2 P R O C E E D I N G S

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: Good morning,
4 everyone. I note that the hour has come and that a
5 quorum of this Council is present. The Council will
6 come to order. Members will take their seats and
7 guests will retire to the seats outside the rails.

8 To give our invocation this morning, the
9 Chair welcomes the Reverend Benjamin Maucere, Pastor
10 of the First Unitarian Church here in Center City.
11 He is here as the guest of Councilman Longstreth.
12 Members and guests will please rise.

13 REVEREND MAUCERE: In order for us to
14 open ourselves to the spirit, I invite us to take a
15 moment in silence, to breathe deeply, to come fully
16 into this place, into the presence of one another,
17 into the presence of the Holy.

18 (Moment of silence.)

19 REVEREND MAUCERE: Thou who art known by
20 many names, we know you as the spirit of justice, as
21 holy wisdom, as the creative power of transforming
22 love, be and abide with this group and guide them in
23 their deliberations and in their speaking, guide
24 this group as it does the work of the people. The
25 work is worthy and so are the workers. May we give

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Amen. The
7 Chair thanks the Reverend for his inspiring
8 invocation. Council will be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: This is the
11 approval of the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
12 March 1, 2001. The Chair recognizes Councilwoman
13 Blackwell.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
15 Madam President. I move that the Journal of
16 Thursday, March 1, 2001, stand approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: It has been
19 moved and properly seconded that the Journal of the
20 meeting of Thursday, March 1, 2001, stand approved.

21 All in favor will signify by saying aye.
22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Those opposed?
24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: The ayes have

6 The Chair recognizes Councilwoman

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
9 Madam President. There are no requests for leaves
10 of absence today on the part of the majority.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: The Chair
12 thanks the Councilwoman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Madam President, on
15 behalf of the Republicans, there are no requests for
16 leave of absence.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Thank you.

18 The Chair will dispense with the regular
19 order of business to recognize the guests and
20 visitors joining us in Chambers this morning. On
21 behalf of all Members of City Council, I welcome you
22 to our Council Session today. We appreciate your
23 taking the time to join us as we attend to the
24 legislative affairs of our City. We certainly
25 invite you to come again.

1 WELCOME AND PRESENTATIONS

2 The Chair recognizes Councilwoman
3 Blackwell for a presentation honoring the volunteers
4 who assisted with the Third Council District Holiday
5 party.

6 Will Mr. Neil Stein and Mr. Gabe
7 Marabella please join the Councilwoman at the
8 podium.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
10 Madam President. We also have KeVen Parker from
11 Simply Delicious Caterers and La Famiglia
12 Restaurant, and certainly our friend Giuseppe Sena
13 and many others.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERA: Councilwoman,
15 whoever is here with the group, I would suggest that
16 they join you at the podium.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERA: Councilwoman
19 Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
21 Madam President.

22 Good morning. This is certainly a
23 special day for us. Councilman DiCicco and
24 Councilman Clarke are also here. This is their area
25 and certainly they have been very helpful and

2 supportive for our holiday feeding of homeless
3 people. And, you know, these are very, very special
4 people here, people who give and don't have to give
5 and who volunteer to make all their resources
6 available and resources that are given to people
7 around the country and they decided to give it to
8 the least of those in our City, and certainly that
9 is what our mission is.

10 Honoring the volunteers who assisted
11 with the Third Council District Holiday Party for
12 thier civic commitment and act of humanitarianism.
13 This is our resolution.

14 Whereas, on December 13, 2000, there was
15 a holiday dinner in the Grand Ballroom at the First
16 District Plaza in West Philadelphia. At the dinner
17 were 500 homeless families, the majority of them
18 children; and

19 Whereas, this was a full-scale gala, a
20 full course gourmet meal, entertainment by the Point
21 Breeze Performing Arts Council, and toys for each
22 child in attendance provided by Penn Mutual Life,
23 the Marine Corps Toys for Tots, American Community
24 Partners and AmeriChoice; and

25 COUNCILMAN CLARKE: Whereas, a

2 traditional holiday meal was prepared by the staff
3 of Gabe Marabella and Neil Stein of Striped Bass and
4 Avenue B, two of the City's top restaurateurs and
5 served by volunteers from the Restaurant School the
6 School of Culinary Arts. Desserts were donated by
7 Giuseppe Sena of La Famiglia; and

8 Whereas, we also recognize the efforts
9 of Ms. Jean Bund, Director of Professional
10 Healthcare Institute; Mr. John Coates of the
11 Redevelopment Authority; Mr. Al Williams of American
12 Community Partners; Robert Beven of a Penn Mutual
13 Life Insurance Company; Mr. KeVen Parker, owner of
14 Simply Delicious Caterers; AmeriChoice and Mr.
15 Michael Nardon, Mr. Louis Souder of OESS; and

16 COUNCILMAN DI CICCIO: Whereas, they and
17 all the other members of the Holiday Dinner
18 Committee went far beyond the call of duty to make
19 December 13th a night that hundreds of our citizens
20 will remember for years to come; and

21 Whereas, events such as the third
22 district holiday dinner reflect the Christmas spirit
23 in its purest and fullest form; it is the spirit of
24 giving and generosity of heart which make lives
25 richer and thus make Philadelphia more caring and

2 compassionate place; and therefore.

3 Resolved, by the Council of the City of
4 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and commend all
5 the members of the Third District Holiday Dinner
6 Committee and volunteers. We thank them for their
7 civic commitment and act of humanitarianism, and we
8 extend to them the sincere respect and deep
9 admiration of this legislative body.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And certainly,
11 this was co-signed by my colleagues Frank DiCicco
12 and Darrell Clarke and agreed to signed by every
13 single member of City Council.

14 And again, we thank all of these people
15 here who are certainly God's instruments of mercy to
16 help people in need in our City. God bless.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: Councilwoman,
19 is there anyone in the group who would like to say a
20 few words.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I would just like
22 to thank everyone and tell everyone that we're
23 committed to feeding a thousand homeless people next
24 Christmas.

25 (Applause.)

1 WELCOME AND PRESENTATIONS

2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
3 thank you, thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: Council will
5 be at ease.

6 (Council at ease.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: At this time
8 the Chair recognizes Councilman Cohen who will
9 present a resolution honoring the Philadelphia Wages
10 for Housework Campaign. Will Ms. Kathy Miller and
11 those accompanying her please join the Councilman at
12 the podium.

13 COUNCILMAN COHEN: The integration of
14 men and women in the City Council of Philadelphia is
15 very obvious. The last resolution authored by and
16 read by Councilwoman Blackwell featured mostly men.
17 The two Councilmembers, Councilman Ortiz and I, the
18 honorees today feature mostly women. I think it's a
19 very healthy development. And I'm honored to be
20 part of it.

21 This is a resolution honoring the
22 Philadelphia Wages for Housework Campaign, the
23 Philadelphia Coalition of Labor Union Women and the
24 Philadelphia and Pennsylvania Chapters of the
25 National Organization for Women for their efforts to

2 eradicate the inequities in the treatment of women
3 and supporting their activities for pay equity on
4 International Women's Day. That activity will
5 include beginning at noon today in the Council
6 Caucus Room, a participation by many working women
7 in the City of Philadelphia of a two-hour lunch
8 period, one hour of which represents a strike for
9 fair play by women, a one hour extension of the
10 lunch period is being celebrated today throughout
11 the nation and throughout the world.

12 Whereas, this City Council previously
13 passed a resolution to recognize Equal Pay Day as
14 the day established to draw national attention to
15 the wage gap between women and men, a gap that
16 according to the National Committee of Pay Equity
17 has widened since last year so that women in the
18 United States working full time earn 72 cents to
19 every dollar a man earns, with black women earning
20 65 cents and Hispanic women 52 cents compared with
21 white men; and

22 Whereas, according to the International
23 Labor Organization, women perform two-thirds of the
24 world's work and two-thirds of this work is unwaged;
25 and

2 Whereas, the 1995 United Nations Fourth
3 World Conference on Women in which the United States
4 government participated, that conference agreed to
5 measure and value unwaged work and include that
6 value in economic statistics. Yet this decision has
7 still not been implemented in the United States; and

8 Whereas, after retirement, women with
9 pensions receive 53 percent of what men receive in
10 pensions while many women have no pension at all;
11 and

12 Whereas, among the world's
13 industrialized countries, the United States has the
14 highest proportion of women living in poverty.

15 I would like to just repeat that because
16 it generally comes as an enormous surprise to
17 people.

18 Whereas, among the world's
19 industrialized countries, the United States has the
20 highest proportion of women living in poverty.
21 Sixty percent of those living below the poverty line
22 are women with dependent children, and 1 in 6
23 children are living in poverty; and

24 COUNCILMAN ORTIZ: By the way, also has
25 the highest proportion of children living in

1 WELCOME AND PRESENTATIONS

2 poverty.

3 Whereas, the US is one of only six
4 countries surveyed by the United Nations that does
5 not have paid maternity care policy for women. The
6 US has also posed international agreements which
7 call for other financial benefits for women
8 including paid breast feeding breaks; and

9 Whereas, economists as well as trade
10 unions have said that a factor widening the US wage
11 gap between women and men is welfare reform which is
12 forcing hundreds of thousands of women, mostly
13 single mothers, into the lowest paying jobs or
14 community service for no pay at all; and

15 Whereas, on March 8, 2001, International
16 Women's Day women and girls around the world and in
17 Philadelphia mobilizing a global women's strike to
18 highlight the major inequities that women experience
19 as a result of their work being unpaid and under
20 paid and as a result of racism, homophobia and other
21 discrimination; now therefore

22 COUNCILMAN COHEN: Be it resolved that
23 the City Council of Philadelphia honors the
24 Philadelphia Wages for Housework Campaign, the
25 Philadelphia Coalition of Labor Union Women and

2 Philadelphia and Pennsylvania Chapters of the
3 National Organization for Women for their efforts to
4 eradicate the inequities and the treatment of women
5 and supports their global women's strike activities
6 on International Women's Day, including the call for
7 a two-hour lunch break against no pay and low pay
8 and for pay equity.

9 Be it further resolved that an engrossed
10 copy of this resolution be presented to the leaders
11 of the aforementioned organizations which will occur
12 immediately thereafter as evidence of the sincere
13 sentiments of this legislative body. Signed by
14 President of City Council Ann Verna, introduced by
15 Councilmember David Cohen and cosponsored by every
16 member of City Council. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: The Chair
19 recognizes Ms. Miller for remarks.

20 MS. SCHULENBERG: Actually, it's been
21 replaced by Ms. Schulenberg from the Wages for
22 Housework Campaign. But on behalf of Kathy Miller
23 and Kathy Black and Pat Albright from our group and
24 all the groups that are represented up here, I
25 wanted to say that one of the nice things about

2 having an event like this is that it's already been
3 a success before we've even begun because we've
4 accomplished the seemingly impossible, grassroots
5 women acting together on a common theme across
6 divisions of race, nationality, language, sexual
7 preference, age, religion, disability, economic
8 situation and most particularly across national
9 borders.

10 The global women's strike has changed
11 the content and impact of International Women's Day,
12 returning to grassroots women, this time drawing out
13 deep and wide international connections among us.
14 Women in cities, towns, in villages and well over 60
15 countries, thousands of E-mails, thousands of hits
16 on the web site, thousands of links from other web
17 sites, and thousands of actions from around the
18 world from Welfare Warriors to Ranging Grannies and
19 now the Grammy-winning Rage Against the Machine
20 which have given us new legitimacy in our children's
21 eyes.

22 Support from men has been very
23 considerable as they've grasped the connection
24 between women's interests and their own as workers,
25 as parents, and as members of society. And the same

2 thing can be said that's true about the City Council
3 resolution. It's already been a success. First of
4 all, you've already passed it so we're not sitting
5 on pins and needles, but also look what came
6 together to get this, grassroots, labor, and
7 feminist groups as represented Wages for Housework,
8 CLUE, and NOW. Traditionally seen as representing
9 different groups, unwaged, low waged, and career
10 women with little to do with each other. But we
11 have everything to do with each other and we have
12 support from over 30 organizations, many of whom are
13 standing up here today. We are united in the United
14 States and with women around the world and are
15 determined to see that any women's crisis is our own
16 crisis and in our refusal of no pay and low pay and
17 our demand for pay equity and payment for caring
18 work. For these demands we have won unanimous City
19 Council support and awareness and we are grateful
20 for that support and particularly to Councilman
21 Cohen who, taking a lead from President Verna, we
22 now affectionately refer to as Councilwoman Cohen,
23 and also to Councilmen Ortiz and Councilman Cohen's
24 wonderful staff, in particular, Tim Kearny.

25 But two hours for lunch is extraordinary

2 when many women only have 30 minutes and many women
3 work through that 30 minutes. But we warn you, our
4 next request may have more teeth in it. We might
5 actually ask for pay. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Councilman, do
8 you anyone else in the group who wants to speak?

9 Council will be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: The Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Kenney.

13 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you, Madam
14 President. Due to Council business, I must leave
15 the Chamber. I have no bills or resolutions today.
16 I'd like to be recorded voting yes on all bills and
17 resolutions while in my absence.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Thank you. At
19 this time the Chair recognizes Councilman DiCicco
20 who I understand has some visitors that he would
21 like to recognize.

22 COUNCILMAN DI CICC0: Thank you, Madam
23 President. This morning I have two groups of
24 students. One group are students from the Regional
25 High School from 11th and Market, and I would ask

2 them to stand up and be recognized.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN DI CICCIO: The second group
5 are five students from the Francis Scott Key
6 Elementary School in South Philadelphia, Raven
7 Washington, Edward Herrell, Julie Chore, Keng Chee,
8 Steven Pham. They're accompanied by the librarian
9 from that school, Rochelle Nocito. These kids
10 produced a digital mural on the history of South
11 Philadelphia. That was done by a grant from
12 Microsoft. This is a 7 foot by 9 foot mural. It is
13 on display at the Methodist Hospital in South
14 Philadelphia on South Broad Street, and I would urge
15 everyone who is in that vicinity to stop into the
16 hospital. It is an amazing piece of digital artwork
17 that these young students, and they're stand back
18 there if you can see them, created along with
19 several other students from the school. They will
20 be with me most of the day today. We're going to
21 have lunch in a short while over at the Hard Rock
22 Cafe. They deserve it. So I'd like for you to give
23 them a big round of applause.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT VERNA: Wonderful.
25 Welcome.

25 And a resolution approving the

redevelopment contract of the Redevelopment Authority of the City of Philadelphia for the redevelopment and urban renewal of a portion of the Model Cities Urban Renewal Area, designated as Parcel No. 219.

And an ordinance amending Title 14 of the Philadelphia Code entitled "Zoning and Planning" by adding a new section 14-1620 entitled "Keystone Opportunity Zone Special District Controls" prohibiting residential uses in certain deteriorated areas of the City and providing for services of the relevant city departments of certain applications relating to the use of the property in such areas.

And an ordinance authorizing the Streets Commissioner on behalf of the City to execute an intergovernmental agreement for the Southeast Pennsylvania Regional Household Hazardous Waste Education, Collection, and Management Project, under certain terms and conditions.

19 the Members of Council to join me in paying tribute
20 to a valiant Philadelphia hero. Gertrude Alston
21 Alexander Barnes died on Thursday past, March 1st.
22 She was an outstanding, dedicated to Delta Sigma
23 Theta Sorority and a North Carolina Sister and a
24 very good friend of my grandmother's. She was a
25 crusader for children, a champion of the absolute

13 growth in numbers has not meant a growth in economic

16 But it is significant that this country as it
17 reaches the 21st century is going back to it's
18 native roots of Spanish becoming probably the second
19 most predominant language in the land as it was when
20 it began being known as America. So I think it's
21 something that we will see and we will celebrate as
22 we continue to grow. Thank you, Madam Chair.

3 resolution calling for the City of Philadelphia,
4 hopefully, the Mayor's Office and Public Property to
5 put -- I found out last week that we subscribe to
6 three weather, two for the Department of
7 Transportation and one for the Aviation Department.
8 The reason I did this was since the television news
9 stations have gotten our weather forecasting into a
10 ratings war -- I mean, one of the stations, Channel
11 10, was interrupting the 10 o'clock news over a week
12 ago and scared the daylights out of everybody. And
13 although this weather forecasting isn't an exact
14 science, possibly if it's by a service and we put it
15 on our cable access station, SEPTA does it with a
16 resolution I did in my first year of Council, they
17 put all the routes, snow emergency routes on there.
18 If we could do this with the cable access station,
19 maybe the people will feel a little better and would
20 trust the actual forecast they're going to get.
21 Now, we realize it's not an exact science, but what
22 happens here is people panic and they rush to
23 supermarkets, buy shovels, buy bread and milk. I
24 don't know what we're doing with all the bread and
25 milk.

2 Councilwoman Tasco says they're
3 shoveling the bread and milk. I'm not about sure.
4 But it really disrupts the daily life of the people
5 in this City and the whole region. They were
6 sending people home from school early. My youngest
7 son got sent home three days in a row, Friday,
8 Monday and Tuesday, and I didn't shovel any snow so
9 it couldn't have been that bad. It all melted in
10 one day.

11 So what we have to do is get this done
12 and I urge the Mayor and the Managing Director and
13 the Department of Public Property to get this on the
14 public access station so the people have faith again
15 in the forecast. If the company that the City hires
16 doesn't forecast correctly, we hire someone else
17 that has a better track record forecasting the
18 weather. Thank you, Madam President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT Verna: Thank you.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman Cohen.

21 COUNCILMAN COHEN: Thank you, Madam
22 President. Just short announcement. All members
23 Law and Government Committee, just a reminder, at
24 1:30 this afternoon continued hearings on the health

18 Final thing, just an added note. I was
19 remiss have in not expecting that the "Daily News"
20 follow the "Inquirer" as being supporters of tobacco
21 lobby. If you saw the "Daily News" over the last
22 week, there have been two full-page ads in the name
23 of Wawa but actually from the tobacco lobby urging
24 people to buy Malboro Cigarettes. They're for sale
25 at reduced rates with a caution in the corner that

2 nobody pays any attention to saying "This add is
3 intended for only adults who smoke."

4 Thank you, Madam President.
