16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon. Thank you. We've
18 established a quorum. We will now
19 consider the actions to be taken on the
20 bills and resolutions before the
21 Committee today.

22 First, I would like to
23 recognize Councilwoman Parker. Chair
24 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

1 you, Mr. President.

2 Mr. President, colleagues, I
3 want to make some comments about Bill
4 No. 210442, which was the parking tax
5 legislation that I introduced.

6 Mr. President, it took the gun
7 violence epidemic plaguing our City and
8 nation, the global COVID-19 pandemic,
9 that's claimed over 600,000 lives in the
10 U.S. and over 3,705 in our City, the
11 world witnessing in various forms the
12 heinous murders of Black people that
13 could have been avoided, Mr. President,
14 if our lives and humanity truly
15 mattered. And there's the opioid crisis
16 that's now touching people from all
17 walks of life that is also experiencing
18 the kind of empathy that quite frankly
19 didn't exist when crack cocaine
20 destroyed many Black communities in the
21 1980s, and really people weren't during
22 that time talking about creating another
23 loan, government funding being invested
24 in safe havens or safe crackhouses for
25 those who were addicted.

1 Nonetheless, it took all of
2 this, all of these things to in essence
3 form what I refer to as the perfect
4 storm, that it appears some needed for
5 many folks to even acknowledge that
6 systemic racism is real and it needs to
7 be eliminated everywhere it exists, that
8 the overall poverty, social, economic,
9 educational and public health
10 disparities that many of us have been
11 fighting to eliminate all of our lives
12 deserves our laser-like focus, time,
13 attention and investment in both the
14 public and the private sector.

15 It is with this in mind,
16 Mr. President, that I have always
17 believed that good jobs, the kind that
18 put people on a path to self-sufficiency
19 so that they can enjoy the dignity that
20 comes with being able to take care of
21 themselves and their families in their
22 own rights. I believe that those good
23 jobs, Mr. President, are an essential
24 part of the solution to addressing many
25 of the ills that you heard me mention

1 earlier.

2 Now, for the thousands of Black
3 men and women, African national men and
4 women, and others from our global
5 communities who are or will be parking
6 workers and live in our great City of
7 Philadelphia, I want you to know and I
8 want you to hear me clearly that I will
9 never be apologetic about attempting to
10 use every tool possible to help ensure
11 that your job is what my grandmother
12 will call a good job, the kind that puts
13 you on a path to self-sufficiency.

14 They also know, these workers,
15 that I am no Johnny-come-lately as it
16 relates to the challenges faced by those
17 in this industry. It mattered to me
18 then, then is after the meeting I held
19 with them, residents of my District who
20 work in this industry, and it matters to
21 me now. That's why I introduced
22 legislation a few years ago that was
23 passed by this Council, mandating just
24 cause for firing and instituting minimum
25 staffing requirements for parking lots

1 and garages. And if the parking
2 operators do not comply, then there are
3 consequences.

4 But this time, Mr. President,
5 we tried to bring the industry and
6 workers, many of whom the workers
7 represented by SEIU 32BJ, to hammer out
8 a compromise that would help to bring
9 these workers out of poverty. We were
10 attempting to secure industry-wide
11 standards that if they were adopted by
12 all firms, they would have provided
13 these men and women with an increase in
14 wages, okay, from a range of \$10 to \$13
15 an hour to \$17 to \$19 an hour, fully
16 paid, employer, union health care,
17 health care, you know equally as great
18 as the health care we receive as City
19 employees, a 401K retirement plan, eight
20 paid sick leave days per year, five paid
21 vacation days in the first year of
22 service that would have then gone up to
23 10 in the second year. This was our
24 goal and a model that could have been
25 duplicated across many industries,

1 Mr. President, for low-wage essential
2 workers.

3 This time we did try to bring
4 all of those parties together, listen,
5 to affirm that any tax cuts be
6 inextricably connected, listen, via a
7 written agreement to the quality of life
8 of workers and not just a philosophical
9 ideal. I heard a lot of that lately,
10 Mr. President, philosophical ideals.
11 Why did we want the written agreement to
12 be connected to the proposed tax cut?
13 Because we all know that the citizens of
14 Philadelphia, they cannot eat ideals
15 alone. They cannot heat their homes
16 with ideals alone. They cannot keep
17 their lights on with ideals alone. And
18 ideals alone, Mr. President, will not
19 ensure their safety, nor will ideals
20 alone lift the citizens of Philadelphia
21 out of poverty.

22 They need good jobs, good jobs,
23 good jobs, because that is the only
24 economic justice that will not only just
25 lift them out of poverty, but it will

1 ensure and encourage their full
2 participation in the social, economic
3 and political processes that govern the
4 distribution of scarce resources that we
5 need to keep our City thriving.

6 Ultimately, yes, it's
7 unconscionable that the out-of-state
8 parking operators literally squandered
9 this opportunity and instead they made a
10 decision to continue to pay poverty
11 wages rather than come to the table to
12 negotiate and lift their employees, our
13 Philadelphia citizens, out of poverty.

14 Mr. President, this fight is
15 not over. I will continue to stand with
16 low-wage essential workers and do
17 everything I can to bring them out of
18 poverty. This will not deter me one
19 instant from continuing to work towards
20 a day when every worker in the City of
21 Philadelphia is paid a living wage with
22 real benefits and can provide for their
23 own families in their own right. The
24 fight for fair wages and equity
25 continues, and I welcome everyone who

1 believes as I do to join our efforts in
2 moving forward.

3 I thank you, Mr. President.

4 Although we can't mandate \$15 to \$17 per
5 hour, we can't mandate retirement
6 security, we can't mandate the kind of
7 health insurance that if you and your
8 wife or your family get sick and they
9 need to go to the hospital to have a
10 surgery, that you won't be in debt for
11 the rest of your life because they
12 needed to seek medical treatment. There
13 will be a day, and we will continue to
14 fight for fair wages and equity.

15 I thank you and our colleagues
16 for your time and patience,
17 Mr. President. We will be holding this
18 bill, and there will be no further
19 activity relative to this bill during
20 our budgetary process. Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman, and thank you
24 for your continued fight for those of us
25 that need the support of all of us.

1 Thank you very much.

2 Next, we will move to Bill No.
3 200655. Chair recognizes Councilmember
4 Parker for a motion on Bill No. 200655.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you, Mr. Chairman.

7 I move that Bill No. 200655 be
8 reported from this Committee with a
9 favorable recommendation and further
10 move that the rules of Council be
11 suspended to permit first reading of
12 this bill at the next session of
13 Council.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can
15 I get a second.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Second.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 Chair notes that was Councilwoman --

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Oh.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Councilman Oh. It's been moved and
22 properly seconded that Bill No. 200655
23 be reported from this Committee with a
24 favorable recommendation and further
25 move that the rules of Council be

1 suspended so as to permit first reading
2 of this bill at the next session of
3 Council.

4 All those in favor of the
5 motion will signify by saying aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Nay.

10 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Nay.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
12 is Councilwoman --

13 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Gym.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 Councilman Thomas?

16 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Yes,
17 Council President. Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. Let the record reflect that
20 Councilwoman Gym and Councilman Thomas
21 voted nay. The motion is carried.

22 Next up will be Bill No.
23 210324, an amendment that was circulated
24 that I referenced earlier.

25 The Chair recognizes

1 Councilwoman Parker for a motion on the
2 amendment to Bill No. 210324.

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
4 you, Mr. Chairman.

5 I offer an amendment to Bill
6 No. 210324. A copy of the amendment has
7 been circulated to all members of the
8 Committee. I move that the amendment to
9 Bill No. 210324 be approved.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Second.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you. It has been moved and
13 properly seconded that the amendment to
14 Bill No. 210324 be approved. This will
15 stay in Committee if approved.

16 All those in favor of the
17 motion will signify by saying aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Those opposed?

21 (Background interruption.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Who
23 was that?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

1 ayes have it. The motion carries. The
2 amendment to Bill No. 210324 has been
3 approved. This bill will stay in
4 Committee before further action.

5 Next, we'll move to Councilman
6 Oh's amendment Bill No. 210322. I
7 understand that Councilman Oh has an
8 amendment to the operating budget to
9 offer.

10 Councilman Oh; is that correct?

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes, that's
12 correct, Council President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Has
14 the amendment been circulated to
15 Members?

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes, it has.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh for a
19 motion on his amendment to Bill No.
20 210322.

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
22 Council President.

23 I offer an amendment to Bill
24 No. 210322. A copy of the amendment has
25 been circulated to all members of the

1 Committee. I'd like to be recognized for
2 comment before I move that the amendment
3 be approved.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Please do, Councilman.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
7 much, Council President.

8 There are many important issues
9 facing this City. The Creative Arts
10 Economy is not an issue. It's a proven
11 solution to many, if not, all of these
12 problems, and that's been well-
13 documented. It's done so with almost no
14 support from government, with a notable
15 exception of Mayor Ed Rendell who
16 encouraged and recognized Philadelphia's
17 future in arts, culture, creativity,
18 innovation and tourism.

19 I've heard far too many
20 intelligent but uninformed or
21 misinformed people say, this City has
22 more important issues than arts and
23 culture. While this City has many
24 pressing issues, it doesn't have many
25 solutions. One of the largest, most

1 impactful, sustainable and equitable
2 solutions can be found in the arts and
3 culture economy. It's a huge economy.
4 It's a huge economic engine that will
5 either grow dramatically or fail
6 dramatically based on what government
7 decides to do.

8 I tell people it's not a hobby.
9 It's not a plaything of rich elitists.
10 It's not a nonself-sustaining sector
11 that's fully dependent on nonprofit
12 dollars. It's an ecosystem that
13 includes a huge for-profit sector.
14 Regionally, its 55,000 full-time jobs
15 benefit our City. In Philadelphia
16 alone, \$3.4 billion a year of economic
17 impact benefit our population, our
18 communities with salaries,
19 opportunities, self-work, mentorship,
20 education, entrepreneurship, financial
21 independence and even wealth.

22 In Philadelphia alone, Arts and
23 Culture provides 37,600 full-time jobs.
24 Last year our City lost 62,800 jobs. If
25 we were to imagine that the average

1 salary and benefits were at least 40,000
2 per job, that would be \$2.5 billion in
3 lost annual wages. The total jobs lost
4 in this City since 1970 when we had
5 920,400 jobs is a quarter million jobs.
6 We've lost a quarter million jobs since
7 1970.

8 We have steadily lost jobs
9 until recently. Then we started to
10 regain jobs, and jobs were growing until
11 COVID-19. In 2019, Philadelphia had
12 740,600 jobs. But as I said, we lost
13 63,000 jobs last year. Now, there's
14 677,800 jobs. Is that number
15 increasing, decreasing or staying level.
16 Clearly, investing in an existing
17 economic engine is a very wise thing to
18 do. Doing tax cuts without associated
19 jobs is wishful, putting stimulus
20 dollars into structural debt is at best
21 temporary and will not solve this
22 problem.

23 On Saturday, I was helping a
24 local coffee company with their public
25 launch. The contribution of arts and

1 culture to this simple promotion can be
2 listed as follows: Three young adults
3 were hired as models and they got paid.
4 One is a full-time aspiring model. One
5 is a part-time model who is a full-time
6 teacher, and one is a full-time college
7 student.

8 A photographer got paid. The
9 setting was at the Azalea Garden at the
10 Art Museum. The gardeners and all the
11 workers at this iconic location are
12 being paid. We use three mugs as props.
13 Each were designed, manufactured and
14 paid for. There was a bag of
15 chocolate-covered pretzels that the
16 company makes, and we used that. That
17 bag was designed, manufactured, everyone
18 got paid. The pretzels were baked in a
19 local plant, which was saved from being
20 closed, so everyone there kept their
21 jobs and got paid. The company is now
22 hiring 25 new workers at its warehouse
23 for \$15 an hour based on the product
24 sales thanks to advertising. The coffee
25 is imported, which means it's shipped,

1 delivered and sold. Everyone is getting
2 paid and sales taxes are being paid.

3 While the models were modeling
4 the product, music was being played.

5 Musicians, producers, audio engineers,
6 studio, songwriters, everybody got paid.

7 City wage tax will be paid. Property
8 tax will fund our City and schools.

9 Rent will be paid. An Uber driver got
10 paid, and the advertising company will
11 be paid.

12 The City will be promoted. The
13 logo is a Liberty Bell, a historic,
14 cultural and international symbol of
15 freedom located here in our City. \$930
16 million in annual household income is
17 paid. It's unlikely these people are
18 not going to be a source of
19 homelessness, crime and gun violence.
20 \$157 million annually in local taxes
21 help fund our school, social service,
22 anti-violence programs like the ones
23 advocated by members of this City
24 Council.

25 All of this is a result of

1 organic economic engine that has been
2 running without government funds.
3 Because of the devastating damage done
4 by COVID-19, this homegrown job and
5 opportunity creator needs government
6 assistance to keep laying the golden
7 eggs that it has been laying all this
8 time.

9 I'd like to talk about the
10 impact on underserved communities, which
11 is widely acknowledged, hip-hop, urban
12 fashion, dance, popping, locking, jazz,
13 gospel music, fun, DJ'ing, EDM. For
14 those much older than me, they'll
15 remember when we had the Sound of
16 Philly, Sigma Sound Studio, Philadelphia
17 International Records and how that
18 impacted our African-American community,
19 bringing wealth and prestige into our
20 communities, created collaborations.
21 How about live jazz and comedy on 52nd
22 Street. Yeah, that was a thing when
23 52nd Street was live entertainment.

24 What about film, television,
25 drumline, graphic designer, set design,

1 carpentry, stage handlers, audio
2 engineers, producers, photographers,
3 advertise, video recording, television
4 crews, pre- and post-production,
5 computer work. Film truck drivers last
6 time I checked got 150,000 a year,
7 Teamsters, for driving a film production
8 truck, screenwriters, novelists, poets,
9 spoken word artists and so much more.

10 The equity and the opportunity
11 in the Arts has defied racial barriers,
12 prejudice and discriminatory laws
13 throughout our history, and a lot of it
14 borne in Philadelphia. According to the
15 Cultural Alliance, Philadelphia's Arts
16 and Culture economy lost \$310 million in
17 revenues between 2020 and 2021. In
18 order to restart the Creative Arts
19 Economy and prevent it from collapsing,
20 Council's Committee on Global
21 Opportunities and the Creative and
22 Innovative Economy has been working on
23 this issue since the start of COVID-19.
24 That's because performing venues were
25 the first to close, first to lay off

1 workers, first to refund ticket sales.
2 They still paid rent and all their other
3 bills, and they'll be the last to open.
4 This impacted the rest of the sector's
5 ecosystem. How much more to save and
6 restart and grow the arts and culture
7 sector.

8 A Creative Arts Economy needs
9 more than a \$45 million fund. It's not
10 enough, but it's the least that we could
11 do. This is what our Committee came up
12 with based on meetings with industry
13 leaders, based on a public hearing that
14 we held. There's 36,000 full-time jobs
15 in Philadelphia alone and a bright
16 future and a very competitive global
17 market where cities and countries around
18 the world have a strategy to take music,
19 art, film and build an economic engine
20 of their own on that.

21 This economy is undergoing
22 serious changes and shifts. We should
23 not disregard what others are so
24 determined to build. Our artists and
25 related workers will leave our City,

1 take their dollars, their families,
2 their opportunities to more supportive
3 locations here in the U.S. and abroad.

4 The American Rescue Plan
5 federal stimulus dollars was given to
6 our City. Council decide what to do
7 with that \$1.4 billion. That's the role
8 of Council. Now, the Mayor has offered
9 his proposal, but he doesn't make that
10 decision. He's got an idea. Now, I
11 disagree with his idea, and I think many
12 Councilmembers do as well.

13 We believe that the stimulus
14 dollars should be used to revitalize our
15 economy, create those jobs. I've
16 offered this amendment, which includes
17 fully restoring the City's Arts budget,
18 creating a new fund for the Creative
19 Arts Economy along with a very
20 reasonable amount of funding for livable
21 communities. That is, specifically 45
22 million into City Council for the
23 creation of a Creative Economy Recovery
24 Fund; 2.2 million into the Manager's
25 Director Office to restore the Office of

1 Arts Culture and the Creative Economy;
2 the Philadelphia Cultural Fund and the
3 Greater Philadelphia Film Office; \$14
4 million to increase the funds to
5 Planning and Development for the Housing
6 Trust Fund to restore prepandemic
7 funding levels; 6 million to the Land
8 Bank for planning and development to
9 restore funding to the Land Bank for
10 operations and acquisitions; 3.75
11 million for Parks & Rec for prepandemic
12 funding; 1.67 million to match FY20
13 funding for commercial corridor
14 cleaning, storefront improvement,
15 business security camera programs, and
16 finally \$1 million for infrastructure in
17 the Managing Director's Office to create
18 a sidewalk repair strategy as
19 recommended by the 2018 Sidewalk Policy
20 Transportation Community Development
21 Initiative, and to restore Vision Zero
22 program funding for Fiscal Year '20.
23 That's collectively livable communities
24 request.

25 This is in summary the

1 amendment that I've provided. It is in
2 writing, and I will move that the
3 amendment be adopted.

4 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ:
5 Second.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded that
8 the amendment to Bill No. 210322 be
9 approved.

10 All those in favor will
11 indicate by saying aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (Nay.)

16 COUNCILMAN OH: I'll request a
17 roll call vote, Council President, for
18 clarity. Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Certainly.

21 Mr. McDermott, a roll call.

22 THE CLERK: Councilmember Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

24 THE CLERK: Councilmember
25 Brooks.

1 (No response.)
