7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
9 motion carries.

10 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: The Chair will dispense
12 with the regular order of business
13 to recognize the guests and
14 visitors joining us in the chambers
15 this morning.

16 On behalf of all members
17 of City Council, I welcome you to
18 our Council session. We appreciate
19 you taking the time to join us as
20 we attend to the legislative
21 affairs of our city. We certainly
22 invite you to come again.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: We have several

2 individuals that members of City
3 Council have here today as guests.
4 I'm going to acknowledge my
5 colleague and comrade in
6 Harrisburg, Senator Art Haywood.
7 Could we give him a round of
8 applause?

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: We thank you for joining
12 us today.

13 The Chair now recognizes
14 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

15 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

16 Thank you, Council President.

17 Good morning, everyone.

18 I'd like to welcome some members of
19 my community doing some amazing
20 work to our chambers today. But
21 before I do that, I'd like to
22 recognize Councilmember Angel Luis
23 Ortiz, Councilmember At-Large, who
24 served our city for many, many

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

5 I'd also like to recognize some of
6 our organizations: Women Against
7 Abuse, Joanna Otero Cruz, Maritza
8 Padua, Caterina Ramirez, Board
9 member Jamie Colleen Miller; our
10 representatives from Congresso
11 Kira; Lutheran Settlement House,
12 David Charles; and Love Shouldn't
13 Hurt, Christina Vega. Thank you
14 all for joining us today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: Could they please stand?

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: Member Lozada, also
20 acknowledge why we are all wearing
21 purple today and the purpose of the
22 purple please.

23 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: We
24 are -- today I am co-introducing a

1 10/16/25 - STATED - GUESTS
2 resolution with Majority Leader
3 Kendra Brooks in recognition of
4 October being Domestic Violence
5 Awareness Month. And our goal is
6 to ensure that we talk about
7 domestic violence not just during
8 the month of October, but that we
9 normalize it and we connect women
10 with resources that they need in
11 order to remain safe.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

15 The Chair recognizes my
16 Majority Councilmember Katherine
17 Gilmore Richardson.

18 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

19 RICHARDSON: Thank you so much,
20 Council President.

21 Today I rise to
22 recognize my Community College of
23 Philadelphia legislator for the
24 day. I did not meet her for the

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2 first time today. I had the
3 wonderful opportunity to meet her
4 while she was a student at the
5 Philadelphia High School for Girls
6 in Councilmember Bass' District.
7 Please welcome Ja-Nile Ari King.
8 Ja-Nile, I'd like you to stand.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

11 RICHARDSON: She is studying
12 communication and media studies at
13 CCP. She loves nature and writing.
14 She is already a self-published
15 author as well as an advocate for
16 mental health and African American
17 youth. Her passion certainly
18 shines through in everything she
19 does. And we know you have a
20 bright future ahead of you so we
21 welcome you, Ja-Nile.

22 And, Council President,
23 while we're here I wanted to take
24 the opportunity to welcome the

2 Independence Blue Cross family to
3 Philadelphia City Council. We'll
4 hear in a moment a resolution
5 presentation for their president
6 and CEO Greg E. Deavens, but I
7 wanted to take this time to welcome
8 his lovely wife and his children,
9 who are all now Philadelphians,
10 Greg and Taryn to Philadelphia City
11 Council as well as the Rev.
12 Dr. Lorena Marshall Blake, I think
13 she's still here with us, Mitch,
14 Steve and the whole IBX team.
15 Everybody, just stand up and wave
16 your hands.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

19 RICHARDSON: Council President, I
20 first met Greg in 2017 at PA
21 Society when he became the Chief
22 Financial Officer for Independence
23 Blue Cross. And since that time,
24 he has been working tirelessly to

2 improve health care outcomes for
3 Philadelphians and communities far
4 beyond ever since. And since
5 taking over the helm of
6 Independence Blue Cross in January
7 of 2021, as the first African
8 American to lead the organization
9 Greg has served with excellence
10 under the most extraordinary and
11 tumultuous times, particularly for
12 the health care industry and for
13 our world.
14 Under his leadership,
15 IBX has made significant progress
16 in addressing longstanding health
17 care disparities and expanding
18 access to high-quality affordable
19 care. Greg's efforts have
20 established him as a respected and
21 influential leader in our city and
22 across the health care industry.
23 He is also the immediate past Chair
24 of the Greater Philadelphia Chamber

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2 of Commerce.

3 We are incredibly proud

4 to call him our fellow

5 Philadelphian along with his

6 family, and we certainly will miss

7 your leadership, Greg, but we wish

8 you and your family all the best in

9 your well-deserved retirement and

10 look forward to continuing to work

11 with you in this next chapter.

12 Thank you, Council

13 President.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: The Chair now recognizes

17 Councilmember Rue Landau.

18 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

19 Thank you, Council President.

20 I want to recognize two

21 wonderful groups that we have

22 today. One, I'm introducing a

23 resolution co-intro'g with

24 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada and

2 also with Councilmember Isaiah

3 Thomas. I wanted to recognize the

4 members of La Liga, which is the

5 first Latino basketball league in

6 Philadelphia.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: It

9 is their 25th anniversary. And I

10 also wanted to just take a second

11 to recognize BalletX on their 20th

12 anniversary as well.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: I just would like to

15 acknowledge that BalletX hails in

16 the 2nd Councilmanic District in

17 this great city of Philadelphia.

18 So great job and great

19 acknowledgement for BalletX.

20 The Chair now

21 acknowledges my Majority Whip

22 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

23 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good

24 morning, everybody. Real quick,

1 10/16/25 - STATED - GUESTS
2 Council President. I know folks
3 who were in Caucus seen a lot of
4 these amazing interns that's here
5 from CCP. I want to say
6 congratulations to all the interns,
7 but I also want to say welcome and
8 thank you to our Interim President
9 of CCP, Dr. Marshall, for being
10 here.

11 Dr. Marshall, can you
12 stand up. If we can all give
13 Dr. Marshall a round of applause.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

16 Thank you, Council President.

17 Thank you, Dr. Marshall.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

20 The Chair now recognizes
21 Councilmember Dr. Anthony Phillips.

22 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

23 Thank you, Council President. I

24 will try not to be long.

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2 But today is a special
3 day in Philadelphia City Council.
4 I'm not going to be long. I'm not
5 going to be out of order.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: I ain't say nothing.

8 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

9 You looked at me. Today we are
10 recognizing Jenaye Munford, a long-
11 time City of Philadelphia beacon.
12 Jenaye is a proud daughter of
13 Northwest Philadelphia 19150, Mount
14 Airy. She is a Simon's Wildcat.
15 And Jenaye began her long and
16 dedicated career to public service
17 during the administration of Mayor
18 John Street, serving as a trusted
19 Special Assistant to the Mayor.

20 In that role, she worked
21 on pivotal initiatives that
22 improved the lives of countless
23 residents and strengthened
24 institutions that make Philadelphia

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2 great. Following that time, Jenaye
3 continued to work under Council
4 President Darrell Clarke. Under
5 her leadership, she started the
6 work, initiated the NPI program,
7 and that continued under you,
8 Council President Johnson.

9 Now, the NPI program,
10 the Neighborhood Preservation
11 Initiative, is approaching its
12 fifth year and has transformed the
13 lives of thousands of
14 Philadelphians. From creating --
15 there you go, there you go. From
16 creating affordable housing for
17 city workers and seniors to
18 alleviating financial burdens for
19 hard-working homeowners through
20 critical repairs, she has literally
21 done amazing work behind the scenes
22 making sure residents of the city
23 of Philadelphia have the best
24 driveways, alleyways, streets

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2 clean, all that and more. I think
3 the list goes on.

4 But this is a tough day
5 for me because it's hard to find
6 City of Philadelphia workers who
7 are not bureaucrats. And you are a
8 person that is working tirelessly
9 every single day to make sure
10 things get done. I cried when I
11 heard about the news. I'm not
12 going to cry right now. But I want
13 to say thank you, Jenaye Munford,
14 for all that you've done for your
15 decades.

16 And not every City
17 employee worker, all of us don't
18 get this. You are special and we
19 wish you the greatest success. And
20 this is your last week in the City
21 of Philadelphia. And God bless you
22 today.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

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2 JOHNSON: So I just want to
3 publicly say it's been a pleasure
4 working with Jenaye regarding the
5 Neighborhood Preservation
6 Initiative, and most importantly,
7 putting people irregardless of
8 their checkbook or pocketbook or
9 their zip code into high-quality,
10 affordable and workforce housing.

11 When our former Council
12 President embarked on the
13 Neighborhood Preservation
14 Initiative, he put Jenaye in a
15 leadership position of one of his
16 most legacy projects, and that's to
17 address housing inequality here in
18 the city of Philadelphia. And
19 we're carrying on that legacy
20 through supporting the current
21 H.O.M.E. Initiative to make sure
22 that everyone here in the city of
23 Philadelphia to have a chance to
24 have a home.

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2 And so, Jenaye, again I

3 thank you for being part of Team

4 Johnson from day one, right.

5 Didn't stick me up. I appreciate

6 that too. Some of y'all will catch

7 that later on, because she believed

8 in the mission and really wanted to

9 keep this project moving forward.

10 So I personally just want to say

11 thank you because you really didn't

12 have to. So thank you very much.

13 Let's give her another round of

14 applause.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes

18 Councilmember Kendra Brooks.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

20 Thank you, Council President.

21 I want to first honor

22 and give a shout-out to my shadow

23 person for the day, Ms. Sarah

24 Roberts from CCP. She picked an

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2 amazing day to follow us because we
3 had so much going on downstairs on
4 the third floor, so she's been
5 running since she got her coat off.
6 So I hope it was an amazing
7 experience for her and I look
8 forward to what she does next.

9 And I also want to
10 recognize the Philadelphia Sisters
11 and Watch Party PHL that are here
12 in the audience today. We'll be
13 honoring them later on so I won't
14 say much about that. But can you
15 stand real quick before we move
16 forward?

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

19 And Ms. Wanda Sykes is also in the
20 audience. She's also part of the
21 Philadelphia Sisters.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I

24 didn't want to just rush over and

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2 swipe over, because everyone's
3 trying to figure out like why she's
4 sitting here. So the elephant in
5 the room, we're here to honor them
6 today. So I look forward to what's
7 next for a women's sports team in
8 Philadelphia. And I was so honored
9 to be able to celebrate them today
10 on the third floor with breakfast.
11 Let's go. Let's show what ladies
12 could do.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: I want to also
16 acknowledge Wanda Sykes was a part
17 of a team to advocate the lobbying
18 to bring a WNBA team to the city of
19 Philadelphia.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: Thank you for working in
23 partnership with our Mayor Cherelle
24 Parker to make that a reality. So

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2 I just want to give you your
3 flowers and acknowledge you.

4 Council will be at ease
5 as we will ask for members to
6 please come to the front of the
7 podium as well as all of the
8 interns who are shadowing us today
9 from CCP so we can take a group
10 shot. Is that okay?

11 (Yes.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilmember Gilmore
18 Richardson who will present a
19 resolution honoring and
20 congratulating Greg E. Deavens,
21 President of -- President and CEO
22 of Independence Blue Cross for his
23 visionary leadership and commitment
24 to advancing equitable health care.

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2 Would Mr. Greg E.

3 Deavens and those accompanying him
4 please join the Councilmember at
5 the podium.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Joining Majority Leader

8 Gilmore Richardson at the podium

9 are the following members:

10 Councilmember Cindy Bass,

11 Councilmember O'Neill,

12 Councilmember and Majority Whip

13 Isaiah Thomas, Councilmember Mike

14 Driscoll, Councilmember and

15 Minority Leader Kendra Brooks,

16 Councilmember Mark Squilla,

18 (Councilmembers and

19 guests approached podium.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

21 RICHARDSON: Thank you. Thank you

22 so much, Council President.

23 Today joined by Greg

24 Deaven's family and also the entire

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2 Independence Blue Cross family, we
3 are here today to honor, celebrate
4 and uplift his service.

5 So Whereas, Greg E.

6 Deavens assumed the role of
7 President and Chief Executive
8 Officer of Independence Blue Cross
9 in January of 2021 becoming the
10 first African American to lead the
11 organization in its history; and

12 COUNCILMAN YOUNG:

13 Whereas, under Mr. Deavens
14 leadership, Independence has made
15 equitable whole person health a
16 strategic priority, integrating
17 physical and behavioral health and
18 working to reduce racial and
19 economic health disparities across
20 the region; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

22 Whereas, Mr. Deavens has championed
23 initiatives that promote access to
24 quality affordable care for all and

2 has fostered partnerships aimed at
3 reducing the cost of medications
4 for members and employer customers;
5 and

6 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:
7 Whereas, Mr. Deavens has been
8 recognized nationally and locally
9 for his leadership, including being
10 named to Modern Healthcare's 100
11 Most Influential People in
12 Healthcare, Savoy magazine's Most
13 Influential Black Executives in
14 Corporate America and Philadelphia
15 magazine's Most Influential People
16 in Philadelphia; and

17 Whereas, Mr. Deavens was
18 awarded an Honorary Doctorate in
19 Human Letters from Manor College in
20 2024, had the privilege of being
21 the Honorary Liberty Bell Ringer as
22 part of the 2022 National Rev.
23 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
24 observance and received the

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2 Excellence in Governance Award for
3 Modern Health Care for his service
4 as Chair of the Board of Directors
5 for Hartford Health Care from June
6 2020 to June 2023; and

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

8 Whereas, Mr. Deavens is engaged in
9 civic and professional leadership,
10 serving as Chair of the Board of
11 Directors of the Chamber of
12 Commerce for Greater Philadelphia
13 and numerous boards, including the
14 Blue Cross Blue Shield Association
15 America's Health Insurance Plans
16 and the African American Museum in
17 Philadelphia.

18 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

19 Whereas, he's a trustee of the
20 Barnes Foundation, an honorary
21 trustee of the Amistad Center for
22 Culture and Art, and a Commissioner
23 for both the Pennsylvania Early
24 Learning Investment Commission and

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2 the America 250 PA Commission; now
3 therefore, be it

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
5 Resolved that the Council of the
6 City of Philadelphia honors and
7 congratulates Greg E. Deavens for
8 his outstanding leadership, his
9 commitment to health equity and his
10 enduring contributions to the well-
11 being of the people of Philadelphia
12 and beyond, despite being a Cowboys
13 fan

14 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE
15 RICHARDSON: Further resolved, that
16 an Engrossed copy of this
17 Resolution be presented to
18 Mr. Deavens, evidencing the sincere
19 respect and admiration of this
20 legislative body. Let's give him a
21 round of applause.

22 (Applause.)

23 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes

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2 Mr. Deavens for remarks.

3 MR. DEAVENS: Council

4 President Johnson, Councilmember

5 Katherine Gilmore Richardson, and

6 distinguished members of City

7 Council, good morning and thank you

8 for this extraordinary recognition.

9 I'm deeply honored and humbled by

10 this resolution and I want to begin

11 by expressing my gratitude to

12 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson

13 for her leadership and for

14 introducing it. I also thank each

15 of you for your incredible service

16 to this great city.

17 The work of this Council

18 to strengthen communities, expand

19 opportunity and make Philadelphia a

20 healthier, more equitable place to

21 live aligns with the mission that

22 has guided Independence Blue Cross

23 for more than 85 years. When I

24 became CEO in January of 2021, we

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2 were in the depths of a global
3 pandemic, a time of fear,
4 uncertainty and strain for our
5 families, for our health care
6 system and for our economy.

7 In that time, we saw the
8 resilience and heart of this city.
9 Philadelphians take care of each
10 other in periods of crisis. We
11 step up for our neighbors. I'm so
12 proud of the work we've done to
13 invest in key drivers of health
14 like education, food security,
15 mental well-being, access to
16 quality care, expanded health
17 screening, efforts to eliminate
18 systemic inequities and a focus as
19 well on economic mobility.

20 I was also honored, as
21 was noted in the resolution, to
22 serve as Chair of the Board of the
23 Chamber of Commerce for Greater
24 Philadelphia, and this gave me a

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2 view into the untapped potential of
3 our city in terms of job expansion,
4 inclusive economic growth and
5 overall economic mobility for young
6 people and families across all of
7 our neighborhoods.

8 And I know that there is
9 much more work to be done in this
10 area and I want to thank the
11 members of Council for what you've
12 done and what I know that you will
13 do and continue to do to help
14 create an environment that supports
15 job growth and lasting economic
16 mobility. I'm passionate about
17 these opportunities and the
18 potential for this city and region,
19 and I'm so fortunate to have had
20 this great experience, but I
21 recognize that none of us, none of
22 us gets to positions of leadership
23 alone. So I'm fortunate to stand
24 on the shoulders of so many giants

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2 that have come before me.

3 If it weren't for my
4 parents Carl and Shirley Deavens,
5 who expected my brother and I to
6 pursue education and excellence, I
7 would not be here. In addition, I
8 had praying grandparents, which I
9 know many of us know about.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: You know I know.

12 MR. DEAVENS: Yes, sir.
13 Yes, sir. I had a business school
14 dean, a woman by the name of Sybil
15 Mobley, a graduate of the Wharton
16 School, and her faculty at what I
17 have to say is not the oldest but
18 the best HBCU in the nation,
19 Florida A&M University, she and the
20 faculty had a vision for their
21 students to become leaders in
22 Corporate America, and I worked for
23 some great leaders over the course
24 of my career who gave me

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2 opportunities to learn, to grow and
3 to lead. And of course, I have an
4 incredible wife and family who
5 supported me in everything,
6 everything right now --

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. DEAVENS: They
9 supported me through a lot of
10 moves. We moved around from a lot
11 of cities across this country and
12 even outside of the country, a lot
13 of long nights at the office, a lot
14 of nights away from the family
15 traveling and all of the rest that
16 comes with being a leader.

17 My wife Beverly and I
18 moved here nearly nine years ago
19 and we have grown to love this city
20 and this region. Our three adult
21 children, Greg, Taryn, who are here
22 with us today, and Danielle as well
23 as our son-in-law Doug have since
24 joined us here and become residents

2 of Philadelphia.

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. DEAVENS: Yes. And
5 I would tell you that as a family
6 we all take great pride in seeing
7 people discover this city's rich,
8 historical and cultural heritage.
9 We've learned that Philadelphia is
10 a city steeped in the traditions of
11 social justice and community self-
12 determination.

13 Meeting community
14 leaders and advocates who fight
15 every day for their neighbors has
16 been a powerful reminder that real
17 change begins with relationships.
18 Each of the relationships that I've
19 been able to cultivate over the
20 years here is really extremely
21 important to me.

22 And finally, I would
23 have to say it has been an
24 incredible privilege to work with

2 City Council and two Mayors during
3 my tenure as CEO. The
4 collaboration between our elected
5 leaders, our community leaders and
6 the city's health care leaders
7 during the pandemic and after the
8 pandemic was and is an inspiring
9 example of putting people first.
10 It saved lives. And for that, I
11 thank all of you.

12 My time leading
13 Independence has also produced some
14 indelible memories. First, I had a
15 chance to ring the Liberty Bell, an
16 incredible honor. I've worked with
17 committed leaders and associates
18 across our company who love this
19 city and love this region, some of
20 whom are represented here with me
21 today. We've helped to sustain
22 St. Christopher's Hospital for
23 Children. We've led on supplier
24 diversity and health equity and

2 we've seen Philadelphia teams make
3 it to the Super Bowl and to the
4 World Series.

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. DEAVENS: I've also
7 had the good fortune to watch
8 40,000 runners cross the starting
9 line, including my youngest
10 daughter Danielle, who's not here,
11 at the Independence Blue Cross
12 Broad Street Run, a source of great
13 pride for our organization. I've
14 celebrated milestone anniversaries
15 for our sponsorship of the Indigo
16 Bikeshare Program and the
17 Independence Blue Cross River Rink.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. DEAVENS: Yes, thank
20 you. And it's also a source of
21 great pride to me that we've seen
22 our company logo added to the
23 uniforms of the Phillies, the
24 Flyers and the Philadelphia Union.

2 We've expanded access to behavioral
3 health providers in this region by
4 almost 50% in the last couple of
5 years.

6 Because of the work that
7 Independence has led with the
8 region's health systems to stop
9 using racial adjustments in
10 clinical decision-making, we've
11 seen hundreds of people receive
12 lifesaving kidney transplants.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. DEAVENS: And then
15 in my time here, I've seen this
16 city elect a Black woman as the
17 100th Mayor of Philadelphia. So
18 let me close by saying all of these
19 great experiences have made my work
20 and personal life here richer and
21 also I'm incredibly grateful for
22 all of them and for all of you.
23 Thank you again for this
24 recognition. May God continue to

2 bless the City Council and the
3 great City of Philadelphia. Thank
4 you.

5 (Applause.)

6 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilmember Brooks who
12 will present a resolution
13 celebrating the work of Watch Party
14 PHL and the Philadelphia Sisters in
15 building an inclusive --

16 (Applause.)

17 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: -- and inspiring
19 community-centered hub for women's
20 professional sports in
21 Philadelphia. Would Jen Leary and
22 those accompanying her please join
23 the Councilmember at the podium.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 JOHNSON: Joining Member Brooks is
3 Councilmember Thomas, Councilmember
4 Gilmore Richardson, Councilmember
5 O'Rourke, Councilmember Landau,
6 Councilmember Young, Councilmember
7 Phillips and Councilmember Jamie
8 Gauthier.

9 (Councilmembers and
10 guests approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

12 JOHNSON: I want to also take a
13 matter of personal privilege and
14 acknowledge Jen Leary for founding
15 the Red Paw Emergency Relief
16 Shelter for animals housed in Point
17 Breeze. Give her a round of
18 applause for that.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: One of my early partners
22 when I got in City Council making
23 sure we rescue dogs.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 All right. We're all here -- nope,
3 we're not.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: One second, Member
6 Brooks.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

8 Good morning, everyone. I'm so
9 proud to be recognizing Watch Party
10 PHL and the Philadelphia Sisters
11 today in Council. I've been
12 fortunate to partner with both
13 organizations over the last couple
14 of years. I've seen firsthand how
15 important it is for women to enjoy
16 their fandom in exclusive spaces,
17 many which are Black and queer-led.

18 Last year the Arts and
19 Culture Team at Working Families
20 Organization partnered with Watch
21 Party PHL, and I remember the
22 feeling and the energy as I walked
23 into the space. It was sisterhood,
24 it was excitement. It was the

2 electric energy of women on the
3 verge of something big. Women have
4 always been athletes, but
5 throughout history our athleticism
6 has been cast in the shadows of
7 men's sports. Not anymore.

8 Today we are honoring

11 energy of women's sports into the
12 spotlight. They have organized to
13 unite diverse groups of
14 stakeholders behind common goal of
15 advancing sports equity and
16 expanding the reach of women's
17 sports in Philadelphia. Their work
18 is opening up untapped
19 opportunities for mentorship,
20 tourism, entrepreneurship and
21 empowerment right here in
22 Philadelphia.

23 Philadelphia Sisters and
24 Watch Party PHL have both played an

4 destination for 2026 and I cannot

5 wait to celebrate with all of their

6 incredible community members during

9 BROOKS: Celebrating the work of

10 Watch Party PHL and the

11 Philadelphia Sisters and building

12 an exclusive and inspiring

13 community-centered hub for women's

14 professional sports in

15 Philadelphia;

16 Whereas, Watch Party PHL

17 was founded in 2024 to bring

18 together women's sports fans across

19 Philadelphia through monthly watch

20 parties, creating a safe, inclusive

21 community that celebrates women's

22 basketball, soccer, tennis and

23 more, with the sound on, and a

24 spirit of connection and belonging;

2 and

3 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

4 Whereas, founded in 2019 the
5 Philadelphia Sisters have been at
6 the forefront of efforts to bring
7 professional women's sports to the
8 city, partnering with the 76ers,
9 Comcast and community leaders to
10 secure Philadelphia's long-awaited
11 WNBA franchise; and

12 ACTING COUNCILWOMAN

13 GILMORE RICHARDSON: In close to
14 two years, Watch Party FHL -- PHL
15 has grown into a vibrant movement,
16 drawing hundreds of supporters to
17 events, launching a podcast that
18 highlights women-owned, Black-
19 owned, LGBTQ-owned businesses and
20 sports advocates in Philadelphia
21 and amplifies community leaders and
22 athletes in Philadelphia sports;
23 and

24 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Whereas, advocating for
3 Philadelphia's women's sports
4 equity across the world, the
5 Philadelphia Sisters have led the
6 charge bringing communities
7 together with key stakeholders and
8 investors. They've engaged with
9 the WNBA repeatedly, overcome
10 multiple setbacks, worked through
11 delays as WNBA teams were awarded
12 to other cities and remained
13 hyperfocused on leveling the
14 playing field for sports equity in
15 Philadelphia; and

16 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

17 Whereas, Watch Party PHL is now
18 channeling this energy into plans
19 for a premier woman sports hub
20 planned to open by spring of 2026.
21 Envisioned as a co-working cafe by
22 day, restaurant and watch bar by
23 night and special event space, it
24 will set up a new standard for

2 fandom everywhere, providing a
3 place where the community can
4 gather and to celebrate women's
5 sports of the present and honor
6 local heroes of the past. And I'll
7 add Watch Unrivaled; and

8 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: As
9 someone who was a manager of
10 women's basketball at Temple, I
11 know firsthand how hard these
12 athletes work.

13 Whereas, the WNBA
14 represents just the beginning as
15 the Philadelphia Sisters are
16 establishing a model to demonstrate
17 how women's professional sports
18 cannot only take root but truly
19 thrive in Philadelphia; and

20 ACTING COUNCILMAN
21 PHILLIPS: Whereas, the launch of a
22 new venture will coincide with
23 Philadelphia's growing profile as a
24 global sports destination,

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 including the incoming MLB All Star
3 game, FIFA Philadelphia Cup, 2026
4 and PGA Championship. And with the
5 long-awaited selection of
6 Philadelphia as home as a new WNBA
7 franchise in 2030 will further
8 affirm that Philadelphia is a
9 women's sports town and lay the
10 foundation to welcome additional
11 women's professional leagues such
12 as the NWSL, PWHL and more; and

13 ACTING COUNCILWOMAN
14 GILMORE RICHARDSON: Philadelphia
15 is among a growing number of cities
16 embracing the trend of women's
17 sports bars as cultural anchors and
18 spaces for everyone, places that
19 galvanize community, uplift women-
20 led and community-focused
21 entrepreneurship and expand the
22 social and economic footprint of
23 women's sports; and

24 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

2 Whereas, the Committee on the
3 Creative Economy recognizes that
4 the most creative and equitable
5 civic interventions begin at the
6 grassroots level, with community-
7 driven efforts that reflect and
8 elevate neighborhood identities,
9 engage in democratic decision-
10 making and continually reinvest in
11 the communities that support them;
12 and

13 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

14 Whereas, the work of Watch Party
15 PHL and the Philadelphia Sisters
16 exemplifies this approach by
17 enriching Philadelphia's creative
18 economy, strengthening community
19 bonds and enhancing the City's
20 global reputation as a place where
21 inclusive ideas thrive; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

23 Whereas, this milestone marks just
24 the beginning of a broader movement

2 because Philadelphia deserves and
3 is hungry for more, with the WNBA
4 franchise as a starting point. And
5 Philadelphia Sisters and their
6 partners are committed to bringing
7 additional women's professional
8 sports to the city, ensuring that
9 Philadelphia becomes not only a
10 leader, but a model for equity in
11 sports nationwide; now, therefore,
12 be it

13 Resolved, that the
14 Council of the City of
15 Philadelphia, Hereby celebrates the
16 work of Watch Party PHL and the
17 Philadelphia Sisters in building an
18 inclusive and inspiring community-
19 centered hub for women's
20 professional sports in
21 Philadelphia.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

24 Thank you all so much for joining

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 us and I'm so honored and
3 privileged to introduce our
4 speakers Jen Leary and Ashley
5 Lunkenheimer. As the founders and
6 key leaders of Watch Party PHL and
7 the Philadelphia Sisters, Jen and
8 Ashley have been at the center of
9 the charge to bring women
10 professional sports and a WNBA team
11 to Philadelphia.

12 True trailblazers, Jen
13 and Ashley's visionary work on
14 sports equity is changing the land
15 state of Philadelphia athletes
16 forever.

17 (Applause.)

18 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes Jen
20 and Ashley for remarks.

21 MS. LEARY: Thank you.
22 This resolution is an honor and a
23 recognition of a community and a
24 movement whose time has come in

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 Philly. I want to start by
3 thanking Council President Kenyatta
4 Johnson, my Councilperson, and I
5 want to extend appreciation to
6 Councilpersons Brooks and
7 Councilmembers O'Rourke Thomas and
8 Gilmore Richardson for this honor
9 and for their continued support of
10 this movement.

11 When I kicked off Watch
12 Party in March 2024, the goal was
13 twofold: It was to bring a
14 community of women's sports fans in
15 Philadelphia together by providing
16 a space that was committed to
17 showing the games with the sound
18 on. Secondly, it was the show, the
19 WNBA, the NWSL and anyone who would
20 listen that Philly is a women's
21 sports town.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. LEARY: As a
24 lifelong Philadelphia sports fan

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 who bleeds green, it was important
3 for me to also build the kind of
4 women's sports fandom here in
5 Philadelphia that we are known for.
6 And I think that's happening. And
7 while Watch Party's efforts may be
8 the most visible, we are by no
9 means the originators or the only
10 ones.

11 I learned quickly when I
12 started Watch Party that there were
13 so many other folks working behind
14 the scenes to bring professional
15 women's sports to Philadelphia. We
16 share this honor with everyone who
17 has laid the groundwork before us,
18 many of whom are in this room with
19 me today and we would not be here
20 without, and most of them are
21 behind me.

22 Last February I went to
23 a sports fandom organizing
24 conference in Miami and got to

2 experience the incredible
3 atmosphere of Unrivaled. It was
4 there I decided Philly needed a
5 women's sports bar. That night I
6 got home from Unrivaled and I
7 randomly DM'd Alex Sykes in the
8 middle of the night and said, I was
9 thinking about opening what was
10 then Philly's first women's sports
11 bar. And I asked her for her
12 thoughts.

13 She graciously responded
14 almost immediately with her phone
15 number and let's talk. Eight
16 months later, look at us now.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. LEARY: For over six
19 years, the Philadelphia Sisters
20 have worked tirelessly without
21 public fanfare or recognition to
22 secure professional women's sports
23 teams for this city. Their
24 commitment has been unwavering.

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Their efforts have fundamentally
3 changed the sports landscape of
4 this city forever. WNBA 2030 here
5 we come.

6 (Applause.)

7 Watch Party PHL is
8 honored to share this resolution
9 with them. Finally, I would just
10 like to take this opportunity to
11 acknowledge my team. Most of them
12 are behind me as well. First, my
13 partners in the hub, Megan DiTolla
14 and Fawn McGee, and my partner in
15 life and in the hub, Lori Albright.
16 All of whom --

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. LEARY: All of whom
19 no matter the crazy thing that pops
20 into my head in the middle of the
21 night, like turning the Watch Party
22 into a brick-and-mortar location or
23 DM'g Alex Sykes, are always there
24 to ride with me. And then of

2 course, my Watch Party and hub
3 teams, quite simply these people
4 standing up here, are the best of
5 the best in the game full stop.
6 Any successful executive will
7 attest that long-term success
8 requires you to surround yourself
9 with people who are smarter than
10 you, who know things you don't know
11 and offer different perspectives.
12 Every day I am energized
13 and in awe of this team and their
14 dedication and talent together. We
15 are truly changing the way people
16 engage with and experience women's
17 sports here in Philly. And this
18 spring we will be opening Philly's
19 premier women's sports hub and it
20 will not be just a bar. It will be
21 a landmark for Philadelphia sports.
22 And it won't have happened by
23 chance. It will be because of this
24 team, this community and this

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. LUNKENHEIMER: I

5 just want to know, President

6 Johnson, if I do the magic and,

7 will Wanda Sykes come up here and

8 speak?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: You got it.

11 MS. LUNKENHEIMER: All

12 right. Good morning. I'm Ashley

13 Lunkenheimer and I am so proud to

14 be part of the Philadelphia

15 Sisters. Alex Sykes, who was just

16 mentioned who does DM a lot in the

17 middle of the night, so part of her

18 energy that we love, Wanda Sykes

19 and my wife Starla Crandall, we

20 have been working for a very long

21 time to do this.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. LUNKENHEIMER: Like

24 Jen said, we're so honored to be

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 here. I can't believe we're
3 standing in City Council
4 celebrating women's sports the way
5 we are, because it's not just an
6 abstract concept anymore. It's for
7 real. So thank you, Council
8 President Johnson, and also along
9 with Councilpersons Brooks
10 O'Rourke, Thomas and Gilmore
11 Richardson, I know some of you --
12 and we can't leave you out, Rue --
13 and Landau and all the other
14 distinguished Councilpeople, not
15 only for this recognition but for
16 the work you do every day to help
17 make Philly the place that we all
18 are proud to call home.

19 I was born down the
20 street here in Jefferson Hospital
21 long before Title 9 was a thing and
22 women had more opportunities, but
23 there were women's basketball
24 players in Philadelphia I could

2 look up to. When Dawn Staley

3 showed up home from college at AAU

4 local tournaments in Philadelphia,

5 it was like the sun shone in and we

6 knew, right. We knew what she was

7 going to be in Philly. It wasn't

8 just her.

9 I went to Cathy Rush

10 summer camps. I played with

11 Dr. J's daughter in high school,

12 because Philly has always -- we

13 weren't very good. And he came to

14 games. He was a loyal father, you

15 know, a girl dad, right. And he

16 would come to games and you'd be

17 saying, oh my gosh, what did he

18 see. Anyway, but Philly has

19 actually always been a woman sports

20 town. We just forgot I guess for a

21 while, and we needed this

22 leadership group, this Philly City

23 Council, the Philly Watch -- Watch

24 Party PHL, the Philly Sisters, we

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 needed all of us, all of you to
3 help make us remember who we really
4 are, which is not just a men's
5 sports town, but also a women's
6 sports town.

7 So in 2019, the Philly
8 Sisters started working. I want to
9 go long, but I won't -- everything
10 good thing happens at a bar over
11 drinks, right. The idea came to us
12 that we needed to bring the women's
13 basketball first because we are
14 also a basketball town, and that's
15 our passion, and then we connected
16 with the indomitable then
17 Councilperson Parker and the
18 incomparable Kyasha Tyson, if you
19 don't know her, she's the best --

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. LUNKENHEIMER: -- to
22 bring professional women's sports
23 back to Philly. Why? Because
24 every one of us has our sports

2 story and all of us know that youth
3 sports have the power to shape not
4 only athletes, but the entire
5 essence of our community.

6 When a young person,
7 especially a young girl, picks up a
8 basketball, the lesson she learns
9 echoes far beyond the court,
10 building leaders, scholars and
11 citizens of this community. But
12 inspiration doesn't happen in a
13 vacuum as they say. It grows when
14 our young people can see women
15 playing professionally right here
16 in their own community with the
17 same visibility, respect and
18 excitement as men's professional
19 teams.

20 When girls see women
21 competing at the highest level,
22 they see what's possible for
23 themselves. They see pathways, not
24 barriers. That's why all of your

2 support for girls youth programs

3 and for bringing women's

4 professional basketball and other

5 sports to our city -- we're not

6 going to stop there -- means so

7 much.

8 You are not just

9 supporting our incredible North

10 Philly star Kahleah Copper and the

11 Delco kid Natasha Cloud and I think

12 we have another person to --

13 Ladie(ph) Harrison and we have a

14 coach here that is indomitable as

15 well. So we are so lucky to have

16 them here with us today. But we're

17 also building confidence,

18 opportunity and equality for our

19 girls and our boys.

20 You are showing our

21 kids, boys and girls alike, that

22 the saying is true, greatness wears

23 many jerseys. Thank you all for

24 believing in our youth, in our

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 girls and the power of sports to
3 unite and uplift our community and
4 we are far from done. We are not
5 at the finish line because the
6 Sisters, Watch Party PHL -- City
7 Council, you're with us, right --
8 no matter what we are just getting
9 started. Go Sisters. Go women.
10 Go Birds.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. LUNKENHEIMER: And
13 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT
14 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
15 Wanda Sykes.

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. SYKES: Thank you,
18 Council President Johnson. And
19 thank you to all the other
20 Councilmembers. I just got to say
21 it's nice to see government at
22 work.

23 (Applause.)

24 MS. SYKES: It really

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 is. This is beautiful. Just thank
3 you. And to be recognized like
4 this, it is huge like Ashley was
5 saying, especially for women and
6 women's sports. But this is a
7 sports town. Philly is a sports
8 town, a women's sports town also.
9 So we're so excited that we have
10 Unrivaed coming in in January, and
11 then, you know, 2030 the WNBA.

12 So I'm not a natural
13 born Philadelphian, but I really
14 adopted this city. You can just
15 feel the strength and the fight and
16 the love. You know, Philly is One
17 Philly, One Love. And some of my
18 best friends are from Philadelphia
19 and I will say they got your back.
20 I mean, I'm learning how to fight a
21 bit, but earlier I wasn't a good

19 Fulton, Jr. is known for his
20 aggressive fighting style and is
21 considered one of the best young
22 fighters in boxing, having a record
23 of 23 wins and 1 loss; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

2 Whereas, Fulton, Jr. has received
3 numerous awards and recognition
4 throughout his life for his role in
5 the boxing community and his
6 contributions to the City of
7 Philadelphia. He has held the
8 World Boxing Council (WBC)
9 featherweight title since February
10 2025, and the unified World Boxing
11 Organization (WBO) and (WBC) super-
12 bantamweight titles from 2021 to
13 2023.

14 Some of his recent
15 fights include wins over boxers
16 such as Brandon Figueroa and Danny
17 Roman. Fulton, Jr. was recognized
18 on May 7, 2025 with the Honorary
19 Sheriff badge, symbolizing
20 recognition and respect to
21 individuals who have made
22 significant contributions to the
23 community from Philadelphia Sheriff
24 Rochelle Bilal; and

19 Philadelphia. He has donated
20 scooters to young people in need
21 and made various monetary donations
22 to charities showcasing his
23 commitment to uplifting underserved

20 fight, he will be five times III
21 Division World Champion and will be
22 considered for the First Ballot
23 Hall of Famers, which will put him
24 in the record books for boxing; and

3 Steph to the podium.

4 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
6 Mr. Fulton for remarks.

8 doing today? Thanks for having me.

19 is our Senator Art Haywood. Thank
20 you for joining us today, sir.

21 (Applause.)

22 SENATOR HAYWOOD: Good
23 morning. Good morning, Council
24 President, all members, all people

2 who are gathered here. I am so
3 glad to join you for Dignity Month.
4 It has already been shared, whether
5 you're Black, Brown or White, rich
6 or poor, urban, suburban. However
7 you might identify, we all have
8 dignity.

9 And yesterday was
10 International Dignity Day
11 throughout the entire world and
12 folks celebrated dignity across our
13 globe. Desmond Tutu, Muhammad Ali,
14 singer Peter Gabriel, they were
15 some of the first signers on to
16 Dignity Day.

17 And the core of dignity
18 is a African standard. It is I Am
19 Because We Are. That is the core
20 of the dignity principle. And we
21 have such great representation in
22 our City Council, showing that
23 there's diverse face and background
24 and that all the worth of everyone

2 is represented here in this
3 chamber.

4 Over 100 countries have
5 recognized dignity. Germany has
6 dignity in their Constitution to
7 protect it as a result of the
8 Holocaust. South Africa after
9 apartheid put dignity in their
10 Constitution. I have a Dignity
11 Constitutional amendment that I am
12 proposing for Pennsylvania.

13 I know that we are short
14 on time and I don't want to really
15 go over, but I do want to say a few
16 more things. We in this city and
17 in this state can overcome some of
18 the gross dignity violations that
19 are in our community: The dignity
20 violation of starvation in Gaza,
21 the dignity violation of paying
22 people \$11, \$12 an hour, the
23 dignity violations of not fully
24 funding our schools, but we can

2 overcome it. And this is all what
3 Dignity Day and Dignity Month is
4 about, bringing to our attention
5 how we treat each other.

6 There's a couple of
7 events happening that I do want to
8 share. Tonight at Woodmeter(ph)
9 Theater a fantastic presentation is
10 going to be made by Professor Stacy
11 Hawkins on the topic of diversity
12 and dignity. We've seen some
13 tensions there. Later this month
14 at Arcadia University we're going
15 to have a conversation about free
16 speech and dignity. We've seen
17 some tensions there.

18 So I want to thank my
19 colleagues, all who are here.
20 Special thanks to Councilman
21 Phillips. Special thanks to you,
22 Council President. And to all who
23 are gathered here today, please
24 take a moment to appreciate each

2 other. Please take a moment to
3 recognize even though there may be
4 differences, and there are going to
5 be, we can still speak to each
6 other with dignity. Thank you so
7 much.

8 (Applause.)

11 Johnson, Ashley Gilmore, Jeremy
12 Blatstein and William Tung also
13 make their way to the podium.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 DR. MARSHALL: Good
17 morning. My name is Dr. Alycia
18 Marshall and I am the Interim
19 President at the Community College
20 of Philadelphia. The last time I
21 was here about five months ago I
22 was asking you all for money, so
23 I'm happy to be here on a more
24 positive note today not asking for

3 think is an important day,
4 Legislator for the Day with so many

12 DR. MARSHALL: It is
13 truly an honor to join our
14 Community College of Philadelphia
15 students, faculty and staff for
16 this important occasion.
17 Legislator for a Day offers our
18 students a first-hand look at how
19 City Council serves the people of
20 Philadelphia and it reinforces the
21 value of civic engagement and
22 education.

23 Today 34 of our students
24 are participating, 17 of whom will

3 that you've seen, and 17 who will
4 serve as CCP votes Student

12 how policy shapes community and how
13 their voices can truly make a

20 reflect with pride on six decades
21 of changing lives and expanding
22 opportunity for Philadelphians. We
23 remain committed to keeping our
24 doors open to all who seek to

4 Today's engagement with

10 intentional, and y'all already know
11 this from her work across the city,
12 and I know this as her Deputy.

13 But today I want to talk
14 about my friend. I started here
15 when I was 20 almost seven years
16 ago, and I feel blessed to have
17 been assigned tasks to support her
18 work because that chance meeting
19 changed my life. It gave me a true
20 role model, a selfless mentor and a
21 big sister. And there is so much
22 to learn from Jenaye, the kindness
23 that she shows every individual she
24 comes across, the patience she

21 My name is Jerrett Johnson. I
22 serve as lead transit organizer for
23 5th Square Advocacy speaking in
24 support of Bill No. 250770

2 regarding speed cameras on Erie
3 Avenue, Allegheny Avenue and
4 Columbus Boulevard.

5 These corridors are
6 among our deadliest stretches in
7 Philadelphia and are also critical
8 step towards saving lives and
9 changing dangerous behaviors toward
10 drivers. Studies have proved that
11 it will benefit not only drivers,
12 but will also benefit pedestrians.
13 Their true value is measured in
14 lives saved, not (inaudible)
15 collected.

16 I have friends and
17 colleagues, which some of them are
18 here today, who ride their bikes
19 along one of these intersections
20 and always think about their safety
21 every single day. These cameras
22 will provide consistent, unbiased
23 enforcement that will give officers
24 relief and focus on other duties.

24 behalf of big bike, but in my

10 Committee last meeting. But let's
11 be clear, it should have been 20.
12 Councilmember Jay Young held the
13 bill at the hearing for the City
14 Hall bike lane, even though the
15 lane is already mostly built.
16 Safety over everything, safety over
17 everything.

18 I want to commend
19 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier for
20 Bill No. 250712 on parking
21 regulations in the 3rd District.
22 She made safety a priority. I also
23 support Bill No. 250718, which
24 creates parking regulations and

2 loading zone on Pine and Spruce
3 streets. This bill is critical.
4 We need to pass it quickly.
5 Groups like Friends of
6 Pine and Spruce are wasting
7 resources fighting commonsense
8 safety improvements. My concern is
9 with the amendment that narrowed
10 the bill to only Pine and Spruce.
11 This adds more red tape for every
12 future parking and loading zone
13 change by OTIS and Streets
14 Department. Let's not make safety
15 harder. Let's make it easier.
16 Let's make it faster. Grow Philly
17 to 2 milli.
18 Raise your hand if you
19 know what happened at the last
20 Philadelphia Land Bank meeting.
21 Probably not, unless you follow me
22 on Twitter or Instagram,
23 NextPhillyMayor. But two members
24 of the Land Bank Board are no

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 longer on the board and they did
3 not have quorum to hold an October
4 2025 Land Bank meeting.

5 Hopefully, this is the
6 first step in improving the Land
7 Bank Board to carry out Mayor
8 Parker's vision of 30,000 homes and
9 move more than 8000 lots held to
10 build more housing to help grow
11 Philly to 2 milli.

12 And of course, we're
13 talking about SEPTA. Only 46 of
14 the 225 Silverliner cars had been
15 inspected and we need to force
16 Harrisburg to get more funding.
17 Ride the ride. Fund SEPTA. Thank
18 you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
20 JOHNSON: Hey, Mr. Blatstein. Just
21 for the record also, that Pine and
22 Spruce bill has been amended to the
23 cover a wider area in the second
24 and the first. And then also, we

2 have a hearing coming up regarding
3 SEPTA and the rail cars so we're on
4 the job. Thank you, sir.

5 MR. BLATSTEIN: Thank
6 you, sir. Good to see you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

9 MR. TUNG: Hello. Good
10 morning. My name is Will Tung.
11 I'm a resident of Southwest Philly
12 and here as a husband and father
13 raising a child in this city. I am
14 here in support of Bill 250712,
15 which will enable the city to
16 regulate parking and loading on
17 47th Street in my neighborhood.

18 This bill is part of a
19 larger plan that reconfigured 47th
20 Street to be far safer and I am
21 proud of Councilmember Gauthier for
22 prioritizing safety here. 47th
23 Street is on the High Injury
24 Network and it's among the most

2 dangerous streets in our city. The
3 reconfiguration of 47th has had a
4 tangible and direct daily benefit
5 to me and my family.

6 My daughter has to cross
7 47th Street on her way to 7th
8 grade. My wife needs to cross it
9 to get to work and her gym. And
10 since the reconfiguration, the cars
11 here drive slower, calmer and it's
12 noticeably less stressful for all
13 of us. I am sympathetic to folks
14 who are skeptical of this bill
15 because they are losing the
16 convenience of parking where
17 they're used to and maybe driving
18 more quickly down the street. And
19 I hope they see things from my
20 perspective where the old layout
21 encouraged reckless driving.

22 For the 45 crashes on
23 this corridor and four serious
24 injuries in the past five years,

2 the status quo has failed them.
3 For my family who is struck by a
4 car in this neighborhood, the
5 status quo has failed my family. I
6 want to thank Councilmember
7 Gauthier for prioritizing safety
8 here on 47th Street and throughout
9 the entire 3rd District. Let's
10 wipe 47th Street off our High
11 Injury Network map. Let's pass
12 this bill. Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. GEFFEN: Hello. My
15 name is Benjamin Geffen. I'm here
16 to speak in support of Bill 250718
17 as amended. I'm for over 15 years
18 a homeowner, a car owner and a
19 bicycle owner in the Center City
20 section of Philadelphia. And by
21 passing the loading zones bill,
22 this city will improve life for
23 homeowners, car owners and bicycle
24 owners all over the city,

2 especially in Center City.

3 I want to just respond

4 very briefly to two things that

5 I've heard opponents of this

6 ordinance say. One is that there's

7 no opportunity for public input.

8 There has been ample opportunity

9 for public input. The public has

10 come and testified at lots of

11 hearings, communicated with lots of

12 members and city officials. And

13 what the public has said is we

14 don't want more process, we want

15 loading zones and we want protected

16 bike lanes, we don't want to wait

17 anymore.

18 The other thing I want

19 to respond to is the comment that

20 there's no evidence of problems.

21 I'm evidence of a problem. Last

22 year I was biking home from work.

23 On the 1500 block of Spruce, an

24 Uber pulled into the bike lane, a

2 driver, and the passenger on the
3 back right flung the door open,
4 knocked me into the pavement. I'm
5 here testifying instead of being a
6 grease spot on Spruce Street today.
7 Because I was lucky enough, there
8 was no truck coming up behind me.
9 But there are lots of people with
10 stories like mine, lots of evidence
11 to the need. Thank you very much.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. PEREZ: I'm Kate
14 Perez talking about dignity, and it
15 only took the Occupation one day to
16 violate the ceasefire, killing
17 seven Palestinians who were
18 inspecting their home in East Gaza
19 with warplanes and quadcopters
20 covering all of Gaza, drone strikes
21 and --

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: Ms. Perez, can we do it
24 on the bill? Work with me today.

2 MS. PEREZ: We can't
3 help but remember that Israel's
4 primary arms dealer is sitting
5 comfortably in Member Young's
6 district, wondering if those bombs
7 left our ports. As the beacon of
8 human rights, it's on Philadelphia
9 to value the lives and rights of
10 Palestinians who are being crushed
11 with weapons made in our city,
12 especially as we continue our
13 sister-city relationship,
14 diminishing our global reputation
15 by excusing, ignoring and enabling
16 this live stream genocide.

17 The Occupation went back
18 on their agreement --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Ms. Perez, can we focus
21 on Affordable Cost of Living Task
22 Force?

23 MS. PEREZ: -- to open
24 the wrong evacuations or

2 humanitarian aid to enter in
3 defiance of international law in
4 the binding ICJ ruling. Activists
5 who tried to bridge the siege were
6 thrown in prison and tortured.

7 Something more than 10,000 --

9 JOHNSON: Task Force, Ms. Perez.

10 MS. PEREZ: --

11 Palestinians died in the street
12 last night from the cold, and those
13 with flu will not find medication,
14 as they still maintain the
15 blockade. Where is their dignity?
16 Where is ours? Arms embargo now.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: We have
19 Elisa Yousey, Jenny --

20 MS. YOUSEY: My name
21 is --

22 CHIEF CLERK: --

23 Boccarbo. I'm sorry. Can Joanna
24 Otero Cruz, Christine Cox, Ed

2 McCauley and Caleb Holtmeyer also
3 make their way to the podium.

4 (Witnesses approached
5 podium.)

6 MS. YOUSEY: My name is
7 Eliza. I am a District 1 resident.
8 I am here in support of Bill No.
9 250718. I drive and I bike. I use
10 Spruce and Pine to get to work. I
11 wiped out on my bike going around a
12 car parked in the loading zone on
13 Spruce Street. Loading zones make
14 sense as part of the overall design
15 of the street. They give drivers a
16 safe and legal space to stop
17 temporarily. These spots are
18 clearly needed.

19 It is smart and
20 practical to give the Streets
21 Department authority to make these
22 types of decisions and to make
23 these loading zones formally legal.
24 So that's why I support this bill.

2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. BOCCARBO DUBE: Good
5 morning, Council President Johnson
6 and City Councilmembers. My name
7 is Jenny Boccarbo Dube, and I live
8 in Center City with my family,
9 District 2. I'm here to testify in
10 support of Bill 250718. Riding a
11 bike in Center City is a privilege
12 I enjoy daily and I am deeply
13 grateful for all the bike lanes
14 throughout the city.

15 Many of you are aware of
16 the horrible crash where Barbara
17 Friedes was killed at 18th and
18 Spruce last summer. Had there been
19 protected bike lanes, Barbara would
20 be alive today. I was walking by
21 at that moment and saw her body
22 lying in the street. That moment
23 will always stay with me and I
24 would like to believe that she did

2 not die in vain.

3 Bike lanes were created
4 for bikes, not cars. If a vehicle
5 parks in a bike lane, they are
6 jeopardizing the lives of bikers.
7 With loading zones, these dangers
8 can be avoided and people can have
9 better and, most importantly, safer
10 places to unload. Additionally,
11 loading zones become parking spaces
12 at night. As a city that has
13 experienced tragedies due to unsafe
14 bike lanes, we should realize that
15 patience is not worth a human life.
16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. OTERO CRUZ: Good
19 morning. Buenos dias. My name is
20 Joanna Otero Cruz and I'm the
21 Executive Director and President of
22 Women Against Abuse. On behalf of
23 Women Against Abuse and all of our
24 valued partners who are here with

2 us today, I'd like to thank
3 Councilmembers Quetcy Lozada and
4 Kendra Brooks as well as all the
5 distinguished City Council for
6 recognizing October as Domestic
7 Violence Awareness Month here in

9 Domestic violence
10 impacts 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4
11 men. Each of us knows someone
12 affected by domestic violence, a
13 mother, a sister, friend, colleague
14 or neighbor. Everyday survivors in
15 the city of Philadelphia make the
16 courageous choice to seek safety.
17 They reach out to our hotline,
18 arrive at our shelters and look to
19 advocates for help. But right now
20 the resources we rely on are at
21 risk.

22 Women Against Abuse
23 serves more than 10,000 individuals
24 each year. For over 50 years, we

2 provide a safe place and a refuge
3 and we must continue to stick
4 together, to fight together, and we
5 stand in solidarity with all of you
6 and we are so grateful for your
7 ongoing support, not just today but
8 year round and we look forward to
9 continuing to work with you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. COX: Hello. My
12 name is Christine Cox. I'm the
13 co-founder, artistic and Executive
14 Director of BalletX, Philadelphia's
15 premier contemporary ballet. I
16 want to thank Councilmember Rue
17 Landau for this recognition of this
18 milestone moment for my company.

19 I'm a born and raised
20 West Philadelphia girl. I danced
21 in the Pennsylvania Valley for 13
22 years. At the age of 10, I started
23 dancing and fell in love with
24 movement. I'm completely blessed

2 to have had a lifetime doing
3 something I love. Love what you
4 do. Love your life. My company
5 employs over 30 people and I really
6 believe that, yes, we are a
7 Philadelphia sports town, but we
8 are an arts town and the arts
9 really make this city so special.
10 They invite people to
11 move to Philadelphia and create a
12 life here. I have dancers and
13 choreographers coming from all over
14 the world to Philadelphia and I
15 represent this city. In 20 years,
16 we built a dance education program
17 that's in six Philadelphia public
18 schools inspiring kids to dance.
19 We're the resident dance company of
20 the Mann Center for the Performing
21 Arts and we donate tickets to
22 Philadelphians all over our great
23 city. Thank you so much to the
24 Councilmembers for your work and

2 your service. Thank you,
3 President.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

7 CHIEF CLERK: We have Ed
8 McCauley, Caleb Holtmeyer. May
9 Bonnie Halad, Susan Burt, Steve
10 Bergquist, Marie Fleming and Rochie
11 Weisberg also make their way to the
12 podium.

13 (Witnesses approached
14 podium.)

15 MR. McCAULEY: Good
16 morning. My name is Ed McCauley
17 and I'm Director of Real Estate
18 Development for Habitat for
19 Humanity Philadelphia. I would
20 like to thank Councilmember Jeffrey
21 Young for his sponsorship of Bill
22 No. 250719 and for his ongoing
23 support of Habitat for Humanity
24 Philadelphia. Thank you also to

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Planning Commission for its
3 support of this bill.

4 Bill No. 250719 seeks to
5 amend the zoning designations of
6 certain areas of land located
7 within an area bounded by 19th
8 Street, Wilt Street, Gratz Street
9 and Montgomery Avenue. The
10 proposed zoning designations will
11 be amended from RSA-5 to RM-1 and
12 CMX-2. Zoning designations such
13 remapping of these parcels owned
14 for many years by Habitat for
15 Humanity Philadelphia will allow
16 habitat to fulfill its mission, to
17 create new affordable housing and
18 homeownership opportunities as well
19 as develop long vacant,
20 underutilized lots.

21 Habitat envisions
22 providing affordable residential
23 dwelling units as well as
24 commercial space that will allow

2 Habitat to expand its offices to
3 better serve the community and the
4 residents through programs and
5 educational workshops. The
6 development proposes approximately
7 20 new affordable housing units,
8 strengthening the fabric of the
9 community as well as office space,
10 which will include a larger meeting
11 room that may accommodate community
12 meetings and various programs,
13 including owner-occupied home
14 repair and affordable
15 homeownership.

16 In conclusion, Habitat
17 respectfully requests that Council
18 approve passage of this bill to
19 allow this important and vital
20 development project to move
21 forward. Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. HOLTMEYER: Hello.

24 My name is Caleb Holtmeyer. I'm

2 here today speaking on behalf of
3 Philly Bike Action. And I got to
4 say I hear a story like Ben's all
5 the time. A lot of people reach
6 out to me and email me about their
7 near misses on our streets in
8 Philadelphia, of almost being hit
9 by a car or being a hit and
10 injured. So this is a frequent
11 problem.

12 I want to speak in favor
13 of Bill 250718. I want to thank
14 City Council for raising this
15 loading zone legislation, improve
16 safety and accessibility of our
17 streets. I understand there was
18 concern that the previous version
19 of the bill only focused on Spruce
20 and Pine Streets. I appreciate
21 that the amended version brought it
22 into scope. So thank you, City
23 Council, for doing that.

24 When the loading zones

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 were introduced, Spruce and Pine
3 Streets were made safer overnight,
4 is used as a bike lane, no longer
5 to swerve into traffic as
6 frequently to avoid parked cars. I
7 wanted to answer past rhetoric that
8 bike lane parking is not dangerous.
9 That may be a convenient position
10 to take if one's perspective is
11 behind the steering wheel at their
12 front door and in the bike lane.
13 It only takes a little empathy to
14 see the danger posed to our biking
15 neighbors with various levels of
16 ability.
17 For example, if you have
18 a glaucoma condition that reduces
19 peripheral vision, you may not see
20 the car passing of your shoulder.
21 If you have hearing loss, you may
22 not hear the vehicle about to speed
23 past you. You can only imagine the
24 hazard to parents teaching kids to

2 bike as they carefully navigate
3 around parked cars.

4 I urge City Council to
5 pass this legislation to legalize
6 loading zones in Center City. Most
7 Philadelphians just want a place to
8 park without endangering their
9 neighbors. No mothers want to see
10 the headline another Philadelphian
11 killed on Spruce Street.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. HALAD: Good
14 morning. Thank you to Council for
15 giving me the opportunity to
16 testify today. My name is Bonnie
17 Halad. I live in Society Hill and
18 I support Bill 250758 and its
19 amendments. I've lived in Society
20 Hill for over 35 years. I
21 previously served on the Society
22 Hill Civic Association in a variety
23 of roles, one most recently as the
24 Chair of the Communications

2 Committee.

3 We always strove to
4 engage our community and get their
5 opinions before making actions.

6 But that's not happening anymore.

7 I no longer serve on the board.

8 The current board recently voted to
9 give \$25,000 to the law firm that's
10 engaged by the Friends of Pine and
11 Spruce to fight the city over these
12 types of laws, such as no stopping
13 and the loading zones.

14 I am here because I want
15 my voice to be heard. I'm here
16 because I want my voice to be heard
17 in support of this bill. I'm here
18 because five years ago a wife of a
19 good friend of mine was struck and
20 killed by a motorist while she was
21 riding her bike. I'm here because
22 I believe this bill is a positive
23 step to enhance safety for
24 bicyclists, while providing for the

2 convenience for loading zones, for
3 residents, contractors and delivery
4 people. Please don't listen to the
5 angry voices. Please listen to
6 those of us that are not being
7 represented and those of us who
8 want to see a progressive, vibrant
9 city. Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. BURKE COLLINS: Good
12 morning or afternoon. My name is
13 Susan -- sorry. My name is Susan
14 Burke Collins and I live at 5th and
15 Pine. I was formerly President of
16 the Society Hill Civic Association,
17 and I am speaking to give you folks
18 some insight into how things have
19 transpired such that we have given
20 \$25,000 to the group that is suing
21 the City of Philadelphia and
22 costing you a great deal of money
23 and time fussing about this.

24 The fact is our

2 community desperately wants a
3 compromise. We have tried. And
4 last year as President, I put
5 together a task force to find that
6 compromise. There have been
7 numerous meetings and Councilmember
8 Squilla and others have been
9 present at those meetings and have
10 heard there are two sides. There
11 are lots of people in our community
12 who are not being heard by the
13 Board of the Civic Association who
14 want to find a compromise where we
15 have bike safety so people like me,
16 an old lady, can happily ride my
17 bike safely as I get from place to
18 place And also young children can
19 ride and learn how to ride a bike
20 safely on our streets, but also
21 accommodate somebody who may need
22 to get a handicapped person into
23 their home briefly.

24 We have a compromise. I

2 even have the compromise that this
3 group put together. There were two
4 sides and I'm glad to distribute
5 it. Thank you very much for giving
6 me time to speak.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Thank you.

10 MR. BERGQUIST: I'm John
11 Steven Bergquist here speaking in
12 favor of Bills 250712 and 250718,
13 creating loading zones in West
14 Philadelphia and Center City. I'm a
15 cycle commuter and proud resident
16 of my adopted home of Southwest
17 Philadelphia, but I originally come
18 from Minneapolis, a city famous for
19 its impressive urban cycling
20 infrastructure.

21 There are useful
22 protected bike lanes and separated
23 paths crossing the entire city.
24 They can take you from residential

2 neighborhoods in both the wealthy
3 and non-wealthy parts of town to
4 the bustling university campuses
5 right to the downtown business
6 district.

7 Where I come from it is
8 completely normal to see children,
9 elders and young professionals of
10 all social classes sharing any of
11 the many protected bike routes at
12 their own pace to get to their
13 destination safely. They might be
14 on a carbon fiber road bike. They
15 might be on a hand-me-down kids
16 bike with training wheels. They
17 might be on an electric wheelchair,
18 because good bike lanes aren't just
19 for bikes.

20 I have seen firsthand
21 the many benefits that safe,
22 predictable and useful micro
23 mobility infrastructure brings to
24 people of all ages, incomes and

2 abilities. Like any cyclist in
3 Philadelphia, I do ride on Spruce
4 and Pine in Center City sometimes.
5 But I personally ride on Fairmount
6 Avenue every day to get to work.
7 Almost every day someone is
8 blocking the bike lane because
9 there's no place to park for
10 deliveries, picking someone up,
11 whatever.

12 I see families and kids
13 forced into traffic at least once a
14 week just in my few minutes a day
15 on the corridor. This is a
16 dangerous situation for everyone
17 who lives, works and travels on
18 Fairmount Avenue. Loading zones
19 would help all these road users get
20 to their destination safely. My
21 fully support legalizing loading
22 zones anywhere in greater Center
23 City and University City. Thank
24 you.

3 CHIEF CLERK: We have
4 Marie Fleming, Rochie Weisberg.
5 May David Alexander Jenkins,
6 Stanley Horwitz, Nico Meyering,
7 Albert Meinster and Linnea Bond
8 also make their way to the podium.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 podium.)

11 MS. WEISBERG: My name
12 is Rochie Weisberg. I'm here to
13 speak in support of Bill No.
14 250712. I want to thank
15 Councilmember Gauthier for her
16 leadership on this issue. I live
17 at the corner of 47th and Hazel so
18 I'm directly affected by the bike
19 lane each and every day.

20 My office faces that
21 corner and I actually had to close
22 my blinds recently because I would
23 just watch cars blow those stop
24 signs all day. I even watched a

1 10/16/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 car run into a stop sign and it
3 caused the street to be closed for
4 a day. I actually have no idea
5 what happened to that person, but
6 it's pretty crazy.

7 And so, I just want to
8 say for me as a cyclist, as a
9 driver, the bike lane has been a
10 huge improvement for my life. I
11 actually also now work and I hear
12 kids biking on the bike lane
13 because they feel safe to do so,
14 which is just how we should be
15 living in a city. And I think it's
16 good to have loading zones so that
17 we have places for the cars to go,
18 because it's now one way. And if
19 they double park, it would just be
20 a disaster. So thank you so much.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. FLEMING: I'm here
23 in support of -- my name is Marie
24 Fleming. I'm here in support of

2 Dr. Beverly Wylie. Declaration of
3 Independence, second paragraph: We
4 hold these truths to be self-
5 evident that all men are created
6 equal, and that they are endowed by
7 their creator with certain
8 unalienable rights, that among
9 these are life, liberty and the
10 pursuit of happiness.

11 The Bill of Rights. The
12 Bill of Rights, Amendment 4
13 protects you from unreasonable
14 searches and seizures. The right
15 of the people to be secure in their
16 persons, houses, papers and effects
17 against unreasonable searches and
18 seizures shall not be violated.
19 And no warrant shall issue but upon
20 probable cause, supported by oath
21 or affirmation, and particularly
22 describing the place to be searched
23 and the persons or things to be
24 seized.

2 Amendment 9, other

3 rights kept by the people. The

4 enumeration in the Constitution of

5 certain rights shall not be

6 construed to deny or disparage

11 the Beverly Wylie resolution,

13 MS. FLEMING: -- 1984

18 JOHNSON: Can we connect this to

19 the Beverly Wylie resolution,

20 ma'am? Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: David Alexander Jenkins,

24 please proceed.

2 MR. JENKINS:

3 Mr. President, members and guests
4 here, Alexander Jenkins and I rise
5 in support of Resolution 250879.
6 Not simply as a policy measure, but
7 also as a moral declaration that
8 our city must reorder its
9 priorities, that we must move from
10 a survival of dignity to a neglect
11 and restoration we gather in
12 Philadelphia that has become a
13 study of contradictions, if you
14 will, a city of billion dollar
15 skylines and boarded-up homes, of
16 expanding universities and
17 evaporating opportunity, of
18 corporate prosperity that often
19 feeds on human despair.

20 Beneath the glimmer of
21 development lies a truth that we
22 can no longer disguise. Our
23 people, our brothers and sisters
24 are living through a crises of

2 affordability, of access and of
3 belonging. Every day thousands of
4 our neighbors face eviction,
5 hunger, homelessness, not because
6 they lack discipline or faith, but
7 because our systems have forgotten
8 that they exist.

9 We have allowed the
10 machinery of a progress to run on
11 the blocks of those and on the
12 backs of those who can least bear
13 its weight. More than pretty
14 language, pen to paper, Member
15 O'Rourke's resolution is a mirror
16 held up to the conscious of the
17 city.

18 It asks us whether we
19 still believe that governance is an
20 act of care. It demands that we
21 look beyond the metrics of profit
22 toward the measure of human worth.
23 You and I know that the soul of
24 Philadelphia is not found in its

2 skyline. It lives in the people,
3 in the grandmother keeping heat on
4 her grandchildren, the neighbors
5 searching for work, the young
6 mother choosing between rent and
7 medicine.

8 Our crisis, as much as
9 it is economic, is moral. It is a
10 slow corrosion that occurs when the
11 measure of human life is left to
12 the market logic. But today we can
13 reclaim the heart of Philadelphia,
14 one that lifts from the ground up.
15 Resolution 250879, champions of
16 Philadelphia, which is deserved of
17 more than survival. It champions
18 of Philadelphia, a city defined by
19 love.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. HORWITZ: Good
22 morning. My name is Stan Horwitz.
23 I'm a 64-year-old Fairmount
24 resident and bicycle commuter. I'm

2 here to express support for Bill
3 250718 and urge every City
4 Councilmember to pass it without
5 limiting its scope only to Spruce
6 and Pine Streets so us bicyclists
7 can ride safely in Center City.

8 Spruce and Pine
9 definitely need to be made more
10 safer, but ideally the Department
11 of Streets should have the same
12 authorities included in this bill
13 citywide. As a bicycle commuter
14 who rides throughout Center City,
15 limiting the scope of this bill
16 only to Spruce and Pine would limit
17 the city's commitment to Vision
18 Zero. Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Excuse me, Stan Horwitz.
22 Stan, just for the record the bill
23 has been amended beyond the scope
24 of Spruce and Pine. Just want to

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. MEYERING: Hi,

5 everyone. My name is Nico

6 Meyering. And I want to thank

11 here today. It's a real honor to

12 be here with all of you. And I

13 want to talk a little bit about our

14 organization.

15 Young Involve

16 Philadelphia served as a dynamic

17 idea for a big, dynamic city. And

18 that idea is that civic engagement

19 is something we can all do every

20 day. 25 years later we are active

21 every day, not just on Election

22 day, but on park cleanup day, City

23 Council hearing day and even on

24 random Tuesdays when you have to

3 Our board, some of my

4 friends here behind me today,

5 started this year as colleagues,

11 over \$15,000 for us and you helped

12 us create over 60 new board members

13 to our board prep program. Thank

14 you so much, Councilmember Landau.

15 Go find us at whyiphilly.org. And

16 thank you to our incredible board,

17 the real heroes. Thanks, folks.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. MEINSTER: Thank

20 you, Council President and

21 Councilmembers, for giving me a

22 moment to speak with you. My name

23 is Albert Meinster. I'm an

24 82-year-old everyday bicyclist.

2 And if I have trouble speaking to
3 you today because I can't locate
4 specific words or I lose my train
5 of thought, it's because I'm a
6 survivor.

7 40 years ago I was
8 struck down by a truck while riding
9 my bicycle and every day I'm
10 reminded of that disability. And
11 I'm here to plead with you to end
12 this, to end the threats that are
13 given to the vulnerable folks on
14 bicycles. You know the John, I
15 don't have to repeat the reasons.

16 But I'd also like to say
17 to you in defense of my fellow
18 Society Hill residents, those on
19 the other side of this issue who
20 have brought a suit against the
21 City, many feel that they are
22 uncaring and unknowing and not very
23 nice people. But on the contrary,
24 they are, they just don't know.

2 They don't know how difficult and
3 how dangerous it is for us on the
4 street. So please, for God's sake,
5 pass the ordinance that gives us
6 the protection that we need while
7 we're on our bicycles. Thanks for
8 listening.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: We have
11 Linnea Bond. May Rishaun Hall,
12 Theresa Feo, Isabel Melvin and
13 Raymond King also make their way to
14 the podium.

15 (Witnesses approached
16 podium.)

17 MS. BOND: Good
18 afternoon. My name is Linnea Bond.
19 I am here today speaking for myself
20 as a District 5 resident as well as
21 on behalf of Physicians for Social
22 Responsibility Pennsylvania.
23 Philadelphia medical professionals
24 are deeply concerned about the

2 financial, environmental and health
3 costs of data centers proliferating
4 across PJM's service area.

5 With limited time, I'll
6 highlight just three concerns:
7 First, when data centers are built,
8 electric costs skyrocket.
9 According to a Bloomberg analysis,
10 wholesale electricity costs as much
11 as 267% more than it did five years
12 ago in areas near data centers.
13 Proposed data centers in Bucks and
14 Luzerne are already likely to
15 increase costs for significantly
16 energy-burdened Philadelphians.

17 Our gas rates will rise
18 November 28th. Our electric rates
19 went up 10% this past January and
20 again in June. Second, a single
21 data center can consume the amount
22 of energy of a city. If this
23 Council truly cares about
24 children's health beyond the month

2 of October, including our near and
3 long-term futures, put your action
4 where your resolutions are. The
5 only thing that will prevent
6 increasing wildfires, floods and
7 worsening heat is deep energy
8 reduction simultaneous with
9 renewable energy conversion.
10 Data centers drive
11 energy, escalating energy
12 consumption and specifically fossil
13 fuels as new dirty gas and coal
14 generators are added to power the
15 grid and also built as generators
16 for individual data centers.
17 Third, these generators pollute the
18 air with nitrous oxides, PM 2.5,
19 carbon dioxide, VOCs and constant
20 noise. Data centers are part of a
21 massive financial bet paid by tech
22 giants who now desperately need us
23 to take on the cost of that
24 investment. But our community's

2 health cannot afford data center

3 proliferation. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. HALL: Good

6 afternoon, everyone. My name is

7 Rishaun Hall. First, I would just

8 at the top like to thank Council

9 President Kenyatta Johnson and

10 Councilwoman Rue Landau for

11 introducing this resolution to this

12 councilmanic body. It is an honor

13 to stand here not just as Rishaun

14 Hall, but on behalf of Young

15 Involved Philadelphia, an

16 organization that has spent 25

17 years asking the fundamental

18 question of our city's rising

19 generation will they or won't they.

20 For a quarter century,

21 YIP's answer has been simple: They

22 will if we invite them. YIP has

23 been founded 25 years ago to serve

24 one goal, to create a space where

3 engage with Philadelphia's civic
4 ecosystem, participate in
5 government, such as this gathering

11 over 6000 members and our flagship
12 program Board Prep has graduated
13 over 1000 participants that serve
14 on boards throughout Philadelphia
15 and the region. Young people are
16 doing the work. And now, our task
17 has been to turn from will they or
18 won't they to they've already done.

19 Our latest product, the
20 State of Young Philadelphia Report
21 serves as YIP's first research
22 product aiming to inform
23 policymakers, civic leaders and the
24 public about the realities and

2 trends facing young adults in
3 Philadelphia. If you are under the
4 sound of my voice, I cordially
5 invite you to our Annual State of
6 Young Philadelphia convening this

9 On behalf of YIP, I
10 thank you for believing in the
11 power of young people and to make
12 this city better and for helping to
13 make sure that when Philadelphia
14 asks will they or won't they, we
15 can proudly answer we already did.
16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. FEO: Good
19 afternoon, Councilmembers. My name
20 is Theresa Feo and I'm here to
21 testify in opposition to bills
22 250712 and 250718. We are opposed
23 to granting the Streets Department
24 blanket authority to revise, alter

2 or eliminate parking or loading
3 zones on not only 47th Street, but
4 any Philadelphia Street using only
5 their broad discretion without
6 community input.

7 Their recent decisions
8 demonstrate that their discretion
9 is flawed and often exercised
10 without regard for context-specific
11 design principles, input from local
12 residents or best practices in
13 traffic engineering. The
14 reconfiguration of 47th Street
15 installed in tandem with the 48th
16 Street bike lane last year
17 illustrates this failure.

18 Over the past two and a
19 half years, OTIS has said the
20 following: We didn't know that
21 Star Harbor was a busy senior
22 center. We didn't know that EMT
23 and fire trucks wouldn't be able to
24 fit down the road after our

2 installation of the bike lane. We
3 didn't know that the ADA ramp for
4 seniors was on the 47th Street west
5 side. We didn't know that
6 St. Francis' dismissal was mostly
7 on Springfield Avenue and we still
8 don't have speed bumps after two
9 months. We didn't know that SEPTA
10 is a -- our road is a bus detour so
11 we were going to make the road too
12 narrow and a turning radius
13 wouldn't fit.

14 We didn't know that the
15 47th and 48th Street weren't on the
16 High Injury Network at all. We
17 didn't know that SEPTA's bus stop
18 prevents a wheelchair-bound
19 resident -- a 62 foot by 16 foot
20 blocked off bollard station on 48th
21 street blocks a wheelchair bound
22 resident from even getting out of
23 her house. There's no CCT van that
24 can get to her.

2 We didn't know that
3 there were EV car owners on the
4 east side of the road. We didn't
5 know that the businesses were
6 consulted. We didn't know the
7 initial meetings of 500 surveys
8 were mostly bike lobby advocates
9 who didn't live in the neighborhood
10 and that the initial meetings
11 weren't inclusive of anybody in the
12 Kingessing and Grays Ferry
13 neighborhood who are really upset
14 about all the additional traffic.
15 And when a child dies as a result
16 of these changes, what will you say
17 then? We didn't know.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: We have
20 Isabel Melvin. Then Raymond King.
21 May Dan Becker, Ogbonna Hagins,
22 Laquisha Anthony and Zachary Mackey
23 also make their way to the podium.

24 (Witnesses approached

3 MS. MELVIN: Good

4 afternoon. Isabel Melvin. Council

5 President Johnson, members of City

6 Council, thank you for what you do

7 for the city of Philadelphia. I

8 support loading zones Bill 250718,

9 Bill 7250712. These bills will

10 make me feel safer as I walk and

11 bike on Spruce and Pine. And when

12 I ride through my old neighborhood

13 in West Philly on 47th Street,

14 thank you for making me feel even

15 safer with the amendment to Bill

16 250718.

17 I'm hopeful that this

18 amendment for the loading zones

19 gives the city authority to cover

20 all of Center City. The pedestrian

21 safety, bicycle and accessibility

22 infrastructure has improved so much

23 over the years. Thank you for

24 listening. I also want to feel

2 safer walking and riding near City
3 Hall. Please pass City Hall's bike
4 lane bill. Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. KING: My name is
7 Raymond King and I'm here to speak
8 about Bill 250718, and urge passage
9 of that bill, because as other
10 people have said, it will create a
11 safer space for bicyclers and motor
12 vehicles. Because when you have to
13 block bike lanes for loading, it
14 creates a danger. I mean, a bike
15 has to go out into traffic or it's
16 just a dangerous condition and I
17 urge the passage of this bill.
18 Thank you very much.

19 (Applause.)

20 MR. MACKEY: Good
21 afternoon. My name is Zachary
22 Mackey and I'm the Manager of
23 Community Engagement at Lutheran
24 Settlement House. And I want to

2 thank and support Councilmembers
3 Brooks and Lozada for their bill on
4 domestic violence. I want to speak
5 in support of it because I'm a
6 survivor of a school shooting,
7 Oakland Elementary in Greenwood,

9 It's not often spoke
10 about or heard of. And I know
11 you're wondering what does the
12 school shooting have to do with
13 domestic violence. Upon further
14 research into the shooter's
15 history, he witnessed his mother be
16 abused by his father. So I work
17 and the work that I do and the work
18 that we do in the city, the
19 domestic violence organizations, is
20 very important, because I dream of
21 a world where no one else has to be
22 a survivor of not only domestic
23 violence, but could be affected
24 from it and then end up being a

2 survivor of a school shooting.

3 So thank you,

4 Councilmembers and the City of

5 Philadelphia, for your work and

6 bills on domestic violence. The

7 work we do is important and it

8 matters, because programs like

11 becoming victims of domestic

12 violence. We teach them about

13 healthy and unhealthy

14 relationships. We work to make it

15 possible for survivors to walk

16 through any door and be believed

17 and know how to be referred to

18 resources from their barbershop to

19 city hall to the grocery store.

20 We're working so people can walk

21 through those doors and get

22 referred to resources like ours.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

9 MR. HAGINS: Ogbonna
10 Hagins, fourth generation chattel
11 slavery survivor. As we discuss
12 this resolution on the cost of
13 living, we must begin with truth.
14 We must first examine the cost of
15 living of the American Freedmen.
16 There can be no genuine
17 conversation about global
18 opportunities when the American
19 Freedmen have not been positioned
20 properly. We will not be
21 positioned properly until we have
22 an office of Freedmen Affairs, an
23 agency to protect their rights and
24 ensure justice under the 13th and

2 14th Amendments.

3 For generations, the
4 badges, vestiges and incidents of
5 slavery have shaped the cost of
6 living for our people through home
7 devaluations, employment
8 discrimination and structural

11 Saturday at 12:00 noon, the
12 Philadelphia Reparations Coalition
13 for American Freedmen, we're having
14 a political wellness checkup at the
15 Lutheran Seminary, 7301 Germantown
16 Avenue.

17 And next Sunday, October
18 26th at LOVE Park here in
19 Philadelphia, we commemorate the
20 30th anniversary of the Million Man
21 March. The goal then was
22 atonement. And now, we will raise
23 the estate of the American
24 Freedman. Ogbonna Hagins. Over

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. ANTHONY: Good

5 afternoon. My name is Laquisha

6 Anthony. I'm the Senior Manager of

7 Advocacy at WOAR, Philadelphia's

8 center against sexual violence. It

9 is both an honor and a privilege to

10 represent WOAR and to stand in

11 solidarity with women against abuse

12 as we recognize October as Domestic

13 Violence Awareness Month.

14 Thank you to

15 Councilmembers Brooks and Lozada

16 and full City Council for

17 recognizing DV Awareness Month.

18 WOAR's mission is to eliminate all

19 forms of sexual violence through

20 specialized treatment services,

21 comprehensive prevention education

22 programs and advocacy and for the

23 rights of victims of sexual

24 assault.

2 Domestic violence is a
3 persuasive and often hidden issue
4 that affects individuals from every
5 corner of our community. It
6 transcends age, gender, race and
7 social economic status. It impacts
8 our neighborhoods, our friends, our
9 coworkers and often times our
10 families. Yet for too long it
11 remains silence. This month is a
12 time for us to lift the silence and
13 to break the cycle of isolation and
14 remind those affected that they are
15 not alone.

16 It is a time to raise
17 awareness, but also reaffirm our
18 commitment to ensuring that all
19 survivors have support they need to
20 heal. The relationship between
21 domestic violence and sexual
22 violence is deeply intertwined and
23 often two forms of violence that
24 coexist abusive relationships.

2 While they are distinct in terms of
3 their specific behaviors, they
4 share many common elements,
5 including power and control
6 dynamics, manipulation and the use
7 of fear and domination of a victim.

8 The recognition of this
9 month is also a step in raising

11 enforcement efforts and expanding
12 victim services. And I thank you
13 to all of those who are here today
14 to support why and we thank them
15 for leading the charge in the DV
16 space. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. KAHLER: Hello. My
19 name is Hannah Kahler and I'm an
20 intern with the Bicycle Coalition
21 of Greater Philadelphia and
22 Families for Safe Streets.
23 Families for Safe Streets is a
24 group comprised of family members

2 who have lost loved ones in traffic
3 crashes throughout the Greater
4 Philadelphia area.

5 Thank you, Council
6 President, for this time. The
7 Bicycle Coalition supports Bill No.
8 250718 about loading zones in

10 the City has the authority to
11 manage all parking and loading
12 regulations in Center City.
13 Updating loading zones and parking
14 is important for adapting roads to
15 meet the needs of today. Good curb
16 management can help alleviate
17 congestion, reduce crashes and help
18 us all share the road more safely.

19 I'm also here as a West
20 Philadelphia resident to speak in
21 support of Bill No. 250712,
22 introduced by my Councilmember
23 Jamie Gauthier, authorizing loading
24 zones to support 47th Street bike

2 lane. It's a huge improvement over
3 how the road used to be. Also here
4 to speak in support of Bill 250770,
5 authorizing automated speed cameras
6 on three additional corridors. And
7 finally, we urge Councilmembers to

9 to authorize a city a bike lane
10 around City Hall. Thank you for
11 your time.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. AJAMU-OSAGBORO:

14 Hotep after Huy(ph). My name is
15 General Muti. General is my title.
16 Muti Ajamu-Osagboro is my name. I
17 want to launch on 250303. It was
18 presented by Councilmember Thomas,
19 and my views are in no way a slight
20 to Member Thomas. The brother,
21 just didn't understand.

22 First and foremost, I
23 want to talk about maybe decades
24 ago I reached out to you,

3 then and I know you support now,
4 ending the sentence of death by
5 imprisonment for children. You was
6 the first one to come aboard. For

11 pole --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
13 JOHNSON: A House bill in 1999 I
14 introduced as a State

17 MR. AJAMU-OSAGBORO:
18 That's correct.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
20 JOHNSON: Providing individuals who
21 are serving a life sentence the
22 opportunity to come home for parole
23 before it was the actual popular
24 criminal justice reform thing to

2 do. Go ahead, sir.

3 MR. AJAMU-OSAGBORO:

4 Indeed. All right. So now, the
5 resolution I oppose vehemently
6 simply because it sets out to
7 reward some of them same judges who

9 death by imprisonment for children,
10 these are some of the same judges,
11 now we want to turn around and
12 reward them. They don't need to be
13 reward. They needed to be
14 excoriated because they made
15 Philadelphia the scourge of the
16 world.

17 Literally no hyperbole.

18 The United States was the number
19 one nation in the world, led the
20 world in sentencing children to
21 death by imprisonment.
22 Pennsylvania led America and
23 Philadelphia led Pennsylvania. And
24 then you stood against it and I

2 pray that you still stand with it.
3 And I never want to reward the
4 judges for doing what's wrong.
5 They made Philadelphia the scourge
6 of the world. Thank you for your
7 time.

8 (Applause.)

9 MR. JACKSON: Good
10 afternoon. My name is Cory
11 Jackson. I'm here to propose the
12 street renaming of 5100 block of
13 Master Street to Dr. Damone B.
14 Jones Way. Dr. Damone B. Jones is
15 a native of West Philadelphia and
16 has dedicated his life to the
17 betterment of the city of
18 Philadelphia, particularly the
19 youth, incarcerated individuals,
20 marginalized communities.

21 His commitment to
22 service, leadership and faith has
23 profoundly impacted the lives of
24 countless individuals. Dr. Jones

2 has served on numerous boards and
3 commissions appointed by local and
4 state leaders, including the
5 Philadelphia Board of Ethics and
6 the Pennsylvania Department of
7 Corrections Review Committee.

8 His leadership as a
9 Commissioner for the Review
10 Committee -- I mean, his leadership
11 as a Commissioner for the Upper
12 Darby Township Civil Service
13 Commission and the Mayor's
14 Commission on African American
15 Males highlights his unwavering
16 commitment to public service.
17 Dr. Jones is a true community
18 leader who has dedicated his life
19 to improving the lives of others.

20 The renaming of the 5100
21 block of Master Street to
22 Dr. Damone B. Jones Way would be a
23 lasting tribute to his tireless
24 efforts to uplift his community.

2 It would also serve as a reminder
3 to the current and future
4 generations that individuals from
5 the various streets of Philadelphia
6 can make a profound impact on
7 society through dedication, faith
8 and service. Thank you for your
9 time.

11 CHIEF CLERK: We have
12 Dan Becker and Corey Jackson.
13 Jordan Teicher.

14 (Witness approached
15 podium.)

16 MR. TEICHER: My name is
17 Jordan Teicher. I live in West
18 Philly at 50th in Larchwood. I'm
19 here to speak in support of Bill
20 No. 250712, regarding parking and
21 loading on 47th Street. 47th
22 Street's protected bike lane has
23 been lifechanging for me and my
24 family. I ride my 2-year-old son

2 to daycare at 42nd and Spruce every
3 weekday and I use the 47th Street
4 lane when riding him back home.

5 Riding a bike is the
6 fastest and cheapest way for us to
7 get to and from daycare, but it is
8 not always the safest. Almost
9 every time we're riding on a street
10 without a protected lane, a car
11 will speed past us, often mere
12 inches away from us. The only time
13 I know me and my son are truly safe
14 on the road is when we are in a
15 protected lane. I want to thank
16 Councilmember Gauthier for giving
17 me and so many others in the
18 neighborhood more opportunities to
19 travel safely in our community.

20 There's so much more to
21 do to make all of our streets safe
22 for everyone. So let's bring the
23 47th Street lane over the finish

17 Thank you so much,
18 Council President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilmember Nicolas O'Rourke.

23 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

2 There is a word today,

3 and today that word is root.

4 That's the theme I'm going with.

5 First, I want to start by

6 appreciating the presence and

7 attention of Quqadar(ph) Liam, a

8 student at CCP studying business.

9 He's here as a part of the

10 contingent of students that have

11 been learning what it's like to be

12 a legislator for the day, and it's

13 been quite a day.

14 I hope that he and his

15 classmates are enjoying their trip

16 to City Hall. I'm always going to

17 ride for the City's university. I

18 know Dr. Marshall has left, but it

19 is one of those institutions that

20 can transform the face of our city.

21 And I'm grateful for the roots that

22 it lays here in the City of

23 Philadelphia.

24 Further, I also want to

2 acknowledge the Watch Party that my
3 Leader has did a presentation on
4 honoring today, Watch Party PHL and
5 the Philadelphia Sisters. I know
6 that the roots for their effort and
7 for this effort are connected to
8 the massive tree that is Philly's
9 basketball, for the passion that
10 exists on our playgrounds, in our
11 high school gyms and world class
12 arenas, at our rec centers and on
13 our blocks.

14 I definitely join this
15 Council and this city in cherishing
16 that the girls and women of
17 Philadelphia are entering an era
18 where women's ball will not just
19 exist but it will flourish, and
20 that is very encouraging as we have
21 heard today during the
22 presentation.

23 I also want to
24 acknowledge that on Tuesday

2 D'Angelo, legendary musician, made
3 his transition Tuesday morning
4 while I was making phone calls
5 after a battle with pancreatic
6 cancer. He was 51 years old.
7 Already in the pantheon of Black
8 performers, he was one of the few
9 folks who really truly chose his
10 musicianship and his artistry over
11 the many commercial avenues that
12 were available to him as a leading
13 light in the industry.

14 Personal trauma played a
15 significant part. But he was
16 deeply deliberate about when and
17 how his music actually came out,
18 and he clearly denied any and all
19 pressures to rush his process. He
20 chose songwriting over hit-making.
21 And ironically, that made his work
22 timeless for many of us.

23 He was a preacher's kid.
24 Definitely grappled with the choice

2 to make music for popular
3 audiences. His parents were clear
4 about wanting him to use his gifts
5 for ministry, but he continually
6 pointed to the influence of his
7 grandmother Alberta Cox. And
8 though one of those church elders
9 who was a community of cornerstone,
10 she was clear with him that he
11 needed to follow his creative
12 vision, a critical sanction at that
13 point in his life.

14 As I said, he's already
15 in the pantheon of Black
16 performers. We can celebrate that
17 nothing about the man was a
18 performance or a put-on, as they
19 would say, in any way. If you
20 wanted something raw, sonically,
21 lyrically or personally, D'Angelo
22 was your man.

23 This loss actually hit
24 me a bit harder than I expected.

2 Maybe because it was sudden and
3 unexpected, maybe because the man
4 felt a bit like his music,
5 enigmatic, existential and
6 immortal. I'm still reeling a bit.
7 I'll be playing only him and Prince
8 until I'm not playing it. But I'm
9 also deeply grateful for how he
10 created another immortal moment in
11 song for our city. The song said,
12 "Let me tell you about this girl.
13 Maybe I shouldn't. Met her in
14 Philly. Her name was Brown Sugar."
15 Those that know, know. Legalize
16 it.

17 But in all seriousness,
18 not being from here he left an
19 indelible mark here and became a
20 pioneer of a genre here that he
21 never actually claimed. That's a
22 statement to his artistry. What a
23 life. Rest in power and sonic
24 bliss, Michael Archer.

2 On the cost of -- thank
3 you. On the Cost of Living Task
4 Force and the Affordable Philly Now
5 Initiative, I want to shout out
6 Members Thomas and Driscoll for
7 authorizing a hearing on what the
8 city can and can't do about the
9 rising costs of energy bills. It's
10 so on point. It's so timely, since
11 energy is just one of the ways that
12 working families are actually
13 feeling some economic pressure in
14 this moment. I'm excited to see
15 what we learn and ultimately to
16 incorporate it in the work of our
17 Cost of Living Task Force that we
18 just voted for.

19 We need an affordable
20 Philly. We need it now. And
21 efforts like this are a critical
22 step on the path to get us to be a
23 city where all of us can afford to
24 actually live here. Further, there

2 was an article that dropped in the
3 Inky this past week that a
4 colleague shared with me about
5 cost-burdened renters.

6 Some of the notes that
7 were in that was that almost half
8 renters -- half the city rents by
9 the way -- half of those renters
10 was about 149,000 households spent
11 35% or more of their income on
12 housing costs in 2024, a 4
13 percentage point increase over the
14 previous year according to the
15 Census Bureau data.

16 Also, HUD calls any
17 renter who spends more than 30% of
18 their income cost-burdened. I'll
19 say that again. HUD calls any
20 renter who spends more than 30% of
21 their income cost-burdened. They
22 also noted that seniors, fixed
23 incomes, are just not, "just not
24 keeping up with the rental market."

2 This is something that we ought to
3 know.

4 So this is one of the
5 many reasons why I was glad to
6 introduce the Philly Rent Refund
7 last week as a part of the
8 Affordable Philly Now Initiative.
9 That bill, unlike the Homestead
10 Exemption that Council President
11 and others have championed, doesn't
12 actually cover all tenants, right.
13 It doesn't even cover all cost-
14 burdened tenants, though that's
15 something to think about.

16 It does focus on the
17 seniors, the widows and the
18 differently-abled persons on fixed
19 income who too often find
20 themselves in the scenarios that
21 the Inquirer's article actually
22 described. So we've seen the
23 signs. We've heard the chance
24 about funding levels for lower-

2 income tenants in the H.O.M.E.

3 Initiative, especially with

4 articles like this dropping that

5 make the immediacy of the crisis so

6 clear.

7 I do hope and I do

8 believe, and I feel like I'm

9 finding it already that this body

10 is ready to truly materially answer

11 the call coming from our

12 constituents who rant, organized

13 and unorganized.

14 Thank you, Council

15 President.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

19 ACTING COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Are there any speeches on

21 the part of the Majority?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes

24 Councilmember Cindy Bass.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 I just wanted to make a
5 mention of the bill that we
6 introduced today around catalytic
7 converter theft. I first
8 introduced a bill in 2022
9 addressing a critical issue that
10 has deeply impacted our community,
11 catalytic converter theft. I'm
12 here to touch up on that ordinance
13 that will cover a loophole and
14 increase penalties to deter this
15 destructive and costly crime.

16 For those that don't
17 know, catalytic converters are
18 essential components of our
19 vehicles designed to reduce harmful
20 emissions. They are also a prime
21 target for thieves because of the
22 valuable metals inside. What is
23 particularly alarming is the method
24 some criminals use. They steal

2 these converters, dismantle them
3 and sell the parts separately,
4 often reassembling them for resale.
5 This practice not only fuels an
6 underground market, but also
7 undermines our effort to keep our
8 streets and neighborhoods safe.

9 The core of our new
10 ordinance is simple but powerful.
11 We are increasing the penalties for
12 catalytic converter theft. This
13 increase is designed so that the
14 cost to sell a stolen catalytic
15 converter will now be higher than
16 the cost to repair the damage
17 caused. Our goal remains clear, to
18 remove any financial incentive for
19 stealing these vital parts.

20 Why do we believe this
21 will work? Well, the evidence is
22 clear. According to the PPD,
23 findings reveal a striking
24 reduction in these crimes following

1 10/16/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 our previous legislative efforts.
3 And between January 16, 2022 and
4 January 15, 2023, one year, the
5 year before the enactment of Bill
6 No. 220923, there were 5,919
7 reported incidents of catalytic
8 converter thefts or attempted
9 thefts.

10 But in the year that
11 followed the bill's enactment, from
12 January 16, 2023 to January 15,
13 2024, that number dropped
14 dramatically to 1,452. This 75%
15 reduction proves that targeted
16 legislation and increased penalties
17 work. But the fight is not over.
18 Criminals are adaptive and we must
19 be one step ahead.

20 So today with this
21 ordinance we are doubling down on
22 our commitment to protecting
23 Philadelphia residents and their
24 property. We are sending a strong

2 message that catalytic converter
3 theft will not be tolerated. We
4 will continue to work closely with
5 law enforcement, community
6 organizations and industry partners
7 to enforce this law and safeguard
8 our city.

9 And one last thing, I do
10 want to give a brief shout-out --
11 well, first, I want to thank my
12 colleagues Councilmember Jamie
13 Gauthier and also Councilmember
14 Curtis Jones for their recognition
15 of the importance of boxing in the
16 boxing industry here in the city of
17 Philadelphia.

18 And I want to give a
19 shout-out to the one and only Boots
20 Ennis from Brickyard, in Germantown
21 for those who don't know. But
22 Boots Ennis won his fight last
23 Saturday night in 1 minute and 58
24 seconds, first round knockout and

2 doing what he does. He's just an
3 amazing young man representing our
4 communities well. And so, shout-
5 out to Boots.

6 Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: You're welcome.
10 Congratulations, Boots Ennis.

11 Councilmember Dr. Nina
12 Ahmad.

13 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

14 Thank you, Council President. And
15 thank you to my colleagues for
16 passing my legislation to make
17 voter registration easier for
18 Philadelphians.

19 I'll save the details
20 for the press conference
21 immediately following this Council
22 session in the hallway in front of
23 Room 405. In short, the bill meets
24 people where they are and makes

2 updating registration easy when
3 people move in the city.

4 I'm also pleased that
5 the Economic Opportunity Review
6 Committee, EORC, bill was reported
7 out of committee to the full
8 Council with a favorable
9 recommendation. This bill
10 strengthens the EORC's ability to
11 do its job by bringing in more
12 perspectives, including the Asian
13 American and the LGBTQ+ Chambers
14 without weakening standards or
15 transparency.

16 As you know, over the
17 past few months I have held two
18 hearings on DHS practices and
19 hosted a town hall. I learned a
20 lot from those sessions. As I
21 prepare legislation to further
22 protect child welfare, it's
23 important we center children's
24 well-being. That's why I am proud

2 that Council adopted my resolution
3 recognizing October as Children's
4 Health Month.

5 Kids are growing. So
6 what they breathe and drink shows
7 up in how they sleep, learn and
8 feel. Our commitment is practical.
9 Fresh air in classrooms, clean
10 drinking water, safe homes free of
11 feeling paint and damp corners,
12 checkups kept, vaccines on
13 schedule, hot lunches that carry
14 students through the day and help
15 that's easy to reach when a child
16 needs to talk to someone.

17 Finally, I want to thank
18 my legislator for the day for
19 joining me, Nevaeh Mitchell, a
20 Behavioral Health and Human
21 Services major at Community College
22 of Philadelphia, who loves writing,
23 photography, nature walks and
24 community engagement. Thank you,

2 Nevaeh.

3 And thank you, Council

4 President. I yield back.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: You're welcome. Good

7 job.

8 Chair recognizes

9 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

10 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good

11 afternoon. Thank you, Council

12 President.

13 First and foremost, I

14 want to say thank you to my

15 colleagues Councilmember Mark

16 Squilla, Councilmember Jeffrey Jay

17 Young, Councilmember Jamie

18 Gauthier, Councilmember Mike

19 Driscoll as well as Councilmember

20 Gilmore Richardson and of course,

21 your support, Council President. I

22 know yesterday was a very eventful

23 hearing as it relates to our

24 security guard legislation. I

2 appreciate your support and your
3 vote of confidence and making sure
4 that we handle that legislation in
5 the right way.

6 So first and foremost
7 thank you, colleagues. That bill
8 is actually a series of bills and
9 resolutions that I've introduced in
10 the last couple of weeks to really
11 make sure that we are focused on
12 2026 and to make sure that we are
13 taking the necessary steps as a
14 legislative body doing our due
15 diligence to put us in a position
16 to have the best possible year we
17 can.

18 Outside of just the
19 security guard bill legislation
20 looking at safety, today I
21 introduced a bill around third-
22 party reservations. If you are a
23 food person like me that recognize
24 the great restaurants in the city

2 of Philadelphia, you understand
3 there's a unique trend happening
4 where people are making
5 reservations at restaurants and not
6 necessarily fulfilling them.

7 In the midst of dialogue
8 with the restaurant and hospitality
9 industry in preparation for next
10 year, this is one of the things
11 that they actually asked us to do
12 and asked us to look at in order to
13 assure that they're able to
14 maximize their ability to service
15 all of the people who are coming to
16 city of Philadelphia next year. So
17 I look forward to working with my
18 colleagues as well as the
19 hospitality industry to address
20 this issue around third-party
21 reservations. I'm glad that other
22 cities have already done it. It
23 puts us in a position to be able to
24 show that there's precedent.

2 We also introduced
3 resolutions around traffic. I
4 think that pretty much speaks for
5 itself, especially anybody who
6 doesn't live in the area of Center
7 City and has to come to City Hall
8 on a consistent basis. Thinking
9 about my Councilperson in the 9th
10 District, we have a pretty long
11 commute on a consistent basis and
12 we understand the traffic issues
13 are already significant right now,
14 so imagine what they're going to be
15 next year. So I'm looking forward
16 to working with the Admin on that
17 particular initiative.

18 And of course, there's a
19 concern and a conversation needed
20 around short-term rentals. Now,
21 Council President, when it comes to
22 short-term rentals I want to be
23 honest, I don't have the solution.
24 I'm not sure what we should do, but

2 I do think it's worth a
3 conversation.

4 I was at an event with
5 Councilmember Gauthier, and I
6 listened to residents in her
7 District talk about the fact that
8 they want to spend June traveling
9 across the world, but they also
10 have benefited from the leadership
11 that this legislative body have
12 showed when it comes to homeowner
13 protection programs like the Senior
14 Tax Freeze, LOOP and Homestead,
15 things that you've championed
16 yourself, Council President. And
17 we don't want the same people who
18 we're trying to protect to be put
19 in a position to be ineligible for
20 those programs because they decided
21 to travel for a month or a couple
22 of weeks while all these people are
23 visiting Philadelphia and they
24 rented their house and there's

2 unintended consequences when we
3 don't do our due diligence and get
4 out in front of these issues. So
5 those four different bills
6 specifically relate to 2026 and
7 getting us ready for 2026. And I
8 appreciate all of my colleagues who
9 co-sponsored those specific
10 resolutions and bills.

11 As I close out, I also
12 want to again take a moment to
13 thank Councilmember Driscoll and
14 his leadership, partnering with
15 him, to assess the cost, the rising
16 cost of energy in the city of
17 Philadelphia. I know Councilmember
18 O'Rourke is looking at
19 affordability in general. But I'll
20 be honest. You know, I think
21 people need to understand that our
22 energy bills are going up too.
23 It's not just them.

24 This is not a decision

1 10/16/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 that Philadelphia government is
3 making. We do not have a direct
4 impact on some of the issues that
5 we're seeing around energy bills.
6 And I'm pretty sure if you pull 17
7 out of 17 members of City Council,
8 we're paying more in energy as it
9 relates to our utility bills just
10 like the rest of the citizens of
11 Philadelphia. And we need to
12 figure out what can we do to curve
13 despite what's happening right now.
14 Because I would hate to look up in
15 a year or two and be paying \$1,000
16 a month in utility bills. I can't
17 afford it and I'm sure most
18 Philadelphians can't afford it.
19 I want to close out,
20 Council President, actually by
21 thanking you for your leadership.
22 Today I introduced a resolution to
23 examine the school closure process.
24 We understand that that decision is

2 going to be made very soon. And I
3 think it's important that members
4 who are especially not on the
5 Education Committee and our
6 District Councilmembers get an
7 opportunity to not just weigh in as
8 it relates to the direction we're
9 going with school facilities, but
10 also we need to give the public an
11 opportunity to communicate to this
12 legislative body what their opinion
13 is.

14 And so, I look forward
15 to that resolution turning into a
16 hearing based on your leadership,
17 Council President. I'm looking
18 forward to that being a Committee
19 of the Whole hearing so it can give
20 everybody an opportunity to get a
21 bite at the apple to be able to
22 communicate our opinion, not just
23 as residents, not just as parents,
24 not just as stakeholders but as the

2 people who devote on what amount of
3 money should actually go to the
4 School District of Philadelphia.

5 So thank you for your
6 leadership, Council President. And
7 thank you to all the members of
8 City Council who co-sponsored that
9 resolution as well as all of the
10 members who are on the Education
11 Committee that's been working on
12 this issue for some time.

13 Thank you, Council
14 President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member Thomas.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Curtis Jones, Jr,

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
20 you, Mr. President and colleagues.

21 Couple of quick shout-
22 outs because I didn't get to do it
23 last week. First goes to Jamie
24 Gauthier, who quite frankly

2 surprised me. I turned on the T.V.
3 and she's taking over a drug
4 corner, captain of the block. I
5 mean, like out there and chasing
6 away negative elements that border
7 my district but she represents.
8 And I was never so proud of my
9 little sisters when they get tough
10 and I've seen them on occasion do
11 that. So shout-out to you.

12 And I want to welcome
13 back Nicolas O'Rourke. We did miss
14 you. I was listening to your
15 speech in -- I said, that's what
16 I've been missing in here. So
17 welcome back. But also thank you
18 for coming out to the 1300 block of
19 Fraizer last week where we
20 dedicated 10 new houses that were
21 totally repaired. And it ranged
22 from people who were low income to
23 workforce development folks who had
24 civil service jobs that just

2 couldn't get ahead of their bills
3 to be able to fix their furnace, to
4 be able to fix their roof.

5 And this program, along
6 with the cooperation of Wells
7 Fargo, is maintaining the glue of a
8 neighborhood so it doesn't convert
9 strictly to rental, that
10 homeownership can be preserved.

11 Thank you for being on the block
12 with me, Member O'Rourke.

13 But I want to also shout
14 out, and this will lead into my
15 true comments, Isaiah Thomas for
16 his focus on 2026 and all of the
17 things that can potentially go
18 right for our city. I've got
19 people from around the globe
20 contacting me and saying, you know,
21 I need to come and be a part of the
22 hundreds of events, local, national
23 and district events that are going
24 to happen next year. And I'm

2 excited about -- I'm feeling kind
3 of patriotic about next year.

4 However and

5 nevertheless, we always got to be
6 prepared in this town for Plan B.

7 And I beseech you, President

8 Johnson. I didn't introduce a

9 resolution on it because I'd rather

10 you take the lead on a -- not a

11 special committee, but at least a

12 work group to work with the

13 Administration, because I sense

14 with the little hairs on the back

15 of my neck that when you have

16 somebody in the White House that

17 reminds me a little bit of Dennis

18 the Menace, like they could go this

19 way, they could go that way, I

20 mean, you don't know what this

21 person will do.

22 One day they wake up at

23 3:00 in the morning and you're all

24 right. The next day they wake up

1 10/16/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 at 3:00 in the morning and they're
3 sending angry tweets and troops,
4 the military, to a town near you.
5 And a lot of people will say, well,
6 you know, and thank God for my
7 Mayor who knows how to keep that at
8 bay, say the right things and do
9 the right things so that we don't
10 get a \$2 billion hit over the head.
11 I get it.

12 But what happens if he
13 wakes up and says, bad things
14 happen in Philadelphia and without
15 any quantitative analysis, without
16 any true justification decide I'm
17 sending people to Kensington. We
18 need to know how we as a government
19 are going to react to that, how we
20 can preserve peace in our streets
21 and have a Plan B, if you would, if
22 he wakes up and starts sending
23 angry tweets and troops.

24 So I'd like you, if you

1 10/16/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 would take the lead, Mr. President,
3 to work with our Mayor. I don't
4 want it all public, because
5 everybody don't need to know
6 everything, the plan, per se. And
7 I trust the leadership of this city
8 to put together a plan that says in
9 case of Trump, break glass, this is
10 what we gonna do.

11 Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
14 JOHNSON: Break glass. Thank you,
15 Member Jones. Appreciate you in
16 this very serious matter.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Rue Landau.

19 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:
20 Thank you, Council President. I
21 think the glass is broken so let's
22 start moving. Okay. Thank you,
23 colleague. I think you're right on
24 point here.

2 First, I want to thank
3 everybody who was able to make it
4 to my Tech Committee, to our Tech
5 Committee hearing yesterday on AI
6 and government. It was an
7 eye-opening discussion, left us
8 with a lot more areas to explore
9 and discussions to be had, but I
10 think we all left there knowing how
11 important that conversation was and
12 knowing where we need to go going
13 forward.

14 I also introduced three
15 resolutions today celebrating the
16 anniversaries of three awesome
17 organizations in Philly doing
18 incredible work. First, I was so
19 happy to honor 25 years of Young
20 Involved Philadelphia. YIP's
21 commitment to increasing civic
22 engagement and fostering leadership
23 development empowers the next
24 generation of professionals.

2 As long-time advocates
3 and elected officials, we might
4 forget what it's like to be one of
5 those young, eager people trying to
6 get involved and uplift their
7 community, but these young
8 Philadelphians are a reminder that
9 we need to keep pushing to create a
10 better, brighter future. Thank you
11 for 25 years of amazing service.

12 I also, along with
13 Councilmembers Quetcy Lozada and
14 Isaiah Thomas, recognized the 25th
15 anniversary of La Liga del Barrio,
16 the city's first Latino youth
17 organization youth basketball
18 league. By providing opportunities
19 for Latino youth in Philadelphia
20 with outlets for educational,
21 athletic and personal development,
22 the team provides a supportive
23 environment for young adults and
24 kids to thrive.

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2 I want to give a shout-
3 out to Ray and Esther Alvarez who
4 had to leave before public comment.
5 They are the founders of La Liga.
6 I have known them my entire
7 professional life. They are like
8 family to me. I am so amazingly
9 proud of them and for the 25 years
10 that they have put into La Liga.

11 I also introduced a
12 resolution celebrating 20 years of
13 BalletX right in Council
14 President's District, which has
15 greatly enriched the cultural life
16 of Philadelphia by virtue of its
17 inventive, expressive and
18 contemporary performances.

19 In 2005, its founders
20 created something more creative and
21 expansive than traditional ballet.
22 Today it serves as a leader
23 nationally and internationally for
24 its innovative programming and

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2 artistic excellence. Thank you for
3 making Philadelphia more beautiful
4 for the last 20 years. Super proud
5 of all of them.

6 Thank you, Council
7 President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Thank you.

10 The Chair recognizes
11 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

13 Thank you, Council President.

14 First, I want to take an
15 opportunity to acknowledge my
16 legislator for a day, CCP student
17 Olivia. It's been great to have
18 her here even for a short time.
19 Her energy and her poise just
20 shines through. And I am glad to
21 hear that she's considering going
22 into urban studies.

23 And next, I just wanted
24 to invite everyone to a briefing

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2 right after Council by the Office
3 of the Youth Ombudsperson that will
4 be held in the Caucus Room. For
5 those that don't know, the office
6 provides oversight for youth
7 residential placement facilities,
8 including juvenile detention,
9 foster group homes and inpatient
10 psychiatric facilities.

11 And so, this is a great
12 chance to learn about one of the
13 tools our city has to provide
14 oversight over these facilities and
15 to support our young people and
16 ensure that they're being cared for
17 well, and there will be tasty
18 lunch. So I hope that's an extra
19 incentive.

20 Thank you so much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: They got vegan?

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

2 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
3 you, Mr. President.

4 I would like to also
5 recognize my legislator for the
6 day, CCP student Selena Ryland.
7 You know, it was a pleasure getting
8 to know her today, just walking in
9 the hallways with her energy. We
10 were already vibing and she
11 understands the things that we go
12 through sitting in this chamber
13 when we got to do the public
14 comment. So I want to thank you
15 again, Selena, for being here
16 today.

17 I want to also on the
18 same note thank CCP for being here,
19 for always being here. For me
20 personally, whenever we need an
21 event at CCP they always come
22 through. So of course, I wanted to
23 honor them on their 60th
24 anniversary. We've had Community

2 College in this city for 60 years,
3 and I know myself and other
4 colleagues are wishing and hoping
5 that we can make Community College
6 free for every single individual in
7 the city of Philadelphia. And so,
8 we're going to continue to be
9 working on that issue.

10 Also, I introduced a
11 resolution today honoring
12 Manufacturing Month. I know folks
13 like to think manufacturing is a
14 lost industry, but here in the city
15 of Philadelphia we have to think
16 about our diversity when it comes
17 to manufacturing. We got to think
18 about the pharmaceutical industries
19 and how much they're producing in
20 the city, the biotech industry, how
21 much they're producing in the city.
22 The FMCs here in the city with the
23 chemical manufacturing. So there
24 are a lot of opportunities in

2 manufacturing in this city that we
3 provide livable jobs, family-
4 sustaining jobs. We have to keep
5 promoting that to our constituents
6 to ensure that they can continue to
7 afford to live in the city of
8 Philadelphia.

9 And on that same note
10 with affordability, today we
11 introduced a bill that would
12 essentially eliminate late fees for
13 residential customers on your water
14 bills, right, because we
15 understand, as other members today
16 have been talking about, how energy
17 and utility costs have been rising
18 across the country and in the city
19 specifically.

20 We can do something
21 about that because we own our water
22 system here. So in order to allow
23 our residents to just be able to
24 live a little bit more free in this

2 city, this bill will enable
3 residential customers the right to
4 avoid paying late fees and
5 penalties on your water bill
6 because we have to make sure that
7 this city is affordable for the
8 people who live in this city.

9 It doesn't mean you
10 don't have to pay your water bill,
11 all right, but we want to make sure
12 that we are providing a level of
13 service that the city residents can
14 really appreciate. And we want to
15 again keep their costs down as much
16 as possible as other costs are
17 continuing to rise in the city.

18 And lastly,
19 Mr. President, I'd be remiss if I
20 do not honor and thank my friend
21 Jenaye Munford. I've known Jenaye
22 since I was an intern in the John
23 Street administration. My son
24 calls her daughter his big cousin.

2 And I'm going to miss her in these
3 halls, but I'm going to be able to
4 continue to work with her as she go
5 work at my alma mater.

6 So, Jenaye, I look
7 forward to working with you in your
8 next capacity.

9 Thank you,
10 Mr. President.

12 JOHNSON: And you actually are also
13 one of the trustees on the Board,
14 correct?

15 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Yes,
16 sir, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: Yeah. And you will be
19 overseeing her in the whole
20 operation.

21 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Yes,
22 sir.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: Good job.

2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

4 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 It's been a long day, so
7 I'm going to try to keep it short,
8 but several things. I also want to
9 recognize my legislator for the
10 day, Jules. Thank you for being
11 with us today. I hope that you
12 have watched your government at
13 work and that you take an
14 additional interest in continuing
15 to work and ensure that young
16 people like you get civically
17 engaged and stay engaged in what is
18 happening in their communities. So
19 thank you for being with us.

20 As we continue to
21 enthusiastically have conversation
22 about 2026, I want to make sure
23 that I continue to speak about the
24 importance of public safety in

2 neighborhoods like mine that have
3 been under the international
4 spotlight as it relates to the
5 opioid crisis.

6 And so, I'm asking all
7 of my colleagues that when you are
8 in rooms and conversations are
9 happening about 2026, that you
10 elevate the importance of public
11 safety in neighborhoods like
12 Kensington so that we don't create
13 situations where people are curious
14 and they come into the community
15 because they want to see and
16 experience what they're seeing
17 online and either caught up in the
18 spiral of addiction because they've
19 tried something and understand how
20 powerful and potent it was and end
21 up being stuck here in our city or
22 because they put themselves in a
23 situation where they put their cell
24 phones up because they wanted to be

2 a part of that video-sharing world
3 and find themselves in a safety
4 situation because someone was upset
5 about them recording.

6 And so, please as you
7 continue to have conversations
8 about 2026, public safety in the
9 Kensington community is extremely
10 important. And so, I ask you to
11 support me and my constituency in
12 ensuring that we pay special
13 attention to that neighborhood.

14 In addition to that, I'd
15 like to thank Minority Leader
16 Brooks for co-sponsoring the
17 resolution honoring recognizing
18 October as Domestic Violence
19 Awareness Month in the city of
20 Philadelphia. Domestic violence is
21 not a distant issue. It is a
22 pervasive reality that affects
23 individuals across all walks of
24 life. It transcends race, gender,

2 age and social economic status.

3 Yet certain communities

4 bear a disproportionate burden.

5 Women, particularly women of color,

6 are more likely to experience

7 intimate partner violence. In

8 Philadelphia where diversity is our

9 strength, we must acknowledge that

10 silence is not an option.

11 This resolution reflects

12 a spirit that refuses to accept

13 violence as a norm and instead

14 chooses compassion, support and

15 justice. Today we also acknowledge

16 Paint Philly Purple Day, driven by

17 our incredible, dedicated partners

18 who were with us today and who are

19 on the front lines of advocacy for

20 survivors every day.

21 Thank you to my

22 colleagues for acknowledging them

23 in our chambers. To my colleagues,

24 thank you for wearing purple today.

2 You all look amazing. And as part
3 of this initiative, we're asking
4 you to do more. And so, the call
5 to action is to take a selfie, post
6 it and share domestic violence
7 resources or a supportive message
8 with the #paintphillypurple. Tag
9 @phillyodvs.

10 I'd also like us not to
11 wait for another tragedy to remind
12 us of the urgency of this issue.
13 We can start conversations now and
14 reaffirm our commitment to creating
15 a Philadelphia that is free from
16 the shadows of domestic violence, a
17 Philadelphia where love, respect
18 and dignity are the foundations
19 upon which we build our future.

20 Thank you so much,
21 Council President.

23 JOHNSON: Thank you very much,
24 Member Lozada.

2 And last but not least,
3 Councilmember Dr. Anthony Phillips.

4 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 I just want to remind
7 the residents of the 9th District
8 that we are having a senior
9 breakfast and bingo this Saturday
10 from 9:00 to 12:00 p.m. at the
11 Findlay Recreation Center located
12 at 7701 Mansfield Avenue. That is
13 for all of our adult citizens.
14 There will be line dancing, bingo
15 and a great breakfast and 30-plus
16 resources for them to explore this
17 Saturday, October 18th from 9:00 to
18 12:00 p.m.

19 I also just want to
20 thank all of our colleagues who
21 supported Ms. Munford and the work
22 that she's been doing in the city
23 of Philadelphia. We don't often
24 have colleagues that are often like

2 Ms. Munford, who are always trying
3 their best to solve issues. I just
4 want to briefly say something to
5 why we wanted to honor Ms. Munford.

6 Jenaye Munford
7 represents somebody that is smart,
8 but she's always thinking outside
9 of the box of how to get things
10 done. One of the reasons why and
11 the main reason, the main reason
12 why I really wanted to -- it was
13 thankful to take on this role on
14 City Council because I do not like
15 bureaucracy. And just for everyone
16 to understand what bureaucracy is,
17 it is a hierarchy, there are strict
18 rules that are often impersonal and
19 overly rigid.

20 Jenaye Munford did not
21 does not represent that, and that's
22 why I champion her today. But
23 there is a department and there's
24 several departments in the city of

2 Philadelphia that have leadership
3 that represents bureaucracy. And
4 the Philadelphia Water Department
5 is one of them.

6 I've had the worst
7 experience with bureaucracy with
8 the leadership of the Philadelphia
9 Water Department, and it takes a
10 lot for me to get this way. I
11 don't get frustrated very easily.
12 I'm normally cool, calm, but
13 something about bureaucracy rouse
14 me up.

15 A few weeks ago back on
16 September 24th, I got notice from
17 neighbors in Philadelphia probably
18 around August that the reservoir in
19 East Oak Lane had rubbish, trash,
20 landscaping issues, weeds all
21 around this fence. And so, the
22 neighbors said, why don't we just
23 find a way to get the Water
24 Department, they're responsible for

2 that reservoir, to clean it up.

3 So I'm like, it's a

4 simple landscaping issue, go out

5 and fix it. So I make the call. I

6 think it's going to be done within

7 a few weeks, few days or so. It is

8 now October 16th and we still have

9 no resolution to a simple

10 landscaping issue.

11 The Mayor of the City of

12 Philadelphia has been pressing the

13 importance of being clean and

14 green. Meanwhile, one of the

15 largest revenue agencies in the

16 city of Philadelphia, in his

17 leadership having spoken to the

18 Commissioner several times, has

19 found a way to make a landscaping

20 issue complicated.

21 Their response, well, we

22 have to go through Procurement,

23 there's a financial person that we

24 need to talk to, we got to find the

2 right person to manage it. There
3 are thousands of landscapers in the
4 city of Philadelphia that can go
5 out and clean rubbish, weeds off of
6 a fence. And that leads me to
7 think about all the other issues
8 that I've kindly been, you know,
9 talking to them about.

10 We had to have a whole
11 community meeting about lack of
12 response from the Water Department
13 in West Oak Lane for something and
14 their confusion about a year ago.
15 At first I said maybe that was
16 something that was normal, we just
17 needed to do it. But now, I'm
18 starting to realize that if you
19 can't solve a landscaping issue
20 with all the type of leadership
21 that you have and the type of
22 people that you have in that
23 department, all the other issues
24 that you make complicated aren't

2 really that complicated.

3 And in addition to that,
4 every time I go to community
5 meetings I hear about the Water
6 Department's lack of care for our
7 community. They're leaving debris,
8 trash around all -- and they're not
9 getting their projects done in a
10 timely fashion. Things that would
11 not be acceptable in Bucks County
12 or even Montgomery County, we are
13 allowing to happen here in the city
14 of Philadelphia.

15 I gave the Commissioner
16 from September 24th. Now, it's
17 October 16th and he has still not
18 addressed this issue in the East
19 Oak Lane, Olney area of
20 Philadelphia. That is not clean or
21 green and it tells me everything
22 that I need to know about the lack
23 of efficiency of the Philadelphia
24 Water Department.

2 I want you all to know
3 that there's something about
4 bureaucracy that just gets me riled
5 up, and the Philadelphia Water
6 Department is a poor example of
7 leadership and it needs to be
8 addressed. I'm not going to let
9 this one go. It is not going to be
10 okay. They have to fix this issue
11 because our neighbors in East Oak
12 Lane and Olney should not be crying
13 and yelling about an issue that
14 they have to deal with since July,
15 since July. It's unacceptable.

16 And when I called him
17 the other day, he said, oh, I'm
18 going to go check it out. What do
19 you mean you're checking it out
20 just now? Get to it. It's
21 unacceptable. I do not like people
22 who do not think outside of the box
23 and to get things done.

24 Thank you, Council

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: Shh, y'all in here making
6 all that noise.

7 Good job, Member

8 Dr. Phillips. But could the press,
9 could y'all respect the body and
10 keep it down a little bit? We know
11 y'all control the narrative, but we
12 still got business to do.

13 Very well said, sir.

14 Hopefully, they'll cover it for
15 you. The Water Department

16 Commissioner, he's not doing his
17 job in East Oak Lane and Olney.

18 And maybe it's like 10 of y'all
19 over there, can cover it and give
20 Member Dr. Phillips some support.

21 I want to take a moment
22 to acknowledge the young man
23 shadowing me today from Community
24 College, Dajuan Wortham. Can we

2 give him a round of applause. I
3 think he did a good job.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: And to all the students
7 from Community College taking time
8 off from their schedule today to
9 see democracy in action. And I
10 applaud them for making the choice
11 to be at the right place at the
12 right time because you don't have
13 to be here. They can be somewhere
14 else doing something else.

15 I also want to take a
16 moment to acknowledge the guest
17 commentator for WURD today,
18 Ms. Thera Martin. We thank you for
19 covering City Council today.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: We know all your hard
23 work that you do in the area of
24 journalism and radio. So thank you

2 for being the guest commentator for
3 WURD covering us today.

4 At this moment, I want

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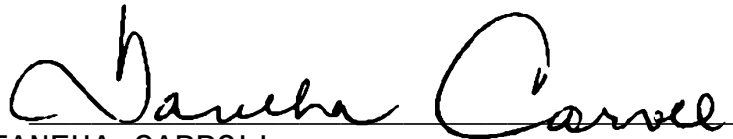
