2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 I note that the hour has come and
4 that a quorum of this Council is
5 present. Council will now come to
6 order. Members will please take
7 your seats. Visitors will please
8 retire to their seats outside the
9 rails.

10 Before proceeding, I will
11 ask all those present to please set
12 your cell phone to silent or
13 vibrate. Thank you.

14 To give our invocation this
15 morning, the Chair recognizes
16 Pastor Neil Bond of St. Peter's
17 Evangelical Lutheran Church. He is
18 here today as a guest of
19 Councilmember Phillips.

20 I will ask all Members and
21 guests to please rise.

22 (Councilmembers, guests and
23 visitors rise.)

24 PASTOR BOND: So this is
25 very interesting. I've never been

3 Gwen and I have been Lutheran
4 Pastors in Philadelphia
5 7-and-a-half years in West Philly,
6 36 years now in West Oakland Lane,
7 husband and wife team.

8 Let's pray.

9 Perhaps, Creator God, the
10 night was restful or maybe it was
11 long or maybe it was exciting or
12 maybe it was tiring, but here we
13 are with a morning that is brand
14 new. And that means that we are
15 alive today, this new day. We are
16 functioning today. We can for the
17 most part move, think, speak,
18 listen, breathe, show up at City
19 Council.

20 Many of us had a roof over
21 our head and a pillow under our
22 head, clothes on our back and in
23 the closet shoes on our feet, food
24 to eat. Safety I pray, friends or
25 family and many other blessings.

3 count more than we need.

4 Oh God, we didn't die last
5 night. Did we assume that this
6 would happen that way. Did we take
7 it for granted. Are we humbled by
8 the miracle of another day, another

10 gifts, the blessings, the fresh
11 opportunities.

12 Do we recognize our
13 connectedness to one another, one
14 Philadelphia, one United States,
15 one world, one single humanity
16 created and valued and not just
17 animals. Dear God, we pray that we
18 might truly be alive today, not
19 just look alive, not just go
20 through the motions or be busy.

21 We pray that we might be
22 humble and grateful, connected and
23 strong and willing and loving as we
24 honor you with how we live our life
25 this day. We want to use this day

4 us the right mind and heart and

6 PASTOR JOHNSON-BOND: And

11 Council.

12 Thank you for this
13 gathering of women and men, elected
14 officers who work to serve and
15 guide the functioning of the City
16 of Philadelphia. Lord, the many
17 needs of the people and the many
18 meetings, the finances, decisions,
19 reports, et cetera, can make this
20 job mindboggling and feel
21 overwhelming.

22 So, oh God, use the
23 talents, skills, wisdom, knowledge
24 and life experience of our

4 Thank you. Before considering
5 these bills and resolutions, we
6 will consider public comment as
7 follows: Your public comment must
8 concern matters on the Second
9 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
10 for possible action at today's
11 Council session.

12 All speakers must sign up
13 in order to testify. If you have
14 not already signed up for today's
15 session, please do so now by giving

17 table outside the rails to my left.

22 Under ideal circumstances,

20 I thank God for the privilege of
21 being here with all of you. I want
22 to say thank you to Dr. Minnie
23 Moore Johnson for all her years of
24 service in Southwest Philadelphia
25 and our City.

2 She still continues to give
3 block parties, serve food, do all
4 the community services, help
5 businesses that all of us,
6 especially we from the old school
7 know and enjoy. All I can say to
8 her is we love you, we appreciate

11 Now, Mr. President, I'd
12 like to take advantage of another
13 opportunity. You know, I came here
14 with Lucien Blackwell during Rizzo
15 days. I'm talking January '76, so
16 I've been around a little while. I
17 am as at home here as I am
18 anywhere. And I would be remiss if
19 I didn't say to Tony Long and his
20 lovely wife, we love you, we thank
21 you. I am so grateful that you're
22 being honored for all your years of
23 service.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 And we love Tony. To know him is
3 to love him. And for all that he's
4 done, I think we all consider him a
5 friend as much as we do our
6 wonderful officer. So God bless
7 him and his lovely wife. Thank you
8 all, Members, and thank you for
9 allowing me to mention two issues.
10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Thank you.

14 Will the Clerk please call
15 the next speaker.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Jasper Liem
17 speaking on Trans Visibility.

18 (Witness approached
19 podium.)

20 MR. LIEM: Good afternoon,
21 everyone. My name is Jasper Liem.
22 I use they and he pronouns
23 interchangeably. I am the first
24 Transgender Executive Director at
25 the Attic Youth Center,

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia's only independent
3 LGBTQ program. For 30 years, the
4 Attic has provided support for
5 trans and gender nonconforming
6 youth in this City, particularly
7 those of color. Even in this fine
8 city of Philadelphia, our trans
9 community has endured inequities of
10 being marginalized, often unseen
11 until our community siblings are
12 taken in acts of violence.

13 Trans Day of Visibility is
14 just one day, but we have been here
15 fighting for our lives every day.
16 It reminds us that we are visible,
17 not just for being transgender but
18 also for being people whose stories
19 extend in every direction.

20 I'm proudly trans and I am
21 proudly Chinese Indonesian and I am
22 proudly someone who has survived
23 the inequities of our city because
24 I was extremely lucky and because
25 of this City's harm reduction

2 effort, our public health and the
3 protections that our city has
4 provided us have saved my life.

5 Because beyond Trans Day of
6 Visibility, we must remember that
7 One Philly means all of us in every
8 part of who we are, every skin
9 tone, every socioeconomic class and
10 every gender. I commend our City
11 for its efforts and I look forward
12 to continuing our protections.
13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 Thank you.

17 Will the Clerk please call
18 the next person for public comment.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Brianna
20 Hollies on Trans Visibility.

21 (No response.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Ester
23 Sentasil on Trans Visibility.

24 (Witness approached
25 podium.)

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. SENTASIL: Hello. My
3 name is Ester Sentasil. I am a
4 15-year-old transgender girl living
5 here in Philadelphia and I go by
6 she/her pronouns. As we are
7 awaiting Transgender Day of
8 Visibility on Sunday, it's
9 important to celebrate the lives of
10 trans people and accomplishments
11 that they present to the world.
12 However, it is also a good thing to
13 understand the struggles that
14 transgender lives face on a daily
15 basis.

16 According to the Human
17 Rights Campaign, over 220 anti-
18 trans and nonbinary bills have been
19 introduced in state legislative,
20 which is an astronomical record.
21 Not only this, but 321 transgender
22 or gender diverse lives have been
23 killed from October 1, 2022 to
24 September 30, 2023 according to
25 Transgender Year App.

2 Every single day people
3 under the transgender umbrella get
4 bullied, mocked, hate-crimes,
5 killed, denied resources that help
6 them live and more. This can lead
7 to many mental health issues, which
8 can induce self-harm urges and
9 suicidal thoughts.

10 As a trans person myself, I
11 have dealt with a lot of
12 transphobia on the Internet and in
13 person. I have people call me
14 slurs, belittle me and make me
15 think of myself as a smaller person
16 because of my identity. I go out
17 on these sidewalks that people
18 commute with while having a feeling
19 like I have all eyes around me
20 because of how I dress, act, talk
21 and more, while hoping I can just
22 get to my destination safely while
23 being myself.

24 I question because of this
25 and I ask myself what if they're

2 right about me and what if they're
3 right about what they say I am.
4 Well, the answer is I'm not. Just
5 because I'm not afraid to express
6 myself as who I want to be does not
7 mean that I'm following people's
8 wishes. It's because it was never
9 about other people and it was about
10 me.

11 I grew up thinking that
12 there was something wrong with me
13 but by the years going on the love
14 that I received from people, it
15 helped me learn that I'm more than
16 just my identity. With this I
17 would like for everyone to always
18 give people in the transgender
19 community kindness as well as
20 everyone else in the LGBTQIA
21 community. With all the stigma and
22 hate against people in the world,
23 even just a compliment could really
24 make someone's day.

25 Please tell your

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 transgender friends and family that
3 you love them and that you see
4 them. This is Transgender Day of
5 Visibility. Protect transgender
6 youth and adults. Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 Will the Clerk please call the next
10 speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Brighton
12 Golphin on Trans Visibility.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Rivera
15 on Affordability Program.

16 (Witness approached
17 podium.)

18 MS. RIVERA: Good morning.
19 My name is Kate Rivera. I'm the
20 Executive Director of the
21 Technology Learning Collaborative.
22 And I'm speaking today in favor of
23 the resolution introduced by
24 Councilmember Landau in favor of
25 the Affordability Connectivity

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Program.

3 The Technology Learning

4 Collaborative or TLC is a coalition

5 of organizations and individuals

6 working to advance digital equity

7 in the Philadelphia area. Quality,

8 reliable and affordable Internet is

9 essential for participation in

10 today's society, providing access

11 to education, employment, housing,

12 benefits, health information,

13 social connection and so much more.

14 The ACP has been a critical

15 tool to advance digital equity,

16 connecting nearly 200,000

17 Philadelphia households to

18 affordable Internet. If ACP is not

19 funded, these households will be at

20 risk of losing service. They'll be

21 forced to make difficult budgeting

22 decisions between Internet and

23 other necessities such as food.

24 We know the burden of poor

25 connectivity falls

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 disproportionately on vulnerable
3 populations. Philadelphia's 2021
4 Home Internet Assessment found that
5 29 percent of low-income
6 households, 33 percent of seniors
7 and 33 percent of Spanish-speaking
8 households lacked home broadband.

9 We describe digital equity
10 as a three-legged stool. So in
11 addition to Internet access, the
12 other pieces are a device
13 appropriate to individuals' needs
14 and the digital skills necessary to
15 achieve their goals. Philadelphia
16 has made significant strides
17 towards achieving digital equity
18 and has been recognized as a
19 visionary trailblazer nationally
20 for this work. But there is much
21 more to do.

22 So I thank Councilmember
23 Landau for introducing this
24 resolution. I also want to thank
25 Councilmember Squilla for his work

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 on digital equity as a member of
3 the City's Digital Literacy
4 Alliance. And I urge all
5 Councilmembers to consider how we
6 can do more to make sure residents
7 are not disconnected if ACP ends,
8 and to work toward making
9 Philadelphia a more digitally
10 inclusive community. Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 Thank you.

13 Will the Clerk please call
14 the next speaker.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Minnie
16 Ruth Moore.

17 (No response.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Harris
19 Mehzer.

20 (No response.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Scott
22 Thompson.

23 (Witness approached
24 podium.)

25 MR. THOMPSON: Scott

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thompson. Good morning. Drivers
3 hiding their license plates from
4 the police and traffic cameras is a
5 bill, so I strongly support Bill
6 240089 that prohibits license
7 plate-flipping devices, and I thank
8 the Council for its action on this.

9 I think this bill is a
10 great start, but it doesn't go
11 nearly far enough. The Council
12 should expand on this bill to
13 include all the other ways that
14 drivers illegally hide their
15 license plates which are much more
16 common than the flipping devices
17 but equally egregious.

18 This includes things like
19 putting a dark tinted cover over
20 the plate, using a sticker or badge
21 to cover up some of the letters on
22 the plate, covering it with an
23 obvious fake or expired temporary
24 tag or just taking a hammer and
25 scraping the paint off.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Cars with obscured plates
3 are everywhere in Philly. And this
4 is not some small ticky-tack
5 offense like an inspection is a few
6 days expired. These drivers are
7 very intentionally going out of
8 their way to hide their identity
9 from the cops so they can speed
10 through our neighborhoods and run
11 red lights and avoid paying tolls.

12 I'm excited about the new
13 speed cameras that Council is
14 considering. But unless we put a
15 stop to this, drivers will just
16 slap a tinted cover on their plate
17 and keep on speeding. New York
18 City recently did an audit and
19 found that \$100 million per year of
20 speeding camera fines are being
21 evaded by drivers who obscure their
22 license plates.

23 Again, this is not a senior
24 citizen running late to a doctor's
25 appointment. These are repeat

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 offenders defacing their cars so
3 they can essentially opt out of
4 following the traffic laws that the
5 rest of us do. And unfortunately,
6 cars with covered plates are often
7 used in much more serious crimes
8 like hit-and-runs and shootings,
9 including the recent horrific
10 shooting at the SEPTA stop a few
11 weeks ago. When so many drivers
12 are covering up their plates, it
13 makes it really easy for the bad
14 guys to do it too.

15 Mayor Parker pledged to
16 make Philly the safest, cleanest,
17 greenest big city in America, but
18 every car with an obscured plate on
19 the streets is a billboard that
20 says crime and disorder are
21 tolerated here, and seeing these
22 drivers get away with it makes
23 regular people feel like a schmuck
24 for following the rules. That's
25 not the Philly I want my kids to

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 grow up in. It won't fix
3 everything, but some additional
4 action to enforce this will send a
5 strong message. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 The Chair recognizes the legendary
9 outstanding leader Dr. Minnie Moore
10 Johnson.

11 (Witness approached
12 podium.)

13 DR. MOORE JOHNSON: Good
14 morning. Thank y'all for having
15 me. I am so blessed. I am
16 extremely blessed that I am being
17 considered for this honor. I'm a
18 little weak right now, but I just
19 want to let you know that my heart
20 is full. I am so grateful to the
21 City of Philadelphia and for Jannie
22 Blackwell, who has worked very hard
23 to accomplish this for me.

24 It's really moving for me
25 because it's something that I

2 have -- this is not what I do.
3 This is who I am and I really
4 believe in my heart that if
5 everyone followed God's mandates
6 and just fed the hungry, housed the
7 homeless, go visit the sick, take
8 care of the widows and the orphans,
9 if you do any part of that, you
10 will be successful in life and all
11 the things that one day receiving
12 an award for doing what God has
13 asked us to do is not going to
14 happen.
15 It's going to be
16 happening -- we're going to be so
17 full of the City of Philadelphia
18 and the world just doing the things
19 that we've been asked to do, and
20 it's not going to be a need for
21 everyone to be honored for it.
22 Everybody is going to be doing it.
23 Thank you, Kenyatta. Thank
24 you, Council. Thank you, Jannie.
25 Thank you all for everything that

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 you have done to make sure that my
3 last days doing what I have to do
4 for God is successful. Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Congratulations. Dr. Moore,
8 Dr. Moore, I just want to say thank
9 you for investing in me as a young
10 man in shaping and helping me
11 become the person who I am today.
12 Congratulations. Thank you very
13 much.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

16 Will the Clerk please call the next
17 person for public comment.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Perez.

19 (Witness approached
20 podium.)

21 MR. PEREZ: Last week when
22 I was here three officials blocked
23 the door to the fourth floor. They
24 said it was closed to the public
25 and there'd be no public speaking.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I waited upstairs and when you
3 called for public comment to speak,
4 you knew I was there, you knew I
5 was coming and you voted to hear me
6 speak this week.

7 I think I should be allowed
8 my full two minutes this time to
9 talk about Palestine. You have not
10 once made time for it. I have
11 ignored --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
13 Ms. Perez, could we just speak to
14 what's on the actual bill, if you
15 don't mind?

16 MS. PEREZ: I've tried to
17 meet with you, President. I've
18 tried to meet with you. I've tried
19 to meet with you. Everyone's
20 ignoring Palestine. The least you
21 can do is listen to her message as
22 this child begs for her life on
23 Instagram.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
25 Thank you.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Could the Clerk please call
3 the next person for public comment.

4 Could the Clerk please call the
5 next person for public comment.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Nicole
7 Kligerman.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES:
9 Mr. Chair.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
11 Chair recognizes Councilmember
12 Curtis Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: We have
14 to do better. This is a forum and
15 we have to follow our protocol of
16 who and how people speak to things,
17 but we need to create a forum where
18 we privately listen to what she has
19 to say. It is the month of
20 Ramadan.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: And I'm
23 a team player. I really am. I try
24 to be. But when there is something
25 egregious that is happening, we at

2 this body -- I don't want to fight
3 the Middle East War here in City
4 Council, but doggone it we have to
5 be fair. She comes every week,
6 tries to be heard and we shut her
7 down. That's got to stop or I will
8 introduce a bill to allow her to
9 speak. We can do it privately or
10 we can do it real public. It is up
11 to this body, but we will not
12 ignore it not another week. Thank
13 you, Mr. President.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 Just for the record, right, for any
17 bill that comes in front of
18 Council, right, it's part of our
19 rules, right. And all due respect,
20 in terms of speaking on issues
21 that's germane to the topic that's
22 on the floor, right, it's part of
23 the rules. And that's how that
24 process always been, rather it's on
25 this topic or any other topic.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Now, however if individual
3 Councilmembers want to have a
4 specific conversation with the
5 young lady or anyone else who comes
6 to speak on an issue that's not on
7 the Calendar, they have the right
8 to do so. In all due respect, if
9 individuals want to introduce
10 legislation as it relates to a
11 topic that a Member wants to speak
12 on, they have the right to do so as
13 well.

14 All we're doing is not
15 shutting individuals down by
16 speaking on what's introduced based
17 upon the rules for the record.
18 That's it.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilmember Phillips.

21 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

22 Listen, I just want to say for the
23 record that our Council President
24 has been really doing well, a great
25 job, not only getting us started on

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 time but making sure that people's
3 voices are heard.

4 Council President Johnson
5 has done a tremendous job with not
6 only making sure that Philadelphia
7 City Councilmembers are not just
8 within the halls of City Council,
9 but they're in neighborhoods and
10 bringing us resources so that we
11 can have town halls as well as
12 other endeavors so that neighbors
13 can hear us.

14 So I want the entire City
15 of Philadelphia to know that public
16 comment is important not only to me
17 and the rest of the City
18 Councilmembers but to this Council
19 President. So with that being
20 said, I want to be very clear that
21 if anyone wants to have a private
22 conversation with me, I'm open to
23 it. My doors are always open. I'm
24 in neighborhoods on a daily basis.

25 And I also want to let us

2 know that it's very important for
3 us to understand that we are a
4 collective here, we're a team and
5 what we understand as public
6 comment is something that we all
7 really, really care about. And I
8 know my Council President cares
9 about it as well. Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 The Chair recognizes Councilwoman
13 Katherine Gilmore Richardson.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

15 RICHARDSON: Thank you, Council
16 President.

17 Per the rules of Council,
18 your public comment must concern
19 matters on the Second Reading and
20 Final Passage Calendars for
21 possible action at today's Council
22 session.

23 With that, Mr. President, I
24 call for the orders of the day.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Curtis Jones.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
5 you, Mr. President.

6 This is not about --

7 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

8 RICHARDSON: With all due
9 respect --

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Usually
11 when they say with all due respect,
12 the disrespect is coming.

13 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

14 RICHARDSON: -- Councilman Jones --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 This is what we're going to do --

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: I had
18 the mic.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 Councilman Curtis Jones.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: I really
22 did. I really did.

23 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

24 RICHARDSON: When you call for the
25 orders of the day, it's not debate.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 When you call for the orders of the
3 day, it's no debate. So that's
4 with all due respect, Councilmember
5 Jones.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 This is what we're going to do --

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's
9 going to --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
11 Councilman Jones.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 Because she is -- according to the
15 rules, she's calling for the orders
16 of the day, right.

17 Will the Clerk please call
18 the next speaker.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Nicole
20 Kligerman.

21 (Witness approached
22 podium.)

23 MS. KLIGERMAN: Hi. I'm
24 Nicole Kligerman. I'm with the
25 National Domestic Workers Alliance.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm going to read in Spanish the
3 resolution put forward by
4 Councilmember Brooks and Council
5 President Johnson. (Spanish
6 translation).

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Will the Clerk please call the next
10 speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes.

12 (Witness approached
13 podium.)

14 MS. LANDES: Good morning.

15 I'm Lynn Landes at
16 Safestreetsphilly.org but also of
17 lynnlandes.org. And because the
18 subject has turned to public
19 comments, I do want to say that my
20 attorney George Bochetto has sent
21 you a letter about your violations
22 of the Sunshine Act and we do
23 intend to take you to court if
24 these are not corrected.

25 You are not allowed under

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Sunshine Act to limit comments
3 to agenda items only. You are also
4 not allowed to add bills and
5 resolutions at the beginning that
6 are not already on the agenda so
7 that we can make informed comments.
8 I just want to say that. And you
9 can find it on my website later on
10 today, that letter that was sent to
11 all of you, at lynnlandes.com.
12 Thank you very much.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Will the Clerk please call the next
16 speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Sandra
18 Speight.

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
21 Will the Clerk please call the next
22 speaker.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
24 Blatstein.

25 (Witness approached

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 MS. SPEIGHT: Good morning.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Good morning, Ms. Speight.

6 MS. SPEIGHT: Good morning.

7 My name is Sandra Speight, and I'm
8 here on the ACP resolution. ACP is
9 set to end the end of April, and it
10 is a very important factor in
11 Internet reception. I'm a senior
12 and just to get television, you
13 have to have Internet Wi-Fi. And
14 as a senior, you're on a fixed
15 income and this is a much needed
16 bill. And Congress is going to try
17 to end it by the end of April.

18 And I am asking everyone to
19 please get behind this bill and try
20 to make them understand that
21 seniors and people that are on
22 fixed incomes really need it. And
23 I want to thank you very much.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 You're welcome. Thank you.

3 Will the Chair call the
4 next speaker.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
6 Blatstein.

7 (Witness approached
8 podium.)

9 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello, City
10 Council. My name's Jeremy
11 Blatstein. Should I drop my
12 website or my Twitter handle
13 @phlmayor, do you want -- no. I'm
14 talking in regards to two bills
15 that are disposing of land from the
16 Philadelphia Land Bank today.

17 They're great. It's good.
18 Housing coming out of -- I mean,
19 lots coming out of the Land Bank
20 for housing is a good thing.
21 Streamlining that process needs to
22 improve. What I want to talk about
23 today is the Turn the Key program.

24 Most of you in this room
25 voted for it. The education

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 surrounding Turn the Key has been
3 lacking. I don't believe that it
4 should just fall on the developers
5 to educate the public about Turn
6 the Key and who this program was
7 intended to help.

8 As lots are moved for Turn
9 the Key, the sale price can be
10 \$280,000. There's a \$75,000 second
11 mortgage that comes along with
12 that, that drops the sale price
13 down to about \$200,000, right,
14 205,000.

15 There's some other money
16 that is given out by the banks,
17 \$5,000 to \$10,000 that drops that
18 price even further down. The
19 average AMI of the people buying
20 these homes, of the 100 that have
21 been sold so far is 57 percent AMI.
22 That is insane and is the point of
23 this program. And to try to then
24 say, well, can we get it down
25 lower. Unfortunately, no. Without

2 other public subsidy, the program
3 won't work.

4 So if you want to say,
5 okay, you want to make these sale
6 prices \$200,000 but you don't want
7 to have any other subsidy, it makes
8 it very difficult. And if you want
9 to help minority developers get
10 involved in development, trying to
11 put that on them is also insane.
12 The margins are already close. So
13 if you want these people to be
14 successful, support the \$280,000
15 sale price and build some homes.
16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Chair please call the next speaker.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Breighton
21 Golphin.

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
24 Chair, please call the next
25 speaker.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna

3 Hagins.

4 (Witness approached
5 podium.)

6 MR. HAGINS: Great morning,
7 everyone. Ogbonna Hagins. I'm the
8 unseated member of City Council.

9 Ogbonna Hagins, O-g-b-o-n-n-a.

10 This resolution in regards to the
11 gun violence prevention, this is
12 more aspirin for a brain tumor,
13 more aspirin for brain tumor.

14 The same way that you
15 wouldn't give someone with a brain
16 tumor an aspirin, why are we giving
17 these aspirin solutions for gun
18 violence. Your study, the Roadmap
19 to Safer Communities -- and you're
20 on your phone while I'm talking to
21 you so you're not paying attention,
22 Councilman.

23 Councilman, you're on your
24 phone and you're not listening to
25 me. Councilman. Councilman,

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 you're not listening to me. You're
3 disrespecting me. That's what the
4 slave masters did during slavery
5 when Black people were trying get
6 attention. Pay attention to what
7 your constituents are saying.

8 Now --

9 (Sergeant-at-Arms
10 approached Witness.)

11 MR. HAGINS: I am but he's
12 ignoring -- I'm talking to the
13 Councilmembers and they're not
14 paying any attention to me. So
15 now, the study said that in order
16 to eliminate gun violence, there
17 needs to be large scale investments
18 in the areas that have been
19 decimated by crime, violence,
20 unemployment. Your study said
21 that.

22 And your study also said
23 that this City is structurally
24 racist as we saw with the example
25 of the Councilman who's still on

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 his phone. So, listen, the
3 structural racism bill that I gave
4 you, I expect this body in the next
5 seven days to meet collectively to
6 go over this legislation that I
7 spent my time with my team to
8 answer the question of the Roadmap
9 to Safer Communities.

10 You said it needed large
11 scale investments. You said it was
12 structurally racist, Council
13 President. What's up? Y'all not
14 addressing structural racism? Not
15 even addressing structural racism
16 is structurally racist. Ogbonna
17 Hagins, your unseated
18 Councilmember.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
21 Will the Clerk please call the next
22 person for public comment.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Breighton
24 Golphin.

25 (Witness approached

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 MS. GOLPHIN: Hi. Can

4 everyone hear me? My name is

5 Breighton Golphin and I'm speaking

6 in support of the resolution for

7 Trans Day of Visibility, so I want

8 to say thank you for Council for

9 that. But I also hope that this is

10 not the first step in making sure

11 that we are better protected in the

12 City.

13 Now, I'm very fully aware

14 that we do have an emergency order

15 declaring Philadelphia a sanctuary

16 city when it comes to our health

17 care, but what we really need is a

18 bill because the folks in this

19 state outside of Pennsylvania,

20 they're not playing around.

21 They're looking to revoke

22 our health care at any moment on

23 the state level, so I hope even

24 though we do have this emergency

25 order and even though I highly

2 doubt that Cherelle Parker's going
3 to take that away, a bill would be
4 of more precedence.

5 I also wanted to highlight
6 what has happened recently as it
7 relates to, like, fund -- like
8 funding no longer like -- I am
9 sorry. I'm tongue-tied. Our city
10 no longer funding safe needle
11 exchanges. A narrative that was
12 completely ripped from this is that
13 it's not just folks who are
14 struggling with addictions that
15 depend on safe needle exchange.
16 It's folks in the trans community
17 as well.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. GOLPHIN: When we get
20 hormones and I'm saying this as
21 someone that is on HRT. When we
22 get hormones, we either get gel or
23 a patch or a needle. Sometimes we
24 are not provided needles because
25 certain nonprofits run out or

2 certain pharmacies don't have them.
3 So where do we go to? We go to
4 these places such as Prevention
5 Point or Savage Sisters Recovery or
6 who else that is offering it.

7 Just understand that if you
8 get rid of safe injection sites --
9 I mean, not safe injection sites,
10 safe needle exchanges from our
11 city, HIV, Hepatitis and all these
12 illnesses will increase, but also a
13 lot of us will not have access for
14 HRT because how are we supposed to
15 inject ourselves with our
16 (inaudible). So I just wanted to
17 say and highlight that. And also,
18 I would like for the City to
19 officially call a ceasefire. Thank
20 you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
23 Thank you.

24 Will the Chair call the
25 next person for public comment.

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: Charlotte

3 Gillum.

4 (Witness approached

5 podium.)

6 MS. GILLUM: Good morning.

7 My name is Charlotte Gillum and I

8 am the proud principal of Lewis

9 Elkin Elementary. Good morning,

10 Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Good morning.

13 MS. GILLUM: Good morning,

14 Council. Good morning, students.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. GILLUM: It is an honor

17 to be recognized today as part of

18 the resolution during Women's

19 History Month, to recognize the

20 work that my colleagues and I do as

21 school leaders in the Kensington

22 community. Councilwoman Lozada is

23 a true friend of Elkin and a true

24 friend of Kensington.

25 The District and the City

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 began the Kensington collaborative
3 that we like to call the Opioid
4 Task Force back in 2017 and it has
5 been an honor to be a part of that
6 work. I am proud over the last
7 seven years I now see light at the
8 end of this arduous tunnel.

9 I have two stories, two
10 quick stories. Based off of the
11 work that I do as a Kensington
12 school leader, it just happened on
13 Monday, a 4th grade girl coming to
14 my office crying because her
15 teacher said that she was being
16 very disrespectful.

17 Through her tears she
18 shared that she is tired and scared
19 because she has to walk to school
20 in disguise because there are
21 people out to hurt her to send a
22 message to her brother. We know
23 that happens all of the time.
24 She's a 4th grader.

25 I have another story about

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 children who see domestic issues at
3 home, things that they should not
4 even witness on T.V., let alone in
5 the kitchen of their own home, and
6 as a result have to then come into
7 school to learn.

8 I think I'm in front of
9 people who have influence over
10 budget. And if that is you, I
11 encourage any time that you have
12 anything before you with mental
13 health supports for our schools and
14 our children, please stand behind
15 that. If you have also some
16 information and influence over safe
17 passages, please stand behind that.
18 Thank you, everyone. Good morning.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
21 Thank you.

22 Will the Clerk please call
23 the next person, public comment.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Erica green.

25 (Witness approached

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 Ms. GREEN: Good afternoon,
4 everyone. I'm Erica Green, and I
5 am so proud to be here today. This
6 morning I would like to express my
7 sincere appreciation to
8 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada, a
9 woman of a tenacious spirit who is
10 laser-focused. She has vision,
11 integrity, intellect, fortitude and
12 a compassionate heart to serve the
13 children and families in Kensington
14 and in the School District of
15 Philadelphia.

16 I am truly humbled as a
17 school leader to be here for
18 Women's History Month. I am a
19 proud Philadelphia native and it
20 brings me great joy to be honored
21 by Councilmember Quetcy Lozada with
22 the other women who serve in the
23 School District of Philadelphia or
24 in another capacity with the
25 Archdiocese because we're all doing

2 this work for young people.

3 And I just want to say that
4 these women serve in very difficult
5 roles in the heart of the open air
6 drug market in Kensington, which
7 can no longer be ignored. When I
8 stand here for children of Conwell
9 and in Kensington, I stand for all
10 children in Philadelphia.

11 We need to do what is
12 right, just and fair for kids in
13 the words of Dr. Constance E.
14 Clayton. Every day when we get up,
15 we need to serve children. We need
16 to champion for children, and it
17 cannot be just words. We see a
18 living testimony of them standing
19 here representing their school
20 Russell Byers Charter. So it's a
21 remarkable time to be a woman in
22 Philadelphia with the first female
23 Mayor Cherelle Parker and seven
24 females serving on City Council.

25 So, Councilmember Lozada, I

1 3/21/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 say that my heart beams with pride,
3 and may you always be blessed for
4 the true heart you have for
5 children and of service. You are a
6 woman of your word and you are a
7 woman of action. Thank you,
8 Councilman President Johnson and
9 the Members today.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you.

13 Will the Clerk please call
14 the next person for public comment.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Awilda
16 Balbuena.

17 (Witness approached
18 podium.)

19 MS. AGUILA BALBUENA: Good
20 morning, Mr. President and all of
21 the members of City Council. I am
22 very appreciative of this
23 opportunity to address you all. My
24 name is Awilda Aguila Balbuena and
25 I'm in my 14th year as the

2 principal of Gloria Casarez
3 Elementary School located on the
4 corner of G and Ontario, which has
5 proudly been named after a very
6 fearless advocate for all of those
7 living in Kensington, the homeless
8 and the LGBTQ+ community.

9 I'm certain her voice was
10 heard in these same walls as the
11 first ever Director of the LGBTQ+
12 office here at City Hall under
13 Mayor Nutter. So here I am having
14 my voice heard during Women's
15 History Month. I had not planned
16 to speak here today, but whenever
17 given an opportunity and given a
18 platform to speak on behalf of my
19 school community also known as my
20 second family, I am honored to do
21 so.

22 Our ask is, this is coming
23 from my school community, we ask
24 that you see us, that you show us
25 we matter and help us to feel like

2 we belong to this big city. I am
3 extending an invitation to all of
4 you to come walk the streets, the
5 same paths my students have to walk
6 to get to school each day. And

10 missed while I was outside. So
11 today in honor of Women's History
12 Month, I am introducing resolutions
13 in honor of several women who have
14 been making history right here in
15 Philadelphia.

16 The first is Eva Gladstein.
17 Eva devoted her career to improving
18 the lives of all Philadelphians and
19 to making government work for those
20 who need it most. Her work spanned
21 multiple City offices in City
22 government and funneled hundreds of
23 millions of dollars into our
24 communities, but she never lost
25 sight of the most fundamental

2 responsibility which is to improve
3 the lives of everyday
4 Philadelphians.

5 When she retired, we lost
6 one of the boldest, most brilliant
7 public servants. She will continue
8 to serve as a model for us who
9 envisioned a Philadelphia where
10 every family can count on safe
11 affordable homes.

12 Second, I would like to
13 honor Dr. JoAnn Seaver. JoAnn has
14 spent decades educating
15 Philadelphia children in ways that
16 embrace their culture, honor their
17 individuality and cultivate a love
18 of learning and challenge them to
19 be leaders and peacemakers.

20 Her tutoring projects have
21 taught thousands of young people
22 across Philadelphia how to read and
23 how to provide life-changing
24 services to children who have been
25 underserved by institutions that

2 should be taking care of them. And
3 to this day, she continues to
4 nourish and strengthen her
5 community.

6 Through her teaching,
7 mentorship and advocacy, she shows
8 us what it means to envision a
9 fight for education that children
10 all deserve. And I met JoAnn
11 during the fight for Wister
12 Elementary. And at that time, I
13 ended up becoming very ill.

14 And just imagine a strange
15 woman just coming to say what does
16 your family need and she was
17 willing and able just to fill in a
18 huge gap that I needed at the time,
19 and I am internally grateful for
20 the support that she had given me
21 and my family at one of the hardest
22 times.

23 And it's important that we
24 support strangers that just saw a
25 need for me and my family and

2 stepped up. And I will forever
3 honor her for the work that she's
4 done in the community as well as
5 with me and my family.

6 And third, Council
7 President, I would like to join you
8 in introducing the resolution in
9 honor of Mercedes Reyes. Mercedes
10 working as a domestic worker when
11 she was 11 years old and currently
12 lives with her family in South
13 Philadelphia. And after
14 experiencing significant abuse in
15 her workplace, including wage
16 theft, discrimination, total lack
17 of health insurance, she began
18 organizing with her fellow domestic
19 workers for respect, dignity and
20 better conditions.

21 And she's been a pillar of
22 the community and a leader in the
23 fight for domestic workers' bill of
24 rights. And although she recently
25 retired after over 70 years as a

2 domestic worker, she remains
3 committed to winning the
4 legislation and funding that will
5 make the promises of the domestic
6 workers' bill of rights a reality.

7 And also, I met Mercedes
8 way before Council session when
9 this domestic workers bill of
10 rights came out. And just seeing
11 her strengths and advocacy around
12 this work where retaliation is
13 unheard, very silent and behind
14 closed doors. And just her
15 willingness to continue to bring
16 more women in the fight about
17 domestic workers, the fight and
18 support of the domestic workers.

19 And I understand this
20 firsthand because I too was a
21 domestic worker early on in life,
22 and I took care of children and
23 took care of seniors. So I'm
24 forever grateful for her advocacy
25 and organizing. And I wanted to

3 opportunity to give her, her
4 flowers now.

5 And I'm also co-introducing
6 a resolution with Councilmember Rue
7 Landau to recognize March 28th is
8 International Trans Day of

11 celebrate the contributions of
12 trans people to our families, our
13 communities, our history, our
14 culture and our movements for
15 justice.

16 This Women's History Month
17 I especially want to acknowledge
18 the contribution of Black trans
19 women like Marsha P. Johnson, who
20 insisted on, No pride for some of
21 us without liberation for all of
22 us. And in honor of Marsha P.
23 Johnson, Dominique Rem'mie Fells
24 and many others, I call on this
25 body to continue to work to protect

7 Anthony Bellmon says, meetings do
8 turn to action. As a result of
9 meetings, we were able to learn
10 about the importance of funding
11 violence prevention organizations.
12 Among everything else, at a meeting
13 I learned about the importance of
14 ski masks.

15 So meetings do lead to
16 action. I just want to let people
17 know that we learned a lot. Mental
18 health has been said. What I
19 believe is now the key thing that
20 residents want to see from our
21 City. And I think how we go about
22 that in the City going forward is
23 going to be our next big thing that
24 we support people on based off of
25 what residents said in Northeast.

2 Parent engagement has been
3 termed for many years now. And I
4 think not it's time on how we can
5 better support our parents. It
6 came from that meeting. And also,
7 we talked about people -- people
8 talked about the idea of
9 spirituality which is something
10 that is relatively new to the
11 discourse, but spirituality in
12 schools being taken away and so
13 forth, that could be potentially
14 helpful.

15 But those are just things
16 that were brought up last night and
17 for all of us to reflect on. So I
18 just want to say thank you, Council
19 President, and all the others who
20 showed up, including Councilman
21 Harrity and Councilman O'Rourke who
22 showed us last night too.

23 Then I just want to briefly
24 announce that Senator Sharif Street
25 is hosting a town hall community

2 service meeting tonight in Logan
3 from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. with myself,
4 Councilman Harrity and State
5 Representative Dorisha Parker.
6 It's going to be at West Systems
7 Health. And that's going to be
8 right there in the Logan section in
9 the City of Philadelphia, so all of
10 our Logan residents please come out
11 to that meeting.

12 We're also going to be
13 having a town hall that I'm hosting
14 in Olney -- well, actually in East
15 Oak Lane for our Olney, Fern Rock
16 and also Logan residents on
17 Thursday, March 27th from 5:30 to
18 about 7:30 at night over at PASSI,
19 6925 Old York Road.

20 We look forward to hearing
21 from you. We'll have some City
22 services there. It's going to be a
23 great time. It's important for us
24 to be in neighborhoods. I want to
25 continue to have residents come out

2 so we can hear them and can do the
3 people's business. So thank you
4 very so much. God bless.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 You're welcome. And great job
7 yesterday. Council in them
8 streets. Keep up the good work.

9 The Chair now recognizes
10 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier.

11 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

12 Thank you, Council President.

13 I wanted to start by
14 congratulating Eva Gladstein and
15 thanking Councilmember Brooks for
16 the resolution. I'm an Eva
17 Gladstein's fan. I see her as
18 somebody that successfully came
19 from activism and organizing into
20 the City and as someone who's had
21 such an impact, a positive impact
22 on people living in poverty in our
23 City. And I hope that when I
24 retire I can say that I've had my
25 hands in as many great things and

2 the same type of really positive
3 impact.

4 I also wanted to talk about
5 my street naming resolution. So
6 today we named the 5400 block of
7 Woodland Avenue "Dr. Minnie Moore
8 Johnson Way" in honor of Dr. Minnie
9 Moore Johnson's service to
10 Southwest Philadelphia the City at
11 large.

12 Dr. Minnie's first foray
13 into community service involved
14 feeding seniors on Thanksgiving in
15 1968. Two decades later she hosted
16 25,000 seniors for Thanksgiving
17 dinner at what was then the
18 Philadelphia Civic Center, credited
19 as the City's largest one-day
20 feeding event in history.

21 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson
22 also has a deep passion for
23 criminal justice. After earning
24 her Doctorate on the subject, she
25 founded Concerned Parents, Inc., a

2 group that provided community
3 service opportunities to the
4 clients of the Pennsylvania Society
5 of Prisons.

6 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson
7 went on to work full-time for the
8 Prison Society, eventually becoming
9 the first program manager for the
10 Re-entry Service Project, where she
11 created the only certified job
12 development course at Temple, which
13 cultivated job opportunities for
14 re-entering residents.

15 Somehow still finding the
16 time to do more, Dr. Minnie Moore
17 Johnson got involved with
18 Philadelphia's Safe and Sound,
19 disrupting the cycle of violence by
20 nurturing young people. Dr. Minnie
21 Moore Johnson is no stranger to the
22 spotlight, having already received
23 hundreds of awards from luminaries
24 like from President Jimmy Carter,
25 President Ronald Reagan, President

2 George H.W. Bush, President Bill
3 Clinton, Reverend H. Sullivan and
4 Congressman Bob Brady.

5 But I'd like to think that
6 this one is special because
7 Southwest Philadelphia has been
8 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson's beloved
9 community for decades, and she
10 nurtured it with love, tenderness
11 and dedication.

12 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson's
13 home on the 5400 block of Woodland
14 Avenue is known among neighbors as
15 a safe haven where they can always
16 find a hot meal or a place to stay.
17 No award feels as special as the
18 one that you receive from your own
19 people. It is only right that
20 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson's name
21 graces the street she has called
22 home for decades.

23 Dr. Minnie Moore Johnson,
24 thank you and your family for being
25 here with us earlier today. I'm

2 grateful for the opportunity to
3 give you your flowers while you're
4 still here, and to rename a street
5 after such an illustrious and
6 accomplished woman during Women's
7 History Month.

8 I also want to acknowledge
9 the Honorable Jannie Blackwell for
10 helping me with the street
11 renaming. The Councilwoman has
12 never stopped looking out for our
13 communities. And I appreciate her
14 partnership greatly. Thank you so
15 much.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
18 Good job.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

21 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank
22 you, Council President, colleagues.

23 I was proud to be able to
24 honor Officer Tony Long, Sr. today.
25 Tony is a member of the graduating

2 class 297A at the Police Academy in
3 April of 1992. In September of
4 2003, Officer Long was assigned to
5 City Hall where he has worked under
6 five City Mayors, leading back to
7 the Honorable Ed Rendell
8 Administration and now to the
9 current Administration of the
10 Honorable Cherelle Parker.

11 Tony served as a 33-year
12 veteran of law enforcement in the
13 Philadelphia Police Department and
14 a 37-and-a-half year employee of
15 the City. Officer Long worked in
16 various capacities, including
17 Philadelphia's sports teams
18 championship games, DNC and RNC
19 Conventions, visits from several
20 Presidents of the United States,
21 numerous elected officials and
22 dignitaries as well as a special
23 visit from Pope Francis in 2015.

24 Officer Long was also a
25 member of the Major Incident

2 Response Team. Over the years,
3 Officer Long has received
4 acknowledgements from his
5 supervisor for his professionalism
6 and years of service.

7 We are sad to see Tony to
8 leave, but it is a well-deserved
9 retirement. We come in here every
10 day and the one thing we know is
11 Tony's going to be sitting down
12 there looking after us along with
13 the other police officers that do
14 that detail, kind of unsung heroes,
15 you know. They protect us every
16 day. A lot of stuff goes on
17 outside of City Hall that they have
18 to attend to.

19 It's just an honor to show
20 him his flowers while he's still
21 here, and especially in front his
22 lovely wife and two children, two
23 young men.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: So

3 applause for Tony Long.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank
6 you, Council President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
8 You're welcome. Congratulations.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilmember Nina Ahmad.

11 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD: Thank
12 you, Council President.

13 I wanted to acknowledge and
14 thank and express my gratitude to
15 our President Joe Biden who during
16 this Women's History Month
17 announced an Executive Order
18 focused on women research. It's
19 the advancing women's health
20 research. It's called the
21 Advancing Women's Health Research
22 and Innovation Executive Order
23 14120, that solidifies women's
24 health research as a priority for
25 the federal government.

2 This action taken has
3 really needed this for a long time
4 because women's health is
5 underfunded, unresearched,
6 understudied. And I hope this is
7 going to result in permanent
8 legislative action so it's codified
9 for the entire country.

10 During the hearings we had
11 in City Council here on March 8th
12 for women's maternal mortality, we
13 encountered evidence from our
14 testimony from physicians who
15 talked about the disparity in how
16 reimbursement happens, insurance
17 reimbursement for procedures
18 between males and females in terms
19 of what procedures get reimbursed
20 at a higher rate.

21 And much of our maternal
22 mortality can be attributed not
23 just to the racism in our health
24 care system, but also to how
25 dollars are allocated to women's

2 health. So I really want to
3 underscore that our nation is
4 paying attention and we in
5 Philadelphia will also be paying
6 attention. Thank you very much.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

11 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
12 you, Council President.

13 As we celebrate Women's
14 History Month, I am honored to
15 dedicate some time today to
16 recognize the contributions of
17 truly incredible women in our City.
18 Today with me as you heard are
19 eight remarkable women who embody
20 the spirit of care, creativity and
21 leadership within the Kensington
22 neighborhood of Philadelphia.
23 These women work hard daily to
24 shape young minds, instill
25 knowledge and foster a love for

2 learning.

3 Their commitment to
4 education and the Kensington
5 community is invaluable to the
6 lives they touch every day. Their
7 impact resonates with their
8 students, the families of their
9 students, teachers, staff, peers
10 and countless community members.
11 Educators will tell you that every
12 day presents new challenges. These
13 challenges often go beyond the
14 classroom. The ones that these
15 women face every day just walking
16 into the building seem
17 insurmountable.

18 They have made a daily
19 commitment to take them on for the
20 betterment of their students and
21 their communities. When it comes
22 to the work we are doing to improve
23 the neighborhood, they are the
24 unsung heroes in the equation. But
25 I believe that years from now when

2 their students become Kensington's
3 next generation of homeowners,
4 business owners and community
5 leaders, they will be singing the
6 praises of the women that are here
7 today carrying the torch. They are
8 the anchors for the future of
9 Kensington.

10 Thank you so much to all of
11 my colleagues for joining me in
12 celebrating their work. Thank you,
13 ladies.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Good job.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

18 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
19 you, Mr. President.

20 First I'd like to say the
21 debate on rules, I'm here for it.
22 I love it. That's what democracy
23 is about, so I look forward to that
24 conversation. But last week on
25 Thursday we held a town hall on

2 youth gun violence in our City
3 where over 200 folks participated.

4 Thank you, Council
5 President, for your participation.

6 Thank you, Councilmember Thomas,
7 and also Senator Street for
8 participating in our discussion
9 with the community to get some
10 feedback on what we could be doing
11 as a City to help better their
12 lives. I also want to thank
13 Commissioner Bethel as well for
14 answering questions, and some tough
15 questions from the community.

16 Last night we also had a
17 SEPTA town hall. I want to thank
18 Councilwoman Katherine Gilmore
19 Richardson for your leadership on
20 this. It allowed parts of North
21 Philadelphia to hear SEPTA's plan
22 on their Revolution. And SEPTA I
23 think got some great feedback last
24 night from some communities in
25 North Philadelphia. We had that

2 meeting at Hope Partnership School
3 at 11th and Huntingdon in the 37th
4 Ward. There will be another
5 meeting with SEPTA at Strawberry
6 Mansion High School April 2nd. So,
7 folks, look forward to that flyer
8 coming soon.

9 And next Wednesday we will
10 also have another community meeting
11 at Philabundance Community Kitchen
12 in the 10th and Dauphin area, so
13 folks who live around 10th and
14 Dauphin and Susquehanna, that part
15 of the community, please come out
16 and share your concerns with me and
17 to get to know your new
18 Councilmember.

19 And last, Mr. President, at
20 1 o'clock today the Committee on
21 Commerce and Economic Development,
22 chaired by Councilmember Squilla,
23 will hold a hearing on Act 135. I
24 am encouraging all who want to
25 learn more about this Act to come

2 and listen in on this hearing.

3 We're going to discuss some great
4 things that the Act does and some
5 things that could use improvement.

6 And so, we welcome you all to
7 participate in that hearing. Thank
8 you, Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 Thank you. Good work.

11 The Chair now recognizes
12 Councilmember Mike Driscoll.

13 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
14 you, Mr. President.

15 Today this body has taken a
16 great stride in combating
17 dangerous, nuisance and illegal
18 driving. But passing this bill to
19 outlaw the possession of license
20 plate flipping devices, we are
21 sending a clear message that these
22 007 devices and their reckless
23 behavior they enable belong in an
24 action movie. They do not belong
25 on the streets of Philadelphia.

2 These devices are used to
3 mask your identity when engaging in
4 reckless driving such as speeding,
5 running red lights, drifting,
6 avoiding tolls and beyond. We are
7 giving law enforcement another tool
8 in their tool kit to combat this
9 behavior in our City. So thank you
10 to my co-sponsors and to every
11 member of this body for voting in
12 favor of this bill and to our law
13 enforcement officers who seek to
14 protect and serve every day.

15 Secondly, Mr. President,
16 I'd like to thank Councilman Curtis
17 Jones for your leadership on the
18 gaming bill. I think that's going
19 to really make a difference in
20 every neighborhood in this City,
21 and it also shows the small
22 businesses that have liquor
23 licenses, legal liquor licenses,
24 the American Legions, the VFWs, the
25 AOHs, that they'll be able to make

2 some legal money to help them stay
3 afloat and to keep our
4 neighborhoods stronger. So thank
5 you, Councilman, for that.

6 I also on behalf of
7 Councilmember Bass want to remind
8 all the Councilmembers that
9 immediately after Council, Members
10 and designated staff, we're having
11 a briefing on PIDC. Lunch will be
12 served.

13 And lastly, yesterday my
14 dad Joe Driscoll, a World War II
15 veteran, celebrated his 100th
16 birthday. So I just want to give
17 him a shout-out. Thank you,
18 Mr. President.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
21 You're welcome. That is truly an
22 honor and a blessing, 100 years.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilmember Rue Landau.

25 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: Thank

2 you, Council President.

3 First, this is our last
4 public meeting in this month, so
5 recognizing all of the strong and
6 courageous women who we've honored
7 during Women's History Month today
8 and throughout this month, it's
9 just spectacular to hear the
10 stories.

11 And second of all, I thank
12 my colleagues for all of our
13 violence community town halls that
14 we're having. Can't wait to start
15 participating in more of those.
16 It's so important to hear from the
17 community. But I want to -- I
18 really want to talk about and
19 underscore the urgency of our call
20 to action carrying the Affordable
21 Connectivity Program.

22 As Chair of the Information
23 and Technology Committee, I believe
24 that access to the Internet is not
25 a luxury but a necessity, a

2 fundamental right. The Affordable
3 Connectivity Program has been a
4 beacon of hope for millions of
5 Americans, bridging the gap between
6 those with Internet access and
7 those without. However, it's
8 impending expiration and threatens
9 to roll back years of progress in
10 closing the digital divide.

11 With this resolution, we
12 urge President Biden and Congress
13 to swiftly prioritize the
14 reauthorization in funding of the
15 Affordable Connectivity Program.
16 By ensuring its continuation,
17 Congress can reaffirm its
18 commitment to equitable access for
19 all Philadelphians and Americans to
20 vital resources such as telehealth,
21 education and employment
22 opportunities. I hope the federal
23 government will rise to the
24 occasion to support our communities
25 regardless of zip code or income

2 level.

3 And second, I'm proud to
4 recognize a resolution I introduced
5 with Councilmember Kendra Brooks
6 that March 31, 2024 as Transgender
7 Day of Visibility in the City of
8 Philadelphia. This is a day to
9 celebrate the vibrant contributions
10 of transgender, nonbinary and
11 gender expansive individuals in our
12 community and lift up the joy,
13 triumphs and pride that transgender
14 people experience and bring into
15 our communities.

16 We honor their resilience,
17 their achievements and their
18 invaluable role in shaping our
19 city's identity. Our celebration
20 must be accompanied by a solemn
21 acknowledgement of the challenges
22 that transgender and nonbinary
23 individuals continue to face.
24 Discriminations, violence and
25 legislative attacks threaten their

2 safety and well-being.

3 We stand in solidarity with
4 them, reaffirming our commitment to
5 fostering an inclusive and
6 supportive environment where
7 everyone can survive. In
8 recognizing Transgender Day of
9 Visibility, let us not only
10 celebrate the progress we have made
11 but also recommit ourselves to the
12 ongoing struggle for a quality in
13 justice. Together let us ensure
14 that every voice is heard, every
15 life is valued and every individual
16 is empowered to live authentically.
17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

19 Thank you very much.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilmember Thomas for a motion
22 to adjourn.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Excuse
24 me, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

2 Councilmember Jones.

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
4 you. I was wondering if Ogbonna
5 Hagins was going to get to speak
6 before I did.

7 But let me first thank my
8 Members for standing up to giants
9 and bullies in voting for the
10 gaming bill. That took a lot of
11 courage. I know you were
12 contacted. I know people told you
13 the sky was going to fall, but I
14 appreciate you guys standing up to
15 the bully. Appreciate you doing
16 the David and Goliath thing for the
17 neighborhoods of the City of
18 Philadelphia.

19 And it is not a perfect
20 bill and we are open to continue to
21 the conversation with people to
22 figure out how to make it a better
23 bill. But what I will note is that
24 in 2017 the door got opened for
25 these machines to be dropped into

2 our neighborhoods and we've been
3 waiting for help from Harrisburg.

4 And I believe by passing
5 this bill it will incentivize our
6 colleagues at the state level to
7 finally take this on and do
8 something on behalf of
9 Philadelphia. My only concern is
10 that when they do, they do not pay
11 attention to what our specific
12 concerns about the gaming industry
13 are and include us in the dialogue.
14 Mr. President, I hope you will take
15 that to Harrisburg for us.

16 Secondly, for evil to
17 triumph it only takes good men and
18 women to do nothing, to say nothing
19 and allow it to exist. I want to
20 thank my Majority Leader for
21 calming me down with the Rule book.
22 She pulled out the Rule book on me.
23 And thank you for that because it
24 is Ramadan. And sho'nuff I was
25 about to break my fast because my

2 emotions started getting in the way
3 of the message and the truth.

4 The issue for me -- and I
5 want to thank my colleague
6 Phillips, and I'm going to take you
7 up on -- you said you would meet
8 with anybody. That's what you
9 said. It's on the record. And I
10 want to join you in meeting with
11 people who you may or may not agree
12 with. Because for 17 years I turn
13 around and I pay attention to
14 whoever comes up to that mic,
15 whether I agree with their cause or
16 not because this is the people's
17 house and they have a right to
18 speak.

19 And what is important is
20 that when you silence people, it
21 only creates agitation and hatred
22 and other things. When you
23 dialogue with people, when you open
24 and really listen, guess what, we
25 might learn something. We might

2 appreciate their point of view.

3 And that's all I ask.

4 I could have, like you
5 said, introduced a resolution to
6 bring the Middle East conflict
7 right here but I was asked not to
8 and it was wise not to, because
9 first we as a body must always
10 sweep under our feet first.

11 Until we clean up the
12 violence here in Philadelphia, who
13 am I, who are we to talk about what
14 should go on over there. We can
15 have our opinion, but our work is
16 right here. So therefore, wisdom
17 dictated that we take care of our
18 business, but I hope that our
19 better angels -- because Ramadan
20 just isn't about not eating and
21 drinking. It's about really
22 reflecting on what is right and
23 what is wrong.

24 And if we listen to people
25 together collectively, I have faith

2 in this body that we will do the
3 right thing every time. We may not
4 like it. It might not be 17 to 0
5 votes. It may be a little
6 contested, but that is better
7 public policy.

8 So I want to thank you
9 again, Majority Leader, for
10 whipping out the -- that was in
11 true Blondell spirit. And I want
12 to say that I too, Member Phillips,
13 believe that we are heading in the
14 right direction. We start on time
15 and if the speeches aren't too
16 long, we end on time. But we
17 should always strive to do better.
18 And listening to people is in that
19 reflection.

20 I live in an
21 interdenominational household.
22 Everybody who believes in one God
23 lives in my house. You know what
24 I'm talking about, Member O'Rourke.
25 And when you listen to others, you

2 will gain from their experience,
3 life experience. One Philly,
4 right. Even if we don't like what
5 they're saying, we're One Philly.
6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Thank you, Mr. Jones. I'm sure
10 this will be first of many spirited
11 dialogues and conversations and
12 debates in this body. And I've
13 been here since 2011 and I've seen
14 a variety of them.

15 But the rules exist for a
16 reason. And just because we follow
17 the rules does not mean we're
18 shutting anyone down. If the
19 subject of debate is not on the
20 floor rather it's for anyone that
21 comes to this body, then we're
22 going to follow the rules just
23 based upon us being aligned with
24 the rules of this great institution
25 that we all voted upon during the

2 last Presidential election for this
3 body.

4 However though, every
5 member in this body including
6 myself, whether I agree with any
7 individual on the topic here in the
8 City of Philadelphia whether it's
9 Ramadan or Christmas, I've sat down
10 with them. I've had conversations
11 with them.

12 No one in here can say
13 rather or not an individual reached
14 out to me directly and said let's
15 have this conversation irregardless
16 of what's said on this particular
17 floor. Individuals know my
18 character and how I operate as an
19 individual. Hence, why I'm in this
20 position right now.

21 So as we move forward as a
22 body, yes, this is the people's
23 house. We will always make sure
24 that people feel comfortable when
25 they do come here. But

2 nevertheless, the rules that we
3 voted upon on this last election
4 for this body are in place for a
5 reason. And just because we have
6 rules do not mean we disagree with
7 another person's opinion. There's
8 just rules to make sure that this
9 body operates efficiently as we
10 move this great City of
11 Philadelphia forward.

12 And so, with that being
13 said -- I'm more than welcome to
14 have a side-bar conversation,
15 Mr. Jones, with yourself or anyone
16 else. But at this particular time,
17 sir, we're going to wrap up.

18 And at this particular
19 time, I'm going to call on
20 Councilman --

21 COUNCILMAN JONES:
22 Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

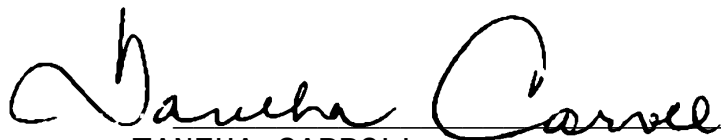
