17 And I am transmitting for the
18 consideration of your honorable body a
19 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
20 Land Bank to dispose of 1331 North 8th
21 Street, located in the 5th Councilmanic
22 District, in accordance with terms of
23 Chapter 16-700 of The Philadelphia Code,
24 all under certain terms and conditions.

9 to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
10 changing the zoning designations of
11 certain areas of land located within an
12 area bounded by Cottman Avenue, Milnor
13 Street, Princeton Avenue, and the
14 Delaware River."

17 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones
18 offers one bill, entitled "An ordinance
19 amending Chapter 9 of Subcode PM ('The
20 Philadelphia Property Maintenance Code')
21 of Title 4 of The Philadelphia Code,
22 entitled 'Additional Special
23 Requirements,' to establish a program in
24 which the City may perform certain urgent
25 repairs and bill the property owner."

9 at a U.S. presidential inauguration."

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Councilman Johnson, you wanted to speak
12 before the reading of the next
13 resolution?

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes. Yes,
15 sir. Well, thank you, Council President.
16 I just wanted to take a moment to
17 acknowledge the purpose of this
18 resolution just honoring the great work
19 of this young lady, Amanda Gorman, who
20 was the first national poet laureate but
21 also the youngest inaugural poet who
22 spoke at our President, President
23 Biden's, inauguration with her poem The
24 Hill We Climb, calling on unity and
25 healing in the United States. Most

2 recently she was racially profiled in a
3 building in which she lived by a security
4 guard.

5 So, you know, this resolution
6 is really sending good vibes of
7 encouragement, support, and empowerment.
8 She talked about how one day she was an
9 icon but another day being racially
10 profiled, and that's what we deal with
11 every day here in America, particularly
12 as black people, irregardless of our
13 status and/or position.

14 And so this resolution is in
15 honor and supporting her great efforts
16 and encourage this young lady to keep on
17 keeping on during this Women's History
18 Month.

8 before this also?

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:
10 Absolutely, Council President. We know
11 he hails from North Philadelphia, the
12 Fifth Councilmanic District, but when we
13 talk about the boxing culture here in the
14 City of Philadelphia, I take a nod to my
15 colleague Councilman Curtis Jones who is
16 always on the front line promoting boxing
17 tournaments and encouraging young people
18 to put down the guns and pick up the
19 gloves. And when you think about the
20 rich boxing culture and the history that
21 we have here in the City of Philadelphia,
22 you know, all this weekend we have had an
23 opportunity to celebrate which we all
24 know as the Fight of the Century.

25 Philadelphia has a shining king

9 resolution, because as Philadelphians,
10 that was a particular moment in the
11 history that I look back on that I'm
12 proud of that has put our city on the
13 map, and we should always continue to
14 celebrate those who are representing the
15 City of Philadelphia in the best and
16 brightest way.

17 And so I enthusiastically
18 introduce this resolution honoring the
19 life and legacy of Philadelphia great
20 heavyweight champion Smokin Joe Frazier,
21 honoring his victory over Muhammad Ali
22 during the Fight of the Century.

25 older, of cannabis for non-medical

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
4 will be referred to committee.

5 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
6 submitting to the electors of the City of
7 Philadelphia of an amendment to Article
8 VIII, Chapter 5 of The Philadelphia Home
9 Rule Charter, entitled, "Referenda
10 Approved by the Voters," by adding a new
11 section providing that the citizens of
12 Philadelphia call upon the Pennsylvania
13 General Assembly and the Governor to pass
14 legislation that will decriminalize,
15 regulate, and tax the use, and sale to
16 adults aged 21 years or older, of
17 cannabis for non-medical purposes.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. Also referred to committee.

20 Hold on a second, Mr. Decker.

21 Councilman Henon, did you want
22 to be recognized now?

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Council President. It was on the
25 previous introduction that Councilman

6 I just wanted to -- point of
7 personal privilege, that a lot of
8 people -- I mean, look, 50 years ago and
9 we're still talking about how proud we
10 are of the City of firsts and proud of
11 our family and our roots and our ability
12 to really gather around each other for
13 public safety, education, and having
14 these stars and starlight power given
15 back to the community, to the entire
16 Frazier family. But they also brought
17 people up with them. They also brought
18 people up in the neighborhoods. They
19 educated them. They connected them to
20 jobs. They did job trainings. They were
21 helping, again, with our public safety
22 trying to put people -- make sure that
23 people who fell on hard times be shown
24 the right path.

25 They also had a good supplier

3 Joe Hand, Jr. -- or Joe Hand Promotions
4 was Cloverlay then at the time, was the
5 promoter. They're also celebrating

9 still continue today with our legacy.

10 So it's more than a fight.
11 It's more than a family. All right?
12 It's all of the City together rallying
13 around one of its own, as we do. We take
14 care of each other. We don't let anybody
15 pick on us. We're very protective of
16 each other and what we do.

17 So I just want to thank
18 Councilman Johnson for recognizing the
19 50-year anniversary, but it's much deeper
20 than that, and I'm proud to be a part of
21 it just like everybody has been for the
22 last 50 years.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

25 Mr. Decker, please continue.

3 Brooks offers one resolution, entitled a

9 powerful model of neighborhood engagement
10 for former first responders and veterans

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Excuse me.
15 Council President?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones -- I'm
18 sorry; Johnson.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yeah. Can
20 I have a small point of privilege just
21 acknowledging my colleague Kendra Brooks
22 as she introduced the resolution honoring
23 a young man named Shawn Wilson, who had
24 an organization called Vets in the Hood,
25 and he's been down to City Council on

2 several different occasions advocating
3 and fighting for resources for our most
4 prized individuals who have served our
5 country, which are our veterans.

6 And so I just want to commend
7 her and also Councilwoman Katherine
8 Gilmore Richardson, just making sure that
9 we acknowledge individuals who are really
10 on the ground doing the work. And,
11 Council President, we know as the leader
12 of this body, it was your hard work and
13 your effort to create the Office of
14 Veterans Affairs and also the Veterans
15 Parade and also the veterans ceremony
16 where we award them every year.

17 And so in that spirit, I just
18 wanted to take a moment just to
19 acknowledge his life and his legacy. And
20 he had a word that said love on purpose,
21 particularly around this issue of gun
22 violence that we're seeing here in the
23 City of Philadelphia, and he had a spirit
24 of just reaching out to young people and
25 helping them change their lives and

2 really talking about really what it is to
3 love on purpose.

4 So I just want to acknowledge
5 that for the record, and my heart and
6 prayers go out to his family and also the
7 Nicetown community as well.

9 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

10 Mr. Decker, please proceed.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Thomas
12 offers two resolutions, entitled a
13 "Resolution honoring and congratulating
14 the Father Judge High School Wrestling
15 Team for their second consecutive win of
16 the Philadelphia Catholic League
17 Wrestling Championship in their 2019 to
18 2020 season."

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
20 will be on next week's Calendar.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
22 authorizing the Committee on Education to
23 hold hearings to identify and examine
24 potential systemic biases in oversight
25 that create inequalities between Black

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Today's Calendar.

7 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Council
8 President, can I be recognized?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Sure. The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Thomas.

12 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
13 Council President. I appreciate it. I
14 just want to take a moment to, first of
15 all, thank my colleague Councilmember
16 Bobby Henon for co-introducing the
17 legislation with me as far as recognizing
18 Judge as the Champion on the Week. And I
19 also want to take a moment to thank all
20 of my colleagues who co-sponsored my
21 resolution around looking at black
22 institutions, black-led institutions,
23 specifically give a shout-out to my
24 colleague Councilmember Jones, who had
25 six black-led institutions in his

2 district alone, and he is one of the
3 co-sponsors of this legislation.

4 I've been in some interesting
5 meetings as a member of the Education
6 Committee and I've been a part of a lot
7 of dialogue as it relates to how black
8 institutions specifically are treated,
9 and what I don't want to happen is for
10 this conversation to be hijacked and then
11 turn into a conversation around charter
12 schools. This is not about charter
13 schools at all. This is about black-led
14 institutions and how black institutions
15 are treated significantly different than
16 their white counterparts.

17 For me personally, again, I've
18 been in part of some dialogues and I've
19 heard some things that I feel like are
20 really troubling, and I think that our
21 best steps moving forward -- because I
22 think that there's some perception issues
23 around black institutions, black
24 educators, black children, and black
25 families. I think that the most

2 important thing for us moving forward is
3 to move this conversation to a public
4 forum so we can assure that the dialogue
5 is one that's transparent, it's
6 informative, it's factual, and it's one
7 that's looked at through a lens of equity
8 as well as justice.

9 I believe in African-centered
10 education. I come from a space of
11 African-centered pedagogy. I'm very
12 familiar with a lot of different
13 initiatives that take place when you're
14 dealing with African-centered pedagogy.
15 Sometimes we start our day with Harambee,
16 which is a key Swahili term that means
17 let's pull together.

18 Young people, they even count
19 using different languages and terms. I
20 listen to my son in Harambee and when
21 they're ready to start, they don't say
22 one, two, three. They say moja, mbili,
23 tatu, and that's teaching the young
24 people numbers in a totally different
25 language.

2 I asked my son this morning,
3 son, what is your principle of the month?
4 And he has a different principle of the
5 month that's based on the principles of
6 Kwanzaa. And so when you're talking
7 about ujima and ujamaa and all the other
8 principles, my son is learning those
9 things at an early stage.

10 When I get the opportunity to
11 ask him about historical allusions, his
12 perception of great black folks is not
13 just limited to Martin Luther King or
14 Malcolm X, and he's in third grade. I
15 had an opportunity to listen to him
16 recite a speech by Langston Hughes that
17 he actually memorized, and in the speech,
18 right, my third grade eight-year-old son
19 was able to articulate in his speech the
20 difference between when you are a person
21 of color and when you are a person of
22 color being forced to go in the kitchen
23 and eat when there's company.

24 So in the spirit of Langston
25 Hughes and in the spirit of my son, I do

2 not want our black institutions to have
3 to go in the kitchen anymore. I want
4 them to be able to have the same access
5 to resources, the same treatment, and the
6 same privileges as their white
7 counterparts.

8 And so in the spirit of black

10 black equity, I emphatically introduce
11 this resolution today.

12 Thank you, Council President.
13 Thank you, colleagues.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 daughter and the next generation of women
20 that their voice matters and that they
21 matter.

22 Thank you so much for your

16 Beth Finn. If you could just state your
17 name for the record and proceed with your
18 testimony, please.

19 MS. FINN: Yes. My name is
20 Beth Finn.

21 Resolution sponsor
22 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
23 Richardson, members of Philadelphia City
24 Council, thank you for considering this
25 important resolution about the Women's

2 March on Philadelphia during Women's
3 History Month. My name is Beth Finn and
4 I am one of the co-founders of the
5 Women's March on Philadelphia and the
6 President of the Pennsylvania Chapter of
7 the National Organization for Women. I
8 live in the Society Hill section of
9 Philadelphia.

10 When we started planning the
11 first Women's March on Philadelphia in
12 late 2016, we did not have any idea what
13 the event would become here at home,
14 around the country, and around the world.
15 We would have considered the event a
16 success if a few hundred people had shown
17 up on the Ben Franklin Parkway to march
18 in solidarity with us and our allies in
19 Washington, DC. We were truly fortunate
20 that our partners in the City's
21 Department of Parks and Rec and Office of
22 Special Events knew better what to
23 expect. Bob Allen, Doug Robinson,
24 Jazelle Jones, and all of their
25 colleagues across countless departments

2 were instrumental in making sure that
3 each of the four Women's Marches on
4 Philadelphia were peaceful, safe, and
5 successful. Without their expertise, the
6 60,000 marchers would not have been able
7 to gather, exercise their First Amendment
8 right of peaceful protest, and strengthen
9 each other for the hard work we knew was
10 ahead of us following the 2016
11 presidential election.

12 Though the challenges facing
13 women did not start with that election
14 and they haven't been magically solved by
15 our most current President, the 2016
16 election served as a catalyst for many
17 Americans to start to claim their voices
18 as citizens. This is the most powerful
19 promise of our democracy.

20 The first Women's March was an
21 opportunity for ordinary people to
22 jump-start their activism. It led to
23 people demanding their rights guaranteed
24 in our Constitution, to constituents
25 expecting more from their elected

2 officials, and to record numbers of
3 women, people of color, LGBTQ people, and
4 underrepresented groups running for
5 office.

6 I am so proud of the work my
7 resister sisters and I have done to
8 organize these four years of women

10 were able to create to amplify these
11 voices, and I am proud of the incredible
12 work that tens of thousands of people
13 took on to make our city, our country,
14 and our world a better place.

15 There is still so much more
16 work to do to guarantee that women are
17 paid equitably for the work that we do,
18 that women have autonomy over our own
19 health and bodies, that the burden of
20 maintaining a household and caring for
21 our children doesn't fall solely on our
22 shoulders, that violence against women,
23 especially domestic violence, is taken as
24 seriously as other kinds of violence, and
25 that women are represented equally in all

2 places where decisions are being made.

3 The passage of this resolution
4 by this Council shows the commitment of
5 the City of Philadelphia to these ideals.

6 Thank you for your support and
7 for your time.

14 woman, one of two black women -- well,
15 three black women who helped to put on
16 the march, we found that there was even a
17 lot of opposition within our own
18 community being a part of this march, but
19 I'm so glad that there was a sisterhood
20 built out of it. I was so glad that we
21 had a platform that we are now able to
22 talk together in unity about all of us
23 being a woman, but so many minority
24 communities were also represented during
25 this time. I am so honored that we were

3 but we were part of a continuous movement
4 that created such an impact across the

6 I want to thank everyone who
7 participated, including our Mayor and
8 several of our Councilwomen who are on

10 who were our partnerships and friends
11 along with this march. And I just want
12 to thank the Council for recognizing.

13 We had one of the largest
14 consistent marches, and there were not
15 only the 65,000 that started that day but
16 there were hundreds of thousands of
17 people that came through the snow,
18 through the rain, through the cold just
19 to put forth a movement that will be
20 written into legacy for the rest of our
21 lives. And I am so honored today that
22 Philadelphia has not only acknowledged
23 it, but it will also be in the records
24 for the rest of our lives, and our
25 generations down the line can also open

3 So I want to thank you again.

18 opportunity to show my support for and
19 speak on behalf of Resolution 210200,
20 which recognizes March 8th as
21 International Women's Day and an event to
22 raise awareness of the adverse oppression
23 and inequities that women have
24 experienced and continue to experience
25 globally, and to celebrate the

7 Violence. For the past 21 years, I have
8 dedicated my life to educating
9 individuals and families how to prevent
10 harm to children, youth, the elderly,
11 people with disabilities, and women.

12 WOAR, the Philadelphia Center
13 Against Sexual Violence, formerly known
14 as Women Organized Against Rape, was
15 founded by women to support victims of
16 rape and other forms of sexual violence
17 at a time when victims of sexual violence
18 were not treated with care, respect or
19 dignity, and when offenders often walked
20 away from the harm which they inflicted
21 upon women and children.

22 What we now know is sexual
23 violence is an issue. It is a societal
24 plague, and it is often used as a weapon
25 of war. We know that sexual violence

2 knows no gender or orientation. It
3 doesn't care about religion, race or
4 socioeconomic level.

5 WOAR was the first rape crisis
6 center in Pennsylvania, and as a result
7 of the leadership of women in the City of
8 Philadelphia, there are now 50 centers in
9 Pennsylvania, one in every county, that
10 provides treatment for victims of sexual
11 violence and promotes prevention
12 education.

13 City Council's support for
14 Resolution 210200 will be an
15 acknowledgment of the vital work
16 conducted by women in Philadelphia and
17 around the world and the importance of
18 leadership of women. And the support for
19 this resolution will continue to show
20 Council's support and efforts to
21 eliminate adverse oppression and
22 inequities faced by women both in our
23 city and around the world.

24 Thank you, Council, for this
25 opportunity to address you today.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Tamara Staley,

6 commenting on 210190.

7 (No response.)

9 MS. STALEY: Greetings. As

10 President and CEO of the Philadelphia

11 Juneteenth Family Incorporated, I want to

12 thank you, Councilman Johnson, and your

13 co-sponsors for supporting the National

14 Juneteenth Day of Observance bill and

15 encourage all of you to send letters to

16 our Congress representatives asking for

17 their support.

18 The Philadelphia Juneteenth

19 Family was founded in 2018. Our core

20 foundation was built on four pillars -

21 spiritual, cultural, education, and

22 political. Each of these pillars

23 represent areas that impact African

24 American communities. Our goal is to

25 research, plan, and organize initiatives

2 that will improve challenges that we face
3 today. We are dedicated to raising
4 cultural awareness, cross cultural
5 exchange, and interest in the African
6 diaspora's agenda.

7 We work tirelessly to help the
8 Juneteenth become the 46th
9 state-recognized holiday, along with
10 others across the City and the state,
11 resulting in a delegation going to
12 Harrisburg to witness the signing by
13 Governor Wolf.

14 We are thankful that Mayor
15 Kenney has made Juneteenth holiday
16 recognized until 2023 by Executive Order.

17 I leave you with this: A lot
18 more work needs to be done, so join the
19 Family.

20 Thank you for the opportunity
21 to address Council, and I hope we can
22 continue counting on you all's support as
23 we move forward.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.

4 MS. STALEY: Tamara Staley.

6 Thank you very much. Thank you for your
7 testimony.

8 MS. STALEY: Thank you.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Kofi Asante, commenting on 210190.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. ASANTE: Good morning.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
15 state your name for the record and
16 proceed with your testimony. Thank you.

17 MR. ASANTE: Kofi Asante.

18 I want to thank Councilman
19 Johnson, City Council President, City
20 Council for the opportunity to speak this
21 morning. I want to say thank you
22 specifically to Councilman Johnson for
23 his courage and his moving the resolution
24 forward to shine light on Juneteenth.

25 Our community needs heroes that

they can touch, and Johnson responded to the urgency from our City Council from our Juneteenth President, Tamara Staley. She called him out of urgency because Juneteenth was not on the Calendar for the City, and he leaped into action like a super hero, like a hero we can touch, and he contacted his constituency and other City Councilpeople, and lo and behold, the Juneteenth was back on the Calendar. So we thank him for that.

We thank him for his courage to be able to put the resolution to move forward our struggle as it relates to Juneteenth, and also to be able to join us in our movement in order to make Juneteenth a celebration in every household, that it becomes a stable name.

When our communities say Juneteenth, they understand the struggles and the sacrifices of those who came before us. And as we move forward even into this year with the pandemic, all the things that have happened to us, it's

2 joyful to be able to know that Juneteenth
3 is thriving and the programs and process

6 So all of you heroes and
7 sheroes that are on City Council, please

10 movement of the holiday Juneteenth on
11 June the 19th even in 2021.

12 God bless, and thank you for
13 this opportunity.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Thank you for
15 your testimony.

16 The next speaker is Mark
17 Harrell, commenting on 210190.

18 MR. HARRELL: Good morning,
19 Council President Clarke and members of
20 City Council. My name is Mark Harrell.
21 On behalf of the Board of the
22 Philadelphia Juneteenth Family, I want to
23 thank Councilman Kenyatta Johnson as well
24 and his colleagues on City Council for
25 introducing the resolution on Thursday,

2 March 4th urging the U.S. Congress to
3 designate Juneteenth a national holiday.

4 The Philadelphia Juneteenth
5 Family is supporting our national mother
6 of Juneteenth, Ms. Opal Lee from Fort
7 Worth, Texas, currently 94 years old, who
8 started a walking campaign to Washington,
9 DC in 2016 and has continued it to bring
10 awareness to the fact that there is
11 support for it all across the nation.

12 There is currently legislation
13 in the U.S. Senate, Senate Bill 4019, and
14 in the House, House Resolution 7232, the
15 Juneteenth National Independence Day Act,
16 that just needs to be passed into law.
17 We want Juneteenth to be recognized as a
18 national holiday.

19 Yes, Juneteenth originated in
20 Texas, but 47 states now have it as a day
21 of observance to commemorate the ending
22 of slavery, and more are making it a paid
23 day off, including states like Virginia,
24 New York, and Texas.

25 We believe Juneteenth can be a

2 unifier, because it recognizes that
3 slaves didn't free themselves and that
4 they had help from Quakers along the
5 underground railroad, abolitionists, both
6 black and white, like Frederick Douglass
7 and William Lloyd Garrison, soldiers and
8 many others who gave their lives for the
9 freedom of being slaves.

10 It's not lost on us that the
11 summer of 2020 saw the largest support of
12 Juneteenth to be a national holiday
13 because of the death of George Floyd
14 highlighted the systemic racism that
15 still exists because of the residual
16 effects of slavery. We can't let the
17 swelling support just simply disappear
18 until the summer rolls around again. We
19 have to make sure that Congress follows
20 through with their commitment to honor
21 the lives of those who came before us.

22 Our goal with her petition,
23 which currently has over 1.5 million
24 signatures and we're aiming for 3
25 million, and her walk is to show Congress

2 and the President that she is not alone
3 in her and the Philadelphia Juneteenth
4 Family's desire to see national
5 recognition of a day to celebrate freedom
6 for all. Will you sign and support this
7 petition to let them know as well?

8 I want to thank you for your
9 consideration and this opportunity to
10 address you today. Victory 400.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
14 appreciate it.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
16 is Albert Dandridge, commenting on
17 210183.

18 MR. DANDRIDGE: Good morning.
19 My name is Albert S. Dandridge III, and I
20 am here to comment on Resolution 210083
21 on Bernard W. Smalley Sr.

22 Bernie Smalley and I grew up in
23 West Philly, directly across the alleyway
24 from each other. His bedroom window
25 faced my bedroom window. We would yell

2 at each other through the windows. We
3 would meet at the back fence, at the
4 corner store, at the G bus across the
5 street from -- bus stop across the street
6 from his house, at the 15 trolley stop
7 down the street from his house. We had
8 each other's backs on the streets. He
9 was a better talker; I was a better
10 fighter.

11 After years of sharing each
12 other's joys and sorrows, the roles
13 became interchangeable.

14 Last fall, we lost our Board of
15 City Trusts' President, friend, and my
16 former law partner, Ronnie Donatucci. I
17 remember at Ronnie's funeral the priest
18 giving the eulogy said that if Ronnie was
19 not in heaven, there is no heaven.

20 With due respect and with the
21 same assurance as the priest, I do not
22 believe that God would have taken Ronnie
23 away from us at the Board without a plan.
24 The plan is Bernie Smalley. I do not
25 believe that there is anyone living who

2 cares more about the children, the
3 administrators, the teachers, and the
4 staff at Girard College than Bernie
5 Smalley.

6 I do not believe there is
7 anyone living who cares more about the
8 miracles that take place and the doctors,
9 nurses, administrators, and staff at
10 Wills Eye Hospital than Bernie.

11 I do not believe there is
12 anyone living who cares more about the
13 charitable entities that help the
14 citizens of Philadelphia than Bernie
15 Smalley.

16 I believe that God has a plan
17 for my friend of more than 65 years and
18 the new President.

19 Thanks be to God.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
22 appreciate it.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Yasmeen Abbott, commenting on
25 Councilman Thomas's resolution on

2 black-owned and led schools.

3 MS. ABBOTT: Hi. Good morning.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MS. ABBOTT: Thank you,
7 Councilman Thomas and colleagues. My
8 name is Yasmeen Abbott and it was
9 imperative to send my children to a
10 black-owned and operated school to
11 complete their education. It wasn't a
12 question. Black schools matter, and
13 attending Universal Institute Charter
14 School from 2011 to 2020 provided a
15 strong academic rigor while having
16 constant black empowerment daily.

17 Raising black girls is already
18 challenging in America. Having them
19 receive education where academic
20 excellence is exemplified was also
21 imperative. Having them see educated
22 black representations of themselves daily
23 helped shape their confidence in who they
24 are for nine years of their lives, going
25 to school from kindergarten to eighth

2 grade.

3 It also helped increase their
4 social and emotional wellness, having a
5 safe place to be educated by blacks
6 unapologetically. They strive for higher
7 education, attending HBCUs, and the
8 importance of being strong, productive
9 black citizens in society making a
10 difference every day.

11 Having the choice to choose
12 that educational platform for my black
13 girls helped me raise them without
14 stress, worry, and fear that I already
15 see as a black mother in America.

16 Thank you all again for this
17 opportunity, and a huge thank you to
18 Universal Institute Charter School staff
19 and school leaders. Their dedication to
20 their students and their scholars is
21 absolutely unmatched.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you so much for your testimony.
24 Appreciate it.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

2 is Daniel Wideman.

3 MR. WIDEMAN: Good morning. My
4 name is Daniel Wideman, a proud parent of
5 a West Oak Lane Charter School, black led
6 and black ran. Thank you, Councilman
7 Thomas, and his colleagues for the
8 support and leadership of calling for
9 this critical important hearing.

10 I chose to send my child to a
11 black-founded, black-led charter school
12 because they put the kids first. They
13 don't look at what the neighborhood is or
14 where they come from. They don't look at
15 how much money we make. They show kids
16 the love and support, no matter where
17 they come from. Every day they put the
18 kids first.

19 For the last three years, I
20 have been a proud parent of West Oak Lane
21 Charter School. The reason why, because
22 my kid comes first in every decision I
23 make. From the hurt, the pain and
24 suffering that our kids go through on a
25 daily basis, it is great to know that we

2 have charter schools like West Oak Lane
3 in the community that is willing to pay
4 forth and give the love and care to our
5 kids.

6 I chose this school. If that
7 choice is taken from me, it's not only
8 going to hurt me, my child, but the
9 neighborhood as well.

10 Please, Council, take forth the
11 effort that Councilman Thomas has put
12 forth in front of you to support the
13 black charter schools in the community.
14 Black schools matter. Our kids matter.
15 Their lives matter to us.

16 Please, I'll ask that today
17 that you believe in our kids the same way
18 we do. They are doing a great job at the
19 black-led, black-ran charter schools.
20 Please do not let that voice get taken
21 away from us.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
25 We appreciate it.

2 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
3 is Diane Clayton.

4 MS. CLAYTON: Good morning.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MS. CLAYTON: My name is Diane
8 Clayton and I am speaking on behalf of
9 the African American Charter School
10 Coalition. I am also a grandparent of a
11 scholar at Global Leadership Academy,
12 which is a black-founded and led public
13 charter school located in West and
14 Southwest Philadelphia.

15 I am here today to thank
16 Councilman Isaiah Thomas and his
17 colleagues who co-sponsored his
18 resolution for their bold leadership in
19 calling for a public hearing to examine
20 the racial bias and discrimination that
21 exists within the School District of
22 Philadelphia's process of oversight,
23 evaluation, and expansion opportunities
24 for black-founded and led public charter
25 schools.

2 In addition to being a strong
3 academic school, Global Leadership
4 Academy celebrates my child's heritage,
5 educates scholars about black history,
6 and gives scholars the opportunity to
7 visit the historic places that serve as
8 safe havens for our ancestors to find
9 their way to freedom.

10 Here we are in 2021 still
11 fighting for our freedom and fighting for
12 equity when it comes to public education.
13 West and Southwest Philadelphia have very
14 limited options when it comes to
15 high-quality public schools. Not every
16 neighborhood in our city has a Central, a
17 Masterman or a Girls' High, not to
18 mention these are special admission
19 schools that require certain criteria to
20 be admitted.

21 We look forward to the
22 opportunity to share our stories and
23 challenges when it comes to maintaining
24 our right as parents and guardians to
25 attend a school of our choice and

2 exposing the double standards and
3 inequitable process this District has
4 implemented when it comes to evaluation
5 of black-founded and led school.

6 Our children are public school
7 students, and the black schools matter
8 and must be evaluated by a fair and
9 equitable process. Doing anything less
10 is not only discriminatory, but it also
11 further hurts children and families like
12 mine.

13 We know doing what is right
14 doesn't always mean that it is popular,
15 but to remain silent on this very
16 critical issue is to be complicit while
17 our civil rights are being violated, and
18 that is not okay.

19 Thank you again for your
20 leadership, Councilman Thomas, and your
21 willingness to address this very critical
22 issue.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
25 appreciate it.

3 is Latisha Swans.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MS. SWANS: Good morning.
7 Hello. I am calling in representation of
8 West Philadelphia Achievement Charter
9 School. For the past ten years, three of
10 my sons, Bennie, Nigel, and Juwan (ph)
11 Swans, have all attended this school.
12 This school has been magnificent for
13 them. It has helped my children go into
14 college. One of my sons is now attending
15 college. One of my sons is now going
16 over to William Penn Charter School.
17 He's just been accepted with almost a
18 full scholarship.

19 This school has meant a lot to
20 me as a mother of four boys. It has
21 really increased the culture of the
22 community of Black Lives Matter movement.
23 It has really showed my boys what it is
24 to be a man and to have male mentors,
25 black men lead my children, give my

2 children direct assistance, give my
3 children direct leadership, open-door
4 policies.

5 The kids at the school, the
6 teachers know my children directly. They
7 know them individually. They have cared
8 for my children throughout their
9 educational experiences here. It has
10 been the best thing I've ever did for my
11 children, putting them in this school.

12 It has also helped continue the
13 legacy of their grandfather, Bennie
14 Jewell Swans Jr., who is a Philadelphia
15 legend, gang war hero.

16 One of the things I want to
17 kind of leave with before I leave this
18 phone conversation and representation of
19 how great this school has been for my
20 children and family is that every child
21 deserves a champion in adults who will
22 never give up on them, who understand the
23 power of connection and insist that they
24 become the best that they can be, and
25 this school has been that and more.

3 this school in the West Philadelphia
4 community for all black lives and the
5 whole entire environment that the school
6 has touched and the children and the
7 people and the faces of the black
8 community.

9 Thank you so much, and have a
10 great day.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you. Ms. Swans, just say your name
13 for the record. Just state your name.

14 MS. SWANS: Latisha Brown
15 Swans.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. Appreciate your testimony.

18 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
19 is Nicole Brown.

20 MS. BROWN: Hello?

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

22 Just state your name for the record and
23 proceed with your testimony, please.

24 MS. BROWN: Good morning. My
25 name is Nicole Brown, and thank you all

2 for having me. I want to thank
3 Councilman Thomas and City Council for
4 this initiative and bringing light to
5 this vital topic.

6 When I think of black-founded
7 and led schools, it is very reminiscent
8 of the establishment of historically
9 black colleges and universities. They
10 are both meant to serve the needs of
11 African American populations, in which
12 they have excelled beyond measure.

13 It is still the same today
14 where our children are denied access to
15 opportunities and additional resources.
16 For this reason, I celebrate and support
17 black-led schools such as Universal
18 Institute Charter School for their
19 overwhelming drive to ensure that our
20 children have what they need. They
21 provide successful images of what it
22 means to be black and successful. They
23 provide successful images that black
24 people can excel despite any disparities.

25 Black-led schools are vital to

2 our children's success because they
3 foster a positive sense of community,
4 culture, and high academic standards.
5 Black students do well when they feel
6 supported and can identify with their
7 educators. They have the rest of their
8 life to be a minority, so it is very
9 important that they be a majority in a
10 high-achieving black school. And I
11 celebrate UICS because my daughter, she
12 was accepted to all her high schools that
13 she chose and she was able to maintain a
14 4.0 GPA since kindergarten at this
15 school. And I have two black sons, and
16 they are supported and they are valued,
17 and I wouldn't have my children in any
18 other school, and that is why it is
19 important to have schools such as UICS
20 and other black-led schools.

21 And, again, thank you. My name
22 is Nicole Brown.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
25 testimony. We appreciate it.

3 Corvin-Levy.

4 COUNCIL SUPPORT: She is not on
5 the line.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Saqib Bhatti.

7 MR. BHATTI: Yes. Hello.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 morning.

10 MR. BHATTI: Good morning,
11 Council President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
13 state your name for the record and
14 proceed with your testimony, please.

15 MR. BHATTI: Yes. Good
16 morning, Council President Clarke and
17 members of the City Council. My name is
18 Saqib Bhatti. I'm the Co-Executive
19 Director of the Action Center on Race and
20 the Economy, or ACRE. Thank you to
21 Councilmember Kendra Brooks for inviting
22 me here to speak and for her leadership
23 on the Cancel Wall Street resolution
24 that's ultimately about winning more
25 money to invest in public services and

2 stopping Wall Street from profiting from
3 our communities. I strongly support this
4 resolution.

5 Across the country Wall Street
6 makes \$161 billion of interest payments
7 on municipal debt. Here in Philadelphia,
8 every year the City spends more than
9 \$245 million a year in interest payments
10 to Wall Street investors, and the School
11 District spends \$145 million a year.

12 The way we currently finance
13 our government does not make any sense.
14 Even though municipal borrowers have a
15 default rate of less than 0.2 percent,
16 we're forced to pay a dollar in interest
17 for every dollar that we borrow.

18 Furthermore, cities with higher
19 concentrations of people of color like
20 Philadelphia are forced to pay even more.
21 Banks already make money by
22 discriminating against us, foreclosing on
23 us, nickel-and-diming us with fees,
24 investing in private prisons to lock us
25 up, financing fossil fuel infrastructure

2 that's polluting our communities, and
3 selling us predatory products. They
4 shouldn't be able to profit from
5 redlining our state and local governments
6 too.

7 Already Philadelphia has been
8 leading the country in work to create a
9 public bank so that we can keep our money
10 here locally. There's more to be done to
11 ensure that we can invest in public
12 services like schools, healthcare,
13 transit, and more.

14 There is no reason for us to
15 pay so much to Wall Street when our
16 fellow government owns a bank. We need
17 the Federal Reserve to call for
18 long-term, zero-cost loans to all cities,
19 states, and school districts, which is
20 fully in the purview of the Federal
21 Reserve. And so that's why we're asking
22 Philadelphia to join cities like Los
23 Angeles to call -- to pass this
24 resolution calling on the fed to offer
25 these loans so that we can keep our money

2 in our communities where they can fund
3 essential services.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
7 testimony. Appreciate it.

8 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
9 other speakers on the public comment
10 list, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you, Mr. Decker.

13 That concludes our public
14 comment session. We will now consider
15 the bills and resolutions on the Second
16 Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

17 Mr. Decker, please read the
18 title of Resolution No. 210183.

19 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
20 congratulating Bernard W. Smalley for
21 being named President of the Board of
22 Directors of City Trusts, making him the
23 first Black President in the board's 151
24 year history.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/11/21 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Thank you.

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Councilwoman Parker for a motion.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. Mr. President,
7 before I call for the motion, I just want
8 to note for the record that in 1990,
9 Mr. President, I was a senior in high
10 school and I got an opportunity to intern
11 in the office of my mother mentor
12 teacher, Marian Tasco, and worked closely
13 with my other mother mentor, Augusta
14 Clark, and it was because of --

15 COUNCIL SUPPORT: I'm sorry,
16 Councilwoman. I just got notified
17 Channel 64 has lost their feed, so we're
18 going to need a moment so they can bring
19 the system back up, please.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

Parker.

COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

Quinones-Sanchez is voting aye.

Councilman Squilla.

COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Aye.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

Thomas.

COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Aye.

CHIEF CLERK: Council President

Clarke.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

3 The ayes are 16; the nays are
4 zero. A majority of all members --

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Council
6 President Clarke, this is Councilman
7 Henon. I'd like to be recorded as aye.
8 I apologize for the delay.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No
10 problem, sir. Thank you.

11 The ayes are 17; the nays are
12 zero. A majority of all members having
13 voted in the affirmative, the bill
14 passes.

15 Mr. Decker, please read the
16 title of Bill No. 210122.

17 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
18 amending Section 9-4116 of The
19 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Public
20 Health Emergency Leave," to establish
21 leave time for public health emergencies,
22 and modify existing provisions concerning
23 the paid sick leave, and make technical
24 changes.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Domb, I believe, had a question on the
5 amendment.

6 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
7 Council President. I do have three
8 questions for the sponsor, Councilmember
9 Brooks, about the amendments and this
10 bill for clarity of the record. So I'll
11 just go through each question one at a
12 time.

13 So can you explain why you
14 included and then removed the language
15 that allows employers who are eligible
16 for federal tax reimbursements when
17 provided emergency leave that's called
18 for in this legislation? I think it's
19 important for the public to understand
20 your position on this point and the
21 impact it has on employers that federal
22 tax reimbursements expire before the
23 emergency order is lifted.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
25 you, Councilmember.

2 Council President, I would like
3 to address the amendments that I sent
4 around today and the clarification that I
5 sent around this morning at the beginning
6 of Council sessions, and hopefully
7 they'll answer Councilmember Domb's
8 questions, and if not, I will proceed to
9 answer his questions following that.

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Can I give
11 you the other two questions so you have
12 them all together?

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Sure.

14 COUNCILMAN DOMB: The other
15 question I had was the rationale for the
16 160-hour threshold for paid time off,
17 PTO. I've heard various iterations of
18 120, 160, 180 days that were floated, so
19 I'm just wondering what the conversations
20 were among the various groups you spoke
21 to and what the advantages or
22 disadvantages are for the various number
23 of hours. It seems that other than
24 having an impact on the very large
25 corporations here in Philadelphia, which

2 are fewer than we'd like, this might hurt
3 some growth industry businesses who can't
4 afford this right now, like businesses
5 that are close to the margin with like
6 501 employees.

7 Can you walk through the
8 thought process on this and the cost for
9 some of these types of growing.

10 And the last question was, I
11 wanted to make sure I understand
12 correctly that the City is subject to the
13 requirements of this bill, and I wanted
14 to get a confirmation on that.

15 That will be it. Thanks.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Okay. So
17 I'll start with the tax breaks. Just as
18 our previous version of the public health
19 emergency leave, if a business with fewer
20 than 500 employees provides leave for the
21 reasons listed in our bill, they will
22 qualify for a tax credit from the federal
23 government. Our legislation was
24 intentionally aligned with the federal
25 reasons for leave so that businesses can

take advantage of the federal tax
credits.

We have not elected to include
explicit language referencing the tax
credit in this bill because there is a
chance, albeit small, that tax credits
may expire before the Commonwealth's
emergency declaration is lifted, which
would leave workers unprotected and
potentially causing us to have to
introduce a third public health emergency
leave bill. And we already left workers
unprotected for January and February and
now most of March, and we can't do that
again.

In terms of the rationale for
the 160 hours, the 160-hour threshold, we
cannot require essential workers to use
all of their vacation time for the year.
So we negotiated with several
stakeholders a reasonable number, and 160
is the number that we came with finally.
Everyone may not agree with this, but we
were in those negotiations with multiple

2 stakeholders.

3 And what else? Will the City
4 fall under this legislation? Yes. The
5 City, like all employers with more than
6 50 employees, will have to comply with
7 the requirements of this bill, and we've
8 been in discussion with the
9 Administration about that.

10 Does that answer all your
11 questions?

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Yes. Thank
13 you very much. Thank you.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: With
15 that --

16 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:
17 Council President?

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.
19 The Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore
20 Richardson.

21 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
22 you, but I wanted to also note for the
23 record based on Councilmember Domb's
24 question that I thought that the generous
25 employer exemption that was presented

2 before dealt with the issue with the
3 City. So I just wanted to make sure that
4 was clear for the record.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes.

6 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Okay.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: We're
8 aligned with what was expected for the
9 paid time off for the City. The City's
10 employees are included.

11 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Got
12 it. Okay.

13 Thank you, Council President.

14 Thank you, Councilmember
15 Brooks.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: No
17 problem.

18 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
19 Councilmember Brooks.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Councilman Domb, are you good?

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Yes.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
24 President, point of information.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

2 I'm sorry. Who was that?

3 COUNCILMAN GREEN:

4 Councilmember Green. Point of
5 information.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Councilman Green.

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I just want
9 to get some perspective and make sure I
10 clearly understand your response to
11 Councilmember Domb.

12 So you're saying that by taking
13 out the amendment that you put in for
14 small business supports, that does not
15 create a conflict with the legislation at
16 the federal level? My understanding is
17 that -- well, let me step back.

18 What was the reason of putting
19 in the small business supports initially
20 in the first amendment that you
21 circulated?

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: The first
23 set of amendments that were sent out, we
24 sent it out prematurely and we had not
25 finalized that that was going to be an

2 amendment. That's why we sent the second
3 version as well as the explanation along
4 this morning. We were in consideration
5 of it, but the fact that we were already
6 left hanging by creating a sunset on the
7 initial paid public health emergency
8 leave bill and we did not want to have to
9 go through a third round of creating this
10 public health emergency leave, so we
11 decided to leave it out.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: But wouldn't
13 there be -- so there's not a conflict
14 between the federal law and what's
15 proposed under this law under the time
16 period that the tax credits are
17 available? Because I believe under the
18 federal law, it talks about ten days as
19 opposed to 80 hours. I just want to make
20 sure that both employees as well as
21 employers have clarity in reference to
22 what applies.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Well, it
24 talks about two work weeks, which could
25 be either classified as ten days or

2 80 hours. One work week is 40 hours. So
3 we classified it together. So I'm not
4 understanding.

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Well,
6 because my understanding --

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: I did
8 double check. When I say the ten days,
9 it kind of threw me off as well, but then
10 the realization that the language talks
11 about ten weeks -- I'm sorry; ten days
12 and 80 hours all equivalent to a two-week
13 work week. So they would still be
14 included. It's only up to a work week --
15 I mean, the work session, which is
16 80 hours or ten days.

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: So the
18 American Rescue Plan language says
19 80 hours or ten days?

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: I
21 think --

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I just want
23 to make sure that both employees and
24 employers have proper guidance. My
25 concern is making sure that the language

2 that's in the American Rescue Plan, we're
3 mirroring that here at the local level,
4 so that if I am an employer or employee,
5 I know I'm basing it on ten days or
6 80 hours, because that could possibly be
7 different, and I just want to make sure
8 that you're saying that under the
9 American Rescue Plan, it's saying one or
10 the other.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: No. So
12 there shouldn't be a conflict between
13 this bill and the federal legislation.
14 It says up to two weeks or 80 hours, and
15 we got that information around the
16 information that we sent linked to the
17 IRS classification, which provides two
18 weeks or 80 hours language as well, and
19 it's also listed in the language that was
20 in the e-mail sent earlier.

21 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Right. But
22 I guess my question is, why can't we just
23 use the exact same language from the
24 American Rescue Plan, so that way,
25 there's no confusion for employees or

2 employers in reference to, do I receive
3 80 hours and/or ten days? And if I'm an
4 employer, I can get a tax credit for that
5 exact same amount. I mean, just for the
6 ease of simplicity considering that we're
7 dealing with a lot of information with a
8 of changes. I'm still just trying to
9 digest all the information in the
10 American Rescue Plan. Each day I'm
11 learning more information. I just think
12 for ease of getting information out for
13 employers and employees, we use similar
14 language that's in the American Rescue
15 Plan.

16 Also, I'm not sure if there's
17 any regulations that need to be adopted
18 to implement this proposed legislation,
19 because there was regulations that were
20 needed in last year's bill that expired.
21 That's why this legislation is important
22 to protect both employees and also
23 employers.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: So from
25 my understanding, the language is the

2 same. We just don't have an explicit
3 reference to the tax credit for the
4 reason that I stated earlier, and that is
5 the only difference. And I believe
6 that -- I'm not really sure what else to
7 say about that. The language is the
8 same. I just did not include the piece
9 of reference directly to the tax credit,
10 but it is the same and it has been
11 verified with legal.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Okay.

13 Because it seemed like when I read the
14 bill and then I read the amendment, it
15 seems like the amendment is just further
16 clarifying that those who are eligible
17 for reimbursement through the federal tax
18 credits are eligible for that, which kind
19 of goes in context with your (7)(a) in
20 reference to requiring -- to extend the
21 federal state laws requiring employers to
22 provide paid leave or paid sick leave
23 related to COVID-19, they can substitute
24 under federal or state law for its
25 obligations in reference to -- and what

2 coincides the relevant federal state
3 laws.

4 So I just -- because I thought
5 the amendment was from a clarify
6 perspective to make sure that people
7 understood both employees and employers
8 that you can receive federal tax credits.
9 So I'm still just trying to make sure
10 that we're keeping the same language
11 what's in the American Rescue Plan here
12 at the local level, so that way,
13 everything is consistent and there's not
14 a lot of confusion and concern.

15 So I just want to make sure I
16 understand, you're saying that the
17 language is exactly the same under the
18 American Rescue Plan?

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes. The
20 language is the same, and the links to
21 the tax credit means that we would -- the
22 leave could expire, and that has happened
23 once, and we don't want it to happen
24 again. That is the reason I did not and
25 do not want to explicitly link the

2 federal legislation. But the language is
3 the same, and everyone who provides
4 public health emergency leave and
5 qualifies for tax credits will receive
6 the tax credit. It's the same language.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: So if it's
8 the same language, why didn't we just
9 stick with the original amendment?

10 Because the original amendment provides
11 additional clarity about federal tax
12 credits that in (7)(a) does not. So if
13 it's the same language, I think that's --
14 that was my assumption, that the purpose
15 of the amendment that you circulated
16 yesterday was to make sure that the
17 language is mirroring the federal law to
18 make sure that both employees and
19 employers understood what they're able to
20 receive under this public health
21 emergency leave due to COVID-19.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: The
23 reason we didn't do it is because the tax
24 credits will expire.

25 Now, in terms of understanding

2 the language, I'm certain that most
3 employers have folks that can help them
4 understand this language very clearly.
5 My concern was to make sure that working
6 folks have access to paid sick emergency
7 leave at 160 hours and that it happens as
8 soon as possible, because people were
9 left out for three months, left out in
10 the cold because of legislation that was
11 requested for us to put a sunset on this
12 as of December 31st. Now we have
13 Philadelphians in the peak of the
14 pandemic that were out of paid sick
15 legislation that we have left hanging.

16 So I will not link the federal
17 legislation to this, because I do not
18 want to go through a third round of
19 public health emergency leave if this
20 were to expire.

21 We are on the uptick.
22 Vaccination is available, and we need to
23 protect our citizens.

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: So I clearly
25 support, and that's why I voted for this

1 3/11/21 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 to get out of the Committee, because the
3 legislation that you introduced last year
4 expired and we need to make sure that
5 employees are covered during the
6 pandemic, which is still going on. I was
7 just trying to get clarity in reference
8 to the tax credit issue, because I saw
9 the amendment and then I saw the new
10 amendment, and I was just trying to get
11 some perspective on -- because clearly
12 there was a reason why you put it in, and
13 I thought it was for the clarity of
14 making sure that the American Rescue Plan
15 coincided with this legislation to make
16 sure employees and employers knew all the
17 perspectives. That's why I asked the
18 question. I'm trying to get that
19 understanding.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Well, I
21 hope I answered your question clearly.
22 Have I?

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I mean, I
24 got a better perspective from you in
25 reference to the amendment. I will look

2 at this again. I think you did say there
3 was some additional -- an e-mail that you
4 provided that had some reference to the
5 American Rescue Plan. I did not get a
6 chance to click onto that link, because I
7 was just looking at both amendments.

8 So thank you, Council
9 President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

12 And is that it? Before I call
13 for the Councilwoman for a motion on her
14 amendment, I just want to for the record,
15 on 200618, I don't believe -- did
16 Councilman Oh, was he recorded in that?

17 CHIEF CLERK: Yes,
18 Mr. President. I have him as voting aye.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Okay. So it was 17. I just wanted to
21 make sure. I got it a note sent to me
22 about Councilman Oh. Okay.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilwoman Brooks for an amendment, a
25 motion on the amendment.

3 hope.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 would like to offer an amendment to Bill
9 No. 210122. A copy of the amendment has
10 been circulated to all members of
11 Council, and I move for adoption of the
12 amendment.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. All in favor of the motion
16 will signify by saying aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Those opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 ayes have it, and Bill No. 210122 has
23 been amended. Bill No. 210122, as
24 amended, will be placed on the Final
25 Passage Calendar for our next session of

2 Council. Thank you very much.

3 Mr. Decker, do you have any
4 additional resolutions?

5 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
6 authorizing the Committee on Housing,
7 Neighborhood Development, and the
8 Homeless to hold hearings examining the
9 race gap in home appraisals and its
10 impact on homeownership and wealth
11 accumulation in Philadelphia, introduced
12 by Councilwoman Parker.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you.

15 The Chair recognizes
16 Councilwoman Parker.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
18 you, Mr. President. I move for the
19 adoption of the resolution.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
22 been moved and properly seconded.

23 All those in favor indicate by
24 saying aye.

25 (Aye.)

3 Those opposed?

10 hold hearings to identify and examine
11 potential systemic biases in oversight
12 that create inequalities between Black
13 and white led schools, resulting in fewer
14 resources or support for Black founded
15 and led institutions, introduced by
16 Councilman Thomas.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Thomas.

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
20 Council President. I move for the
21 adoption of the resolution.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 All those in favor indicate by

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

8 ayes are good. The resolution is

9 adopted.

10 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
11 other resolutions on the Final Passage
12 Calendar, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

15 That completes our Calendar for
16 today. Prior to recognizing members for
17 speeches, I will note for the record at
18 this time we will use the Chat feature
19 available in Microsoft Teams to allow
20 members to signify that they wish to be
21 recognized. In order to comply with the
22 Sunshine Act, the Chat feature must only
23 be used for this particular purpose.

24 With that said, are there any
25 speeches on behalf of the minority?

2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilwoman Brooks.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
5 you, Council President. I want to thank
6 every member of Council for voting to
7 pass the resolution I introduced last
8 week calling on the Federal Reserve to
9 offer zero interest long-term loans to
10 municipalities.

11 Currently, Philadelphia pays
12 over \$245 million in rent interest fees
13 to Wall Street banks each year, while the
14 School District of Philadelphia pays over
15 145 million every year.

16 As the poorest city in the
17 country, it is unthinkable that we are
18 hemorrhaging this amount of money just to
19 line the pockets of the wealthy, and the
20 money should be spent as needed on our
21 own city services.

22 With the recent passage of
23 President Biden's stimulus bill, the City
24 of Philadelphia is slated to receive
25 1.3 billion from the federal government,

2 just enough to offset the budget deficit
3 caused by the pandemic. This is welcome
4 news, but we know far from enough to
5 address the challenges our city is
6 facing. From toxic school conditions to
7 a shortage of low-income housing to a
8 looming climate crisis, Philadelphia will
9 require a massive influx of funds to
10 support its most vulnerable community
11 members and create a livable environment
12 for future generations.

13 The pandemic has exposed large
14 holes in our city's social safety net and
15 revealed the damage that decades of
16 systemic inequality and the poor chronic
17 underfunding and austerity has caused.
18 The Cancel Wall Street campaign, led by
19 the Action Center on Race and the Economy
20 and supported by community leaders across
21 the country, has been embraced by cities
22 like Los Angeles, and I'm proud that
23 Philadelphia is joining the charge.

24 So I want to thank
25 Councilmembers Gauthier, Gym, Henon,

2 Gilmore Richardson, and Domb for their
3 co-sponsorship, and I look forward to
4 continuing to fight for the investments
5 in our communities alongside you all.

6 Thank you, Council President,
7 and thank you to my colleagues.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you very
10 much.

11 Speeches on behalf of the
12 majority?

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Bass.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. Today I introduced two
17 resolutions that raise awareness of two
18 very important health issues for the
19 month of March, nutrition and brain
20 injury.

21 According to the Center for
22 Disease Control and Prevention, chronic
23 diseases such as heart disease, cancer,
24 and diabetes are the leading causes of
25 death and disability in the United

2 States. In fact, six out of every ten
3 adults has a chronic disease, and four
4 out of every ten has multiple chronic
5 diseases. As a result of uninformed food
6 choices, risk factors of chronic disease
7 have been identified in even younger
8 ages.

9 Good nutrition not only reduces
10 the risk of disease, but also improves
11 well-being and health, promotes safe
12 pregnancies and birth, strengthens immune
13 systems and lengthens lifespans.

14 However, we also have to
15 acknowledge that having access to the
16 nutritious food and being able to give
17 healthy eating and physical habits are a
18 privilege. Good nutrition is not
19 accessible, especially to those who are
20 low income and living in food deserts and
21 food swaths.

22 Organizations like
23 Philabundance, the Black Women's Health
24 Alliance, the Coalition Against Hunger,
25 North Philly Peace Park, and Weavers Way

2 are all examples of leaders in
3 Philadelphia working to increase access
4 to fresh food and health wellness and
5 nutrition education every day.

6 I want to thank you for your
7 work in reducing health disparities in
8 our city and working towards promoting a
9 healthier, more equitable Philadelphia.

10 On another note, it is
11 important to increase understanding of
12 chronic brain injury. More than 210,000
13 children and adults in Pennsylvania are
14 living with a disability due to traumatic
15 brain injury, which is just one example
16 of a chronic brain injury.

17 This year's theme for Brain
18 Injury Awareness Month is
19 #MoreThanMyBrainInjury to help educate
20 others on what it's like to live with a
21 brain injury and reduce stigma.

22 The COVID-19 pandemic has
23 presented unique challenges for students
24 suffering from brain injuries. The
25 coalition -- or the collaboration

2 required between teachers and families is
3 inhibited by distance learning and lack
4 of daily structures that can cause
5 increased dysregulation and negative
6 behaviors, further resulting in stress on
7 student and the adult. Additionally, too
8 much screen time results in eye strain,
9 increased fatigue, and other symptoms
10 that are amplified in persons with brain
11 injuries.

12 Groups like the Brain Injury
13 Association of Pennsylvania, Magee Rehab
14 Hospital of Jefferson Health, and Penn
15 Medicine are dedicated to improving the
16 qualify of life of those affected by
17 brain injuries and their families. They
18 each have a number of support groups,
19 education campaigns, and programs for
20 brain injury survivors and their
21 families.

22 Thank you for your dedicated
23 service to all of them and all
24 Philadelphians and their families who are
25 living with brain injury.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Domb.

7 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
8 Council President. Yesterday we
9 recognized, I believe, the one-year
10 anniversary of the first COVID diagnosis
11 in our city. It's been a rough year for
12 all of us, particularly though our young
13 people, whose high school and college
14 years have really been impacted, and
15 that's why I think it's important today
16 that we recognize when good things
17 happen, particularly as it impacts our
18 younger people.

19 Last night a really good --

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Councilman
21 Domb?

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Yes.

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:
24 Kindergarten also got snatched away from
25 a lot of children as well, sir.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Last night a
4 really good thing happened in
5 Philadelphia. Drexel Dragons Men's
6 Basketball Team won the Colonial Athletic
7 League Championship game, making the NCAA
8 Tournament for the first time in
9 25 years. I'd like to congratulate
10 President Fry, Athletic Director Zillmer,
11 and Coach Spiker and the team for showing
12 us how teamwork and determination can
13 make a difference of our young men and
14 women. That example of teamwork and
15 determination is how I want to begin my
16 remarks today.

17 Each week since the beginning
18 of February -- it's been about five weeks
19 now -- I've taken the opportunity to
20 address with my colleagues on Council one
21 overriding message: We cannot fight this
22 pandemic if we do not come together
23 around a massive plan.

24 I'm going to skip the rhetoric
25 and give you the numbers and let the

2 numbers speak for themselves.

3 On February 22nd, the CDC
4 allocated a total of 63,690 first and
5 second doses combined. On March 1st, the
6 CDC upped its allocation for a total of
7 68,640 first and second doses combined.
8 On March 8th, the CDC once again upped
9 its allocation to a total of 70,980 first
10 and second doses combined.

11 Three days ago, the Health
12 Department informed us that during the
13 week of February 22nd, the City
14 administered 51,300 first and second
15 doses. They told us that the following
16 week, the week of March 2nd, we
17 administered over 90,000 doses, which
18 included the FEMA site allocation of
19 42,000 doses that week. So the City
20 possibly dosed 50,000 people.

21 Given that the City has
22 received over 200,000 doses from the CDC
23 over the past three weeks, it has only
24 had the capacity to deliver 150,000 of
25 these doses, according to the City's

2 accounts. We are sitting on today 50,000
3 doses that have not been distributed to
4 Philadelphians, 50,000. And unless we
5 act now, these numbers are only going to
6 get worse.

7 Follow along with me for a
8 moment so we understand the impact. If
9 we need to vaccinate, let's just say,
10 1.2 million Philadelphians and two-thirds
11 of these vaccinations require two doses
12 of either the Pfizer or Moderna dose, we
13 will need to administer 1.6 million doses
14 of Pfizer or Moderna vaccines and 400,000
15 of the Johnson & Johnson doses, which is
16 one shot, for a total of 2 million doses,
17 2 million.

18 According to the Health
19 Department website, the City has
20 administered 435,000 doses to date. Yet,
21 according to the City as of two weeks
22 ago, 42 percent of our first doses went
23 to non-residents, bringing the total
24 number of fully vaccinated, two doses,
25 Philadelphians at present is somewhere

2 around 100,000.

3 With that, our goal, our
4 objective here has to be to administer
5 approximately 1.8 million more doses by
6 the end of May, which is the timeline
7 President Biden laid out in the
8 distribution.

9 Over this week, the Health
10 Department told us we don't have the
11 capacity to adequately scale up our
12 vaccination efforts. We are limited by
13 the number of providers we currently
14 have.

15 In addition to the providers in
16 place now, the Health Department is
17 ramping up six sites, which can do 400 to
18 500 shots per day, but these sites are
19 only open one day a week. So they
20 collectively only add 3,000 doses to our
21 distribution totals per week.

22 The Inquirer today reports that
23 the Health Department has approved 60
24 more sites, but if we can only keep six
25 sites open one day a week, how are these

2 sites going to get us to where we need to
3 be?

4 Our inability to develop a plan
5 that we have requested that is scalable
6 to meet vaccine supply chains will only
7 delay our ability to save lives and to
8 get Philadelphians back to where they
9 want to be and, frankly, after this long
10 year, where they deserve to be.

11 According to my calculations,
12 if we vaccinate at our current pace, we'd
13 be at herd immunity in maybe seven
14 months, depending on how long FEMA sticks
15 around Philadelphia.

16 That's not the worst news. If
17 we look at what we're being allocated and
18 what we're able to distribute, in about
19 three weeks we will have to preserve all
20 our doses for those who need a second
21 dose. The example is the Convention
22 Center. As of March 23rd, no more first
23 doses there. They're going to switch to
24 second doses. This means that we won't
25 have capacity to administer more

2 first-round doses to people, just as more
3 contagious mutant strains are entering
4 our city.

5 I think it's important that we
6 talk about the numbers as they relate to
7 our equity goals for distribution. We
8 are told the FEMA site at the Convention
9 Center, a neighborhood site that is
10 67 percent white, was selected to achieve
11 racial equity. Yet, an analysis of the
12 City's registry, which is the only way to
13 get an appointment at the site, shows
14 that less than 20 percent, less than
15 20 percent, of the registry live in the
16 15 most underserved communities of color
17 in the City. When you put our biggest
18 vaccination site in a white neighborhood
19 and use an invitation list that is
20 overwhelmingly white, it seems we're set
21 up to fail on equity.

22 When we first announced the
23 Philly Special Plan, I and others said
24 this is the best plan for scaling up our
25 vaccination capacity and achieving racial

2 equity. Today I say that this is not
3 just the best plan, it may be the only
4 plan we have to get the job done at this
5 point.

6 Our role here is to ensure the
7 Administration meets our expectations and
8 the public's expectations on the delivery
9 of this vaccination. In the last week,
10 we discovered a lot of details of what
11 we're doing, and it's not looking great.
12 Now we have to fix it. I hope all of you
13 will stand with me to encourage the Mayor
14 to open up Lincoln Financial Field and
15 other large-scale sites with a plan. We
16 need a plan to deliver 1.8 million doses
17 before the end of May, because as of now,
18 we are on the wrong track and we are
19 heading in the wrong direction.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Green.

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,

2 Council President. I know last week we
3 adopted a resolution to acknowledge and
4 memorialize those who had lost their
5 lives due to this pandemic. In today's
6 Council session we've heard a number of
7 our colleagues talking about COVID-19.
8 In fact, the World Health Organization on
9 March 11th, one year ago today,
10 identified COVID-19 or the novel
11 Coronavirus as a global pandemic. And if
12 I reflect on last year, I was actually
13 attending a National League of Cities
14 conference in DC, and that was actually
15 the last conference I attended, and
16 that's when we were just really starting
17 to get a sense of this pandemic and the
18 impact it was starting to have, but then
19 we had no idea the impact it would have
20 throughout the entire globe.

21 And so as we moved into 2021,
22 things are definitely looking up, but I
23 think we get so caught up in all the
24 issues of the day and all the news,
25 sometimes we don't really reflect on the

2 impact of a piece of legislation.

3 Yesterday in DC, the American
4 Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was passed, and I
5 know the various papers and other outlets
6 have covered some of the information in
7 this plan. People are familiar with the
8 \$1,400 checks for individuals, but this
9 plan is revolutionary in a lot of ways.
10 We have not seen this type of impact at
11 the local level, at the state level, and
12 at the federal level in decades.

13 This plan is going to expand
14 the child tax credit by about \$300 a
15 month, provide about 1.8 million in
16 dollars for SNAP benefits. It's going to
17 provide a significant amount of money for
18 our school districts. The School
19 District of Philadelphia is looking to
20 receive over a billion dollars. It
21 increases health insurance and extends
22 unemployment benefits due to the pandemic
23 and has opportunities for pension
24 assistance as well as helping those that
25 have -- and entrepreneurs that have a

2 racial ethnic background that have
3 experienced systemic discrimination with
4 aid through \$15 billion in Economic
5 Injury Disaster Loans. It expands the
6 Paycheck Protection Program, providing
7 additional eligibility and additional
8 funding for that program. For our
9 restaurants, food and beverage
10 establishments, we're looking at
11 \$28.6 billion, 25 billion specifically in
12 one area, about 1.25 billion for
13 shuttered venues.

14 Then just locally here in the
15 City of Philadelphia, our Transportation
16 Authority, which has been decimated by
17 this pandemic, is expected to receive
18 about \$615 million, the airport
19 \$115 million, and here locally as a city
20 we anticipate receiving over a billion
21 dollars. About half we'll be able to
22 receive within two months and then the
23 other half we'll be able to drawn down
24 next year.

25 So when we think about the

2 American Rescue Plan, not only is it
3 providing billions of dollars for states
4 and 19,000 municipalities around the
5 country are going to benefit just like
6 here in Philadelphia, a lot of money in
7 reference to try to make sure the
8 vaccination effort gets done in
9 jurisdictions around the country, but
10 it's also going to really impact poverty.

11 Council President, in your
12 statement the other day you talked about
13 how this is going to drastically reduce
14 child poverty for a city that has a
15 25 percent poverty rate. The impact of
16 the American Rescue Plan is not only a
17 way we come back out of this pandemic,
18 but it's also how we truly address
19 poverty. To me, this is the closest
20 thing we've had to the war on poverty
21 from President Johnson. It's going to
22 have ripple effects throughout this
23 nation in many ways. And I just wanted
24 to bring some of those things to our
25 attention, because we get so busy with

2 all the different issues that we're
3 trying to deal with, that sometimes when
4 we have real positive legislation that's
5 really going to make an impact on
6 citizens in the City of Philadelphia, we
7 don't spend sometimes I think enough time
8 to really talk about that.

9 So in the coming days and weeks
10 and months, we'll be getting more details
11 of the specific details of the American
12 Rescue Plan and how it's going to impact
13 citizens in our city who have really been
14 struggling for so long. And to me what
15 it really does is demonstrates why voting
16 matters.

17 We went through a campaign last
18 year, and some people will say, well, why
19 should I participate, why should I vote?
20 This is the example of why voting
21 matters. The fact that we've been able
22 to change an administration and bring a
23 president that was able to get the
24 American Rescue Plan passed, in addition
25 by having voters in another state like

2 Georgia elect two state senators. That's
3 how that impacts us here in the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 So I hope that as we continue
6 to move forward and get more information
7 regarding the American Rescue Plan,
8 people will make that connection, that
9 tie of why voting is important here in
10 the City of Philadelphia, not just in one
11 election but every election, and how this
12 is a really, as at that time Vice
13 President Biden said, BFD. This is
14 really a BFD for the City of
15 Philadelphia.

16 So thank you, Council
17 President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, Councilman. What does that
20 stand for? No; never mind. Never mind.

21 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I can't say
22 that on the air.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank

2 you, Council President, and good
3 afternoon, everyone. As several members
4 have noted, yesterday the American Rescue
5 Plan was passed by the U.S. House of
6 Representatives. The legislation will go
7 to President Biden's desk for a final
8 signature tomorrow. This is the most
9 significant national stimulus effort
10 since the New Deal. It can't be
11 overstated how important this is and what
12 a transformational impact it will have on
13 towns and cities across the country,
14 including Philadelphia.

15 In addition to another round of
16 direct payments for many Americans, an
17 extension of unemployment benefits and
18 billions of dollars for vaccine
19 distribution, schools, transit agencies,
20 and housing assistance, the plan will
21 provide flexible funding to states and
22 cities that can be used to support a wide
23 range of initiatives.

24 So today I want to encourage
25 our city and state leaders to

2 meaningfully direct some of these funds
3 towards gun violence prevention and
4 intervention initiatives. We cannot pass
5 up this opportunity to combat our city's
6 gun violence crisis. It could not be
7 more dire.

8 More Americans died from gun
9 violence in 2020 than in any other year
10 on record. Here in Philadelphia, we
11 nearly reached a record high number of
12 homicides last year, and so far, we're on
13 track to exceed it in 2021. And what's
14 especially disturbing is that juvenile
15 homicide rates are skyrocketing. The
16 number of minors who have lost their
17 lives is up 200 percent from this time
18 last year, and a large portion of this
19 loss is taking place in my district.

20 Embaba Mengesteabe, a
21 15-year-old resident of West Philly, died
22 last week after being shot in the head.
23 This past Tuesday night another
24 15-year-old, Antonio Walker Jr., was
25 fatally shot. And a 16-year-old who had

2 been shot in October died as a result of
3 his injuries on Tuesday night as well.

4 The loss of these children is
5 tragic and traumatic, not just for their
6 family and friends but for our entire
7 community. Experts are attributing this
8 disturbing spike in violence to the
9 pandemic, and similar to the pandemic, we
10 need to treat the gun violence crisis
11 like the public health crisis that it is.
12 This means implementing evidence-based
13 programs that focus on prevention,
14 intervention, and victim services.
15 Because also like COVID, gun violence is
16 contagious. Research suggests that even
17 just witnessing a shooting can increase
18 the probability that a young person will
19 be involved in violence within the next
20 two years.

21 We are seeing a light at the
22 end of the tunnel when it comes to COVID,
23 but our communities experiencing
24 increased rates of gun violence remain
25 under siege day in and day out.

2 The way a government spends is
3 a reflection of its values. I hope that
4 we use this infusion of funds as an
5 opportunity to reflect the fact that
6 eradicating gun violence is a public
7 safety priority, a public health
8 priority, and a racial justice priority
9 all wrapped up in one.

10 I look forward to working with
11 my Council colleagues and with the Kenney
12 Administration to see what we can do to
13 move resources towards this issue
14 immediately now that help is on the way.

15 Thank you so much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Parker.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I
22 just have a quick two issues that I want
23 to address, and I want to start by
24 thanking both Councilmember Green and
25 Councilmember Gauthier for their comments

2 regarding President Biden's historic
3 game-changing \$1.9 trillion American
4 Rescue Plan COVID-19 stimulus bill.

5 Mr. President, I want to note
6 for the record that Councilwoman
7 Gauthier -- Councilmember Gauthier, she
8 hit the nail on the head when she talked
9 about the flexible funding available for
10 cities and states that is included in
11 this package. It is important for
12 Philadelphians to know, because they are
13 thinking about CARES and the other
14 2020-related stimulus dollars that had
15 been distributed from Washington, DC, but
16 what Philadelphians should know is that
17 when we had to close a \$750 million
18 budget gap last year and people couldn't
19 understand why certain cuts were made
20 when we received funding from the state,
21 I'm not sure that people understood the
22 help that came from Washington didn't
23 give Philadelphia the flexibility to use
24 that money to replace revenue that we
25 lost as a result of COVID.

2 It's with that spirit and
3 intent in mind, Mr. President, that I
4 want to say a huge thank you on your
5 behalf and all members of this body to
6 President Biden, the Biden-Harris
7 administration, all members of the
8 Philadelphia delegation, and our U.S.
9 Senator Casey for his support of this
10 bill, and to also say that we look
11 forward to, under your leadership,
12 Mr. President, engaging with our Mayor,
13 Jim Kenney, along with our Philadelphia
14 congressional delegation, Boyle, Evans,
15 and Mary Gay Scanlon, along with our
16 state legislative leaders. That is
17 Vincent Hughes and Williams, along with
18 Leader McClinton, Whip Harris, and all
19 members of the Philadelphia delegation in
20 both chambers in Harrisburg to make sure
21 that we have a robust intergovernmental
22 discussion and strategy for how we will
23 employ the use of these dollars as we
24 move forward.

25 I also, Mr. President, need to

2 say thank you to you and Mayor Kenney,
3 because sometimes I think it's only a
4 story if people think that we are at each
5 other's throats, but I thank you,
6 Mr. President, and Mayor Kenney for
7 working together to come up with the
8 strategy to move Philadelphia's budget
9 process, the budget address, which would
10 trigger the budget hearings, for moving
11 them further down the line, giving us an
12 opportunity for this federal legislation
13 to be passed so that some of the terrible
14 decisions that we would have had to be
15 considering with the potential
16 \$450 million budget hole that we had, we
17 can now start from a true space.

18 So I want to say thank you, and
19 I'm looking forward to working with all
20 of our colleagues in an intergovernmental
21 way to address this issue.

22 Now for the good stuff,
23 Mr. President. Last night I had the
24 great opportunity of zooming with -- and
25 I want to make sure I get this right --

2 the Philadelphia Chapter of the Coalition
3 of Labor Union Women here as they honored
4 some Philadelphia trailblazers. They
5 honored a lady by the name of Dianna
6 Montague, who was the first African
7 American woman to join the Philadelphia
8 Ironworkers Union 405.

9 It's a coincidence that she
10 gave our prayer today, because they also
11 honored Archbishop Mary Floyd Palmer, the
12 first woman President of the Philadelphia
13 Council of Clergy.

14 They honored a lady I didn't
15 know of, Mr. President, but they did a
16 video on her. Her name is the late,
17 great Anne Feeney. She was a wonderful
18 folk singer and a political activist and
19 the first woman President of the
20 Pittsburgh Musicians Union.

21 And she also honored a lady we
22 all know well and we love, Carol Stukes,
23 the first African American woman elected
24 as the National Conference Public
25 Employees Retirement System Secretary,

2 and Carol and I, aside from her purple
3 hair that I love, we connected because
4 she was committed to pensions and
5 retirement security.

6 It's with that being said that
7 I want to thank you, CLUW, for
8 acknowledging the efforts of those women
9 who have been breaking through glass
10 ceilings and knocking down bolted doors
11 to say to generations to come that they
12 can too have an opportunity to succeed
13 and sit at tables where they are not
14 currently represented.

15 So to Koren Parker, who was the
16 President of CLUW -- Councilmember Jones,
17 she is not a resident of the Fourth. She
18 lives in the Ninth Councilmanic District,
19 just so you know. To all of the
20 officers, trustees, executive board
21 members of CLUW, to Thelma Clements and
22 Selena Hodges, thank you for your
23 leadership.

24 I also have to for the record
25 note that Michelle Slay, Shoshana

2 Bricklin, Vanessa Fields, Nina Ahmad, Hal
3 and Sue Rosenthal, they were present with
4 us. And I was also proud to join with my
5 soror, Judge Timika Lane; my coalition
6 sister, Cateria McCabe; judge and member
7 of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Lori
8 Dumas; and Judge Maria McLaughlin. They
9 were all present for this event, and it
10 was just nice to see women from all walks
11 of life, Mr. President, come together to
12 lift each other up under the spirit and
13 umbrella of solidarity.

14 Thank you, Mr. President, and
15 thank you, colleagues.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. And I want to shout out
22 and thank my colleagues, starting with
23 Member Thomas for his passionate defense
24 of institutions of color today. That
25 moved me, and it showed his commitment

2 not only to the education process but how
3 committed he is as a parent to making
4 sure that his children and all children
5 get what they deserve by way of cultural
6 companies. So I want to say that.

7 I want to say thank you to
8 Member Green who put it succinctly as to
9 how important the passage of that
10 legislation was. Somebody asked me in a
11 discussion -- some of us government
12 junkie geeks tend to get together and
13 talk about budgets, and they asked me how
14 bad is the upcoming budget, and before
15 yesterday, the only thing I could say is
16 real bad, and real bad meant that there
17 were scenarios of 10 and 20 percent cuts
18 by department and what that would have
19 meant to service delivery for the people
20 that we represent.

21 I want to shout out your
22 leadership, President, because you can
23 have any old captain of a ship during
24 good weather and sunshine and everybody
25 is floating down the Delaware, but when

2 the storms come, you need a captain of a
3 ship that understands some of the, as you
4 always say, the adult decisions, tough
5 decisions we are paid to make and we're
6 prepared to make.

7 So that rescue wagon that came
8 from our Philadelphia delegation, the
9 Congress, the Senate, and the White House
10 meant more than people actually know,
11 that we were on our way to a very bad
12 place.

13 I want to thank Member Gauthier
14 for citing that in these good times, not
15 to forget the systemic problems of gun
16 violence.

17 So now I raise one other area
18 of focus. The School District is going
19 to be one of the biggest beneficiaries of
20 these dollars, manna from heaven or manna
21 from Washington, right? Our children,
22 who have been at home being educated,
23 some in difficult circumstances, have
24 suffered. I think we're looking at some
25 of the highest absentee rates among

2 students ever. We're going to see a lot
3 of poor grades as a result of those
4 absentee rates. It is imperative over
5 the summer that all of the support
6 systems, whether it's credit recovery at
7 the high school level or tutoring to play
8 catch-up at the grade school level, be
9 employed this summer. If we can afford
10 it, we should do it.

11 In addition, we should take
12 this time over the summer to prepare our
13 aging facilities to be able to accept our
14 young people and teachers with modernized
15 ventilation systems. We should not waste
16 this crisis to do what needs to be done
17 not just for today but for years to come.

18 So, as you said, we were afraid
19 in our discussions budgetarily that this
20 was going to be a one-time appropriation
21 and that we had one year as a
22 municipality to recover, to get people
23 back in restaurants, people in hotels,
24 people back in business offices, but the
25 way this is happening, it will give us

2 more like a two-year recovery period, for
3 which, as one member of Council, I am
4 grateful.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. We're all
8 grateful, yes. Much needed.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yeah.

12 Thank you, Council President. You know,
13 I was sitting here kind of reflecting on
14 my comments. I wasn't even prepared to
15 make comments today as I was just taking
16 this day in, but yesterday was a pretty
17 rough day. The last couple days have
18 been pretty rough, but just echoing the
19 sentiments of my colleague Councilwoman
20 Jamie Gauthier, we are really in a state
21 of crisis right now and we are really
22 losing too many young people to senseless
23 gun violence.

24 When I think about the work
25 that we are doing, last week we

2 introduced legislation to create a
3 resource network around violence,
4 resources for young people and families
5 so they don't have to address this issue
6 of senseless gun violence alone without
7 resources. I think about the Office of
8 Victim Advocates in which we want to open
9 up during this spring to help families
10 who have lost loved ones to gun violence.
11 I think about Katherine Gilmore
12 Richardson who had penned a letter to the
13 Administration to make sure that during
14 this upcoming budget session, that every
15 department has a plan around how they're
16 addressing gun violence if we're giving
17 them resources. I think about
18 Councilwoman Jamie Gauthier who said that
19 we need to be in a state of emergency,
20 declare it right now here in the City of
21 Philadelphia, which is, we all know, long
22 overdue.

23 But I think about my
24 constituents when I'm out and about in
25 the streets, and I looked at the mother

3 this was really a good kid, and it just
4 reinforces how critically important it is
5 that those that have lost loved ones to
6 gun violence, like those families deserve
7 justice.

8 Like we got this whole concept

10 acts of violence happen, a lot of time
11 it's quiet, but I just implore the
12 constituents that I represent, those who
13 are listening, that if they see
14 something, say something, right? Because
15 that mother, that father who are losing
16 their loved ones to gun violence, that's
17 a hole in their hearts that's never going
18 to be replaced.

19 So there's a level of urgency
20 in addressing this issue but, most
21 importantly, what we don't always talk
22 about around this issue is, justice needs
23 to be served to those family members who
24 have lost loved ones to gun violence.

25 So I look forward to continuing

2 to work with my colleagues to figure out
3 how do we get to the bottom of this
4 issue. We're definitely going in the
5 wrong direction. We're in the middle of
6 a pandemic, and so we're fighting two
7 different issues at one time, but it kept
8 me up late last night, as it has been
9 plenty different nights, because at some
10 point in time, it's like we represent the
11 people and we're doing the best that we
12 can, but around this particular issue,
13 we're not winning right now, and too many
14 young people are dying to senseless gun
15 violence.

16 So I implore the other leaders,
17 law enforcement agencies to aggressively
18 stay on top of this issue like we're
19 doing in City Council, wrap our heads
20 around how we get to the bottom of it,
21 because we all know that when it gets hot
22 outside during this upcoming summer,
23 right, we see an uptick in gun violence.
24 So there's no reason why that level of
25 urgency -- actually, it should have

2 started last year, but we're not really
3 preparing even more aggressively now
4 before this summer comes.

5 And so I'll keep everybody
6 posted as I continue to work with my
7 colleagues around this issue, but we got
8 to get to the bottom of it, because if
9 not, nothing else matters at all. And if
10 anybody thinks I'm wrong about that, just
11 go ask your constituents how they're
12 feeling right now about the state of
13 Philadelphia around this issue. And it's
14 totally just unacceptable.

15 So I just wanted to put that on
16 the record, and I'll continue to work
17 with my colleagues with some concrete
18 ways on how we address it, but as a
19 community as a whole, we got to all step
20 up and make sure that -- we call for
21 justice around a variety of different
22 issues. Let's start calling for justice
23 for these young people who are being
24 murdered here in the city streets of
25 Philadelphia.
