percent of this Council body. My
11 voice will be heard and my wallet will be
12 used. Let's get all hands on deck.

21 unnamed heroes that would have been

10 was, who suffered that fate, and there
11 are tens of thousands of people like
12 that.

13 I remember at a eulogy for my
14 great-grandfather in South Philly and as
15 kids we always used to go down to his
16 basement, and he had a saber. And
17 reckless as we were, we would be playing
18 with his saber trying to chop each other
19 up.

20 So in my mind, I always thought
21 he was the cook for the calvary. I
22 thought he was the guy who went and made
23 chamber, made kind of moves for the
24 higher-ups and generals. Come to find
25 out he was a Rough Rider and he went up

2 that hill with Teddy Roosevelt, and he
3 was no joke.

4 How many dozens, thousands in
5 each conflict before, you know, it kind
6 of was leveled out are a part of history
7 but not a part of our history?

8 So with that, I move for the

13 Manayunk actually means in Native
14 American language a good place to drink.

16 talking about.

17 And so we want to look at this
18 and make sure we understand and respect
19 the fact that these indigenous people
20 were here first. These indigenous people
21 have a robust history.

22 And for that, I move for the
23 adoption of the resolution.

17 from a kindergarten program at his
18 friend's school, and Brent and I met
19 shortly after, I think it was, another
20 men's group led by Eric Marsh is how we
21 connected.

22 So I want to just thank and
23 honor them for the work that they've been
24 doing and thank you for the commitment to
25 our community.

2 And Councilmember Thomas left
3 me some remarks here as well that I need
4 to follow up on. So he says, the former
5 Temple University basketball players with
6 two decades of experiencing -- for
7 experience serving their community as
8 social workers and youth advocates
9 founded a youth literacy non-profit,
10 FathersRead365, to boost literacy in
11 young children in response to an
12 overwhelming need to increase reading
13 skills for children age 0 to 6 in
14 Philadelphia neighborhoods.

15 Black male educators make up
16 only two percent of educators, so they
17 play a crucial role in expanding
18 representation in our school systems. In
19 addition, they connect young adults to
20 read to kids and provide them with role
21 models, and today the pair have donated
22 170,000 books to Philadelphia's youth.

23 So these men have done an
24 amazing job and I just want to
25 congratulate them.

11 Philadelphia.

12 There has been studies that
13 shows that prisons are built based upon
14 the third grade reading levels of our
15 young people, right? And so when you
16 talk about getting young people in the
17 path to success, it starts with them
18 learning how to read, learning how to
19 write.

20 When we talk about classroom
21 behavior, some of the outbursts that you
22 see from young people may be based upon
23 them not knowing how to read, and so they
24 find other ways, right, to express
25 themselves in the classroom so they don't

2 feel embarrassed.

3 And so I just want to thank the
4 two of you for your hard work and your
5 dedication. Continue to keep up the
6 work. I heard you loud and clear saying
7 the City of Philadelphia should be

10 hopefully -- you have that relationship
11 with Councilman Thomas, so we always
12 support his efforts, and hopefully you
13 can continue expanding the program that
14 you're doing, but thank you very much for

9 gender and sexuality that our society
10 imposes, in honor of all of our friends
11 and loved ones who have already come out
12 as well as those who have not, in honor
13 of the people who have risked violence
14 and discrimination in order to come out,
15 as well as those who have come out in the
16 midst of joy and celebrating.

17 National Coming Out Month is an
18 opportunity for us all to strengthen our
19 community and support each other in
20 sharing the truth of our experiences and
21 our identities. It is not a day to
22 pressure anyone to come out or to shame
23 those who have not yet come out. It's a
24 day to celebrate the beauty of being true
25 to yourself and having the courage to

2 share your experience and supporting
3 others who may choose to come out to you.

4 It is also a day to acknowledge
5 the difficulties many face in coming out
6 and to recognize that many people are
7 still not able to safely come out. And
8 as of August, there are more than 580

10 introduced at state legislatures. Of
11 these 580, over 80 have been signed into
12 law in this year alone. This more than
13 doubles last year's number, which is
14 already the worst in years on record.

15 By celebrating National Coming
16 Out Day, the City of Philadelphia stands
17 proudly with our queer community against
18 legislative attacks, hate, and violence,
19 and we commend the strength and courage
20 and resilience of our queer community and
21 affirm their right to justice and safety
22 in our city and throughout our country.

23 From October 6th through 8th,
24 Philadelphia celebrates National Coming
25 Out Day with our fest, the National

2 Coming Out Parade and Festival Resource
3 Fair and the first National Coming Out

19 the opening ceremony last evening, and I
20 wanted to give them a hearty welcome to

6 I just want to take a brief
7 moment to thank my colleagues, those who
8 came out to the Crime Summit at St. Joe's
9 University last Saturday. For those who
10 did not come but yet their work spoke for
11 them, thank you again. For those who
12 submitted positive recommendations in the
13 chat, thank you for those
14 recommendations. But it is a work in
15 progress. It is historic in nature.
16 I've never seen over 150 advocates, from
17 boots on the ground to members of the
18 Chamber of Commerce, credible messengers,
19 to people from behind the walls,
20 juveniles from JJC, talking to each other
21 in a proactive verb, meaning here's my
22 suggestion, here's what we can do.

23 You took us on a number of
24 field trips to other municipalities, and
25 the one thing that we drew from Chester

2 or Trenton was that the individuals that
3 are responsible, the stakeholders, could
4 sit in a room, breathe the same air,
5 point at a solution as opposed to
6 pointing at each other, and that was the
7 spirit of the conference.

8 Next steps, St. Joe's
9 University will be putting together what
10 is called a white paper, and it will be
11 formatted to identify the problem, the
12 solution, and the next steps, whether
13 it's budgetary, legislative, or policy.
14 That will be presented to the 100th
15 Mayor. It will be presented first to
16 members of this body for your edit.

17 So everything from the
18 Kensington Marshall Plan to conflict
19 resolution in schools, to Gun Violence
20 Task Force that we've created, all will
21 be fused into a document that will be
22 presented to the Mayor. And thank you
23 for that chief safety officer Charter
24 change, because they will have this as a
25 rule and guide to move this city forward.

2 What happened over the weekend
3 two weeks ago, what happened with a bike
4 rider that I know -- I thought it was
5 Squilla, I swear. I thought you were
6 going to run him down yourself -- jumping

10 to visit, might want to work, might want
11 to send their kid to go to school, there
12 is a caution that is doing this city a
13 disservice.

14 Now, I'm of the opinion, like
15 my colleagues, I want the right hand of
16 fellowship and want to help young people
17 that want to do right, but I got the left
18 hand of punishment that if you act like
19 you want to go to jail, we're going to
20 help you along your merry way.

21 So we have got to have
22 difficult conversations, Quetcy,
23 difficult conversations about things that
24 might seem on the surface a bit
25 insensitive, but if we don't look

2 ourselves soberly in the City mirror,
3 King of Prussia is going to eat our
4 lunch.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. A very impressive
8 event, great turnout.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Squilla.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 We heard a lot of things
14 happening this week, but one of the other
15 things that we didn't mention is through
16 October 2nd through the 6th, we're proud
17 to recognize the National Digital
18 Inclusion Week. It's a great time to
19 raise awareness of the solutions
20 available to help bridge the digital
21 divide and bring high speed internet to
22 homes in Philadelphia.

23 As COVID came through, it made
24 it abundantly clear how these vital goals
25 for our children's future are needed.

2 The PHLConnectED program was instrumental
3 in keeping kids in school by providing
4 access to classrooms when they suddenly
5 went virtual. This program stood up
6 quickly, thanks to our partners in the
7 Office of Innovation and Technology and
8 the Administration, the School District
9 and our colleagues right here in City
10 Council.

11 The results were astounding.
12 PHLConnectED enabled more than 23,000
13 free internet connections for families
14 over three years. That's 23,000 free
15 internet connections for people who
16 didn't have it.

17 But we know that's not enough.
18 The worst of the pandemic is hopefully
19 behind us, but PHLConnectED is now
20 focusing on getting the word out about
21 the Affordable Connectivity Program, or
22 ACP, a federal program. Through ACP,
23 Philadelphians who are eligible can
24 receive \$30 monthly credits to pay for
25 broadband internet. When combined with

2 low cost options, monthly internet
3 subscriptions may be almost at no cost to
4 some families.

5 OIT is supporting the ACP
6 program by bringing general awareness to
7 the benefits of every Philadelphia
8 household, with or without school-age
9 children.

10 Philadelphia households can
11 visit GEP -- GETACP. They can also dial
12 211 to schedule an ACP appointment with
13 Digital Navigator or visit the Free
14 Library location and ask for information
15 about the Affordable Connectivity
16 Program.

17 We understand that even though
18 there's a lot of challenges out there, we
19 can work with our partners to make this a
20 reality for everybody here in the City.
21 Our internet service provider partners
22 including Comcast, some of the partners
23 we have in Philadelphia Digital Navigator
24 include Beyond Literacy, Drexel, Excite
25 Center, Esperanza, SEAMAAC and others.

10/5/23 - STATED - SPEECHES

We need to continue working together with the children and families to adult education in the Free Library. Philadelphia provides digital skill classes around the City, the answer to the call to get Philadelphia connected. And while the work continues, I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude for this incredible effort and thank you and looking forward to being able to provide internet access to all Philadelphians throughout the City of Philadelphia.

And one last thing, PHL Council briefing for Philly Cam is right after Council. There will be lunch provided for staffers and colleagues who want to attend right in the Caucus Room following Council.

5 commend Majority Leader Jones on his
6 Crime Summit event this past weekend. It
7 was a great turnout with all of the
8 people in the room, from City leaders to
9 community leaders to young people that we
10 would need to make a dent on these
11 issues. The conversations were
12 meaningful and solution oriented, and I
13 look forward to seeing the blueprint and
14 I look forward to being a part of the
15 implementation. And job well done, and
16 thank you for your leadership.

17 I also wanted to ask that we
18 take a moment of silence for Josh Kruger,
19 who was tragically and brutally murdered
20 a few days ago. I didn't know Josh very
21 well, but we were friendly. He was such
22 a great person. He was someone who was
23 supportive of me and my work in Council.
24 He was someone who was a public servant
25 here at the City of Philadelphia for many

2 years and, as a journalist and a thought
3 leader, was also a voice for some of the
4 most vulnerable people in the City,
5 including those experiencing
6 homelessness, the LGBTQ community, and

10 our city and a loss for his family as
11 well. He also lost a brother not too
12 long ago. And so it's just a horrible
13 thing to happen to his family, and I just
14 wanted to know if we could take a moment
15 of silence to recognize such a great
16 person who was taken away from us.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can
18 we please have a moment of silence.

19 (Moment of silence.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Harrity.

24 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank you,
25 Council President.

2 Thank you, colleagues, for
3 voting on my resolution to remember the
4 murder of 22-year-old Masha Amini on
5 September 16th, 2022. I originally
6 wanted to do it on the anniversary a
7 couple weeks ago, but we didn't have the
8 text written up.

9 Iran by the government
10 officials sparked outrage around the
11 world. Masha Amini was killed in
12 violation of her human rights. Her death
13 has triggered a new wave of demands for
14 human rights and dignity for women around
15 the world.

16 People, and especially women,
17 should not have to face death for mere
18 violations of morality, and it is our
19 hope that by remembering Masha that we do
20 not let other people fall prey to
21 government-sanctioned violence.

22 Coming from the City of
23 Philadelphia, the birthplace of
24 democracy, the birthplace of freedom, I
25 believe that we have to stand up for

2 civil rights -- for human rights
3 violations, no matter where they occur.
4 And I hope just by remembering this poor
5 young lady, who we will never know the
6 great things that she was bound to do
7 because of something senseless, that we
8 just keep her in our prayers and her

10 forget, because if you forget, it will
11 happen again.

12 So thank you.

19 I want to also echo thanks to

22 I just want to let you know

12 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
13 you, Council President.

14 Every year there are men,
15 women, and children who are trafficked.
16 And so we are holding a committee hearing
17 on Children and Youth October the 10th at
18 Enon Baptist Tabernacle Church on 2800
19 West Cheltenham Avenue. I'd like to
20 invite everyone to participate.

21 Part of what we heard or part
22 what I heard when I participated in
23 Councilman Jones' Crime Safety Summit was
24 that children oftentimes communicate with
25 each other through social media and they

2 don't know who they are really talking
3 to. And that is who these traffickers
4 often prey and how they prey on children
5 in marginalized or vulnerable
6 communities.

7 So I ask you all to
8 participate, be a part of the
9 conversation and help us come to
10 solutions around how we educate our kids
11 about the dangers of human trafficking.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Driscoll.

17 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
18 you, Mr. President.

19 I just want to highlight that
20 the Committee on Transportation and
21 Public Utilities will hold a public
22 hearing on Wednesday, October 11th at
23 1 o'clock in a remote manner using
24 Microsoft Teams. The remote hearing is
25 regarding examining the impacts of and

2 funding alternatives for an extension of
3 the existing Broad Street Subway line
4 into the underserved Northeast along the
5 Roosevelt Boulevard.

6 So that hearing will be
7 Wednesday, October 11th at 1:00 p.m.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman. It will be a very
11 interesting discussion.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Johnson.

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
15 Council President.

16 I want to also echo the
17 sentiments of my colleague Councilwoman
18 Jamie Gauthier acknowledging the life of
19 Josh Kruger, who was an award-winning
20 journalist, a strong advocate for those
21 who are homeless, as well as a strong
22 advocate in the LGBTQ community, but also
23 a member of the Point Breeze community.

24 And so we were out and about
25 yesterday on his block talking to

2 neighbors addressing the issue of trauma,
3 because anyone that live on the block,
4 you wake up in the morning, find out
5 somebody is murdered, there's levels of
6 trauma that the neighbors are feeling in
7 the neighborhood.

8 So I wanted to take a moment to
9 echo the sentiments regarding his life
10 and legacy.

11 And also throughout this
12 weekend just doing my due diligence and
13 doing work and talking to different
14 business leaders around the state of our
15 city and we talked about how in order for
16 us to recruit businesses to come into our
17 city to expand our tax base, we need a
18 city that's cleaner, safer, and competent
19 in terms of how government operates. And
20 then the discussion talked about how
21 nationally we are going viral for all the
22 wrong reasons, right, getting phone calls
23 from people from other parts of the
24 country reaching out to us making sure
25 we're safe when they see people looting

2 and wreaking havoc in Center City, but
3 also this recent incident that took place
4 this weekend where a bunch of ATV riders
5 surround a young lady. One young man
6 jumps on back of her car, breaking her
7 back window out. She got babies in the
8 car. He drops a gun, then points the gun
9 at her face, which is totally
10 unacceptable.

11 And so I thank my colleague
12 Councilman Curtis Jones for hosting the
13 Crime Summit to begin looking at that
14 issue with comprehensive solutions as we
15 go into a new administration addressing
16 the issue.

17 And on the issue of ATVs and
18 illegal dirt bikes, I'm going to be
19 organizing an intergovernmental task
20 force to begin looking at are we looking
21 at all the ways that we can address this
22 issue. This isn't the first time we had
23 to address illegal dirt bikes here in the
24 City of Philadelphia. Councilman Curtis
25 Jones actually took a bunch of young men

to the woods over in Jersey on a four-wheeler ATV to try to show them alternatives to driving down the street, right? But there's legislation that has been introduced on the state level that we're entertaining, and I spoke to Commissioner John Stanford yesterday and tried to get more understanding of what are we doing, what aren't we doing, and how can we get a handle on this particular issue.

Obviously it's illegal to ride dirt bikes in the City of Philadelphia, so that's a non-starter, right? And at the same time, I'm not a big fan of mass incarceration, but there has to be a level of accountability, right?

So we need to make sure we're doing everything we can possible, rather that's supporting more police officers on the street, again exploring alternatives to young men who don't want to ride in the street, but at the end of the day, what took place -- see, the quality of

life issue, I'm like, okay, a lot of noise, right? They wreaking havoc in terms of you driving down the street. And I was surrounded yesterday, so I kind of like perked up, because I'm like I don't want to bump nobody while I'm driving and then I got to go through -- I'm serious. I'm like -- because these days you can't really argue with somebody when you get out the car like back in the day, right? So, you know, I know I had to slow down and let them go ahead of me, but when I watched that young lady, right, go back and forth with this young man, the coward I'm going to call it, right? See me if you want to see me, but coward, right, jump in her face, put a gun in her face, right? And she didn't back down, right? She didn't back down, right, but I had no idea there was children inside the car, right? And to all the chumps that were sitting there watching it go down with another young lady arguing with a young man, right, was

2 totally despicable and unacceptable.

3 So we're going to bring
4 together some stakeholders, District
5 Attorney, Police Commissioner, his team,
6 right, some state legislators to begin
7 looking at, again, are we doing
8 everything possible.

9 From my understanding, when
10 they take some of the bikes, there's like
11 some law where they have to figure out a
12 way to give the bikes back to folks.
13 Well, if that's the case, how do we close
14 that loophole, right? Are we immediately
15 destroying the bikes, right?

16 And so at least we have a
17 better understanding as we move forward
18 how we're addressing that issue from a
19 quality of life standpoint, because we're
20 never going to build our city if folks
21 don't want to come here. And the level
22 of the reputation that we're having
23 virally on a national level, well, if I
24 was a Fortune 500 company, I might think
25 twice about coming here, because you know

2 why? One, I got to make sure my
3 employees are safe. Two, the families
4 that will move here that actually work in
5 our city, they want to make sure they're
6 going to a neighborhood that's safe, got
7 good schools, and that's clean.

8 So thank you, Council

10 available as we move forward around
11 illegal task force around ATVs, sir.

13 Thank you, Councilman.

24 going on in the City of Philadelphia and,
25 two, this whole issue around ATVs. And

3 concerning. We actually had the City of
4 Hartford was supposed to be scheduled to
5 come to talk about their drone use

9 last minute saying there's some concern
10 about coming to Philadelphia, because
11 they saw the looting and all of the drama
12 that was going on across this city, and
13 unfortunately that's what people see on
14 the national news, CNN, MSNBC, and they
15 cancelled the trip. It was like -- I was
16 like, wow, I cannot believe this.

17 So I'm sure that we need to
18 follow up, because what I'm told, they
19 have a really, really good program. So
20 thank you for bringing that to our
21 attention.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Vaughn.

24 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank
25 you, Council President.

2 I just want to mention that
3 just as we have bad children creating
4 havoc in the City of Philadelphia, we
5 also have some good. A City of

9 called The Wiz at 3622 North 17th Street
10 here in Philadelphia, and he reached out
11 to the young lady whose car was damaged
12 and paid to have the window replaced.

18 You know, go get an egg sandwich from his
19 restaurant or something like that just so
