21 Mr. Decker, please read the
22 titles of those bills and resolutions.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
24 Phillips offers one bill and one
25 resolution, entitled "An ordinance

4 Parking of Boats, Motor Homes, Truck
5 Campers, Semitrailers, Truck Tractors,

7 prohibitions on semitrailer and truck
8 tractor parking in the Ninth District of
9 Council"; and

10 A resolution calling on the
11 administration, along with the
12 Philadelphia Parking Authority, to
13 perform an audit of semitrailer and truck
14 tractor parking across the City of
15 Philadelphia, to investigate best
16 practices in other jurisdictions, and to
17 provide solutions to this growing problem
18 in the City. Also authorizing the City
19 Council Committee on Streets and Services
20 to hold public hearings to assess the
21 enforcement of semitrailer and truck
22 tractor parking regulations.

23 Mr. President, Councilman
24 Phillips would like to be recognized on
25 this resolution and bill.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilman Phillips.

4 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
5 you, Mr. President. Before I make a
6 motion on this resolution, I would like
7 to make a few comments about the
8 legislation.

9 First, I want to thank the
10 co-sponsors of this legislation,
11 Councilmember Brian O'Neill,
12 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
13 Richardson, Councilmember Sharon Vaughn,
14 Councilman Mark Squilla, Councilman Mike
15 Driscoll, Councilmember Kenyatta Johnson,
16 Councilmember Curtis Jones, and
17 Councilman James Harrity, Councilmember
18 Kendra Brooks, Councilmember Quetcy
19 Lozada, and Councilmember Cindy Bass.

20 Today I'm introducing both a
21 bill and resolution. Both of these
22 legislative items are focused on a major
23 quality of life issue that is plaguing
24 many of our neighbors in the Philadelphia
25 area and, that is, the semitrailer and

2 truck tractor parking in residential
3 neighborhoods.

4 The bill I introduced emulates
5 legislation that was recently introduced
6 by my district Council colleagues Brian
7 O'Neill and Mike Driscoll.

8 Today I want to just mention
9 just something really briefly about truck
10 parking.

11 No issue rises higher than
12 quality of life, crime, and public
13 nuisances in the City of Philadelphia
14 than truck parking. When I was elected,
15 I promised my neighbors that I would
16 immediately focus my attention on real
17 efforts to measurably improve quality of
18 life. My bill does that.

19 For residents in the Ninth
20 District and across the City, today is
21 the beginning of relief from intrusive
22 trucks on residential blocks. Today I
23 have authored and introduced a focus that
24 will eradicate the presence of unwanted
25 commercial vehicles on the City streets.

2 Residential neighborhoods
3 across the City are inundated with
4 vehicles that diminish the beauty,
5 livability, and desirability of life.
6 This has implications for all
7 Philadelphians. Eradicating this problem
8 is my opening sabo. We're just getting
9 started.

10 So the Administration would
11 like to help us enforce these meaningful
12 measures, assess the prevalence of
13 illegal parking trucks across the City,
14 and take every possible step posthaste to
15 make our city a better place to live.

16 At the same time, I am business
17 friendly -- I'm a business-friendly
18 proponent of commerce in the City. My
19 legislation seeks to help business
20 people, especially hard-working truck
21 drivers and owners who deserve a city
22 that looks out for them.

23 I envision a safe, accessible,
24 and secure regional transportation hub
25 that puts truck drivers at ease and

2 alleviates the burden that currently is
3 imposed upon residents who are actually
4 stricken by this issue in the City of
5 Philadelphia.

6 So, Council President, today I
7 want to say that we also need to
8 understand how the City can better
9 implement the existing laws that are
10 already on the books. For example,
11 several of my colleagues, including
12 at-large Council colleagues Thomas and
13 Oh, have introduced legislation related
14 to truck parking and other quality of
15 life issues, and we need to understand
16 how the laws are being further
17 implemented by the Administration.

18 Because I also want the
19 Administration to publicly share the
20 results of its audit, my resolution also
21 authorizes the City Council Committee on
22 Streets and Services to hold public
23 hearings to assess the enforcement of
24 semitrailer and truck tractor parking
25 regulations.

2 I believe this is a problem
3 that we can solve and we can make it a
4 win-win for residents and truck drivers
5 alike.

6 With that said, I move that the
7 rules of Council be suspended to permit
8 the consideration of the resolution at

10 of each.

19 today, Mr. President, is Khalil Wilcher.
20 (Speaker approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. WILCHER: Good morning. My
24 name is Khalil Wilcher. I'm a resident
25 of the Ninth Councilmanic District,

2 currently reside in Mount Airy.

3 I want to thank you -- give a
4 thank you to the distinguished members of
5 Council and specifically to Councilman
6 Anthony Phillips for his resolution
7 specifically about the truck parking on
8 the street.

9 In my councilmanic district and
10 my ward, 50th Ward, this is an issue.
11 Specific streets we have the trailers
12 parked. We have a lot of things that
13 become eyesores, but it's a safety issue.

14 I do recognize that commercial
15 transportation is a lucrative business, a
16 tax-generating business, and a business
17 that is necessary, specifically in Black
18 and brown communities. Any positive
19 revenue streams I'm all for. However, I
20 think it does need to be regulated and it
21 should be allowed to be curtailed by
22 whether it be Parking Authority, whether
23 it be some form of ordinance, signs,
24 signage, and it should be able to be
25 handled in that manner.

2 My suggestion would be at a
3 later date, maybe the ward leaders or
4 maybe the committee people get together
5 and designate areas in which the
6 commercial vehicles can be parked and
7 placed out of the way and not on streets
8 where maybe to block traffic, you can't
9 see also children, you know, walking and
10 things of that nature.

11 I think it's a good resolution,
12 and I thank the Councilman for
13 introducing it again. Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
16 We appreciate it.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Edison Frazier, commenting on 200658.
19 (Speaker approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MR. FRAZIER: Good morning. My
23 name Edison Frazier and I'm here on the
24 Bill 200954 [sic], the resolution
25 approving the Neighborhood Preservation

3 Now, I agree that with the golf
4 course coming around, it's bringing money
5 to the neighborhood, but at the same
6 time, it destroying the neighborhood and
7 it's not really going to bring nothing to
8 the neighborhood, because I've been
9 trying to do this paint ball thing. So I
10 don't know -- ain't nobody -- I've been
11 talking to certain people. So I got to
12 come through here to get this out,
13 whereas though I think that the paint
14 ball would bring more to the kids on the
15 streets than the violence and stuff like
16 that.

17 That paint ball ain't really
18 going to bring -- I mean, the golf course
19 really ain't going to bring nothing. You
20 destroying trees. You cutting it down.
21 I'm from Philly Thrive. You cutting
22 trees and you destroying the
23 neighborhood.

24 The average Black young person
25 ain't going to go to no golf course,

2 ain't going to go to no golf course. I
3 was bringing the paint ball thing because
4 I was going to do it like the Bloods and
5 the Crips, bring them together, educate
6 them, get them jobs and moving on.
7 Nobody don't hear me. So I've been doing
8 this for like four, five years.

9 I mean, Councilman, I mean, you
10 approved me to do it, but, you know, you
11 say you going to talk to me. I talked to
12 Kenyatta. I talked to Gauthier. It's
13 like, I mean -- the golf course really
14 ain't going to do nothing, because a
15 young Black ain't going to come there and
16 play no golf. It's bringing money, but
17 at the same time, it's destroying our
18 community.

19 So I'm saying if I bring this
20 paint ball thing, it's going to put a
21 patch on the crime. I'm around the City.
22 I know the shooters. They need something
23 to do.

24 I don't know if this the
25 platform for this, but I tried to talk to

2 everybody, but this is what I got to do
3 now.

4 I got a kid right now on the
5 run I don't know what to do with. I
6 don't want to turn him in. I don't want
7 to turn him in.

8 So I'm just saying like -- like
9 I'm having a meeting with you, Jones and
10 Kenyatta, and I want to see what we going
11 to do, because you gave me the money to
12 get the paint ball stuff. Now I need
13 somewhere to go. You gave me the money
14 to get the paint ball. I ain't trying to
15 put you -- but I'm trying to say to you,
16 you gave me the money to get it.

17 I mean, you put the golf course
18 up there. Let me put the paint ball up
19 there. That's going to bring money and
20 it's going to stop the crime a little
21 bit. That's all I'm saying.

22 That's all. I'm done. But I
23 see you after this is over, Mr. Jones.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
4 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

5 (Speaker approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
9 Lynn Landes, founder of
10 HealthAlertPhilly.org. I'm commenting in
11 support of Councilwoman Bass's resolution
12 to enforce the Healthy Outdoor Public
13 Spaces law, which minimizes the use of
14 toxic pesticides in public spaces. It is
15 vitally important that the laws City
16 Council passes are enforced by the Mayor.
17 Otherwise our system of checks and
18 balances falls apart.

19 It is equally important that
20 City Council not pass laws and policies
21 that violate people's civil liberties
22 without a very good reason for doing so.
23 Therefore, I respectfully request that
24 City Council end the mask and social
25 distancing mandate that is currently

2 being required in this Chamber.

3 I am not questioning City
4 Council's good intentions, but there is
5 no science to justify the use of these
6 mandates in public spaces. In fact, I
7 filed a Right-to-Know Request for any
8 studies the Board of Health uses to
9 justify mask mandates, but they refused
10 to provide even one, and that is because
11 there are few, if any.

12 Conversely, there are over 150
13 studies and reports that indicate that
14 masks are not only ineffective at
15 preventing transmission of disease, they
16 can be very detrimental to our mental and
17 physical health. Masks lower oxygen
18 intake and increase carbon dioxide
19 levels, which is particularly harmful for
20 young children, pregnant women, and the
21 elderly.

22 Masks can be contaminated with
23 bacteria, toxic chemicals, and dangerous
24 fibers. Masks can also increase the
25 incidence of respiratory infection. Yet

2 the public has not been informed of any
3 of these harmful health effects by the
4 Board of Health, which is highly
5 unethical.

6 For all of these reasons, I
7 respectfully request that City Council
8 end the mask and social distancing
9 mandates in this Chamber.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Peter Winslow, commenting on 220954.

15 (Speaker approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MR. WINSLOW: Good morning. My
19 name is Peter Winslow. I am a
20 Philadelphia resident. I speak to you
21 today as President of A Smart
22 Collaboration LLC and as the candidate
23 recommended by City Council to Mayor
24 Kenney for appointment to the initial
25 Board of the Philadelphia Public

2 Financial Authority.

3 Thank you, President Clarke and
4 members of Council, for this opportunity
5 to speak in support of Resolution No.
6 220945 -- excuse me; 54 for the approval
7 of the Statement and Budget of the
8 '22-'23 Neighborhood Preservation
9 Initiative, and I thank Council and Mayor
10 Kenney for approving this \$400 million
11 program in 2020.

12 The intentions and the mission
13 of the Neighborhood Preservation
14 Initiative and the Philadelphia Public
15 Financial Authority are aligned, and
16 those of us who are supporting the
17 Financial Authority and the public bank
18 do not want to wait until the entity as
19 the Public Financial Authority is
20 established to put forward innovative
21 programs, such as the ones that can be
22 done under this initiative.

23 So we applaud it going forward.
24 And I would point out that when the
25 Financial Authority is implemented, that

2 there will be some additional benefits
3 that will accrue to the program.

4 Presumably the Financial Authority would
5 be a recipient of the service agreements
6 that are contemplated under the program,
7 but there are some other things that we
8 can add to this effort that are not
9 currently available.

10 The legislation for the Public
11 Financial Authority mandates that we
12 qualify as a Community Development
13 Financial Institution, which is something
14 that a city agency or one of the other
15 authorities is unable to do because they
16 do not have independence of the
17 government, which is one of the
18 requirements.

19 Furthermore, none of the
20 existing institutions are interested or
21 have the capacity to become a public bank
22 and thereby engage in fractional-reserve
23 banking, which would extend the capacity
24 of the institutions working collectively
25 as the citywide effort to further the

2 goals that we all hold together.

3 So thank you very much, and I
4 urge passage today. Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
7 appreciate it.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Andrew Frishkoff, commenting on
10 220954.

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Andrew Frishkoff? I saw him earlier.

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He
16 must have left.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Reverend Jeanette Davis, commenting on
19 a resolution introduced today and to be
20 adopted today by Councilwoman Gauthier.

21 (Speaker approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 REVEREND DAVIS: Good morning,
25 President Clarke and Councilmembers. My

2 name is Reverend Jeanette Davis and I am
3 the Executive Director of Davis Ministry
4 Group non-profit organization. I am also
5 a member of the Philadelphia Black Clergy
6 and Vicinity and also an Advisory Board
7 member to a new initiative called
8 57 Blocks.

9 So today I am here in
10 support -- I stand in support and I
11 request that the resolution that was
12 presented today by Councilwoman Gauthier
13 for gun violence prevention and for our
14 youth be approved.

15 I would also like to request
16 that a strategic plan be implemented into
17 our communities that can bring about real
18 change by reducing gun violence in the
19 City. That plan that we would like to
20 see City Council embrace is called the 57
21 Block Initiative to ensure that we are
22 collectively doing everything humanly and
23 morally possible to provide resources and
24 public safety precautions for our youth
25 and our residents of Philadelphia.

2 I will share a brief synopsis
3 of the 57 Blocks. 57 Blocks is the
4 working name for a strategy aimed at
5 reducing gun violence and addressing its
6 harmful impacts on our hardest hit
7 neighborhoods through targeted investment
8 of resources, services, and environmental
9 improvements. This strategy is designed
10 to bring non-law enforcement
11 evidence-based services and improvements
12 to the people and places that are in dire
13 need of them the most.

14 Immediately following these
15 proceedings, we will convene across the
16 hall for a short briefing on the 57 Block
17 Initiative. We invite and encourage all
18 Councilmembers to attend the briefing
19 with questions, concerns, and to learn
20 how to participate in this initiative.

21 I'm closing with this: To whom
22 much is given, much is required. God has
23 given us a voice and the power to
24 advocate for his people. We know that to
25 put the work in, that's what we need to

2 do. We know that faith without works is
3 dead.

4 So as the clergy continues to
5 pray, as our community organizations
6 continue to be on the front line, and our
7 elected officials continue to provide new
8 legislation and, most importantly, as
9 God's power continues to rest, rule, and
10 abide with us, we can be victorious in
11 transforming Philadelphia back to the
12 great city it once was.

13 Thank you, and may God continue
14 to bless you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
17 We appreciate it.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
22 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 220954.

23 (Speaker approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MR. HAGINS: Great morning,
3 everyone. Ogbonna Hagins.

4 I definitely am in agreement
5 with the hundred million dollars for the
6 Neighborhood Preservation Initiative.

7 I want to talk a little bit
8 about the violence. The violence that --
9 in regards to this, though, the violence
10 that you see in the Afro American
11 community was imported because of factors
12 beyond their control. It is time this
13 city owns this reality.

14 The Brookings Institute has
15 provided empirical data of longstanding
16 social, economic, and legal repression of
17 the Afro American Freedmen community in
18 Philadelphia through home and commercial
19 property ownership.

20 The average loss in the Afro
21 American community home market is about
22 \$48,000 per home, amounting to billions
23 and billions in cumulative losses
24 collectively.

25 We now have evidence that the

Afro American community in Philadelphia has been robbed of billions of dollars. The question is, how is this body going to approach getting the money back. I feel that this injustice warrants a convening of a special committee accompanied by the District Attorney's Office to investigate and, if needed, to prosecute those responsible.

In closing, it is very possible, it's very possible that there would have never been a Junior Black Mafia, a Black Mafia, or the current drill killings if those billions were allocated or allowed to remain in the Afro American community to be passed down through generations and generations.

This body can no longer, this body can no longer just sit by idly while the Afro American communities spiral into an economic collapse.

Thanks.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Reverend Gregory
7 Holston, commenting on 220954.

8 (Speaker approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 REVEREND HOLSTON: Good
12 morning. My name is Reverend Gregory
13 Holston. I am Senior Advisor on Policy
14 and Advocacy at the District Attorney's
15 Office. I am the Chair of Black Clergy's
16 Gun Violence Committee and also a member
17 of the 57 Block Coalition Initiative that
18 Reverend Jeanette Davis was just talking
19 about.

20 I stand in support of this
21 \$400 million initiative around home
22 preservation, neighborhood preservation,
23 particularly in the areas of lighting. I
24 can't say enough about more resources for
25 lighting.

2 One of the points that we are
3 continually making in this 57 Block
4 Initiative is simple things like lighting
5 and trash removal make all the difference
6 in terms of the violence in our
7 community.

8 One of our groups, Frontline
9 Dads, a member of our group did a study,
10 a survey of North Philadelphia, and the
11 number one issue came back in the areas
12 that they walked and talked to the
13 community was lighting, lighting,
14 lighting. If we just had some more
15 lights, we would not have the violence
16 that we're having. So I'm happy that we
17 are having some resources to start to
18 really address that.

19 Part of this 57 Block
20 Initiative considers all of those issues
21 and talks about it doing it in a real
22 way, in a real strategy. We look at
23 those 57 blocks, we look at about a
24 quarter mile radius around each one of
25 those blocks, and we find that 30 percent

2 of the homicides of the City of
3 Philadelphia occur only on five percent
4 of the land in the City of Philadelphia.

5 The neighborhoods that are
6 suffering the most are those kinds of
7 neighborhoods, and those neighborhoods
8 have been disinvested in for the last
9 hundred years.

10 Our country has had a policy of
11 not investing in Black and brown
12 neighborhoods, and much of the
13 neighborhoods that we walk in in North
14 Philadelphia and Kensington were
15 neighborhoods that were specifically and
16 intentionally targeted to not have
17 investment, that mortgages were denied
18 simply because Black and brown people
19 were there. And that policy lasted
20 through the 1970s intentionally and still
21 lasts today through the practice. And we
22 even found a study, as you know, from
23 2018, the Reveal report, that showed very
24 clearly that mortgages are still being
25 denied two or three times and that the

2 Black and brown community is losing over
3 a billion dollars or close to a billion
4 dollars a year in mortgages.

5 Come after this meeting today.

6 We urge you, Council, with all our heart
7 to come and let us be able to share all
8 of this information with you so that we
9 can build a strategy that can really
10 transform our city and end this gun
11 violence nightmare that's occurred for
12 the last 50 years in our city.

13 Thank you so much.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

16 - - -

17 (Applause.)

18 - - -

19 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
20 is Khaleef Alexander, commenting on
21 220954.

22 (Speaker approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MR. ALEXANDER: Good morning.

2 My name is Khaleef Alexander. I am here
3 representing an organization called
4 Concerned Black American Citizens, and
5 one of the reasons why I'm actually
6 speaking today is because I'm noticing
7 that, you know, the City of Philadelphia
8 doing amazing things or at least trying
9 to, right?

10 Now, one thing that we haven't
11 really addressed is the structural
12 violence, and I know a lot of the times
13 we say the term "gun violence," but
14 structural violence is a more unique
15 thing. It affects the economics. It
16 affects the mental capacity. It also --
17 it creates what we see as this thing
18 called gun violence.

19 Now, previously you heard
20 Brother Ogbonna Hagins, he spoke on
21 behalf in regards to the economic
22 component, right? Now I'd like to focus
23 a lot on the reparations piece, the
24 structural violence piece, and the most
25 important piece is this thing called the

2 Freedmen Bureau.

3 Now, we had the Freedmen Bureau
4 during the reconstruction era. Many
5 people, they may not be familiar with
6 that, but during the reconstruction era,
7 we had that.

8 We have this beautiful statue
9 outside of Octavius Catto, who was killed
10 in the City of Philadelphia during the
11 reconstruction era for the right to vote.
12 But he didn't die for the right to vote
13 just for anything. He died for the right
14 to vote for liberation of his people.

15 So with that being said, I look
16 around in the City of Philadelphia and we
17 have an Office of Immigrant Affairs, an
18 Office of LGBTQ Affairs, but we don't
19 have an Office of Black American Affairs.

20 So I'm trying to figure out how
21 can we get that -- how can we have that
22 as a reality in today's time, but also
23 how can this body -- how can we earmark
24 dollars specifically for Black Americans,
25 because that's something that we need.

2 We talk about the violence all
3 the time in the City of Philadelphia, but
4 we know that these different programs
5 that people have, that's not going to
6 really end the violence. That's a
7 Band-aid for gunshot wounds. That's not
8 going to do much.

9 So I say all that to say one of
10 the main reasons why I'm here today is to
11 speak on behalf of the reparationists,
12 and I just imagine that the City of
13 Philadelphia look into the lineage wealth
14 gap between Black Americans and white
15 Americans as by quoted by Dr. William
16 "Sandy" Darity from Duke University
17 anywhere between 14 and 20 trillion
18 dollars. And I think if this body begins
19 to look at the lineage wealth gap, we'll
20 be able to answer some of the questions
21 in regards to the violence that we have
22 in the City of Philadelphia, because the
23 violence is a health crisis, and anywhere
24 you have a health crisis, immediate funds
25 are released.

2 So I can conclude on that.

3 Thank you.

10 for the adoption of the resolution.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All in favor indicate by saying
15 aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it, and that resolution is
22 adopted.

23 Mr. Decker, Resolution No.
24 220956.

25 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

2 naming the 600 block of North 66th Street
3 as "John Skief Way," in honor of John
4 Skief, the founder of the Harambee
5 Institute of Science and Technology
6 Charter School.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you.

9 The Chair again recognizes
10 Councilman Jones.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 For those of us who are old
14 enough to remember Baba Skief, he was a
15 trailblazer who in education, before
16 there was a Black Male Engagement, before
17 there was an emphasis on Black educators
18 being in our school, said at West
19 Philadelphia High School that there
20 needed to be a different type of process
21 to educate our young people, particularly
22 males, particularly individuals that were
23 at risk of being lost in the system.

24 He cited a number of the
25 statistics on how our kids graduate, how

2 they wind up in bad outcomes. And more
3 than just citing them, he did something
4 about it by establishing Harambee
5 Institute, which happens to be in the
6 Fourth District.

7 In addition to that, to his
8 education advocacy, he was a vanguard on
9 social issues, civil rights issues,
10 anti-violence issues, and left us too
11 soon, but what he left behind was an
12 institution called Harambee. And if
13 you've ever been in that school, it is
14 different than many schools, because
15 there is a woke atmosphere before that
16 term was ever truly popular, and the
17 kids, the children, the youth there have
18 a sense of self that only exists in a
19 handful of schools that I know of, and
20 they're very proud of their institution,
21 of their projected future. And I'm
22 thankful to him and his family for
23 bringing that institution into our
24 district by buying the land, by buying
25 the property and moving that institution

2 forward, which, in my opinion, was the
3 vanguard for a number of charter schools
4 in the City of Philadelphia.

5 And, therefore, I move for the
6 adoption of the resolution.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you.

25 The Chair recognizes

24 speeches.

25 On behalf of the minority,

3 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
5 much, Council President.

6 First, I'd like to join
7 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas in welcoming
8 Longstreth. I went to Longstreth
9 kindergarten K through 6, and so I've
10 been there recently, along with our
11 former Councilmember Jannie Blackwell, a
12 few times and always happy to see the
13 children from the neighborhood here.

14 I do have an announcement I'm
15 going to roll into a comment that has to
16 do with legislation, but first I'd like
17 to just welcome everyone to PHL Live
18 Center Stage Award Show. That is going
19 to be on Tuesday, December the 20th at
20 the World Cafe Live, and what that is for
21 folks who don't know, it's a free
22 platform where people get on and submit
23 their original music, three-minute video,
24 and they're reviewed by Grammy Award
25 winners, music industry leaders in ten

musical categories, everything from hip-hop to classical to jazz to R&B, rock, and three judges pick five finalists and they perform in ten musical categories at different venues, and now we will have the award show where the five finalists are recognized. One winner will get \$1,000, free studio recording time and other things like that.

Really what it is is a platform for people with talent who want to move ahead in their pursuit of their talent and ability.

It is very important to our city. It's very important to our efforts to deal with a lot of problems in our city, but we're going to really reflect on what young people want. There's a lot of things that are good for them. They're not interested. The creative arts economy is something they're very interested in, and they want the opportunities, and this is what that

2 effort is.

3 I get criticism from that.

4 Sometimes people say like you're wasting
5 your time in the arts, and I always blurt
6 this out: \$3.4 billion -- this is
7 pre-COVID per year -- \$920 million in
8 household income per year, and
9 \$157 million in local taxes per year.

10 It's not a waste of time. It's very
11 important that we pursue this.

12 And so I'm going to roll into
13 my next comment, which is this: As a
14 Councilman at-large, the greatest problem
15 that I've faced is not having any money,
16 and people are always surprised to find
17 out that Councilpeople at-large don't
18 have a budget, don't have funding, don't
19 have funds. We got to operate pretty
20 much -- I got to get the money from
21 corporations and other entities. So I'd
22 like to shout out Dunkin' Donuts and
23 Laborers Local 57 for donating the funds
24 to make the prizes available.

25 But whatever work it is, and

2 speaking on behalf of all of our at-large
3 Councilpeople, you know, we cover the
4 whole City, and we don't have funds, and
5 people come to us asking for money to
6 support their work. We don't have any
7 money to give them.

8 I actually started a youth
9 non-profit symposium where I bring
10 foundations and corporations to give
11 money to non-profits to serve children
12 and youth.

13 What I'm saying is, it's been
14 raised a couple times, and perhaps not
15 satisfactorily by me, why do
16 Councilmembers at-large not have a fund,
17 and I think they should. I think
18 Councilmembers at-large should have a
19 fund to support some of the work that
20 they do for the community.

21 And I know it's controversial,
22 but I'm going to bring it up on behalf of
23 my colleagues. They should have some
24 funds. It's a lot of work to cover the
25 whole City with no money, no resources,

2 and try to do things and help people.

3 I intend to write a bill to
4 allocate funds to members at-large so
5 they have some level of money that they
6 can engage with.

7 What I was told, Council
8 President, is Councilmembers at-large
9 don't have money because the public
10 doesn't want Councilmembers to have
11 money, and I understand that. They don't
12 want Councilmembers to have money. They
13 don't want us to have resources. They
14 don't want us to go outside of the City.
15 I understand all that, but for the better
16 interest -- you know, I went to Korea, I
17 had to pay for it myself, to meet with
18 the Chairman of Korea Airlines, to meet
19 with the Executive Vice President of
20 Asiana Airlines, to meet with the Vice
21 Chairman of Hyundai Motor Group because
22 we had a train manufacturer here in
23 Philadelphia.

24 I've been to Pathway Schools in
25 New York. I go down to Washington to the

2 Embassy. I have to pay for that out of
3 my pocket, which is okay, but traveling
4 through the City with non-profits and
5 community groups and everybody else who
6 often times come to City Council, say we
7 need some financial help, we need some
8 help -- I'm looking for two laptop
9 computers, by the way, because the Imam
10 asked me, he needs two laptops. I'm
11 calling. I'm looking for laptop
12 computers.

13 I get asked for things. I have
14 no money. I can't give money. I'm just
15 saying PHL Live or whatever work I do,
16 isn't it a problem that I have to
17 constantly beg corporations, constantly
18 look for donations to do the government's
19 work?

20 There might be a conflict of
21 interest. Somebody might say you're
22 funding some of this with your campaign
23 funds even though it's not a campaign
24 here, but I got to pay for this somehow.

25 With all of that said, I ask

2 all of you, my colleagues, to share your
3 thoughts with me. Maybe I'm missing
4 something. But there are seven at-large,
5 you know, five of them democrats, two of
6 them not, and for the not, we have a
7 Working Families Party, we got a
8 republican here. Who knows what the
9 future will hold, but the at-larges I
10 think should have some level of public
11 funds to do their public work.

12 Thank you very much.

19 It looks like you all are starting out
20 with like six members here today. That's

24 internally.

10 On behalf of the majority, the
11 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
13 Mr. President.

14 Gil Scott Heron had a line that
15 says the revolution will not be
16 televised. Popular song in the '70s, one
17 that I tapped my feet and nodded my head
18 to a lot. But I tapped my feet and
19 nodded my head this week because I did
20 not understand how SEPTA could have a bus
21 revolution and not have it thought out
22 well.

23 I want to thank my colleague
24 Member Johnson for sponsoring a hearing
25 that hopefully we can encourage the State

2 to be a part of.

3 I want to thank my colleague
4 Gilmore Richardson for being the alarmist
5 to say this was going down and that out
6 of the 118 routes, 105 of them are going
7 to either be discontinued, altered,
8 merged, or rerouted. Talk about a
9 revolution.

10 Member Johnson talks about,
11 what is it, 7, 7 bus?

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: 17.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: 17 bus that
14 he grew up on that goes through his
15 district and travels throughout the City.
16 In my area, the G bus from Woodland
17 Avenue to City Avenue.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: South
19 Philly too.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Hits South
21 Philly too.

22 All of these are going to be
23 renamed, rerouted. For what?

24 Under the emphasis of the
25 efficiency that they said, and eventually

2 in Roxborough, they admitted it was
3 because of money. It was because of
4 money. And they said that ridership was
5 down.

6 I would suggest to them that if
7 you kept SEPTA clean, you'd increase
8 ridership. If you kept SEPTA safe, you
9 would increase ridership. If you kept
10 SEPTA reliable, you would increase
11 ridership. You don't cut services to
12 increase ridership.

13 We are experiencing in parts of
14 our city unprecedented expansion, houses
15 going up, cranes everywhere, new
16 residents to the City of Philadelphia.

17 You tried to sell us on let's
18 ride automobiles less. Well, if we ride
19 automobiles less, we should be riding
20 buses more, and in so doing, have more
21 options to be able to get from Point A to
22 Point B.

23 It is inconceivable that kids
24 from Andorra have to now travel, add time
25 to get to school, from getting up at 5:00

2 in the morning to have to get up at 4:00
3 in the morning.

4 It is wrong for our senior
5 citizens, who know their way to their
6 doctor's office, to now have to
7 recalculate their way to vital services
8 they depend on.

9 We should be considering
10 merging of stops maybe, more efficient
11 buses definitely, but we should not do
12 any of that without listening to the
13 community.

14 So Gil Scott Heron said the
15 revolution will not be televised. The
16 counterrevolution will be publicized, and
17 we're not going to sit by in this body,
18 because it affects every one of the
19 districts and, by the way, Member Oh, all
20 of the at-larges in this body.

21 So stay tuned, stay involved,
22 and don't let this revolution, shots be
23 fired and us not address those issues.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

18 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
19 you, Council President.

20 I want to start by also
21 acknowledging the students here from
22 Longstreth, which is in the Third
23 Councilmanic District. It's wonderful to
24 see you all here this morning.

25 Today I introduced two

2 resolutions, the first of which
3 co-introduced with Councilmember Thomas
4 honors the life and legacy of Cobbs Creek
5 community leader Coach Gene Lett by
6 renaming the 5500 block of Christian
7 Street after him.

8 Coach Gene was a lifelong
9 resident of West Philadelphia and spent
10 his entire life pouring his heart and
11 soul into uplifting his community's
12 youth.

13 Coach Gene was more than just a
14 coach to his basketball players. He was
15 a role model and a mentor. He required
16 excellence from his players, not only on
17 the court but in the classroom as well.

18 Through his Degree Chasing
19 program, he constantly emphasized the
20 student part of being a student-athlete.
21 And as President of the Christy Rec
22 Center Recreation Advisory Council and a
23 dedicated volunteer at Christy for years,
24 he led countless youth programs and
25 community events, creating fun and

2 creative programming for kids and adults
3 alike.

4 Coach Gene's sudden passing
5 last month left a huge hole in the hearts
6 of everyone who loved him, especially in
7 the Cobbs Creek community that he called
8 home. And I'd like to offer my sincere
9 condolences to his wife, Andrea, his
10 children, and grandchildren. I hope that
11 renaming the 5500 block of Christian
12 Street serves as a small token of the
13 City and of Cobbs Creek's gratitude for
14 Coach Gene's unwavering dedication to
15 West Philly's young people.

16 We miss him dearly, and Cobbs
17 Creek will feel a lot emptier without
18 him.

19 I also co-introduced a
20 resolution with Councilmember Johnson
21 calling for a hearing on youth gun
22 violence so the City can develop a more
23 comprehensive, targeted, and proactive
24 strategy to engage youth who are at risk
25 of being involved in or who are already

2 involved in gun violence.

3 I am gravely concerned that the
4 victims and perpetrators of gun violence
5 are becoming younger and younger and that
6 small beefs are resulting in our children
7 being injured or murdered.

8 Children are shooting each
9 other at football games, at supposed safe
10 havens like parks and rec centers, and
11 just steps away from their schools.

12 Our city can't go on like this,
13 and we cannot allow this to become
14 normal, because these young people are
15 Philadelphia's next generation of
16 business leaders, community organization
17 leaders, and City Councilmembers.

18 As a city, we have a
19 fundamental duty to make sure that they
20 have the tools they need to remain safe
21 and to thrive. And although the City
22 already provides an extensive array of
23 services for young people, I consistently
24 hear from advocates and young people
25 directly that we are not offering our

2 youth adequate supports or opportunities.

3 Parents do not know where to go
4 for help, and when they do connect with
5 services, those services are often not
6 delivered in time to save their children.
7 Simply put, we are failing, and we cannot
8 pretend otherwise.

9 As I've said before, the gun
10 violence epidemic in our city is a public
11 health emergency, just like the COVID-19
12 pandemic, and we need to take the same
13 multi-layered, collaborative approach to
14 saving our children from gun violence.

15 We know that we cannot use a
16 one-size-fits-all prevention strategy
17 across all age groups when it comes to
18 addressing involvement with gun violence.
19 This is why I introduced this resolution
20 today calling for the Special Committee
21 on Gun Violence Prevention to hold a
22 hearing to explore the issue of youth gun
23 violence, to identify service gaps,
24 clarify what's working, and uncover
25 budgetary policy and programmatic

2 remedies internally and externally.

3 Our youth are calling out, and
4 we must help them. We can do more, and
5 we must do more to solidify
6 Philadelphia's long-term success by
7 protecting and supporting our next
8 generations of leaders.

9 These children are our future,
10 and they deserve nothing less than bold,
11 targeted, quick, and impactful support
12 from their local government.

13 Thank you so much.

14 And then, lastly, I just want
15 to remind everyone that we have a
16 briefing right across the hall in the
17 Caucus Room for Councilmembers and staff
18 on the 57 Blocks Initiative. I want to
19 thank the members of the 57 Block
20 coalition that came here to speak today,
21 Reverend Holston and Reverend Davis. I
22 also want to thank Ogbonna Hagins and
23 also the other young man who spoke so
24 poignantly about how Black neighborhoods
25 have been disinvested in for decades and

2 decades and decades and that you can tie
3 a direct line straight from that
4 disinvestment to the gun violence that's
5 happening now.

6 57 Blocks calls for targeted,
7 bold investments in quality of life
8 services and other interventions that can
9 really help those neighborhoods to move
10 forward. This is a proven strategy.
11 It's been proven even by our own
12 Dr. Eugenia South, a brilliant Black
13 trauma surgeon who does work at Penn, who
14 even looked at how the City's targeted
15 Basic Systems Repair Program, if we
16 target it correctly, can help to drop the
17 level of shootings on particular blocks.

18 And so I believe in this
19 strategy very much, and I hope all my
20 colleagues will come over to hear the
21 briefing and to get some lunch too.

22 Thank you so much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 Councilwoman Blackwell, thank

3 I just want recognize
4 Councilwoman Blackwell. She's back in.

5 Thank you, Councilwoman, for
6 being here.

7 - - -

11 Thank you so much.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Harrity.

14 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Council
15 President Clarke, today I rise to address
16 the plight of the opioid and gun violence
17 epidemic in our city.

18 On November 28th, 2022, the day
19 on which myself and our three newest
20 colleagues took our oath of office to
21 become members of this body, I drove to
22 my home in Kensington, only to find that
23 police officers were there at both ends
24 of the block investigating a murder of a
25 17-year-old.

2 This is just one example of the
3 type of violence that plagues all our
4 communities. Sadly, there are no stories
5 covering this shooting. The Inquirer
6 wasn't there to report the details.
7 Channel 6 did not send the news van.

8 In this city, we have been too
9 accustomed to single instances of murder,
10 that only mass shootings make headlines.
11 All other instances of crime can be seen
12 as just a normal day in Philadelphia.
13 This is unacceptable.

14 While Philadelphia's 2022
15 homicide rate is approximately
16 seven percent lower than the 2021, it is
17 appalling that through the end of
18 November, 53 of those arrests for
19 homicide were juveniles. Most
20 shockingly, 37 victims of homicide were
21 also juveniles.

22 We are failing our children
23 when we take -- sorry. We are failing
24 our children when they take to the
25 streets to shoot each other. We are

failing our children when they are pushing poison like Fentanyl on our streets and carrying guns to harm each other. We are failing our children when we do not give them the chance to have the same education and extracurricular activities that children in our counties have. At the same time, we are failing our children when we do not hold the individuals who commit these heinous crimes accountable.

We need to send a clear message to those who commit violence in our city. We will make sure that you are found, fully punished to the full extent of the law.

The critical component to this is equipping our law enforcement officers with the tools needed to investigate each and every one of these crimes, including more cameras in high-crime areas. While this body's Appropriations bill passed last week attempted to do some of that, it doesn't go far enough.

2 Public safety is one of the
3 most pressing issues facing our Council
4 today. We must prioritize the City's
5 safety so that we can prevent another
6 year like this year or last year.

7 We can get our children back to
8 what they're supposed to be doing, which
9 is being kids.

10 I'm tired of burying children.
11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 - - -
15 (Applause.)

16 - - -
17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Thomas.

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
20 Council President.

21 A couple things real quick.
22 First and foremost, I wanted to offer my
23 condolences to the family of Gene Lett.
24 Councilmember Gauthier spoke briefly
25 about Gene's impact in the Third

Councilmanic District, specifically his work at Christy Rec Center, but I remember Gene when he was assistant coach at Lincoln University. Gene was somebody who I competed against. Some of my best friends and some of the people who are having a phenomenal impact on our children today played for Gene and was mentored by Gene, and because of the work he's done and the legacy that he's created, his life will continue to live on, not just through Gene Jr., who is a great young man who is also doing the work, but through all of the different adults now who he coached, who he mentored who are also now giving back and having a positive impact on young people all across the City of Philadelphia.

So I just wanted to acknowledge Gene. And my heart is still broken for him and his family, as he actually passed away on his way to the hospital, but he was participating in an athletic activity, doing what he loved to do in

2 one of our rec centers. So my thoughts
3 and prayers go out to Gene, his wife, his
4 children, and everybody that is hurt by
5 Gene's passing.

6 I also wanted to, like you,
7 Council President, acknowledge my
8 Philadelphia delegation chair, who I see
9 walk in earlier, State Rep Morgan Cephas,
10 as well as former Councilwoman Jannie
11 Blackwell, who I personally appreciate,
12 who actually still continues to mentor me
13 and support me even while not being in
14 Council.

15 So, Councilwoman Blackwell,
16 it's always an honor for you to be in our
17 presence.

18 If folks did not know,
19 yesterday the PIAA voted to allow NIL,
20 name, image, and likeness, for high
21 school students all across the
22 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. This is
23 going to completely change what it means
24 to participate in interscholastic
25 athletics, and this Council body is

2 already thinking about what protections
3 we need to take in order to support those
4 young people.

5 A few weeks back I introduced
6 the NIL Youth Protection Act right here
7 on this Council floor, and I talked about
8 the importance of making sure that we
9 have resources and legal advice available
10 for young people so they don't become
11 victims of predatory behavior.

12 So while that bill has not been
13 passed yet, I'm going to continue to work
14 on my colleagues and continue to push the
15 Administration to make sure that the
16 funding and the dollars are allocated and
17 are there to be able to make sure that
18 young people have the support they need,
19 especially if they come below a certain
20 income level.

21 Last, but not least, I'm having
22 an event this weekend, the inaugural
23 Councilman Isaiah Thomas Classic, where
24 we're going to be inviting high school
25 students from all over the area to

2 participate and compete on a level that
3 will put them in a position to be able to
4 show their skills off to not just the
5 folks who are viewing the event this
6 weekend but as well as the scouts and the
7 college coaches who we're going to send
8 the film out to.

9 So I'm excited about that. And
10 believe it or not, Councilmember Oh, I
11 had to raise the money myself to be able
12 to put this event on so it could put our
13 young people in the position where we did
14 not charge any of the teams and any of
15 the youth who participate in the event.

16 So if you want to come out this
17 weekend and look at some highly
18 competitive student-athletes who are now
19 eligible for NIL deals, we will be having
20 the event this Friday at Frankford High
21 School, which is my alma mater, and this
22 Saturday at MaST Charter School.

23 Thank you, Council President,
24 and thank you, colleagues, for your
25 continued support.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Phillips.

7 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
8 you, Council President.

9 I simply wanted to -- this
10 wasn't a part of my original remarks, but
11 I simply wanted to say I really enjoyed
12 listening to Councilmembers Curtis Jones
13 and David Oh, Jim Harrity and Jamie
14 Gauthier just now. Really it touched me.

15 I just wanted to come forth and
16 say thank you to this body for coming
17 forth and supporting the resolution for
18 us to review truck parking in the City of
19 Philadelphia.

20 I do want it to be known loud
21 and clear that we have truck drivers who
22 are residents in the City of
23 Philadelphia, and it is important for us
24 to find where they can park and how they
25 can have a better experience of parking.

2 But our residents and our neighborhoods
3 are really concerned about that, and we
4 have to come to a rightful compromise of
5 some sort of how we're going to make sure
6 truck parking is a situation that we can
7 ensure that helps us with the quality of
8 life in Philadelphia.

9 And also truck parking, what I
10 do know is that it's also a violence
11 prevention measure in more ways than one,
12 because when we have better quality of
13 life, things are better.

14 And then, lastly, I just want
15 to say thank you all again, looking
16 forward to working. The collaboration is
17 key to me, and so I just want to say
18 thanks to all the Councilmembers.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
24 Mr. President.

25 I too enjoy hearing all that my

2 colleagues have to say and I think that
3 it's very valuable information, so I want
4 to thank them for all of their hard work
5 throughout the City of Philadelphia.

6 I did want to make just a
7 really brief comment on Councilman Jones'
8 and Councilman Johnson's work relating to
9 SEPTA. As many know, I have a soft spot
10 for SEPTA and often get information
11 regarding what's happening, particularly
12 in our subway system, and I just wanted
13 to make note that these cutbacks, while
14 at the same time planning expansion
15 outside of the City of Philadelphia,
16 expansion into the suburbs and up to King
17 of Prussia, you know, which is well and
18 fine, but cutting back in underserved
19 neighborhoods is absolutely unacceptable
20 while expanding at the same time to more
21 affluent communities. It absolutely is
22 unacceptable.

23 I did want to publicly put out
24 there that I have asked the General
25 Manager of SEPTA on numerous occasions,

probably for almost a year now, to travel with me on the Broad Street Line and just check it out and to travel at very specific times, to travel during the morning rush hour and just see what's going on, travel in the evening or after school hours and into the early evening hours as commuters and, you know, students are traveling and just see what's going on, and then traveling late at night around the 10 o'clock hour and see what's going on, because we haven't been able to get that commitment out of the General Manager just yet. They've offered to ride at something like 11 o'clock in the afternoon, which is a very nice period of time probably to ride SEPTA, but if you really want to know what's going on and what's happening, before you start cutting services, inconveniencing folks, changing routes, all these kinds of things, you really need to know what's going on.

So I say this on the record as

2 once again an invitation to take this
3 ride and see what's going on.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. I'm sure word will get to
7 her.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Vaughn.

10 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank
11 you, Council President.

12 Councilwoman Bass, I am not
13 riding SEPTA with you at night, because I
14 do know what's down there under ground,
15 especially a lot of unbecoming things,
16 but I do want to say I would like SEPTA
17 to take into consideration that a lot of
18 seniors are used to riding one mode of
19 transportation, and then to try to change
20 them to ride something else, along with
21 their walkers and canes and the bags that
22 they always seem to carry, it would cause
23 an inconvenience. And by having that one
24 mode of transportation opposed to getting
25 off and catching the subway or train or,

2 you know, those other vehicles, it puts
3 them more at risk opposed to just getting
4 on one place and getting off at another.
5 So we really need to talk about that.

6 And I'm with Councilman Oh.
7 At-large Councilpeople definitely need an
8 activity fund. We need some kind of
9 income for all these requests that
10 continue to come in for yearly events
11 that happen in our city that it is
12 expected of us to partake in.

13 I think it might be a good idea
14 for some of the District Councilpeople to
15 just take those bills over for us, you
16 know, because they have that money.

17 You all didn't hear
18 Councilwoman Bass just say "what?"

19 But it is hard for us as
20 at-large to be supportive of some of the
21 activities that happen around the City of
22 Philadelphia and, you know, especially
23 those of us that have not had the
24 opportunity to raise a lot of funds yet
25 because we have just come into office,

2 but we're being asked to support
3 activities that are going into the next
4 year or forthcoming.

5 So that is something I'm really
6 going to hope that you look into, Council
7 President.

8 Thank you, David Oh, for
9 bringing that up. It's a daily thing
10 that -- daily challenge that we have to
11 deal with and one that we could
12 definitely use some help with.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 It seems like a little
16 coordination going on here today.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Johnson.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
20 Council President.

21 Just a couple brief remarks.
22 On Monday -- and I want to thank you for
23 your leadership for the initiative with
24 this body to pass the \$400 million bond
25 that will allow us to provide more than

1,000 affordable housing units here in the City of Philadelphia over the next several years. And on Monday at 1:00 p.m. in my district, we were joined by you, myself, and other colleagues who would like to kick off the 1,000 affordable units that we will be providing and building here in the City of Philadelphia.

We know some of our districts are dealing with the issue of gentrification, and, you know, I did learn if you don't have a gentrification problem, you have an even bigger problem in your district.

And so we recognize that in the midst of development that we do see taking place, we want to make sure we have affordable units for individuals who live in the City of Philadelphia irregardless of their checkbook and/or their pocketbook. And that event will take place on Monday at 1:00 p.m. at 30th and Wharton Street, and I'm sure all

2 Councilmembers will be receiving
3 information from the Council President's
4 office regarding the kickoff.

5 Yesterday we hosted a Special
6 Committee on Gun Violence hearing, and I
7 thank all my colleagues who took time out
8 of their schedule to participate, because
9 when we host these hearings, they give us
10 the opportunity to do a deeper dive with
11 the Administration on how are we
12 addressing the issue of gun violence here
13 in the City of Philadelphia.

14 One piece of information to me
15 that was pretty interesting and an
16 eye-opener is that the small strides but
17 in this particular issue when it comes to
18 gun violence, any accomplishments that we
19 make should still be acknowledged, and
20 the Philadelphia Police Department report
21 from Commissioner Danielle Outlaw showed
22 how we have reduced homicides, right, in
23 some of the highest crime-ridden and
24 violent-ridden police districts here in
25 the City of Philadelphia.

2 And for me when I asked her
3 what's your reasoning of why we're making
4 progress on these particular areas, it's
5 because some of the things we are doing
6 are actually working. And so I attribute
7 some of those accomplishments are based
8 upon some of the work that this body has
9 been doing.

10 We've invested more than
11 \$250 million historically around this
12 issue of gun violence prevention over the
13 last two budget cycles. And so when you
14 talk about making sure that you have
15 crisis and trauma-informed responders
16 coming out to address individuals with
17 mental health and mental illnesses as
18 opposed to police officers goes toward us
19 addressing the issue of gun violence here
20 in the City of Philadelphia.

21 When you talk about us having a
22 1-800 hotline, resource hotline, that you
23 established, Council President, for
24 individuals who are looking for some type
25 of resources and/or support around the

2 issue of gun violence, that came from
3 this body.

4 When you talk about the issue
5 of addressing victims and co-victims of
6 gun violence, under my office we
7 introduced legislation to create the
8 Office of Victim Advocate where now
9 individuals who lost a loved one to
10 senseless gun violence has a place to go
11 to to strictly support those who have
12 been impacted by gun violence. But also
13 making sure that we are strategically
14 focusing on those individuals who are
15 more than likely killed or be killed here
16 in the City of Philadelphia plays a
17 significant role on how we reduce the
18 issue of gun violence.

19 So I thank all my colleagues
20 for participating. That particular piece
21 of information I thought was very, very
22 interesting, because homicides are down,
23 shootings are up slightly, right, which
24 is the issue that we have to address, but
25 another issue we want to follow up on is

2 making sure where these guns are coming
3 from.

4 There are no gun factories in
5 Strawberry Mansion. There are no gun
6 factories in Point Breeze. And we are
7 going to collect more than 6,000-plus,
8 6,000-plus illegal guns off the streets
9 of Philadelphia.

10 So that's a bigger issue that
11 we have to address. That's the bigger
12 issue that we have to question.

13 I also tell my friends in the
14 press, when you are covering this issue
15 of gun violence, ask the bigger question,
16 where these comes are coming from, who
17 are flooding the streets of Philadelphia
18 with illegal guns, right? Because they
19 aren't just coming here from nowhere.
20 Some way, somehow illegal guns are
21 winding up in the hands of younger and
22 younger young people.

23 And so we want to make sure
24 that we're addressing this from a
25 comprehensive standpoint with our U.S.

2 Attorney's Office, whoever our new
3 Attorney General is going to be, and our
4 District Attorney strictly around the
5 issue of tracking down where the illegal
6 guns are coming from, making sure they're
7 not winding up in the hands of young
8 people who we're trying to save in the
9 first place, but while we're trying to
10 save them, right, by providing them
11 resources. At the end of the day, the
12 accessibility to guns will allow them to
13 resolve a conflict or beef with a
14 handgun.

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.
18 Looking forward to that groundbreaking on
19 Monday, kick it off, sir. Thank you for
20 the invitation to South Philadelphia.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You're
22 welcome, sir.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Okay. That concludes our speeches on
25 behalf of the minority and the majority.
