1 2/13/20 - STATED - INVOCATION

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started, if
4 everyone will take their seat, and if we
5 can hold down your voices. And I also
6 would like to ask if anyone has a device
7 that makes noise, please turn it off or
8 on vibrate or on airport mode. Thank
9 you.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, the Chair recognizes our friend,
12 the Reverend Bonnie Camarda of the
13 Salvation Army. She is here today as the
14 guest of Councilwoman Maria
15 Quinones-Sanchez.

16 I would ask all members,
17 guests, and visitors to please rise.

18 (Councilmembers, guests, and
19 visitors rise.)

20 REVEREND CAMARDA: Let's just
21 take a minute to recognize that God is in
22 the house and we do it for a minute of
23 silence, and then no matter what
24 tradition you sit, some of us are in
25 different traditions of walk with God,

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2 that you recognize that it's a God who
3 really want to reign in the City of
4 Philadelphia. Then let us pause for a
5 minute before I pray.

6 (Brief pause.)

7 REVEREND CAMARDA: The word in
8 the Old Testament say it is because of
9 the Lord's mercy and loving kindness that
10 we are not consumed, because his
11 compassion fail not. They are new every
12 morning, great and abundant is
13 faithfulness. The Lord is my portion or
14 share, save my living being; therefore,
15 what I hope in him and work expectantly
16 for him.

17 Father, we just pray in this
18 morning that your loving kindness will
19 consume the City of Philadelphia. Lord,
20 you know the challenges that are in each
21 of our neighborhood, the violence that is
22 reigning. Lord, we just call to just get
23 violence away from our neighborhood, and
24 peace, the peace of God that overpass all
25 understanding will come and reign.

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2 Lord, I pray that every morning
3 we will think that yesterday is gone but
4 today has come, and because today has
5 come, we are going to (unintelligible)
6 visible to take every corner of this
7 city.

8 Lord, we just thank you for
9 every City Councilmember that is here,
10 for everyone who is here in this room.
11 And I just pray, Lord, that you will help
12 us, help the City official to do the work
13 that you have called them to do. Lord,
14 that we'll be agents of peace, agents of
15 change for our city.

16 We thank you, Lord, and we know
17 that your presence will abide for us as
18 long as we recognize that you are Lord of
19 all.

20 Amen.

21 (Amen.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you so much, Reverend. We
24 appreciate all what you do and your
25 spiritual guidance today.

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2 Council will be at ease.

3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you very much. And, again,

6 Reverend, thank you for that spiritual
7 guidance. Thank you.

8 Our next order of business is
9 the approval of the Journal of the
10 meeting on Thursday, February 6th, 2020,
11 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move that the Journal
15 of the meeting of Thursday, February 6th,
16 2020 be approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. It has been moved and
20 properly seconded that the Journal of the
21 meeting of Thursday, February 6th, 2020
22 stand approved.

23 All those in favor indicate by
24 saying aye.

25 (Aye.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 ayes have it. The Journal is approved.

7 And our next order of business
8 is requests for leave of absence, and the
9 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
11 you, Mr. President. On behalf of the
12 members of Council, there are no requests
13 for leaves of absence today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair thanks the gentle lady.

16 At this time I would like to
17 dispense with the regular order of
18 business and I would like to thank
19 everyone who has taken time out of their
20 busy day to come down to witness their
21 government in action. We genuinely
22 appreciate you being here. We hope your
23 stay here today is a knowledgeable one
24 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
25 so much so that you come back again. So,

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2 again, thank you.

3 At this time, the Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Gym, who will
5 present a resolution honoring Mabel "Chi"
6 Chan. Would Ms. Chan and those
7 accompanying her please join the
8 Councilwoman at the podium.

9 (Councilmembers and guests
10 approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
12 joining Councilwoman Gym, we have
13 Councilman Henon, Councilwoman Gilmore
14 Richardson, Councilman Domb, Councilwoman
15 Brooks, and Councilman Johnson and
16 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman
17 Oh and Councilman Green.

18 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
19 very much, everybody.

20 If you know Philadelphia and
21 especially if you know --

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Councilwoman, hold on a second until we
24 get everyone.

25 Okay. Please proceed,

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2 Councilwoman.

3 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you,
4 everybody. Good morning. If you know
5 Philadelphia and especially if you know
6 Philadelphia Chinatown, there's no name
7 more synonymous with a history of Chinese
8 American Philadelphians in this city than
9 Mabel "Chi" Chan.

10 We are honored today to honor
11 Mabel and her lasting legacy and
12 contributions to the City of
13 Philadelphia. Mabel came here many
14 decades ago with a dream and a vision for
15 a vibrant, diverse city. She landed in
16 the City of Liberty, and she definitely
17 made it a place where all people could be
18 here and thrive.

19 Her home, the restaurant that
20 she had helped run for decades on end,
21 was Joy Tsin Lau, and it was often not
22 only a place where there were
23 celebrations of weddings and places of
24 birthday parties and honorees and Lunar
25 New Year celebrations that you can't even

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2 imagine, where the food was boundless.
3 And for many immigrant communities who
4 often thought that they had to create
5 home, they found it in Mabel's restaurant
6 at Joy Tsing Lau. It was a place where
7 people could gather, could tell stories,
8 could laugh, could remember and gain
9 enough strength to build for the days
10 beyond.

11 And it wasn't just a place that
12 Mabel had for the Chinese community and
13 the Chinese American community in
14 Philadelphia. It was a bigger gathering
15 place for politics to talk about the
16 future of what the City could look like,
17 integrated with a vibrant immigrant
18 community that was diversifying and
19 growing even within the Asian American
20 community.

21 Mabel comes from Fujian, and
22 for folks who may or may not know, the
23 Fujian community has evolved and grown
24 into one of the fastest growing
25 communities here in Philadelphia and on

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2 the East Coast. Chinese Americans have
3 many different ethnicities and speak many
4 different dialects, but Mabel made sure
5 to embrace all of it. And I'd like to
6 give just so much gratitude, so much
7 personal gratitude, for what she was able
8 to do.

9 The last thing I wanted to
10 share is that Mabel is not only a
11 fantastic business woman, an amazing
12 convener of people, a joyous host and the
13 most generous host in the City of
14 Philadelphia, but she's also an
15 incredible artist. She celebrated
16 Chinese opera. She supported folk arts
17 locally, keeping cultural traditions
18 alive for immigrant communities that
19 aren't able to see it necessarily on big
20 stages. She made sure that she supported
21 organizations across the City that
22 reminded us of our folk traditions. And
23 for so many communities, Asian American
24 and others, but many who feel that their
25 voices may not be reflected in mainstream

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2 culture, she reminded us of what it means
3 to have elders who tell us stories that
4 we're not going to always read in every
5 book. She taught us songs that we aren't
6 going to hear on popular radio. She
7 reminded us of mythologies and folk tales
8 that put people who look like her and
9 many others as super heroes with super
10 powers who could overcome the odds. And
11 for that, this community honors and you
12 thanks you from the bottom of our heart
13 and City Council.

14 So with that, we'll start. And
15 so I'm honored to have so many members of
16 City Council supporting this.

17 So this resolution honors Mabel
18 "Chi" Chan and her lasting legacy and
19 contributions to the Philadelphia
20 community.

21 Whereas, Mabel Chan was born in
22 1957 in Fujian Province, China as the
23 second oldest daughter in a family of
24 seven kids. Ms. Chan's family moved to
25 Hong Kong, where she was able to attend

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2 the most prestigious secondary high
3 school on a full scholarship; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:

5 Whereas, Ms. Chan's father immigrated
6 alone to the United States in 1970, in
7 hope of eventually reuniting with the
8 rest of the family. In 1970, after three
9 years of non-stop work and with the
10 support of friends, Ms. Chan's father was
11 able to purchase a take-out restaurant on
12 Lehigh Avenue; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
14 during this time, Ms. Chan had severe
15 appendicitis and was deemed by doctors as
16 unsavable. At the time, Ms. Chan wanted
17 to become a monk after being exposed to
18 Buddhist philosophies. After surviving
19 appendicitis, Ms. Chan decided that she
20 would dedicate her life to doing good
21 deeds; and

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, in
23 1974, four years after Ms. Chan's father
24 immigrated to the United States, Ms. Chan
25 and her mother reunited with him. The

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2 family settled on the second floor
3 apartment of the take-out restaurant in
4 North Philly that Ms. Chan's father
5 owned; and

6 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
7 three years later, Ms. Chan, with the
8 support and blessings from her father,
9 took over the management of her father's
10 restaurant. Ms. Chan worked early
11 mornings and late nights, which allowed
12 her to learn essential management skills
13 for her future; and

14 Whereas, Ms. Chan and her
15 family longed to move to Chinatown, a
16 noticeably underdeveloped neighborhood
17 given its proximity to Center City, where
18 the Chan family could find a community
19 whose members spoke their language of
20 Cantonese. After six years of
21 backbreaking labor, Ms. Chan, her sister,
22 and her father were able to purchase a
23 paper factory warehouse at 1026 Race
24 Street. The Chan family converted the
25 warehouse into a restaurant named Joy

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2 Tsin Lau; and

3 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Joy

4 Tsin Lau officially opened on October

5 25th, 1983, and became a monumental

6 success that influenced business and

7 investment in the Chinatown community.

8 The restaurant is recognized as aiding

9 the Chinatown community to secure its

10 economic footing in Philadelphia. The

11 eatery attracted a host of well-known

12 figures from the Philadelphia community,

13 such as Ed Rendell, Mike Stack, Bob

14 Brady, and Tom Fugliato; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And

16 whereas, Joy Tsin Lau has always been

17 more than a mere restaurant venue for Ms.

18 Chan. Ms. Chan operated Joy Tsin Lau as

19 a place for community cultivation for

20 individuals who do not have a sense of

21 belonging anywhere else in the City due

22 to language and cultural barriers. This

23 commitment has made Ms. Chan known as a

24 "Second Sister" in the Chinatown

25 community, the big sister who looks out

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2 for everyone; and

3 Whereas, Joy Tsin Lau has also
4 been a starting point for many revered
5 chefs and restaurant owners who have
6 established anchoring institutions in
7 Chinatown, such as Jade Harbor, Yakitori
8 Boy, K-Top, and Ocean City; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Whereas,
10 Ms. Chan established a longstanding
11 commitment to her community. For years,
12 the restaurant was a stable source of
13 employment for many students, who worked
14 part-time at the restaurant and were
15 provided housing on the fourth floor of
16 the building. Ms. Chan also donates her
17 restaurant's profit to elderly centers in
18 Chinatown, where she also performs
19 traditional Chinese opera and serves
20 bento boxes to elders. In addition, Ms.
21 Chan began the tradition of an annual
22 Chinatown Independence Day Celebration
23 Banquet and brought the community members
24 together to participate in the parade;
25 and

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2 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: She is
3 definitely a class act. When you think
4 of Judith Bonzelic (ph) in the business
5 community, Joan Krajewski of the
6 Northeast, Marian Tasco of the City, Ms.
7 Chan is that in Chinatown. There's not a
8 conversation where she is not navigating
9 or at the center of or moving forward,
10 and we thank you for that leadership. As
11 a woman, I appreciate the role that you
12 play in your community.

13 Whereas, Mrs. Chan has used her
14 resources and personal fortune to support
15 victims of domestic violence and to
16 connect crime victims to free legal
17 services. In 2008, following a series of
18 violent incidents in South Philadelphia
19 High School, Mabel took the initiative to
20 hold a meeting of community leaders to
21 address the persistent issues of bullying
22 against Asian immigrants; and

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And I too
24 want to echo the sentiments of my
25 colleagues. I've had the opportunity to

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dine and interact with Mabel Chan several different times at her restaurant in Chinatown. So today is truly an honor and a pleasure.

Whereas, Ms. Chan is a trailblazer in her community and became the first female President of the Chinese Benevolent Association, and in 2007 was appointed as the Chairwoman of the Association's Board, which made tremendous contributions of service to the City of Philadelphia;

Whereas, Mabel Chan has been credited with uplifting the Chinatown community and has been an integral part of fostering a neighborhood where everyone, regardless of their barriers they face, can thrive.

COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Mabel Chan's story is that of many Philadelphians, a narrative of people who choose to call this city home and dedicate their lives to improving their neighborhoods through strong communities. Her lasting legacy

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2 is deeply intertwined in the history of
3 Philadelphia and that of Chinatown. So
4 now, therefore, be it

5 Resolved, that the Council of
6 the City of Philadelphia honors Mabel
7 "Chi" Chan and her legacy and
8 contributions to the City.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
12 the Chair recognizes Ms. Chan for
13 remarks.

14 MS. CHAN: I really surprised
15 and I really happy and I really excited
16 and really appreciate it.

17 Thank you, everyone, and thank
18 you all Councilmember for this great
19 honor. I was the first female member to
20 join the Chinese (unintelligible)
21 Association and also the first female
22 person of CBA.

23 I'm proud to stand here today
24 with Councilwoman Helen Gym and our
25 first -- it's our first Asian American

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2 Councilwoman, Helen Gym. And thank you,
3 Councilwoman Helen Gym again. Sorry.
4 And also thank you, Councilman Mark
5 Squilla of our District Councilman, and
6 thank you all Councilmembers in support
7 of our immigrant community.

8 Thank you so much. Thank you
9 all of you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. CHAN: May I say in Chinese
12 for our Chinese members? They are here
13 today. Okay?

14 (Ms. Chan speaking in Chinese.)

15 MS. CHAN: Make a beautiful
16 America in the future.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. CHAN: Thank you all our
19 Councilmembers and everyone. Thank you
20 so much. Thank you, Maria, too and thank
21 you, everyone. Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Council will be at ease.

25 (Council at ease.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you and, again, congratulations to
4 Ms. Chan.

5 At this time, the Chair
6 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will
7 present a resolution recognizing South
8 Philadelphia rap group Young Flames.
9 Would Chris Giddens and those
10 accompanying him please join the
11 Councilman at the podium.

12 (Councilmembers and guests
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 joining Councilman Johnson, we have
16 Councilman Thomas, Councilwoman Parker,
17 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson,
18 Councilman Jones, and Councilman Green.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
20 morning, everyone.

21 (Good morning.)

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
23 morning, everyone.

24 (Good morning.)

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: In 1998, I

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2 lost a cousin of mine to gun violence in
3 South Philadelphia, and as opposed to me
4 getting involved in the retaliation that
5 was going to take place as a result of
6 him losing his life, I started my own
7 program to address the issue of gun
8 violence called Peace Not Guns. From
9 that point, I decided to dedicate my life
10 to teaching young people conflict
11 resolution, anger management and, most
12 importantly, anti-street education.

13 The reason why I'm so inspired
14 by this presentation today is because as
15 a city, we're in a state of a crisis. We
16 are in a state of emergency. On any
17 given day when you turn on the
18 television, we bear witness to the
19 senseless acts of gun violence taking the
20 lives of predominantly African American
21 young men.

22 But there is hope. There is
23 joy in my soul, because these young men
24 whom I'm about to present a resolution to
25 are doing the right things for the right

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2 reasons, inspiring a sense of hope in our
3 neighborhoods, focusing on putting down
4 the guns.

5 And so with that being said, I
6 want to thank my colleagues for joining
7 me as we honor and salute the Young
8 Flames. Give them a real big round of
9 applause.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Who
12 created an anti-violence song called
13 "Guns Down" that specifically focuses on
14 the very critical issue of gun violence
15 that we're dealing with right now as a
16 city. And they're so inspiring by their
17 efforts, because as a young man, I think
18 I started my program when I was in my
19 20's, but the good word says out of the
20 mouth of babes. And so for me, we want
21 to continue to encourage these young men,
22 because they represent truly the best
23 that the City of Philadelphia has to
24 offer. And I'd also like to say they
25 come from South Philadelphia. So the P

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2 is definitely here in the building.

3 Recognizing South

4 Philadelphia's rap group the Young Flames
5 for their positive theme music, including
6 their anti-violence song "Guns Down."

7 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: And
8 whereas, Young Flames began with a group
9 project for music class by four students
10 at Universal Institute Charter School.
11 In the two years since, the group has
12 grown to comprise 10 members: Safee
13 Johnson -- raise your hand when I call
14 your name -- Safee Johnson, Kaiear
15 McGhee, Kaaliq McGhee, Ma'kye McNeil,
16 Jahmill Meadows, Amir Crawford, Jaden
17 Barasky, Bahij Goodwin, Asir Bagwell, and
18 Tyree Reaves. All ten members are
19 residents of South Philadelphia and
20 students at Universal Institute Charter
21 School. The group is managed and
22 mentored by Christopher Giddens; and
23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
24 the group's name was derived from a
25 mixtape entitled Flamers by Philadelphia

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2 native and rap superstar Meek Mill. Like
3 Meek Mill, the group has blended advocacy
4 for social causes with its music; and

5 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Whereas,
6 the group's first performance on October
7 7, 2019 centered around the theme of
8 anti-bullying. Since then, the group has
9 performed and recorded other music with
10 positive messages, including "Guns Down,"
11 which is my favorite. The song was
12 motivated in part because of some of the
13 families of the members have been
14 affected directly by gun violence. The
15 group's lyrics also advocate against
16 substance abuse and for academic success
17 and personal responsibility. On February
18 4th, 2020 Philadelphia's local ABC
19 affiliate, Channel 6, aired a segment on
20 the group, prominently featuring "Guns
21 Down." They hope to continue to grow
22 their audience and one day be featured on
23 the Ellen Show; and

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
25 group's members are also active in their

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communities. Among their activities are football with the South Philadelphia Sharks, intramural basketball, and participation in the Alpha Leadership Academy run by Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated; and

Whereas, the passion, focus, and positivity mentioned above are a shining example of the positive potential of Philadelphia's youth. Despite the weighty challenges of this time, Young Flames have used music to spread positive messages in their community, an effort that deserves recognition and praise; now, therefore, be it

COUNCILMAN JONES: Be it resolved, that the Council of the City of Philadelphia, that South Philadelphia's rap group Young Flames be recognized for the positivity and themes in their music, including the anti-violence song "Guns Down."

Further resolved that an engrossed copy of this resolution

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2 presented to the Young Flames be evidence
3 of this Council's appreciation and
4 esteem.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: We're
7 going to do this a little different,
8 right? Because I've been in these
9 Chambers on plenty of different times,
10 and when shee-shee people come down and
11 people of high status, we clap, we stand
12 up, you know.

13 Now, again, on any given day,
14 right, we'll turn on the news and we'll
15 see African American young men being shot
16 down and murdered by gun violence, right?
17 These young men are in the right place
18 doing the right thing. So I'm going to
19 ask for everyone in the room to please
20 stand and give them a real big round of
21 applause.

22 (Standing ovation.)

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
24 President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, sir.

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Mr. Giddens for remarks.

5 MR. GIDDENS: Good morning,
6 everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 MR. GIDDENS: "Wow" is the
9 first thing that comes to mind when I
10 think of this honor. On behalf of the
11 boys, myself, and the entire Young Flames
12 family, I would like to thank every
13 Councilmember, especially Councilman
14 Johnson who sponsored this resolution and
15 made this happen for us.

16 When one of the boys, Amir,
17 came to me with the idea of "Guns Down,"
18 I had no idea the impact we could create
19 with this song. The boys each put their
20 heart and soul into every line that they
21 wrote and delivered a message that our
22 City deeply needs.

23 Gun violence has affected many
24 of us in this room, and for a group of
25 kids to have the courage to stand up

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2 against this epidemic leaves me
3 completely blown away every time I think
4 about it. Looking at their faces
5 standing before you today, I'm beyond
6 proud of each and every one of them.

7 Standing up here today, I want
8 to say we need our community to join with
9 us. The nonsense, the violence, the
10 killings all need to end. Our kids need
11 to see that education and being able to
12 talk through their issues are the right
13 answer and not succumbing to the
14 pressures many of them face, joining a
15 gang or carrying a gun to solve their
16 problems.

17 Our youth deserve the
18 opportunity to walk to school or walk to
19 the playground without the fear of simply
20 being in the wrong place at the wrong
21 time. As a community, there are more of
22 us who live life as we're supposed to
23 than not, and it's time we take our
24 streets back. If our youth can see this
25 and stand up for this, then there's no

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2 reason why we as adults cannot do the
3 same.

4 I urge everyone to join these
5 boys and the movement they are creating.
6 Our kids need to see all the positives
7 that we can offer, which is why I started
8 this group to begin with. I know this
9 because mentorship is key. I was that
10 kid who needed a mentor.

11 Let's start doing what we need
12 to do, uplifting our youth, providing
13 them avenues to safe spaces where they
14 can have fun and, most importantly,
15 creating a city, a city that all of us
16 can be proud to live in.

17 I thank you again on behalf of
18 the Young Flames and leave by quoting one
19 of the lyrics from their song: It's a
20 marathon that they're running and there's
21 no time for gunning.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And last,
25 also my office will be giving an Activity

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2 Fund grant in the amount of \$1,000 to
3 also support our youth in their endeavors
4 and all the things that they're doing as
5 well.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Council will be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you and congratulations, an
12 inspirational moment for some awesome
13 young men.

14 Our next order of business is
15 communications, and the Chair requests
16 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the
17 messages to the Chief Clerk from the
18 Mayor.

19 Mr. Decker, can you please read
20 those messages.

21 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
22 and members of the Council of the City of
23 Philadelphia, I am transmitting herewith
24 for the consideration of your honorable

23 Philadelphia Fire Code," to establish
24 limitations on the use of hydrogen
25 fluoride and hydrofluoric acid.

3 Referred to committee.

4 CHIEF CLERK: And a

14 Thank you, Council President. On behalf

15 of the Administration, I introduced a

16 bill banning hydrogen fluoride. That was

17 the key ingredient that was used at the

18 Philadelphia Energy Solutions Refinery

19 which caused the major explosion that

20 rocked the foundation of South

21 Philadelphia as well as Southwest

22 Philadelphia.

23 The Bankruptcy Court awarded a

24 company by the name of Hilco the

25 opportunity to develop the Philadelphia

2 Energy Solutions site in the future, and
3 I'm going to be working with the Chair of
4 the Environmental Committee, Katherine
5 Gilmore Richardson, in the future to hold
6 hearings to, one, make sure that all
7 environmental issues regarding that site
8 are addressed; two, there's a smooth
9 transition with the new owner; and, three
10 and most importantly, the community has a
11 say-so in what the future development of
12 that site and what it looks like and
13 making sure that there's community
14 engagement and also the smooth transition
15 of jobs. And I want to make sure that
16 those individuals who lost their jobs
17 under the Philadelphia Energy Solutions
18 also have a voice in this process as
19 well.

20 Based on the proposal that I
21 received and sitting down with the Hilco
22 Company, in the future this will be an
23 economic boom to the City of
24 Philadelphia, with a projected amount of
25 10,000 jobs. So I think it's going to be

2 a benefit to our region.

3 I always unfortunately have to
4 remind people regardless of how much
5 development that we see taking place in
6 the City, we're still the number one big
7 city when it comes to poverty, also with
8 people living significantly in deep
9 poverty. So this will be a welcome
10 project to the City of Philadelphia and
11 also the Second Councilmanic District.
12 We want to make sure that the community
13 and the workers and the environmentalists
14 have a seat at the table.

15 So, again, myself and
16 Chairwoman of the Environmental Committee
17 and myself chairing the Public Utility
18 Committee will be hosting hearings in the
19 near future on what that transition will
20 look like.

21 Thank you, Council President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Henon.

4 of clarification and information. And I
5 totally agree with the Councilman in his

9 negligence and greed of big business who
10 failed to correct the capital investment
11 and improvement that was much needed.
12 And although that chemical is extremely
13 bad and I support banning it and coming
14 up with an alternative if it ever stays
15 online, but it was the neglect of big
16 business and greed that put the profits
17 over capital investment that caused that
18 explosion.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 The Chair again recognizes
23 Councilman Johnson.

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
25 Council President. I just want to also

3 that I hosted with Blondell Reynolds
4 Brown around this particular issue with
5 the environmentalists, and although this
6 substance may not have been the cause, it

9 and just based upon the testimony of
10 individuals from the building trade, they
11 were pretty comfortable about this ban
12 moving forward.

13 And so I just wanted to state
14 that for the record based upon the
15 recommendations from the Refinery
16 Advisory Group. We want to make sure
17 people are safe, and at the end of the
18 day, those individuals who live in that
19 neighborhood -- I live about -- I
20 live on -- I don't want the TV to see
21 where I live. I live about eight blocks
22 away, and at the end of the day, we want
23 to make sure individuals are safe. And
24 this company that is coming, if they have
25 any additional plans regarding anything

2 energy related, we're going to be paying
3 attention to make sure that they aren't
4 using this substance that can pretty much
5 incinerate our whole city.

17 Public Health and Human Services to hold
18 hearings to help the city adequately
19 prepare for, avoid, and, if needed,
20 mitigate the effect of emergency room and
21 hospital closures as research has shown
22 disparate impacts on patients that are
23 low income and/or from communities of
24 color in addition to the loss of jobs.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

18 As it relates to the second
19 resolution, I'm sure that we are all
20 significantly concerned about the
21 hospital closures all across the City,
22 including the one that was recently
23 announced -- the possibility of one that
24 was recently announced yesterday.

25 The purpose of this is, as we

10 have these increased number of incidents
11 and the likelihood of someone
12 unfortunately not being able to be saved
13 because there's no emergency room near
14 them.

15 So this is a very important
16 issue, and I look forward to the dialogue
17 around this issue so we can figure out
18 how do we better serve the citizens of
19 Philadelphia.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 MR. EASTMAN: Good morning.
10 Thank you for the opportunity to speak.
11 My name is Joe Eastman. I live in South
12 Philadelphia. I'm a taxpayer. I'm also
13 the son of two World War II veterans who
14 actually wore the uniform.

15 In September 1971, I walked up
16 North Broad Street, like many of the
17 veterans in here with me before me, and
18 went into 401 North Broad, raised my
19 right hand, and went on an adventure for
20 25 years in uniform, both as an enlisted
21 man and a commissioned officer.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. EASTMAN: Thank you. I
24 only got two minutes, guys.

25 I'm opposed to this bill, but

1 2/13/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 let me say this from the outset. I
3 think, Councilwoman, what you've done is
4 noble, and I think that giving these
5 graduates of this program an opportunity
6 is a good thing. I'm opposed to the
7 process of how this has happened.

8 I think some people in here
9 know me. I'm a fairly well-connected vet
10 and I found out about this kind of
11 happenstance about 12 hours before it
12 went to committee. That's not right.
13 I'm from an era -- as you can tell, I'm
14 old. I'm from an era and some of these,
15 my colleagues, are too where we were spit
16 on, called baby killers, and not welcomed
17 back to the United States, and all we did
18 was what our country asked us to do.

19 I am here to tell you, as long
20 as I have a breath, nobody, nobody will
21 take advantage of a veteran again. And
22 I'm not saying that's happened, but it's
23 a lack of respect for us.

24 We don't come and ask for
25 anything. All we ask for is what we

2 earned, because none of us that wore the
3 uniform got a participation trophy. None
4 of us got something because, oh, we
5 couldn't work hard enough to get it, so
6 we want it. No. We had to go out and
7 earn it every day.

8 Somebody gave us ten preference
9 points somewhere along the line.

10 I think you got the gist of it.
11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony, sir, and
15 thank you for your service.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Naseem Bey.

17 (No response.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Naseem Bey,

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. BEY: Good morning. My
24 name is Naseem Bey, as you already heard.
25 I'm here representing One PA and the

3 Now, what I've been thinking is
4 that we should go through with having an
5 independent labor office for the City. I
6 think that because, you know, from what
7 I've been hearing from everybody around
8 me tells me, they don't really make ends
9 meet and then having jobs where you got
10 to deal with discrimination and deal with
11 inequality doesn't really help at all.

12 So the labor office will help keep
13 companies and stores in check and keep
14 them doing what they supposed to.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
17 testimony.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Maryanne
20 Bellesorte.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MS. BELLESORTE: Hi, everyone.
23 Thank you. I'm Maryanne Bellesorte. I
24 am the Vice President of Advocacy at
25 Pathways PA and the National

2 Implementation Director at Family Values
3 at Work. I'm here today to ask you all
4 to vote yes on Bill 200042-A, which would
5 create an independent labor office.

6 Five years ago yesterday I
7 stood in this room with all of you as you
8 passed the paid sick days bill for
9 Philadelphia. It was an amazing day.
10 And since then, Council has gone on to
11 pass even more protections for workers,
12 including the fair workweek law and the
13 domestic worker bill of rights.

14 Unfortunately, passing
15 legislation isn't enough in Philadelphia
16 or nationally. In my role with Family
17 Values at Work, I see cities and states
18 struggling to make sure that workers know
19 about the laws and that the laws are
20 enforced.

21 Here in Philadelphia,
22 enforcement and education has gotten a
23 lot better around worker protections, but
24 there's still more to be done. Creating
25 an independent Department of Labor will

2 ensure that the laws that you pass
3 actually work and continue to work beyond
4 this Administration. I urge you all to
5 vote yes on this bill.

6 Thank you.

11 commenting on 200121.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. EDWARDS: Good morning.
16 Good morning, Council President Clarke,
17 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson, and
18 members of Council. A special thanks for
19 this resolution. And so we're here to
20 speak in support of Resolution No.
21 200121.

22 My name is Mark Edwards. I'm
23 the elected President, or as we refer to
24 the position Basileus, of Mu Omega
25 Chapter. Mu Omega Chapter is a graduate

15 if she will come forward. She is the
16 niece of our Dr. Oscar James Cooper.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. EDWARDS: In memory of his
19 legacy, Dr. Cooper epitomizes the
20 fraternity's four cardinal principles of
21 manhood, scholarship, perseverance, and
22 uplift, and our organization represents
23 membership of several hundreds of
24 thousands of like-minded men inspired to
25 uphold the very principles of Omega Psi

2 Phi Fraternity.

3 Dr. Cooper continued his
4 commitment to grow our organization as a
5 charter member, where he served as the
6 first Basileus of Mu Omega Chapter, and
7 today I'm honored to follow his legacy as

9 representing various professions
10 throughout the City and region.

11 In closing, to learn more about
12 our organization, I would encourage you
13 to visit our website at
14 www.muomegaques.com, learn about some of
15 our programming. In particular as we
16 speak today, we have launched our
17 scholarship program. So if you have
18 young people, high school students, in
19 your councilmanic districts, please
20 channel them to our website. We offer
21 four \$1,000 scholarships for four years.

22 Thank you very much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. KENT: Good morning,
5 esteemed Council, family, and friends.

6 When you live your life around
7 what matters most, it gives perspective
8 to what matters at all. The men of Omega
9 Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated, Second
10 District, the mighty Second District, I
11 am the First District representative,
12 First Vice District representative that
13 encompasses the states of Maryland,
14 Delaware, New Jersey, New York, and of
15 course the great state of Pennsylvania.

16 There's three things you need
17 to know about the Omega Psi Phi
18 Fraternity, Incorporated and you all
19 become a member of our family. One, our
20 four founding fathers. Of course
21 Dr. Oscar James Cooper, Dr. Earnest
22 Everett Just, Bishop Edgar Amos Love, and
23 the scientist, Frank Coleman.

24 Number two, which you heard,
25 our four cardinal principles that all

17 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Nicholas
20 Pannella.

21 (No response.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Nicholas
23 Pannella.

24 (No response.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Mike Daly,

2 commenting on 200006.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. DALY: Thank you, President
5 Clarke and Councilmembers.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 afternoon.

8 MR. DALY: My name is Mike Daly
9 and I'm the Executive Director for the
10 Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans Memorial
11 Fund. I have a very short letter from
12 Terry Williamson, who is President of the
13 Fund.

14 Dear Council President Clarke
15 and Councilmembers, City Council is
16 poised to place on the ballot an
17 ill-advised measure to give graduates of
18 City technical schools a preference for
19 civil service jobs normally afforded to
20 veterans and the children of police and
21 firefighters killed in the line of duty.
22 Its supporters argue it would take
23 nothing away from men and women who
24 earned the preference in the service of
25 their country and this city.

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2 That's not true, because it
3 would.

4 Trade school graduates would
5 help deplete the pool of available jobs
6 for veterans. Other politicians would
7 later be tempted to follow the specific
8 groups of their own.

9 A move like this would just be
10 another step in the nobly inspired to
11 keep a running support for our veterans.
12 Plus I think that an argument can be made
13 that as one support of the measure said,
14 the graduates already leave school with
15 in-demand skills, especially that
16 employers want. Sadly, it's not always
17 the same for veterans who are well
18 qualified so many ways, including men and
19 women who return from service, but
20 sometimes don't have the skills local
21 employers want.

22 As a Vietnam veteran, I've seen
23 the short-tripped my fellow veterans got
24 when they returned home from Vietnam. I
25 was beginning to think this was in the

2 past, but now I'm not so sure.

3 I would urge strongly Council
4 to consider your support -- reconsider
5 your support for this bill.

6 Thank you, everyone.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
11 on. Mr. Decker, hold on one second.

12 The Chair recognizes
13 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

14 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. For the record, I
16 just wanted to ensure that all the
17 members and stakeholders here today know
18 that Resolution No. 200040 and Bill No.
19 200006 are being held per my remarks at
20 the Committee on the Law and Government
21 hearing which was held on February 5th.
22 We are having a Committee on Labor and
23 Civil Service next week to address any
24 further concerns relative to those two
25 pieces of legislation.

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2 Thank you very, very much. And
3 also amendments have been circulated
4 prior to the hearing amongst all of my
5 colleagues. They're on your desk and
6 also they've been circulated via e-mail.

7 Thank you so much.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 Mr. Decker, call the next name.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Julia Kristan.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. KRISTAN: Hello. Good

14 afternoon. My name is Julia Kristan.

15 I'm a registered nurse at Einstein

16 Hospital in the emergency department. I

17 also serve on the executive board of

18 Einstein Nurses United, which is our

19 PASNAP local.

20 PASNAP nurses stand behind this

21 important resolution that Isaiah Thomas

22 and others are presenting to study and

23 mitigate the effects of hospital and

24 emergency room closures.

25 What hospitals like Einstein,

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Hahnemann, and Mercy have provided is a front-line healthcare to patient populations that are predominantly lower income and predominantly people of color. It does not go without notice that on the tail of Hahnemann's closure, we find ourselves grappling with the potential closure of Mercy Hospital in the heart of West Philadelphia.

What we see time and time again in our city are the echoes of the very imperfect foundation of our nation. In the midst of Black History Month especially, we will be remiss to think that we have escaped our past and during legacies of redlining have left Philadelphia one of the nation's most segregated cities and one of the poorest.

Hospital closures have profound effects not only in the communities they serve but on the larger health service system. Nothing occurs in a vacuum, and the closure of one hospital means increased volumes, wait times, and

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frustrations at the other overburdened
ERs and primary care systems.

Patients find themselves having
to look for entire new networks. From
the logistics of finding an ER that used
to be in their backyard to shifting their
medical records from a lifetime of care,
we can only imagine the stress and
upheaval they face.

Something is wrong with our
healthcare in this country when patients
and healthcare workers are constantly
fighting for care and resources they
need. How is our system so imbalanced
that disparities across class lines
persist along lines of color? What
incentives are we providing when
pharmaceutical and insurance companies
see windfall profits while patients
struggle for equitable access to
appropriate care? How will she be judged
by society when executives and developers
hold more power than our own people in
determining healthcare access?

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2 As a nurse, I am called to
3 advocate for my patients. Today I'm
4 called and I am dreaming of a society
5 where all my patients can live in a city
6 where their access to healthcare is
7 determined not by the color of their
8 skin.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Ma'am, if you can wrap it up.

11 MS. KRISTAN: Sorry. Thank
12 you.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Jarrett Smith.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. SMITH: Hello. My name is
19 Jarrett Smith and I serve as the
20 Government Relations representative with
21 SEIU Healthcare for Pennsylvania
22 representing more than 45,000 healthcare
23 workers across the state in hospitals,
24 nursing homes, and home care.

25 In a city that boasts its eds

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2 and meds, the elimination of Mercy
3 Hospital's inpatient services is a kick
4 in the teeth after the closure of
5 Hahnemann last year. Once again, a
6 facility that provides essential care to
7 black and brown communities and employs
8 hundreds of workers has fallen prey to
9 priorities of free market medicine, which
10 prioritizes the wealth of the few over
11 the health of the rest of us.

12 Philadelphians must now realize
13 that these closures are not isolated or
14 one-off events, but are part of larger
15 trends in a healthcare industry that
16 increasingly places profits over patients
17 and where area hospitals, doctors, and
18 specialists are being cannibalized by
19 large integrated delivery networks and
20 multi-state health systems.

21 I applaud Councilmember Thomas
22 for his call to create a working group
23 and analyze the effects of closures that
24 can proactively examine the healthcare
25 crisis facing our city. Working people

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2 are tired of shouldering the pain while
3 elected leaders and wealthy CEOs fail
4 year after year to respond to harmful
5 consolidation trends that we have
6 protested for years.

7 It is time for you to act and
8 to invest in healthcare in a way that
9 makes us healthy. We need to bring
10 together voices of patients from
11 low-income communities and communities of
12 color, as well as their caregivers, to
13 demand that the system, largely funded by
14 our taxpayer dollars and insurance
15 premiums, meet our needs.

16 We will only have a truly just
17 healthcare system when the voices of
18 consumers and caregivers carry more power
19 than the interests of executives.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 afternoon.

4 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

5 This is an official decree of the people
6 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
7 such, requires immediate action and
8 remedy.

9 Every week, Council, Mayor,
10 Governor, and others transfer private
11 property to the government, probably
12 unlawfully.

13 Last week, did multiple
14 oath-bound officials testify that they
15 have failed to perform their known duty
16 or task? Did they confess to failure to
17 secure the people's houses, persons, and
18 effects? Was the Sheriff decreed to
19 arrest most officials last year? Did the
20 Sheriff's failure to perform their known
21 duty or task would have brought
22 significant change?

23 If you do not want to follow
24 your oath to God, why do you run for
25 office and why aren't you in jail? Can a

2 RICO-style conspiracy to deny rights
3 exist without accessory-after-the-fact
4 help from the Sheriff?

5 The constitutions require
6 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
7 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
8 duty. Your oath of office requires you
9 to act or face prison.

10 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
11 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
12 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
13 through 28; and other laws listed in
14 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
15 violated.

16 I call on the federal and
17 Commonwealth governments to perform their
18 constitutional obligations to investigate
19 and prosecute all involved in the theft
20 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
21 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

22 The denial of my God-given 42
23 USC 1982 property rights for 26 years is
24 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
25 and requires immediate remedy.

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2 A just government must obey the
3 rule of law. This color of law
4 government must have its Charter to
5 govern revoked until a constitutionally
6 compliant government is installed.

7 Public servants cannot refuse
8 their sworn duty to act any more than a
9 fireman can refuse to fight a fire.

10 I remind Council, it takes a
11 lot of cooperation to create and allow
12 all of this monumental corruption each
13 and every week.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Larry Holman,
17 commenting on 200006 and 200040.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 afternoon.

21 MR. HOLMAN: Good morning. My
22 name is Larry Holman. I want to say good
23 morning to President Clarke and members
24 of City Council, my fellow veterans, and
25 everybody else in the room. Also I want

2 to give a shout-out to my Councilman,
3 Bobby Henon. Good morning, sir.

4 I'm a Vietnam veteran and a
5 military retiree of the U.S. Navy. I've
6 lived in Northeast Philly since I retired
7 from the Navy in 1982.

8 When I learned of the bill that
9 erodes the hiring preferences currently
10 available to veterans and children of
11 first responders, I wondered why
12 Philadelphia has a Veterans Advisory
13 Commission and why it has a Director of
14 Veterans Affairs. I wondered if advising
15 counsel was sought from these resources
16 prior to moving forward with such an
17 incentive measure which constitutes a
18 slap in the face of veterans.

19 Veterans are among a very small
20 percentage of citizens who have stepped
21 forward and offered their lives when
22 their country needed them. Those who are
23 fortunate enough to survive their
24 training and deployments return to make a
25 transition to civilian life.

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2 The reason veterans are given
3 preference, which does not guarantee them
4 a job, by the way, is because they have
5 been away from the job market serving
6 their nation. Thus they have not had an
7 opportunity to pursue education or
8 technical training to prepare them for
9 employment, nor have they had an
10 opportunity to acquire on-the-job
11 experience in the field they may be
12 seeking to enter.

13 Therefore, please do not
14 diminish the service of veterans to our
15 nation by diluting the value of the
16 employment preference for those veterans.

17 People often thank me for my
18 service, and I often respond, you are
19 worth it. I mean it when I say that.
20 Every citizen is worth my service to them
21 and the nation. So please take
22 appropriate action to restore my
23 confidence in your sincerity when you
24 thank me for my service. And in your
25 future deliberations on this, some of the

2 questions that should be issued or
3 addressed -- thank you very much.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much for your testimony, and
7 thank you for your service.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Andy Waskie.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MR. WASKIE: Thank you very
13 much. Good afternoon. I'm here as an
14 advocate for veterans. My official name
15 is --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
17 state your name.

18 MR. WASKIE: Pardon me?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
20 was just saying state your name for the
21 record.

22 MR. WASKIE: Anthony Waskie,
23 but most of my friends know me by my
24 nickname Andy Waskie. I am a resident
25 and citizen of Philadelphia, a voter, and

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2 a taxpayer, and I'm also representing
3 Benjamin Franklin Post 405 of the
4 American Legion at the Union League,
5 which I serve as an officer, Vice
6 Commander, and also the Armed Services
7 Council of the Union League and,
8 therefore, through that work with those
9 groups, we work assiduously for veterans
10 who deserve our support and our
11 commemoration.

12 So I'm in favor of a section of
13 the populus of our citizens who served
14 and sacrificed, sometimes receiving
15 illness and wounds and maiming and took
16 orders and did them to the best of their
17 ability, returned home, and did it all
18 for love of country and their duty.

19 I am against eliminating,
20 diminishing or eliminating or diminution
21 of any of the preference that would be
22 given to the hiring process, so that they
23 should because of their service, because
24 of their time, because of their loyalty,
25 because of their dedication, they have

2 certainly earned that preference.

3 And so I came here today, and I
4 haven't been here very often. I'm a
5 historian. I know some of you here
6 because we work with like Lincoln Day at
7 the Union League, O.V. Catto Day, which
8 is coming up on the 22nd, and all of
9 those were great veterans and deserve our
10 recognition as well.

11 Thank you very much.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you for your testimony, sir, and
14 thank you for your service.

15 (Applause.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Griffies.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. GRIFFIES: Good morning,
19 everyone.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MR. GRIFFIES: Welcome to the
23 house that veterans built. We built this
24 building.

25 My name is Joe Griffies. I'm

2 the host of the Welcome Home Veterans
3 radio show. Most of you have been on my
4 show. I'm a big supporter, born and
5 raised in Philadelphia.

6 I want to recommend --
7 Councilman Clarke, I have a lot of
8 respect for you, an Edison grad.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you.

11 MR. GRIFFIES: -- (continue)
12 that we do not initiate a bill until we
13 sit first with our Council that was put
14 there in the first place. And I am
15 challenging the 17 Councilmembers, of
16 which 16 are not veterans, did not serve
17 their country, to visit the Michael J.
18 Crescenz VA Medical Center, 36th and
19 Woodland. Walk in the corridor and see
20 the wheeling chairs, the crutches, the
21 walkers, the canes. Go to the second
22 floor and see the prosthetic department.
23 Next to the prosthetic department is the
24 blind department. We have 485 blind
25 veterans. And then go to the seventh

2 floor, the mental health floor, where
3 hundreds of veterans are there to see a
4 psychiatrist, their psychologist, their
5 counsel worker, their caseworker.
6 They're not there because they want to be
7 there. Most of them are there because
8 they want to be around tomorrow.

9 Why do we ask so few to do so
10 much and in return get so little?

11 In my closing, I -- and there's
12 a gentleman over there laughing. You
13 think it's funny?

14 I guarantee he's not a veteran.

15 In my closing, I'll give you
16 648 reasons why this bill should not
17 pass. They're the names of the teenagers
18 that went to Vietnam from Dock Street.
19 We're putting a memorial March 29th.
20 We're building a memorial, and I
21 guarantee -- and most of you's don't know
22 this -- that ten veterans died in Vietnam
23 and haven't come home yet. And on the
24 29th of March, your school, your alma
25 mater, Councilman Clarke, we are cutting

2 the ribbon for the 66 condos that the
3 veterans built to take the veterans off
4 the street of Philadelphia, and our
5 street is loaded with veterans.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony and thank
9 you for your service.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Patrick McKenna.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 afternoon.

15 MR. McKENNA: Good morning,
16 Mr. President, members of Council. My
17 name is Patrick McKenna. I was born in
18 Fishtown. I was raised in East
19 Kensington. I raised my family in
20 Southwest Philadelphia in a home that I
21 still own and pay taxes on. I presently
22 live in Darby Borough, and I'm a member
23 and elected of the Council of Darby
24 Borough.

25 As a combat Marine -- a Marine

2 combat -- a combat Marine of the Vietnam
3 War, I strongly oppose Council Bill
4 200006 and Resolution 200040. This is
5 basically, I see it, that I don't feel
6 that any one student should be
7 discriminated against by not getting --
8 by getting points because they went to a
9 special school. I don't think -- or a
10 certain school. I don't think that
11 students or applicants for employment for
12 civil service jobs within the City should
13 be discriminated against because of the
14 school they went to, the neighborhood
15 they grew up in, the religion they
16 profess or the color of their skin. I
17 think everybody should be equally
18 treated.

19 And I also appreciate the fact
20 that in this country, veterans get
21 preference for civil service jobs because
22 of the service they have rendered to
23 their country and their fellow citizens
24 and the world.

25 As a member of the Council, I

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sit on a panel that interviews applicants
for the Public Works and Police
Department. I think they're valuable --
I think of veterans as valuable assets to
these teams, because I know that veterans
know how to recognize and obey authority,
follow rules, wear a uniform, and respect
their neighbors and their co-workers.

And I also know that they have worked
with people of different cultures within
the military, and they do it wisely.

Thank you for your time.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your remarks, sir. Thank
you for your service.

(Applause.)

CHIEF CLERK: Darryl Johnson.

(Witness approached podium.)

MR. JOHNSON: Yes. Good
morning. My name is Darryl Johnson.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
afternoon.

MR. JOHNSON: I am a veteran,
as you know, but in addition, I am a

2 retired teacher from the Philadelphia
3 School District. The school that I
4 taught at had the highest number of CTE
5 shops in the district. So when I first
6 seen this resolution, I was a little bit
7 torn, because we tell our students to not
8 only work hard to get your academics
9 together, but you can also learn a trade
10 and be self-sufficient and it can lead
11 you down the road of independence,
12 financial independence.

13 So I was torn, because I love
14 my kids and I wanted the best for them,
15 but when I thought about this and I
16 thought about how it was being presented
17 so quickly and with so much lack of
18 information, I was disturbed. It was
19 disturbing to see that this resolution,
20 loosely as it's written, can open doors,
21 open the floodgates to further lobbying
22 to this esteemed body or other groups to
23 receive preferential treatment that was
24 created by law for veterans. And this
25 will erode this preferential treatment.

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2 I am one who benefited from
3 that when I got out the service in 1974
4 and I took the apprenticeship test down
5 the Navy Yard and I was accepted, and
6 those points helped me get a good job.
7 And it's the same place where my father
8 could not get a job at the Navy Yard, and
9 he served in World War II and brought his
10 family up from the South and could not
11 get a job in the Navy Yard because of
12 discrimination. I was able to get that,
13 and if it wasn't for this preferential
14 treatment, it wouldn't have happened.

15 So this is not something we
16 take lightly. Just to bring up a
17 group -- and I have a lot of respect for
18 CTE. Just to bring up a group, it can
19 happen in the future where more and more
20 and more until it's eroded and it's to
21 the point of being useless and
22 unacceptable for veterans.

23 Thank you very much for your
24 time.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you, Darryl. Thank you for your
3 testimony. Thank you for your service.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Bob Reilly.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MR. REILLY: Thank you for
10 allowing me to come into your home.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
12 state your name for the record.

13 MR. REILLY: Robert Reilly.

6 democracy, there are times where we just
7 disagree, and this is one of those times.

8 The major issue that has
9 occurred is lack of information. I have
10 tried to inform the veterans community,
11 and they have reached out to me for
12 information. I've tried to ensure that
13 that information is accurate.

14 There is a bill, well intended,
15 Charter change, to try to provide a
16 hiring preference to Philadelphia School
17 District graduates of a career technical
18 school. And at this point in time, the
19 bill has been or is being amended to
20 offer five preference points, but the
21 issue is not solely about the number of
22 points. The issue is, is that an erosion
23 of the hiring preference for veterans and
24 the children of fallen police officers
25 and firefighters? I think it is. That's

2 why I opposed it in committee and I
3 oppose it because graduates of career
4 technical schools are very employable and
5 they do not appear to me to need a
6 Charter change hiring preference.

7 There are other ways to assist
8 and help any group in Philadelphia
9 through legislation, tax credits and
10 other things. What I will say is that I
11 believe that the playing field should
12 always be level. Ten points for one
13 person is ten points less for everyone
14 else. That includes graduates of
15 Community College, our regular high
16 schools, persons with disabilities,
17 returning citizens, recovered drug
18 addicts and others.

19 Ten points for veterans to me,
20 that is a merit-based preference. It is
21 for the service and the sacrifice that
22 they have provided, the same as I would
23 see in a --

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN OH: The same as I

3 If someone said they served our nation, I
4 would say that's a plus in character and
5 public good, and I understand that that

9 preference, our city of 30,000 employees
10 has only 1.8 percent veterans hired. So
11 despite this ten point preference, our
12 city is very low in terms of the veterans
13 hired. And we have a large population of
14 veterans and a larger population when we
15 include those on the GI bill that attend
16 our universities.

17 So to me, this is a group that
18 is not only deserving, meritorious, but a
19 group in need. For that reason, although
20 I appreciate, as many expressed, the good
21 intention of the bill, I do oppose it,
22 and I certainly will try to see how there
23 can be a mutually beneficial agreement on
24 how to do this, but from the
25 communications that I have received, I do

2 not see that a Charter change preference
3 is the way to address the problem.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Brooks.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
11 you, Council President. Yesterday the
12 School District of Philadelphia announced
13 that it would be temporarily closing two
14 more schools due to asbestos, Clara
15 Barton Elementary in Feltonville and
16 James J. Sullivan in Wissinoming. This
17 brings the total schools to close this
18 year to nine.

19 With every closure
20 announcement, families are forced to
21 scramble to find childcare, and they are
22 filled with anxiety about their
23 children's health and safety. And all of
24 this chaos and anxiety week after week
25 could be avoided.

2 The District is systematically
3 testing all schools for asbestos, as it
4 does to uncover -- it will uncover
5 issues, but the District has failed to
6 communicate its testing plan. They could
7 easily inform parents each week of the
8 schools they are testing and their plan
9 that will help if they identify an issue.

10 We all know the schools need
11 funding, and I support the call to
12 declare a state of emergency so that our
13 schools get the funding they deserve, but
14 lack of funding is no excuse for why we
15 cannot make sure that Philadelphia public
16 school students and families are
17 informed.

18 Dr. Hite has acknowledged that
19 the District needs a better communication
20 plan, and now I am asking him publicly to
21 create that plan.

22 This failure to communicate
23 continues the history of excluding and
24 traumatizing vulnerable communities. Our
25 kids deserve better. Our families

2 deserve better. Our teachers and school
3 staff deserve better, and they deserve
4 better now.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 on behalf of the majority, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Green.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
13 Council President. Today has been
14 somewhat interesting, as always. I had a
15 great opportunity to come into City
16 Council to debate the issues of the day.
17 It was interesting how both my longtime
18 colleague Councilmember Johnson and my
19 newer colleague Councilmember Katherine
20 Gilmore Richardson put me in a little bit
21 of a spot today. One had me honoring
22 Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated.
23 The other had me honoring Alpha Phi
24 Alpha.

25 But as I was reflecting on

2 those two great organizations and as we
3 are here in February, which is Black
4 History Month, it also had me think about
5 the men that were being honored as part
6 of those acknowledgments today,
7 Christopher Giddens, who was and is the
8 founder of the Young Flames, and
9 Dr. Oscar J. Cooper, one of the founders
10 of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, and also it
11 made me also think about the hearing we
12 had on Tuesday at Christian Stronghold
13 Baptist Church regarding the ManUp
14 program and some of the anti-violence
15 programs that Solomon Jones is doing and
16 working with others.

17 And so Mr. Giddens, Dr. Cooper,
18 and Solomon are all three individuals who
19 have stepped up and basically manned up.

20 As we all know, we have a
21 significant issue in this city of gun
22 violence, and when I looked at the young
23 men who are part of the Young Flames who
24 came up with this music video and this
25 song and it also reflected on the

2 distinguished men of Omega Psi Phi who
3 are having their hundredth anniversary of
4 their chapter here in the City of
5 Philadelphia, it demonstrated that we can
6 step up as either very, very young men
7 like Young Flames or more seasoned men
8 like the men of Omega Psi Phi, as well as
9 the work that Solomon Jones is doing with
10 the ManUp initiative.

11 And so these are individuals,
12 some who are no longer with us and some
13 who are very young, really exhibiting all
14 the means and the thoughts and
15 reflections behind Black History Month.

16 And so I just wanted to make
17 that point today. As we continue to deal
18 with the issues of gun violence and
19 public safety in our city, we need more
20 men to man up, especially in the African
21 American community, and follow the
22 leadership of Christopher Giddens and the
23 Young Flames, Solomon Jones, as well as
24 Dr. Oscar J. Cooper and the men of Omega
25 Psi Phi.

2 Thank you, Council President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. You all did an
5 awesome job the other night.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
9 you. I feel compelled to also stand up
10 and congratulate my colleagues and the
11 work of Solomon Jones and all of the
12 folks who came out to the hearing the
13 other night. I was happy to join
14 Councilman Green, Councilmen Johnson and
15 Jones as they navigated this
16 conversation, and we were joined by
17 Councilwomen Brooks, Gauthier, Gilmore
18 Richardson, and Domb. Yeah, we had a
19 Council quorum, and it was a very
20 important conversation.

21 In a couple of weeks, the Mayor
22 will give us a list of folks in the
23 School District, and I'm reminded of the
24 conversation around representation, in
25 particular representation of black men on

2 that board. And so I look forward to
3 receiving that list from the Mayor and
4 engaging in that conversation.

5 Tuesday night I listened
6 intently, and I appreciated the candor
7 and the passion and the conviction not
8 only of Solomon Jones but the many men
9 who stood up and shared their stories.
10 As always, I was inspired by the black
11 men who came not just to talk about the
12 problem, but to really, as Councilman
13 Green put it, man up, stand up, and be
14 part of the solution. And the
15 conversation was very productive, because
16 everyone came forward to talk about what
17 they were doing, how they were doing, and
18 their commitment to do more.

19 I came away feeling very
20 hopeful as we talk about and we welcome
21 our new Commissioner, as the Councilmen
22 talk about gun violence, but it was not
23 just about talking about it, but real
24 solutions and real strategies.

25 They challenged us. And I look

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2 forward to Part 2, because, Council
3 President, they challenged us in Council
4 as their leaders and their
5 representatives to invest in people, the
6 people doing the work on the ground.

7 In the next few weeks we'll
8 begin a budget process. That budget
9 should be a moral document that reflects
10 the values and how we prioritize people
11 in the City of Philadelphia.

12 I know you're committed to this
13 and the work that we continue to do
14 around poverty, because at the root of
15 all of this is the generational poverty
16 that exists, but Tuesday night I was the
17 most hopeful I've been in a long time,
18 that if we invest in people, the people
19 doing the work on the ground, we can do
20 much better for our neighborhoods.

21 Thank you, Council President
22 Clarke.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore
4 Richardson.

5 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. As the daughter of
7 the deceased James William Gilmore, who
8 is an Army veteran, who served a tour of
9 duty in Korea, I feel compelled to speak
10 up and out regarding the legislation that
11 I introduced and that we are continuing
12 to work on in this legislative body.

13 On January 23rd, 2020, I
14 introduced Bill Nos. 200006 and 200007
15 and also Resolution 200040, which would
16 amend the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter
17 to authorize Council to give a civil
18 service testing preference to students
19 who graduate from a Career and Technical
20 Education program in Philadelphia. And
21 on February 5th, 2020, a committee
22 hearing was held for one of the bills and
23 resolutions in the Law and Government
24 Committee specifically around placing the
25 question before the qualified electors

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2 regarding this upcoming election for them
3 to decide if they want us to have a
4 preference.

5 There was a second bill
6 introduced in that package that was also
7 referred to the Labor and Civil Service
8 Committee, which that committee hearing
9 has not been held yet and has been
10 scheduled for February 18th, 2020.

11 However, since the Law and Government
12 hearing when a number of issues and
13 questions, comments, and concerns were
14 raised, my team and I have done the
15 following:

16 We have met with several
17 organizations and individuals to discuss
18 challenges and concerns relating to the
19 legislative package.

20 On Monday, February 10th, 2020,
21 we met with Carlo Aragoncillo, Lloyd
22 Remick, Anthony Boyle, George Ginder, and
23 others from the Philadelphia Veterans
24 Advisory Commission and corresponded with
25 other veterans groups that we were aware

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2 of, and all the veterans groups that are
3 here today, we are currently receiving
4 their information so that we can be in
5 close contact with them as we move
6 forward in this process.

7 On Tuesday, February 11th, we
8 met with the firefighters and the FOP,
9 and we are continuing with additional
10 meetings with DC33 and 47 later on today.

11 So we do intend to continue to
12 listen to concerns that have been raised
13 prior to the hearing, which is why all of
14 my colleagues received a copy today on
15 their desk and via e-mail of the steps
16 that we have taken since the Law and
17 Government Committee hearing, as well as
18 some of the proposed amendments that we
19 will introduce at the Labor and Civil
20 Service hearing.

21 Over the past several years,
22 the School District of Philadelphia,
23 obviously with the support of
24 Philadelphia City Council, has made
25 significant investments in our career and

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2 technical education programs as we
3 continue to figure out a way to create
4 pathways and pipelines to employment for
5 our young people in the City of
6 Philadelphia. I contend that we cannot
7 continue to ask our business community to
8 do more with creating workforce
9 development opportunities if we're not
10 doing more ourselves from the perspective
11 of the City of Philadelphia.

12 Also, this legislation, the way
13 it's currently written, would not take
14 anything away from a veteran. A veteran
15 would still receive their ten point
16 preference on the civil service
17 examination. It just adds that a
18 graduate of a career and technical
19 education program would receive a
20 preference, because they do have over
21 1,080 work hours of skill training for
22 specific trades.

23 Mr. President, I also
24 respectfully disagree with anyone who
25 intentionally spreads false information

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2 for their personal benefit, and I will
3 not allow that to occur with any
4 legislation that we're working on,
5 because we are working hard to address
6 the comments and concerns of everyone
7 that we're working with, and I look
8 forward to continuing to work with the
9 community as we move forward.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Parker.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

16 Mr. President, our new members are just
17 really making me so happy with the
18 substance of the work that they are
19 proffering in this body. It's very
20 encouraging.

21 I just wanted to comment
22 quickly on the record as Chair of the
23 Committee on Law and Government. I
24 wanted to say a special thank you to
25 Councilwoman Katherine Gilmore Richardson

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2 for the very methodical and intentional
3 efforts put forward in the process to
4 ensure that all stakeholders associated
5 with the legislative package that she was
6 sponsoring would have their voices heard.
7 And during that hearing, Councilwoman
8 Gilmore Richardson, I think you noted
9 that you were continuing to meet with
10 more and more stakeholders about
11 questions or concerns regarding the
12 legislation.

13 I just wanted to specifically,
14 for the benefit of those who are in this
15 Chamber and at home who are watching,
16 there is nothing more credible than a
17 public servant and an elected official
18 who does their homework and ensures that
19 any entity that is impacted by
20 legislation being proffered has the
21 opportunity to have their voice heard.
22 And it takes a whole lot of work and it
23 takes a whole lot of time, and people
24 don't usually see that part, but I wanted
25 to commend you, Councilwoman, for that

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2 work.

3 I also wanted to say a special
4 congratulations, and it really is in
5 order, for Councilman Green, members
6 Johnson and Jones regarding the ManUp PHL
7 hearing at Christian Stronghold. While I
8 was not able to attend the hearing due to
9 some longstanding familial commitments, I
10 want to thank you for making sure that
11 you got the people on the ground in the
12 room.

13 I was texting members of
14 Council while it was going on, letting
15 them know that I was watching it. But
16 the idea that there is no silver bullet,
17 anybody running around this city,
18 Mr. President, telling you that they have
19 the sole solution to reducing poverty or
20 addressing gun violence is really selling
21 a dream. The complexities associated
22 with how we get there I think will
23 include the body of work that this
24 Council produced during the last session,
25 what we've been working on this session,

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2 and what will come out of it in the
3 future, while partnering with many of the
4 organizations who presented at the
5 hearing that was held.

6 So, again, I want to say a huge
7 thank you to Solomon Jones, all members
8 of ManUp PHL, the sisters who are working
9 hard to support them for the record. It
10 reminds me a little bit of like civil
11 rights. We saw the guys Abernathy and
12 King and some others up front, but, you
13 know, in order for anything like that to
14 be successful, there were going to be
15 some women in the background.

16 So kudos to those who are
17 getting the work done but they are just
18 not being seen and/or heard.

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Gauthier.

24 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
25 you, Council President. As you have

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2 heard, Mercy Hospital in West
3 Philadelphia is facing the closure of its
4 inpatient and acute care services, along
5 with its emergency room. The loss of
6 these services can have a dramatic and
7 detrimental impact on the ability of West
8 and Southwest Philadelphians to access
9 medical care in our city.

10 To give you an idea, in 2018,
11 Mercy Philadelphia Hospital had near
12 7,700 admissions and 48,000 visits to the
13 emergency department. That means
14 thousands of people will now have to
15 travel further away and wait longer to
16 see a doctor when they are experiencing
17 an emergency.

18 Mercy served as a vital
19 healthcare option for many poor and
20 working-class people in the Third
21 District. And like many struggling urban
22 hospitals, its patients are a mixture of
23 those on Medicaid, those on Medicare, and
24 the uninsured. Its closure is
25 reminiscent of the closure of Hahnemann

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2 last year and the closure of St. Joseph's
3 in North Philadelphia in 2016, both
4 struggling urban hospitals serving mostly
5 black and brown communities in
6 Philadelphia.

7 But black and brown communities
8 are entitled to high-quality healthcare
9 and to fair treatment by our healthcare
10 system, and hospital workers are entitled
11 to fair treatment as well.

12 Nine hundred people work at
13 Mercy Philadelphia, and many of them are
14 members of my community as well. Last
15 night I heard from one employee who is
16 worried sick. She has a child in school,
17 bills to pay, and no sense of when the
18 hospital is closing or what it means for
19 her job or the patients in her care. She
20 heard of the news through the press.

21 Mercy's workers deserve to be
22 cared for and respected through this
23 process, and my office will be watching
24 this situation closely. I ask that Mercy
25 Hospital be transparent about its plans

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2 and communicate proactively with City
3 Council and the public as things develop.
4 I also ask for our City's other
5 healthcare providers to step up and help
6 meet the critical needs that will be
7 created by this loss. And I look forward
8 to working with my colleagues on Council
9 and in the Administration on a path
10 forward for partnering with our remaining
11 urban hospitals in this difficult
12 landscape and for providing equitable
13 healthcare to everyone in our city. Our
14 citizens deserve nothing less.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Johnson.

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
21 Council President. First, I want to echo
22 the sentiments of my colleagues in
23 thanking Councilmen Green and Jones, and
24 I had the opportunity to participate with
25 them and my other colleagues regarding

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2 the ManUp PHL initiative, because truly
3 if we're going to reverse the tides of
4 gun violence that we're seeing in the
5 City of Philadelphia, it's not only going
6 to take elected officials to be a part of
7 the solution, it's going to take the
8 community to step up to the plate in
9 addressing such a critical issue.

10 I had the opportunity yesterday
11 to meet with a group of advocates who had
12 lost their lives to -- who had family
13 members who have lost their lives to gun
14 violence, who have also been co-victims
15 of gun violence, and I thank my
16 colleagues for joining me in that
17 discussion, but the sole purpose of
18 working with victims and survivors of gun
19 violence is to make sure that their
20 voices don't become lost in this
21 conversation, because ultimately they are
22 the ones who are severely impacted. And
23 so we're going to be making sure that
24 they have a seat at the table regarding
25 how we're being supportive of their

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2 efforts.

3 We do have a hearing that's
4 going to take place in this Council
5 Chambers next Thursday, February the 20th
6 after Council session at 1:00 p.m., and
7 it's strictly around survivors, victims,
8 and co-victims of gun violence.

9 We address issues of
10 notification of family members when the
11 perpetrator who has caused the murder are
12 released back out on the street, how do
13 we address that issue.

14 It was you, Council President,
15 a couple budget sessions ago addressed
16 our former Police Commissioner on the
17 homicide clearance rate and what are we
18 doing to make sure that we're
19 apprehending those who are committing
20 these murders. At that time, the
21 clearance rate was somewhere around 14
22 percent. After we established the
23 Special Committee on Gun Violence, it has
24 increased somewhere around, to date, 48
25 percent, which shows the progress that

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2 this body was able to achieve based upon
3 us being proactive and making sure all of
4 the law enforcement agencies are talking
5 to one another and making sure they have
6 the necessary support in addressing this
7 issue.

8 So the hearing will be an
9 opportunity for us to get recommendations
10 and, most importantly, provide a platform
11 for those who are most severely impacted
12 by this issue. And, again, that's going
13 to be in this Council Chambers February
14 the 20th at 1:00 p.m.

15 On a lighter note, we won't
16 have a chance to see one another until
17 next Thursday, so Happy Valentine's Day,
18 everyone. In the Southwest part of my
19 district at Myers Recreation Center this
20 evening from 5:00 to 9:00, we will have
21 our annual Sweethearts Ball. So to all
22 those who are watching and who are
23 listening, you must be from the Southwest
24 part of my district to be able to attend
25 this event this evening. Hopefully you

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2 have signed up, but if you haven't and
3 you're just hearing about it today, you
4 are more than welcome to come,
5 participate in our Bop contest, watch me
6 do the Electric Slide, the Cha-Cha, all
7 those dances that folks taught us --
8 other folks taught us, seasoned folks
9 taught us to do.

10 So we look forward to having a
11 good time. You know Derek Green can
12 dance, y'all. I just want to state that
13 for the record. He gets it in. And my
14 colleagues, if you want to come past and
15 just mix and mingle with some of the best
16 constituents out in Southwest
17 Philadelphia, you're more than welcome to
18 stop past. That's 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
19 at Myers Recreation Center, and just have
20 a good time.

21 So with that being said, thank
22 you, everyone, and everyone have a
23 blessed weekend.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman.

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2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Jones.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. In a packed church at
6 Christian Stronghold Baptist Church on
7 Lancaster Avenue in West Philadelphia,
8 over 450 people came out and were very
9 concerned about the state of emergency
10 that we have in our city.

11 What I think is very notable
12 about the dialogue and discussion and
13 exchanges in ManUp was, it was balanced.
14 It talked about people who were victims
15 of crime, and the fact that some of
16 them -- I mentioned a gentleman that all
17 of you know. I'm going to spare his
18 family his name, but had lost not one
19 son, not two sons, but now a grandson to
20 gun violence. That is a real thing that
21 has to be balanced with the fact that we
22 want to do criminal justice reform.
23 Because it's not a question of "or." It
24 is a question of "and." We want to do
25 both of them.

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2 The second thing that I think
3 was recognized was the fact that the
4 closure rate for murders and gunshots
5 needs work. We have to deal with issues
6 like no snitching cultures. You know,
7 one person said that if you're lucky, you
8 might get an enthusiastic detective that
9 really wants to solve your individual
10 issue and crime. That has to be a
11 balanced approach that all life is
12 precious and all tears are important.

13 Closure is a real thing for a
14 lot of these families, and if you do so,
15 can curtail some of the back and forth
16 violence that we actually experience.

17 The other thing that we cannot
18 ignore based on those comments was the
19 poverty rate, that some people feel
20 trapped within their kind of environment.
21 I met a young person that said they had
22 never been ten blocks outside their
23 neighborhood. The only time they came
24 downtown was to go to court or to get a
25 pair of sneakers. We have to change the

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2 reality of people's generational deep
3 poverty. And we're going to deal with
4 that, and it's not a question of "or."
5 It's a question of "and," and we're going
6 to handle that.

7 As we look at the budget coming
8 up, we need to take that as an
9 opportunity to figure out, as was said,
10 the pieces of the puzzle that will create
11 the solution. It's not one thing. It's
12 many things working together and
13 coordinating. We're going to look for
14 those opportunities.

15 And ultimately we have a new
16 piece of that puzzle with Commissioner
17 Outlaw, and she's done some of her
18 homework in the three days of getting
19 around, talking to the rank and file, and
20 eventually we will get an opportunity to
21 exchange ideas and to exchange
22 perspectives, to take something old,
23 something old, something borrowed,
24 something blue, some of the old
25 situations we have in Philadelphia, some

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2 new ideas that she may bring, new
3 perspective, and the blue force that we
4 have to work with called the police
5 force, because we cannot do this by
6 ourselves.

7 So I was thankful to Solomon
8 Jones. I told him that not since the
9 Million Man March have I been that
10 optimistic about possible solutions for
11 inner city communities.

12 So the proof is in the pudding.
13 We have a couple of months worth of
14 budget before us, and we need to see how
15 we can incorporate some of those
16 solutions from things like Councilperson
17 Thomas talked about, summer jobs and how
18 it's easier to get a job in Council than
19 get a summer job for a kid. We have to
20 address a lot of those things in
21 coordination to address anti-violence.

22 Thank you, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

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2 O'Neill.

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. Normally our rules
5 prevent us from speaking about pending
6 legislation. Since that didn't happen
7 today and there's already been three
8 speakers, I will add my words to it.

9 Dealing with the veterans
10 preference/CTE preference proposal, a
11 couple of things I think should be noted.
12 I'm on both Law and Government and Labor
13 and Civil Service where the companion
14 bill is.

15 One, there are many preferences
16 in the City for testing. There are many
17 civil service tests. They are all, to my
18 understanding -- and we should get more
19 familiar with them because they're not
20 mandated in the Charter, but they're part
21 of our system. They're targeted to the
22 qualifications or special expertise that
23 the training, whatever it may be, that
24 that particular individual would have.
25 It doesn't exist here.

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2 Someone who is taking a certain
3 course in the CTE program, if they were
4 getting preference -- and we can argue
5 whether it should be three or five. I
6 think ten is off the table now, as I
7 heard. There's a purpose to it that is
8 clear. If you were trained in electrical
9 and there's an electrical test, test
10 involving electrical training, it would
11 be great to be able to give preference
12 for that, but there's many, many tests
13 that that training, whether it be in
14 electrical or plumbing or whatever it
15 might be, soldering, which is a big need
16 out there, that makes all kinds of sense.
17 We wouldn't have to do it -- I think it
18 would be pretty easy to convince the
19 Administration to add that to -- add this
20 to that list, but it would be for the
21 specific test that applies to your
22 training. And I think that is something
23 that -- I know it's something that
24 doesn't exist here and it's something
25 that should be part of anything with our

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2 CTE program. Otherwise, you take a CTE
3 program and you're an average student and
4 somebody has studied, finished the top of
5 their class, near the top of their class,
6 they don't get preference, and their
7 education in our system, in our high
8 schools, may be much more important to
9 that job than the qualification of
10 someone getting vocational training and
11 getting a three point preference, where
12 the other person who is a very good
13 student doesn't. So there's an
14 unfairness there, I believe. That's
15 pretty clear.

16 Secondly, if you look at the
17 Charter provision and what's being
18 amended here, it says -- and it's very
19 short. After the veterans and the
20 legacy, applicants whose mother or father
21 were killed in the line of duty, that
22 you're adding any qualified graduate of a
23 career technical education program in the
24 School District of Philadelphia. Well, I
25 believe that the average voter -- and

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2 considering myself an average voter, I
3 would assume that what I just talked
4 about was tying that training to the test
5 that they'd be getting the preference in
6 is a fair inference that someone would
7 make. So I don't think that it says
8 enough for a voter to make a conscious,
9 intelligent decision about whether to
10 vote yes or no.

11 Lastly, this does hurt veterans
12 and legacies. Legacies don't have an
13 organization like the veterans. The
14 veterans have spoken very clearly. If I
15 give someone in a test that veterans get
16 ten points on -- and this is every test,
17 because this does not target anything.
18 So veterans and legacies, whether police,
19 fire or all of the other civil service
20 tests, the civilian test, they get ten
21 points, they know that people get three
22 in certain tests if they have certain
23 qualifications. However, this would
24 effectively reduce the veterans and
25 legacy benefit to five points, because if

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2 a veteran or a legacy is taking a test
3 and competing with somebody who took a
4 CTE class and got the thousand hours,
5 whatever, they eventually only have five
6 points against in a competition with that
7 person. So there is actually a reduction
8 and a diminution of the veterans
9 preference when it counts. That's the
10 only time it counts in this situation, is
11 when they are competing with someone from
12 a CTE class.

13 And while we may have issues in
14 our uniform testing, how many applicants
15 we get and how many people are in a
16 certain class, there's myriad reasons for
17 it. We should know all about them. We
18 should have testimony from the Police
19 Department, the Fire Department as to why
20 our numbers may not be what we think they
21 should be. This is not the answer to it.
22 The answer is to deal with the underlying
23 problems and seeing if they can be
24 solved.

25 This has no connection to

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2 solving that problem. And I don't think
3 that a veteran taking a police and fire
4 test should have to compete, or any of
5 the other tests, with anyone who has no
6 qualifications for that job, and that
7 will be most of the tests.

8 If you had a specific training
9 in a CTE program, that they should have
10 their ten points now be reduced to five
11 when they're competing with people that
12 are being proposed -- applicants that are
13 being proposed to get the five points now
14 in this legislation.

15 But someone spoke about the
16 open-endedness of this, and believe me,
17 if somebody is voting on this, they're
18 going to vote on this ballot question.
19 As I said, I think there's already a fair
20 inference that there is a targeting for
21 this. Why would you be separating out
22 some high school students from all the
23 high school students?

24 But if you take this a step
25 further, there's other ways of dealing

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2 with this. And I know this was done in a
3 hurry. You can't get around that.
4 People that are affected by this found
5 out two days before. That's not a lot of
6 time. It wasn't vetted with our Veterans
7 Advisory. There's a whole lot of things
8 going on here. And there's nothing wrong
9 with that. It happens all the time, but
10 you pull back and you say, hey, we need
11 more time on this. We got to think this
12 through more. We got to bring the Mayor
13 in. Maybe the Mayor is willing to do
14 this tomorrow, not wait for a Charter
15 change and we'll see how it works.
16 Hopefully it would be targeted, and we'll
17 see what the end result is.

18 So I do think that this isn't
19 legislation that we should be offering
20 false information or anything about, but
21 I do think there's an underlying problem,
22 particularly in the uniform class's
23 testing, and we haven't heard a word from
24 the Police Department or Fire Department
25 about why those numbers are lower than

2 people think they should be.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

9 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
10 Council President. First, Happy
11 Valentine's Day to everybody. It's
12 coming up tomorrow.

13 And, second, I just wanted to
14 bring up this time of year, we're heading
15 towards the Earned Income Tax Credit
16 issues. I'm a little troubled because I
17 just found out that our numbers are going
18 in the reverse direction. We now have
19 45,000 people in the City of Philadelphia
20 who are not applying for the Earned
21 Income Tax Credit. Over \$113 million of
22 federal money is being left on the table
23 just in the Earned Income Tax Credit.

24 Just to give you the power of
25 this, a single parent with two children

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2 under the age of 17 can get checks up to
3 \$6,400, or a couple with two kids under
4 the age of 17 earning 51,000 -- single
5 parent earning 44,000 -- can get up to
6 \$6,400. You can file back three
7 additional years. So we're talking about
8 a lot of money. We're talking about
9 \$25,000 for the max. The average credit
10 is \$2,500, but you can still get 10,000
11 by filing back three additional years.

12 This \$113 million comes out of
13 everyone's paycheck. It's called federal
14 withholding tax. And if we don't make
15 sure that the residents of this city get
16 this money, in many ways it's a transfer
17 of wealth out of Philadelphia to
18 Washington, and it's terrible for our
19 residents not to get this money.

20 On the big scale, we're talking
21 about on this chart from Benefits Data
22 Trust -- and you're familiar with this,
23 because I know we're on this case -- \$463
24 million in federal money between Earned
25 Income Tax Credit of 113 million, food

2 stamps 100,000, with 67,000 people not
3 getting their money, medical assistance,
4 Medicaid, 40,000 people not getting
5 Medicaid, over 230 million. Then you
6 have other programs like prescription
7 assistance and property tax and rent
8 relief.

9 And so, Councilman Jones and
10 Councilmember Johnson and Councilmember
11 Green, I was there Tuesday night and I
12 thought you all did a great job, by the
13 way, a really good job, and there was
14 other members there too. But maybe what
15 we should do in these future Round 2, we
16 should ask maybe somebody from Benefits
17 Data Trust to set up a table with a
18 computer, and those 450 people who came
19 in, make them aware of these programs,
20 and if they don't qualify, tell them to
21 tell ten people about it and we should
22 tell ten people about it.

23 And to the press, we need you
24 to do a public service announcement about
25 all these benefits.

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2 This is too important for us
3 not to ask the press to help us get the
4 word out.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: More
10 to come.

11 That concludes our speeches
12 today, and with that, I would like to
13 recognize Councilman Jones for a motion
14 to adjourn.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
17 adjourned until Thursday, February 20th,
18 2020 at 10:00 a.m.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
22 seconded that Council stand adjourned
23 until Thursday, February 20, 2020, 10:00
24 a.m.

25 All those in favor say aye.

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2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

7 ayes have it. The motion carries.

8 Thank you all very much.
