2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Good morning, everyone. Good
4 morning, everyone.

5 (Good morning.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 I note that the hour has come and
8 that a quorum of City Council is
9 present. This Council is now
10 coming to order.

11 Will all members please
12 take your seats. All visitors
13 please retire to your seats outside
14 the rails. And before proceeding,
15 I will ask all those present to
16 please place your cell phones on
17 silent or vibrate and please take
18 any sidebar conversations outside
19 of the Council chambers.

20 To give our invocation this
21 morning, the Chair has the distinct
22 honor and privilege of recognizing
23 the Reverend Mark Tyler of the
24 historical African American Mother
25 Bethel African Methodist Episcopal

2 Church. He is here today as the
3 guest of Councilmember Landau.

4 I will ask all members and
5 guests to please rise.

6 (Councilmembers, guests and
7 visitors rise.)

8 REV. DR. TYLER: Morning.
9 (Morning.)

10 REV. DR. TYLER: Let us
11 pray.

12 The hymn writer penned the
13 words God of grace, God of glory on
14 thy people, pour thy power. He
15 went on to write later, Grant us
16 courage, grant us wisdom for the
17 facing of this hour. Grant us
18 courage, grant us wisdom for the
19 facing of this hour. This is our
20 prayer for this Philadelphia City
21 Council on this day. Grant them
22 courage, grant them wisdom for the
23 facing of this hour.

24 For God in this hour, we
25 find ourselves tested once again.

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2 In this hour, democracy is
3 literally on the ballot. It's
4 filled our people with so much
5 anxiety as some try to roll back
6 the hands of time and even go as
7 far as to threaten the use of the
8 American military against
9 dissenting American citizens.

10 We need you in this hour.
11 In this hour even locally we need
12 you for there are far too many
13 parents who wake up this morning
14 grieving the loss of a child due to
15 gun violence. We need you in this
16 hour to fill us with grace, with
17 courage, with wisdom for we need a
18 comprehensive new vision of public
19 safety that goes beyond throwing
20 people away and tossing away the
21 key.

22 In this hour, God, someone
23 is literally sleeping outside as
24 the temperatures dip close to
25 freezing. We need you in this

2 hour. We need you as visitors that
3 come to our city who don't have the
4 luxury of flying in or taking
5 Amtrak but on Greyhound buses and
6 can't find a warm place to rest.
7 We need you in this hour.

8 We need moral development
9 that finds a way to develop and not
10 displace existing communities. We
11 need you, God, because someone
12 still lives even in this city in
13 fear of racism, sexism, homophobia,
14 xenophobia. And then in this hour
15 on this special day, we pause in
16 these chambers to recognize victims
17 of domestic violence. And so,
18 those of us who are standing need
19 the courage to confront even our
20 loved ones who are often the
21 perpetrators to bring an end to
22 this disease.

23 And so, God, now in this
24 hour give our Council President,
25 give every District Councilmember,

3 every staff member, every intern,
4 every volunteer and, in fact, every
5 citizen in this city that we love
6 so much the courage and wisdom to
7 face, to meet and to excel in this
8 hour.

9 Finally, God, help us to
10 see as you see. Expose the myth
11 and lie of scarcity, that there's
12 only so much to go around. Expose
13 it by showing us instead your
14 infinite abundance and possibility.
15 Let your abundance fall in this
16 city until every child has a
17 quality seat in every school,
18 public charter or private.

19 Let your abundance fall
20 until every citizen has a living-
21 wage job and everyone has a roof
22 overhead and a refrigerator that is
23 full, that everyone has a
24 retirement that is fully-funded,
25 that everyone has health care. In

2 fact, God, let your abundance fall
3 so much that every neighborhood
4 looks like Chestnut Hill, that
5 every neighborhood looks like
6 Society Hill, that every

9 and then we'll give your name the
10 praise. Send your name that we ask
11 it all.

12 Amen.

13 (Amen.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

15 The Chair thanks the Reverend Mark
16 Tyler for his invocation.

17 Council will now be at
18 ease.

19 (Council at ease.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 The next order of business is the

11 The Chair recognizes

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: There
14 are no leaves of absence today,
15 Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 The Chair thanks the Councilmember.

18 The Chair now recognizes
19 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson
20 for a motion regarding certain
21 legislative matters that may arise
22 during the course of today's
23 session of Council and that were
24 not listed on the Calendar
25 circulated prior to today's

3 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

4 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President.

6 I move that any of the
7 following matters, if considered
8 today, may be added to the agenda

10 required by law, subsequently
11 published on an amended agenda
12 after the consideration of those
13 matters: resolutions authorizing
14 hearings, amendments to bills on

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 It has been moved and properly
14 seconded that the legislative
15 matters stated by Councilmember
16 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson
17 may be added to the agenda for
18 today should those matters arise
19 during the course of this session
20 of Council.

21 All those in favor will
22 signify by saying aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

25 Those opposed?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 The ayes have it and the motion
5 carries.

6 The Chair will dispense
7 with the regular order of business
8 to recognize the guests and
9 visitors joining us in chambers
10 this morning.

11 On behalf of all members of
12 City Council, I welcome you to our
13 Council session. We appreciate
14 your taking the time to join us as
15 we attend to the legislative
16 affairs of our city. We certainly
17 invite you to come again.

18 The Chair also recognizes
19 the presence of Councilmember Mark
20 Squilla.

21 At this time the Chair
22 recognizes Deputy Whip
23 Councilmember Cindy Bass who will
24 present a resolution honoring and
25 recognizing the distinguished

2 Reverend Dr. Alyn E. Waller on his
3 30th Pastoral Anniversary and
4 loyal and dedicated service to God,
5 his church, humanity and the city
6 of Philadelphia.

7 Would Reverend Dr. Alyn
8 Waller and those accompanying him
9 please join the Councilmember at
10 the podium. Joining Councilmember
11 Bass will be Councilmember Nina
12 Ahmad, Majority Leader Gilmore
13 Richardson, Councilmember O'Neill,
14 Minority Deputy Whip O'Rourke,
15 Councilmember Phillips, Minority
16 Deputy Leader Councilmember Brooks,
17 Councilmember Thomas, Majority
18 Whip --

19 (Everybody.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 No, that ain't everybody. And
22 also, Councilwoman Jamie Gauthier.

23 We can begin. The Chair
24 recognizes Councilmember Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank

2 you, Mr. President.

3 Well, good morning,
4 everyone. Thank you so much for
5 being here today. And it's really
6 truly an honor for me to be able to
7 present this to my pastor, really
8 everybody's pastor, Pastor Alyn E.
9 Waller. And also, I wanted to take
10 a moment really quickly to
11 recognize Sister Ellyn Jo Waller.

12 The two of them have really
13 been so significant in the lives of
14 so many Philadelphians, including
15 myself, and not just as advisors
16 on a spiritual level but on every
17 level and every aspect of being,
18 Pastor Waller has given and given
19 and given of himself.

20 And last night I was
21 listening to an interview with the
22 late great Howard Thurman. And he
23 was being interviewed, and this was
24 probably like in the '70s or so.
25 And so, he credited his entire

2 life's work to someone who he never
3 knew his name, never really knew,
4 period.

5 He was a young man
6 preparing to go off to college who
7 needed fare for his belongings, was
8 at the train station, didn't have
9 fare. This is at the turn of the
10 century, around then. He didn't
11 have fare. And he as a young man
12 was sitting sort of to the side
13 distressed, crying, upset.

14 And when a stranger walking
15 down the train tracks approached
16 and said, why are you crying? And
17 he said, I don't have the fare for
18 my belongings. I'm not going to be
19 able to go to college. And so,
20 this stranger paid the fare and
21 kept on walking.

22 And he told the story 60
23 years later. And he credited his
24 entire life's work to a stranger,
25 someone who he didn't know, someone

2 he was not connected to. And so, I
3 thought about that this morning and
4 I thought about the impact you can
5 have on someone's life that you
6 don't know. And Pastor Waller has
7 had such a profound impact on so
8 many lives of so many people that
9 he does not know.

10 And so, I'm going to ask
11 you to really give him a round of
12 applause and thanks for all that he
13 has done --

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: -- for
16 this city and for so many.

17 And so, we have a citation
18 or a resolution which reads,
19 Honoring and recognizing Reverend
20 Dr. Alyn E. Waller on his 30th
21 Pastoral Anniversary and his loyal
22 and dedicated service to God, his
23 church, humanity and the community.

24 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

25 Whereas, Dr. Alyn E. Waller was

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2 called to lead Enon Baptist
3 Tabernacle Baptist Church, a
4 historic Black church located in
5 Germantown section of Philadelphia
6 on July 3, 1994 and was installed
7 as a Senior Pastor on September 11,
8 1994; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

10 Whereas, under Dr. Waller's
11 leadership Enon's congregation grew
12 tremendously so that by July of
13 2006, the substantial number of
14 congregants necessitated the
15 development of a new 34-acre campus
16 on in East Mt. Airy. The new
17 campus included a 5000-seat
18 sanctuary, a family life center,
19 athletic field that accommodated
20 numerous youth ministries,
21 including cheerleading -- which my
22 daughter was one -- football,
23 basketball, baseball, track and
24 soccer.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

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2 RICHARDSON: And whereas, the
3 church which now serves over 15,000
4 members became a church in two
5 locations --

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

8 RICHARDSON: -- with worship
9 services in both sites and
10 establishment of key community
11 programs, with nearly 100
12 innovative ministries and
13 partnerships, including educational
14 and humanitarian initiatives and
15 critical health screenings. During
16 the height of the coronavirus
17 pandemic, Dr. Waller partnered with
18 the Black Doctors COVID-19
19 Consortium to offer free testing
20 for thousands of people on Enon's
21 parking lot and then administered
22 vaccinations at the church as well;
23 and

24 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

25 Whereas, Dr. Waller gathered

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2 hundreds of men from various
3 religious backgrounds and community
4 affiliations to establish a men's
5 ministry offering a perceptible
6 presence and positive influence in
7 Philadelphia's neighborhoods; and

8 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

9 Whereas, Dr. Waller's outreach
10 extends far beyond the walls of the
11 church through the local and
12 international community activism,
13 with Enon committing 10 percent of
14 the church's yearly revenue to
15 support diverse community needs
16 within Dr. Allen and Dr. Ellyn's
17 vision leading to the establishment
18 of Enon Tabernacle Western Cape
19 Church in South Africa; and

20 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

21 Whereas, Dr. Waller earned a
22 Bachelor's degree in Music
23 Business, a Master's of Divinity
24 degree from the Southern Baptist
25 Theological Seminary, a Doctor of

2 Ministry degree in Ministry to
3 Marriage and Family from the Palmer
4 Theological Seminary, and he also
5 holds an Honorary Doctorate from
6 Lincoln University. Dr. Waller is
7 also an alum of the Harvard
8 Business School's program for
9 Leadership Development and a
10 Certified Life Coach, Executive
11 Life Coach by the International
12 Coach Federation; and

13 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:
14 Whereas, Dr. Waller prior to being
15 called to lead Enon Tabernacle
16 Baptist Church, served as Minister
17 of Music at Canaan Missionary
18 Baptist Church in Louisville,
19 Kentucky and later accepted the
20 call to pastorship as the Senior
21 Pastor of the First Baptist Church
22 of Donora in Pennsylvania; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
24 Whereas, this year 2024 marks
25 Dr. Alyn Waller and Dr. Ellyn Jo

2 Waller's 30-year anniversary at
3 Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church
4 that -- we can clap for that.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: --

7 which was celebrated on Saturday,
8 September 7, 2024. And it is noted
9 that they continue to lead the
10 largest Black congregation in
11 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania with
12 distinction and dedication; now,
13 therefore, be it

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

15 Resolved by the Council of the City
16 of Philadelphia that it hereby
17 honors and recognizes Reverend.
18 Dr. Alyn E. Waller on his 30th
19 Pastoral Anniversary and his loyal
20 and dedicated service to God, his
21 church, humanity and the community,
22 and Further Resolve that an
23 Engrossed copy of this resolution
24 be presented to Reverend Dr. Alyn
25 E. Waller as a token of the sincere

2 admiration of this legislative
3 body. Congratulations, Pastor
4 Waller.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 The Chair recognizes Reverend
8 Dr. Alyn E. Waller for remarks.

9 REV. DR. WALLER: Let me
10 say thank you to Councilwoman Bass
11 and to all who have come together
12 for this resolution and really to
13 all of you who are here today, to
14 the city of Philadelphia. I thank
15 God for the privilege of serving
16 with you. I call the name of
17 Louise Williams because she helped
18 me get my Philly card.

19 As you know when you're not
20 from Philly and you move to Philly,
21 Philly will let you know you're not
22 from Philly until you get your
23 Philly card, and I thank God
24 because once you're in Philly and
25 of Philly if you're loved by

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2 Philly, there's no greater love on
3 the planet than Philadelphia.

4 (Applause.)

5 REV. DR. WALLER: So thank
6 you very much for taking these few
7 moments out. I know there's much
8 more business to be done on behalf
9 of the people of Philadelphia, but
10 I'm honored to be a part of that
11 business today. Thank you so very,
12 very much.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Council will be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
18 The Chair takes a moment of
19 personal privilege to acknowledge
20 the PARENT POWER organization. We
21 ask for them to stand just to
22 acknowledge them for their hard
23 work. Can you stand please?

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

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2 Thank you for your advocacy and
3 fighting for parents across the
4 city of Philadelphia.

5 At this time the Chair
6 recognizes Councilmember Bass who
7 will present a resolution honoring
8 and recognizing Jaron "Boots"
9 Ennis, the reigning International
10 Boxing Federation World
11 Welterweight Champion for -- y'all
12 can clap. We got a champion in the
13 building.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

16 He's being honored for his
17 outstanding achievements in
18 professional boxing and working in
19 the community. Would those
20 accompanying Jaron "Boots" Ennis
21 and those accompanying him, please
22 join him at the podium.

23 Joining Councilmember Bass
24 will be Councilmember Jim Harrity,
25 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada,

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2 Councilmember O'Rourke,

3 Councilmember Mike Driscoll and

4 Councilmember Nina Ahmad.

5 (Councilmembers and guests
6 approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 And if Bud Crawford is out there,
9 the City of Philadelphia want you
10 to know we want all the smoke.

11 Come back down that weight class.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: All
13 right, all right, all right.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: There
16 it is. Well, good morning,
17 everybody. The champ is here. All
18 right now.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: All
21 right now. Okay. We want to thank
22 him for coming out. Philadelphia
23 is a boxing city. Listen, we're --
24 Reverend Waller, we're a praying
25 city and we're a boxing city, so we

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2 want you to pray over this upcoming
3 fight. This fight we have on
4 November 9th, right, at the Wells
5 Fargo. This is going to be
6 exciting.

7 We have a champion here in
8 our midst and we are so excited
9 about it and taking this time and
10 opportunity out to say
11 congratulations in advance.
12 Congratulations on your last fight,
13 but congratulations on your
14 upcoming fight for the victory is
15 at hand.

16 And so, we want to
17 recognize Germantown, 8th District,
18 Germantown's own Brickyard is in
19 the house. Brickyard is in the
20 house.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So we
23 want to recognize our champion and
24 let him know that we've got his
25 back as he prepares to get ready

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2 for this really big fight here in
3 the city of Philadelphia.

4 And so, we have a
5 resolution recognizing and honoring
6 Jaron "Boots" Ennis, the reigning,
7 reigning International Boxing
8 Federation World Welterweight
9 Champion for his outstanding
10 achievements in professional boxing
11 and his work in the community.

12 Whereas, Jaron "Boots"
13 Ennis was born on June 26th, 1997
14 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and
15 raised in the Germantown section of
16 the city of Philadelphia; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: And
18 whereas, Jaron Ennis trained in the
19 sport of boxing since he was a
20 young child under the tutelage of
21 his father, professional boxer
22 Derek "Bozy" Ennis, who helped hone
23 his son's talent to become a
24 successful fighter in the world of
25 professional boxing. Jaron's

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2 success has included winning silver
3 and gold medals at the U.S.
4 National Golden Gloves
5 Championships in 2014 and 2015
6 respectively; and

7 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

8 Whereas, Jaron made his
9 professional debut on April 30th,
10 2016 with a first-round knockout
11 victory over Cory Muldrew, followed
12 by a string of victories, including
13 wins over Chris Alexander and
14 Marcus Beckford in 2016 and
15 multiple stoppage wins in 2017 and
16 throughout subsequent years; and

17 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

18 Whereas, Jaron continued his
19 success with notable victories over
20 such opponents as Sergey Lipinets
21 and Thomas Dulorme in 2021 and
22 Custio Clayton in 2022. He later
23 claimed the IBF, Interim World
24 Welterweight title in a boxing
25 match against Karen Chukhadzhian in

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2 January 2023, followed by a
3 successful defense against Roiman
4 Villa in July 2023; and

5 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

6 Whereas, on November 9th, 2023
7 Jason was awarded the IBF World
8 Welterweight title following the
9 Federation's removal of the
10 previous champion, and he
11 subsequently successfully defended
12 the IBF belt against David
13 Avanesyan on July 13, 2024, winning
14 by technical knockout in the first
15 round; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

17 Whereas, Jaron with his father are
18 significant role models to young
19 people in their community by
20 providing mentoring and training
21 through their boxing program; and

22 Whereas, Jaron holds the
23 distinction of being the only
24 current World Boxing Champion
25 hailing from the City of

2 Philadelphia; now, therefore, be it

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

5 Resolved that the Council of the

6 City of Philadelphia recognizes and

7 honors Jaron "Boots" Ennis, the

8 reigning International Boxing

9 Federation, IBF, World Welterweight

10 Champion for his outstanding

11 achievements in professional boxing

12 and his work in the community; and

13 Further Resolve that an Engrossed

14 copy of this resolution be

15 presented to Jaron "Boots" Ennis as

16 evidence of the sincere respect and

17 admiration of this legislative

18 body. Let's give him a big round

19 of applause, y'all.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 The Chair recognizes Jaron Ennis

23 "Boots" and Mike Wise.

24 MR. ENNIS: Well, I want to

25 thank everybody for coming.

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2 Appreciate you guys. And I want to
3 thank the City, you know, for
4 getting behind me and backing me.
5 November 9th I can't wait to put on
6 a show and win in a dominating
7 fashion and another knockout. And
8 I got more belts to get. I'm
9 trying to be undisputed.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. WISE: Hey, how y'all
12 doing. I'm Mike Wise. I'm just
13 here to talk about his father and
14 Boots knowing him since he was
15 about 4 years old, and his father
16 being like a father to me and
17 everybody in my neighborhood. I
18 mean, we honoring this man and his
19 son for not just what they bring to
20 the table in the boxing world but
21 what they also bring to my
22 community.

23 I mean, I can tell you like
24 me being young, 12 years old, me
25 and my friends running up in the

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2 gym, in the dungeon. It was called
3 the dungeon. It was a real hard
4 gym, like chasing chickens-like
5 gym. So we in the gym and he'd
6 come get us all the time and let us
7 spar and do our thing.

8 And then one day when I got
9 a little older he seen me walking
10 down the street and I got into a
11 street fight. And he pulled me out
12 the streets and brought me back to
13 the gym and then started bringing
14 up all my friends that was troubled
15 on the streets, and then he brought
16 my son up. And my son is a
17 professional fighter because of
18 this man.

19 And Boots, it's a little
20 story a lot of people don't know.
21 Like when he was a child it was
22 like a Goku thing with me. If
23 y'all don't know what that's about,
24 the Goku thing. His mother was
25 like Bulma and his father was Goku

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2 and they had this super saying son
3 that like watched the father. The
4 father, he was that with the hands.

5 And then he had another
6 son, Pooh, he was that with the
7 hands. Then he had another son
8 Farah, and you seen Farah was that
9 with the hands. And then we seen
10 this one come up, but he was never
11 allowed to come to the gym and box
12 because his mother always made sure
13 that he had his school work first.
14 And I'm talking about for years we
15 didn't see him.

16 But this is our champion of
17 the world now, Philadelphia's own
18 bringing light to our city in the
19 honor of his father Bozy Derek
20 Ennis. Let's bring it together.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank
23 you. And I just wanted to also
24 recognize Simon One-Punch Carr
25 everybody know from, from -- what

2 party of town are you from? You're
3 not from Germantown.

4 (Everywhere.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

6 Mr. Everywhere.

7 MR. CARR: It's always a
8 pleasure to come here, man. And,
9 City Council, thank you for having
10 me, Philadelphia. We here to
11 celebrate a champion. I watched
12 him since he was a little kid
13 develop into a real champion, not
14 just a professional champion in the
15 ring, but a people champion that
16 represent Philadelphia. This is
17 what it's all about.

18 Bozy, he's been like a
19 father figure to me ever since I
20 was coming up. Pooh and Farah,
21 they like brothers to me. Although
22 I'm from a different section of the
23 city, they like my cousins. So
24 they always protect me on the
25 opposite side of the world. And

2 when they come down to the Wells
3 Fargo, I protect them so it's like
4 a reciprocity, you know. I mean,
5 we have this joint camaraderie, and
6 it's always good to see everybody
7 connected and coming together.

8 And I owe it to this man
9 because he's bringing fights back
10 to Philadelphia, and we getting
11 everybody unified and connected and
12 it's not segregated no more. So
13 give a round of applause to Jaron
14 "Boots" Ennis.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. CARR: Thank you, Cindy
17 Bass, for having me. I wouldn't
18 even really be here if it wasn't
19 for her, Councilman -- Council
20 President Johnson as well as Curtis
21 Jones, Jr. We get ready to put on
22 a citywide tournament all around
23 the city of Philadelphia. We want
24 to kick this off. We going to
25 always honor the champs that come

3 keep this homegrown base going,
4 continuing on and on and on. Thank
5 you very much.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you.

9 Council will be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 At this time the Chair recognizes
13 Councilmember Kendra Brooks who
14 will present a resolution declaring
15 October as Domestic Violence
16 Awareness this month in the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 Would Maritza Padua and
19 those accompanying her please join
20 the Councilmember at the podium.

21 Joining Councilmember
22 Gil -- joining Councilmember Brooks
23 is Majority Leader Gilmore
24 Richardson, Councilmember Squilla,
25 Quetcy Lozada, Councilwoman Lozada,

9 (Councilmembers and guests
10 approached podium.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
12 you, Council President. I want to
13 thank all of my colleagues and
14 staff members who are wearing
15 purple today to demonstrate their
16 support for Domestic Violence
17 Awareness Month.

18 As some of you know, I lost
19 my cousin Tiana to domestic
20 violence. About 10 years ago my
21 cousin Tiana recognized that
22 another family was being abused.
23 She noticed her black eye and had
24 the courage to speak to her about
25 it and encourage her to leave an

2 abusive relationship.

3 Tiana understood how hard
4 it could be to escape an abuser
5 because she, herself, was trapped
6 in an abusive relationship. A few
7 days later Tiana's abuser murdered
8 her. She was not able to escape
9 her own abuser, but her kindness
10 and courage helped a loved one
11 break free of an abusive
12 relationship that had caused that
13 black eye.

14 And in honor of that
15 kindness and courage and in honor
16 of all survivors trying to break
17 free, I introduced legislation to
18 expand the definition of domestic
19 violence to include coercive
20 control.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Some
23 often ask what is coercive control.
24 It refers to a pattern of abusive
25 behaviors that limits another

2 person's safety and freedoms
3 through manipulation threats or
4 intimidation. Coercive control
5 does not have visible signs like a
6 black eye or bruises, making it
7 even more difficult to identify and
8 stop that abuse.

9 Because of the law we
10 passed in 2021, victims of coercive
11 control are now entitled to the
12 same protections as victims of
13 domestic violence, including taking
14 time off from work to access
15 services and to find housing.

16 I will continue to honor
17 Tiana's memory by fighting for
18 victims of domestic violence,
19 making resources more visible and
20 accessible and ensuring survivors
21 know that they are not alone.
22 Whether we are aware of it or not,
23 all of us know someone who has been
24 impacted by domestic violence.

25 Domestic violence is a

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 public health crisis and it impacts
3 people across the lines of race,
4 class, gender, sexuality and
5 ability. Domestic violence often
6 happens behind closed doors and
7 survivors often face intimidation,
8 threats and shame that prevent them
9 from speaking out.

10 It can be hard to
11 recognize, even harder to talk
12 about. So by declaring October
13 Domestic Violence Awareness Month,
14 we commit to ending the silence
15 surrounding domestic violence and
16 we send a clear message to
17 survivors: We see you, we value
18 you, you are not alone and we are
19 here to help.

20 We have several great
21 partners in this work and we are
22 recognizing and honoring them
23 today. Congresso de Latinos
24 Unidos, Lutheran Settlement House
25 Bilingual Domestic Violence

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Program, Women in Transition and
3 Women Against Abuse. Many of us in
4 Council are familiar with Women
5 Against Abuse and have advocated
6 for them to receive City funding to
7 continue their important work.

8 Women Against Abuse serves
9 10,000 Philadelphians each year and
10 provide the City's only domestic
11 violence emergency shelter. They
12 also provide life-saving legal
13 representation for impacted
14 families and served as the lead
15 operator for the Philadelphia
16 Domestic Violence Hotline. I hope
17 today's presentation will serve as
18 a reminder of this critical service
19 Women Against Abuse provides and
20 their dependence and on-timely
21 disbursement of City funds for
22 their daily operating costs. So
23 with that, we'll read our
24 resolution.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: As

2 someone who witnessed as a child
3 domestic violence, this is
4 personal. Whereas, one in three
5 women and one in four men and over
6 half of the LGBTQIA+, over half,
7 will experience domestic violence
8 in their lifetime.

9 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: And
10 whereas, domestic violence is not a
11 private family issue. It is a
12 widespread community problem that
13 requires comprehensive community
14 solutions. We must acknowledge
15 this so we can work collectively
16 towards ending domestic violence
17 and creating safe, healthy
18 communities for everyone; and

19 Whereas, each year the
20 Philadelphia Police Department
21 responds to more than 100,000
22 domestic violence-related calls.
23 However, domestic violence extends
24 far beyond Philadelphia; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

2 Whereas, domestic violence is a
3 pervasive national issue where
4 every minute 24 people are victims
5 of physical violence, rape or
6 stalking by an intimate partner in
7 the United States. This amounts to
8 more than 12 million people
9 annually and it results in the loss
10 of life for more than four
11 individuals each day; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

13 RICHARDSON: Whereas, amidst a time
14 of great division, we are calling
15 for a coming together to prevent
16 intimate partner violence and build
17 a community where every member can
18 thrive; and

19 Whereas, in declaring
20 October as Domestic Violence
21 Awareness Month, the City of
22 Philadelphia commits to supporting
23 the strong Philadelphia network of
24 advocates, survivors, supporters
25 and organizations working to end

2 relationship abuse and foster a
3 culture that ensures survivors find
4 the help they need; and

5 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

6 Whereas, Domestic Violence
7 Awareness Month is being sponsored
8 locally by Women Against Abuse and
9 Congresso de Latinos Unidos,
10 Lutheran Settlement House's
11 Bilingual Domestic Violence Program
12 and Women in Transition, and
13 through their sponsorship they are
14 encouraging everyone to help to
15 increase the awareness of domestic
16 violence in our homes and
17 communities and to decrease its
18 negative impact on Philadelphia.
19 And in Council, we all remember
20 Linda Rios.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

22 RICHARDSON: Yes.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And
25 whereas, abuse in Philadelphia's --

12 Whereas, Women Against Abuse and

13 its partners Congresso de Latinos

14 Unidos -- I used to work there so I

15 cheated -- Lutheran Settlement

16 House's Bilingual Domestic Violence

17 Program and Women in Transition

18 make up the Philadelphia Domestic

19 Violence Collaborative; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

21 Whereas, the Philadelphia Domestic

22 Violence Collaborative provides a

23 comprehensive continuum of services

24 to survivors of domestic violence

25 and their families in Philadelphia,

2 which includes safe housing, legal
3 aid, counseling, medical advocacy
4 and behavioral health services; and

5 Whereas, the Philadelphia
6 Domestic Violence Collaborative
7 provides life-saving resources to

10 domestic violence; and

11 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

12 Whereas, Philadelphia Domestic
13 Violence Collaborative partners
14 with the City of Philadelphia to
15 operate a 24-hour toll-free
16 Philadelphia domestic violence
17 hotline that provides callers with
18 crisis intervention, safety
19 planning and linkage to community
20 resources, including intake into
21 Women Against Abuse's emergency
22 safe havens; and

23 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

24 Whereas, in Fiscal Year 2024, more
25 than 9,739 calls were answered via

2 the hotline providing life-saving

3 responses; and

4 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

5 Whereas, to ensure a more holistic

6 approach to addressing violence in

7 our community, the Philadelphia

8 Domestic Violence Collaborative is

9 partnering with the City

10 Administration's Office of Domestic

11 Violence Strategies and over 70

12 different community stakeholders to

13 implement shared safety,

14 Philadelphia's response to

15 relational violence, a citywide

16 plan to respond to domestic

17 violence in Philadelphia; and

18 Whereas, to support a

19 coordinated community response to

20 domestic violence, the Philadelphia

21 Domestic Violence Collaborative

22 organizations will hold events

23 throughout the month of October to

24 promote awareness about domestic

25 violence and to build community

2 support so that all Philadelphians
3 will take a stand against violence;
4 now, therefore, be it

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

6 Resolved that the Council of the
7 City of Philadelphia declares and
8 recognizes October as Domestic
9 Violence Awareness Month in the
10 City of Philadelphia. Further
11 Resolved, that an Engrossed copy of
12 this resolution be presented to the
13 representatives of Women Against
14 Abuse, Congresso de Latinos Unidos,
15 Lutheran Settlement House Bilingual
16 Domestic Violence Program and Women
17 in Transition as a sincere
18 expression of City Council's
19 gratitude and appreciation for and
20 commendation for raising the public
21 awareness regarding domestic
22 violence. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: We
25 would like Maritza to come and

15 Padua. I am the Vice-president of

16 Policy and Strategic Initiatives at

17 Women Against Abuse. On behalf of

18 Women Against Abuse, our sister

19 agencies Congresso de Latinos

20 Unidos, Lutheran Settlement House,

21 Women in Transition, our DV

22 community partners such as Madre de

23 Tierra, Love Shouldn't Hurt, Dos

24 Puentes, and the survivors

25 especially of domestic violence we

2 serve, I want to thank
3 Councilmember Brooks and all of
4 City Council for recognizing
5 October as Domestic Violence
6 Awareness Month in Philadelphia.

7 For more than 48 years,
8 Women Against Abuse and its
9 partners have led Philadelphia's
10 response to domestic violence. We
11 are the safe, welcoming shelter
12 that parents run to with their
13 children when their homes become
14 danger zones. We are the team of
15 experienced, caring attorneys who
16 help victims navigate the
17 complicated court system
18 successfully.

19 We are the understanding
20 hotline counselor who answers the
21 phone at 3:00 a.m. and tells the
22 person whispering on the other end
23 that they are not alone. We are
24 the community educators who are
25 teaching 6th graders and 8th

2 graders about the warning signs of
3 abuse so they can pursue healthy
4 relationships and break
5 intergenerational cycles of
6 domestic violence.

7 We are the volunteers
8 handing out hotline cards at
9 resource fairs in communities most
10 heavily impacted by gun violence.
11 We are the ones hugging those who
12 weep in grief after losing their
13 mother, sister, cousin or friend to
14 an abusive ex. We are the ones
15 working with first responders to
16 create a more effective response to
17 the 100,000 911 calls that are made
18 each year for domestic violence.

19 We are the front lines in
20 Philadelphia's movement to end
21 intimate partner violence. We
22 fulfill a critical and life-saving
23 role and we need your help to keep
24 the safety net healthy and strong.
25 We need City government's

2 attention, action, funding to

3 ensure the doors remain open and

4 the lights remain on.

5 Amid a time of division,

6 transition and a difficult

7 fundraising landscape, of course I

8 had to mention that, we must work

9 together in unison to ensure

10 Philadelphians who are trapped in

11 abusive relationships receive the

12 safe escape and support they

13 deserve.

14 While today is an important

15 day to officially recognize

16 Domestic Violence Awareness Month,

17 our city is only as strong as the

18 weakest among us, and your

19 commitment is essential to ensure

20 the well-being of some of

21 Philadelphia's most vulnerable. I

22 thank you for proclaiming October

23 as Domestic Violence Awareness

24 Month in Philadelphia and I urge

25 you to put your advocacy into

2 action not just today but all

3 yearlong because your communities

4 are counting on us and we are

5 counting on you. Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

23 The ayes have it. The motion
24 carries. This bill will be placed
25 on our First Reading Calendar for

3 The next order of business
4 is the consideration of the

22 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 Thank you. Before considering
15 these bills and resolutions, we
16 will consider public comment as
17 follows: Your public comment must
18 concern matters on the Second
19 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
20 for possible action at today's
21 Council session.

22 All speakers must sign up
23 in order to testify. If you have
24 not already signed up for today's
25 session, please do so now by giving

3 table outside the rails to my left.
4 Once you have signed up, you will
5 be called in the order in which

14 CHIEF CLERK: May Kate
15 Perez make their way to the podium
16 along with Ali Naganuma, Shamar
17 Pitts and Gary Andress. Kate
18 Perez, Ali Naganuma, Shamar Pitts,
19 then Gary Andress, please make your
20 way to the podium.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 podium.)

23 MR. NAGANUMA: Hello,
24 everybody. My name is Ali Naganuma
25 and I'm here along with my fellow

2 clowns -- hey, clowns -- to proudly
3 support Bill 240655 which would
4 give additional tax breaks to
5 Hilco's Bellwether District. For
6 all of you who don't know, that's
7 the former South Philly oil
8 refinery land that was the largest
9 polluter in the city for 150 years
10 until those pesky environmental
11 justice activists raised such a
12 fuss.

13 Okay. Well, there was
14 cancer and asthma and the explosion
15 almost killed everybody in the
16 city, but, hey, we're still here,
17 right, no problem. Anyhoo, thank
18 you to everybody for joining us for
19 today's show. Halloween came early
20 this year. City Council presents
21 an environmental justice horror
22 show.

23 We clowns were so inspired
24 and felt really deeply connected to
25 all of the absurdity put on here

2 today by City Council, Hilco, the
3 Mayor, the DEP and the EPA, so we
4 wanted to come out to celebrate
5 this truly momentous occasion.
6 Thanks to our leaders today marks a
7 successful shut-out of the
8 environmental justice community
9 surrounding the old oil refinery
10 site and all of their silly little
11 concerns about the future of their
12 health, you know, their housing
13 security and their families. You
14 know, it is just so fun to play
15 around with people's lives. Can we
16 get a round of applause for that.
17 Yeah.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. NAGANUMA: We are just
20 so enthusiastic about achieving a
21 second round of tax breaks for
22 Hilco before there has been any
23 City Council hearing on this
24 redevelopment project as a whole.
25 Whoa, can you say efficiency. And

2 no annoying public input on the
3 plan for 12 million square feet of
4 warehousing. That will bring a
5 whopping 10,000 trucks per day
6 through our neighborhoods. Thank
7 goodness y'all squashed any of that
8 clean air talk.

9 It is fantastic that City
10 Council and all of our
11 environmental protection agencies
12 don't even care that Hilco plans to
13 raise their site above the
14 floodplain and doesn't account for
15 any increased flooding impacts on
16 nearby neighborhoods. Out of -- oh
17 my gosh, and the cherry on top. I
18 almost forgot. How you even
19 figured out how to avoid giving the
20 community a legally binding
21 Community Benefits Agreement, which
22 was promised to us back in 2020
23 when you got the first round of tax
24 breaks. The way that Hilco just
25 wrote up some community benefits

2 commitments that nobody can even
3 hold Hilco accountable to, that's
4 so awesome. It's just a truly
5 celebratory day.

6 In closing, we clowns would
7 love to nominate Council President
8 Kenyatta Johnson and CEO of Hilco,
9 Roberto Perez, to the Board of the
10 Clowning Society of Philadelphia to
11 celebrate their leadership and
12 their commitment to not one inch of
13 environmental justice. So
14 congratulations to you all. We're
15 so proud to call you one of our
16 own.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Will the Chief Clerk please call
20 the next speaker.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Shamar Pitts,
22 Gary Andress. And may Wayne Miller
23 also make their way to the podium.

24 MR. PITTS: Good afternoon.
25 I got to follow up -- oh, I'm

2 sorry. My name is Shamar Pitts.

3 And I'm a lifelong resident of

4 Grays Ferry in South Philadelphia.

5 And I have to follow up the

6 presentation by our clown friends,

7 but I do want to reiterate that

8 this is very serious. It's not a

9 joke.

10 So we have an opportunity

11 here in our city with the largest

12 redevelopment in our history to

13 actually make a change. And I

14 would like to say I'm proud of the

15 change that has been made by our

16 leadership and City Council,

17 including our Council President

18 Kenyatta Johnson, with gun violence

19 going down 40 percent.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. PITTS: This is huge.

22 And right now when I see this

23 development I see that we have

24 opportunity we can stomp this thing

25 out 100 percent and make it happen,

2 but we have to be serious. We have
3 to be serious about it. We can't
4 put the people second. And in our
5 society the people normally come
6 second.

7 And in this situation it is
8 an example of the people coming
9 second. And the people come second
10 because we have built, we have
11 built a system where a person like
12 our Council President is
13 responsible for this development
14 taking place in his District. He's
15 responsible for that. So if
16 anything goes wrong with that,
17 he'll be graded as being a failure.

18 So this is the reason why
19 the pressure is put on our City
20 officials, but we got to stand up.
21 We got to stand up for the people.
22 We have to. We cannot give tax
23 breaks and promises of all these
24 lucrative things to corporations
25 before considering the citizens of

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. PITTS: And in this
5 situation we all want redevelopment
6 here. We want this redevelopment

11 those things while we have the
12 opportunity to do so.

13 And I want -- yes, I'm
14 wrapping it up right now. I'm
15 wrapping it up. I want our
16 community members and our residents
17 to be held accountable for fixing
18 these problems. But I also want a
19 CBA so both sides can be held
20 accountable in fixing these issues.
21 I want to be held accountable. I
22 want my community to be held
23 accountable and I want Hilco to be
24 held accountable. And the only way
25 we can be held accountable is if we

3 both want to be held accountable.

4 And that's what we want. And

5 that's why the clowns are here and

6 this is serious. It ain't no joke.

9 CHIEF CLERK: We have Gary

10 Andress, Wayne Miller and also

11 Lynette Sutton, make your way to

12 the podium.

13 (Witnesses approached

14 podium.)

15 MR. ANDRESS: Good morning.

16 My name is Gary Andress. I'm the

17 Assistant Business Manager for

18 Steamfitters Local Union 420.

19 Local 420 is committed to

20 supporting efforts to revitalize

21 Philadelphia in order to attract

22 new business and new employment

23 opportunities for our members and

24 our all residents. For this reason

25 Steamfitters Local 420 strongly

2 supports Bill No. 240655.

3 The development of the
4 former PES Refinery into the
5 Bellwether District is a
6 transformational opportunity for
7 the trades and for our city. With
8 a development timeline of more than
9 10 years, this project provides job
10 opportunities for our members as
11 well as a training ground for
12 apprentices and journey workers.

13 Over 2,000 union workers
14 have already been employed at the
15 project site, with the total
16 projected to be over 20,000 at full
17 build. Opportunities for site work
18 will accelerate with the pace of
19 the development, which is one of
20 the many reasons we support this
21 legislation.

22 HRP Group, the developer of
23 the Bellwether District is
24 committed to diversifying and
25 expanding the labor workforce

2 pipeline, a commitment we share
3 also at our Local. Through their
4 Economic Opportunity Plan, the
5 participation in voluntary
6 workforce development programs, HRP
7 is facilitating pathways for local
8 students to get exposed to careers
9 in the trades and the
10 pre-apprenticeship and
11 apprenticeship programs that we
12 offer.

13 The Local is proud to
14 partner with HRP to bring the
15 Bellwether District to life with
16 local union labor and urge the City
17 Council to pass this legislation
18 today. Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 MR. MILLER: My name is
21 Wayne Miller. I'm the President of
22 the Philadelphia Building Trades.
23 Council President Johnson and City
24 Councilmembers, thank you for
25 considering the testimony of

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Laborers District Council of
3 Philadelphia supporting Bill No.
4 240655.

5 Again, my name is Wayne
6 Miller and I'm the President of
7 Philadelphia Building Trades. We
8 work to secure family-supporting
9 wages, safe working conditions,
10 quality benefits, quality of life,
11 essential for members of the
12 Building Trades in Philadelphia.
13 The Bellwether District in South
14 and Southwest Philadelphia is a
15 generational opportunity to create
16 tens of thousands of family-
17 sustaining jobs right here in our
18 city.

19 The development is
20 projected to create over 20,000
21 construction-related jobs for union
22 workers. Our members are at work
23 on the site every day, transforming
24 nearly 2 percent of the city. The
25 City Council supports for measures

2 to responsibly increase the speed
3 of development means more
4 opportunities for our members,
5 which is why the Building Trades
6 strongly support Bill No. 240655.

7 Additionally, HRP Group,
8 the developers of the Bellwether
9 District, has demonstrated a strong
10 commitment to expanding and
11 diversifying the workforce pipeline
12 in Philadelphia, a commitment we
13 share, for providing direct
14 educational opportunities for the
15 School District of Philadelphia's
16 students at the Bellwether District
17 to funding Community College of
18 Philadelphia scholarships to
19 support pre-apprentice programs
20 with the Building Trades.

21 HRP is a partner for a
22 positive change for our community.
23 In addition to these individual
24 initiatives, HRP has joined with us
25 collaboratively partner of

2 Everybody Builds, an organization
3 dedicated to diversifying
4 Philadelphia construction industry.
5 The Building Trades strongly
6 support Bill No. 240655 and urge
7 the City Council to vote favorably
8 on this legislation today.

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez.
11 Non-conformities are businesses
12 that are no longer legal and will
13 eventually be shut down by the
14 City. By this definition, Leonardo
15 in O'Neill's District, Day &
16 Zimmerman in Young's District and
17 Ghost Robotics in the President's
18 District must immediately be shut
19 down as they are all violating our
20 Federal Conventional Arms Transfer
21 policies by continuing to supply
22 weapons to Israel despite the
23 knowledge that these weapons will
24 be used to perpetuate more crimes
25 against humanity.

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Since its creation as a
3 settler colony in 1948, Israel has
4 been guilty of the crime of
5 apartheid and has since been found
6 guilty of torture and sexual and
7 gender-based violence against more
8 than 10,000 Palestinian civilian
9 hostages who are being held in
10 well-documented torture camps with
11 at least 1,000 of whom who are
12 children who are subjected to the
13 same well-documented torture as the
14 adults.

15 As a reminder, this cannot
16 be called a war as one of the
17 richest militaries in the world
18 drops bombs on civilians in a
19 country that has no formal
20 military, air force or navy. Our
21 sister city is also the only state
22 in the world that puts children in
23 military courts. Many held in
24 administrative detention, meaning
25 they have committed no crimes.

2 Selling weapons to states
3 that hold children in
4 administrative detention violates
5 our country's Conventional Arms
6 Transfer policy. The youngest
7 hostage released was a 13-year-old
8 boy who was shot, arrested and
9 eventually released with only half
10 of a brain left. I'll be sure to
11 email you all the video later
12 today, but Palestinians started
13 this morning with the Occupation
14 bombing a school in their refugee
15 camp, forced to watch their
16 families burn alive again. That
17 bomb could have been sold to them
18 by Day & Zimmerman right on Spring
19 Garden Street.

20 On March 30, 2018, 30,000
21 Palestinians protested Israel's
22 blockade at the border wall of the
23 Gaza strip. They continued their
24 nonviolent protests every Friday
25 until December 27th the next year.

2 The Occupation responded by
3 claiming it was a cover for Hamas,
4 releasing tear gas and live
5 ammunitions into the crowd,
6 eventually murdering 223 civilians,
7 wounding 13,000 where a majority
8 were struck by three to five
9 bullets each.

10 Today more than 200,000
11 Palestinian civilians have been
12 slaughtered and Israel continues
13 its complete blockade of the Gaza
14 strip, has now extended its bombing
15 campaign to Yemen, Syria and
16 Lebanon. Companies in our city are
17 selling these weapons to help kill
18 civilians. It's time for you to
19 call for an arms embargo. Free
20 Palestine.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. SUTTON: Good morning,
23 Council President Johnson and
24 members of City Council. My name
25 is Lynette Sutton and I'm the

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Managing Partner of Girl Concrete,
3 a minority-owned business based in
4 Philadelphia. Our mission is to
5 provide high-quality -- Lynette
6 Sutton. Our mission is to provide
7 high-quality concrete construction
8 services, but we also pride
9 ourselves in an inclusive, diverse
10 and local workforce, men, women,
11 apprentices and returning citizens.
12 I am here today to express
13 my strong support for Bill No.
14 240655 and urge Councilmembers to
15 vote in favor of the bill's passage
16 today. Girl Concrete is proud to
17 serve as the prime concrete
18 contractor for the first build at
19 the Bellwether District, which
20 represents the largest contract
21 since the founding of our company.
22 Not just crumbs and that is
23 serious.
24 This opportunity has
25 allowed us to build our capacity,

2 grow our workforce and scale our
3 business. HRP's commitment to
4 inclusive practices in construction
5 is evident through their support of
6 firms like ours, Girl Concrete. We
7 are deeply committed to building a
8 diverse and inclusive workforce
9 pipeline, and HRP is a valuable
10 partner in that endeavor. We look
11 forward to being on future builds
12 at the Bellwether District as
13 construction progresses. Thank you
14 very much for considering Girl
15 Concrete's testimony in support of
16 Bill No. 240655.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: May Anton
19 Moore, Ricky Duncan and Charles
20 Reeves also make their way to the
21 podium.

22 (Witnesses approached
23 podium.)

24 MR. DUNCAN: Good morning,
25 Honorable City Council. Thank you

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 for considering my testimony and
3 support of Bill No. 240655. My
4 name is Ricky Duncan and I'm the
5 CEO and Executive Director of the
6 NOMO Foundation. NOMO is acronyms
7 that stands for New Options More
8 Opportunities and is deeply
9 committed to our mission in
10 providing a safe space for youth
11 and young adults to develop
12 positive life skills and break the
13 cycle of poverty.

14 We believe in nurturing
15 positive outcomes and focusing on
16 what young people need to thrive.
17 Our approach is proactive, moving
18 beyond reacting to problems and
19 needs. Since 2010, NOMO has
20 offered a holistic anti-violence
21 program, including education, job
22 training, counseling and more and
23 empowering our youth for a brighter
24 future, which brings me to my
25 testimony.

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The Bellwether District
3 development in South and Southwest
4 Philadelphia, that I would like to
5 say that I live in and been living
6 in all my life, is an exciting
7 project that will provide immense
8 opportunity for economic
9 investments in our communities and
10 jobs for our youth, which is why
11 I'm testifying.

12 With more than 19,000
13 permanent jobs anticipated,
14 including the majority of positions
15 that do not require a college
16 degree, is incumbent on all us to
17 ensure that our youth have the
18 skills they need to succeed. Not
19 everyone is going to be a college
20 graduate. Not everyone has the
21 skills that they need to pass the
22 test to maybe be in a labor union.
23 But given this opportunity, this
24 will open doors for a lot of the
25 young people that I serve.

2 HRP Group, the developer of
3 the Bellwether District, has made
4 inclusive workforce development a
5 priority and it's a collaborative
6 partner for our community events
7 and programs, including sponsoring
8 our youth programing and partner
9 with us to provide resources such
10 as winter coats for our neighbors
11 in need and also offering school
12 supplies when it's time for our
13 young people to go back to school
14 and materials needed for our
15 workforce development training to
16 get our kids ready to go into this
17 development.

18 We are deeply committed to
19 building a brighter future for
20 Philadelphia youth and HRP is a
21 valuable partner in these efforts.
22 Thank you very much for considering
23 this testimony on Bill No. 240655.
24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: May Charles

3 Reeves --

4 MR. REEVES: My name is

5 Charles Reeves and I'm a resident

6 of Grays Ferry. I want to thank

7 City Council, Mr. President.

8 You're one of ours so you already

9 know us. So I've been listening to

10 both sides. I want to thank the

11 clowns because y'all represent my

12 community, right, and I love y'all,

13 right, and we going to continue to

14 fight. We just got different

15 opinions on how this going to go,

16 but I appreciate y'all.

17 But y'all heard all the

18 stats, y'all heard all the numbers,

19 y'all heard everything, right.

20 I've been doing this for a while,

21 right. My community at one time

22 led this city in killings. Through

23 the work that we've been doing,

24 nobody got shot in two years.

25 That's my priority. My priority is

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 to continue the education part.

3 The school needs the education

4 help. We need the funds.

5 We need everybody working

6 together to ensure that this

7 project -- I'm on that board. I've

8 been on there four and a half

9 years. I listen to -- do I agree

10 with all this stuff? No. Is it

11 transparent enough? No. But I'm

12 there. I'm in the room. I'm

13 listening, right. I know what they

14 trying to do.

15 I just need y'all support

16 to back me and I'm going to

17 continue to fight to make sure we

18 do it. But again, I share my

19 community with two different

20 facets. We have two different

21 opinions, right, on how to go about

22 saving our community. But we love

23 our community. We love our city,

24 right. So we going to continue to

25 work, right, and we just appreciate

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 all the help we get. The number --
3 what's the number, Mr. Lopez?
4 60-something-something. Go ahead,
5 Mr. Lopez.

6 MR. LOPEZ: Good morning.
7 I'm just going to just go over a
8 little bit of his time. But one
9 thing that Charlie didn't mention
10 is that his father was a longtime
11 advocate on Tasker Street. I have
12 a property on Tasker Street. And
13 the reality of it is that nobody
14 spoke about what the K0Z zone is.

15 First of all, it will
16 stimulate investment in the
17 community. It's about economic
18 development and employment. The
19 reality of it is that this is the
20 opportunity to change the quality
21 of life of the people in this city.
22 All right.

23 And so, you may dress as a
24 clown which makes me think that you
25 symbolize this as a joke. But the

2 reality of it is, is that we're
3 talking about saving people's
4 lives. And you can jump around and
5 play, but the reality is that
6 people are being displaced. Black
7 and Brown people are being
8 displaced from South Philadelphia
9 because of gentrification. This is
10 our opportunity to create
11 apprenticeship jobs, build, get
12 construction jobs, build better
13 housing.
14 You sit here and talk about
15 these bills, but you fight against
16 something and then you just -- you
17 mentioned about the old people who
18 damaged the property but you didn't
19 talk about the people who are
20 remediating the property, you
21 understand. So the reality of it
22 is Hilco has done great things and
23 good things in the community. And
24 you may see them as small things,
25 but we have to start somewhere,

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 right. You can't just say, well,
3 let's just kill it and that's it.

4 No, we have to start
5 somewhere and move forward. So
6 stop all the nonsense. This is not
7 a joke. Take your clown stuff off.
8 Come to the table. And yeah,
9 right, because I want you to
10 represent me. And I'm not a clown
11 and my kids are not a clown. The
12 people who died on the street are
13 not clowns.

14 All right. So -- oh, I'm
15 sorry. Well, they went over their
16 minutes. I should have mine too.
17 I want my senior minutes. All
18 right. But again, God bless this
19 chamber. But the reality of it is
20 we support this bill. This bill
21 should be passed to the better and
22 best interest of the citizens, the
23 youth of this community. Amen.

24 (Applause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Wanda Walker.

2 May Ogbonna Hagins --

3 MS. WALKER: Morning,
4 beautiful people. My name is Wanda
5 Walker and I always come to talk
6 about generational wealth and
7 houses being stolen in
8 Philadelphia. My biggest concern,
9 number one, are the seniors and how
10 they're being treated. I am going
11 to stay on topic so I'm supposed to
12 mention a bill that I agree with.

13 So I want to say thank you,
14 Councilwoman Rue, for your 240663
15 it looks like. And, President
16 Johnson, it looks like you're
17 putting something in place where
18 properties are going to be
19 individually looked over before
20 they get sold. I come to City
21 Council every week and it sounds
22 more like an auction.

23 I'm looking at the amount
24 of properties that keep going to
25 the Land Bank. I looked it up.

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 They have over 5,000 properties.

3 They're not being moved. I look at

4 the sheriff's sales and thank God

5 for Rochelle Bilal. It seems like

6 she's not allowing a lot of things

7 to be sold. But the problem is we

8 have to keep people in their homes.

9 There's nothing more

10 affordable than the house your

11 grandmom or granddad was trying to

12 give to you that gets stolen over

13 taxes or water, and it should be

14 something in place with so many

15 properties being exempt that

16 seniors after so many years of

17 paying taxes just don't have to pay

18 taxes anymore. You should not have

19 to apply for a program. So many

20 seniors don't even understand it.

21 We have 10 Districts. Each

22 one of you all represent about

23 160,000 people in your District.

24 And when you have these little

25 church meetings to help people

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 apply for these LOOP programs and
3 such, you see about 20 people. So
4 come on, you might help maybe 60,
5 80 people a year out of 160,000
6 that you represent. And at least
7 80,000 need some type of tax
8 exemption. This has to stop.

9 You're giving stuff to
10 developers. They build in our
11 neighborhood and the minute they
12 finish, all of our taxes go up and
13 that becomes the next round of
14 people that have to give up their
15 homes. On top of that when you
16 look at all these buildings going
17 up, you can't find not a single
18 community person or Black person on
19 the job and that's the number one
20 thing we need, so this has to stop.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. WALKER: I got you.
23 This has to stop people. You all
24 are our first line of defense.
25 You're supposed to be our

2 representatives, our protectors,
3 and that's what I need you all to
4 do. We don't want any more
5 turkeys, tampons, bookbags or
6 street namings. We need jobs. We
7 need education and we need our
8 seniors to stay in these houses
9 because we're smart enough to know
10 our seniors are our secret sauce.
11 They're the ones that hold most of
12 our wealth. Stop pushing them out
13 of our community. Thank you and
14 I'll see you next week for the next
15 10 Thursdays.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: May Ogbonna
18 Hagins please make his way to the
19 podium. Then Jeremy Blatstein,
20 Khalif Alexander. Then Norman
21 Tookes.

22 (Witnesses approached
23 podium.)

24 MR. HAGINS: Good morning.
25 My name is Ogbonna Hagins. I'm a

2 4th generation chattel slavery

3 survivor and I'm an American

4 Freedman --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Just one second, sir. Council will

7 be at ease for a second.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 The Chair recognizes Councilmember

11 Isaiah Thomas.

12 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank

13 you, Council President.

14 I'm going to request that a

15 leave of absence be granted as I

16 have to tend to other Council

17 bills. And I would like for the

18 record to be voted aye on all bills

19 and resolutions that will come

20 before the legislative body today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 Leave is granted. Thank you very

23 much.

24 MR. HAGINS: Yeah. I would

25 like you to just take three minutes

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 to stay here and listen to what I

3 have to say, Councilman --

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Absolutely.

6 MR. HAGINS: -- Thomas.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Oh, okay. Go ahead.

9 MR. HAGINS:

10 Councilmembers, today you are

11 introducing Bill No. 240660 which

12 aims to amend the Homestead

13 Exclusion by changing the deadline

14 for property designation. This is

15 a step in the right direction. But

16 with that in mind, I am here to

17 call for the establishment of an

18 Office of Freedmen Affairs, a

19 continuation of the Freedmen's

20 Bureau.

21 The Freedmen's Bureau Act

22 of 1866 was never repealed, never

23 declared unconstitutional and never

24 concluded by presidential

25 proclamation. Its provisions

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 remained active and enforceable.

3 Yet the descendants of the

4 emancipated in this city have been

5 left without the protections that

6 is rightfully ours.

7 While Philadelphia has

8 created offices for immigrants,

9 LGBTQ people and others, the

10 American Freedmen, the progeny of

11 the emancipated, chattel slavery

12 survivors who built this city, we

13 don't have an office. How do you

14 as American Freedmen Councilmembers

15 justify that.

16 I had a meeting with

17 Councilmember Harrity before the

18 summer. You promised to introduce

19 this bill. We gave you everything

20 in writing. We're waiting to hear

21 from you. No, no need to talk

22 about it now. We were in the

23 meeting. I'm just saying I've been

24 waiting all summer. We've been

25 waiting all summer and we haven't

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 gotten a response from you. We
3 need a response for our office the
4 same way if it was anti-Semitism
5 you would jump to it right away.
6 So we need your attention in this
7 matter for the progeny of the
8 emancipated right now.

9 The Office of Freedmen
10 Affairs will provide the
11 comprehensive support that we need
12 in education, health care, economic
13 empowerment and legal advocacy.
14 These are not privileges. They are
15 the constitutional rights of the
16 American Freedmen and we are
17 demanding that this city fulfill
18 them right now.

19 Believe me, I know many of
20 you may not even understand a lot
21 of the language but your
22 legislative aides do. I suggest
23 that you consult them and find out
24 what you have to do. Ogbonna
25 Hagins, unseated council president,

2 fourth generation chattel slavery

3 survivor. Over and out.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Can Jeremy

6 Blatstein, Khalif Alexander and

7 Norman Tookes also make their way

8 to the podium.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 podium.)

11 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello, City

12 Council. My name is Jeremy

13 Blatstein. Congrats, Council

14 President Johnson, on your

15 appointment to the Clown Club.

16 That's a big accomplishment. I'm

17 glad that you can have a sense of

18 humor about this because I think

19 that both sides today what you

20 heard on that bill is important to

21 talk about, right.

22 The Keystone Opportunity

23 Zone, and that's what the bill is

24 about, is spurring development in

25 an area of the City of Philadelphia

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 that needs remediation. It's an
3 area that without Hilco and without
4 the Keystone Opportunity Zone tax
5 credit would not be happening right
6 now for the City of Philadelphia.

7 With that being said, and
8 you heard both sides, transparency
9 and accountability should be at the
10 forefront of this while we move
11 forward. What we're talking about
12 and you hear people say, well,
13 there's not people from the
14 community on the job sites. That's
15 just not true, straight up, right.

16 The unions are using labor
17 and the apprenticeship program from
18 the neighborhood to really build up
19 from this, the ground up. And I
20 just want that to be heard and it
21 be clear what the stats are. So
22 that's just something to keep in
23 mind as we move forward, the
24 transparency and accountability
25 from the unions, which isn't

2 usually transparent and
3 accountable, right. What is the
4 makeup of the workforce, where do
5 they live, what's going on. That's
6 something that I think we can talk
7 about.

8 The last thing I'll talk
9 about, SEPTA. Raise your hand if
10 you rode SEPTA to City Hall today.
11 That's zero. Councilmember
12 Johnson, you were off the hook this
13 morning because I had a prior
14 engagement. But next week what
15 stops better for you? Let's commit
16 now. Tasker, Morris or Federal
17 stop? What do you want -- what
18 time, 7:00 a.m.? 7:00 a.m., okay,
19 perfect. I'll meet you there at
20 7:00 a.m. That's a commitment.

21 And the only other thing I
22 will say is if you didn't read the
23 article that was yesterday in the
24 paper about PHA and the vouchers, I
25 would encourage each and every

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 person in this room to read that.
3 The article stated that the market
4 rate units that was being built
5 were being then filtered down to
6 voucher holders, and that is from
7 PHA. That's just a thing that
8 happens when more units are built
9 in Philadelphia. And thank you.

10 CHIEF CLERK: We have
11 Khalif Alexander, Norman Tookes.
12 And may Dr. Jonesia and Marvin
13 Robinson also make their way to the
14 podium.

15 (Witnesses approached
16 podium.)

17 MR. ALEXANDER: So what is
18 it -- good afternoon, everyone. My
19 name is Khalif Alexander and I am
20 here to speak on the bill in
21 regards to Revitalizing Downtowns
22 and Main Streets Act, which is HR
23 9002. Now, this is an important
24 bill for many reasons. First of
25 all, shout-out to Councilman Young

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 for introducing this bill, but not
3 only that, looking at downtowns and
4 revitalization.

5 As we begin to discuss
6 revitalization, we want to look at
7 economics, right, and that's one of
8 my favorite things. So let's
9 discuss downtown and historical
10 districts. We know that Black
11 people, Black Americans in
12 particular, built this city of
13 Philadelphia. Not only just the
14 city of Philadelphia, the 13
15 colonies and the Deep South. So we
16 know this. Then we should also say
17 that the Revitalizing Downtowns and
18 Main Streets Act should focus on
19 Black Americans who helped develop
20 these cities.

21 And when you begin to talk
22 about the contracts, when you begin
23 to talk about the economic
24 opportunities and advancement, that
25 should go to those fellow Black

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 residents. Now, honestly -- shout-
3 out to people on City Council. I
4 know some of y'all. I've known
5 some of y'all for years. I know
6 some of y'all people that work for
7 y'all.

8 But let's be real. We know
9 these contracts, they not going to
10 go to Black people. We know that
11 Black people aren't going to get
12 these opportunities because we're
13 in one of the biggest cities in
14 America. Yet we have the highest
15 level of poverty out of the biggest
16 cities in America.

17 We know that Black people
18 in America that live in
19 Philadelphia are living at
20 extremely high levels of poverty.
21 So what is our solution? Our
22 solution is again to develop an
23 Office of Freedmen Affairs Agency
24 for our Black Americans. Just like
25 my previous colleague Ogbonna

2 Hagins said, we have an office for
3 the Immigrant Affairs and the LGBTQ
4 Affairs, but where's our office for
5 Black Americans.

6 He got on Councilman
7 Harrity. Councilman Harrity, he
8 said he gave you the bill. I don't
9 know what's going on, but we're
10 going to have to get this bill out
11 to the other individuals because at
12 the end of the day, there's a long
13 standing of what we call benign
14 neglect from Black politicians not
15 only in the city of Philadelphia,
16 not only in the state of
17 Pennsylvania but nationwide.

18 And if you don't know what
19 the benign neglect clause means, it
20 basically means do something for
21 everyone else but the Black
22 Americans. You can give us
23 turkeys -- like the woman said, you
24 give us turkeys and tampons, but
25 when we go to try to get a \$10

2 million or \$20 million, a micro
3 grant to develop an economic hub
4 and an economic engine for our
5 Black Americans, we don't get that.

6 So again, I'm going to
7 close off with this. Now is the
8 time -- and I know a lot of y'all
9 working on the election right now
10 so I'm going let y'all do your
11 thing. But after that -- I'm going
12 to let y'all do y'all thing on
13 that. Win, lose or draw. But
14 after the election we have to begin
15 to focus on the economics of Black
16 Americans.

17 Yes, the gun violence is
18 down. Now that the gun violence is
19 down, we have a new initiative,
20 focusing on the economics for our
21 Black Americans in the city of
22 Philadelphia. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. TOOKES: Good morning.
25 My name is Norman Tookes. And I'm

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 here to talk about the Office of
3 Freedmen Affairs in Philadelphia,
4 is about to make an effort in this
5 century to finish the works on
6 reconstruction. The unfortunate
7 sabotage of the Freedmen's Bureau
8 stifled upward mobility and caused
9 the collapse of the burgeoning
10 economic infrastructure and systems
11 of inheritance that today's
12 generation would benefit from.

13 Without institutional
14 infrastructures backed by
15 government appropriations, we
16 remain vulnerable to impossible
17 factions and solutions to Freedmen
18 communities. As they said earlier,
19 every impacted population in
20 Philadelphia has an office.

21 Why aren't the emancipated
22 afforded the same protections,
23 because this is a sabotage of you
24 guys' political career if y'all
25 stand with the African American,

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Black American, the Freedmen of
3 this city, to give us equal
4 opportunity to do the things in
5 which will empower us as people to
6 stop the killings the shootings in
7 our neighborhoods. Why? Because
8 we can flourish the same way that
9 you can.

10 And you cannot say that
11 it's not business as usual when
12 Congressmen will not stand up and
13 say, okay, look, what are we going
14 to do for African Americans, Black
15 Americans, cotton-pickers, freedom
16 fighters. None of y'all have
17 anything on your agenda that's
18 going to say that this is what
19 we're going to do for Black
20 America. And until any of you have
21 a Black agenda, I don't think that
22 any of you deserve a Black vote,
23 period. Thank you.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Jonesia
25 and Marvin Robinson also make their

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 way to the podium.

3 (Witnesses approached
4 podium.)

5 DR. JONESIA: All right.

6 Good morning, everyone. I'm

7 Dr. Chinchila Jonesia, Executive

8 Director of Right the Wrong

9 Coalition and Be a Voice. I am

10 here today to actually support the

11 bill introduced by Councilmember

12 Bass for the resolution to enforce

13 against illegal things taking place

14 in stores throughout this city in

15 South Philadelphia.

16 There are at least five

17 stores that I know of and I've done

18 interviews and put out stuff on

19 media and all that stuff and

20 stories on that are selling

21 marijuana. They're selling

22 alcoholic beverages. They're

23 selling hard liquor like bottles of

24 tequila and everything else, and

25 they're open 24 hours and this

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 illegal activity is causing a big
3 problem.

4 And so, I am so glad that
5 you introduced that bill,
6 Councilwoman Bass. Also, I am in
7 support of Councilmember O'Rourke's
8 bill, and that is Bill No. 240904
9 calling on the state of
10 Pennsylvania to abolish the death
11 penalty with House Bill 9999,
12 although that's a great bill to
13 abolish the death penalty, but the
14 death penalty goes far beyond
15 ending the death penalty through
16 executing people that are
17 incarcerated.

18 The death penalty also is
19 death by incarceration, which is
20 men and women behind the walls that
21 are serving life sentences without
22 the possibility of parole. Those
23 people will never get out of prison
24 so they're actually going to die in
25 prison, so that is also a death

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 penalty. So we also need to look
3 at that and address that as well.

4 And I want to thank also
5 Councilwoman Bass and Council
6 President Johnson on the bill for
7 the Homestead to increase that time
8 for that and then real estate taxes
9 and all of that. And I really like
10 what Wanda Walker said about that.
11 And also, I just want to bring the
12 fact to people that are having
13 problems with their property taxes
14 you can always appeal it. So you
15 need to do that and it's very easy
16 to do. So try to appeal your taxes
17 because most people's property
18 taxes have gone up three times the
19 amount from last year. All right.
20 I'm Dr. Chinchila Jonesia. Thank
21 you.

22 MR. ROBINSON: Good
23 morning. Actually good afternoon.
24 My name is Marvin Robinson. I'm a
25 committee person in the 4th Ward,

1 10/17/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 second vice-president of the 4th
3 Ward. I'm only coming here to say
4 to the President, to all the City
5 Council, especially At-large, ask
6 this (inaudible) all of y'all will
7 be held accountable for what we
8 want in our communities.

9 It's not fair when people
10 like myself is out there in the
11 wilderness with guns trying to
12 clean up my neighborhood and I
13 don't get no support. So this is
14 for you, President, to you, all
15 your City Councilpeople, it has to
16 stop. After the election everybody
17 will be hold accountable. Have a
18 great day.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Council
20 President, there are no further
21 names for public testimony.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 mail-in ballot, fill it out and
21 turn it back in and their job is

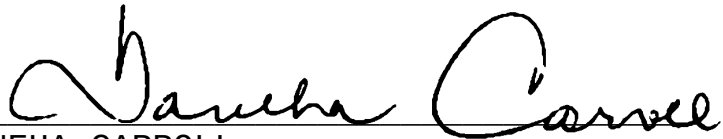
