15 matters on the Second Reading and Final
16 Passage Calendars for possible action at
17 a session of Council. A speaker on any
18 of those matters must sign up in order to
19 testify. You must call 215-686-3406 by
20 3:00 p.m. the day before the session to
21 sign up for public comment.

22 When you call, we will take
23 your name, phone number, the number of
24 the legislative item you are commenting
25 on and whether you are in support of or

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning. Just state your name for the
25 record and please proceed with your

3 MS. SCHOONMAKER: Good morning.

4 My name is Lindsay Schoonmaker and I am

5 here to speak on Resolution No. 210809.

6 Thank you so much for hearing my comment

7 and to Councilmember Parker for putting

8 forward this resolution.

9 I'm a resident of Philadelphia

10 and also a supervising attorney at

11 Philadelphia VIP, a legal aid

12 organization that matches low-income

13 Philadelphians with pro bono attorneys

14 for civil legal issues. At VIP, we fully

15 support this resolution to spread

16 awareness about the need for estate

17 planning. We see hundreds of clients

18 each year with title issues to their

19 homes from lack of proper estate

20 planning. We also see the need to ensure

21 our seniors and other incapacitated folks

22 are properly cared for when they can no

23 longer care for themselves.

24 Proper estate planning can

25 resolve these issues, but there is a lack

2 of awareness about the importance of
3 these documents and how to obtain them.

4 VIP helps over 100 clients a
5 year with estate planning. A client
6 whose wife recently passed away with
7 title to their home in her name alone was
8 able to get title when a volunteer
9 attorney of ours helped him probate his
10 wife's estate. Because of how suddenly
11 his wife died and because she did not
12 have a will in place to protect her
13 husband and twin boys who had been
14 adopted, the process was tricky.

15 When we were finally able to
16 get the title issue resolved and into
17 their name, our client quickly agreed to
18 estate planning documents. And just last
19 week he told me how comfortable he was
20 after working with VIP and getting all of
21 his papers in order. He said his friends
22 were also surprised at how he was getting
23 everything in order, but he had learned
24 from experience how important that is.
25 He wants to leave his boys well cared for

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2 if something should happen to him too.

3 So to deal with this at VIP, we
4 recruit, train, and support volunteer
5 attorneys to not just draft documents but
6 to counsel clients on what they really
7 want and need in estate planning
8 documents and also to make sure those
9 documents are properly executed.

10 We provide template documents,
11 trainings, and other resources, including
12 notary services, for our volunteers and
13 clients, and we've had great success
14 partnering with community partners such
15 as neighborhood groups like the
16 Brewerytown Sharswood NAC, the outreach
17 events you all put on, and other
18 non-profits like Rebuilding Together
19 Philadelphia to host intake clinics and
20 information sessions about estate
21 planning.

22 So we love the idea of
23 spreading more information to promote
24 estate planning and believe National
25 Estate Planning Awareness Week is a great

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2 step in that direction.

3 Thank you for your time and
4 consideration of this resolution.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you very much for your testimony.
7 We appreciate it.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Sandra Dungee Glenn, commenting on
10 210681.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning. Just state your name for the
13 record and please proceed with your
14 testimony.

15 MS. GLENN: Good morning,
16 Council President Clarke and members of
17 City Council. My name is Sandra Dungee
18 Glenn, founding partner of The Collective
19 network and The Collective Investment
20 Group. I'm here to support Bill No.
21 210681, the Neighborhood Preservation
22 Initiative.

23 In November 2019, Tayyib Smith,
24 Steve Sanders, and I brought together a
25 group of experienced Black real estate

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2 developers and launched The Collective.
3 We've committed to support our seven
4 companies through advocacy and raising
5 \$100 million in capital to put into their
6 projects. They've committed to and have
7 a track record of doing projects -
8 commercial, mixed-use, for sale, and
9 rental housing - that produce financial
10 returns and add assets that benefit
11 existing residents instead of displacing
12 them.

13 The Collective developers have
14 a pipeline of over \$300 million in
15 projects. Our members are Mosaic, TPP
16 Holdings, West Powelton, Ujima,
17 Wilson-Drake, Smith and Roller, and BKP.
18 This list will continue to grow, and you
19 can learn more about us at
20 thecollectivephl.com.

21 I want to thank Councilmember
22 Sanchez, Jones, Johnson, Bass, Domb, and
23 Green for meeting with us and supporting
24 our work. We believe the process for
25 real estate development must shift from

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2 top down to one that takes a more
3 holistic view of a neighborhood's needs.
4 NPI can be a great start in this
5 direction.

6 Our comments are based on
7 research and our members' experience
8 working in Philadelphia. We'd like to
9 work with you to leverage private capital
10 with NPI to maximize the impact on
11 neighborhoods.

12 NPI includes important
13 priorities, and we have four
14 recommendations as you implement Year 1.

15 First, we'd like to target the
16 accelerated fund to provide credit
17 enhancement and cover free development
18 costs for developers whose projects have
19 a quantifiable social impact. We
20 recommend broadening the criteria for
21 qualified projects, raising the
22 guaranteed limit, and increasing the
23 investment amount. Prioritize projects
24 that provide quantifiable impacts in the
25 areas of employment, BIPOC business and

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2 homeownership, livable income, and access
3 to essential services.

4 Second, NPI should use
5 comprehensive master planning to get the
6 most benefit from each investment.
7 Partner with residents and other local
8 voices to ensure that new projects
9 holistically address the specific needs
10 of a given area.

11 Third, expand the role of the
12 Land Bank and streamline the process.
13 The bill references certain use, but we
14 believe it can be applied in a wider
15 variety of situations to improve
16 community stability and expand access to
17 neighborhood-level wealth creation.

18 Finally, NPI should apply
19 research-based impact metrics to capture
20 and address the social determinants of
21 health. We've identified and mapped
22 metrics that show the interplay between
23 real estate and outcomes, including
24 housing cost burdens, food deserts, lead
25 exposure, and others. We're happy to

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2 partner as an independent third party to
3 apply these metrics to NPI investments.

4 We're delighted to work with
5 you and further refine this roadmap to
6 determine how best to put it into action,
7 and we thank you for your time.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
10 testimony today.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is the Reverend Gregory Holston,
13 commenting on 210636.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning. State your name for the record
16 and please proceed with your testimony.

17 REVEREND HOLSTON: Good
18 morning. My name is Reverend Gregory
19 Holston. I am the Senior Advisor on
20 Policy and Advocacy for the District
21 Attorney's Office and here to support the
22 passage of Bill No. 210636, what is
23 called the driver equality bill.

24 I'm thankful for all the work
25 that has been done around this bill,

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2 around dealing with this such difficult
3 issue.

4 The reality of driving while
5 Black as being a crime across the nation
6 and in Philadelphia is a reality that
7 most of us who are Black have experienced
8 in some way, in some manner over the
9 years. Many of us have given the talk to
10 our children, particularly our Black
11 males, in reference to this reality.

12 About six years ago, I was
13 pastoring a church and we had a community
14 forum around stop and frisk, and at that
15 community forum, it was very volatile.
16 The conversation was very heated,
17 particularly when one member of that
18 panel, a police officer, a police chief,
19 said that White supremacy had no
20 relationship to the Police Department.

21 I think we've come a long way.
22 I think we made some broad steps with
23 this bill to come to the reality that
24 racism and structural racism is a reality
25 in our Police Department and that we need

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2 to do and set policy to make change.

3 Over 300,000 stops each year,
4 74 percent of them African American,
5 90 percent where no arrests are involved,
6 less than one percent involved any
7 capture of any guns. It seems the
8 process is for years that racism and that
9 Black people are treated in a different
10 manner and in a different way by our
11 Police Department, and this bill signals
12 with the partnership of Councilperson
13 Isaiah Thomas, all the leaders on
14 Council, the former Public Defender, Keir
15 Bradford-Grey, and our Police
16 Commissioner, Danielle Outlaw, coming
17 together to address this issue in a real
18 and tangible way that can make the
19 difference in the lives of Black and
20 Brown people in the City of Philadelphia.

21 We've come a long way. We've
22 taken some steps. We're responding in
23 the right kind of way.

24 I gladly support this bill and
25 see it not just as an end, but as a

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2 beginning of a real way for our Police
3 Department and all of our law enforcement
4 to really regain the trust of our Black
5 community in every way.

6 Thank you so much.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony. We
9 appreciate it.

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
11 is Nikki Grant, commenting on 210636.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 morning. State your name for the record
14 and just proceed with your testimony.

15 MS. GRANT: Good morning,
16 Councilmembers. Thank you so much for
17 allowing me to speak. My name is Nikki
18 Grant. I'm the Policy Director of
19 Amistad Law Project.

20 I promise to be very brief this
21 morning. I just want to thank the
22 Council for moving forward with the
23 driving equality bill, which will
24 redirect police time and resources
25 towards keeping Philadelphians safe and

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2 removing the negative interactions with
3 police.

4 The City has a very long
5 history of stop and frisk and driving
6 while Black stops, which targets Black
7 communities, and this bill is an
8 excellent way to address this problem.

9 I am particularly excited that
10 this bill will gather data about traffic
11 stops and help us identify and correct
12 police officers who do target Black
13 people for traffic stops.

14 I want to particularly thank
15 Councilmember Thomas for his leadership
16 on this issue.

17 And that's all I have to say,
18 but thank you so much for me to hold this
19 bill. Have a great day.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
22 We appreciate it.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The final speaker
24 for today, Mr. President, is Queen Judith
25 Robinson, commenting on 210636-A.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. State your name for the record
4 and please proceed with your testimony.

5 QUEEN ROBINSON: Good morning.
6 Queen Judith Robinson here to testify on
7 Bill Nos. 210635 and 210636-A.

8 I want to focus on the part of
9 the bill that talks about preventing
10 racial disparities. As an African
11 American woman, I agree with that
12 100 percent, but with over 400 murders in
13 this city, mostly Black people, now our
14 women and children, I really don't want
15 to hamper law enforcement as it relates
16 to possibly reducing crime.

17 So I want to focus on why so
18 few criminals are being targeted, why so
19 few criminals are found when all of these
20 folks are being targeted for stops.
21 Something is out of order where that many
22 people could be stopped who happen to be
23 African American and we're not getting
24 these criminals who are shooting up our
25 rec centers and killing all over

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2 Philadelphia.

3 Our cameras show they're
4 getting in and out of vehicles. So I
5 think we need to focus right there, why
6 are so many people being targeted who are
7 not these folks, who are criminals,
8 murderers in our communities.

9 In addition, the bill talks
10 about protect public safety. That's
11 where I want to be, protected, protected
12 by our law enforcement. So I want law
13 enforcement to focus on even the smallest
14 crime as it relates to the broken window
15 theory. I'm talking about the broken
16 taillight theory. These criminals are
17 running around our community in and out
18 of cars shooting up in broad daylight.

19 So as much as I don't want
20 racial disparity as it relates to these
21 targeted crimes, I want to do further
22 research to find out why they're doing
23 all of these targets of drivers' vehicles
24 but not finding criminals. That's where
25 I want to focus right there. And I don't

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2 know how this bill could expound on that
3 or expand on that, but I think we need to
4 focus right there. How could that be?
5 How could that be that we're not finding
6 criminals that are running loose, driving
7 around with illegal possession all over
8 Philadelphia, wreaking havoc on our
9 community?

10 So as much as I want to make
11 certain that we're not being
12 disrespected, I don't want law
13 enforcement hampered in that regard. Can
14 we please focus on why they're not
15 getting these criminals off our streets,
16 moving around in vehicles.

17 Thank you very much for the
18 time. I appreciate that, and I hope we
19 can identify that area. Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
22 We appreciate it.

23 Is that it, Mr. Decker?

15 properly seconded that the resolution be
16 adopted.

17 All in favor indicate by saying
18 aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it, and that resolution is
25 adopted.

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2 Mr. Decker, read the title of
3 Bill No. 210636-A.

4 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
5 amending Title 12 of The Philadelphia
6 Code, entitled "Traffic Code," to clarify
7 the appropriate methods and circumstances
8 of enforcement of traffic violations in
9 order to provide for the fair and
10 transparent administration of traffic
11 violations, prevent racial disparities,
12 and protect public safety, and making
13 certain technical changes.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Thomas.

18 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
19 Council President. I just want to make a
20 few remarks before we go ahead and vote
21 on this bill.

22 First of all, I just want to
23 talk about the data and the problem a
24 little bit, and I appreciate everyone's
25 input and testimony today.

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2 In a 12-month period looking at
3 the year 2018, Philadelphia Police found
4 illegal drugs or guns in less than one
5 percent of traffic stops, as Black
6 drivers were 34 percent less likely than
7 White drivers to be carrying anything
8 illegal but significantly more likely to
9 be pulled over than our White
10 counterpart. The data showed that
11 72 percent of Black Philadelphians have
12 been pulled over, while 90 percent of
13 driving stops are for code violations
14 that don't even warrant a ticket.

15 We are in a position right now
16 where we are seeing a disproportionate
17 number of people being pulled over,
18 300,000 people specifically at the year
19 we looked at, and when you found that
20 less than one percent of those stops led
21 to some type of contraband and/or a
22 weapon, we see that there's an issue
23 there.

24 Now, I know a lot of folks are
25 talking about this issue around public

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2 safety and impacting public safety. The
3 seven different violations that we are
4 looking at are not violations that impact
5 public safety.

6 I also want people to keep in
7 mind over the last two, four, six or so
8 years that we've been seeing an increase
9 in crimes as it relates to the City of
10 Philadelphia, the current practices were
11 already in place. So I don't see any way
12 that this bill would have a negative
13 impact on public safety here in the City
14 of Philadelphia.

15 The driving equality agenda is
16 something that what we've classified
17 certain Motor Vehicle Code violations as
18 a primary violation, which allows an
19 officer to conduct a traffic stop and
20 essentially name them now secondary
21 violations, which traffic stops will no
22 longer be used as the primary means of
23 enforcement. These are not things that
24 impact public safety. So we're not
25 looking at things like running a stop

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2 sign. We're not looking at things like
3 speeding.

4 (Background noise.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
6 on one second. Somebody needs to mute.

7 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: That's my
8 good friend. I give him a pass.

9 Municipalities across the
10 country are developing police reform
11 legislation, and it's been an honor for
12 us to essentially work with a number of
13 different partners. So in the midst of
14 crafting this legislation, I don't want
15 folks to think that this was a one-off
16 initiative. This was a bill that was
17 introduced nearly a year ago. My team
18 worked with law enforcement, along with
19 the Mayor's Office and the Managing
20 Director's Office, to put together a
21 working group to decide exactly what we
22 felt like we can do effectively once we
23 all agreed that this was a significant
24 issue that disproportionately impact
25 people of color.

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2 Similar to the daily consent
3 decree, the driving equality agenda will
4 require police to collect and report
5 information as it relates to traffic
6 stops. The Police Department will
7 maintain digital records of who has
8 conducted the stop, who was stopped,
9 where the driver was stopped, the reason
10 for the stop, and whether or not police
11 action was taken and if contraband or a
12 weapon was discovered. This information
13 will be published on a regular basis and
14 searchable for everybody.

15 So not only will the bill look
16 to address some of the disproportionate
17 number of stops we see in people of
18 color, the bill will also have a
19 transparency component that's going to
20 require a certain level of communication
21 with myself, with other members of
22 Council, and with the general public.

23 The reason I think that that's
24 significantly important is because what
25 we are trying to do is show that we are

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2 attempting to do things a little
3 different. This is 2021. We can't do
4 things the same way we did in the past.
5 We have to be more innovative. We have
6 to continue to reinvent ourself, and we
7 have to continue to put ourself in a
8 position where we're listening to the
9 constituents that elected us all and
10 responding to the concerns that's been
11 communicated to us and moving in a way
12 that's data driven.

13 So I want to thank all of my
14 colleagues for your support throughout
15 the course of this process. I've talked
16 to many of you throughout the course of
17 the last couple months. I would love to
18 have your vote for this bill, and I think
19 this is something that is historic that
20 can put us in a position where we're
21 addressing a systemic issue that's been
22 plaguing Black communities not just in
23 Philadelphia but all across the country.

24 Thank you, Council President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 I believe Councilman Oh had
4 some comment. The Chair recognizes
5 Councilman Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes, I do.

7 Thank you very much, Council President.

8 And I do want to commend my colleague
9 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas for his
10 innovative efforts. I do not agree with
11 him and I will be voting against the
12 bill. I do want to explain, however, my
13 reasons, particularly addressing our
14 District Attorney's Office, which I am
15 very troubled by their statements.

16 Let me say first that the bill
17 is most likely preempted by state law.
18 Secondly, is probably an illegal bill.
19 And particularly the Motor Vehicle Code,
20 as articulated in a letter to this body
21 July 13th by State Representative Martina
22 White citing the Pennsylvania Vehicle
23 Code, which states in its provisions that
24 the Code shall be applicable and uniform
25 throughout the Commonwealth and in all

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2 political subdivisions in this
3 Commonwealth, and no local authority
4 shall enact or enforce any ordinance on a
5 matter covered by the provisions of this
6 title, unless expressly authorized. And
7 this body is not authorized.

8 The next thing is that this
9 bill makes secondary violations out of,
10 for example, driving without a current
11 registration for up to 60 days because --
12 it's not making it legal. It's still
13 illegal. It's preventing the police from
14 stopping a vehicle and effectively even
15 ticketing that vehicle for up to 60 days.
16 It also prevents the police from stopping
17 a vehicle that is driving without
18 emissions or inspection stickers and
19 other things.

20 And it does not -- it's for all
21 vehicles - trucks, cars, buses. It has
22 nothing to do with the race of the
23 person. The person could be White,
24 Black, Asian, Hispanic. The police are,
25 according to this bill, unable to stop

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2 those vehicles. And even if they have
3 insurance, their insurance is
4 ineffective. So if they hit someone, if
5 they get into an accident, if they hit
6 someone on a bicycle or a child, they
7 effectively have no coverage. That is
8 something that would harm the driver as
9 well as the person who is hit.

10 I do think for public safety
11 it's important that our police be able to
12 safeguard our public highways and roads
13 by stopping vehicles that are a danger to
14 the public because they are not
15 inspected, not registered, and not
16 effectively covered by insurance.

17 The final thing I want to say,
18 particularly because of what the District
19 Attorney's Office has said, I oppose and
20 I have outspokenly said I am against
21 improper use of stop and frisk. That's
22 unconstitutional. It's racially
23 oriented. Stop and frisk has a
24 legitimate purpose, provided there is
25 reasonable suspicion, articulable

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2 suspicion that a crime has been committed
3 and that the person is armed and
4 dangerous. Then the police have an
5 ability to stop the person and pat them
6 down, not for a -- just to see if there's
7 a weapon.

8 However, police departments,
9 including in Philadelphia, have used stop
10 and frisk unconstitutionally and
11 improperly to simply stop people in
12 neighborhoods, pat them down for drugs,
13 for contraband, for weapons, whatever
14 they want. That is a gross misuse. It's
15 unconstitutional. I oppose it. Everyone
16 should.

17 However, stopping vehicles that
18 are violating the state traffic code is
19 not that. They are stopping vehicles.
20 If there is a disproportionate stopping
21 of vehicles that are not in violation of
22 the driving code, that would be improper.
23 That is as illegal as any other thing.
24 But if they are properly stopping
25 vehicles that are in violation of the

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2 driving code, there's nothing wrong with
3 that.

4 And if the insinuation or if
5 the implication is that there are police
6 officers falsely stopping vehicles and
7 using traffic code violations as an
8 excuse, we should know about that and we
9 should correct that. However, a police
10 officer who's intent on stopping
11 something wrongfully could simply say
12 they're driving recklessly.

13 I think what we want to do is
14 to make the public safe by enforcing the
15 laws. We don't want to pass illegal
16 bills and certainly don't want to subject
17 people in our poorest of neighborhoods to
18 being hit by a vehicle that is uninsured.

19 For that reason, I will be
20 voting against the bill.

21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
23 President, I have a point of --

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Council
25 President, may I be --

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
3 on. Councilwoman Bass had a question.

4 The Chair recognizes
5 Councilwoman Bass.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I do want to, number one,
8 I want to thank the author, the sponsor
9 of this bill, Councilmember Thomas,
10 because I know that in all things that he
11 does, his heart is certainly in the right
12 place and he's really trying to make a
13 difference for the citizens of
14 Philadelphia and particularly for those
15 who have had the unfortunate experience
16 of being stopped but really without
17 cause.

18 I overall support this piece of
19 legislation, but I did have a question
20 that I would like for the sponsor to
21 clarify, particularly around the
22 registration.

23 And so I did check in with my
24 own insurance agent prior to this vote
25 now to ask specifically about the

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2 insurance effect on registration, and
3 Councilman Thomas, you are indeed right.
4 I was told by my insurance provider that
5 the registration, it is a requirement,
6 but it would not affect the coverage if
7 you are actually in an accident.

8 However, my question is, can
9 you give us some additional detail about
10 the idea that this is -- basically if
11 you're operating your car without a valid
12 registration, you're operating a motor
13 vehicle illegally. And so can you talk
14 to us about the idea that you are
15 operating a vehicle that is not properly
16 registered and is, therefore, operating
17 illegally on the streets within the City
18 of Philadelphia. I was hoping that you
19 could address that.

20 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Council
21 President, may I address the concern?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Please. Yes, Councilman.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
25 Council President.

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2 Thank you, colleagues, for your
3 questions, and thank you for this
4 dialogue.

5 Councilmember Bass
6 specifically, we've been having this
7 conversation for some time, so I
8 appreciate you bringing it to the floor,
9 because the same questions you have,
10 other constituents in the City of
11 Philadelphia asked.

12 As far as the valid
13 registration, you're absolutely right.
14 When someone does not have a
15 registration, it does not have a negative
16 impact on their insurance, and something
17 can still be done as it relates to
18 incidents take place, insurance can still
19 be covered.

20 Under this legislation, I just
21 want to be very clear. If someone is
22 driving and they do not have registration
23 and their registration has expired, they
24 can still be ticketed, right? Often your
25 registration is ticketed by the

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2 Philadelphia Parking Authority. Often
3 your registration is ticketed by law
4 enforcement officers who might be foot
5 patrol officers, who might have just
6 walked past your car.

7 You also can look at
8 registration being something that's
9 enforced as it relates to the violation
10 once someone has been pulled over. So
11 similar to a seatbelt, no one is saying
12 that it's not legal to drive around
13 without a seatbelt, but when you look at
14 the type of enforcement, all we're asking
15 the City of Philadelphia to do is to look
16 at the enforcement mechanisms as it
17 relates to these different traffic
18 violations.

19 Now, if someone has committed a
20 crime and there is some type of
21 reasonable cause to be able to pull
22 someone over, none of that would be
23 impacted by this bill. So the idea that
24 public safety will be directly impacted
25 would suggest that our best means of

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2 fighting crime is to randomly pull people
3 over and hope that we're lucky to be able
4 to find some type of weapon or
5 contraband.

6 I think that it would be naive
7 of us in the year of 2021 with all the
8 technology and different means and
9 mechanisms that we have to be able to say
10 that our best means of impacting public
11 safety is to randomly pull people over
12 because they might have committed a
13 traffic violation and their skin is a
14 certain color. We know that there are
15 other counterparts.

16 And I want to move into
17 addressing some of the things that
18 Councilmember Oh said. Councilmember Oh
19 talked about the idea that people who are
20 being pulled over are people who
21 committed violations. I wouldn't argue
22 that, but my argument would be when you
23 look at the percentage of people in the
24 City of Philadelphia and you look at the
25 people who commit violations based on

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2 Councilmember Oh's logic, he's basically
3 suggesting that only Black people break
4 the law, because only Black people are
5 being pulled over. And if you talk to
6 White folks in the City of Philadelphia,
7 which I've talked to plenty of them,
8 their registration expires. Their
9 emission stickers expire. They just
10 don't have the same negative interaction
11 with law enforcement that their Black
12 counterparts do.

13 I want to address a couple
14 other things that Councilmember Oh talked
15 about. He brought up a letter that was
16 sent from a state legislator that was
17 actually dated January 13th, like he
18 said, but that letter was actually sent
19 to Council today. So I want to be clear
20 for the record that that letter was sent
21 to Council today while it was dated
22 January 13th.

23 I also want to be clear for the
24 record that the letter was inaccurate.
25 It talked about nine different violations

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2 that we were looking to move from primary
3 reasons to secondary reasons, and that's
4 just not true. There aren't nine
5 violations. There were never nine
6 violations, and the information in that
7 letter, again, is not accurate.

8 On top of that, the letter also
9 suggests that the City would lose revenue
10 based on finding and feeling poor people
11 and people of color. The Department of
12 Justice looked at what took place in
13 Ferguson and actually said that what was
14 happening in Ferguson was wrong. It was
15 a civil rights violation, and it was
16 something that should be addressed.

17 So for that letter to insinuate
18 that we should continue to fine poor
19 people and people of color to generate
20 revenue for the City of Philadelphia is
21 the exact type of institutional racism
22 that we essentially do not want to have
23 in the City, and it's extremely
24 disappointing that my colleague would say
25 in one breath that he feels like stop and

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2 frisk is a significant problem and the
3 exact same breath encourage us to be able
4 to generate revenue off of the backs of
5 poor people and people of color.

6 I want to say again thank you
7 to all of my colleagues for your support
8 throughout the course of this process. I
9 want to be very clear that I've had
10 dialogue with my colleagues, some who
11 communicated they can vote for it, some
12 who communicated they can't vote for it,
13 and others who communicated their
14 concern, but I do want to make sure that
15 we're having authentic dialogue as it
16 relates to what we're doing and we're not
17 playing politics on an issue that
18 violates people's civil rights.

19 I will be more than willing to
20 have a conversation with any state
21 legislator who feels like that this bill
22 is illegal. We've talked to a number of
23 different lawyers, including the Public
24 Defender's Office, the City Solicitor's
25 Office, as well as multiple attorneys,

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2 who do say that the City of Philadelphia
3 has our own right as a county to
4 determine how we enforce Motor Vehicle
5 Code violations.

6 This bill will not change the
7 law. This bill will not say that
8 something is no longer illegal. This
9 bill will only communicate how we as a
10 municipality enforce these things that
11 are essentially illegal.

12 Thank you, Council President.
13 I appreciate it. And I'm here to answer
14 any other questions that my colleagues
15 may have before we look to vote on this
16 bill.

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
18 President, I had an earlier point of
19 information.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I'm sorry.
21 Mr. President?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
23 Councilwoman.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I just
25 wanted to say, number one, I wanted to

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2 thank the Councilmember for his
3 explanation. I still have some
4 reservations, but the Councilmember has
5 provided detailed statistics in terms of
6 the issue that I'm most concerned about,
7 which is the invalid registration,
8 expired registration, and in those
9 statistics it states that about seven
10 percent of these stops are connected to a
11 registration. So it's not the biggest
12 issue, but still nonetheless, it is an
13 important issue to me.

14 I am going to support the bill
15 today, but only with the agreement.
16 Councilmember Thomas did say that he
17 would continue to monitor the
18 registration numbers and pay attention,
19 and we will revisit this after we have
20 enough data to see if this is a
21 significant problem that we really need
22 to address in a more robust way.

23 So I am going to stand in
24 support of where the Councilmember is
25 today, but with reservations, and he has

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2 agreed to work with me on those
3 reservations in the future.

4 So thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 Councilman Green, you had a
8 point of order? Sorry.

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Yeah. Well,
10 a point of information. I just wanted to
11 follow up on a couple things, and I'm
12 going to make sure that my understanding
13 of the bill is correct.

14 In looking at the bill, which
15 is the most recent amendment that I see,
16 I see both the enforcement of primary
17 violations, which allows a law
18 enforcement officer may initiate a
19 vehicle stop and at the discretion cite a
20 driver for a violation, and then
21 enforcement of a secondary violation. It
22 provides information where an officer may
23 initiate a motor vehicle stop for a
24 secondary violation observed within the
25 City of Philadelphia.

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2 My understanding, and
3 Councilmember Thomas, if you can correct
4 me, that you worked very closely with the
5 Police Department in reference to
6 drafting this legislation. And so my
7 understanding based on your work with the
8 Police Department as well as the City
9 Solicitor's Office, it was deemed that
10 this draft that is before us today is
11 legal from their perspective, both from
12 the Police Department and them saying
13 that this will not impact their ability
14 to enforce the law in the City of
15 Philadelphia based on how this law has
16 been amended, as well as the City
17 Solicitor's Office. Am I correct in that
18 perspective?

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Council
20 President, if you don't mind me
21 answering.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Please.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:
25 Councilmember Green is absolutely correct

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2 in his analysis of the legislation and
3 the work that's been done to lead up to
4 this point.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 Councilman Oh, I think you
8 wanted to be recognized again.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes. Thank you
10 very much, Council President. I'd like
11 to make a clarification.

12 When I said effectively
13 covered, an insurance policy is a
14 contract between, for example, me and my
15 insurance company. There are conditions
16 to the coverage. So if I get on the road
17 in violation of state law with a car
18 while I have expired registration,
19 expired -- I haven't gotten an
20 inspection, things like that, I have
21 coverage. However, if I get into an
22 accident and the insurance company finds
23 that I was driving with those violations,
24 they can choose to not cover me for
25 violating our agreement that my car and I

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2 were not supposed to be on the road.
3 That's effectively the lack of coverage.

4 So while it is technically
5 correct to say, you can say that you
6 still have an insurance policy and you
7 have coverage, that coverage is at risk.
8 And for those who don't believe that
9 insurance companies are eager to give up
10 money, you're taking a great risk and I
11 would say on the greater side of not
12 being covered because your car was in
13 violation of the state motor vehicle code
14 and you were not supposed to be driving
15 it. Therefore, they have a right and
16 ability to deny coverage to you.

17 That's just my clarification.
18 And with that, I think we all understand
19 what's at stake and we're all ready to
20 vote.

21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: One more
25 point of clarity, Council President.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilman Thomas.

4 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I just want
5 to say again thank you to my colleagues,
6 and I respectfully disagree with
7 Councilmember Oh's perspective of this
8 particular issue, and I also want to just
9 for the record and for public consumption
10 communicate that I'm very accessible.
11 We've had multiple dialogues with a lot
12 of our colleagues who felt like the bill
13 was problematic and had questions and
14 concerns around the bill, and most of my
15 colleagues decided to have that
16 conversation before we came for a vote
17 today.

18 So I feel like if Councilmember
19 Oh as well as other people who he
20 communicated communicated to us and if
21 they had legit concerns about the bill
22 and they really felt like that this was
23 something that would impact the public
24 safety of the citizens of Philadelphia,
25 it's probably not best to wait until the

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2 day of when we're actually going to vote
3 for it to be able to have that
4 conversation.

5 So all of these questions could
6 have been answered. We could have put
7 Councilmember Oh in a position where we
8 could have had this conversation so he
9 understands what we're trying to do as
10 well as -- or what we're not trying to do
11 as well as any other letter that might be
12 referenced here today.

13 So thank you, Council
14 President. I appreciate you giving me
15 the opportunity to provide a moment of
16 point of clarity. Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: One last
20 point of information.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you.
24 Reading through the bill once
25 again, Councilmember Thomas in his

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2 legislation makes reference to various
3 matters under the state code, and my
4 understanding -- I just want to make sure
5 I understand this fully -- that at no
6 point is a police officer in the City of
7 Philadelphia prohibited from enforcing
8 the state code within the City of
9 Philadelphia. They are doing enforcement
10 for a primary violation through a
11 citation or they're doing an enforcement
12 of a secondary violation, which may
13 enable that officer to initiate a motor
14 vehicle stop for a secondary violation.

15 So my understanding, my reading
16 of the legislation is that officers
17 within the City of Philadelphia have the
18 full ability to enforce all of the
19 traffic laws within the Commonwealth of
20 Pennsylvania in the City of Philadelphia.
21 The difference is doing an enforcement by
22 way of a citation as opposed to a vehicle
23 stop. Am I correct in that reading?

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

25 Councilmember Green again is correct, and

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2 we are as a Council body continuing to
3 work on different innovative ways of
4 enforcement of Motor Vehicle Code
5 violations, such as addressing noise
6 ordinances and other issues that
7 constituents in Philadelphia have
8 communicated to us as a concern.

9 So thank you, Councilmember
10 Green, for the clarity.

11 And thank you, Council
12 President, for allowing us to address
13 this issue in depth. We appreciate it.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Absolutely. The people's house always
16 has a very transparent public
17 conversation about these matters. It's
18 very important for us to do this.

19 Okay. Mr. Decker, read the
20 title of the bill again just for the
21 public.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Bill No. 210636-A
23 is an ordinance amending Title 12 of The
24 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Traffic
25 Code," to clarify the appropriate methods

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2 and circumstances of enforcement of
3 traffic violations in order to provide
4 for the fair and transparent
5 administration of traffic violations,
6 prevent racial disparities, and protect
7 public safety, and making certain
8 technical changes.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 This bill having been read on
12 two different days, the question now is
13 shall the bill pass finally.

14 Mr. Decker, please call the
15 roll.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
17 Bass.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
20 Brooks.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Aye.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb.

23 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Aye.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
25 Gauthier.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: A very
3 enthusiastic aye.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
5 Gilmore Richardson.

6 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Aye.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green.

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym
10 is voting aye.

11 Councilman Johnson.

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones
14 is voting aye.

15 Councilman Oh.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: No.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

13 I want to take a moment to
14 thank my colleagues for supporting my
15 office through the introduction, passage,
16 and now enforcement of the Renters'
17 Access Act, which went into effect in the
18 City of Philadelphia yesterday.

19 I especially want to thank
20 Councilmembers Gauthier, Gym, Henon, and
21 Thomas who co-sponsored this legislation
22 and were early supporters of the bill.
23 And I want to thank the Community Legal
24 Services for their early partnership and
25 expertise in crafting this legislation.

1 10/14/21 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 The Renters' Access Act
3 regulates the tenant screening and
4 application process so that applicants
5 are given a fair shot at securing
6 housing. It ensures that families are
7 not forced into homelessness or into
8 dangerous living situations solely
9 because of an old eviction filing, low
10 credit score, and an inability to pay
11 bills during COVID-19 emergency period,
12 an inaccurate credit report or another
13 incomplete depiction of an applicant's
14 financial situation. And when there's
15 transparency and accuracy built into the
16 tenant screening process, both renters
17 and landlords have a clear picture of how
18 decisions are being made and why.

19 I see the enforcement of this
20 legislation as an important step towards
21 achieving housing justice and racial
22 justice in Philadelphia.

23 What this law asks landlords to
24 do is engage in a holistic assessment of
25 applicants. This breaks down many of the

2 structural barriers that have kept poor
3 and working-class people of color out of
4 the rental housing market for decades,
5 and now eviction records
6 disproportionately affects and impacts
7 Black women and their families and can
8 make it nearly impossible to obtain
9 private rental housing. This law evens
10 the playing field and gives them a fair
11 shot.

12 My team has been working hard
13 with local stakeholders to create clear
14 guidelines and outreach materials so
15 renters are aware of their rights and
16 landlords have clear information on what
17 is expected of them. We have already
18 begun circulating these guidelines, and
19 it will be uploaded shortly to the L&I,
20 Philadelphia Commission on Health and
21 Relations, and Fair Housing Commission's
22 websites.

23 I want to invite my colleagues
24 and the public to share these resources
25 so that these laws are widely and fairly

2 enforced so our constituents are
3 guaranteed clear pathways to securing
4 rental housing.

20 hard work around this driver equity bill.

3 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman. A
4 lot of work went into what will be a good
5 bill.

6 Councilman Oh, did you wish to
7 be recognized or am I reading my --

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes, I did.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Okay. The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Oh.

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
13 Council President. Today I introduced a
14 resolution, the result of an arson upon
15 the house of a community leader.

16 Councilmembers Quinones-Sanchez and
17 Councilmember Squilla and myself were at
18 a press conference, and they deal with
19 this issue constantly, and I try to
20 support them as best as I can. They're
21 intimately involved with the community.

22 In this instance, this woman
23 came out of her home to confront drug
24 dealers on her block that were giving
25 away free samples of heroin in an effort

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2 to market their product, turn that corner
3 into a drug dealing location, and for
4 that, she received a phone call while she
5 was not at home, but her child was at
6 home, that the front of her house was on
7 fire. And there's a video of it. That
8 was a couple weeks ago.

9 The persons who did this have
10 been -- there are people who can identify
11 them, but the investigation goes on.

12 This is an issue where I think
13 it is critical that the City leave no
14 stone unturned to ensure that people
15 understand this is not a new day in
16 Philadelphia where you start attacking
17 community leaders and residents who are
18 trying to live in a decent community
19 setting their homes on fire.

20 I urge the Administration to
21 issue a \$20,000 reward for information
22 leading to the arrest of these
23 perpetrators and information leading to
24 those who are behind them.

25 This has to be a priority in

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2 our city. Our citizens are watching, our
3 community leaders are watching, and the
4 criminals are watching to see what we are
5 going to do.

6 This woman is concerned about
7 her safety.

8 I will also make this point:
9 We will not be able to address crime and
10 murder in this city if we solely focus a
11 large portion on solving murders and
12 investigations. You will be overwhelmed
13 with them. Prevention is critical in law
14 enforcement to provide for public safety,
15 and we need to do that.

16 In this case, there are active
17 criminals. They are out there, and this
18 has to be a priority in our Police
19 Department, in our city to ensure the
20 safety of our citizens.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 O'Neill.

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2 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. Last week both Councilman
4 Green and I had excused absences to
5 attend the Pennsylvania Municipal League
6 meeting in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. And
7 if Councilman Thomas is looking for a
8 champion of the week, and I know he
9 always comes up with one, he would do
10 well to pick Councilman Derek Green, who
11 served as President this past year at the
12 Pennsylvania Municipal League under
13 difficult circumstances with the pandemic
14 and just hit it out of the park during
15 the entire conference that he chaired,
16 some difficult technology issues. He was
17 right on keeping the crowd calm, and he
18 was flawless.

19 And I've attended over 30 of
20 these conferences. I was President
21 twice, once elected and once filling --
22 the board asked me to fill an unexpired
23 term, and it's not an easy task, and on
24 neither of those occasions did I do
25 nearly as well as Councilman Green did

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2 last week.

3 So I just want to congratulate
4 him personally. I was proud. He made
5 Philadelphia proud. And I know,
6 Councilman Thomas, not everyone is an
7 athlete that gets the champion of the
8 week, and if you're looking for somebody,
9 you'll do very well with our colleague
10 Councilman Green.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 And congratulations, Councilman
15 Green.

16 And speeches on behalf of the
17 majority?

18 Councilman Green.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
20 Council President.

21 Thank you to my colleague
22 Councilmember O'Neill, who has provided a
23 lot of wisdom in his leadership involved
24 in not only the Pennsylvania Municipal
25 League and also the National League of

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2 Cities where he served as the past
3 President for both of those
4 organizations. Following in your
5 footsteps and the footsteps of my former
6 boss, Councilmember Marian Tasco, both of
7 you have been leaders in promoting the
8 City of Philadelphia around the
9 Commonwealth and around the country. So
10 thank you for your kind words.

11 I just wanted to make a point
12 that the City of Philadelphia has made a
13 lot of great strides in reference to
14 diversity. Just yesterday myself and a
15 number of other members of Council had
16 the opportunity to attend the 45th
17 anniversary for the launch of the
18 Philadelphia Gay News, and Mark Segal has
19 been an activist and a journalist. And
20 we've made a lot of strides in reference
21 to diversity from gender, in reference to
22 orientation, in reference to ethnicity.
23 Kind of the last barrier that I think we
24 need to really move forward in reference
25 to diversity is in reference to those

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2 that have physical and learning
3 differences.

4 As we go into next year, we'll
5 be moving forward with the Americans with
6 Disabilities Act transition plan for the
7 City of Philadelphia to make our City
8 Hall as most open as possible for those
9 that have physical and learning
10 differences as well as our entire city.
11 And I'm a strong proponent of this work
12 because many of you know that I have a
13 son on the autism spectrum.

14 This weekend we will have our
15 annual Walk Now for Autism Speaks Walk at
16 9:00 a.m. at Citizens Bank Park. Last
17 year it was virtual. This year we're
18 back in person walking around Citizens
19 Bank Park. It looks like it's going to
20 be a great fall day this Saturday. So I
21 will be out there with my family and all
22 the other supporters and friends who try
23 to lift up those that have a physical and
24 learning difference and help them in
25 reference to the work that they're trying

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2 to do in their own lives and help them to
3 have great careers and lives in our
4 phenomenal city as we continue to push
5 forward with greater diversity,
6 especially with those that have physical
7 and learning differences.

8 So if you are around on
9 Saturday, please join me at Citizens Bank
10 Park, 9:00 a.m. for the Walk Now for
11 Autism Speaks Walk.

12 Look forward to seeing you, and
13 thank you, Council President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Parker.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
19 you, Mr. President.

20 Let me start, Mr. President, by
21 adding my voice to the choir.

22 Councilmember Green,
23 congratulations on all of the work and
24 leadership that you have provided via the
25 Pennsylvania League, along with the NLC.

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2 It has served our city well. So
3 congratulations to you, and thank you,
4 Councilmember O'Neill, as well.

5 I also want to congratulate
6 Councilmember Kendra Brooks. Last night
7 she and I think Councilmember Gilmore
8 Richardson also participated, we were on
9 a Zoom with the We Dream Black group,
10 along with the National Domestic Workers
11 of America, and it was a pretty powerful
12 celebration and it was, in essence, to
13 lift up the resolution that Councilmember
14 Brooks introduced and that we passed
15 establishing the Dorothy Bolden Day here
16 in Philadelphia.

17 So, Councilmember Kendra
18 Brooks, thank you, and on behalf of all
19 of the matriarchs in my family, thank you
20 for working to lift up their livelihood,
21 and to Councilmember Quinones-Sanchez for
22 her early work with the legislation.

23 Now, I want to just note that I
24 got a call during our Council that we
25 lost a Philadelphian who had done a great

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2 deal of work for each of us in the area
3 of photography. And we know how
4 important photographers are. We think
5 about the historic photo with Brother
6 Malcolm and Dr. King. We think about
7 Dr. King and Rabbi Heschel and the power
8 that photographers have in memorializing
9 history, Mr. President.

10 And here in our great City of
11 Philadelphia -- I know I'm going to tell
12 my age -- if you know photographers,
13 particularly in the Black community, you
14 know John-John, who passed away years
15 ago. If you've ever taken a prom picture
16 and you went to Essence, that means you
17 know Washeez (ph). I call him my Omega
18 man photographer.

19 And I called Councilmember Bass
20 during the session, because I couldn't
21 think of the name that I was missing from
22 Germantown Avenue, and that was -- I
23 called her and Sharmain Matlock-Turner,
24 and they were both like George Butler,
25 George Butler, memorializing families and

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2 very important days in our city.

3 Well, I want to note for the
4 record that we lost our main man, Marty,
5 Marty Regusters from Leaping Lion
6 Photography. Every picture I ever took,
7 Mr. President, when I needed the picture,
8 I needed the head shot before I had the
9 money. Did you hear what I just said,
10 Mr. President? I needed the head shot
11 before for the fundraising invitation so
12 that I could earn the money needed to pay
13 him, and he took the shot.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: I want to
16 say to his family, I want to say to his
17 life partner, Kim Perry, I want to say to
18 his sister, Dee Regusters-Fox, thank you
19 for sharing him. I want to say to his
20 partner in photography -- you know, it is
21 not perfect when you have five pimples
22 and it's the day of the shoot. He calls
23 in Ellen Conway to tag team with him, and
24 Ellen would do your makeup while Marty
25 took your pictures.

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2 Marty, we love you. Leaping
3 Lion, thank you for what you did for us,
4 and we will keep you and your family in
5 our prayers and we will work with all
6 members of Council and make sure that we
7 get a resolution done honoring his work
8 in our great city.

9 I also want to finally just
10 note for the record that I thank VIP.
11 Lindsay came on during public comment to
12 talk about the estate planning workshop
13 that we will be hosting next Wednesday,
14 October the 20th virtually at 6:30 p.m.

15 For anyone talking about the
16 need to preserve and build generational
17 wealth, particularly in Black and Brown
18 communities, one of the most unspoken
19 about issue that needs to be addressed is
20 the issue of estate planning. And when
21 we talk about issues like tangled titles
22 that I'm honored that my team and I have
23 been working to address since I became a
24 member of the Pennsylvania House back in
25 2005 and people started walking in that

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2 office and we knew that they couldn't
3 take advantage of services in the City
4 because they weren't the owner of record.
5 We are now going to work on providing
6 people with access to those professionals
7 who can help them develop a will so that
8 they can understand what power of
9 attorney is. We're going to give them a
10 booklet that we used in the Pennsylvania
11 House where they can collect all of their
12 information and put it together.

13 And so I'm looking forward to
14 it. National Estate Planning Month is
15 extremely important, and anyone who is
16 talking about preventing gentrification,
17 preventing gentrification, that's not
18 only simply about the cost of property,
19 but it's also home preservation,
20 neighborhood stabilization, and how we
21 build and pass along generational wealth.
22 And because many folks haven't been
23 wealthy enough to have an accountant and
24 an attorney on hand for what they need to
25 do with their personal business, we've

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2 seen a lot of generational wealth leave
3 our communities.

4 So we are not going to stop
5 addressing this issue. It's not sexy,
6 but Lord knows it's substantive.

7 Thank you, Mr. President, and
8 thank you, colleagues.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman. Our
11 hearts and prayers go out to the family
12 of Marty. Always an upbeat kind of
13 person, I'll tell you. He'll be missed.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
17 you, Council President. I know Marty was
18 a staple at many, many, many events. So
19 to his family, thank you for this
20 service.

21 I want to also congratulate
22 Councilmember Thomas for his work on this
23 driving bill. Any time you have a good
24 debate, it means you're doing good things
25 when you're asking the tough questions

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2 and the tenseful conversations about how
3 we change the narrative. So congrats on
4 the work and the work to be done, because
5 ultimately the bill -- this is the
6 beginning of a process, not the end of
7 it. It's how you implement it and
8 monitor it that will be telling.

9 I just want to again highlight
10 and thank all of my colleagues who
11 participated in many of the Hispanic
12 Month activities, particularly
13 Councilmember Oh, who really has, between
14 the Fette El Libro (ph) and Vive Latino,
15 has done a really good job this year of
16 highlighting some of the Latino culture
17 and events. So I want to personally
18 thank him, but thank all of my
19 colleagues.

20 This afternoon -- we started
21 this about four years ago -- we will have
22 a Latinos in Government reception in the
23 City Hall Courtyard, along with City
24 Solicitor Cortez, Deputy Mayor Cynthia
25 Figueroa, and a number of Deputy

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2 Commissioners who have been promoted over
3 the last couple years, if you haven't met
4 some of them, Janita Rijoso (ph), Leon
5 Richard Montanez, Rolando Randone. And
6 this year we've also included some of the
7 highest ranking members of the public
8 safety portfolio, our captains. Both
9 happen to be female, Captain Maria
10 Rodriguez and Captain C.C. Ortiz. So go
11 figure, but all the folks participating.

12 So any of my Council colleagues
13 who are around around 5 o'clock, if you
14 want to stop by the Courtyard and just
15 say thank you and share with us. We have
16 two local Latino vendors, Loco Lucho and
17 Lisa Peru. And we absolutely want to
18 thank our sponsor, Editory (ph) and
19 Associates, for helping us pull this
20 little recognition of folks just getting
21 together.

22 So the good weather is because
23 Latinos are getting together outside.
24 Don't think Mother Nature wasn't in
25 cahoots with us. So enjoy today.

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2 Thank you, Council.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you.

5 The Chair recognizes
6 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson. I
7 think you wanted to --

8 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
9 you, Council President. My apologies. I
10 must be excused from the session, as I
11 have a Local Government Advisory
12 Committee meeting with the United States
13 EPA at 12:00 p.m.

14 Thank you very, very much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, Councilwoman. Let the record
17 reflect, Councilwoman.

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 Next up the Chair recognizes
20 Councilman Thomas.

21 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
22 Council President. I just want to take a
23 moment to thank again my colleagues for
24 passing this historic legislation today.
25 I appreciate your support.

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2 I want to start by thanking
3 some folks that are not my colleagues.
4 Then I'm going to go into my colleagues.

5 Thank you to USA Today and the
6 Philadelphia Inquirer for endorsing this
7 legislation. Of course, thank you to the
8 Public Defender's Office for being a part
9 of our work group as well as former Chief
10 Public Defender Keir Bradford-Grey.

11 Thank you to POWER, Professor
12 Woods, Dr. Cooper, and CASA Local 502,
13 the Philadelphia Federation of Teachers
14 and Unite Here for your endorsement
15 letters, Malcolm Jenkins and the Players
16 Coalition for your support, Richard
17 Hooker and the Teamsters Local 632 -- I
18 mean 623 for your support, Mayor Biss for
19 your testimony and support, Amistad Law,
20 Live Free, Professor Hannon at Villanova,
21 Professor Forman of Yale Law, of course
22 my colleagues, and the Police Reform
23 Working Group.

24 I have to give a huge thank you
25 to Mayor Kenney, Commissioner Outlaw, and

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2 the entire Administration for working
3 with us throughout the course of this
4 process.

5 As it was talked about earlier
6 with Councilmember Green and his
7 leadership with the National League of
8 Cities, he definitely used his network to
9 help introduce me to other people who
10 were doing similar things and who have
11 done similar things in other places, to
12 be able to lean on them for guidance
13 throughout the course of the last year.
14 So thank you, Councilmember Green.

15 Of course to my freshmen four
16 colleagues who -- my therapist and
17 everything else. Thank you guys for
18 having my back. I appreciate you.

19 I want to say thank you to
20 Councilmembers Gym, Johnson, and Sanchez
21 as well, who have been mentors and
22 extremely supportive throughout the
23 course of this process.

24 Thank you to Councilmember
25 Parker, who had the ballot initiative on

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2 the ballot to be able to address this
3 issue and to put us in a position to be
4 able to use her ballot initiative to be
5 able to talk about how Philadelphians
6 felt as it relates to this particular
7 issue.

8 Councilmember Bass and I have
9 talked about the data registration side
10 of this. So I want to say thank you to
11 her for her support.

12 My colleagues Councilmembers
13 Domb and Squilla, a huge thank you to
14 both of you for working with me on the
15 amendment to this particular legislation
16 so you can help me make sure that we get
17 it right.

18 Of course, Council President,
19 thank you for your leadership and helping
20 steer this bill across the finish line.

21 And last, but not least, I want
22 to say thank you to my colleague
23 Councilmember Brian O'Neill.
24 Councilmember O'Neill and I have had
25 in-depth dialogue about this particular

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2 bill. We've talked about the good, the
3 bad, the ugly. And as the youngest
4 member on Council, talking to the one
5 with the most wisdom on Council,
6 Councilmember O'Neill, I appreciate you,
7 and it's a pleasure to serve on Council
8 with you, Councilmember O'Neill, because
9 we can even agree to disagree and still
10 have great informative dialogue in the
11 midst of that.

12 So thank you, everybody. I
13 appreciate you guys so much.
14 Philadelphia is leading the nation when
15 it comes to this particular issue. And
16 like I promised you all before the midst
17 of this, we're going to monitor this
18 issue and we're going to make sure that
19 we get it right. And if it's not right,
20 we're going to be more than prepared to
21 go back to the drawing board and amend
22 the legislation to be able to assure that
23 we get it right.

24 Shifting gears, last, but not
25 least, today at 5:30, if folks are free

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2 after you're finished with Councilmember
3 Sanchez, because I'll be out there with
4 you at 5 o'clock, we will be at the
5 Kimmel Center today in collaboration with
6 Young Involved Philly to put together an
7 event around arts and advocacy. The
8 event is going to take place from 5:30 to
9 7:30. Some of the panelists are folks
10 who work with and in collaboration with
11 City Council and this legislative body,
12 and we will be talking about the great
13 work that this legislative body has done
14 with our private partners as it relates
15 to the advocacy for arts and culture and
16 some of the things that we plan on doing
17 moving forward.

18 So if you're free, please join
19 us at the Kimmel Center today at 5:30.

20 And, again, thank you so much,
21 everybody, for your continued support. I
22 appreciate you and I appreciate working
23 with you all.

24 Thank you, Council President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Bass.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, thank
6 you, Mr. President.

7 Thanks to my colleagues for the
8 great work that everybody is doing, and
9 Councilmember Thomas, I look forward to
10 following up with you on my concerns.
11 Thank you so much for being willing to
12 discuss them and have open dialogue and
13 conversation.

14 Right before we went online, I
15 got the call about Marty Regusters and it
16 nearly dropped me to the floor. He's
17 been a friend for so long. I can't even
18 remember when we first met, we go so far
19 back. And I just thank God that I had
20 the opportunity to know him, to be in his
21 company, to call him a friend. He was
22 somebody who was really, really special
23 in the City, and he's really going to be
24 missed.

25 So he did work pictures, as

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2 Councilmember Parker said. He did head
3 shots. He did -- listen, for almost any
4 event that I did, Marty was there. He
5 did baby shower pictures and baby
6 pictures for me and everything. He was
7 like family. So he's really going to be
8 missed by all of us, I'm sure.

9 So thank you, Mr. President,
10 for indulging me on that.

11 I also just wanted to speak
12 very briefly about a press conference
13 that we had just yesterday regarding
14 Waterview Recreation Center in Germantown
15 with the Black Clergy of Philadelphia. I
16 want to thank the Black Clergy for really
17 coming forward in a very strong, robust
18 way and saying that our playgrounds and
19 recreation centers deserve more. And
20 they have an initiative now in which --
21 led by Reverend Collier. They are going
22 to be really working and pressing and
23 pushing for the conditions of our rec
24 centers to be addressed.

25 This is something that's long

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2 overdue, and I just cannot thank them
3 enough for having us there yesterday.
4 And also many thanks to Reverend Jeanette
5 Davis and also Reverend Holston who were
6 at the press conference yesterday, as
7 well as State Representative Steve Kinsey
8 and State Senator Art Haywood.

9 I said yesterday, and I'll say
10 it again, as taxpayers, we have a
11 covenant with the City of Philadelphia,
12 all of us, in which we agree that we're
13 going to pay our taxes, and in response
14 to that, the City's end of the bargain is
15 that they're going to maintain our
16 facilities. And so that agreement has
17 been broken. That is not what has been
18 happening.

19 And so as much as I love a
20 community cleanup, I'm about sick and
21 tired of doing community cleanups for
22 things that we're paying to have cleaned
23 up, like our rec centers.

24 We shouldn't have to go out on
25 our Saturday mornings and clean up rec

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2 centers. We pay for our rec centers to
3 already be cleaned and addressed and
4 maintained through our tax dollars.
5 These services are supposed to be
6 provided. If we as a community want to
7 provide additional services, then by all
8 means, we should be able to do that, but
9 at the same time, the services that we
10 pay for should be happening. They should
11 be happening through our budgetary
12 process. They should be happening
13 through our Rebuild initiative in which
14 we ask folks to pay extra for soda and
15 sugar-sweetened beverages.

16 And so folks are asking -- it's
17 like the old commercial, where's the
18 beef? You know, where's the money?
19 What's happening? Why is this not being
20 addressed in a more timely manner? Why
21 do we have to keep going out and cleaning
22 up our recreation centers? Because
23 they're not being cleaned, they're not
24 being greened, they're not being
25 maintained, and what's happening with

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2 that.

3 Our communities deserve more,
4 and I look forward to really being a
5 strong part of this initiative and ask
6 other members of Council to join us.

7 One of the things that we are
8 doing to strengthen our rec centers
9 across the board in the 8th District is,
10 we are in the process of rebuilding all
11 of our advisory councils. And so we had
12 a meeting approximately two weeks ago
13 with a number of individuals over at
14 Lonnie Young. We expected -- listen, we
15 had hoped for ten people, Mr. President.
16 We had over 30, 35 people who showed up,
17 and that's a testament to the fact that
18 people are interested, people care, and
19 they want to see more in their
20 neighborhoods.

21 So we started with Lonnie
22 Young. We have Wister Playground coming
23 up this Sunday, the 17th, from 2:00 to
24 4:00 p.m. at Wister Playground. So we
25 want to encourage folks if you live in

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2 that area or if you're just interested,
3 please join us. We need your help.

4 And we want folks to show up
5 and show out. We cannot complain from
6 the sidelines. We have to be an active
7 part of what's happening in our
8 communities. So we want to encourage
9 folks to come out this Sunday from 2:00
10 to 4:00 at Wister Playground.

11 We also have scheduled
12 Waterview Playground for an open house on
13 November 10th. So we want folks to come
14 out there. Happy Hollow Playground in
15 Germantown is also being scheduled, along
16 with a number of others.

17 So we want to really encourage
18 folks to be a part of the solution, and
19 we think that working together, we can
20 get great things done. Can't get it done
21 by ourselves, not one of us, but working
22 together we can get a lot accomplished.
23 So please come out and participate.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you for
3 your work on very important rec issues.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you
8 very much, Council President.

9 One, I just want to thank
10 Isaiah Thomas and his hard work and his
11 dedication for his driver equity bill.
12 It was not an easy piece of legislation
13 on public policy for him to actually
14 shepherd through City Council without any
15 type of adverse feedback. So I just want
16 to give him a shout-out, because I've
17 been talking with him from day one. I
18 watched him go through the process. I
19 watched him do his research. I watched
20 him stay on the case when it comes to
21 addressing this particular issue. So I
22 just wanted to say kudos to him.

23 I also want to just send out my
24 prayers to the family of Marty. And I
25 just met Marty just based upon me doing

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2 the work that I do in terms of being a
3 former State Representative as well as a
4 City Councilman, but in that process, I
5 remember one day he offered just some
6 words of encouragement and support just
7 based upon the work that I have been
8 doing, and from there, we just developed
9 a cool relationship.

10 And so he definitely will be
11 missed. He was just an all-around good
12 guy. And so my prayers and thoughts go
13 out to his family. I just wanted to put
14 that out there for the record.

15 I want to thank all my
16 colleagues who participated yesterday in
17 the Special Committee on Gun Violence
18 hearing. There were some key discussions
19 that took place that at least makes me
20 feel like we're going in the right
21 direction, although we will be surpassing
22 500 homicides this year in the City of
23 Philadelphia.

24 I did pay close attention to
25 some of the key police districts across

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2 the City of Philadelphia under Operation
3 Pinpoint where homicides and shootings
4 are actually going down. And so
5 hopefully we can build on the successes
6 of those particular police districts but,
7 most importantly, continuously working
8 together in a comprehensive way in
9 addressing the issue of senseless gun
10 violence. And those key findings were
11 just based upon the working relationship
12 between, contrary to popular belief, our
13 District Attorney's Office and our
14 Philadelphia Police Department.

15 So hopefully we will
16 continuously see more of that type of
17 collaboration moving forward, and that's
18 the only way that we're going to reduce
19 the senseless gun violence that we're
20 seeing here in the City of Philadelphia.

21 And last, but not least, all of
22 us who have been around Council for a
23 little bit know our good friend Joe
24 Meade, who currently right now works for
25 the Philadelphia Flyers, and they will be

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2 having a pep rally outside City Hall
3 today with the Broad Street Bullies,
4 Philadelphia Flyers today at 12:00 p.m.
5 So anyone who wants to come out, have a
6 good time, meet Gritty to kick off this
7 Flyers season, come on out and have a
8 good time.

9 Thank you, Council President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Broad Street Bullies. Boy.

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Squilla.

15 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. And I also want to
17 congratulate my colleagues for all the
18 work that they have done. The debate in
19 our conversation is always so important,
20 and it's great to hear people could
21 disagree and still (connection issues).
22 So I appreciate that.

23 But I do want to mention
24 something that Councilmember Green
25 mentioned too about it was an honor for

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2 me to speak the other day down at the
3 historic marker dedication for the PGN,
4 Philadelphia Gay News. It's a historic
5 moment here for the City of Philadelphia,
6 and Mark Segal and his husband, Jason,
7 have really given a lot to the City of
8 Philadelphia and also (connection issues)
9 the City for younger people to stand on
10 their shoulders to achieve even new
11 heights.

12 So I'm not a big speaker here
13 in a lot of these sessions, but I thought
14 it was really important to (connection
15 issues) congratulations to the PGN and
16 Mark Segal.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

20 That concludes our speeches on
21 behalf of the minority and majority.

22 And with that, the Chair
23 recognizes Councilman Squilla for a
24 motion to adjourn.

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President. I move that the Council
3 be adjourned until Thursday,
4 October 21st, 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. It has been moved and
8 properly seconded that Council stand
9 adjourned until Thursday, October 21,
10 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

11 All those in favor indicate by
12 saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it. The motion carries.

19 Thank you all very much.

20 Awesome work.
