15 Council President and
16 colleagues, today I'm introducing a
17 legislative package to create the Office
18 of Victim Advocate. I want to thank all
19 of the victims who have lost loved ones
20 to gun violence and those who are
21 victims, co-victims, and survivors of gun
22 violence for attending the press
23 conference which we held yesterday
24 regarding the rollout of the legislation.

25 I want to also take a moment

2 and thank my colleague Councilwoman
3 Katherine Gilmore Richardson and Kendra
4 Brooks for also attending the press
5 conference but also, most importantly,
6 being supportive of this effort from day
7 one.

8 The new Philadelphia Victim
9 Advocate Office would serve as a hub for
10 crime victims, survivors, and others
11 affected by crime in general. The office
12 functions would include coordination,
13 planning, and oversight. And I'm calling
14 for the creation of this new office
15 within the City of Philadelphia to work
16 on systemwide issues affecting victims
17 and co-victims, but I have a special
18 interest in those who are victims and
19 survivors of gun violence.

20 The advocates have told me that
21 the fragmented nation of victim services
22 leads to a lack of consistency and timing
23 of outreach service and services
24 provided. The new Office of Victim
25 Advocate is long overdue here in the City

2 of Philadelphia. The creation of this
3 new office was among the recommendations
4 I heard from Philadelphians during a
5 recent hearing on the City Council's
6 Special Committee on Gun Violence,
7 specifically the Subcommittee on Victims
8 and Co-Victims of Gun Violence, in which
9 I chair, along with my colleague
10 Councilman Curtis Jones.

11 The Council hearings provided
12 an overview of the impact on gun violence
13 on survivors, but also provided them an
14 opportunity to voice their issues and
15 concerns. The hearings also examined
16 what anti-violence programs that we are
17 working on, those that work and those
18 that need improvement.

19 To date, we have seen 64 people
20 who have been victims of homicide here in
21 the City of Philadelphia, a 25 percent
22 increase compared to the same time in
23 2019, and that's according to statistics
24 provided by the Philadelphia Police
25 Department. In 2019, Philadelphia

2 recorded 356 homicides. That total
3 marked the highest homicide count in over
4 a decade.

5 So as we start this budget
6 process, I've always been a consistent
7 voice when it comes to advocating as it
8 relates to supporting our anti-violence
9 efforts here in the City of Philadelphia,
10 but I want to specifically make sure that
11 that mother who lost a son or daughter to
12 gun violence, that father who lost a son
13 or daughter to gun violence, that they
14 are at the table when we talk about
15 policy, that they're at the table when
16 we're talking about resources, that
17 they're at the table when we talk about
18 our comprehensive plan when it comes to
19 fighting the issue of gun violence here
20 in the City of Philadelphia.

21 Thank you very much, Council
22 President, and I want to personally thank
23 you for your support from day one in the
24 creation of the Special Committee on Gun
25 Violence and allowing me through this

3 one, and most importantly, will allow
4 those who are victims, co-victims,

6 it relates to the issue of crime and

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
12 that will also be on today's Calendar.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Oh.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
16 much. I offer no bills or resolutions.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 That concludes our introduction
20 of bills and resolutions.

21 And our next order of business
22 is reports from committee, and the Chair
23 recognizes Councilman Henon for a report
24 from the Committee on Public Property and
25 Public Works.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - REPORTS

2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. The Committee on Public
4 Property and Public Works reports one
5 bill with a favorable recommendation.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Mr. Decker, please read that
9 report.

10 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
11 and members of the Council of the City of
12 Philadelphia, the Committee on Public
13 Property and Public Works, to which was
14 referred Bill No. 200010, entitled "An

16 Department, on behalf of the City of
17 Philadelphia, to enter into one or more
18 agreements with a vendor or vendors for
19 the purchase and servicing of online
20 legal research services, investigative
21 tools, and related goods and services,"
22 respectfully reports it has considered
23 the same and returns the attached bill to
24 Council with a favorable recommendation.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/5/20 - STATED - REPORTS

2 Thank you.

3 The Chair again recognizes
4 Councilman Henon.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I move that the rules of
7 Council be suspended as to permit the
8 first reading of this day Bill No.
9 200010.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you. It has been moved and
13 properly seconded that the rules of
14 Council be suspended so as to permit
15 first reading this day of Bill No.
16 200010.

17 All those in favor say aye.
18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and this bill will be
24 placed on our First Reading Calendar
25 today.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING

2 That concludes our reports from
3 committee, and our next order of business
4 is consideration of the Calendar.

5 I note that the bill just
6 reported from committee with a suspension
7 of the rules has been deemed to have had
8 its first reading today. This bill will
9 be placed on our Second Reading and Final
10 Passage Calendar at our next session of
11 Council.

12 There are apparently no
13 additional bills on the First Reading
14 Calendar, so the Chair recognizes
15 Councilwoman Parker for the purpose of
16 calling up resolutions and bills on the
17 Second Reading and Final Passage
18 Calendar.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. The following
21 resolutions and bills are being called up
22 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
23 Calendars today. They are Nos. 200040,
24 200195, 200006-A, 200007, 200013, 200019,
25 200004, 200020, 200021, 200023, 200024,

2 200087, 200091, 200092, 200120, and
3 200090. All other resolutions and bills
4 are being held.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 Before we move on passage of
8 all bills and resolutions on the Final
9 Passage Calendar today, we will have our
10 public comment session. It will go as
11 follows:

12 When your name is called, you
13 will go to the middle of the Council
14 Chambers. There's a podium, and on that
15 podium, there is a device. When the
16 light turns green on that device, you
17 will start your public comment. When the
18 light turns yellow, you will have 30
19 seconds to conclude your remarks. When
20 the light turns red, we'd ask that you
21 please adhere to our guidelines and
22 conclude your remarks.

23 Your comment must be on a bill
24 or resolution that is on the Final
25 Passage Calendar today. We want to thank

2 you very much for your anticipated
3 cooperation.

4 Mr. Decker, please call the
5 first name on the list.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Mark Snyderman.

7 (No response.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Mark Snyderman.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MR. SNYDERMAN: Good morning.
13 My name is Mark Snyderman. I want to
14 thank City Council and everybody here for
15 letting me speak. I am a 58-year-old
16 drug addict in recovery. I had something
17 planned to say, but I want to let my
18 higher power in God take over at this
19 time.

20 Things have changed since I
21 started doing drugs in 1979. Younger
22 people -- I am in recovery. I'm in a
23 12-step program. Younger people come
24 into the 12-step program and they come in
25 and out, and the reason why they're

2 homeless is because their families kicked
3 them out because they're using drugs.

4 I've hurt a lot of people in my
5 life. I've hurt God mostly, my parents,
6 and the people that love me the most.

7 I suffer from the disease of
8 addiction. It is a disease, according to
9 the Council -- I'm sorry; the CDC. I'm
10 in therapy. I also go to meetings. And
11 my suggestion is that we have
12 communication between drug addicts and
13 their families to get them off the
14 street.

15 One thing is for sure,
16 everybody is going to go home tonight and
17 another drug addict will die on the
18 streets of Philadelphia tonight because
19 they don't have the resources that we
20 need to get them clean.

21 Safe drug houses do not work.
22 They started in the '50s and '60s in
23 Haight-Ashbury in California, and they
24 don't work. A drug addict uses because
25 he wants to use, simple as that. I have

2 triggers that I have to deal with every
3 night, drug dreams that I have to deal
4 with every night 2, 3, 4 o'clock in the
5 morning. The only person I can go to is
6 God.

7 I want to thank City Council
8 again. Please vote on no safe drug
9 houses. I hope my message doesn't fall
10 on deaf ears. Something needs to be done
11 to address this problem.

12 And I want to thank City
13 Council. Thank you. God bless.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Councilwoman, let me recognize you.
17 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

18 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. For clarification, I
20 just wanted to note that Bill and
21 Resolutions No. 200040, 200006-A, and
22 200007 will be placed on the Suspension
23 Calendar today, per my testimony at the
24 Veterans Advisory Commission meeting on
25 the record yesterday, and I wanted to

2 clarify that for all of the veterans who
3 are here to provide testimony on those
4 pieces of legislation.

5 Thank you so much.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,
7 Councilwoman, you may want to reference,
8 Councilwoman, for those of us here who
9 don't know what those bill numbers mean,
10 can you recognize the subject matter.

11 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Yes.
12 So the bills are related to providing a
13 preference for career and technical
14 education programming school graduates in
15 the City of Philadelphia. They will be
16 placed on the Suspension Calendar today.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20 Mr. Decker, call the next name.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Lorin Williams,
22 commenting on 200040.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning.

25 My name is Lorin Williams. I am also the

2 First District Commander of Philadelphia,
3 and my reasons here come because I hear
4 complaints about they're taking the
5 veterans preference, which is not right.
6 It should be if you're doing things for
7 the kids for trade school, then that's
8 all it should mention in your bill, not
9 veterans preference, not anything about
10 the police, the firemen, anything. It
11 should be for those kids for that trade
12 school. It should be in there that they
13 should maintain a certain grade level,
14 attendance level in order to get that.

15 Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Tyrone Love.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
20 200040.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. LOVE: Good morning,
23 Mr. President, Council --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. LOVE: -- City of
3 Philadelphia, City Council, also the
4 citizens of Philadelphia. The reason
5 that I'm here -- my name is Tyrone A.
6 Love. I am the Commander of Veterans of
7 Foreign Wars Post 3090 that's located at
8 5212 Race Street in the West Philadelphia
9 area, past Commander of American Legion
10 Post No. 682, which is located in the
11 Mount Airy area. I am also the Director
12 of Veterans Affairs for the State of
13 Pennsylvania for the Most Worshipful
14 Prince Hall Grand Lodge. The reason for
15 my being here is in reference to the
16 veterans preference.

17 It's not that we're against the
18 veterans preference and/or the amendment
19 of veterans preference and/or preference
20 for the children, but what we ask for and
21 what's told to me and/or what I've heard,
22 that you have suspended it until further
23 clarification; is that correct?

24 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Yes.

25 MR. LOVE: So with that, I

2 applaud you for doing so. When we do
3 have a chance, I would love to have a
4 sit-down with you whenever you're
5 available.

6 We as veterans, we all know --
7 can I have a show of hands how many
8 veterans we have here in City Council,
9 City Council only.

10 Okay. So that being said, that
11 being said, we are the reason that
12 everyone that's in here have the right to
13 be here, we as veterans. All I ask is
14 don't forget us, because we haven't
15 forgot you, because many of us have taken
16 an oath to give with a blank check to
17 this country. So don't take what was
18 given to us many years ago.

19 Now, if you want to do anything
20 for veterans and/or the children that
21 come out of schools, what I ask you to
22 do, how about you add to and not take
23 away.

24 Have a good day.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Frank Criniti,
5 commenting on 200195.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. CRINITI: President Clarke,
8 thank you for having me here today. City
9 Council, thank you for having me here
10 today. I'm here for 200195 resolution in
11 speaking on behalf of South Philadelphia
12 and all residents of Philadelphia here
13 and throughout the country maybe.

14 We do not want the safe site
15 anywhere in the country. Not to say that
16 you're not able to help an addict. You
17 can help an addict, but you're not
18 helping them giving them money or giving
19 them any more heroin in any of these
20 facilities.

21 I'd like to ask everyone here,
22 I assume that everybody here lives in
23 Philadelphia or close by. Raise your
24 hand if you never got notified for this
25 site that it was supposed to be seen.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Mayor Jim Kenney says he never had a
3 meeting with the Board of Directors here,
4 had no knowledge of this. How could that
5 be?

6 Raise your hand if you did not
7 get notified, everybody in the room.
8 Anybody in the room, raise your hand if
9 you did not get notified in regards to
10 the safe site in South Philadelphia or
11 Philadelphia.

12 I'm sure a lot of City
13 Councilmen didn't get notified. I know
14 that for a fact. And I hope this
15 resolution gets passed to have no safe
16 sites and be notified. Every citizen in
17 Philadelphia, every City Council, the
18 ones that are on board for no safe site
19 here, the other ones should get on board,
20 because I don't feel it's right that City
21 Council does not get notified and the
22 people that live in these neighborhoods
23 throughout the City of Philadelphia or
24 throughout Pennsylvania.

25 President Clarke, thank you

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 again. I appreciate you. I'm all for
3 this resolution for no safe site in
4 Philadelphia or throughout the whole
5 country. That's me, and it's a lot of
6 veterans that -- I'm also a veteran.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. CRINITI: I'm a veteran. A
9 lot of veterans, I go to veterans
10 hospital every month, and a lot of
11 veterans are against any of this.

12 And let me say one more thing,
13 President Clarke. An addict -- and I've
14 been in Philadelphia since 1958. An
15 addict -- and I know quite a few of them
16 out there, helped a couple of them. You
17 don't help them by giving them a ten
18 dollar bill. You don't help them by
19 giving them money for dope. Heroin --
20 when they turn around and bring that site
21 in there, the heroin addict goes in there
22 with a bag, maybe two bags. They don't
23 even know what the quality of that heroin
24 is, how strong it is. They might take an
25 overdose right there in the site. That's

2 100 percent. I can guarantee you that if
3 they don't know -- that nurse in the safe
4 site don't know the quality of that
5 heroin, unless they have a scientist or a
6 chemist in there.

7 Thank you very much. I
8 appreciate you all for just speaking to
9 you's.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Shannon Farrell,
14 commenting on 200195.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MS. FARRELL: Good morning. My
19 name is Shannon Farrell. I'm here today
20 to talk about the resolution about what
21 happened in Philadelphia, not just this
22 past week but last year as well.

23 This is the second time that
24 Safe House has attempted to put a safe
25 injection site in the City of

2 Philadelphia. The first time happened in
3 Kensington last year. Not many people
4 cared. Last week they tried it in South
5 Philly.

6 I'm the President of an RCO.
7 There's a process in the neighborhood
8 when you want to put a deck on your house
9 or you want to put a bakery in my
10 neighborhood. You have to go through the
11 process and come in front of the
12 community. I don't know why you think
13 this is so special that they don't have
14 to do that. They didn't even bother to
15 try and engage the community.

16 It's unfair to not let us have
17 a say and you's decide for us. This is a
18 democracy, not a dictatorship. And that
19 didn't happen, again, for the second
20 time. And I will note that last year
21 when they tried this in my community,
22 there was only two Councilmembers that
23 were enraged by that, and that was
24 Councilwoman Sanchez and Councilman Mark
25 Squilla. So you's are already behind.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 This is twice they've done this. They
3 have proven they do not care or respect
4 our opinion.

5 Coming in and engaging the
6 community doesn't mean you have to come
7 and get community support all the time,
8 but you have to come in and acknowledge
9 that they're there, and we've been there
10 much longer than the problem has been.

11 This has to change. This is
12 unfair to everybody. You made a decision
13 to support something. So if you did so,
14 then why didn't you come to the
15 community? If you're supporting
16 something you don't think they will,
17 well, then that's something maybe you
18 should rethink.

19 I have lived in a safe
20 injection site. They shoot up on our
21 streets. They leave their needles on the
22 ground. That already happens. Violent
23 drug dealers, they shoot the kids that
24 live in my neighborhood.

25 Five hundred people were there

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2 three years ago. I started meeting with
3 the Managing Director's Office three
4 years ago, and there's still 500 people
5 on the street. So maybe you should start
6 looking at what you don't do, which is
7 get your services straightened out. Lift
8 the smoking ban. How about provide beds?

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. FARRELL: How about Liz
11 Hersh saying \$31 million would eradicate
12 homelessness? Is that part of this
13 budget today? Because I'd like to see
14 that.

15 I really think that you showed
16 disrespect to everybody. For three years
17 I've worked with you. You did it last
18 year. You did it again. So I don't
19 know. I don't know what's going to
20 change. I feel like you's know that this
21 is not going to be popular, so you're
22 just going to force it down somebody's
23 throat or it's not going to happen at
24 all, and that's your own fault.

25 There's two things I took away

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 from my trip in Toronto. One, the
3 government ran over those prevention
4 sites and took responsibility for it
5 where we could hold them accountable. In
6 our neighborhoods we can't hold people
7 who are private non-profits accountable
8 for anything. They don't answer to us.
9 You do.

10 And the second thing was, they
11 had gun control. So go back and revisit
12 while you're exactly going to support
13 this since you don't think you're going
14 to get community support. There's a
15 problem with that.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

21 (No response.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Maureen

23 Fratantoni.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. FRATANTONI: Good morning.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Fratantoni, Maureen Fratantoni.

3 I'm here from the community of
4 South Philadelphia. I lived here my
5 whole life, 59 years, and may I say I
6 have never seen anything like this. We
7 were, as one girl said, blind-sided. I
8 did not get notice of the meetings or I
9 did not get notice of this safe injection
10 site. And when they told me about it, I
11 was like I couldn't believe it. Neither
12 could my son, who is special needs, who
13 attends South Philadelphia High. He
14 thinks this idea is ludicrous, and I do
15 too.

16 I'm for the Resolution 200195.
17 There has to be transparency within our
18 communities and our government. So we
19 need for you to let us know when these
20 things are going to take place so that we
21 can be there and give our input.

22 Some of the stakeholders, the
23 schools, the principals did not even know
24 about this, and I was floored when I
25 heard that. So no one knew about it in

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 my community. I live on 11th Street.

3 The other thing I want to say
4 is about the illegal drugs. If you're
5 bringing illegal drugs, that is against
6 the law, and so I cannot see this. My
7 son cannot see this. My son -- they have
8 a methadone clinic near the school and
9 you see a lot of people hanging around
10 there outside.

11 I'm all for recovery. Okay?
12 Make clinics where they can recover and
13 not be a euthanasia clinic. Clinics for
14 recovery to make them clean, not to have
15 them kill themselves in the process.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Susan Lindsay,
21 commenting on 200195.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. LINDSAY: Good morning,
24 President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

1 3/5/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 morning.

3 MS. LINDSAY: I'm really upset
4 about how this all went down with no one,
5 no one being told about these injection
6 sites. Injection sites are not a good
7 idea. Funding for treatment centers,
8 rehab centers, mental health facilities,
9 that's what's going to get addicts help,
10 not injection sites.

11 By opening injection sites,
12 you're facing more drug addicts in the
13 area, more drug dealers in the area, and
14 more crime. So safe injection sites are
15 not the answer. The funding has to go
16 towards these facilities. Put the
17 funding there. Stop trying to make money
18 on drug addiction. Help them. The
19 streets are crawling with addicts.

20 Right where they wanted to open
21 it at Broad and McKean, we have two
22 methadone clinics. They get their
23 methadone. They wait until the high
24 wears -- and then they go get high, and
25 you're allowing people to help them get

2 high. They're supplying the bowls to
3 burn for the heroin needles.

4 My son-in-law, who passed away
5 three years ago, had insulin-dependent
6 diabetes. He had to jump through hoops
7 to get his insulin needles. He took two
8 different kinds of insulin. The prices
9 are skyrocketing. It's totally
10 ridiculous that they can get these
11 supplies for free and my son-in-law
12 passed away. Like what sense does that
13 make? I just don't understand what this
14 city wants to do, but then to do it
15 underhandedly makes things a hundred
16 times worse.

17 Not one person in Philadelphia
18 knew about this. Mayor Kenney stated
19 that he was unaware of it. He sits on
20 the Council -- I mean, he sits on the
21 Board of Safe Home, so how didn't he know
22 about it? That's a downright lie. Is
23 this what it's coming to now? Our
24 politicians are going to start lying and
25 sneaking around?

1 3/5/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 There will not be a safe
3 injection site in the City of
4 Philadelphia, because we will fight until
5 the death.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. LINDSAY: Thank you for
8 your time.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
12 other speakers on the public comment
13 list, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much for your testimony.

16 That concludes our public
17 comment session. We will now move to our
18 Calendar.

19 Mr. Decker, please read the
20 title of 200040.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

3 implementation of supervised heroin
4 injection sites and urging the Mayor and
5 Safehouse to stop further development of
6 supervised injection sites so that the
7 impacted residents, businesses and
8 institutions can be informed and heard.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Brooks.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
12 you, Council President. I will be voting
13 no on a resolution introduced by
14 Councilman Oh that urges the Mayor --

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: -- that
17 urges the Mayor and Safehouse to seek
18 further development of supervised
19 consumption sites. The language used
20 throughout is crafted to inspire fear and
21 spread misinformation.

22 The resolution states --

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: -- that
25 these sites could have a potentially

2 devastating impact on neighborhoods. It
3 also refers to overdose prevention sites
4 as heroin injection facilities.

5 The data on overdose prevention
6 sites is clear. The surrounding
7 communities see a reduction in
8 drug-related arrests, public displays of
9 drug use, and publicly discarded drug
10 paraphernalia.

11 Every single day Philadelphia
12 loses an average of three of our
13 community members to an overdose. If
14 these overdoses took place under the
15 supervision of a medical professional, it
16 would reduce that number to zero.

17 There are over 100 overdose
18 prevention sites across the world and not
19 a single facility has recorded an
20 overdose death.

21 Furthermore, the resolution
22 introduced alongside a bill will place
23 extremely strict limitations on the
24 process of opening one of these
25 facilities. The resolution and its

2 accompanied bill would indefinitely delay
3 overdose prevention sites from opening in
4 Philadelphia. I cannot in good faith
5 endorse an approach that will lead to
6 more preventable drug-related deaths.

7 Like many of my colleagues --

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Like many
10 of my colleagues, I believe that
11 transparency, education, community
12 involvement should be integral parts of
13 any overdose prevention site opening in
14 Philadelphia. My own evolution and
15 understanding of overdose prevention
16 sites has been shaped through
17 conversations with harm-reduction
18 advocates and healthcare specialists. It
19 would be a mistake to deny that
20 opportunity to others.

21 I have seen firsthand how the
22 government can respond to the addiction
23 crisis. My community, my family are
24 still recovering from the war on drugs
25 that criminalized and incarcerated black

2 people at a striking rate. For the black
3 community, the trauma still reigns in our
4 bodies, and it would be unforgivable to
5 repeat the same mistakes. What we know
6 now is that criminalization and
7 incarceration do not save but endanger
8 lives.

9 We also know --

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: We also
12 know that while the opioid epidemic is
13 largely represented as a public crisis
14 that affects the white community, black
15 and brown people are overrepresented
16 among those that died as a result of a
17 drug overdose.

18 I reject the flame vote work
19 that treats the opening of a life-saving
20 medical facility as a moral crisis but
21 views the death of over 100 -- I'm sorry;
22 over 1,000 Philadelphians each year as
23 the norm. We must create a clear and
24 realistic path for overdose prevention
25 sites opening in Philadelphia.

1 3/5/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 I thank Mayor Kenney and the
3 Administration for their leadership on
4 the issue, and I also look forward to
5 working with my colleagues in City
6 Council to move for an urgent -- move
7 this urgent work forward.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Squilla.

14 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. It's very unfortunate
16 that we would have people even here in
17 Council today that would not want a
18 public process on anything in a
19 democratic society.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: When you
22 hear that it's better that people know
23 better than you and it's good for them
24 and you should just do it anyway tells us
25 that we're moving far away from our

2 democratic priorities.

3 Today we have instances of
4 people who say they know things, they
5 bring up statistics and evidence, but
6 when countered, they try to say that
7 you're either for killing people or
8 you're for saving people. That is the
9 wrong message that we're giving out there
10 today, and it's a shame that people want
11 to use that instead of having dialogue
12 and conversation to show why they are
13 right.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: I normally
16 don't speak up and don't speak out,
17 because I think we could do this through
18 conversations and communications, but
19 when you get ignored and you get played,
20 it is very upsetting. And when you
21 represent a district that people call you
22 to ask you for help and you don't have an
23 opportunity to answer them because you do
24 not know the answers is just flat-out
25 wrong.

2 And we talk about statistics.

3 We talk about what it's doing out there.

4 There's evidence-based medicine that is

5 out there that tells us certain things.

6 There's also research and literature that

7 tells us certain things. There's doctors

8 and researchers that tell us through time

9 that these safe injection sites do not

10 work.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Keith

13 Humphreys, an addiction research and

14 psychiatric professor from Stanford

15 University, has told us that anybody who

16 looks at this evidence and looks at the

17 statistics and says that SISs are harmful

18 may be wrong, anybody who also does not

19 demonstrate -- SISs do not demonstrate

20 overdose deaths over time.

21 It is not proven that -- there

22 was a recent study, a meta-analysis done

23 from the University of South Wales in the

24 UK, has showed that there was only eight

25 studies, only eight studies that had

2 transparent and rigorous enough
3 information to use, where the other
4 studies were not transparent and
5 rigorous. They're saying this
6 information that he received was only
7 through those eight studies and that
8 therefore the research was not accurate.

9 So we know if anybody knows
10 that all the research that is done today
11 has not proven that safe injection sites
12 actually saves lives, and yet he even
13 states that it is very possible that safe
14 injection sites through the use of
15 providing such access maybe even
16 increases deaths in our city.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: If you
19 look at British Columbia, if you look at
20 British Columbia, in 2006, there was 226
21 overdose deaths. They have upwards of 20
22 safe injection sites throughout British
23 Columbia. Their overdose deaths grew
24 tenfold by 2018 to 1,514 overdose deaths
25 a year. So we're showing people by

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2 bringing them to these sites, these
3 overdose deaths are increasing. Even in
4 Vancouver in 2008, 38 overdose deaths
5 were in Vancouver. In 2018, over ten
6 times more overdose deaths are now in
7 Vancouver, 382.

8 Now, these are statistics and
9 facts. So for people to say that we're
10 looking at whether we're saving lives or
11 not saving lives, I think we have to look
12 at these statistics. I think we have to
13 have these conversations, and I think we
14 need to look at a point where we could
15 then talk about the facts of what we're
16 doing if we are really saving lives or if
17 we're not saving lives.

18 It also says there, Sharon
19 Lewis, who is a professor at Jefferson
20 University, says that she was hired by
21 the City of Philadelphia to look into
22 this, and it says -- it tells me if we
23 want to demonstrate that this is an
24 effective strategy for harm reduction,
25 one of many that are out there, we ought

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2 to be very careful and thoughtful on how
3 we develop data to answer these important
4 questions before moving forward.

5 So we know that -- I think we
6 should have a dialogue about this. And
7 for people who support no dialogue and
8 people who think that they should just be
9 able to put things because they know
10 better than others, I think you have to
11 relook at this information, and I think
12 we should be able to have a point of
13 discussion where we can all agree or
14 disagree on if this process works.

15 Thank you so much.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
18 you.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilwoman Gym.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Yes. Thank
22 you very much, Madam Chair. I also want
23 to say that I will be voting no on the
24 resolution to --

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I want to
3 thank Councilmember Kendra Brooks for her
4 profound and passionate statement. I
5 also want to let -- I also want to
6 explain to this body a little bit,
7 because I agree with many of the people
8 in this room that there needs to be a
9 much better public process that is
10 inclusive and where people are heard.
11 There is no excuse for a process that
12 does not include that. But I think that
13 is different from what is being proffered
14 in the resolution, which I think is
15 important to debunk some of the myths
16 around it.

17 I have visited three overdose
18 prevention sites around the world. All
19 three of them are massively different
20 from one another. One was government
21 run. One was non-profit run. One was a
22 mix. But there is a lot of clarity that
23 this is a public dialogue and a public
24 responsibility.

25 When I went to Copenhagen and I

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2 met with one of the owners of the
3 overdose prevention site, she confronted
4 me with our statistics, 900 people dead
5 in one year. She told me that this was
6 more than an entire village in
7 Copenhagen, and she asked why we didn't
8 do something more.

9 There is no question that
10 overdose prevention sites are part of a
11 continuum of care. They are not the
12 solution. They are not the beginning and
13 they are not the end.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: But they are
16 part of a continuum of care that
17 recognizes that you cannot recover, you
18 cannot detox, and you cannot survive if
19 you are dead.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: We need a
22 better conversation. We can do better as
23 a city in terms of public process.

24 Twelve hundred people are dead.
25 Last year, the year before, the numbers

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2 are growing. Our city is in crisis. Our
3 children are watching. Every street
4 right now is an injection site when we
5 don't have solutions. We have to think
6 through what the possibilities are.

7 I am committed to making this a
8 public process. What became very clear
9 from all of my visits is that any of
10 these facilities need a robust public
11 process, conversations with communities.
12 That should have happened, and the
13 ownership of that does belong on this,
14 but that should not prohibit the
15 continued dialogue, exploration, and the
16 urgency and importance by which we need
17 to address this topic head-on.

18 So I want to thank
19 Councilmember Brooks for saying that far
20 more articulately than I did, and I'm
21 grateful to all the people in this room.
22 Wherever we are, we are going to have to
23 figure this out together.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
3 you.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
7 much.

8 In 2015, I introduced the first
9 and only resolution dealing with this
10 current opioid/heroin crisis. It was a
11 resolution to combat the heroin/opioid
12 epidemic in Philadelphia in 2016.

13 At the time, I never heard of
14 such a thing as a safe injection site. I
15 formed no opinion for or against. But
16 what I did have was personal experience,
17 as many people in this room have, dealing
18 with the bureaucracy, the limitations,
19 the lack of funding, the lack of
20 treatment, the lack of options for people
21 who are actually trying to get off of
22 drugs.

23 The thing that all experts
24 agree is that the most critical thing is
25 that you make treatment available when a

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2 person wants treatment. If they don't
3 want to be treated, it's very hard to
4 force them to try to get off of an
5 addiction as powerful, as detrimental, as
6 evil as heroin, but any time, no matter
7 how many times they relapse or fail,
8 there should be treatment available for
9 them and not shortening that time, 90
10 days, being reduced and reduced. It
11 should be for as long as it takes to get
12 someone recovered.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN OH: And, yes, there
15 should be no barriers. We should reduce
16 red tape.

17 The other thing is, people are
18 moving around this region from
19 Philadelphia to Delaware County, to Bucks
20 County, to Chester, to Camden. We don't
21 have a regional approach. We have to
22 have early intervention. We don't need a
23 policy of fail first before you get help.

24 But none of these
25 recommendations that were made and

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2 adopted by Council after seven community
3 hearings, going into neighborhoods in the
4 Northeast and Roxborough, in Manayunk, in
5 South Philadelphia, in West Philadelphia,
6 in North Philadelphia have really been
7 followed through.

8 Yes, we've distributed
9 Naloxone, Narcan. We've done that, and
10 we have tried to do a couple other
11 things, but so much of the time and
12 effort has focused on warring with
13 neighborhoods, trying to force them to
14 take in safe injection sites, to the
15 point where now all of our effort is
16 being contradicted in a battle with each
17 other. The window is closing when we can
18 help people.

19 What I would say is this:
20 While I oppose, because I agree after
21 looking at this issue, I have concluded
22 that safe injection sites do far more
23 harm than good, but reasonable people
24 will differ. We have smart, intelligent
25 people on both sides of this issue.

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2 The issue that is raised today
3 was created by a sudden and shocking
4 announcement on Wednesday that the next
5 week they were going to operate a safe
6 injection site at Broad and Oregon
7 Avenues, without any knowledge, no input,
8 no notice to the community, the
9 institutions like the churches, the
10 daycares, the mosques, the synagogues,
11 the high schools. That process is
12 extremely problematic, and I think it did
13 a great disservice to anyone who wants to
14 advocate for a safe injection site.

15 Yes, everybody understands that
16 neighborhoods don't want it, but to say
17 that they are wrong and have no right to
18 determine the nature of their
19 neighborhood, that they're selfish, that
20 we should force them to accept what some
21 people believe as life-saving when that
22 is in dispute.

23 What I would say is really
24 this: Let's be transparent. I've said
25 openly I am not for them. And I will

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2 start with this for the people that keep
3 talking about lives: Count all the
4 lives, not just the lives that you're
5 focused on. All the lives.

6 I start in Mexico. I start
7 where our heroin is coming from. Between
8 2006 and 2012, 120,000 people were
9 murdered, not OD'd, not a traffic
10 accident. They were murdered as a result
11 of the drug trade. Twenty-seven thousand
12 are still missing. Take it into the
13 United States. Bring it to Philadelphia,
14 where you have people killing each other.

15 The thing about a safe
16 injection site, which is contrary to
17 every other treatment, every other
18 treatment, assisted or not assisted, with
19 methadone, Methadose, whatever you have,
20 they don't do heroin. They don't inject.
21 It's a treatment. The thing about a safe
22 injection site is the person has to go
23 out and hopefully they're rich enough, I
24 suppose, to get this without committing a
25 crime, without prostituting themselves,

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2 without putting themselves at risk of
3 murder to get the money they need for a
4 14-bag-a-day habit, seven days a week,
5 every week of the year. That is what
6 people are subjecting these people to,
7 and right now there are people today and
8 yesterday who are being denied treatment.
9 They want treatment. There's no beds.
10 There's no money. There's no resources.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Put the money,
13 the resources into treating people who
14 really want to get off heroin or whatever
15 drug they're on. Make it unlimited.
16 Give them the length of time they need.
17 Help them get a job.

18 The issue for us right now
19 today is whether or not people can have a
20 discussion on this and come to -- my
21 point is not necessarily going to
22 prevail, but we started a point, and that
23 process is open. We'll have a hearing on
24 Monday. There will be a vote on it
25 eventually in City Council. It may be

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2 held, may be moved forward, might be
3 voted up or down. That's a democratic
4 process.

5 But coming in here and saying
6 you don't care about lives, you want to
7 kill people, we're going to stick it
8 where we feel, that is a process that is
9 extremely undemocratic and disrespectful
10 of people's intelligence.

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Squilla.

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I want to say that we've
19 been working on this for a while,
20 Councilmember Sanchez and myself, amongst
21 others, to raise awareness about this
22 epidemic and how serious it is, and we
23 all lost loved ones to this horrible
24 disease.

25 We introduced legislation,

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2 myself co-sponsored by many other
3 members, to reduce overprescribing, to be
4 able to get lists for us through the
5 Health Department that the state was
6 receiving so we could be able to track
7 that information. We provided
8 low-barrier housing. We even went as far
9 as working with our harm-reduction
10 advocates for distribution of Narcan
11 throughout the communities to help
12 hopefully reduce the overdose deaths.
13 But we still have a lot more work to do,
14 and we need to do that.

15 We increased our budget \$5
16 million last year to hopefully start this
17 process and 36 million more in the next
18 five years to do that, but it's not
19 enough. We need to meet people where
20 they are. We need to look at hiring
21 researchers and outreach folks to go out
22 there and meet these folks. We got to
23 remove barriers to treatment, as I spoke
24 before. One of the barriers that our
25 city has put in place is if you smoke,

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2 you cannot get access to treatment.

3 These things are very important that we

4 need to do as a city. We need to get

5 treatment on demand. We need to make

6 sure as soon as people are ready to get

7 treatment, we have access for them. We

8 need a continuum of care to make sure we

9 follow the folks through the process to

10 be able to make sure that we engage them

11 at every point in their lives and

12 reconnect them with their families. And

13 then we have to look at our partners in

14 recovery homes, how do we regulate them

15 to make sure that we have as many as

16 possible available to people who still

17 want to be able to go out there and live

18 a good life and try to get off this

19 disease and to be open to making their

20 lives better so that they can enjoy both

21 their families and themselves.

22 So this is a lot of work.

23 We're committed to doing it. We're

24 committed to working together, but

25 whatever we do, we still need a process.

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2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes

7 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
9 you. I don't want to belabor the
10 discussion. I want to welcome many
11 people to this discussion that many of us
12 who have been working on this for the
13 last 12 years before harm reduction was a
14 term. Before we talked about all of the
15 issues around access to treatment, there
16 was a neighborhood of Kensington that
17 became the epicenter of this problem, and
18 I want to thank all of the folks who
19 throughout the last four years in
20 particular, three years in the more
21 intense way, have begun to learn to
22 listen to each other.

23 When we leave here today, the
24 issue will not be resolved. There will
25 be many conversations about access to

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2 treatment, 20 percent of our treatment
3 slots that go unutilized every day,
4 access to real treatment when people are
5 ready without all of the barriers, as has
6 been mentioned.

7 Let me remind people what we do
8 agree upon, because ultimately we got to
9 continue to listen to each other.

10 We agree on education. Harm
11 reduction, what we do and how we treat
12 people and where we meet them is
13 different for everyone. We can talk
14 about prevention. The need to expand
15 prevention and availability of
16 information for folks is hugely
17 important.

18 The state needs to do more
19 around its regulatory practices and stop
20 stopping Philadelphia from being able to
21 meet people where they are, recovery
22 house reform, rooming houses, all of the
23 things that we need to get people out of
24 the street and into a place with some
25 dignity so that we can help them on their

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2 lifetime journey of recovery.

3 Let me remind people what we
4 agree upon. Screaming at each other,
5 disrespecting each other is not listening
6 to each other. Telling someone someone
7 is wrong for how they feel is not
8 listening to each other. Telling someone
9 what they can have on their block in
10 their neighborhood is not listening to
11 each other.

12 All you have to do is go to
13 Kensington to see that what is happening
14 there is not the way we want the rest of
15 the City to look like. The fact that we
16 have folks in addiction, 500 -- and to
17 Kensington's credit, they call them the
18 outside visitors. 500 people in
19 addiction, defecating, open needle
20 exchange, all of those things.

21 Some people will go into a safe
22 injection site if one ever got up. The
23 majority of the people who are in
24 Kensington will not.

25 (Audience member yelling out.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Folks, folks, folks.

4 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: This is
5 part of the problem. We don't listen to
6 each other.

7 You can't change how people
8 feel about this. People in Kensington
9 have deserved and deserve better than
10 what we've had there.

11 The last three years we made
12 tremendous progress from the community
13 and the advocates. The community of
14 Kensington allowed two respite centers to
15 be put up in their neighborhood so that
16 we can help move people from the streets.
17 The community of Kensington allowed us to
18 do Narcan distribution, needle exchange,
19 all of those things. The community of
20 Kensington has demonstrated its
21 willingness to be open, but when we say
22 people are wrong for feeling what they
23 feel, for believing what they believe,
24 we're not being respectful to a process.

25 So I'm going to end where I

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2 started. We agree that we need to do
3 more education. We agree that we need to
4 do more prevention. We agree that we
5 need to really meet people where they are
6 without barriers. We agree that there
7 should always be a process. And we agree
8 that we need to be respectful around how
9 we have these conversations.

10 This is not a delay process. I
11 said this last week and I'll continue to
12 say it. This is a leadership moment. If
13 government is going to do this,
14 government has to lead. It has to create
15 a process where people are heard, and
16 then ultimately it acts in a responsible
17 way.

18 What we have in Kensington is
19 not responsible. We have a lot of
20 restoration to do in Kensington. Folks,
21 let's not lose this conversation by
22 calling each other out as opposed to
23 listening to each other and leading on
24 this issue.

25 If you want people to be

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2 sympathetic to you, people talk about
3 1,200 folks, I remind people, I can give
4 you names and I'm happy to spell out all
5 the names of all the funerals that I have
6 been to and unfortunately the funerals
7 that I will be at, because, again, the
8 access to treatment, the de-stigmatizing
9 of this disease is a lifetime journey.
10 It's going to take us decades to get
11 through this process.

12 But everybody is entitled to
13 feel how they feel. Everybody is
14 entitled to be heard. And no one should
15 be labeled regardless of which side of
16 this issue they're on.

17 Let's leave here today with
18 that renewed commitment. I know the
19 leadership in Kensington is committed to
20 that, because we've created the space
21 where we have more respect for each other
22 in this conversation.

23 Thank you, Council President.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Green.

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
6 Council President. I will be very brief.
7 I think you heard the passion from both
8 sides of this issue.

9 There is a fear that we'll have
10 well over 1,000 deaths again in 2020, but
11 it's also the fear of what this type of
12 facility will bring to someone's
13 neighborhood. And I think if you listen
14 to all the conversations from all the
15 people who have been working on this
16 issue recently and also for a number of
17 years, the key issue from my observation
18 that caused such concern was a lack of
19 dialogue and a lack of a process.

20 When Councilmember Sanchez and
21 Squilla went to Toronto to see a safe
22 injection site in operation, my
23 understanding is that the information
24 that was provided is that you have to
25 have a community engagement process in

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2 order for this type of facility to be
3 successful. And it reminds me -- I want
4 to remind people in this room who may not
5 remember the work of late Councilmember
6 Joan Krajewski who brought a methadone
7 clinic to her district on State Road, and
8 there was a lot of opposition and she was
9 not in support of it, but it was through
10 an ongoing conversation with near
11 neighbors that Northeast Treatment Center
12 was able to bring a methadone clinic to
13 State Road.

14 And so when I had the chance to
15 tour that clinic, among a number of other
16 clinics over the past couple years, when
17 we went there, the near neighbors were
18 not concerned about Northeast Treatment
19 Center, but they were concerned about the
20 nuisance bar across the street. The
21 reason why they got to that position is
22 because of communication and a process.
23 And this situation did not have that same
24 dialogue and the same process, and I
25 think that's what's caused the fear from

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2 a number of perspectives.

3 So I look forward to continuing
4 this conversation, but we must have a
5 process that all people are engaged with
6 so we can reduce the fear.

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
14 Council President. And I was trying to
15 really just take this information in, but
16 myself serving as the Councilperson of
17 the Second Councilmanic District is where
18 the proposed site was proposed. And so
19 just being a young man who grew up in
20 South Philadelphia all my life, I'm not
21 going to let anyone ever kind of lecture
22 me on what my community looks like when
23 it comes to drug addiction, rather it's
24 the crack epidemic that ravished our
25 community or, most importantly, heroin

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2 addiction. And it didn't just all of the
3 sudden just start as recently as now. We
4 all know individuals who came back from
5 Vietnam in our communities addicted to
6 heroin.

7 So this topic isn't new
8 primarily to the African American
9 community, but why I support Councilman
10 David Oh's resolution, because it talks
11 about a process of transparency. It
12 talks about the process of making sure
13 the community in which this site is going
14 to be located, rather it's in the Second
15 Councilmanic District or any other part
16 of the City, making sure that that
17 process is one that's inclusive and, most
18 importantly, that people that live inside
19 that neighborhood have a say-so.

20 I've been an elected official
21 close to 15 years now, serving in the
22 State House before I became a
23 Councilperson, and I recognize how
24 government works. If this site was
25 proposed in Rittenhouse Square or this

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2 site was proposed in Manayunk, it would
3 be a different type of conversation,
4 because I recognize how --

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I
7 recognize how City services are
8 distributed. I recognize even when we
9 have a School District -- and with all
10 due respect, when we talk about
11 resources, I know what schools receive
12 more resources than schools in
13 impoverished neighborhoods.

14 And so when we talk about
15 putting a site like this in any
16 neighborhood throughout the City of
17 Philadelphia, we want to make sure that
18 the process is inclusive. We want to
19 make sure that the people who live inside
20 the neighborhood have a seat at the
21 table.

22 I want to commend Councilman
23 Mark Squilla, who borders the Second
24 Councilmanic District in the First, for
25 working on this issue with me. And,

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2 again, it's not about if you don't
3 support safe injection sites, that you
4 don't support individuals who are in
5 recovery, you don't support individuals
6 who are addressing issues of addiction.
7 That's not the case at all. We just have
8 different philosophies on how we think
9 people should be treated when it comes to
10 the opioid crisis.

11 And so I really want to just
12 observe and recognize this process and
13 this discussion, but at the end of the
14 day, it was my neighborhood where the
15 site was proposed. It was my
16 constituents who called me and outraged.
17 It was the parents of the daycare
18 centers, the two daycare centers, that
19 were located -- and it's a little
20 different when you're a District
21 Councilperson, because we have direct --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Wait

18 Just one real quick
19 housekeeping note. We've had several
20 interesting budget messages. Just the
21 decorum as it relates to our budget
22 message, we would ask that you refrain
23 from any outbursts or comments. This is
24 not public comment session. So we would
25 like you to respect this house, which is

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2 the people's house. I want to thank you
3 very much for your anticipated
4 cooperation. It is clearly advised that
5 people should applaud.

6 So the Philadelphia Home Rule
7 Charter states that the Mayor shall
8 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
9 before the end of the fiscal year, his
10 Operating Budget message and proposed
11 Operating Budget ordinance for the
12 ensuing fiscal year.

13 At the same time, the Mayor
14 shall submit to Council the Recommended
15 Capital Program and Capital Budget as
16 received from the City Planning
17 Commission, to the extent approved by the
18 Mayor.

19 I now appoint the following

12 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you,
13 Council President Clarke and members of
14 City Council for inviting me to speak
15 here today. It's always great to be back
16 in this Chamber, and it's hard to believe
17 that this is already my fifth budget
18 address as Mayor. I often think of the
19 popular saying about parenthood that many
20 of you have probably heard: "The days
21 are long, but the years are short."

22 That pretty much sums up how it
23 feels to be Mayor. Days definitely feel
24 long, but the years fly by, and I know
25 that this term will go as quickly as the

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2 first.

3 I share this sentiment as a bit
4 of advice for our new Councilmembers -
5 Kendra Brooks, Jamie Gauthier, Katherine
6 Gilmore Richardson, and Isaiah Thomas.

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: There is a
9 finite -- you can clap for them.

10 There is a finite period of
11 time for each of us to make a positive
12 impact on our city as elected officials.
13 I look forward to working with all of you
14 to do just that.

15 The Fiscal Year 2021 Budget and
16 the Five Year Plan builds on the agenda
17 we discussed back in January just up
18 North Broad Street at The Met - fighting
19 for a safer and more just city; providing
20 quality education for all; delivering
21 cleaner and safe streets; building
22 inclusive and resilient neighborhoods;
23 creating a more diverse, efficient, and
24 effective government.

25 These are the top priorities of

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2 our Administration.

3 The key investments in this
4 Plan and the Capital Program will advance
5 these specific goals and ultimately help
6 lift at least 100,000 Philadelphians out
7 of poverty. This is a priority I know we
8 all share.

9 Our Administration's
10 anti-poverty strategy focuses on
11 providing support for those in need now,
12 helping Philadelphians raise their
13 incomes, and investing in policies and
14 programs that will break the cycle of
15 intergenerational poverty.

16 These investments double down
17 on programs we know are working for our
18 residents such as PHLpreK, Community
19 Schools, and Rebuild. They also fund the
20 commitments we've made to prioritize key
21 issues over the next four years.

22 Let me begin with our top
23 priority of creating a safer and more
24 just city for us all.

25 Before I do so, I was going to

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2 recognize Commissioner Danielle Outlaw,
3 who had to leave on business, and I just
4 want to give her a round of applause in
5 her absence.

6 (Applause.)

7 MAYOR KENNEY: Less than a
8 month on the job and she's already
9 brought a fresh perspective to our city.

10 I want to thank the public for
11 welcoming her graciously. I ask that you
12 continue praying for her success and
13 supporting her and our department in the
14 days and years ahead.

15 Make no mistake, her success is
16 our city's success. Commissioner Outlaw
17 is leading our Administration's efforts
18 to transform police-community relations,
19 make necessary internal reforms, and
20 reduce the senseless violence.

21 But we know that she can't do
22 that alone. We also know that to be
23 successful, the Department needs
24 strategic investments required of modern
25 policing.

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2 That's why this budget calls
3 for \$5.7 million for the staff and
4 technology needed to expand Operation
5 Pinpoint.

6 This initiative is starting to
7 show positive results in the target
8 areas, including a 17 percent
9 year-to-date decrease in homicides and
10 significant decreases in shooting victims
11 in Pinpoint areas.

12 Because of this progress, we
13 expect to expand Pinpoint to three more
14 police districts. We will also increase
15 the use of body-worn cameras and improve
16 training to eliminate racial bias.

17 And as Council President Clarke
18 has called for, this budget allows us to
19 hire public safety enforcement officers
20 to help ensure more police officers are
21 where we need them most, in neighborhoods
22 preventing violent crime.

23 To better address issues of
24 gender discrimination and sexual
25 harassment within the Police Department,

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2 we've earmarked \$360,000 to expand the
3 capacity of the Employee Relations Unit
4 of the Mayor's Office of Labor.

5 This will allow them to assume
6 the investigatory process for PPD, taking
7 those investigations outside of the
8 Department.

9 We'll also continue to fight
10 for improvements to the disciplinary
11 process as part of the upcoming
12 collective bargaining agreement, a
13 priority highlighted by our freshmen
14 Councilmembers.

15 We'll work hard with the FOP to
16 protect the rights of our officers, while
17 also strengthening Commissioner Outlaw's
18 ability to hold bad cops accountable. We
19 know this is a top concern for the
20 Department and our residents.

21 To reduce and prevent the gun
22 violence that has been tearing our
23 communities apart, this Plan adds \$8
24 million a year for the implementation of
25 evidence-based and community-informed

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2 strategies in the Philadelphia Roadmap
3 for Safer Communities.

4 We will expand the Community
5 Crisis Intervention Program and fund a
6 rapid response team that can respond to
7 communities experiencing deep trauma.

8 We'll also continue making
9 targeted community investment grants,
10 expand youth employment programs, and
11 reduce neighborhood blight.

12 A shared priority we have with
13 Councilmembers Jones and Johnson is
14 launching group violence intervention,
15 otherwise known as Focused Deterrence.

16 The strategy involves targeted
17 outreach to the small and active number
18 of people involved in street groups. It
19 offers incentives such as training and
20 employment for compliance, along with
21 swift consequences for criminal activity.

22 This approach is supported by
23 numerous successful cases of violence
24 reduction in other cities across the
25 country.

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2 To support initiatives like
3 Group Violence Intervention, our gun
4 violence investments include \$2 million
5 in a new transitional jobs program that
6 has successfully reduced violence in
7 other major cities.

8 Since most of our crimes stem
9 from poverty and lack of opportunity, we
10 will provide job training and jobs to
11 residents who are at the highest risk of
12 being involved in violence.

13 All these strategies and more
14 aim to reduce homicides by 30 percent and
15 shootings by 25 percent by the end of
16 this term.

17 We're confident with a unified
18 effort as well as continued lobbying for
19 common-sense gun reform at the state and
20 federal levels, we can achieve this goal.

21 Over the life of this Plan,
22 we'll continue building on the success of
23 our criminal and juvenile justice reform
24 efforts. As we know, long-term
25 sustainability of criminal justice

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2 reforms requires deep and meaningful
3 collaboration with the communities most
4 impacted by mass incarceration.

5 We remain committed to
6 reinvesting savings from our reforms
7 directly into impacted communities.

8 The Office of Reentry
9 Partnerships will enhance and streamline
10 connections to the resources that
11 residents returning from incarceration
12 need to thrive, such as high-quality
13 workforce training, housing, and other
14 supports.

15 We'll also launch our first
16 Neighborhood Resource Center. This will
17 be a network of community centers where
18 people can report to their probation
19 officers in their own neighborhood and
20 access services alongside family members
21 and neighbors.

22 The vision for these centers is
23 to remove barriers and transform
24 supervision to ensure that people receive
25 the support they need to move forward.

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2 And we'll work with our
3 partners to make Philadelphia's pretrial
4 system more equitable. That means
5 working to eliminates cash bail, a
6 practice --

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: -- a practice
9 that causes people living in poverty to
10 languish in our jails awaiting trial
11 simply because they cannot afford to pay
12 for their freedom.

13 We are also increasing
14 opportunities for diversion away from the
15 criminal and juvenile justice system and
16 into services at the point of law
17 enforcement contact.

18 All of these efforts will help
19 us promote safety and racial equity while
20 reducing the jail population by 50
21 percent from where it was in 2015. We
22 are continuing the work of collaborative
23 and data-driven criminal justice reform
24 through the MacArthur Foundation Safety
25 and Justice Challenge.

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2 But to truly prevent crime and
3 reduce the need for incarceration in the
4 first place, the most critical and
5 impactful investment we can continue to
6 make is in quality education.

7 That's why this Plan includes
8 an unprecedented \$2 billion for
9 education, from PHL, to K to 12, to
10 Community College.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR KENNEY: By Fiscal Year
13 2023, we will be providing quality pre-K
14 to 5,500 children every single school
15 year.

16 Four years ago we were debating
17 how to fund this transformative program,
18 and now we are setting up our youngest
19 learners and their families for success
20 in elementary school and beyond.

21 I want to thank you for helping
22 make this possible -- this initiative so
23 successful.

24 For our public school students,
25 we are investing 267 million in Fiscal

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2 Year 21 for the School District of
3 Philadelphia, a \$45 million increase over
4 Fiscal Year 20.

5 (Applause.)

6 MAYOR KENNEY: As you know, I
7 firmly believe the only way to create
8 lasting equity in Philadelphia is to
9 ensure all of our city's children,
10 regardless of their zip code, have great
11 schools in their neighborhoods.

12 During our first term, we
13 proudly put Philadelphia's future back in
14 the hands of residents by returning the
15 School District to local control and
16 giving it fiscal stability for the first
17 time in recent history.

18 (Applause.)

19 MAYOR KENNEY: Not only did we
20 launch PHLpreK and Community Schools, but
21 we also redesigned our entire \$23 million
22 out-of-school-time system. And we are
23 working in close partnerships with the
24 District to redesign our \$100 million
25 behavioral health system.

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2 (Applause.)

3 MAYOR KENNEY: With the support
4 and advocacy of Councilmember Gym, we
5 appointed a diverse local School Board
6 and are investing more than \$1.4 billion
7 in funding in the District.

8 I'm very proud of the
9 District's momentum, having recently
10 celebrated four straight years of steady
11 progress of schools citywide.

12 Under the leadership of
13 Superintendent Dr. William Hite and
14 School Board President Joyce Wilkerson,
15 more students are reading on grade level
16 and graduating on time. And we have
17 better supportive services to meet the
18 extensive needs of our students and their
19 families.

20 So please join me in giving
21 Dr. Hite, President Wilkerson, and our
22 entire Board of Education a round of
23 applause to thank them for their service
24 to our city.

25 (Applause.)

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2 MAYOR KENNEY: All that said,
3 Dr. Hite, President Wilkerson, and I are
4 keenly aware that there's much more work
5 to do until we can confidently say all of
6 our schools, District-led and charter,
7 are where they need to be.

8 But creating a system of great
9 schools requires resources. Governor
10 Wolf's budget is promising, and our local
11 delegation is working hard to do
12 everything it can to bring more funding
13 into Philadelphia public schools. But we
14 will once again be called on to step up
15 for our kids.

16 The crisis with lead and
17 asbestos removal in our schools is
18 evidence enough that decades of cuts and
19 disinvestment come at a price.

20 While the District remains
21 stable this fiscal year, its future
22 financial condition is tenuous. And I
23 refuse to return to the days of draconian
24 cuts and wondering whether schools will
25 open on time. It is our generation who

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2 must have the political courage to act
3 and lead our city from a legacy of
4 survival to a future of students actually
5 thriving.

6 (Applause.)

7 MAYOR KENNEY: In addition to
8 providing our K to 12 system with
9 increased funding, this next term brings
10 another area of focus for our
11 Administration.

12 When I think about how we can
13 make a real impact on reducing poverty,
14 improving educational attainment, and
15 preparing a highly skilled workforce, no
16 institution provides a greater
17 opportunity than the Community College of
18 Philadelphia.

19 CCP is the predominant gateway
20 to greater economic mobility for
21 graduates of Philadelphia public schools.

22 It enrolls just over 1,600
23 recent high school graduates each year,
24 and that number does not even include the
25 thousands of adults advancing their

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2 education and career goals by attending
3 Community College.

4 CCP offers more than 100

5 Associate degree and certificate
6 programs. Proficiency certificates are
7 available in a number of occupations,
8 from accounting and advanced automotive
9 repair to architectural visualization,
10 biomedical equipment, and cyber security.

11 Associate degrees also are
12 offered for in-demand careers such as
13 engineering science, nursing, computer
14 science, dental hygiene, and digital
15 forensics.

16 And the evidence is clear, a
17 post-secondary credential or college
18 degree is essential to thrive in today's
19 rapidly changing economy. Yet rising
20 costs of higher education and the student
21 debt crisis are harming students' ability
22 to access and complete their education.

23 Raising the City's two- and
24 four-year degree attainment rates is a
25 major component of our inclusive growth

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2 strategy. And if we are serious about
3 achieving that goal, we must address the
4 dual challenges of tuition affordability
5 and basic needs insecurity.

6 So with all of this in mind, I
7 propose in this Plan a major investment
8 of \$63 million in new funding for
9 Community College of Philadelphia to
10 launch the Octavius Catto Scholarship.

11 The Catto Scholarship is a
12 "last dollar" tuition model that
13 effectively closes the gap between other
14 financial aid and the student's remaining
15 balance. It will also provide basic
16 needs and academic supports that foster
17 degree completion.

18 We have a simple but vital
19 goal - to significantly increase
20 graduation rates for full-time CCP
21 students.

22 We know that tuition is not the
23 only significant barrier to graduation.
24 In fact, more than half of the
25 respondents to a recent Temple University

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2 study indicated they were housing and
3 food insecure.

4 That is why we are combining
5 last-dollar funding with additional
6 support to remove the burdens that hit
7 many of our students, especially those
8 living in poverty, particularly hard.

9 We'll give each first-time,
10 full-time student in the program \$1,500
11 per semester to offset the cost of books,
12 transportation, and food.

13 The City will also work with
14 CCP to better connect more of their
15 students to public benefits, childcare,
16 and housing supports.

17 The Catto Scholarship will give
18 these transformative opportunities to a
19 projected 6,500 students over the next
20 five years.

21 And we'll provide over \$700,000
22 in funding to expand opportunities for
23 dual enrollment and summer bridge
24 programs to ensure our Catto Scholars are
25 ready for the rigor of college.

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2 (Applause.)

3 MAYOR KENNEY: Mountains of
4 data tell us that this investment will
5 make a real difference in people's lives,
6 while also promoting the economic
7 prosperity of our city over the long
8 term.

9 But it was cemented even more
10 for me personally after talking to some
11 of our students.

12 Take Lylia, a senior at George
13 Washington High School, one of our
14 Community Schools in the Northeast.
15 Lylia and her parents are from Algeria
16 and arrived in Philly six years ago.
17 They came to Philadelphia determined to
18 find more educational opportunities and a
19 better life.

20 Despite the challenges that she
21 faced in high school as an English
22 learner and during her mother's battle
23 with a serious illness, Lylia is
24 ambitious, resilient, and dedicated to
25 her education.

2 She now speaks three languages,
3 including English, and is the vice
4 president of a mentorship program for
5 immigrant girls at George Washington, a
6 program the Community School Coordinator
7 helped to establish. In fact, Lylia's
8 leadership role took her to Harvard
9 University to present at an alumni
10 conference last spring.

11 Lylia wants to follow in her
12 parents' footsteps and study medicine,
13 which they practiced in Africa, and she's
14 on the right track. Next week she will
15 begin an internship in our Department of
16 Public Health through the Community
17 Schools' new City Interns program. And
18 in the fall, she will go to CCP.

19 With enough support to complete
20 a degree at CCP, Lylia can then transfer
21 to study pre-med at Temple University. I
22 know that our city can help fulfill her
23 dream and her family's dream of a better
24 life through education.

25 We can also help current

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2 full-time CCP students, like Brittany who
3 lives in Southwest Philadelphia.

4 Brittany is studying business and Spanish
5 at CCP, and also hopes to transfer to
6 Temple after graduating with her
7 Associate's degree.

8 She is also a single mom and
9 works two jobs to support herself and her
10 daughter. This is not easy.

11 Given these challenges, I am
12 glad that Brittany's daughter Elizabeth
13 is one of our PHLpreK students. She goes
14 to school right across the street from
15 CCP at Spring Garden Academy. This
16 center has the state's highest quality
17 rating, and because of PHLpreK, Elizabeth
18 attends for free.

19 Brittany can focus on her
20 studies, knowing that her daughter is in
21 a safe and high-quality learning
22 environment. And Elizabeth already knows
23 some big words, like "impressive," which
24 is exactly how I'd describe her and her
25 mother.

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2 Lylia and Brittany are here
3 with us today, and I would like to ask
4 them to stand.

5 (Applause.)

6 MAYOR KENNEY: From Southwest
7 Philly to the Northeast and every
8 neighborhood in between, these determined
9 young adults represent our Catto
10 Scholars, who we as a city will help
11 achieve the American dream.

12 I want to send a clear message
13 to our high school students, especially
14 those who may think college is out of
15 reach or simply cannot afford it. If you
16 work hard and graduate high school, you
17 can go to Community College full time,
18 tuition free, and even get money for
19 books, transportation, and food.

20 We're committed to this because
21 I believe in you, everyone in this
22 Chamber believes in you, and the City of
23 Philadelphia cares about you.

24 So now that I've shared the
25 largest new investment in our Plan, I

2 want to shift focus to the Capital
3 Program, particularly related to our goal
4 of creating cleaner and safe streets.

5 The single largest capital
6 investment continues to be addressing the
7 quality of our streets, to the tune of
8 52.1 million this year and \$335.6 million
9 over six years.

10 Since 2016, thanks to the
11 support of Councilmember O'Neill, we've
12 more than doubled the number of miles
13 paved, and moving our roadways towards a
14 state of good repair remains a top
15 priority.

16 We plan to invest 240 million
17 in street paving alone over six years.

18 We'll continue designing safer
19 streets that promote zero fatalities and
20 put people first through a \$9 million
21 investment in Vision Zero over six years.
22 And we'll deliver on our goal of creating
23 40 miles of protected bike lanes by the
24 year 2025.

25 We'll provide funding for SEPTA

2 of 4.7 million to support capital
3 improvements at stations and other
4 facilities. This is in addition to the
5 annual \$89 million local Operating Budget
6 contribution the City provides to SEPTA,
7 and we'll leverage grant funding through
8 a \$1.4 million appropriation for
9 repairing bridges.

10 Most notably, we'll be
11 expanding street sweeping to all
12 residential neighborhoods and commercial
13 corridors citywide.

14 We learned a great deal from
15 our street sweeping pilot in six
16 neighborhoods last year, where we used
17 capital funding to buy new mechanical
18 brooms and hired laborers.

19 Residents supported the program
20 and expressed that they noticed their
21 blocks were cleaner because of this
22 program. In fact, 96 percent of the
23 residents in the pilot areas supported
24 expanding this program citywide.

25 As a result of this pilot and

2 because of the support of Councilmembers
3 Parker, Henon, and Squilla, we propose
4 \$10 million to expand street sweeping to
5 more neighborhoods in Fiscal Year 21 and
6 \$67 million over five years.

7 We will use the data and
8 recommendations in the pilot's evaluation
9 to improve the program moving forward.

10 As part of the 2020 program,
11 mechanical cleaning will be expanded to
12 new neighborhoods, and in some areas cars
13 will be required to move during sweeping
14 operations.

15 We're still finalizing the
16 implementation plans, and full details of
17 the 2020 program will be announced later
18 this spring.

19 Ensuring cleaner streets is a
20 pivotal first step to creating more
21 inclusive and resilient neighborhoods.

22 Our city is experiencing a
23 period of transformative economic growth,
24 which has contributed to a reduction in
25 our poverty and unemployment rates, as

2 well as a rise in median incomes.

3 While we are progressing, we
4 must move faster to close the inequality
5 gap and foster more affordable, stronger,
6 and healthier neighborhoods.

7 That is why our budget invests
8 \$6.6 million in Fiscal Year 21 and nearly
9 \$33 million from the General Fund over
10 the Plan in PHLRentAssist.

11 This new program will stabilize
12 households living in poverty, with a
13 focus on youth aging out of foster care,
14 low-income working families, and
15 individuals with disabilities.

16 Its goal is to prevent eviction
17 and the negative effects of displacement
18 by filling the gap between what people
19 can afford to pay and the cost of rent,
20 which is a household's largest expense.

21 A safe, stable place to live is
22 a necessary foundation for people to
23 participate in the workforce, for
24 children to go to school, and for youth
25 to pursue a credential and get the

2 education to help them move out of
3 poverty.

4 Through this program, we will
5 test innovative and cost-effective
6 practices to housing instability and
7 poverty alleviation, including through a
8 cash transfer pilot program.

9 To further drive economic
10 mobility, raise incomes, grow businesses,
11 and support neighborhoods hit the hardest
12 by crime and opioids, we're going to
13 continue the implementation of our
14 inclusive growth strategy.

15 Our Plan calls for growing
16 quality jobs through entrepreneurship,
17 increasing job training, and attracting
18 and retaining businesses using new
19 sector-based strategies.

20 As championed by Councilmember
21 Bass, we'll increase funding for the
22 Department of Human Services by \$600,000
23 to support wage increases for the summer
24 youth jobs program. This will be in
25 addition to the 7.9 million we invest

2 annually in WorkReady.

3 And in partnership with
4 Councilmember Sanchez, we'll continue
5 making historic investments in housing
6 affordability, homeless services, and
7 homeownership. From FY19 through the end
8 of this Plan, we will make \$115 million
9 in contributions to the Housing Trust
10 Fund.

11 We'll continue our citywide
12 efforts to combat the opioid crisis,
13 drawing on everything we've learned
14 during the first term from the
15 Philadelphia Resilience Project and the
16 Mayor's Task Force to Combat the Opioid
17 Epidemic.

18 We recently established a new
19 Opioid Response Unit in the Managing
20 Director's Office. The unit will oversee
21 targeted strategies to prevent addiction,
22 connect more people to treatment, and
23 save more lives from opioid overdose,
24 while also helping our neighborhoods
25 recover from the toll of the crisis.

2 On top of our new investment of
3 \$1 million earmarked for the opioid work,
4 I propose increasing funding for the
5 Department of Health by \$2.3 million to
6 expand prevention efforts and address key
7 quality of life concerns in Kensington.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: We make these
10 investments because we are focused on
11 ensuring fewer people suffer premature
12 deaths because of this epidemic.

13 And while I understand that
14 some of you disagree with the policy and
15 have concerns with how and when community
16 members are consulted, we will continue
17 to work with advocates to support opening
18 overdose prevention sites to save lives
19 and help connect people to treatment.

20 (Applause.)

21 MAYOR KENNEY: We will take a
22 greater role in --

23 (Audience member yelling out.)

24 MAYOR KENNEY: We will take a
25 greater role going forward to ensure

2 community conversations happen this year,
3 as they did extensively in 2018.

4 I'm optimistic that we can find
5 a path forward, because I think we're
6 more aligned on this issue than it may
7 appear.

8 For example, we all know
9 someone who struggled with addiction, and
10 many of us have lost someone we love to
11 overdose.

12 I also think we can agree that
13 as a society we failed an entire
14 generation during the crack epidemic and
15 the failed war on drugs because of bad
16 policy.

17 (Applause.)

18 MAYOR KENNEY: We cannot let
19 history repeat itself simply because
20 we're afraid to try new, albeit
21 controversial, approaches.

22 And I know that we all agree
23 that the City must do more to save lives
24 and help our fellow Philadelphians reach
25 their God-given potential.

2 With that said, I want to be
3 very clear that I refuse to look another
4 parent in the face and tell them I didn't
5 do everything I could to try to keep
6 their child alive long enough to survive
7 their disease.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: While we deal
10 with these life-threatening crises, we
11 must continue to address the climate
12 crisis by working to build inclusive and
13 resilient neighborhoods.

14 Since 2018, we've been
15 committed to delivering on the Paris
16 Climate Agreement to reduce carbon
17 emissions 80 percent by the year 2050,
18 and we've established our own ambitious
19 climate goals.

20 I propose a 750,000 increase
21 for our Office of Sustainability to
22 expand the Greenworks program with new
23 staff and hire a Chief Resiliency
24 Officer.

25 This important role is to

2 ensure climate adaptation is integrated
3 into all City operations and work with
4 external stakeholders to create citywide
5 climate adaptation plans that direct
6 private development towards climate
7 resiliency.

8 It also includes \$250,000 in
9 capital for LED lighting system upgrades
10 and the Greenworks fund and \$181,000 in
11 the Energy Office to meet climate and
12 energy goals.

13 Additionally, a quarter million
14 dollars is provided to the Philadelphia
15 Energy Authority to provide solar panel
16 incentives.

17 Another major area of
18 investment I'm thrilled about is Rebuild,
19 our transformational infrastructure
20 initiative made possible because of the
21 Philadelphia beverage tax. We've
22 committed hundreds of millions of dollars
23 to rebuilding our aging parks, recreation
24 centers, playgrounds, and libraries.

25 Work has now begun at more than

2 60 Rebuild sites across the City,
3 representing over 120 million of new
4 investment, mostly in high-need
5 neighborhoods.

6 I look forward to joining you
7 at many groundbreakings and re-openings
8 this spring.

9 Next week I will join
10 Councilmember Gauthier at Miles Mack
11 Playground in Mantua to preview the
12 renovations starting on the playground
13 and recreation building this spring.

14 The improvements coming to
15 Miles Mack are the result of many
16 conversations with residents to make sure
17 the City's investment reflects the
18 community's needs and will deliver for
19 the young people who call Miles Mack
20 home.

21 As critical and inspiring as we
22 all agree Rebuild is, it is not enough
23 that we just transform the buildings and
24 fields. We must improve the quality of
25 programming that children, youth, and

2 families can access.

3 That is why we are investing \$1
4 million to enable Parks and Rec to embark
5 on an ambitious systemwide effort to
6 provide higher-quality programs and
7 realign their staffing structure to
8 better serve communities in need.

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR KENNEY: And we'll
11 increase funding for the Free Library to
12 hire more staff --

13 (Applause.)

14 MAYOR KENNEY: -- which will
15 help reduce unexpected closures, and for
16 the first time in recent history,
17 maintain six-day service year round.

18 (Applause.)

19 MAYOR KENNEY: The Six-Year
20 Capital Program includes 143.5 million
21 for Parks and Recreation, including 50
22 million to help support the
23 transformation of FDR Park into a
24 regional recreational and environmental
25 amenity.

2 (Applause.)

3 MAYOR KENNEY: It will also
4 bring to fruition the long overdue Bethel
5 Burying Ground Memorial.

6 (Applause.)

7 MAYOR KENNEY: The Capital
8 Program supports investments in our
9 neighborhood commercial corridors,
10 industrial areas, and economic and
11 recreational improvements along both
12 riverfronts.

13 We will support improved
14 pedestrian experiences around East Market
15 and Chestnut Streets.

16 And we will redesign Paine
17 Plaza outside the Municipal Services
18 Building to better meet the needs of
19 residents and business owners coming to
20 do business with the City. This project
21 will also complement the transformation
22 of Love Park and Dilworth Park to create
23 high-quality public spaces for residents
24 and visitors alike.

25 Investing in our public spaces

2 is as important as investing in our
3 education system. We can't underestimate
4 the return on investment and enhanced
5 quality of life it brings to people who
6 live, work, and visit our great city.

7 Having the necessary resources
8 to invest in our public spaces goes hand
9 in hand with our fifth major priority of
10 this term - creating a more diverse,
11 efficient, and effective government.

12 As Councilmember Green has
13 called for, we're going to build on our
14 financial stability to modernize services
15 so we can deliver better customer
16 services to residents and businesses.

17 In fact, the Plan calls for
18 over 300 million in capital funding to
19 modernize services. For example, we'll
20 invest \$69 million in OPAL, O-P-A-L,
21 which will standardize, streamline, and
22 integrate business processes across
23 Finance, Procurement, and other
24 departments.

25 \$22.5 million in the Office of

2 Innovation and Technology will be used
3 for network infrastructure improvements
4 and other applications used by
5 departments.

6 I'm proposing new investments
7 that advance racial equity, reform
8 burdensome fines and fees, diversify our
9 workforce and contract recipients, and
10 expand efforts to rid the workplace of
11 sexual harassment.

12 (Applause.)

13 MAYOR KENNEY: During the first
14 term, we changed how the City handles
15 claims of sexual harassment, improving
16 the ways complaints are filed and
17 investigated. This term, as I said,
18 we'll add a new position in the Office of
19 Labor Relations to increase its capacity
20 to administer sexual harassment
21 prevention trainings for all front-line
22 staff.

23 To advance racial equity, we
24 will bolster the Office of Diversity,
25 Equity and Inclusion so it can examine

2 and address institutional and structural
3 disparities across the government.

4 (Applause.)

5 MAYOR KENNEY: One major area
6 that we are examining is the practice of
7 administering fines and fees across the
8 government, which too often comes with
9 unintended consequences.

10 Fines and fees are mostly
11 issued to recoup costs of service and to
12 curb problematic behavior. However,
13 until now, they have mostly been enacted
14 without regard for one's ability to pay.

15 It's time to reconsider
16 practices where fines and fees fail to
17 meet their intended goal or, even worse,
18 cause harm. This disproportionately
19 impacts low-income communities and people
20 of color.

21 Councilmember Parker and I
22 recently called on the Board of the
23 Trustees of the Free Library of
24 Philadelphia to eliminate fines for
25 overdue materials, and I'm pleased that

2 this policy went into effect last month.

3 We expect to see an increase in
4 returned materials and, more importantly,
5 we hope that more Philadelphians will
6 come back to access vital library
7 services as a result of this policy
8 change.

9 We will continue this momentum
10 by closely examining the impact of other
11 municipal fines and fees, finding ways to
12 reduce the financial burden on those who
13 lack the ability to pay.

14 When it comes to prioritizing
15 better customer service for our
16 businesses and residents, the Office of
17 the Managing Director will lead a
18 citywide initiative to enhance the
19 customer experience for both groups.

20 We're working internally to
21 streamline various processes that
22 customers engage in every day so we can
23 improve efficiency and service delivery.

24 We'll start the planning
25 process for improvements and redesign of

2 the Municipal Services Building lobby and
3 concourse using a human-centered design
4 process.

5 We'll complete an audit of all
6 City buildings and properties to ensure
7 compliance with the Americans with
8 Disabilities Act.

9 And we'll create a business
10 acceleration team, at an investment of
11 \$530,000, to make it easier for
12 businesses to work with departments,
13 solve their problems, and navigate
14 processes.

15 These are just a few ways that
16 we will work to make government run with
17 greater efficiency.

18 This agenda I just described is
19 only possible because of the work we've
20 done to improve the City's fiscal health.

21 Without fiscal stability, the
22 bold investments in education, community
23 college, street sweeping, and modernizing
24 our technology would not be feasible.

25 But last year we had the

2 highest fund balance in the City's
3 history. We continued to reduce the
4 pension system's unfunded liability and
5 should reach nearly 60 percent funded at
6 the end of the Plan.

7 In fact, we're still on track
8 for the pension system to be 80 percent
9 funded by the year 2029 and 100 percent
10 funded by the year 2033.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR KENNEY: That's a big
13 deal.

14 These investments are vital for
15 the financial health of our city.

16 And as Councilmember Domb has
17 called for, we're maximizing revenue
18 collections and reducing delinquency,
19 having achieved a real estate tax
20 collection rate of 96 percent.

21 In order to promote growth
22 throughout the City, the Plan has over
23 \$200 million in wage and business tax
24 cuts, including the extension and
25 acceleration of reductions to the net

2 income side of the BIRT.

3 We're requesting no tax rate
4 increases, and we're making a
5 long-requested change from the business
6 community to Market-Based Sourcing in the
7 year 2023.

8 We're also being prudent and
9 planning for a potential economic
10 downturn. We'll continue reserving at
11 least \$56 million a year to hedge against
12 a recession or potential federal funding
13 cuts. And we're putting together another
14 195 million into the Rainy Day Fund
15 throughout the Plan, bringing the total
16 amount deposited to 229 million.

17 Over the next few months, we
18 will engage in a robust discussion of
19 this budget and Five Year Plan, and it's
20 possible that on some things we just
21 won't agree, and that's fine.

22 In this city with limited
23 resources and many, many important but
24 often competing priorities, honorable
25 people working with the best intentions

2 are bound to disagree.

3 Yet as we work through these
4 priorities, I am confident none of us
5 will lose sight of the greater goal we
6 all share - to make Philadelphia safer,
7 cleaner, healthier, and to give our
8 children a chance to achieve their
9 dreams.

10 This is not a political speech,
11 but I can't lose sight of the difficult
12 drama that is playing out at the national
13 level as we choose a president for the
14 next four years.

15 This nation is fractured to a
16 degree that I can't recall since the
17 turbulence of the '60s. It's sad. It's
18 really sad.

19 But I am proud of the fact that
20 no matter what we see happening in
21 Washington, those of us here in this
22 Chamber are determined to continue
23 fighting for Philadelphia.

24 I have said this several times
25 over the last four years, and it remains

2 just as true today. With the dysfunction
3 of governance at the national level, it
4 is clear that cities, large and small,
5 must lead this country.

6 All of us here, elected
7 officials, staff members, advocates,
8 concerned residents, all of us are
9 evidence of Philadelphia's ability to
10 lead.

11 Have no doubt, in 2020 we will
12 step up and do what is right for our
13 neighbors, for our region, and for our
14 nation. We will not be stopped by
15 polemics or partisanship. We will not be
16 stopped by thinly disguised racist
17 rhetoric. We will not be stopped by fake
18 news or the lies of those who claim to be
19 leaders.

20 No matter where the United
21 States is headed, we here in Philadelphia
22 will not be stopped.

23 So thank you all very much, and
24 now let's get to work.

25 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
12 surprised.

13 Any speeches on behalf of the
14 majority?

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Green.

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
18 Council President. After a long
19 legislative session, sometimes you need
20 sustenance and nourishment. So I want to
21 thank the Art Museum as well as Johnson
22 Controls, Philadelphia Energy Authority,
23 and the Mayor's Office of Sustainability.
24 We will be having a briefing for
25 Councilmembers and staff regarding the

2 Guaranteed Energy Savings Act. I chair
3 the EOP Committee for that initiative,
4 and really did a great job at the Art
5 Museum and want to provide that
6 information to my colleagues and staff,

9 So thank you, Council
10 President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 There being no additional
14 speeches, the Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Jones for a motion to adjourn.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
18 adjourned until Thursday, March 12th,
19 2020 at 10:00 a.m.
