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2 REVEREND DIAZ-MARTINEZ: The
3 Lord be with you.

4 (And also with you.)

5 REVEREND DIAZ-MARTINEZ: Let us
6 pray.

7 Heavenly Father, in your word
8 you have given us a mission of that holy
9 city through which the nation of the
10 (unintelligible) glory. Behold and
11 visit, we pray that cities of the earth,
12 especially the City of Philadelphia.

13 Renew the times of good to our
14 regard which for our city life send us
15 honest and able leaders. Enable us to
16 eliminate poverty, prejudice, and

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you so much, Pastor.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you very much.

8 Before we start, I would ask if
9 anyone has an electronic device that
10 rings, buzzes or does whatever, that
11 makes noise, I would ask that you please
12 turn it off or turn it on silent. We
13 appreciate your cooperation.

14 The next order of business is
15 the approval of the Journal of the
16 meeting of Thursday, June 12th, 2014.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Greenlee.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I move that the
21 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, June
22 12th, 2014 be approved.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. It has been moved and

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2 properly seconded that the Journal of the
3 meeting of Thursday, June 12th, 2014
4 stand approved.

5 All those in favor?

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it, and the Journal is
12 approved.

13 The next order of business is
14 requests for leaves of absence, and the
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Curtis Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. On behalf of the
18 majority, there are no requests for
19 leaves of absence today.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 You all will understand why I'm
23 smiling in a moment. We're going to
24 recognize a very special guest today.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

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2 Brian O'Neill.

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. On behalf of the
5 republicans, there are no requests for
6 leave of absence.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you, sir.

9 At this time, I would like to
10 recognize -- I want to recognize
11 Councilman Jones. Let's get the
12 introductions.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: We are
14 pleased and proud to have a lot of guests
15 observing us in action today, Judge
16 Dumas, President Judge Kevin Dougherty,
17 but one that I've met several years ago.
18 The President of Erie's City Council is
19 here with us today and I'd like to
20 introduce Councilman Curtis Jones, Jr.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you so much, Councilman.

24 And, Council President, one
25 Council President to another, thank you

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2 so much. We really appreciate you being
3 here, and I'd love to get an opportunity
4 to come to one of your sessions. Thank
5 you so much.

6 At this time, I'd like to
7 recognize Councilman Oh.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
9 much, Council President. I too would
10 like to just recognize that in our
11 audience today are three veterans, Chris
12 Diaz, who is President of the Drexel
13 University Veterans Club, 800 members,
14 Navy Corpsman who served with the
15 Marines; Bob Wagner, former Captain with
16 the Special Forces; and Dave Henderson,
17 Captain who served three tours, two in
18 Iraq and one in Afghanistan, here to
19 observe and also to support the veterans
20 VA hearing that we'll have over the
21 summer.

22 Thank you very much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 I ask them to stand up. Just

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2 kind of raise your hand.

3 Congratulations.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much for your service.

7 The Chair recognizes

8 Councilwoman Blackwell.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. Today I'd like to
11 welcome to Council Mr. Edwin Goff, Board
12 of Directors, as well as students from
13 the Cobbs Creek Community Environmental
14 Education Center. They are here with us
15 today.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Please stand.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you and welcome. Thank you for
21 being here today.

22 We have no other recognitions.

23 At this time, I would just like to

24 dispense with the regular order of

25 business and I would like to welcome

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2 everyone here today. I want to thank you
3 for coming down to witness your local
4 government in action. We really
5 appreciate the fact that you took time
6 out of your day to come down to see us.
7 We hope that today is a pleasurable
8 experience, so much so that you want to
9 come back again. So, again, thank you
10 very much, and have a good time today.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Kenney, who will
13 present a resolution honoring the
14 students and teachers of Academy at
15 Palumbo School. Would Dr. Adrienne
16 Wallace Chew and those accompanying her
17 please join the Councilman at the podium.

18 And joining Councilman Kenney,
19 we have Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
20 Brown and I believe Councilman Squilla.

21 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. This is a resolution
23 honoring the students and teachers of
24 Academy of Palumbo High School in South
25 Philadelphia for their achievements in

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2 winning one of five prizes in Samsung's
3 nationwide Solve for Tomorrow contest
4 which includes \$140,000 in new technology
5 for their school.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
8 Academy at Palumbo is a School District
9 magnet high school located in South
10 Philadelphia whose mission includes
11 raising the aspirations of each student,
12 developing universally applicable problem
13 solving techniques, acquiring
14 technological skills and instilling a
15 life-long passion for learning that
16 includes a rich cultural arts experience;
17 and

18 Whereas, earlier this year,
19 teachers Klint Kanopka and Susan Lee put
20 together a team of 15 students to compete
21 in Samsung's nationwide Solve for
22 Tomorrow contest. Samsung created the
23 contest to raise awareness and interest
24 in schools across the country in the
25 areas of, we know, Science, Technology,

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2 Engineering and Math, also known as STEM;

3 Whereas, the Palumbo team used

4 local crime data to create an algorithm

5 to map out the safest route from one

6 location to another, and specifically the

7 safest routes to their school. The team

8 gave values to streets surrounding their

9 school on the level 1 to 5, with streets

10 with recent crime reports rated higher,

11 or more dangerous. The students also

12 completed a survey of all students to

13 determine where the students come from,

14 and how much of their commute is spent

15 walking. The data and subsequent

16 algorithm can be used by students and all

17 Philadelphians to find the safest routes

18 for them to take them throughout South

19 Philadelphia; and

20 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

21 on Tuesday, March 25th, 2014, with much

22 elation and excitement, the students

23 learned that their project was chosen as

24 one of the five winners out of more than

25 2,300 schools participating throughout

2 the country; and

3 Whereas, led by school
4 principal Dr. Adrienne Wallace Chew and
5 teachers Lee and Kanopka, the Palumbo
6 team included students from all high
7 school grades, 9 to 12. The team members
8 are: Aigner Andrews, Jason Barr, Eva
9 Biegalski, Emmanuel Cruz, Yagouda Diallo,
10 Steven Geiger, Tuong Lam, Lydia Le,
11 Kimberly Ly, Tarzan MacMood, Tiffany Ng,
12 Deanna Polsz, Van Sam, Amy Tran, Quyen
13 Truong, Alex Wallace, Diyaaldeem
14 Whitaker, Emmanuel Williams and Ming Wu.

15 I hope I did some of them
16 right.

17 And whereas, accomplishments
18 like this further illustrate just how
19 exceptional our young people can be when
20 given the necessary tools and direction.
21 We need to continue to highlight our many
22 successes as we make sure we give every
23 student in our school exactly what they
24 need to succeed; now, therefore

25 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Be it

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2 resolved, by the Council of the City of
3 Philadelphia, that Council does hereby
4 honor and commend the students and
5 teachers of Academy at Palumbo High
6 School in South Philadelphia for their
7 achievements in winning one of five
8 prizes in Samsung's nationwide Solve for
9 Tomorrow contest which includes \$140,000
10 in new technology for their school.

11 Further resolved, that an
12 engrossed copy of this resolution be
13 presented to Principal Dr. Adrienne
14 Wallace Chew, Ms. Susan Lee, Mr. Klint
15 Kanopka and the Academy at Palumbo Solve
16 for Tomorrow team as evidence of the
17 sincere sentiments of this legislative
18 body.

19 Congratulations and thanks for
20 your hard work.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 the Chair recognizes Dr. Chew for
24 remarks.

25 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'd like

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2 to thank the Council for recognizing our
3 students for their achievements, and I'd
4 also like to thank my students to
5 continuing to achieve in spite of the
6 best wishes of the State of Pennsylvania.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you. Thank you so much.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will
16 present a resolution honoring the
17 Honorable Abram Frank Reynolds. Would
18 Judge Reynolds and those accompanying him
19 please join the Councilman at the podium.

20 And joining Councilman Johnson,
21 we have Councilwoman Marian Tasco and
22 also Councilman Denny O'Brien and
23 Councilwoman Cindy Bass.

24 Folks, can I ask you to hold
25 your voices down a little bit, please.

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2 Thank you.

3 And Councilman Jones and
4 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez will also
5 join the Councilman.

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Dr. Martin
7 Luther King, Jr. once said life's most
8 persistent question is what are you doing
9 for others.

10 As I reflect upon my path in
11 life, I think about how I grew up in the
12 streets of Point Breeze, South
13 Philadelphia, graduated from Edward Bok
14 High School, went on to Mansfield
15 University where I received my degrees in
16 criminal justice, dual minors in
17 philosophy and sociology, decided to come
18 back to the City of Philadelphia to serve
19 my community by attending the University
20 of Pennsylvania Fels Center of Government
21 and also had the opportunity to go on to
22 Harvard Business School where I
23 participated in a non-profit leadership
24 program for non-profit leadership and
25 board management, had the great

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2 opportunity to work for a state Senator
3 and decided to run for state
4 Representative and answered the call to
5 come back home to my City of
6 Philadelphia, becoming the first African
7 American Councilman representing the 2nd
8 Councilmanic District of Philadelphia.
9 And when I think about my experiences
10 that I normally share with my young
11 people, I have to think about my
12 experience and the path that have gotten
13 me to this point in life, and I think
14 about a gentleman who I've met on this
15 path who offered some stern words of
16 encouragement, some stern words of advice
17 that helped me become the young man who I
18 am today, and that gentleman is the
19 Honorable Frank Reynolds, judge of the
20 Family Court, who I wanted to take time
21 out of my busy schedule to acknowledge
22 him for his advocacy and his work with
23 dealing with juveniles, steering our
24 young people on the right path and
25 allowing them to have a clear

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2 understanding that if they make smart
3 decisions and smart choices, they can
4 also have a career such as a Councilman
5 Kenyatta Johnson, born and raised in
6 South Philadelphia.

7 And so at this time, I wanted
8 to sincerely show him that I appreciate
9 those encouraging words that he has
10 offered me as a juvenile to kind of put
11 me on the path and in some cases probably
12 even save my life when we look at the
13 issue of youth gun violence being the
14 number one killer of African American
15 young men. And so I want to sincerely
16 take this time and thank my colleagues
17 for being here as well as Judge Dougherty
18 as well as Judge Lori Dumas and also my
19 good friend, Mr. Benny Price.

20 Honoring, recognizing and
21 commending the Honorable Abram Frank
22 Reynolds for his efforts to promote
23 justice, adequate representation, and
24 healthy development for youth.

25 Whereas, Judge Reynolds began

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2 practicing law in Philadelphia 30 years
3 ago as an assistant public defender. He
4 was appointed to the Philadelphia Court
5 of Common Pleas in 1986. In 1992, Judge
6 Reynolds became the first state
7 supervising judge to be appointed by the
8 Pennsylvania Supreme Court; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
10 for seventeen years, Judge Reynolds
11 served the City of Philadelphia as a
12 Family Court judge and Administrative
13 judge of the Philadelphia Family Court.
14 Judge Reynolds' hands-on leadership of
15 the Juvenile Court from 2000 to 2003
16 served as a national model; and

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
18 during his tenure, he instructed young
19 attorneys entering the courtroom on the
20 importance of proper court procedures and
21 preparation. At least 507 young
22 assistant district attorneys reaped the
23 benefit of Judge Reynolds' direction.
24 Over the course of his career, Judge
25 Reynolds remained in Family Court; he was

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2 unwilling to accept an appointment to a
3 more prestigious office; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
5 Judge Reynolds enlisted in the military
6 in 1959. He served our country on active
7 duty on several tours between 1959 and
8 1965. Judge Reynolds was a briefing
9 specialist at Langley Air Force Base with
10 the Air Command unit until 1959, a highly
11 decorated reconnaissance unit; and

12 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Whereas,
13 throughout his career, his Honor has
14 inspired youth to achieve. Judge
15 Reynolds is a certified tennis teaching
16 professional in a tennis program that
17 provided over 100 scholarships and
18 produced five American Tennis Association
19 National Championships; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,
21 Judge Reynolds is a recipient of
22 Pennsylvania's Outstanding Judicial
23 Leadership Award in 2003 from the
24 Juvenile Court Judges' Commission and the
25 Philadelphia Bar Association's Thurgood

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2 Marshall Award. Judge Reynolds founded
3 the National Conference of Black Lawyers
4 in Philadelphia. In 2006, he earned his
5 LLM degree at Temple's Beasley School of
6 Law; now, therefore

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
8 by the Council of the City of
9 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor,
10 recognize and commend Judge Abram Frank
11 Reynolds for his efforts to promote youth
12 development, representation, and justice.

13 Further resolved, that an
14 engrossed copy of this resolution be
15 presented to Judge Abram Frank Reynolds
16 as evidence of the sincere sentiment of
17 this legislative body.

18 And on behalf of the members of
19 City Council, Your Honor, I'd like to
20 officially present you this citation.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Judge Reynolds for
24 remarks.

25 JUDGE REYNOLDS: Ladies and

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2 gentlemen, I want to thank you all for
3 lending me the most important packages of
4 my life. It was great raising your
5 children.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you very much. Before we proceed,
14 I'd like to recognize a good friend of
15 ours and thank him for continuing to
16 provide a safe and secure environment.
17 I'd like to recognize our good sheriff,
18 Sheriff Jewell Williams. How are you,
19 sir?

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for being here. I feel much
23 safer.

24 At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who

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2 will present a resolution honoring Marq
3 Temple. Would Mr. Temple and those
4 accompanying him please join the
5 Councilwoman at the podium.

6 And joining Councilwoman
7 Blackwell, we have Councilwoman Cindy
8 Bass.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Julius
10 Hayes, come on up. All of those with
11 Marq, we want to come forward. We
12 weren't letting you out. We had a pastor
13 of Bible Way. We're glad to have Pastor
14 Damone Jones and all of those renowned
15 leaders who are here with their
16 individual organizations and their titles
17 and their leadership roles in the
18 community. Thank you all. I'm going to
19 let Marq figure out how he's going to
20 introduce all these folks.

21 Resolution honoring and
22 recognizing Marq Temple for his
23 leadership and lifelong dedication to the
24 children and youth in Philadelphia on the
25 occasion of his retirement after 33 years

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2 of service to the Philadelphia Department
3 of Human Services.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
5 Marq Temple was born and raised in the
6 Strawberry Mansion Section of North
7 Philadelphia; and

8 Whereas, Mr. Temple, after
9 graduating from Cardinal Dougherty High
10 School in Philadelphia, went on to
11 receive a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology
12 from Howard University in Washington, DC
13 and returned to Philadelphia to
14 successfully obtain his Master of Social
15 Work Degree from Temple University; and

16 Whereas, Mr. Temple was united
17 in marriage to his wife Darlene and is
18 the proud parent of two daughters, Autumn
19 and Jada, and proud grandparent of two
20 grandsons, Devon and Jalen; and

21 Whereas, in 1981, Mr. Temple
22 began his career with Philadelphia's
23 Department of Human Services as a Youth
24 Counselor; and

25 Whereas, Mr. Temple's passion,

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2 drive and commitment to Philadelphia's
3 youth help him ascend through the ranks
4 from a Youth Counselor at the
5 Philadelphia Youth Study Center to
6 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
7 Youth Study Center, where he oversaw the
8 daily operation of the City's juvenile
9 detention facility; and

10 Whereas, during his career,
11 Mr. Temple has met and interacted with
12 many people, but none more important to
13 him than his late mentor, former
14 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
15 Youth Study Center, Clarence D. Holmes,
16 Sr.; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

18 Whereas, during his career, Mr. Temple
19 played a pivotal role in the Youth Study
20 Center becoming the first ACA accredited
21 facility in Pennsylvania. More
22 importantly, Mr. Temple oversaw the
23 successful relocation of Philadelphia's
24 Youth Study Center from its old location
25 at 2020 Pennsylvania Avenue to a state of

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2 the art Juvenile Justice Services Center
3 in West Philadelphia; and

4 Whereas, Mr. Temple is proud to
5 say that he has committed his entire
6 working adult life to the betterment of
7 Philadelphia's youth through his 33 years
8 of service with the Philadelphia's
9 Department of Human Services; and

10 Whereas, Mr. Temple has served
11 thousands of youngsters through his
12 career and continues to make Philadelphia
13 a better place through his affiliations
14 with the Pennsylvania Chapter of the
15 National Association of Blacks in
16 Criminal Justice, the Juvenile Detention
17 Center's Association of Pennsylvania, the
18 FBI's Citizen's Academy, the Philadelphia
19 Chapter of Concerned Black Men, Inc. and
20 Hiram Lodge No. 5; and

21 Whereas, Mr. Temple believes
22 that, quote, "if given an opportunity, it
23 is our duty and responsibility to make a
24 positive impact on a young person's life;
25 for in this work some kids get arrested,

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2 and some get rescued, we must be there to
3 lift and guide them back on the right
4 track," end of quote.

5 Therefore, be it resolved, that
6 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
7 hereby honors and recognizes Marq Temple
8 for his leadership and lifelong
9 dedication to the children and youth of
10 Philadelphia on this occasion of his
11 retirement after 33 years of service to
12 the Philadelphia Department of Human
13 Services.

14 Further resolved, that an
15 engrossed copy of this resolution be
16 presented as a sincere expression of City
17 Council's appreciation and recognition.
18 And we certify that this is a true and
19 correct copy of the original resolution,
20 adopted by the Council of the City of
21 Philadelphia on June 5th, 2014, and we
22 are proud, Cindy and I, to have been able
23 to introduce this on behalf of the
24 President and that each and every member
25 of City Council was proud to sponsor it.

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2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair recognizes Mr. Temple for remarks.

6 MR. TEMPLE: Wow. Thirty-three
7 years is a long time and doing a lot of
8 stuff.

9 Thank you, Mr. President and
10 the members of this body. It's an honor
11 to be here. As you see, I have a lot of
12 folks with me. And one in particular is
13 my -- this is my oldest aunt.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. TEMPLE: She's 96.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. TEMPLE: And this is her
18 first time in City Council.

19 So some other folks have told
20 me that this is their first time here, so
21 I'm very pleased that I had the
22 opportunity to get them here to see our
23 folks in action, as the President said.

24 So I have a lot of folks here.
25 I have my wife, my children, and Pastor

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2 Damone. Damone was at the Youth Study
3 Center, came when I started. He wasn't a
4 pastor then. He's been ordained during
5 that period of time.

6 And my brother. You know my
7 brother dearly, and all my friends. I'm
8 very humbled to be here to receive this.
9 Not to be longwinded, but our children,
10 as they said, is the reason for our work.
11 So many times you don't understand it
12 until it happens, until you see it.

13 At the Center where when I was
14 growing up in North Philly when most of
15 my brother's friends were at the Youth
16 Study Center, we had a good time. The
17 streets were a little safer. So I got an
18 opportunity to work with those folks. To
19 make it even more challenging is when you
20 get a kid that you're leaving work at 4
21 o'clock or 10 o'clock at night and a kid
22 comes with a plastic bag and you ask him,
23 Why are you here?

24 And he says, I have nowhere to
25 go. So they came back there.

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2 Or a kid that tells you, I lost
3 my mother. I lost my mother and father
4 on the same day, that the father was
5 abusive and killed the mother, and the
6 police came and took the father. This is
7 what a young daughter said to me. So she
8 lost both her parents on the same day.

9 Or a kid that says, Mr. Temple,
10 if you -- you want to help me? You have
11 to go back to my birth.

12 These are the kids that were
13 coming through the Center. These were
14 the challenges that we had to deal with,
15 at least for me in the last 33 years.

16 And then there's the remarkable
17 ones where I didn't tell the young lady
18 to come, but she came to the Center one
19 day and she's smiling in my face, and
20 she's with a group of students that are
21 touring from Temple, and she's smiling
22 like I'm supposed to know her. And then
23 when she tells me her name, I'm like, Oh,
24 my God. She did a 360. Here she is
25 graduating from Temple with a social work

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2 degree and she was one of my first social
3 work clients at the Youth Study Center,
4 and now she's going on to get her
5 Master's Degree.

6 So there are a lot of successes
7 that we do, a lot of folks that we touch
8 through the years that make it
9 worthwhile.

10 So I am very humbled and very
11 honored to get this recognition. It's
12 been challenging, and I'm quite sure that
13 there's a lot more work to do, because
14 the struggle continues, and all these
15 folks behind me are the folks that make
16 it happen. They're friends of mine,
17 they're family members, but they all care
18 for our children.

19 So thank everyone for coming
20 and supporting me, and thank my dear
21 Councilwoman.

22 (Applause.)

23 MR. TEMPLE: And my
24 Councilwoman and Mr. President. Thank
25 you very much.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 LaSalle to win the PIAA AA at the Giant

15 Mr. President. I beg for my colleagues'
16 indulgence as I speak on the number one
17 issue facing the City of Philadelphia.

18 I thank you to you and my
19 colleagues for the early morning
20 conference calls, the late night evening
21 meetings, continuous feedback in a very
22 fluid environment to continuously do what
23 is essential and necessary to put
24 students first.

25 The funding package I introduce

2 today is the result of what I call
3 shuttle diplomacy in a continuously fluid
4 environment.

5 I make no mistake, while we are
6 16 individual members, collectively,
7 collectively under the leadership of
8 Chairman of the Education Committee,
9 Jannie Blackwell, we share one singular
10 goal, to give our students the education
11 that they are entitled to as a
12 fundamental right of this city.

13 Your quote, Mr. President,
14 Council has been singularly focused on
15 securing appropriate resources for our
16 schools from the state.

17 The bill introduced today
18 authorizes an additional borrowing of
19 funds by the Philadelphia Authority for
20 Industrial Development, on behalf of the
21 City, which will result in an additional
22 \$30 million going to the School District.
23 The 30 million is intended to support the
24 School District operating budget for
25 Fiscal Year '15. Understand still that

2 the 27 million authorized in Bill No.
3 140512, which Council will approve today,
4 is for Fiscal Year 2014.

5 The state legislation that
6 authorized the City to extend the 1
7 percent sales tax will provide that the
8 first 120 million in proceeds each year
9 go to the School District. Any
10 additional proceeds are to be used for
11 our city's pension fund obligations.

12 For the first four fiscal
13 years, the first 15 million of the City's
14 share will be used to pay debt service
15 incurred by the City for the benefit of
16 the School District. Therefore, it's
17 anticipated that the City will cover the
18 \$30 million contribution through the
19 sales tax proceeds.

20 To you, Mr. President, thank
21 you again for your leadership. There is
22 no question that you have been a strong
23 and steady voice advocating for the
24 School District of Philadelphia for it to
25 use the tools and resources available.

2 We trust that the School District will
3 follow through with plans to sell the
4 vacant buildings that they've been
5 authorized to sell and then work with
6 Councilmembers who have an interest in
7 those sales of those buildings.

8 To be clear, today's funding
9 package does not release the Commonwealth
10 of Pennsylvania from meeting its state
11 constitutional obligation. We also want
12 listeners to know that we're not giving
13 up on our request from Harrisburg to give
14 us the authority to add the \$2 per pack
15 cigarettes. Your regular checks to
16 Harrisburg with members of your staff are
17 not to be unnoticed by members of this
18 Council as you continue to focus on the
19 number one issue facing this city.

20 To Mr. Wolf, you should know
21 that Philadelphia is not alone in our
22 outrage over Governor Corbett's cuts to
23 public education. Sharon Ward, Director
24 of the Pennsylvania Budget and Policy
25 Center, stated, and I quote,

2 "Pennsylvanians are worried that our
3 schools are in crisis. Across the
4 Commonwealth, schools have had to
5 increase class size, cut full day
6 kindergarten, music and the arts, all
7 changes that the public doesn't like and

9 them."

10 Further, eight in ten, or 77
11 percent, of voters are concerned about
12 cuts in funding for public education in
13 Pennsylvania, with nearly half of all
14 voters at 48 percent concerned as well.
15 And when you look at women, the concern
16 is even greater. Eighty-five percent are
17 concerned and 55 percent are very
18 concerned.

19 So to Mr. Wolf we say the
20 Commonwealth deserves more. Our students
21 deserve more when it comes to the funding
22 of public education.

23 In closing, let the record show
24 for the fourth year, City Council is
25 stepping up to the plate to deliver

2 additional needed funding to support our
3 schools. We know that the success today
4 is 1,000 percent linked to the success of
5 this city for decades to come. We also
6 know that education is the single best
7 weapon to reduce crime and poverty while
8 we grow our economy.

9 In closing, I'll quote again
10 Vice President Joe Biden who said it well
11 and I think captures what this debate is
12 all about: "Don't tell me what you
13 value. Show me your budget and I'll tell
14 you what you value."

15 Today's funding, additional
16 funding package, illustrates that once
17 again City Council is standing firmly on
18 the side of the next generation of
19 leaders.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Onetha McKnight,
4 commenting on 140488.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 afternoon.

8 MS. MCKNIGHT: Good afternoon,
9 everyone.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Please proceed. Good afternoon.

12 MS. MCKNIGHT: I am Onetha
13 McKnight and I am here to speak on Bill
14 No. 140488. I would like to thank
15 Councilman Wilson Goode, Jr. -- thank
16 you, Councilman Goode -- and the rest of
17 City Council for passing a stronger
18 version of the Mayor's Executive Order
19 around 21st century living wage law and
20 benefits.

21 I work at Philadelphia
22 International Airport for a company
23 called Prospect. I currently make \$5.75
24 an hour, plus tips that are not
25 guaranteed.

1 6/19/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Despite the Mayor's Executive
3 Order and numerous bills in City Council
4 and voters' overwhelming support of a
5 ballot measure for 21st century wages and
6 benefits, employers at the Airport still
7 have not paid workers the wages nor have
8 they outlined a plan. We want to make
9 sure City Council put measures into place
10 to look at enforcement and implementation
11 around the current laws.

12 We work hard, we pay taxes, and
13 we deserve to be treated fairly.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. McKNIGHT: After all, we
16 help make Philadelphia's airport and the
17 City run more smoothly.

18 Again, I want to thank City
19 Council for fighting for higher wages for
20 deserving Philadelphians.

21 Thank you for allowing me to
22 speak.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much for your testimony.

25 (Applause.)

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Carol Duncan,
3 commenting on 140488.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MS. DUNCAN: Good morning,
6 members of Council. Thank you for
7 hearing my comments on the same
8 resolution that the previous speaker was
9 speaking of. I am Carol Duncan, Co-Chair
10 of POWER's Job Strategy team. I also
11 serve as POWER's representative on the
12 Living Wage and Benefits Review
13 Committee, which acts as an agency of
14 Council to review the implementation,
15 effectiveness, and enforcement of Chapter
16 17-1300.

17 I am thrilled, as I know all of
18 you are, that together we passed Ballot
19 Question 1. However, POWER has concerns
20 with the rollout of that legislation.

21 On Tuesday this week, I
22 participated in a meeting of the Living
23 Wage and Benefits Review Committee. We
24 heard a statement during our public
25 community segment from representatives of

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2 the Animal Care and Control Team that has
3 58 workers subcontracted to a City-funded
4 organization. I might not have all these
5 details exactly right, but this is what I
6 understand.

7 They explained that their
8 contract was renewed in June. They were
9 expecting to see the new law was carried
10 out and that their paychecks were
11 increased, but they saw no increase.
12 They wondered why, since the legislation
13 states that the voters having approved
14 the amendment that the ordinance shall
15 take effect immediately.

16 We could not get a good
17 explanation for the failure to issue the
18 wage increase. I understand in general
19 that the procedures for implementing the
20 legislation are not yet crafted. I am
21 asking on behalf of POWER that Council
22 urge the Administration to speed up the
23 implementation of legislation. Every
24 week that goes by prolongs the struggles
25 of low-income workers to maintain health

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2 and housing.

3 I thank you all for the stance
4 you have taken to raise our most
5 vulnerable citizens to the security of a
6 living wage.

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Fatmata

12 Massaquoi, commenting on 140488.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MS. MASSAQUOI: Hi.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. MASSAQUOI: Hi. My name is
18 Fatmata Massaquoi. I would first like to
19 thank the City Council to pass Bill
20 140488 to cover 21st century wage
21 benefits to cover all workers. I work at
22 the Philadelphia International Airport
23 for 18 years under different
24 subcontractors. I started work for Delta
25 Global Services. Here I was paid \$8.50

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2 an hour and benefits, short of
3 healthcare, free flights, EIE bonuses.

4 When DGS lost contract to
5 Prospect, Prospect workers work at 7.50
6 by hour and all DGS workers were able to
7 keep their pay rates. We lost all
8 benefits. Prospect offer no sick days,
9 no personal days, no flight benefit, no
10 healthcare, and no benefits.

11 We as workers, we are not
12 asking to be paid a million. Just a fair
13 and -- just a fair and livable wages. We
14 should always have to work -- we should
15 not have to wait for those companies to
16 do the right things and give workers
17 their rates.

18 We hope City Council and
19 Administration as well as US Airway, we
20 do everything to -- and do everything
21 to -- I'm sorry.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 That's okay.

24 MS. MASSAQUOI: Do everything
25 to implement and enforce those wages as

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2 soon as possible.

3 Again, we would like to thank
4 City Council for passing the legislation
5 today.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you so much for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Rodney Oglesby,
12 commenting on 140512.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 afternoon.

16 MR. OGLESBY: Good afternoon.
17 Good afternoon, Council President Clarke
18 and fellow members of Council. My name
19 is Rodney Oglesby, Executive Director for
20 the School District of Philadelphia's
21 Government Relations Office, and I'm here
22 today to comment on Bill No. 140512,
23 which is on Final Passage Calendar for
24 today.

25 On behalf of Superintendent Dr.

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2 Hite, SRC Chairman Bill Green, most
3 importantly, the students and families of
4 our great city, we want to thank City
5 Council, all of City Council, today both
6 for passing this bill which provides \$27
7 million to the District for the current
8 fiscal year and also for introducing a
9 new borrowing bill that would authorize
10 an additional \$30 million borrowing for
11 the next fiscal year. We appreciate that
12 the timing of this new bill emphasizes
13 the need to continue pressing Harrisburg
14 for funding, and we are united with
15 Council in that effort.

16 Based upon Council's commitment
17 today, we are going to build into our
18 budget this additional \$30 million for
19 the next fiscal year.

20 So I want to thank Council for
21 its commitment. With this commitment,
22 we're going to be able to avoid over \$40
23 million in cuts in the budget that the
24 SRC adopts on June 30th.

25 So, finally, I just want to say

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2 thank you again to all members of City
3 Council. The children of Philadelphia,
4 the families of Philadelphia appreciate
5 your support and we appreciate your hard
6 work for the education of kids in the
7 City.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Birchett,
13 commenting on 140231 and 140581.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. BIRCHETT: Good afternoon,
18 Councilman. I am speaking first on
19 140231 and really want to immediately
20 express my appreciation to Councilman
21 Jones and the other cosigners on this
22 bill, because it's going to provide for a
23 homeownership opportunity in our
24 communities. The Philadelphia Affordable
25 Housing Opportunity Zone is a good thing,

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2 and we're looking forward to it. Council
3 President Clarke especially, I'd like to
4 see in the future this designation for
5 our area of west of Broad Street, north
6 of Lehigh and north of -- yeah; south of
7 Lehigh Avenue and north of Cecil B. Moore
8 in particular. We're looking forward to
9 that.

10 Pursuant to this as well, I
11 speak to you in reference to Council Bill
12 140581 in reference to the Redevelopment
13 Authority conveying many parcels of land
14 to the Philadelphia Housing Authority.
15 For this I have concern.

16 In our North Philadelphia
17 community, we have many developments that
18 have been completed and look very, very
19 nice with the utilization of dollars
20 through the Philadelphia Housing
21 Authority. However, my concern is that
22 in many of these projects, tax credits
23 have been used, and tax credits have a
24 life of generally 15 years. My concern
25 is the disposition of the homes and the

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2 land once the tax credits have expired
3 and the future disposition of these
4 homes, that they not be flipped into
5 properties that are no longer available
6 financially for low-income people. That
7 is a major concern.

8 We have that concern at 21st
9 and Norris with the 8 Diamond Homes
10 there. Once those tax credits expire, it
11 is our understanding that those 152
12 townhouses may belong to and be able to
13 be disposed of as Michaels Development
14 would want to. And so I would appreciate
15 further discussion and consideration for
16 the Council Housing Committee to be
17 cognizant of this and consider the future
18 of our neighborhoods.

19 In closing, I would like to say
20 that we have considerable concern about
21 the accelerated sale of William Penn High
22 School, and we would ask our Council
23 President if you would meet with the
24 William Penn Development Coalition in
25 reference to that. It's our

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2 understanding that this afternoon SRC's
3 meeting, that the SRC will be putting to
4 a vote the sale for -- providing for the
5 sale for this property pulled out away
6 from the list of all of the 21 schools,
7 and we understand, and we do agree that
8 the schools should be sold. However, we
9 want this property, this 14-acre
10 property, as a STEM school for our
11 community.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony. And,
15 Ms. Birchett, if you and Ms. Woods and
16 other individuals that I see here,
17 friends of mine, have time after the
18 Council session -- if you don't, we can
19 meet at a later date -- to clarify what
20 one of the proposals is since I see a
21 sign that talks about a stadium. I
22 understand the concern, but if we can
23 meet a little later or at another time,
24 we can get some clarity on some of the
25 things that are actually being proposed.

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2 MS. BIRCHETT: We're available
3 to meet today, and thank you for that
4 immediate response.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Okay. Thank you. Thank you for your
7 testimony.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Tashira Mass.
9 (No response.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Tashira Moss,
11 commenting on 140377.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 afternoon.

15 MS. MOSS: Good afternoon. My
16 name is Tashira Moss. I grew up here in
17 Philadelphia, born and raised, educated
18 in private school, actually went to
19 public high school. After that, I went
20 to college, came back home, had some
21 financial troubles, working full time. I
22 go to Kaplan online.

23 I pretty much say that to say
24 on May 31st, I was arrested for a small
25 amount of marijuana. I had to spend the

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2 night in jail. I missed a day of work.
3 I just recently was fired for that from
4 that job because I was still on probation
5 as a new hire, which means I didn't have
6 any sick days or vacation days. And
7 because I had to call that a sick day
8 when I had to spend the night in jail, I
9 was fired for that. Now I have to pay
10 \$200 and make an appearance in court or
11 else I'm going to go to jail.

12 I have no criminal history.
13 I've never been arrested before. I've
14 never experimented with hard-core drugs
15 or anything like that. Barely drink.
16 Well over the legal age, though. Today
17 is my birthday. I'm turning 24.

18 Just say that to say that it's
19 caused like a lot of -- this small amount
20 of marijuana, not saying it's right or
21 wrong or whatever, but for me to get
22 arrested, I lost my job, I have to pay
23 \$200 or else I am going to jail for a \$5
24 bag of marijuana I think is very
25 outrageous and quite ridiculous. And not

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2 only for me, but for people that's in my
3 circumstances.

4 There's people out there who
5 smoke crack, do heroin, but then there's
6 people, they might smoke marijuana from
7 time to time, they have a regular job,
8 they live normal lives and not bad
9 people, no criminal history, no issues
10 like that. But now I have to deal with
11 the system and I might go to jail. I
12 just lost my job.

13 So I'm in a whirlwind of
14 craziness right now, but I wanted to just
15 speak up on that because I feel like it's
16 unfair and I feel like a \$25 fine would
17 have sufficed. Glad we paid it. Because
18 now I don't know who is going to hire me.
19 I have a record now and I don't have a
20 job anymore and, you know, I feel as
21 though that's an issue that needs to be
22 spoken on, because it's unfair, in my
23 opinion.

24 That's all I have to say.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Ryan Damon,

6 commenting on 140377.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

9 afternoon.

10 MR. DAMON: Good afternoon.

11 Hi. My name is Ryan Damon. I'm from a

12 small town in South Carolina like the

13 great Joe Frazier. I graduated with

14 honors from Charles Y. Audenried High

15 School in South Philadelphia in 2002. I

16 have since created a solid work history

17 for myself since moving here at the

18 tender age of 14. My last job was the

19 longest to date. I was a senior teller

20 at Citizens Bank for a period of six

21 years before I quit because of a robbery.

22 Well, because I was robbed twice in -- I

23 was robbed twice in a three-week period.

24 So a very traumatic experience for me.

25 So I've been -- which I'm still going to

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2 court for, because I know it's the right
3 thing to do, is to testify, that is, on
4 behalf of my job because of what happened
5 with that experience.

6 I'm sad to say that I was
7 affected by this practice. It slowed
8 down my expungement process, because I
9 was in the process of getting an
10 expungement when I was arrested for a
11 small amount of marijuana as well just
12 like my friend there.

13 I also -- when I was
14 arrested -- so in hopes of gaining
15 meaningful employment, I have -- like
16 I've done so many times over the years,
17 it doesn't bother me that I was held
18 accountable for my actions, but it does
19 bother me that the amount that I was held
20 accountable for was just the \$200 for
21 such actions. Not to mention that this
22 is apparent for many campuses like Temple
23 University, LaSalle, Penn State, and many
24 other places around the country.

25 I was honored when Mr. Lee,

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2 Michael Lee, that is, from The Post
3 program invited me, along with Councilman
4 Kenney, to voice my opinion about such
5 action.

6 In closing, I hope that there
7 is a brighter future for this bill, and
8 at this time I would like to thank you
9 for your time, your patience, as well as
10 your ears.

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Bishop J. Darrell
16 Robinson, commenting on 140377.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 BISHOP ROBINSON: Good
21 afternoon. I'd like to take the time to
22 thank City Council, Council President,
23 and for all of those that are here
24 surrounding this bill.

25 I was not arrested for a small

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2 amount of weed, but as you have heard, we
3 have two young people here that were not
4 only arrested for a small amount of weed
5 but the rest of their lives are
6 jeopardized. Their future is
7 jeopardized. Their ability to make money
8 and to live a decent life in the City is
9 jeopardized because of a small amount of
10 weed.

11 I'm here in support of this
12 bill, because most of the people that are
13 affected by the bill are my children, my
14 youth, those who I represent.
15 Unfortunately, the young man and the
16 young woman will have to now really
17 wrestle to get a job. And what will be
18 the alternative? What will they be able
19 to do when they are not able to find a
20 job?

21 I think that we need to look at
22 this very seriously, because we're in a
23 city that is arresting our black youth at
24 a disproportionate number. They are
25 egregiously being affected and hurt.

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2 That fine lady spends a night in jail, a
3 worker, a good citizen, a good person,
4 and now she has to carry the taint of a
5 record for carrying a small amount of
6 weed. Is that right? Is that fair?

7 The fact of the matter is, it's
8 not right and it's not fair, and I think
9 Councilman Kenney has presented a very
10 good bill, one that will hopefully stop
11 some of the bleeding.

12 You know, the statistics are
13 alarming to me. I'm a pastor. I try to
14 help youth. I try to get youth jobs, and
15 it's just ridiculous, because when I ask
16 the youth for the amount of years that
17 I've been in the ministry, which has been
18 over three decades, when I try to get
19 these youth jobs and I ask them about
20 their records and they say, Well, you
21 know, I had some weed and I got stopped
22 and, you know, I haven't been able to get
23 a job, in the streets they call it
24 trapping on the block when they sell
25 drugs. If they're not able to get a job,

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2 then what other alternatives do they have
3 to take care of themselves, to take care
4 of their family? Trapping.

5 Our youth create the darkness
6 in which they are raised up in. And I'm
7 not trying to give a sermon, but I want
8 to be very clear. Our youth did not
9 create that darkness. Our youth did not
10 create this unfair bias, this racially
11 biased policing. They didn't create it,
12 but they have to exist in it. That's
13 just not fair.

14 And you know what's even more
15 alarming, that even if we do the right
16 thing and pass the bill and make sure
17 that these youth are only fined, the only
18 youth that will be fined is still, I'm
19 afraid, those youth that are part of my
20 ethnicity. I'm very sad at the way we
21 handle things in this city as it
22 relates --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Pastor, I know you're on a roll, but...

25 PASTOR ROBINSON: Can I say one

2 more thing before I sit down? This is my
3 last statement. They turned the mic down
4 and everything. It's good to be able to
5 control the mic on a preacher.

6 But let me say this: I'm not
7 for so much the legalization as I am for
8 us being fair.

9 God bless you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Pastor. Thank you for your
12 testimony.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Bilal Qayyum,
15 commenting on 140377.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. QAYYUM: Good afternoon.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 MR. QAYYUM: President Clarke
21 and members of City Council. First of
22 all, let me take this opportunity to
23 thank you for your support last week of
24 our 25th Anniversary of the Father's Day
25 Rally Committee, and I'm here this

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2 afternoon to support Bill 140377.

3 In the legislation that
4 Councilman Kenney outlined, it reports
5 that 4,000 arrests are made every year
6 and 82 percent of them are African
7 Americans. And I can bet the majority of
8 them are African American males.

9 There's not a Councilperson
10 sitting here whose district I haven't
11 been in at night campaigning to stop
12 violence, interacting with guys on the
13 corner who are up to -- some of them are
14 up to no good. Some of them are up to no
15 good because they see no hope or have no
16 hope to make changes. But we spend a lot
17 of time in the streets interacting with a
18 lot of these young men trying to get them
19 to go to the right route. And it took me
20 a while to digest and look at this bill,
21 and I had a discussion with Councilman
22 Kenney about me supporting it. And you
23 heard the comments and particularly the
24 young lady, and I don't know of anyone of
25 my age that hasn't tried some smoke, that

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2 smoked some weed, and I'm pretty sure a
3 lot of you I'm looking at right here in
4 Council, members, smoked some weed, but
5 it was by the grace of God that you were
6 not stopped and arrested, sent to jail so
7 that you would not be sitting here this
8 morning in City Council.

9 So I am pleading with you that
10 the vote would be favorable today. I
11 know that in my college years, there was
12 many a days that I had a little bit of
13 weed, Al, to get me through.

14 Well, he just looked at me.
15 I'm sorry.

16 It doesn't make it right. But
17 we all experiment, we all try, but we
18 were not arrested and held hostage.

19 The four engines that drive the
20 Philadelphia economy - hospitality,
21 education, financial service, and
22 retail - if you have a felony commitment,
23 you can't get work. We know and y'all
24 know my work, and I can tell you between
25 60, 65 percent of African American males

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2 are jobless in the City of Philadelphia.
3 Why? A lot of them do have records,
4 unfortunately. So we don't need to be
5 adding to the continued prisonization of
6 particularly African American males.

7 I brought with me this morning
8 a book, and I think a lot of you are well
9 aware of this book. If you have the need
10 to read it, it's by Michelle Alexander
11 called The New Jim Crow: The Mass
12 Incarceration in the Age of the
13 Colorblindness. Michelle documents that
14 this is a trend across the country to put
15 African American males into jail, and
16 they start with -- the hook is with
17 marijuana.

18 So I would indulge and plead
19 that the Council do the right thing this
20 morning and pass this Bill 140377 so we
21 could start hopefully seeing a decrease
22 in the number of our young folks going to
23 jail.

24 I also will say this and end by
25 saying this: We will have a

2 responsibility -- when I say "we," my
3 organization and other organizations --
4 that we need to educate our young folks
5 about what the bill is and that they
6 should not be going around smoking. It's
7 not in their best interest. And I would
8 share with you that this morning I had
9 the discussion with a police officer,
10 which will be named nameless, and he said
11 even though this bill passes, if the
12 police stop young males and they don't
13 have the proper ID, they could be still
14 taken to the police station. Well, guess
15 what? That's going to happen in the
16 African American community, not
17 necessarily the white community. So we
18 got to have an education campaign to our
19 young males that they need to have the
20 proper information and they need to have
21 the proper knowledge to keep them out of
22 going to prison.

23 So, once again, I hope and
24 plead that this morning that you will do
25 the right thing and pass this bill.

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2 Thank you very much.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Nucci,

7 commenting on 140596.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 MS. NUCCI: Thank you for
10 inviting us here to speak today on
11 Resolution 140596. My name is Lisa Nucci
12 and I'm President of the Art Institute of
13 Philadelphia. I am here today with our
14 Dean of Academic Affairs, Dr. Harry
15 Costigan.

16 The Art Institute of
17 Philadelphia was founded in 1971, and
18 we've been providing creative students
19 with career-focused education for more
20 than 40 years. Regionally accredited by
21 the Middle States Commission on Higher
22 Education, the Art Institute offers
23 degree and diploma programs in a dozen of
24 areas of the applied arts, including
25 design, media, culinary, fashion. As of

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2 2013, the Art Institute of Philadelphia
3 enrolled approximately 2,500 students.

4 MR. COSTIGAN: Our thousands of
5 graduates are distinguishing themselves
6 as creative professionals with --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Excuse me, sir. Excuse me, sir. What's
9 your name?

10 MR. COSTIGAN: Harry Costigan.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Okay. I just wanted to make sure. You
13 guys want six minutes instead of three?

14 MR. COSTIGAN: No.

15 Our thousands of graduates are
16 distinguishing themselves as creative
17 professionals with businesses throughout
18 the Greater Philadelphia area and beyond.
19 For example, in 2013, 86 percent to 100
20 percent of our culinary, web design,
21 interior design, and fashion graduates
22 were working in their field within six
23 months of graduation. Our graduates are
24 an important source of employees who can
25 fill the skills gap in our city's most

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2 important industries both today and
3 tomorrow.

4 It's clear that the Art
5 Institute of Philadelphia is an important
6 part of the City's economy and that the
7 skills we offer are key to the health of
8 the City's business community. For
9 example, our culinary graduates are in
10 demand by restaurants and food service
11 establishments that are part of the
12 leisure and hospitality industry, tourism
13 being a significant component of the
14 Philadelphia economy.

15 In service to our community,
16 the Art Institute of Philadelphia has
17 partnered with several organizations,
18 including the Children's Hospital of
19 Philadelphia, University of Pennsylvania,
20 MANNA, and the Art Museum of
21 Philadelphia, to name just a few. In
22 2013, our outstanding service to this
23 city earned us a citation from the City
24 of Philadelphia for our students' work on
25 the Philly Youth Success.

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2 MS. NUCCI: Our main message
3 today is to tell you about the negative
4 impact the proposed federal Gainful
5 Employment rule could have on the Art
6 Institute of Philadelphia's ability to
7 provide skill graduates to the
8 Philadelphia economy. We are very
9 concerned, and here's why:

10 The Gainful Employment rule as
11 currently proposed will deny access to
12 student aid for over a million students
13 nationwide who are currently enrolled in
14 programs that are deemed ineligible for
15 failing to meet certain arbitrary metrics
16 with no clear alternative. The proposed
17 rule primarily targets at private-sector
18 institutions that serve a
19 disproportionate number of underserved
20 students.

21 We support the Administration's
22 interest in providing greater access and
23 opportunity to low and minority students
24 to pursue higher education, and we agree
25 that student debt and college

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2 affordability are issues that need to be
3 addressed. Today we urge you to support
4 the resolution being introduced by
5 Councilman Oh.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you so much for your testimony.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Greg Brinkley,
11 commenting on 120232.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 afternoon.

15 MR. BRINKLEY: Good morning. I
16 would like to first say I'm commenting on
17 140525, which speaks about the election
18 of Ms. Asia Coney, Ms. Ethel Wise to the
19 Board of Commissioners. This was placed
20 on a fast track by Councilman Jones.

21 I have no problem with the work
22 that they're going to do. What I do have
23 a problem -- I'm the President -- I'm
24 Greg Brinkley, President of the
25 Abbotsford Homes Resident Council.

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2 What I am concerned about is
3 the process. The process very clearly,
4 we had a young lady from the Abbotsford
5 Homes who ran, submitted all the proper
6 documents. It was ruled illegal. We
7 appealed that process and was deemed she
8 wasn't. The problem, Mr. President, was
9 that by the time she got her hearing and
10 was deemed eligible, there was only nine
11 days left for the election, clearly
12 giving the advantage to the other
13 candidates of almost two months.

14 I sent a letter to your office,
15 because you and the Mayor are responsible
16 ultimately for selecting the persons or
17 approving the persons from that process.
18 I sent letters to both your offices, and
19 in fact, I even saw you on Delaware
20 Avenue. I went to my Councilman, Curtis
21 Jones, trying to facilitate this meeting.
22 Again, this isn't about Ms. Coney or
23 Ms. Wise. I spoke on record to the
24 Philadelphia Housing Commissioners.

25 There is no issue on whether

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2 Mrs. Miller was properly -- had followed
3 due diligence, because it was okay. They
4 agreed that. They did not give her
5 enough time to have the same access as
6 others to access the residents. I think
7 that was a major infraction upon the
8 democratic process, and when we -- I'm
9 told that from your office that someone
10 in your office, you guys didn't want to
11 revisit the issue. So what does 80,000
12 residents do who is entitled to run for a
13 historic election? This is the first
14 time it's ever happened. So now we just
15 say, Oh, the heck with it, even though
16 she was correct.

17 The only way to remedy this
18 situation before you guys -- before the
19 Council can vote on it is to order a new
20 election.

21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Helen Gym,
25 commenting on 140512.

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 afternoon.

5 MS. GYM: Good afternoon.

6 First of all, I want to thank the members
7 of City Council, especially our Council
8 President, Darrell Clarke.

9 As a Philadelphia public school
10 parent, we've made it a singular mission
11 to reach out to every single one of you
12 in different ways, and I felt like since
13 you have heard from so many of us over
14 the last few weeks, I thought it was
15 really important today that you hear from
16 a parent who said thank you as we move
17 something forward. So it's very much
18 appreciated. And for as much heat as you
19 might have felt or heard from parents who
20 are deeply concerned about what's
21 happening in our public schools, we
22 promise you that our attention is now on
23 Harrisburg and we will go to Harrisburg.
24 We will be talking with our local and
25 state legislators about what's happening

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2 with our cigarette tax and other
3 promises. We'll also be reaching out to
4 the Chamber of Commerce, to higher ed
5 institutions, to the Parking Authority,
6 and every other civic and public entity
7 that has the responsibility to fund our
8 schools responsibly.

9 I do want to, however, bring up
10 a humble reminder about what we were able
11 to accomplish and what still needs to be
12 done, because there's still a lot more
13 that needs to be done.

14 Today, Philadelphia public
15 school children will leave schools, and
16 many of our families will be left in the
17 lurch, most of us uncertain of about at
18 least \$66 million in a gap that is going
19 to be significant for next year.

20 The money that moves today is
21 not sustainable funding, as we all know.
22 It's a one-year expense, and we need to
23 be thoughtful and careful about long-term
24 funding solutions that are happening.

25 We also want to be thoughtful

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2 that the conditions that our schools are
3 in right now are extreme. Schools opened
4 this year under circumstances that every
5 educator should have found appalling, and
6 all of us did. We had no nurses and
7 counselors in schools for weeks on end.
8 Willard Elementary School's families
9 fought for years, almost ten years, to
10 get a brand new school building built.
11 Their number one thing that they wanted
12 built in that building for their
13 five-year-olds, six-year-olds, and
14 seven-year-olds who are going to be
15 reading was a school library. That
16 library is dark and closed because we
17 can't afford librarians. There are only
18 14 in a school system with 200 buildings.

19 Bartram High School had 148
20 staff in June 2011 and opened this year
21 with 101, and we look at the violence
22 that happened to young children through
23 the most difficult times of their lives
24 and we ask ourselves whether we are
25 conducting a sickening social experiment

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2 on children to see how much they can
3 take, and then when they don't meet the
4 standard, we call them out for it and we
5 punish them for it. That is not
6 accountability for the people who matter.

7 (Applause.)

8 MS. GYM: I want us to think
9 very quickly about South Philadelphia
10 High School. This week the principal at
11 South Philadelphia High School will
12 graduate for the first time his 9th
13 graders that he saw from 9th grade to
14 12th grade. Four years of a principal
15 that returned. We fought for that
16 stability, but this year she had to deal
17 with merging hundreds of students into a
18 school and a thousand dollars less per
19 child.

20 If we fight for people like
21 Otis Hackney at South Philadelphia High,
22 if we believe in stable schools, if we
23 think schools can turn around, then how
24 do we expect him to be able to do that
25 work for a 20 percent pay cut and a

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2 thousand dollars less per child?

3 These are not budget cuts
4 anymore. They are not. They are human
5 rights abuses happening in this city to
6 our children.

7 (Applause.)

8 MS. GYM: It's not
9 belt-tightening.

10 I'm totally wrapping up.

11 It's not belt-tightening. It's
12 not thoughtful. And as much and as
13 difficult as I know this budget season
14 is -- and I am not on the side of the
15 School District, on the side of any
16 particular entity, Council, legislators.
17 That's not the issue. For all the
18 problems that we have, the only people
19 who pay are our kids. They pay through
20 the lack of services, through the
21 attention that's paid for them. We're
22 fighting for them. That is the only
23 thing that we're looking for.

24 And so I just want to say all
25 of that to say that this is a moral issue

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2 of our times, and we will be back. We'll
3 be back to ask you to resolve this issue
4 before September. We don't want to open
5 schools again in the circumstances that
6 we did.

7 I do want to thank you for the
8 movement that we had, and we will see you
9 hopefully this summer.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Michael
15 Churchill.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. CHURCHILL: Thank you. You
18 know, talking about being useless,
19 following the eloquent Helen Gym is an
20 impossible chore. So I will just merely
21 say, I'm an attorney with the Public
22 Interest Law Center. We've been working
23 in the schools. We collected over 900
24 complaints for this year about the
25 terrible conditions and the lack of

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2 nurses, the lack of counselors, the lack
3 of enough teachers, expanding class
4 sizes, the terrible conditions that Helen
5 has just so eloquently described.

6 So I want to say first thank
7 you. Thank you very much for taking the
8 actions approving the \$27 million that's
9 on your agenda for today and for putting
10 on your agenda the \$30 million for
11 September. That will help the situation
12 greatly. That will all go to our
13 children. We thank you.

14 But I need to echo Helen's
15 remarks. It will only help bring us to
16 the situation where we are this year.
17 That is not a tolerable situation. So I
18 urge all of you to continue working on
19 what a long-run solution will be. It's
20 the only solution for our children, is a
21 real one, will take care of all of their
22 needs and not patchwork that
23 unfortunately we have to put up with with
24 this year, and we thank you for at least
25 getting us to that point. And we will be

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2 back to talk to you in the summer and in
3 the fall about what a real solution will
4 be.

5 But thank you for this step.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you for your testimony.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
10 commenting on 140445.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. KING: Thank you, President
13 of the City Council. Thank you,
14 Councilmembers. And I am addressing
15 140445, and that is the ordinance
16 authorizing the treasury to enter into an
17 amendment agreement with the
18 too-big-to-fail bank, and I just wanted
19 to say that the Dodd-Frank Act still
20 exists, that the specter of a bail-in
21 process hovers the United States banking
22 system. And I want to remind the
23 political leadership that economic
24 warfare still exists, that the private
25 central bank intrigues of speculative

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2 bubbles, defaults, devaluations, bank
3 rate manipulations, deflations, and
4 inflations are the tools being used by
5 liberal city of London-centered and
6 controlled economic planners today.

7 If you are told that you cannot
8 fund your education system, that is not
9 financial sense. That is economic
10 warfare. And political leadership once
11 again should act with that certain
12 knowledge. I say that the creation of a
13 public bank will serve to protect the
14 rights and power of the citizenry of
15 Philadelphia, and I ask that City Council
16 create that resolution.

17 I would like to thank the City
18 Council for Resolution 140512. It was a
19 great idea to get the assistance of
20 another agency, a department within
21 Philadelphia, and I'm sure that there are
22 more departments and agencies within
23 Philadelphia that can help out the School
24 District of Philadelphia.

25 Thank you so much.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Devon Miner,
5 commenting on 140512.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MR. MINER: Good afternoon,
10 Council President and members of City
11 Council. My name is Devon Miner. I am
12 here today on behalf of Public Citizens
13 for Children and Youth, also known as
14 PCCY.

15 We would like to thank the
16 Council President and the Council for
17 your support of public education and for
18 your recent allocation of 30 million in
19 new funds. However, these funds are
20 needed sooner rather than later.

21 Last summer we saw the District
22 cut central office positions and close
23 over 20 schools. We cannot continue to
24 allow the Philadelphia School District to
25 crumble. We cannot lose any more school

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2 staff and lose any more teachers, nurses,
3 and counselors and expect our children to
4 be productive in a classroom of 41.

5 However, we would like to let
6 you know that PCCY is working diligently
7 in Harrisburg to put pressure on
8 legislators to pass the cigarette tax.
9 If anyone here today wants to learn more
10 about how they can get involved with some
11 of our efforts in Harrisburg, please feel
12 free to see me afterwards.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Cye Harold

17 Sheppard, commenting on 140512.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 afternoon.

21 MR. SHEPPARD: Good afternoon,
22 Mr. President. Good afternoon, City
23 Council. Good afternoon, citizens of
24 Philadelphia.

25 Any time anything has to do

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2 with schools, I'm there.

3 I wish we could look at maybe
4 the top 50 salaries of the people that
5 work at the Board of Education. I think
6 if they slashed their salaries, it might
7 be enough to put a significant dent in
8 the deficit. And they remain at work
9 failing our children, failing our future,
10 and failing us. Instead of going to jail
11 for a crime, they stay in their positions
12 and reap many rewards. It's crazy. Then
13 I'm watching our schools being sold with
14 the public not at the table that we paid
15 for and the privatization of everything.

16 In New Orleans right now, there
17 is not one public school left. They're
18 all charter and all private.

19 So we got to wake up. That's
20 the way that's going all across the
21 country.

22 I would also ask that we not
23 sell PGW. Jobs have been promised for
24 maybe three years, and you lay off all
25 the people making a lot of money, been

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2 there a while, connect with Marcellus
3 Shale, our water system, our eco system.
4 I continue to say get the frack out of
5 here.

6 Lastly, I'm limping right now
7 because of the tremendous beating I
8 received at the 14th District Police
9 Department. Enough is enough. You need
10 to address that. There's not a few good
11 officers -- few bad. It's a few good.

12 Last thing. I want to close on
13 an upper note. On July 10th to July
14 16th, 25,000 black men will invade
15 Philadelphia, spend money, do workshops.
16 I'm a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity,
17 and I hope we roll out the red carpet and
18 we will uplift from our principles,
19 manhood, scholarship, perseverance, and
20 uplift.

21 Enjoy your summer. Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

24 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
25 other speakers on the public comment

10 think the City Councils understand the
11 contradictions that are going on in
12 Strawberry Mansion as it pertains to us
13 not being respected as homeowners that I
14 am, as block captains that I am, as
15 activists that I am, and certainly as
16 business owners that I am.

17 There is a zoning last week to
18 build a recreation center in the center
19 of our block, that being the 3200 block
20 of Berks Street. We knew nothing about
21 it. There was no discussion about it.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
23 Bey, one second. Can you just say you're
24 talking about PHA.

23 here -- and I thank you, Councilwoman

24 Tasco, in respect of your information

25 that I see here, because as we build in

2 our communities, we are in respect for
3 the homeowners the housing development is
4 building, and there is no development for
5 the community. There is no Block Grant
6 offered to my block. There was nothing
7 offered to us. There was investments

9 Council to know that we in Strawberry
10 Mansion has been divided, but we have
11 come together because we feel like we're
12 being undermined. We feel like land is
13 being sold and stole from us with no
14 representation.

15 And I came here today to say
16 that as a homeowner in that block, we do
17 not want a recreation center built in the
18 middle of a residential area that is only
19 accessible to PHA residents. As a matter
20 of fact, I think you understand,
21 Councilman Clarke, President Councilman
22 Clarke, 5th District. Our area spoke
23 with you. We do not want it.

24 And so we need someone to speak
25 to. I brought it here because I raised

3 feel like what do we do at this point?
4 When someone come to you with a blueprint
5 of what they're going to put there
6 without talking to you, it draws a fight.

10 talk to us. This development will not go
11 up without being respected and having an
12 equal opportunity for the participation
13 of the -- in combination over 63
14 something million dollars that will be
15 invested.

16 The young black men in our
17 community don't have jobs. Young black
18 contractors and -- well, just contractors
19 in general are not at the table. So that
20 is a serious problem, and we need to
21 rectify that.

17 Here in Philadelphia, for
18 example, as we're looking at a new
19 economy emerging where artists,
20 musicians, software developers,
21 videographers, filmmakers, journalists,
22 writers, and all sorts of other skilled
23 and talented persons are entering our
24 workforce, many of them, if not most of
25 them, go to for-profit career training

2 institutions. But whether it is a
3 non-profit like Temple University or
4 University of Penn or a for-profit
5 entity, what happens is most of these
6 people who come out of these schools and
7 training programs may not be able to get
8 a job right away or they may not get a
9 job in their profession or they may not
10 make a lot of money initially. What this
11 rule is doing is, it distinguishes that
12 if you come out of a non-profit
13 university or college, that that college
14 can continue to grant financial aid loans
15 and work study programs to their
16 students. However, if you go to a
17 for-profit entity like the Art Institute
18 and so many others in Philadelphia that
19 provide culinary education such as the
20 Restaurant School and others, that if
21 graduates from that school are not
22 earning enough money, there's a ratio
23 that they have to have no more than 12
24 percent of their earnings for that year
25 after graduation be for repayment of

2 student loans or 30 percent of their
3 discretionary income.

4 So what happens is based on
5 this history of earnings-to-debt for
6 student loan repayments, students who
7 currently go to the schools will no
8 longer be allowed to receive work study
9 grants or student loans, and the result
10 of that will be that these students will
11 not be able to go to college or to go to
12 career schools.

13 So while it's well intended, it
14 has very negative consequences based on
15 an artificial measurement that
16 particularly for Philadelphia and other
17 urban centers, especially those in the
18 creative/innovative economy, will be
19 very, very hurtful to. And so this
20 resolution urges the Secretary of
21 Education to reconsider the possibility
22 of narrowing the scope to focus on those
23 problematic institutions, but not to
24 create such a large bucket that even the
25 good institutions where many low-income

2 students are attending who need help,
3 even middle-class students, need help in
4 order to finish their education.

5 So I would urge my colleagues

16 Code, entitled "Regulation of Individual
17 Conduct and Activity," by adding a new
18 Chapter 10-2100, entitled "Marijuana
19 Possession," to create a civil penalty
20 for the possession of certain items and
21 to provide for penalties and enforcement
22 procedures for violations of such
23 provisions.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Before I call for the vote, the Chair

3 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. As I stated in last
5 week's Law and Government Committee
6 hearing, I commend Councilman Kenney for
7 starting this dialogue in an effort to
8 reduce resources spent on small amounts
9 of marijuana arrests in the Police
10 Department, the District Attorney's
11 Office, and the courts. However, I have
12 several concerns about the measure that
13 is before us today.

14 The DA's Office, with the
15 cooperation of the First Judicial
16 District and the Public Defender's
17 Association, implemented the Small Amount
18 of Marijuana program, known as the SAM
19 program, in June of 2010. This was done
20 after a local attempt to make possession
21 of a small amount of marijuana a summary
22 offense. This attempt was struck down by
23 the courts. For clarity, the penalty is
24 currently an ungraded misdemeanor, not a
25 felony.

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2 Since mid 2010 through last
3 week, the SAM program has delivered
4 nearly 14,000 cases involving the
5 possession of less than 30 grams of
6 marijuana away from traditional
7 prosecution and saved the City nearly \$10
8 million. It's clear the DA's Office has
9 made a concerted and honest effort to
10 ease the resources spent on marijuana
11 arrests. They've established a
12 thoughtful protocol for such cases, and
13 it gives offenders a sensible path to
14 have their records wiped clean.

15 The DA's Office agrees to a
16 release on recognizance bail for every
17 individual charged with SAM. This
18 eliminates the chance that the individual
19 will be held on that case. Those
20 arrested are processed quickly. The
21 average time from arrest to arraignment
22 to release is less than 17 hours and
23 ensures that individuals will not sit all
24 weekend waiting to go free.

25 Within two weeks of arrest, SAM

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2 individuals are officially offered entry
3 into the program, can complete the
4 program and have their records expunged
5 within six months of arrest.

6 Participants pay a \$200 penalty, which is
7 significantly less than the estimated
8 \$600 the court costs in lab fees that an
9 individual is required to pay if
10 convicted of SAM.

11 The purpose of the program is
12 to identify non-violent offenders and
13 give them an opportunity to avoid
14 convictions and the consequences that
15 flow therefrom. Again, this is a
16 thoughtful resources savings approach by
17 the local law enforcement community and
18 operates within the four corners of
19 Pennsylvania state law.

20 I think the bill currently
21 under consideration may really have a
22 state law preemption problem despite the
23 technical limitations in the language.
24 As part of my due diligence, I ran this
25 measure by several highly regarded

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2 attorneys specializing in appellate and
3 constitutional matters, and after those
4 conversations, I am of the firm belief
5 that if this ever went to the Supreme
6 Court, they're likely to say that
7 Philadelphia has no business making up
8 its own penalties for things that the
9 Legislature has already penalized.

10 Regardless of where you fall on
11 this issue, we are bound to live within
12 confines of our laws, and the reality
13 remains that in Pennsylvania, possession
14 of marijuana remains illegal. To change
15 that, you really have to go to
16 Harrisburg. And while this bill doesn't
17 per se decriminalize marijuana possession
18 because it's civil in nature under The
19 Philadelphia Code, it essentially has the
20 same effect.

21 In addition to the preemption
22 issue, I have questions and concerns
23 within four specific areas of the bill.

24 The public misinterpretation
25 and the discretion of police: Will the

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2 public believe that marijuana is legal
3 now in the City of Philadelphia? What
4 kinds of problems will this cause for
5 police officers? Will an unintended
6 consequence be increased aggravated
7 assaults on police officers due to the
8 misunderstanding and misinterpretation of
9 the law? On one hand, we questioned the
10 discretion of the Police Department. Now
11 we will give those same police officials
12 the discretion to decide who to arrest
13 and who not to arrest and who to fine.
14 Something here just doesn't make sense.

15 If I am arrested and someone
16 else is fined, can I sue the City for
17 unlawful arrest? Could this raise
18 unwanted equal protection claims against
19 the City?

20 Public places: There is
21 widespread concern by police and
22 community members regarding the loitering
23 that is often associated with marijuana
24 use in their communities. In short, they
25 want to be able to answer complaints from

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2 the community about groups of people
3 smoking marijuana on corners in front of
4 stores, et cetera.

5 If it is not a question of
6 public health to allow people to smoke
7 marijuana in public -- is it not a
8 question of public health? Do you want
9 to be standing on a corner or a bus stop
10 with your children while someone is
11 smoking a joint? What does the Health
12 Department have to say about that? Both
13 in Washington, DC and Chicago, they make
14 it clear that it is not okay and it
15 remains unlawful to smoke in public.
16 Even Colorado where marijuana is
17 legalized statewide, they do not allow
18 smoking in public. This bill does not do
19 so.

20 Fines: The fine is entirely
21 too low at \$25 compared to other civil
22 penalties. You have to pay \$50 for an
23 open container violation for alcohol,
24 which is legal. You have to pay a \$50
25 fine for public urination or defecation.

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2 Skateboarding, roller blading, and
3 bicycling on public property is a \$300
4 fine. Failure to properly clean up after
5 your dog is a \$300 fine. The Chicago
6 ordinance calls for fines of 250 to
7 300 -- for \$250 to \$500, while the DC
8 law, which has not been approved yet by
9 Congress, requires a \$100 fine.

10 The SAM program requires a \$200
11 penalty and has experienced a
12 participation rate of 95 percent since
13 its inception. This is evidence that the
14 fine isn't exorbitant and individuals are
15 willing to pay it. At \$25, it almost
16 encourages getting high in public and
17 some might factor into that the cost of a
18 good time.

19 Probation: And this is
20 critical. Almost 70 percent of SAM
21 offenders have prior criminal contacts
22 and are on some form of probation. What
23 about people who are on probation and the
24 judge specifically orders as a condition
25 of their probation that they not possess

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2 or consume any controlled substance or
3 break the law? How will the judge know
4 that this person was fined \$25 for
5 violating that order?

6 In closing, I understand where
7 Councilman Kenney is trying to go with
8 this measure, but this isn't the path.
9 To accomplish his objective the right
10 way, it must be done via statute in
11 Harrisburg by making possession of a
12 small amount of marijuana a summary
13 offense.

14 Thank you, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 like to express my admiration for

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2 really say that with all sincerity. I
3 don't agree with him on this bill, but I
4 wanted to say that, because I really
5 appreciate new ideas, new approaches.

6 The reason that I have my
7 concerns is because at the end of the
8 day, marijuana, no matter what you do in
9 Philadelphia, is a criminal violation in
10 the State of Pennsylvania. I don't want
11 to mislead people in our city that if you
12 happen to have a certain small amount,
13 that you are okay. You're not okay. You
14 can be arrested and you can be
15 prosecuted. I think the larger
16 discussion, which some people have said
17 this will lead to, is the issue of
18 whether there should be legalization of
19 marijuana, but until that discussion
20 occurs in the State of Pennsylvania, this
21 issue to me is very similar to
22 prohibition. People like to have their
23 booze, but the booze, which is illegal,
24 comes at a price.

25 Marijuana is an organized crime

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2 issue. A lot of people are abused and
3 exploited and murdered in processing and
4 distributing and selling the drug here in
5 the United States.

6 Perhaps we should in the United
7 States come to a conclusion on what our
8 policy is. I find it very problematic
9 that we tell other countries not to grow
10 it. We spend a lot of money to prevent
11 it from entering. We pursue lots of
12 people, put them in jail, and at the same
13 time, we're saying but if you have a
14 little bit, it's okay.

15 So that is my concerns and why
16 I will be voting against it.

19 majority of San Francisco's City Council
20 and strong blocks of City Councils in
21 Atlanta, Chicago, Denver, New York,
22 Phoenix, San Diego, Seattle, and here in
23 Philadelphia.

24 Recently, Local Progress
25 members converged on Seattle's Income

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2 Inequality Symposium to push for a higher
3 minimum wage. We have an active
4 15-member Board, including SEIU, and I
5 serve as the founding Board member. I'm
6 also the national Chairman of the Local
7 Progress on Good Jobs Campaign.

8 I mention all this because our
9 action here today is in fact part of a
10 growing national movement to address
11 income inequality, and Philadelphia has
12 the leadership role in that movement.

13 There's not only action here
14 and in Seattle, but also Chicago, New
15 York, San Francisco, Washington, DC and
16 elsewhere. This movement is led locally
17 by SEIU, POWER, Unite Here, Fight for
18 Philly and, of course, this City Council.
19 Our local message is clear: Public money
20 shouldn't be invested in poverty wages.

21 Today we will help even more
22 employees receive an even better wage,
23 one with more dignity.

24 Since my original law was
25 enacted in 2005, we've raised the wage

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2 standard from \$5.15 to \$7.72 to \$10.88
3 per hour, and now we aim even higher, to
4 at least \$12 per hour with a CPI
5 multiplier each year, also required for
6 subcontractors at any tier, because we
7 are still the poorest big city in
8 America.

9 To explain the bill, the bill
10 codifies the Mayor's Executive Order
11 signed on May 6th and the Charter
12 amendment approved by voters on May 20th
13 by a three-to-one margin. This is real
14 help for real people; in fact, the people
15 who need it the most. That's why every
16 member of the City Council co-sponsored
17 this bill and the Administration
18 testified in favor of it.

19 But to be clear, this bill
20 can't be enforced until we actually pass
21 it. So let's make it law right now and
22 enforce it. It's the right thing to do
23 right now.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I just want to take a
8 moment to thank all of the Councilmembers
9 in supporting your legislative package
10 that you put together regarding PHA and
11 the opportunity zones. I think it's a
12 real vision that we have, and I'm sure
13 it's going to be nationally recognized,
14 while we are able to have a plan put
15 together where 2,000 new units for PHA
16 residents, middle-class Philadelphians,
17 and also taking care of some of the
18 vacant land and vacant buildings and
19 properties that were tax delinquent that
20 have been sitting on the rolls for such a
21 long time. And it's that kind of --
22 somebody had mentioned earlier about
23 taking chances and having a vision, and
24 that's a vision that's actually going to
25 put people in homes. It's actually going

2 to put people -- put some dollars back on
3 the tax rolls and put communities back
4 together by hiring local residents and
5 giving communities an opportunity to grow
6 otherwise where they wouldn't have this
7 change.

8 So the creativity that you have
9 put together in this package with the
10 Housing Trust Fund and the tax credit
11 combinations is something historic that
12 we all witnessed, and I'm not sure that
13 everybody who comes to City Council
14 understands the type of work and
15 partnership that you were able to put
16 together in this. I know this body
17 recognizes that. The ability to leverage
18 funds, partners, the Philadelphia
19 building trades, and the ability to help
20 low-income residents and middle-class
21 Philadelphians being a part of the
22 community and making communities grow is
23 pretty impressive.

24 So I just want to recognize
25 that publicly and thank you.

3 Thank you, Councilman. And thank you for
4 your continued support in building those
5 coalitions. And I want to thank
6 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez for her
7 dogged pursuit of the Land Bank that will
8 play an integral role and all of the
9 other members in their various assets as
10 it relates to the ability to contribute
11 to the rebirth of the neighborhoods,
12 because at the end of the day, that's
13 what it's all about. We have to very
14 aggressively rebuild our neighborhoods
15 and to make sure that we stem the tide of
16 decline in a lot of the neighborhoods
17 that are not referenced in some of the
18 trade magazines. So thank you so much
19 for that.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Jones.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I want to follow my
24 colleague's line of comment and thank you
25 for your leadership on so many issues,

2 sometimes public, sometimes not so
3 public. And I know you're not much older
4 than me, or at least I don't know that,
5 but you have served as a wise mentor in
6 many, many situations, and it's
7 unfortunate that sometimes you stand at
8 the helm of Council, because I know if
9 you didn't, your opinion would be heard a
10 lot more. So we're kind of fortunate to
11 be able to have you almost restrained in
12 that manner.

13 I want to thank you
14 particularly for the dozens of times you
15 traveled up to Harrisburg fighting for
16 more funding for schools, struggling with
17 the lack of accountability sometimes this
18 body has, weighing, if you would,
19 debating in your own mind about how we
20 should support and whether or not. And
21 at the end of the day, you have
22 consistently put forth votes, policy
23 measures, whether it was selling schools
24 or whether it is actual appropriations to
25 support our children. I want to thank

2 you for that.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to
6 also transition and say thank you for
7 some of the shuttle diplomacy as
8 mentioned about fighting for labor peace
9 in the City of Philadelphia. I know that
10 you care a great deal about it and I know
11 that members of this body have
12 demonstrated it. I'm going to use
13 Councilwoman Reynolds' borrowed quote
14 from Joe Biden: "Don't tell me what you
15 value. Show me your budget and I will
16 tell you what you value."

17 Today I protested with a vote
18 of conscience -- and I know many other
19 members have done it in the past and will
20 do it in the future -- not to vote for
21 the operating budget you had me
22 introduce, and the reason is because
23 we've done such great work advocating for
24 fair labor practices in the City of
25 Philadelphia. Whether we talk about the

2 security guards I remember a couple of
3 years ago that went unnoticed until
4 Councilman Goode stood up and said we're
5 going to do something about getting them
6 a fair contract, having worked for two
7 years without one. I know when 1199C had
8 issue with some of the hospitals, we
9 stood firm and helped them in the ways
10 that we could to try to find labor peace.
11 Whether it was 32BJ and the security
12 guards or the workers that work in our
13 schools, in the cafeteria, this body,
14 members of it, Sanchez and others, fought
15 for them.

16 The Gas Works is always a
17 consideration in their union. Many of us
18 went down to TWU for the SEPTA workers.
19 Councilman Johnson, myself, and others
20 went down there. And Cindy Bass always
21 talks about her sister, who is a SEPTA
22 driver.

23 The teachers union just got
24 help today. We passed a measure that
25 will help them maintain their high

2 integrity of their work effort to educate
3 our young people, but we left some of our
4 work undone. District Council 47 has a
5 contract. District Council 33 does not.
6 I've watched my moral compass,
7 Councilwoman Blackwell, be the lone
8 soldier in voting against a budget over
9 and over again, and I always didn't
10 understand why, but what made it
11 clarionly clear was the second worst
12 winter this city ever had. And a water
13 main broke two blocks, two blocks from my
14 house, and I was coming home from a late
15 night meeting and it was maybe 9 o'clock,
16 and it was frigid. And I watched members
17 of the Water Department stand out there
18 with frozen beards, frozen beards. I
19 refused to even get out the car to say
20 thank you. It was that cold. But they
21 stood out there all through the night to
22 make sure that residents in the City had
23 water.

24 Now, I am not trying to get
25 into the muck and mire of the details of

2 what a fair contract will be, but we
3 cannot leave those people behind each and
4 every year as we pass this budget. I
5 know each of you have a vote of
6 conscience as well. I'm not saying you
7 don't. But you also let me know the
8 consequences of not passing the budget,
9 those same members, those same members
10 would not be paid.

11 So I want to thank my
12 colleagues for being the grownups in the
13 room, often pulling me from the ledge and
14 you offering me some wise counsel and
15 guidance, but let us not forget that we
16 have still our work undone and we won't
17 be right until all of us are right.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
21 those kind words. I just want to
22 reference -- and I know I'm not supposed
23 to speak while I'm up here, but every now
24 and then I take liberties.

25 I just wanted to talk about the

2 Harrisburg treks that we've made, and you
3 actually accompanied me a couple of
4 occasions. And the one consistent theme
5 when we go there, they always talk about
6 how great a job City Council is doing.
7 And so that immediately gives me some
8 level of credibility when I talk to
9 people about support for the City of
10 Philadelphia, because they genuinely hear
11 and they know that you guys are doing a
12 great job.

13 So I want to commend you and
14 thank you for the level of work and the
15 level of sincere policy initiatives that
16 you put forth that put us in a level that
17 we've never been at before. And I know
18 I'm going to hear it from a former
19 Councilmember, but I got to call it like
20 it is. I'm sure John Street will call
21 sometime this afternoon and say, Clarke,
22 what are you talking about? Are you
23 suggesting that I didn't do as good a
24 job? But it's the simple reality that
25 you guys are great. You guys are really

2 great.

3 This budget issue -- and like
4 you said, Councilman, you referenced the
5 fact that we had to vote for the budget
6 today because we did not want police and
7 firemen and all other municipal employees
8 not to get paid. I just don't hope -- I
9 hope that that's not construed to anyone
10 that we're not going to be vigilant and
11 we're not going to be very aggressive,
12 and I suspect within the next week or so
13 there's going to be a very public
14 statement about coming to a conclusion on
15 this municipal contract. This is
16 ridiculous for them to have gone more
17 than six years without a raise in this
18 environment. So that has to get done,
19 and I'm sure we'll be talking over the
20 next couple of days. So I want to thank
21 you so much for that.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Just one
23 other point.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Sure.

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: One of those
3 civil servants is in the Caucus Room next
4 door, the new Commissioner, Commissioner
5 Sawyer of the Fire Department. We've
6 provided lunch for a meet and greet. We
7 wish all members and staff to come over
8 and meet our new Fire Commissioner.

9 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 The Chair recognizes
13 Councilwoman Tasco.

14 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. I too want to thank you
16 for your leadership. I know the hard
17 work you're doing trekking to Harrisburg
18 every week trying to deal with the issue
19 of the School District.

20 I have another statement I want
21 to make about an issue that is before or
22 will be before the Council.

23 Four years versus eight weeks.
24 Four years versus eight weeks. Four
25 years versus eight weeks. In 2010, the

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2 Administration started the PGW sale
3 process by selecting Lazard as a
4 strategic advisor. In 2014, 2014, City
5 Council selected Concentric Energy
6 Advisors as its consultant to provide
7 advice on the PGW sale proposal.

8 On April 11th, 2014 and after
9 signing non-disclosure agreements,
10 Concentric started to review over 6,000,
11 6,000 PGW-related documents in a virtual
12 data room and numerous other confidential
13 materials.

14 Today is June 19, 2014. That's
15 four years versus eight weeks. Although
16 the Administration has been working on
17 the PGW sale proposal for four years, the
18 media and the Administration have been
19 asking, When will Concentric finish its
20 report?

21 There are many questions that
22 have to be answered and all of these
23 documents have to be reviewed.

24 PGW has been in existence since
25 1841 and is the only public utility

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2 operated by a major city with desirable
3 facilities to liquefy and store natural
4 gas. There are those who believe this
5 viable asset should be sold and
6 privatized.

7 City Council and the
8 Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission
9 are the deciding parties on the sale of
10 PGW. Given the complexity and the
11 importance of the proposed transaction,
12 City Council would be irresponsible if we
13 did not do our due diligence.

14 Over the past few weeks,
15 Concentric has met with PGW management,
16 representatives of the Administration,
17 Community Legal Services, and the Gas
18 Works employees union, Local 686.
19 Concentric has held weekly conference
20 calls with Council staff and various
21 conference calls with JP Morgan, Lazard,
22 Loop Capital, Ballard Spahr, and PGW's
23 Chief Financial Officer and Chief
24 Operating Officer. Concentric has
25 submitted seven sets of information

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2 requests to the Administration and will
3 be submitting an eighth set next week.

4 With Concentric's support,
5 Council is proceeding toward an informed
6 decision. We will not cut corners and
7 rush to make a judgment that will have an
8 impact on every ratepayer in this city.
9 I do not appreciate those civic groups,
10 who have no notion of what is going on,
11 trying to tell us what to do. PICA, the
12 governing board that oversees us, made a
13 decision about a sale based on a
14 seven-page PowerPoint. I call that
15 irresponsible.

16 When the Administration tried
17 to rush Council to pass real estate tax
18 rates based on an incomplete Actual Value
19 Initiative, Council took the time to do
20 it correctly, with better results, as
21 Chicago did when it had to look at
22 selling its -- privatizing its parking
23 meters.

24 If responsible elected
25 officials don't carefully examine all of

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2 the details of a transaction, the
3 citizens can get burned. This is a major
4 decision that we have to make and we need
5 to know exactly what we're getting into.

6 And so I appreciate the time
7 you've given and the support you've given
8 to weigh in on the fact that we do need
9 to study every detail. The devil is in
10 the details. So let's not act in haste
11 only to repent at leisure.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

15 That appears to conclude our
16 speeches, and the Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Brown for a motion.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
20 adjourned until Thursday, September 11th,
21 2014 at 10:00 a.m.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
