9 today in our chambers.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 And we also have the great pleasure
13 and honor to have Ms. Erika
14 Alexander, actress, here today as
15 well who will also be honored.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 I don't geek out too many times but
19 that's Erika Alexander, y'all.
20 Living Single, y'all. If you know,
21 you know, right.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 That's that culture. Those that
25 know, know. Maxine.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 At this time the Chair recognizes
5 Councilmember from the mighty 5th
6 Councilmanic District Jeffrey Jay
7 Young who will present a resolution
8 naming Master Street between Broad
9 Street and Carlisle as Erika
10 Alexander Way.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Will Erika Alexander and those
14 accompanying her please join the
15 Councilmember at the podium.
16 Joining Councilmember Young will be
17 the following Councilmembers:
18 Councilmember Nina Ahmad,
19 Councilmember Cindy Bass,
20 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada
21 Councilmember Kendra Brooks,
22 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
23 Richardson, Councilmember Nicolas
24 O'Rourke, Councilmember Mark
25 Squilla, Councilmember Anthony

5 (Councilmembers and guests
6 approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
9 Jeffrey Jay Young.

10 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
11 you, Mr. President.

12 Good morning to you all.
13 I'm excited to be here today on
14 this day because today we are
15 honoring a living legend who was
16 discovered here in our beloved City
17 of Philadelphia, someone who
18 deserves to have all the
19 recognition, all the flowers while
20 she is still able to do even more
21 great things in this society, in
22 this world. I am honored and
23 pleased to recognize today Erika
24 Alexander.

25 (Applause.)

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: And so,
3 we have a long resolution so bear
4 with us today please. But she
5 deserves to have all of her
6 accolades in the world so you all
7 know the things that she has
8 accomplished, the things she's
9 going to continue to do and the
10 great things that we will predict
11 that she will do in the future
12 again.

13 So I'm going to start this
14 ceremony off, but all members of
15 Council are up here are also elated
16 to join us in this ceremony. So a
17 resolution also naming Master
18 Street between Broad Street and
19 Carlisle Street as Erika Alexander
20 Way.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Whereas,
23 Erika Alexander was born on
24 November 19, 1969 in Arizona to
25 Robert and Sammie Alexander and

2 moved to East Mt. Airy, 8th

3 District, in Northwest Philadelphia

4 in 1983; and

5 Whereas, Alexander joined

6 the New Freedom Theater in North

7 Philadelphia when she was 14 and

8 was discovered by independent film

9 company Merchant Ivory during the

10 fifth week of a six-week summer

11 acting class; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

13 RICHARDSON: And whereas,

14 Alexander's first onscreen acting

15 role was in a Merchant Ivory

16 production, 1986's My Little Girl,

17 a lead role she earned after twelve

18 screen tests and four auditions;

19 and

20 Whereas, Alexander

21 graduated from the Philadelphia

22 High School for Girls in 1987 as a

23 member of the 231st graduating

24 class; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Whereas, Alexander would go on to
3 perform in plays at New York Public
4 Theater throughout the 1980s
5 touring the world with The Royal
6 Shakespeare Company in Peter
7 Brook's groundbreaking play the
8 Mahabharata when she was 17 years
9 old; and

10 Whereas, the Mahabharata
11 opened the famed Majestic Theater
12 in Downtown Brooklyn which is known
13 to the world today as the BAM
14 Harvey Theater; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: And
16 whereas, Alexander would receive
17 her big break in 1990 when she was
18 cast as Pam Tucker in The Cosby
19 Show appearing --

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: We
22 can clap for that.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
25 Appearing on the highly acclaimed

2 sitcom until the show's finale in

3 1992 that took her from

4 Philadelphia to East New York,

5 Brooklyn; and

6 Whereas, Alexander would

7 receive her breakout role in 1993

8 being cast as high-powered attorney

9 Maxine Shaw on Fox's Living Single.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: A

12 role for which she would receive

13 multiple NAACP Image Awards for

14 Outstanding Actress in a Comedy

15 Series; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

17 Whereas, Alexander would portray

18 Maxine Shaw for five years until

19 1998. Her character serving as an

20 inspiration for many Black women

21 attorneys such leaders as Stacey

22 Abrams, Rep. Ayanna Presley, Joy

23 Reid and more; and

24 Whereas, Color Farm Media

25 discovered the "Maxine Shaw Effect"

2 in a study showing 1 out of 3 Black
3 women lawyers surveyed saying that
4 the Maxine Shaw character
5 influenced their decision to attend
6 law school with 8 out of 10 Black
7 females professionals saying,
8 Maxine Shaw inspired them to pursue
9 leadership in male-dominated
10 professions; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:
12 Whereas, Alexander's onscreen
13 career includes numerous
14 appearances and starring roles such
15 as Selma Cotter in the long Walk
16 Home, Ciel in 54, Detective Latoya
17 in Get Out, Perenna in Black
18 Lightning, Shanti in Déjà Vu,
19 Yolanda in Insecure, Constance
20 Irving in Bosch, Linda Diggs in Wu
21 Tang: An American Saga, and Barb
22 Ballard in Run The World, for which
23 she was nominated for the NAACP
24 Image Award for Outstanding Guest
25 Performance; and

2 Whereas, Alexander's
3 television career includes many
4 guest starring spots on Law and
5 Order, Special Victims Unit, ER,
6 CSI, Crime Scene Investigation,
7 Criminal Minds, LAX, 7th Heaven,
8 House, Suits, Grey's Anatomy, Last
9 Man Standing, Swimming with Sharks
10 and a reprisal of her Maxine Shaw
11 character on a 2005 episode of Half
12 & Half; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: And
14 whereas, in 2024 Alexander received
15 numerous plaudits for her role as
16 Coraline opposite Jeffrey Wright in
17 a critically acclaimed American
18 Fiction, being nominated for an
19 Independent Spirit Award and NAACP
20 Image Award for Best Supporting
21 Actress as well as Screen Actors
22 Guild Award for Outstanding
23 Performance by a cast in a Motion
24 Picture, amongst a haul of
25 nominations and awards the film

2 would receive; and

3 Whereas, Alexander's
4 artistic work has extended beyond
5 the big screen, co-authoring
6 several comics and graphic novels,
7 including the critically-acclaimed
8 Concrete Park, and stepping behind
9 the camera to co-direct PBS's The
10 Big Payback in 2023, which served
11 as Alexander's directorial debut;
12 and

13 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

14 Whereas, The Big Payback was
15 produced by Color Farm Media, an
16 award-winning entertainment,
17 innovation and social impact
18 venture, Alexander co-founded with
19 Ben Arnon in 2017 to bring diverse
20 and underrepresented stories to the
21 big screen; and

22 Whereas, in 2020 Color Farm
23 Media released their acclaimed
24 documentary film titled John Lewis:
25 Good Trouble about the late

2 Congressman and civil rights

3 icon --

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: --

6 that won an NAACP Image Award for

7 Best Documentary and was nominated

8 for three Emmy Awards; and

9 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: All

10 right. Whereas, in 2022 Alexander

11 served as the creator, writer,

12 producer and host of Color Farm

13 Media's groundbreaking audio

14 series, Finding Tamika, about a

15 missing Black woman Tamika Huston.

16 The series, produced with Audible,

17 won the prestigious duPont-Columbia

18 Award for excellence in journalism,

19 was Audible's Best True Crime

20 series of the Year, and won a Webby

21 Award; and

22 Whereas, Color Farm's

23 social impact campaign for Finding

24 Tamika, in conjunction with the

25 White House and with Howard

2 University, inspired national media
3 projects and bolstered support for
4 legislative and policy changes to
5 combat "missing white women
6 syndrome." The audio series
7 changed how missing Black women and
8 people of color are seen, looked
9 for and found nationally.

10 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And I
11 want to say I want to thank Jay for
12 cutting this short because there
13 was so much more to do. But
14 whereas, Color Farm Media also
15 created educational curricula based
16 off the Maxine Shaw Effect, in
17 partnership with Microsoft,
18 Discovery Education, Reconstruction
19 and Langston League to teach
20 leadership and communication skills
21 and influence attitudes and beliefs
22 regarding career choices,
23 emphasizing the role of
24 representation in media and
25 creating awareness of legal and

2 leadership careers among middle-
3 school and high-school students;
4 and

5 Whereas, Alexander's
6 commitment to social impact has
7 touched the political realm as
8 well, as she was the most traveled
9 surrogate for Hillary Clinton in
10 2008 and 2016 presidential
11 campaigns to elect the first female
12 U.S. President, which included
13 serving as delegate from California
14 and returning to her hometown of
15 Philadelphia to deliver a speech in
16 2016 at the Democratic National
17 Convention; and

18 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

19 Whereas, Alexander has actively
20 campaigned for Stacey Abrams,
21 Kamala Harris, John Lewis and Joe
22 Biden, among many others at the
23 local and national level; and

24 Whereas, Alexander has
25 testified before the U.S. House of

2 Representative Judiciary Committee
3 on the topic of diversity in
4 America and media representation of
5 people of color, joined State
6 Governor Stacey Abrams in Atlanta
7 for a discussion with the
8 Department of Education as part of
9 the White House Initiative on
10 Racial Equality and has testified
11 on panels in California and
12 Washington D.C. on the topic of
13 reparations, the subject of her
14 project The Big Payback; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
16 Alexander is a sought-after speaker
17 as an expert on topics such as
18 representation in media, power and
19 entrepreneurship in media, women's
20 empowerment, equity and education,
21 mental health, inclusive
22 storytelling for all genre and
23 multi-platforms and political
24 surrogacy, speaking at the 2023
25 American Federation of Teachers

2 Conference on Racial Justice, the
3 2023 National Summit on Poverty,
4 the Geena Davis Institute on Gender
5 Representation, Essence Fest and
6 CBS for Diversity in Entertainment;
7 and

8 Whereas, Alexander is a
9 critical thought leader on racial
10 and gender equity, serving as a
11 board member for One Fair Wage
12 while remaining highly involved
13 with social and racial justice
14 organizations such as The Poor
15 People's Campaign, Color of Change,
16 NAACP, UNCF, Emily's List Creative
17 Council, and is an advisor to
18 Planned Parenthood; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE
20 RICHARDSON: That's what Girls'
21 High girls do, we work.

22 Whereas, in recognition of
23 her service to society, social
24 justice, humanitarianism and social
25 science, Alexander joined the ranks

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 of Dr. Maya Angelou, Phylicia
3 Rashad, Coretta Scott King, Susan
4 Taylor, Ruby Dee and Barbara Bush
5 when she was awarded an Honorary
6 Doctorate from Bennett College in
7 2023 --

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

10 RICHARDSON: -- where she served as
11 the school's commencement speaker
12 that year; and

13 Whereas, in recognition of
14 her service to society, social
15 justice, humanitarianism and social
16 science, Alexander joined those
17 ranks again and again.

18 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

19 Whereas, that same year her
20 birthplace of Winslow, Arizona
21 renamed the street she grew up on
22 as "Erika Alexander Way" in honor
23 of her work and career
24 achievements; and

25 Whereas, Alexander has long

2 been regarded not just as an
3 actress but as an activist
4 storyteller, Afrofuturist,
5 humanitarian, entrepreneur,
6 creator, director and producer
7 whose many talents and commitment
8 to the betterment of humanity have
9 made a lasting mark on the arts for
10 40 years and counting; and
11 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: So I'm
12 bringing it home, right. We're
13 finishing this up. But I just want
14 to let you all know the greatness
15 of Girls' High girls because this
16 is what Girls' High girls can do.
17 So to all the girls that are in our
18 city everything that was mentioned
19 in this resolution, this is
20 something that you can do, this is
21 something that you can become.
22 This is why we renamed the street
23 after her. So when you see her
24 name, you see all the accolades,
25 all the things she's accomplished

2 and you look up and say, I can do
3 that too. So this is exactly why
4 we wanted to do this in City
5 Council.

6 Whereas, growing up in
7 Philadelphia was a key component to
8 the success Alexander has gained
9 throughout the years in
10 entertainment, activism,
11 leadership; and

12 Now, therefore, be it
13 resolved, by the Council of the
14 City of Philadelphia, that Master
15 Street between Broad Street and
16 Carlisle Street shall be named as
17 "Erika Alexander Way" --

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Yes.
20 And be it further resolved, that an
21 Engrossed copy of this Resolution
22 be presented to Erika Alexander as
23 evidence of the true and sincere
24 admiration and respect of this
25 legislative body. Thank you so

2 much for everything you've done.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 The Chair recognizes Ms. Erika

6 Alexander for remarks.

7 MS. ALEXANDER: I'm

8 shaking, and I want to say thank

9 you. I wouldn't be here without

10 friends and family and mentors. So

11 I would like my brother, a

12 Philadelphia police officer, to say

13 a few remarks before I say

14 something.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. ALEXANDER: I won't

17 take up too much of your time, but

18 it would be a disservice if all

19 this here wouldn't have happened if

20 my mother at the age of 14 didn't

21 find her way here singing for the

22 Marian Anderson Award. And we

23 don't know what God has in store

24 for us, but that was the start of

25 finding a city, Philadelphia, which

2 became our family's home base.

3 And you guys have done

4 nothing more but embraced my

5 sister, my family, my daughter

6 Sarai who's part of Little Big

7 Sister who sang here in these halls

8 and my wife Danielle, a native

9 here, and my sister Carla. On

10 behalf of them, I want to say thank

11 you, Philadelphia. Thank you for

12 embracing us. Thank you for our

13 family that had no home making

14 Philadelphia our home.

15 So to the Honorable Carter

16 who is my District Representative

17 of South Philadelphia. Go South

18 Philly --

19 (Johnson.)

20 MR. ALEXANDER: Excuse me,

21 Johnson. Forgive me. Johnson, I'm

22 sorry.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 No, you good.

25 MR. ALEXANDER: I want to

2 thank you all and everyone here
3 once again. God bless you all and
4 thank you very much.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 Thank you.

8 MS. ALEXANDER: Thank you.

10 thanks to Councilman Jeffrey Young,
11 Jr., his staff, and Representative
12 Malcolm Kenyatta for making this
13 glorious moment possible, to New
14 Freedom Theater founders,

16 Robert Lesley, founders, and my
17 teacher Johnny Hobbs, Jr. who
18 planted the seeds of storytelling
19 and being human studies within me.
20 Thank you. Every part I play is a
21 love letter for your innovation and
22 genius in arts and education.
23 Thank you Philadelphia High
24 School for Girls' Class of 231 and
25 the Alumni Association for your

3 needed to take on the challenges

10 mastermind and an innovative
11 architect of new generation of
12 sustainable creators. And thank
13 you to my family, John, a
14 Philadelphia police officer,
15 Carolyn, a Philadelphia social
16 worker, Danielle, a Philadelphia
17 cardiac nurse and community farmer,
18 and my mother Sammie Alexander, who
19 though retired now, served in
20 Philadelphia as a social worker and
21 educator for decades.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. ALEXANDER: My
24 siblings -- thank you -- Myesha,
25 Shalonda, Robert, Diane, my nephew

2 Marlon and my nieces Sarai, Solei,
3 Sianni who created a festival for
4 Philadelphia musicians to find them
5 and elevate them, my greater family

10 and honor. Thank you.

11 I'm humbled yet thrilled by
12 this recognition from Philadelphia,
13 a city that stands for freedom,
14 independence and the power to
15 harness a new future by embracing a
16 government made by and for the
17 people. I'm a storyteller and
18 storytelling is fundamental to how
19 we see ourselves in the world. We
20 are in a storytelling chain all the
21 time and we ignore it to our
22 detriment.

23 Reverend William Barber of
24 The Poor People's Campaign, my
25 mentor, calls this period that

2 we're in the Third Reconstruction.
3 And if that's true, then it's time
4 to push beyond the boundaries that
5 perpetuate white supremacy and
6 tribalism and tell a better story

10 not for the City of Brotherly Love
11 who loves me back.

12 And what that means also is
13 now is the time to continue to
14 rebuild America's foundation as it
15 should have been since the first

19 the architects of America,
20 Philadelphia. You are the
21 architects of the future. Thank
22 you for building so much of your
23 legacy in my DNA. I'll never
24 forget this day, this amazing
25 recognition over my Philly street

3 And I promise you this, for
4 all that I've been given I will do

11 and love be our guide. Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Council will be at ease.

15 (Council at ease.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

17 At this time the Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Majority Leader
19 Gilmore Richardson who will present
20 a resolution recognizing, honoring
21 and celebrating Zeta Phi Beta
22 Sorority, Inc. on the occasion of
23 Zeta Day at City Hall.

24 Would Josie Jones and those
25 accompanying her please join the

2 Councilmember at the podium.

3 (Councilmember and guests
4 approached podium.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

6 RICHARDSON: Thank you so much,
7 Council President Kenyatta Johnson.
8 And while the members of Zeta Phi
9 Beta, Inc. are being assembled
10 along with our brothers of the
11 Sigma Fraternity, Inc., I wanted to
12 take a moment to welcome you all to
13 our sorority party.

14 It is my humble honor and
15 privilege to welcome my finest
16 sorors of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,
17 Inc. to Philadelphia City Council's
18 Zeta Day at City Hall 2024.

19 First, I'd like to thank

23 Social Action Coordinator Josie
24 Jones, we thank you and we welcome
25 you.

21 R. Richardson, my husband, y'all.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

24 RICHARDSON: And with that, we are
25 recognizing honoring and

10 such contributor and we are
11 celebrating our Zeta Day at City
12 Hall today, Thursday, September 26,
13 2024; and

14 Whereas, on January 16,
15 1920, Zeta Phi Beta Sorority was
16 founded on the campus of Howard
17 University in Washington D.C. by
18 Arizona Cleaver Stemons, Pearl Anna
19 Neal, Myrtle Tyler Faithful, Viola
20 Tyler Goings and Fannie Patty
21 Watts; and

22 Whereas, Zeta Phi Beta
23 Sorority was founded on the simple
24 belief that sorority elitism and
25 socializing should not overshadow

2 the real mission of progressive
3 organizations - to address societal
4 mores, ills, prejudices, poverty
5 and health concerns of the day; and

6 Whereas, over the past 104
7 years, members of Zeta Phi Beta
8 Sorority, Inc. have led countless
9 initiatives addressing a variety of
10 crucial issues, including voting
11 rights, affordable health care,
12 financial literacy, economic
13 empowerment and support for
14 historically Black colleges and
15 universities, political awareness
16 and involvement; and

17 Whereas, the ladies of Zeta
18 Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. have come
19 to Philadelphia City Council as a
20 part of our mission to be
21 community-conscious and action-
22 oriented; and

23 Whereas, one of the most
24 important issues impacting Black
25 women today is the disparity in

2 maternal mortality. Black women
3 have historically had the highest
4 maternal mortality rates due to a
5 combination of effects from
6 institutional racism that have
7 resulted in susceptibility to
8 certain health conditions and lack

10 Members of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,
11 Inc. have advocated for continued
12 investments in improving maternal
13 health outcomes just two weeks ago
14 on Capitol Hill with almost 1,000
15 members and in state capitals
16 across the United States of America
17 and now here today in the great
18 city of Philadelphia; and
19 Whereas, one of the most
20 important ways to achieve policy
21 outcomes is to make your voice
22 heard at the ballot box. The
23 ladies of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,
24 Inc. timed our advocacy at City
25 Hall to align with National Voter

2 Registration Day and to raise
3 awareness about the importance of
4 the upcoming election and to
5 promote voter registration.

6 Now, therefore, be it

11 Sorority, Inc. on the occasion of
12 our Zeta Day at City Hall; and

13 Further resolve that an

17 evidence of the sincere sentiments
18 of this legislative body. Thank
19 you so much.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 The Chair recognizes Josie Jones
23 for remarks.

24 MS. JONES: Good morning.

25 (Good morning.)

19 serve our communities with zeal.

17 to be here. Ever since Zeta has
18 embraced me, I have loved what it
19 has stood for because it aligns

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 At this time, the Chair recognizes
21 Councilmember Phillips who will
22 present a resolution honoring and
23 recognizing the Honorable Stephen
24 Kinsey for his exceptional service
25 and leadership as a member of the

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 Pennsylvania House of
3 Representatives from 2013 to 2024,
4 elected to represent the 201st
5 Legislative District in the mighty
6 Northwest part of Philadelphia,
7 Stephen Kinsey proudly served for
8 six terms demonstrating unwavering
9 dedication to his constituents and
10 community.

11 Would Representative Steve
12 Kinsey and those accompanying him
13 please join the podium. Joining
14 Councilmember Phillips will be
15 Councilmember Nina Ahmad,
16 Councilmember Cindy Bass,
17 Councilmember Kendra Brooks,
18 Councilmember Mike Driscoll,
19 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
20 Richardson, Councilmember Nicolas
21 O'Rourke and Councilmember Mark
22 Squilla.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Also,

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 any family or friends or supporters
3 that are here today as well, staff.

4 Well, Council President,
5 they say that imitation is a form
6 of flattery and you're going to see
7 why. I did something -- I'm about
8 to do something that is a flattery
9 to you, so thank you.

10 So before I give some brief
11 remarks, I would like to welcome
12 Councilwoman Cindy Bass just to say
13 a few words about Representative
14 Stephen Kinsey of the 8th District.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
16 morning, everyone. So Steve, you
17 know, he's like a brother. Get
18 over here. You know, listen, Steve
19 and I have had a long storied
20 history in politics in the
21 Northwest section of Philadelphia.
22 And the one thing I just really
23 wanted to say is that, number one,
24 we're going to miss your wit and
25 humor and just general good

3 someone like Steve Kinsey.

4 But I will say that I think
5 sometimes people look at the work
6 that we do and we make it look easy

11 I said as a friend, as someone
12 who's like a sibling to him, you
13 know the highs and you know the
14 lows.

15 And so, we're really going
16 to just miss you and I wish you the

18 endeavors. And I know that you've
19 always been successful so I know
20 that you will be successful. But
21 we're just really going to miss
22 you. All right. So God bless and
23 godspeed in all of your future
24 endeavors and whatever we can do to
25 be helpful as a body, this Council,

2 we love you. Great job. Great
3 job.

4 And the one last thing I'll
5 say really quickly is that Steve, I
6 have a great appreciation for those
7 who put in the work and then run

11 community activist. He was
12 engaged. He knew the people on the
13 ground. Everybody in Germantown
14 knows Steve or is somehow connected
15 to the Kinsey family. And so,
16 that's a testament of the work that
17 he put in, not just in public
18 service as a State Representative
19 but in service to the community
20 long before there was any title.
21 So God bless you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

24 Before we go into the resolution, I
25 just want to briefly say that we've

3 shows you who they are, you believe
4 them. And more often than not,
5 this well-worn quote refers to
6 people in the negative aspects of
7 their personality and character.

8 However, in this instance

11 has shown us who he is and we
12 should believe him. He has shown
13 us the highest virtues of untiring
14 and integrious leadership. He has
15 shown us what it means to be
16 consistently present and when
17 present, to make meaningful

20 reflect their ambitions, hopes and
21 dreams.

22 Representative Kinsey has
23 constantly and perpetually shown us
24 who he is. As a champion of
25 bipartisanship during politically

4 co-found the Bipartisan Caucus in

12 a job well done. Good luck, God
13 bless and keep on keeping on.
14 Enjoy the next phase of your life
15 and continue to show us who you
16 are.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Now,
19 for the beginning of our formal
20 presentation I just want to
21 acknowledge that State
22 Representative Kinsey's office is
23 here, also State Representative-
24 elect Andre Carroll is here and
25 also State Representative Anthony

2 Bellmon is here as well in his
3 honor. And we just want to say
4 thank you all from the Northwest
5 for all that you have done.

6 So the man of the hour.

7 Honoring and recognizing the
8 Honorable Stephen Kinsey for his
9 exceptional service and leadership
10 as a member of the Pennsylvania
11 House of Representatives from 2013
12 to 2024. Elected to represent the
13 21st Legislative District, Stephen
14 Kinsey proudly served for six terms
15 demonstrating unwavering dedication
16 to his constituents and community.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

18 Whereas, a resident of Northwest
19 Philadelphia and a proud product of
20 the Philadelphia public school
21 system, Stephen Kinsey holds a
22 Bachelor of Science Degree from
23 West Chester University, okay, all
24 right, and a Master's in Business
25 Administration from Eastern

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 University. His commitment to
3 education and public service is
4 deeply rooted in his own
5 experiences in education; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

7 Whereas, as a distinguished leader
8 within the Democratic Caucus,
9 Stephen Kinsey served as Chairman
10 of the Pennsylvania Legislative
11 Black Caucus and was a founding
12 Co-Chairman of the House Bipartisan
13 Caucus.

14 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: To my
15 esteemed former colleague, in 2023
16 he was appointed Majority Chairman
17 of the Pennsylvania House Human
18 Services Committee overseeing
19 crucial services related to the
20 Medicaid system and the state's
21 most vulnerable populations; and

22 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Okay.
23 Not here. Okay. Nic is coming up
24 now. Should I go?

25 (Yes.)

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Okay.

3 All right. I'll read it. Got it.

4 Whereas, Stephen Kinsey's

5 dedication to equitable education

6 funding is notable. Driven by his

7 personal understanding of

9 opportunities, he worked tirelessly

10 to ensure that all schools receive

11 fair funding regardless of

12 geographical location or zip code.

13 Amazing.

14 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: His

15 advocacy extended to early

16 childhood education where he hosted

17 rallies at the State Capitol to

18 support funding for children and

19 workers in the childcare industry.

20 And in addition to his legislative

21 achievements, Stephen Kinsey was

22 appointed by former Governor Tom

23 Wolf as a trustee at West Chester

24 University and selected by House

25 Democratic Leadership for the

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Pennsylvania Minority Business

3 Development Authority Board.

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: He is

5 also co-founder of the Northwest

6 Action Alliance, a grassroots

7 community organization and serves

8 as the Vice-president of Government

9 Advocacy and a Director of

10 Community Engagement at CareRing

11 Health; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

13 RICHARDSON: And whereas, Stephen

14 Kinsey is the proud, proud father

15 of Shanessa, Lanessa, may she rest

16 in peace, Wynessa and Mila. He

17 remains actively involved with

18 local schools and community

19 organizations throughout the

20 Northwest Philadelphia area and is

21 an active member of Kappa Alpha Psi

22 Fraternity, Inc., and I'm going to

23 add by way of Kappa Gamma

24 Chapter --

25 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 KINSEY: That's right.

3 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

4 RICHARDSON: -- KG, which provides
5 leadership, training and mentoring
6 to youth across Pennsylvania.

7 Now, therefore, be it;

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

9 Resolved by the Council of the City
10 of Philadelphia extends its deepest
11 appreciation to the Honorable
12 Stephen Kinsey for his remarkable
13 contributions to public service and
14 community leadership. His legacy

24 legislative body.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: All
3 right. So before we have
4 Representative Stephen Kinsey give
5 us some remarks -- I don't think we
6 have time for one more, right?

7 Okay. All right. So real
8 briefly we're just going to have
9 Representative Anthony Bellmon say
10 30 seconds of remarks, and then I'm
11 going to move on to Stephen Kinsey.

12 STATE REPRESENTATIVE
13 BELLMON: All right. I heard the
14 assignment. I will be quick. I'll
15 just say this to the Honorable
16 Stephen Kinsey and a lot of times
17 when people seek public office,
18 they try to live up to the term
19 honorable, to the adjective
20 honorable. And, Stephen Kinsey,
21 you have absolutely done that in
22 your tenure in the Pennsylvania
23 House of Representatives.

24 I want to thank you for --
25 I've known Steve Kinsey for about

17 Driscoll for a motion.

18 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
19 you, Mr. President.

20 I move that the rules of
21 Council be suspended to permit
22 first reading of this day of Bill
23 No. 240674 only.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 9/26/24 - STATED - REPORTS

2 It has been moved and properly
3 seconded that the rules of Council
4 be suspended so as to permit the
5 consideration of Bill No. 240674
6 just read by the Chief Clerk at
7 today's session of Council.

8 All those in favor of the
9 motion will signify by saying aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

15 The ayes have it. The motion
16 carries. And Bill No. 240674 will
17 be placed on our First Reading
18 Calendar for today. Bill No.
19 240304 will be placed on the First
20 Reading Calendar at our next
21 session of Council.

22 The next order of business
23 is the consideration of the
24 Calendar. I note that the bills
25 just reported from committees with

2 the suspension of rules have been
3 deemed to have been read on the
4 first reading. These bills will be

8 As there are no additional

12 for the purpose of calling up bills

16 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

17 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
18 Mr. President.

19 The following bills and

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you. Before considering
9 these bills and resolutions, we
10 will consider public comment as
11 follows: Your public comment must
12 concern matters on the Second
13 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
14 for possible action at today's
15 Council session.

16 All speakers must sign up
17 in order to testify. If you have
18 not already signed up for today's
19 session, please do so now by giving
20 your name to Ms. Hasson at the
21 table outside the rails to my left.
22 Once you have signed up, you will
23 be called in the order in which
24 your name appears on the sign-up
25 sheet.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Under ideal circumstances,
3 public commenters each will have
4 three minutes to speak. However,
5 this time limit may vary from
6 session-to-session due to the
7 volume of individuals participating
8 today. The time limit will be one
9 minute. In order to be fair to all
10 those wishing to speak, I intend to
11 hold faithfully to the one-minute
12 limit.

13 When you begin speaking,
14 you will see a green light on the
15 podium when there are 30 seconds
16 remaining to your time. The light
17 will turn yellow which is your
18 reminder to conclude your remarks.

19 Once one minute has passed,

10 Jamie Walker, Eric Tars and Twyla
11 Nunes-Ueno also make their way to
12 the podium.

13 Representative Andre
14 Carroll.
15 (Witness approached
16 podium.)

17 STATE REPRESENTATIVE
18 CARROLL: Good morning, City
19 Council. For the record, my name
20 is Andre D. Carroll and I am the
21 State Representative-Elect in
22 Legislative House District 201.
23 First, I want to start by thanking
24 Council President. I want to thank
25 Philadelphia City Council. I also

3 Thomas for this opportunity

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
6 Mr. Representative Carroll, could
7 you just give me one second if you

9 STATE REPRESENTATIVE
10 CARROLL: Sure.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
13 Quetcy Lozada.

14 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
15 you, Council President. My
16 apologies, Rep-Elect.

17 I'd like to excuse myself
18 from session and I'd like to be
19 marked aye on all bills and
20 resolutions.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 Excuse is granted. Thank you very
23 much.

24 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
25 you.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Representative-Elect Andre Carroll.

5 You can proceed, sir.

6 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

7 CARROLL: Thank you so much,

8 Council President. Again, my name

9 is Andre D. Carroll, State

10 Representative-Elect for House

11 District 201. Again, I want to

12 thank Philadelphia City Council.

13 Thank you, Council President, and

14 also thank you, Councilmember

15 Isaiah Thomas, for this

16 opportunity. I would also like to

17 take the opportunity to

18 congratulate my future colleague

19 Keith Harris for also winning his

20 special election last Tuesday,

21 September 17th.

22 I want to start by saying

23 33 years ago there was a baby born

24 to a mother who was battling with

25 substance abuse and a father who

2 would later go on to spend 95
3 percent of his life in prison. I
4 was raised by my grandmother and I
5 want to give honor to my
6 grandmother today because without
7 her grace I don't stand before you
8 today with this opportunity.

9 The journey to this moment
10 has been long. It's been 10 years
11 and it includes the opportunity to
12 work in the Philadelphia City
13 Controller's Office, also serving
14 in the Senatory District Office of
15 Anthony Hardy Williams. So I want
16 to give great honor to Controller
17 Rebecca Rhynhart and Allen
18 Butkovich for the opportunity to
19 serve in their office.

20 Before ever serving in
21 office, I met a gentleman by the
22 name of Isaiah Thomas who at that
23 point wasn't a City Councilmember.
24 He, in fact, at that time was an
25 educator, a mentor and a coach.

2 And I want to thank him for this
3 moment because it's his investment
4 into young men all across the city
5 that produces opportunities like
6 this one.

7 Also, I want to say that
8 the best that America has to offer
9 is what I keep in mind. As I
10 embark on this journey as the next
11 State Representative, I think about
12 the things that unite us versus the
13 things that divide us versus the
14 investment in education, housing or
15 health care. We must understand
16 that we are working in
17 collaboration and sometimes we will
18 disagree and that's absolutely
19 fine.

20 I promise as I embark on
21 this journey to give the best of my
22 ability and the best that I can.
23 On Monday in Harrisburg, Pa I will
24 be inaugurated as the second openly
25 Black gay man to serve in the House

2 of Representatives in Pennsylvania.

3 (Applause.)

4 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

5 CARROLL: While I take this
6 opportunity with great honor, it is
7 above identity that I will have
8 opportunity to serve in this
9 position. I will get a chance to
10 serve the great community members
11 in Germantown, West Oak Lane and
12 Logan. So again, I want to yield
13 back to Philadelphia City Council.
14 I want to thank you for this
15 opportunity and I look forward to
16 serving with you all together.
17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 Thank you.

21 CHIEF CLERK: May Jamie
22 Walker, Eric Tars, Twyla Nunes-Ueno
23 and Kenny Arpels-Josiah.

24 (Witnesses approached
25 podium.)

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. WALKER: My name is
3 Jamie Walker and I work in the
4 community to get involved and make
5 positive changes. I'm here to
6 support the idea that housing is a
7 basic human right and to talk about
8 the problems with the recent sweeps
9 in Kensington. These sweeps are
10 cruel and don't solve the issues.
11 People are homeless, mentally ill
12 or addicted to drugs, need help,
13 not punishment. Locking them up is
14 not the answer.

15 A tragic example is Amanda
16 Cahill who died in jail after a
17 Kensington sweep. Amanda was a
18 kind, caring person who struggled
19 with addiction. She had dreams and
20 hopes like all of us. She was a
21 mother, a daughter, a sister and a
22 friend. Her family is now left to
23 mourn her loss, a loss that could
24 have been prevented with proper
25 care and support.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 She was arrested for drug
3 possession and didn't get the
4 medical care she needed. Our jails
5 are not equipped to handle people
6 going through withdrawal and they
7 are already short-staffed. Studies
8 have shown these sweeps are not
9 effective in the long term. For
10 instance, after a sweep the area
11 might look clean for a short time
12 but people often return because the
13 root causes of homelessness are not
14 addressed.

15 Amanda's death shows that
16 we need to change how we deal with
17 addiction and mental health and we
18 should provide stable housing,
19 medical care and support service.
20 Housing is a basic human right and
21 it's the first step to helping
22 people recover and get back on
23 their feet. These issues don't
24 just affect individuals. They
25 impact entire families, communities

2 when we fail to provide proper care
3 and support.

4 We tear families apart and
5 create more suffering. We need to
6 think about the children, parents
7 and loved ones who are affected by
8 these policies. I urge Council to
9 focus on treating addiction and
10 mental illness as issues not
11 crimes. Let's work together to
12 make our city a place where
13 everyone can live with dignity and
14 get the help they need. Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. TARS: Good morning.
17 My name is Eric Tars and I serve as
18 the Senior Policy Director at the
19 National Homelessness Law Center
20 where I helped to organize the
21 national support for Gloria Johnson
22 and her fellow homeless plaintiffs
23 in the Johnson versus Grants Pass
24 case at the Supreme Court. And I'm
25 also a proud Philadelphia resident.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 In short, despite
3 widespread understanding that
4 everybody needs a safe place to
5 sleep, the Supreme Court and a
6 shameful ruling in the tradition of
7 Plessy versus Ferguson and
8 Korematsu versus the United States
9 excluded homeless people from the
10 Constitution's protections against
11 cruel and unusual punishment,
12 giving cities a green light to
13 segregate desperately Black and
14 Brown, LGBTQ+ and disabled
15 population and ticket and arrest
16 them for surviving outside even if
17 there's no safe indoor place for
18 them to be.

19 Councilmember Brooks'
20 resolution makes clear, throwing
21 homeless people in jail or finding
22 them makes homelessness worse and
23 just because cities can do this,
24 does not mean that they should.
25 Council must pass this resolution

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 as a first step to take a stand
3 against the Court's ruling and then
4 must continue to do the right thing
5 and focus on housing, not
6 handcuffs, services not sweeps as a
7 proven solution to homelessness.
8 Please support Resolution 240764.
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: We have Twyla
12 Nunes-Ueno. May Kenny Arpels-
13 Josiah, Kayden Hujack and Zemia
14 Brandon also make their way to the
15 podium.

16 (Witnesses approached
17 podium.)

18 MS. NUNES-UENO: Hi. My
19 name is Twyla Nunes-Ueno and today
20 I'm here to testify for Clara
21 Hensley who worked on Resolution
22 No. 240766 with Fridays for Future.
23 She wasn't able to be here today
24 because of the rescheduling of the
25 Council session. I'm sure I don't

2 need to stand here and explain to
3 you all how catastrophic the
4 climate crisis is becoming to
5 everyone. We all know that and yet
6 we still aren't doing enough about
7 it. We are still going in the
8 wrong direction.

9 As a student, a climate
10 activist and a 17-year-old, I'm
11 terrified of my own future, not
12 because of college or choices ahead
13 of me, but because of the inaction
14 from governments and the
15 generations before me. It's
16 undeniable by science that coal,
17 oil and gas are all carbon bombs.
18 All of these fossil fuel-driven
19 sources of energy are the root of
20 the climate crisis, the root that
21 is hurting and destroying
22 communities right now. Not in 5,
23 10, 20 years right now.

24 Today on your agenda is a
25 resolution endorsing the call for a

2 Fossil Fuel Nonproliferation Treaty
3 urging the federal government to
4 support this initiative by entering
5 into treaty discussions and
6 committing the City to prioritizing
7 a fair and equitable clean energy
8 transition. Irreversible damage
9 has been done, but we can still
10 save the earth.

11 We need to reach net zero
12 carbon emissions by 2050, but this
13 can't be done without holding
14 fossil fuel producers accountable.
15 We need a just equitable fossil
16 fuel phase-out and we need it to
17 start now. Clara worked heavily on
18 creating and advocating for this
19 and she's sorry that she couldn't
20 be here today. But regardless,
21 please think of the young people in
22 your life. That's all. Thank you
23 so much.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. ARPELS-JOSIAH: Hi. My

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 name is Keanu Arpels-Josiah. I'm a
3 19-year-old climate justice
4 organizer and today I speak on
5 behalf of Fridays for Future USA in
6 support of Fridays for Future
7 Philly and Councilmember O'Rourke's
8 Resolution 240766 in support of the
9 Fossil Fuel on Nonproliferation
10 Treaty.

11 Last year I was at the U.N.
12 climate negotiations known as the
13 Conference of Parties or COP in
14 Dubai. For 28 years of
15 negotiations, the COP had failed to
16 even mention the words fossil
17 fuels, responsible for 92 percent
18 of our emissions. For 28 years of
19 negotiations, the COP failed to
20 mention the very thing destroying
21 our future, flooding our schools,
22 bringing us deadly heat and
23 fastening and worsening deadly
24 extreme weather.

25 Tearing apart our community

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 for 28 years, the global south and
3 island nations have demanded action
4 and for 28 years countries like
5 ours and the global north have said
6 no. In a world where 46.9 million
7 people were displaced from the
8 climate crisis just last year in a
9 country where we continue to be the
10 largest expander of fossil fuel
11 infrastructure, in a region where
12 our sky was orange from wildfire
13 smoke just last June and in a city
14 where this past summer was the
15 hottest in a history and yet the
16 coolest one for the rest of our
17 generation's lives, we must
18 recognize the need for action.

19 Our generation is screaming
20 out for our future. The global
21 south and folks across the country
22 are calling out for their survival.
23 That's why it's so critical this
24 resolution is on the calendar
25 today. We must have a just,

2 equitable and immediate phase-out
3 of fossil fuels to clean and
4 community-driven renewable energy
5 and that must begin with stopping
6 the expansion of new fossil fuel
7 infrastructure. That's what the
8 Fossil Fuel Nonproliferation Treaty
9 is all about. It's what science
10 nearly unanimously calls for. So
11 we can't wait for Philly to join
12 cities around the country and
13 calling for this resolution.
14 (Applause.)
15 MS. HUJACK: Hi. My name
16 is Kayden Hujack. And I'm here to
17 condemn the Supreme Court's
18 decision to allow the
19 criminalization of homelessness and
20 instead I'm here to advocate that
21 the City provide adequate services
22 for these individuals instead of
23 throwing them in an institution to
24 be abused, neglected and in some
25 case have their lives taken.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The City's inherent evil to
3 attack our most vulnerable
4 populations will only add
5 additional trauma resulting in the
6 likelihood of reoffending. This
7 will lead to even more homelessness
8 on the streets exactly the opposite
9 of Cherelle's plan. It is apparent
10 with these types of reactionary
11 beliefs in play that the City
12 officials do not consider homeless
13 people, people below the poverty
14 line or substance abusers as actual
15 humans and are indeed to them
16 indisposible.

17 Take my cousin Amanda
18 Cahill, for example, whose life was
19 just taken due to these types of
20 initiatives. Amanda was picked up
21 on the 4th of September sweep
22 initiated by Cherelle Parker. And
23 due to these inhumane decisions,
24 they threw my cousin in a jail that
25 was, in fact, not prepared for the

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 influx of substance users and
3 homeless people that they said they
4 were prepared for.

5 The streets of Kensington
6 did not take my cousin. Actually
7 she survived them. The PDP and the
8 staff at PICC did as well as
9 Cherelle and her insistent need to
10 attack the most vulnerable. Not
11 only is throwing homeless
12 individuals in jail inhumane, this
13 led to the death of Amanda which
14 proves and wins the fight that
15 myself and other harm reductionists
16 have been trying to make, this
17 doesn't work.

18 If this is going to be the
19 initiative, then maybe instead of
20 deploying more officers in the
21 streets of Kensington, the plan
22 should be adequately staffing her
23 jails making sure that the medical
24 professionals are on deck and
25 correctional officers are properly

2 educated on how to keep these

3 people safe.

4 Unfortunately, that wasn't

5 the case with my cousin. But this

6 is why I am here, to make sure that

7 this doesn't happen to anyone else,

8 although it did a week later. The

9 victim's name was Michael McKinnis,

10 another individual who was left

11 unsupervised all night. The system

12 learned nothing and failed yet

13 another person.

14 I, Kayden Hujack, the

15 cousin of Amanda Cahill condemns

16 Grants Pass versus Johnson --

17 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Your

18 time is up --

19 MS. HUJACK: No, I'm

20 (inaudible)...

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 (Gestured).

23 MS. HUJACK: The further we

24 neglect to treat these people like

25 human beings, the problems will

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 only maximize until their death,
3 which will more than likely happen
4 due to resolutions like these being
5 ignored. I, Kayden Hujack, the
6 cousin of Amanda Cahill condemns
7 the Grants Pass versus Johnson and
8 I'm screaming justice for my cousin
9 Amanda, who the PDP couldn't even
10 bother to get a gurney for and
11 dragged her out in a body bag
12 allegedly.

13 Amanda, you deserve better
14 and I hope your death at least
15 instills much-needed change and
16 eradicates these God-awful beliefs
17 before somebody else is in the bag
18 next. Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: We have
21 Zemoria Brandon. May Sarah Pierre-
22 Louise, Rayya El Zein and Kate
23 Perez also make their way to the
24 podium.

25 (Witnesses approached

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 REVEREND BRANDON:

4 Greetings, Council President

5 Kenyatta Johnson and other

6 Councilmembers. My name is

7 Reverend Zemoria Brandon. I serve

8 as the Administrator Social Worker

9 for the Philadelphia/Delaware

10 Valley Chapter of the Sickle Cell

11 Disease Association of America, a

12 community-based organization

13 established over 42 years ago to

14 meet the needs across the life span

15 for children, adolescents, adults

16 and families living with sickle

17 cell disease through the following

18 services: Roundtrip

19 transportation, newborn screening

20 follow-up, case management,

21 supportive services and referrals,

22 patient parent support groups,

23 multi-cultural initiative, advocacy

24 support, single gene genetic

25 counseling and education.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 This morning we offer our
3 support of the Brooks' honorary
4 resolution introduced by
5 Councilmember At-large Kendra
6 Brooks in recognition of our
7 organization and her leadership,
8 commitment and advocacy along with
9 other Councilmembers who have
10 supported our funding requests over
11 the past two years of \$100,000.

12 We appreciate your
13 continued interest in the Sickle
14 Cell Disease Association of America
15 Philadelphia/Delaware Valley
16 Chapter. However, in closing it is
17 our hope that this year's Cultural
18 Fund will provide a funding
19 opportunity for our agency to
20 continue shining a light on sickle
21 cell by building on our 42-year
22 history of providing supportive
23 services and honoring our mission
24 of improving the quality of life
25 across the life span for children,

2 adolescents, adults and families
3 living with Sickle Cell Disease and
4 sickle cell trait, may it be so.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Thank you.

8 MS. PIERRE-LOUIS: Good
9 morning. My name is Sarah Pierre-
10 Louis and I'm the Community Health
11 Worker for the Sickle Cell Disease
12 Association Philadelphia/Delaware
13 Chapter -- all right. So I'm the
14 Community Health Worker for the
15 Sickle Cell Disease Association of
16 America, the Philadelphia/Delaware
17 Valley Chapter, and I'm also one of
18 the people in the Philadelphia area
19 living with Sickle Cell Disease.

20 The impact of Sickle Cell
21 Disease on an individual as well as
22 a family can be devastating. And
23 while many of you may know what
24 sickle cell is, each experience is
25 unique. As a child this disease

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 has kept me in the hospital, out of
3 school and affected my family who
4 have always supported me. But what
5 got me to where I am now is the
6 help from my amazing support
7 systems of medical professionals,
8 social workers, camps and
9 organizations like this one.

10 Now, as an adult through
11 this organization I am able to
12 assist with raising awareness,
13 providing much-needed support
14 services such as transportation and
15 financial services as well as
16 advocating for health care for
17 those living with sickle cell
18 disease. I thank you for all the
19 support from the Cultural funds
20 that we received in the past and
21 for your much appreciated support
22 going forward. Thank you for your
23 time.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 CHIEF CLERK: We have Rayya
4 El Zein, Kate Perez and may Teresa
5 Duncan also make their way to the
6 podium.

7 (Witnesses approached
8 podium.)

9 MS. EL ZEIN: Hello. I
10 have letters for Council. I'm here
11 to speak against amendments to Bill
12 240242. Business should not
13 continue as usual during a
14 genocide. We, the people of
15 Philadelphia -- we, the people of
16 Philadelphia, stand against our
17 country's complicity in Israel's
18 ongoing genocide of Palestinians.
19 We condemn our federal and state
20 taxes funding the war machine while
21 our own public schools are so
22 underresourced.

23 We call on City Council to
24 pass a resolution for, one, an
25 unconditional permanent and

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 enforceable ceasefire in Gaza; two,
3 an immediate arms embargo of
4 Israel; three, divestment from
5 Israeli companies and companies
6 complicit with the occupation like
7 Energix; four, protecting the
8 rights of students, teachers and
9 workers of Philadelphia to speak
10 against genocide and war crimes in
11 Palestine, Sudan, Congo, Haiti and
12 elsewhere.

13 Over the past year in
14 Palestine, Israel has killed more
15 than 200,000 people, detained
16 10,000 hostages and 80,000 people
17 are missing. This week Israeli air
18 strikes killed almost 600 people in
19 just one day.

20 In our city, weapons
21 manufacturers Day & Zimmerman,
22 Leonardo and Ghost Robotics are
23 selling directly to Israeli forces.
24 We, the people of Philadelphia, say
25 enough of the war machine. It is

2 morally imperative that the City
3 Council pass the resolution calling
4 for, one, an unconditional,
5 permanent and enforceable ceasefire
6 in Gaza.

7 Two, an immediate arms
8 embargo against Israel; three,
9 divestment from Israeli companies
10 and companies complicit with the
11 occupation like Energix; four,
12 protecting the rights of students,
13 teachers and workers of
14 Philadelphia to speak against
15 genocide and war crimes in
16 Palestine, Sudan, Congo, Haiti and
17 elsewhere.

18 We are tired of watching
19 our families get torn apart. There
20 should be no business as usual
21 during a genocide. Cease fire now.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
23 Will the Clerk please call the next
24 speaker.

25 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: May Kate

4 Perez make their way to the podium.

5 (Witness approached

7 (Cease fire now.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: May Teresa

10 their way to the podium. Teresa

11 Duncan and Amy Eusebio.

12 (Cease fire now.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Ms. Perez, you can begin your

15 speech or do you want to defer to

16 your team?

17 MS. PEREZ: Cease fire now.

18 (Witness approached

19 podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 Please begin.

22 (Cease fire now.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Please begin, sir, your testimony.

25 MS. JOHNSON DUNCAN: Good

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 morning, President Johnson and the
3 illustrious City Council and
4 citizens of Philadelphia. My name
5 is Teresa Johnson Duncan. I'm the
6 Director of the Center for
7 Leadership Development and
8 Advocacy, and I'm representing one
9 of our signature programs today,
10 the Fresh Bottoms Diaper Bank.

11 Diaper Bank is defined as
12 the lack of a sufficient supply of
13 diapers to keep an infant or a
14 child clean, dry and healthy. And
15 in Philadelphia, many families
16 struggle to afford this basic
17 necessity. Diapers are not covered
18 by any federal assistance program
19 such as SNAP, TANF or WIC. And
20 many daycare agencies require
21 parents to provide diapers for
22 their children. Some children with
23 disabilities never outgrow the need
24 for diapers.

25 The consequences of diaper

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 need are far-reaching without an
3 adequate supply, severe diaper
4 rashes and infections apparent to
5 take a child to the emergency room
6 over and over again. Parents may
7 miss work or even school because
8 they cannot leave their children at
9 a day care. This creates a cycle
10 of economic hardship and stress for
11 families who are already facing
12 financial challenges.

13 During this week I urge you
14 to consider helping Fresh Bottoms
15 and other Diaper Banks. We are
16 being featured at the PECO Crown
17 Lights tonight, the 28th and the
18 29th, and we look for your support.
19 Fresh Bottoms has been helping many
20 of the Councilpeople here. We
21 thank you for your support. We
22 will show up at your baby showers
23 and we are available for you.
24 Remember, a clean diaper builds
25 character. Thank you for your

2 time.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Thank you.

6 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez,

7 240247. We know of three weapons

8 manufacturers in your districts.

9 Non-conformities means that these

10 businesses no longer comply with

11 City standards. Our conventional

12 arms transfer policy state that the

13 United States cannot transfer

14 weapons when it's more likely than

15 not to be used in violations of the

16 Geneva Conventions or other severe

17 human rights violations of which

18 Israel has already been found

19 guilty of multiple in the

20 International Court of Justice, and

21 especially considering their recent

22 escalations in Lebanon, Yemen, Iraq

23 and Syria.

24 Companies in our city that

25 continue to sell weapons to the

2 Israeli occupation violate the
3 (inaudible) Assistance Act of 1961
4 and the Arms Export Control Act.
5 U.S. soldiers are now on the ground
6 to evacuate in Lebanon as Israel
7 aims for a regional war. You can
8 pass a resolution calling on
9 Congress to support the Sanders
10 joint resolutions of disapproval to
11 halt this next wave of arm sales to
12 Israel.
13 (Inaudible) are
14 non-conformities and detrimental to
15 the city. Pending an end to
16 Israel's occupation, third
17 (inaudible) states must immediately
18 stop all forms of aid or assistance
19 that help maintain the unlawful
20 occupation, including halting arms
21 transfers and ceasing all trade
22 with illegal settlements.
23 We want an arms transfer.
24 We want to cease fire. Free
25 Palestine.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Amy Eusebio.

4 May Rasheed Milledge, Paul Birdsong
5 and Kareem Price, also make their
6 way to the podium.

7 (Witnesses approached
8 podium.)

9 MS. EUSEBIO: Good
10 afternoon, Councilmembers. My name
11 is Amy Eusebio and I serve as the
12 Executive Director of the City of
13 Philadelphia Office of Immigrant
14 Affairs. I'm here today to comment
15 in favor of the Welcoming Week
16 resolution introduced by
17 Councilmember Nina Ahmad. And I
18 want to just share a little bit for
19 those who don't know the Office of
20 Immigrant Affairs, we are a
21 permanent City office with a
22 mission to promote the well-being
23 of immigrants, refugees and asylees
24 in the city of Philadelphia.

25 And we do this by promoting

2 policies and programs that
3 facilitate their successful
4 inclusion into the City's civic,
5 economic and cultural life. And
6 so, today I am here to celebrate
7 our 12th Annual Welcoming Week, and
8 it is part of a national program
9 initiative led by a nonprofit
10 called Welcoming America that
11 really has a goal of creating a
12 sense of belonging and inclusion
13 for all of our City's residents,
14 including the foreign born.

15 Just want to comment
16 briefly on some of the featured
17 events over the last couple of
18 weeks, including an art exhibit at
19 the Free Library called Belonging
20 that's on display until October
21 1st. Several flag-raising
22 ceremonies, a job fair yesterday,
23 many wonderful events.

24 And so, I just want to
25 thank the support of City Council

2 for supporting immigrants, refugees
3 and asylees in the city of
4 Philadelphia and for celebrating
5 Welcoming Week. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
8 You're welcome.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Rasheed
10 Milledge, Paul Birdsong, Kareem
11 Price and John Geeting also make
12 their way to the podium.

13 (Witnesses approached
14 podium.)

15 MR. BIRDSONG: My name is
16 Paul Birdsong. In reference to
17 Resolution 240724 regarding
18 merchants facilitating illegal
19 activities that negatively impact
20 our communities, I'm puzzled as to
21 how the law enforcement community
22 in Philly who due to an archaic
23 forensics lab, poor community
24 support and unused or inoperable
25 cameras citywide who under the

2 direction, yet without the support
3 of Mayor Cherelle Parker, who can't
4 tackle larger tasks such as the
5 overwhelming epidemic of gun
6 violence accompanied by 2,000-plus
7 unsolved murder cases, plans on or
8 has the resources to take on this
9 task.

10 City Council, you have
11 given Mayor Cherelle Parker all the
12 support she needs to give us
13 community support. You've given
14 her all the support she needs to
15 give us cameras and a forensics
16 lab. We no longer look to you for
17 the solution rather camaraderie and
18 putting pressure on our Mayor to
19 prioritize Philadelphia's safety.
20 And until she does, every victim
21 who possibly could have been
22 prevented by a decision it is on
23 her to make is on her hands. I
24 repeat their blood is on her hands.

25 Also, President Kenyatta

2 Johnson, just a question and you
3 ain't got to answer me straight up
4 right here, but I've noticed that
5 there is a lot more priority in
6 putting time on all the ceremonial
7 things than the ability of the
8 public to come testify. I wonder
9 why that is when this whole thing
10 is about making this city a better
11 city for these people. All power
12 to the people.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Kareem Price,
15 John Geeting, Andrea Rogers,
16 Victoria King, make their way to
17 the podium.

18 (Witnesses approached
19 podium.)

20 MR. ROGERS: Good morning.
21 My name is Andrea Rogers and I
22 serve as Executive Director for
23 Starfinder Foundation. I'm in
24 support of Councilmember Rue
25 Landau's Resolution 240757, calling

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 on the School District to expand
3 SEPTA student fare passes to all
4 students for usage at all times
5 regardless of the residential
6 distance from schools.

7 So Starfinder, my
8 organization, is a sports-based
9 youth development organization that
10 engages youth in health and
11 physical fitness, social emotional
12 wellness and an ability to focus on
13 the future from neighborhoods all
14 over Philadelphia. So we see kids
15 from over 50 schools in the city
16 and we engage them through deep
17 programs, supportive mentorship and
18 a tight-knit community, and our
19 foundational belief is that all
20 youth deserve to learn, grow and
21 thrive.

22 So while we serve PreK
23 through high school, our key
24 program is our high school program
25 which is an afterschool and

2 summertime program that they come
3 to us and we know that students
4 that participate in afterschool and
5 weekend and summer programs are
6 less likely to engage in risky
7 behaviors, engage in adverse
8 relationships, interpersonal
9 relationships and they have the
10 ability to succeed.

11 So among so many other
12 barriers in the city that limit
13 opportunity for our youth to
14 optimize their potential, a key
15 barrier that is prohibitive are the
16 costs of transportation or
17 difficulty navigating
18 transportation within a limited set
19 of rules.

20 I am hopeful that this
21 measure will help lift that barrier
22 for youth and their families and
23 lead to increased access to
24 opportunities that will empower
25 young people and allow them to

2 explore their talents and promote
3 increasing their options in the
4 future. Thank you, Councilmember
5 Landau, and thank you to your
6 colleagues. I look forward to
7 seeing this resolution passed.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 You're welcome.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Victoria
12 King, Connor Descheemaker, Cymbol
13 Lai, MaCherie Dunbar.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 MR. DESCHEEMAKER: All
17 right. Hello there. My name is
18 Connor Descheemaker. I am the
19 Coalition member for Transit Board
20 Philadelphia speaking in support of
21 Councilmember Landau's Resolution
22 240757. I've got printed letters
23 from two folks who could not be
24 here today, Rebecca Fabiano from
25 Fab Youth Philly as well as a

2 student Aumi Long.

3 I want to thank several

4 members of Council, Councilmember

5 Phillips and staff, Councilmember

6 Landau, in particular Molly,

7 Councilmember O'Rourke and Staff

8 member Kate, Councilmember Brooks

9 and Staff member Eric,

10 Councilmember Thomas and Staff

11 member Ben. We're all here in

12 support of expanding student fares

13 because this is putting us in

14 alignment with cities across the

15 country, including most recently

16 New York, who are expanding

17 transportation access for youth.

18 We have received a ton of

19 digital support, this is a

20 no-brainer, for enhanced

21 independence, improved connection

22 to community and youth engagement,

23 more ridership for SEPTA and

24 support for our youth and families.

25 This is an incredible opportunity

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and I'm really excited to see the
3 momentum for this. Let's get it
4 funded and let's get it
5 implemented. Thank you so much for
6 your time.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Thank you.

10 MS. LAI: Good morning. My
11 name is Cymbol Lai. I'm -- fine.
12 Okay. Got it. I'm testifying
13 today in support of the resolution
14 authorizing a joint hearing on the
15 use of electronic monitoring for
16 GPS for youth involved in
17 Philadelphia's juvenile justice
18 system.

19 First of all, I'd like to
20 thank Councilmember Phillips and
21 Councilmember Landau for
22 introducing this resolution. We
23 and many of our partners have been
24 working on this problem for years
25 so thank you very much.

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Philadelphia has seen an overall
3 decrease in the spending on youth
4 involved in the criminal justice
5 system and a decrease in overall
6 numbers of youth incarceration
7 since 2016.

8 At the same time, we've
9 seen an increase in reliance on
10 electronic monitoring in FY2017.
11 We had 1500 youth on GPS
12 surveillance. In FY2023 we have
13 around 1,700. More and more the
14 City has used GPS as an alternative
15 to youth detention. While we may
16 think that GPS is better than being
17 confined, we've heard stories from
18 young people challenging that
19 assumption. So youth tell us about
20 how they can't go to their programs
21 and job trainings or therapy
22 sessions that are court-mandated
23 because they risk violations.

24 We've heard of youth
25 getting violations because they

2 stopped off at a store to get a
3 sandwich and they stayed there too
4 long. We've heard stories about
5 youth who can't in the middle of
6 summer sit out on their porch
7 because if they do, they're going
8 to get a violation so they sit at
9 home and they bake.

10 So these stories and the
11 cost of using monitoring and
12 maintaining the GPS system is
13 increasing are reasons why we find
14 that the hearing is very, very,
15 very important. We want to know
16 what we're doing, why we're doing
17 it and whether or not this tool has
18 its intended effect.

19 So again, we've been
20 working alongside partners of this
21 problem for years. We hope that
22 these hearings uplift the
23 experiences of young people who
24 have gone through a DPS monitoring
25 so that Philadelphia can develop a

2 better, more holistic, more
3 rehabilitative strategy for youth.
4 Thank you for your time.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: MaCherie
7 Dunbar. May Michael Felker,
8 Michelle Smith and Sterling Johnson
9 also make their way to the podium.

10 (Witnesses approached
11 podium.)

12 MS. DUNBAR: Good
13 afternoon, Council President,
14 ranking members and esteemed
15 members of Council. My name is
16 Mashare Dunbar. I'm a retired Air
17 Force combat veteran, an out
18 lesbian who served during Don't
19 Ask, Don't Tell.

20 I'm here today as a member
21 of the Board of Directors
22 representing the Veterans Multi-
23 service Center known as VMC, an
24 organization proudly supporting
25 veterans of all backgrounds and

2 experiences, including those like
3 myself who faced discrimination
4 during their military service due
5 to the now repealed Don't Ask,
6 Don't Tell policy.

7 First and foremost, we want
8 to thank Councilmember Rue Landau
9 for introducing this resolution
10 which honors the anniversary of the
11 repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell.
12 It acknowledges the immense
13 sacrifices made by LGBTQ+ veterans.
14 For too long the bad paper
15 discharge is given to over 13,000
16 service members between 1994 and
17 2011, have blocked them from basic
18 resources like VA health care, home
19 loan guarantees, education
20 benefits, all critical components
21 of successful transition from
22 military service.

23 At the VMC, we see
24 firsthand the impact of these
25 denials, creating challenges due to

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 mental health and physical health
3 conditions, housing insecurity and
4 a lack of access to essential
5 support services. These challenges
6 are compounded for LGBTQ+ veterans
7 who suffered additional mental,
8 emotional and systemic trauma
9 simply for being ourselves.

10 Most of those discharged
11 under Don't Ask, Don't Tell still
12 have not come forward to seek their
13 earned benefits and discharge
14 upgrades. Supporting this
15 resolution honoring the repeal of
16 Don't Ask, Don't Tell makes a
17 declarative statement that says we
18 see you, we honor you, we support
19 you. Philadelphia can be a leader
20 in ensuring that every LGBTQ+
21 veteran and our community feels
22 welcome and is aware of the steps
23 that they can take to restore their
24 benefits.

25 VMC is committed to working

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 alongside the City to make this
3 happen. We ask this Council to
4 continue standing with LGBTQ+
5 veterans not just in words but in
6 action. Pass this resolution and
7 let's work together to ensure that
8 their service is honored and that
9 the injustices of the past do not
10 define their future. Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 MR. SMITH: Council
13 President and Councilmembers. My
14 name is Michal Smith. I'm the
15 Executive Director of Cradles to
16 Crayons Philadelphia. Thank you
17 for hearing me today. Cradles to
18 Crayons is the largest national
19 nonprofit with children's clothing
20 insecure at the core of our
21 mission.

22 There are no federal and
23 few state-based programs that cover
24 this essential critical items like
25 shoes, coats and clothing. Cradles

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to Crayons closes those gaps that 3
3 in 5 children in Greater
4 Philadelphia face by providing
5 packages of clothing and essential
6 items to kids living in low income
7 and homeless situations.

8 Since we opened our doors
9 here in 2006, we've provided 1.5
10 million packages of clothing and
11 essentials to kids in the region by
12 helping 200 human services agencies
13 in Philadelphia. This year we'll
14 distribute 300,000 packages. But
15 the reason I'm here today is to
16 talk about diaper need. 1 in 2
17 families in Philadelphia face
18 diaper need annually.

19 When families go without an
20 adequate supply of diapers, they
21 risk diaper rashes and infection
22 and it's really critical that we
23 fund this. More importantly, when
24 a family doesn't have diapers, they
25 don't go to work and miss an

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 average of 5.1 days of work a
3 month. That's why we've provided 8
4 million diapers in America and 3
5 million diapers here in
6 Philadelphia and today we're
7 distributing 780,000 out of East
8 Falls giving factory warehouse
9 today.

10 Thank you for your help
11 with this. Thank you for the
12 recognition of national Diaper
13 Needs Awareness Week and thank you,
14 Councilman Rue Landau, for
15 supporting this today. Diaper need
16 is vital for kids in our region.
17 Please help us. Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Sterling
20 Johnson, Byron Golson, Lynn Landes
21 and Jeremy Blatstein also make
22 their way to the podium.

23 (Witnesses approached
24 podium.)

25 MR. FELKER: My name is

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Mike Felker. I want to thank
3 Councilmember Landau for her
4 resolution on the repeal of Don't
5 Ask, Don't Tell and recognition of
6 LGBTQ+ veterans. I was a U.S. Navy
7 Hospital Corpsman, who served as a
8 combat medic with the Marines in
9 Vietnam in 1970.

10 It is important that my
11 fellow gay veterans, we who have
12 served and sacrificed for our
13 country, be given access to the
14 benefits they have earned and
15 deserve, including VA medical care,
16 home loans and the GI bill. Thank
17 you.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. JOHNSON: Hello. My
20 name is Sterling Johnson. I'm from
21 Philadelphia Community Land Trust
22 in Philadelphia Housing Action.
23 I'm here to support Councilperson
24 Brooks' Resolution 240764
25 condemning the Grants Pass decision

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 from the Supreme Court. First, I
3 don't want to forget this, the
4 reason that we're here is to
5 support families, mostly Black and
6 Latinx families and my organizing.

7 I'm going to shout out
8 justice for the Mitchell children
9 which comes from the experience of
10 Janie Mitchell which is one of our
11 organizers here with us. We're
12 fighting to keep people together
13 with more decriminalization. The
14 way that the systems talk to each
15 other makes it impossible for
16 housing to happen, makes it
17 impossible for jobs to happen.

18 I don't understand how you
19 expect people with a criminal
20 record to have equal access to jobs
21 and housing. And what we must stop
22 is the dehumanization of people.
23 The fact that a senator in the
24 center of Pennsylvania would deny
25 the organizations in Kensington

2 \$7.5 million because he did not
3 know that kids lived in Kensington
4 is the result of the constant
5 dehumanization.

6 The videos, the slander,
7 the statements made wildly without
8 centering the actual people and
9 actual families that live in
10 Kensington, we have to stop it.
11 The fact that he doesn't know that
12 and that he says, no, you don't
13 deserve afternoon -- afterschool
14 activities, a soccer program.

15 If we understand the need
16 to come together, actually hold --
17 actually this did happen, right,
18 this has happened in our city. And
19 even as recent as 2019, I will say
20 Councilwoman Blackwell brought a
21 lot of people together and said,
22 we're going to make sure that
23 hospitals are going to be held
24 accountable for the people that end
25 up on the street. You know, we're

2 going to have a long
3 conversation -- going to end now.

4 But the thing -- I'm
5 disabled. The thing that I cannot
6 stand is when I see people that
7 should be given care, health care,
8 health care. A syringe is health
9 care, to be in a hospital and
10 receive care and pain management.
11 Withdrawal management is health
12 care. That's all it is. They
13 should not be on the street and the
14 hospitals have to be held
15 accountable. Thank you for your
16 time.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Byron Golson,
19 Lynn Landes, Jeremy Blatstein and
20 Noah Forer also make their way to
21 the podium.

22 (Witnesses approached
23 podium.)

24 MR. GOLSON: Good morning.
25 Good morning, Council President

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Johnson and members of City
3 Council. I am Byron Golson and I'm
4 here to support the resolution
5 honoring my cousin Jazz composer
6 tenor saxophone musician arranger
7 Benny Golson who died this week at
8 95, introduced by Councilmember
9 Jeffrey Young.

10 The last time I stood here
11 I was representing Settlement Music
12 School. My twin brother and I are
13 musicians because of Benny, and
14 this is a full circle moment,
15 because 10 years ago Jeff Young
16 drafted a resolution on behalf of
17 his boss, then President Clarke, to
18 honor Benny who was in these
19 chambers for the first time in his
20 life.

21 He marveled at the elegance
22 of this room. And as I recall,
23 Councilman Young's father was a
24 Benny fan as well. On the same day
25 in 2014, Mayor Nutter honored Benny

2 in the Mayor's reception room and

3 Vince interviewed him for WURD.

4 Benny was born and raised in North

5 Philadelphia, graduated from

6 Benjamin Franklin High School.

7 Some of his accomplishments

8 were he composed several Jazz

9 standards such as Killer Joe,

10 Whisper Not, I Remember Clifford

11 and Blues March, and he was a very,

12 very deep influence on my life as I

13 became a musician following in his

14 footsteps. Thank you very much.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. LANDES: Good

17 afternoon. I'm Lynn Landes of

18 Safestreetsphilly.org. I support

19 the resolution to strengthen

20 enforcement against illegal

21 activity in certain stores, but the

22 City needs more. We need our laws

23 fully enforced across the board.

24 To that end, I ask City Council to

25 urge the Mayor to announce the new

1 9/26/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 forensic lab as soon as possible.

3 As to last Saturday night's

4 mayhem in Center City, there's no

5 surprise there. The Mayor and City

6 Council need to restore summary

7 arrests and community court

8 throughout the city, not just for

9 Kensington. In violation of both

10 local and state laws, the City is

11 still not fully enforcing the law

12 in every part of the city. And in

13 violation of federal law,

14 Philadelphia is still a sanctuary

15 city for illegal immigration.

16 We are sending a

17 dangerously mixed message. We must

18 enforce a law across the board for

19 effective and equal justice even

20 with a new forensic lab there is no

21 magic bullet when it comes to

22 public safety. From retail theft

23 to wanton murder, from broken

24 windows to open borders, everything

25 matters. Thank you.

2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy

4 Blatstein, Noah Forer, Sultan

5 Smalley and David Gibson, make your
6 way to the podium please.

7 (Witnesses approached
8 podium.)

9 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello,
10 President Johnson, City Council.
11 I'm talking about SEPTA today. You
12 know what the question is. Raise
13 your -- my name is Jeremy
14 Blatstein. I'm sorry for that.
15 Who rode SEPTA to City Hall this
16 morning? Oh, zero. Come on. The
17 quality-of-life issues surrounding
18 City Hall, you saw it on Saturday
19 night, and you see it on a daily
20 basis. But I really would
21 encourage you to ride SEPTA to City
22 Hall.

23 I think that it really will
24 be eye-opening to see the issues
25 that your constituents face on a

2 daily basis. And it really is
3 another opportunity also what's
4 been spoken on today regarding
5 homelessness and how that impacts
6 around the quality of life around
7 City Hall.

8 Love Park and the
9 surrounding area has progressively
10 gotten worse over the last 6 to 12
11 months. The study that came out
12 this past week reflected that. So
13 as we talk about housing and
14 homelessness, I would just
15 encourage each and every one of you
16 to really see that firsthand and
17 ride SEPTA.

18 So my challenge to you, I
19 said it last week, I'm going to say
20 every week, ride Septa on Thursdays
21 and really show -- ride the ride
22 and put some oomph behind it.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. FOYER: Hello. My name

2 is Noah Zohar Foyer. I'm a
3 19-year-old environmental activist
4 and I co-founded the Philadelphia
5 chapter of Fridays for Future at 16
6 years old. Thank you, City
7 Councilmembers, who sponsored the
8 fossil fuel nonproliferation treaty
9 in supporting ending new fossil
10 fuel expansion.

11 However, words can only be
12 the first step. I want you to
13 react to the global climate crisis
14 the same way you guys reacted to
15 the global pandemic in 2022. We
16 changed the way we were going about
17 our daily lives and the way our
18 systems operated in order to ensure
19 our chances of survival.

20 I want you to think about
21 how many of you need air, food and
22 water to survive. Hoping that's
23 all of us. I want you to think
24 about how many people around the
25 world do not have access to all

2 these resources. I'll let you know
3 how many people, 2.2 billion. 17
4 to 20 percent of the Amazon
5 Rainforest has already been
6 destroyed and its irreversible
7 tipping point is reached when 20 to
8 25 percent has been cut down.

9 When I graduated from high
10 school in 2023, we were
11 congratulated by being engulfed in
12 a thick, heavy smoke greeted from
13 the wildfires in Canada. Climate
14 change is here. Climate change is
15 now. Margaret Mead, a
16 revolutionary American
17 anthropologist said, Never doubt
18 that a small group of thoughtful,
19 committed individuals can change
20 the world. In fact, it is the only
21 thing that ever has.

22 I would like to give every
23 single person in this room today,
24 every individual, five things that
25 they can start doing today to

2 reduce their impact on the planet.

3 One, educate yourself and your

4 friends and your family on climate

5 change. Talk about it. Two,

6 reduce the amount of food and

7 plastic we are wasting. We don't

8 need to buy more than we consume.

9 Three, reduce the amount of

10 resources that you are throwing

11 away. It's okay to share. We can

12 be a community. We can reuse

13 clothes. We can reuse plastic.

14 Four, lower that thermometer. If

15 you want to put the AC on 70, bump

16 it down to 69 instead. It's

17 okay -- sorry, I meant heating.

18 It's okay to have it lower than

19 what you need. It saves energy.

20 And five, use public transit more

21 or bike. It will help the transit

22 system become more accessible to

23 everyone and that is something we

24 need.

25 It does not matter what

2 your political stance, religion,
3 background or education is.
4 Climate change is a threat that is
5 impacting every single one of us
6 right now and it is not going to
7 disappear by ignoring it. As a
8 community, it is our responsibility
9 to do every single thing we can to
10 take the steps necessary to pave
11 the path to a sustainable, livable
12 future. Do it for me. Do it for
13 your kids and do it for the kids to
14 come. Please. Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. SMALLEY: Hello. My
17 name is Sultan Smalley. I am a
18 student at the Community College of
19 Philadelphia and a member of the
20 Sunrise Movement. I am here to
21 support the passage of the fossil
22 fuel nonproliferation treaty
23 resolution. The Philadelphia youth
24 deserve the ability to imagine
25 their futures with equanimity, not

2 fear.

3 We cannot afford to act

4 slowly in our ongoing climate

5 crisis. The time to act is today.

6 Billionaires and big corporations

7 have for too long been allowed to

8 exacerbate the warming of our

9 planet with impunity. Today's City

10 Council has the opportunity to help

11 ameliorate the decades of inaction

12 from our government. This is an

13 existential threat and let's not

14 forget who bears the brunt of this.

15 It's the working-class

16 Black and Brown communities like

17 the citizens near the Bellwether

18 District who reported higher levels

19 of cancer while an oil refinery

20 operated near their homes and dealt

21 with the consequences of the same

22 refinery exploding in 2019,

23 releasing hydrochloric acid in the

24 atmosphere.

25 Furthermore, Philadelphia

2 has a child asthma rate three times
3 the national average, but the risk
4 is unequal. The majority Black
5 neighborhood of West Philadelphia
6 where I grew up in Cobbs Creek has
7 some of the city's highest asthma
8 hospitalization rates. This is to
9 say that passing this treaty is not
10 just a climate justice issue. It
11 is a racial justice issue. It is
12 an economic justice issue and we
13 must acknowledge the contiguity
14 between all these different issues
15 in order to tackle the climate
16 crisis with the level of
17 seriousness it warrants.

18 We stand at an inflection
19 point and I often feel deflated
20 because I don't see enough action.
21 But in times like this, I remember
22 that there are decades where
23 nothing happened and days where
24 decades happened. So please make
25 this day worth a decade. Thank

11 of Peace Justice Sustainability now

12 which is the associate group of

13 Peace Action, the nation's oldest

14 secular peace group since 1957.

15 I'm also representing the

16 Philadelphia area No more War

17 Coalition speaking in favor of the

18 resolution for our fossil fuel

19 treaty. Thank you for allowing me

20 time to speak.

21 As everyone should know by

22 now, we all face two existential

23 threats to humanity survival, the

24 spread and potential use of nuclear

25 weapons and the growing climate

2 emergency. On the introduction to
3 the fossil fuel treaty website page
4 it says, just like 50 years ago
5 when the world used international
6 treaties to diffuse the threats
7 posed by nuclear weapons, today the
8 world needs a fossil fuel
9 nonproliferation treaty to phase
10 out fossil fuels, support dependent
11 economies, workers and communities
12 and to diversify away from fossil
13 fuels.

14 In 2019 City Council passed
15 a resolution encouraging the U.S.
16 to support the treaty on the
17 prohibition of nuclear weapons or
18 the TPNW. Over the years we
19 reduced the nuclear threat from
20 70,000 warheads to around 12,000
21 today, but new nuclear weapons are
22 being planned by all nuclear
23 countries, though they are illegal
24 according to the TPNW.

25 We must continue to work to

2 abolish nuclear weapons and we know
3 it's possible, but we will do
4 little good if we keep the world
5 from frying in a nuclear firestorm
6 to let it slowly fry thanks to the
7 current climate emergency, like the
8 proverbial frog in the pot. It's
9 time to take action and compel
10 governments to end fossil fuels.
11 Let's take a step by passing this
12 resolution. Thank you. One last
13 point. Democracy takes time. A
14 minute isn't enough. Thank you.
15 (Applause.)

16 MR. HAGINS: Great
17 afternoon. Ogbonna Hagins, fourth
18 generation chattel slavery
19 survivor. Councilmembers, while I
20 applaud the formation of the
21 Special Committee on Kensington, I
22 cannot ignore the hypocrisy staring
23 us in the face. We rush to address
24 issues in Kensington, but where is
25 the same urgency when it comes to

2 the progeny of the emancipated, the
3 American Freedmen.

4 Let's talk about the
5 elephant in the room. We have
6 offices for the Caribbean and for

11 offices for everybody else in this
12 building, but the people who save
13 this nation, the people who built
14 this nation doesn't have an office
15 in this building. I demand that
16 immediately.

17 I talked to my man right
18 here Councilman Harrity, who has
19 met with us. You guys got to meet.
20 We got to have an office of
21 American Freedmen within this
22 building, the first one in the
23 history. Ogbonna Hagins, unseated
24 Council President, American
25 Freedman and a fourth generation

24 On the housekeeping side,
25 we in the 4th District will be

10 realest podcast ever. We'll be
11 doing a podcast out there talking
12 about current events. Come on out
13 and have a good time. There'll be
14 20 food trucks, even vegan. We did
15 that just for you. So come out and
16 enjoy.

17 On Tuesday we will be
18 hosting a nonpartisan, nonpartisan,
19 watch party at the Container
20 Village from 6:00 to 9:00-ish,
21 whenever they get done, but that's
22 also free food, fun. We have
23 KeithFromUpDaBlock, the comedian
24 who does live interventions on
25 hilarious, political satire. So

5 though, we were out in Chicago

11 around Black men, in particular the
12 brothers from the barbershop.

13 And so, the challenge was
14 if you think we're moving too fast
15 and leaving you behind, figure out
16 an agenda and keep up. Challenge
17 made, challenge accepted. So in my
18 research I was also in Jeffrey
19 Young's District at OIC'S mall and
20 I ran into a young man on the way
21 out who knew I was an elected
22 official, and he was one of those
23 barbershop guys that really isn't
24 engaged, really feels left behind,
25 really feels not a part of

2 whatever's the prosperity aspects
3 going forward for people.

4 But what I discovered in
5 talking to some of my staff who
6 come from rural Pennsylvania,
7 there's a lot in common there.
8 When a factory closes, they feel
9 left behind and is this for me, my
10 future and where do I fit in. So I
11 went and talked to the guy and I
12 found out he lives right across the
13 street literally from Temple in the
14 projects.

15 And he said to me, every
16 day he watches students. He lives
17 in the shadow of opportunity, the
18 shadow of opportunity. And so, he
19 watches young people, deserving
20 students go in and out of class,
21 matriculate through the class, wind
22 up with degrees, jobs and a future.
23 In his mind he's being left behind.

24 Out of the 19,000 students
25 in the freshman class in all of the

2 universities this year, only 12
3 percent come from Philly. Out of
4 that 12 percent, how many of them
5 are poor, how many of them are
6 African American, how many of them
7 are males like this man. He
8 doesn't get a job there, he doesn't
9 get a scholarship from there.

10 There's no care packages coming
11 there. There's only watching and
12 living in the shadow of opportunity
13 as it passes him by.

14 So we have to engage with
15 this resolution introduced today.
16 There's some people getting it
17 right. There's some universities
18 that get it right. I would point
19 to, again in your District, Member
20 Young, Community College. Their
21 connectivity to the surrounding
22 community and people within the
23 working and poorer classes is
24 exemplary. They have classes that
25 they offer in different schools.

2 In their West Philadelphia
3 auto shop, more kids come through
4 there and wind up working for the
5 City of Philadelphia than any other
6 program in the city combined. The
7 Mayor talks about and I'm looking
8 forward to a municipal university,
9 where they teach young people how
10 to get jobs in the Streets
11 Department, in the Gas Works, on
12 the electric poles, that they have
13 a real pathway to those
14 opportunities that seem to be
15 passing them by at the university.
16 But it's not just Temple. You can
17 go to Lasalle. It's Morton Homes
18 right around the corner. There's a
19 kid sitting on the steps right now
20 watching the students pass them by.
21 University of Penn there down, The
22 Bottom, and they don't know how to
23 figure out how to get up top.
24 So what I want to do with
25 this hearing is just say, what are

2 the best practices that communities
3 and others are doing and what are
4 some of the universities that might
5 need a little help to figure it
6 out. And let's get them, take them
7 from each other to knit a cloth so
8 that our young people aren't
9 disenchanted about the process.

11 it ain't for me.

12 We got to change that
13 narrative. We got to turn them
14 around by showing them that pathway
15 of opportunity to a successful
16 life, a life worth living.

3 to thank my colleagues today for
4 allowing me a little bit more time
5 on the presentation today with
6 Erika Alexander. I just think that
7 she is someone who deserves that,
8 but it wasn't necessarily just for
9 Erika Alexander. For me that was
10 to show the greatness of folks who
11 come from our city, the Girls' High
12 graduates that I know like the
13 Vice-president of Community
14 Education at Ensemble Danielle
15 Allen; Executive Director of
16 PhilAbundance Loree Jones;
17 Executive Director and Chief
18 Council for the State
19 Appropriations Committee Courtney
20 Richardson; Majority Leader
21 Katherine Gilmore Richardson, these
22 are names of women who are from our
23 city who do great things for our
24 city who continue to show what we
25 have to offer, so it was for those

2 folks.

3 Mr. President, I want to
4 thank you as well for partnering
5 with me at the Property Tax
6 Assessment Workshop in Center City
7 with CCRA. We got some great
8 information out to those folks in
9 the community. And I know every
10 Council, particularly District
11 Councilmembers, are going out
12 throughout their Districts letting
13 folks know what programs exist for
14 them.

15 There's a program out there
16 for you. If you own a property in
17 the city of Philadelphia, there is
18 a program out there for you that
19 can provide some relief on your
20 property taxes. Special deadlines
21 are coming up. October 7th is a
22 deadline to file for the appeal. I
23 encourage everyone to file an
24 appeal if you believe that your
25 assessment is inaccurate. October

2 7th is the deadline to file an
3 appeal. It is free.

4 Speaking of housing, on
5 this Saturday there is the PHDC
6 Housing Fair in North Philadelphia
7 at 15th and Montgomery where there
8 will be folks talking about
9 affordable housing opportunities,
10 mortgage opportunities and
11 everything housing will be at this
12 fair on Saturday if you can attend.
13 15th and Montgomery on Temple
14 University campus. Please show up.

15 Also, on Saturday my office
16 will be doing a community cleanup
17 right near Temple University
18 between Berks Street and Diamond
19 Street from 16th to 20th in the
20 32nd Ward. If you're available to
21 come volunteer, please come
22 volunteer. We'll be out there at
23 8:30 a.m. at 16th and Berks.

24 There's also tomorrow a
25 teen takeover at Mander Recreation

2 Center beginning at 6:00 p.m. to
3 10:00 p.m. It is a safe space for
4 teenagers for tomorrow and
5 throughout the month of October
6 every single Friday. This is a
7 place where teenagers in North
8 Philadelphia can go to feel safe,
9 to have activities. Please utilize
10 Mander Center at 33rd and Diamond
11 on Fridays between 6:00 and
12 10:00 p.m.

13 This last weekend I went to
14 the Janazah of Alaysia Smith. She
15 was a 13-year-old who was shot in
16 the chest and killed in North
17 Philadelphia. And I was
18 heartbroken while I was there. I
19 went in between the lovely service
20 of our Chair Appropriations
21 Committee Jordan Harris, his wife.

22 I had to step out to go to
23 this Janazah, but I was brought to
24 tears literally outside because
25 these were little kids, 12-, 13-,

2 14-year-old children crying,
3 hurting, full of trauma because one
4 of their friends, one of their
5 loved ones, a 13-year-old girl was
6 shot and killed. And just looking
7 around, the folks that are out
8 there are folks who look just like
9 me, right.

10 Why is it again that our
11 communities are the only
12 communities that have to
13 continuously experience this trauma
14 of gun violence. And for the life
15 of me I'm trying to figure that out
16 and trying to figure out solutions
17 to this.

18 So, Mr. President, as I
19 continue to work day-in and day-out
20 in this body we're going to be
21 putting forth programs and shouting
22 positive places like the teen space
23 at Mander Rec Center on Fridays for
24 teenagers to go to feel safe,
25 because we should not be the only

2 folks that have to go through this.
3 Why are we going through this
4 day-in and day-out. And so, that's
5 the core of why I'm here to figure
6 out that issue, to find solutions
7 to that particular issue.

8 And on a little personal
9 note to folks who are testifying,
10 there are a lot of us who don't
11 have to take SEPTA to see
12 homelessness, drug use and poverty
13 because it's in the neighborhoods
14 that we live in. So I just want to
15 put that out there as well.

16 And, Mr. President, I also
17 want to thank and congratulate
18 Councilmember Thomas for putting
19 forth the resolution honoring Andre
20 and Keith. I look forward to
21 working with both of them. Keith
22 represents the 195th District,
23 which his District encompasses my
24 District as well.

25 And also, the resolution we

2 put forth today, thanking my
3 colleagues honoring Benny Golson, a
4 North Philadelphia native. For
5 those who don't know, he wrote
6 scores for M.A.S.H., Mission
7 Impossible, the Partridge Family

9 world-renowned jazz artists that
10 come from our city. He was friends
11 with -- his friends was John
12 Coltrane, right, and the like.

13 So I want to honor his
14 family, honor his memory, his
15 legacy, the legacy of music that
16 comes from this city. We are a
17 musical city and we need to honor
18 the history and legacy of that.

19 And thank you so much,
20 Mr. President, for your time today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

25 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good

3 A couple things real quick.

4 First, after Council today Mural

5 Arts would like to invite all

6 members to Room 491 for some framed

7 photos of murals for every office.

8 So if there's an opportunity to

11 Councilmembers, I've been to all

12 your offices, they're amazing,

13 there's a quick gift there for

14 Councilmembers from Mural Arts. I

15 want to say thank you to Mural Arts

16 for participating in that

17 initiative.

18 I also want to take a

19 moment to thank BET. For those who

20 don't know, my office worked with

21 Senator Vincent Hughes's office and

22 a number of organizations to put on

23 a Get Out To Vote concert as well

24 as a panel discussion focusing on

25 encouraging Black men to get out to

2 vote. So we appreciate BET for
3 coming to Philadelphia and all the
4 local artists who were able to
5 perform at the Met. It was a
6 phenomenal event. We had lots of
7 young people. And again, the goal
8 is to push and encourage as many

10 in this November's election.

11 In that same spirit, on
12 Tuesday we will be working with
13 Councilmember Curtis Jones,
14 Councilmember Kendra Brooks and a
15 few other elected officials,
16 Senator Hughes as well as State
17 Rep. Roni Green at the Sixth Man
18 Center and a few other
19 organizations to put together
20 another Get Out To Vote initiative
21 that'll take place from 5:00 to
22 8:00, 4200 Wissahickon Avenue. And
23 again, the goal is to provide free
24 resources, services and programs,
25 but really push citizens across the

2 city of Philadelphia to vote. And
3 this effort on Tuesday is focused
4 on young people.

5 I also want to take a
6 moment to thank, because we haven't
7 been in Council since then, all of
8 the people who partnered with our
9 office to put together what I would

11 event that we did on September
12 14th. We had a panel discussion at
13 that event. And it was news
14 presented to me, colleagues, that
15 the gaming industry generates more
16 revenue in a year than the music
17 industry and the movie industry
18 combined.

19 Billions of dollars are
20 being accumulated by the gaming
21 industry, and it is my focus along
22 with my colleagues on City Council
23 to make Philadelphia the home for
24 gaming. When you think about other
25 industries and where you travel

2 across the country to be able to
3 have your talents mature, we want
4 people all across the country to
5 come to Philadelphia for gaming.

6 We already have a
7 phenomenal annual event that we do
8 every year. We also thank Drexel
9 University. For those who don't
10 know, Drexel has one of the best
11 gaming programs in the entire
12 country as it relates to degrees
13 that young people can get. And we
14 are already on the cusp of doing
15 it. So the work will continue.
16 There will be more things coming
17 out of my office specifically
18 around gaming, and we're going to
19 push to make Philadelphia the home
20 city and the entire country for the
21 gaming industry and the gaming
22 business. So thank you all for
23 your support with that initiative.
24 And I definitely have to give a
25 shout-out to my Chief of Staff Dom

2 Miller who's really the gaming
3 connoisseur as it relates to the
4 work that we're doing.

5 Last but not least, I have
6 to take a moment to thank -- well,
7 I want to start actually by
8 thanking former Councilmember Helen
9 Gym. For those who don't know,
10 about two years ago former
11 Councilmember Helen Gym and I had a
12 meeting as she was looking to
13 depart City Council and she talked
14 to me about some of the issues that
15 we were facing in the prison. And
16 she had began working on a
17 Philadelphia Prisons Community
18 Oversight Board and the work wasn't
19 complete by the time she was
20 prepared to step away from this
21 body.

22 And so, my team decided to
23 take on this huge project which
24 we've been working on for two years
25 in collaboration with the

2 Defender's Office, the Prison
3 Society, the District Attorney,
4 Amistad Law Center and a coalition
5 of 36 other groups who recognize
6 the problems that we have with the
7 prisons here in the City of
8 Philadelphia.

9 I also want to take a
10 moment to thank Mayor Parker and
11 her entire Administration. Prior
12 to the bill being even introduced,
13 we've had multiple meetings with
14 the Administration about the issues
15 that are taking place in the
16 prisons. And let's be honest,
17 these issues existed long before
18 our current Mayor became the Mayor,
19 before our current Administration
20 was in place. And I appreciate
21 their commitment to working with
22 this legislative body to try our
23 best to rectify these issues as it
24 relates to the concerns for both
25 the prisoners as well as the people

2 who work in the prisons.

3 I want to thank all of my
4 colleagues on City Council for
5 co-sponsoring this bill, including
6 you, Council President. We have 16
7 co-sponsors for this particular
8 legislation which communicates to
9 me the sense of urgency around the
10 issues that we're facing in the
11 prison and the need to see some
12 type of change.

13 I especially want to thank
14 Councilmember Mike Driscoll because
15 this issue is flat out in his
16 District. And before even coming
17 to City Council, he's been
18 advocating and fighting for change
19 as a state legislator. And I also
20 want to thank Councilmember Nicolas
21 O'Rourke and his staff for working
22 closely with my staff over the last
23 three months to get this bill in
24 the final stage and we're looking
25 forward to engaging the

2 Administration as well as the
3 advocates and all parties and
4 stakeholders who truly care about
5 what's going on, to figure out what
6 is the happy compromise as it
7 relates to making sure that we have
8 the proper oversight for our
9 prisons and ensuring that all
10 people who enter and leave those
11 facilities are safe.

12 During my first term and
13 into my second term in City Council
14 we've seen and heard some of the
15 most horrific stories that I
16 personally will never forget as it
17 relates to things that have
18 happened in the prison. So I'm
19 excited to know that there's an
20 appetite to see some type of change
21 and we're looking forward to
22 working with the number of
23 different stakeholders to bring
24 about that change.

25 I think that's it for me,

2 Council President. Thank you for
3 the opportunity. And, colleagues,
4 I apologize for being long-winded
5 so late in the afternoon. You know
6 that's not me, but I think that we
7 had some important announcements
8 and this is possibly a historic
9 legislation that can really change
10 how our prisons are essentially
11 watched over.

12 Thank you, Council
13 President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Thank you, Councilmember Thomas.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Nina Ahmad.

18 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD: Thank
19 you, Council President.

20 And echoing what my
21 colleagues have said about our
22 youth in our city and what they are
23 facing, I want to start at the
24 beginning. And today I introduced
25 a resolution recognizing September

1 9/26/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 2024 as Infant Mortality Awareness
3 Month. This is the beginning for
4 our residents in Philadelphia when
5 they are born and the infant
6 mortality rate in Philadelphia is
7 alarmingly high with 8.4 deaths per
8 1,000 live births compared to the
9 national average 5.8 deaths per
10 1,000 live births which is also
11 unacceptable. Both of these
12 numbers are unacceptable, and these
13 rates are even higher for Black and
14 Brown infants.

15 While bringing awareness to
16 this issue, it is crucial my office
17 also recognizes the need for
18 structural change. We have been
19 continuing our work to address the
20 maternal and infant mortality
21 crisis and implicit bias in
22 Philadelphia throughout collective
23 action and conversations with
24 crucial stakeholders and ultimately
25 legislation.

2 We must all commit to
3 addressing the underlying social
4 determinance of health and
5 supporting mothers, birthing people
6 and children postpartum. And I
7 thank all my colleagues for sharing
8 this vision for Philadelphia
9 families.

10 Thank you, Council

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Thank you, Nina. And as always,
14 Members, a great job, hard work,
15 Mr. Thomas and Nina and Jeffrey
16 Young and Kathy and Phillips and
17 everyone who put forth legislation
18 today to move our great City of
19 Philadelphia forward.

20 At this particular time --
21 the Chair recognizes Councilmember
22 Jeffrey Jay Young.

23 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
24 you, Council President.

25 I think this is an

2 important issue for all of us in
3 our city. On Tuesday, October 1st
4 the Streets and Services Committee
5 along with the Public Safety

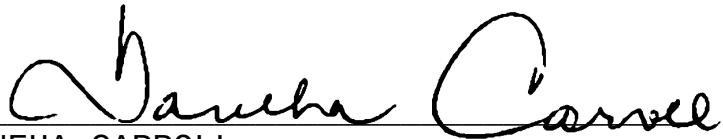
