2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 We're going to get started now. Thank
4 you.

5 Can I have a little quiet,
6 please. We're going to get started. We
7 want to make sure we can accommodate the
8 Mayor's address.

9 We've established our quorum.
10 I'd like to welcome everybody.

11 To give our invocation this
12 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend
13 Michelle Anne Simmons of Why Not Prosper,
14 Incorporated. She is here today as the
15 guest of Councilwoman Bass.

16 I would ask all guests,
17 members, and visitors to please rise.

18 (Councilmembers, guests, and
19 visitors rise.)

20 REVEREND SIMMONS: Good
21 morning.

22 (Good morning.)

23 REVEREND SIMMONS: I'm so
24 grateful and honored and have much
25 appreciation for Councilmember Bass for

3 I am so grateful to be here to do it.

2 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. I move that any of the

11 At this time, our next order of

18 resolution Honoring and Celebrating
19 Representative Joanna E. McClinton,
20 Esquire on her historic election as the
21 first Black woman and first woman Speaker
22 of the Pennsylvania House of
23 Representatives.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore

3 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
4 you, Council President.

5 Good morning, Council President
6 and colleagues, and in the presence of
7 our Chair of the Philadelphia delegation,
8 State Representative Morgan Cephas, it is
9 my absolute honor and privilege to
10 introduce today's resolution honoring my
11 friend, daughter of Southwest
12 Philadelphia, lawyer, minister,
13 glass-shattering, history-making first
14 woman and first Black woman to serve as
15 the Speaker of the Pennsylvania House of
16 Representatives, our Representative,
17 Joanna Elizabeth McClinton, Esquire.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:
22 Speaker McClinton is no stranger to
23 shattering glass ceilings. In fact, it's
24 what she does best.

25 In 2018, she became the first

2 woman and first African American elected
3 to serve as House Democratic Caucus
4 Chair. Two years later she made history
5 yet again by becoming the first woman
6 elected democratic leader of our State
7 Legislature. And just last month she
8 became Pennsylvania's first female
9 Majority Leader.

10 Since 2015, Speaker McClinton
11 has served as a strong advocate, not only
12 for the 191st Legislative District, but
13 on behalf of all Pennsylvanians.

14 Her journey to public service
15 started long before she took elected
16 office. As an attorney, she brought her
17 talents to the Philadelphia District
18 Attorney's Office, the Defender
19 Association of Philadelphia, and later as
20 Chief Counsel to State Senator Anthony
21 Hardy Williams.

22 I actually first met Rep
23 McClinton during her days as a student at
24 La Salle University in Councilmember
25 Bass's district.

2 In addition to all that she has
3 accomplished, I am truly excited about
4 what that means for our great city. We
5 know there is much work to do, and
6 working with our partners in Harrisburg,
7 including our new Appropriations Chair,
8 Representative Jordan Harris, I know that
9 we will get the job done.

10 So, colleagues, please join me
11 and my colleague Councilmember Jamie
12 Gauthier, who co-introduced this
13 resolution with me, in congratulating
14 State Representative Joanna Elizabeth
15 McClinton, Esquire, the first woman to
16 serve as Speaker of the Pennsylvania
17 House of Representatives.

18 Not only is this momentous
19 occasion good for all of us, it is good
20 for our city and the contributions she
21 has made towards creating a brighter and
22 more equitable future for all
23 Pennsylvanians.

24 We thank you, we appreciate
25 you, and we congratulate you. Kudos.

12 Gilmore Richardson for the opportunity to
13 co-introduce this resolution, and I
14 wanted to offer my own personal
15 congratulations to Speaker McClinton.

16 It's hard to put into words the
17 enormous sense of pride that is felt in
18 West and Southwest Philadelphia in
19 particular about her ascendance to the
20 Speaker position, and I know that that's
21 a sense of pride that also extends
22 throughout the City and the State. And
23 everywhere I'm looking, I see people
24 congratulating Speaker McClinton, and I
25 can feel how much people are inspired.

2 And I think the reason why there's been
3 such an overjoyed reaction is because
4 this is what it feels like when someone
5 deserves the role and the title that they
6 get, and there's no one more deserving of
7 this than Speaker McClinton.

8 She puts her whole heart into
9 her work. She brings resources, badly
10 needed resources, into our community, and
11 she is a member of the community through
12 and through. And I think we all feel so
13 proud of her because we relate to her.

14 And so I want to just offer my
15 sincere congratulations.

16 Thank you so much.

2 I just want to echo the
3 sentiments in congratulating and honoring
4 my little sister, now Madam Speaker
5 Joanna McClinton, and it's truly
6 significant that she not only broke a
7 glass ceiling but also shifted the
8 dynamics of how the body of Harrisburg,
9 specifically the General Assembly, will
10 operate moving forward.

11 Being a former member of the
12 State House of Representatives, it's
13 critically important to be able to have a
14 coalition across the state as it relates
15 to advocating for the issues and concerns
16 of the State of Pennsylvania as well as
17 the City of Philadelphia, and Joanna
18 McClinton has showed she's a worthy and,
19 most importantly, exceptionally qualified
20 leader within that area in making sure
21 that she's bringing everybody together
22 and advancing the State of Pennsylvania.

23 So I know that our Philadelphia
24 delegation chairwoman, who is sitting
25 here as well, knows when you have elected

2 an African American woman to serve the
3 State House in the State of Pennsylvania
4 is truly a significant and, most
5 importantly, a big deal.

6 So I just wanted to also put my
7 comments on the record. I'm truly proud
8 of the young lady that Joanna McClinton
9 has become, just watching her grow
10 throughout this process from wanting to
11 run for office to now becoming Madam
12 Speaker in the General Assembly in the
13 State of Pennsylvania.

14 So I just want to personally
15 say congratulations as well.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Driscoll.

20 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
21 you, Mr. President.

22 I want to welcome Morgan
23 Cephas, Representative, our leader of the
24 Philadelphia delegation, my former
25 colleague, person I sat next to for a

2 full term. We are so proud of you being
3 in the majority. My only regret on
4 Tuesday was that I wasn't a member of the
5 General Assembly. I would have nominated
6 Joanna McClinton and I would have voted

9 Representatives, and colleagues here in
10 City Council, Philadelphia will be
11 treated with respect.

7 today, Mr. President, is Vicky Ung,
8 commenting on Bill 220244.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MS. UNG: Good morning,
13 everyone. I'm President of Vietnamese
14 American community in Philadelphia. I
15 would like to thank the City of
16 Philadelphia for allowing our community
17 to display the South Vietnam flag over
18 the past several years.

19 This simple but symbolic
20 gesture should be continued. The South
21 Vietnam flag is the identity of
22 Vietnamese American community.
23 Recognizing this can acknowledge the
24 contribution and experience of nearly
25 16,000 Vietnamese American taxpayer.

2 This is the same flag that fly
3 high in the Vietnamese American event
4 throughout the Vietnamese business
5 district, like on the 6th and Washington
6 Avenue, at the Vietnam Veteran Memorial
7 where it's paired with the U.S. flag, and
8 everywhere else in the City.

9 I'm the one that the treasurer,
10 that do fundraising with Vietnamese. We
11 raise over \$80,000 for that Penn Landing,
12 two flag there, the Vietnamese flag and
13 American flag right there.

14 Beside paying a tax and being a
15 dutiful citizen, Vietnamese American have
16 served in the U.S. Army, Navy, and also
17 the Air Force. Our Vietnamese American
18 people that live in this country, we
19 honored to live here, and I think we
20 should honor this fine Vietnamese
21 American servicemen and our region by
22 display the South Vietnam flag.

23 Don't forget, 58,000 servicemen
24 die in Vietnam and 1,600 are still
25 missing in action in Vietnam. Let's

2 raise the yellow flag at the City Hall to
3 pay the homage to the bravery and service
4 of Vietnam veteran and raise awareness
5 for those who still missing. We must not
6 forget about them.

7 During the Vietnam War, many
8 Vietnamese Philadelphia fight along with
9 U.S. servicemen. When the war ending, we
10 all suffer. The people work with or know
11 American people, we be in the prison and
12 suffer many, many year under the
13 communist they call reeducation camp,
14 where they nearly starve to death. They
15 were stripped to act as citizen and they
16 change the way of life.

17 The yellow flag symbolize where
18 we come from and our fight for the free
19 society.

20 I am survivor of Vietnam War.
21 For those survivor, the communist-risen
22 officer red flag with yellow star in the
23 middle elicits anger and profound sense
24 of loss. I have here so many, so many
25 story about the communist abuse, which

17 morning.

18 MS. VU: Good morning,
19 everyone. My name is Le-Quyen Vu. I am
20 the Executive Director of the New Chinese
21 American Council. I am here to offer my
22 voice to represent all immigrants and
23 refugee in Philadelphia.

24 This bill is important because
25 this bill was introduced as a result of

2 the rules of which flag and how flag is
3 being raised at City Hall.

4 The flag being raised at City
5 Hall for some community in Philadelphia
6 represent their struggle for freedom,
7 their escape to America.

8 Philadelphia is a city that is
9 the birthplace of freedom. Philadelphia
10 is the City of brotherhood. So I am
11 asking all Councilmen to introduce -- to
12 pass this bill, because this is the
13 balance and it fix the rule that was
14 broken.

15 You are close to the people.
16 You live among your constituent. This is
17 what your constituent wants, and I urge
18 you to please vote yes for this bill.

19 Thank you.

4 Please state your name for the record and
5 begin your testimony.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. SHALIGA: Dear

8 Councilmember, dear audience, my name is
9 Serge Shaliga. I represent Belarusian
10 American community of Philadelphia, Group
11 Belarus Freedom Philadelphia, and
12 Nationwide Organization Association of
13 Belarusians in America.

14 On March 25th, 1919, the
15 Belarusian People Republic was
16 percolating, and the white, red, white
17 flag was established as the official flag
18 of Belarus.

19 After the fall of the Soviet
20 Union in 1991, the same flag became the
21 official symbol of Belarusian
22 independence and freedom. White, red,
23 white flag of Belarus was the flag that
24 President Bill Clinton waved along the
25 American flag when he visited Belarus in

1 3/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 1994. I will show this picture.

3 In Belarus, however, this
4 symbol of freedom is forbidden under
5 regime of Dictator Lukashenko. The use
6 of this flag can threaten innocent
7 Belarusians with years in prison.

8 The current official red,
9 green, white flag is the former flag of
10 the Belarusian Soviet Socialist Republic
11 and was re-established by the Dictator
12 Lukashenko in 1995. This flag is a
13 painful reminder of the oppression
14 Belarusians were subjected to during the
15 USSR and serious human rights abuse,
16 persecution, fury (ph), and the murders
17 of Belarusian opposition members and
18 single activities by Lukashenko regime.

19 Under this official red, green,
20 white, red flag, Russian missiles are
21 launched from the Belarusian territory to
22 kill innocent Ukrainians.

23 Therefore, I, Serge Shaliga, a
24 representative of the Belarusian American
25 community of Philadelphia, appealing to

2 City Council to pass Bill 220244, which
3 would allow the City Council to authorize
4 resolution the display of our historical
5 Belarusian white, red, white flag.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
11 Mr. Chairman, is Joe Tran, commenting on
12 220244.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.
14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Please state
16 your name for the record and begin your
17 testimony.

18 MR. TRAN: Joseph Tran.

19 Thank you. Thank you, and good
20 morning, Council President and members of
21 the City Council. My name is Joseph
22 Tran, current student and President of
23 the Philadelphia student body and
24 government of the Philadelphia College of
25 Osteopathic Medicine and Board member of

2 the Vietnamese American community of
3 Pennsylvania.

4 I am grateful for the
5 opportunity to be speaking here before
6 this body representing both the
7 Vietnamese American community of this
8 Commonwealth and the City of Philadelphia
9 in support of Bill No. 220244.

10 The Vietnamese American
11 community are people and children of
12 immigrants, including myself, many of
13 whom are refugees who have, like among
14 many other groups throughout our nation's
15 history, have come to call the United
16 States our home in search of all the
17 values all Americans hold dear, which is
18 democracy, freedom, and opportunity.

19 Today there are over two
20 million Vietnamese Americans across the
21 United States, with almost 45,000 in our
22 state and over 14,000 who reside here in
23 the City.

24 I'm a first-generation
25 Vietnamese American who is proud to call

2 Philly my home. Having been raised and
3 living here my entire life, I am both
4 grateful for the opportunity that both
5 America and the City of Brotherly Love
6 has given to my family and myself, a
7 place that gave my father, who is
8 President of the Vietnamese American
9 community of Pennsylvania, the
10 opportunity to pursue and practice
11 medicine again and for me to follow in
12 his footsteps, being a student at the
13 Philadelphia College of Osteopathic
14 Medicine where I currently serve as
15 Student Government President,
16 representing our fine medical and
17 graduate students.

18 I come before you today again
19 to ask for your support as our elected
20 representatives to vote yes in this bill
21 in order to codify a formal solution to
22 recognize the Vietnamese American
23 heritage flag as the flag of the
24 Vietnamese American people and for the
25 City to officially support this flag and

2 its raising as a symbol for our community
3 and its people.

4 This flag is more than a symbol
5 of our people in diaspora. It is the
6 embodiment of the values and struggles in
7 the fight and name for freedom, equality,
8 and democracy. But almost over 60,000
9 American troops have sacrificed and
10 spilled their blood during the Vietnam
11 War, values that are shared by us both as
12 Americans and as free Vietnamese people.

13 As a country and city that
14 prides itself on diversity, equality, and
15 democracy, I sincerely and humbly ask
16 that this City Council simply recognize
17 this fact for our people as one of many
18 groups that make up our great city and
19 great country.

20 Thank you very much for your
21 time.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
23 for your testimony.

4 is Nghi Vo, commenting on 220244.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MR. VO: Good morning. My name
9 is Nghi Vo and I would like to give my
10 comment to the Bill 220244.

11 The Philadelphia flag raising
12 event is held as a way the City
13 government try to connect to various
14 refugees and immigrant communities living
15 in Philadelphia. We were very happy to
16 come to the City to recognize our
17 heritage, but last year Mayor Kenney
18 borrow directly from the State Department
19 to forbid any flag to be raised at the
20 City flagpole if the flag is not
21 recognized by the U.S. Department.

22 My question to everyone here,
23 if we cannot raise the flag we want, then
24 what flag we should raise?

25 Effectively Mayor Kenney tells

2 us that we have to show support the U.S.
3 approved flag. That is the red flag of
4 the communist government in Vietnam.

5 We once were political
6 refugees, and that is the reason why we
7 are here today and why we have been
8 admitted into this country. Mayor Kenney
9 tells us that go through the City Hall
10 and show affection and affiliations to
11 the communist party. That is an irony
12 and does not make any sense.

13 The City flagpole is not a
14 federal property. The flag raising event
15 is not an event to honor any government
16 delegates or any country. That event is
17 to recognize the various community of
18 immigrants and refugees into
19 Philadelphia.

20 Mayor Kenney should know that
21 his (unintelligible) is deeply hurtful to
22 our community.

23 I would like to appeal to City
24 Council to approve this Bill 220244 so we
25 can decide how we want to represent.

3 we have more than 1,500 persons sign to

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MR. HAGINS: Great morning,
17 everyone. Ogbonna Hagins, H-A-G-I-N-S.

18 Of course I am in agreement
19 with renaming the 4900 block of Walnut
20 Street Paul L. Robeson Way. I would like
21 to recite a quote by Paul Robeson.

22 "You want to shut up every
23 Negro who has the courage to stand up and
24 fight for rights of workers, and I have
25 been on many picket lines for the

2 steelworkers too."

3 In some respects, at the same
4 time that I agree with renaming the 4900
5 block of Walnut Street to Paul Robeson
6 Way, I feel that the work of this body
7 should also reflect what Paul Robeson was
8 about. Robeson also said, "to be free to
9 walk the good American earth as equal
10 citizens, to live without fear, to enjoy
11 the fruits of our toil, to give our
12 children every opportunity in life. The
13 dream which we have held so long in our
14 hearts is today the destiny that we hold
15 in our hands."

16 Council, you have the ability
17 to fulfill the works of Brother Robeson
18 in Philadelphia by not going along to get
19 along, not being selfish, and by fighting
20 and lobbying for economic repair, other
21 words -- otherwise known as reparations.
22 Particularly in the Afro American
23 community, it would make an incredible
24 difference.

25 Unfortunately, some of your

6 Finally, Robeson fought for

9 American in this city? Are you fighting
10 for reparations for Afro Americans in
11 this city? Do you know that crime and
12 violence is as a result of poverty?

13 Alan Greenspan said that there
14 is no debt that America cannot pay,
15 because it prints money.

16 Pay the debt that's due to the
17 Afro American, and I guarantee you you'll
18 see a reduction in the crime and violence
19 in this city.

9 The current restriction on
10 public comments to agenda items only is a
11 violation of the public's First Amendment
12 right to petition the government for
13 redress of grievances as well as a
14 violation of the Pennsylvania Sunshine
15 Act, which states quite clearly that City
16 Council shall provide a reasonable
17 opportunity for taxpayers to comment on
18 matters of concern, official action, or
19 deliberation which are or may be before
20 the board or Council prior to taking
21 official action.

22 According to a 2015 decision of
23 the U.S. District Court in Duff versus
24 the City of Philadelphia, the main reason
25 City Council is getting away with this

2 restriction is that they haven't actually
3 enforced it.

4 In the words of the court,
5 quote, "The court finds the plaintiff has
6 failed to state a claim upon which relief
7 may be granted because plaintiff has been
8 permitted to speak on non-agenda items at
9 City Council meetings," unquote.

10 If City Council's aim is to
11 manage public comments in a reasonable
12 manner, City Council can do that under
13 the Sunshine Act, caselaw, and common
14 sense.

15 Clearly, the public comment
16 period is not an opportunity for the
17 public to talk about their favorite
18 recipes, and it is reasonable to impose
19 restrictions on the content of public
20 comments for special hearings as well as
21 during regularly scheduled City Council
22 meetings and committee meetings when
23 discussing specific bills or resolutions,
24 but not for the entire duration of a
25 regularly scheduled public meeting.

2 The Philadelphia School Board
3 and other cities and towns do not impose
4 this restriction on public comments for a
5 good reason. It's an unfair suppression
6 of our freedom to speak.

7 In this City of Liberty, it is
8 time to end this unconstitutional
9 restriction that has done untold damage
10 to the public's trust and to their human
11 right to hear what their fellow citizens
12 have to say about their own government at
13 City Council meetings.

24 context. You cannot be a politician and
25 also be anthropobic.

10 other restrictions that are being made
11 that --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Excuse me, sir. Are you talking about
14 the flag raising?

10 The attempts to muzzle speech
11 must not be a part of this government.
12 There have only been disastrous outcomes
13 when censorship has been allowed to take

16 attempt to stifle speech in this Chamber.

17 I call on Councilmembers and
18 the residents of this city to not support
19 public officials who want to move away
20 from light and towards darkness.

17 way for Black artists across almost every
18 medium. His signature song, Ol' Man
19 River, remains one of the top show tunes
20 in American history.

21 He shattered the glass ceiling
22 as the first African American to play
23 Othello on Broadway. He became a staple
24 of the silver screen both in Hollywood
25 and here in Philadelphia. And this only

3 Robeson achieved during his lifetime.

4 But rather than using his
5 success to avoid the struggles plaguing
6 our country and our people during his
7 lifetime, Paul Robeson used his platform

10 rewarded Paul Robeson for his activism by
11 branding him a communist sympathizer and
12 throwing him in front of the U.S. House
13 Un-American Activities Committee,
14 resulting in his art becoming banned from
15 public consumption.

16 So today we push back on that
17 injustice by recognizing Paul Robeson for
18 what he truly is, an American hero whose
19 groundbreaking legacy still inspires
20 Black children in Philadelphia and across
21 the world 125 years after he was born.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, thank
20 you, Mr. President.

21 I wanted to just take a brief
22 moment before I call for the adoption of
23 the resolution, because I really wanted
24 to make sure that people knew and
25 understood what a very special person

2 that Myra Brown is and all that she's
3 done here in the City of Philadelphia for
4 its citizens.

5 And, you know, in the title of
6 the resolution, we acknowledge Myra for
7 being the Board Chair, the first African
8 American woman Board Chair of Women's
9 Way, which is incredibly significant.
10 It's a huge organization that does a lot
11 of work around women's issues and has
12 been around for a very long time. And so
13 for us to just have a woman of color, an
14 African American woman, leading that
15 organization, I think it's incredibly
16 significant.

17 And I'm going to ask Myra to
18 just stand, if she would.

19 - - -

20 (Applause.)

21 - - -

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And it's an
23 organization dedicated to the advancement
24 of women, girls, and gender and racial
25 equity. She has also been an

2 instrumental Board member on the Board of
3 Directors for organizations like Philly
4 Girls Rock -- or Girls Rock Philly, the
5 AIDS Law Project of Philadelphia, and the
6 Philadelphia International Airport
7 Capacity Enhancement Project.

8 Myra was named in 2019 Woman of
9 and Minority Business Leader of the Year
10 by the Philadelphia Business Journal, and
11 as Chief Executive of NWON Opportunities,
12 she provides work readiness and career
13 preparedness workshops and training to
14 jobseekers. NWON also helps businesses
15 meet their staffing needs while
16 businesses -- building a skilled
17 workforce.

18 And the one thing that's not
19 mentioned here that really is near and
20 dear to my heart is the work that Myra
21 does with the Nicetown-Tioga Library.
22 And so we've had a wonderful program that
23 Myra and I put together over at
24 Nicetown-Tioga Library to make sure that
25 there was job readiness and skills being

2 offered at that library two days a week.
3 They're there all day. And they're
4 really having an incredible impact and
5 having folks come in, get the training,
6 and get very high-paying jobs.

7 And so we hope -- Myra, stand
8 back up. We hope that we would be able

10 ask David to stand up with her. David is
11 a young man that Myra recruited from the
12 neighborhood, who is now working with
13 NWON and who is moving forward in his
14 career, and one of those high-paying
15 jobseekers who is now fully employed and
16 just has a wonderful future ahead of him.

17 And when we just give people a
18 chance, it makes all the difference in
19 the world.

20 So thank you to Myra, and I am

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you very much.

18 It is now that time.

19 Okay. Folks, it is that time.
20 The time has come to consider the Mayor's
21 presentation of his annual budget.

22 The Philadelphia Home Rule
23 Charter states that the Mayor shall
24 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
25 before the end of the fiscal year, his

2 operating budget message and proposed
3 operating budget ordinance for the
4 ensuing fiscal year.

5 At the same time, the Mayor
6 shall submit to Council the recommended
7 capital program and the capital budget as
8 received from the City Planning
9 Commission, to the extent approved by the
10 Mayor.

11 I now appoint the following
12 committee to escort the Mayor into the
13 Council Chambers: Councilman Jones,
14 Councilman Squilla, Councilwoman Bass,
15 and Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

16 (Brief pause.)

17 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Council
18 President, the Mayor has arrived.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you.

21 Ladies and gentlemen, I'm
22 pleased to introduce the Mayor of the
23 City of Philadelphia, Mayor James F.
24 Kenney.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Mr. Mayor. Welcome back.

6 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you. It's
7 been a while.

8 Before I start, I want to
9 acknowledge the presence of one of our
10 great State Representatives, Morgan
11 Cephas. I was told she was here.

12 There she is. Thank you.
13 Thank you.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 MAYOR KENNEY: Thanks for all
18 your hard work. You really do us proud.
19 So thank you. I appreciate it. And
20 really happy about our new Speaker.
21 Isn't that wonderful?

22 So good morning, everybody, and
23 let me begin by thanking Council
24 President Darrell Clarke and members of
25 City Council for the invitation to speak

2 here today.

3 I'm happy to be back in this
4 Chamber as we kick off the annual process
5 of creating our city's budget.

6 The last time I gave this
7 speech in person was March 5th, 2020.
8 Only 17 days later, COVID-19 shut down
9 our city and changed our lives
10 dramatically.

11 Looking around me this morning
12 and thinking about the uncertainty and
13 the seismic sudden changes we have
14 navigated together since 2020, I am
15 overwhelmed with admiration for our city,
16 its residents, and public servants and my
17 fellow City leaders. We have lived and
18 led through history.

19 Together we have navigated and
20 continue to lead our city through a
21 global pandemic, a nationwide reckoning
22 on racial injustice, and a national
23 crisis of gun violence that is causing
24 heartbreak and pain for too many families
25 and communities across Philadelphia.

2 I look forward to working with
3 this esteemed body of elected leaders to
4 adopt a budget that reflects our
5 commitments to equity and progress, and
6 prioritizes sustainability and fiscal
7 stability so that our city is ready for
8 any changes and all the opportunities
9 that the future holds.

10 I also want to take this moment
11 to recognize and thank Council President
12 Clarke, who has served in this role for
13 the entirety of our Administration and
14 has been a valued colleague for much
15 longer than that.

16 Darrell and I spent a lot of
17 time after I was elected envisioning what
18 we could accomplish during our time in
19 office.

20 So I want to give him a round
21 of applause. He deserves it.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 MAYOR KENNEY: Things like

1 3/2/23 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 community schools and better funding for
3 public education, affordable housing, and
4 new jobs. I am so proud of what we've
5 achieved, and thank you very much,
6 Mr. President.

7 Together with all our City
8 Council, we will build on our success and
9 finish with energy, momentum, and a
10 strong foundation for our city's next
11 chapter.

12 As we begin the budget process,
13 I want to acknowledge the months of work
14 already completed before today.

15 Our vision for the final budget
16 of this Administration is to make
17 investments that provide quality services
18 and infrastructure for residents,
19 maintain the City's fiscal health, reduce
20 racial disparities, and achieve equitable
21 outcomes.

22 We have asked City departments
23 to ensure that their budget proposals are
24 designed with racial equity as a guiding
25 principle, and we have continued to

2 improve our budget process to include
3 more voices and more input from a diverse
4 group of employees and residents.

5 This budget cycle we held 15
6 community focus groups with residents,
7 six sessions with local organizations
8 across many sectors, and five employee
9 focus groups.

10 This process revealed that we
11 all agree on what's important to our
12 shared future: education, public safety,
13 racial equity and alleviation of poverty,
14 housing, and quality and accessible
15 services and infrastructure.

16 These priorities reflect our
17 concern for each other. They are our
18 city's values, and I couldn't be more
19 honored to be this city's mayor. I am
20 confident that together we can pass a
21 budget we can all be proud of.

22 As we entered 2023, I
23 reaffirmed our commitment to the
24 priorities that have guided me since the
25 beginning of our first term. These

2 priorities include quality education for
3 all, a safer and more just Philadelphia,
4 thriving neighborhoods, and inclusive
5 growth and economic opportunity.

6 We have made progress in each
7 of these areas, but there is still urgent
8 work left to do, and this budget features
9 new and immediate investments that will
10 bring more opportunities, supports, and
11 services to all Philadelphians.

12 Seven years ago I told City
13 Council that together we could expand
14 quality pre-K, create community schools,
15 invest in our public spaces, and help
16 small businesses.

17 We took on corporate interests
18 to pass the beverage tax, and as a
19 result, today there are more than 13,000
20 children who have attended free, quality
21 pre-K funded by the City.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 MAYOR KENNEY: And now, partly

2 because of President Clarke's urging, and
3 now 10,000 students and their families
4 are benefiting for expanded activities at
5 community schools.

6 We didn't stop there. From the
7 Catto Scholarship to the PHLConnectEd,
8 we've prioritized education during our
9 second term as well.

10 Providing our children with
11 high-quality services and opportunities
12 from infancy to adulthood is still the
13 absolute best thing that we can do for
14 them and for our city.

15 We have made historic
16 commitments to public education over the
17 last two terms, totalling over
18 \$1.68 billion in new revenue.

19 Our partnership has helped the
20 School District establish new fiscal
21 stability. They've achieved an
22 investment-grade bond rating, and their
23 projected fund balance at the end of this
24 fiscal year is an impressive 591 million.
25 Different from the old days when I first

2 was in Council.

3 This year we will follow
4 through on our commitments to fund public
5 schools and invest \$1.4 billion in the
6 School District over the life of the Five
7 Year Plan, in addition to the local tax
8 revenues that support the District.

9 Our proposed budget for FY24
10 includes a \$282 million contribution to
11 the District. That's 171 percent higher
12 than it was the year before my first
13 term.

14 In my 2020 budget address, I
15 announced our plans to create a City
16 scholarship for the Community College of
17 Philadelphia, and despite the financial
18 uncertainty brought on by the pandemic,
19 we followed through and established the
20 Octavius Catto Scholarship that year.

21 To date, over 1,400 Catto
22 Scholars have received tuition-free
23 enrollment, funds for basic needs, and
24 wraparound support services. I am proud
25 that we held firm on this commitment,

2 because this program has been vital for
3 many students' recovery from the pandemic
4 and their plans for the future.

5 Here are just a few stories:

6 Tabatha Bywater works full-time
7 in the Jefferson Health radiology
8 department while raising twins. She is a
9 Catto Scholar studying healthcare so she
10 can advance in her field.

11 Tabatha says, quote, "This
12 scholarship has given me the opportunity
13 to finally be able to reach the goals I
14 have not only set for myself, but for my
15 growing family. Thank you for granting
16 me this wonderful opportunity and thank
17 you for being just as invested in my
18 future as I am."

19 Norma Nicholas is a 40-year-old
20 Catto Scholar and an immigrant to the
21 U.S. She says the scholarship has given
22 her the opportunity to show her children
23 that anything is possible.

24 She earned her GED last year,
25 and is studying healthcare in hopes of

2 becoming a nurse. She says, quote, "I am
3 going to take advantage of this chance to
4 be a good role model for my family, to
5 work hard, and to fulfill my potential."

6 Another scholar, Christina
7 Tsan, is her parents' oldest child, and
8 says she felt like, quote, a million
9 bucks, when she told them she could go to
10 college for free. The scholarship turned
11 her dream of getting a debt-free college
12 education into a tangible reality.

13 Christina is here today.
14 Christina, thank you for sharing your
15 story. We are all incredibly proud of
16 you and your classmates.

17 Could you please stand.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 MAYOR KENNEY: Hearing these
22 stories makes me feel like a million
23 bucks.

24 The Catto Scholarship makes
25 dreams possible, not just for individual

2 students, but for their families as well.

3 To meet the increasing demand
4 for this anti-poverty initiative and
5 prepare more Philadelphians for the
6 academic and professional success they
7 dream of, the proposed budget will
8 dedicate \$11.6 million to Catto
9 Scholarships in FY24.

10 We will also invest a total of
11 more than \$270 million in our city's
12 Community College through FY28 to ensure
13 this vital institution remains accessible
14 and affordable, while offering the
15 quality educational opportunities that
16 Philadelphians need for post-secondary
17 success.

18 And for our youngest learners,
19 this year's budget will create 950 new
20 PHLpreK seats in FY24, bringing the
21 program's size to 5,250 seats total.

22 That's over 5,000 children --
23 it's more than the number of freshman
24 students at Temple -- attending
25 City-funded pre-K each year.

2 I am extremely proud of what
3 this program has accomplished in just six
4 years, serving more than 13,000 children,
5 funding diverse neighborhood businesses,
6 expanding the number of quality pre-K
7 seats citywide, and creating
8 opportunities for caregivers to find
9 employment, work additional hours to save
10 for their families, or even go to school
11 themselves.

12 Most importantly, it's giving
13 children the quality early education that
14 they surely deserve, which prepares them
15 for early literacy and academic success.

16 When we make investments in
17 education, especially in the youngest
18 learners, we're investing in a process
19 that takes longer than an election cycle
20 to prove its full potential. But the
21 wait is worth it.

22 We recently heard from one of
23 our first PHLpreK families. Diana's son
24 Mason attended pre-K at Prodigy Learning
25 Center, which is one of the first pre-K

2 centers we partnered with when PHLpreK
3 started in 2017.

4 The PHLpreK program allowed
5 Diana to send her youngest son to a pre-K
6 center she trusted without worrying about
7 the financial burden of his tuition.

8 Because Mason was enrolled in a
9 safe and enriching environment during the
10 day, Diana was able to earn her
11 Bachelor's degree in 2017 and her MBA in
12 2018. She also earned a Master of
13 Education in 2020, and now works for the
14 Defender Association of Philadelphia.

15 - - -

16 (Applause.)

17 - - -

18 MAYOR KENNEY: Today, Mason is
19 in the 4th grade and earning outstanding
20 grades, which his mom credits to his
21 excellent pre-K experience.

22 Diana also thanks the PHLpreK
23 program for supporting Mason to grow
24 emotionally and facilitating a strong
25 partnership between her and her son's

2 teachers.

3 This is the incredible story of
4 just one pre-K family. With the
5 expansion proposed in this budget, more
6 than 18,000 children will have attended
7 PHLpreK by the end of our term. This is
8 an extraordinary accomplishment for our
9 city.

10 Establishing and expanding this
11 program is the highlight of my career,
12 and I look forward to its continued
13 success in the years to come.

14 While we continue to invest in
15 places of learning, it is just as
16 important that we invest in the places
17 where our residents live.

18 Rebuild is an historic
19 investment in public spaces, transforming
20 rec centers, libraries, and playgrounds
21 that have languished for far too long.

22 With the program now in high
23 gear, we are committing \$47.5 million of
24 combined new borrowing and operational
25 support for Rebuild in FY24.

2 This will help us reach our
3 goal of 80 percent of low-income
4 households living within a mile of a
5 recently renovated public space by the
6 end of the calendar year. We have over
7 20 groundbreakings and at least 15
8 ribbon-cuttings planned in 2023.

9 And let me be clear, because I
10 think there is some confusion in the
11 press. We have doubled down on our
12 commitment to Rebuild even in the face of
13 the sector-wide cost increases.

14 We are dedicating all the
15 dollars needed to bring 72 sites to
16 world-class standards that we and the
17 City Council have promised our
18 communities, and we remain dedicated to
19 working with community members to ensure
20 that their vision is reflected in every
21 project.

22 Rebuild is a win-win program
23 that transforms lives as well as
24 facilities, by offering support and
25 opportunities for underrepresented

2 businesses and workers.

3 The construction projects have
4 a minority and women-owned business
5 participation rate of more than
6 65 percent.

7 - - -

8 (Applause.)

9 - - -

10 MAYOR KENNEY: And we will make
11 sure those spaces are consistently
12 available to the public by committing
13 \$14 million over five years to make sure
14 every library branch has the staff it
15 needs to provide residents with
16 dependable five-day service, with an
17 additional \$37 million committed to
18 expanding service at all branches back to
19 six days per week.

20 - - -

21 (Applause.)

22 - - -

23 MAYOR KENNEY: Just last
24 weekend, we hit an important milestone as
25 ten neighborhood branches reopened for

2 Saturday service.

3 With new funds from the budget
4 we passed together last year, I am so
5 proud that our Parks and Rec team has
6 been able to open 66 recreation centers
7 on the weekends, with all rec centers
8 being open on the weekends by the end of
9 2023.

10 And in this budget we have
11 added another \$1.7 million in Parks and
12 Rec inclusion plan, which ensures that
13 facilities are more accessible and
14 welcoming to everyone, including
15 individuals with disabilities.

16 We will also sustain our
17 investments in arts and culture, which
18 over seven years have funded 700 free,
19 family-friendly cultural events in
20 Philadelphia neighborhoods, prioritizing
21 low-income zip codes.

22 We are proud of the number of
23 public art projects in neighborhoods and
24 the increased diversity in the stories
25 being told through public art.

2 We also look forward to working
3 with Council to support the African
4 American Museum in Philadelphia as they
5 prepare to move to 18th and Vine, where
6 they belong. I am very excited for their
7 incredible collection and programs to
8 join our other iconic institutions along
9 the Parkway. This is important. It's
10 really important.

11 I'm pleased --

12 - - -

13 (Applause.)

14 - - -

15 MAYOR KENNEY: I am pleased
16 that our continued focus on reliable City
17 services is working. Our on-time trash
18 pick-up is at the highest consistent rate
19 in almost a decade, and in 2022, the new
20 street sweeping program cleaned more than
21 16,000 miles of street, a distance
22 equivalent to traveling two-thirds around
23 the way of the globe.

24 The program also removed almost
25 800 tons of debris in high need

2 neighborhoods across the City.

3 In this budget, we are making
4 new investments in sanitation services,
5 including a \$2.5 million investment to
6 expand street sweeping and \$4 million for
7 the creation of another crew to address
8 the challenges presented by illegal
9 dumping in neighborhoods across the City.

10 - - -

11 (Applause.)

12 - - -

13 MAYOR KENNEY: And I want to
14 introduce some of the newest members of
15 the Streets Department over here with us
16 today.

17 Our first cohort of Public
18 Safety Enforcement Officers started with
19 the City on Monday. They are the first
20 civilian City employees to provide
21 official support for pedestrians,
22 cyclists, and drivers.

23 You will see them working
24 during peak traffic times to address
25 congestion, promote safety, and help our

2 residents and visitors travel the City
3 more easily.

4 It takes dedicated, skilled
5 people to deliver the services I've
6 mentioned and reach the goals that we
7 have set for the budget process.

8 And just like many other
9 employers, one of the greatest challenges
10 we've faced after the pandemic is hiring
11 and retaining workers.

12 To make sure we are doing all
13 we can to help departments hire the
14 workers they need, the FY24 budget will
15 provide an additional \$1.9 million to the
16 Office of Human Services to support
17 improvements to the way we recruit and
18 hire.

19 I want to thank City Council
20 for their support with this urgent issue
21 facing the City, which includes creating
22 a Special Committee on Retention and
23 Recruitment of Municipal Workers.

24 As this group convenes and as
25 we work together to pass a budget, we

2 will make sure we are prioritizing the
3 needs of City workers, current and
4 future. Our first goal with this work
5 will be to ensure that the lowest paid
6 City workers are paid enough to sustain
7 their family's needs.

8 We've also made commitments in
9 this budget to fund our labor agreements.

10 Public service does not need to
11 be a sacrifice. All workers should be
12 able to live here comfortably, with
13 benefits that support them and their
14 families.

15 While poverty in Philadelphia
16 is at a 15-year low, we know that
17 economic hardship and the overall cost of
18 living are urgent challenges for far too
19 many residents citywide.

20 One way we are addressing this
21 is advancing our commitment to racial
22 equity, establishing a \$5 million fund in
23 FY24 to clear criminal justice-related
24 debts that create barriers to employment
25 and opportunity.

5 MAYOR KENNEY: We want to
6 support, not penalize, people who are
7 taking the right steps to keep their
8 lives on track.

9 The Five Year Plan will also
10 expand on our collective commitment to
11 affordable housing, housing stability,
12 and housing opportunities for people
13 experiencing homelessness.

14 We are investing \$29 million
15 over five years into eviction prevention,
16 including expanding the Right to Counsel
17 program which guarantees free legal
18 assistance with eviction proceedings for
19 low-income residents in the zip codes
20 most affected by evictions.

21 We all agree that any
22 homelessness is too much homelessness,
23 and I'm glad to report that our
24 housing-first approach in Philadelphia is
25 making significant strides.

2 The City's homeless prevention
3 and rapid rehousing efforts have reduced
4 homelessness by 22 percent in the last
5 five years, and family homelessness has
6 been reduced by an incredible 42 percent.

7 Our efforts won't end there.
8 We are investing \$6.7 million over five
9 years to create 100 new supportive
10 housing units for people who are
11 chronically homeless.

12 - - -

13 (Applause.)

14 - - -

15 MAYOR KENNEY: And we know that
16 this model is 90 percent successful in
17 preventing a return to homelessness.

18 We are also committing
19 \$3.2 million over five years to operate
20 Sanctuary Village, which will be
21 Philadelphia's first tiny home community.

22 And we are committed to
23 sustaining the Kensington-focused
24 Encampment Resolution Team, which makes
25 daily contact with people experiencing

2 homelessness, offers connections to
3 treatment, housing and services, and
4 responds to neighborhood concerns.

5 Thanks to funding from the
6 national opioid settlement, we are
7 investing in community-driven planning
8 and solutions in Kensington.

9 We are also using the funds to
10 address the overdose crisis with expanded
11 outreach and engagement, and reduced
12 barriers to treatment through mobile
13 supports.

14 Ensuring thriving neighborhoods
15 across the City also requires us to plan
16 ahead and invest now to prepare for a
17 warmer and wetter climate.

18 To that end, the FY24 budget
19 includes \$20 million of new borrowing and
20 operating support for the planned
21 transformation of FDR Park, which is the
22 first park plan in Philadelphia's history
23 to incorporate climate change
24 projections.

25 FDR Park is a welcoming space

2 for diverse and underserved communities,
3 and a sanctuary for local wildlife.

4 The plan will address frequent
5 and future flooding so that this historic
6 park is accessible and preserved for
7 generations to come.

8 - - -

11 MAYOR KENNEY: We know that
12 climate change presents an elevated
13 threat to communities of color in
14 Philadelphia, and this is in part due to
15 the centuries of systemic racism that
16 have shaped our city's neighborhoods and
17 infrastructure.

18 To confront this, last year we
19 established the Philadelphia
20 Environmental Justice Advisory Commission
21 to engage residents in the process of
22 fixing historic injustices and building
23 resiliency for the future.

24 The Five Year Plan will provide
25 \$1 million over five years to fund the

2 Commission and provide direct funding to
3 communities working to address this goal.

4 The FY24 budget also includes
5 \$22 million across 12 departments to
6 maximize the historic opportunity
7 presented by the federal Bipartisan
8 Infrastructure Law, which is already
9 yielding results and bringing
10 transformative opportunities to
11 Philadelphia communities.

12 To date, the City has won more
13 than \$136 million in five major
14 competitive BIL grants, in addition to
15 \$450 million expected in surface
16 transportation formula funds.

17 While we make plans for our
18 city's future, we are ever-mindful of the
19 urgent crises facing us today.

20 The challenges of the pandemic
21 have precipitated an alarming rise in gun
22 violence across the nation and here in
23 Philadelphia as well.

24 I know that ending this crisis
25 is an urgent and personal priority for

2 every elected official in this room. And
3 there is no higher priority for our
4 Administration. Public safety is a
5 pre-condition for every single one of our
6 goals.

7 Last year we announced a record
8 investment in gun violence with your
9 help, and this year's \$233 million budget
10 will keep up the momentum as we roll out
11 this year's public safety and criminal
12 justice investment.

13 This includes \$50 million for a
14 new forensic lab and another
15 \$14.7 million over five years for new
16 forensic specialists.

17 - - -

18 (Applause.)

19 - - -

20 MAYOR KENNEY: We are also
21 committing \$9.2 million over five years
22 to Operation Pinpoint, which deploys
23 additional police resources to the places
24 where violent crimes occur the most.

25 Operation Pinpoint carried out

2 a significant redeployment in four areas
3 across the City at the end of 2022.

4 We know hiring is crucial to
5 our success here, and the Five Year Plan
6 invests a million dollars in recruitment
7 for the Police Department with a focus on
8 diversity, equity, and inclusion.

9 In FY24, we will work to
10 further reduce shootings by continuing to
11 partner with the Civic Coalition to Save
12 Lives, and I am pleased to announce the
13 latest development in this partnership,
14 which is that we will soon welcome
15 Estelle Richman as the Managing
16 Director's Senior Advisor for Gun
17 Violence Intervention.

18 - - -
19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 MAYOR KENNEY: Drawing on her
22 years of public leadership and service to
23 the City and State, Estelle will work
24 closely with the dedicated teams of City
25 staff and community leaders who are

2 working at this every day.

3 Together, we will continue to
4 expand ongoing efforts to intervene with
5 individuals at the very highest risk of
6 being involved in gun violence, and
7 strengthen the coordination to keep these
8 individuals alive.

9 One of the key proposals in
10 this effort is the Group Violence
11 Intervention, or GVI. Earlier this week
12 we shared a promising evaluation of this
13 nationally recognized model, which
14 lowered the average rate of weekly
15 shootings by up to 50 percent among
16 participating groups here in
17 Philadelphia.

18 We are making new investments
19 in the program with this budget by
20 allocating an additional \$1.4 million in
21 stipends to encourage participation.

22 And we are investing in a Youth
23 Leader Program run by the Philadelphia
24 Commission on Human Relations, which will
25 bring conflict resolution training to

2 high school students.

3 - - -

5 - - -

6 MAYOR KENNEY: We will continue
7 to partner with the School District to
8 prioritize student safety so children
9 feel safe and welcome in places of
10 learning, show up every day, and access
11 all the services and academic
12 opportunities that their schools offer.

13 Our collective attention to
14 this crisis is making a difference.

15 I am grateful for the support
16 of City Council, our police officers and
17 partners in public safety, and the many
18 departments and agencies working around
19 the clock to prevent violent crime
20 through proven interventions and
21 community investment.

22 Their work is literally saving
23 lives.

24 - - -

25 (Applause.)

2 - - -

3 MAYOR KENNEY: They know, and I
4 know, that we can't move fast enough on
5 this issue. So we will continue to
6 invest in the strategies that are working
7 to accelerate their impact.

8 And we will continue to call on
9 some state legislators to help us address
10 the reckless availability of firearms in
11 our city. It is unacceptable for
12 lawmakers in Harrisburg to keep us from
13 saving the lives of our own residents.

14 The common denominator in every
15 fatal shooting is a weapon, and we need
16 to be able to adopt gun policies that are
17 saving lives in other states and other
18 cities.

19 With every challenge that we
20 face together, I remain confident that
21 this city will prevail.

22 Looking back on our recovery
23 from the pandemic, I am more optimistic
24 than ever about Philadelphia's growth and
25 the opportunities we can create for our

2 residents and future generations.

3 Three years ago, our city came
4 to a standstill and this government
5 pivoted to address an unprecedented
6 crisis affecting every single person in
7 Philadelphia. We knew our city's
8 resilience would see us through, but we
9 didn't know when.

10 Today, children are back in
11 school, Center City's comeback is
12 national news, airport travel is up more
13 than 25 percent compared to last year,
14 and new businesses are opening, arriving,
15 and expanding here with the same pluck
16 and innovation that our city has known
17 since its founding.

21 MAYOR KENNEY: Last year we
22 announced that Chubb, one of the world's
23 largest insurance companies, will build
24 and open a new Philadelphia office in
25 2026, creating the company's largest

2 office in North America as well as 1,250
3 new jobs.

4 Philadelphia will have yet
5 another chance to shine on the world
6 stage as a 2026 World Cup host city.

10 MAYOR KENNEY: These
11 opportunities are a testament to the work
12 that we have done to support business,
13 startups, and commercial corridors while
14 fostering equity and inclusion.

15 Philadelphia is a world-class
16 city, and everyone is welcome to live,
17 work, and play here.

18 This budget will sustain our
19 commitments to inclusive growth by
20 further lowering business and wage taxes,
21 which are already the lowest they've been
22 in decades.

23 We are also continuing to
24 support the Quality Jobs Initiative
25 Program, which will provide grants to

2 businesses that create new, quality jobs
3 accessible to all Philadelphians.

4 I think we can all agree that
5 an accessible, safe, and reliable transit
6 system is essential to growth and equity
7 in any major city.

8 Our budget includes two major
9 investments that will reduce the burden
10 of transit costs on Philadelphia families
11 and promote SEPTA ridership.

12 By bringing more riders into
13 the system, we can build an even
14 stronger, faster, and safer system for
15 everyone and reduce emissions in our
16 region.

17 Over the next two years, we
18 will commit \$62 million to pilot a
19 zero-fare transit program that will serve
20 at least 25,000 Philadelphia residents
21 who are near or below the poverty level.

22 - - -

24 - - -

25 MAYOR KENNEY: This means much

2 more than a free trip. In a recent
3 community needs assessment, 39 percent of
4 residents in poverty cited transportation
5 as their biggest obstacle to finding and
6 sustaining employment.

7 The zero-fare transit program
8 will make it easier for low-income
9 residents to get to work and access all
10 of our opportunities that our city has to
11 offer.

12 In addition, the City will
13 invest \$9 million per year to join other
14 large employers in the region
15 participating in the SEPTA Key Advantage
16 program.

17 Working with our labor
18 partners, we will provide free transit to
19 all City employees.

20 - - -

21 (Applause.)

22 - - -

23 MAYOR KENNEY: This two-year
24 pilot is an opportunity to boost the
25 City's hiring and retention efforts, and

1 3/2/23 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS

2 aligns with our goals of sustainability,
3 traffic safety, and equity as well.

4 SEPTA's system is rebuilding
5 ridership back to pre-pandemic levels,
6 and we are optimistic that these
7 investments will help the agency sustain
8 and improve the critical services that so
9 many Philadelphians rely on.

10 While Philadelphia's economy is
11 on a good path, we know that global
12 factors are driving fluctuations beyond
13 our immediate control.

14 The Five Year Plan takes into
15 account the impact of inflation, not just
16 on households but also on operating
17 departments, and we will remain committed
18 to the City's financial health as a
19 whole.

20 I am very proud that the City
21 now holds its highest bond rating in
22 40 years, thanks to our success in
23 strengthening the pension fund and
24 rebuilding our reserves.

25 - - -

4 MAYOR KENNEY: This really
5 matters, because we want to be prepared
6 for every challenge and opportunity,
7 whether it's an economic downturn or a
8 moment where we can step up to what's
9 right in a crisis.

10 On that note, I want to
11 recognize all the partners and
12 departments that welcomed buses of asylum
13 seekers over the course of several weeks.
14 We worked with non-profit partners to
15 stand up a welcoming center to receive
16 838 tired travelers, including children,
17 looking for a better life and a safe
18 home.

19 Last month, Welcoming America
20 made it official. We are a Certified
21 Welcoming city.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 MAYOR KENNEY: I am proud of

1 3/2/23 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 the efforts led by our Office of
3 Immigrant Affairs, and the departments
4 and agencies we work with, to make sure
5 that everyone feels a sense of belonging
6 here in Philadelphia.

7 I know that our welcoming
8 values will only further our city's
9 success, and we will always step up when
10 our leadership as a city is needed.

11 I will end with this: The
12 first day of the PHLpreK program was a
13 very cold day in January of 2017. I
14 remember it was cold because I remember
15 the tiny coats the students all wore on
16 their way to school. That was more than
17 six years ago.

18 A three-year-old student who
19 started the program that day is nine
20 years old today. Like Diana's son Mason,
21 they gained skills in pre-K that have
22 benefited them throughout elementary
23 school.

24 They will be in middle school
25 when the 2026 World Cup arrives in

1 3/2/23 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS

2 Philadelphia. They will likely start
3 college nine years from now in 2032.

4 It is my hope that they will
5 choose a rewarding career and a home for
6 their family here in their own hometown.

7 I hope that decades from now
8 their family can go for walks in FDR
9 Park, where the bold investments we make
10 in FY24 will have protected this
11 one-of-a-kind natural refuge from
12 flooding and improved access for
13 everyone.

14 And they will meet their
15 friends at a local rec center, where
16 Rebuild's renovations this year have
17 transformed the facility for future
18 generations to enjoy.

19 I hope that they will feel safe
20 and healthy regardless of where they
21 live, thanks to our investments in
22 violence prevention and environmental
23 justice.

24 And I know they will enjoy even
25 more commercial, cultural, educational,

2 and professional opportunities because of
3 our investments in equitable growth and
4 because we've worked with SEPTA to make
5 all areas of the City more connected and
6 more accessible than ever.

7 And when their mayor stands in
8 front of City Council or if they're the
9 Mayor themselves, don't think it doesn't
10 cross my mind every time I visit a pre-K.

11 I hope that our investments in
12 growth and opportunity, paired with sound
13 financial practice, have positioned the
14 City's finances, stability, and
15 prosperity to a point where the services
16 and infrastructure we provide reflect our
17 city's highest ambitions.

18 I have always approached this
19 role with the years beyond this
20 Administration in mind, with faith in the
21 power of education, faith in the
22 incredible potential of our residents,
23 and faith in the innovative, resilient,
24 caring, and optimistic character of our
25 city.

2 And I am dedicated each day of
3 the remainder of our term to a brighter,
4 safer, more sustainable future for the
5 City, just as I have each day since 2016.

11 to be part of its progress, and it is
12 also an honor to work alongside City
13 Council as dedicated to services as each
14 of you.

15 So thank you. We need to get
16 to work.

17 And I want to just say to all
18 of you, I learned a lot in this Chamber.
19 I was taught a lot. I grew up a lot. I
20 matured a lot. I had people like Gussie
21 Clark and Marian Tasco and Jannie
22 Blackwell who brought me along, this kid
23 from South Philly, and taught me how to
24 represent the entire city, and I just
25 want to thank all of you for your

2 dedication and your hard work. And this
3 is my last budget address. I wish you
4 all well, and God bless you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
9 have one last item we have to resolve, so
10 if we can ask for a little quiet. Thank
11 you.

12 I want to thank the Mayor for
13 his last budget message, and we will
14 start our budget process shortly.

15 At this time, we will move to
16 our speeches.

17 Are there any speeches on
18 behalf of the minority?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Speeches on behalf of the majority?

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Johnson.

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yeah.
25 Thank you, Council President.

2 I just have to clarify an
3 announcement regarding our withdrawal of
4 the AKA resolution where they're
5 celebrating their anniversary next week.
6 That resolution will be reintroduced next
7 Thursday during their conference.

8 So I just wanted to clarify
9 that just for all the listening audience
10 and those who are watching that the AKA
11 resolution celebrating their anniversary
12 will be reintroduced next Thursday.

13 Also, on next Wednesday, March
14 the 8th, we will be announcing the Joe
15 Frazier -- Smokin' Joe Frazier Day in the
16 City of Philadelphia. That's going to
17 take place at 3:00 p.m. outside of the
18 Joe Frazier statue in South Philadelphia
19 at Xfinity Live, 1100 Pattison Avenue.
20 And, again, March the 8th of 2023 we'll
21 be declaring Smokin' Joe Frazier Day in
22 the City of Philadelphia in the memory of
23 the Fight of the Century when he beat
24 Muhammad Ali.

25 And so that's going to take

2 place at Xfinity Live at 3:00 p.m.,
3 located at 1100 Pattison Avenue, and all
4 those who would like to attend are more
5 than welcome as we honor a true
6 outstanding Philadelphian.

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Awesome. Thank you.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Jones.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
13 Mr. President.

14 It was good hearing the budget
15 address and knowing all of the work that
16 was put into this budget by members of
17 Council, things they advocated for,
18 things they fought for, and it was good
19 to see it manifested in a document called
20 the budget.

21 My staff is delivering at this
22 point a budget care package, and in that
23 budget care package is a Snickers bar,
24 some healthy granola kind of substance,
25 water, because we have work to do and

2 we're going to spend a lot of hours in
3 here making that budget document a real
4 living document.

5 I know all of us have a lot of
6 work to do this year in particular, but
7 we're going to spend a lot of time in
8 this.

9 To that end, I'd like to
10 encourage members and staff to join me in
11 visiting some of these facilities.

12 One-third of our budget is
13 public safety, Police, Fire, Prisons,
14 Courts, and it's difficult to, in a half
15 a hour budget presentation, really digest
16 all of the aspects of a department.

17 So starting tomorrow, we're
18 going to take our first road trip
19 domestic, not like yours in different
20 cities, Mr. President, but we'll be up at
21 the police training facility. And former
22 Member Oh talked about non-lethal
23 training. It's important that we kick
24 the tires, see what they do, see what
25 they can do better. Councilman Johnson

2 introduced the no chokehold legislation
3 that passed, but see how that is being
4 trained, implemented, and included in
5 their training.

6 In addition, we will be dealing
7 with simulators to look at real-life
8 scenarios when people get stopped by
9 cars, real-life scenarios when they have
10 to make a split-second decision about
11 whether to use lethal force.

12 So I encourage us, those who
13 can make it, to come up. We're leaving
14 tomorrow. We're going to take that ride.
15 But if you cannot go, send someone in
16 your staff that is dedicated to analyzing
17 those particular departments within the
18 budget.

19 And enjoy your budget survival
20 kit, and we put Snickers in there so that
21 during the process, none of the members
22 get hangry.

23 So thank you very much,
24 Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Gauthier.

5 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
6 you, Council President, and many thanks
7 to Mayor Kenney for joining us today.

8 I am excited by what we just
9 heard, and I'm very excited to continue
10 working with Council and with the Mayor
11 and his team on a budget that centers
12 racial equity across every part of the
13 City.

14 Even though this budget marks
15 the end of our legislative term, I know
16 that none of us intend to slow down,
17 because our constituents cannot wait
18 another year for a budget that takes
19 Philadelphia boldly out of the pandemic
20 and into a more equitable future.

21 I'm proud that over the past
22 two fiscal years, we've doubled down on
23 our efforts to fund an urgent, targeted,
24 and trauma-informed response to the gun
25 violence epidemic, but I also know that

2 we have a long way to go before we
3 restore peace to our streets.

4 That's why I look forward to
5 once again banding together as a Council
6 to invest in grassroots violence
7 prevention programs, paying special
8 attention to redirecting youth at risk
9 of, or already involved, in gun violence.

10 And as part of our
11 anti-violence strategy, we must also
12 ensure that all residents, no matter if
13 they call Center City or Mill Creek home,
14 receive reliable municipal services
15 proven to reduce crime.

16 I'm proud that last year my
17 JustServicesPHL campaign successfully won
18 an additional \$30 million above the
19 proposed budget for the equitable
20 provision of City services. However, my
21 conversations with City agencies and
22 constituents confirms that \$30 million
23 barely scratches the surface of what it
24 will take to give every resident their
25 fair share. That's why I'm bringing

2 JustServicesPHL back and expanding to
3 housing-related services as well.

4 According to the Office of
5 Homeless Services, 70 percent of the
6 residents they served in Fiscal Year 2022
7 entered their system for the very first
8 time. Frankly, this does not surprise
9 me, because a study my office completed
10 pre-pandemic found that Philadelphia's
11 rent gap pre-pandemic was \$75 million per
12 month.

13 As I speak, constituents facing
14 homelessness are desperately calling
15 government agencies and non-profits in
16 search of rental assistance or supportive
17 housing, but many of them will get the
18 same apologetic answer, we're out of
19 money and you have to try somewhere else.

20 The 100 new supportive housing
21 units proposed by the Mayor is an
22 excellent start, but City Council can go
23 further by shoring up OHS's emergency
24 rental assistance budget, as well as by
25 funding additional case managers so the

2 City can help our neighbors experiencing
3 homelessness get back on their feet.

4 We cannot ignore the need of
5 families forced to make the impossible
6 choice between homelessness and living in
7 a home that could collapse at any time,
8 thanks to the neglect of absentee
9 landlords. And that's why I want to
10 allocate funds to help residents
11 displaced due to unsafe conditions find a
12 new home rather than ending up on OHS's
13 doorstep.

14 And to further prevent
15 evictions, we must ensure our nationally
16 acclaimed Eviction Diversion Program has
17 a budget it needs to help every tenant at
18 risk of eviction stay in their home, and
19 support the Mayor's plan to expand Right
20 to Counsel.

21 We must also protect vulnerable
22 neighbors long before they make it to the
23 eviction stage. For instance, the City
24 must do more to preserve our affordable
25 housing stock. Frankly, inaction isn't

2 an option, because more than 5,400
3 affordable housing units can disappear
4 across this city within the next five
5 years, and 900 of those are in my
6 district alone.

7 So let's couple our work on
8 housing insecurity with a renewed effort
9 to solve this crisis at one of its
10 roots - poverty. And I can think of few
11 better ways to accomplish this
12 challenging feat than by investing in
13 workforce development.

14 The life sciences sector is
15 booming in Philadelphia, and nowhere is
16 this growth more visible than in the
17 areas of West and Southwest Philly that I
18 represent.

19 In the past month alone, I've
20 been to groundbreaking ceremonies for
21 over one million square feet of life
22 sciences development. And I could not be
23 more excited, because the life sciences
24 generates high-paying jobs for residents
25 from all educational backgrounds. But

2 it's up to our body to fund high-quality
3 workforce development programs that
4 prepare working-class residents to be
5 competitive applicants for these jobs
6 before they even come online. And we
7 must start now if we want to make sure
8 the life sciences industry grows
9 alongside rather than without our
10 communities.

11 It's been the mission of this
12 City Council to lead Philadelphia into a
13 more community-minded and equitable
14 future. Philadelphia is counting on us
15 to keep going, and I intend to deliver.

16 Thank you so much.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Harrity.

21 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Yes,
22 Council President. I just wanted to
23 commend Mayor Kenney and his
24 Administration on his efforts to help the
25 normal citizen.

1 3/2/23 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT

2 I believe that with SNAP
3 benefits being cut by \$95 a month to our
4 most vulnerable citizens, I believe that
5 his program for SEPTA will help greatly
6 in kind of evening that out.

7 So while we criticize him on
8 occasion, I just have to commend him for
9 his commitment to the safety of the
10 citizens of Philadelphia with his
11 investment in law enforcement, and I look
12 forward to actually seeing the budget in
13 completeness.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

17 That appears to conclude the
18 speeches on behalf of the minority and
19 the majority.

20 And with that, the Chair
21 recognizes Councilman Squilla for a
22 motion to adjourn.

23 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
