12 BISHOP PORTERFIELD: Our Lord,
13 how excellent is thy name in all the
14 earth, great creator of all in existence.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Oh.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes. Thank you
17 very much, Council President. I just
18 wanted to clarify if anyone is confused,
19 yes, I did introduce a resolution last
20 week, but we received an edit after I had
21 introduced it and I became aware of it,
22 and we would like it to be just so very
23 perfect, and so I am reintroducing a
24 corrected version of the resolution.

25 Thank you very much.

3 Thank you.

4 Councilman Domb, are you ready?

5 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I hope so.

6 Can you hear me okay?

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
8 can hear you.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Domb.

11 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
12 Council President, and thanks for the
13 opportunity to speak today on this
14 resolution calling on the Mayor,
15 Governor, and the Pennsylvania General
16 Assembly to use all powers of their
17 offices to declare a state of emergency
18 in the Kensington neighborhood and bring
19 about a multi-jurisdictional operational
20 and financial approach to this
21 humanitarian disaster.

22 I authored this resolution and
23 introduced it today alongside my
24 colleagues Councilmembers Maria
25 Quinones-Sanchez and Councilman Mark

2 Squilla. They have put a tremendous
3 amount of time and energy and resources
4 into addressing the many complex issues
5 that have consumed Kensington for far too
6 long.

7 Despite the City's countless
8 efforts and those efforts made by so many
9 amazing community-based organizations and
10 residents, we must acknowledge that our
11 approach isn't getting the results
12 Kensington deserves. This has become a
13 disaster area of epic proportions, a
14 disaster that requires relief efforts
15 that far exceed the capacity and
16 resources of the City of Philadelphia's
17 government.

18 This is not a problem created
19 solely by the people of Philadelphia, and
20 nor should the solutions fall on our
21 backs alone. Unfortunately, Philadelphia
22 is home to the worst urban opioid crisis
23 in America, and Kensington, the 19134 zip
24 code, is the epicenter.

25 The neighborhoods surrounding

2 the Kensington Avenue corridor has for
3 decades languished under the weight of a
4 thriving drug trade, along with criminal
5 activity, violence driven by territorial
6 illegal drug sales, and people
7 experiencing substance use disorders,
8 mental illness, and homelessness.

9 The streets are occupied with
10 open drug use and littered with trash,
11 dangerous needles all over the place and
12 other toxic waste. People are sleeping
13 in their own feces, walking around barely
14 alive, and actively killing themselves on
15 our city streets. This is unbearable.

16 Year after year, families,
17 friends, and neighbors from all over the
18 region continue to lose their loved ones
19 because of Kensington's grip, which
20 becomes impossible for many to escape, no
21 matter the age, the gender, or the race.
22 The number of lives lost is shocking and
23 heartbreaking.

24 In 2018, 1,116 people died of
25 overdoses in Philadelphia. In 2019,

2 1,150 people died of overdoses in
3 Philadelphia. And in 2020 -- it keeps
4 going up -- 1,214 overdose deaths in our
5 city. And in 2021, the total figures,
6 which have not been for the full year yet
7 but we know for six months we're at 640
8 died from a drug overdose in just the
9 first six months, outpacing the prior
10 year's figure.

11 No one here is surprised to
12 know that Kensington and the 19134 zip
13 code continue to lead the City in these
14 overdose-related deaths. The stats alone
15 indicate that the scale of this crisis
16 exceeds the City's capacity. We must
17 seek all available emergency relief
18 resources from the state and federal
19 governments through the Pennsylvania
20 Emergency Management Agency and the
21 Federal Emergency Management Agency to
22 address the humanitarian disaster in
23 Kensington.

24 We need our state and federal
25 partners to provide us with access to

2 resources that will provide hazard
3 mitigation, access to health-related
4 treatments, neighborhood cleanup and
5 remediation, wraparound social services
6 for neighborhood residents and those
7 experiencing homelessness and substance
8 use disorders.

9 Ultimately we need all
10 necessary assistance to maintain a safe
11 and healthy environment for
12 Philadelphians living or working in this
13 area.

14 We all want to achieve the same
15 goals here, and the time is now for us to
16 take bold, unprecedented actions. We
17 support the Mayor's Office and the
18 initiatives set forth by the
19 Administration to tackle this ongoing
20 issue.

21 Today we continue to stand with
22 Mayor Kenney and urge him to support our
23 call to state and federal officials to
24 declare a state of emergency in
25 Kensington. This will provide access to

2 a level of support that is required to
3 change the direction of Kensington.

4 When you think about the
5 disasters that have occurred across the
6 United States, those disasters have led
7 to federal and state emergency
8 declarations with FEMA operational
9 support and disaster relief efforts.

10 Just think about some of the floods, the
11 hurricanes, or tornadoes. Some just last
12 an hour or a day or maybe even a week,
13 but the federal government brings in FEMA
14 resources at every turn.

15 When you compare these
16 disasters and recent pandemic efforts
17 with what has occurred in Kensington for
18 decades, over 10,000 days, there's no
19 comparison. FEMA and emergency relief
20 efforts is what's needed here, and it's
21 needed now.

22 Again, I want to thank
23 Councilmember Sanchez and Councilmember
24 Squilla, along with all my colleagues who
25 have co-sponsored this resolution. This

2 is the beginning of a new approach and
3 one that is long overdue for Kensington.
4 Kensington deserves this.

22 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:

23 Councilmember Clarke, this is
24 Councilmember Squilla. I'm unmuted now.
25 Aye.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

4 Let the record reflect that
5 Councilman Squilla is voting aye, and the
6 record is 15, the nays are zero for Bill
7 No. 220225.

8 Mr. Decker, do you have any
9 additional resolutions?

10 CHIEF CLERK: I do not,
11 Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Sailing.

14 All right. That concludes our
15 legislative Calendar for today. We will
16 now move to our speeches.

17 Prior to recognizing members
18 regarding speeches, I will note for the
19 record at this time that we will use the
20 Chat feature available in Microsoft Teams
21 to allow members to signify that they
22 wish to be recognized. In order to
23 comply with the Sunshine Act, the Chat
24 feature must only be used for this
25 particular purpose.

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2 And with that said, are there
3 any speeches on behalf of the minority?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I do

7 Speeches on behalf of the
8 majority?

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Green.

11 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
12 Council President.

13 I am wearing a teal tie today.
14 Today is 2022 Teal Day, and this is in
15 honor of Sexual Assault Awareness Month,
16 and I know myself and a number of members
17 of Council will be participating in a
18 press conference today at 2 o'clock in
19 the Mayor's Reception Room and really
20 saluting the work of Women Organized
21 Against Rape, which is now known as the
22 Philadelphia Center Against Sexual
23 Violence.

24 We know this has been an issue
25 in our city for some time, and the

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Philadelphia Center Against Sexual Violence was founded in 1971 and it was the first and only rape crisis center in the City of Philadelphia and one of the first in the nation.

When we think about the impact that COVID-19 had around the world but also here in the City of Philadelphia, this issue also played out and the pandemic played out in the issues of sexual violence, and it was an increase in the services called upon for the Philadelphia Center Against Sexual Violence.

I know on April 29th they'll be working with the Mayor's Commission on Women to actually have a human chain around City Hall to continue to uplift this issue and concern.

So I'm proud to stand with a lot of my colleagues and others around the City of Philadelphia to salute the work of the Philadelphia Center Against Sexual Violence as we acknowledge this

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2 month, April, being Sexual Assault
3 Awareness Month and that today being Teal
4 Day here in the City of Philadelphia.

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Domb.

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
11 Council President.

12 I just want to take a moment to
13 publicly thank my legislative counsel,
14 Laurel Grbach, for her work in City
15 Council, as this is her last City Council
16 session today. Very sad, but happy for
17 her.

18 Since joining my office, Laurel
19 has been tremendous, a great asset for
20 us. She's helped me with everything,
21 steering some great legislative efforts
22 for all of us and honoring members of our
23 community who mean a great deal to all of
24 us, and she's been a great team member.

25 She's represented the field of

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2 public service with nothing but complete
3 professionalism and passion and tried to
4 make the City a better place for all of
5 us.

6 Some of the things that come to
7 mind that Laurel really was the author of
8 and helped were the low-income wage tax
9 refund we did a few years ago, the
10 streeteries and sidewalk cafe
11 legislation. She worked on all of that
12 and did it. And the wholesale
13 legislation.

14 In many ways, I call myself the
15 seagull. I fly in, I drop my, and then I
16 leave, and she picks it all up. She does
17 a great job. But she's also done more
18 than that. She's kept our office
19 together as a team.

20 She's going on to the School
21 District. And, by the way, all of our
22 staff does a great job, not just Laurel
23 but everyone, but Laurel has been special
24 to me, so I just want to wish her well.
25 And she knows there's only one

2 requirement I have for her for the School
3 District and, that is, I gave her
4 12 months to put in place mandatory
5 teaching from K to 12 financial literacy,
6 technology, and entrepreneurship.

7 Laurel, we wish you the best
8 and we will miss you, but good luck at
9 your new position.

10 Thank you, Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman. Yes, we do, but
13 we will still interact with her. That's
14 a good thing that she's staying in
15 government and keeping the -- continuing
16 her commitment to service to the citizens
17 of the City of Philadelphia. Good stuff.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Parker.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
21 you, Mr. President.

22 I want to second Councilmember
23 Domb. Whenever I've communicated with
24 her, Councilmember Domb, with any
25 legislation that you've been working on,

2 she's been professional and the process
3 was always seamless. So congratulations.

4 Also, special thanks to
5 Councilmember Derek Green for referencing
6 Teal Day and the activities of Women
7 Organized Against Rape/Philadelphia
8 Center Against Sexual Violence. Our
9 colleague Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
10 Richardson is appropriately dressed today
11 in her teal.

12 I want to note for the record,
13 Mr. President, that while I will not be
14 able to attend today's press conference
15 due to a longstanding prior commitment, I
16 support this effort 1,001 percent.

17 When I was in the Pennsylvania
18 House, I learned and -- oh, gosh, my age
19 again. Jill Porter was a reporter for
20 the Philadelphia Daily News, and she had
21 written about a Match.com serial rapist,
22 and we learned that Pennsylvania was the
23 only state left in the nation -- even the
24 federal government would allow experts to
25 testify in cases of sexual assault, and

2 in Pennsylvania we could not. It took us
3 six years, but we were able to change
4 that law.

5 So while I will not be there in
6 person today, you all know that I am
7 there in spirit.

8 Finally, Mr. President, two
9 last issues. When I was in Harrisburg,
10 Mr. President, I learned very quickly
11 that we would be judged by three very
12 specific budgets when it came time to
13 make a determination about whether or not
14 the voters would hire us and/or fire us.

15 The first bucket,
16 Mr. President, was our overall voting
17 record, because when you're in
18 Harrisburg, you're voting on hundreds and
19 hundreds of bills, so people will comb
20 through your record to see what you voted
21 for and what you voted against.

22 The second bucket,
23 Mr. President, was what legislative
24 efforts did you champion, what did you
25 take the lead on.

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And the third and final thing, which while I was in Harrisburg my mentor mom, Marian Tasco, made sure I understood was one of the most important buckets, and that was if you're not leveraging your vote in Harrisburg to secure resources to match funding secured by your local District Councilperson -- and I know Councilmember Squilla talked about this yesterday, then Councilmember Sanchez. They were talking about our ITEF funding, but we usually need matching dollars, and if the relationship is such, you should always be able to go to your State Rep or your State Senator and they can secure during the budget process matching dollars for projects.

Well, this past weekend, State Representative Isabella Fitzgerald was the lead organizer for all of the cleanup efforts throughout Northwest Philadelphia in the Ninth Councilmanic District in particular, and I wanted to say a special thank you to her and to let her know I

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2 got many calls. I wasn't at every site.
3 She was the person doing the work and
4 leading the efforts, but I got many calls
5 from people saying thank you for the work
6 that was being done. So I want to say
7 thank you to her for her leadership.

8 Finally, to the people of
9 Kitchen of Love food bank, I know that
10 you knew that there was something
11 different over the past few weeks. You
12 saw the staff there attempting to keep
13 the food bank going in the absence of
14 Marlene Trice, whose vision and
15 leadership and close connection,
16 Mr. President, to Strawberry Mansion on
17 every hundred of 31st Street there. She
18 started a food bank that has been
19 recognized by the Eagles, the
20 Philadelphia Corporation for the Aging,
21 and so many other agencies as the model
22 for allowing residents, those who are in
23 need, to select what they want.
24 Literally the food bank sets up the food
25 on the table, not necessarily prepared in

2 a box but you walk around and you choose
3 what you want, giving the people in need
4 of help even more dignity.

5 Well, Mr. President, she took
6 ill last week, had to be hospitalized, is
7 still hospitalized. I want to say to
8 her, to the family, to the extended
9 family who work at Dorothy Emanuel
10 Recreation Center with that Kitchen of
11 Love, we're going to keep our boss lady,
12 Marlene Trice, in our prayers and we're
13 going to keep the Kitchen of Love food
14 bank going for those who need it.

15 Thank you, Mr. President, and
16 thank you, colleagues.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Council Lady. Our prayers go
19 out.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Jones.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

24 It is budget season. This is
25 when we -- it's our Olympics. It's our

3 agencies, programs to try to lift them up
4 or guide them correctly and support them
5 financially.

6 I want to -- and I was proud of
7 my colleagues yesterday going in on every
8 department, asking the question what are
9 you doing to help the current crisis of
10 reducing gun violence in the City of
11 Philadelphia, what are you participating,
12 what program and what are the results,
13 and I was proud to listen to that whole
14 budget process.

15 But what I want to rise today
16 about is, sometimes departments can be
17 penny wise and pound foolish. I talk
18 about the School District of the City of
19 Philadelphia. I love when my colleague
20 Member Thomas fights for, represents some
21 of the positive accomplishments of sports
22 teams that our youth are a part of, but
23 it's like going in one pocket, taking it
24 out of another pocket, putting it in,
25 when we charge non-profits for these

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facilities.

I am a track coach, retired and in recovery. I love track and field. I coached my daughter's team. I coached Representative Cephas, who ran her way to UVA, you know, and I witnessed what Member Thomas continues to witness is the joy and redirection of energy of young people when they're put in situations firmly.

But when you charge a track team \$5,000 to use the track out in back of King High School, a dirt track, unimproved but essential to teach track and field, \$5,000, it is unacceptable.

When you deal with teams from every one of our districts that have to face that, not only during outdoor but during indoor, a lot of our young people during COVID could not participate. So where we had a dozen teams, we may have maybe eight teams citywide.

Every year I look forward to going to the 21st Ward where they have

2 Opening Day and a couple of dozen teams,
3 all pristine, stand out there.

4 We cannot continue to charge
5 teams that are in fact participating in
6 anti-violence measures, taking young
7 people, putting them in a positive
8 direction, and strangling them to death
9 with these fees.

10 Mr. President, colleagues,
11 until we address this, I refuse to vote
12 for another budget for the School
13 District until they address this travesty
14 to non-profits, small teams, and our
15 children who benefit from these
16 facilities. Their parents pay the
17 freight through the real estate taxes and
18 then we charge them again. That's double
19 dipping in the worst way to the most
20 vulnerable and most important investment
21 we have.

22 I said yesterday at the budget
23 hearing that a city benefits when old men
24 and women plant trees they will never
25 experience the shade of. When you coach

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2 a kid, you may never see them become the
3 men and women that they are going to be,
4 but know that you have participated in
5 raising strong youth as opposed to fixing
6 broken men and women.

7 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman. Councilman, you
10 need to put together a book, because you
11 come up with some really, really --

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: I got to
13 credit other people with some of the
14 well-placed quotes.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
16 doesn't matter. It doesn't matter. You
17 can make it a footnote, Councilman. The
18 fact of the matter is, you bring it to
19 the public, public's view.

20 Thank you so much, Councilman.
21 You are so right.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Thomas.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good
25 morning, everybody.

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Thank you, Council President.

I'm going to be very, very brief. I just wanted to announce that tomorrow we're doing a food giveaway in partnership with Councilmember Bass from 10:00 to 12:00 at Triumph Baptist Church. We did it last year. We understand this is one of the biggest issues that we face in the City of Philadelphia, and we have a lot of food to give away. So please spread the word, make sure folks that are in need come out, as we want to give the food away.

What I will say real quick, Councilmember Jones, it is a much diverse problem than what you realize. It's not just the issue of the organizations getting access to the spaces. It's also the issue of being able to provide free programming in general across the City of Philadelphia.

When I was growing up, you know, you could participate in a basketball league or be a part of a

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2 summer program and it would be free. We
3 just don't have the amount of free
4 programs that we once had in the past,
5 and so that was one of the things that I
6 challenged the Administration on when we
7 were looking at the budget conversation
8 that you were talking about yesterday and
9 just the amount of free programs and
10 initiatives that we have in the City of
11 Philadelphia.

12 I'll stop right there. Someone
13 is telling me my time is up.

14 Thank you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you so much
17 for bringing that to our attention.

18 Councilman, where is that
19 location again, the food?

20 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I'm sorry.
21 The location is Triumph Baptist Church,
22 which is Germantown and Hunting Park, and
23 we'll be there at 10 o'clock tomorrow
24 morning until all the food is gone. So
25 we're looking forward to that, and

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2 hopefully we can help a lot of people in
3 need.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

6 That concludes our speeches for
7 the minority and the majority today, and
8 the Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for
9 a motion to adjourn.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
12 adjourned until Thursday, April 21st,
13 2022 at 10:00 a.m.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. It has been moved and
17 properly seconded that the Council stand
18 adjourned until Thursday, April 21st,
19 2022, 10:00 a.m.

20 All those in favor indicate by
21 saying aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it. The motion carries.

4 I want to thank you all very
5 much and, again, please be safe.

6 Thank you all. Love you guys.
