2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started now.
4 We had a couple of issues we had to
5 resolve. Thank you very much for being
6 here today.

7 I note that the hour has come,
8 that we have a quorum present, and we
9 will now come to order.

10 Just real quickly, I'd like to
11 ask if anyone has an electronic device,
12 be it a phone or any other type of device
13 that makes noise, if you can please turn
14 it off now or turn it on silent, we
15 really would appreciate that.

16 To give our invocation this
17 morning, the Chair recognizes Rabbi
18 Yochonon of the B'Nai Abraham Chabad. He
19 is here today as the guest of Councilman
20 Squilla.

21 I would ask all members and
22 guests to please rise.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 rise.)

25 RABBI GOLDMAN: Almighty God,

2 master of the universe, the members of
3 this august body, the City Council,
4 convene here to fulfill one of the seven
5 commandments, which you first issued to
6 Adam at the time of this creation
7 5783 years ago and then reissued to Noah
8 and his sons after the Great Flood, the
9 commandment to govern by just laws.

10 At the dawn of civilization, as
11 related in the biblical book of Genesis,
12 you issued the following seven values as
13 a divine code for human conduct, which
14 came to be known as the Noahide laws.
15 They form a framework for universal
16 morality, safety, peace, stability, and
17 unity, enabling us to share our beautiful
18 planet.

19 One, belief in a single God who
20 created the universe, conducts its
21 affairs, and is intimately invested in
22 our lives, an almighty God who loves us,
23 watches our behavior, scrutinizes our
24 hearts, and rewards goodness, to worship
25 you alone and not to serve idols.

2 Two, words are powerful and
3 should be used carefully, never to
4 profane or blasphemy your holy name.

5 Three, not to murder. As our
6 city deals with the crisis of gun
7 violence, we affirm our belief in the
8 sanctity of human life as a
9 non-negotiable value. Each human being
10 is an entire world. Taking a life goes
11 against the very purpose of our
12 existence.

13 Four, theft is a violation of
14 the boundaries that are integral to human
15 relationships, respecting our fellow
16 citizens and integrity of their property,
17 not to steal, lie, or cheat.

18 Five, respecting the family
19 unit as a sacred, divine gift that must
20 be enshrined and cherished, not violated,
21 not to commit adultery, incest, or any
22 other aberration of our intimate family
23 relationships.

24 Six, we are God's
25 representatives to care for the world and

2 its creations. We are responsible for
3 the welfare of animals and are commanded
4 not to be cruel to any living creature.

5 Finally, seven, the only way to
6 address injustice is to establish an
7 ethical and unbiased judicial system.

8 Every society should govern by
9 just laws which are based on the
10 recognition and acknowledgment of you,
11 God, as the sovereign ruler of all people
12 and nations. The responsibility of this
13 City Council is thus critical to the
14 function of our society.

15 We, the citizens of this
16 blessed City of Philadelphia, the City of
17 Brotherly Love, proudly proclaim this
18 recognition and our commitment to justice
19 in our nation's Pledge of Allegiance, one
20 nation under God, with liberty and
21 justice for all.

22 Those assembled here to enact
23 laws that govern this blessed city are
24 elevated in our society to preserve and
25 safeguard democracy and freedom in our

2 daily lives, thereby enhancing our divine
3 service to the ultimate lawmaker and law
4 enforcer, the creator of the universe.
5 Grant us, almighty God, that they be
6 cognizant of your presence and conduct
7 their deliberations accordingly.

8 Bless the esteemed members of
9 this Council with good health, wisdom,
10 compassion, good cheer, good fellowship,
11 and added security in these challenging
12 times. May they constantly realize that
13 in laboring for the enactment of just
14 laws, they are doing your will.

15 May God bless America, and let
16 us say amen.

2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. We introduced an
4 amendment today to our bill dealing with
5 steep slope legislation.

6 What we have been doing, which
7 I promised Councilwoman Gilmore
8 Richardson to do, is begin a series of
9 meetings with constituents from as far
10 away as Eastwick and to the neighbors of
11 the golf course, such as Overbrook Park
12 Civic and others, and in so doing, we've
13 been addressing some of the concerns
14 about exempting that golf course from
15 steep slopes. What we want to do is
16 limit the exemption and clarify that they
17 cannot build impervious surfaces on that
18 slope.

19 So what we're doing is -- it is
20 not today -- we are looking at being able
21 to have that dialogue between now and
22 next week to come up with further
23 compromises and understandings.

24 I think communication is key.
25 Some of my members have raised these

2 issues with me, and we are listening and
3 it is not falling on deaf ears.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 designations of certain areas of land
22 located within an area bounded by
23 Parkside Avenue, 49th Street, Jefferson
24 Street, and 48th Street (extended),"
25 respectfully reports it has considered

25 Those opposed?

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 Before we move into our public
8 comment, I just want to make an
9 announcement. We have a provision that
10 I'll read shortly in our rules that
11 allows us to limit the number of
12 repetitious comment. Today we will have
13 to enact that rule. We have a
14 significant number of individuals that
15 are here to testify on the aforementioned
16 golf course in Overbrook. Frankly
17 speaking, way too many on the same
18 subject matter.

19 So we are going to select a
20 number of individuals that are in support
21 of and are in opposition of. What I will
22 do to try and be fair is to read the
23 names of the individuals that were listed
24 to testify who will not be speaking.

25 I just want to say is that okay

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, sir.

6 All right. And also if there
7 is anyone whose name is not called to
8 testify that has signed up, if you have
9 written testimony, please submit your
10 written testimony. It will be placed as
11 a matter of record in the record for
12 today's Council session.

13 And as indicated earlier by the
14 sponsor of that bill, the bill will not
15 be called up for a vote today. There
16 will be several amendments and several
17 more community meetings to discuss the
18 issue before final passage.

19 And with that, let me state the
20 process. As I said, we will be
21 considering public comment. It will go
22 as follows:

23 Your public comment must
24 concern matters on the Second Reading and
25 Final Passage Calendars for possible

2 action at today's Council session. All
3 speakers must sign up to testify. If you
4 have not already signed up for your
5 session, please do so now by giving your
6 name to the Sergeant-at-Arms at the table
7 set up outside in the hallway outside the
8 Council Chambers.

9 Once you have signed up, you
10 will be called in the order in which your
11 name appears on the sign-up sheet. Under
12 ideal circumstances, we would normally
13 have three minutes. Because of the
14 volume and our interest in making sure
15 that we get as many people as possible,
16 we're going to limit it to two minutes.
17 So if you have testimony, please adjust
18 your testimony to reflect the number as
19 it relates to the time limit.

20 As I indicated, in order to be
21 fair, we're going to hold faithfully to
22 the time limit. And when you begin to
23 speak, you will see a green light on the
24 podium. When there are 30 seconds
25 remaining to your time, the light will

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 turn yellow, which is your reminder to
3 conclude your remarks. Once your two
4 minutes have passed, the light will turn
5 red and the Sergeant-at-Arms will
6 disconnect the microphone. At that
7 point, please yield the podium to the
8 next speaker, if you have not already
9 done so.

10 We talked about the rules as it
11 relates to repetitious comment, so we
12 will try our best to accommodate a number
13 of individuals. And, again, I will read
14 the names of those people who have signed
15 up.

16 Mr. Decker, can you please call
17 the first name on the list.

18 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
19 today we have, Mr. President, is Henry
20 Davis, commenting on 220918.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MR. DAVIS: Good morning, Mr.
25 President, members of Council. My name

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 is -- I've been thrust into the brutes
3 this morning, so bear with me a moment.

4 My name is Henry Davis. I'm a
5 Board member of the Eastwick Friends and
6 Neighbors Coalition, which is an
7 environmental justice non-profit
8 community organization. I've been a
9 resident at Eastwick for approximately
10 seven years, and the Eastwick community,
11 as we know, is a flood-prone
12 neighborhood.

13 During the seven years that I
14 have been a resident, I've observed the
15 devastation of damages caused by
16 repetitive flooding from the 1999 flood
17 storms. I spoke to other residents that
18 have suffered the damage and have gone
19 through the process of reforming their
20 homes, and they continue to stay at the
21 Eastwick area, the Floyd storm and
22 Tropical Storm Isaias, where Eastwick
23 residents are still in recovery.

24 What specifically concerns me
25 about the proposed bill at 220918 is the

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 lack of public input and transparency and
3 the potential increase of flooding and
4 other environmental impacts in Eastwick.

5 As a constituent, we actually
6 have received enough information to make
7 an informed decision about the bill's
8 ecological effects on Eastwick and other
9 downstream communities such as Cobbs
10 Creek and Darby.

11 Therefore, I urge you not to
12 vote on this bill on January 19th, which
13 is today of course, but instead vote on
14 it January 31st -- of course,
15 Mr. President, we've heard the comments
16 you've made regarding the amendments --
17 and to comply with the Commission's
18 recommendation by responding to community
19 concerns, including the following:

20 One, lack of details about the
21 proposed steep slope disturbances and
22 long-term measures to ensure the
23 stability of the slopes.

24 Number two, lack of a
25 comprehensive environmental impact study,

2 including, but not limited to, the
3 increased risk of erosion, landslides,
4 subsidence from clearing trees and
5 vegetation from steep slopes, increased
6 sedimentation leading to the aquatic
7 habitat degradation, risk of leaks from
8 damage to the underground eight-inch
9 high-pressure petroleum pipeline caused
10 by the increased erosion, landslides, and
11 subsidence.

12 The impact of high, tightly
13 woven netting --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'll
15 give him a little extra time. He had
16 trouble.

17 Go ahead, sir. Another
18 30 seconds.

19 MR. DAVIS: Netting on both
20 local bird life and neighborhood view
21 shed, and increased runoff from the toxic
22 pesticides and other chemicals used in
23 the maintenance of golf courses.

24 I'm going to cut this down.

25 Number three, no explanation as

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to the developer cannot apply for
3 approval of the proposed steep slope
4 disturbances through the regular zoning
5 process.

6 Number four, lack of community
7 outreach to inform residents about the
8 bill and its environmental impacts.

9 Number five, no comprehensive
10 plan to monitor long-term environmental
11 impacts of this project.

12 And, in closing, number six, no
13 explanation how there will be enough room
14 for walking trails around the perimeter
15 of the golf course without an offset
16 between the 150-foot wall that's going to
17 separate the residents from the golf
18 course. It doesn't make sense.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
20 right.

21 MR. DAVIS: And neighborhood
22 properties.

23 I'm going to cut it short
24 because my time has expired.

25 Thank you.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony, sir. We
4 appreciate it.

5 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
6 is Harriet Achman, commenting on 220918.

7 (No response.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Harriet Achman.

9 (No response.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
11 is Shawmar Pitts.

12 Shawmar Pitts, commenting on
13 220918.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MR. PITTS: My name is Shawmar
16 Pitts.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MR. PITTS: Good morning,
20 everyone. My name is Shawmar Pitts.
21 Good morning, everyone.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MR. PITTS: I'm glad to be here
25 this morning.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 So in lieu of time and the
3 Council President asking us to keep it
4 short, I'm going to keep it short.

5 So with this plan to build a
6 golf course in Cobbs Creek, I definitely
7 object to it because of the things that I
8 see in our neighborhoods and in our
9 communities and what we see, we all see
10 it. We see the gun violence, and the
11 bottom line is, the reason why it's so
12 bad is because our communities have been
13 cut off from the economics of the City
14 for a very long time, and we've been cut
15 off from proper education for a very long
16 time.

17 So this is the reason why we
18 have so much violence right now. This is
19 the reason why you see kids getting
20 younger and younger committing these
21 crimes. And I believe that it's not
22 their fault. They have been neglected.
23 They have been neglected, and I have been
24 neglected when I was their age. So it's
25 been going on for a very long time.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 So now we have opportunities
3 now in the City with redevelopment to
4 make an economic -- words just mess me up
5 sometimes -- an economic investment in
6 our youth in our communities, and this is
7 one of those times.

8 We have a huge expanse of land
9 where we can use that to benefit the
10 youth, and we can use that with the
11 brilliant ideas that we have. And I
12 think that the \$6 million that they got
13 with a grant from the state and in the
14 City budget could have went to things
15 that we need. And we always come for
16 money, and it's hard for us to get
17 funding for the things that we need, and
18 here you have billionaires with a
19 \$60 million project. We never get spent
20 \$60 million projects on us. It's unheard
21 of.

22 These are the things we need to
23 turn the tide on gun violence and the
24 things that plague us in our city and
25 have been plaguing us for a long time.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 And I'm going to end because
3 the red light been came on. So thank
4 you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you for your testimony. We
7 appreciate it, sir.

8 - - -
9 (Applause.)

10 - - -

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Eddison Frazier, commenting on 220918.
13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MR. FRAZIER: How you doing?

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MR. FRAZIER: Good morning.
18 Eddison Frazier from Philly Thrive.

19 I wasn't going to oppose this
20 bill for Cobbs Creek, but I was out there
21 the other day with my dog walking the dog
22 and I happened to come to the guy
23 Enrique. He the operation of Cobbs Creek
24 Foundation. He out there shooting paint
25 balls. He out there with golf balls

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 already. Ain't even get approved for
3 this stuff. He don't even know who he
4 was talking to. He out there with golf
5 balls shooting the golf balls.

6 Now, let me tell you this:
7 Cutting down the trees is our ability to
8 breathe. They are the lungs of the
9 planet. The trees benefit from
10 buildings, neighborhoods. Trees
11 influence temperatures, shades. Trees
12 help cool down the planet. By cutting
13 down trees, our gas and our electric bill
14 going to go up.

15 So I wasn't really going to say
16 nothing about this, but they got -- I did
17 my homework on them. They got like 100
18 sponsors. We didn't need to get them
19 that money. They thought it was sweet.
20 They thought it was sweet until he ran
21 into me out there in that yard.

22 My program, I target the
23 shooters. I want the shooters. That's
24 what I want. My program is a golf course
25 program. Nobody ain't really paying

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 attention to me, but I'm coming. I'm
3 coming. Nobody really paying attention
4 to me.

5 I'm out there with the shooters
6 every day. Them dudes that ride their
7 dirt bike, let's put it out there, cross
8 road. Let's get them to the league and
9 stuff like that. Let's do that.

10 I'm out there with these
11 shooters. These golf course people don't
12 live in our community. They come down
13 here, think they going to be able to do
14 all that stuff, and it's not happening.

15 When you cut the trees down,
16 you're killing the earth. I went out
17 there the other day. It's like a
18 cemetery out there, a cemetery out there.

19 So I oppose this bill, and I
20 hope any of City Council will call, get
21 with me so we can put this program
22 together so we can stop the violence.

23 They ain't bringing nothing to
24 our community. Golf is for rich people.
25 Golf is for rich people. I live right

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 down the street from there. They from
3 rich -- he out there shooting golf like
4 it's a game, and these kids out here
5 dying. When we going to do something
6 about it? We keep on coming to these
7 meetings.

8 Can I get one more minute?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thirty seconds.

11 MR. FRAZIER: All right,
12 30 seconds.

13 And I'mma keep -- I mean,
14 Jones, he came to me. I went to him. He
15 like the only one that has faith in me,
16 but you know all this stuff going on now.
17 We got a meeting tomorrow. I'm going to
18 make it happen. I'm tired of the
19 violence and stuff like that. I'm sick
20 of it. And I did 20 years in jail. I
21 want to prove that these kids need
22 something to do, man. They need
23 something to do.

24 We keep on talking and talking
25 and nothing happens. Girl just got

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 choked in the Chinese store around that
3 way. Come on, man. We need something
4 for them to do. You change the minds of
5 the thinkers, you take them on the field.
6 We want to get their attention, put them
7 on the field, and then educate them, what
8 you need, what's going on, stuff like
9 that. We can't keep on having these
10 meetings and stuff like this and the
11 murder rate going up crazy.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

15 - - -

16 (Applause.)

17 - - -

18 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
19 is Katrina Clark.

20 (No response.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Katrina Clarke.

22 (No response.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Sheila Gibbson.

25 (No response.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Sheila Gibbson.

3 (No response.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

5 is Jacelyn Blank.

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Jacelyn Blank.

8 (No response.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

10 is Nieda Bey.

11 (No response.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Nieda Bey.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

15 is Juanita Killson.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Juanita Killson.

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Juanita?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not

23 here.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

25 is Jamie Glenn.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (No response.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Jamie Glenn.

4 (No response.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
6 is Lawrence Szmulowicz, commenting on
7 220918.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 MS. SZMULOWICZ: Yes. Hi. My
10 name is Lawrence Szmulowicz. I'm here to
11 speak on Bill 220918, entitled "Cobbs
12 Creek Golf Course Overlay District."

13 I live downstream from the golf
14 course in the Cobbs Creek neighborhood
15 where I regularly organize trash
16 clean-ups and bird walks.

17 I want to restrict my comments
18 to the current form of the bill. I look
19 forward to reviewing the amendments and
20 engaging in some of the conversations
21 that Councilmember Jones just mentioned.
22 But in its current form, this bill is bad
23 for Philadelphia.

24 The proposed overlay district
25 may only apply to the Cobbs Creek Golf

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Course, but its effects extend beyond
3 those boundaries. The ordinance, if
4 passed, would create a dangerous
5 precedent of using overlay districts to
6 carve out exemptions to core
7 environmental protections.

8 Steep slope protection is
9 environmental protection. As the Zoning
10 Code explicitly recognizes, the purpose
11 of the steep slope protection is to
12 promote safe and compatible development
13 throughout the City that avoids adverse
14 impacts and degradation of the
15 environment.

16 Other zoning measures in the
17 same category include heritage tree
18 protections, which were just recently
19 strengthened by the Philly Tree Fund
20 bill. None of the existing 35 overlay
21 zoning districts exempt those districts
22 from steep slope protection.

23 With all of the environmental
24 challenges facing Philadelphia, we should
25 be strengthening, not weakening, our

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 local environmental protections. More
3 specifically, this bill would expose
4 Overbrook and downstream communities like
5 Eastwick and Cobbs Creek where I live to
6 serious negative environmental impacts.

7 Steep slope protections exist
8 for a reason. If disturbed, steep slopes
9 are highly susceptible to erosion,
10 leading to sedimentation of nearby
11 streams and related downstream flooding.

12 The stakes could not be higher.
13 There are 254 properties immediately
14 adjacent to the golf course, most of them
15 single-family homes. Downstream
16 communities like Eastwick already suffer
17 from chronic and severe flooding. The
18 burden of proof is on the developer to
19 show that their plans will not harm these
20 communities. So far, the developer has
21 failed to meet this burden. We still do
22 not know key details about the
23 developer's plans, which slopes will be
24 disturbed, how many trees will be cut
25 down, and how will they control erosion

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 after the trees are cut down.

3 I'm almost finished. One
4 second, please.

5 The proposed overlay zoning
6 district is also unnecessary. It applies
7 to two parcels of land, both under the
8 control of a single developer. That
9 developer could achieve the same result
10 as this overlay district by applying for
11 a zoning variance.

12 In fact, the developer did
13 apply originally for a zoning variance to
14 clear trees of steep slopes at 25 percent
15 or greater, but abruptly withdrew that
16 appeal in March 2022 before a zoning
17 hearing could take place.

18 Rather than create a new
19 overlay zoning district, the developer
20 can simply reapply for a zoning variance.
21 If the variance is justified, then the
22 developer can achieve the same result as
23 sought through the overlay district.

24 So I'm asking Council to reject
25 this bill in its current form.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Just one last sentence.

3 Let the developer apply for a
4 zoning variance, meet with the local RCO
5 and community, and have a full and fair
6 hearing on the merits of their plan
7 before the Zoning Board of Adjustments.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
11 We appreciate it.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Ted Pickett.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Ted Pickett.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Michele Gaffney.

19 (No response.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Michele Gaffney,
21 commenting on 220918.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. GAFFNEY: Hi. My name is
24 Michele Gaffney. I am the founder of an
25 organization called Build Like You Live

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Here, BuildLikeYouLiveHere.org. I
3 testified in December on Bill No. 220918.

4 Many of the residents are
5 covering plenty, so I will just say that
6 I appreciate that the amendments are
7 being made and I hope that they will be
8 publicized for everyone to find.

9 I registered this morning
10 because I thought that this was still on
11 the Final Passage Calendar, because it
12 was listed on the agenda. The agenda was
13 not updated, and I called three different
14 offices trying to find out whether or not
15 it was going to be voted on today, and no
16 one could give me an answer. So I would
17 also appreciate if Council could put
18 those updates out more quickly and more
19 accurately.

20 Thank you.

21 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
22 is Cynthia Peace.

23 (No response.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Cynthia Peace.

25 (No response.)

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
3 other speakers in opposition, Mr.
4 President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The speakers --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you. For the record, because of
10 the unavailability of those individuals
11 in opposition, we were able to get
12 everyone who has come down to testify in
13 opposition to the golf course proposal.

14 We will now go to the support.

15 Just go down the list,
16 Mr. Decker. I'm sorry. I don't mean to
17 try to tell you how to do your job, sir.

18 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
19 in support of 220918 -- or the first
20 speaker in support of 220918 is Enrique
21 Hervada.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. HERVADA: Thank you. My
24 name is Enrique Hervada. I'm the COO for
25 the Cobbs Creek Foundation. I wanted to

2 thank everyone here today for listening
3 to what we have to say.

4 The first thing I'd like to say
5 is, we're not a developer. We're a
6 501(c)(3) non-profit that started a
7 partnership with the City well over ten
8 years ago to try and restore a failing
9 golf course that literally was falling
10 into a creek.

11 It's a historic golf course,
12 dates back to 1916 and has a lot of
13 historic features to it and a lot of
14 significant events that happened there.
15 It's actually in the National Black Golf
16 Hall of Fame. And the golf course really
17 fell into total disrepair, so we've been
18 working on this for over ten years with
19 Parks and Rec, the Water Department of
20 Philadelphia, and many other experts on
21 creating a sustainable golf course, 27
22 holes with a driving range and, most
23 importantly, a 30,000 square foot
24 education center that's going to be
25 available to the children of the

2 community at no cost to them.

3 We are looking at significant
4 partners to come in and help us with
5 that. Plans are underway for a really
6 tremendous opportunity for the youth of
7 Philadelphia.

8 We've also been working with
9 the local schools already and we've had
10 many events with the students in the
11 area, and we've also had well over 150
12 meetings with the residents. We recently
13 had an open forum meeting with over 75
14 residents in person. We had multiple
15 Zooms. So the notion that we haven't
16 talked to anybody is a little bit of a
17 stretch to me.

18 But I wanted to say thanks to
19 everyone on City Council, certainly
20 support this bill, and look forward to
21 its passage and doing something really
22 great for the City of Philadelphia.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 in support of 220918 is Morgan Moore.
3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. MOORE: Hello, everyone.
5 My name is Morgan Moore. I am the
6 Director of Education and Community
7 Engagement with the Cobbs Creek
8 Foundation. As Enrique stated, we are a
9 501(c)(3) non-profit not only renovating
10 the Cobbs Creek Golf Course but building
11 an educational center there on the
12 grounds.

13 I'm sorry Mr. Frazier is not
14 here, because we were actually in
15 agreement that the City right now has not
16 had a lot of good news coming out of it.
17 Our young people are in peril. Our
18 streets are filled with carnage. And the
19 best way to stop that is to provide
20 educational opportunity. This is exactly
21 what this project is going to do.

22 This golf course has a
23 significant history of racial equity. It
24 allowed African Americans and women to
25 play in 1916 when that was unheard of.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 And not only are we going to restore that
3 and bring the game of golf back to our
4 community, but we're also going to have
5 free educational and athletic programming
6 for our students. I could not think of a
7 better way to support them. And I urge
8 our City Council people to vote in
9 support of this bill unanimously, and I
10 thank Councilman Jones for his vision and
11 supporting this bill.

12 Thank you for allowing me the
13 time to speak.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: The final speaker
17 in support of Bill No. 220918 is Ben
18 Dewan.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. DEWAN: Good morning.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. DEWAN: My name is Ben
24 Dewan and I am the Superintendent for the
25 Cobbs Creek Foundation. I'm here in

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 support of the overlay ordinance for the
3 golf course to help move the restoration
4 forward by helping us begin the necessary
5 creek restoration.

6 I've worked in golf for
7 13 years and was immediately drawn to
8 this project for various golf reasons and
9 the educational benefits it will provide,
10 all while being run by a non-profit
11 organization.

12 As a resident of the City who
13 lives ten minutes from the course, I'm
14 excited to be a part of restoring the
15 historic hundred-year-old lost asset to a
16 golf course and green space the City and
17 neighborhood can be proud of and all can
18 enjoy. It will be a boost economically,
19 educationally, and socially to the
20 community, and I ask for City Council's
21 support in passing this bill.

22 Thank you.

23 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
24 other speakers regarding Bill No. 220918.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Who is the next speaker?

3 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
4 Mr. Chairman, is Jack McCarthy,
5 commenting on 221042.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.
7 Please state your name for the record and
8 begin your testimony.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MR. MCCARTHY: Hello. My name
11 is Jack McCarthy. I am here speaking in
12 support of the Music Industry Task Force
13 report.

14 I am a longtime Philadelphia
15 music historian. I have been giving
16 tours, writing, lecturing, working on
17 exhibits and film documentaries on
18 Philadelphia music, and I have managed
19 major projects for the Philadelphia
20 Orchestra, the Mann Music Center, the
21 Philadelphia Jazz Legacy Project, the
22 Philadelphia Music Alliance.

23 And I say all this to
24 demonstrate that I know whereof I speak
25 when I say that Philadelphia in terms of

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 from a historical perspective is one of
3 the most important cities in the world,
4 without doubt, across every genre of
5 music - classical, jazz, rock and roll,
6 R&B, gospel, rap and hip-hop, soul music.
7 Philadelphia has produced music and
8 musicians that have transformed the
9 world. This is without question.

10 The problem is that all of
11 these different communities basically
12 work in their own silos and they don't
13 really work together, and the work of the
14 Music Industry Task Force and the
15 recommendations in its report will help
16 to bring all of these disparate
17 communities together to really promote
18 and celebrate Philadelphia music history
19 and its rich, live, current music scene.

20 As a music historian, I make it
21 a point to go to the great music cities
22 of the world to immerse myself in their
23 music cultures - Nashville, New Orleans,
24 Memphis. These cities have thriving
25 musical ecosystems of museums and tours

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and historic sites and live music venues.

3 We have all the ingredients to
4 do that here in Philadelphia. We just
5 don't have the infrastructure, and the
6 work of the Music Industry Task Force
7 will help to make that happen. We can do
8 what these other great cities do. We
9 have all the ingredients.

10 And just one last thing,
11 Philadelphia had a Municipal Bureau of
12 Music from 1929 to 1932. It helped to
13 support and celebrate Philadelphia music.
14 Its great achievement was the creation of
15 the Robin Hood Dell. So there is
16 precedent.

17 So thank you for the
18 opportunity.

19 - - -
20 (Applause.)

21 - - -

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
23 for your testimony.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is David Ivory.

2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

4 Please state your name for the record and
5 begin your testimony.

6 MR. IVORY: David Ivory.

7 Good morning and thank you for
8 this hearing to give a voice to our music
9 creative economy. I'd like to thank
10 Councilman Oh for leading the way and the
11 charge here with this hearing and helping
12 the arts and the creative economy, and
13 thank you to members of City Council for
14 your attention on this very important
15 matter.

16 My name is David Ivory. I am
17 the Chair of the Music Industry Task
18 Force as well as a Grammy-nominated and
19 multi-platinum music engineer, a
20 producer, and former President and
21 National Trustee of the Recording
22 Academy, otherwise known as the Grammys.

23 I share a bit of my background
24 with you to demonstrate my experience and
25 how I dedicated my life to the

2 Philadelphia music industry.

3 I want to take you back several
4 years ago to August 2017. This City
5 Council passed the creation of the Music
6 Industry Task Force to look at the
7 economic impact of the music industry and
8 to articulate ways that the City can help
9 support the music industry of which
10 Philadelphia is so famous for.

11 The Music Industry Task Force
12 looked at other music cities, such as New
13 York, Nashville, Seattle, what they were
14 doing to enhance their musical heritage
15 and economy. We also held networking
16 events with emerging artists,
17 professional musicians, and music makers
18 to get a sense of the challenges from the
19 ground.

20 Understanding that the
21 resources were limited, the Task Force
22 purveyed the broader music community to
23 confirm with other music professionals
24 our ten recommendations.

25 Just a quick history. Our

2 hearing was supposed to happen the day of
3 the shutdown of City Council and the City
4 due to COVID. So we're actually back
5 right now for our first time back.

6 Here's the list of
7 recommendations:

8 Number one, and the most
9 important, establish a centralized
10 permanent Philadelphia Music Office or
11 commission to continue the work initiated
12 by the Music Industry Task Force.

13 Market the strengths of
14 Philadelphia's rich musical history and
15 current boom of the music venues and
16 artists.

17 Promote Philadelphia music to
18 the City's transportation hubs, such as
19 Philadelphia International Airport and
20 30th Street Station.

21 The redevelopment of the Sigma
22 Sound Building, 212 North 12th Street, as
23 a cultural center, museum, event space,
24 et cetera.

25 Develop the awareness campaign

2 of fair compensation for working
3 musicians.

4 Establish performing arts
5 priority loading zones and unloading
6 zones and temporary parking areas so
7 musicians don't get a ticket when they're
8 just trying to unload their gear.

9 Identify sources of funding for
10 sustained, dedicated efforts to grow the
11 Philadelphia music economy.

12 Create hubs for music and
13 concert promotion and utilize the City's
14 zoning community to develop policies to
15 help enhance music creators.

16 In conclusion, I hope that City
17 Council will pass the recommendations of
18 the Music Industry Task Force and provide
19 the necessary resources needed to create
20 a permanent Philadelphia Music Office.
21 Your support to take these steps are
22 vital to preserving Philadelphia's
23 heritage as a music force in the country
24 and the world.

25 Thank you very much.

2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
3 for your testimony.

8 is Donn Thompson Morelli, commenting on
9 221042.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MS. MORELLI: Good morning,
12 esteemed members of City Council. I am
13 Donn Thompson Morelli, also known as Donn
14 T, recording artist, singer-songwriter,
15 independent record label owner, author,
16 and President of the Philadelphia Chapter
17 of the Recording Academy.

18 I have a storied musical
19 lineage and represent generations of
20 music creators. I am sister to Ahmir
21 "Questlove" Thompson. I am the daughter
22 of --

23 - - -

24 (Applause.)

25 - - -

2 MS. MORELLI: Yes.

3 I am the daughter of the late
4 legendary singer Lee Andrews, both
5 Philadelphia Walk of Fame inductees. My
6 grandfather, as an aside, my late
7 grandfather is Beachey Thompson of the
8 legendary Dixie Hummingbirds, for those
9 of you who love gospel music.

10 You know, as a Philadelphia
11 musician born and raised in West
12 Philadelphia, the music economy and
13 seeing it thrive is something that is
14 near and dear to my heart. It is for
15 that reason I am asking City Council to
16 seriously consider the Music Industry
17 Task Force's recommendation to help grow
18 our music community and the creative
19 landscape here for the betterment of the
20 City of Philadelphia.

21 As you might expect, I have a
22 vested interest in the development of
23 music-focused cultural centers and
24 programming to establish Philadelphia's
25 significance in music history, both past

2 and present, and the need for a dedicated
3 effort from the City to recognize and
4 help preserve our important music sites
5 like Sigma.

6 I want to reiterate what David
7 Ivory said. Most major cities have a
8 dedicated, established music office.
9 This isn't a new idea. So, you know --
10 and those cities are, David named some,
11 but New York is another one; Austin,
12 Texas; Nashville; many others.

13 You know, Philly has fallen
14 behind, but I believe that we can do
15 better. We should do better.

16 That is my time. I thank you
17 for your time, City Council, your
18 attention, your consideration. The work
19 that you do here in this place is
20 profound and impactful and very
21 appreciated.

22 Have a good day.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

5 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
6 really appreciate it.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Marcus Bryant, commenting on 221042.
9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MR. BRYANT: Greetings, members
13 of City Council, colleagues, and fellow
14 Philadelphians. I'm honored to be with
15 you today.

16 For those who don't know, I am
17 Marcus Bryant, Rated Art and CEO of LOUD
18 Series. I'm a singer-songwriter and a
19 producer who works with John Legend,
20 H.E.R., Diddy, Ludacris, and many others.
21 I'm an active citizen of Philadelphia and
22 currently serving as the Secretary for
23 the Philadelphia Chapter of the Recording
24 Academy, known for the Grammys. I'm an
25 educator and an advocate for creative

2 arts.

3 On December the 9th, 2022, I
4 testified before the Committee on Global
5 Opportunities and the Creative/Innovative
6 Economy. The recommendations from the
7 Music Industry Task Force were adopted
8 and instituted as Council to be voted on.

9 Today I am focusing on
10 Recommendation No. 10, utilize the City's
11 zoning and community development policies
12 to benefit the music industry. As a
13 professional songwriter and performer, I
14 know that if there are more tax and
15 business incentives for new recording
16 studios, music publishers, and record
17 labels to open businesses here, our
18 creative economy could flourish.

19 One way local musicians, myself
20 included, can be supported by this is the
21 Parking Authority designating performing
22 arts priority loading areas so that we do
23 not have to risk being ticketed while
24 loading and unloading for our gigs.

25 I know from experience getting

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 my equipment in and out of venues safely
3 and not being rushed will make a
4 difference and keep me focused on my
5 performance. Additionally, in order to
6 draw national and international artists
7 to Philadelphia, we have to become an
8 attractive hub.

9 As an artist who also works
10 behind the scenes, having support from
11 Philadelphia's leadership will increase
12 options and create more beneficial
13 experiences and opportunities for the
14 music community.

15 Our city has too much to offer
16 to not be recognized as a viable location
17 for concerts, festivals, and recording
18 studios. We are asking for City
19 Council's support, because if an
20 independent music office is established,
21 it would develop and administer in the
22 growth of the music sector of our city's
23 creative economy, assisting our city's
24 music industry and recording artists,
25 whose lives depend on it.

2 I understand the budget
3 supporting the creation of a music office
4 that includes investing in a staff will
5 assure that we as creators are not solely
6 responsible for resourcing what is
7 designed to benefit us. A proposed
8 budget will be presented to you in
9 February.

10 It will be a challenge to
11 progress without your assistance. We are
12 asking for your full support as we
13 continue to entertain, uplift, and
14 promote in our great hopeful City of
15 Philadelphia.

16 Thank you for your time.

17 - - -

18 (Applause.)

19 - - -

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Laurin Talese, commenting on 221042.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. TALESE: Good morning.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 MS. TALESE: It's an honor to
5 be before you today. Thank you for
6 granting my peers and I an audience, and
7 thank you for the thoughtful and tedious
8 work you do day to day for our city.

9 My name is Laurin Talese. I'm
10 a professional recording artist,
11 vocalist, composer, and I tour the world
12 as a United States cultural ambassador
13 with our Department of State's Bureau of
14 Educational and Cultural Affairs. I also
15 currently serve our community as the Vice
16 President of the Philadelphia Chapter of
17 the Recording Academy, also known as the
18 Grammys.

19 I'm here today asking the City
20 Council to seriously consider the Music
21 Industry Task Force recommendations to
22 help grow our music community and
23 creative economy.

24 The genesis of my music career
25 took place during my undergraduate

2 studies at the University of the Arts. I
3 graduated in 2004. In the nearly
4 20 years since, I've become deeply
5 concerned that the City that I call home,
6 one that is overflowing with talent so
7 unique, integral, and masterful, that
8 every major touring band in the United
9 States includes somebody from Philly, and
10 it continues to lose its creative talent
11 due to the lack of music industry
12 infrastructure, resources, and
13 environment to thrive.

14 Many of my U Art peers and I
15 have since graduating cultivated
16 accomplished and illustrious careers.
17 Most of them call New York, LA, and
18 Nashville home.

19 I love this city, and I am yet
20 holding on.

21 - - -

22 (Applause.)

23 - - -

24 MS. TALESE: In 2019,
25 53 percent of Philadelphia

2 artists/musicians surveyed said they had
3 considered moving to another city.

4 Retention of young professionals and
5 artists, especially recent graduates,
6 needs to be a priority to continue having
7 them contribute to our creative economy.

8 More infrastructure and support of our
9 creative economy will incentivize our
10 future leaders to stay right here in
11 Philadelphia.

12 The ten recommendations
13 outlined by the Music Industry Task
14 Force, including, but not limited to,
15 developing an awareness campaign for fair
16 compensation for working musicians, the
17 marketing of Philadelphia's rich and
18 robust musical history and its music
19 venues, young and legacy artists,
20 promoting Philadelphia music in the
21 City's transportation hub, such as
22 Philadelphia's International Airport and
23 30th Street Station, would solve our lack
24 of retention and create a healthy and
25 thriving, creative ecosystem.

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Please pass these
3 recommendations, as it is vital to our
4 success of the creative economy and
5 rightful global distinction as the
6 leaders, trendsetters, and originators
7 across the art sector.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 MS. TALESE: Thank you for your
11 time today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Katrice Cheaton.

19 (No response.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Katrice Cheaton.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 There she is. She's here.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
24 210434.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. CHEATON: Hello.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 MS. CHEATON: Hi. My name is
6 Katrice Cheaton. Can you hear me?

7 Can you hear me now?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

9 MS. CHEATON: Okay. Hi.

10 So I've been doing community
11 work in the City for like eight years
12 now, and I'm well aware of the ins and
13 outs of the City, the struggles going on
14 in the City, especially the
15 (unintelligible) person here in the City.
16 And I just learned what it's like to be
17 homeless in the last 24 hours, and so did
18 my brother, when we were illegally
19 evicted from our home yesterday
20 afternoon.

21 Now, we've been fighting the
22 eviction process. It was done in a very
23 illegal manner. And the reason why I'm
24 talking about the bill that is
25 represented today for 210434 was that the

2 police did not handle our situation in a
3 kind way at all. It was very hostile.
4 The Sheriff was very hostile. It just
5 wasn't something that they seemed to care
6 about when I mentioned to them we weren't
7 properly notified. We weren't given
8 ten-day notice. Everything that was done
9 was a farce.

10 The Housing Authority looked
11 the other way. DOJ looked the other way.
12 Mayor Kenney's office looked the other
13 way. The eviction diversion program --
14 the eviction protection program looked
15 the other way.

16 So then we decided -- we had to
17 sleep, we had to find somewhere to sleep.
18 So we slept at 30th Street, because
19 Project HOME couldn't find anywhere for
20 us to stay together, because as male and
21 female, as a brother and sister, you have
22 to separate.

23 And I say all this to say the
24 eviction was done as a means to cover up
25 the human traffic intent on our lives.

2 You have a human trafficking situation in
3 the City, and it is very bad. They're
4 using the Eviction Court to cover it up.

5 Now, we slept on the bench at
6 30th Street. Through the niceties of an
7 actual Amtrak cop, one of the few that
8 was nice to us yesterday, so we know not
9 all cops are bad, but minimal training is
10 like the least that needs to be done in
11 order to be able to handle people with
12 empathy when they're going through such a
13 hardship, especially when it's something
14 illegal being done and people looking the
15 other way.

16 Minimal training is the least.
17 Empathy is necessary. And you need a
18 spiritual team, spiritually aware people
19 to handle what's going on, because it's
20 not just me dealing with people. It's
21 narcissists, sociopaths, and psychopaths
22 we're dealing with, and those are Satan's
23 children. And we're people of God, and
24 that's why we're targeted.

25 Thank you.

3 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

4 We appreciate it.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 200658.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. HAGINS: Good morning,
14 everyone.

15 After not being in these
16 Chambers for almost a month, it would
17 have been nice to see a bill or two in
18 regards to some of the major issues
19 facing the City. Even though so far this
20 year we see a slight reduction in
21 homicide compared to this time last year,
22 I see no real improvement overall.

23 I come here every Thursday to
24 speak and to draw your attention to the
25 realities of what's happening out here in

1 1/19/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 these streets of Philadelphia.

3 This being an election year, I
4 was at least anticipating something
5 dealing with the dirty streets that have
6 been spoken about -- that I've spoken
7 about on several occasions in this
8 Chamber and how just simply cleaning and
9 greening the City would decrease crime
10 and violence by at least 30 percent.

11 I would think that there would
12 be some sort of resolution or bill in
13 regards to the gun violence, economic
14 development, particularly in the Afro
15 American communities, or just something
16 dealing with how our citizens are driving
17 so recklessly in the City.

18 Even though I am in favor of
19 Bill 200658, an ordinance authorizing the
20 installment of traffic signals or a
21 traffic signal at the intersection of
22 Upland Way and Berks, but what good is it
23 if there's no enforcement in the City of
24 laws?

25 I commend the Council President

2 for dealing with the over 4,000 people
3 who are on the waiting list to be
4 employed, but how difficult can it be to
5 hire people for the jobs that are vacant?

6 And in regards to the music, I
7 got to tell you, my son -- one of my sons
8 is in Germany right now pursuing his
9 music career. He should be in
10 Philadelphia, but because the music
11 industry is not really looked at well in
12 this city, he's in Germany, not a
13 different city, not a different state,
14 but a different continent to pursue his
15 music career. We have to do something
16 immediately in regards to this issue.

17 Thanks.

19 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The final speaker
24 today, Mr. President, is Lynn Landes,
25 commenting on 210913.

2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
6 Lynn Landes, publisher of
7 ProtocolsforDemocracy.org. I do support
8 Bill 210913, but today I would like to
9 make some suggestions that will hopefully
10 improve City Council meetings for all
11 concerned.

12 As I suggested at the last City
13 Council meeting, please inform the public
14 that they are allowed to make public
15 comment at City Council meetings on any
16 issue that falls within the purview of
17 City Council. So please refrain from
18 restricting our remarks to legislative
19 agenda items only. This is an
20 unconstitutional restriction on our right
21 to free speech.

22 Council can restrict topics for
23 public comment on special occasions, but
24 not for regularly scheduled public
25 meetings.

2 In addition, please give
3 speakers their full three minutes to
4 talk. This is the accepted norm in your
5 written policy. So it is unfair to
6 restrict speakers to two minutes right
7 before they are set to speak. Many
8 speakers have come with prepared remarks
9 and this last-minute change can really
10 throw them off.

11 Also, please hire a
12 professional to install better
13 sound-absorbent materials in the City
14 Council Chamber. There is a strong echo
15 that makes it very difficult to
16 understand people when they are speaking
17 into a microphone.

18 Lastly, please end the
19 requirement for face masks and social
20 distancing at City Council meetings and
21 allow people into the balcony seats.
22 There are no credible scientific studies
23 that prove masking or social distancing
24 stop the spread of any virus. In fact,
25 it is well documented they do more harm

2 than good.

3 I want to thank those
4 Councilmembers who are not wearing masks,
5 but please stand up for our right to not
6 wear them either. We should all be
7 treated equally in a democracy.

8 Thank you for your attention.

16 the Music Industry Task Force. This has
17 been a long journey. We've done this for
18 several years now. I think we started in
19 like 2012 or '13. Anyway, it's taken a
20 long time, but we're climbing up the rung
21 of this ladder, and I think the first few
22 rungs have been especially difficult.
23 But it is the music industry leaders
24 themselves and the music industry
25 participants, all the artists, producers,

14 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

19 That concludes our Calendar for
20 today.

21 And are there any speeches on
22 behalf of the minority?

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Oh.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

2 much, Council President.

3 I wanted to thank everyone
4 here, all my colleagues, yourself, over
5 these many years to get to this point of
6 passing the report, the recommendation of
7 the Philadelphia Music Industry Task
8 Force.

9 Having come to this point,
10 there are more rungs up the ladder, and I
11 know what's coming.

12 Those recommendations, I would
13 urge everyone and everyone listening to
14 look at the ten recommendations. There
15 are many recommendations that could have
16 been made. These are our top music
17 industry leaders. They tried to do
18 things that are practical, things that
19 can be done. One of the most important,
20 of course, will be to establish a
21 permanent Music Industry Office.

22 There's no exaggeration in how
23 great our city is when it comes to the
24 creative arts economy, especially music,
25 just how much talent we have in this city

2 and what it would mean to everyone in our
3 neighborhoods and communities to really
4 give them the platform that they need.
5 This will cost money.

6 It is a challenge between our
7 body and the Administration exactly how
8 important of an item this is going to be,
9 but I think Council has led the way and I
10 hope that we will continue to do that.

11 The second thing I want to say
12 is, I did introduce a bill today and it
13 is about the at-large Councilmembers.
14 Again, for those who don't know, we have
15 ten districts, and that covers our entire
16 city, ten districts, our entire city.
17 Yet we have at-large members who travel
18 throughout the City, sometimes in
19 different nooks and crannies, sometimes
20 being approached by people who are
21 looking for help as well, and sometimes
22 they weren't able to get, with so many
23 demands on our District Councilpeople,
24 get some assistance or some help because
25 of limited funding, and the only thing

2 at-large Councilpeople can do within this
3 body is ask them where they live and tell
4 them to talk to their District
5 Councilperson, and maybe we'll do an
6 introduction or talk to their State Rep
7 or talk to the State Senator or talk to
8 somebody. Me, I introduce them to the
9 foundations and corporations. We just
10 completed our Youth Non-Profit Symposium.

11 But I do think it is well worth
12 it for at-large Councilmembers, seven
13 at-large Councilmembers, to be able to
14 say, yes, I'll be able to submit
15 application so that your non-profit and
16 the good work that you want to do can be
17 considered for funding as well.

18 So with that, I thank you,
19 Council President and colleagues. Thank
20 you so much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, Councilman.
23 Speeches on behalf of the
24 majority?

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

2 Jones.

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
4 Mr. President.

5 Let me first thank my
6 colleagues Councilman Johnson,
7 Councilperson Gilmore Richardson,
8 Councilmember Gauthier for their
9 patience. Downstream is a real thing.
10 It affects Eastwick. It affects Cobbs
11 Creek. And so their encouragement for me
12 to talk to the members of their community
13 I took to heart and, therefore, we
14 introduced this amendment to the bill.

15 But I'd like to for the record
16 because of the comments cite some facts.
17 One fact is that the steep slope
18 legislation I have some understanding of
19 because I'm the prime author of that
20 legislation when we got it passed some
21 years ago, and the intentions of that
22 legislation were to take a hard look at
23 overdevelopment in hillside
24 neighborhoods, such as Manayunk, East
25 Falls, other places in Germantown to take

2 a look at how we take woodland and make
3 impervious surfaces which makes a
4 downhill slope. We looked at it. We
5 passed it, but it was never truly
6 intended for open spaces like golf
7 courses, unless they were trying to build
8 a physical structure. That's number one.

9 Number two, when we argue, and
10 sometimes in this Chambers we argue, but
11 what we never do, and not even in this
12 Chamber, is try to villainize people for
13 having a difference of opinion.

14 So when you tend to put me on
15 the front page of Grid Magazine four
16 times, I have to cite to you that I
17 represent 66 percent of the parkland. I
18 did the Manatawna Farms overlay. In
19 these Chambers we had hearings to stop
20 fracking that encouraged the Water
21 Department to put its sensors ten miles
22 up on the Schuylkill so that if in fact a
23 catastrophe happened, we could close off
24 those intakes to safeguard our water.

25 In fact, we have when my

2 colleague introduced -- what is it
3 called, the Monsanto bill. What was the
4 actual name, Member Bass?

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Say again.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: For the
7 pesticides used by the parks.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Right.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: The
10 legislation.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Yes.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: What was it
13 named?

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: The HOPS
15 bill.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: That bill,
17 the outdoor bill.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: The outdoor
19 public spaces.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Public
21 spaces bill, there you go.

22 I was on that bill, worked with
23 my colleague to figure it out. It was
24 not easy, but we did it.

25 When we were in Upper

2 Wissahickon and joggers and bikers could
3 not get reception on phones, we held
4 Verizon to task to make those parks safer
5 by connectivity.

6 I cite these things not to
7 brag, but everybody has a right to
8 freedom of speech. They do not have the
9 right to freedom of the facts.

10 And so as we look at Cobbs
11 Creek Golf Course, an \$80 million
12 investment to restore a historic golf
13 course that Charlie Sifford was only able
14 to work on, and the Brown Bomber when he
15 came to Philadelphia played on to its
16 historic nature, it benefits my district.

17 I will safeguard other
18 districts. We will continue to meet with
19 stewards of the park to figure out how we
20 could do that, but please do not think
21 that the community doesn't benefit.
22 We're talking about three different
23 schools, high schools, that will have
24 golfing programs, golfing teams. Five
25 young people a year will go and learn

2 golf course management. I'm not just
3 talking about being a caddy, but how to
4 safeguard against pesticides and things
5 like that.

6 There is a commitment from this
7 non-profit to enrich the community that
8 they reside in. I cannot tell you -- I
9 wish I could -- some of the people,
10 national golfers, hint, hint, golfers of
11 color, hint, hint, that are interested in
12 this golf course because of its
13 investment, but I guarantee one thing,
14 that we will continue the communications
15 process, that I will take their
16 considerations to heart, and if we need
17 to amend it again, we will amend it
18 again.

19 But please just to win an
20 argument, do not create villains where
21 there are none.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes

2 Councilwoman Gauthier.

3 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Good
4 afternoon, everyone.

5 I'm excited to be back in this
6 Chamber with you all to complete the
7 people's business. Since this is an
8 election year, some have referred to this
9 as a lame duck session of Council, but
10 let me be crystal clear. I am not
11 slowing down, and I intend to keep
12 championing legislation that uplifts and
13 empowers our most vulnerable residents,
14 because there is work to be done and it
15 needs to get done this year. So I'd like
16 to take a few minutes to discuss some of
17 my legislative priorities for this
18 Council session.

19 In the next five years alone,
20 over 5,400 affordable housing units are
21 at risk of disappearing across the City,
22 and 900 of these are in the Third
23 District alone. We have a duty to take
24 bold and proactive measures to preserve
25 as many of these homes as possible.

2 Otherwise, we will enter an even more
3 desperate affordability crisis than we
4 are already in.

5 But this 5,400 number is more
6 than a statistic. It's 5,400 low-income
7 families who may be thrown out of their
8 homes and thrown into the gauntlet with
9 thousands of other families struggling to
10 find an affordable home.

11 That's why on the final day of
12 Council last year I introduced the
13 People's Preservation Package. The
14 package gives the City and our affordable
15 housing partners additional tools that
16 will help us preserve as many expiring
17 affordable homes as possible. This
18 includes requiring property owners to
19 give notice of their intention to sell
20 affordable housing properties to other
21 affordable housing developers and
22 community groups.

23 Property owners will also need
24 to give other affordable housing
25 providers the opportunity to buy an

2 expiring affordable housing development
3 so that the homes remain affordable.

4 In addition, the People's
5 Preservation Package authorizes the City
6 to create a directory of all affordable
7 housing properties in Philadelphia, their
8 funding streams, and when their funding
9 expires. This common sense step will
10 give the City and our partners the
11 information we need to prepare for
12 looming expirations, with the intention
13 of keeping families in their homes.

14 The final piece of my People's
15 Preservation Package is a hearing on
16 illegal discrimination against households
17 holding tenant-based vouchers. The Fair
18 Practices Ordinance prohibits landlords
19 from refusing to rent based on a tenant's
20 source of income, including tenant-based
21 vouchers. However, more than 65 percent
22 of Philadelphia landlords illegally
23 refuse to rent to families with vouchers,
24 and we cannot allow this rampant
25 injustice to continue. That's why at

2 this hearing we will uncover what we need
3 to do to end voucher discrimination once
4 and for all.

5 In addition to affordable
6 housing, I remain focused on championing
7 a bold, targeted, and trauma-informed
8 response to our city's gun violence
9 epidemic. This year I believe we must
10 devote more attention to supporting youth
11 at risk of or already involved in gun
12 violence.

13 Like many of you, I have heard
14 from my constituents that the City's
15 violence prevention and intervention
16 initiatives focused on young people
17 aren't enough to meet the need on the
18 ground. And as the victims and
19 perpetrators of violence become younger
20 and younger, it is clear that we need to
21 be doing much more to protect our
22 children.

23 So I look forward to my
24 upcoming hearing with Councilman Johnson
25 to determine what legislative and

1 1/19/23 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 budgetary steps we can take this year to
3 keep Philadelphia's young people safe.

4 I also look forward to working
5 with you all to protect the priorities
6 this body has fought hard for over the
7 past three years. This includes giving
8 grassroots anti-violence organizations
9 funding to complete their work and
10 investing in proven strategies to reduce
11 violent crime, such as play space
12 intervention like cleaning and greening.

13 Last year my JustServicesPHL
14 campaign championed a \$30 million
15 investment in improving City services,
16 starting in the neighborhoods
17 disproportionately impacted by gun
18 violence. And I look forward to
19 continuing this campaign during the
20 budget process, because it will take much
21 more than \$30 million to give
22 working-class Black and brown
23 neighborhoods the level of municipal
24 services they need to disrupt the cycle
25 of violence.

2 This session I will also turn
3 my attention towards workforce
4 development in the life sciences sector.
5 Millions of square feet of lab space and
6 other real estate have come online in
7 West and Southwest in the last couple of
8 years. These spaces will be filled by
9 life sciences companies focusing on gene
10 and cell therapy, pharmaceutical research
11 and development, veterinary medicine and
12 more, and these businesses will generate
13 thousands of high-paying jobs, many of
14 which will be available to those without
15 a college degree, such as lab
16 technicians.

17 That's why I will hold a
18 hearing to identify steps the City can
19 take to dramatically expand life sciences
20 workforce development so that we can help
21 working-class Black and brown residents
22 benefit from this economic growth.

23 I will seek to establish and
24 expand high-quality training
25 opportunities that prepare working-class

2 residents to be competitive applicants
3 for jobs before they come online.

4 We must also create
5 opportunities to expose young people to
6 the life sciences industry, support GED
7 programs with ties to the life sciences,
8 and link training for ramps to specific
9 job opportunities.

10 I am excited to build off of
11 the successes of Philadelphia's existing
12 job training and placement initiatives to
13 ensure that the life science industry
14 grows alongside rather than without
15 working-class Black and brown residents.

16 I look forward to working with
17 you all to pass legislation and a budget
18 that prioritizes protecting our most
19 vulnerable residents. Philadelphia is
20 counting on us, and I'm determined to
21 deliver.

22 Thank you so much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman. I'm
25 sorry. I got caught up in it. I was

2 waiting for more.

3 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: That's
4 okay. I know you were --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
6 were on a roll. Very impressive,
7 Councilwoman. Thank you so much.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Vaughn.

10 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Welcome
11 back, everyone.

12 I'd like to send out get well
13 wishes to our colleague Katherine Gilmore
14 Richardson. The Councilwoman isn't
15 feeling well.

16 And, lastly, I want to say how
17 proud I am of my son, Kevin Lamont
18 Vaughn, who turned 21 today.

19 - - -

22 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Super
23 exciting. He's in his third year of
24 Howard University, and I could not be
25 more proud as a mother to know that my

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
6 right. Awesome.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Phillips.

9 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
10 you, Council President.

11 I want to say Happy New Year to
12 everyone who is here today and also want
13 to say greetings to all of our colleagues
14 as we work earnestly to deliver for the
15 needs of all the residents of the City of
16 Philadelphia.

17 I was compelled to speak today
18 because I want to make something very
19 clear about why I do the work that I do
20 and why I love to serve.

21 For the past few weeks or so, I
22 visited residents and neighborhoods
23 throughout our district, the Ninth
24 District, from Fern Rock to Logan, to
25 Northeast, East Oak Lane, Mount Airy,

2 West Oak Lane, Burholme, Oxford Circle,
3 Castor Gardens, Lawncrest, Lawndale, you
4 name it.

5 Throughout this time as I was
6 visiting different neighborhoods, I
7 became overly aware of why I really,
8 really wanted to be the servant of the
9 Ninth District and, most importantly, be
10 the voice of our people in this area, and
11 it has to do with the fact that I truly
12 believe that when it comes to
13 legislation, when it comes to initiatives
14 that come out of our district, it should
15 not come from the heart of what Anthony
16 Phillips believes should happen. It
17 should not come from the heart of what a
18 few people believe should happen. It
19 should come from the heart and the soul
20 and the ideas of what the majority of the
21 Ninth District wants from its leaders.

22 So I'm here today because I
23 have always believed in collaboration,
24 I've always believed in listening and,
25 most importantly, I've always believed in

2 excellence and full execution of ideas
3 and initiatives.

4 So during my travels, I've come
5 to learn that the Ninth District wants a
6 presence of their Councilmember, and I
7 vow to be very present among all the
8 neighborhoods in the Ninth District.

9 They also want their
10 Councilmember to listen, and I vow to
11 listen and not only, to also do.

12 They also have made it very
13 clear that quality of life issues, a
14 great standard of living is something
15 that's really important to our district.

16 So with that being said and
17 listening, I have come to understand that
18 we have a serious truck parking issue in
19 our district, semi-tractor-trailers.
20 That is why I've been glad to work with
21 Councilman O'Neill and Councilman
22 Driscoll on initiatives that are not only
23 affecting my district but also their
24 districts and other districts in the City
25 of Philadelphia, because what I've come

2 to understand is that there is nuisance
3 and truck parking in the City of
4 Philadelphia. And what's happening is
5 that they're ruining pavements, they're
6 also ruining people's property value, and
7 they're also creating blight, and it's
8 not safe for our children.

9 I've walked behind trucks at
10 night and I've seen how dangerous this
11 is.

12 So this legislative session I'm
13 hoping that we are able to get -- I'm not
14 hoping. I'm asking, I'm demanding that
15 we rid this problem of
16 semi-tractor-trailers in the City of
17 Philadelphia, because there are places to
18 park and we will definitely find more
19 places to park for our truckers, but we
20 can no longer allow for people to get
21 away with doing illegal activity when
22 they know it's illegal.

23 In addition to that, what's
24 also important to our neighbors is that
25 they're concerned about abandoned cars,

2 they're concerned about loitering,
3 they're concerned about dumping, and
4 they're concerned about public safety,
5 just like all of us. And when it comes
6 to public safety, what I've heard is that
7 they're interested in mental health
8 programs, but they're also interested in
9 quality youth programs. They're
10 interested in going back to Leon Sullivan
11 days and doing something around jobs over
12 crime. And they're also interested in
13 finding ways on how we can do more town
14 watches, which will require not as much
15 legislation as much but more funding but
16 also more initiatives, starting with me
17 as their representative.

18 I see myself not as an
19 authority figure in the way that I am the
20 dictator of the Ninth District. I see
21 myself as a facilitator of ideas, making
22 sure that all of our voices are heard.

23 I just want to say that I'm
24 excited about this new year and what this
25 new year has come, and I thank all of my

2 colleagues, especially the more seasoned
3 ones who have been here, for welcoming
4 me, including you, Council President, and
5 helping me become adjusted to this very
6 different auspicious body of work when it
7 comes to City Council, because one of the
8 things that I'm also serious about is
9 figuring out a way how to make the City
10 much more efficient and effective and
11 responsive to our neighbors.

12 I come from a background of
13 being an executive in a non-profit
14 working with young people, and we had a
15 "whatever it takes" approach to
16 everything that we did. We stayed up all
17 night, all day just to get things done,
18 and things got done. And I have that
19 mentality when it comes to City Council,
20 but I also want to thank people for
21 helping me become more acquainted with
22 this body of work, and I think because I
23 have a service background, this hasn't
24 been that hard of an adjustment, but what
25 has -- and that's why I continue to be

3 So with that being said, thank
4 you all so much, and I look forward to
5 presenting more ideas that comes from the
6 voices of the people of the Ninth
7 District, because I'm their
8 representative of that voice and I

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Harrity.

15 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Hello,
16 Council President, fellow members.

17 Today I introduced legislation
18 to amend Section 9-1100 of The
19 Philadelphia Code to expand access to
20 life partnership regardless of gender
21 identity of the individual in the
22 relationship.

23 I'd like to thank
24 Councilmembers Driscoll, Gilmore
25 Richardson, Jones, Thomas, Squilla, and

2 Vaughn for co-sponsoring.

3 Life partnerships do not
4 provide the same rights to a couple as a
5 marriage and can be terminated at any
6 time, but it can allow some couples to
7 obtain certain benefits, including
8 insurance coverage, medical
9 decision-making, and visitation rights.

10 This legislation brings
11 Philadelphia in line with other cities
12 such as New York, which has amended their
13 life partnership ordinance to include all
14 couples regardless of gender.

15 While not all insurance
16 carriers will provide the same benefits
17 to life partners as spouses, it is
18 essential that the status be afforded to
19 all Philadelphians as a way to show their
20 commitment to the individuals they love
21 and to obtain important rights and
22 privileges while being traditionally --
23 while not being traditionally married.

24 It is my hope that in the new
25 year, that we continue to make changes to

2 the law which expands the rights of all
3 Philadelphians while we work to tackle
4 the most pressing issues of our city.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 O'Neill.

10 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Yes.

11 Councilman Harrity, I passed
12 along that I wanted to co-sponsor that.
13 It's my office's fault, but I'll be on
14 it, and this is public notice that I'm
15 co-sponsoring, because I intended to from
16 the beginning.

17 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank you.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

19 Congratulations. Okay.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Johnson.

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I was
25 following protocol, sir, waiting for the

10 for my Chief of Staff, Christopher B.
11 Sample, who passed away. His service was
12 yesterday. I want to thank all the
13 Council staff members who actually took
14 time out of their schedule and showed up.
15 I want to thank Councilwoman Jamie
16 Gauthier and Councilwoman Cindy Bass and
17 Councilman Curtis Jones for being
18 supportive of the family and showing up.
19 And we really appreciate as a staff and
20 as a team all the outgoing love and
21 support that my team has received going
22 through this very, very trying process.

23 Chris Sample was not only my
24 Chief of Staff but also a friend but,
25 most importantly, he was a lifelong

9 Abraham, and also myself.

10 And so he's going to be truly
11 missed. Always had a smile. Around the
12 office I called him Billy Dee. That's
13 how smooth he was, right, old school
14 Denzel Washington.

15 So we want to definitely
16 continue to keep his life and legacy
17 going with the work that we're doing, and
18 just ask for an official moment of
19 silence on his behalf.

10 here in this Chamber and this body is
11 addressing the issue of senseless gun
12 violence here in the City of
13 Philadelphia.

14 Day in and day out I have met
15 so many mothers -- I just honored a group
16 of mothers -- who didn't have the ability
17 to see their son turn 21 years old. I
18 work with plenty of mothers and fathers
19 who every holiday was sitting at the
20 table where there's an empty seat because
21 they have lost a son and even daughters
22 to senseless gun violence.
