2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Good

3 morning, everybody. And I note that the
4 hour has come and that a quorum is
5 present at this Council and Council
6 session will come to order. Members,
7 would you please take your seats.
8 Visitors will retire in the seats outside
9 of the rail before the proceedings will
10 begin. And I ask all those present to
11 please be mindful of your cell phones and
12 any other devices that will have any kind
13 of interruption in our proceedings today.

14 Today to give our invocation
15 this morning, the Chair recognizes
16 Chaplain Deborah Thomas of Bethesda
17 Presbyterian Church. She is here today
18 as the guest of Councilman Greenlee.

19 And I would like all members
20 and guests to please rise.

21 (Councilmembers, visitors, and
22 guests rise.)

23 CHAPLAIN THOMAS: Good morning.

24 (Good morning.)

25 CHAPLAIN THOMAS: Let us pray.

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2 Dear God, first we want to
3 thank you for the opportunity to come to
4 you on behalf of this body of government
5 here in Philadelphia, the City of
6 Brotherly Love. We ask for wisdom,
7 guidance, and discernment for these
8 public servants as they go about doing
9 the people's business.

10 We know what happens here
11 affects every person in this city and
12 surrounding suburban neighbors, that this
13 Council represents the least and the
14 greatest of us. We pray that they may be
15 able, if need be, to disagree without
16 being disagreeable, knowing that they are
17 elected by the people to represent them.
18 Bless their staff, who is the backbone of
19 their offices.

20 As we close out 2019, let them
21 realize that the decisions made here will
22 have long-lasting effects into the next
23 decade. We want Philadelphia from this
24 Chamber to shine like a beacon to other
25 cities and towns, that others will want

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2 to emulate how Philadelphia handles their
3 crises, their expansions, and their
4 day-to-day concerns.

5 All these things we ask from
6 you, who has always been and will
7 continue to remain involved in the
8 affairs of all your children individually
9 and collectively.

10 Amen.

11 (Amen.)

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
13 thanks the Chaplain on her invocation
14 today.

15 Council may be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: The next
18 order of business will be the approval of
19 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
20 October 3rd, 2019.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Greenlee.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. Chairman. I move that the
25 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

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2 October 3rd, 2019 be approved.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been
5 moved and properly seconded that the
6 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
7 October 3rd, 2019 stand approved.

8 All those in favor signify by
9 saying aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes
14 have it. The Journal is approved.

15 The next order of business will
16 be for leaves of absence.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Greenlee.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. Chairman. On behalf of the
21 majority, there are no requests for leave
22 of absence today.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
24 thanks the gentleman.

25 The Chair now recognizes

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2 Councilman Oh. Councilman Oh, leave of
3 absence on behalf of the minority.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: On behalf of
5 the minority, there are no requests for
6 leaves of absence. Thank you.

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
8 thanks the gentleman.

9 Now we will dispense of regular
10 business and the Chair recognizes all
11 guests and visitors who are joining us
12 here in our Chambers today. On behalf of
13 the members of City Council, we all want
14 to welcome you and welcome to our session
15 of Council. We appreciate you taking the
16 time to join us here and participate in
17 our legislative affairs, and we
18 certainly, certainly invite you to join
19 us again.

20 At this time, the Chair
21 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
22 will present a resolution recognizing
23 Dr. Walter Palmer. Would Dr. Walter
24 Palmer and those accompanying him please
25 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

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2 (Councilmembers and guests
3 approached podium.)

4 COUNCILMAN HENON:

5 Councilwoman, on your lead.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
7 you very much, and thank you all for
8 being here. We note that for the
9 remainder of the Council session, if you
10 all want to talk among one another, the
11 Caucus Room will be available. After
12 Council, of course, Blondell Reynolds
13 Brown has a meeting, but that will at
14 least give you time to talk one with the
15 other while we are here.

16 My goodness. Yes, it is
17 amazing. I think he thought he was
18 having another class in a school.

19 This is a great privilege for
20 me, a great honor for me. I apologize
21 for the Honorable Stanley Straughter,
22 Chairman Emeritus of the Mayor's
23 Commission on African and Caribbean
24 Immigrant Affairs and Echoes of Africa,
25 because he is in DC today, but he sends

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2 his love, respect, and his apologies for
3 not being here.

4 Resolution honoring and
5 recognizing The Palmer Foundation for all
6 the great work they have done to bring
7 recognition to African American stories
8 and fight racism in America; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, The
10 Palmer Foundation was created by
11 Professor Walter D. Palmer in 1955 to
12 collect information on African American
13 History and American Racism; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
15 the Foundation created the Black People's
16 University of Philadelphia Freedom School
17 to develop strategies to fight against
18 racial injustice in America which
19 included desegregating Band Stand at 46th
20 and Market and Paul Whiteman Dances and
21 the Mummer's Blackface; and

22 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, over
23 the last sixty years, Black People's
24 University of Philadelphia founded,
25 organized, sponsored, and supported

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2 projects for leadership training in
3 education, community law, business and
4 politics, as well as fighting against
5 racial segregation; and

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
7 BPUP protested racial discrimination in
8 Philadelphia schools, government,
9 colleges, hospitals, public
10 transportation, news outlets, the U.S.
11 Post Office, Fire and Police Departments,
12 banks, stadiums, Out of Chinatown, Penn,
13 Temple and Drexel's expansion; and

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
15 BPUP founded the original Philadelphia
16 Freedom Theatre, the First Black
17 Independent Political Party, "COPE 46,"
18 the Walter D. Palmer Leadership Partners
19 Charters School, Black People's Unity
20 Movement, City Wide Black Community
21 Council, Society for Preservation for
22 African History, National Association of
23 Black Social Workers and Philadelphia
24 Citywide Council and Human Rights; and

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

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the Black People's University of
Philadelphia organized the November 1967
student strike, Black Power, Black
Panther, anti-war African Diaspora
conferences, as well as Temple and Penn
Black Studies, Jesse Jackson for
President, anti-gang activities, Penn
Hospital and CHOP desegregation, Civil
Rights, Afro-Centric Free Mandela
Movements; and

COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
BPUP co-sponsored the Black United Fund,
Odunde, African American Museum,
Congressional Black Caucus, Black
Teachers' Roundtable, Pennsylvania's
Black Political Caucus, Temple and Penn
Community Mental Health programs, African
American and Puerto Rican Day Parades,
Black Oak Park and Cobbs Creek Civic
Associations, North Philadelphia Model
Cities and Public Health Centers, the
SNCC dynamite case, Black Panthers, Move
78, Move 85, Community Legal Services,
police abuse, school choice, housing

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2 rights, and Charter Schools and -- I know
3 Cody Anderson is going to be proud -- the
4 first WDAS Unity Day; and

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
7 whereas, over the last sixty years,
8 thousands of Philadelphians have
9 benefited from the work of The Palmer
10 Foundation and Black People's University
11 of Philadelphia; now, therefore, be it

12 Resolved, by the Council of the
13 City of Philadelphia, it does hereby
14 honor, recognize, salute, lift up, and
15 celebrate The Palmer Foundation for all
16 of the great and important work they have
17 done to bring recognition to African
18 American stories and fight racism in
19 America.

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to Philadelphia's own
23 Dr. Walter D. Palmer as a sincere
24 expression of the Council of the City of
25 Philadelphia, our gratitude, admiration,

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2 and recognition.

3 Indeed you are to be
4 congratulated, Dr. Palmer.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
7 now recognizes Dr. Palmer for remarks.

8 DR. PALMER: Thank you very
9 much, Councilmembers. I want to thank
10 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell for
11 initiating this resolution, and I want to
12 thank all the Councilpeople who signed
13 off on it.

14 And I just want to note, you
15 have to realize what life was like 60, 65
16 years ago. There just was not what you
17 see today. There was not the diversity.
18 Blacks were shamed in many, many places.
19 There weren't black conductors on the
20 trolleys and the trains, et cetera.

21 So it's been a long journey. I
22 won't recap it. What I will tell you is
23 this, that those 65 years legacy and
24 materials, two file cabinets have gone to
25 University of Pennsylvania archives so

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2 that people will be able to study
3 particularly the displacement that
4 Temple, Penn, and Drexel and all the
5 universities have done.

6 Eight file cabinets are going
7 to the Charles Blockson Collection, the
8 largest African American collection.
9 She's here. Dr. Turner is here.

10 (Applause.)

11 DR. PALMER: We have six
12 interns working on a number of
13 publications. One publication is called
14 Africa's Gift to the World. That's the
15 African Diaspora. Another is called
16 Everything You Need to Know Before Having
17 a Race Discussion If You're For Real.
18 Then another one is Who Were the
19 Indigenous People of the World on All
20 Seven Continents. Another one is
21 Teaching Young People How to Organize for
22 Social Change. And, finally, a number of
23 artists got together, black artists in
24 this city, and have put together a
25 program, a calming book, using me as the

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2 subject. Eric Battle of Marvel Comics
3 put this together. Kinsey Brown was the
4 prime author.

5 (Applause.)

6 DR. PALMER: But what I want to
7 do is, I want to thank people today.
8 This is not for me as much as it is an
9 opportunity for me to thank so many, many
10 people. And in my travels, there are
11 thousands and thousands of people that I
12 have been engaged with who have allowed
13 me to help teach -- to teach them, but
14 I've also learned from them. Okay? And
15 I shout out today -- and I hope some of
16 them are here. I want you to take a
17 look.

18 Sherri Darden, where are you?
19 Put your hand up. Sherri Darden is that
20 young black woman here, who is the
21 publisher of the Scoop magazine. We need
22 to save that magazine.

23 Linn Washington, where are you?
24 Linn Washington, a writer for the
25 Philadelphia Tribune.

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2 The Freedom Fighters, where are
3 you? Freedom Fighters are here with
4 Girard College.

5 PAAN, where is the PAAN group?
6 Okay. These are folks fighting against
7 drugs and violence in Philadelphia.

8 Black Men at Penn, Black Men at
9 Penn, Black Alumni Activist Council, the
10 John Hope Franklin Society, Molefi
11 Asante's Africology, the House of Umoja
12 with Falaka Fattah.

13 Lest We Forget, the museum, the
14 African Holocaust Museum, Legacy
15 Pathways, Charles Blockson Collection,
16 the Black Women's Health Alliance, Locks
17 Conference. Where is Dr. Sabree? Dr.
18 Sabree.

19 The Uptown Project. Where's
20 Linda? The Uptown Project. The National
21 Association of -- NAN, the group that Al
22 Sharpton started, people supposed to have
23 been here today.

24 African American Museum, the
25 Alliance of Black Social Workers. On the

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2 other side, students, where are some of
3 the students that are here from the
4 University of Pennsylvania and other
5 places and these young beautiful children
6 that are down here in front of us right
7 now.

8 (Appause.)

9 DR. PALMER: The Soldier of
10 Love Foundation fighting against violence
11 against women. Girard College was here.
12 Are they still here? Jubilee School was
13 right here. Echoes of Africa, Asian
14 Americans United, Mayor's Commission on
15 African and Caribbean Affairs, the 1619
16 African Slavery Committee, which I'm also
17 on, Odunde, the Pennsylvania Human
18 Relations Commission. We're on an
19 advisory board there. The Black Comic
20 Book Association with Yumy Odom and all
21 the other different artists we named.

22 The African Alliance of North
23 America, Joffrey Satoli from South
24 Africa, who was a band out of South
25 Africa in the 1960s, came here to

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2 Philadelphia. They told him to hook up
3 with me. For 25 years, we fought the
4 Free Nelson Mandela right here on
5 Philadelphia.

6 Also be sensitive and
7 supportive of Black Lives Matter as well
8 as MeToo.

9 Now I want to say something
10 else to you. I'm a strong believer in
11 community and the elders. No society
12 survives if you don't have the elders.
13 No society survives unless the elders
14 reach down to the youth. We have got to
15 rebuild our communities around the basis
16 of family and community, and children and
17 elders are essential to this.

18 (Applause.)

19 DR. PALMER: Vanessa, oh my
20 God. I was on the political side.
21 Vanessa, Curt -- him and Chaka, I got
22 them involved in their first
23 demonstrations and picketing, right, with
24 the Black Caucus in Pennsylvania, most of
25 those guys, right?

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2 But I want to say to you that
3 this is four generations for people who
4 knew me. This young woman over here in
5 the orange shirt, that's my daughter, my
6 oldest daughter. She's 59 years old.
7 She's 59 years old.

8 (Applause.)

9 DR. PALMER: Where is my son?
10 Where's Walt? Where's Walt? Oh, get out
11 of here. Come over here. Come out of
12 there. This is my oldest son, Walt, Jr.
13 He's 64 years old.

14 (Applause.)

15 DR. PALMER: On Monday I have
16 my birthday. I'm 85. I'm five years
17 away from 90.

18 (Applause.)

19 DR. PALMER: But today I
20 invited somebody who knew me. There's an
21 old saying that if you live long enough,
22 there won't be anybody to remember you
23 when you were in elementary school. She
24 remembers me when I was in elementary
25 school. Cora Hill was born and raised in

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2 the Black Bottom and she is 100 years old
3 in August.

4 (Applause.)

5 DR. PALMER: That's the
6 connection. That's the connection. She
7 wants to say a couple of words.

8 MS. HILL: All I want to say is
9 there's only one Walt Palmer, and he
10 encouraged me to go back to school, to go
11 to Harrisburg, get my license in those
12 days just to be a practical nurse, but he
13 has always been behind me as a young man
14 and he has been a fighter. He'll
15 fight -- he would fight for anything,
16 whatever the cause. If it was dog watch,
17 he would fight it, and he is really to be
18 honored.

19 (Applause.)

20 DR. PALMER: Thank you so much.
21 Thank you.

22 I also want to make a note.
23 Remember, during the MOVE crisis, I was
24 the chief negotiator in MOVE in the first
25 shootout they had in '68, and I was also

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2 negotiating to try to resolve the issue
3 in 1985 in the Osage shootout. I was
4 there, and now some of the MOVE members
5 after 40-some years are coming home. I
6 can tell you that I was there. MOVE did
7 not shoot the first shot.

8 (Applause.)

9 DR. PALMER: I was standing in
10 the middle of the street right in front
11 of their house when I heard a shot or
12 what sounded like a shot coming from over
13 my shoulder. At that point, I dropped
14 and hit the ground, because I knew that
15 all hell would break loose. The place
16 was surrounded. And momentarily right
17 after that, the shooting took place, and
18 the police in front of the building were
19 shooting down into the building. I was
20 watching Sergeant Ramp, who was on the
21 corner by a pole in Pearl Street. MOVE
22 could never have hit him, because the
23 guns were projected at me or in my
24 direction, not at me personally. So the
25 bullets could not have gone around the

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2 corner.

3 I've often times said that this
4 is the largest, the greatest travesty in
5 American jurisprudence. They went to
6 jail for 40 years for something they did
7 not commit.

8 Maybe you didn't like them
9 because they ran their dogs. Maybe you
10 didn't like them because they ate garlic.
11 Maybe you didn't like them because they
12 had the compost. Maybe you didn't like
13 them because they didn't have glass in
14 their windows. That's a code violation.
15 That's not a bombing violation. And we
16 must take that into account and realize
17 the fact that we have to take
18 responsibility for everything we do.

19 And I'll close by saying this:
20 I would be remiss if I did not note
21 Councilman Lucien Blackwell and his wife
22 Jannie Blackwell for 40 years of
23 constituent service in the City of
24 Philadelphia.

25 (Applause.)

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2 DR. PALMER: Jannie Blackwell,
3 you are the epitome of constituent
4 services. Your attitude, your demeanor,
5 your approach, your way in which you deal
6 with people, you will be sorely missed,
7 but you'll never be forgotten. The work
8 that you and Lu did, the groundwork you
9 did, hopefully it's a model for many to
10 come after you.

11 On the political side, I did
12 not purposely forget about Vanessa, but
13 we did a lot of work in getting a lot of
14 people elected, blacks elected in the
15 town. Andrew Carn was one young man we
16 worked with. He became a state
17 legislator for 18 years. David
18 Richardson became the youngest person in
19 the history of Pennsylvania to become
20 elected to the State Legislature, and we
21 have more and more. A lot of guys in
22 here -- Curt will often times tell you
23 about me, like I said before, blast on
24 him and pulling him into demonstration
25 and picketing. Yes, a lot of picketing.

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2 It's a lot of demonstration. And I'll
3 tell you something, I went to jail in '67
4 for closing down the School District of
5 Philadelphia to save our children, and at
6 85 or 90, I'd be willing to go to jail
7 again to save our babies. We must all
8 chime in to save our children.

9 (Applause.)

10 DR. PALMER: Thank you. Thank
11 you, everyone. Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 DR. PALMER: So Council can do
14 its business, I would ask any of our
15 guests that are here to walk across the
16 hallway into the Caucus Room for a few
17 minutes so we can convene. Okay?

18 Thank you, City Council. Thank
19 you, Mr. Chair.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: At this
25 time, the Chair now recognizes

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2 Councilwoman Blackwell, who will present
3 a resolution recognizing Christian
4 Dunbar. Would Mr. Dunbar and those
5 accompanying him please join the
6 Councilwoman at the podium.

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
10 you very much. This is a special
11 pleasure and privilege for me. We have
12 the first African-born -- he's from
13 Liberia -- Treasurer for the City of
14 Philadelphia. Yes. Let us honor.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
17 let me say that he worked with the
18 African community and the entire City
19 even before becoming our City Treasurer.
20 He's active in Echoes of Africa, the
21 Mayor's Commission on African and
22 Caribbean Immigrant Affairs, that we
23 co-founded these in 2000 and 2005, and he
24 is a person that you can call on for any
25 issues. He understands, he's down to

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2 earth, and he's willing to help anybody
3 with any issues, and certainly it doesn't
4 have to be technical finance issues, but
5 any issues with regard to City financing.
6 We've called on him many, many times, and
7 we are very, very grateful and blessed to
8 be here for this presentation.

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I too want
10 to say it's truly an honor and a
11 privilege to have this opportunity to
12 recognize Christian Dunbar as the
13 Treasurer here in the City of
14 Philadelphia. He's also played a major
15 role in helping the City of Philadelphia
16 recover 30 million, something along those
17 lines, 33 million to be exact. And so we
18 thank you for your dedication and your
19 public service.

20 Recognizing and honoring
21 Christian Dunbar on his appointment as
22 the City Treasurer of Philadelphia.

23 Whereas, on June the 17th of
24 2019, Mayor Jim Kenney announced his
25 appointment of Christian Dunbar as City

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2 Treasurer, succeeding Rasheia Johnson;
3 and

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
5 Mr. Dunbar was the Deputy Treasurer for
6 the City of Philadelphia since 2014. In
7 this role, he was responsible for the
8 issuance of all notes and bonds on behalf
9 of the City's General Fund and Enterprise
10 Funds used to finance capital projects;
11 and

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
13 additionally, Mr. Dunbar serves as a
14 Mayoral appointee and Chairman of the
15 Philadelphia Land Bank Board of
16 Directors. He also serves as an advisor
17 to the United States Agency for
18 International Development, known as
19 USAID, and the World Bank Group for the
20 advancement of capital market
21 development, structured product
22 development, and governance in Emerging
23 Markets; and

24 Whereas, prior to joining the
25 City, Mr. Dunbar was a Wealth Manager

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2 with Wells Fargo Advisors. So he is
3 exceedingly equipped. In that capacity,
4 he has managed investments and credit
5 products for high net worth individuals,
6 institutions, and public entities.
7 Mr. Dunbar has also advised several
8 African governments on fiscal and
9 monetary policy; and

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
11 Mr. Dunbar has presented at conferences
12 in the U.S., Canada, Africa, and Europe
13 on topics including capital market
14 development, emerging market risk, and
15 Environmental Social and Governance
16 impact; and

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
18 Mr. Dunbar earned his BA from Temple
19 University. At Temple University, he was
20 an athlete. He was named the Most
21 Valuable Player and Captain of the
22 football team; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
24 Dunbar is of Liberian descent. His
25 maternal grandfather, William V.S.

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2 Tubman, served as President of Liberia
3 for 27 years. And we did not know until
4 today that Mr. Dunbar is also a
5 descendent of American abolitionist and
6 humanitarian Harriet Tubman. He lives in
7 West Philadelphia with his wife and two
8 children.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Now,
10 therefore, be it

11 Resolved, that the Council of
12 the City of Philadelphia, hereby
13 recognizes and honors Christian Dunbar on
14 his appointment as City Treasurer.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Most
16 importantly of all, it's further
17 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
18 resolution be presented to the City
19 Treasurer, Christian Dunbar, as a sincere
20 expression of the Council of the City of
21 Philadelphia's gratitude, admiration, and
22 recognition.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
25 now recognizes Mr. Dunbar for remarks.

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2 MR. DUNBAR: Thank you very
3 much. First off, I want to thank
4 Councilwoman Blackwell for honoring me.
5 I want to thank this whole body as well
6 for honoring me. And I'd be remiss not
7 to thank Dr. Palmer, who was just up
8 here. It is his shoulder that many of us
9 stand on to allow us to do what we do
10 today.

11 I would also like to thank the
12 Mayor and Rob Dubow for entrusting the
13 City's -- their portfolio, investment
14 portfolio in my hands. I'd also like to
15 thank really the tremendous staff that we
16 have in City Treasury. As the Councilman
17 mentioned, we were available to reconcile
18 the \$33 million, and it was really
19 through their hard work over time that we
20 were able to do that in a timely manner.

21 I'd also like to thank my
22 predecessor, Rasheia Johnson, who really
23 led that effort and who is now in the
24 private sector, but I want to thank her
25 for her many years of counsel that we

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2 worked together to reconcile and to do
3 all the things we did.

4 I certainly also want to thank
5 many of the members of Council who I have
6 leaned on throughout the years for some
7 level of counsel, Councilman Johnson,
8 Councilman Green, Councilman Squilla,
9 Councilwoman Parker, Councilman Domb,
10 Councilwoman Bass, and all the other
11 Councilmembers who really have taken my
12 calls over the years whenever I've had an
13 issue or needed to talk to someone.

14 And I'd also be remiss if I did
15 not recognize Sade Lewis, who was a
16 previous City Treasurer, who is of
17 Nigerian descent, you know, and she -- I
18 think many of the members of this body
19 know her very, very well.

20 Lastly, I'd like to thank my
21 wife and my two little ones.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Smart man.

23 MR. DUNBAR: If it wasn't for
24 her support, I would not be allowed to be
25 the public servant and put all the

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2 years -- all the hours that we're able to
3 put in to serve the citizens of
4 Philadelphia.

5 And with that, I just want to
6 thank everyone here, and I really
7 appreciate it. I'd also like to just
8 quickly thank some of the professionals
9 in the industry that really help the City
10 do what the City needs to do. It's a
11 complicated market, a complicated
12 industry, and the professionals that we
13 work with on a daily basis help make the
14 market efficient.

15 Thank you very much.

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

25 you, Mr. Chairman. I have two

3 was noted during caucus, Mr. Chair. One
4 is privileged and one is non-privileged.
5 The non-privileged is co-sponsored by
6 Councilmembers Sanchez, Johnson, Jones,

8 is co-sponsored by Councilmembers Clarke,
9 Johnson, Henon, Jones, Domb, Gym,
10 Taubenberger, and -- just those two.
11 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: It will be
13 reflected on the record. Thank you,
14 Councilwoman.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And,
16 Mr. Chairman, after the title of the
17 non-privileged resolution is read, I wish
18 to be recognized. And then after the
19 titles of both resolutions have been
20 read, I wish to be recognized again to
21 speak on them.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

23 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
24 resolution calling for a fair contract
25 for commercial office cleaners and

2 building service workers in Philadelphia.

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: That will be

5 The Chair recognizes
6 Councilwoman Parker.

10 consideration of this resolution on
11 today's Final Passage Calendar.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been
14 moved and properly seconded.

15 All in favor signify by saying
16 aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes
21 have it. It will be placed on today's
22 Final Passage.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
24 resolution authorizing the Committee on
25 Labor and Civil Service to hold hearings

2 regarding service providers and employers
3 honoring existing and prior worker
4 contract agreements.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
6 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
8 you, Mr. Chairman. First, I want to
9 again thank co-sponsors Sanchez, Johnson,
10 Jones, Greenlee, and Green for the
11 resolution that calls for a fair contract
12 for commercial office cleaners and
13 building service workers in Philadelphia.

14 Prior to us starting Council --
15 thank you, Council President -- we had a
16 press conference with them today just to
17 note that we stand in solidarity with
18 them.

19 The second authorizes the
20 Committee on Labor and Civil Service to
21 hold hearings regarding service providers
22 and employers honoring existing and prior
23 worker contract agreements.

24 Unfortunately, these
25 resolutions are related around a common

2 theme relative to employers and their
3 efforts to cut costs and make a profit at
4 the expense of their employees.

5 We know that yesterday the
6 3,000 commercial office cleaners and
7 building service workers took the
8 courageous stance and they took a strike
9 vote, and if they don't get a fair
10 contract by this coming Tuesday, they
11 will strike.

12 Their demands aren't extreme.
13 They just want what all working
14 individuals want, and that's fair wages
15 with good healthcare and retirement
16 security.

17 The second resolution is one
18 that I hope folks have been paying
19 attention to, and there have been three
20 recent high-profile cases that brought
21 this issue to the forefront. An example,
22 one, Vita Healthcare Group assumed
23 ownership of the Somerton Center and
24 Spring Garden Center Nursing Home
25 facilities. As the new owners, they

2 slashed wages by more than 30 percent for
3 some workers and made healthcare
4 practically unaffordable by instituting a
5 \$10,000 deductible.

6 After many months and much
7 activism by the nursing home workers and
8 public officials, Vita Healthcare Group
9 and the workers were able to reach a fair
10 union contract that made access to
11 healthcare attainable and set fair wages.

12 The second example is Sodexo, a
13 major facilities management corporation
14 with contracts throughout Philadelphia.
15 They had a contract to provide
16 environmental services at Hahnemann
17 University Hospital. According to the
18 contract, the workers, who are also
19 members of District Council 1199C, they
20 had a right to earn both sick and
21 personal time. However, when Sodexo lost
22 the contract in 2018, they refused to pay
23 out that earned and sick time to the
24 members of District 1199C.

25 According to calculations, the

1 10/10/19 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 workers are owed over \$218,000 in
3 compensation from Sodexo in connection to
4 both earned and sick time.

5 And in the most recent example,
6 which was just brought to my attention in
7 the past week or so, members of the
8 Pennsylvania Association of Staff Nurses
9 and Allied Professionals, PASNAP, they
10 are currently facing uncertainty at Saint
11 Christopher's Hospital for Children. The
12 hospital's new owners, Tower Health and
13 Drexel University, have indicated that
14 they do not intend to recognize the
15 collective bargaining agreement. In
16 particular, they have conveyed that they
17 plan to alter the staffing levels that
18 the members fought hard to achieve and
19 which are critical to providing the kinds
20 of care that the children at the hospital
21 need.

22 In all of these examples,
23 they're all in the healthcare realm.
24 This practice is unfortunately happening
25 across many industries. In the era of

2 frequent outsourcing acquisitions and
3 mergers, it is increasingly common for
4 service providers and employers to refuse
5 to honor existing and prior worker
6 contract agreements despite already
7 having existing laws on the books. We
8 need to explore if, how, and under what
9 terms can these laws be better enforced
10 and/or strengthened to protect workers.

11 We also know that we have a
12 long way to go in ensuring that we have
13 economic justice in our great City of
14 Philadelphia, but both of these
15 resolutions we believe are a step in the
16 right direction, and we look forward to
17 getting the facts on the record.

18 So thank you, Mr. Chairman, and
19 thank you, colleagues, for all of your
20 patience and allowing me to communicate
21 very specifically so nothing is
22 misunderstood what the goals and
23 objectives of both of these resolutions
24 are.

25 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

13 resolution recognizing the 95th
14 Anniversary of the Curtis Institute of
15 Music, its part in training the world's
16 finest musicians, and for its
17 contributions to the rich cultural fabric
18 of the City of Philadelphia.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: This
20 resolution will be placed on today's
21 Final Calendar.

22 The Chair now recognizes
23 Councilwoman Gym.

24 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
25 very much, Mr. Chairman. I have one

2 bill, and I'd like to be recognized after
3 the reading of the bill.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
5 Councilwoman.

6 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
7 amending Title 6 of The Philadelphia
8 Code, the "Health Code," to add a section
9 establishing requirements for hospitals
10 that anticipate closing.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair
12 recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

13 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
14 very much, Mr. Chairman. Over the
15 summer, the for-profit hedge fund owner
16 of Hahnemann Hospital rocked this city
17 with the abrupt closure of a vital
18 Philadelphia institution that served tens
19 of thousands of patients and employed
20 thousands of workers. The closure
21 announcement was made in mid June, and
22 Hahnemann was basically closed by
23 September.

24 Today, ten of us introduced a
25 bill to make sure Philadelphia will never

2 again be left out of critical decisions
3 that impact the lives of our neediest
4 residents.

5 I want to thank Councilmember
6 Henon and my Council co-sponsors
7 Greenlee, Parker, Johnson, Blackwell,
8 Squilla, Jones, Domb, and Green for
9 backing this. This bill effectively
10 codifies into law an existing 1969 Board
11 of Health regulation that required
12 advanced notice for closure of hospitals
13 and medical facilities.

14 What we want to make sure is
15 that the time that we get, this bill will
16 require six months advanced notice and
17 require hospitals to work with the City
18 on planning that ensures the appropriate
19 and safe transition for patients and help
20 staff members land on their feet.

21 In the poorest large city in
22 the nation, Hahnemann was a critical
23 safety net hospital, which saw 50,000
24 patients a year going through its ER. It
25 was one of six maternity wards left in

2 the City of Philadelphia. When it
3 announced its maternity ward closure with
4 only days notice, it left 800 moms-to-be
5 with precious little time to find other
6 options. Thousands of patients were also
7 left in the dark. Thirty-five hundred
8 employees, some of whom had been with the
9 hospital for decades, lost their jobs.
10 Hundreds of doctors who had trained for
11 years for a placement at a major city
12 institution had to scramble to find other
13 options. And it's a telling sign of the
14 downward spiral of healthcare in America
15 today that a hedge fund owner named Joel
16 Freedman teamed up with a real estate
17 company to buy Hahnemann in the first
18 place. Over the next 18 months, he
19 quickly drained it of its assets as he
20 extracted every ounce of profit.

21 And it's worth noting that
22 Mr. Freedman, as he readies the Center
23 City hospital for a massive sale, has
24 already bought a \$7 million Los Angeles
25 home -- it's his second in that city --

2 as a bonus.

3 But the harsh realities and
4 destructive practices of a ruthless
5 for-profit healthcare market means cities
6 have to step up in our protections and
7 demand for transparency. There are
8 dozens of hospitals across the State of
9 Pennsylvania that are in worse financial
10 shape than Hahnemann right now. National
11 statistics indicate that one in five
12 rural hospitals will close or consolidate
13 in the coming years.

14 It is my belief that we need
15 Medicare for all and an end to the
16 ruthless for-profit mentality around
17 healthcare that puts all of our lives at
18 risk, but in the meantime, we're offering
19 this bill as a reminder that
20 Philadelphians can't afford to wait this
21 out.

22 Thank you very much.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Councilwoman. This bill will be referred
25 to the appropriate committee.

10 It is my sincere hope that
11 these hearings will serve as a catalyst

13 of us who sit on I-95 traffic every day
14 deserve better than this.

sources for the bonds and certain other
actions," respectfully reports it has
considered the same and returns the
attached bills to Council with a
favorable recommendation.

COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair

COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

10 introduction today.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
12 Mr. Chairman. I have no bills or
13 resolutions today.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
15 Councilman.

16 The next order of business is

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: It's been

23 rules of Council be suspended to permit
24 the use of a Consent Agenda to consider
25 the bills just read by Councilman

2 Greenlee.

3 All in favor will signify by
4 saying aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes
9 have it, the motion carries, and we will
10 consider the Consent Agenda shortly.

11 The Chair again recognizes
12 Councilman Greenlee for the purpose of
13 calling up bills and resolutions on the
14 regular Second Reading and Final Passage
15 Calendars today.

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
17 you, Mr. Chairman. In addition to the
18 bills being considered on the Consent
19 Agenda, the following resolutions and
20 bills are being called up from the Second
21 Reading and Final Passage Calendars.
22 They are Nos. 190769. All other bills
23 and resolutions are being held.

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
25 Councilman.

1 10/10/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 That brings us to our public
3 comment. Before considering the
4 resolutions and bills, we will consider
5 the public comment as follows:

6 Your public comment must
7 concern the matters of the Second Reading
8 and Final Passage Calendars for today's
9 actions in today's Council session.

10 All speakers must sign up to
11 testify. If you haven't already signed
12 up for today's session, please do so to
13 my left by giving your name to the
14 Sergeant-of-Arms at the table.

15 You will be called in the order
16 in which your name appears on the sign-in
17 sheet, and you will have two minutes
18 today due to the amount of volume, two
19 minutes today to speak. In order to be
20 fair for all those wishing to speak, I
21 intend to hold faithful to the two-minute
22 limit.

23 When you begin speaking, you
24 will see a green light at the podium.
25 There will be 30 seconds remaining to

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2 your time when the light will then turn
3 yellow, which is a reminder to conclude
4 your remarks. Once your two minutes have
5 passed, the light will turn red and the
6 Sergeant-of-Arms will disconnect the
7 microphone. At that point, please yield
8 the podium to the next speaker, because
9 we do have a lot of speakers on today's
10 public comment.

11 I will also reserve the right
12 to our rules of Council to limit the
13 repetitious comments on the subject
14 matter.

15 I will ask the Chief Clerk
16 please read the name of our first
17 speaker.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Harry Barnum,
19 commenting on 170408.

20 (Witnesses approached podium.)

21 MR. BARNUM (through
22 translator): Good morning to everyone,
23 to the Council, to the President, to the
24 members here and the people in the
25 audience. My name is Harry Barnum. I'm

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2 a death advocate at Liberty Resources.

3 I'm here to mention something on 170408.

4 This resolution I don't want to

5 complain about, but I think this

6 resolution has been waiting for a year

7 and the Committee has done nothing about

8 it. You must finish the old business.

9 It's been put off far too long. It's

10 been a year, and as I look to that goal,

11 I say what's happening?

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. BARNUM: What are you

14 doing? What is happening?

15 I don't want to complain, but I

16 feel it's my job to behoove you to do

17 something. It is old business and it's

18 been waiting too long. I just keep

19 hearing you say over and over talking

20 about different numbers and this one has

21 never been resolved.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: Our next

25 speaker, please.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Daniel Symonds,
3 commenting on 170408.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. SYMONDS: Hello, members of
6 City Council. My name is Daniel Symonds.
7 I'm an educator at the Franklin-SLA
8 campus of the Philadelphia School
9 District and a PFT member of the Caucus
10 of Working Educators.

11 I want to teach today.
12 Education is my life's work. My students
13 ought to be in class right now, but
14 that's not possible because the
15 Philadelphia School District has led our
16 campus into a preventable crisis due to
17 mismanagement, lack of transparency, and
18 failure to meaningfully engaged
19 stakeholders over the course of the
20 entire project, as our asbestos cloud of
21 a school is but one example of the
22 citywide toxic schools and unequal
23 treatment that brings me here today.

24 What can we do to heal? I have
25 three simple requests. I call upon City

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2 Council to investigate the mishandling of
3 the Franklin-SLA project that has more
4 than 1,000 students out of school for two
5 weeks.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Excuse me.
7 I'm going to have to interrupt for a
8 second, and this is a good reminder for
9 all those who are coming for public
10 testimony. Would you please state the
11 number of the bill in which you are
12 authorized to speak on.

13 MR. SYMONDS: The school
14 suspension bill, because the School
15 District has suspended us from school.
16 Let me look it up. 174048 [sic], I
17 think.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

19 MR. SYMONDS: Thank you. All
20 right. So my three recommendations are
21 quite simple. We need a hearing to
22 investigate what's gone wrong in our
23 project led by the City Controller that
24 includes after-school public hearings,
25 and taxpayers should know how \$37 million

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2 and counting has been mismanaged by this
3 School District.

4 A second simple request, there
5 should be an establishment immediately of
6 a Special Committee on School Facilities
7 to address lead and asbestos in all of
8 Philadelphia's schools. District and
9 state officials should be made to answer
10 questions to develop plans to prevent
11 cancer and other endangerments that
12 pervade the buildings students and
13 families and teachers are told to trust
14 is safe. The School District clearly
15 worries about bad press, but has not done
16 the work of admitting to and solving the
17 actual problem.

18 Lastly, Council, I urge you to
19 visit schools in your own districts and
20 in the poorest zip codes of Philadelphia.
21 Shadow a child, learn their experience,
22 and then ask me if my request for a
23 truth-telling investigation is
24 unreasonable. Some problems are complex,
25 take a lot of time and money to solve.

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2 Telling the truth doesn't cost a dime.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

5 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
6 please.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Elizabeth

8 Cesarini, commenting on 170408.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. CESARINI: I'm commenting
11 on 170408.

12 Monday is indigenous people's
13 day. So I'd first like to take a moment
14 to honor the fact that we are here on
15 (unintelligible) Lenape lands.

16 My name is Elizabeth Cesarini
17 and I'm here to support Councilmember
18 Reynolds Brown and Gym and their
19 resolution calling on and urging the
20 School District of Philadelphia to
21 permanently prohibit the suspension of
22 elementary-aged students from first
23 through fifth grades. Kindergarten too
24 maybe. And keeping young people in their
25 schools should be all of our first

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2 priorities.

3 I'm also here because we have
4 heard that our neighborhood school is in
5 danger of being uprooted. I work as an
6 ELL coordinator at Olney Charter High
7 School. In the nine years I've worked
8 here under ASPIRA, I've seen the English
9 language learner program grow from about
10 40 students in 2011 to 678, as of now 681
11 as of today, an increase of 1,595 percent
12 in nine years. This is due to the
13 strength of our students and our
14 programming, our dedicated unionized
15 teachers, our amazing staff, and the
16 choice more and more families continue to
17 make every day to trust their students to
18 grow in our school.

19 Our students and families have
20 been uprooted by climate change, economic
21 devastation, trauma and war from the
22 Caribbean, Central America, the Middle
23 East, Southeast Asia, Africa, and across
24 the United States. They have since put
25 down roots in the Olney neighborhood and

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2 across Philadelphia.

3 Our students and families cite
4 programs like College Access, Peer
5 Mediation, our ELL program, our athletic
6 department, band, music, art, our large
7 special education department, all of our
8 caring and compassionate teachers and
9 staff as the reason they enroll and keep
10 coming to school.

11 These roots have not been easy
12 to cultivate. In a city, state, and
13 country that would often rather raise
14 what exists and nurture what is already
15 growing, we at Olney Charter High School
16 urge you to support our efforts to put
17 down strong roots in our land and create
18 a better life for our students, families,
19 staff, and community.

20 Thank you for your time.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Before I ask
24 the Chief Clerk to read the next three
25 speakers, again, I just want to remind

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2 everybody we do have a lot on our agenda
3 here today in the public comment.
4 Please, we're giving a little bit of
5 flexibility on subject matter. Stick to
6 the subject on the bills that you are
7 speaking on Final Passage.

8 So, Mr. Decker, please read the
9 name of the next three speakers.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Claire Cynthia
11 Louischarles, Sharon Bryant, Sherrie
12 Cohen.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MS. LOUISCHARLES: Good
15 morning, everyone. My name is Claire
16 Cynthia Louischarles. I'm talking No.
17 170408 and a resolution calling and
18 urging the School District of
19 Philadelphia to permanently prohibit the
20 suspension of elementary-aged students
21 from the first to fifth grade.

22 I don't think that's fair
23 because they are little kid and I don't
24 think they know what they doing. They
25 just like -- the first to fifth grade.

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2 And also I'm here to talk in
3 favor of Olney Charter High School. And
4 I love this school because you get an
5 opportunity to learn whatever you want to
6 do, and there's a lot of club. You could
7 (unintelligible.)

8 At Olney Charter High School,
9 the teacher always look at you in the
10 same way as others. They never
11 discriminate you and they're not bias.

12 I'm in 11 grade right now and
13 I've seen a lot of changing going in the
14 school. I can tell because I'm in that
15 school since ninth grade. For example,
16 there's something we call children.
17 Something happens to them -- I said that
18 because when I was in ninth grade, there
19 is only ten children. Other students see
20 that. The children have more good stuff
21 so they make it for to become one.

22 A student -- they used to let
23 us fight, but not anymore. The students
24 are changing from bad to good. Before we
25 were the worst school of all, but not

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2 anymore.

3 Second example, just
4 transportation. Student that live near
5 Olney Charter High School are happy
6 because they don't have to take like
7 buses. I was asking many student if
8 change from Olney to other school, it
9 would be difficult, they say yes because
10 they have to take train to get out of
11 school. And I don't think they should
12 close the school because the teacher love
13 their student.

14 Thank you for your attention.
15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.
17 Mr. Decker, our next speaker.
18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MS. BRYANT: Good afternoon,
20 citizens and honorable Council. My name
21 is Sharon Bryant. Thank you for this
22 opportunity.

23 As a longtime Philadelphia
24 School District educator, I want to
25 testify on Resolution 170408 regarding

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school suspensions. Under normal
circumstances, I'd oppose excessive
suspensions of students because we know
it's critical for them to physically be
present in school in order for them to be
able to learn, but unfortunately, my
students and colleagues being physically
present at the Lewis C. Cassidy
Elementary School, number one in
disrepair in the School District, is like
sending them to the slaughterhouse. I
just found out this morning that there
are now students wearing doctor-ordered
masks.

So, again, in the Inquirer's
Toxic School series and in Shades of
America's Environmental Injustice series,
this morning I come crying out to you to
suspend everybody from Cassidy, both the
students and the staff. Put everybody
out.

(Applause.)

MS. BRYANT: They should have
been out of there really a long time ago,

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2 long before I arrived in 2016. Now it's
3 almost 2020 and they're still over there
4 breathing toxic air, being exposed to
5 mold, lead, and asbestos. I hear that my
6 classroom, 302, may have been condemned.
7 My exposures there caused me numerous
8 respiratory illnesses that I've never had
9 before a day in my life.

10 There are now only seven
11 teachers remaining at Cassidy from the
12 time I went out injured on duty a year
13 and a half ago. They left due to
14 illness, early retirement, and a plethora
15 of voluntary transfers.

16 The job with teaching nowadays
17 is hard enough in and of itself, so
18 suffering under both toxic environmental
19 and psychological conditions proves to be
20 too much. I already know your answer,
21 there's no money. So that's the task at
22 hand. We have to find the money. We
23 have to figure out a way to address the
24 toxic lead and asbestos conditions across
25 all affected schools in our aging

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2 society.

3 I thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

6 Mr. Decker, our next three
7 speakers, please. Or let's go next two.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Minh Tran,
9 followed by Joshua Block, followed by
10 David Ivory.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. TRAN: Good morning,
13 Councilmembers. My name is Minh Tran at
14 Benjamin Franklin High School, class of
15 2017 alum and was also a youth
16 coordinator at Ridley. I'm here to speak
17 on Resolution No. 170408 about school
18 suspensions.

19 I think we need to give
20 students more time in the classrooms, not
21 taking it away for suspensions. Speaking
22 of taking away student time in classroom,
23 I'm sure that you all have heard about
24 the thousands of students from Benjamin
25 Franklin High School and Science

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2 Leadership Academy missing school for
3 more than ten days due to asbestos in
4 their schools. The School District of
5 Philadelphia has spent 37 million on a
6 project to merge Benjamin Franklin High
7 School and SLA into one building. The
8 project did not meet any tainted deadline
9 and was rushed through the process so
10 that students can be in the building by
11 this school year. As a result of that,
12 students from Benjamin Franklin High
13 School had to attend school days during
14 construction for the past 18 months, but
15 the problems have existed long before.

16 So I went to Benjamin Franklin
17 High School from 2014 to 2017. As one of
18 many neighborhood schools across the
19 City, we don't get much funding,
20 attention, and transparency from the
21 School District. When I was a student
22 there, every day I would be in the
23 classroom, lunchroom, and hallways that
24 have peeling lead paint falling from
25 walls and pipes. There are water

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2 fountains that have "do not drink" signs
3 on it, and I learned that later on that
4 asbestos has been present in the building
5 at an alarming level. At first I
6 questioned myself, what is this problem
7 and no one has done anything about it.
8 Over the years, I learned that because we
9 are used to crumbling conditions and
10 having to survive in the least amount of
11 resources, we normalize these conditions,
12 and the people in power also normalize
13 them. In fact, Dr. Hite repeatedly cited
14 that Philly is an old city and old
15 buildings have lead. And if we didn't
16 have noticed already and have been
17 reminding from people, we don't even
18 spend much of their time in the toxic
19 school conditions.

20 As an alum from Benjamin
21 Franklin High School, I urge you to, one,
22 pass a resolution for an immediate
23 investigation at the misleading of the
24 District and the multi-million taxpayer
25 dollars, construction power in the SLA

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2 building that left more than a thousand
3 students out of school for more than ten
4 years.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
6 for your testimony, sir. We're going to
7 have to stick to our timeline.

8 MR. TRAN: And pass a
9 resolution to establish a Special
10 Committee on School Facilities to
11 address --

12 (Microphone turned off.)

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr. Decker,
14 could you please read our next speaker,
15 please.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Joshua Block.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. BLOCK: Good afternoon,
19 esteemed members of the Council. My name
20 is Joshua Block. I'm a parent of two
21 School District students. I'm a teacher
22 at Science Leadership Academy, and
23 currently I stand before you instead of
24 teaching my students, because today that
25 is not an option.

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2 I'm speaking in response to
3 170408, and like many before me, I would
4 like to express that removing students
5 from school does not move people closer
6 to education goals. And like many people
7 before me, I need to connect this issue
8 to what is going on in every -- not
9 every; in many other places in our School
10 District.

11 The most recent crisis is not
12 an isolated incident, the conditions of
13 something that many school communities
14 are dealing with at this very moment.
15 This is a problem of infrastructure, but
16 it is also a problem of governance and
17 oversight.

18 There is no denying the funding
19 issues the District faces. There is no
20 denying as well the dysfunctional ways
21 decisions are currently made and the
22 deliberate ways the School District
23 avoids transparency.

24 For these reasons, I ask you to
25 step in by investigating the enormous

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2 public health and infrastructure failure
3 of the Ben Franklin-SLA campus project.
4 We need to know why this was handled so
5 incompetently. We need to know how many
6 children in Philadelphia -- how many
7 children currently in Philadelphia have
8 construction going on in their schools.
9 We need to know how many young people are
10 continually exposed to toxic conditions
11 in their pursuit of education. Finally,
12 we need you to visit schools. We need
13 you to spend time with students during
14 their days and be more connected to the
15 reality of schools in our city.

16 Thank you very much.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

19 Mr. Decker, our next speaker.

20 CHIEF CLERK: David Ivory.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. IVORY: Good morning. My
23 name is David Ivory. I'm a
24 Grammy-nominated recording engineer, a
25 music producer, and the Director of the

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2 Sound Recording and Music Technology
3 program at Montgomery County Community
4 College and, most importantly, the Chair
5 of the Philadelphia Music Industry Task
6 Force. I'm here to testify on Bill
7 160026-A with regards to musicians having
8 access to load in and out of certain
9 venues without getting ticketed.

10 The music community has many
11 struggles, including performing in the
12 City. We have a strong musical heritage
13 here in Philadelphia, but musicians and
14 artists of today that will create that
15 future musical heritage are consistently
16 in danger of being muted with policies
17 that face them, from lack of local venues
18 to perform in, to feeling among most
19 people that music is free, musicians and
20 artists facing a daunting challenge to
21 make a living in the City of Brotherly
22 Love and Sisterly Affection.

23 One of the low-hanging fruit
24 that the Music Industry Task Force
25 identified to help the music community is

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2 Bill 160026-A. This bill would provide
3 some relief to musicians trying to start
4 their careers here in the City. How?
5 Well, for a start, often times bands and
6 individual musicians get a parking ticket
7 just for loading into their gear to
8 perform their show. The little money
9 that they will make that night becomes
10 the payment for the parking ticket, which
11 then makes their performance essentially
12 free, if not in the red. This bill would
13 provide loading zones to make it safe and
14 free from getting a ticket just for
15 loading in their musical equipment to the
16 venue.

17 I've been a music producer and
18 music professional for more than 35
19 years, and the ability for start-up bands
20 or just independent musicians to play and
21 perform in the City have been made harder
22 and harder year in and year out. This
23 bill would provide at least some relief
24 and be a great step forward to helping
25 these start-up artists and musicians

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2 perform in this great music city.

3 I urge the City Council to vote
4 to make this bill a reality so we can
5 show that the City still supports our
6 great heritage as well as the future
7 music makers.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

11 Mr. Decker, our next three
12 speakers, please.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Jesse Lundy,
14 followed by Dr. Louis Anthony DeLise,
15 followed by Joe Danihel.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. LUNDY: My name is Jesse
18 Lundy. I've been a concert promoter here
19 in Philadelphia for 24 years. I book
20 over 200 shows a year in the City in a
21 variety of venues. I'm here to testify
22 today about Bill 160026-A with regard to
23 what Mr. Ivory said just before. This
24 bill will offer relief to the musicians
25 who often aren't making enough money to

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2 pay the parking ticket that they might
3 get.

4 We, with the Music Industry
5 Task Force, are interested in helping
6 continue the pilot program that was
7 started before our organization formed to
8 create spaces outside of venues in a few
9 of the venues here in town basically just
10 to see how it works and to help
11 streamline and make that process work for
12 both the City, the Parking Authority, the
13 venues themselves.

14 This will not only take weight
15 off of the shoulders of the musicians as
16 they hurry to get their equipment into
17 the venues, it also takes weight off of
18 the venues' staff who are otherwise
19 standing watch for Parking Authority
20 people to come along and write a ticket.

21 So we urge you to please help
22 us make this a reality. We at the Music
23 Industry Task Force are interested in
24 keeping musicians coming to Philadelphia
25 and keeping them happy while they're

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2 here.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

6 for your comments.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Dr. Louis Anthony

8 DeLise.

9 (No response.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

13 This is an official decree of the people
14 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
15 such, requires immediate action and
16 remedy.

17 Every week, Council, Mayor,
18 Governor, and others transfer private
19 property to the government, probably
20 unlawfully.

21 Last week, I heard multiple
22 testimonies of government officials
23 taking children without permission. I
24 testified the government is stealing my
25 home, stealing my just compensation.

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2 Council's response was to unlawfully
3 reduce public testimony from five minutes
4 to two minutes.

5 If committing one crime one
6 time would land persons in jail, why
7 haven't officials been prosecuted? If
8 officials lied to God in their oath of
9 office, how can constituents reelect
10 them?

11 The constitutions require
12 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
13 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
14 duty. Your oath of office requires you
15 to act or face prison.

16 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
17 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
18 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
19 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
20 711, 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed
21 in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056
22 appear violated.

23 I call on the federal and
24 Commonwealth governments to perform their
25 constitutional obligations to investigate

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2 and prosecute all involved in the theft
3 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
4 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
5 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
6 25 years is egregious, extraordinary,
7 oath-violating, and requires immediate
8 remedy.

9 A just government must obey the
10 rule of law. This color of law
11 government must have its Charter to
12 govern revoked until a constitutionally
13 compliant government is installed.

14 I remind Council, it takes a
15 lot of cooperation to create and allow
16 this weekly monumental corruption.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr. Decker,
19 will you please read our next three
20 speakers, please.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
22 190779, Antoinette Richardson, Cortez
23 Johnson, Adelaida Morales. Please
24 approach the podium.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

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2 MS. RICHARDSON: Hello. Hi. I
3 would like to thank this opportunity for
4 speaking on behalf of 190779. I also
5 want to thank Councilmembers Oh and Bass
6 for bringing this up to -- this
7 resolution up for DHS to be accountable
8 for what they actions.

9 Now, my daughter has been taken
10 from me six years ago, and they have
11 committed so many crimes against our
12 children that our children and parents
13 are dying daily. So this needs to be --
14 this needs to be brought to senses. So
15 the welfare system needs to be
16 accountable for what they have done to
17 our children.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. RICHARDSON: If you are for
20 our children, if you say you're for our
21 children, then this resolution needs to
22 be passed. They are our future and they
23 need our help.

24 My child, I never seen my child
25 for six years. I don't even know if

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2 she's alive or dead because of DHS.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. RICHARDSON: But I'll

5 reassure you this: We have so many

6 people fighting on our behalf, so if you

7 are against this resolution, I want to

8 ask you this: Will your children be

9 taken by DHS? Will you cry over your

10 grandchildren because they were taken?

11 This is why I'm saying bring legislation

12 to pass -- do not oppose this. Okay?

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MR. JOHNSON: Hi. I'm talking

17 about Resolution 190779. My name is

18 Cortez Johnson and I'm a tenth grader at

19 SLA. I have no school today because my

20 school has asbestos. I'm worried and

21 stressed more about not being able to see

22 my sister. Next week is her birthday and

23 I probably won't get to see her. You

24 see, the social worker last week changed

25 my visit to Friday at 3:30. I get out of

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2 school at 3:05, which is at Broad and
3 Spring Garden. I have to travel to 50th
4 and Parkside.

5 We usually go Wednesdays at
6 3:30, which is good because I get out of
7 school at 1:00 p.m. The social worker
8 will not give us a consistent schedule.
9 I have done nothing wrong. Why can't my
10 sister live with me?

11 I can count how many times I
12 have seen my sister since DHS took her.
13 Seven times in three years, only for one
14 hour. I live with my aunt and we have
15 space. I should not have to go to some
16 place twice a month to see her.

17 There is no special committee
18 to address child separation. Can you
19 help the children and vote yes for
20 Resolution 190779? I have no vote; just
21 a voice.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. MORALES: Should I say the

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2 number first? 191779 [sic]. So the
3 reason that I'm here is for the bill that
4 I am here is to speak about the family
5 separation inside Protective Service.
6 Keeping families can hurt, and it's very
7 important to me. And also hurt the
8 community too. So let me get to the
9 bottom of this.

10 So hi. By the way, my name is
11 Adelaida Morales. I have two kids
12 attending ASPIRA John B. Stetson Charter
13 School and one that is now attending
14 Olney Charter School. The school not
15 only had helped my kids' education, but
16 it has created leaders in our community.

17 Students are different in all
18 aspects. Some needs more attention than
19 others. What's offered at Olney is more
20 than any other school had offered to my
21 children and the community, beginning
22 with the staff. These people love their
23 children. They are more than just
24 teachers. They're mentors, they're
25 friends, family.

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2 We have a community center,
3 clothing. We offer washer, dryers,
4 (unintelligible), household items, care,
5 access to computer, (unintelligible)
6 uniform.

7 All you hear is people talking
8 about PSSA tests and what about our
9 children's failing. Yes, they did test,
10 and some of the children come from Elkin
11 and Crown, reading and writing in
12 kindergarten, first grade level, and we
13 hold them accountable for it.

14 ASPIRA John B. Stetson Charter
15 School has not only helped my children,
16 but also helped me. I was always shy and
17 will only imagine talking in front of
18 anyone like I'm doing now. John B.
19 Stetson Charter School staff has
20 empowered me by providing me with many
21 other and parents training, parenting
22 classes, cooking, training, family,
23 comfort and so many.

24 So I'm going to skip to the
25 last. I always say if you don't walk the

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2 shoes, you don't have the right to talk.
3 At ASPIRA, I'm involved. I know it's
4 working. Why try to fix something that
5 is already fixed?

6 John B. Stetson High offered
7 the community center in a school in North
8 Philadelphia. We're the only one that
9 has a full bank.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

12 Mr. Decker, would you please
13 read the names of our next three
14 speakers, please. Our next three
15 speakers.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Miltreda Kress,
17 followed by April McBride, followed by
18 Nasir Cabress. Please approach the
19 podium.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. KRESS: Good morning,
22 Council. Thanks for giving me the
23 opportunity to speak. My name is
24 Miltreda Kress. I'm speaking on behalf
25 of Resolution No. 190779.

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2 I've sat here -- I've stood
3 here several times telling you my story.
4 I'm not here for that today. Today I'm
5 going to read a post comment that came
6 from a social worker that works for one
7 of the CUAs.

8 As a supervisor and teaming at
9 one of the CUAs, I can tell you that we
10 have sometimes, not always, seen very
11 sloppy work. Social workers are not
12 always following policy and procedure.
13 In addition to that, I have seen what I
14 feel to be civil rights violations on
15 part of child advocates and the courts.
16 They want to address this as a
17 case-by-case basis, but the issues are
18 systematic.

19 Overall, DHS workers work very
20 hard -- DHS workers work very hard to
21 appropriately serve the families of
22 Philadelphia. However, we do ourselves
23 no favor in not being open to
24 constructive criticism.

25 I ask you today to please,

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2 please pass this resolution. We are not
3 asking that you shut DHS down. We
4 understand that their job is very
5 important, that children do need
6 protection, but what we are asking is
7 that you review DHS to ensure that they
8 are following state and federal laws,
9 because I can assure you they are
10 currently not following state laws.

11 Our children mean the world to
12 us. What would you do, what would you do
13 if you were in our shoes? Would you
14 fight for your children or would you roll
15 over and just let them push you around
16 and push gag order on you and shut you
17 up?

18 Our children mean the world to
19 us, and we will do everything to get our
20 children back.

21 (Applause.)

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. McBRIDE: Good morning. I
24 would like to speak to you on Resolution
25 No. 190779 in regards of establishing a

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2 Special Committee on Child Separation in
3 Philadelphia to investigate child
4 separation in Philadelphia's child
5 welfare system.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Can you
7 state your name for the record, please.

8 MS. McBRIDE: My name is April
9 McBride.

10 Child separation and family
11 alienation of any sort will always have a
12 negative outcome, reason being is that
13 each and every child individual have been
14 given to their families by God and which
15 a bond has been made for that child even
16 before it leaves the mother's womb. That
17 mother and family is the only personal
18 people that the child is familiar with
19 from birth, and that's their security
20 blanket.

21 When the child is ripped away
22 from what he/she considers their security
23 blanket, it become traumatizing, mental
24 confusion, and anxiety sets in. This
25 alone is abusive, and it becomes a part

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2 of an unforgettable history for them.

3 With implementing Resolution
4 190779, there will be a major decrease on
5 illegal child separation, foster care
6 abuse rates and murders, because finally
7 the individuals that are responsible will
8 have to answer and be held accountable
9 for their gross actions from the top to
10 the bottom.

11 As I sat in the DHS Oversight
12 Board meeting this past August, I was
13 very disturbed about the amount of
14 funding that's distributed throughout DHS
15 child welfare system that goes towards
16 keeping children in foster care instead
17 of appropriating those funds to help the
18 families stay together as a unit.

19 DHS fiscal budget for 2019-2020
20 is proposing a budget of 386.2 million in
21 state funding and 150.1 million in
22 federal funding. In order to continue to
23 request these funds and keep the funds
24 coming, DHS -- actually there is a quota
25 for them to meet. That quota can only be

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2 met by removing children from their
3 families, and this has been executed by
4 very evil, undermining, unfair practices
5 of the so-called Child Protective
6 Services.

7 (Applause.)

8 MS. McBRIDE: DHS caseworkers
9 are the worst, purposely breaking this
10 law and the ones guilty and need to be
11 accountable and be shown that our
12 children are not for sale to the highest
13 bidder or biggest bonus checks or
14 retaliation for parents standing up
15 against DHS.

16 My daughter, my daughter, I
17 gave her a poster board and a marker. I
18 asked her -- I told her, I said, draw a
19 picture. She didn't draw a picture. She
20 wrote me this letter. Dear mom, I missed
21 you while I was in foster care and didn't
22 like those mean foster parents. They are
23 mean and said some mean things about you.
24 I felt bad, so I said something in my
25 head, and that wasn't nice at all. I

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2 love you.

3 This came from my daughter, the
4 one they took improperly.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. CABRESS: Good afternoon.

9 My name is Nasir Cabress and I want to
10 speak on the resolution of 190779, the
11 separation of the children from their
12 families.

13 When I heard of DHS, I thought
14 they were people who helped children in
15 abusive households. Little did I know,
16 no, they weren't. And some of the social
17 workers are so poisonous, they'll do
18 anything to get a check in their hands.

19 A lady by the name of Santa
20 Pray (ph) made our lives a living hell
21 and broke my family up with her nefarious
22 lies. She made my mom look like an
23 abusive parent when I knew the truth
24 about my mother.

25 My momma always do her best as

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2 a single parent, making sure everything
3 is great for our children, for making
4 sure we eat, to have clothes, and having
5 a warm, nice home to live in. However,
6 when all of this began, I told the lady
7 that, but she recited my word and said
8 that my mother beat me.

9 That shows that she just wanted
10 to have something on her reports, but it
11 was all lies. She even went as far as
12 telling people that my mom refused to
13 open the door when she had come to talk
14 to us, which is a lie as well because she
15 only came in there once. I thought the
16 conversation was going to be about my
17 mother, but, nope. It was questions
18 like, how do you like the school, what do
19 you want to do in life. This all
20 happened around the holiday season that
21 was 2018, which made the whole thing so
22 depressing.

23 My mom spent thousands of
24 dollars for a lawyer for this oppression.
25 We had many plans too, but they were

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2 ruined. Not being able to spend
3 Thanksgiving or Christmas with my sister
4 broke my heart, and just seeing the
5 presents sit there in the corner was
6 dispiriting.

7 The only time I would see my
8 sister was at the center. I couldn't
9 stand walking in there. It hurt me so
10 bad.

11 My sister literally had to open
12 her Christmas presents and get them at
13 the center and not under a tree. It tore
14 my spirit apart. Then to watch my mom
15 have to have a fake smile to stay strong
16 for us through all of this broke me even
17 more. She tried to stay strong for her
18 children, but eventually that came to an
19 end because it started getting
20 depressing.

21 So at the beginning, my
22 sister -- so whatever is done in the dark
23 come out in the light. My sister started
24 to run away at the beginning from her
25 so-called foster parents several times,

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2 trying to find -- saying that she misses
3 us. So they move her farther away,
4 almost like 45 minutes away so she
5 wouldn't be familiar with her
6 surroundings.

7 The acts of DHS is unfair,
8 unfounded, inappropriate. Now this is
9 part of our family's history and we'll
10 never forget. Vote yes, but before I
11 walk away, my question to you, Mayor and
12 the City Councilmembers, how would you
13 feel if you felt my pain I had to go
14 through and what if a child or a loved
15 one had to go through this?

16 Thank you for your time.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

19 Mr. Decker, would you please
20 read the names of our next three
21 speakers, please.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Yolanda Bryant,
23 followed by Bridget Powell, followed by
24 Vanessa Leary. Please approach the
25 podium.

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
4 proceed. Please state your name.

5 MS. BRYANT: Good afternoon.

6 My name is Yolanda Bryant. I'm here on
7 Resolution 190779.

8 I want to thank David Oh and
9 Cindy Bass for believing in the families
10 and doing this.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. BRYANT: I also want to
13 know why Helen Gym and Cherelle Parker
14 isn't here right now while we doing this
15 resolution.

16 First, I want to say this
17 resolution is not about nothing else but
18 the children, who are our future. A
19 broken system that is set up for failure
20 that lives in urban communities and the
21 inner city. This resolution is for the
22 poor families that's suffering from
23 poverty issues, then minorities that's
24 living in the communities of all race.

25 This is not just a one-color

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2 resolution or epidemic. It's purposely
3 targeted for those individuals in society
4 that are weak, poor, undereducated,
5 that's working minimum wage, the young
6 and the old. This is what we call the
7 wealthy and greedy evildoers
8 school-to-prison pipeline system.

9 DHS started this program in the
10 '90s. It was made up to protect our
11 children and, as we all know now, is an
12 organization called Cash for Kids.

13 This resolution is not about a
14 political preference such as democrats or
15 republicans. The purpose of this
16 resolution is to protect our children and
17 to intervene between families and
18 unnecessary removals.

19 How can they say they support
20 the children when they sit back and allow
21 corruption to happen to our children?
22 How can you make a difference to a child
23 if the advocates is still sponsoring
24 foster homes instead of the parents and
25 help them in and make better themselves

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2 from poverty issues? How can you change
3 a broken system that continues to repeat
4 the same cycle and build prisons and
5 reform schools instead of building more
6 low-income housing to help the poor and
7 build better schools?

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, ma'am. Your two minutes are up.
10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
14 state your name and proceed.

15 MS. POWELL: Bridget Powell.

16 Good morning. I'm speaking
17 about Resolution 170408. As a school
18 nurse of 23 years and a high school nurse
19 for 17 years, I've seen my share of
20 tobacco use among youth. This is
21 important, but child separation is even
22 bigger.

23 First, I'd like to thank
24 everyone who took time out of their
25 schedule yesterday to talk to me about

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2 this important issue and/or their
3 legislative aide. I come to your
4 hearings and I listen attentively.

5 In May, Councilwoman Gym said
6 that there was a task force, so there was
7 no reason to do a new one. I called her
8 office. I said, hey, when is the next
9 meeting so I can come to. I was told it
10 was in August. I told many parents. And
11 in August, I asked them to come to the
12 library. And at this time, I would like
13 for everyone who came in August to raise
14 their hand.

15 (Some audience members raising
16 their hand.)

17 MS. POWELL: I couldn't make
18 that meeting, but I got a phone call as I
19 was at a board meeting for the Girl
20 Scouts, and they were like, there is no
21 meeting. So I contacted Helen Gym's
22 office again. She said, oh, it was
23 cancelled because there wasn't enough
24 people who RSVP'd.

25 I said, I've worked for the

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2 School District for 23 years. I know how
3 to RSVP. There was no RSVP. So in
4 September, I said, well, let me know when
5 the next meeting is.

6 In September, the meeting
7 happened, September 19th. It wasn't
8 about family separation. It was about
9 residential placement, like Glen Mills.
10 Yes, residential treatment is important,
11 but that's not what we're asking for.

12 I come to these hearings. I
13 hear about resolutions. I don't see any
14 other resolution getting voted out but
15 this one about child separation. We just
16 want a fair process and we want what's
17 best for the kids.

18 My nephew stood up here. It
19 was pretty hard for him. He hasn't seen
20 his sister. And I would just like to
21 give out some pictures so that they can
22 see that these children are in rooms, and
23 I also would like to give out the task
24 force and by saying nobody is listening.
25 We need you to.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you, ma'am.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Our next
6 speaker?

7 CHIEF CLERK: Vanessa Leary.
8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
10 state your name and proceed.

11 MS. LEARY: Hi. My name is
12 Vanessa Leary, and I thank you for your
13 time today. I'm here on Resolution
14 190779, and the reason why, it needs to
15 be passed.

16 People think that it's just --
17 DHS doesn't -- it's completely perfect.
18 There's no such thing as a completely
19 perfect DHS agency. I've heard of -- I
20 actually heard myself of caseworkers
21 saying, oh, I'm going to make sure that
22 you're not going to get your kids back.
23 I have heard of parents completing every
24 single goal and not getting their kids
25 back. Myself, I have completed every

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2 goal, and you want to know where my kids
3 are? Still in DHS care. You want to
4 know why I'm not getting them back?
5 Because I am a survivor of domestic
6 violence. I am a survivor of rape. And
7 guess what? They're using that against
8 me, because they want to know if that
9 trauma is part of my reasoning for being
10 a maternal parent. I'm not proper
11 parenting.

12 So I want to ask you this:

13 There is two people not here today in
14 Council. There's Gym and Parker. Well,
15 now she's here. But they were blocking
16 this. So why are they blocking this if
17 there was nothing wrong with DHS?

18 If your kids were in DHS care,
19 what would you do to get your kids back?
20 What would your limits be? My limits, I
21 would never give up, and I'm up for
22 termination.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, ma'am. Your two minutes are up.
25 Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

4 Mr. Decker, our next speakers.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Lillian

6 English-Hentz, followed by Joe Cox,

7 followed by Miss Bennett. Please

8 approach the podium.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please

11 state your name and proceed.

12 MS. ENGLISH-HENTZ: My name is

13 Lillian English-Hentz and I'm here to

14 talk about the bill I want to talk about,

15 190779. I'm here because this bill

16 relates to separation of families,

17 separation of children and families.

18 We of Olney Charter High School

19 have a family and I want to talk to you

20 about it, and I want to thank

21 Councilwoman Bass and Councilman Domb,

22 because they have listened to us. Okay?

23 The School District, who allows

24 children to come and swipe in and leave

25 and walk the halls and the streets, is

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2 the kind of school that Olney was years
3 ago before ASPIRA took over our school.
4 Now the School District for no reason is
5 trying to shut this school down.

6 This school is the place where
7 our children find food, shelter, love and
8 care. And so, therefore, I am here to
9 tell you that I may not be no taller than
10 5'3", but Imma tell you right now, we are
11 going to fight, we are going to fight
12 this, and we're going to fight it and
13 we're going to fight it some more,
14 because you are -- the national
15 government is putting children in cages
16 and separating families. The Governor is
17 against charter schools. I am for
18 education, period.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, ma'am. Your time is up.

21 MS. ENGLISH-HENTZ: And Olney
22 is going to fight you.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you.

25 (Applause.)

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
4 state your name.

5 MR. COX: Good afternoon.

6 Thank you. My name is Joe Cox. I'm
7 running for City Council at-large as a
8 progressive independent.

9 190779, I am strongly in favor
10 of this bill and in the creation of a
11 Special Committee on Child Separation.
12 People have been told there already is a
13 committee. Let's get it done.

14 As an activist, I have been
15 fighting against child separation for
16 years. Shut down Berks Detention Center
17 while we're at it. It is clear there is
18 a problem here in Philadelphia, as we
19 have the highest rate of child separation
20 in the country. Have you been listening
21 to all of the families that have spoken
22 already?

23 We all want to come away with a
24 real solution and this bill could be the
25 first step.

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2 Also, let's see some action
3 about these school conditions that should
4 be illegal.

5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

8 Mr. Decker, our next speakers.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Taleah Taylor.

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

11 Ms. Taylor here?

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
14 state your name and proceed.

15 MS. TAYLOR: Sister Taleah
16 Taylor. I'm here also to speak about
17 Bill 17909 [sic]. Hold on one second,
18 please. My apologies.

19 I thought I had to leave.

20 So I'm here to speak about Bill
21 190779 in favor of Councilman David Oh's
22 resolution. My name is Sister Taleah
23 Taylor. I'm President of the City of
24 Dreams Coalition and Vice Chair of
25 Philadelphia Anti-Violence Coalition.

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2 In all my years of coming to

3 City Council, I have never seen a

4 resolution to form a special committee

5 get defeated or prolonged so long, and

6 this has been going on for too long.

7 When it comes to our children, it should

8 have been done and over with, period.

9 But yet Councilman David Oh's resolution

10 to form a special committee to protect

11 our children is being fought tooth and

12 nail primarily by Parker and Gym, and it

13 doesn't make sense. There should be no

14 argument about protecting our children.

15 We should be able to amend some things.

16 I know we don't agree on everything, but

17 the bottom line is protecting our

18 children and what we all go through.

19 We will be paying close

20 attention of which way everyone votes

21 today, and we already have a committee

22 and I am sitting on the board of the

23 committee to hit the streets in all ten

24 districts to let everyone know and let

25 your constituents know how much you care

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2 about those children. And I'll be out
3 there with my T's as I do y'all petitions
4 every year, every voting time. I'll be
5 out there myself making sure all the ward
6 leaders, all the committee people,
7 everyone knows which way you vote today.

8 What I can't swallow is how you
9 protect -- you won't protect our
10 children, but you allow other convicted
11 pedophiles like Emmanuel Bussie from
12 Different Kind of Democrat to come here,
13 roam the streets of City Hall, lobbying
14 for y'all politicians that I already made
15 aware of his abusive history, his deviant
16 history he's already convicted for. Yet
17 and still he still has been given a
18 chance to rape another child volunteering
19 for somebody's election. I'm trying to
20 wonder why.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, ma'am. Thank you, ma'am. Your two
23 minutes are up.

24 Please, Mr. Decker.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next three

1 10/10/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 speakers, James Thompson, followed by Dan
3 LaSalle, followed by Ron Whyte. Please
4 approach the podium.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MR. THOMPSON: Good afternoon.

7 My name is James Thompson. I'm here for
8 changing the zoning designations and
9 identifying that this area is a Promise
10 Zone, but what about the zoning Olney
11 Charter High School falls in? Again, my
12 name is James Thompson and I'm the proud
13 principal of Olney Charter High School.
14 Today I'm here to speak to you on behalf
15 of the positive impact that Olney Charter
16 High School has had on the students and
17 the surrounding community.

18 First and foremost, I would
19 like to formally invite each of you to
20 visit our school, meet our staff and
21 students, witness our classroom
22 instructions, and see firsthand what
23 makes our school worthy of continuing to
24 serve the community.

25 I have been an educator for

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2 over 20 years and a school leader for
3 more than ten. Over the years I've
4 transitioned to being a staunch advocate
5 for the rights of our students and the
6 community we serve.

7 The School District of
8 Philadelphia launched its Renaissance
9 School initiative, a program designed to
10 dramatically improve the student
11 achievement in the District's lowest
12 performing schools. Olney is one of the
13 schools that shifted from being run by
14 the District to being run by ASPIRA while
15 remaining a neighborhood school. Since
16 the transition in 2011, a major shift in
17 both climate and academic gains has been
18 undisputable. It is evident that we
19 continue to maintain a rate of success
20 far higher than our neighboring schools
21 serving a familiar population.

22 There have been drastic
23 reductions in the rates of student
24 suspension, serious incident, making the
25 school a much safer environment for our

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2 students to learn and grow. We serve
3 2,000 students and nearly 90 percent of
4 them come every day and go to class.

5 We have shifted the culture
6 from students being fearful to a culture
7 of students empowered to achieve great
8 things. We currently house the largest
9 English language learner and special
10 education population in the City, and we
11 support every learner, inclusive of
12 students who temporarily got off track
13 and need additional support.

14 They are trying to ram through
15 a vote tonight to close Olney Charter
16 High School, but before you allow the
17 District to shut us down, come and see
18 what we have to offer our students.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you.

22 (Applause.)

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
25 state your name and proceed.

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2 MR. LaSALLE: Good morning.

3 I'm here to speak about Resolution
4 180669.

5 For any person here who is
6 concerned about --

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: State
8 your name, please.

9 MR. LaSALLE: Dan LaSalle. I'm
10 the Administrator at Olney Charter High
11 School.

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
13 you.

14 MR. LaSALLE: For anyone
15 concerned about the unethical practices
16 of banks, financial literacy needs to be
17 an incredibly important thing on your
18 mind, and there is no school that does it
19 better than Olney Charter High School.
20 In fact, MarketWatch has named us as the
21 most innovative financial literacy
22 program in the country. Just yesterday I
23 spoke with a representative from Andrew
24 Yang, democratic candidate for President,
25 one of their representatives on the phone

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2 to discuss a national platform that
3 copies our program.

4 If the School District succeeds
5 in closing us down, we will not be able
6 to do what the person who began today's
7 remarks said, allow Philadelphia to be a
8 beacon for other cities in the entire
9 country.

10 Councilmembers, I believe that
11 your job is hard, as many of ours, and
12 that when the School District engages in
13 big decisions, it is very possible that
14 they can make small errors by overlooking
15 a school. To allow our school to not be
16 renewed would crush out many innovative
17 programs, not only our financial literacy
18 program. We have the second best debate
19 team in the entire City in 2018. Do you
20 know what it's like to be a neighborhood
21 school, go to citywide competitions and
22 be like, oh, Central High, the top magnet
23 school, don't worry about them, they're
24 easy, and then we beat them.

25 Just this morning at 9:00 a.m.,

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2 the School District of Philadelphia has
3 decided to proceed with a committee
4 meeting, giving us less than 12 hours of
5 notice. I really plead with you
6 Councilmembers to have a conversation
7 with whoever you can. If you allow our
8 school to not be renewed, there are many
9 innovative programs, very successful
10 classrooms that will not be allowed to
11 operate.

12 Just on March 29th, 2019, the
13 School District put out a report about
14 how they have discrimination against
15 closing minority-led charter schools more
16 often, and here we are with that very
17 same situation in front of us.

18 I ask you to allow us to be
19 continued to renewed.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you.

22 (Applause.)

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
25 state your name and proceed, please.

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2 MR. WHYTE: Hi. My name is Ron
3 Whyte. I'm speaking in favor of Bill No.
4 190606. I want to thank Councilpeople
5 Sanchez, Clarke, Parker, and Blackwell
6 and Johnson for introducing this bill. I
7 do support the adequate governing of
8 public property, but sidebar, I have to
9 say I did age out of foster care and
10 people in my family have been in foster
11 care. We need to get to the bottom of
12 who is profiting off of separating our
13 families. So I do support that as well,
14 just as a quick sidebar.

15 I also want to say that when we
16 talk about vacant lots and vacant
17 property, many people in our city live
18 near vacant lots and vacant property that
19 are filled with trash and litter, a lot
20 of it plastic bags. A study came out
21 from University of Pennsylvania saying
22 that if you live near a vacant lot or
23 vacant property with trash and litter,
24 you are more likely to suffer from
25 depression, feelings of inadequacy. We

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2 have to do something about this.

3 A few weeks ago thousands and
4 thousands of youth were marching in the
5 streets for the climate strike for
6 environmental justice. Our Mayor is over
7 in Europe right now meeting with other
8 mayors. He is talking about climate
9 justice and climate issues. If we can't
10 do the small things like banning plastic
11 bags, how will we do the big things like
12 tackling climate change? So we really
13 have to get serious about fixing our
14 environment.

15 I want to thank everyone for
16 listening to me right now, and I hope
17 that when the bill comes up regarding
18 plastic bags and cleaning up our streets,
19 that all Councilpeople take into
20 consideration what our neighbors are
21 saying about having to go out every day
22 and cleaning up this trash. It is really
23 out of control. We have to do something.
24 We need to fix this problem ASAP.

25 Thank you very much.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

6 Mr. Decker, our next speakers.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next three
8 speakers, Salima Pace, Ogbonna Hagins,
9 and Desiree Whitfield. Please approach
10 the podium.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MS. PACE: Good afternoon,
13 everyone. My name is Salima Pace. I'm
14 the Secretary/Treasurer of District
15 1199C, and we just want to say thank you
16 to Councilwoman Cherelle Parker and the
17 others who have presented the -- I
18 apologize. Who have presented to call
19 the hearing to explore the service
20 providers that are not honoring the
21 contracts.

22 We are simply asking that our
23 members get paid. We are simply asking
24 that the work that is put in, that they
25 have the quality of work that they

2 deserve, and we are asking that you
3 support this as this resolution makes its
4 way through. And, again, we want to
5 thank Councilwoman Parker for bringing
6 this resolution up today.

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
10 you.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
13 state your name.

14 MS. WHITFIELD: Good afternoon.
15 My name is Desiree A. Whitfield. This is
16 part of my written statement to the
17 Judicial Conduct Board about Judge Lyris
18 Younge, and I'm going to reiterate it for
19 time. I wrote them because I met her
20 long before she was a judge. She worked
21 for the City Solicitor's Office.

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Excuse
23 me. I'm sorry. What bill are you
24 talking about?

25 MS. WHITFIELD: I am standing

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2 here for Bill 190779.

3 As I continue, I wrote them
4 because I met Lyris Younge long before
5 she was Judge Lyris Younge, as a City
6 Solicitor where she was writing illegal,
7 falsified petitions to remove children
8 from their homes. When I questioned
9 Lyris Younge, who is now standing on the
10 charges from the Judicial Conduct Board,
11 her exact words to me was, us removing
12 children, illegally removing children
13 from their homes, is the way we make
14 money. It's my livelihood.

15 I want to put something else on
16 record. I reported this to Reverend Alyn
17 Waller from Zion Baptist Church, in which
18 we both go. He sided with her because
19 she is -- she was a trustee of Zion
20 Baptist Church. I heard earlier that
21 there's going to be a way about Reverend
22 Alyn Waller. I protest that right now,
23 because if you didn't find it necessary
24 to investigate about the illegal actions
25 of one of your trustees, why would a way

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2 be named in your honor?

3 I am standing here asking City
4 Council to stop accepting the calls from
5 your Mayor this morning and do the right
6 thing and vote for Bill 190779. If I had
7 drove a one-way street drunk, then my
8 child would have been taken from me, but
9 you had people that sit right here in
10 City Council that has been drunk driving
11 on a one-way street --

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
13 you, ma'am. Your two minutes are up.
14 Thank you, ma'am. Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. HAGINS: Good afternoon,
18 everyone. My name is Ogbonna Hagins, and
19 I'm going to be speaking about 190703, an
20 ordinance amending Section 2-304 of The
21 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Compensation
22 for Members of the Board." You can read
23 that. I'm in favor of that, absolutely,
24 right? But check this out. The
25 Sanitation Department, the trash men, are

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2 up for a contract. They went six years
3 without a contract. We don't need them
4 not having a contract and treating our
5 city like a garbage can like they do. So
6 I'm in favor of this bill to deal with
7 our environment. As you know, I'm Philly
8 green man. I deal with the environment
9 in the City, and you guys are really
10 dropping the ball, because everything
11 that you're hearing is a result of a
12 negative environment, a dirty
13 environment, an environment where I have
14 to come here stepping over trash. It's
15 not acceptable.

16 The second thing I want to add
17 on is, I want to congratulate
18 Councilwoman Sanchez for standing up
19 against indicted people on Council. I
20 agree with you, and I'm ashamed that the
21 other Councilmembers haven't stood up way
22 before this. We have -- and ironically
23 he's up there now dealing with overseeing
24 this meeting.

25 That money that's going out to

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2 people who are indicted, people who are
3 being investigated need to be going
4 towards our children and towards these
5 schools. As a retired teacher, I taught
6 30 years ago, starting 30 years ago. I
7 stopped 22 years ago to raise my
8 children. There were paint chips falling
9 off the classroom walls when I was
10 teaching there. There were paint chips
11 falling off the classroom walls when I
12 was a student at Dobbins. What are you
13 guys going to do? You need to be
14 ashamed.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you, sir. Your time is up. Thank you.
17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:
19 Mr. Decker, our next group.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,
21 followed by Vilma Lipper. Please
22 approach the podium.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
25 state your name and proceed.

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2 MS. LANDES: Hi. My name is

3 Lynn Landes and I'm the co-founder of

4 safestreetsphilly.org speaking on 160720.

5 Just as there are rules for

6 businesses such as where to locate a

7 grocery store, there are also rules for

8 residents. There is a homeless

9 encampment of 17 tents a couple blocks

10 away from City Hall on Vine Street

11 between 16th and 17th Streets. The other

12 night there were 50 people sleeping

13 outside of the Convention Center. Every

14 day we are calling about homeless

15 sleeping in our neighborhood just five

16 blocks away from here. We were told that

17 the homeless are living on the streets of

18 Philadelphia because federal courts have

19 said they have a right to, but that's not

20 what the court said. In Martin versus

21 the City of Boise, the Ninth Circuit

22 ruled that if there is no shelter

23 provided by the City, only then could the

24 homeless sleep on the streets.

25 Yesterday I received an e-mail

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2 from the City's Managing Director, who
3 told me that the homeless have a
4 constitutional right to sleep on the
5 street and they couldn't be forced into
6 shelters.

7 We have been trying to get the
8 homeless off of the streets and into the
9 shelters, thinking that available space
10 was the deciding factor, but now we're
11 being told it isn't. If the homeless
12 want to sleep outside, that's their
13 right. That is not what the court said,
14 but that's the position of the City of
15 Philadelphia. It's an invitation to
16 chaos. The police are demoralized,
17 businesses are frustrated, and residents
18 are angry.

19 The City is bragging that they
20 are handling the problem by not arresting
21 anyone. This carrot and carrot approach
22 to law enforcement is not working.
23 District Attorney Krasner is not doing
24 his job, and other City officials have a
25 confused notion of constitutional rights

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2 that ignores the rights of all residents
3 to live in a city that protects their
4 health, safety, and welfare.

5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
8 you.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Please
11 state your name and proceed.

12 MS. LIPPER: Vilma Lipper.

13 Good afternoon, Buenas tardes,
14 shalom.

15 This is my granddaughter, Chloe
16 Lipper. Her Hebrew name is Isdia after
17 her grandfather, who was an Israeli hero.
18 I'm pleading here to the Jewish community
19 to help me fight her case.

20 Chloe is being sexually abused
21 by her father, with the knowledge of DHS,
22 Family Court, as well as the hospital.

23 Would you please give me
24 attention? Sir, please, some respect. I
25 don't see the respect. You're talking in

2 the background and then you're going to
3 cut off my...

4 Again, Jewish girl. She is a
5 Jewish girl, being sexually molested by
6 her father, with the knowledge of DHS,
7 Family Court, and the hospital where she
8 was taken care of. The social worker was
9 a relative of the father, and she
10 threatened (unintelligible). After two
11 weeks of her being -- after two weeks of
12 her knowledge of her, seemed like in
13 child pornography, my baby was
14 transferred to rehab, where she was
15 sharing a room with a teenager and the
16 father stayed a couple days, with full
17 knowledge of his preference.

18 Now here is my granddaughter
19 with us, happy.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, ma'am. Your two minutes are up,
22 ma'am. Thank you. Thank you very much.

23 MS. LIPPER: No. I have --

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
25 you, ma'am. Thank you.

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2 (Microphone turned off.)

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Ma'am,
4 really. We've asked everybody to please
5 adhere to the two-minute rule. Please,
6 ma'am. I appreciate it. Thank you,
7 ma'am. Thank you.

8 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
9 other speakers on the public comment
10 list, Mr. Chairman.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you, Mr. Decker.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We

2 All those in favor say aye.

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it. That resolution is
9 adopted.

10 Mr. Decker, do you have any
11 additional resolutions?

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
13 authorizing the City Council Committee on
14 Aging to hold public hearings examining
15 solutions to prevent the ongoing
16 displacement of senior citizens with
17 fixed incomes due to rising rental costs,
18 introduced by Councilman Jones.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I'd like to speak on this
23 resolution.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded -- I'm

2 sorry.

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: I would like
4 to speak on the resolution.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
6 I'm sorry, Councilman.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. Many districts, if not
9 all districts in the City of
10 Philadelphia, are experiencing a flood of
11 multi-unit properties that are coming of
12 age that have had some type of federal or
13 state-assisted financing. During those
14 times of financing, there were rent
15 restrictions put on a lot of those
16 residents. So in a case in one of the
17 buildings in my district, seniors had a
18 \$400 a month mortgage.

19 As these agreements come of age
20 and some of the owners opt not to renew
21 any new relationship with HUD, we're
22 finding some building owners that are
23 opportunists, saying that we'd like to
24 renovate, go a different direction, and
25 move some of these existing residents out

2 so that we can upgrade, quote, and be
3 able to charge market rate.

4 I am not a socialist. I want
5 people to feel free to move their
6 properties in certain directions, but not
7 at the expense of people who have lived
8 in facilities sometimes for decades,
9 sometimes never being late, never missing
10 a month's rent.

11 So the issue for some of those
12 residents is facing that kind of
13 capitalism.

14 The second part of it is
15 average median income. What that means
16 is that some people's rents are
17 calculated on that average median income
18 for the City. So when people with means
19 move in in their relative geographic
20 area, that average median income is
21 counted against some of the pensions that
22 were frozen, because they're not going
23 up, and so they find themselves in
24 buildings that we helped the owners get,
25 helped them to find funding for. Those

2 shovels are in our respective offices.

3 Now retired civil servants, some police
4 officers are finding themselves having to
5 move out of those same facilities and
6 move with their children because they
7 can't afford the rent increases that are
8 being proposed.

9 We hope that this hearing will
10 shed light on that, and not to stifle
11 capitalism but to offer alternatives to
12 gentrification. And so I look forward to
13 this, and I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All those in favor say aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it. That resolution is
25 adopted.

15 for its adoption.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
18 been moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor say aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it. That resolution is

19 Where's Will at? He's

25 name first. Will Carter has been here

7 hard-working young man. He's grown to be

10 Is he coming?

11 Yeah, Carter. Come on.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
14 everybody knows Will and everybody loves
15 Will. And Will has been a person that
16 has been an awesome, awesome addition to
17 the City Council of Philadelphia, and we
18 just want to say, man, you know, we
19 really appreciate what you've done.
20 You've grown to be one of my little
21 brothers, you know. I hope I've given
22 you good counsel over the years. I guess
23 I did because you're married with two
24 children now. So you did the right
25 thing.

2 But, Will, we just want to say
3 on behalf of Council, thank you so much
4 for your contribution.

5 Will will now -- has actually
6 started. He's going to serve in the
7 Chamber of Commerce, Vice President of
8 Local Government, Advocacy and

10 around and he'll be moving the needle.
11 He has some very optimistic perspective
12 on what he's going to be able to do from
13 that side of the equation.

14 We wish you well. We hope
15 you're very successful. So, Will,
16 congratulations, man, and thank you for
17 your service.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Jeffery Young. So another young
21 individual. Jeffery, actually, I
22 remember Jeffery came in the office when
23 I was again around in 44 and he was
24 the -- what were you? My Youth
25 Commission?
