2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

3 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: I note that the hour has
10 come and that a quorum of this
11 Council is present. I'm asking for
12 all members to please take your
13 seats. I'm asking for all visitors
14 to please retire to the seats
15 outside the rails. And before
16 proceeding, I will ask all those
17 present to please set your cell
18 phones on silent and/or vibrate.
19 Most importantly, I'm asking for
20 you to take all sideboard
21 conversations out of the City
22 Council chambers.

23 To give our invocation
24 this morning, the Chair recognizes

2 the Reverend Kathy M. Mitchell,
3 Assistant Pastor of Triumph Baptist
4 Church. She is here today as
5 guests of the Majority Whip
6 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

7 I'll ask all members and
8 guests to please rise.

9 (Councilmembers, guests
10 and visitors rise.)

11 PASTOR MITCHELL: Please
12 bow your heads, close your eyes and
13 open your hearts. God, our Father
14 and creator, Jesus Christ, our Son
15 and Redeemer, Holy Ghost, our God
16 and counselor, we give you praise
17 and thanksgiving for being in your
18 holy presence and being on one
19 accord at this solemn moment.

20 This prayer is one of
21 faith and it comes through human
22 lips that are at times ones of
23 doubt. We are relying on your
24 goodness and believing all of your

12 Forgive our foolish
13 race, recall us in our right mind
14 and breathe through the hearts of

18 Affection, the birthplace of
19 American democracy within the
20 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

21 We know and acknowledge
22 that the earth is the Lord's and
23 the fullness thereof, the world and
24 they that dwell therein. So this

11 and museums, SEPTA and Amtrak, the
12 Philadelphia International Airport,
13 bus lines and taxi cabs, Uber and
14 Lyft, the police department, the
15 fire department, first responders,
16 the sanitation and street
17 departments.

18 We pray for her honor,
19 the Mayor Cherelle Parker in
20 Philadelphia, City Council.
21 Heavenly Father, we pause for
22 prayer, not just to do all of the
23 talking but to also listen to you
24 at this very moment.

21 On behalf of the Minority, the
22 Chair recognizes Councilmember

24 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

23 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the

7 On behalf of all members
8 of City Council, I welcome you to
9 our Council session. We appreciate
10 your taking the time to join us as
11 we attend to the legislative
12 affairs of our great city and we
13 certainly invite you to come again.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Majority Leader Councilmember
16 Katherine Gilmore Richardson.

17 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE
18 RICHARDSON: Thank you. Thank you
19 very much, Council President.

20 During the welcome I'd
21 like to take the opportunity to
22 acknowledge very special guests
23 that we have in chambers today.
24 They are here in support of the

12 Traci's mom Andrea Powell.

13 You all may remember
14 Traci as one of our real estate
15 divas here in the city of
16 Philadelphia, but she was born and
17 bred in the city from the great 8th
18 Council District and she is one and
19 was one of our stars in the
20 Philadelphia community. She worked
21 with us in Council and worked with
22 many organizations across the city
23 to help many individuals achieve
24 first-time homeownership and

3 We will miss her, her

21 people from Overbrook High School's
22 Panther Peace Core.

23 The program was founded
24 in 2008 by Overbrook High School

12 welcome them to chambers this
13 morning on behalf of Councilmember
14 Jones and I. They've been here all
15 morning. They had breakfast in
16 Council, and I am just so proud to

12 Ms. Dd, beautiful soul.

13 I also want to
14 acknowledge the CEO and founder,
15 there will be a resolution
16 introduced by Majority Whip
17 Councilman Isaiah Thomas,
18 acknowledging Miskeen clothing
19 line. We have today, the CEO and
20 founder, Mr. Ibn Anderson.

21 And most of you may or
22 may not know, Miskeen was one of
23 the foremost clothing lines that
24 contributed to the fashion culture

12 founder of Miskeen Clothing line,
13 Ibn Anderson, can you just please
14 stand.

9 of living that's not in our DNA.
10 We barter, we do community, we use
11 each other's strengths, we trade.
12 We put people in positions that
13 have their strengths and the ones
14 that have weaknesses we pair them
15 up. We have to do a better job of
16 working within our community to
17 find people with the strengths,
18 with the credentials. And if they
19 don't have the credentials and
20 they're more blue collar, we can
21 put them in spaces to do labor,
22 because we have the expertise and
23 excellence in labor. We have
24 expertise in contracts and

2 relationships and we also have
3 expertise in people who just know
4 how to structure stuff. Seek those
5 people out and put them in position
6 to do their strengths and create a
7 better and more functional
8 community."

9 We will miss her
10 insight, her energy, her cheerful
11 spirit, her extreme thoughtfulness,
12 kindness and care for others. I
13 will miss her randomly popping up
14 at my house to take our kids to
15 (inaudible) and Ritas or the phone
16 calls that she says, Commish,
17 somebody missed a block of trash in
18 area 2b and the Grays Ferry Homes
19 Association will be coming for you.

20 On tomorrow, Traci, a
21 lover of the arts, Fashion Week,
22 and the Met Gala will be
23 memorialized at Philly's very own
24 Met. Doors open at 9:00, the Ivy

2 Beyond the Wall service at 9:30.

3 Funeral style memorial at 10:00.

4 All are welcome to attend.

5 In closing, allow me to

6 paraphrase the words of Maya

7 Angelou, It's not what people say

8 or what they do, but how you make

9 them feel. Traci Powell was a

10 doer, but it's all the ways in

11 which she made each of us feel, be

12 seen or heard that will be

13 remembered most. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. HARDEN: May it

16 please this Honorable Council. I

17 think this is my first time

18 speaking before City Council, so I

19 think it speaks to the impact that

20 Traci Powell's had on my life. I'd

21 like to thank Council President

22 Kenyatta Johnson and the sponsors

23 of this resolution, the Honorable

24 Majority Leader Councilmember

5 Many of those gathered
6 here today may have known Traci
7 Powell. If you never had the
8 opportunity to meet her, I
9 apologize that you did not, that
10 you missed the opportunity to have
11 your life improved upon by someone
12 who grew to be family to me.

13 Traci was a butterfly.
14 She was vibrant, vivacious,
15 colorful, graceful and
16 transformative. And in the end,
17 like the presence of a butterfly
18 that decides to rest for a moment
19 on the tip of your finger, on the
20 tip of your nose, her presence was
21 fleeted. We got to experience her.
22 We got to see her beauty and then
23 she was gone.

24 Some of you are very

2 familiar with parts of my personal
3 story. I see so many friends here
4 on council that know about my
5 transformation after losing both of
6 my parents and being shot five
7 times, Traci was a part of my
8 story, and I wanted to make sure

11 significant contributing factor to
12 my own success and the success of
13 hundreds of Philadelphia families
14 and some of the individuals, even
15 in this room on this Council, was
16 the result of the efforts of Traci
17 Powell.

18 She was an example for
19 all of us in the basic tenets of
20 servant leadership. She had
21 friendship, she had love, she had
22 ambition. And for the members of
23 Council here who I know are
24 frequently the tow truck that gets

2 called, and we always wonder who do
3 you call when you need to tow the
4 tow truck. I want to tell you all
5 that it's very important that you
6 remember the 3 Ps of Traci P. One
7 is that she was present. Second is
8 that she was proximate. And I'm
9 going to break a rule because it'll
10 be more memorable, she was
11 unpretentious which starts with a
12 U, but it's still one of the P's of
13 Traci P.

14 I'm preaching to the
15 choir when it comes to being
16 present, proximate and
17 unpretentious, but she was
18 omnipresent in our communities.
19 She built trust. And you all
20 understand that to build trust you
21 have to show up. That's Rule No.
22 1. You got to show up. You have
23 to be present. She always showed
24 up with her hallmark energy, joyful

2 spirit and thoughtfulness.

3 Traci sparkled in every

4 room she showed up in. The thing

5 about proximity and the difference

6 between presence and proximity is

7 presence is just being there.

8 Anyone could be in this room right

9 now, but proximity is that warmth

10 that you offer to someone so that

11 you can build that deep,

12 substantive relationship.

13 Proximity is knowing your friends'

14 kids' names. Proximity is breaking

15 bread over dinner. Proximity is

16 making sure that, you know, I got

17 \$2 left. Well, let's go -- we used

18 to call it a bum box growing up in

19 West Philly. You would get a

20 dollar rice and gravy from Danny

21 Wok.

22 That was the sort of

23 person that Traci was. If you

24 didn't have the money, the time,

2 the treasure, she would give her
3 last to you. Your wounds were her
4 wounds. She could feel your
5 anxiety and step in. She could
6 sense your needs and fears and
7 offer stability, trust and support.

8 My favorite Traci story
9 is I grew up in a Muslim household.
10 I don't identify. I'm not a
11 particularly religious person. But
12 when my daughter was first born,
13 like some families we had some
14 family hegemony, and my daughter
15 was staying with me, and we had a
16 split living arrangement.

17 And I called Traci and
18 she said, Well, what are you doing
19 for Christmas? I said, Well,
20 Traci, I don't really celebrate
21 Christmas. She said, Well, Sasha
22 does. And she showed up at my
23 house and decorated the entire
24 house. I mean, she had tree

2 lights. She was up there with
3 a -- and mind you, Traci was about
4 5'1". So for her being up on my
5 house putting up Christmas lights
6 was something very significant.

7 I'll close on this. The
8 last time I saw Traci was at my
9 home for a celebration of a
10 personal accomplishment. Many of
11 you were also there, and she bought
12 me a compass. That was her gift to
13 me on the occasion of me making
14 partner at my law firm.

15 And this morning I was
16 looking for some inspiration and
17 some guidance and really just to
18 make sense of all of this, like
19 many of her family and friends are,
20 and I picked up the compass to look
21 at it and it has an inscription
22 that tells me to remember my morals
23 and remember the things that got me
24 where I am today, are the same

2 character traits that I should
3 maintain as I proceed forward,
4 which I think all of us understand
5 you have to be true to yourself.

6 And I'll close on this,
7 the compass -- and I mean,
8 compasses work one way. It points
9 to north. But when I picked up the
10 compass, Council President, it
11 pointed to me. And when I say that
12 with the expression that you have
13 to remember that you have to be
14 present, proximate and
15 unpretentious with yourself as
16 leaders. I ask that you all take
17 care of yourself so that you can
18 continue serving our communities
19 and having the same impact Traci
20 Powell had on me. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. RICHARDSON: Good
23 eve -- good afternoon or good
24 morning, Council. My name is

2 Courtney Richardson. I had the
3 honor of serving as the President
4 of the Barristers' Association of
5 Philadelphia. Traci Noel Powell
6 was not only a proud supporter of
7 Barristers', but we shared a bond
8 through America's premier Greek
9 letter organization for African
10 American women, Alpha Kappa Alpha
11 Sorority, Inc. and the Black Wealth
12 Project. But above all, Traci was
13 my friend. Traci was my tow truck.
14 When I needed to rehab
15 my childhood home in the 8th
16 Councilmanic District, Traci gave
17 me her resources to do so. Traci
18 represented everything that is
19 right with Philadelphia, building
20 community, modeling collective
21 responsibility and uplifting
22 others. A real estate powerhouse
23 for over two decades, her accolades
24 were many, including from this very

2 body, but her impact reached
3 beyond, far beyond her career.

4 She was a hope dealer.

5 Her words and presence reminded
6 people of just who they were, but
7 who God created them to be. As an
8 educator in generational wealth,

10 schools have to offer. And we all
11 wanted more time, especially her
12 beloved mother Ms. Andrea. But we
13 are deeply grateful for the 44
14 beautiful years she gave to this
15 city. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. ELLIS: Good
18 morning, Council. My name is
19 Camari Ellis. Thank you all for
20 having me to speak on behalf of my
21 good friend Traci. All right. So
22 thank you all for allowing me to
23 speak on behalf of my good friend
24 Traci Powell.

2 Traci and I were both
3 co-founders of the Black Wealth
4 Project, which was all about
5 reaching underserved communities
6 and helping them understand the
7 importance of real estate and
8 overall financial literacy. But
9 the sum of Traci, she was our

11 Philadelphia lost one of
12 their greatest angels this week or
13 this month. When I think about
14 Traci, there's a couple of things
15 that come to mind. She always put
16 people over money even though she
17 was a real estate broker. She
18 always put community first no
19 matter what. And so for me, I
20 always strive to live by those
21 things and I think those are
22 lessons we can all live and pass on
23 as we go forward. Thank you all
24 for having us. Thank you.

3 MR. WILLIAMS: Good

4 morning, everyone. My name is

5 Jimmy Williams. I'm also a member

6 of the Black Wealth Project, but

7 Traci was a lifelong friend of

8 mine. I've known Traci over

9 35-plus years. We went to Ivy Leaf

10 Middle School together, for those

11 who remember Ivy Leaf and that kind

12 of shaped us to be who we were, but

13 it's very difficult for me.

14 But the one thing I want

15 to say is this: Dr. King said,

16 everybody can be of service,

17 everybody can be great because

18 everybody can serve. And I think

19 about that quote when it comes to

20 Traci because she is always of

21 service.

22 On our last conversation

23 we were on the phone for two hours,

24 and she just calls me out of the

2 blue and says, how can we get more
3 of our Black real estate
4 professionals to work together, I
5 need to figure that out. She said,
6 I'm going to figure that out. So
7 we're talking.

8 And then within the same
9 conversation she says, I want to
10 challenge you. She says,
11 Philadelphia is a place with so
12 much talent, what can we do to keep
13 our talent in Philadelphia, right.
14 So these are the things that she
15 would think about day-in and
16 day-out. She was always of
17 service. I mean, always of
18 service.

19 Last thing I want to say
20 is this: A couple months ago Traci
21 and I went to see Sinners, the
22 movie Sinners that came out. And
23 we leave the theater and I'm
24 talking about how much I love the

2 movie. And she says, How can we
3 use this to serve the community? I
4 said, The movie? She says, We need
5 to rent the theater out, this has
6 to be a way -- everything was about
7 serving the community and serving

10 and I wouldn't miss this for the
11 world. My prayers are with her
12 mother. We love Traci and she was
13 one of one. She's going to be
14 sorely missed. But thank you guys.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. PARRIS: Good
17 morning and thank you all. My name
18 is Elizabeth Parris. I am the
19 other half of real estate. I'm a
20 loan officer with Cardinal
21 Financial. And why that's
22 important, Traci and I met 10 years
23 ago through a client. And it
24 wasn't just through working

2 together that identified this as
3 someone that I knew we were going
4 to be involved in our lives
5 forever. It was the budding
6 friendship and the passion and the
7 dedication to our community that we
8 each held that we became thick as

11 officer for 10 years. Traci has
12 been a realtor for well over 20 and
13 we matched wits for days. And so,
14 something that stood out to me in
15 our relationship and growing as
16 friends and becoming family in a
17 way, is that Traci managed to find
18 herself not only as a support but
19 as the orchestrator, as the
20 motivator, collaborating and
21 assisting in so many ways.

22 So I want to say this:
23 As one of our mutual colleagues,
24 Mark Brown could not be here. He's

3 for her memorial tomorrow. Please
4 remember that Traci was the
5 embodiment of be the change you
6 want to see in the world. I ask
7 that everyone who knew Traci honor

10 legacy she leaves is one of impact,
11 integrity, community building and
12 purpose. The City of Philadelphia
13 has lost a hero and gained an
14 angel. Thank you.

15 CHIEF CLERK: We have
16 Ibn Anderson, Bonita Cummings. May
17 Jeremy Blatstein, Collin Kawan-
18 Hemler, Peter Ahn and Mo Rushdy
19 also make their way to the podium.

20 (Witnesses approached
21 podium.)

22 MS. ANDERSON: Good
23 morning. My name is Ibn Anderson,
24 and I am the President of Miskeen

2 Originals, a brand that was
3 incorporated here in Philadelphia
4 on 10/24/1999. On behalf of the
5 entire Miskeen Originals family, I
6 want to extend our deepest thanks
7 to City Council President Kenyatta
8 Johnson and the entire Philadelphia
9 City Council for this incredible
10 resolution.

11 The recognition today
12 means the world to us, not just as
13 a brand but as a movement born
14 right here in Philadelphia. Miskeen
15 Originals was always more than
16 clothing. It is wearable art, a
17 voice for the unheard and a symbol
18 of creative rebellion.

19 As we relaunched the
20 brand in 2025, we're bringing that
21 same spirit into a new era,
22 combining hand-painted fashion with
23 cutting edge technology like AI and
24 block chain and re-engage in our

2 community through art, education
3 and entrepreneurship.

4 We were built by the
5 city and we're building again.

6 With your support, we believe
7 Miskeen can again inspire the world
8 from right here in Philly. Thank

12 and fashion, make an impact and
13 make history. Thanks again.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Keep up the good work.

16 MR. ANDERSON: Thank
17 you.

18 MS. CUMMINGS:

19 Greetings, Councilmembers. My name
20 is Bonita Cummings, Strawberry
21 Mansion Community Concern RCO
22 offering testimony on 250568. I
23 rise today not just as a community
24 advocate, but to speak directly to

2 you as parents and as Philadelphia
3 concerned about the future of your
4 own children.

5 Bill No. 250568 burdens
6 your own families. This bill
7 allows developers to convert every
8 vacant parcel into multi-family
9 units appraised at 600,000 to over
10 1 million per building, not for
11 community benefit but for investor
12 portfolios.

13 But here is the truth:
14 Those inflated values raised
15 assessments and property taxes are
16 nearby single family homes,
17 including those owned by our
18 seniors, many of whom were lifelong
19 public servants, teachers, nurses,
20 transit workers. These elders
21 often do not qualify for the
22 low-income or senior tax relief
23 because they earn modest pensions.
24 That means their property taxes go

2 up. Their children inherit debt,
3 not wealth. And in many cases, the
4 family is forced to exit or lose
5 the home entirely.

6 The bill is
7 intergenerational harm disguised as
8 housing policy. You are voting to
9 make your own children poor before
10 they turn 15 by loading the city
11 with debt and approving housing
12 models that destroy protections
13 meant to stabilize our
14 neighborhoods. Let us also be
15 clear, ignoring community input,
16 bypassing zoning law and excluding
17 our RCOs isn't just bad policy,
18 it's a Title 6 civil rights
19 violation.

20 This bill exposes the
21 City to federal challenges for
22 discriminating against Black and
23 Brown neighborhoods under the false
24 banner of affordable housing. I

2 urge you protect the people, not
3 the developers. Reject or amend
4 Bill No. 250568 so that it does not
5 rewrite our rights or jeopardize
6 our future.

7 A community like
8 Strawberry Mansion, though not rich
9 in income, is rich in amenities,
10 open space, history and cultural
11 legacy. Under Bill No. 250568,
12 neighborhoods like ours will remain
13 permanently marginalized because
14 this bill removes our ability to
15 shape what happens to our land.
16 Without zoning protections and
17 community input, we will never
18 become the next Fairmount, Spring
19 garden or Northwest. This bill
20 ensures that decisions are made
21 without us, over us and against us.
22 This is not housing justice. This
23 is generational harm. Thank you
24 for not taking my voice today and

2 allowing me to speak.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

5 Thank you.

6 MR. BLATSTEIN: We're

7 talking about housing, housing,

8 housing. My name is Jeremy

9 Blatstein. But if we're talking

10 about housing, it's a \$800 million

11 bold plan of the MOVE Initiative --

12 H.O.M.E. Initiative, sorry. It's a

13 great plan.

14 But we just heard from

15 the one person, RCO, from Jay

16 Young's auntie who's holding up 57

17 fully-funded affordable units.

18 Each and every one of you are

19 stopping that. It is completely

20 unacceptable that you're allowing

21 one person to stop 57 affordable

22 units. The tax credits expire at

23 the end of June. You are using

24 taxpayer dollars to sue to stop

2 housing from being billed. It
3 needs to stop. It is so
4 unacceptable, and you can't say
5 you're for affordable housing if
6 you support this appeal. So I
7 encourage you to every one of you
8 if you really care about affordable
9 housing, to vote no.

10 The last thing we're
11 talking about is SEPTA. Raise your
12 hand if you rode SEPTA this year,
13 this year. Yeah, we got this.
14 Okay, yeah. Okay, Councilwoman
15 Bass, look at that. SEPTA is
16 crucial for cities. Everybody
17 relies on it. Ride the ride. Fund
18 SEPTA. Grow Philly to 2 millie.
19 Thank you.

20 CHIEF CLERK: We have
21 Collin Kawan-Hemler, Peter Ahn, Mo
22 Rushdy. May Jana Julian, Kate
23 Perez, Taneal Walker, Daniel
24 Eisenberg and Tess Fieler also make

2 their way to the podium.

3 (Witnesses approached
4 podium.)

5 MR. HEMLER: Good
6 morning. My name is Collin Kawan-
7 Hemler. I am a library assistant
8 at Kingessing Library. I'm a
9 member of District Council 33 and I
10 urge Council to vote no against
11 Resolutions 250196, 250197 because
12 it's astonishing to me that the
13 Free Library of Philadelphia is
14 receiving no increase in funding
15 either in operating costs or
16 capital costs.

17 Flat funding is not
18 going to fix all the issues we
19 have. District Councilmembers, I
20 want you to listen closely to this
21 list. 13 branches yesterday were
22 closed yesterday due to staffing or
23 cooling issues. Our HVAC systems
24 are broken, that is Bustleton,

2 Durham, Santore, Falls Schuylkill,
3 (inaudible), Lillian Marrero,
4 Ramonita, Rodriguez, South Philly,
5 Donnatuci, Walnut Street West and
6 Welsh Road, we're all closed. And
7 material pickup services are not
8 adequate, full services.

9 We are so much to the
10 communities. We are child care.
11 We are printing services. We are
12 internet services. And when the
13 branch itself is closed because we
14 cannot safely open because the
15 temperature is way too high, people
16 lose out. Children in the
17 community lose out. We need more
18 funding for programming, for basic
19 essentials like garbage bags. They
20 are hard to come by and nobody has
21 answers.

22 HVAC again, security, we
23 need higher wages. Okay. District
24 Council 33 is the lowest paid city

2 workers. Municipal guards deserve

3 so much more. Okay. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

6 Thank you.

7 MR. AHN: Good morning,

8 members of the City Council. Today

9 I'm testifying as a Germantown

10 resident in opposition to the

11 proposed budget. It seems like the

12 big money would organize people --

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

14 Please state your name for the

15 record. Please state your name --

16 MR. AHN: Peter Ahn. It

17 seems like the big money would

18 organize people conveniently and

19 fast, but big money does not

20 organize. They purchase. The

21 wealthy collaborate together while

22 dividing the middle class and the

23 vulnerable by lifting people up

24 from the middle, upper economic

2 strata. We need to lift from the
3 bottom.

4 A theologian, Dorothee
5 Sollo once quoted, Berthold Brecht,
6 a German playwright, there are many
7 ways to kill. We can thrust a
8 knife into somebody's belly or let
9 him starve to death. We can
10 withhold medication or treatment of
11 an illness or we can force someone
12 to live in substandard housing. We
13 can simply work someone to death or
14 drive into suicide or send them to
15 war. Very little of this is
16 forbidden in our country.

17 Let's add or we can cut
18 budget that supports mobile crisis
19 responder units or we can weaponize
20 law enforcement and respond with
21 lethal force by traumatizing and
22 catastrophizing conflict and mental
23 health crisis or we can cut taxes
24 from large corporations like

2 Comcast and Aramark or by giving
3 landlords, developers and lobbyists
4 no transparency or accountability.
5 I oppose this Philly version of the
6 big, beautiful budget proposal.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. RUSHDY: Mo Rushdy.
9 Council President, Councilmembers,
10 Madam Chair, thank you for your
11 transparency. To our Mayor, thank
12 you for having the courage and
13 energy to conduct all these town
14 halls, last of them yesterday
15 finishing at 9:00 p.m. to transpire
16 the enormous vision that you have.

17 I'm here to testify on
18 behalf of 250214, '530, '195, '212,
19 '525, and '524. Everyone wants the
20 city growing, a growing tax base,
21 businesses opening up in the city
22 and the city's vulnerable having
23 resources to not only help them
24 survive, but help them thrive.

2 I look at the \$800
3 million bond, which when leveraged,
4 will create \$2 billion to \$3
5 billion worth of projects, repair
6 projects, small and big. That in
7 itself will bring over \$6 billion
8 to \$8 billion of economic impacts
9 to the city of Philadelphia, more
10 tax collections, job creation.

11 This bond program is
12 itself a growth tool for our city.
13 Codifying tax reductions has never
14 been done before. Many don't talk
15 about this very important fact.
16 This is big. This is huge. We are
17 an old city. We are a city that
18 has neighborhoods with little
19 resources and an aging housing
20 stock. Fixing these aging housing
21 stock ensures that people can stay
22 in their neighborhoods. We need
23 safe homes and we need affordable
24 housing. That needs resources.

2 This budget and the
3 H.O.M.E. program not only deals
4 with programs that uses this
5 tremendous bond, but the
6 legislative packages that we saw
7 that makes building homes easier,
8 makes the process streamlined. In
9 the time where building permits are
10 largely, sharply down from two
11 years ago, these legislative
12 packages are crucial to see more
13 building. We are looking forward
14 to more packages in the fall and
15 subsequent sessions removing red
16 tape and getting housing production
17 on steroids, as our great Mayor
18 would say.

19 We are taking steps in
20 the right direction to achieve
21 that. We need to see a diverse
22 workforce. We need to stop middle
23 class Black flight from our city by
24 providing options like Turn the Key

3 of the largest generational wealth
4 production in the history of our
5 city.

6 Picture that, \$250,000
7 in equity for each of 2,000 to
8 3,000 homes. That's close to \$1

11 in this great city. At the end, I
12 just want to say that we succeed
13 with pragmatic solutions. And when
14 everyone looks at the big picture
15 and not just what's good from their
16 own perspective, the Mayor and
17 Council President just did that.
18 Thank you very much.

19 (Background
20 interruption.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
22 Okay, okay, okay. Let's be
23 respectful so we can hear everyone.
24 We need to hear everyone speak. We

2 need to hear everyone speak, so
3 please let's be respectful of
4 everyone.

5 Please state your name
6 for the record and proceed.

7 MR. EISENBERG: Hi. My
8 name is Daniel Eisenberg. I serve
9 as the Pastor of St. John's
10 Lutheran Church in Mayfair in
11 District No. 6. I also serve as
12 the Dean of the Northeast Northwest
13 Conference of Lutheran Churches in
14 the Southeastern Pennsylvania
15 Senate of the Evangelical Lutheran
16 Church in America. I do all that
17 stuff. And I am a volunteer
18 organizer with POWER Interfaith.

19 And I stand in
20 opposition to Bill 250199, in
21 particular the plan to repeal the
22 BIRT tax. We just had a town hall
23 for the first time that we hosted,
24 and Councilmember Driscoll was

2 present and we had a very good
3 meeting. And at that meeting, we
4 heard a lot of stories of folks
5 that are struggling, folks who are
6 living in their cars.

7 I shared a story of a
8 parishioner who had a seizure
9 because he's been rationing his
10 seizure medication. We also host
11 Feast of Justice, which feeds over
12 5 -- excuse me, whoa, that went
13 quick -- 550 families every month
14 and they have less resources to do
15 more. They're struggling, having
16 to turn people away which is
17 heartbreaking.

18 My fear is that if we
19 don't slow down on these tax cuts,
20 that burden of making up that
21 revenue, if it is made up, will
22 fall on the people that are already
23 struggling like the people I love
24 and serve.

3 CHIEF CLERK: We have

4 Jana Julian. Then Kate Perez.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

6 Chair recognizes Councilmember

7 Anthony Phillips.

8 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

9 Thank you. Thank you, Chairwoman

10 Bass. Thank you so much for

11 presiding today.

12 I respectfully request a

13 leave of absence for the remainder

14 of today's session. I've missed a

15 lot of graduations that I've been

16 wanting to go to, and they have me

17 speaking today so I have to go to a

18 few of them.

19 But I just wanted -- I

20 had to come back and actually had

21 to be here and vote proudly for the

22 Mayor's bills and budget that she's

23 doing for housing and also for our

24 budget. So I'd like to be recorded

2 as voting yes on all the remaining
3 bills and resolutions, including
4 the Mayor's budget and housing
5 bill. And no on Bill 250044-A.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you very much. Leave
8 granted.

9 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

12 Please state your name for the
13 record and proceed with your
14 testimony.

15 MS. FIELER: Hi. Tess
16 Fieler, District 1. I'm testifying
17 opposed to Bill 250199. I'm
18 representing POWER Interfaith, Arch
19 Street United Methodist Church, our
20 nonprofit the Center Philadelphia,
21 which is a daytime drop-in center
22 for our unhoused and unsheltered
23 neighbors as well as the RCO Center
24 City organized for responsible

2 development.

3 I've spoken to dozens of
4 people in these organizations and
5 we are all deeply concerned that if
6 the BIRT tax and wage taxes are
7 cut, the burden will fall on
8 already skyrocketing property
9 taxes, leading to further
10 displacement and added strain on
11 our already strained homeowners and
12 renters. And I especially think of
13 the strain it will put on the
14 unhoused and unsheltered people and
15 the service providers who serve
16 them, considering our drop-in
17 center has had to due to capacity,
18 turn away 514 guests from March to
19 May, three months, and that's just
20 our agency.

21 So we're asking City
22 Council to please slow down and
23 consider the impacts of the BIRT
24 tax cuts and not pass any cuts.

2 And if passed, we ask Council to
3 think seriously about a plan to
4 replace our lost revenue. Thank
5 you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

8 Ma'am, can we get you to return to
9 the podium? We need your name for
10 the record. We need you to state
11 your name for the record.

12 MS. FIELER: Tess

13 Fieler.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

15 Thank you so much.

16 Ms. Perez, please state
17 your name for the record and
18 proceed.

19 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez.

20 It's day 102 of the Israeli
21 Occupation's complete blockade
22 against Palestine (inaudible) and
23 distributing aid distribution of
24 murdered civilians en masse. The

2 IOF released their own drone
3 footage of targeted strikes against
4 children. City bonds must have the
5 stipulation that they cannot invest
6 into apartheid states and
7 explicitly cannot invest into
8 companies operating within states
9 maintaining illegal occupations.

10 Solidarity to the
11 thousands of people in (inaudible)
12 Egypt today on the road to Rafah
13 with aid, even though Israel
14 consistently bombs, kidnaps, drops
15 chemicals on and leaves aid workers
16 in Palestine. We can't allow
17 weapons to leave our docks and
18 pretend to be uninvolved.

19 On Tuesday, PPD
20 violently arrested citizens
21 protesting the disgusting ICE
22 kidnapping of five people that
23 morning, videos of PPD actually
24 kneeling on their necks. ICE

2 announced that they're going to
3 increase mass deportations with the
4 backing of the armed National
5 Guard. Don't give the cops more
6 money to hurt us. We should be
7 having nonstop emergency meetings
8 for sanctuary city status, announce
9 sanctuary city and an arms embargo
10 against Israel. Free Palestine.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: May we
13 also have Kaanan Raja, Queen Judith
14 Robinson, Carrie Rathmann, Antoine
15 Lewis, Megan Malkemes, Kareem
16 Sweeps, Park Frost and Karen Joslin
17 also make their way to the podium.

18 (Witnesses approached
19 podium.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. WALKER: Taneal
23 Walker. Good morning, everyone.
24 My name is Taneal Walker, a proud

2 resident of the 8th District, Cindy
3 Bass's District, a devoted member
4 at First United Methodist Church of
5 Germantown. I'm here today to
6 share my reality.

7 I faced housing
8 insecurity, from homelessness on
9 the streets with my son to barely
10 keeping a roof over our heads. I
11 now pay 1500 a month, a price most
12 people can't afford. Despite
13 working 80 to 100 hours a week is
14 exhausting, 12- to 16-hour shifts.
15 I'm left scrambling just to cover
16 bills and support my family.

17 I stand before you today
18 not as a victim, but as a voice, a
19 call for change. Affordable
20 housing should be a right, a safe,
21 stable haven for every family. Let
22 my story be a (inaudible) for
23 action so that no one else has to
24 endure this struggle. Thank you

2 for allowing me to share my

3 testimony. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

6 Thank you.

7 MS. RAJA: Good morning,

8 Councilmembers. My name is Kaanan

9 Raja and I am here on behalf of

10 Children First and our health team.

11 I want to first thank Councilmember

12 Ahmad and this body for taking

13 action on this youth vaping crisis.

14 We support the Vape Free

15 Futures Act because this bill

16 (inaudible) the harms of vaping.

17 According to the Philadelphia

18 Department of Public Health, in

19 2024 38% of Philadelphian youth

20 reported trying e-cigarettes and

21 19% currently use them. Rates are

22 highest amongst Black and Latino

23 youth in underserved neighborhoods,

24 deepening existing health

2 disparities.

3 This crisis is not

4 abstract for me. It is personal.

5 While working in high schools as a

6 public health intern, I facilitated

7 health education sessions. Nearly

8 every kid in my class admitted that

9 they had tried vaping. Many

10 believed e-cigarettes are safer and

11 less addictive than cigarettes, and

12 most were completely unaware that

13 vapes contain even higher levels of

14 nicotine than cigarettes.

15 These kids were

16 misinformed. Thankfully, we know

17 what can lessen vaping in kids.

18 Graphic warning labels and targeted

19 education have helped drive an 86%

20 decrease in youth tobacco use from

21 1997 to 2021. This bill's warning

22 sign requirement builds on this

23 evidence-based intervention.

24 Moreover, it channels

2 50% of the fines back into youth
3 vaping prevention and education
4 programs. Councilmembers, the Vape
5 Free Futures act protects our kids
6 from the harmful effects of
7 nicotine addiction and it sends a
8 clear message: Philadelphia is
9 committed to a vape-free future and
10 it's committed to protecting its
11 youth from the harms of nicotine
12 addiction. Thank you for
13 considering this critical
14 legislation. We urge you to vote
15 yes.

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. RATHMANN: Good
18 morning. My name is Carrie
19 Rathmann. Thank you for having me
20 testify today. I'm here to testify
21 on Bill 250566 and '568. So I'm
22 here to represent Habitat for
23 Humanity Philadelphia, where we
24 build and preserve affordable homes

2 for low-income homeowners. We're
3 also proud members of the
4 Philadelphia Coalition for
5 affordable communities.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. RATHMANN: So we do
8 this work throughout the city,
9 maintaining homeownership and
10 creating homeownership for
11 low-income families, moving us to a
12 city where everyone has a safe,
13 stable and decent place to live.

14 We also have a specific
15 focus on advancing Black
16 homeownership because we know
17 that's the way to bridge
18 generational wealth gaps. City
19 Council's housing investments have
20 a powerful impact, and we urge you
21 to adopt the bold H.O.M.E. Plan
22 that builds, restores and preserves
23 affordable housing for those most
24 vulnerable. We support the main

2 vision, but we have to say we urge
3 you to cap the support at those
4 making no more than 80% AMI, and
5 we'd like to see more details about
6 the plan.

7 We also urge stronger
8 focus on the programs that will
9 substantially expand the supply of
10 affordable housing by creating new
11 units that are accessible to
12 low-income families and households,
13 and also preserving naturally
14 occurring affordable housing that's
15 already serving folks. This
16 includes rental and homeownership
17 opportunities.

18 We know that
19 prioritizing these strategies will
20 ensure the public investment have a
21 lasting effect on housing. We have
22 other recommendations, but they've
23 been in the record already. Thank
24 you.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

3 Thank you.

4 MS. MALKEMES: Good

5 morning, Council. My name is Meg

6 Malkemes and I'm a member of POWER

7 Interfaith who lives, works and

8 worships in North Philly,

9 testifying against Bill No. 250119

10 and the proposed elimination of the

11 BIRT tax, which if passed would

12 result in a loss of \$2 billion in

13 tax revenue over the next decade.

14 And as an employee of a

15 federally qualified health center

16 in North Philly where the majority

17 of patients are insured by

18 Medicaid, we're terrified at how

19 federal tax cuts will devastate our

20 community. As someone who relies

21 on SEPTA, I'm afraid of how

22 impending SEPTA cuts will disrupt

23 my ability to work as an organizer.

24 I'm worried for the people I

2 organize with who do not know how
3 they will continue to afford rent.
4 And I'm here today because I'm
5 afraid of how eliminating taxes on
6 big businesses like Comcast and
7 Aramark, this city's third largest
8 source of tax revenue will make
9 these crises worse.

10 You don't need to be a
11 tax expert to understand that the
12 loss of this funding can only
13 either mean a decrease in the
14 resources we already do not have
15 enough of or an increase in the
16 price of property taxes we already
17 cannot afford. It pains me to
18 think of the schools that could be
19 built, the parks that could be
20 played in, the students that could
21 be fed, the libraries that could be
22 open if these funds were left
23 untouched.

24 And it concerns me. I

2 think that in a moment when our
3 city needs it needs to be protected
4 from a corporate agenda at the
5 federal level, we've been offered a
6 budget that'll make this even more
7 catastrophic. I urge every member
8 of Council to slow down on these
9 proposed tax cuts or find a new
10 source of tax revenue so we can get
11 the resources we need without
12 everyday people having to pay the
13 cost. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have
18 Antoine Lewis, Kareem Sweeps, Park
19 Frost, Karen Joslin. May Dawn
20 Harris, Janet White, Reverend
21 Michael Kane, Debbie Robinson and
22 Rosetta Calloway also make their
23 way to the podium.

24 (Witnesses approached

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 MR. SWEEPS: Good

4 morning, Council -- City Council,

5 the great City Council. Good

6 morning, residents. My name is

7 Kareem Sweeps. I am a resident of

8 Hunting Park, 43rd Ward, a

9 committee man for my division, 25th

10 Division, also a representative of

11 POWER Interfaith.

12 I am here today to

13 basically to -- I do support the

14 bill -- the bill, sorry, 250199,

15 but I do not support the \$700

16 million tax cut. And the reason is

17 because the core problem is that

18 this tax cut, this proposed tax

19 cut, basically appears to power

20 (inaudible) short term political

21 gain. Also, it boosts up big

22 businesses.

23 It do not represent any

24 residential essential services. It

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 actually reduces residential
3 services, some that I need, some
4 that everyone else needs like
5 SEPTA. The thing is beeping. Am I
6 done -- yeah, and that's it.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 MR. LEWIS: Good
10 morning. My name is Antoine Lewis.
11 I'm a member of One PA, an election
12 captain. We're pleased -- my bad.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
14 Yeah, we can't hear you.

15 MR. LEWIS: We are
16 pleased that City Council and the
17 Mayor has allocated 800 million
18 towards our city's housing crisis.
19 There are too many underserved
20 residents in our neighborhoods that
21 are being forced out of their
22 communities by raising housing
23 costs.

24 If we are going to

2 address the crisis of
3 gentrification, we have to get the
4 details of the housing plan right.
5 Low-income home repair programs are
6 critical. Let's preserve our
7 neighborhoods. The proposed budget
8 for the H.O.M.E. Initiative
9 actually reduces funding for home
10 repair programs. If there is not
11 enough help for me, how are we
12 helping residents of Philadelphia.
13 Follow the money. Confront the
14 power.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. HARRIS: Good
17 morning.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
19 morning.

20 MS. HARRIS: My name
21 is -- I'm sorry?

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Go
23 ahead.

24 MS. HARRIS: My name is

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Dawn Harris and I'm the broker and
3 owner of Keys & Deeds Realty. We
4 proudly serve homebuyers and
5 sellers across Philadelphia. I
6 would like to quickly say that I'm
7 sending love to the family of Traci
8 Powell who is well-respected in the
9 community and of course, a fellow
10 broker.

11 I'm here to speak today
12 on behalf of the many residents of
13 the city, especially those we
14 haven't had yet the honor to serve
15 who are working hard every day to
16 achieve one of the most fundamental
17 goals in life, and that is
18 homeownership. We are well aware
19 of the financial pressures facing
20 today's buyers.

21 Home prices are up.
22 Interest rates are up. Interest
23 premiums -- I'm sorry, insurance
24 premiums are up. And now, a

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 proposed increase to the city's
3 transfer tax would push things even
4 further out of reach. I want to be
5 clear that I've examined this
6 proposal from many different
7 angles, looking for a way that this
8 increase might be absorbed or
9 mitigated by buyers or sellers.
10 And unfortunately, there's no clean
11 pivot here.

12 Some buyers don't have
13 the flexibility to raise their
14 purchase price in order to increase
15 the seller assist to accommodate
16 such an increase. And so, we're
17 raising numbers just to chase the
18 same outcome. But in doing so, we
19 risk stopping the deal altogether.

20 This proposed tax
21 increase may seem small on paper,
22 but its ripple effect is real. It
23 can delay dreams, disqualify buyers
24 and in some cases, stop a home

2 purchase from happening altogether.
3 Is my mic ready to go on -- I'll
4 close in saying this: That I'm
5 urging you to reconsider and let's
6 not penalize the very people we
7 should be empowering, whether they
8 are buying their first home or
9 selling the only one they've ever
10 known. Let's keep the door to
11 homeownership open for all
12 Philadelphians.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

15 Thank you. Thank you for your
16 testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have
18 Janet White, Reverend Michael Kane,
19 Debbie Robinson, Rosetta Calloway.
20 May Emaleigh Doley, Janet White,
21 Loretta Payne, Mark Clincy and
22 Susanne Stone also make their way
23 to the podium.

24 (Witnesses approached

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 MS. WHITE: Hello. My
4 name is Janet White and I'm asking
5 you to vote yes on Bill 250331. I
6 am a member of Philly Thrive and a
7 resident of District 8, Cindy Bass.
8 I'm also a former mother of five
9 daughters, 20 grandchildren and
10 three great-grands and a former
11 nursing home health aide.

12 I lived in Magnolia Mews
13 Germantown and I moved in the
14 apartment 2018. Over the past
15 seven years, I experienced multiple
16 instances of poor maintenance,
17 unsafe conditions. When I moved in
18 there, cracks, windowsills, ants,
19 roaches, everything. I even had
20 rodents running around apartments,
21 also had water damages.

22 Finally, after not
23 having heat for an entire winter
24 and after putting in multiple

2 maintenance requests, I was fed up.
3 I was fed up. And after four years
4 of living like this, I called L&I.
5 The next thing you know eviction
6 process and everything. Thank
7 you -- I have a lot to say, but
8 thank you for allowing me to share
9 my story, and I hope that you will
10 do the right thing and support
11 low-income residents for over
12 corporate landlords and developers.

13 We need you to vote yes
14 today and to fund the entire Anti-
15 displacement Fund and Built to Last
16 and the H.O.M.E. program and thank
17 you very much.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. KANE: My name is
20 Michael Kane. I'm the Pastor of
21 Old First Reformed United Church of
22 Christ at 4th and Race and the
23 Co-chair of POWER Interfaith.
24 We're here today -- thank you.

2 We're here today to talk against
3 Bill 250199, getting rid of the
4 business tax.

5 I spent the last three
6 months talking to about 35 of the
7 homeless and food insecure people
8 we serve each week and they agree
9 with me that if individuals pay tax
10 in Philly, businesses should pay
11 tax. We're really worried. What
12 are we going to do without
13 700,000 -- \$700 million worth of
14 income when income revenue from
15 D.C. is drying up.

16 Finally, to use my own
17 example, I'm a pastor of a church
18 in Councilman Squilla's District,
19 but I live in Councilman Young's
20 District. Currently, my taxes went
21 up from \$4000 to \$10,000 a year.
22 I'm not homeless, but I'm not the
23 richest person in this city either.
24 Currently my house is valued for

2 taxes at more than I could sell it
3 for. We need to figure out how to
4 fund this city, fund homeless
5 services, fund services for all of
6 us so that the businesses don't do
7 well and all of us else suffer.

8 Thank you very much.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

11 Thank you.

12 MS. FORD: Good morning,
13 everyone. My name is Carol Ford
14 and I speak on behalf of my friend
15 Debbie Rogers. We are members of
16 Philly Thrive. I am commenting on
17 Bill 250331, and I am a renter of
18 District 2 and a member of Philly
19 Thrive. I remember growing up in a
20 house that was not visible. It has
21 so much mold that it caused me and
22 my siblings to have asthma. No one
23 would help my single mother make
24 the repairs. We need every -- even

2 though she was trying to get
3 support and live a decent place.

4 Now, 50 years later my
5 friend Mary's mother is still
6 facing the same challenges. She
7 can literally see the sky through
8 her roof. There is too much money
9 in the city of Philadelphia to be
10 living like this with people
11 helping the city grow and we make
12 money for (inaudible).

13 We put you in office
14 because you have told us that you
15 will help us. We want you to do
16 the right thing. Please vote yes
17 on Bill 250331 to establish an
18 anti-displacement fund and help
19 make sure that people live in
20 safety on their own. The city
21 needs to be about us and not the
22 big landlords and development.

23 The current bill does
24 not affect what we need. I hope

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the city will fund bill to
3 (inaudible) the anti-displacement
4 funding and the H.O.M.E. placement
5 fund. Imagine that your family is
6 going through this right now and
7 how would you feel. Would you want
8 to help them. You can help them by
9 voting yes today and provide more
10 funding moving forward.

11 And also, seniors are
12 having a hard time too. Please
13 help the seniors too that's going
14 through this too, and myself and my
15 family are going through this too,
16 the same thing. So make sure you
17 help us with this bill and please
18 vote yes for 250331. Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: We have
23 Rosetta Calloway, Emaleigh Doley,
24 Janet White, Loretta Payne, Mark

2 Clincy, Susanne Stone. May Seneca
3 Grant, Melissa Mont, Aurora Howell,
4 Robert Vance and Gregory Allen also
5 make their way to the podium.

6 (Witnesses approached

8 MS. CALLOWAY: My name
9 is Rosetta Calloway. I'm here to
10 talk about 25011, please vote
11 against. I'm a member of the
12 Church of Provision of Grace World
13 Mission Church. And spreading the
14 rumor of this bill is something
15 that's very important. I noticed
16 that people always have good news.
17 And when they have good news, they
18 go out and spread the good news.

19 Ms. Cindy Bass, I went
20 out and voted for you because
21 you're in my District and I heard
22 the good news about you. But the
23 news about this bill, who has heard
24 about it? Not many. Everyone I go

2 to and talk about this bill, this
3 \$700 billion that are being taken
4 away from the city of Philadelphia
5 because there's no longer taxes for
6 big companies. Are you kidding?
7 We are the little man. We need the
8 tax money. It's so many things in
9 the city that needs to be fixed,
10 and who is fixing them?

11 We had the money. How
12 is the money going to be replaced?
13 We would like to know that. But at
14 this time, I want to close with --
15 it's a saying. When good news is
16 spread around, people are happy and
17 cheerful to learn of it. But when
18 you take news and slide it under
19 the table and want to pass it by,
20 what kind of news is that, Rosetta
21 Calloway Powell.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. MONT: My name is
24 Melissa Mont. I am a mother, a

2 grandmother and I've lived in
3 Philadelphia since 2007. I'm here
4 to urge you to vote on the Right to
5 Relocation, Bill 250331. I spent
6 years in a dangerous, pest-infested
7 apartment where the walls leaked
8 sewage and rodents ran free.

9 I ended up in the
10 hospital with pneumonia and now
11 live with chronic heart and lung
12 conditions. I did not choose this.
13 It happened because my landlord
14 ignored every single warning sign
15 and the system allowed it. This is
16 why right to relocation matters.
17 It gives renters like me a way out
18 when landlords fail to meet basic
19 health and safety standards.

20 But one bill isn't
21 enough. We need to see Mayor
22 Parker's H.O.M.E. Plan include
23 funding for relocation and for the
24 repairs that help struggling

2 homeowners stay in their homes.

3 Displacement isn't just a renter's

4 issue, it affects entire

5 neighborhoods.

6 We also need to be

7 clear, renters need the full

8 package of protections. This is

9 just one piece of the Safe and

10 Healthy Homes Act. We will be back

11 in the fall to fight for the other

12 two bills and we will not stop

13 until they pass.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Please state --

17 MS. MONT: And while you

18 enjoy your summer with your

19 families, I want you to see me. I

20 want you to picture my face when

21 you sit down for a meal or watch

22 your grandchildren play, because

23 people like me aren't getting that

24 time.

2 We're living with
3 physical and emotional consequences
4 of landlords who put profit over
5 people and a system that allowed
6 them to do so for far too long.
7 Vote yes. We are not going away,
8 and we need your leadership now.
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

12 Please state your name again for
13 the record. Please have her state
14 her name again for the record.

15 MS. MONT: Melissa Mont.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

17 Thank you.

18 MR. CLINCY: My name is
19 Mark Clincy and I am commenting on
20 Bill 250331. I am Philly Thrive
21 and a resident of District 2. I am
22 a renter on a fixed income. We
23 need all Philadelphians, not just
24 some, not just a few, but all

2 Philadelphians to have a safe and
3 healthy home. We will no longer be
4 the silent majority anymore, as you
5 see we are speaking out.

6 We need you to vote yes
7 today in order to establish an
8 anti-displacement fund for renters
9 to be able to move out of unlivable
10 conditions. We need more
11 protections for renters against
12 retaliation and against
13 displacement. Please put your
14 low-income senior and disabled
15 constituents over the profit of
16 corporate landlords and developers.

17 This year's budget
18 doesn't reflect these buyers, but
19 you have an opportunity to correct
20 that this fall. We need 10 million
21 for Built to Last and 5 million for
22 the Anti-displacement Fund and the
23 H.O.M.E. Initiative. We are
24 sharing our voices and we need you

2 to listen. Don't be the blind
3 leading the blind. We need you to
4 step up and do your job because we
5 are doing ours. Thank you.

6 CHIEF CLERK: We have
7 Seneca Graham, Aurora Howell,
8 Robert Vance, Gregory Allen. May
9 Lynn Landes, Sierra Freeman, Sherry
10 Brown, Abraham Pardo and Jacob
11 Zychick also make their way to the
12 podium.

13 (Witnesses approached
14 podium.)

15 MS. STONE: Good
16 morning, City Council. Thanks for
17 letting us speak today. My name is
18 Susanne Stone and I am the
19 principal of Stone Sherick
20 Consulting Group. I am honored to
21 testify today in strong support of
22 Bill No. 250568, the H.O.M.E.
23 Initiative. This bold and
24 unprecedented investment represents

2 a critical step forward in
3 addressing Philadelphia's deepening
4 housing crisis.

5 At Stone Sherick, we
6 work with developers all across the
7 city to preserve and develop new
8 affordable housing. We have seen
9 firsthand the transformative nature
10 that a small city investment can
11 make. We leverage hundreds of
12 millions of private dollars to
13 build deeply, deeply affordable
14 housing for the city's most
15 vulnerable.

16 I look forward to
17 working in partnership with the
18 Mayor, City Council and both
19 nonprofit and for-profit developers
20 to rise to this occasion. I urge
21 you to vote yes on the H.O.M.E.
22 Initiative. Thanks for your time
23 and your leadership.

24 (Applause.)

2 MS. DOLEY: My name is
3 Emaleigh Doley. Good afternoon and
4 thank you for the opportunity to
5 speak. I am the Deputy Director of
6 Neighborhood Gardens Trust, and I'm
7 a proud resident of Germantown in
8 the 8th District, but I'm here
9 today to advocate for another
10 community and voice my support for
11 Resolution No. 250609 in District
12 3.

13 This bill involves the
14 transfer of land to Neighborhood
15 Gardens Trust for the permanent
16 preservation of Summer, Winter
17 Community Garden in Powelton
18 Village. This site is home to an
19 active, well-loved garden making an
20 impact and cultivating community in
21 Powelton and nearby Mantua and
22 Drexel University, all since 1976
23 which is older than me.

24 The land beneath this

2 well-loved garden was in jeopardy
3 of being lost to development, and
4 we want to thank and applaud
5 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier and
6 her office for working with the
7 community and NGT in navigating
8 this complicated land and
9 preservation process.

10 Protecting community
11 gardens is part of Neighborhood
12 Preservation, and we look forward
13 to working with all the other
14 members of City Council to preserve
15 longtime community gardens in your
16 districts. These are places where
17 people can grow food, flowers and
18 community, and they deserve our
19 protection and investment into the
20 future. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
23 afternoon.

24 MS. GRANT: Good

2 afternoon, Council. My name is
3 Seneca Grant, and I would like to
4 say thank you to Councilmembers for
5 hearing all of our testimonies
6 today, Madam Chair of the Housing
7 Committee for our hearing that we
8 had before, and especially the
9 honorable Nicolas O'Rourke, who was
10 our bill sponsor. Thank you, sir,
11 you are forever in our debt and we
12 will continue to have you in our
13 thoughts and prayers with your
14 family.

15 Again, my name is Seneca
16 Grant. I'm a resident of Bentley
17 Manor, an Odin property in West Oak
18 Lane. I've been living there since
19 November 2023. I'm a born and
20 raised Philadelphian and I'll bring
21 it here my entire life through my
22 family and myself.

23 Last November L&I came
24 and failed the two Odin Properties

2 in a cluster here, Mount West and
3 Bentley Manor, and marked my
4 building as unsafe. They failed
5 them for having the wrong kind of
6 fire doors and a lot of other
7 issues, including the bricks and
8 the facades, amongst other things,
9 like infestation. And that
10 inspection helped, but because they
11 started doing the work to make the
12 repairs, but what if the conditions
13 had been worse and the building
14 marked unsafe for human habitation?
15 Me, my neighbors would have nowhere
16 to go.

17 That is why I'm urging
18 you and pleading with you to vote
19 yes on Bill 250331, the Right to
20 Relocation, because renters need
21 this. It will set up an anti-
22 displacement to prevent
23 Philadelphians from losing housing
24 in their building if their building

2 is condemned. But a program needs
3 to be funded as well, which is why
4 we hope to see funding from the
5 Mayor's H.O.M.E. Plan for the anti-
6 displacement fund for renters as
7 well as the repair program.

8 Repair programs are to
9 prevent homeowners from being
10 displaced as well, repair programs
11 like Built to Last. Renters need
12 all three pieces of legislation
13 that we are a part of the Healthy
14 Homes Act, and we look to meet with
15 you guys again in November to
16 further these processes. Thank you
17 very much.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
19 Thank you.

20 DR. ALLEN: Good
21 morning. I am Dr. Gregory J.
22 Allen, President and CEO of
23 Overbrook West Neighbors, a
24 nonprofit community development

2 corporation founded in 2018 to
3 serve the Overbrook neighborhood in
4 which I grew up and currently live.

5 I want to share my
6 gratitude for all of City Council
7 and its work to support the mission
8 of Philadelphia's neighborhoods,
9 business corridors and CDCs, with
10 special appreciation for my 4th
11 District Councilmember Curtis Jones
12 Jr., Councilmember Jamie Gauthier
13 and Majority Leader Katherine
14 Gilmore Richardson.

15 Congratulations to the students and
16 staff of Overbrook High School who
17 were represented here today.

18 This morning I offer
19 public comment in support of the
20 budget bills for the Office of
21 Clean and Green Initiatives and the
22 Commerce Department. We have done
23 lots of quality-of-life issues in
24 Overbrook, naturally this means we

2 did lots of clean-ups, lots and
3 lots of clean-ups. And none of
4 this would have been possible
5 without the unwavering support of
6 Director Carroll Williams and his
7 team the Streets Department, now

10 Department Commissioner Karen
11 Fegley before and now they've
12 always come through for Overbrook,
13 our neighborhood streets, including
14 alleyways, driveways and business
15 corridors are cleaner than ever.
16 Finally, with their
17 support, the Lancaster Avenue
18 Business corridor is prepared to
19 develop strategic planning and
20 targeted investment from the City
21 and the Commonwealth of
22 Pennsylvania. It is for these
23 reasons and so many more I share my
24 unreserved support of the Office of

3 bills. With their continued

4 support, we will be able to

5 continue our mission of keeping

6 Overbrook safe, clean and

7 organized. Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

10 Thank you.

11 MS. BROWN: Good

12 morning. My name is Sherry Brown

13 and I'm here to oppose Bill 250631.

14 I have lived in Strawberry Mansion

15 for 69 years. And it is appalling

16 that out of the 57 units that Penn

17 Rose is scheduled to start

18 construction on in a one- to

19 two-block area, Councilman Young is

20 focused on one single pocket

21 stretch.

22 A couple months ago over

23 400 people came together at Wayland

24 Temple Baptist Church and testified

2 in favor of the rebuild project at
3 the Cecil B. Moore Library. At the
4 end of that meeting, Senator Street
5 and Representative Harris both
6 stood up and said that the people
7 had spoken. Yet, Councilman Young,
8 you swore to support and serve your
9 constituents, but have chosen to
10 continue to be disrespectful and
11 ignore us.

12 It has been one year
13 since rebuild was approved and that
14 the ribbon should have been cut at
15 the groundbreaking ceremony. It is
16 unknown how the federal tariffs
17 will affect the cost of materials
18 and constructions for this
19 renovation. But what we do know is
20 that we cannot afford to wait
21 another year or six months, or
22 Councilman Young, is this what you
23 are counting on or do you want the
24 money to run out?

2 Okay. We implore you to
3 sign the notice to proceed so that
4 the Administration can begin to
5 rebuild renovation by putting the
6 project to bid. It's time to do
7 the right thing, and we would like
8 for you to do the right thing right
9 now. Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. FREEMAN: Sierra
12 Freeman. Good morning,
13 Councilmembers. My name is Sierra
14 Freeman. I'm here as the lead
15 organizer for Brewerytown Sharswood
16 Neighborhood Coalition or BSNC
17 Philly or just BSNC, as a member
18 organization with Alliance for Just
19 Philadelphia, an advocate for the
20 work that the Citywide Friends Of
21 are doing, and I'm here to speak on
22 Bill No. 250196.

23 I also want to take a
24 moment to offer healing energy to

2 Traci Powell's family and healing
3 energy to Traci Powell as she
4 travels to the ancestral row. You
5 may be wondering why a member of a
6 neighborhood group is here making
7 testimony on behalf of the budget
8 and with neighborhood concerns.

9 Frankly, initially I
10 would be too. You see, all
11 neighborhoods are connected to
12 wards and all wards are connected
13 to a district. All districts are
14 connected to this entire city of
15 Philadelphia. My neighborhood, the
16 29th ward, 5th District, and the
17 City of Philadelphia needs your
18 help and support today with the
19 campaign to Save the Cecil B. Moore
20 Library.

21 We've done all that we
22 can to see that this library is
23 renovated immediately and becomes
24 the beautiful 21st Century third

2 space we know that it can be.

3 Amongst those things that we've

4 done include a town hall where

5 we've had nearly 400 people attend.

6 They also include a number of

7 different petitions and surveys and

8 canvassing that we've done.

9 Our first survey, 159

10 responses, 46 build a new library

11 if we have the money, 130 renovate

12 now. Survey No. 2, 80% Brewerytown

13 residents, 425 responses, 330

14 renovate now, 85 renovate now seek

15 more funding. Our after-town hall

16 survey, 59.1% live in the

17 neighborhoods that the library

18 serves, 52.7 live in 19121, the

19 same zip code as the library. 92.5

20 want to see the Rebuild project

21 begin ASAP.

22 So we are here asking

23 you, Councilman Young, to sign the

24 notice to proceed so that we can

2 move forward with the Cecil B.

3 Moore Library renovation. I also

4 want to say we need safe, healthy

5 homes. We need these large

6 corporations to pay BIRT taxes.

7 Thank you so much.

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: We have

12 Aurora Howell, Robert Vance. We

13 have Aurora Howell, Robert Vance,

14 Lynn Landes, Abraham Pardo, Jacob

15 Zychick. May Ogbonna Hagins,

16 Khalif Alexander, Robin Hynicka,

17 General Muti Ajamu-Osagboro and

18 Karen Abney make their way to the

19 podium.

20 (Witnesses approached

21 podium.)

22 MR. REYES PARDO: Shall

23 I proceed?

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Yes.

2 Please state your name for the
3 record and proceed with your
4 testimony.

5 MR. REYES PARDO: Hi.

6 Good afternoon. My name is Abraham
7 Reyes Pardo. I am the Vice-
8 President of Housing at the Urban
9 League of Philadelphia. I'm here
10 to commence in support of Bill
11 250568.

12 The bill doesn't only
13 allow for the continuity of housing
14 programs that serve very specific
15 and critical purposes, but it does
16 it in a very particular moment in
17 history. Private-sector led first-
18 time homebuyer programs are
19 disappearing. Tangled titles
20 continue to disproportionately
21 afflict the lives of Black and
22 Brown families. Naturally-
23 occurring affordable housing is
24 scarce. Housing insecurity due to

2 market speculation continues to
3 afflict the lives of many renters
4 and a housing stock that isn't
5 getting any younger.

6 I wish this process was
7 fueled by good intentions, but
8 without a sizable intentional
9 infuse of funding and the City
10 leading the path, thousands of
11 families will be at risk of being
12 either displaced or homeless.
13 Thank you.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 MR. ZYCHICK: Jacob
17 Zychick on behalf of the American
18 Heart Association. Thank you for
19 the opportunity to provide public
20 comment on the prevalence of
21 electronic cigarettes and youth
22 vaping in our city.

23 The American Heart
24 Association is deeply concerned

2 about the prevalence of e-cigarette

3 use by the kids of Philadelphia.

4 38% of youths have tried and 19

5 currently use vaping products.

6 Each year the tobacco industry

7 sells over \$300 million worth of

8 their deadly products in our city.

9 74% of e-cigarette sales

10 are flavored products, and research

11 has shown that most teens start

12 using these tobacco flavored

13 products. These products are

14 appealing to young people and many

15 mistakenly believe that they are

16 less harmful.

17 The American Heart

18 Association would like to reiterate

19 that there's no such thing as a

20 safe tobacco product. We would

21 like to thank Councilmember Ahmad

22 for championing these efforts in

23 Bill 250213. That would strengthen

24 penalties for retailers that sell

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 these harmful products to youth and
3 ensure that 50% of all those fines
4 collected would be allocated to
5 youth e-cigarette prevention and
6 education programs in our city.
7 Thank you, Councilmember Ahmad, and
8 thank you everyone in Philadelphia
9 City Council.

10 MR. HAGINS: Good
11 morning. Ogbonna Hagins, President
12 of Philadelphia Reparations
13 Coalition for American Freedmen.
14 As you consider the revised five-
15 year financial plan, let it be
16 known that while you find millions
17 for everything else in this city,
18 you've deliberately left the
19 American Freedmen out of your
20 budget and out of your
21 consciousness. The Reparations
22 Task Force is now default and its
23 silence speaks volumes.
24 Philadelphia wants nothing to do

1 6/12/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 with reparations. You create
3 agencies for every group but not
4 for the Descendants of the
5 Emancipated.

6 Even Juneteenth, now a
7 holiday, has been reduced to a
8 hollow performance with no
9 structural repair. Meanwhile, the
10 Philadelphia Reparations Coalition
11 for American Freedmen, my
12 organization, has been doing the
13 real agency work, educating,
14 organizing and uplifting the city's
15 Freedmen community for the past
16 three years with no support.

17 If you're passing a
18 financial plan, then include us,
19 the Philadelphia Reparations
20 Coalition for American Freedmen, at
21 the very least, subsidize the work
22 we are already doing on your
23 behalf. And I don't appreciate the
24 person who introduced this task

2 force when I speak, she walks out,
3 Gauthier. Ogbonna Hagins. Over
4 and out.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you for your testimony.

8 MR. ALEXANDER: So good
9 morning, everyone. My name is
10 Khalif Alexander. I am here as an
11 organizer for Juneteenth. I
12 decided to speak about the City of
13 Philadelphia's five-year plan. And
14 I looked at the plan and I believe
15 that there needs to be additional
16 revisions.

17 One of those revisions
18 is this, we're looking at the lack
19 of adequate funding to specifically
20 harm communities. That harmed
21 community is Black Americans or, as
22 my buddy just previously stated,
23 the Emancipated, the descendants,
24 the Freedmen.

2 Now, when we're looking
3 at that, right, we're discussing
4 housing today. I seen a fellow
5 from a community development
6 corporation. And one of the things
7 that we proposed over a year and
8 some is the development of an
9 Office for Freedmen Affairs that
10 focuses on these initiatives,
11 housing. It focuses on a
12 genealogy. It focuses on community
13 development.

14 But you know one thing
15 that we haven't talked about
16 Juneteenth. There's organizations
17 receiving lots of funding for
18 Juneteenth and they are a
19 historically Juneteenth
20 organization like mine. My
21 organization has been around for
22 six or seven years and we're
23 looking at the lack of adequate
24 funding.

2 Well, if we had this

3 office, then we would have proper

4 funding to grassroots Juneteenth

5 organizations who do community-

6 based work to enhance the spirit.

7 What do you call that? You call

8 that a cultural celebration. You

9 call that lineage specificity. You

10 call that cooperative economics.

11 These are the things that we focus

12 on. So I thank you and hope you

13 all have a good day.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have

18 Robin Hynicka, General Muti Ajamu-

19 Osagboro, Karen Abney. May Aliya

20 Chandy, Abiya Thomas, Dawud Bey,

21 Linnea Bond and Teresa Howell also

22 make their way to the podium.

23 (Witnesses approached

24 podium.)

2 PASTOR HYNICKA:

3 Councilmember Bass and
4 Councilmembers, thank you for this
5 opportunity to speak. I speak
6 against Bill 250199. My name is
7 Robin Hynicka. I'm the Pastor of
8 the Arch Street United Methodist
9 Church in the 1st District where
10 Councilman Squilla is our District
11 person, but 32-year resident of the
12 great Council District, 7th Council
13 District where Councilmember Lozada
14 is our Councilperson.

15 I live on the 4200 block
16 of Paul Street in the Frankford
17 neighborhood. My own property
18 taxes went from \$900 to \$3,000 in
19 this latest round. While I have
20 the privilege to be able to pay
21 that, many of my neighbors do not.
22 I am severely concerned about them,
23 but today I stand also as a member
24 of POWER Interfaith speaking in

2 relationship to the business tax
3 reduction.
4 Ask these questions
5 before you vote. What if the first
6 test of any economic policy were
7 this. Does it reduce poverty and
8 create racial equity? What happens
9 when we invest in tax cuts for
10 corporations and businesses rather
11 than investing in schools,
12 libraries, affordable housing and
13 the untapped genius of youth? Can
14 a city truly flourish if a quarter
15 of its people remain cut off from
16 economic opportunity? And then why
17 repeat tax strategies that after 20
18 years have failed to lift our
19 neighbors out of poverty? And
20 whose future are we really funding
21 when over 80% of the jobs that
22 these tax cuts purport to create
23 will go to folks outside of the
24 city or newcomers, not our

2 underserved, underemployed and
3 unemployed neighbors. Thank you
4 very much.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you for your testimony.

8 MR. AJAMU-OSAGBORO: Let
9 him cook, let him cook. And the
10 church say Amen. I'm here to -- my
11 name is General Muti Ajamu
12 Osagboro. General is my title,
13 Muti Ajamu-Osagboro is my name.
14 I'm here to oppose 250528, not so
15 much on the merits as once again,
16 the language.

17 The language is just
18 cryptic. The average Jane and John
19 Q Public cannot read it. They
20 don't know what's going on in the
21 city and they need to know what's
22 going on, because it has to do with
23 our future, the fiscal budget. And
24 it's talking about what we're going

2 to do in the future all the way up
3 to 2031. So I think this is
4 extremely important.

5 I found this sign --
6 even though I'm from the great
7 state of North Philadelphia, city
8 of Richard Allen, I actually live
9 in Germantown now. And this sign I
10 found on the ground -- on the
11 fence, taped to the fence. And it
12 says, Notice, pesticide
13 application.

14 Do you know what Roundup
15 is, Councilwoman bass?

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
17 Absolutely.

18 MR. AJAMU-OSAGBORO:
19 Okay. Well, in our community in
20 Germantown they're spraying the
21 foliage with Roundup, which is a
22 cancer-causing agent. Why is the
23 City of Philadelphia, why is the
24 Mayor's office allowing them to

2 spray cancer-causing agents on our
3 foliage where we have to live and
4 breathe and our children play and
5 our animals walk? That's going to
6 create cancer clusters. Those
7 people, which are predominantly
8 Black and Brown neighborhoods, are
9 going to get cancer, are going to
10 have to pay the hospital bills,
11 then going to die and then the
12 developer is going to come in and
13 take their homes. This is about
14 gentrification. And so, this is
15 nonsense. This is genocide. I
16 want to thank you for your time and
17 we have to do something about this.
18 We have to stop this immediately.
19 Thank you very much and you have an
20 absolutely magnificent day.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So I
22 do want to state for the record
23 that in 2020, Council, my office we
24 introduced the HOPS bill to stop

23 Chandy, a City College for

21 MS. HOWELL: I first
22 want to say thank you to the
23 Housing Committee. We appreciate
24 your consideration of all the bills

5 commitment to funding proactive

7 We're here today to make

10 that it is fully funded through the
11 Mayor's H.O.M.E. Plan so that it is
12 not just an empty promise. Please
13 remember these are people like us
14 who are disabled, low income, that
15 are being taken advantage of by
16 these egregious corporate
17 landlords.

18 Yes, we're renters but
19 we want safe, healthy homes just
20 like I'm sure everyone in City
21 Council has. Yes, we're renters
22 but we want to build community too,
23 and we want to be treated like you
24 would treat your own family. And

3 will you help us.

4 We hope you pass this
5 Right to Relocation bill today and
6 that you pass and fully fund all of

14 CHIEF CLERK: We have
15 Dawud Bey, Linnea Bond. May Sam
16 Lew, Jasmine Henderson, Harvey
17 Hirdle, Trina Benjamin, Asya
18 Richardson and Vaniah Foat also
19 make their way to the podium.

20 (Witnesses approached
21 podium.)

22 MS. BOND: Hi. My name
23 is Linnea Bond. It's okay.

24 Everyone says it wrong. I was here

2 the other day to hear Isaiah Thomas
3 emphasize we're in the middle of so
4 many crises, SEPTA, housing,
5 violence. Why are we then cutting
6 taxes for big businesses that can
7 most afford to pay for the basic

9 Specifically, I agree
10 with the many people who have
11 reminded us that repairs of old
12 housing stock are essential, which
13 is why I'm worried that the \$800
14 million H.O.M.E. Initiative doesn't
15 provide enough funding for repairs
16 for the people who most need it.

17 In addition, we need the
18 three bills in the Safe Healthy
19 Homes Act. It was heartbreaking to
20 see only one move forward last
21 week. I'm a renter lucky with a
22 great landlord, but I live next
23 door to a landlord with multiple
24 violations. No one should live in

2 those conditions. But it should
3 also be mentioned that no one, no
4 homeowner, landlord or renter wants
5 to share a wall with a landlord who
6 has mold and illegal furnace and

10 us.

12 MR. BEY: My name is
13 Dawud Bey. Good afternoon. First
14 and foremost, I want to thank the
15 members of the Philadelphia City
16 Council for your tireless work and
17 dedication to moving this city
18 forward, especially thank you to
19 Council President Kenyatta Johnson
20 for his leadership and his deep
21 commitment to the communities we
22 all serve.

23 I also want to recognize
24 each and every Councilmember for

20 resources and lives and rebuilding
21 this city from the ground up.

22 I am proud to be doing
23 that work through the Fine Print
24 Construction and the Dawud Bey

17 in premium, unprocessed, chemical-
18 free Indian hair.

19 I want to begin and
20 express my heartfelt thanks to
21 Mayor Parker for your bold vision
22 and unwavering commitment to making
23 Philadelphia the safest, cleanest,
24 greenest big city in America with

20 opposition to this proposed budget

21 which is an attack on working-class

23 In 2015 the jail budget

24 was \$240 million with 8000 people

3 population has dropped by more than
4 half to 1300, yet the budget has
5 increased by nearly 30%. Why are
6 we still pouring money into the
7 jails, a place where pregnant moms

9 21-year-old Rashawn Chambers died
10 because he did not get insulin and
11 where incarcerated people are paid
12 just \$2 a day to run this jail.

13 Instead we need life-
14 saving services like healthy homes
15 and mobile crisis. Mobile crisis
16 teams are not fully funded and
17 never have been. People in mental
18 health crises are left waiting for
19 an hour or more. Teams like this
20 could have saved Aaron Rainey, a
21 36-year-old father who voluntarily
22 agreed to seek treatment. Instead
23 he was killed by the police. That
24 is unconscionable. And now, you're

3 Squilla's Bill 25027300 {sic} on

6 installs algorithmic surveillance

11 freedom. I oppose this budget. I

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I

24 would. If we could do a moment of

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: Okay. The Chair

5 recognizes Councilmember Cindy Bass

6 for a motion. I'll ask everybody

7 to stand for a moment of silence

8 vote on this resolution.

9 (Standing moment of
10 silence vote.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

12 JOHNSON: The resolution has been

13 passed.

14 Will the Chief Clerk
15 please read the title of the next
16 resolution.

17 CHIEF CLERK: A
18 privileged resolution thanking
19 Philadelphia Eagles owner Jeffrey
20 Lurie and his family for their
21 generous \$50 million donation to
22 the Children's Hospital of
23 Philadelphia and Penn Medicine to
24 establish the Lurie Autism

2 Institute, an organization centered
3 on accelerating autism research.
4 Introduced by Councilmember Ahmad
5 on behalf of Council President
6 Johnson.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad for a
10 motion on a resolution.

11 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

12 Thank you, Council President. I
13 move for the adoption of the
14 resolution on your behalf.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: It has been moved and
18 properly seconded that the
19 resolution be adopted.

20 All those in favor
21 signify by saying aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
5 resolution is adopted.

6 Will the Chief Clerk
7 please read the title of the next
8 resolution.

9 CHIEF CLERK: There are
10 no further resolutions in my
11 possession, Council President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

14 Are there any speeches
15 on behalf of the Minority?

16 Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Kendra Brooks.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

19 Thank you, Council President.

20 I want to express my
21 disappointment in the 2026 budget
22 and explain why I'm voting no
23 today. I voted no on the tax bills
24 today because this plan

2 overwhelmingly benefits large
3 corporations. And in the first
4 month of this Trump Admini --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Member Brooks, one
7 second.

8 Could we keep it down
9 because I don't think members can
10 hear the member's remarks.

11 Chair recognizes
12 Councilmember Kendra Brooks.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

14 Thank you. In the first six months
15 of this Trump Administration, we
16 have already seen cuts that have
17 directly caused Philadelphians to
18 lose their livelihood. In the
19 coming year, we expect devastating
20 cuts to SNAP. Medicaid and other
21 federally-funded programs that
22 working families rely on.

23 The budget that we are
24 voting on today is largely

2 unchanged from the Mayor's
3 proposal. City services are flat-
4 funded or cut, at a time when we
5 need them the most. Across the
6 country and included in Harrisburg,
7 legislators worry about Trump's
8 cuts or increasing state and local
9 funding for services and
10 identifying new revenue sources,
11 not this budget.

12 However, this budget
13 reflects a significant shift in the
14 City's Council power to advocate
15 for the resources of our
16 constituents. Numerous nonprofits
17 my office has helped fund in the
18 past have been left in the dark on
19 both process and funding.

20 City Council took a
21 major step forward in last year's
22 budget with the first ever direct
23 funding for Planned Parenthood and
24 continued funding for Abortion

2 Liberation Fund. Now, at the same
3 time Congressional Republicans are
4 set to slash funding for Planned
5 Parenthood nationwide. The city
6 funding for our local chapter of
7 Planned Parenthood has disappeared.

8 We also know that our
9 young people are at risk. The
10 School District is projecting a
11 large budget shortfall and school
12 closures. Multiple Councilmembers
13 and parents across Black and Brown
14 neighborhoods advocated for these
15 increases in millage rate in order
16 to boost public school funding.

17 Instead this budget sets
18 up our schools for major cuts in
19 the coming years. For this reason,
20 I cannot support this budget. I
21 made a promise to protect
22 Philadelphians this budget cycle.
23 And I'm sorry to say that this
24 budget doesn't do it for me. Thank

2 you so much.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member Brooks.

6 Speeches on behalf of
7 the Majority.

8 Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
10 Richardson.

11 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

12 RICHARDSON: Thank you. Thank you,
13 Council President. And I want to
14 thank you very much for your
15 leadership throughout the spring
16 session and for all the hard work
17 and the late nights. We appreciate
18 you and all that you do for us
19 throughout the budget process so
20 that we can get to this space in
21 place.

22 I also wanted to wish
23 you, Council President, and all of
24 the fathers on City Council a Happy

2 Father's Day in advance. That is
3 specifically for Councilmember
4 Curtis Jones, Jr. Each year we
5 will be celebrating and uplifting
6 each of you because we appreciate
7 all that you do for our children.
8 It's not just the moms getting the
9 job done. It's the dads too. So
10 Happy Father's Day in advance.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

12 JOHNSON: Thank you for that.

13 Chair recognizes
14 Councilmember Curtis Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
16 you, Mr. President.

17 But thank you, Kathy
18 Gilmore Richardson. Fathers
19 understand what I'm about to say.
20 It's your mother, it's your mother,
21 it's your mother, and then maybe
22 it's your father. And we get it
23 because they are our backbone.

24 I want to shift and kind

2 of echo what you just said about
3 your leadership, sir. I don't say
4 things I don't mean. You know me.
5 You piloted this budget process
6 masterfully. I know my good friend
7 and colleague, she knows how I feel
8 about her professionally, but I'm a
9 push back gently.

10 Sometimes you got to
11 look at the glass half full, not
12 just half empty. I listened to the
13 advocates that came. I heard
14 cheers. I heard jeers. Some
15 things you like in the budget, some
16 things you don't. Some things you
17 fight about, some things you win,
18 some things you lose. But the
19 process of making this budget is
20 not easy and it is not perfect, but
21 the imperfect shouldn't be the
22 enemy of the good.

23 I've been here a minute,
24 only second to Old Man River

2 O'Neill, but I have never heard a
3 Mayor put this much emphasis on
4 affordable housing. And I know
5 that this is a historic commitment
6 to that process.

7 Is it perfect? No. I
8 red-circled some of the things that
9 I had question about. But the good
10 should not be the enemy of the
11 imperfect. I said that
12 differently, but you know what I
13 mean.

14 I watched my colleagues
15 struggle with this budget. I've
16 seen colleagues, who will go
17 unnamed, come in here at 1:00 in
18 the morning, flailing their hands
19 in frustration because we should
20 have probably been let go earlier,
21 but the process of making that
22 sausage was difficult.

23 I watched one of my
24 colleagues come in here, throw his

2 hands up -- did I say his -- throw
3 his hands up and say, I give up on
4 this, I've been fighting this all
5 by myself, right, but here we are,
6 sir. And I am saying to you that
7 some of the things that you got to
8 think about on the cuts to business
9 taxes -- Brother Troy ain't here
10 from WURD, got laid off.

11 Businesses, small
12 businesses are a part of the
13 infrastructure of our economy too.
14 And the issues and pushback I get
15 often doesn't come from the mighty
16 Chambers of Commerce. They come
17 from the mom-and-pop business
18 owners that have been catching hell
19 since the pandemic. There are
20 commercial corridors that you and I
21 represent that took an L during
22 those downturns, during the civil
23 unrest that ain't never came back,
24 and may never come back. And if we

2 don't start giving them a break
3 too, there'll be more Troys that we
4 lay off.

5 So I say this to you,
6 that all of you look a little
7 tired, a little wore out. But
8 that's all right, you earned this
9 title. And for the benefit of the
10 people, I thank you, Mr. President,
11 I thank my Mayor for going through
12 this and I thank this body for
13 voting out a budget and closing.

14 The uncertainty at the
15 federal government means that we
16 can't be against -- like you may
17 not have messed with this person,
18 that person before, but we're all
19 in the Philadelphia foxhole
20 together right now. And we got to
21 kind of pull ourselves together and
22 say, I'm going to hold my nose on
23 this vote and I'm going to go with
24 it for the benefit of the whole of

2 Philadelphia.

3 And I thank you,
4 Mr. President, I thank our Mayor,
5 and I thank this Council for doing
6 their level best to protect the
7 citizens of Philadelphia. Thank
8 y'all and have a great, great
9 break.

11 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member Jones,
12 those kind remarks.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilmember Rue Landau.

15 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

16 Thank you, Council President.

17 As we close out this
18 spring session, I'd like to thank
19 our incredible interns for all
20 their hard work. I think my
21 interns might not still be here,
22 but if Jasmine, Ali and Andrea are
23 still here -- oh, right there.
24 Please stand if you're here.

3 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

4 They've all been instrumental in
5 planning policies, helping
6 constituents and serving the city.

7 Thank you guys so much. It's been
8 so wonderful to have you guys.

9 I'd also like to
10 recognize the final passage of my
11 Move-In Affordability Plan today.
12 Having worked as a housing lawyer
13 for decades, I know that the
14 upfront cost of moving can be the
15 difference between staying put and
16 giving yourself a fresh start,
17 whether they be aging seniors,
18 low-income families trying to
19 improve their living situations or
20 people leaving unsafe housing or a
21 young person looking to move to
22 Philly.

23 I'm incredibly proud of
24 this legislation that move-in costs

2 won't be as expensive a burden, and
3 I appreciate all of the
4 conversations I've had with
5 colleagues and advocates to get
6 this done.

7 It's Pride Month. It's
8 still Pride Month. And today I
9 want to say I'm thankful for all my
10 colleagues here for supporting two
11 resolutions today, recognizing
12 local and national LGBTQ+ leaders.

13 First, my dear friend
14 Harvey Hurdle, who's retiring from
15 his position as Executive Director
16 of the Bar Association but who has
17 worked deeply within larger
18 institutions promoting LGBTQ
19 rights. Harvey has been a mentor
20 of mine and has been very helpful
21 for me to understand how the larger
22 institutions support our work.

23 Because we didn't have
24 speeches last week, I want to give

2 a shout-out to Chris Bartlett who I
3 recognized last week. Chris has
4 been super supportive and helpful
5 for me as a mentor, in teaching me
6 so much at an early age about
7 speaking truth to power, being an
8 activist, fighting the fight, from
9 screaming in a megaphone to back in
10 the early '90s caring for our
11 siblings who were dying of AIDS.
12 Chris literally taught me how to
13 hug people in the hospital and kiss
14 them lightly on the head as we said
15 goodbye.
16 I gave a resolution
17 today recognizing the 10-year
18 anniversary of the landmark
19 Obergefell case, which celebrates
20 10 years of same sex marriage in
21 this country. My wife Carrie and I
22 became the first couple in
23 Pennsylvania to get a same sex
24 marriage license.

3 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

4 And earlier this month I had the
5 absolute joy and pleasure of
6 finally meeting Jim Obergefell in
7 Washington, D.C. He's a wonderful
8 man. As lovely and wonderful as
9 these things are, we have to
10 recognize how Pride this year feels
11 different. There's a dark cloud
12 hanging over it, a rising tide of
13 hatred that is not just alarming,
14 but deadly.

15 Verbal assaults,
16 physical violence and political
17 attacks against LGBTQ+ people are
18 escalating across the country and
19 at every level of government.
20 Donald Trump's GOP is fueling it,
21 dismantling rights, inciting fear
22 and targeting our very existence.

23 Incidents have already
24 been on the rise in Philadelphia as

2 well and we are witnessing this
3 disturbing trend. According to
4 GLAD since May of last year, there
5 have been 932 violent anti-LGBTQ+
6 incidents in the United States, an
7 average of 2.5 every single day.

8 Over half of them have
9 specifically targeted transgender
10 and gender non-conforming people
11 with a disproportionate impact on
12 people of color. This violence
13 doesn't happen in a vacuum. It
14 grows in the shadow of hate speech,
15 of state-sanctioned discrimination,
16 of leaders who use platforms to
17 dehumanize us. And when the most
18 powerful man in the world demonizes
19 LGBTQ+ people, this is a result:
20 broken families, stolen futures,
21 empty seats at the table.

22 As we close out the
23 spring session, I ask that my
24 colleagues in City Council and

2 everyone in this chamber think
3 about this: Honor the LGBTQ lives
4 that are lost to violence and
5 hatred and let us recommit not just
6 to celebrating Pride, but to
7 defending our community with every
8 tool that we have.

9 Thank you, Council
10 President. Everybody have a great
11 break.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: Thank you.

15 Chair recognizes
16 Councilmember Mike Driscoll.

17 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

18 Thank you, Mr. President. And
19 thank you leadership team. Thank
20 you colleagues for all your hard
21 work these last several months.
22 These budgets aren't easy, but I
23 think we did a good job
24 collectively today. And just want

2 to highlight a couple things,
3 Mr. President.

4 I was proud to introduce
5 and champion the legislation that
6 gives the City Controller's office
7 fiscal oversight of the Mayor's
8 \$800 million H.O.M.E. Plan. This
9 plan represents a historic
10 investment in affordable housing,
11 and with that comes a
12 responsibility to ensure that every
13 dollar is spent wisely, fairly and
14 transparently.

15 Oversight isn't about
16 slowing down progress. It's about
17 building public trust, protecting
18 taxpayer resources and ensuring
19 that the housing crisis is
20 addressed with both urgency and
21 integrity.

22 I want to thank the
23 Controller's office for stepping up
24 to serve as an independent watchdog

2 and for their partnership in
3 safeguarding this once-
4 in-a-generation investment. This
5 legislation is about accountability
6 and about delivering real results
7 in every neighborhood, including my
8 home, Northeast Philadelphia.

9 And secondly,
10 Mr. President, I want to thank you
11 for introducing the Philadelphia
12 Retirement Savings Program, an
13 important step towards economic
14 dignity for working people in our
15 city. This bill creates an
16 automatic savings program for
17 employees who don't have access to
18 retirement plans through their
19 jobs, particularly small businesses
20 or part-time positions.

21 With this program,
22 Philadelphia is filling a gap,
23 offering a pathway to long-term
24 financial security for workers who

2 too often have been left behind.

3 And I'm proud to support a measure

4 that empowers people to build

5 wealth over time, reduces reliance

6 on public assistance in the future

7 and strengthens our city's economic

8 foundation. This is a smart,

9 compassionate policy, and I thank

10 you, President Johnson.

11 Whether we're talking

12 about affordable housing, public

13 safety or retirement security for

14 working people, we're making long-

15 term investments to strengthen the

16 fabric of our city. I'm grateful

17 to have played a role in advancing

18 those priorities, and I look

19 forward to continuing the work

20 ahead.

21 Thank you,

22 Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: You're welcome. Thank

3 Chair recognizes

4 Councilman Jeffrey Jay Young.

5 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
6 you, Mr. President.

7 I'm very grateful for
8 your resolution honoring Traci
9 Powell. She was a friend of mine,
10 supporter of mine, a colleague of
11 mine. Every word that was
12 mentioned about her today was
13 absolutely true. From the moment I
14 met her years ago when I first
15 started working in this space,
16 until our last conversation, It's
17 always been the same. She's always
18 been that same person. So thank
19 you for honoring her.

20 Thank you for honoring
21 Miskeen. That took me back to when
22 I was a young boy here in the city.
23 That's what we wore. That's what
24 we, you know, that was the style.

2 The artwork was so unique. It was
3 so Philly. And so, thank you for
4 that. We need that. We need stuff
5 that make us Philadelphians stand
6 out as Philadelphia.

7 Also, I want to kind of
8 echo some of the sentiments of my
9 colleague Councilman Curtis Jones.
10 When it comes to this budget and
11 the Mayor's H.O.M.E. plan, you
12 know, you look at it, you circle
13 some things. But at the end of the
14 day when you look at what this bill
15 will do for our city, there are
16 more positives that come out of
17 this bill. And with the help of
18 Councilmember Driscoll introducing
19 legislation to provide the
20 oversight to make sure there's
21 transparency, I do think that as a
22 Council we'll be able to work with
23 the Administration on ensuring that
24 these goals can implement it to the

2 benefit and the interest of the
3 city of Philadelphia.

4 And lastly today,
5 Mr. President, there were some
6 folks in the chambers who mentioned
7 some statements about a library in
8 our District, the Cecil B. Moore
9 Library. And I want to be very
10 clear with the listening public to
11 really understand what is happening
12 here.

13 So we all know that
14 there are issues with libraries
15 throughout our entire city.
16 Deferred maintenance has been -- I
17 wouldn't even call it deferred.
18 It's been 20, 30 years since some
19 of our libraries had any type of
20 maintenance done to it.

21 And so, one of the very
22 first things I did when I came up
23 on this body is advocate for more
24 funding for our Cecil B. Moore

1 6/12/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Library. And with the support of
3 this body, we achieved that. There
4 was only about \$5 million allocated
5 to Cecil B. Moore Library. We
6 fought to get an additional \$5
7 million allocated for the Cecil B.
8 Moore Library, and we're going to
9 continue to keep fighting to get
10 more money for the Cecil B. Moore
11 Library.

12 But, yes, I have big
13 dreams. I have big dreams for my
14 District. And why would I be
15 serving if I didn't, right. Why
16 are we serving if you do not have
17 big dreams for your constituents.

18 We have a youth gun
19 violence issue in this city. There
20 is a surge in gun violence in terms
21 of perpetrators and victims amongst
22 the youth in our city. So if
23 you're upset that I'm fighting for
24 more money for our library because

2 I'd like to see a true 21st century
3 library that has the space, that
4 has the physical space that our
5 teens could use in order to help
6 prevent some of these tragedies
7 that happen with gun violence, a
8 teen can get a gun just as easy as
9 they can take out a book in the
10 city. That is true.

11 A study found that for
12 14-year-old Black males, there is a
13 1 in 8 chance that you will be shot
14 and/or killed by a firearm by the
15 time you're 25 years old. Compare
16 that same age range for
17 non-Hispanic White males, there's a
18 1% chance, 1 out of 100 chance
19 you'll be shot and/or killed by a
20 firearm by the age of 25.

21 And so, you look in the
22 area they were talking about, the
23 19121 zip code, the area that I was
24 raised in, right, those are the

1 6/12/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 young people who are more likely
3 than not to be shot in or killed by
4 gun violence. So why aren't we
5 creating spaces that's going to put
6 positive things into the hands of
7 our young people.

8 Let's talk about space.

9 Yes, there are proposed renovations
10 for the Cecil B. Moore Library.

11 But the staff room in the basement
12 is proposed to be about 306 square
13 feet. There's a work room, that's
14 proposed to be about 445 square
15 feet. And the teen space is only
16 400 square feet.

17 How many teenagers can
18 fit in 400 square feet of space in
19 one of the most violent and
20 dangerous districts in the city of
21 Philadelphia? How many? We need
22 more space. We need a new library,
23 a brand new library that can host
24 things like e-gaming, right.

2 Because they've told us already,
3 Councilman Thomas, they prefer to
4 be in libraries, right, to host
5 these types of things. That's what
6 we mean when we say 21st century
7 library.

8 Where's the space for
9 social media for these kids, right.
10 There's no space there. You cannot
11 do that in 400 square feet. You
12 cannot. It's impossible. So all
13 these folks who were here
14 advocating talking about I'm this,
15 that and the other with developers
16 and all that, come see me.
17 Because, listen, I'm always going
18 to be fighting for our kids,
19 always.

20 We have to think about
21 the next generation. Stop thinking
22 about ourselves. Think about these
23 kids. Over 1500 juvenile gun
24 arrests in the past three years,

2 Mr. President, right. What are we
3 doing? So I will continue to
4 advocate and fight for the youth of
5 my Council District, our Council
6 District, the 5th Council District,
7 North Philadelphia, because those
8 are the youth that always end up as
9 a statistic. We're trying to
10 change that image.

11 We can't change it with
12 these outdated infrastructure.
13 It's impossible. It's impossible.
14 Those who know may not know at some
15 point in time there was the Free
16 Library Foundation and then a Free
17 Library Philadelphia. The Free
18 Library Foundation used to fund a
19 lot of stuff in our libraries.
20 That's no more. That money don't
21 exist. It's not there anymore.
22 It's not the same.

23 We have to figure this
24 out. So I'm going to continue to

1 6/12/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 fight for more funding for our
3 libraries to continue to make sure
4 that we have new facilities for our
5 kids. That library was built in
6 1961, '62, so that means a 70-year-
7 old today used to use that library.

8 Why should a 7-year-old
9 today use the same library that a
10 70-year-old used to use?

11 Technology moves so fast.

12 Everything is so much different
13 now. This is a whole different
14 world. We need new spaces. And
15 I'm going to continue to fight for
16 new spaces for our babies, because
17 that's what they are. These
18 teenagers are our babies and they
19 need space to be teenagers so they
20 can stop being out here acting like
21 adults. They need spaces to be
22 kids. And we have to keep fighting
23 for spaces for them to be kids.

24 And if you disagree, you

2 disagree. But I'm always going to
3 be out here fighting to make sure
4 that our kids have spaces to be
5 kids, because I can't take 1500
6 kids getting arrested with guns.
7 The surge of kids getting arrested,
8 the surge of kids getting killed, I
9 mean, I've already talked about
10 going to a Janazah this year alone.

11 Last year I went to a
12 couple of them for teenagers. This
13 is a problem and we should not
14 normalize this. And if you're
15 upset that I'm trying to get more
16 for our kids, that tells me
17 something about you. Who are you
18 in it for? Are you in it for our
19 kids because I don't think so.

20 I'm going to continue to
21 leave my District with integrity,
22 Mr. President, and my constituents
23 know how to hold me accountable.
24 Thank you so much.

3 JOHNSON: You're welcome, Member
4 Young, and keep fighting the good
5 fight for your constituents.

6 As there are no more
7 speeches, first, I want to say
8 Happy Father's Day to all of the
9 fathers. And most importantly, I
10 want to thank each and every last
11 one of you for your hard work and
12 your dedication as it relates to
13 moving the City of Philadelphia
14 forward.

15 And leadership is not
16 new to me. I recognize in this
17 process that as we work toward
18 moving the City of Philadelphia
19 forward, we're always not going to
20 agree. But I always know that we
21 have a common mission, each and
22 every last single one of you,
23 including myself, on how we move

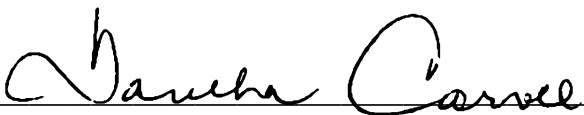
