19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
24 motion carries.

1 10/30/25 - STATED - GUESTS

2 The Chair will dispense
3 with the regular order of business
4 to recognize the guests and
5 visitors joining us in chambers
6 this morning. On behalf of all
7 members of City Council, I welcome
8 you to our Council session. We
9 appreciate your taking the time to
10 join us as we attend to the
11 legislative affairs of our great
12 city. We certainly invite you to
13 come again.

14 The next order of
15 business is presentations. At this
16 time, the Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Curtis Jones, Jr.,
18 who will present a resolution
19 honoring and recognizing Bernie
20 Prazenica on the occasion of his
21 retirement after 17 outstanding
22 years of distinguished service as
23 President and General Manager of
24 WPVI-TV 6ABC.

2 Will Bernie Prazenica

3 and those accompanying him please

4 join Councilmember Curtis Jones at

5 the podium. Joining Councilmember

6 Jones are the following members,

7 Councilmember Landau, Councilmember

8 Nicolas O'Rourke, Councilmember Jim

9 Harrity, Councilmember Mike

10 Driscoll, Councilmember Phillips,

11 Councilmember O'Neill and

12 Councilmember Squilla.

13 (Councilmembers and

14 guests approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: The floor is yours,

17 Member Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: There

19 goes that news van again. So there

20 are certain things that are

21 Philadelphia; cheesesteaks, water

22 ice, water plugs and Bernie

23 Prazenica. They are all a part of

24 the fabric of the City of

2 Philadelphia. Without his
3 leadership -- oh, and by the way,
4 Council President, the news station
5 is located in the 4th Councilmanic
6 District.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Absolutely.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: There
10 you go. You got the stadiums. I
11 got the stations. So when we look
12 at what his 17 years has
13 represented, you can't have
14 Thanksgiving without the
15 Thanksgiving Day Parade, which
16 they've consistently covered. You
17 can't have some of the -- when
18 everybody else was getting away
19 from DEI, he hosted Black History.
20 He hosted mayors that came here of
21 color. He did not back up, he did
22 not waver, he did not flinch. And
23 we appreciate him. He is truly,
24 truly a Philadelphian.

2 I remember those macro
3 things that he does. But one day
4 he called me up to the station, I
5 was impressed. I said, he called
6 me up to the station. I wonder
7 what this is about. Maybe he's
8 going to bestow some type of 4th
9 District award or something like
10 that. He looks out the window and
11 says, you see that street over
12 there, it needs a streetlight and
13 it's dangerous and you're the
14 District Councilman. Do you
15 remember that?

16 MR. PRAZENICA: I do.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: And
18 for the record, I got it done. So
19 his orders shall be punctually
20 obeyed. I don't know what this
21 city would have been like without
22 17 years ago you stepping up to the
23 plate. And all I will know -- and
24 that's in '07, and that was the

2 year I ran and me and you came and
3 did service together, so I'm not
4 leaving. You can stay. You can
5 stay too.

6 So we hope that he will
7 still be around, providing his
8 leadership and guidance to the
9 media at-large, in the city in

12 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:
13 Honoring and recognizing Bernie
14 Prazenica on the occasion of his
15 retirement after 17 years of
16 distinguished service as President
17 and General Manager of WPVI-TV
18 6ABC;

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
20 Whereas, Bernie Prazenica, a Temple
21 University graduate, began his
22 broadcasting career in Pittsburgh
23 in 1982, later holding leadership
24 positions in Richmond, Virginia and

2 Raleigh, North Carolina before
3 returning home to Philadelphia in
4 1994; and

5 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

6 Whereas, in 2007 Prazenica was
7 named President and General Manager
8 of 6ABC, becoming the longest
9 serving General Manager in the
10 station's history, and for nearly
11 two decades has guided the city's
12 most watched local newscast, Action
13 News; and

14 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

15 Whereas, under his leadership WPVI
16 continued its dominance as
17 Philadelphia's top-rated local news
18 station, a tradition spanning
19 nearly half a century and
20 maintained its reputation for
21 journalistic excellence, community
22 service, innovation; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

24 Whereas, Prazenica oversaw the

2 completion of a new office and

3 state-of-the-art studios on City

4 Avenue in 2009 and -- yeah, 2009,

5 ensuring the station remained

6 competitive in an evolving media

7 landscape; and

8 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

9 Whereas, throughout his career

10 Prazenica was described by longtime

11 anchor Jim Gardner as a guy who

12 keeps the lights on at 6ABC,

13 reflecting his steady leadership

14 behind the scenes, dedication and

15 commitment to both staff and

16 community; and

17 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

18 Whereas, Prazenica's career has

19 been marked not only by his

20 professional achievements but also

21 by his compassion, humility and

22 competitive drive. These qualities

23 made him a respected leader, mentor

24 and colleague; and

3 Giving up the Republican.

4 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

5 Whereas -- and proud to be
6 actually. Whereas, on December 31,
7 2025, Bernie -- I don't like being
8 called by my last name so it's
9 Bernie -- Bernie will step down as
10 President and General Manager,
11 closing a remarkable chapter in
12 Philadelphia broadcasting history
13 and leaving behind a legacy that
14 will continue to shape the station
15 for years to come; now, therefore,
16 be it

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:

18 Resolved, by the Council of the
19 City of Philadelphia, that it
20 Hereby honors and recognizes Bernie
21 Prazenica on the occasion of his
22 retirement and expresses its
23 gratitude for his many years of
24 leadership at WPVI 6ABC and his

2 contributions to the Philadelphia
3 civic and cultural leadership;

4 Further resolved, that
5 this Engrossed copy of this
6 resolution be presented to Bernie
7 Prazenica as a small token of

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Congratulations,
12 Mr. Prazenica. The floor is yours
13 for remarks.

14 MR. PRAZENICA: Oh.
15 Well, I'm overwhelmed, to say the
16 least. Thank you. First off,
17 Council President Johnson, and
18 happy birthday. I hope that's okay
19 to say that. District 4, the best
20 district, right. The support of
21 Councilmember Jones has been
22 amazing. Not only does he fix
23 streets, but he's there for
24 everything that we need and we

3 Of course, his wife

4 Jazelle is the best and maybe even

5 better.

6 (Applause.)

7 MR. PRAZENICA: She's

8 just been the best to 6ABC. And to

9 everyone at Council, this ballet

10 that you performed is just amazing.

11 Thank you. Thank you for

12 recognizing me. I have my wife

13 Patty and my son Michael --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Smart man.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. PRAZENICA: Without

18 my family, you know, nothing goes

19 bright or nothing goes at all. So

20 I love them and thank them for

21 being here. I want to recognize my

22 team at 6ABC because quite frankly,

23 they're the ones that do all the

24 work. I may get some credit for

2 it, but they're behind me. And
3 guys, I appreciate you so much.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. PRAZENICA: And my
6 friends from the City Avenue
7 Services District are here with me,
8 Brian Fenstermaker. You know it's
9 been a joy to be part of the City
10 Avenue corridor and Brian's doing
11 an amazing job pushing us forward.
12 So listen, it's just been an honor
13 to be part of 6ABC and to have the
14 opportunity to do some significant
15 things for the city of Philadelphia
16 and for this region. And again,
17 it's a long heritage not started by
18 Bernie, but by many, many years of
19 recognizing that if we're all going
20 to move our community forward, we
21 need to do it together and we have
22 a loud voice and it's an
23 opportunity to do some good things.
24 So thank you so much for this. I'm

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
14 JOHNSON: Thank you. Before
15 considering these bills and
16 resolutions, we will now consider
17 public comment as follows: The
18 public comment must concern matters
19 on a Second Reading and Final
20 Passage Calendars for possible
21 action at today's Council session.

22 All speakers must sign
23 up in order to testify. If you
24 have not already signed up for

2 today's session, please do so now
3 by giving your name to Ms. Hasson
4 at the table outside the rails to
5 my left. Once you have signed up,
6 you will be called in the order in
7 which your name appears on the

9 Under ideal
10 circumstances, public commenters
11 each will have three minutes to
12 speak. However, this time limit
13 may vary from session to session.
14 Today the time limit will be two
15 minutes. In order to be fair to
16 all those wishing to speak, I
17 intend to hold faithfully to the
18 two-minute limit.

19 When you begin speaking,
20 you will see a green light on the
21 podium. When there are 30 seconds
22 remaining to your time, the light
23 will turn yellow which is your
24 reminder to conclude your remarks.

2 Once two minutes have passed, the

12 I will now ask the Chief
13 Clerk to please read the name of
14 our first speaker.

15 CHIEF CLERK: May Kate
16 Perez, Zachary Wilcha, Pamela
17 Rainey Lawler, David Alexander
18 Jenkins, Jake and Sarah Adams and
19 Nancy Rimmer please make their way
20 to the podium.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 witness table.)

23 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez
24 commenting on Bill 250708,

2 adjusting the punishments for
3 violating stop orders. The city
4 wants to make it clear if you're
5 told to stop and still persist,
6 there will be consequences. As of
7 Tuesday, our sister city ceasefire
8 violation count has jumped to more
9 than 125, having murdered 104
10 people just last night with 46 of
11 them being children.

12 More than 200 people
13 were injured and hundreds more are
14 still trapped under the rubble,
15 making it Day 754 of paramedics
16 digging through the rubble for
17 remains for people or their
18 remains. I am still shocked at the
19 photos of headless children being
20 walked into overcrowded, crumbling
21 hospitals from last night.

22 Any person who violates
23 Section A 504.7 shall be subject to
24 immediate arrest by police and

2 issued a citation. This is similar
3 to the arrest warrant the ICJ
4 submitted calling for the arrest of
5 war criminal Netanyahu and some of
6 his cabinet. I worry that our
7 partnerships with the occupation
8 grows our apathy to human rights,
9 especially as we somehow still
10 allow cross-trainings between the
11 PPD and the IOF.

12 These are the same
13 soldiers that regularly arrest
14 Palestinian children during
15 nighttime raids, separating and
16 interrogating them for hours before
17 bringing kids as young as 12 before
18 a judge and holding them in
19 military prisons indefinitely.
20 We're seeing increases of ICE
21 activity and we know their history
22 of separating children.

23 Just Tuesday, we had
24 Mahmoud Khalil in our city fighting

2 for his freedom of speech. We need
3 to enact an arms embargo against
4 Israel now.

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. WILCHA: Hello.

7 Good morning, Council President
8 Johnson. Happy birthday to you and
9 to anybody else in this room that
10 that applies to and good morning to
11 all of City Council. Appreciate
12 the chance to speak. My name is
13 Zach Wilcha, pronouns he/him and
14 his. And I'm CEO of the
15 Independence Business Alliance. I
16 represent our Board staff corporate
17 partners are amazing members today
18 in support of but more accurately,
19 in gratitude for Councilmember
20 Landau's resolution recognizing our
21 ongoing work as well as our recent
22 achievement of being National
23 LGBTQ+ Chamber of the Year by the
24 National LGBT and Allied Chamber of

2 Commerce.

3 We thank City Council,
4 not only for this recognition and
5 not only for taking us seriously as
6 a member of the Diverse Chambers
7 Coalition of Philadelphia and
8 inviting us to have seats at the

10 made about our community's economic
11 and social well-being, but also for
12 making the work we do possible
13 without having to play defense.

14 The work that LGBTQ+
15 Chambers do is more important than
16 ever. And at the IBA for the last
17 nearly two decades, we consider
18 entrepreneurship and steady
19 employment in affirming spaces, the
20 paths to self determination for
21 queer people and that the vitality
22 of business and efforts to maintain
23 a robust economy depend on a
24 diverse and inclusive workforce and

2 clientele, the ability to feel
3 safe, valued and protected from
4 bigotry even in this challenging
5 era or especially in this era.

6 We must do the right
7 thing for communities and the good
8 thing for the bottom line. At the

10 to prioritize the programs that
11 focus on trans and diverse
12 communities, even if that prospect
13 is scary right now because they are
14 central to our mission and because
15 LGBTQ+ Chambers are uniquely
16 positioned to lead in these spaces.

17 We are so honored to
18 work amongst the very best that our
19 community has to offer, the Chamber
20 leaders and elected officials
21 across the city who are friends and
22 colleagues and brave innovators in
23 the face of dark times and we are
24 grateful for your support and

2 encouragement as we do what's best
3 for our communities that we
4 represent in Philadelphia.

5 Our work would not be
6 possible without a supportive City
7 Council whose vision aligns with
8 ours to foster an environment of

11 LGBTQ+ communities and all of those
12 who support equality. Thank you,
13 Councilmember Landau and all of
14 City Council for the citation.
15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. RAINEY LAWLER: Good
18 morning, Councilmembers and thank
19 you, Councilwoman Landau, for
20 introducing this very important
21 resolution and recognition of
22 November to be the month of
23 recognizing homelessness and
24 hunger.

2 As you all know, we're
3 all dealing with the amazing
4 cutbacks in federal assistance,
5 food assistance. My name is Pam
6 Rainey Law -- you know, this is --
7 anyway. Can I -- oh, good, thank
8 you. My name is Pam Rainey Lawler
9 and I'm the founder and board
10 member at Philabundance and we've
11 been involved in this work for 40
12 years. And it's hard to believe
13 that 40 years on we're still
14 dealing with this problem. The
15 need is greater than ever as we all
16 know.

17 I mean, the media is
18 filled with the stories of people
19 who are struggling every day to
20 meet their most basic needs.
21 Philabundance is stepping up to the
22 plate, as are many other
23 organizations that are working on
24 the whole issue of food security.

2 You know, food security,
3 it's an interesting term. It's the
4 term that we use a lot, but we're
5 talking about hunger and people who
6 don't have enough food to eat every
7 day, whether it's families,
8 children, seniors. So I think all
9 of us care very deeply about this
10 issue, exacerbating the crisis that
11 people are dealing with in terms of
12 high cost of living. The cutbacks
13 in federal assistance have been
14 profound in the past couple of
15 months.

16 It is -- oh, you know, I
17 wonder if a whistle might be a good
18 idea when someone goes over. You
19 know, I bring whistles to things.
20 Anyway, I'm basically here to say
21 that the situation is -- does that
22 mean no? Does that mean I'm done?
23 Okay. You could call me.

24 Anyway, you know that

2 the situation is dreadful. People
3 are dealing with the most profound
4 situation. In November and why
5 this resolution is so important is
6 because SNAP benefits which help
7 solve the problem, but don't do it
8 completely, are going to be
9 withheld, and the federal
10 government is not releasing --
11 okay, I got to wrap it up.

12 I could have read the
13 whole thing which some people
14 prepared for me, but you get the
15 gist. And, Councilmember Landau,
16 thank you so much for doing this.
17 It's all about recognition and
18 taking action to solve this
19 incredible problem. These are
20 solvable problems. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

23 Thank you.

24 MR. JENKINS: Madam

3 Alexander Jenkins and I rise again
4 to address Resolution 250303,
5 jumping at the opportunity to
6 complete the thought I began two
7 weeks or last week ago with only
8 two minutes to paint more broadly
9 my enthusiasm about the Justice
10 Juvenile Service Center.

11 The phrase Carpe Diem
12 is broadly entered into
13 (inaudible). We are taught to
14 believe in English it is translated
15 to mean seize the day. No, no, I'm
16 sorry, that is wrong. It does not
17 actually mean that. For those of
18 us who are intimately more familiar
19 with Latin, I can tell you that
20 that is incorrect.

21 Carpe diem actually
22 means to pluck the day, pluck --
23 come on, somebody. To pluck
24 requires discernment. It is a

2 gentle, yet deliberate, act that
3 asks us to mind and heart, to
4 choose carefully what is ripe for
5 the moment, like seizing something
6 which simply and blankly overlooks
7 it all. Carpe requires us to
8 insist something is chosen.

9 And so, when we speak of
10 Carpe Diem in the context of
11 Juvenile Justice Service Center
12 schools, we are not applauding
13 conquest but celebrating
14 cultivation. For 20 years this
15 program has plucked with intention
16 and care from our city's young
17 people. Judges, educators, mentors
18 and advocates who have reached deep
19 into the lives of many often
20 overlooked, they have selected each
21 moment spent as an opportunity to
22 impart wisdom, dignity and hope.
23 It is just as easy to haphazardly
24 misinterpret the word carpe as it

2 is to overlook the lives of those
3 touched by this program, easy to
4 speak of justice in broad,
5 aspirational terms.

6 But carpe diem reminds
7 us that justice is intimate. It
8 happens in choosing. When a judge
9 pauses to listen, when a teacher
10 extends that silence for a space of
11 grace, when a student for the first
12 time believes the diem ahead might
13 truly belong to them.

14 Today as we commend this
15 program and all who sustain it, let
16 us impart across the great city its
17 titled tenet, that each life in our
18 care is worthy and ripe for
19 choosing that the plucked fruit of
20 that labor nourishes our city for
21 the next 20 years and far beyond.
22 I yield back.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

4 Jake and Sarah Adams, Nancy Rimmer.
5 May Robert Sims, Lynn Landes and

10 MR. ADAMS: Good
11 afternoon. My name is Jacob Adams
12 and this is my wife, Sarah. We
13 have ran and owned the Barber's
14 Hall in Philadelphia, 1402 West
15 Oxford Street for 47 years. I'd
16 like to thank you for recognizing
17 the Barber's Hall for the service
18 that we have rendered to the
19 community.

20 And I'd also like to let
21 you know that my wife and I, we've
22 been married 60 years.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. ADAMS: And another

2 thing, I'd like for all of you to
3 know that I have been a Ward leader
4 under Tate, under Rizzo, under
5 Wilson Goode. I've been a Ward
6 leader for over 20 years serving

9 I'd like to thank you all for
10 recognizing me and my wife as well
11 and naming Oxford Street Jacob and
12 Sarah Adams Way. Thank you so
13 much.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your
17 service.

18 MR. ADAMS: That's all I
19 have to say.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

21 Thank you so much for all that
22 you've done for the city. Thank
23 you.

24 MS. RIMMER: Good

2 morning. My name is Nancy Rimmer.
3 I'm the Legal and Advocacy Director
4 at the Homeless Advocacy Project or
5 HAP. HAP is a legal services
6 organization that represents
7 adults, youth and children
8 experiencing or at risk of
9 homelessness in a variety of civil
10 legal matters such as public
11 benefit applications, eviction,
12 judgment relief, shelter advocacy,
13 identification issues and more.
14 HAP meets its clients
15 where they are. We hold legal
16 clinics every week at city homeless
17 shelters and social service
18 agencies, and we know from
19 firsthand experience that our
20 clients are facing growing food and
21 housing insecurity because their
22 ability to access food assistance
23 as well as evidence-based housing
24 and treatment programs is in

2 jeopardy.

3 We support today's
4 resolution to recognize Hunger and
5 Homelessness Awareness Month and we
6 thank Councilmembers Landau,
7 Gauthier and Young as well as the
8 other members of City Council and
9 numerous organizations throughout
10 Philadelphia who are advocating for
11 housing and food justice on behalf
12 of the most vulnerable residents of
13 our city. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have
18 Robert Sims, Lynn Landes, Allison
19 Houghton. May Jeremy Blatstein and
20 Ogbonna Hagins also make their way
21 to the podium.

22 MR. SIMS: Yes. Hello.

23 My name is Robert Sims. I'm here
24 to talk about the juvenile justice

2 system. Our juvenile justice
3 system is twisted, man. We really
4 need to talk to our kids and
5 straighten them out so we don't
6 have to -- so they don't have to go
7 through the juvenile system.

8 Me, myself, I was in a
9 juvenile system, not like -- so I'm
10 saying we need to really talk to
11 our kids, show them we love them,
12 man, so they don't turn their backs
13 on us and end up in the juvenile
14 system.

15 But anyway, again I need
16 to talk about the thing that's
17 going on in the streets. I'm
18 running for inspector of election.
19 I chose to run with the pedophiles,
20 the people that's trying to -- that
21 like to have little intercourse
22 with little kids. I need to talk
23 about that. I need to get on that.
24 I've been striving and running on

2 that point for a long time. Thank
3 you. Have a nice day.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

5 Thank you.

6 MS. LANDES: Good
7 morning. I'm Lynn Landes of
8 Safestreetsphilly.org. I oppose
9 some sections of the bill regarding
10 minimal training -- minimum
11 training for security officers,
12 such as requiring training program
13 be owned and operated by a
14 nonprofit. That sounds like a gift
15 to the nonprofit community.

16 I'd also like to point
17 out that currently and in violation
18 of Title 9-4400, many security
19 personnel do not take
20 responsibility for what goes on
21 outside of their facilities,
22 particularly on their sidewalks,
23 such as at the Reading Terminal
24 Market.

2 But more importantly,
3 when security personnel do secure
4 someone who has violated the law
5 and the police arrest the
6 offenders, our District Attorney
7 Larry Krasner is systematically
8 failing to enforce the law and
9 refusing to prosecute many of them.
10 Worse yet, it has been reported
11 that Larry Krasner has essentially
12 invited those who have been
13 lawfully and rightfully convicted
14 and incarcerated to appeal their
15 sentences and sue for damages to
16 which his office rolls over.

17 Recently, the FBI and
18 our police department broke up a
19 large criminal syndicate freely
20 operating in Kensington, but those
21 arrested will be tried in federal
22 court because Krasner cannot be
23 trusted to do his job. Public
24 safety is government's number one

2 job. Yet businesses and residents
3 continue to flee our unsafe city
4 because private security cannot
5 overcome a fundamentally flawed
6 public prosecutor's office.

7 Very sincerely, Mayor
8 Parker and City Council need to put
9 an end to the reign of terror that
10 is DA Krasner and publicly endorse
11 Democrat Pat Dugan for District
12 Attorney for next week's election
13 on November 4th. And if that
14 doesn't work, they should sue Larry
15 Krasner for failure to do his job
16 and enforce the law. Thank you.

17 MS. HOUGHTON: My name
18 is Allison Houghton and I'm here on
19 behalf of Bethesda Project. I just
20 wanted to thank every
21 Councilmember, Councilmember
22 Landau, Councilmember Gauthier for
23 introducing the resolution and for
24 the continued partnership and

21 the local nonprofit sector during

22 Hunger and Homelessness Awareness

23 Month. We are proud to stand

24 beside Philadelphia City Council

2 and our other homeless services
3 providers and hunger aware --
4 hunger -- I saw Philabundance was
5 here, and that's why I'm shouting
6 them out -- services providers in
7 Philadelphia and beyond. So thank
8 you, everyone.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

11 Thank you.

12 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello.
13 Happy 30th birthday, City Council
14 President Johnson.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: Thank you.

17 MR. BLATSTEIN: My name
18 is Jeremy Blatstein and I'm here
19 today in support of Bill No.
20 250648. Now, some might look at
21 this bill and call it spot zoning
22 because we're talking about
23 rezoning a single lot on Broad
24 Street from ICM-X to CMX-4. But

2 what I want to stress is that this
3 is actually about a broader
4 principle.

5 The City of Philadelphia
6 last overhauled its zoning map back
7 in 2012. And ever since then,
8 we've been layering on these zoning
9 overlays that restrict where
10 housing can be built. Some
11 districts did implement the 2035
12 plan, but the overlays counteracted
13 any progress that was made. It
14 shouldn't be the norm that you have
15 to go to a City Councilmember or go
16 through the lengthy ZBA process
17 just to do basic development in
18 Philadelphia, especially along our
19 transit corridors.

20 If we're serious about
21 the growing Philly to 2 milli
22 vision, yes, that means growing our
23 population to 2 million, maybe not
24 in five years but it should be a

2 guiding star, then we need to be
3 pro growth, pro housing and pro
4 jobs. That means making it easier,
5 not harder, to build by-right and
6 it means this Council needs to take
7 a hard look at how we rezone and
8 allow more housing to be built
9 without unnecessary obstacles.

10 In short, let's not
11 create more problems by making
12 developers jump through hoops or
13 risking lawsuits over ZBA rulings.
14 Let's make Philadelphia a place
15 where growth is straightforward and
16 opportunities are plentiful.

17 And last but not least,
18 we're talking about SEPTA, but not

3 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
7 resolution is adopted.

8 Would the Chief Clerk
9 please read the title of the next
10 resolution.

11 CHIEF CLERK: A
12 privileged resolution commending
13 the Department of Licenses and
14 Inspections for launching its new
15 Virtual Inspection Program and
16 celebrating its continued efforts
17 to develop proactive rental
18 property inspections to have safe
19 and healthy homes. Introduced by
20 Councilmember O'Rourke.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember O'Rourke for a motion
24 on the resolution.

19 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the

21 Would the Chief Clerk
22 please read the title of the next
23 resolution.

24 CHIEF CLERK: A

2 privileged resolution honoring the
3 Saint Hubert's Catholic High School
4 for Girls' soccer team for winning
5 the 2025 Philadelphia Catholic
6 League Championship. Introduced by
7 Councilmember Driscoll.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes
10 Councilmember Mike Driscoll for a
11 motion on the resolution.

12 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: I
13 move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: It has been moved and
18 properly seconded that the
19 resolution be adopted.

20 All those in favor of
21 the motion will signify by saying
22 aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
6 resolution is adopted.

7 Would the Chief Clerk
8 please read the title of the next
9 resolution.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Council
11 President, there are no further
12 resolutions in my possession.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

15 Are there any brief
16 speeches on behalf of the Minority?

17 Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Nicolas O'Rourke.

19 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:
20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 I do have a word from
22 the Minority today and today that
23 word is vigilance, compound word
24 vigilance. Vigilance for a few

2 reasons. One, I introduced a
3 resolution commending L&I for
4 launching their permanent Virtual
5 Inspection Program and noting the
6 department's continued efforts to
7 develop proactive rental
8 inspections.

9 Many will remember who
10 have been a part of our hearings
11 through the course of the budget
12 process my focus on rental
13 inspections and why I believe it's
14 particularly important. This
15 program is an example of moving
16 from pilot to permanent in a timely
17 fashion, despite a departmental
18 reorganization, despite a change in
19 administration. And that steady
20 focus is an example of the public
21 excellence that we encourage and
22 work to ensure across all city
23 operations. And I know I have some
24 Amens on that with other members of

2 the Council.

3 I'm very much looking
4 forward to the department's
5 upcoming pilot. L&I is set to
6 begin proactive rental inspections
7 very soon, and I'm excited for that
8 innovation to build upon the one
9 that we're celebrating today. It's
10 amazing, I think, the things that
11 our least-funded public safety
12 department, because that's what
13 they are, can actually do. And it
14 excites me thinking of what they
15 could do with more support.

16 Further, also about
17 vigilance and holding vigil, if you
18 will. Over the weekend may have
19 read the news of a shooting at
20 Lincoln University's homecoming,
21 killed one person and injured six
22 others, and that is certainly
23 heartbreaking.

24 Those of us who have

2 walked the campus of an HBCU, many
3 of you, if the rain doesn't deter
4 you, may even go down to the game
5 this evening of two HBCUs that will
6 play each other down at the Linc.
7 But those of us who have watched
8 the campus of HBCU, many of us who
9 even haven't know just how
10 important homecoming is to the life
11 of the university as well as the
12 surrounding community and culture.
13 But this kind of thing,
14 shootings, not only can it not be a
15 part of our city streets, it can't
16 be a part of our college campuses.
17 It can't be a part of the culture.
18 Plain and simple. I'm praying for
19 all the students still reeling on
20 campus, all the families, the
21 community connected to it and all
22 the Lincoln students in Philly for
23 that matter. And I hope others
24 will join me in keeping them in

2 mind and in prayer during this
3 time.

4 Lastly, other big news,
5 Camden-based American Water is
6 aiming to buy Bryn Mawr-based
7 Essential Utilities and its Aqua
8 Water Division. I don't know if
9 folks saw that on the news. This
10 deal would combine the two largest
11 municipal water and sewage system
12 companies in the United States into
13 a single entity that aims to
14 acquire more.

15 These are the two firms
16 that have been buyers for all but
17 one of the water acquisitions that
18 follow the passage of Act 12 in
19 2016. In other words, 21 of the 22
20 acquisitions of water systems were
21 held between two firms, and now
22 those two firms want to merge.

23 You don't have to be a
24 dyed-in-the-wool leftist to be wary

2 of this kind of corporate
3 consolidation, not when it comes to
4 our natural resources. Liberalism
5 used to be all about serious trust-
6 busting, for those of us that have
7 read our history. It's a part of
8 the tradition that I actually like.

9 The CEO of Essential
10 Utilities said that the merger
11 would make it easier to keep
12 customer rates affordable.

13 (Laughter.)

14 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

15 The laughter resonates with me as
16 well, which is a fascinating turn
17 of phrase, right, keep customer
18 rates affordable. It's interesting
19 that there's talk of maintaining
20 affordability when the main issue
21 with water privatization across the
22 country and Pa has been the rate
23 hikes that follow the sales of
24 these public utilities. It's like

2 Coca Cola and Pepsi merging to keep
3 their products healthy. That's
4 funny, not really. It's nonsense.

5 My hope is that I can
6 persuade all of you, my colleagues,
7 to see why it's important to stay
8 vigilant about our own utilities
9 like water and not wait until it's
10 on our doorstep and then we have to
11 deal with worst service and higher
12 rates. We want to make sure that
13 Philadelphia remains the city that
14 people can afford. I think
15 vigilance on this front is in our
16 best interest.

17 Thank you, Council
18 President.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member
22 O'Rourke. I was around this body
23 when they tried to privatize PGW
24 and some folks even wanted our

2 airport, but not on our watch.

3 (Applause.)

5 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes, on
6 behalf of speeches of the Majority,
7 Councilmember and Whip Isaiah
8 Thomas.

9 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good
10 morning, Council President -- oh,
11 good afternoon, Council President.
12 Good afternoon, colleagues.

13 Just a couple of
14 announcements. The first
15 announcement, since we won't have a
16 Council session next week I would
17 like to make people aware of the
18 City Hall Youth Leadership Summit
19 Series that we've been doing.
20 We're now in Cohort 3 and the
21 events have been amazing. The
22 young people have been phenomenal.
23 And the goal is to bring together
24 some of the best and brightest

2 young people from across the city
3 of Philadelphia.

4 So we're encouraging
5 young people to apply to be a part
6 of Cohort 3. The date for the
7 event is November 8, 2025 from
8 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Sixth
9 Man Center. So again, encouraging
10 people to apply for the Youth
11 Leadership Summit.

12 I also want to again
13 commemorate and say congratulations
14 to all the Black male educators. A
15 special shout-out to Sharif
16 El-mekki and the great work he does
17 with the Black Male Educators
18 organization. Of course, we need
19 more Black men teachers and that
20 campaign is happening right now.

21 Also would like to make
22 remarks on behalf of the Education
23 Committee, specifically looking at
24 an initiative that's going to be

2 happening out of Carpenter's Hall,
3 which is clearly a national
4 historic landmark. But Carpenter's
5 Hall is pleased to announce the
6 Young Philadelphians Continental
7 Congress. This is a new and
8 historic civic education program
9 hosted by Carpenter's Hall in
10 partnership with the School
11 District that will launch in 2026
12 as a part of our celebration of the
13 birthday of the country, not just
14 your birthday, Council President,
15 250 years.

16 The program will consist
17 of five Saturday sessions between
18 late July and late April. The
19 Carpenter's Hall hopes to recruit
20 20 to 25 delegate teams from across
21 the city. A team is one student,
22 one teacher from the same school,
23 which would allow participants to
24 build relationships with their

2 peers in other parts of the city.
3 Teams will represent different
4 neighborhoods -- you hear that,
5 District Councilmembers -- and they
6 are inviting all public high
7 schools, public charter schools to
8 apply. The goal is to have at
9 least one team from every
10 Councilmanic District.

11 And I'll stop right
12 there, Council President. It's a
13 phenomenal initiative and I'm
14 encouraging everybody in City
15 Council and young people to get
16 involved. Thank you, Council
17 President. Thank you, colleagues.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
19 JOHNSON: Thank you very much,
20 Deputy Whip Thomas.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilmember Curtis Jones.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
24 you, Mr. President.

2 On Tuesday we will have
3 an election and whoever you want to
4 vote for, that's up to your
5 individual rights. But you need to
6 not underestimate what the power of
7 judges do. A judge, even though
8 with all due respect to my
9 colleagues, every day they get the
10 ability to determine someone's
11 liberty, someone's freedom, they
12 are important.

13 There are bills before
14 some of the state courts that this
15 Council passed like Lost and
16 Stolen, like Red Flag laws that are
17 hovering around, the gaming
18 industry hovering around these
19 courts, and people are putting
20 their hand on their cheek trying to
21 decide what is best for the City of
22 Philadelphia.

23 No matter where you
24 stand on the issue, your vote is

2 your voice. Please say something.
3 When we have turnout of only 14%,
4 14 out of 100 people actually come
5 out and vote. You may say my vote
6 doesn't matter. Well, you better
7 ask yourself, what's going on at
8 the Supreme Court, what's going on
9 in the state courts I just
10 mentioned and what will go on as
11 No. 47 continues some of his
12 questionable and even illegal
13 policies and we better have people
14 in those courtrooms that represent
15 our interests.
16 So some people say it's
17 like chess, you know, it's 64
18 squares on the board. You better
19 make your moves. And if you don't
20 think your vote is important, even
21 the pawn if they make it across the
22 board can become the king or the
23 queen. Please make your moves.
24 Thank you.

4 JOHNSON: Very well said, Member
5 Jones.

6 Chair recognizes --
7 Councilmember Thomas, you want to
8 be acknowledged?

9 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

10 Yeah. I'm sorry, Council
11 President.

12 I just needed to finish
13 my remarks as it relates to the
14 youth. The Young Philadelphia's
15 Continental Congress, the person
16 who's in charge of it, the
17 Executive Director is here,
18 Mr. Michael Norris. Michael, can
19 you stand up real quick?

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: So
22 if anybody has any questions about
23 this initiative, any of the
24 District Councilmembers, the

3 involved, Michael's here. He has
4 more information. He's willing to
5 pass that out and we'll also post
6 it on social media as well.

7 Sorry about that,
8 Council President. Thank you

11 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

12 Chair recognizes
13 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 Today along with
17 Councilmember Young I co-introduced
18 a resolution expressing our city's
19 solidarity with the people of
20 Jamaica after Hurricane Melissa,
21 one of the most destructive storms
22 in recent history, brought
23 catastrophic flooding, landslides
24 and widespread devastation to the

2 island and tragically claimed lives
3 and has displaced thousands.

4 Our city is home to one
5 of the nation's largest Jamaican
6 American communities, so there are
7 many people here who have loved
8 ones back home and are also dealing
9 with this loss. And I think many
10 of you know that my mother hails
11 from St. Vincent and the
12 Grenadines, an island that has also
13 experienced its fair share of
14 extreme weather events and a
15 volcanic eruption in recent years.
16 So my heart goes to out to everyone
17 in Jamaica who's enduring this and
18 dealing with this loss and
19 uncertainty.

20 We are a welcoming city
21 and I wanted us to express
22 solidarity with our Jamaican
23 neighbors as they recover and
24 rebuild. Thank you.

2 And I would also ask to
3 be excused to handle other Council
4 business.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Thank you. Excuse is
7 granted.

8 Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad.

10 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:
11 Thank you, President, and happy
12 birthday again.

13 Council just had a
14 hearing about Philadelphia's
15 beverage tax and I wanted to once
16 again ground this conversation in
17 what has worked and who has
18 benefited. This policy was never
19 just about a tax. It was about
20 investing in people.

21 The beverage tax has
22 delivered measurable results.
23 Thousands of Pre-K seats for our
24 children, stronger community

2 schools and upgrades to libraries
3 and recreation centers that give
4 families safe, enriching places to
5 learn and grow. It has also
6 strengthened our child care
7 ecosystem, where many providers are
8 women-led and supported, women
9 small businesses, entrepreneurs who
10 anchor our commercial corridors,
11 hire locally and reinvest in their
12 neighborhoods. There's been a
13 debate about whether Rebuild
14 projects are too nice.

15 As I said this in the
16 hearing, I'll say it again, why
17 not? Taj Mahal is for our
18 children. Why shouldn't our kids
19 have the best quality recreation
20 centers, spaces they're proud to
21 spend their time in? We live in a
22 first world country and yet we are
23 begging for scraps for our youngest
24 citizens.

2 I reject that. So when
3 we talk about revising the beverage
4 tax, let's remember this is not
5 just numbers on a spreadsheet.
6 This is classrooms filled with
7 opportunity. This is small
8 businesses who open on our
9 corridors. This is children with
10 access to quality early education,
11 because we as a city chose to
12 invest in them. We have to keep
13 that lens, the lens of children,
14 families, working, parents and
15 neighborhood businesses at the
16 center of this debate.

17 And I'll end with this:
18 Yesterday the Mayor signed my Voter
19 Registration bill into law, Bill
20 No. 250744. This matters because
21 expanding access to the ballot is
22 part of the same vision. It's
23 investing in families, investing in
24 women-led small businesses and

2 investing in the future of

3 Philadelphia's children.

4 Our democracy is

5 healthiest when everyone has a bass

6 to be heard. We all have a role to

7 play in that democracy. That's why

8 I urge -- like my colleague

9 Councilmember Curtis Jones, Jr.

10 just said it -- everyone to make a

11 plan to vote next Tuesday, November

12 4, 2025. Too much is at stake. To

13 stay at home decide how you're

14 getting to the polls, when you're

15 going and take time to understand

16 who and what's on the ballot.

17 If you have a mail-in

18 ballot, drop it off in the drop

19 boxes. Do not mail it anymore.

20 Too much is at stake to stay at

21 home. Your voice is your power.

22 Please use it. Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

4 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 Today I was honored to
7 recognize Independence Business
8 Alliance for being named the 2025
9 National LGBT Chamber of the Year
10 by the National LGBT Chamber of
11 Commerce. Since 2007 this group
12 has provided meaningful
13 connections, access and resources
14 for Greater Philadelphia's LGBTQ+
15 and allied business communities,
16 entrepreneurship and steady
17 employment and affirming spaces are
18 essential paths for everyone but
19 LGBTQ+ people often face additional
20 barriers, especially our
21 transgender and non-binary
22 siblings.

23 I've been lucky enough
24 to be out and proud for the

2 majority of my career, but not
3 every queer person can say the same
4 in the U.S. More than 80% of trans
5 employees in the U.S. have
6 experienced discrimination or
7 harassment at work. When we spend
8 more than 40 hours a week working
9 for an organization, we deserve to
10 do so as our authentic selves,
11 businesses that not only support
12 but actively work to uplift the
13 LGBTQ+ community are performing the
14 true allyship of practicing what
15 they preach. Thank you, Zach
16 Wilcha, for your leadership at IBA
17 and for speaking to this resolution
18 here today.

19 I also introduced a
20 resolution with Councilmembers
21 Gauthier and Young recognizing
22 November 2025 as Hunger and
23 Homelessness Awareness Month in the
24 City of Philadelphia. During the

2 Thanksgiving season, families come
3 together to show their gratitude
4 for their health and home. But
5 across Philadelphia, many will be
6 going hungry and without shelter
7 this year.

8 I encourage everyone to
9 engage in the true holiday spirit,
10 giving back to your community and
11 donating to a local food bank or
12 homeless shelter. This is
13 especially urgent now in the wake
14 of the government shutdown, whether
15 they've lost a paycheck or awaiting
16 the government to return to work or
17 their SNAP benefits are on hold for
18 the unforeseeable future. This is
19 going to be a particularly
20 difficult season for many of our
21 Philadelphia's residents.

22 As we heard today,
23 experts and advocates have been
24 raising the alarm bells about the

2 crisis facing the 472,000
3 Philadelphians who use SNAP to shop
4 for food as a result of harmful and
5 dangerous decisions made by the
6 Trump Administration. Because of
7 this, I urge the City of
8 Philadelphia and state of
9 Pennsylvania to consider to declare
10 a state of emergency and use all
11 available resources to fill this
12 emergency funding gap caused by the
13 SNAP freeze.

14 While Washington delays
15 their decision, we cannot wait. We
16 are looking down the barrel at
17 rising grocery prices, rent, child
18 care and health care costs.
19 Philadelphians are already facing
20 an affordability crisis. On top of
21 that, President Trump's harmful
22 policies and political games are
23 resulting in SNAP restrictions,
24 cuts to benefits and now stopped

2 payments because of the shutdown.

3 Hunger is a policy

4 failure. We can't let politicians

5 decide who gets to eat. Families

6 who depend on SNAP to buy food are

7 faced with an impossible choice:

8 Pay for groceries, rent or other

9 expenses. Our food banks and

10 pantries are already seeing

11 increased demand for food and need

12 donations desperately.

13 Philadelphians need the

14 SNAP program to buy groceries with

15 dignity. I urge Governor Shapiro

16 and Mayor Parker to help our

17 residents most in need before our

18 federal government lets the worst-

19 case scenario take hold in our

20 communities.

21 Finally, Council

22 President, as Vice Chair of the

23 Housing Committee I wanted to take

24 a moment and thank you for your

1 10/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 commitment to transparency and
3 public input by holding a hearing
4 for the H.O.M.E. Plan. As a
5 lifelong housing activist, I look
6 forward to advocating for funding
7 to be allocated primarily to
8 low-income residents of
9 Philadelphia and programs that
10 support them.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
12 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.
13 Chair recognizes
14 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

15 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
16 you, Mr. President.

17 Today I just want to
18 echo the sentiments of our
19 colleague Councilmember Jamie
20 gauthier and really just send or do
21 whatever we can do for folks in
22 Jamaica who are devastated by the
23 Hurricane Melissa. It's just, you
24 know, it's heartbreaking to see

2 some of those things that's
3 happening when the eye of the storm
4 looked like, it seemed like it just
5 sat over Jamaica for hours and then
6 there's nothing you can do about
7 that from some of these natural
8 disasters. So just want to make
9 sure we uplift all those in that
10 community to know that they do have
11 support on the City Council.

12 Today we also introduced
13 a resolution honoring Dr. Alycia
14 Marshall becoming the permanent,
15 not permanent, but installed as no
16 longer Interim President of
17 Community College of Philadelphia.
18 Community College of Philadelphia
19 is an asset to the city. With
20 campuses all over the city, I
21 encourage every young person, not
22 even young person, every person who
23 just is looking for a way to
24 upskill themselves, I would say,

2 look at Community College. They
3 offer every program you can think
4 of to help you upskill, to help you
5 grow, to help you find self-
6 sustaining opportunities in the
7 city.

8 We also honor SELF,
9 Inc., one of the largest providers
10 of homeless services in the city.
11 We all know that homelessness is on
12 the rise nationwide and it's up to
13 us here locally to do whatever we
14 can to ensure that our folks are
15 housed here in the city.

16 And on that same note
17 regarding housing, I just want to
18 let the residents of the 5th
19 Council District know that we were
20 awarded five tax credit deals in
21 this last cycle. For those who
22 don't know, the Low Income Housing
23 Tax Credit is the primary tool in
24 which affordable housing gets

2 developed in our city, particularly
3 with the 9% tax credits.

4 And so, out of the total
5 41 awards that were awarded across
6 the state, the 5th Council District
7 has five, right. So the total 13
8 that was awarded in the city, the
9 5th Council District has five,
10 right, with the support of our
11 office. And so, we're going to
12 continue to support affordable
13 housing development in the 5th
14 Council District and beyond.

15 So just to put that in
16 numbers, Council President, there
17 will be -- these five projects
18 represent 229 new affordable units.
19 Some will be senior housing, some
20 will be general affordable housing,
21 but this is housing that is crucial
22 to working families and seniors
23 throughout our city. And so, we
24 will always support the idea of

2 affordable housing and I look
3 forward to working with this
4 Administration on supplying more
5 funding for affordable housing for
6 our working families and our
7 seniors in the 5th Council
8 District.

9 And lastly,

10 Mr. President, two things we're
11 doing since there's no session next
12 week: On November 8th, we will be
13 naming a street after LGP Qua at
14 9th and Clearfield. We are asking
15 everyone who has been impacted by
16 Qua to come out to just show your
17 love in the community for him.

18 He was a young man whose
19 life was taken way too soon. He
20 was all about positivity and
21 uplifting our youth to do positive
22 things in our community. So we're
23 asking you all to attend that
24 ceremony at 9th and Clearfield. I

2 believe it's at 10:00 a.m. on
3 November 8th.

4 Also, next Wednesday,
5 November 5th, we will be having a
6 Center City Town Hall at the
7 Parkway Central Library branch from
8 6:00 to 7:30. We're encouraging
9 all residents who live in the 5th
10 District portion of Center City to
11 come out to express some of their
12 ideas, concerns. Talk to city
13 service departments and agencies
14 about how we can make your
15 neighborhood better.

16 And with that, I want to
17 thank Mr. Jake Adams and Mrs. Sarah
18 Adams for coming down here today.
19 For those who don't know, Barber's
20 Hall has been a North Philly staple
21 for almost 50 years and we are
22 celebrating Mr. Jake's retirement.
23 He held down the fort as long as he
24 could in that community, but it's

2 always at one point in time we all
3 will have to retire. At some point
4 Mr. Jake had decided to retire, so
5 we want to make sure we honor him
6 and celebrate him for all of his
7 hard work he put not only just for
8 his business, but for the
9 community.

10 You heard that he was a
11 Ward leader for so many years, but
12 he was a committee person as well
13 for 50 years, right. So we have to
14 honor the work that he has put into
15 our community. We have to honor
16 those who laid the path for us.

17 And with that,
18 Mr. President, again I thank you
19 for allowing me time today.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

22 Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

24 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

2 Thank you, Council President.

3 Very quickly today I
4 introduced a resolution calling on
5 the General Assembly to add
6 medetomidine to their controlled
7 substance list. If some of you
8 remember when I first arrived, we
9 called on the General Assembly to
10 add xylazine, which is a horse
11 tranquilizer that is found in the
12 drug supply in our city.

13 Medetomidine has replaced that
14 substance, and it is 100 to 200
15 times more potent than xylazine is.

16 We have been talking to
17 our health care providers who tell
18 us that it is extremely challenging
19 and that it is difficult to respond
20 to the critical care need that many
21 of the patients who arrive at their
22 doorsteps to be treated. And so, I
23 am urging all of my colleagues to
24 join me in asking the General

2 Assembly to add medetomidine to
3 that list to help our law
4 enforcement partners as well as our
5 public health partners to be able
6 to better respond. Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Thank you.

9 Chair recognizes
10 Councilmember Dr. Anthony Phillips.

11 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

12 Thank you, Council President. Good
13 afternoon.

14 I just want to start by
15 saying, you know, I absolutely love
16 Councilmember Mark Squilla. He's
17 actually one of my favorite
18 Councilmembers, and one of the
19 things -- he is. I just want to
20 tell him --

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: Tell him how you really
23 feel.

24 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: He

2 really is. But you know, today's
3 bill the decision I made, I just
4 want to further add some notes to
5 it. The decision I made to vote no
6 against the paper bag bill, you
7 know, has nothing to do with the
8 support that all of us have for
9 sustainability in the city of
10 Philadelphia.

11 I think that's why most
12 of the members here decided to
13 support it because we believe in
14 sustainability, we believe in
15 protecting our environment. Yet
16 one of the things that I still had
17 questions about, which is important
18 is -- this morning I actually came
19 in ready to vote for it, but then I
20 kept hearing more and more about
21 the SNAP benefits being taken away
22 and I just thought that at this
23 very moment in our city we need to
24 hold this bill because at the end

2 of the day, people are concerned
3 about what the federal government
4 is doing to our city.

5 And regardless of how
6 low cost this may be, I just
7 thought maybe the City of
8 Philadelphia could be helpful in
9 this regard by creating another
10 initiative where we help support
11 with funding of reusable bags that
12 we give out to communities, you
13 know, or some other initiative to
14 help this sustainability initiative
15 beyond a fee.

16 And so, I just want to
17 say that again we need to address
18 the federal government and what
19 they're doing around adding
20 other -- inflation is going up, our
21 SNAP benefits that could
22 potentially be taken away and we
23 just don't want to add more worry
24 and trouble to people in the city

2 of Philadelphia.

3 And so, I respect all of
4 our members, especially
5 Councilmember Mark Squilla, for
6 what we're trying to do here with
7 the city, but my heart was tugging
8 with me and it just felt like it
9 wasn't the right time. If this was
10 in 2020, next year or something is
11 a little better, even a year
12 before, you know, absolutely, let's
13 go for it. But just something
14 about this week just got to me a
15 little bit. So that's where we are
16 with that.

17 Next, I just want to
18 quickly note that right after the
19 session we have -- also, happy
20 birthday, Council President, again.
21 I want to publicly say that.

23 JOHNSON: Thank you.

24 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

2 And thank you for all that you have
3 done for our city. You've been a
4 good supporter of all of us on City
5 Council and we really value you and
6 what you do. You really try to
7 bring us in to work together.
8 Appreciate you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: Thank you.

11 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

12 The Children and Youth -- we're
13 having a Children and Youth
14 briefing today in the Caucus room.
15 Lunch is going to be provided.
16 Members allow your staff to come.
17 As I've noted before, we have the
18 nation's first pilot Playful
19 Learning program, which is focused
20 on affordable housing developments,
21 which is an opportunity for us to
22 reimagine community spaces as
23 platforms for early learning and
24 family engagement.

2 A lot of these new
3 playful learning spaces have been
4 done in Councilmember Young's
5 District in North Philadelphia, but
6 playful learning is looking to be
7 extended across the city of
8 Philadelphia in everyone's
9 district. And as the Chair of
10 Children and Youth, I'm glad and
11 proud to be one of the leading
12 anchors and supporters of this
13 initiative with the We're Brilliant
14 Cities and all the wonderful people
15 who are working on this.

16 So please join us for
17 lunch at noon to learn more about
18 Playful Learning, which is a live
19 and learn initiative. And speakers
20 include Sean McKinney from the
21 William Penn Foundation, Winfield
22 Thomas from the Brewerytown
23 Sharswood space. We have Dr. Katie
24 Hirsch Bass from Temple University,

2 and Dr. Sarah Little from Playful
3 Learning Landscapes. Thank you so
4 much.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
6 JOHNSON: Thank you, Dr. Phillips.
7 Chair acknowledges
8 Councilmember Mark Squilla.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. And Happy birthday
11 to you and Marnie and everybody
12 else whose birthday it is.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
14 JOHNSON: Thank you, sir.

15 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: I
16 just want to state for clarity,
17 understanding the challenges of
18 SNAP and individuals in underserved
19 communities, this bill has actually
20 been worked on for quite some time
21 and there was a fee proposed early
22 on. And the reason why the fee
23 didn't get in initially was because
24 there was some challenges with the

2 state and the state had a
3 preemptive role in this, and our
4 goal was to get the bill passed as
5 soon as possible so that we could
6 then challenge the state on a
7 preemption, which we ended up
8 winning. And you see this bill
9 moved forward and other
10 municipalities have moved forward.

11 But this time we really
12 did a study on the bill,
13 understanding the challenges of
14 reducing plastic as a waste
15 material, but also reducing the use
16 of waste in general, whether it was
17 paper or plastic and we saw an
18 increase. We saw a reduction of
19 plastics, but an increase in paper
20 usage, which had created even more
21 of a challenge in some of our
22 communities.

23 The communities that
24 we're concerned about with SNAP and

2 others have stores and other
3 providers that have been charging
4 for bags for many years, People
5 like Save A Lot, Aldi and others.
6 And people in the underserved
7 communities are the first to
8 comply, to bring their own bags.
9 And the goal of this bill and
10 legislation is to bring your own
11 bag, not to charge you \$0.10 for a
12 bag.

13 So it's really a
14 behavioral change of bringing your
15 own bags to locations to do that.
16 And the change in behavior will not
17 cost you anything because these
18 bags are provided. We have a lot
19 of partners that share these bags.
20 If you look at anybody that wants
21 to do something advertised, they
22 give these reusable bags out. And
23 if there's locations that we
24 believe need additional reusable

2 bags, we would be happy to work
3 with people to do that.

4 But again, the goal was
5 not to charge an additional \$0.10
6 and the goal was to make sure
7 people bring their own bags to
8 these locations and then therefore
9 reduce the challenges on the
10 environment and reduce the waste
11 that we see on the streets.

12 And so, I understand
13 members have concerns and I respect
14 them for those concerns. We will
15 continue to work with all members
16 on that. But I just want to make
17 for clarity it wasn't to be able to
18 make money for anybody. This money
19 goes directly to the retailer. So
20 the goal for the retailer is to
21 participate in this and also
22 provide reusable bags.

23 And so, at the end of
24 the day as we go through these

2 challenges, we see that this type
3 of legislation has been passed in
4 other municipalities without the
5 impacts and the concerns that we're
6 hearing. But I will continue to
7 work with my colleagues and people
8 who are opposed to this type of
9 legislation and try to find ways to
10 mitigate those concerns as we move
11 forward. So thank you so much and
12 thank you to everybody who
13 supported the legislation.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member
16 Squilla.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas for a
19 motion to adjourn.

20 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

21 Forgot that was my part today,
22 Council President. Thank you.
23 Council President.

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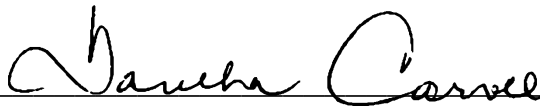
