3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started very shortly.
7 Thank you. We'll get rocking.

8 We have a quorum, so we're
9 going to get started. So to give our
10 invocation this morning, the Chair

12 Great.

13 Big Picture Alliance empowers
14 youth filmmakers and creatives by giving
15 them the tools and skills to bring their
16 ideas and experiences to life. Through
17 peer-to-peer mentorship, after-school and
18 summer programming, Big Picture Alliance
19 has been helping young Philadelphians
20 break into the film industry for over
21 30 years.

22 Big Picture Alliance provides
23 quality out-of-school-time programming,
24 which we know is exceedingly important to
25 Councilmember Thomas, and it helps to

14 Thank you very much, Councilwoman.

15 And our next order of business
16 is the introduction of bills and
17 resolutions, and I would ask the Clerk to
18 please read the titles of the bills and
19 resolutions that are being offered by our
20 members today.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
22 Phillips offers an ordinance amending
23 Chapter 10-600 of The Philadelphia Code,
24 entitled "Public Spaces - Prohibited
25 Conduct," by prohibiting certain facial

2 coverings from being worn in certain
3 spaces, all under certain terms and
4 conditions.

5 Mr. President, Councilman
6 Phillips would like to be recognized.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Phillips.

9 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Good
10 morning, colleagues and members of the
11 viewing public.

12 On several occasions, neighbors
13 have asked me, Councilman, when will you
14 ban those masks?

15 I know some of my Council
16 colleagues who are here today have gotten
17 similar questions. Well, today marks the
18 beginning of the process to address this
19 issue, because this morning I'm
20 introducing a ski mask ban.

21 Among several states, Virginia,
22 West Virginia, Florida, South Carolina,
23 and Georgia all have facial covering
24 bans. Before the pandemic, New York City
25 and DC also had a facial covering ban.

2 With my bill, Philadelphia will be next.

3 Before the pandemic, it was
4 well understood that when you see someone
5 wearing a ski mask, they're about to
6 commit a crime. That's why folks wear
7 them, to remain anonymous while
8 committing crimes.

9 Now, if we look at recent
10 police footage of shootings and robberies
11 in the City, many of these people are
12 wearing ski masks, and because of an
13 imprisoned rapper named Pooh Shiesty who
14 started this trend, you cannot
15 distinguish a misguided kid from a common
16 criminal. That is a problem.

17 It is a problem that we cannot
18 ignore. We cannot ignore it, because
19 neighbors feel unsafe. We cannot ignore
20 it, because police struggle to identify a
21 suspect in these masks. And we cannot
22 ignore it because this is both a public
23 safety issue and a quality of life issue.
24 Our quality of life suffers when folks
25 feel intimidated while going about their

2 daily life in the City.

3 The discourse on this subject
4 has been focused on whether it will stop
5 shootings. I'm not going to sit here and
6 pretend that it will, but what it will do
7 is make it easier for the police to
8 identify suspects and make our neighbors
9 feel safer.

10 We cannot remain silent on this
11 issue. When our neighbors, our seniors,
12 mothers, aunts, grandparents, and
13 children feel intimidated in their own
14 neighborhoods, it is time that we listen
15 to their concerns and ban these masks.

16 Before the pandemic, no one
17 would have defended wearing ski masks in
18 90-degree heat. There's simply no
19 reasonable justification for what we're
20 seeing play out in this city.

21 So, parents, stop letting your
22 children wear them. Stop buying them for
23 your children. And, young people, stop
24 wearing them.

25 And I'll take the opportunity

2 to encourage business owners to stop
3 allowing people to wear ski masks in
4 their stores as well. You cannot serve
5 in these communities and be scared of the
6 people you're serving.

7 With that said, I would like to
8 thank my co-sponsors, Councilmember Jim
9 Harrity, who has been there every step of
10 the way in support of this. Thank you,
11 Jim. And Councilmember Jones,
12 Councilmember Johnson, Councilmember
13 Gilmore Richardson, Councilmember Bass,
14 Councilmember Lozada, Councilman Squilla,
15 Councilman O'Neill, Councilman Driscoll,
16 and Councilmember Vaughn, thank you for
17 co-sponsoring this very important
18 legislation.

19 Thank you, Council President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
5 week's Calendar.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
7 resolution authorizing the Committee on
8 Public Safety to conduct hearings
9 regarding the use of unmanned aircraft
10 systems, also known as drones, as an
11 additional law enforcement tool that
12 would enhance public safety in the City
13 of Philadelphia.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Today's Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And on his own
17 behalf, Councilman Jones offers a
18 non-privileged resolution also naming the
19 5600 block of West Girard Avenue as
20 "Reverend James S. Allen Way."

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
22 week's Calendar.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a

3 reestablish an effort to ensure

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
9 Mr. President.

10 It was never more clear, never
11 more evident that when the I-95 situation
12 occurred, that there was a need for rapid
13 communications. I had to reach out to my
14 colleagues that were directly affected by
15 its collapse.

16 But, more importantly, on a
17 regular basis, whether it's natural
18 disasters such as flooding and rain,
19 whether it's water disasters when we find
20 out that a major section of Philadelphia
21 had contamination in their water, that
22 the Commissioners should be able to reach
23 out and contact elected officials.
24 Elected officials should conversely be
25 able to reach Commissioners to get

2 accurate information to be disseminated
3 to the public. When that doesn't happen,
4 misinformation happens, bad advice
5 happens, and it's chaotic.

6 Back in the day -- and I use
7 that term -- we had a communications
8 process that a lady would connect you,
9 almost like a phone operator, that if you
10 didn't want to give out your phone number
11 to a Commissioner or the Commissioner
12 wanted to give out their phone number to
13 you, they would make that connection.
14 They would make that call so that in
15 cases of emergency or dire need, people
16 could connect to people.

17 I think it's time that we
18 revisit that. I think I named it in the
19 resolution, the name of the lady.

20 What's her name?

21 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:
22 Switchboard.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Well, you
24 called the switchboard and then you
25 get -- you remember this, special

3 It's time to reinstitute that,
4 but intermodal, an e-mail chain, a text
5 stream, a phone call, member to
6 Commissioner, Commissioner to member, has
7 to be a part of our rapid response
8 communications, and I look forward to
9 working in this Administration but look
10 forward to instituting it in the next so
11 that we can stay connected.

12 Member Phillips represented --
13 not Member Phillips, but Member Driscoll
14 was pushed into a situation where he
15 needed every hand on deck. He was out
16 there for what seemed like days, but his
17 ability to mobilize all of us is an
18 important factor in responding to manmade
19 or natural crisis.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 Next week's Calendar.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

25 Johnson offers three resolutions. On

10 members of the National Baseball Hall of
11 Fame's "Golden Era Committee" to nominate
12 and elect former Philadelphia Phillies
13 great Dick Allen to the National Baseball
14 Hall of Fame as part of the Class of
15 2027.

16 Mr. President, Councilman
17 Johnson would like to be recognized for a
18 motion on this resolution.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
22 Council President.

23 Before I be acknowledged for
24 the motion on this resolution, I just
25 have a few remarks.

2 Today I've introduced a City
3 Council resolution urging the members of
4 the National Baseball Hall of Fame's
5 Golden Days Era Committee to nominate and
6 elect former Philadelphia Phillies great
7 Dick Allen to the National Baseball Hall
8 of Fame as part of the Class of 2027.

9 In December of 2021, Mr. Allen
10 fell one vote short of getting into the
11 Hall of Fame for the second time in a
12 row. Allen's supporters will now have to
13 wait until the Golden Days Era Committee
14 votes in December of 2026 to see if
15 Mr. Allen will finally make it into the
16 Hall of Fame.

17 After speaking with the
18 Phillies and Mr. Allen's family, I have
19 introduced this resolution to show that
20 City Council and the City of Philadelphia
21 support having him in the Baseball Hall
22 of Fame.

23 Mr. Allen is not just one of
24 the greatest players in Phillies history,
25 but is considered the Phillies first

2 African American superstar. His
3 statistics alone show that he is long
4 overdue to be inducted into the Baseball
5 Half of Fame. A seven-time Major League
6 Baseball all-star, Dick Allen spent nine
7 of his 15 Major League seasons from 1963
8 to '77 with the Philadelphia Phillies and
9 won National League Rookie of the Year in
10 1964.

11 During this time with the club,
12 Allen batted .290 with 204 doubles, 204
13 home runs, 655 runs batted in, and played
14 in 1,070 games. His slugging percentage
15 is second best in Phillies history,
16 behind only Hall of Famer Chuck Klein,
17 and he ranks 10th in the team history in
18 home runs.

19 Mr. Allen, whose No. 15 was
20 retired by the Philadelphia Phillies club
21 in September of 2020, became one of the
22 all-time greats in Phillies history after
23 being signed by the team in 1960 to his
24 first professional contract.

25 He joined the Phillies' front

2 office in 1994 as a Fan Development
3 Representative and later a Club
4 Ambassador.

5 Mr. Allen passed away on
6 December the 7th of 2020 at the age of
7 78. Mr. Allen is only the ninth member
8 of the franchise in its 140-plus year
9 history to have his jersey retired.

10 The other Phillies alumni to be
11 so honored also have plaques hanging in
12 the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, New York
13 is Richie Ashburn, Jim Bunning, Mike
14 Schmidt, Steve Carlton, Roy Halladay,
15 Robin Roberts, Allen as well as Grover
16 Cleveland Alexander and Chuck Klein.

17 The legacy of Mr. Allen will
18 continue for generations to come, thanks
19 to the newly named Dick Allen Field at
20 the Philadelphia Phillies Major League
21 Baseball Urban Youth Academy that was
22 dedicated last week at FDR Park in South
23 Philadelphia, which is in the Second
24 Councilmanic District.

25 The Dick Allen Field is another

2 great reminder for our next generation of
3 players of what he endured as an African
4 American player while still achieving
5 great success. Dick Allen's legacy will
6 never be forgotten.

7 And, again, I want to thank
8 former World Champion Phillies player
9 Dickie Ray Noles for coming to City
10 Council today to testify in support of
11 this resolution.

12 Mr. Noles was a Major League
13 pitcher with several teams during his
14 career and played for the Phillies from
15 1979 to 1981 and again in 1990. Dickie
16 was also a member of the 1980 World
17 Series Championship team pitching and
18 relief.

19 Noles was a player in the minor
20 leagues when he first was introduced to
21 Allen. The two later became great
22 friends.

23 I urge my colleagues here to
24 approve the passage of this resolution.
25 Once this resolution is approved, one

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2 copy will be given to the Philadelphia
3 Phillies so they can send it directly to
4 the National Baseball League Hall of
5 Fame's Golden Days Era Committee and a
6 second copy will be give to Mr. Allen's
7 family to show them that the City of
8 Philadelphia and City Council supports
9 their efforts to get their loved one
10 inducted into the National Baseball Hall
11 of Fame.

12 And with that being said,
13 Council President, I move that the rules
14 of Council be suspended so as to permit
15 consideration of this resolution at
16 today's session of Council.

6 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

7 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
8 you, Council President.

9 It is crystal clear that many
10 of the crises plaguing our city have
11 their roots in American slavery. And
12 while I am proud that Philadelphia is a
13 beacon of progressive ideals and
14 diversity, we know that Black
15 Philadelphians who descended from
16 enslaved Africans endure racism that's
17 baked into the foundation of our city and
18 society.

19 Therefore, the City has a duty
20 to join with state and federal government
21 and remove and rectify extraordinary
22 racial disparities. Because not only did
23 the government never atone for its
24 original sin of American slavery, but for
25 generations after the Civil War, General

2 Order No. 3 and the Fourteenth Amendment,
3 lawmakers enacted and encouraged policies
4 that subjugated Black residents to
5 second-class citizenship.

6 Redlining prevented Black
7 families from earning generational
8 wealth. Predatory companies and
9 individuals tricked Black residents into,
10 quote, "buying homes on contracts,"
11 turning Black families who just wanted a
12 home of their own into cash cows.
13 Employers paid Black employees less than
14 their white counterparts, continuing the
15 centuries-long tradition of exploiting
16 Black bodies for labor, and segregated
17 public schools for its children of color
18 to learn in crumbling and overcrowded
19 environments, preventing generations of
20 already disadvantaged young people from
21 obtaining the high-quality education they
22 needed to escape crippling poverty.

23 So when this body discusses
24 implementing bold solutions that get at
25 the root of problems like poverty and

2 gentrification, reparations must be a
3 part of that conversation, because
4 reparations are not a handout, they are
5 what the descendents of enslaved Africans
6 are owed and need. And nowhere is this
7 more apparent than the gun violence
8 epidemic that disproportionately impacts
9 our working-class Black residents. You
10 can trace a direct line from the decades
11 of racially motivated disinvestment in
12 Black neighborhoods to gun violence.

13 We all know that it is no
14 accident that formerly redlined areas
15 full of blighted properties, crumbling
16 schools, and uncollected dumping
17 experience the most violent crime. And
18 until these communities receive the
19 investments required to rectify these
20 problems, gun violence will continue to
21 haunt this city.

22 And so I am proud that today on
23 the eve of Juneteenth we are taking a
24 step towards loosening slavery's
25 lingering chokehold on the descendents of

2 enslaved Africans by establishing the
3 Philadelphia Reparations Task Force.

4 The Philadelphia Reparations
5 Task Force will complete a comprehensive,
6 data-driven study to determine if and how
7 our city was complicit in slavery. And
8 while there's no way to truly eradicate
9 past wrongs, the Task Force will
10 recommend concrete steps, financial and
11 otherwise, we can take to eradicate
12 extraordinary racial disparities.

13 Until we look into our past
14 with the determination to uncover the
15 entire truth, no matter how ugly or scary
16 that truth may be, our original sin will
17 continue to toxify the present and the
18 future.

19 Thank you to the neighbors who
20 have been pushing this city to take this
21 necessary step, especially Breanna,
22 Rashaun, and the entire Philadelphia
23 N'COBRA Chapter. It is because of your
24 activism that we are here today.

25 And I know that Rashaun and

10 escape this cycle of poverty and violence
11 without addressing the original cause of
12 harm, and we owe it to the people of
13 Philadelphia, the largest portion whom
14 are Black, to examine reparations as a
15 way to make up for hundreds of years of
16 exploitation and move towards the
17 equality that Black people have always
18 deserved.

19 Thank you so much, Council

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 Before we consider the bills
20 and resolutions on our Final Passage
21 Calendar, we will have our public comment
22 session. Your public comment session
23 will go as follows:

24 You must be concerning the
25 Second Reading and Final Passage

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2 Calendars for possible action today. All
3 speakers must sign up in order to
4 testify. If you have not already done
5 so, you may do so at the desk outside of
6 the Council Chambers with the
7 Sergeant-at-Arms.

8 Once you have signed up, you
9 will be called in the order in which your
10 name appears on the sign-up sheet.

11 Under ideal circumstances, you
12 will have three minutes, but we have a
13 significant number of individuals signing
14 up to testify, so we will have a
15 two-minute limit. I would ask you to
16 please adjust your testimony to reflect
17 the two-minute time limit.

18 In order to be fair, we want to
19 hold faithfully to that time limit. So
20 when you go to the podium, there will be
21 a device on that podium. There is a
22 green light. When the light turns green,
23 it will be your time to speak. When the
24 light turns yellow, you will have
25 30 seconds to conclude your remarks. And

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2 when the light turns red, we'd ask that
3 you please adhere to our guidelines and
4 conclude your remarks.

5 I want to thank you very much
6 for your willingness to participate in
7 your government in action and thank you
8 very much for your anticipated
9 cooperation.

10 I would ask Mr. Decker please
11 read the first name on the list today.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
13 today is Dickie Noles, commenting on
14 230527.

15 - - -

16 (Applause.)

17 - - -

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MR. NOLES: First of all, I'd
20 like to thank Councilmember Johnson for
21 introducing the resolution, and I'm
22 honored to be here as well as Rob
23 Holiday, and the Phillies would like to
24 thank you also.

25 This is an important topic for

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2 me, because it's history. Dick Allen is
3 our history in Philadelphia. I'm a
4 Philadelphian now. I'm from North
5 Carolina. I never thought I'd live in
6 Philadelphia after the 1980 World Series.
7 I've been here 31 years, so I know a lot
8 about the history of Philadelphia.

9 I didn't know about the history
10 of Dick Allen when I signed with the
11 Phillies in 1975, but shortly afterwards
12 we brought Dick Allen back, and I
13 remember we had this hotel down in
14 Clearwater, Florida where we had the
15 minor league players and the major league
16 players, and there was this invisible
17 line that was drawn where we couldn't
18 enter over into their space, but Dick
19 Allen would enter over into our space.
20 He would come over to the minor leagues.
21 He would take a sanitary and fill it full
22 of pennies and come over to our side and
23 play poker with all the minor league
24 players.

25 My first appearance of Dick

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2 Allen was pretty impressive. I was in
3 awe. I had heard about the long home
4 runs. We knew about the numbers. I
5 heard and knew about the Rookie of the
6 Year, the MVP, the 11 years of being the
7 best in the game on an OPS. But I really
8 didn't know Dick as a person.

9 I heard -- everybody has got a
10 story in Philadelphia of a home run he
11 hit over Connie Mack's roof, a home run
12 he hit over the building in left field in
13 Yankees Stadium. Mickey Mantle once said
14 that Dick Allen hit the ball harder and
15 farther than anyone that he had ever
16 seen.

17 So when I met Dick as a person
18 in 1994 when he came back to work for us
19 in the Community Relations Department, I
20 was really stunned to see what a great,
21 loving, caring, selfless man he was. The
22 only problem about Dick was, when he
23 stops to talk to you, you're going to be
24 there a while. So every time I would
25 wait on him, I would hear that he was

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2 coming to the ball park, and I couldn't
3 wait to see him, and we have a guard out
4 that parks the cars and he would stop and
5 talk to the guard and ask you about your
6 family and was very sincere about wanting
7 to know how you were doing. Then there's
8 another guard before he entered the ball
9 park, and he would stop and talk to him.
10 And we had policemen around our ball
11 park, and he would talk to them.

12 Here's the impact that Dick
13 Allen had on other people, as myself and
14 Rob Holiday will attest to. He wanted to
15 know about you. He would give you his
16 shirt off his back. But when every
17 police officer that I knew in Clearwater
18 would talk about Dick Allen, they would
19 say, this man is really a sincere man,
20 he's a gentle giant. And everybody that
21 ever knew about Dick and his home runs
22 and the 42-ounce bat thought he was 7'4"
23 and 300 pounds of muscle.

24 But Dick was a loving, as I
25 stated, caring man.

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2 I want to read a comment that
3 Jackie Robinson made. It's one of my
4 favorite: A life is not important except
5 in the impact it has on other lives.

6 Dick's impact in baseball may
7 have been good at times, may have been
8 bad at times, but the numbers speak for
9 themselves. There's no teammate that
10 ever played with Dick Allen that will not
11 attest to the fact that he was a great
12 teammate. I've never heard anybody say a
13 bad word about Dick Allen.

14 The one thing I would like to
15 share with you in closing with my remarks
16 is the one thing that I think is most
17 important to me, is Dick changed my life
18 in many ways. I never heard him speak
19 evil or bad about one person, but I would
20 do that from time to time. Baseball
21 talk. And Dick would always remind me,
22 God made that person, they're very
23 special.

24 I think life happens in times
25 of our -- things happen in times of our

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2 life that are not coincidental. My
3 mother used to walk -- I lived on B and
4 Allegheny Street in the third grade. I'm
5 from North Carolina, but she moved up
6 here. My mother used to walk around with
7 me all the time and say, God loves you,
8 he made you, that makes you special.
9 That was Dick Allen's message.

10 Our big bond came on the Bible.
11 I never met anyone in my life that knew
12 it from the beginning to the end.
13 Probably not many preachers know it, but
14 Dick did.

15 There was a time when I got hit
16 in the face one time with a line drive in
17 the temple throwing batting practice
18 after my career. I had a concussion.
19 They made me go to my room and stay
20 there, and Dick stayed with me. We had
21 adjoining rooms. He opened up the door
22 and about every 15 minutes he would come
23 in and say, you still all right, aren't
24 you?

25 As night fell and it got to be

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2 about 10 or 11 or 12 o'clock at night, he
3 would walk in and look at me and say, you
4 still alive?

5 I'd say, yeah, I'm still
6 breathing.

7 But the one important thing
8 that he would do during that time of our
9 fellowship would sit and tell me all the
10 stories, all the stories that I read
11 about in his perspective, all the stories
12 that I heard about in his perspective.
13 So I asked Dick, I said, Dick, you
14 ever -- you have no animosity towards
15 anything that ever happened in your
16 career? Not even the press? Only
17 teasing. But he told me, he says no.
18 I've forgiven everybody and everything.

19 And I did play a part in that,
20 and Dick Allen made the changes he needed
21 to make. And I know right now he's in
22 God's hall of fame, but in my opinion,
23 Dick doesn't just deserve to be in the
24 National Baseball Hall of Fame. He needs
25 to be there. They're going to be a

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2 better Hall of Fame with Dick Allen
3 there.

4 Thank you very much, and I urge
5 you to -- thank you.

6 - - -

7 (Applause.)

8 - - -

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much for your testimony,
11 Champ.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Lysa Monique Jenkins Hayden.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MS. HAYDEN: Hi. My name is
16 Lysa Monique Jenkins Hayden and I am here
17 in support of Bill No. 230271.

18 I am a proud Philadelphian,
19 specifically from North Philadelphia,
20 Strawberry Mansion section of the City.
21 I stand on the shoulders of my
22 grandmother and my mother, who also
23 served the City in various capacities.

24 I'm here because the businesses
25 that surround the neighborhoods that I

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2 grew up in, third generation growing up
3 in, I moved back as my primary residence
4 three years ago when my mother passed,
5 and the neighborhood just looks very
6 different. These businesses that are
7 allowed to be open 24 hours are a
8 surprise to me. And I heard one of the
9 Councilpeople say today that you can't be
10 scared to serve the people that you are
11 in the neighborhood of.

12 I feel like there is not enough
13 legislation to help us understand how to
14 deal with intimate interpersonal
15 relations when we make commerce out of a
16 neighborhood. And so lots of the stores
17 now there are not inhabited or the people
18 don't live where they're actually owning
19 stores and businesses, and so this
20 creates a lot of discord.

21 A few things that we've been
22 trying to coordinate in my neighborhood
23 is the License and Inspection and Police
24 Department and like a review process of
25 how we handle complaints about the

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2 businesses. There was a recent shooting
3 on Mother's Day. So this is the first
4 year I'm celebrating a Mother's Day after
5 losing my mother in August of last year,
6 and I woke up at 5:00 a.m. in the morning
7 to a shooting of a woman that I knew.
8 She was shot in the face in a store.

9 This store actually does
10 protect the people, the clerk behind
11 the -- like the glass screening, but it
12 doesn't really protect the folks that
13 come in to use it, because there's only
14 one way in and one way out.

15 And so I really am in support
16 of this bill. It's causing much nuisance
17 in the community, and I would appreciate
18 everyone's support to this bill as well.

19 Thank you.

20 - - -

21 (Applause.)

22 - - -

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

2 is George Gordon.

3 (No response.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: George Gordon,
5 commenting on 320271.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. GORDON: Hello. My name is
8 George Gordon. I'm here in support with
9 the proposal we just heard from Lysa
10 Jenkins about these nuisance -- well, I
11 call them nuisance businesses. These
12 businesses are -- I think they get their
13 license saying that they're opening up a
14 grocery store, because as it turns out,
15 it's some sort of marijuana paraphernalia
16 type of business. And they're in the
17 neighborhood. They're popping up all
18 over the place, and they're creating a
19 big disturbance in the neighborhoods.

20 We have two on our corner. We
21 have one on one side of the corner and
22 another one on the other end of the
23 corner of our block, and they're
24 contracting a lot of traffic. A lot of
25 kids are visiting these stores, and they

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2 have long lines out of these stores and
3 they're open 24 hours a day. And I don't
4 see what kind of business they could have
5 or what kind of need they will have to
6 open 24 hours a day in your neighborhood.

7 So we're just right now trying
8 to fight back these businesses from
9 popping up everywhere, and I'm hoping
10 that everybody will try to support the
11 business that she just -- the proposal
12 she just read to you.

13 Thank you.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

18 I would ask the Chief Clerk to
19 please read the name of our next speaker.

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Reverend Roy L. Jones, commenting on
22 230506.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 REVEREND JONES: Good morning.
25 Good morning. My name is Reverend Roy

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2 Jones. I represent two churches in New
3 Jersey. I represent organizations in
4 Philadelphia as well, and I'm here to
5 speak about Resolution 230506, and the
6 leaders putting that resolution together
7 was our friend Mark Squilla, and we thank
8 him and we're here today to thank Mark
9 Squilla for putting this resolution
10 before you and getting the support to
11 bring it to this table.

12 The other Council leaders,
13 Ms. Bass and Councilwoman Katherine
14 Gilmore Richardson and Lozada and
15 Mr. Driscoll and Isaiah Thomas, were key
16 co-sponsors of this bill, so we thank
17 you.

18 But what I want to share with
19 you today is that there's a crisis in the
20 nation of Haiti and it pales in
21 comparison to what we are going through
22 in this nation, and we are really going
23 through some difficult times in this
24 nation.

25 So I want to share that in the

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2 nation of Haiti right now, there are no
3 freedoms. There are no opportunities to
4 walk to the grocery store. There are no
5 opportunities to see their young children
6 go to school. There are no opportunities
7 for them to deal with basic human rights
8 and deal with the basics of life, getting
9 food, shelter and those sorts of things.

10 So I want to thank this Council
11 for considering this resolution, but it
12 is no accident that we're here today,
13 because Reverend Leon Sullivan also
14 started a movement, a national and
15 international movement, dealing with --
16 in the apartheid in South Africa.

17 So Team Haiti today recognizes
18 that this Council has made a historic
19 move and step to start us on this
20 national movement to bring light,
21 visibility, and force to the crisis in
22 Haiti.

23 So I want to thank every
24 Councilmember that votes for this
25 resolution, and I want to thank all of

2 those supporters that are here from Team
3 Haiti that came out today to support this
4 resolution and to thank you personally.
5 But I want to remind you that there are
6 gang rapes every day, there's violence
7 every day, there's mayhem every day,
8 there's kidnappings every day in the
9 nation of Haiti.

10 So I want you to please
11 consider voting for this resolution, and
12 we thank you from the bottom of our
13 hearts that you took it into your hands
14 to make this step today on behalf of
15 standing in solidarity with the nation of
16 Haiti.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

18 REVEREND JONES: So we want to
19 thank you, and we appreciate you, and we
20 want to remind you as you go home
21 tonight, that Haiti is in crisis.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

24 - - -

25 (Applause.)

4 And I would ask the Chief Clerk
5 to please read the name of our next
6 speaker.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Rene Fabinne, commenting on 230506.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. RENE: Good morning. My
11 name is Fabinne Rene. I'm Haitian and
12 member of Team Haiti-USA. I'm here today
13 to support the Bill 230506.

14 Let's start by thanking
15 Reverend Roy L. Jones of Mount Zion
16 congregation for the outstanding work on
17 behalf of Haiti.

18 Reverend Jones, the level of
19 your advocacy elevates Haiti to its
20 rightful place as a nation, the first
21 free state to emerge from slavery. Thank
22 you for dedicating your time to helping
23 shape a prosperous future for our
24 country.

25 Today it is fitting that is in

2 the hall of City Council in Philadelphia,
3 the best place of modern democratic, we
4 address our thoughts on Haiti, a nation
5 in crisis, fighting for its democratic
6 rights to overcome its misfortunes and to
7 succeed.

8 We are sure that you all know
9 what is happening in Haiti. We are
10 witnessing in the 21st century the
11 disintegration of a nation before our
12 eyes, before the eyes of the world. And
13 the big, powerful democratic countries
14 have stood highly and fell for years and
15 months to seriously help solve a problem
16 that the (unintelligible) grossly help to
17 create and to the media as we -- any
18 tragedy that affects Black lives.

19 The people dying in Haiti are
20 (unintelligible) fact of life -- of our
21 lives don't matter. It's baffling that
22 in 21st century people still see orders
23 that way based solely on the color of the
24 skin.

25 People need to know the root of

2 the current crisis in Haiti. You can
3 find the answers in two words: greed and
4 wickedness.

5 In the aftermath of the 2010
6 earthquake, Haiti received billions of
7 dollars in reconstruction funds, more
8 than the billion in low interest loans
9 from the state of Venezuela alone.

10 All these funds were plundered
11 by (unintelligible) leaders in complicity
12 with orders.

13 So we here today to thank the
14 Deputy Whip Squilla and all of City
15 Council for stand up and taking over this
16 resolution.

17 Thank you so much.

18 - - -
19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

22 Mr. Clerk, please read the next
23 name of our speaker.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Brigitte Vonny, commenting on 230506.

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 MS. VONNY: I am Brigitte Vonny
4 from Team Haiti-USA, and organization
5 really want to thank you from the bottom
6 of our heart, Reverend Jones, for helping
7 us shape the prospect of a future for
8 Haiti.

9 We, the people of Haiti, know
10 what kind of country we want. Our people
11 want a country where they can be
12 productive at building -- our people want
13 a country where they can be productive at
14 building good lives for themselves and
15 their family, where they can fulfill
16 their potential as they do elsewhere.
17 Our people can, given the right
18 circumstances.

19 We will always be grateful to
20 you for supporting our people's struggle
21 for freedom and economic justice. We
22 thank each of you, honorable members of
23 the Council, Deputy Whip Mark Squilla,
24 Cindy Bass, Quetcy Lozada, Katherine
25 Richardson, Mike Driscoll, and Isaiah

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2 Thomas, the sponsors of the truth and
3 reconciliation resolution of Haiti that
4 we pray will lead at bringing light and
5 fair solution to the ills of Haiti in an
6 organized, diligent, and coherent manner.

7 Please contact our elected
8 officials as our government to support
9 the will of the Haitian people. Tell our
10 government to sever its ties with these
11 corrupt regimes, destroyers of people's
12 dreams.

13 All Haitians ask -- all they
14 ask for is to live in a democratic,
15 well-governed, corruption-free Haiti.

16 We shouldn't allow the wicked
17 to do as they want. And please there are
18 honest and well-qualified Haitians who
19 can do a great job at building a better
20 future for Haiti.

21 Why would anyone think that
22 hardship, a bad life, is the only fate of
23 the Haitian people what they deserve?
24 Those who steals your people this way are
25 mistaken. We will not -- I'm sorry. We

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2 will work on it until we make Haiti a
3 prosperous state, the state that our
4 founders and those who love progress are
5 proud of. Haitian can do it.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

8 - - -

9 (Applause.)

10 - - -

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And if we
12 can have the Chief Clerk please call the
13 name of the next speaker.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
15 Madam Chair, is Charles Celestine,
16 commenting on 230506.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. CELESTINE: We thank you
19 all for being here today to support the
20 Haitian people in this struggle. It
21 doesn't have to be that way. Haitian do
22 well everywhere we are. Why can't we
23 must do it in Haiti?

24 There is an indication that
25 there's something basically wrong with

2 the way the country is governed, and we
3 want to change that.

4 When we came to Philadelphia,
5 this is the city that inspires. Every
6 time we think about Philadelphia, we got
7 to think about freedom, liberty,
8 democratic right.

9 What happened in Haiti is not
10 by accident. The way we took, we had our
11 independence. Imagine a bunch of police
12 with no (unintelligible) top of the time,
13 not even for five minutes manage to
14 congregate together and organize the
15 rebellion that will bring them to
16 independence, and from there, who were
17 totally isolated, no partners to do
18 business with.

19 But now we are living in
20 different time, and we can change that
21 instead of looking at us like some kind
22 of (intelligible) nation but as partners,
23 and we will do good for America and that
24 will do good for America.

25 Our community of immigrants,

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2 imagine what that do for this country.
3 That mean we are connected with the rest
4 of the world in a very particular way.

5 Thank you very much.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

7 - - -

8 (Applause.)

10 MR. CELESTINE: We want to
11 change things in Haiti.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you
14 for your testimony today.

15 Mr. Clerk, please read the name
16 of our next speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Terrence McAleer, commenting on
19 230415.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MR. McALEER: I asked hopefully
22 that I could get a little extra time to
23 speak on Mr. Driscoll's other bill too,
24 but the thing I'm here to talk about --

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Please

2 state your name for the record and then
3 proceed.

4 MR. McALEER: My name is
5 Terrence McAleer. I'm from the Olney
6 section of Philadelphia.

7 I don't represent any
8 individuals or groups involved in any of
9 this street activity, but my own opinion
10 and observation.

11 I've watched drag racing happen
12 in Philadelphia for years, and they've
13 asked for a place to go and do it safely
14 off the streets. Now they have drifting
15 and other sports of their kind, and they
16 really need to have a place off the
17 streets sponsored by the City to do it
18 safely and structurally proper.

19 It's too far to go to Atco or
20 to Maple Grove for drag racing or those
21 activities, and for the City to provide
22 that here would reduce stress and
23 increase the productivity and decency of
24 our young people of all races.

25 On the second bill regarding

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2 the transportation up the Boulevard,
3 because of all the underground
4 infrastructure, it would be absolutely
5 cost prohibitive to do a subway, but
6 would make sense to do an elevated line
7 all the way up to Bucks County, and you
8 could come up somewhere between 9th
9 Street and C Street on the Boulevard in
10 the middle and be able to go all the way
11 up to the top of the City to give people
12 a proper transportation system to fulfill
13 their needs to be able to go shop and to
14 go to work every day safely.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

17 - - -

18 (Applause.)

19 - - -

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Mr. Clerk,
21 please read the name of our next speaker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Gerald Pierre, commenting on 230506.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. PIERRE: My name is Gerald

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2 Pierre. I'm a member of Team Haiti. I'm
3 here to let you folks know that we thank
4 you, all of you, that passed this
5 resolution.

6 Mine will be short. So, again,
7 thank you. Team Haiti is here. We have,
8 as you know, Brigitte, Fabinne, Charles,
9 Dr. Larose, Mr. Jones, Rev Jones, our
10 reverend, and his wife here. So we thank
11 you in helping Haiti.

12 Right now the country of Haiti
13 is like non-existent on the planet,
14 because gangs are everywhere. You can't
15 go north. You can't go south. You are
16 just stuck in the capital. And daily we
17 have rapes, people being kidnapped for
18 ransom.

19 By the way, when they kidnap
20 somebody, they don't ask for the Haitian
21 money. They ask U.S., and it's \$300,000,
22 \$400,000. Nobody ever make that money in
23 Haiti as working. So Haiti need help.

24 And thank you very much for
25 that resolution.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Chenet Larose, commenting on 230506.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 DR. LAROSE: Good morning,
13 everybody.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
15 morning.

16 DR. LAROSE: It was really a
17 good pleasure for me to be here.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Please
19 state your name for the record and then
20 proceed.

21 MR. LAROSE: There's something
22 about not only Haiti -- I'm sorry. My
23 name is Dr. Chenet Larose and I'm a
24 member of the Haiti-USA team. And I
25 don't know how to express my thought and

2 everything about Philadelphia and Haiti,
3 and I can say that Philadelphia is a
4 good, good place for me and give me a lot
5 of opportunity, and also this is a city
6 of brotherhood, as everybody knows.

7 And so I have to remind
8 everybody that Haiti was the second
9 country in the world after U.S. to fight
10 for liberty and everything around, and we
11 have in a situation that we need USA to
12 help Haiti, and I thank Philadelphia.
13 This is really a good place to be here.

14 And also I have to express my
15 gratitude to Councilwoman Bass. And
16 beside her also I have to say a few thank
17 to, even that she's not really here, a
18 member. This is Council Blackwell and a
19 lot of people too. I have to say too
20 (unintelligible) a street. I have to say
21 that also.

22 So please help Haiti. A
23 religion without you, I don't think Haiti
24 can go any further.

25 Thank you. I appreciate it.

3 Dr. Larose.

4 - - -

6 - - -

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Mr. Clerk,
8 please call the name of our next speaker.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Khalef Alexander.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. ALEXANDER: Good morning.
13 Good afternoon. My name is Khalef
14 Alexander, or some just call me Khalef,
15 the Reparationist, but I am here today to
16 speak on behalf of Councilwoman
17 Gauthier's bill that she introduced in
18 regards to reparations.

19 First, I would like to say that
20 the United States of America, we rebuilt
21 many countries, Japan, Germany. We are
22 giving lots of money to Ukraine right
23 now, and Black Americans who built this
24 country brick by brick, we deserve
25 reparations. It's not a handout. It's

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something that is just due.

When we begin to look at the relationship between Juneteenth, because I haven't heard a mention of Juneteenth this entire time since I've been here today, there's a relationship between Juneteenth and reparations. That relationship is, once you gain your freedom, you are supposed to receive economic justice or, shall I say, 40 acres and a mule.

Juneteenth became a national holiday a few years ago, thanks to the work of the likes of Ron Brown, my mentor, known as Mr. Juneteenth in Philadelphia, and many others. And when we're looking at that relationship, yes, Juneteenth has become a national holiday, and Juneteenth 1865 we were physically freed, but now we're at a point where we have to take the mental shackles off of our people in the City of Philadelphia, and that mental shackle is what we see going on today.

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2 We have a violence crisis, we
3 have a poverty crisis, and we have a
4 genocide crisis. All of these things
5 have been created, in my eyes, by the
6 government. Maybe not you all sitting in
7 these seats, but historically the
8 government has done some very wrongs to
9 Black Americans.

10 So needless to say, reparations
11 is just due. Juneteenth is our
12 independence and our freedom day, and I
13 hope that you all can, you know,
14 acknowledge that a little more as we
15 continue fighting the fight.

16 Lastly, I would like to end on
17 this: A great folk hero once said, kids
18 are losing lives and they got me scared
19 losing mine, and if I hold my tongue
20 about it, I'll get crucified.

21 I wrote this on a bumpy flight
22 on a summer night flying over Chattanooga
23 I heard trying to spread the movement.

24 And the movement is reparations
25 now for Black Americans. The movement is

2 celebrate Juneteenth for Black Americans.
3 And the movement is to have a
4 self-identification to be the best of who
5 you are.

6 Thank you for your time.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you
8 for your testimony.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Mr. Clerk,
13 please read the name of our next speaker.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. LANDES: Good afternoon.

18 My name is Lynn Landes, founder of
19 wildfoodies.org and
20 safestreetsphilly.org.

21 I support Resolutions 210913
22 and 230432. As pesticides continue to be
23 sprayed on City parks in violation of
24 City laws, the good news is that the Wild
25 Foodies of Philly and other groups will

2 not be required to obtain a permit in
3 order to take small tours through
4 City-owned parks. I want to thank my
5 attorney, George Bochetto, for
6 representing me in this manner.

7 The other good news is that so
8 many of our Councilmembers are standing
9 up to the Mayor and declaring that they
10 do not want safe injection sites in their
11 districts, although there are concerns
12 about the effectiveness of zoning
13 restrictions that can be overturned by a
14 Zoning Board appointed by the Mayor who
15 supports safe injection sites.

16 The big question is this: Why
17 are safe injection sites a possibility at
18 all? Taking illegal drugs is still
19 illegal. Safe injection sites clearly
20 aid and abet an illegal activity. So why
21 does City Council have to do anything
22 about this matter at all?

23 The general answer is that our
24 government at every level no longer feels
25 bound by the law. The federal government

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has opened up our nation's borders to illegal entry, which includes drug and human traffickers. Our state government has stood by and let it happen, and our city government has welcomed them in. Plus our city government is allowing rampant violation of our state and local public safety laws, so it is no wonder that chaos is the result.

The needle exchange program, which has dumped millions of needles into our neighborhoods, the lack of effective and mandatory rehabilitation facilities, plus a medical profession and pharmaceutical industry that has helped to create this catastrophe, including the methadone debacle, should all be up for discussion and review under the Sunshine Act.

We need many more hearings to get to the bottom of what's really gone wrong, and I strongly suggest they be in person with a virtual component for the disabled and those who can't attend.

14 had to leave. He had to leave.

15 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
16 other speakers on the public comment
17 list, Madam Chair.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Okay. And
19 that concludes today's public comment.

20 We will now consider today's
21 Resolution Consent Agenda.

22 I will ask the Clerk to read
23 the titles of all of the resolutions on
24 the Consent Agenda. After each title is
25 read, any member may object to the

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

16 (Duly seconded.)

19 All in favor indicate by saying
20 aye.

21 (Aye.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank

20 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: I move

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 All in favor indicate by saying

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it, and that motion is adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
10 honoring and congratulating GQ Aviation
11 on nearly a decade of service as a
12 premier flight school at the Philadelphia
13 Northeast Airport and recognizing its
14 exceptional leadership in promoting
15 diversity in the Northeast Philadelphia
16 community and aviation industry at-large,
17 introduced today by Councilman O'Neill.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill for a
20 motion.

21 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
23 of the resolution.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

3 All in favor indicate by saying

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it, and that resolution is
11 adopted.

12 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
13 other resolutions on the Final Passage
14 Calendar, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you very much. That concludes our
17 Calendar for today.

18 Are there any speeches on
19 behalf of the minority?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Speeches on behalf of the majority?

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Jones.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2 Mr. President.

3 Today, colleagues, I rise to
4 acknowledge a lot of the good work that
5 has been done by this Council. First,
6 you, President Clarke, by insisting that
7 we have a Chief Public Safety Officer for
8 the City of Philadelphia. That was
9 forward thinking and I think will bear
10 fruit towards the ultimate goal of public
11 safety and anti-gun violence, and I'll
12 make my point.

13 Over the weekend -- oh,
14 yesterday, there was an Olney mother shot
15 in the head with her two-year-old child.
16 In addition, same day, there was an Uber
17 driver shot, same day, other shootouts.
18 There were 45 shells at the site of the
19 mother and child caught in the crossfire,
20 45 shells.

21 I want to give you context on
22 what that is. The Saint Valentine's Day
23 massacre in Chicago, which was chronicled
24 in movies, there were 70 shots seven day.
25 That is only a bad weekend in the City of

2 Philadelphia.

3 I would further say that at the
4 shootout at the O.K. Corral, there were
5 40-plus shells accounted for that day,
6 with only three fatalities. That's a bad
7 Saturday at a pop-up shootout at a
8 festival in the City of Philadelphia.

9 But the good news is that I
10 absolutely believe, colleagues, that
11 there is the ingredients to solve gun
12 violence and public safety within the
13 City of Philadelphia currently through
14 programs, through resources that exist.

15 And you may say, Jones, why do
16 you think that? Because there are rays
17 of light all throughout the City. The
18 problem is that when things have been
19 independently uncoordinated, they only
20 make a mess. When they begin to
21 coordinate, they make beautiful music
22 with pianos, they draw Picassos, because
23 the fingers are coordinated.

24 The Chief Public Safety Officer
25 that you insisted upon can be the

2 coordinator/conductor of the beautiful
3 music.

4 There are good things
5 happening. My colleague Councilmember
6 Lozada is, with Councilmember Harrity,
7 Councilmember Squilla, fighting for a
8 real plan for Kensington, not just the
9 excellent articulation of the problem.
10 In the second hearing, she's going to
11 call upon agencies to tell me what you
12 are going to do to solve the problem, not
13 just point it out, but solve it.

14 Kathy Gilmore Richardson, a
15 long time ago, before it was popular,
16 said conflict resolution needed to be in
17 the curriculum of every school so that in
18 the playground, in the sandbox, kids
19 understand you're going to have
20 disagreements. It doesn't have to result
21 in violence.

22 There are -- every day you
23 argue about what the captives in the
24 Kensington have to live with. But the
25 ingredients are that there are schools in

2 11 zip codes in the City of Philadelphia
3 that provide 90 percent of the inmates on
4 State Road. We have to coordinate all
5 these activities.

6 When we knee-jerk things, we
7 closed Saint Gabe's, we closed Glen
8 Mills, but we didn't realize that we
9 would have overcrowding at the Juvenile
10 Justice Center, young people sleeping on
11 the floors of the gymnasium as we speak,
12 creating dangerous situations where
13 corrections officers and social workers
14 are forced to come in between warring
15 youth and getting pummeled and put in the
16 hospital. That spills over to our six
17 facilities on State Road.

18 All of these things
19 independently happening have consequences
20 one to the other. And so we have to
21 create and I'm calling for a citywide,
22 state-affiliated, federally attended
23 crime summit, anti-violence summit, in
24 the City of Philadelphia over the course
25 of the summer. Why? Because the 100th

2 Mayor is going to have to come up with a
3 game plan, not just excellent
4 articulation of the problems, as one
5 member that we know often says, but we
6 got to come up with a plan, and the
7 members in this body have to help them.
8 And I believe that we've begun that
9 process, sir, but I think we need -- the
10 job is still yet to be done.

11 And so as we start to take
12 SEPTA, as we start to take School
13 District and to begin to pull everybody
14 in the room and not point at the problem
15 but point towards solutions, I think we
16 have the ability to orchestrate the
17 solutions to some of this stuff. It is
18 not beyond our grips.

19 We have Estelle Richman who is
20 working with the private sector. They
21 understand finally that this is not just
22 a "them" problem. It's a "all of our"
23 problem.

24 On the news they talked about
25 San Francisco. They're closing major

2 malls in urban areas because we don't
3 have our stuff together to be able to
4 stop theft, people just coming in and
5 randomly sacking stores. They're saying,
6 we're out of here. We'd rather go up
7 to -- we were talking about it -- King of
8 Prussia.

9 You know, when my kids go out,
10 they say, yeah, we're going to dinner.

11 I said, well, yeah, we can go
12 to McCormick and Schmick's right down
13 here.

14 No. I'm going to take that
15 40-minute ride up to where they believe
16 it is safe.

17 So the private sector, Estelle
18 Richman, Comcast and others, are putting
19 together a game plan. If we coordinate
20 these things, Mr. President, colleagues,
21 I think we have the solutions. Vanessa
22 Harley has done good work, but we had to
23 add that to the tools on the tool belt.

24 I challenge us over the summer
25 to come up with a summit to talk about

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anti-gun violence and crime prevention strategies for the City of Philadelphia, because until we do that, moving a stadium on Market Street, you got a lot of work to do before that. You have 200 kids that have 200 parents that have been on -- my colleague Cindy Bass talks about, and I applaud her and I plagiarize it to a degree, what do you do when you realize that the shooter lives with you. Well, you create solutions, like Toss a Mattress Friday. And we got to really have uncomfortable conversations. It's about what's really going on in our respective neighborhoods and be able to cowboy up to the plate to help the next Mayor to help come up with solutions that are plausible.

We throw money at it, and it's right to add resources, but resources without accountability, if it ain't measured, it ain't managed. And we're going to do some things differently.

We had -- and I'm going to

2 close on this. I had the children of the
3 Muslim community for Muslim Day come down
4 here, and they loved the ceilings and
5 they sat in your seats, spun around, some
6 of them, way too more comfortable than
7 they should, but when they got done and
8 they had a press conference, they looked
9 at me and respect of you and said, what
10 are you going to do different? Because
11 we still dying.

12 And so the answer to that has
13 to be some concerted thinking,
14 cooperative planning, breaking down
15 silos. You took us to Camden, to
16 Chester, to Trenton, and what we saw that
17 was different was that the stakeholders
18 could be in a room, breathe the same air,
19 and work towards solutions, with a lot
20 less resources than we had.

21 And so I challenge all of us --
22 this ain't political. This is for the
23 future of our city -- to work together to
24 come up with that crime summit, to get
25 the right stakeholders in the room with

2 the right solutions so that we empower
3 the next Mayor to be able to solve this
4 damn problem.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. I'm sure we will
8 accept that challenge and move forward.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
12 Council President.

13 Just a few brief announcements
14 but also want to acknowledge a resolution
15 that was passed early on that I paid
16 attention to but didn't get a chance to
17 comment on, because we're dealing with
18 the same issue in the Second Councilmanic
19 District, and that's Councilman
20 Driscoll's bill around addressing drag
21 racing. And for me in the Second
22 Councilmanic District, particularly
23 around Essington Avenue, particularly
24 around Pattison Avenue where the stadiums
25 are, we've been dealing with this issue

2 of drag racing for several years, right?
3 We had a couple fatalities before in the
4 past.

5 And so I do applaud your
6 efforts in making sure we highlight that
7 issue, but also taking an aggressive
8 stance and approach when individuals are
9 engaging in those type of activities,
10 that not only that they can actually get
11 fined but can also actually lose their
12 vehicle.

13 And so I thank you for stepping
14 up to the plate and addressing that
15 issue, because it's definitely -- it's a
16 quality of life issue, but it's also a
17 matter of life and death from a public
18 safety standpoint.

19 And I also just want to
20 acknowledge the work of the young
21 Councilman Phillips from the Mighty
22 Northwest who decided to take on an issue
23 that's very, very -- it can be viewed as
24 controversial, right, but nevertheless as
25 members of this body as leaders in the

2 City, right, sometimes we have to take
3 positions that are unpopular to kind of
4 reclaim a level of lawlessness, a level
5 of, I would like to call it, what should
6 be expected in terms of how we support
7 our young people, right?

8 And so when you talk about
9 people walking down the street, you could
10 do as you please, but if you all walking
11 down the street in 90-degree weather,
12 right, with a mask over your face,
13 right -- and I'm a different type of
14 elected official, where I come from the
15 streets. I keep my ear to the streets.
16 And I've been told several different
17 times, Councilman, the reason why
18 homicide having a problem solving these
19 homicides that are taking place, the
20 mask.

21 And so, you know, although it's
22 not a be-all, end-all solution, but also
23 when it comes to public properties that
24 we control, it goes to at least setting a
25 tone. And if not, at least sending a

2 message, right, of -- because saying that
3 Councilman Jones has said that Cindy
4 always says, every young person got a
5 key, goes to somebody's home, right? So
6 we want to try to figure out ways to be
7 supportive overall.

8 I was watching how in the Third
9 Councilmanic District this weekend there
10 were like a hundred kids at 46th and
11 Market, and I called Jamie like, yo, like
12 they cutting up. And it's never to
13 criminalize them. It's never to demonize
14 them, because, again, I come from that
15 environment. Everybody knows I got my
16 first gun charge at the age of 16. I've
17 been down Juvy Hall as a young kid. So
18 you're not talking to an elected official
19 who hasn't walked the walk and talked the
20 talk. And it took somebody to see some
21 things in myself that I didn't see as a
22 young man to kind of help me become the
23 person who I am today, but I also was
24 held accountable for my actions, right?
25 And my mom also -- we don't come from a

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2 pristine environment, but my mom also
3 made sure that at the end of the day, she
4 wanted to know who I was hanging out with
5 when I came home, don't come in this
6 house with something I ain't give you,
7 right?

8 And so, you know, we got to
9 support our young people, support our
10 families, right, but also hold ourselves
11 as a people to a level of not being
12 enablers but a different level of
13 expectation, these steps where I come
14 from, and we can address it
15 comprehensively when it comes to the
16 issue of public safety.

17 And so those two things, they
18 kind of stuck out to me in terms of
19 public policy and things that we're
20 working on.

21 But I'm just going to, on a
22 lighter note, mention a couple events
23 that's coming up that I wanted to
24 reiterate for people.

25 So on this Wednesday, June

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the 21st at the Marriott Courtyard at the Navy Yard, we'll be having a Doing Business with the City Workshop and Forum. We'll be partnering with SEPTA, Rebuild, the Navy Yard, which has a ten-year master plan of development that's going to be taking place. The Philadelphia International Airport, the Port of Philadelphia, and the Philadelphia School District will have presentations on how to do business with the City of Philadelphia.

I'm a strong advocate that if we're going to move the City of Philadelphia forward, everybody has to have a seat at the table. We're the number one big city when it comes to poverty. We carry that title, but nevertheless, though, we're not aggressively making sure we're putting people at the table who wouldn't necessarily always have an opportunity to get the great financial and economic resources and support that are available

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2 if we're not aggressively and being
3 intentional about making sure people are
4 at the table, and I still believe that
5 we'll continuously carry that title, and
6 we all don't want be the direct link
7 between poverty and the crime and gun
8 violence that we have seen.

9 Councilwoman Gauthier did a
10 study in the past that shows the highest
11 zip codes where we see crime are zip
12 codes where we see poverty. And so
13 there's a direct correlation.

14 So to everyone that's
15 listening, again, that's going to be next
16 Wednesday, June the 21st at the
17 Philadelphia Navy Yard at 10:30 a.m.
18 we're going to have a Doing Business with
19 the City of Philadelphia Workshop and
20 Forum, and we want as many people as
21 possible to come out and to participate.

22 Also, on Friday, June the 30th,
23 save the date. We will be having a
24 street renaming for a gentleman by the
25 name of Kevin Parker. He used to own a

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restaurant called Ms. Tootsie's. I'm quite sure everybody had a chance to eat some of his catering but, most importantly, visit his establishment. And so I want you to save that date. Come out if you can as we honor the life and legacy of a person who meant a whole lot to individuals here in the City of Philadelphia.

And last, but not least, since I've been asked several times about an event that I had to cancel, we will be having a Point Breeze Night Market on Thursday, July the 6th on Point Breeze Avenue from 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Now, welcome everyone to come on out, participate, get some good food, and have some vegan food trucks for all those that may not eat meat, but you can also come get some ribs as well.

So as we wrap up, I want to thank my colleagues for these flowers as the men in City Council celebrate Father's Day weekend. So we want to

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2 thank you. We appreciate the flowers and
3 the love. To all the fellas, I hope
4 y'all kick y'all feet up this weekend and
5 chill -- he said no. I am -- and relax.
6 But to all the fathers in here, Happy
7 Father's Day. Enjoy this week, and I'm a
8 strong advocate about fatherhood and,
9 most importantly, the role that it plays
10 in our society looking out for our little
11 ones and our family. So Happy Father's
12 Day, everyone. Take care.

13 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
14 Councilmember.

15 Councilmember Phillips.

16 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
17 you, Councilman Squilla.

18 I just wanted to simply
19 acknowledge the young woman and the
20 two-year-old in Olney that Councilman
21 Curtis Jones mentioned. To me it's very
22 disheartening to see this happen in our
23 city, and I just want everyone to keep
24 them in your prayers. I'm going to be
25 continuing to work closely with our

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2 police captain in our district to kind of
3 see what we can do to support that family
4 going forward.

5 I, additionally to that, I just
6 wanted to acknowledge and thank
7 Councilman Mike Driscoll for all of his
8 leadership with the I-95 circumstance
9 that's taking place in the Northeast
10 section of Philadelphia, and I just
11 wanted to say thank you, Councilman
12 Driscoll, for all that you're doing.
13 Thank you.

14 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.
15 Councilmember Driscoll.

16 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Well,
17 thank you, colleagues, for the support
18 you've provided me this past week.
19 You've all reached out to me, and
20 "whatever you need," that's what I've
21 heard from every one of you, and I'm
22 truly grateful.

23 At 6:17 on Sunday morning, 6:17
24 a.m., I was awoken to an explosion, which
25 later turned out to be a vehicle carrying

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2 85, 100 gallons of fuel, couldn't
3 navigate the exit ramp and flipped on its
4 side and exploded, and the heat, as you
5 know, has crippled I-95.

6 But what I witnessed when I got
7 on the scene that day was not only a
8 tragedy but was people coming together.
9 Managing Director Tumar Alexander was
10 already there. We had all the first
11 responders, the fire marshal, you name
12 it, working collaboratively together.

13 That very day Mayor Kenney
14 came, Governor Shapiro came to the site.
15 Senator Casey arrived the next day. U.S.
16 Congressman Brendan Boyle came to the
17 site. U.S. Secretary Pete Buttigieg came
18 to the site, and Pennsylvania Secretary
19 Mike Carroll came to the site, and all of
20 them pledged the full resources of the
21 City government, of the state government,
22 and of the federal government to get that
23 critical artery back up and running,
24 because all the commerce, 55 percent of
25 the gross national product uses I-95. So

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2 we know for the supply chain for the
3 small businesses, for the betterment of
4 commerce in America, that we have to get
5 that highway up and running, and it was
6 heartwarming to see all levels of
7 government working together.

8 And I just wanted to publicly
9 acknowledge that today, because we're
10 going to get that done in record time.
11 We have the building trades on site. We
12 have tremendous contractors. We have the
13 will of the Secretary of Transportation.

14 And so my heartfelt thank you
15 to all of you that supported me through
16 these critical last four days.

17 And, Mr. President, I just want
18 to comment on another matter. This
19 Friday took another step towards cracking
20 down on quality of life issues, including
21 fighting boom parties and reckless
22 drifting. We passed two critical
23 resolutions, one establishing a task
24 force to look at existing code and
25 departmental practices related to the

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2 construction industry and getting
3 business done. The task force will
4 produce a report for the next Mayor and
5 City Council with actionable steps to
6 revise the related code and how it is
7 administered.

8 The second resolution
9 authorizes a hearing to examine the
10 impacts of funding opportunities to bring
11 rapid transit to the Northeast. We must
12 pursue all options to uplift over 500,000
13 of some of our city's most diverse
14 communities that reside along that
15 corridor.

16 The excitement around this
17 announcement has been overwhelming, and
18 the opportunities this project presents
19 are huge.

20 Lastly, Mr. President, this
21 body has decided to honor one of our
22 city's great leaders, former Congressman
23 Bob Borski. We not only honored his
24 immense legacy, but we have continued his
25 fight to help everyday Philadelphians.

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2 So thank you to all my
3 colleagues and to you, Mr. President, for
4 taking true action to help our city. I
5 believe with all my heart our best days
6 are yet to come, that the future for the
7 City of Philadelphia is bright.

8 And I would like to wish all
9 the fathers a warm Happy Father's Day.

10 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
11 Councilmember, and thank you for your
12 continued efforts on something that has
13 touched everybody, especially with the
14 I-95 challenge.

15 Councilmember Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.
17 Mr. Chairman, just briefly, I want to
18 acknowledge that we will be on Sunday
19 having our Juneteenth Parade, which
20 starts off in the Fourth District, ends
21 up in the Third District at 12:00 noon
22 starting at 52nd and Parkside.

23 I think this might be our
24 seventh Juneteenth Parade. It moved from
25 Center City to West Philly to accommodate

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2 longer floats and participation, and I'm
3 excited about the fact that it
4 acknowledges the struggles of
5 emancipation for freed slaves in America,
6 but it is truly appropriate that my
7 colleague Jamie Gauthier introduced a
8 reparations piece to kind of be a
9 companion to the celebration but to the
10 realization that that whole process had a
11 negative impact and that there's some
12 people still suffering that need help.

13 So everybody is welcome to come
14 out. It is a festive activity. I used
15 to walk it. I will ride a float this
16 year, Mr. Chairman, and look forward to
17 seeing everybody out there.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
20 Councilmember.

21 Councilmember Vaughn.

22 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank
23 you.

24 On the topic of the shooting
25 yesterday in Olney, I sat in my living

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2 room and heard the gunfire, and I said to
3 my son, who I was talking on the
4 telephone with at the time, I hear
5 gunfire. Of course my phone started
6 blowing up, because not only do I live in
7 Olney close to that area, I'm the ward
8 leader in that area. And a couple of us
9 went out to see what was going on after
10 the fact, and it just was really sad to
11 find out that a young child got shot in
12 both legs as a result of the recklessness
13 that our city continues to endure from
14 the youth that seem to be losing their
15 minds.

16 I also want to mention this
17 Saturday I hope all of my colleagues will
18 join us, myself and Councilman Curtis
19 Jones, for a special street renaming
20 ceremony to honor the late Barbara
21 Daniel-Cox. The street naming will be
22 held at North 41st Street between
23 Parkside and South Concourse Drive. It
24 will be now called the Barbara Daniel-Cox
25 Way.

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Barbara Daniel-Cox is the founder of the Black Family Reunion, and she used to celebrate Black history here in Philadelphia every year in the park with stilt walkers and dancers and drummers and the beautiful costumes, and she was a force to be reckoned with when it came time to discuss Black history. She made sure if you were ever in her presence or in her company that she shared something with you about the heritage of Africans. And most important, she not only talked the talk, she walked it, and she dressed that way continuously in her life.

So please come out and be a part of this big celebration with us this Saturday between 10:00 and 11:00 a.m.

21 really shocking to see. But I saw you
22 there and had a lot of confidence that I
23 knew things were going to be done and
24 they were going to be done right, and I
25 want to thank all the players who showed

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2 up.

3 I was really heartened to hear
4 Governor Shapiro's words yesterday and,
5 you know, everybody stepping up to the
6 plate. And whatever we as an entire city
7 can do to help get 95 back on track and
8 just to stop the disruption, we're all
9 here for you for that. And also
10 condolences to the driver of the truck
11 who we lost on that day, to his family.

12 And that being said,
13 Mr. Chairman, I move that Council stand
14 adjourned until Thursday, June 22nd, 2023
15 at 10:00 a.m.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: It's been
18 moved and properly seconded that Council
19 stand adjourned until Thursday,
