2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started.
4 We're going to have a very long day, so
5 if the members will take their seats.

6 I just want to say before we
7 get started -- I'll actually say it in
8 the script -- that we have a
9 significantly long list of individuals
10 wishing to comment today. I'm not sure
11 if they're here in person. So we are
12 going to have to pare that list back,
13 one, because of the length of the list,
14 but on the same subject matter there's a
15 significant number of individuals, and
16 under the rules, we're allowed to pare
17 that list back.

18 We're going to try to do the
19 best we can to accommodate as many people
20 as possible, but, again, we have a very,
21 very, very long day in terms of the
22 number on the legislative agenda today.

23 So I just wanted to say that
24 ahead of time.

25 We're going to get started. We

2 have established our quorum and Council
3 will now come to order.

4 To give our invocation this
5 morning, the Chair recognizes Rabbi Robyn
6 Frisch of Temple Menorah Keneseth Chai.
7 She is here today as the guest of
8 Councilman Driscoll.

9 I would ask all members and
10 guests to please rise.

11 (Councilmembers, guests, and
12 visitors rise.)

13 RABBI FRISCH: Thank you,
14 Council President Clarke.

15 Thank you, Councilman Driscoll,
16 for granting me the honor of being here
17 today.

18 I stand humbly before God and
19 before all of you, aware that just three
20 days ago we marked Juneteenth. But just
21 as the Israelites' freedom from slavery
22 from Egypt didn't bring them immediately
23 to the Promised Land, Juneteenth didn't
24 mark the end of the journey for slaves
25 and for their descendants.

2 While there's certainly reason
3 to celebrate Juneteenth, there's still
4 much work left to do, and we can't let
5 this week pass without recognizing it as
6 a call to action.

7 Our biblical heritage commands
8 us not to oppress the stranger, because
9 we were slaves in the land of Egypt.
10 Similarly, Juneteenth should remind all
11 Americans of our responsibility to our
12 fellow human beings.

13 We must remember that each
14 human being is created in the image of
15 the divine, and ensure that everyone can
16 exercise their God-given right to
17 freedom, to dignity, and to opportunity.

18 In Philadelphia, we look to the
19 esteemed members of our City Council for
20 guidance in this endeavor. May you
21 always keep in mind that a leader is a
22 servant, and to serve -- and to lead is
23 to serve.

24 The leaders of this Council
25 serve the people of this city, not just

2 those with wealth and power and influence
3 and connections, but all people. And in
4 performing your responsibilities, we pray
5 you'll never lose sight of the biblical
6 command: Justice, justice shall you
7 pursue. This means justice and, where
8 appropriate, mercy for everyone, for the
9 last, the least, and even for the lost.

10 For each of you on the City
11 Council, the leaders and the servants of
12 the people of Philadelphia, I ask for
13 that blessing upon you with the words of
14 the priestly benediction:

15 May God bless you and keep you.
16 May God's countenance shine upon you and
17 be gracious to you. May God always be
18 with you.

19 And may each of you be blessed
20 with the most precious gift of all in the
21 essential, sacred work that you perform
22 in City Council. May you be blessed with
23 the gift of shalom, of wholeness, and of
24 peace, and may you help to bring shalom
25 to this great city of ours.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it. The motion carries.

22 And our next order of business
23 is communications, and I would ask the
24 Clerk to please read the messages from

3 CHIEF CLERK: From the Mayor to
4 the President and members of the Council
5 of the City of Philadelphia, pursuant to
6 Sections 4-604 and 2-307 of the Home Rule
7 Charter, I am today transmitting to the
8 Council the recommendation of the City
9 Planning Commission on the following
10 bills: Council amendments to Capital
11 Program and Budget, Bill Nos. 230144 and
12 230145; and I am pleased to advise you
13 that on June 21, 2023, I signed all of
14 the bills which were passed by Council at
15 its session on June 8, 2023, except Bill
16 Nos. 230308 and 230318, which I am
17 returning without my signature, and Bill
18 No. 230319, which I am returning
19 disapproved.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 And our next order of business
23 is the introduction of bills and
24 resolutions. I would ask the Clerk to
25 please read the titles of the legislation

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
5 Phillips offers two resolutions, a
6 privileged resolution honoring Dallas
7 Hubert as a Hero of the 9th Council

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Today's Calendar.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a
13 non-privileged resolution renaming the
14 1400 block of Vernon Road, at the
15 intersection of Michener Avenue, to "John
16 F. White, Jr. Way."

17 Mr. President, Councilman
18 Phillips would like to be recognized on
19 this resolution.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair recognizes Councilman Phillips.

22 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Good
23 morning, Council President. Good
24 morning, colleagues. And good morning,
25 viewing public.

2 Today I'm introducing two
3 resolutions. The first one I'm
4 introducing is to honor Dallas Hubert as
5 a Hero of the 9th Councilmanic District
6 for his laudable service to the
7 community.

8 Dallas has dedicated himself to
9 ensuring our neighborhoods are clean,
10 avidly participating in community
11 clean-ups across our district. In all
12 that Dallas Hubert does, he furthers the
13 progress of our city, Philadelphians who
14 through dedication and excellence
15 contribute in a meaningful way, and he's
16 an example of what that looks like to be
17 an integral part of our community and to
18 its functioning of creating wholeness to
19 our city.

20 So as the Ninth District
21 Councilmember, I am making it my business
22 to ensure that the sincerity of my
23 gratitude for Dallas Hubert's service is
24 heard loud and clear.

25 Thank you, Mr. Hubert.

2 He's not here today, but he'll
3 be recognized later on.

4 The second resolution I'm
5 introducing is to rename the 1400 block
6 of Vernon Road to John F. White, Jr. Way.
7 His legacy and career has been of a
8 fervent public servant. He's often
9 forgotten when we discuss Philadelphia
10 legends, but he is undoubtedly one of
11 them.

12 From being a State
13 Representative, a Ninth District City
14 Councilmember, Secretary of the
15 Department of Public Welfare, and
16 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
17 Housing Authority, to now being the
18 President and CEO of The Consortium, John
19 White, Jr. has done it all.

20 John White throughout his
21 career has taken on issues related to
22 education, juvenile justice, prison
23 reform, social welfare, and energy.
24 While in these Chambers, John White, Jr.
25 held Council's first hearing on HIV and

2 AIDS, and he increased awareness about
3 fetal alcohol syndrome and spearheaded
4 the Emergency Utility Fund, assisting
5 Philadelphians with heating bills.

6 Many of the programs John White
7 began during his tenure at the Department
8 of Public Welfare have stood the test of
9 time. Their enduring success of his
10 programs is a testament to White's vision
11 and dedication to improving healthcare in
12 this state.

13 For all these reasons and more,
14 I'm proud to honor John F. White, Jr. for
15 his lifetime of admirable service to the
16 City and Commonwealth.

17 Thank you, Council President,
18 and thank you, City of Philadelphia.

16 All in favor indicate by saying
17 aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and that resolution is
24 approved.

25 That will be on today's Final

3 will be on the next session's Calendar.

4 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Yes, sir.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
6 on, Mr. Decker.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Johnson.

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
10 Council President.

11 I just want to also just echo
12 the sentiments and acknowledge and thank
13 my colleague for introducing the
14 resolution for a street renaming for a
15 gentleman who I always considered to be a
16 giant amongst men when it comes to
17 politics here in the City of
18 Philadelphia. Also, as the CEO of The
19 Consortium that specifically deals with
20 those who are addicted to drugs and have
21 mental and behavioral health issues, he's
22 always been a forefront advocate and also
23 working with this body to make sure that
24 we're doing all the things possible when
25 we address the issue of trauma and

2 behavioral health and mental health
3 issues when it comes to the residents
4 here in the City of Philadelphia.

5 So I too concur and support the
6 introduction of the resolution supporting
7 John White, Jr., former Councilmember,
8 Secretary of Health here in the State of
9 Pennsylvania, and saying good job.

10 Thank you, Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Bass.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
16 Mr. President.

17 I wanted to join my colleagues
18 as well on just recognizing former
19 Councilman and former Secretary, John
20 White, Jr., who has been -- you know, I
21 like to think of him as sort of like a
22 quiet storm in the background, playing in
23 the background, but at the same time, he
24 can really bring the thunder and the fire
25 as needed.

2 He has a level of experience
3 around City government that is really
4 unmatched, particularly in these areas.
5 And so when I need advice or counsel, I
6 go to seek wise counsel from John White,
7 Jr., and he is always available and has
8 made himself really a legend in this
9 city. And a lot of people just really
10 haven't recognized that over the years,
11 but I think that, Councilman Phillips,
12 you're doing a great job in recognizing a
13 former Councilman who has done a
14 tremendous amount of work for the City of
15 Philadelphia, and I'm honored to stand
16 with him on that.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Jones.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

23 And, Member Phillips, that is a
24 good recognition. I would only
25 historically submit that he was

3 he moved to the Northwest, and he now
4 resides back in West Philadelphia, but we
5 can have the street naming up in your
6 district.

9 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you very
10 much.

11 Mr. Decker, please proceed.

12 I'm sorry. The Chair
13 recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
15 Mr. President.

16 I served with John White in
17 Council after he had been a star in
18 Harrisburg and spent a lot of time with
19 his dad, John White, Sr. as well, and
20 phenomenal family and a phenomenal guy.
21 He is a superstar in this city, has been
22 for 40 years, and it's probably the
23 easiest vote I've ever had to take.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

3 Mr. Decker.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Thomas
5 offers one bill and two resolutions,
6 entitled "An ordinance providing for the
7 submission to the qualified electors of
8 the City of Philadelphia of the proposal
9 set forth in a Resolution approved by
10 Council proposing an amendment to The
11 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter relating
12 to the creation of the Philadelphia
13 Prison Community Oversight Board"; and

14 A privileged resolution
15 honoring and congratulating the Champions
16 of the Week, Father Judge High School
17 baseball team, for their victory at the
18 2023 PIAA title baseball game, marking
19 the first time a Philadelphia team has
20 won a state baseball championship.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Thomas.

25 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good

2 morning, Council President.

3 Good morning, colleagues. You
4 can clearly tell I'm happy to be back.

5 Thank you to all of my
6 colleagues for all of your support and
7 everything over the last month.

8 We're here today to recognize a
9 phenomenal historic occasion. If you see
10 the back of City Council, that's not
11 security. Those are actually high school
12 students who look like grown adults, and
13 at the end of the day, I just want to
14 take a moment to commend Father Judge's
15 baseball program.

16 Thank you to my colleague
17 Councilman Driscoll, who is the District
18 Councilperson who co-introduced this
19 resolution with me. And like it was said
20 in the resolution, this is the first time
21 ever that we've seen a PIAA District 12
22 team win a state championship of
23 baseball. This team won the Catholic
24 League Championship, they won the City
25 Championship, and the State Championship.

2 So they got the entire trifecta this
3 year, 25 wins, 2 losses, 11 and 1 in the
4 Catholic League. And before coming into
5 Council, I asked them, I said, well, how
6 many of you are seniors, and over five of
7 them, maybe close to a half dozen said
8 that they are seniors. And I said, well,
9 how many of you plan on continuing your
10 academic journey after high school, and
11 all of them said that they planned on
12 doing it.

13 So if you know anything about
14 winning a championship -- I fortunately
15 do -- you never ever, ever, ever forget
16 these moments. No matter where you go in
17 life, no matter where you matriculate to,
18 no one is ever going to take away the
19 fact that you're the first team in the
20 City of Philadelphia's history to
21 accomplish what you've accomplished.

22 So we're proud of them, and
23 let's give them a round of applause.

5 Thank you, colleagues, for
6 supporting this.

7 Thank you to the coaches,
8 teachers, and athletic directors, and
9 thank you to the parents who allowed your
10 children to represent the City of
11 Philadelphia and represent us well.
12 Thank you, everybody.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you.

15 Awesome. Congratulations, and
16 thank you so much, and thank you for
17 representing your city well. Awesome
18 stuff.

19 Thank you. That will be on
20 next session's Calendar.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And Councilman
22 Thomas also offers a non-privileged
23 resolution proposing an amendment to The
24 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter to provide
25 for the creation of an independent Prison

2 Oversight Board and Office of Prison
3 Oversight and providing for the
4 submission of the amendment to the
5 electors of Philadelphia.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Referred to committee.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones
9 offers three bills and three resolutions.
10 On behalf of Council President Clarke, an
11 ordinance to amend the Philadelphia
12 Zoning Maps by changing the zoning
13 designations of certain areas of land
14 located within an area bounded by
15 Mayfield Street, 6th Street, Indiana
16 Avenue, and Marshall Street.

17 And on his own behalf,
18 Councilman Jones offers an ordinance
19 establishing a no parking regulation on
20 both sides of Forbidden Drive between
21 Bells Mill Road and Wises Mill Road; and

22 An ordinance authorizing the
23 installation of all-way stop signs at the
24 intersection of 34th Street and West
25 Allegheny Avenue.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those three bills will be referred to
4 committee.

5 Hold on, Mr. Decker.

6 Councilman Driscoll, am I late
7 on recognizing you? Are you good?

8 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: I'm good,
9 yeah.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 Proceed, Mr. Decker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
14 resolution welcoming Narendra Modi, the
15 Prime Minister of the Republic of India,
16 on the occasion of his historic Official
17 State Visit to the United States.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Today's Calendar.

20 CHIEF CLERK: And a
21 non-privileged resolution calling on the
22 leadership of the City of Philadelphia,
23 as well as state and federal partners to
24 develop an anti-crime and anti-gun
25 violence summit that will create a

2 forward-focused solution-oriented game
3 plan for the 100th Mayor's consideration.

4 Mr. President, Councilman Jones
5 would like to be recognized for a motion
6 on this resolution.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
10 Mr. President.

11 Last week I recognized the
12 individual efforts of members to deal
13 with solutions to the gun violence and
14 crime problem in the City of
15 Philadelphia. What we got from your
16 leadership was a key point person to be
17 that one entity to be able to hold
18 accountable for crime, anti-violence, gun
19 violence in the City of Philadelphia.
20 Whether it's additional appropriations by
21 my members, whether it's public policy
22 such as what do you do when the shooter
23 is with you, whether it is Kensington
24 Marshall Plan, all of those things have
25 to be thought out, worked out, not with a

2 sense of pointing at the problem but all
3 of us working together pointing at the
4 solution.

5 You took us to different
6 municipalities, and what we learned from
7 that was that they could work together,
8 break down the silos, and figure ways to
9 make it better for the citizens. Over
10 the summer, we hope to begin that work.

11 Many schools are getting out
12 and got out last week, but many good
13 educators, good teachers said to their
14 students, we're going to give you a
15 homework assignment so that you don't
16 fall back during the summer. Well, this
17 is similar.

18 Over the summer, we hope to
19 work with the private sector and the
20 public sector, educational institutions,
21 universities to come up with a game plan
22 that we can present to the 100th Mayor of
23 the City of Philadelphia.

24 We'd like both of the
25 recommended nominees to sit in on it.

2 They don't have to comment. They just
3 need to listen.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 Councilman, did you want a
8 rules suspension on that?

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. I move
10 that Council of the City of Philadelphia
11 suspend the rules to allow this
12 resolution to be considered at today's
13 session of Council.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
16 been moved and properly seconded.

17 All in favor of the motion.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

18 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
19 you, Council President. I'd actually
20 like to speak on the former resolution.

21 I'd like to take a moment to
22 acknowledge the incredible work of
23 Abdul-Aliy A. Muhammad. Abdul-Aliy is a
24 native of West Philadelphia and continues
25 to honor their roots through community

2 activism, collective care, and art.

3 They founded the Black and
4 Brown Workers Cooperative, a direct
5 action collective that challenges,
6 resists, and dismantles systems that
7 oppress working-class Black and brown

10 medication strike to protest abusive
11 workplace conditions and sexual violence
12 against staff and patients at a local
13 non-profit and served as a source of
14 support and care for the family of slain
15 transgender neighbor Dominique "Rem'mie"
16 Fells.

17 And something I've had the
18 privilege to work with Abdul-Aliy on is
19 Finding Ceremony, their initiative with
20 Dr. Lyra Monteiro to honor the remains of
21 Black and brown Philadelphians unjustly
22 used as specimens by the Penn Museum.

23 I could go on and on, but I
24 know we will hear from Abdul-Aliy
25 directly and many of their supporters and

2 friends during public comment.

3 So I want to conclude by
4 thanking Abdul-Aliy, especially for their
5 work organizing and supporting Black,
6 queer, transgender, and HIV-positive
7 Philadelphians, especially those who

9 experience homelessness or are disabled.

10 At the start of Pride Month, I
11 remarked that Black and brown
12 transgender, non-binary, and gender
13 non-conforming residents experience
14 unacceptable levels of discrimination,
15 marginalization, and oppression, and that
16 we have to do much more to wrap our arms
17 around them. I am grateful Philadelphia
18 has Abdul-Aliy working to uplift these
19 communities each and every day.

9 The Chair again recognizes
10 Councilman Jones for the purpose of
11 calling up bills and resolutions on the
12 regular Second Reading and Final Passage
13 Calendar today.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
15 again, Mr. President. In addition to the
16 bills and resolutions on today's Consent
17 Agenda, the following bills and
18 resolutions are being brought up for

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 Before considering the
6 resolutions and bills today, we are going
7 to consider the public comment. It will
8 go as follows:

9 Okay. Your public comment must
10 concern matters on the Second Reading and
11 Final Passage Calendar for possible
12 action at today's Council session. All
13 speakers will be called based on the
14 sequence of their signing up for today.
15 Once you have signed up, you will be
16 called in the order in which your name
17 appears on the sign-up sheet.

18 Today we will ask you to alter
19 your testimony to two minutes. We have a
20 significantly long agenda and we want to
21 make sure that people have an opportunity
22 to speak before tonight. So please
23 adjust your testimony to reflect the
24 two-minute time limit.

25 In order to be fair, we intend

2 to hold faithfully to the established
3 time limit. And when you begin speaking,
4 you'll see a green light on the podium.
5 When you see green, it is your time to
6 speak. When you see yellow, you will

9 that you please conclude your remarks and
10 adhere to our guidelines.

11 I want to thank you very much
12 for your anticipated cooperation.

13 Mr. Decker, I want to ask you
14 to read the first name on the list.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
16 today, Mr. President, is Conlan Crosley,
17 commenting on 230534.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MR. CROSLEY: Thank you,
20 members of Council. I am Conlan Crosley.
21 I am a former member of the Department of
22 Licenses and Inspections where I worked
23 as a construction plan review specialist
24 and building code official. Prior to my
25 time in the Department, I worked as a

2 union carpenter, a construction safety
3 officer doing construction safety audits
4 and training since I've been an OSHA
5 trainer for the last decade and a union
6 carpenter for 24 years.

7 I'm a lifelong Philadelphian, a
8 dad, a husband, and an advocate for
9 labor, and served in all capacities,
10 including shop steward with the United
11 States Brotherhood of Carpenters and
12 staff representative for AFSCME Local
13 2187.

14 When I was hired, I thought I
15 would refire from the Department of
16 License and Inspections, and I even
17 earned a Master's Degree in Human
18 Resources so that I could eventually take
19 a leadership role within the Department
20 when I was ready.

21 Things started to change when
22 we got new leadership and it was crystal
23 clear they had an agenda. Dangerous
24 contractors were now referred to as
25 customers, and inspectors had targets on

2 their backs and were made examples of
3 when customers were made to follow the
4 rules.

5 Due to my background with
6 AFSCME, I fought with management at every
7 turn, and things became clearly unhealthy
8 for me. My wife and my father asked me
9 to seriously begin taking a new job.

10 Two years after I left the
11 Department, I won a unanimous decision I
12 had filed with the Pennsylvania Labor
13 Board in an unfair labor practice with
14 the Commonwealth. The judge could not
15 believe the level of hubris and hostility
16 that the Department had during the
17 meetings.

18 During my tenure with the
19 Department, I came across a lot of hard
20 workers that were made up into rank and
21 file inspectors who did the important
22 work of keeping Philadelphian citizens
23 safe on a daily basis. You never hear
24 about these tireless civil servants
25 because when they're doing their job

2 correctly, there aren't buildings
3 collapsing, and poor construction
4 activity is not in the news, meaning a
5 lot of Philadelphians are kept safe.

6 Life safety is always and
7 should be a code official's primary
8 responsibility and goal when they come to
9 work. However, the last few years the
10 Department has forgotten its core values
11 and has become a hostile place, and
12 punitive retaliatory behavior is the norm
13 on the 11th floor for License and
14 Inspections brass.

15 This environment has led to
16 dozens of quality inspectors to leave the
17 Department.

18 Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
20 is Peter Burns, commenting on 230532.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. BURNS: Hello. My name is
23 Peter Burns. I'm here to support the
24 resolution for Philadelphia Reparations
25 Task Force to study and develop

2 reparations proposals for Black
3 Philadelphians, descendants of enslaved
4 Africans in the United States.

5 I'm a member of White Men for
6 Racial Justice. We are a national
7 community with a strong presence here in
8 greater Philadelphia.

9 The study of reparations is
10 welcome, and its formal and concrete
11 implementation is overdue. I support the
12 Task Force and look forward to the repair
13 and truth-telling that will result.

14 Ta-Nehisi Coates argues: To
15 celebrate freedom and democracy while
16 forgetting America's origins in
17 slavery -- in a slavery economy is
18 patriotism a la carte. If Americans
19 claim ownership of the celebrated aspects
20 of their past like democratic
21 institutions, they need to likewise take
22 responsibility for the negative aspects.

23 I would add that we can say two
24 seemingly unaligned things are true.
25 While I and others may believe our city

2 and our country as well is exceptional,
3 then it stands to reason that status
4 cannot go unexamined. We can say that
5 Philadelphia is a place of love and
6 opportunity in so many ways, and yet at
7 the very same time we have to work to do
8 the -- we have to acknowledge the
9 negative past. In fact, by addressing
10 the harmful past of slavery and its long
11 legacy, our city becomes more whole and
12 comes together as something new and
13 better.

14 All of us are diminished by
15 false narratives and the myths we tell
16 ourselves regarding slavery and its
17 legacy. These narratives placate those
18 who would bury the past, and they
19 continue to gaslight and hold back those
20 whose ancestors were enslaved and all who
21 still today suffer the many effects of
22 systemic injustice.

23 I'm enthusiastic that the
24 Reparations Task Force can lead to a city
25 of which I can be even more proud, and

2 even as I acknowledge our shared history,
3 my or my ancestors roll in harm in my own
4 part in reparations.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
6 going to ask --

7 - - -

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
12 I'm going to ask you all to
13 please adhere to the timeline. I'm
14 trying to let everybody get in, but we
15 really need to comply with the timeline
16 that's been established today. Thank
17 you.

18 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
19 is Makayla Coleman, commenting on 230532.
20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MS. COLEMAN: Good morning. So
24 my name is Makayla Coleman.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Go

2 ahead.

3 MS. COLEMAN: What are
4 reparations? By definition, reparations
5 are the acts or process of making amends
6 for a wrong.

7 Reparations for the Black and
8 brown residents of Philadelphia are past
9 due, and not just reparations in the form
10 of money while continuing to turn a blind
11 eye to the systemic inequalities and
12 disadvantages that allow Black and brown
13 communities continue to face.

14 Not reparations that allow
15 systems that continue to characterize and
16 classify me based on the color of my
17 skin.

18 Not reparations that allow
19 systems to continue to keep people who
20 look like me mentally, physically,
21 emotionally, and spiritually broken.

22 And definitely not reparations
23 that allow systems to be built that lead
24 to shattered dreams and a loss of hope.

25 After years, decades, and

2 centuries of exclusions, how long will we
3 have to experience the residual of
4 slavery's effects, feeling disadvantaged,
5 and when a little boy or girl asks why,
6 the only response is given "because of
7 the color of your skin"?

8 Schools have taught me, us,
9 about our history, the struggle, the
10 sadness, the pain, and the suffrage,
11 slavery. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.,
12 Rosa Parks, Harriet Tubman, Malcolm X,
13 and that's where the psychological
14 warfare with self-acceptance of your
15 place in this world begins.

16 The fact that we were once the
17 greatest -- the world's greatest
18 influencers, and I'm not talking about
19 social media influencers, but instead I'm
20 talking about the kings, queens,
21 teachers, artists, healers, engineers,
22 and architects --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Leslie, let me handle it.

25 MS. COLEMAN: How did we get

2 here? Leaders like my great-grandfather,
3 civil rights activist, George Sawyer from
4 Savannah, Georgia, who fought for fair
5 housing, equal employment opportunities,
6 integrated schools, and safer
7 neighborhoods from the late '40s until
8 his untimely death in the late '90s, from
9 Georgia all the way to the greater City
10 of Philadelphia, has been wiped from
11 history, buried with them.

12 So when I talk to you about
13 reparations, I'm not talking about -- I'm
14 talking about systemic and systemic
15 transformation.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Okay.

18 MS. COLEMAN: Resources

19 being --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Ma'am, I'm going to need you to wrap it
22 up, though.

23 MS. COLEMAN: Absolutely.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I

25 want to be fair.

2 MS. COLEMAN: Absolutely.

3 A reconstructed school system
4 that works for everyone, equitable
5 housing, food insecurity, job insecurity,
6 life security.

7 Until reparations are granted,
8 excuse me as I continue to fight three
9 times harder to get one-fifth of what I
10 deserve.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
12 need you to wrap up.

13 MS. COLEMAN: Excuse me if I'm
14 not motivated to stand for the National
15 Anthem and Pledge of Allegiance.

16 Excuse me if I sleep --

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Ma'am, ma'am, all due respect, I can't
19 give you like five minutes and everybody
20 else gets two minutes. All right? So
21 please bring it to a conclusion.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
3 testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
5 is Richard White, commenting on 230532.

9 MR. WHITE: Good morning.
10 Thank you for introducing this
11 resolution.

12 In 1781, Catto wrote not to
13 appeal the Gradual Abolition Act of 1780.
14 In 1838, James Forten and Robert Purvis
15 wrote an appeal of the 40,000 citizens.
16 In 1865, the USCT 8th Regiment from
17 Philadelphia went to Texas to help
18 liberate those under confederate control.
19 In 1864, Octavius Catto organized and
20 attended the Equal Rights League
21 Convention. In 1948, Richard White, Sr.
22 created the National Freedom Day.
23 Between 1954 to 1968, Raymond Pace
24 Alexander and Cecil B. Moore led protests
25 and lawsuits to desegregate Girard

2 College. In 1968, State Representative
3 David P. Richardson led the march for
4 African Americans to study in the
5 Philadelphia public schools.

6 These persons, others, and
7 communities were asking to do no harm.

8 From 1684 through the present,
9 the Colony of Pennsylvania and the County
10 of -- and City of Philadelphia has
11 facilitated harm on Black Philadelphians
12 by legislations and regulations. This
13 resolution is a step in the healing of
14 Black Philadelphians.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

8 MR. MCKENZIE: Good morning.
9 My name is Osaze McKenzie and I'm here to
10 support the reparations legislation.

11 Most people associate Manayunk
12 with restaurants, bars, boutiques, but at
13 one time Manayunk was a mill town where
14 their Main Street covered in textile
15 mills through Leverington Avenue well
16 past Shurs Lane.

17 By 18th century attempts at
18 large-scale mechanism technology,
19 manufacturing is largely unsuccessful.
20 Textile mills proliferated the region in
21 the early 19th century. England's
22 restrictions on the transfer of
23 technology to America were increasingly
24 circumvented, and numerous European
25 immigrants with expertise at textile

2 production settled in the region and set
3 up factories.

4 The invention of the cotton gin
5 in Georgia 1793 made possible the
6 processing of enormous amounts of raw
7 southern cotton to be shipped to
8 Philadelphia mills. While the
9 introduction of steam power and rail
10 transportation in 1820s and 1830s spurred
11 further expansion of the local textile
12 industry, industrial communities such as
13 Manayunk, Frankford had developed on the
14 strength of the early water power mills
15 became major textile centers in the
16 antebellum period, joining Germantown,
17 which had been a long locus of hand-free
18 knitting mills.

19 The truth is, slavery was a
20 national phenomena the North, including
21 Philadelphia, shared in as well.

22 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 morning.

9 MR. ALI: Good morning, members
10 of Council. My name is El Ali. I am
11 Chiricahua Apache, Eastern Cherokee, and
12 Black.

13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Grand
14 Rise OCO. This is Standing Rock
15 (unintelligible), direct blood line to
16 (unintelligible.)

17 MR. ALI: While African slavery
18 is often acknowledged as a crucial factor
19 of the development of plantation
20 agriculture in the southeastern colonies,
21 the role of American Indians at the
22 source of labor is often omitted.

23 Both before and during African
24 enslavement in the Americas, American
25 Indians were forced to be labor as

2 slaves. American Indian and slavery is a
3 piece of history of slavery that has been
4 glossed over.

5 It is well documented that
6 between 1492 and 1880 more than eight
7 million American Indians were enslaved in
8 the Americas, in addition to the
9 12.5 million African slaves.

10 As with Africans shipped to the
11 America, Indians were transported from
12 their native communities on the East
13 Coast to labor elsewhere slaves in the
14 Caribbean Islands.

15 Instead of viewing the
16 victimization of Africans and Indians as
17 two entirely separate processes, it
18 should be compared, contrasted, and
19 treated as one. Doing this will shed
20 more light on the consequences of
21 colonialism in the Americas.

22 The history is important,
23 because without slavery and unfree labor,
24 European colonization in the New World
25 would have been limited. Generations of

2 blood descendants of American Indians who
3 were enslaved and whose families that
4 continue to live in the City of
5 Philadelphia should not be excluded from
6 the Reparations Task Force.

7 If the Task Force seeks to
8 address the legacy of slavery and
9 discrimination, how can many of you walk
10 on the streets across the City that are
11 named after American Indian peoples still
12 intentionally exclude us? And this is
13 our homeland for thousands of years.

14 Therefore, it is vital that
15 this Task Force also includes the
16 descendants of American Indians who were
17 slaves in their efforts towards true
18 reparations, acknowledging the full
19 extent of the slave trade and its impacts
20 of poverty, education, and gentrification
21 today in this city.

22 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MS. BRICKLIN: I'm handing out
21 a longer version since I'm going to be
22 cutting.

23 My name is Shoshanna Bricklin,
24 an ordained Hebrew Priestess and
25 congregant of Mishkan Shalom Synagogue in

2 Roxborough. I am part of a recently
3 formed Reparations Committee and am
4 speaking for our committee in strong
5 support of this resolution.

6 Our synagogue's committee was
7 an outgrowth of our participation in a
8 four-day intensive training this past
9 January co-sponsored by the Mayor's
10 Commission on Faith-Based Initiatives and
11 Interfaith Affairs entitled "Creating a
12 Culture of Reparations." Eighty-five
13 people representing 15 area congregations
14 attended the course, with the goal that
15 they would learn and discern about
16 reparations and create congregational
17 plans for implanting this much-needed
18 antidote to systemic racism in our city
19 and country.

20 Our committee has already begun
21 to work engaging fellow congregants
22 grounded in our own religious teachings.
23 For Jews, many of whom came here as
24 immigrants in the last century, the
25 question has always been, what does this

have to do with me? But we are guided by the teaching of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, scholar, friend, and ally of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King. Heschel reminds us that in a free society, some are guilty, but all are responsible. To put it another way, how have we as white people benefited from this system as complicit subjects, even if we didn't enslave anyone or have businesses that used materials produced by enslaved labor?

Moving forward in our congregational work, the principles deeply embedded within our tradition tell us, among other things, and I will cut, in Deuteronomy we are told justice, justice you shall pursue.

Rabbis of the Talmud deliberated about the right thing to do when we discovered that the house in which we live was built on a stolen beam. One rabbi argues that the entire house must be torn down and the beam returned.

2 Another rabbi argues that it makes no
3 sense to destroy the home, yet some form
4 of acknowledgment and compensation is
5 owed to the owners of the stolen beam.

9 argument is relevant today.

3 MR. STEVENS: Good morning. My
4 name is Craig Stevens. I live in Mount
5 Airy, which used to be part of
6 Germantown, and I want to thank, first of
7 all, Councilmembers Brooks and Gauthier
8 for introducing this ordinance today and
9 the Council for moving ahead and
10 supporting it.

11 I also want to honor the
12 National Coalition of Blacks for
13 Reparations in America, which has been
14 one of the more strongest committed
15 groups nationally in the last several
16 decades pushing for some consideration of
17 reparations through Congress through
18 HR-40, which now even President Biden
19 supports. And also I want to honor
20 Rashaun Williams and Breanna Moore, who I
21 think are both here today. You are the
22 local chapter leaders who have pushed
23 this through with the support of many
24 groups across the City.

25 I'm a member of Unitarian

2 Universalist in Mount Airy. We are fully
3 behind this legislation and hope to be
4 supporting it across the City. Many of
5 us, particularly I as a white person and
6 also a descendant of a family that
7 enslaved hundreds, if not thousands, of
8 people in the South, in Virginia, and
9 even starting in Barbados, that white
10 people have a key role to play. One is
11 to examine whatever privilege they may
12 have experienced going back to their
13 origins coming to this country, whether
14 it was poor or rich, and the comparative
15 benefits they received, even such as
16 being able to swim in a public pool
17 without harassment, acid, and other
18 things being done to prevent you, or
19 whether it's making a job advancement.

20 So I urge you to examine your
21 own consciences and see the part you can
22 play in bringing about wholeness in the
23 City.

24 Thank you.

17 as the President of the Philadelphia
18 branch NAACP to speak on this issue of
19 great importance to our community and our
20 nation as a whole - reparations.

21 I am in support of the
22 resolution introduced by Councilmembers
23 Gauthier and Brooks authorizing the
24 creation of the Philadelphia Reparations
25 Task Force to study and develop

reparations proposals for Black
Philadelphian descendant enslaved
Africans in the United States.

Reparations, in the simplest
form, are compensation for past harms
inflicted on a group of people in the
case of African Americans. Reparations
would be a recognition of centuries of
people in case of long enslavement,
oppression, and discrimination that our
ancestors endured in this country. The
NAACP believes that reparations are not
only necessary but are long overdue.

The legacy of slavery and
institutionalized racism continues to
impact our community in profound ways.
African Americans face higher rates of
poverty, unemployment, and incarceration
than any other group in this country. We
also suffer from the effects of
generational wealth inequality, as our
ancestors were denied the ability to
accumulate wealth through land ownership
and inheritance.

2 The creation of this task force
3 would supply the necessary data and
4 information to call on our government to
5 acknowledge the atrocities committed
6 against African Americans and to take
7 tangible steps towards repairing the
8 damage that has been done.

9 Reparations could take many
10 forms, including financial compensation,
11 land grants, and investment in education
12 and job training programs.

13 We understand that reparations
14 may be a controversial topic, but it is
15 important to recognize that this is not
16 about assigning blame for seeking
17 revenge. It's about acknowledging the
18 past and working towards a more just and
19 equitable future for our Americans.

20 In conclusion, the NAACP urges
21 our government to seriously consider the
22 issue of reparations and to take action
23 towards rectifying the injustices of the
24 past. We cannot move forward as a nation
25 until we have addressed the sins of our

2 past and take steps to make amends for
3 our future.

4 I applaud Councilwoman Gauthier
5 and Brooks for establishing this
6 resolution and ask that we vote yes to
7 establish this task force.

5 MS. McCURDY: Good morning.

6 Thank you, Council President and
7 Councilmembers. My name is Monica Medina
8 McCurdy. I'm Executive Director of All
9 Together Now Pennsylvania and also
10 representing the P3 Coalition, which
11 stands for Pot Profits for Pennsylvania.
12 The Coalition includes Philadelphia
13 CannaBusiness Association, Black Dragon
14 Breakfast Club, Free My Weed Man,
15 Minorities for Medical Marijuana, and the
16 Pennsylvania Farmers Union. We are an
17 urban and rural coalition.

18 I am also a healthcare
19 provider, a physician assistant formerly
20 working for Community Health Center in
21 North Philadelphia, and I'm a member of
22 Doctors for Cannabis Regulations.

23 The P3 Coalition is calling for
24 full equitable legalization of adult-use
25 cannabis or recreational cannabis. We

2 are opposed to Bill 230448 sponsored by
3 Councilmember O'Neill.

4 I do not speak for the
5 multi-state operators or MSOs who
6 currently dominate the medical marijuana
7 industry. I understand they oppose this
8 bill as well, but we oppose for different
9 reasons.

10 The intent of the bill is
11 unclear. Is the intent to only limit
12 current medical marijuana dispensaries to
13 District 10 and 4 from selling adult-use
14 cannabis at that location, except if they
15 obtain a zoning variance, or is the
16 intent to eventually cover any adult-use
17 cannabis business in the future in the
18 zoning requirement as well?

19 Why is a specific zoning
20 requirement for sales needed at this
21 point in time, before the state has
22 issued a law governing adult-use
23 cannabis? Regulations can presumably
24 allay the concerns that any Councilmember
25 has by requiring adult-use cannabis

businesses to meet with community residents as part of the licensing process.

We would prefer Council put forth a resolution that supports a fully legal and well regulated adult-use market. Legalization with smart regulations will result in greater, not less, public safety, including ensuring children and adolescents do not access the product.

We seek legalization, which only allows independent small business owners to sell adult-use cannabis within the Philadelphia limits. This is so that independent and local owners, primarily BIPOC owners, are able to build generational wealth.

In conclusion, I ask that you please remove that bill from the Consent Agenda and vote on it separately, and when you do vote, to vote no on that bill until you have some more information from the entire cannabis community.

14 Greetings. I am Nabeelah Bey, past
15 female Chairperson around N'COBRA
16 Philadelphia Chapter. I am also a school
17 behavioral health counselor. I am also a
18 behavioral health and mental health
19 doctoral student, and as such, I am in
20 full support of the resolution to advance
21 the Philadelphia Reparations Task Force.

22 N'COBRA has identified five
23 areas of repair. My major interests are
24 behavioral health and mental health
25 repair and the area called peoplehood.

2 The Task Force will work to
3 develop targeted solutions for the
4 disparities continued to be faced by the
5 descendants of Africans enslaved in the
6 United States, also known as DAEUS.
7 Suggested improvement include free
8 college education through the doctoral
9 level, improved housing solutions,
10 fairness and actual reform and
11 rehabilitation in the just us system and
12 other remedies.

13 A few of my suggestions/demands
14 for repair are, culturally sensitive
15 mental health services need to be
16 available to all residents, conveniently
17 located, free of cost and administered by
18 African American professionals.

19 The City should waive all fees
20 and costs associated with legal name
21 changes. This will evoke the principle
22 of Kujichagulia, self-determination, to
23 define, name, create for, and speak for
24 ourselves. Just this seemingly small act
25 will greatly increase the self-esteem of

2 DAEUS people.

3 The City should fund the
4 acquiring of dual citizenship documents
5 and passports for all DAEUS people who
6 apply. It is recommended for all DAEUS
7 people to be a citizen of an African
8 country that has membership in the
9 African Continental Free Trade Area as
10 well as retaining their citizenship in
11 the land that we built free of charge.

12 I want to thank the committee
13 members who introduced the resolution.

25 name is Rob Buscher and I stand before

2 you as the President of the Japanese
3 American Citizens League, Philadelphia
4 Chapter, speaking in support of the
5 Reparations Task Force.

6 I am also -- my family was
7 incarcerated during World War II and
8 received reparations from the United
9 States government. So speaking as a
10 descendant of those who have received
11 this repair and know the power that it
12 gives, I deliver the following brief
13 statement that was unanimously approved
14 by our membership.

15 The Japanese American Citizens
16 League is the oldest and largest Asian
17 American civil rights organization in the
18 country founded in 1929. Our local
19 chapter was established in 1947 by
20 Japanese Americans who resettled in
21 Philadelphia after experiencing the
22 forced removal and eviction from their
23 West Coast homes, forfeiture of their
24 property, and incarceration in the
25 American mass concentration camps during

2 World War II.

3 JACL Philadelphia unequivocally
4 supports N'COBRA Philadelphia and their
5 efforts to establish a Reparations Task
6 Force in the City of Philadelphia. As
7 Japanese Americans, we are no strangers
8 to racism in this country. Our Japanese
9 grandparents and great-grandparents
10 emigrated to the United States in the
11 early 20th century during a time when the
12 KKK was actively lynching Asian
13 immigrants in the West Coast.

14 Beginning in 1790, Japanese
15 immigrants, along with other immigrants
16 from Asian countries, were denied the
17 right to vote and were therefore barred
18 from becoming U.S. citizens. It was only
19 through the friendship, solidarity, and
20 allyship with African American civil
21 rights leaders the Japanese Americans and
22 other Asian American communities gained
23 the right to become naturalized citizens
24 in 1952, gained the right to move freely
25 between the United States and Asia with

2 the 1965 Hart-Celler Act and countless
3 other hard-won legal victories championed
4 by Black activist leaders.

5 Japanese Americans are one of
6 the few communities who have received
7 reparations from the United States
8 government as a result of the Civil
9 Liberties Act of 1988.

10 In the interest of time, I'll
11 just skip ahead.

12 In support of Black
13 reparations, JACL Philadelphia recently
14 joined over 75 other Japanese American
15 progressive organizations in support of
16 the National Nikkei Reparations
17 Coalition. Speaking as a community who's
18 deservedly obtained our own redress, we
19 do not believe that any amount of
20 reparations is capable of erasing the
21 harm, pain, or trauma that persists for
22 generations as a result of the
23 enslavement of Africans, Jim Crow, and
24 other prejudicial regulation. However,
25 we do hope that this will open a space

2 for meaningful conversation and healing,
3 as has occurred in the communities of
4 Japanese Americans.

19 MR. WILCHA: Good morning,
20 Councilmembers. I'm Zach Wilcha, CEO of
21 Independence Business Alliance, and I'm
22 here today speaking on behalf of
23 Philadelphia's LGBTQ+ business community
24 comprised of all races and ethnic
25 backgrounds, industries, and types of

entrepreneurs.

The IBA serves more than 1,000 professionals across 325 member businesses. We want to thank our City Councilmembers for considering voting for an investment in small diverse businesses through reducing BIRT and wage tax and responding to the needs of our businesses as we conveyed them to you. We also want to thank anyone who meaningfully listened to us, even if they favored other paths forward.

In October of 2021, we came together with our local diverse chamber counterparts to work collectively as a community to meet the unique challenges diverse business enterprises face when they engage with our local economy. With the goal of economic uplift for and within diverse business communities, we speak with a united voice on issues where we unanimously align. Our aim is to do good things for businesses and the best thing for people, which we believe are

2 not mutually exclusive.

3 Somewhere along the way, it
4 became a popular notion that helping
5 businesses cannot help our communities,
6 but in Philadelphia, that could not be
7 further from the truth. After our latest
8 survey of member businesses, we heard the
9 voice of our constituents loud and clear.
10 The biggest hurdle to entrepreneurship in
11 Philadelphia is the cost of doing
12 business and, furthermore, that lowering
13 taxes, particularly the business-killing
14 BIRT tax, should be the top priority for
15 the budget this season if we want to
16 create a thriving business environment.
17 In fact, close to 90 percent of our
18 respondents to our survey indicated that
19 reducing it would have a positive or
20 highly positive impact on their
21 businesses.

22 These double taxes, which do
23 not occur in similarly situated cities to
24 Philadelphia, are grinding away at
25 businesses at a historical moment when

resources are thinner than ever. More dangerous for our city's future is the fact that these taxes simply do not exist in neighboring cities and makes the prospect of moving one's business out of the City quite alluring.

We applaud your aggressiveness and plans for over the next year to make sure we can prioritize keeping our businesses alive and thriving.

Overwhelmingly we heard routinely positive feedback from our constituents that last year's reduction in BIRT taxes were essential for the survival of their businesses and how we can not stop now. Our businesses said that they were able to use the money they saved from the BIRT tax reduction to invest in their own businesses in areas such as hiring, security, and cleanliness.

We believe that reductions like these are an indication from City Hall that they are ready to make Philadelphia

3 our communities.

4 Keeping businesses alive,
5 sustainable, and thriving is a
6 progressive move for the City of
7 Philadelphia, and we appreciate your
8 focus on this vital measure.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
11 for your testimony.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: It is
16 appreciated.

17 Mr. Decker.

18 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
19 Mr. Chairman, is Khine Zaw.

20 (No response.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Khine Zaw.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Not here.
23 Next.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Ricki Li,
25 commenting on 230147 and 230149.

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
4 for your patience. Please state your
5 name and begin your testimony.

6 MS. LI: Hi. How are you? My
7 name is Ricki Li. I'm the owner of YD
8 Home and other many businesses. Here I'm
9 trying to represent the Asian business
10 community to ask the City to consider the
11 BIRT and wage taxes for us.

12 First of all, I would really
13 like to thank -- the City of Philadelphia
14 have been many years helping us, and
15 looking back, the reason for a lot of our
16 accomplishment came from a lot of tax
17 reductions, looking at that as an
18 investment that City government is for
19 our business community.

20 For example, we have the tax
21 abatement for the real estate for the
22 last many, many years, and we have -- so
23 for many businesses and real estate
24 already benefit from it. So now we are
25 in the era that we came from Poland. A

2 lot of businesses are struggling with
3 very high inflation, high wage costs, and
4 also very high cost for the high crime
5 rate. So at this time, I really would
6 like the City to invest in the people,
7 who are working so hard, creating jobs
8 and putting their own personal investment
9 to do business in Philadelphia. And I
10 think this time this bill is really going
11 to help us tremendously. Just will help
12 the City of Philadelphia build it up with
13 tax abatement.

14 Thank you very much.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
16 for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Javier Suarez,
22 commenting on 230147 and 230149.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Please state
25 your name and begin.

2 MR. SUAREZ: Good morning. My
3 name is Javier Suarez. I'm the VP of
4 Strategic Partnerships for the Greater
5 Philadelphia Hispanic Chamber of
6 Commerce, and I'm speaking on behalf of
7 our President and CEO, Jennifer
8 Rodriguez.

9 At GPHCC, we firmly believe
10 that entrepreneurship is one of the keys
11 to solving the inequity that encumbers
12 the growth and development of poor and
13 underrepresented communities and should
14 be a priority of City government.

15 Research shows that families
16 who own a business are wealthier than
17 families who do not. And Hispanic
18 families who own a business have four
19 times the net worth of Hispanic families
20 who do not.

21 Entrepreneurs are the backbone
22 of the U.S. economy, but here in
23 Philadelphia, entrepreneurship is on life
24 support. We rank at the bottom of
25 comparable cities for many key indicators

2 of business climate, whether it is the
3 cost of doing business, ease of doing
4 business, or business creation.

5 It is more expensive to do
6 business here than in Los Angeles, San
7 Francisco, or Washington, DC.

8 Nevertheless, according to Pew's Economic
9 Recovery Dashboard, small businesses in
10 Philadelphia with fewer than 50 employees
11 are creating new jobs at a higher rate
12 than the large or mid-sized companies.

13 We know that business taxes are
14 burdensome to small businesses. In fact,
15 70 percent of small businesses surveyed
16 by the Diverse Chambers Coalition of
17 Philadelphia state that lowering crime
18 and taxes should be the top priorities
19 for the government.

20 It is false to state that
21 business tax reductions are achieved at
22 the expense of the working-class and
23 vulnerable residents. Not only does the
24 proposed budget provide increased
25 resources for needed social services, but

2 it should be noted that the primary
3 beneficiaries of BIRT reductions are the
4 locally owned and operated small
5 businesses, the ones that cannot afford
6 accountants to craft tax avoidance
7 strategies. These small businesses
8 generate 33 percent of all jobs in the
9 City.

10 Steady, long-term business tax
11 reductions like those proposed, together
12 with other proposed investments in
13 quality of life and improved safety, will
14 provide a significant boost to the
15 reputation of the City and as a place
16 that values and encourages
17 entrepreneurship and will encourage
18 long-term growth.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
21 for your testimony.

22 Mr. Decker, who is next to
23 testify?

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Regina Hairston.

2 COUNCILMAN JONES:

3 Ms. Hairston.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

6 State your name for the record and please
7 begin.

8 MS. HAIRSTON: Regina A.

9 Hairston.

10 Good morning, Councilmember
11 Jones and the other Councilmembers of
12 this body. I am Regina A. Hairston, the
13 President and CEO of the African American
14 Chamber of Commerce for Pennsylvania, New
15 Jersey, and Delaware.

16 I will not belabor the points
17 that have been stated this morning, but I
18 would like to add an additional
19 perspective.

20 This morning we heard from
21 people before me that talked about the
22 importance of reparations. When we look
23 at Black business particularly, we are in
24 that group of needing reparations as
25 well.

2 This is the second largest
3 diverse city in the United States, with
4 44 percent of the population being
5 represented is Black. However, only 1.8
6 businesses are Black per 1,000 residents.
7 That is 44 percent Black residents, but
8 only 1.8 are owned by Black firms in this
9 city.

10 When we look at investment into
11 Black businesses, we know that 50 percent
12 of Black businesses do not get the
13 funding and the capital that they ask
14 for.

15 So we say to this body, you did
16 the work last year in reducing taxes. It
17 is not about triple-down economics. It's
18 about filling the cups of the folks who
19 need it the most, the Black and brown
20 businesses in this city.

21 What does tax reduction look
22 like for those businesses is about having
23 the capital to reinvest into their
24 businesses so that they can grow in scale
25 at the same level as their peers.

2 We are already behind, folks.

3 We are already behind. So we must put
4 every level of government before us in
5 order to lift up these businesses.

6 So I thank you to Councilmember
7 Isaiah Thomas who has pushed this bill,
8 because our businesses deserve the same
9 type of investment that we see for other
10 populations in this city.

11 So thank you for your time, and
12 I do support these bills.

13 - - -

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.
17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 Mr. Decker.

19 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
20 is Dan Lee.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Mr. Lee.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
23 230144 and 230149.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. LEE: Hello, everyone. My

2 name is Daniel Lee. I am the owner of
3 Farina Pasta and Noodle. We are a small
4 restaurant located right downtown in
5 Center City. I'd like to thank the
6 Councilmembers for hearing me out, for
7 being able to provide this testimony.

8 I'm one of the people that this
9 bill directly affects. By reducing the
10 BIRT tax, the wage tax, it absolutely
11 does put money back in my pockets that
12 I'm then allowed to then go and invest
13 back into my own business.

14 I work about seven days a week.
15 I can't count the hours. I have no clue.
16 But all of my time and all of the extra
17 money that comes back to my business or
18 comes to me goes back into the business.
19 It allows me to hire. It allows me to
20 pay for more events, preparations. I'm
21 able to expand my business. And I can't
22 do that when I'm paying thousands and
23 thousands of dollars in taxes off of
24 money that I don't have, and that's
25 exactly what the BIRT tax does. I have

2 to pay money based off of an estimate of
3 what I'm assuming I'll make. So then I
4 have to pay that over the course of the
5 year, which hinders me during the
6 summertime. It hinders me going into the
7 fall time.

8 So I don't want to go too deep
9 into everything that everybody has
10 already said, but I would like to state
11 that these things directly affect people
12 like me, because I am going to build this
13 restaurant to be the next greatest
14 restaurant, and ideally I'd like to have
15 it centered here in Philly. I want to
16 have the headquarters here in Philly. I
17 don't want to have to move to Montgomery
18 County. I don't want to have to move to
19 Delaware County and drive all of my
20 employees out that way.

21 But unfortunately that tends to
22 be the case when I have to make a
23 decision on where the headquarters are
24 going to be. Do I want to stay in
25 Philadelphia where I'm going to have to

2 pay an additional tax on every one of my
3 employees? My employees are going to
4 have to pay an additional tax just to
5 come into the City. They don't want to
6 do that. They would rather just stay out
7 in Montgomery County.

8 But as the way I see it,
9 Philadelphia needs more headquarters
10 here. And so by relieving the tax
11 burdens off of people like me, where ten
12 years down the line I'm able to create a
13 \$20 million business, that does then mean
14 more taxes, more than what you would have
15 collected in BIRT.

16 Thank you.

17 - - -

19 - - -

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
21 for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Yvonne Gaskin, commenting on 230514.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

2 Please state your name for the record and
3 begin your testimony.

4 MS. GASKIN: Hi. My name is
5 Yvonne Gaskin and I wanted to talk about
6 the bill -- my name is Yvonne Gaskin and
7 I wanted to talk about the Bill 230513,
8 and I'm interested in talking about how
9 it's followed in the City of
10 Philadelphia, and I started to hear
11 comments on my thinking. And I was
12 unable to pay my PECO and my gas bill,
13 and I didn't want to ask anyone here or
14 anyone in the City of Philadelphia to pay
15 it.

16 I am unmarried. We talked
17 about -- I mean, we heard a lot of
18 stories about slavery and things of that
19 nature. So we already know that we
20 shouldn't be following a Black woman
21 home. I don't feel comfortable in my
22 shower. I don't feel comfortable combing
23 my hair. I usually don't look like this.

24 And so I just want to stop --
25 you know, I just want to find out who is

2 following me around and who is reading my
3 thinking and my ideas. And if you could
4 just make it stop, stop reading my ideas,
5 stop reading my thinking so I can get up
6 and get dressed like everyone else in
7 here.

8 I'm also hearing voices about
9 not contacting a person of interest who
10 is a man. I don't want your husband and
11 I don't want your husband to want me, but
12 I just really want people -- I just
13 really want to stop hearing the voices
14 and I just really want to stop hearing my
15 ideas.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
18 for your testimony.

19 - - -

20 (Applause.)

21 - - -

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 230432.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good day.

2 Please state your name for the record and
3 begin your testimony.

4 MS. LANDES: Good afternoon.

5 My name is Lynn Landes, founder of
6 safestreetsphilly.org. I'm here to
7 support Councilmember Jones' call for a
8 summer summit about the problem of
9 violence in the City of Philadelphia, as
10 well as Bill No. 230410 and any other
11 measures that ban safe injection sites
12 from Philadelphia as well as stop
13 enabling substance abuse in general,
14 including recreational marijuana use.

15 Increasingly, we have people
16 coming into our neighborhoods smoking
17 marijuana, which makes us involuntary
18 inhalers of a psychoactive drug. Smoking
19 pot is not the harmless activity many
20 people believe it to be, and I strongly
21 recommend Alex Berenson's book Tell Your
22 Children for an in-depth look at the
23 history and harm of marijuana use.

24 We should also be looking at
25 what other toxins are in our environment

2 that may be contributing to mental
3 illness and criminal behavior. These
4 toxins are in our air, water, soil,
5 consumer products, and medicines,
6 including wireless technology and LED
7 lights. We are all living in a toxic
8 cocktail, but young children are
9 particularly susceptible.

10 That said, City Council should
11 send a loud and clear message that its
12 laws will be enforced by the Police and
13 the District Attorney, and if not, City
14 Council should take these government
15 agencies to court to compel enforcement.

16 And, lastly, we need to rebuild
17 our local businesses, industry, and farms
18 so that we are locally self-reliant as
19 possible. Most people, particularly our
20 youth, are entirely disconnected from
21 reality because we import most of our
22 goods and services, which also leaves
23 many of our citizens with nothing of
24 substance to do. We must turn that
25 around and take charge of our own destiny

2 and well-being.

3 Thank you.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Thank you for

6 The next speaker is Jacqueline
7 Wiggins.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
9 for your testimony.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
12 230532.

13 MS. WIGGINS: Good afternoon --

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MS. WIGGINS: -- City Council,
17 N'COBRA leadership, City of Philadelphia
18 residents, and families. My name is
19 Jacqueline Wiggins. I'm a senior
20 citizen, resident, and a member of
21 N'COBRA. I'm testifying in support of
22 Resolution 230532, and I appreciate the
23 work of Councilmembers Gauthier and
24 Brooks and others before.

25 I am fourth generation removed

2 from enslavement. My great-grandfather,
3 Papa Isaac Brown, was born in 1835 and
4 was enslaved on the Moon Plantation in
5 Newberry, South Carolina. I know he and
6 our descendants and all descendants of
7 the Maafa, the Holocaust that happened in
8 this country, want this resolution voted
9 on in the affirmative and all others put
10 forth nationwide because of its past --
11 it is past time for this study to have
12 happened.

13 Please cast your vote in the
14 affirmative, Councilmembers, but ensure
15 that there is the mandatory
16 accountability and the just and ethical
17 monitoring and enforcement, enforcement
18 of the study's results. Our descendants
19 demand nothing less. The damage must be
20 repaired.

21 And I'd like to add that we
22 lost a mighty giant to the City, state,
23 and country, Mr. Charles Blockson, this
24 week. He will be missed but never
25 forgotten for the critical role he did in

2 lifting the contributions of African
3 Americans in Philadelphia, this state,
4 and the country.

5 Thank you.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Lore Blumenthal.

13 (Witnesses approached podium.)

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
15 for your patience. Please state your
16 name for the record and begin.

17 MS. BLUMENTHAL: Hi. My name
18 is Lore Blumenthal.

19 You are so loved. It's really
20 intimidating to speak on you, because you
21 are the best writer I know.

22 It is an extreme privilege to
23 stand with and honor Abdul-Aliy Muhammad
24 every single day.

25 Right now I want to speak about

2 their friendship. They show up actively
3 in friendship. They have expanded the
4 definition of holding space and care for
5 me. In every interaction, I have known
6 them to radiate kindness, thoughtfulness,
7 and sincerity.

8 I am sure many others here in
9 the room have gotten a call from them
10 checking up on us when we know that
11 they've got a lot to handle and they
12 don't need to be extending themselves
13 anymore. They keep showing up for the
14 survival of vulnerable populations and
15 for the peace of those unalive.

16 I have never known someone to
17 respect human life the way that they do.
18 Abdul-Aliy does the work that wouldn't
19 need to be done if resources were
20 distributed equitably and environment
21 systems of oppression didn't exist.

22 In the face of injustice, they
23 refuse to be quiet or still. They change
24 hearts, systems, and eliminate pathways
25 forward.

2 It is an honor to see you, all
3 parts of you, the shiny and the rough,
4 whatever you're willing to share. I am
5 grateful for the artist, the poet, the
6 journalist, the doula, the community
7 builder, and the friend that you are. I
8 love you.

11 - - -

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Charlyn Griffith-Oro.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MR. MAURICE: Hello. My name
16 is Dennis Maurice. I'm speaking on
17 behalf of Charlyn.

18 I welcome -- and I'm reading
19 her words on behalf of the citation for
20 Abdul-Aliy Muhammad.

21 I welcome everyone in their
22 seats to whisper or say aloud a
23 benevolent Black indigenous ancestor's
24 name, as we are only here thanks to the
25 remarkable spirit of our Black indigenous

2 forebears. I especially must offer up
3 the name of Abdul-Aliy's mother, Mama
4 Melody Beverly, as she is proud of you
5 today and every day in your life.

6 My name is Charlyn Magdalene
7 Griffith-Oro and I am honored to offer
8 comment today on the beloved child of
9 Philadelphia, Abdul-Aliy Muhammad.

10 I say for the public record
11 today that your citation is about the
12 depth and breadth of your imagination,
13 faith, and your brave heart. The manner
14 in which you exhibit love for this place
15 and its people is fierce. This citation
16 is an acknowledgment of your ability to
17 dream of a city and a world that will
18 exist after the destruction of white
19 supremacy and capitalism.

20 For public record today, I say
21 that with all of us here, it must be
22 actualized. Abdul-Aliy, the way you hold
23 this possibility inspires people in every
24 single industry that the City relies on.
25 Your ideas and the language that you

2 shape are present in the stories,
3 programs, and work of local journalists,
4 politicians, and educators and activists.

5 I urge this body today to take
6 Abdul-Aliy's name into the world with
7 respect, giving them the credit they
8 deserve for such inspiration and insight.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 - - -

15 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
16 is Irit Reinheimer.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. MILLER: Good morning. My
21 name is Antoine Miller. I'm reading a
22 statement from Irit, who had to step out,
23 in support of Abdul-Aliy.

24 I've known Abdul-Aliy for many
25 years now. We first met around 2015 or

'16 when we worked together as board members of Mariposa Food Co-op, and we built a friendship since then.

Abdul-Aliy has always deeply committed to their communities. They have worked from within organizations and outside of them, always inviting us to do better and to build toward justice and to repair the harm that's been caused. They asked us to care for one another.

Abdul-Aliy has done this through their journalism, creative writing, organizing, art, protests, acts of solidarity, advocacy, and friendship. They use all the tools they have access to, knowing that there are different tools necessary for different jobs.

This ability to do this, all with love, is their gift to all of us. I'm so glad we have the opportunity today to honor their work, their care, their voice, and their love for their communities through this resolution.

8 is Jake Nussbaum.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MR. NUSSBAUM: Good morning.
13 My name is Jake Nussbaum and I'm here to
14 support my friend, Abdul-Aliy.

15 First, I want to extend my
16 deepest gratitude to them for all of the
17 work they've done, the sacrifices they've
18 made for this city, for all of the people
19 of this city.

20 I've been working with
21 Abdul-Aliy for many years on issues
22 regarding human remains in museums and
23 really people's ancestors being held in
24 museums in Philadelphia. I've seen the
25 sacrifices they have made, the harm they

2 have endured in order to return ancestral
3 remains to their communities and care for
4 those who were not extended care in their
5 after lives. This is care work on the
6 deepest level that I know it takes a
7 tremendous toll on Abdul-Aliy.

8 They have done so much to bring
9 this issue into the public and to bring
10 ancestors home. It is often thankless
11 work. So this is such a beautiful
12 opportunity just to say thank you.

13 But also I know, because they
14 told me before I came up here, that they
15 would want me to bring this issue to the
16 Council as well of stolen remains in
17 museums. So while it is beautiful to
18 honor Abdul-Aliy's sacrifices, it can't
19 stop here. The museums of Philadelphia
20 are filled with the remains of Black
21 indigenous people of color, poor people,
22 disabled people who are desecrated in
23 death and robbed from their resting
24 places. I call on the Council to
25 prioritize this issue and to protect

2 those folks, like Abdul-Aliy who put
3 themselves in harm's way to bring this
4 issue to the light and to bring these
5 ancestors home.

6 We've heard a lot today about
7 reparations, and I want you to consider
8 the importance of returning the remains
9 of ancestors in that process of
10 reparations.

11 So just a big thank you and
12 deep gratitude to Abdul-Aliy for the work
13 you've done on this issue.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Tonya Sears.

22 (Witnesses approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 afternoon.

25 MS. SEARS: Good afternoon. My

2 name is Tonya Sears. I am the cousin of
3 Abdul-Aliy, and I just want to say that I
4 love you. I need to say this publicly.
5 I appreciate you for sacrificing yourself
6 for those who cannot speak for
7 themselves, for those who do not know how
8 to speak out for themselves to have
9 change. And your mother is so proud of
10 you and all our family members that have
11 gone on are proud of you and those that
12 are here now are proud of you, and we
13 support you in everything that you do.

14 MS. MONTEIRO: And I'm Lyra
15 Monteiro, and I have a few words to say
16 as well.

17 I'm a collaborator with
18 Abdul-Aliy in the work of Finding
19 Ceremony in which we have been trying to
20 bring back descendant communities and
21 descendant control over the remains that
22 are kept incarcerated in Philadelphia's
23 museums, including the Penn Museum.

24 And I need to say that as --
25 I'm a professor of history of American

2 studies and of Africana studies at
3 Rutgers University Newark, and I need to
4 put this in perspective the work of
5 Abdul-Aliy, who is an incredible human.

6 This city created the problems
7 we are dealing with now that Abdul-Aliy
8 is trying to resolve. The bodies of
9 people who had to live in the almshouse
10 because they could not provide for
11 themselves were given to doctors by the
12 City. The City's almshouse gave these
13 people's bodies to doctors, and those
14 bodies are now in museums in the City.

15 It is entirely appropriate then
16 that this honor is coming now to someone
17 who is continuing to do this work, but I
18 also need to see that backed up by the
19 government of this city.

20 Additionally, I need to put
21 this in perspective from the perspective
22 of international work. These kinds of
23 projects are being undertaken throughout
24 the world, and Abdul-Aliy Muhammad had
25 made possible what is happening here that

2 is unique, that is individual, and what
3 we can possibly achieve here in terms of
4 returning people to their families is
5 being watched by the entire world.

6 So, again, I am very glad that
7 the City is honoring this person who is
8 bringing the world's attention to
9 Philadelphia here.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 MR. NAGEL: Good afternoon,
4 Council President, members of Council.
5 My name is Adam Nagel and I serve as
6 Director of Government Affairs for Penn
7 Future, a statewide environmental
8 advocacy non-profit, here today to give
9 remarks in support of Resolution No.
10 230514.

11 This resolution reflects the
12 pressing need for relief sought by so
13 many Philadelphians who are struggling to
14 make ends meet in the face of rising
15 utility costs. As the resolution makes
16 clear, residents are facing higher costs
17 for water, electric, and heating and
18 cooling, and also urges the responsible
19 utilities to chart a new sustainable
20 course of action to reduce costs.

21 Over the past year, Penn Future
22 has aggressively advocated for the Water
23 Department and the Kenney Administration
24 to pursue a new path that does not rely
25 solely on ratepayers to fund the

2 Department's operations.

3 We opposed the Department's
4 rate increase and called for the City to
5 invest available federal funds to support
6 capital improvements and relieve some of
7 the need to finance these projects
8 through debt service.

9 But we also understand that the
10 Department is facing increasing costs on
11 its own. In a hearing before the
12 Committee on Transportation and Public
13 Utilities, Commissioner Hayman stated
14 that the cost of electricity and gas is
15 projected to increase for the Department
16 by 11 percent and 19 percent,
17 respectively.

18 This brings us to the larger
19 question facing Philadelphia and every
20 municipality across the country as we
21 grapple with the combined impact of
22 rising utility costs and the growing
23 threat of the climate change: How will
24 we power our buildings?

25 City Council has asserted its

2 role in this critical conversation
3 through legislation related to improving
4 efficiency performance standards and
5 supporting initiatives like the
6 Philadelphia Energy Authority's Built to
7 Last program. Efforts like these will
8 continue to improve energy efficiency and
9 promote sustainability in Philadelphia's
10 built environment.

11 However, there is much more
12 work to be done. Rising energy costs
13 confirm that fossil fuels are
14 increasingly expensive. We also know
15 that from our experience during winter
16 storm Elliott, that they are increasingly
17 unreliable sources of energy when we need
18 them the most. As temperatures dropped,
19 forced outages increased exponentially,
20 leaving many to wonder whether they would
21 have electricity and heat at a critical
22 time.

23 Municipalities across the
24 country are moving forward with ambitious
25 plans to prepare for a clean energy

2 future, and Philadelphia must do the
3 same. We must continue to rebuild our
4 aging infrastructure through programs
5 like Built to Last. We must accelerate
6 efforts to bring renewable energy to
7 municipal buildings. City Council should
8 examine efforts within the Water
9 Department to reduce emissions and
10 utilize renewable energy.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
12 you can wrap it up. You can submit your
13 testimony, if you'd like.

14 MR. NAGEL: Thank you, Council
15 President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Johnson and City Councilmembers. I'm
3 here in support of 230408. I come before
4 you not as the President of ROAD or as a
5 City-accepted RCO head. I come to you as
6 a resident of Grays Ferry who has lived
7 in this area for 44 years. That's all of
8 my life. The only time I ever left was
9 when I went to college.

10 Now I'm going to tell you a
11 quick story about a broken promise that
12 the City forgot but a community
13 remembered.

14 Years ago there was another
15 neighborhood in Grays Ferry, a community
16 where people called it home. As the
17 story goes, the City offered and told the
18 families, let us fix your houses and you
19 will be able to move back into brand new
20 homes. That neighborhood is now home to
21 Fresh Grocer, McDonald's, and other
22 commercial businesses.

23 Those kids who lived in that
24 neighborhood are now grown with
25 grand-kids, no longer waiting on that

2 promise of returning home.

3 For as long as I can remember,
4 Grays Ferry has always been overlooked
5 and stood in the shadow of other areas,
6 but we are not shadow dwellers. If you
7 Google Grays Ferry, racism will pop up
8 and its long history, and we know that
9 and as with any bad, there is good.

10 With the gentrification
11 happening, I hardly recognize my
12 neighborhood, but facets of it are still
13 strong. This project that Longfellow is
14 proposing is an opportunity for long-time
15 residents and new residents to have
16 training, jobs, economic development, and
17 most of all partnerships, real
18 partnerships, not someone deciding what
19 they think is best for Grays Ferry but
20 instead asking what is it that Grays
21 Ferry needs and what can we do to help.

22 For the past few weeks, that's
23 what we've been working on with
24 Longfellow. Is it the best agreement? I
25 do not know, but what I do know is that

2 it's an opportunity and a chance for more
3 in a neighborhood that was never
4 forgotten by its residents.

5 For all that I've said, I ask
6 you to support this project.

21 I am going to testify on 230532 instead.

22 So first things first, my name
23 is Khaleef Alexander. I go by Khaleef
24 the Reparationist.

25 I want to thank this body for

3 for, you know, doing something for Black
4 Americans. We've been reaching out to
5 people for about three years now to try
6 to get people involved in the reparations
7 movement, rather it be organizations,
8 politicians, different things of that
9 nature, and I'm just happy that we're
10 seeing something finally happen.

11 Back in 2020, the Mayors
12 Organized for Reparations and Equity
13 forum, they were created by Eric
14 Garcetti, the former Mayor of LA. Over
15 50 mayors nationwide, they signed on to
16 this, including our own, Mayor Jim
17 Kenney. Yet we haven't heard or seen
18 anything about this.

19 However, you know, I want
20 people today to get familiar with the
21 term "lineage-based reparations." Now,
22 what is that? That is a term that was
23 coined by the likes of Dr. Claud
24 Anderson. Dr. Claud Anderson, for many
25 of those who don't know, he served on

2 President Jimmy Carter's cabinet back in
3 the 1970s.

4 Now, I'm saying this because
5 Dr. Claud Anderson testified at Congress
6 over 20 years ago stating that if Black
7 Americans don't get reparations, we're
8 going to go down.

9 Look what we're seeing in Black
10 America today. In fact, look what we're
11 seeing in Black Philadelphia today.
12 We're seeing genocide, homicide, and all
13 types of craziness at the highest levels
14 that many people have seen.

15 So I say this to everyone
16 listening today: We must make sure that
17 this reparations bill passes, but we have
18 to make sure that reparations is lineage
19 based and it focuses on specifics,
20 because when we deal with groups of
21 people in politics, we make sure that we
22 get it right. When we're focusing on
23 Black Americans, we have to make sure
24 that we get it right, and we have to
25 focus on the lineage qualifications.

2 Race-based policies are deemed as
3 unconstitutional, which we know.

4 So I leave off with this: If
5 you support reparations, just say on
6 three with me. One, two, three,
7 reparations now.

8 One, two, three, reparations
9 now. Reparations now.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony. We
13 appreciate it.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Brenda Moore, commenting on 230411.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MS. MOORE: Good morning. It's
20 actually Breanna Moore, and I'll be
21 speaking in support of the resolution to
22 establish a Reparations Task Force in
23 Philadelphia.

24 I want to express appreciation
25 to Councilmember Jamie Gauthier and

3 I would like to express appreciation to
4 my elder as well as the youth and my
5 peers who have spoke so thoroughly today
6 in your public comment.

7 I'm going to keep it short, but
8 I really just want to reflect on the
9 young woman who spoke maybe about
10 15 minutes ago. I see her as
11 representing the root of reparations,
12 which is repair. She came here, and that
13 was a cry to the City for help.

14 So often we ignore people,
15 especially Black people who need this
16 repair. We go on about business as usual
17 and continue to do that. Like my friend
18 just said, we are in dire need right now.
19 We are living in chaos. We're dealing
20 with a shooting every week, a school
21 shooting, gun violence. We get alerts
22 that you can't drink the water. You get
23 another alert you can drink the water.
24 You get an alert you got to wear a mask
25 because the smoke pollution coming from

2 Canada. We are dealing with so much.
3 There is no reason why the City Council
4 should not pass this resolution today.

5 And I'm going to end by saying
6 there is already a law on the books in
7 Philadelphia that was passed in these
8 Chambers in 2005. It's called the
9 Slavery Era Business/Corporate Insurance
10 Disclosure Law. This law requires
11 financial depositories that are doing
12 business with the City of Philadelphia to
13 research their history to see if they
14 have profited from slavery in the slave
15 trade in any way, and if they have, they
16 have to make financial reparations.

17 This law is not being enforced.
18 No financial depository has fulfilled
19 this requirement, yet they're still
20 continuing to do business with the City.
21 It needs to be enforced. Y'all need to
22 check the Procurement Department, the
23 Treasurer Department, and the Law
24 Department.

25 Thank you.

17 bill could be felt statewide when
18 adult-use cannabis is legal.

19 As many of you know, I have
20 spoken in regards to reparations for the
21 past year. In Evanston, Illinois, its
22 revenues from legal cannabis actually
23 benefited American Freedmen, a/k/a Afro
24 Americans, towards their home values and
25 renovations of homes.

2 As you may know too, I was the
3 only reparations candidate running for
4 City Council, and I am extremely happy
5 that one of my main platform planks to
6 form a Reparations Task Force will
7 actually come into fruition.

8 I am actually obviously in
9 favor of this Task Force, but the
10 language has to be amended to reflect who
11 are actually entitled to reparations.
12 Only the American Freedmen are to receive
13 reparations. American Freedmen are known
14 as Afro Americans, African Americans,
15 Black Americans, et cetera, et cetera.

16 American Freedman is a
17 race-neutral, lineage-based designation.
18 Without using the proper language, it
19 will undermine the justice claims for
20 reparations and economic repair.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony. Appreciate
24 it.

14 vote of aye is a vote to override the
15 Mayor's veto and a vote of nay is a vote
16 to sustain the Mayor's veto.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank you

2 so much, Council President.

3 I'm glad to fight for the
4 historic additions to the City's budget
5 and I'm proud to be voting for them
6 today.

7 I'm proud to have successfully
8 led the fight for 3 million in additional
9 funding for mobile crisis response units.
10 Over 200 Philadelphians each day -- 200
11 residents each day seek mental health
12 support, and this funding will help
13 ensure trained mental health providers
14 will be able to respond to every call.

15 I'm proud to have successfully
16 led a fight for \$800,000 in additional
17 funding for the Department of Labor.
18 This funding will be used to hire more
19 staff for the Office of Worker
20 Protections. With the full staff, the
21 Office of Worker Protections could help
22 the City to keep the promises it made to
23 working families when we passed the wage
24 theft ordinance, fair workweek, and the
25 domestic workers' Bill of Rights.

I'm proud to have successfully led the fight for the funding of Pennsylvania Immigration Family Unity Project, which provides legal defense for family members who are threatened for deportation, and for Sickle Cell Disease Foundation, which supports and cares for affected families and a great number of people who are Black, and I want to thank my colleagues who stood with me on that.

But I could not in good conscience vote for the cuts to the BIRT and the wage tax in this budget. These cuts are permanent and reoccurring and will lead to \$107 million in lost revenue over the next five years alone.

With no plan to replace that revenue by reinstating PILOTs or by the Philly Wealth Tax, these cuts will inevitably lead to service cuts, maybe not immediately but certainly down the line.

I would much rather see the money invested in City service that helps

2 small businesses and working families
3 thrive, services like street and street
4 light repairs, trash collections,
5 cleaning and greening of vacant lots.

6 Tax cuts hamper our ability to
7 provide services that are essential to
8 families and businesses alike.

9 And I want to thank you,
10 Council President, and I want to thank my
11 colleagues for supporting the additional
12 revenue that I aimed for.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 Speeches on behalf of the
17 majority?

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Gauthier.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
21 you, Council President.

22 I'm excited by many of the
23 amendments this body made to the City's
24 Fiscal Year 2024 budget. Thanks to your
25 hard work and advocacy, we are making

2 important strides on topics ranging from
3 mobile crisis units, cleaning our
4 commercial corridors, environmental
5 justice, and same-day pay work for
6 returning residents. I am thankful for
7 my colleagues' leadership and
8 partnership.

9 And, yes, we are slightly
10 improving the City's ability to combat
11 quality of life issues, but the
12 incredibly low amount that we are
13 investing to combat this issue is like
14 putting a Band-Aid on a broken bone, and
15 it is a slap in the face to working-class
16 Black and brown residents who have been
17 begging this body to fully fund the
18 services they need to live on green,
19 clean, and safe blocks.

20 The \$72 million proposal City
21 Council united behind was not a pie in
22 the sky number. It was a surgical
23 improvement to life-saving services that
24 was borne from years of collaboration
25 between this body, City agencies,

2 community organizations, and
3 constituents.

4 JustServicesPHL was for every
5 corner of our city, not just West and
6 Southwest Philadelphia. Because as we
7 saw during our Public Safety hearing in
8 Kensington, lacking City services is the
9 status quo across Philadelphia.

10 But we do not need to look any
11 further than the Third District to
12 understand the urgency and importance of
13 significantly improving our municipal
14 services. My constituent services team
15 receives dozens of calls a day, sometimes
16 more, from residents struggling to access
17 very basic services that every taxpayer
18 should automatically receive. But it
19 isn't unusual for my office to receive a
20 picture of a kid who had his teeth
21 knocked out during a car crash or field
22 calls from frustrated RCOs about nuisance
23 businesses that operate illegally and
24 breed crime, including shootings, without
25 any repercussions.

2 And it breaks my heart and
3 blows my mind that because our operating
4 agencies are buckling under the enormous
5 need for their services, my team must
6 climb mountains to help constituents in a
7 timely manner.

8 We frequently acknowledge that
9 the budget is a moral document. I could
10 not vote for this budget because the
11 message I think it sends to our residents
12 is that we value the bottom line of
13 corporations and affluent residents more
14 than investing in the municipal services
15 our neighbors need to thrive and survive.

16 Council's latest tax cuts saves
17 the median resident a mere \$21 annually.
18 That means Philadelphians earning \$53,000
19 annually won't even save enough for a
20 half a tank of gas, and most of my
21 constituents only make a fraction of
22 this.

23 I cannot look my constituents
24 in the eye and tell them we do not have
25 \$9 million to comprehensively combat

2 chronic illegal dumping or \$4 million to
3 slow cars down around schools and parks
4 when we are spending \$32 million on tax
5 cuts annually.

6 I think it is irresponsible and
7 ill advised when many of our residents
8 are not receiving the municipal services
9 they are owed.

10 As the former executive
11 director of a business organization, I am
12 acutely aware of the need to uplift and
13 empower minority-owned enterprises, but
14 these tax cuts will overwhelmingly
15 benefit large non-diverse businesses.
16 Enterprises need an income of a million
17 dollars in revenue to get \$1,800 back,
18 and most neighborhood businesses earn
19 nowhere near this and already have tax
20 exemptions.

21 If we wanted to create a fund
22 for Black and brown small businesses or
23 raise the BIRT exemption, I would be
24 fully on board, but I'm not going to
25 support a handout for affluent companies

2 that have the means to pay taxes when we
3 should be investing in the services our
4 neighbors and neighborhood businesses
5 tell us they need to thrive.

6 I could not in good conscience
7 vote to authorize a budget that decreases
8 our revenue during a time where we should
9 be spending money on vital services. And
10 every time we get a call about illegal
11 dumping or dangerous driving or blight,
12 we'll be painfully reminded about the
13 choice we made today to prioritize big
14 business over community.

15 To my colleagues, thank you for
16 hearing me out and for your work on the
17 budget. And to the residents, I promise
18 to keep fighting for a budget that gives
19 our neighborhoods the care and resources
20 they deserve.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes
25 Councilwoman Lozada.

2 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
3 you, Council President.

4 First, let me begin by saying
5 thank you to my colleagues. My first
6 seven months here, my first budget, I had
7 many questions. I was often confused and
8 frustrated and stressed out, but each and
9 every one of you has always been
10 supportive and has gotten me through some
11 days when I was ready to scream and give
12 up. And so I really appreciate all of
13 you in allowing me to be me through this
14 first seven months of my time here.

15 But, Council President, I'd
16 also like to make brief remarks regarding
17 Bill No. 230410, which was on our
18 schedule and asked by the Planning
19 Commission for a 45-day delay and a
20 request for review.

21 For decades, the residents of
22 the Seventh Council District have long
23 awaited legislation that will prevent
24 this type of facility in their community
25 without community participation and that

2 would address the quality of life issues
3 they face day in and day out stemming
4 from this opioid epidemic, needles
5 outside of their doorstep, the inability
6 to use public transportation, kids having
7 to use safe corridors that shield them
8 from their innocence of their
9 environment.

10 While the 45-day delay is a
11 Charter requirement and there's nothing
12 that I can do or this legislative body,
13 along with our co-sponsors, Clarke,
14 Squilla, Jones, Johnson, Driscoll, Bass,
15 Phillips, O'Neill, Harrity, and Vaughn
16 can do to shorten the timeline, let me be
17 clear. This legislation represents the
18 voice of residents, a voice that with
19 this delay is not being respected. In my
20 district, that voice has been an
21 overwhelming no.

22 However, this legislation, if
23 the community so chooses through a
24 community process, would allow these
25 consumption sites to exist within that

2 district. Simply put, this legislation
3 gives the community a voice, and we've
4 heard today how important a voice is in
5 policies and legislation that we present
6 on this legislative floor.

7 We have for decades had the
8 opportunity to address this humanitarian
9 crisis for both residents and for those
10 battling addiction, a crisis that did not
11 arrive overnight but stems from systemic
12 inequalities and injustices. We have had
13 decades to ask all the questions. We
14 have had decades to do all of the
15 research and its potential impact.

16 From home break-ins, petty
17 thefts to prostitution, insecurity, gun
18 violence, trauma, and residents feelings
19 like prisoners in their own homes and
20 their communities, at what point is it
21 enough?

22 We will give the Planning
23 Commission the 45-day delay because we
24 have no choice, but we will not yield.
25 We will find ways to address quality of

2 life issues in our neighborhoods, and we
3 will not stop fighting for this
4 community.

5 I look forward to passing this
6 legislation when we return in the fall.
7 With the support of my colleagues, I'm
8 committed to continuing to have
9 conversations that bring resolutions and
10 working with our state legislators, our
11 Governor, and our next Mayor to address
12 these issues until we take back our
13 communities and invest in the resources
14 that these communities have been
15 ignored -- who have been ignored and who
16 deserve it so much.

17 Thank you so much.

19 Thank you, Councilwoman. You achieved
20 quite a bit in your first seven months.
21 Congratulations.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President and colleagues.

3 Samantha Williams, Esquire, who we let
4 leave here, we let leave here. She ran

6 and she keeps coming back. I don't
7 understand.

8 We do our thing and here you

10 is? Well, we miss you too.

11 I just wanted everyone to
12 recognize Samantha Williams. And her
13 less known sister --

18 there, because she said in the hallway
19 she got more votes than you. That's all
20 I'm going to say.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Phillips.

3 want to be on record saying it's good to
4 see you, Sam, as well.

5 Also being on record, early --
6 I don't know what I was thinking about --
7 I said motion. I meant to say move to
8 adopt the resolution, but I just want to
9 say I want to put it out there, still
10 learning seven months in.

11 Listen, I just really wanted to
12 say thank you. You know, having done
13 service all my life for the most part
14 since I was a teenager, you know, I'm not
15 new to service, but I am new to this body
16 of service, and, you know, I wanted to
17 quickly jump in and do as much as
18 possible to serve the City of
19 Philadelphia and the residents of the
20 Ninth District.

21 I know being a new guy, there's
22 always questions of whether or not -- you
23 know, what is he going to do, how is he
24 going to do it, and I always wanted to
25 make sure I did the best I can.

2 But I want to be able to say
3 thank you publicly to Council President
4 Clarke for all your mentorship and your
5 support, you know, to try to help me get
6 through this as the leader of this body.
7 I also want to say thank you to everyone
8 here today who helped myself, Councilman
9 Harrity, Councilwoman Lozada, and
10 Councilwoman Vaughn, who is actually more
11 like a senior member in more ways than
12 one even though this is her first year.
13 She's teaching us stuff, transition here.
14 So I just want to say that.

15 And also to Council President
16 Clarke and also Jenaye Munford of NPI,
17 yesterday we did a wonderful thing where
18 we are funding for the first time
19 driveways in the City of Philadelphia.
20 That's never been done before.
21 Councilwoman Tasco, Councilwoman Parker,
22 and Councilman John White were big
23 advocates for that, and thanks to you,
24 Council President, for the first time
25 we're going to be funding driveways

2 through the City of Philadelphia,
3 something that's not affordable for a lot
4 of our residents. And that's -- you've
5 not only done that for me and our
6 district, but you're doing that across
7 the board with alleyways and trees and so
8 forth.

9 So you've been really making
10 some really pioneering work happen in our
11 city, so I want to say thank you so much
12 and God bless, carry forward. This has
13 been a great first seven months for me.
14 I'm looking forward to September, and
15 we'll do the work of the Lord together.

16 God bless.

18 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. You
19 were a hero yesterday. I must say that
20 you put on a good event, and the people
21 in your community, particularly on that
22 block, were extremely excited.

23 You need to know that you have
24 set off a firestorm of calls, texts, and
25 e-mails today from people across the City

2 of Philadelphia that want to get their
3 driveways done. So thank you for putting
4 that on yesterday. Thank you.

5 The Chair recognizes
6 Councilwoman Bass.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. Yes, he set off a
9 firestorm. I have a list already.

10 But thank you to my colleagues
11 for your fantastic work, particularly my
12 new colleagues that have been just a joy
13 really to work with and a pleasure to
14 work with and a lot of fun as well, as
15 this one here.

16 But a couple things. I wanted
17 to again say thank you so much to
18 everyone for the passage of this budget.
19 I think it's really important that when
20 we have the opportunity to give money
21 back to the citizens of Philadelphia,
22 that we do so. It's not, you know,
23 something that -- I know everybody
24 doesn't necessarily agree. I know my
25 colleague spoke to it earlier and has her

reasoning and rationale, and I certainly do understand and respect that, but I also know that the argument that, you know, the government can spend your money better than you can just doesn't fly with a lot of people, myself included. I think that where we have the opportunity to provide some relief to folks, that that's what we need to do, and I think this budget does that, so it's an honor to do that.

But I did want to speak about something that's deeply personal to me today, and it's something I feel like the City of Philadelphia, we all should be talking about, and really no one is talking about it.

And so, Mr. President, if you'll indulge me, I'd like to just read my remarks that I've prepared for this very important topic, and it's really around DHS and the reform that's necessary.

As a member of Philadelphia

City Council and the Chair of the Committee on Public Health and Human Services, I recognize that it is incredibly important to remember that the lives, futures, and ultimately the destiny of our most fragile citizens in need, who are children in Philadelphia, can easily be altered. The trajectory can be upward, like a catapult, moving our youth against the wind and into a limitless future, or it can be downward, like a shovel digging deep, knowing that deep holes and unstable foundations can be nearly impossible to escape.

So many of us know these kids and actually were these kids. We were hoping for a better life, while unsure of how to navigate rough neighborhoods, complicated families, unaddressed trauma and the like. And while some of us made it to the land of stability, far too many did not.

Whether you're in the system that's DHS, foster care, or in need of

2 adoption, et cetera, or not, too many of
3 our youth need the direction and guidance
4 of these very systems that have failed
5 their families generationally.

6 I was one of the lucky ones. I
7 was adopted at birth. But the problems
8 of this enormous system continue on, and
9 despite my hearings on the DHS Community
10 Umbrella Agency, also known as CUAs,
11 debacle, there is little to no visible
12 action planned by the City's Department
13 of Human Services to offer better service
14 to this clientele.

15 And so I want to take this
16 moment to actually thank one of the
17 previous providers for not attempting to
18 renew their contract with the Department
19 of Human Services, knowing that not only
20 do they lack the capacity to provide the
21 services needed, but they have been
22 extremely negligent in the past,
23 including returning three sisters who
24 were repeatedly sexually assaulted by
25 their abusive father and to the tune of

2 costing them a \$6 million settlement.

3 So I say thank you, soon-to-be
4 former provider, for ending the facade of
5 quality services. Thank you for
6 acknowledging that you are unable to make
7 critical decisions regarding safe
8 environments for young people. And thank
9 you for no longer requesting taxpayer
10 dollars with no deliverables.

11 If only we were able to thank
12 you before you entered into a contract
13 that damaged innumerable lives, most of
14 them young people. And while I wish that
15 the decision was made because it was the
16 right thing to do, I know that it had a
17 whole lot more to do with your inability
18 to obtain insurance for your operation as
19 required in your contract.

20 One last thing. On your way
21 out of the proverbial door, I noticed
22 that you were operating four out of the
23 ten agencies that are Community Umbrella
24 Agencies, and thus little attention has
25 been given to the fact that a whopping

2 40 percent of the foster care system in
3 Philadelphia is in trouble and is going
4 to likely have new and inexperienced
5 providers. Where are the alarm bells
6 that should be ringing? And this is of
7 great concern, isn't it?

8 How did we get here? DHS, I
9 ask you, how did we get here?

10 Clearly, reform is needed in
11 the system, as neither I nor my Council
12 colleagues have been briefed on this
13 matter, not even given any information.
14 Clearly, reform is a priority, as we
15 cannot continue down this path and then
16 say why are our young people acting out?
17 They're acting out because on this level,
18 this city has failed them.

19 But it can be better. I'm
20 looking forward to pulling together key
21 stakeholders and to begin the makings of
22 the system being reformed, because these
23 are all of our children, and they not
24 only deserve an answer, they deserve
25 better from the system and from the City.

4 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 Councilman Johnson, you did
11 not -- are you okay?

12 Councilman Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. I
14 don't want to belabor the point, but
15 Member Bass hit on something that is at
16 the root of a lot of the criminal
17 activity, a lot of the bad outcomes.
18 When you see 200 young people on Market
19 Street and you wonder where they came
20 from, a lot of times they came from that
21 system.

22 So I look forward to working
23 with you to help. That's one piece in
24 the cog of anti-violence that we should
25 be considering. So thank you for that.

5 Councilman, you jumped off and
6 jumped on. You did want to be

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yeah.

11 Just wanted to be brief in just
12 supporting my colleague Councilwoman
13 Cindy Bass, not only for her advocacy but
14 also really stepping up to the plate and
15 being transparent and at the same time
16 using her own personal experiences as to
17 why she's passionate about addressing
18 this issue. And at the end of the day,
19 these are all of our children.

20 And so, Sis, you have my
21 support. Anything that I can be
22 supportive of your efforts. And also
23 thank you for your courage in stepping up
24 to the plate and just using your personal
25 experiences about why - -

6 important. And I don't think a lot of
7 times the wider public understands. Like
8 we really care about the work that we're

11 as usual.

12 And so, Colleague, you have my
13 110 percent support.

19 help but take this personal.

24 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank you
25 very much, Council President. I can't

3 start pushing my button. It never goes
4 on. But y'all want to hear from me now.

5 Listen, I want to let everyone

9 Curtis Jones and myself. We are having
10 this hearing regarding the escape of the
11 two inmates from the Philadelphia
12 Industrial Correctional Center on the
13 evening of May the 7th, and I'm asking
14 everyone to please try to attend and come
15 on there with some serious questions that
16 we need to ask these people about what
17 happened and how this was able to occur.

6 lot of things, but this part of the job I

12 much. Your transition was quite smooth.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

15 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
16 you, Council President.

17 I too wanted to rise in support
18 of Councilmember Cindy Bass for her call
19 to action for the Department of Human
20 Services, but I also wanted to commend
21 her for sharing her story, which is truly
22 our story, and know that I am in full
23 support of the work that I know you will
24 do ahead on this issue, because we must
25 ensure that we are taking care of our

2 young people and that we are the village
3 for our young people.

4 So thank you, Councilmember
5 Bass. You have my full and unwavering
6 support. Thank you.

7 Thank you, CP.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Thomas.

12 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good
13 afternoon.

14 Thank you, colleagues. First
15 and foremost, of course, Councilmember
16 Bass, I think you touched us all with
17 your testimony and, more importantly,
18 making yourself vulnerable. We
19 definitely appreciate that.

20 As it relates to today's
21 budget, I just want to put a couple
22 things on the record, because I think
23 it's really important.

24 First and foremost, in my
25 opinion, I think it's really disingenuous

2 and not fair to the members of City
3 Council to give the public the perception
4 that we had to choose between tax cuts
5 and other City services. That was not
6 the case with this year's budget.

7 Last year we had a \$700 million
8 surplus, and for those who don't
9 understand economics, when you're
10 operating in the midst of the surplus, if
11 you decide to offer any type of tax cuts,
12 we're not cutting any services or not
13 hiring any people. We anticipate there
14 being more revenue than what we planned
15 for. So in the midst of the revenue that
16 we anticipate coming in, similar to that
17 business owner who testified earlier who
18 talked about having to pay revenue on
19 anticipated -- having to pay taxes on
20 anticipated revenue, that's exactly what
21 we're doing with the City.

22 And so I understand we can't
23 raise the exemption. If we could, we
24 would. During my time in City Council,
25 I've been very thoughtful about every

2 bill that I've introduced and every
3 significant project I've been a part of,
4 whether it's something like driving
5 equality that took me over a year to
6 introduce and pass the legislation or
7 even grant programs like the Illuminate
8 the Arts grants that I had a chance to
9 work with my colleague for.

10 I know firsthand when you try
11 to put together a grant program or a big
12 project through the City of Philadelphia,
13 those things take years. Illuminate the
14 Arts was a \$1.5 million grant program
15 that took us nearly a year to get off the
16 ground during the pandemic in the midst
17 of an emergency.

18 So at the end of the day, I
19 hear a lot of things that we wish we can
20 do. I would love to raise the exemption
21 for businesses. We already know some of
22 the red tape that we've run into there.
23 But I just had to put this on the record,
24 because at the end of the day, one thing
25 about the decisions that we're making

2 today around taxes, they are not
3 permanent. If we come back next year and
4 we feel like what we did did not work, we
5 can modify, we can change, we can adjust.

6 When you look at how tax
7 structure works and how you look at these
8 things through an economic perspective,
9 cuts are gradual. They're small.

10 They're meant to be that way, because
11 when you're doing cuts, it's supposed to
12 happen over a five-year or sometimes even
13 a ten-year timeline. That's why we have
14 five-year plans.

15 So I want to thank my
16 colleagues for standing strong as it
17 relates to this year's budget,
18 specifically the tax cuts, and I just
19 want to let the public know that we did
20 not have to choose between this and other
21 constituent services. We did this
22 because it was the right thing to do, and
23 we know that there are other constituent
24 needs and other issues that we have to
25 fund to assure that we're giving

2 Philadelphia the best product.

3 In closing, I just want to
4 remind the listening public and other
5 legislators that last year we put so much
6 money into departments and into programs
7 like cameras and things of that capacity,
8 that departments had to give us money
9 back. We fought for different things for
10 public safety that still hasn't been
11 purchased today, whether it's cameras or
12 technology for the Police Department or
13 anything like that.

14 So in conclusion, this budget
15 did some things that I agree with, some
16 things that I disagree with. We put a
17 lot of money a lot of different places,
18 including an extra 50-plus million for
19 police. And so when I think about this
20 budget, I'm proud of the product that we
21 were able to produce, and I want the
22 citizens of Philadelphia to understand
23 that we are trying our best to move in
24 their best interest. We're thinking
25 about the restaurants, the businesses,

2 the barbershops and beauty salons who
3 can't just relocate to Conshohocken, like
4 the man said, or King of Prussia or
5 things of that capacity. They need the
6 foot traffic in Philadelphia, and they
7 deserve a bone. And if we could find
8 another way to give them a bone, somebody
9 please let me know, because I'll be the
10 first one to support that. Until then,
11 I'm proud of the tax cuts.

12 Thank you, Council President.

10 how to handle a situation where you may
11 forget someone's pronouns and other
12 issues as well. And lunch will be
13 served. Hope everybody can stop by.

17 Councilman Harrity.

18 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: I had it
19 pushed. I don't know.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not
21 my fault, sir. I'm looking at the
22 screen. Sorry.

23 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: I
24 thought --

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 Chair recognizes Councilman Harrity. I
3 didn't see your name.

4 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: I thought
5 I was on punishment, but I was only
6 actually -- I just wanted to say thank
7 you to all my colleagues here in Council
8 for making this budget season bearable.
9 You know, I got a lot of advice and I got
10 a lot of people in this room who helped
11 me and guided me through the process and
12 getting some of my things into the
13 budget, which was great. I feel a big
14 sense of accomplishment.

15 But I'd like to thank all my
16 sponsors and co-sponsors with me on the
17 domestic partnership bill that we amended
18 today. It kind of sunk through with the
19 all-bill amendment, but I just wanted to
20 say thank you. I'm actually very proud
21 of the support that I got with this bill.
22 This was my first bill. It's my first
23 bill to pass. I'm very excited, and I'm
24 very excited that I had basically the
25 whole Council co-sponsor this bill.

2 It was needed. It's a way for
3 people to give a commitment to their
4 significant other without actually having
5 to get married. It was a right that was
6 given to a few, and now it is given to
7 all, as it is supposed to be.

8 So I thank you all, and I thank

10 and I look forward to the work that we
11 will be doing again in our next session.
12 So thank you all.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 behalf of the minority and the majority.

17 I'm not allowed to give
18 speeches on the podium, so I'll shut up.
19 But I just want to thank you so much,
20 guys, for not only the budget season but
21 this year of your involvement, your due
22 diligence. More importantly, in an
23 election year, you didn't disappear. You
24 continued to do the work for the people
25 of the City of Philadelphia, being here

3 that we understood what was reflected in
4 this particular year's election in terms
5 of what we commit to, how we fund
6 initiatives, where we put money to

10 So I want to thank you all so
11 much again for a successful legislative
12 session, budget session. Look forward to
13 rocking and rolling over the course of
14 the summer, because we do have to get
15 things implemented as the appropriating
16 authority. If it's not spent, it doesn't
17 count, right? So we have to continue to
18 push forward.

19 So you all have an awesome,
20 quote/unquote, legislative recess. We're
21 not going away. We'll still be around,
22 for those that think that we somehow take
23 a two-month vacation, right? That's not
24 the case. So we look forward to working
25 with you all throughout the season and we

2 can get another -- a number of
3 significant initiatives so we can set the
4 phones on fire like Councilman Phillips
5 did yesterday with all these dollars that
