9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. 00:10:32

11 Mr. President, today I am
12 introducing a bill that is co-sponsored
13 by Councilmembers Jones, Squilla, Henon,
14 O'Neill, Green, and Oh that will lower
15 the parking tax rate to 17 percent with 00:10:45
16 the start of the new fiscal year,
17 July 1st, 2021. This bill,
18 Mr. President, is a follow-up to Bill No.
19 200288 signed by the Mayor last June as
20 part of the 2020 budget negotiations. 00:11:01

21 Bill No. 200288 raised the
22 parking tax rate from 22 and a half to
23 25 percent for one year, from July 1st,
24 2020 to July 1st, 2021.

25 Bill No. 200288 also stated, 00:11:19

2 Mr. President, that it is Council's
3 intent to establish a Good Parking Jobs
4 for Philadelphia Review Committee as an
5 agency of Council comprised of mayoral 00:11:32
6 appointees, two of whom shall be members
7 of Council. In the event that such
8 committee determines the satisfaction of
9 Council that the conditions in the
10 parking industry favorably support the 00:11:46
11 development of stable jobs while
12 providing a path to advancement for
13 workers in the industry, it is Council's
14 intent, beginning with respect to Fiscal
15 Year 2022, to reduce the rate of the 00:11:59
16 parking tax, with the goal of reducing
17 the rate to 17 percent.

18 Subsequently, Mr. President,
19 Bill No. 200387 created the Good Parking
20 Jobs for Philadelphia Review Committee, 00:12:15
21 and the Mayor appointed the members in
22 early 2021. The members of the
23 committee, we've been meeting informally
24 and communicating throughout 2020 and
25 2021, and we will be having a meeting on 00:12:28

2 June 7th, 2021.

3 As Philadelphia continues to
4 recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, I
5 view this bill that we are introducing 00:12:39
6 today as a tool in the toolbox that will
7 incentivize visitors to come back to
8 Philadelphia and help ensure our economic
9 competitiveness in the region.

10 As I have repeatedly stated 00:12:53
11 during the budget hearings this spring,
12 when we are considering lowering tax
13 rates, we need to think very carefully
14 through why we are lowering these tax
15 rates and who may be the beneficiaries of 00:13:07
16 lower tax rates.

17 It is my hope that by lowering
18 the parking tax rate, we can further
19 incentivize those who want to return to
20 our great city, including people who want 00:13:17
21 to enjoy our arts and culture,
22 restaurants, hotels, Convention Center,
23 and overall hospitality and tourism
24 industries that are, in essence, second
25 to none. 00:13:31

2 Most importantly, though, the
3 goal of lowering this tax rate is for
4 some of the benefits, Mr. President, to
5 flow directly to the parking workers, 00:13:38
6 either by bringing back laid-off parking
7 workers or by improving the pay and the
8 benefits of parking workers.

9 It is with this in mind that I
10 am happy to have partnered not just with 00:13:51
11 the parking industry on this legislation
12 but also with SEIU 32BJ who represents
13 many of the parking lot and garage
14 workers.

15 Philadelphia has long had a 00:14:04
16 higher parking tax rate than our peer
17 cities, including New York City where the
18 rate is just over 18 percent for
19 non-residents and just over 10 percent
20 for residents. 00:14:16

21 The plan for our city was to
22 begin lowering the parking tax rate in
23 2020 and beyond, but COVID, you know, the
24 pandemic precluded us from doing that,
25 and after a year of raising the parking 00:14:30

2 tax rate to 25 percent, now is the time
3 to rethink whether our high tax rate is a
4 barrier to incentivizing people to return
5 to our great city and to rethink whether 00:14:41
6 such a high tax rate is actually hurting
7 the parking workers we want to help.

8 I believe that it is possible
9 to be pro-industry, pro-business, and
10 pro-worker, and as the bill states, its 00:14:55
11 passage will await the outcome of a
12 determination by the Good Parking Jobs
13 for Philadelphia Review Committee that
14 the conditions in the parking industry
15 favorably support the development of 00:15:10
16 stable jobs and provide a path to
17 advancement for workers in the industry.

18 So let me be clear. I will not
19 move for the adoption of this bill unless
20 and until the Good Parking Jobs for 00:15:23
21 Philadelphia Review Committee determines
22 that a lowering of the parking tax rate
23 will in fact benefit workers.

24 So I look forward to this bill
25 being considered along with our other 00:15:36

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2 budget bills, and ultimately I look
3 forward to seeing where Fiscal Year 2022,
4 where our budget ends up and how it

5 ultimately ends up benefiting the 00:15:46
6 residents and workers of Philadelphia.

7 I also want to note for the
8 record that we always want to make sure
9 that any public policy we are introducing
10 is data driven and research based. I was 00:15:58

11 very pleased to get a memo from a
12 third-party independent verifying entity,
13 ESI, Econsult Solutions, and I want to
14 note that it states this: The City

15 Administration and City Council are 00:16:13
16 actively looking for ways, large and
17 small, to promote the favorable

18 positioning of the City. There's no one
19 policy or program that will solve the
20 problem, but many small, smart moves can 00:16:26

21 significantly position the City for a
22 greater recovery, and one relatively
23 small but economically significant step
24 the City could take to achieve this

25 overall economic recovery objective is to 00:16:43

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is

19 Mr. Decker, please read the
20 title of Resolution No. 210434. 00:41:27

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
22 calling on the City of Philadelphia to
23 implement minimum force training for all
24 law enforcement officers.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The 00:41:36

2 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

3 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
4 much, Council President. I move for the
5 adoption of the resolution.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

10 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I had
11 requested a comment on this resolution.

that training should be improved and all
of that, but I do want to make clear that
minimum force policy is already in
existence, and I would be surprised if
officers are not trained on their

they have talked about further

4 They specifically talked about things

10 proposed, for example, in this resolution 00:43:50

11 in some instances are acknowledged, but

12 Ramsey and many others say that what

13 officers need more than anything else are

14 strong interpersonal skills, and very few

15 get little formal instruction on that and 00:44:04

16 that is not mentioned in this resolution.

17 But the main reason why I have
18 serious concerns about this resolution is
19 that there are two clauses in it that

20 really take on the work of this Council 00:44:16

21 and this Council's body to hold police

22 officers, the Police Department, and our

23 city to a higher standard. I will

24 specify.

25 Two of the clauses say "As a 00:44:28

18 broader public safety. That effort is

22 chokeholds, supported unanimously by our
23 body, came out of that work.

24 Councilmember Thomas's bill to
25 review vehicular police stops and ensure

3 diversion of different aspects of
4 profiling and raise space policing of our
5 communities is an important aspect of the 00:45:44
6 work that we are doing. And of course

9 by our Council body and in line with
10 appropriate police practices, is the 00:45:59
11 continued work.

12 I am not comfortable supporting
13 a resolution that so broadly disparages
14 this work and leaves open-ended this idea
15 that these efforts are questionable and 00:46:17
16 may result in unintended consequences
17 that increase crime and injury.

18 I will be voting no on this
19 bill -- on this resolution as a result,
20 unless there were some significant 00:46:31
21 changes or expansions to it.

22 But I really feel that this
23 body takes police responsibility
24 seriously. We support minimum force,
25 which is already a policy of the Police 00:46:44

2 Department, and what we need to be
3 emphasizing right now is not just minimum
4 force training but an expansion of
5 de-escalation, a supporting of the mobile 00:46:55
6 crisis units, for example, a supporting
7 of alternatives to policing, and a
8 supporting of ensuring that our police
9 officers get actually the training that
10 has been called for and needed and not 00:47:07
11 just what is already on the books.

12 Thank you, Council President.

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
14 President, I have a point of information.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: 00:47:16

16 Thank you.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Green.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I want to
20 thank Councilmember Gym for raising the 00:47:21
21 comments that she raised. My question is
22 to the sponsor in reference to the nature
23 of those two whereas clauses.

24 I believe reading is
25 fundamental, and when I first read the 00:47:33

3 something that many people would be
4 supportive of until I did read those two
5 clauses, which also caused me pause. 00:47:44

6 So with that, I would like the
7 sponsor to provide some additional

10 regarding minimum force training. 00:47:55

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Councilman Oh.

13 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
14 much. I appreciate both questions and
15 both issues raised by Councilmember Helen 00:48:04
16 Gym and Councilmember Derek Green.

17 So let me say that there are
18 policies and then there are practices.
19 So a policy, for example, may be to
20 perform well or to not do certain things 00:48:24
21 or to do certain things on the football
22 field. You could call that a policy, but
23 it's not a practice unless you practice
24 it. And there are things that you can do
25 well without stress or pressure and then 00:48:46

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2 there are things that you do
3 automatically when you are under
4 life-threatening stress and pressure.

5 What happens is, people have to 00:49:00
6 be trained to do or not do certain
7 things. It comes with a lot of training.

8 Officers go through the Police
9 Academy, and for the most part, not
10 completely but for the most part, except 00:49:16
11 for the yearly examination and

12 qualification that they go through, which
13 is not extensive, they don't receive
14 additional training. And I think the

15 issue about George Floyd, which is a very 00:49:30
16 serious one, which cities like ours and
17 police departments actually even across

18 the world are responding to, legislators
19 are responding to. And I think the issue
20 is, there's many ways to respond to it, 00:49:50

21 but one of the things that we can do, one
22 of them is to focus on what happens when
23 police officers are responding to

24 life-threatening confrontations, and the
25 training that they have is on using 00:50:06

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lethal force and they do not have continuous training in how to not use force, when not to use force, and how to use minimal force and when to use minimal force. Lethal force is always at their disposal in that they have a firearm, for example, that they can rely on, and that's what they've been trained.

So while there may be some written rules and guidance and policies on minimum force, it has to be a practice.

The example of someone believing they pulled out a taser and is actually a firearm is an example that when people are under stress, they do things believing they're doing one thing. It takes practice. It takes practice under pressure in order to be able to not make those errors. It also will guide the department on perhaps where the taser is located, what type of taser should be used, how it may not be confused with a firearm. And I would like to say that

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2 there are differences, and so let me
3 explain some of the differences.

4 Police generally are trained
5 when they are trained -- it's actually 00:51:40

6 not an extensive amount -- in defensive
7 tactics. Defensive tactics are, for

8 example, how to combat someone using a
9 baton or when you don't have your

10 firearm, it's not working or those type 00:52:00
11 of things.

12 Minimum force is not simply
13 using the least amount of force by

14 applying, for example, jujitsu or judo
15 holds or wrestling holds or things like 00:52:18

16 that. It is a mentality to kind of

17 assess the situation and make a very

18 quick and proper decision on whether any

19 force should be used, whether it is

20 better to let the suspect flee the 00:52:35

21 situation or whether when dealing with an

22 elderly person or a teenager, certain

23 types of restraints are proper or

24 improper.

25 Without proper training, a 00:52:49

1 5/13/21 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 person may try to apply a restraint, and
3 it's not a chokehold, that may result in
4 a broken shoulder, a broken arm, a broken
5 elbow. Chokeholds are not the only type 00:52:59
6 of holds. There are other holds that can
7 result in some pretty serious damage as
8 well.

9 I think it is important that
10 those who are charged with the 00:53:11
11 responsibility of restraining someone who
12 may be harming another person or even
13 trying to kill that person understand the
14 most efficient and effective ways.

15 Regarding what are some of the 00:53:23
16 questionable things, for example, in New
17 York, the city put out a rule that when
18 arresting a suspect, police officers
19 cannot put any weight on the suspect when
20 they're in a prone position. That's 00:53:41
21 going to be very difficult. Putting
22 weight on a suspect when you're trying to
23 subdue them enough to put handcuffs on
24 them or to control them, if you're not
25 going to put weight -- there are ways not 00:54:00

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2 to put weight on people. There are ways
3 to put weight on people. Just a blanket
4 rule don't put weight, you're going to
5 need a lot of officers on that one person 00:54:09
6 trying not to put weight on them.

7 Putting weight on them is a way
8 to restrain them without harming them,
9 without letting them get hurt, without
10 letting them hurt themselves. And so I 00:54:22
11 think that is going to have an unintended
12 consequence. Either you're going to have
13 like five officers on someone or -- and
14 if they're trying to subdue that person
15 and they don't put weight on them, that 00:54:37
16 person might get more injured or the
17 police officers might get more injured.
18 And so I think education is the best way
19 to deal with those topics.

20 Chokeholds, for example, there 00:54:49
21 are a lot of different types of
22 chokeholds, many, many chokeholds.
23 There's all sorts of ways to apply
24 chokeholds.

25 The bill that we have is that 00:55:01

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2 once a person is controlled, chokeholds
3 are not to be applied. However, when an
4 officer is trying to protect their weapon
5 from a person who is trying to grab their 00:55:11
6 weapon or to kill them or to harm them or
7 to harm others, there is no rule that we
8 have that chokeholds are not applicable.
9 You can apply chokeholds when you are
10 fighting for your life or trying to 00:55:25
11 prevent damage from occurring. However,
12 it is when the person is subdued.

13 Now, what kind of chokeholds?

14 There are a variety of chokeholds and
15 they have different effects. There are 00:55:37
16 what we call blood chokes and there are
17 air chokes, which can crush your
18 esophagus. There are chokes that will
19 put you to sleep. There are chokes you
20 could apply with one arm in, one arm out. 00:55:57
21 There are chokes that could result in a
22 broken neck. There are all sorts of ways
23 to choke people. You could do it with a
24 collar, you could do it with clothes, you
25 could do it with your elbow. You can do 00:56:11

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2 it in many, many ways.

3 It is a good idea to train
4 officers to understand the unintended
5 consequences of restraining people, and I 00:56:19
6 think that is a good idea.

7 I will say, in my opinion --
8 and this is something that can be
9 discussed -- qualified immunity has come
10 up, and when qualified immunity is 00:56:36
11 removed, there's a good chance that
12 officers will not want to carry out their
13 duties. That is an unintended
14 consequence that can come up for
15 discussion. 00:56:53

16 So those are things that I am
17 talking about. I will say that Delaware
18 County, Bucks County have already began
19 the exploration of mandatory minimum
20 force training, which, again, it is not 00:57:04
21 simply telling a person not to use
22 greater force than necessary. It is
23 teaching and training them how to assess
24 the situation and how to present in their
25 minds the idea of what is the violation, 00:57:18

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2 what type of conduct is appropriate.

3 For example, we all saw the
4 video of the Army lieutenant who pulled
5 into a well-lit gas station over what is 00:57:31
6 otherwise a traffic stop and having two
7 police officers pull out their firearms
8 and point it at him. It would appear to
9 me completely unnecessary.

10 I do understand for people who 00:57:47
11 are concerned that, yes, traffic stops
12 are very dangerous and you also have
13 unfortunately law enforcement that have
14 been murdered as a result of a traffic
15 stop. I'm not saying to be uncautious. 00:58:00
16 I am saying that a traffic stop where a
17 person pulls into a well-lit gas station,
18 has an Army uniform on -- yes, it may be
19 fake, but the point is the conversation,
20 the approach, all those things are part 00:58:18
21 of minimum force training, to not simply
22 pull out firearms, point them at a person
23 and begin that type of dialogue with
24 demands and commands.

25 So that is minimum force 00:58:32

2 training, and I think it is something
3 that is important to be pursued in our
4 Police Department.

5 Thank you. 00:58:41

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
7 President?

24 regarding chokeholds, and I guess you're
25 saying that the efforts on the national 00:59:19

01:00:27

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2 When it comes to the proper and
3 important idea of restraining or
4 preventing chokeholds, there are many
5 type of chokeholds, many ways to do it. 01:00:37

6 And so none of the legislation that I'm
7 aware of -- there may be that just

8 blanketly even if someone is coming at
9 you and trying to grab your weapon, you

10 can't apply a chokehold. I've never seen 01:00:51

11 that. All the legislation is about after
12 you restrain someone or you have someone
13 in control, you cannot apply a chokehold.

14 But if someone is trying to stab you or
15 shoot you or grab your weapon, yeah. 01:01:04

16 When you are a police officer dealing
17 with a bigger, stronger person trying to
18 grab your gun, there's been no law that

19 I'm aware of that prevents an officer

20 from doing everything they can to prevent 01:01:18

21 themselves from being killed, including
22 chokeholds.

23 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:

24 Mr. President?

25 COUNCILMAN OH: However, the 01:01:25

2 point that I have is that --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
4 on. All right. This is going on.

5 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Mr. 01:01:30
6 President?

8 Councilwoman, hold --

9 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: I
10 call for the orders of the day. 01:01:33

15 discussion for all the reasons the debate 01:02:37

18 My request yesterday to the
19 Police Commissioner was specifically
20 around an update to the Justice 01:02:49
21 Department report that really laid out
22 the changing of policy around use of
23 deadly force and all of these restraint
24 measures, and this is one of the reasons
25 I requested that update from her, because 01:03:02

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2 I think it's a valuable conversation to
3 have.

4 I just don't think that making
5 a statement versus calling for a public 01:03:09
6 hearing is what we should be doing given
7 the nuances and the interpretations.

8 So that's my point of
9 clarification. There's a lot of stuff on
10 the books. The Police Commissioner is 01:03:18
11 going to submit that to us before the end
12 of this budget cycle as an update to
13 policy and practice. And that's my point
14 for the record.

15 Thank you, Mr. President. 01:03:31

16 COUNCILWOMAN GYM:

17 Mr. President, Council President, I also
18 had a point of clarification.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Excuse
20 me. Excuse me. 01:03:38

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Let me kind of
22 do it one at a time, if you don't mind.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Excuse
24 me.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: I can't answer 01:03:42

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2 like five different points after people
3 make them.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: A

5 little order, please. All right? 01:03:45

6 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez
7 has been teed up. Councilwoman Gym has
8 been teed up.

9 Councilman Oh, and you know I'm
10 a very patient person. Some people like 01:03:59
11 to --

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

13 Mr. President?

14 COUNCILMAN OH: I'm very
15 patient too. Listen, let me, if you 01:04:05
16 don't mind, Council President, if I could
17 just answer Councilwoman Sanchez rather
18 than trying to remember the question and
19 go through like a bunch of
20 Councilmembers. I don't know if I'll 01:04:15
21 remember at the end of that.

22 So in answer to Councilmember
23 Sanchez's point, I think a hearing is a
24 wonderful idea. However, as you stated,
25 minimum force training is not up to City 01:04:28

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2 Council. That is something that is
3 within the purview of the Administration
4 and the Police Commissioner.

5 However, what is in our purview 01:04:37
6 is funding. What is in our purview is
7 certain aspects of that, because minimum
8 force training does not just happen out
9 of thin air. There has to be made by the
10 Police Commissioner and the 01:04:56

11 Administration what they're going to do.
12 They have to create a program. City
13 Council will not be involved in creating
14 a program. We can have a hearing on it.
15 They have to create a program. Then they 01:05:07
16 have to decide how they're going to
17 implement that program.

18 For example, if officers who
19 are, for example, patrol officers or
20 officers who are engaged in making 01:05:19
21 arrests are going to receive mandatory
22 minimum force training, how do they do
23 it, where do they do it, do they do it at
24 the Police Academy, do they do it at a
25 local approved provider such as a 01:05:31

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2 certified martial arts school, what
3 program are they getting? If they are
4 receiving that training, who is paying
5 for it? What if they get hurt while they 01:05:43
6 are getting this training? Is that
7 covered by workers' compensation? Are
8 they expected to do this on their own
9 time? What is the incentive? If they're
10 doing it on job time, does that take them 01:05:56
11 off of their shift? Those issues have to
12 be first worked out by the Administration
13 and they have to decide if they're going
14 to do that, and then they would present
15 to us, City Council, a budget request if 01:06:12
16 that is something that they're going to
17 try to pursue.

18 So that is why I did it in
19 terms of a resolution, because that is
20 going to be something that is completely 01:06:23
21 within the purview of the Administration.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

24 Mr. President, I just want to note for
25 the record that I'm having technical 01:06:33

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2 difficulties and my hand up function is
3 not working, but I did, Mr. President, in
4 lieu of all of the conversation and
5 dialogue surrounding Resolution No. 01:06:44

6 210434, if an order at this time, Mr.
7 President, wanted to make a motion that
8 210434 be tabled.

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Council 01:06:59
11 President, could I just have a point of
12 clarification just --

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Excuse
14 me, Councilwoman --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold 01:07:06
16 on, guys.

17 It was moved and seconded.

18 Councilwoman Gym, you had a
19 point of clarification?

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you 01:07:12
21 very much. I have had a chance to
22 communicate with Commissioner Outlaw, and
23 I feel very strongly about this.

24 For the Council sponsor, it is
25 inaccurate to say that the police 01:07:20

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2 officers of the PPD are only trained in
3 lethal force. She made very clear to me
4 that there is a minimum force directive

5 already in play and that officers are 01:07:30

6 trained accordingly. The mythology that
7 somehow our problems with policing are
8 based on the fact that officers are only
9 trained in lethal force, do not have

10 minimum training obviates the fact that 01:07:42

11 the bigger issue is in play, which is how
12 are we de-escalating within our
13 communities. That is the problem

14 fundamentally with the resolution, that
15 it is inaccurate by saying that police 01:07:56

16 officers are not trained in minimum force
17 training and that somehow this is a magic
18 bullet while, maybe intentionally, I'm

19 not clear, disparaging significant
20 efforts that this Council body has 01:08:13

21 undertaken to take a look at other forms
22 of interaction that are critically
23 important if we are going to both raise

24 up public confidence and trust in
25 policing and to improve public safety in 01:08:26

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2 the City of Philadelphia.

3 The Commissioner herself has

4 clarified that the PPD is not solely

5 trained in lethal force. So comments to 01:08:36

6 that effect are inaccurate, and they are

7 not -- I feel like they are irresponsible

8 in the sense that they deflect away from

9 why this Council body has been so engaged

10 and is so important in discussing 01:08:53

11 alternatives and expansion, and in the

12 wake of George Floyd, we are not doing

13 things that create unintentional

14 consequences. We are being very

15 purposeful and research based and 01:09:06

16 evidence based about what this city needs

17 to pursue in the wake of what has

18 happened, not just to George Floyd,

19 Breonna Taylor, but to people here in our

20 own city. 01:09:18

21 Thank you very much, Council

22 President. I will be voting no.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: I would like to 01:09:23

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2 respond to that, Council President.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Okay. It was a call to the question by 01:10:16
6 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
9 Mr. Decker.

10 CHIEF CLERK: There was a 01:10:26

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman 01:25:22

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
13 much, Council President. I am going to
14 respond just simply about what I believe
15 is just misinformation, and information 01:25:34
16 can always be learned, so it's not a huge
17 problem.

18 I spoke with the Commissioner
19 in length about this topic. As I did,
20 Commissioner Ross and Commissioner 01:25:48
21 Ramsey. I am well versed in this topic.
22 I have spoken to other officers in the
23 Police Department and I've spoken to
24 different supervisors. I, from time to
25 time, find police officers in my jujitsu 01:26:12

2 academy and I train with them. They're
3 paying for that out of their pocket.

4 This is a national issue. It
5 has been around for a long time. Other 01:26:25
6 countries train their officers better
7 than we do, primarily because in other

10 times they have machetes or they have 01:26:43
11 knives, and officers find themselves
12 dealing with those situations.

13 There's a difference between
14 writing a rule and training someone to do
15 it. If we could just write rules and 01:26:59
16 create a championship basketball team,
17 that would be great. But we can't. No
18 matter how much written instruction or
19 verbal instruction you give to someone,
20 no matter how talented they are, they 01:27:12

21 need a basketball, they need a court,
22 they need to train, they need to
23 practice, and they have to overcome their
24 natural reactions through training and
25 discipline. 01:27:25

3 think that's where we have a problem.

4 For those who want to de-fund the police

5 beyond what people want and we're talking 01:27:35

6 about the have's and the have not's,

7 those who have public safety, those who

10 communities and those who don't. Not 01:27:48

11 everybody in our city wants or needs the

12 police, but there are a lot of people,

13 far more people in our city, that live

14 with crime constantly.

15 Gun violence is not happening 01:28:02

16 in every neighborhood of our city, and in

17 those communities, they want policing.

18 They just can't get it. They want it,

19 and they want it improved. They want

20 reforms. But then we're running up 01:28:16

21 against people who say there are no

22 reforms that could happen that will

23 improve the police, and that's where we

24 get into this problem, trying to improve

25 the police to regain a level of 01:28:26

2 confidence, because people who want the
3 police and require the police yet have
4 concerns about policing. And to the

11 better, that we will allocate the funds
12 and the tools and the resources so that
13 people know that our police officers are

16 It is not mythology. People
17 who are not trained properly or trained
18 adequately or trained extensively do not
19 perform well.

20 There is a level of training 01:29:19
21 that people can receive. For example,
22 our officers go through the Police
23 Academy, but outside of that, they are
24 going to work and they work a stressful
25 job. They work long hours, and then they 01:29:33

11 in the directive. Without the training,
12 without the resources, without the tools,
13 that leaves the idea that the police will
14 never get better. We will reduce the
15 police. They will not be available. We 01:30:11

16 will limit their interaction. We will
17 replace them with something else. And
18 what we are doing now that I'm saying is
19 unintended consequences is without better
20 training and tools, you're simply 01:30:23

21 creating restrictions, prohibitions,
22 punishments, being fired, being sued and
23 saying that's going to create a better
24 Police Department. It's not. It's just
25 going to create a Police Department of 01:30:36

3 jobs. So that when that 911 call is made
4 because your life is being threatened,

9 a counselor, a psychologist to come out,
10 that's great. But the call is man with 01:31:02
11 gun. It's not man with gun who needs to
12 be talked to by a psychologist and a
13 counselor. That's not the call.

14 So I don't know of any social
15 workers who are rushing out to the call 01:31:13
16 man with gun, man with knife. That is a
17 police officer, and that police officer
18 can assess the situation and then call a
19 counselor, a social worker. That is what
20 we are trying to make part of training 01:31:26
21 and make sure that the officers are
22 certified and that the City is doing its
23 part.

24 Bad police officers is the
25 fault of this Administration and this 01:31:38

2 Council. Not just blame the police
3 officers or the Police Department. They
4 work for the City. They are City
5 employees. They are our employees. Our 01:31:46
6 duty is to provide them with the
7 equipment and training they need.

8 I think it's a great idea

10 Councilmembers, and several wanted to go 01:31:59
11 look at a police academy and do citizens
12 training. I think that's a great idea.
13 I think people who don't know anything
14 about policing, who don't live in
15 high-crime neighborhoods, who have never 01:32:10
16 been surrounded by people trying to hurt
17 them or take their life, who do not need
18 to call the Police Department and require
19 immediate action, as many, many of our
20 citizens do, can make up rules that are 01:32:23
21 just words on a piece of paper.

22 So I will rework the
23 resolution, but the resolution is really
24 a request to the City to create a
25 practice and a policy, and then they will 01:32:47

3 that policy and practice a reality. That
4 is where we come in. We can approve or

12 autism, and we need to increase training,

15 change some of the challenges that we've 01:35:19

17 from my perspective, don't believe to be
18 true. I think that's been mythology,
19 which is the mistake just by increasing
20 training. 01:35:28

21 And I can only speak from my
22 experiences as an African American man
23 and the interaction I've had with the
24 Police Department, in particular as a
25 former Assistant District Attorney and 01:35:37

3 being racially profiled. I don't think
4 additional training would have changed
5 that dynamic that I was racially profiled 01:35:46
6 when I was actually coming from the

9 that decided to racially profile me as I
10 was going to my car leaving the DA's 01:35:58
11 Office.

12 So I think this is an ongoing
13 conversation, a robust conversation that
14 this body has engaged in and will
15 continue to engage in as we move forward 01:36:07
16 to not only address the gun violence
17 issue in our city, but also make sure
18 that people are not being racially
19 profiled as we try to address these
20 issues. 01:36:18

9 last point I failed to mention for Smith
10 Playground. If people could come at 1:45 01:36:49
11 on Saturday at Smith Playground for the
12 activities and festivities.

16 I remember that giant sliding board
17 looked so big as a child. That's
18 interesting. 1:45, Councilman?

22 Thank you. I might come see that. Thank
23 you, Councilman.

4 Good morning, everyone. Today,
5 May 13th, is the 36th anniversary of the 01:37:27
6 MOVE bombing. On this date in 1985, the
7 City of Philadelphia carried out a brutal
8 attack on its own citizens. As part of
9 an effort to forcibly evict MOVE, a Black
10 liberation group, from their home at 6221 01:37:44
11 Osage Avenue, police fired over 10,000
12 rounds of ammunition in under 90 minutes
13 at a row house containing children. When
14 that didn't achieve the desired effect,
15 City officials then made the 01:37:59
16 unconscionable decision to drop a bomb on
17 the home. This is among the only times
18 in our nation's history that a police
19 force has bombed its own people.

20 That explosion caused a fire, 01:38:09
21 which authorities allowed to burn. They
22 didn't call in firefighters until nearly
23 an hour later, and by that time, it was
24 already out of control. Eleven members
25 of the Africa family, five children and 01:38:24

2 six adults, lost their lives in that
3 house, and as a result of the fire, two
4 surrounding City blocks were burned to
5 the ground, destroying 61 homes and 01:38:34
6 leaving 250 Philadelphians homeless.

7 To this day, not a single
8 person has faced criminal consequences or
9 been held accountable in any meaningful
10 way for these brutal acts. To this day, 01:38:48
11 justice has not been served.

12 Last year, this body passed a
13 resolution formally apologizing for the
14 events of that day in 1985 and
15 establishing May 13th as an Annual Day of 01:39:02
16 Remembrance in Philadelphia to honor
17 those we lost. I want to thank all my
18 colleagues for supporting this important
19 effort.

20 It is vital that we reflect on 01:39:13
21 these painful and harmful moments in our
22 history. We need to fully reckon with
23 what happened that day. We need to
24 understand it and remember it so that we
25 don't ever repeat it. 01:39:25

2 And, furthermore, we need to
3 recognize the pain and trauma that these
4 events have brought upon the Cobbs Creek
5 community and Black people in our city as 01:39:34
6 a whole. We are very much still dealing
7 with the consequences of this tragedy in
8 our communities today.

9 Just last month, it came to
10 light that the remains of at least two of 01:39:44
11 the Africa children were mishandled and
12 given to the Penn Museum without the
13 family's consent. These are the remains
14 of children who died at the hands of the
15 state, and even in death, they didn't 01:39:55
16 receive even a shred of respect or
17 dignity. It's disgusting and barbaric.

18 The fact that our city not only
19 killed five Black children but then gave
20 their bones away without any 01:40:10
21 consideration for what their family's
22 wishes were demonstrates a lack of care
23 and concern for Black lives.

24 Philadelphians deserve a full
25 accounting of what happened, and everyone 01:40:21

2 involved needs to be held accountable for
3 their actions.

4 And, finally, before I close, I

5 would like to read the names of the 11 01:40:29

6 Philadelphians we lost that day and ask

7 that we pause for a moment of silence in

8 their memory. Netta Africa age 12, Tree

9 Africa age 14, Phil Africa age 11,

10 Delisha Africa age 12, Tomaso Africa age 01:40:50

11 9, John Africa, Conrad Africa, Raymond

12 Africa, Frank Africa, Rhonda Africa, and

13 Theresa Africa.

14 May we please have a minute of

15 silence. 01:41:09

16 (Moment of silence.)

24 economists on each side of the spectrum

10 those industries that are expected to 01:44:03

11 recover quickly are those in the field of

16 entertainment, hospitality, and food

17 services. And, Mr. President, this data

18 is from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

19 It's with that in mind,

20 Mr. President, that I want to say to 01:44:32

21 Visit Philadelphia, to Greater

22 Philadelphia Cultural Alliance, the

23 Greater Philadelphia Hotel Association,

24 and our Philly-based members of the

25 Pennsylvania Restaurant and Lodging 01:44:45

2 Association that we hear you, that we
3 know there is a need for us to do as much
4 as we can to front-load federal stimulus
5 dollars in this budget to fund a robust 01:44:57

9 and ensuring that there are economic
10 opportunities for all Philadelphians and 01:45:15
