good morning, and good morning to all the
awesome moms across the City of
Philadelphia. Really appreciate you more
than you know.

We have established a quorum,
so we're going to come to order.

To give our invocation this
morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor G.
Lamar Stewart of Taylor Memorial Baptist
Church. He is here today as the guest of
Councilwoman Brooks.

I would ask all members and
guests please bow your heads for the

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invocation.

PASTOR STEWART: Thank you,
Council President.

Let us pray.

God, we bless and we thank you
today for your presence and for this
opportunity to come to you with prayer
and to seek you ahead of this session and
ahead of this meeting for City Council.

God, I'm praying today for City
Council. I'm praying for the wisdom of
Council as they think through policy that
will impact the people of this city, the
policy around education and poverty,
around safety and economic development,
around community development. I pray,
God, for wisdom for each Councilperson on
this day.

God, we thank you and we're
praying, God, for the work of each
Councilmember in their respective
districts and from the City at-large.
God, we thank you, God, for their
commitment to think through sensible

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2 programming for the spring and summer for
3 young people and seniors and vulnerable
4 communities.

5 God, I pray that you continue
6 to give each of them the innovation and
7 the willpower and the courage to do what
8 seems to be impossible even during these
9 very difficult days.

10 And, God, on today, we also
11 acknowledge and we thank you for every
12 woman and every individual who is a
13 mother, whether that person is an auntie
14 or a grand-mom or someone who
15 biologically birthed a child. I thank
16 you, God, for the opportunity and the
17 gift of mothers on this week.

18 We pray for each mom who
19 unfortunately had to bury a child or
20 perhaps this Mother's Day is difficult
21 because over the last several years, they
22 had to bury a child. I pray, God, that
23 you would give them peace and joy and
24 your presence even right now.

25 So, God, as this body convenes

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and gathers, I pray, God, that you would guide their conversation and that you will give them wisdom and strength.

We pray these things in the name that's significant to me, the name of Jesus Christ, we pray.

And all God's people said amen.
(Amen.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you so much, Pastor, for the spiritual guidance this morning. We really appreciate you being here. Thank you.

PASTOR STEWART: Thank you, Council President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Our next order of business is the approval of the Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April 28th, 2022, and the Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you, Mr. President. I move the Journal of the meeting on Thursday, April 28th, 2022 be approved.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. It has been moved and properly seconded that the Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April 28, 2022 stand approved.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have it, and the Journal is approved.

And our next order of business is requests for leave of absence, and the Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you, Mr. President. On behalf of the members of Council, there are no requests for leaves of absence today.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The Chair thanks the Councilwoman.

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2 The Chair again recognizes the
3 Councilwoman for a motion on the Sunshine
4 Act.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. I move that any of
7 the following matters, if considered
8 today, may be added to the agenda for
9 this session of Council and, as required
10 by law, subsequently published on an
11 amended agenda after the consideration of
12 those matters: resolutions authorizing
13 hearings, amendments to bills on first
14 reading, the reconsideration of a bill
15 being vetoed by or re-called from the
16 Mayor, resolutions taking substantive
17 action to be voted on in this session, a
18 motion to withdraw a bill or resolution
19 that is not on the Calendar, and a motion
20 placing a bill or resolution on or
21 returning a bill or resolution from the
22 Suspension Calendar that is not listed on
23 today's Calendar.

24 The purpose of this motion is
25 to provide the public with notice

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2 concerning possible actions by Council
3 that arose too late to be included on the
4 Calendar that was published prior to
5 today's session.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you. It has been moved and
9 properly seconded that the legislative
10 matters stated by Councilwoman Parker may
11 be added to the agenda for today, should
12 those matters arise during the course of
13 the Council session.

14 All in favor indicate by saying
15 aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it. The motion carries.

22 And our next order of business
23 is communications. I would ask
24 Mr. Decker to please read the messages
25 from the Mayor and any other

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2 communications that he may have in his
3 possession.

4 CHIEF CLERK: From the Mayor to
5 the President and members of the Council
6 of the City of Philadelphia, pursuant to
7 Sections 4-604 and 2-307 of the Home Rule
8 Charter, I am today transmitting to the
9 Council the recommendations of the City
10 Planning Commission on the following
11 bills: Bill Nos. 220222, 220298, and
12 220323; and I am transmitting for the
13 consideration of your honorable body a
14 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
15 Land Bank to dispose of 1543, 1545, 1547,
16 1549, 1551, 1553, 1555 -- 1554 and 1555
17 South Dover Street, 1540 through 54 South
18 Myrtlewood Street, and 1546 South 30th
19 Street located in the 2nd Councilmanic
20 District; and

21 A resolution authorizing the
22 Philadelphia Land Bank to dispose of 2453
23 North Carlisle Street located in the
24 Fifth Councilmanic District; and

25 An ordinance amending Section

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2 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
3 "Designation of Bicycle Lanes," to
4 authorize bicycle lanes on Lindbergh
5 Boulevard between 58th Street and 65th
6 Street, and making associated changes to
7 lanes of travel within the same limits;
8 and

9 An ordinance amending Section
10 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
11 "Designation of Bicycle Lanes," to
12 authorize a bicycle lane on Grays Ferry
13 Avenue from 34th Street to Washington
14 Avenue, and making associated changes to
15 parking regulations within the same
16 limits, all under certain terms and
17 conditions.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, Mr. Decker.

20 And our next order of business
21 is the introduction of bills and
22 resolutions. And by way of a reminder,
23 we are asking that all resolutions,
24 including privileged resolutions, be
25 placed on the Final Passage Calendar for

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our next session of Council, unless they are being referred to committee. In our current remote environment, this procedure will provide the appropriate opportunity for public comment.

I would like to thank you in advance for your anticipated cooperation.

Mr. Decker, please read the titles of the legislation that's being offered today by our members.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Parker offers four bills and two resolutions, entitled "An ordinance amending Chapter 10-700 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Refuse and Littering,' to further define short dumping and related violations and to revise penalties and remedies related to such offenses"; and

An ordinance establishing parking regulations in the vicinity of: Bingham Street, and Comly Street; and

An ordinance establishing parking regulations in the vicinity of:

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2 Clearview Street and North Broad Street;
3 and

4 An ordinance establishing
5 parking regulations in the vicinity of:
6 Lawrence Street and Somerville Avenue;
7 Ashdale Street and North 2nd Street;
8 Fairhill Street and Tabor Road; Chew
9 Avenue and North 5th Street; Howard
10 Street and Fisher Avenue; Tabor Road and
11 North 5th Street; Elkins Street and North
12 7th Street; Somerville Avenue and North
13 4th Street.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Those bills will be referred to the
16 appropriate committee.

17 CHIEF CLERK: And on behalf of
18 Council President Clarke, Councilwoman
19 Parker offers two resolutions, entitled a
20 "Resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
21 Redevelopment Authority to execute and
22 deliver to the Philadelphia Land Bank
23 deeds conveying title to various
24 properties located in the Fifth
25 Councilmanic District, including on the

1
2 following streets: Monument Street,
3 North Sydenham Street and North 31st
4 Street."

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
6 week's Calendar.

7 CHIEF CLERK: And also on
8 behalf of the Council President, a
9 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
10 Redevelopment Authority to execute and
11 deliver to the Philadelphia Land Bank
12 deeds conveying title to certain
13 properties located in the Fifth
14 Councilmanic District pursuant to the
15 requirements of the Commonwealth Land
16 Bank Act.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
18 week's Calendar.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym
20 offers two resolutions, entitled a
21 "Resolution authorizing the Committees on
22 Children and Youth and Public Health and
23 Human Services to hold hearings
24 concerning the imminent threat to the
25 longstanding constitutional right to an

1
2 abortion, to examine the profound and
3 devastating local impact that the
4 potential repeal of Roe versus Wade would
5 have on individual lives and society as a
6 whole, and to explore what Philadelphia
7 can do to ensure and increase access to
8 abortion in the face of this threat."

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Councilwoman Gym, would you like to be
11 recognized on this resolution?

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
13 very much, Council President.

14 For a right to be meaningful,
15 it must be broad, inclusive, and
16 accessible. For 50 years, Roe v. Wade
17 has stood as law of the land, recognized
18 as a fundamental constitutional right
19 rooted in the right to privacy, to choose
20 what to do with pregnancy for your
21 reproductive health and for your rights.

22 It is a ruling that helped
23 shape my life. It's a ruling that has
24 shaped the lives of all of us on this
25 body, whether or not we chose to exercise

1
2 it. Healthcare has been better because
3 of it. Our economy has grown because of
4 it.

5 Every single one of the
6 Justices of the Supreme Court, especially
7 Neil Gorsuch, Brett Kavanaugh, and Amy
8 Coney Barrett, during their confirmation
9 hearings looked the American people in
10 the eye and declared Roe v. Wade settled
11 territory.

12 The law and the Constitutions
13 have not changed; only the Justices of
14 this court have. A court that cannot
15 bear or even restrict access to ban
16 military assault weapons can then now
17 fully, effectively, and purposely ban
18 abortions.

19 We should let that sink in.

20 The outcry is not just about
21 Roe v. Wade, but the undeniable reality
22 that ending the right to privacy as
23 fundamental and broad means that a highly
24 selective, undeniably narrow, and deeply
25 political interpretation of the right to

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2 privacy on which Roe v. Wade is based now
3 endangers other rights enacted by the
4 court, the right to marry whom you love,
5 whether same sex or interracial, the
6 right to contraception.

7 Today Governor Greg Abbott of
8 Texas announced that he hopes to
9 resurrect a 1982 SCOTUS ruling about the
10 fundamental right to an education,
11 including for undocumented children. All
12 of us should be outraged and deeply
13 concerned.

14 And for the last eight months,
15 Texas has lived in that post-Roe reality.
16 Fourteen hundred abortions a month are
17 now sought out of state. In total, 13
18 states have in place trigger bans in the
19 event of Supreme Court action in which
20 abortions would be banned in those 13
21 states, and a total of 26 states have
22 laws demonstrating an intent to ban legal
23 abortions.

24 So what I would say is that
25 this work now comes home to us, to local

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2 governments, to state-level legislatures.
3 Today Roe v. Wade remains the law of the
4 land, and this memo, whether leaked or
5 whistle blown, is an opportunity for the
6 next six weeks for all of us to take this
7 seriously.

8 This week, thousands of people
9 went to the steps of the U.S. Supreme
10 Court. Hundreds rallied in front of the
11 federal courthouse here and in front of
12 City Hall. This is something that will
13 resonate for years and decades to come,
14 outlasting many of us in our current
15 Council positions, but nonetheless the
16 urgency is here.

17 I want to thank the women of
18 City Council. I want to thank our
19 colleagues and all of our sponsors for
20 being open to holding hearings on the
21 work that lies ahead, on listening and
22 hearing from our reproductive healthcare
23 advocates, from our abortion providers,
24 from City agencies about what the City of
25 Philadelphia can do to ensure and expand

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access to abortions in the boundaries of
the City of Philadelphia. I look forward
to the hearings and for the work to come.

Thank you very much, Council
President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

bills with a favorable recommendation.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Thank you,

4 To the President and members of
5 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
6 the Committee on Labor and Civil Service,
7 to which was referred Bill No. 220186,
8 entitled "An ordinance amending Chapter
9 21-1100 of The Philadelphia Code,
10 entitled 'Community Development,' by
11 adding new provisions related to
12 workforce housing programs, amending the
13 applicability period, and making other
14 technical changes"; and

15 Bill No. 220261, entitled "An
16 ordinance amending Section 20-101 of The
17 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Residence
18 Requirements,' by clarifying that
19 temporary residence outside the City,
20 including for military service or
21 educational purposes, does not prevent a
22 person, including a police recruit, from
23 meeting the Residence Requirement,"
24 respectfully reports it has considered
25 the same and returns the attached bills

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to Council with a favorable
recommendation.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 That concludes our reports from
7 committee, and our next order of business
8 is the consideration of the Calendar.

9 I note that the bills just
10 reported from committee with a suspension
11 of the rules have been deemed to have had
12 a first reading and they will be on our
13 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar
14 at our next session of Council.

15 As there are no additional
16 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker for
18 the purpose of calling up resolutions and
19 bills on the Second Reading and Final
20 Passage Calendar today.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Again,
22 thank you, Mr. President. The following
23 resolutions and bills are being called up
24 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
25 Calendars today. They are Nos. 220367,

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220370, 220371, 220373, 220374, 210933,
220112, 220113, 220224, 220298, and
220291. All other resolutions and bills

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

with the consideration of our public
comment, I want to take a five-minute
break to allow our technology
professionals an opportunity to connect
our speakers today.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, and we are back. Thank you
for your patience.

So now that everyone is
connected to the meeting and before
considering the resolutions and bills we
have before us today, we will consider

1
2 the public comment. It will go as
3 follows:

4 Public comment must concern
5 matters on the Second Reading and Final
6 Passage Calendars for possible action at
7 a session of Council. A speaker on any
8 of those matters must sign up in order to
9 testify. You must call 215-686-3406 by
10 3:00 p.m. the day before the session to
11 sign up for public comment.

12 When you call, we will take
13 your name, your phone number, the number
14 of the legislative item you are
15 commenting on, and whether you are in
16 support of or against the legislation,
17 and add your name to the list. We will
18 telephone each person on the list during
19 the Council session and invite them to
20 our remote meeting.

21 Under ideal circumstances, they
22 will each have three minutes to speak.
23 However, this time limit may vary from
24 session to session. Today we will have
25 three minutes.

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2 In order to be fair to all
3 those wishing to speak, I do intend to
4 hold faithfully to the established time
5 limit. So once invited to the meeting
6 and asked to begin your testimony, a
7 timer will be started. We will monitor
8 your remaining time throughout your
9 testimony, and when there are 30 seconds
10 remaining of your time, you will be
11 reminded of this. Once your allotted
12 time has passed, you will be asked to
13 conclude your remarks, and shortly
14 thereafter, you will be muted and
15 disconnected from the remote meeting.

16 I also reserve the right to
17 limit the number of speakers where
18 repetitious comments are being made on
19 the same subject matter, which could
20 affect callbacks for public comment at a
21 meeting.

22 Also, please be aware that the
23 public meeting is being recorded. So
24 because it's public, participants and
25 viewers have no reasonable expectation of

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privacy. So by continuing to be in the meeting, you are consenting to being recorded.

I want to thank you very much for your willingness to participate in today's public comment session. Thank you again.

Mr. Decker, please call the first name of the witness, the speaker today on our public comment session.

CHIEF CLERK: Yes, Mr. President.

The first speaker we have today is Queen Judith Robinson, commenting on 210685-A and 210800.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

Good morning. State your name for the record. Please proceed with your testimony.

QUEEN ROBINSON: Yes. Good morning. Queen Judith Robinson here taking this opportunity to request that City Council be brought back in session

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2 in person ASAP. According to an article,
3 Philadelphia is one of the only big top
4 ten cities that's still doing virtual,
5 and it's bad enough that the citizens are
6 disconnected from this process, but I am
7 respectfully requesting that you move
8 forward as a body to let us breathe the
9 breath of life and come back on the
10 scene, because I see that you all are
11 practicing politics, you know. You're
12 all over the place doing this, that, and
13 the third, which, you know, I can
14 appreciate that, because I'm there right
15 along with you, but then I see that we're
16 not having in-person City Council.

17 So let's do the people's
18 business. Let's get back on track.
19 Let's ease back in to doing the best we
20 can be in this -- as we ease out of this
21 pandemic. I think you all would set the
22 best example by showing, you know, that
23 we can move forward to the future.

24 As it relates to this budget,
25 you know, we as the citizens don't get an

1
2 opportunity to speak until May 24th, and
3 it's really tough for someone like
4 myself, citizen Queen Judith Robinson,
5 who keeps abreast of what's going on, but
6 in order to have real input and to
7 actually attend hearings would be so
8 important to have input.

9 So much going on. Obviously
10 none of us are smarter than all of us,
11 because look at our city, a mess in so
12 many ways. We should know where the
13 money is being directed to be most
14 efficient and effective. We should have
15 input and monitor where these funds are
16 going, like that soda tax. We can't get
17 Cecil B. Moore Rec Center repaired after
18 five years.

19 We want to have input and talk
20 to you all about that. Then I'm also
21 seeing like you're talking to some people
22 but not to others. This is not about
23 your friends and family. We're not here
24 as citizens to make you happy. You
25 represent us. We must allow you to know

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what our input is so you can do our business.

So I know these sessions can get a little testy, and I appreciate good questions. You know I do. So continue that, but just know that we should move forward in this very important process.

I know it's easy to get used to this virtual process, like we all on television or something, but the real deal is getting up close and personal and talking to each other respectfully and listening to each other respectfully and doing the people's business. That's what the most important part of this process that you all represent is to me.

I'm a committee person, so I'm at that very lowest level of contacting citizens and talking to the people and then relaying it up those chain of reaction, I'm going to call it, because it's not the chain of command to me, because you all represent me and you should hear me out.

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So I do appreciate your attention. I'll be back at a hearing today later talking about short dumping and trash. I got a lot of input, because that's what we do up in North Philly, been cleaning for all these years and it's getting worse. So listen out.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

QUEEN ROBINSON: Thank you very much.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony. We appreciate it.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker is Katherine Freeland, commenting on 220373.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning. State your name for the record and proceed with your testimony.

MS. FREELAND: Thank you. My name is Katherine Freeland and I'm the Public Health Program Director at the Hepatitis B Foundation. Thank you so

1
2 much for the opportunity to speak to you
3 about viral hepatitis and its impact on
4 the City of Philadelphia.

5 There are approximately 25,000
6 individuals living with hepatitis B in
7 this city and about 50,000 living with
8 hepatitis C, and since 2008, the
9 Hepatitis B Foundation and its coalition,
10 Hep B United Philadelphia, have been
11 working in underserved communities to
12 bring access to healthcare services and
13 awareness of hepatitis B and its link
14 between liver cancer.

15 Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic,
16 we received a heart-wrenching call from a
17 teacher who was looking for information
18 for a student. He was a young
19 19-year-old soccer player whose family
20 originated from West Africa and was only
21 given a couple of months to live. He had
22 liver cancer caused by hepatitis B but
23 did not know about his ongoing hepatitis
24 B infection, was not receiving care or
25 management and, as a result, passed away

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far too soon.

Unfortunately, this is a common story in our communities and one that is completely preventable. Like this young man, most do not know about their hepatitis B infection, and it's almost always a silent disease.

Hepatitis B impacts African immigrant, Asian American, Pacific Islander communities and is one of the leading health disparities for these populations. We're also seeing hepatitis B on the rise among persons who inject drugs, and in 2019, the Philadelphia Department of Public Health released a health advisory noting a 175 percent increase between 2017 to 2019 within this population alone.

The challenge with hepatitis B is lack of awareness, lack of testing, lack of vaccination and prevention efforts, and limited access to healthcare services due to a variety of challenges, like language and costs, for example.

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2 We hope that the recognition of
3 this month as Hepatitis Awareness Month
4 can work towards bringing attention and
5 awareness of the link between hepatitis
6 and liver cancer.

7 Right now liver cancer is on
8 the rise in the United States, and it is
9 expected to continue to rise unless more
10 efforts to work towards prevention, early
11 detection, and screening for hepatitis B
12 and C are done.

13 We as a coalition continue to
14 live out our mission and reach
15 underserved communities through
16 screening, vaccination, and education,
17 and we hope to continue to partner with
18 City Council as we work towards reaching
19 elimination goals of viral hepatitis in
20 the City.

21 Thank you so much for working
22 towards this resolution and for your time
23 and we hope for your support for
24 Hepatitis Awareness Month.

25 Thank you so much.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you so much for your testimony. We appreciate it.

members regarding speeches, I will note
for the record at this time that we will

Microsoft Teams to allow members to
signify that they wish to be recognized.

With that said, speeches on
behalf of the minority?

The Chair recognizes Councilman

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Oh.

COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much, Council President. I have two matters to comment on.

First, I'd like to wish everyone a happy May 5th, Cinco de Mayo, and just clarify it's not Mexican Independence Day. It's actually the day that the Mexicans defeated the French Empire at the Battle of Puebla. And we happen to have a very large population of folks from Puebla living here in our city, and I always enjoy their festivities when you see them with the French costumes and the horses. That's all a reenactment of the Battle of Puebla. So I certainly want to join in celebrating victory over being conquered by the French Empire.

On a more serious note, I want to just note that on Tuesday, Norman Mineta passed away. For those who don't know Norman Mineta, he was a cabinet member under two presidencies, republican

1
2 and democrat. He's a lifelong democrat,
3 a proud democrat. He spent his early
4 childhood in an incarceration camp, also
5 called an internment camp, because he was
6 a Japanese American child, and during
7 World War II, many Japanese Americans
8 were placed in incarceration camps.

9 After graduating from college,
10 he served in the U.S. Army. He served
11 during the Korean War as an intelligence
12 officer. He later was elected to City
13 Council in San Jose, became Vice Mayor
14 and then Mayor in San Jose, and in 1975,
15 he ran for Congress, served 20 years, to
16 1995, where he retired as Chair of the
17 very powerful Public Transportation -- or
18 Transportation and Public Works
19 Committee. And then in 2000, President
20 Bill Clinton nominated him, and he passed
21 the Senate confirmation process to become
22 the first Asian American to serve at a
23 secretary level. And following that,
24 President George W. Bush appointed him as
25 Secretary of Transportation.

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2 In 1994, he founded the
3 Congressional Asian Pacific American
4 Caucus and an institute, and it was that
5 institute that I had the pleasure of
6 working with its first Executive
7 Director, Francey Lim Youngberg, and
8 Congressman Norm Mineta.

9 What a wonderful gentleman,
10 just a wonderful person to work with, a
11 proud democrat but always very
12 broad-minded in his public service,
13 putting the public interest first, a real
14 great example for America but also
15 specifically for Asian Americans, as he
16 was someone who broke many barriers.

17 He will be greatly missed. He
18 died at 90. And I did introduce a
19 resolution today, but I just wanted to
20 note that we will miss him, and certainly
21 he's impacted us here in Philadelphia.
22 And condolences to his family and all
23 loved ones.

24 Thank you very much, Council
25 President.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you, Councilman.
Speeches on behalf of the
majority?
The Chair recognizes Councilman
Green.
COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
Council President.
I wanted to thank Councilmember
Oh for that history, both on Cinco de
Mayo and regarding the late Senator --
I'm sorry; late Secretary Norm Mineta and
his leadership and legacy.
This week, Council President, a
number of members of Council had an
opportunity to see a survey from the
diverse chambers talking about the real
issues that their members are having as
small businesses in the City of
Philadelphia.
They talked about issues of
crime and taxes, and we know we have a
25 percent poverty rate in our city, and
this survey really kind of illustrated

1
2 what we all know, that we have a very
3 challenging tax structure in the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 We also know the pandemic has
6 been really challenging for small
7 businesses, especially Black and Brown
8 businesses. Nearly twice as many Black
9 and Brown businesses closed during the
10 pandemic at a rate of about 41 percent.

11 And so we know in this city we
12 have a very difficult tax structure, and
13 Council President, through your
14 leadership, you put together a Tax Reform
15 Working Group that myself and
16 Councilmember Maria Quinones-Sanchez,
17 Councilmember Domb, yourself, the
18 Administration, citizens from around the
19 City were part of that Tax Reform Working
20 Group. And so we started meeting in
21 August of 2021 really looking at the
22 challenges we have in tax policy in the
23 City.

24 And it was my understanding
25 from the Administration that they will be

1
2 looking at the proposals coming out of
3 the Tax Reform Working Group as proposals
4 for the City of Philadelphia and that we
5 continued to meet with the Administration
6 not only throughout last year, early part
7 of this year, and even in the Mayor's
8 budget speech, I thought we were on the
9 same page of trying to come up with a
10 proposal. We knew that we couldn't
11 really put together a proposal until we
12 had the City's real estate assessments.

13 So I was somewhat shocked this
14 week and I think other members of Council
15 as well as the Tax Reform Working Group
16 and citizens around the City that when we
17 received the assessment information, the
18 Mayor also provided a proposal regarding
19 taxes. This was something that was a
20 different perspective. I thought we were
21 all on the same team until that proposal
22 came out. And in many ways, I can -- I
23 feel like members of the Sixers when Ben
24 Simmons just decided he was going to
25 leave the team and do his own thing.

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2 We as a body know that we don't
3 have that option. We can't just walk off
4 the court and leave the team. And so as
5 we go through the budget process and deal
6 with the hard issues of how we allocate
7 all the resources that come into the City
8 of Philadelphia, including the
9 \$1.4 billion from the American Rescue
10 Plan, we're going to have to balance all
11 of these issues, issues of how we deal
12 with public safety, which is the number
13 one concern in our city, how we provide
14 the resources that we need for the
15 quality of life services for the citizens
16 in the City of Philadelphia, as well as
17 tax policy.

18 So I look forward to a robust
19 debate in this body as we grapple with
20 all these issues and try to balance
21 between how we look at our tax policy in
22 the City of Philadelphia and address the
23 issues that so many of our constituents
24 need for us to address as part of the
25 budget process.

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I hope that the Mayor will collaborate with us as we go through this process and rejoin the team.

Thank you, Council President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman.

The Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good morning, Mr. President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

Mr. President, I wanted to just note for the record that on today, Councilmembers Johnson, Jamie Gauthier, Cindy Bass, Helen Gym, and I had the great honor and privilege to be joined by City Controller Rebecca Rhynhart, Congressman Brendan Boyle, and our PA House Representative and Chair of the Pennsylvania Legislative Black Caucus Donna Bullock in attending a pre-Mother's Day breakfast that was held at the School District of Philadelphia by

1
2 the organization that we wish were not in
3 existence, Mothers in Charge, led and
4 founded by Dorothy Johnson-Speight. And
5 this pre-Mother's Day breakfast,
6 Mr. President, their theme is "A Mother's
7 Plea for Peace, Sons Please Put Down Your
8 Guns."

9 After the breakfast, they are
10 going to start a march, Mr. President,
11 from the School District at 440 North
12 Broad Street and it's going to proceed
13 down Broad Street to City Hall and
14 they're going to have a rally, being led
15 by the mothers here at City Hall.

16 So I know all of the women of
17 Council, if schedules permit, were asked
18 to come and all members of Council, if
19 you can come, please be there at the
20 rally. We're going to present our formal
21 citation from the City Council of
22 Philadelphia and to thank those mothers
23 for channeling their pain and suffering
24 and grief into action.

25 Thank you so very much,

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Mr. President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilwoman.

The Chair recognizes Councilman
Johnson.

COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
Council President.

I just want to take a moment
and ask if we could have a moment of
silence for former State Representative
Harold James. He represented the 186th
Legislative District covering the areas
of South Philadelphia and Southwest
Philadelphia, and he passed this week.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you, Councilman. Have a moment of
silence.

COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
Council President. I had the great
opportunity to work with former State
Representative Harold James. He served
as the President of the Guardian Civic
League. He served as a Chairperson of
the Pennsylvania Legislative Black

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Caucus. He was a former Philadelphia police officer. He was also on the forefront of criminal justice reform before it became a wave.

He was always advocating to make sure that individuals who were defendants in cases receive their rights properly. He was on the forefront of making sure that interrogations by police were videotaped. On countless times I've watched him challenge our former District Attorney, Lynne Abraham, regarding the role that the District Attorney's Office played in partnership with the Philadelphia Police Department in addressing a variety of different issues that significantly have an impact on the African American community.

So just want to take a moment just to acknowledge his leadership and the work that he has done here in the City of Philadelphia.

For all those on the listening audience who are listening, his wake will

1
2 take place on Wednesday, May the 11th at
3 Tasker Street Missionary Baptist Church
4 in South Philadelphia, 2010 Tasker
5 Street, from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m., and his
6 funeral will take place on Thursday, May
7 the 12th at Yesha Ministries beginning at
8 10:00 a.m. located at 23rd and Snyder
9 Avenue.

10 Thank you very much, Council
11 President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I wanted to take a moment to
acknowledge the attendance of the
Governor, the Mayor, the Managing
Director, Member O'Neill, and Member
Squilla at the Police and Fireman's
Memorial yesterday. As we sat out there
representing City Council and we looked
out at the audience of families who had
lost their loved ones in the service of
the City of Philadelphia, it truly put in
perspective what the definition of public
service really truly means.

In one case, one of the
officers that passed away, Officer Tab
Ali, was from the 5th District, which is
in the Fourth Councilmanic District. I
remember him as always being a guardian
of people, a guardian of public safety.

The last time we were together,
it was with some of the members of City
Council on a bike ride. He literally

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rode the bike. He stopped in intersections. Katherine Gilmore was with us, Member Thomas was there, Member Squilla was there, and I just remember how humble a servant he was.

He is truly missed, along with the other firemen and police that lost their lives, and many of them lost their lives due to COVID over the last two years, and we want to thank them for their service, thank their families for their sacrifice.

Thank you, Mr. President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman. True soldiers for the City of Philadelphia.

The Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you, Council President.

I just want to echo Councilman Jones. I couldn't make that event, but that's the ultimate sacrifice, so thank you for bringing that up. And I also

1
2 want to be in support of Councilman Green
3 on this Tax Reform Commission, and we
4 should have another meeting on that, but
5 also in that diversity chambers that we
6 heard this week, I think it was
7 Councilman Green, Councilmember Sanchez,
8 Councilmember Thomas, myself, and other
9 staffers of all of our offices heard from
10 these chambers, the diverse chambers,
11 about how tough it is for these
12 businesses to survive in our city with
13 what they have to deal with, especially
14 the last three years. So we do have to
15 try to help them.

16 And I also want to mention to
17 you, Councilman Jones, last night I was
18 with a developer, Michael Davis, who is
19 developing the Budd Company in your
20 district, I guess, and he was mentioning
21 to me that I think they have like three
22 million square feet for life sciences,
23 but how difficult it is to hire people
24 from outside the City because of the wage
25 taxes. They're having some trouble with

1
2 that.

3 So I'm just sharing some of
4 these issues, because in the long run, we
5 are on the verge of an explosion in our
6 city of life science, and it's cell and
7 gene therapy, what we're known throughout
8 the world as being at the very top, and
9 many of our companies that have been
10 started here through Penn and other
11 places have stayed here, but many have
12 also gone to Boston and other cities.

13 And I say this because we have
14 to make sure that we keep these companies
15 here. We need to -- they are important
16 jobs for the City but also important for
17 us too in our schools, as we mentioned
18 yesterday, to make sure that our schools
19 are training our students for this
20 future, because this is a game-changer
21 for the City. It's not just about people
22 from outside getting jobs here. It's
23 about the students and the residents of
24 our city getting these jobs.

25 But I can tell you, we have

1
2 someone in our city who is like the
3 Godfather of cell and gene therapy who's
4 formed companies in excess of \$15 billion
5 of market capitalization right here in
6 Philadelphia. Half of them have left.
7 We have to figure out ways to keep them
8 here. That's very important for this
9 space.

10 So I'm just -- I'll be back to
11 all of you with some ideas, but I wanted
12 to mention that this is something that I
13 think is extremely important for the
14 economy of our city and to grow our
15 economy, and we need to support all those
16 life science companies, as we do with
17 other businesses.

18 Thank you very much, Council
19 President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you very
22 much. Must seize the opportunity when
23 it's presented to us, because it may not
24 be there for long.

25 Mr. Decker, I believe that

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concludes the speeches on behalf of the minority and the majority.

So with that, the Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for a motion to adjourn.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you, Mr. President. I move that Council stand adjourned until Thursday, May 12th, 2022 at 10:00 a.m.
