2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started, if the
7 members will take their seats. Thank
8 you.

9 To give our invocation this
10 morning, the Chair recognizes the
11 Reverend Naomi Washington-Leapheart,
12 Director for Faith-Based and Interfaith
13 Affairs for the City of Philadelphia.
14 She is here today as the guest of
15 Councilwoman Gym.

16 I would ask all members,
17 guests, and visitors to please rise.

18 (Councilmembers, guests, and
19 visitors rise.)

20 REVEREND WASHINGTON-LEAPHEART:
21 I'd like to thank Councilwoman Gym for
22 the invitation this morning. Let us
23 pause now for a moment of grounding and
24 connection, and I invite you to share in
25 this moment in any way that aligns with

2 your own tradition or consciousness.

3 Oh God of many names, we lift
4 up the City of Philadelphia to you this
5 morning. You know every intersection by
6 name. You dwell in every neighborhood,
7 and you are present even in those places
8 where we feel like we have to squint to
9 see you. Help us to feel holy energy
10 around us everywhere.

11 As our children go to and from
12 school all over the City, some excited to
13 be there, some itching to escape, we pray
14 for them that they are inspired, that
15 they can feel a sense of belonging. Give
16 our children the endurance they need for
17 the journey.

18 And as our teenagers take
19 selfies and filter them to look perfect,
20 we pray for them. We pray that they know
21 that they are already perfect to the one
22 who created them. Help us to remind them
23 that even as they are becoming what they
24 will be, they are already precious to us.
25 Give them the endurance they need for the

2 journey.

3 Our families need a holy touch,
4 God. Every household, every bloodline,
5 every parent, every elder, every aunt,
6 every uncle, every cousin, those who are
7 connected not by lineage but by love,
8 help us to find joy in each other. Give
9 us the endurance we need for the journey.

10 I pray this morning for all of
11 our citizens who might be feeling tired
12 or angry or full of despair. I pray for
13 those who feel the pain and discomfort of
14 illness or heartache. I pray for those
15 who feel their lives are moving too fast
16 or too slow. I pray for those who need
17 deposits in their hearts and in their
18 bank accounts and in their communities.

19 And I pray especially this
20 morning for this body assembled before
21 me, our city's leadership, as they give
22 their time and energy and brilliance to
23 this task of governance. Our City
24 Councilmembers need a holy touch. Our
25 Mayor needs a holy touch. So grant them

the wisdom to make sense of conflicting
issues, competing interests. Make them
hungry and thirsty for justice. Give
them the courage they need to be bold in
their commitment to meeting the needs of
the people of Philadelphia. Remind them
that people are your priority, not
profits, not property, not popularity.

Where they need to find joy
again in their work, give them joy.
Where they need to find hope again in
their work, give them hope. Where they
need to find rest so they can continue in
this work, give them rest. Where they
need to find connection in the midst of
isolation, deepen their relationships.

In the places where they need
to build bridges, give them tools. In
the places where they need to tear down
walls, give them tools. Where they need
solutions, give them imagination. Where
they need to be nudged, nudge them.
Where they need to be agitated, agitate
them. Give them the endurance they need

2 to complete the tasks ahead of them, not
3 just this morning but every morning.

4 Source of life, you know what
5 touch each of us needs, so grant us with
6 that touch. We need your divine
7 interruption to be whole and to make all

9 This is our prayer. In the
10 name of all that is good and just and
11 holy, may it be so.

12 Amen.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you and, Reverend, thank you again
21 for those inspiring words. We really
22 appreciate it.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, and our Journal is

7 The Chair now recognizes
8 Councilman Oh for request for leave of
9 absence for members of the minority.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
11 much, Council President. On behalf of
12 the minority, there are no requests for
13 leave of absence.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much, Councilman.

16 So I'd like to thank everyone
17 for coming down today, taking time out of
18 your busy day to witness your government
19 in action. We genuinely appreciate you
20 being here. We look forward to your next
21 visit here. So, again, enjoy your stay
22 here today and thank you.

23 At this time, the Chair
24 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
25 will present a resolution recognizing

3 I hope I said that right.

4 Would Dorothy and John Wilkie
5 and those accompanying them join the
6 Councilwoman at the podium.

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have
11 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman Gym,
12 Councilman Domb, Councilwoman Blondell
13 Reynolds Brown.

14 (Music playing.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Good
16 morning, and thank you.

17 Resolution hereby proclaiming
18 October 18th, 2019 as Kulu Mele Day in
19 Philadelphia in honor of the nation's
20 first African Dance and Drum Ensemble on
21 its 50th Anniversary.

22 Whereas, on September 4th,
23 2019, Kulu Mele African Dance and Drum
24 Ensemble celebrated its 50th Anniversary.
25 The celebration of this historic event

2 continues with the world premiere of
3 their new spellbinding production, Ogun
4 and the People, on Saturday, November
5 30th at Annenberg Center for the
6 Performing Arts and the launch reception
7 of its new commemorative book, Kulu
8 Mele's Ogun and the People: Celebrating
9 50 Years, on Friday, October 18th at the
10 African American Museum of Philadelphia;
11 and

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, Kulu
13 Mele was founded in 1969 by legendary
14 drummer Baba Robert "Ibikunle" Crowder,
15 the dynamic ensemble is the oldest
16 continually performing African dance and
17 drum ensemble in the nation; and

18 Whereas, under Crowder's expert
19 tutelage, the ensemble continued the
20 traditions of iconic
21 dancer/choreographers Pearl Primus and
22 Katherine Dunham by performing authentic
23 dances of Africa and its Diaspora, and
24 became a major part of the foundation of
25 Philadelphia's Black Arts Movement of the

2 1960s and 1970s. Kulu Mele helped give
3 birth to a cultural renaissance in
4 Philadelphia's African American
5 communities and attracted those who were
6 eager to study and experience African
7 culture through the performing arts.

8 Scores of dancers and drummers were
9 trained by Crowder through Kulu Mele at
10 its longtime headquarters in West
11 Philadelphia's Lee Cultural Center; and

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
13 Kulu Mele has been a crucial training
14 ground for African dance, drum and
15 culture throughout the Philadelphia
16 region. Over 77 dancers and musicians
17 have participated in Kulu Mele through
18 the years. The Philadelphia-based
19 ensemble is dedicated to serving the
20 community by presenting and preserving
21 the culture, dance and music of Africa
22 and its Diaspora; and

23 Whereas, Kulu Mele draws on the
24 musical and movement of Brazil, Haiti,
25 Cuba, Nigeria, Ghana and the Senegambia

2 region, as well as African American art
3 forms like Hip-Hop, Bop, Cha-Cha and the
4 Slop. The ensemble is the first
5 performance on the main stage upon the
6 sacred procession's return from the river
7 of Philadelphia's annual Odunde Festival
8 since the beginning in 1975; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I'm
10 incredibly honored to celebrate this 50th
11 anniversary. Mama Dottie and family, you
12 are family as much as anything else, and
13 thank you for helping build an
14 extraordinary organization and
15 institution and uplifting the importance
16 of art as not only an extraordinary
17 cultural form but as a transfer of
18 knowledge and language, culture, history,
19 and pride to people.

20 So whereas, in the 1990s
21 Dorothy "Mama Dottie" Wilkie became
22 artistic director and started
23 incorporating West African dance into the
24 choreography. She and her husband John
25 "Wilk" Wilkie, the group's music

2 director, both joined Kulu Mele in 1971
3 as dancers and drummers. In 2007, she
4 was awarded the prestigious Pew
5 Fellowship in the Arts for dance
6 choreography. John was among the elder
7 African drummers honored at "Skin on
8 Skins: Where it All Began" at
9 Philadelphia's historic Church of the
10 Advocate in 2011. The husband and wife
11 team was celebrated for their outstanding
12 contributions to the cultural arts by the
13 Philadelphia Folklore Project in 2015;
14 and

15 Whereas, the Wilkies continue
16 to follow in Baba Crowder's footsteps in
17 advancing African culture by training
18 dancers and drummers through Kulu Mele so
19 the culture will be preserved for future
20 generations.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: As someone
22 who has seen this company a number of
23 times, it is indeed a cultural
24 experience. Seize the opportunity and
25 see them at the Annenberg.

2 Now, therefore, be it resolved,
3 that the Council of the City of
4 Philadelphia, hereby proclaims October
5 18th, 2019 as Kulu Mele Day in
6 Philadelphia. They honor the nation's
7 first, first African American Dance and
8 Drum Ensemble on the occasion of its 50th
9 Anniversary.

10 Further resolved, that an
11 engrossed copy of this resolution will be
12 presented to the leadership of Kulu Mele
13 African Dance and Drum Ensemble as a
14 sincere expression of the Council of the
15 City of Philadelphia. We offer our
16 gratitude, our admiration, our
17 recognition, and your willingness to
18 train young people.

19 They have young people in this
20 ensemble who are as young as four and
21 five years old.

22 Congratulations.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 the Chair recognizes Dorothy and John

3 MS. WILKIE: I just want to
4 thank the Council and Ms. Jannie
5 Blackwell for this resolution. I know
6 that Baba Robert Crowder is smiling down
7 on us for what we're doing now and where
8 we are today. I know that Kulu Mele is
9 the heaviest force here in Philadelphia
10 for Black Arts Movement.

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Council will be at ease.

15 (Council at ease.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
20 present a resolution to the Curtis
21 Institute of Music. Would Patricia
22 Johnson and those accompanying her please
23 join the Councilman at the podium.

24 (Councilmembers and guests
25 approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 joining Councilman Domb, we have
4 Councilman Oh, Councilman Henon,
5 Councilwoman Blackwell, and Councilwoman
6 Parker and Councilman Taubenberger and
7 Councilwoman Gym and Councilman Johnson
8 and Councilman Squilla and Councilman
9 O'Neill.

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Recognizing
11 the 95th Anniversary of the Curtis
12 Institute of Music, its part in training
13 the world's finest musicians -- and
14 you're going to hear about that -- and
15 for its contributions to the rich
16 cultural fabric of the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 I'll just take a moment to
19 mention that one of my favorite parts of
20 the Curtis School of Music is from the
21 movie Trading Places. I love that movie,
22 and that was filmed in the Curtis School
23 of Music.

24 Councilman.

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

2 And whereas, for the last 95
3 years, the Curtis Institute of Music has
4 been an institution in musical education
5 based in Philadelphia. Curtis was
6 founded in 1924 by Mary Louise Curtis
7 Bok.

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Mrs. Bok
9 was the only child of Philadelphia-based
10 Louisa Knapp and Cyrus H.K. Curtis. Her
11 father's company, Curtis Publishing
12 Company, produced two of the most popular
13 magazines in America: The Saturday
14 Evening Post and the Ladies' Home
15 Journal;

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
17 Curtis's rare tuition-free policy was
18 established in 1928 and to this day
19 provides merit-based, full-tuition
20 scholarships for all Curtis students.
21 Students continue to be accepted for
22 study at Curtis solely on the basis of
23 their artistic talent and promise;

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
25 Mrs. Bok assembled a faculty that would

2 attract the most promising students, and
3 developed a philosophy ensuring that
4 these exceptionally gifted young
5 musicians would receive training to
6 prepare them for careers as performing
7 artists on the highest professional
8 level. Curtis continues this history of
9 excellence today;

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Curtis
11 alumni have gone on to make history as
12 soloists, composers, conductors,
13 orchestral players, and chamber
14 musicians. Curtis graduates have
15 received Pulitzer Prizes, Guggenheim
16 Fellowships, and Avery Fisher Awards and
17 are in the front rank of soloists and
18 conductors;

19 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
20 Whereas, Curtis graduates are members of
21 the world's leading orchestras, including
22 principals in every major American
23 orchestra. They have sung with La Scala,
24 Covent Garden, the Vienna Staatsoper, and
25 the San Francisco Opera, among others,

2 and more than 60 have sung at the
3 Metropolitan Opera;

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
5 Curtis provides a unique musical
6 education for its students. The student
7 body remains around 175 musicians and the
8 school maintains an elite 4 percent
9 acceptance rate. Each student receives
10 instruction from a faculty of
11 performer-practitioners and
12 world-renowned visiting artists; and

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
14 with esteemed graduates leading and
15 performing in the most prestigious
16 musical bodies across the globe, the
17 power of Curtis's legacy far surpasses
18 its size. The Curtis campus reflects the
19 rich heritage of the institution and the
20 many musicians who have trained here; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
22 Whereas, in addition to prominent solo
23 careers, many Curtis alumni have gone on
24 to positions in major orchestras, opera
25 companies, chamber ensembles, hold

2 teaching positions at renowned
3 educational institutions; work with
4 important community outreach
5 organizations; and more; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
7 whereas, in celebration of the 95th
8 Anniversary, the Curtis Institute is
9 coordinating Philadelphia Music Week 2019
10 from October 15th through October the
11 21st;

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: And whereas,
13 Philadelphia Music Week is a celebration
14 of our City's vibrant music community.
15 Coordinated by the Curtis Institute of
16 Music, the Greater Philadelphia Cultural
17 Alliance, and REC Philly, the week's
18 events include public performances and
19 educational opportunities presented by
20 Philadelphia area music organizations,
21 venues, and artists;

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Now,
23 therefore, be it resolved, this Council
24 of the City of Philadelphia recognizes
25 the 95th Anniversary of the Curtis

2 Institute of Music and Philadelphia Music
3 Week 2019.

4 Congratulations to the
5 leadership.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
8 the Chair recognizes Ms. Johnson for
9 remarks.

10 MR. MOSSEY: Good morning. My
11 name is Christopher Mossey. I'm a Vice
12 President for Advancement at the Curtis
13 Institute. I'm here with my colleague
14 Patricia Johnson.

15 On behalf of Roberto Diaz, the
16 President and CEO of Curtis, and the
17 entire Curtis community, I thank the
18 Council and everyone here for this
19 proclamation.

20 In addition to everything that
21 was already written in the proclamation,
22 I would like to add that Curtis strives
23 to give as much back to the Philadelphia
24 community as it gets. We present over
25 200 performances in Philadelphia, most of

2 them free to the public. We have ongoing
3 relationships with public schools, health
4 and social organizations, and our alumni
5 have gone on to found very important and
6 impactful new organizations in
7 Philadelphia.

8 We are always striving to get
9 better in our education and our
10 operations and in our relationship with
11 the community, and we invite this Council
12 and we invite everybody here in this room
13 to visit Curtis, come to our concerts and
14 give us feedback on how we can become
15 better all the time.

16 Thank you very much.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. Council will be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Again, congratulations, and thank you
23 very much.

24 At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will

3 Helms. Would Ms. Helms and those
4 accompanying her please join the
5 Councilman at the podium.

6 (Councilmembers and guests
7 approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 joining Councilman Jones, we have
10 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwomen Gym,
11 Parker, Councilman Domb, Councilwoman
12 Blondell Reynolds Brown, and Councilwoman
13 Quinones-Sanchez.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: So if you
15 look at the face of Ms. Helms today, she
16 looks a little bit surprised, because she
17 had no idea that we were going to honor
18 her this morning. She came to my office,
19 and the Recreation Department staff had
20 her in my office under false pretenses.

21 Matter of fact, come on up
22 here. The Chairwoman of Recreation
23 Committee needs to come up with us.

24 So fear is a primal instinct.
25 It goes back to the caveman days of fight

2 or flight. You were either going to rise
3 up against whatever fear you have or
4 you're going to run from that fear, and
5 that is a human emotion, but at times you
6 really get the measure of a person at the
7 time -- and if anybody tells you they've
8 never been afraid, that's not true.

9 That's just not true. It's what you do
10 after your fear takes hold of you that
11 defines that person. Further definition
12 comes when you conquer your own fear and
13 then supersede the need to help others
14 over that fear.

15 The Recreation Department,
16 along with Ms. Helms, demonstrated that
17 at Baker Playground on a Saturday after a
18 basketball tournament when one thing led
19 to another, words were exchanged, and gun
20 shots ensued. Eight people -- come here,
21 Chairwoman.

22 Eight people were shot. Thank
23 God none of them died. None of them
24 died. But what happened with the
25 Recreation Department and their staff,

2 their training, their heart kicked in and
3 they went to help others, mothers,
4 fathers, and children, to make sure
5 everyone was safe, because no one knows
6 what's going on right at that moment.
7 When fear kicks in, you can't really
8 determine where the danger is coming
9 from. You can only research your soul to
10 find out which direction you're going to
11 go in.

12 So we wanted, after the dust
13 was settled, after the cameras were gone,
14 after the bullet wounds healed, to
15 acknowledge the Rec Department, and the
16 reason why I also asked my Chairwoman of
17 Recreation to come up, she talked about a
18 long time ago getting cameras for all of
19 our rec centers, and I'm thankful of that
20 and we are trying to follow that through.
21 But we are grateful for the Recreation
22 Department's commitment to our children,
23 commitment to our spaces where our
24 children play. And so, therefore, we're
25 going to honor them and particular staff

3 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:

4 Recognizing and honoring the Department
5 of Parks and Rec employee, I'm sure
6 volunteer, maintenance person, caretaker,
7 program person, driver, all of the
8 wonderful things, Jeneen Helms for her
9 heroic actions during the mass shooting
10 at Baker Playground on July 13th, 2019.

11 Whereas, Jeneen Helms is a
12 native of Philadelphia, being born in
13 North Philadelphia, raised in West
14 Philadelphia. She is one of six children
15 growing up in a single-parent home,
16 something she attributes to her desire to
17 work hard despite many obstacles and
18 circumstances that may come her way; and

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
20 Ms. Helms graduated from William Penn
21 High School. She went on to attend
22 Shippensburg University and Community
23 College of Philadelphia, where she
24 majored in accounting. Her ultimate
25 career goal is to become an accountant;

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
4 currently, Helms is a dedicated seasonal
5 employee of the City of Philadelphia's
6 Department of Parks and Recreation.
7 Helms has been employed by the Department
8 since June of 2015 and works as a pool
9 maintenance attendant; and

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, on
11 July 13th, 2019, Jeneen Helms was ending
12 her shift at Baker Playground in the
13 Overbrook section of Philadelphia, when a
14 shootout occurred during a community
15 cookout and basketball tournament. Seven
16 people were injured in the shooting; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
18 with great courage and bravery, Helms
19 rushed to the aid of children and others
20 at the playground at the time of the
21 shooting, making sure that everyone
22 remained safe until help arrived. Helms
23 never hesitated about reporting to work
24 the very next day, just hours after the

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
11 Council President. Today I'm introducing
12 a resolution co-sponsored by
13 Councilmembers Henon, Jones,
14 Taubenberger, O'Neill, Oh, Green,
15 Johnson, and Squilla calling on the City
16 Controller's Office to investigate and
17 audit the \$50 million OnePhilly HR
18 system. OnePhilly is an internal system
19 that is supposed to administer payroll,
20 human resources, and pensions for the
21 more than 25,000 City employees. It has
22 encountered some serious errors and
23 issues since its implementation.

24 In addition to being almost
25 four years behind its initial launch date

2 of December 2015, recent reports have
3 indicated that thousands of employees
4 were overpaid and the City remains
5 unaware of how much money was lost.
6 There are also many employees that were
7 underpaid.

8 The list of issues surrounding
9 our new payroll and human resources
10 system are becoming extensive. Most
11 recently reported by the Philadelphia
12 Inquirer, it indicated that thousands of
13 employees were underpaid and overpaid and
14 the City remains unaware of how much
15 money was lost. Litigation from City
16 employee unions increases in overtime due
17 to miscalculations for thousands of
18 employees who earned time and a half and
19 inaccurate sick time and vacation time,
20 leaving employees tasked with tracking
21 their own time.

22 This resolution ensures that a
23 full investigation and audit of OnePhilly
24 will be a priority of the City
25 Controller's Office due to the severity

2 of the issues being reported. It's
3 completely unacceptable for the City to
4 issue incorrect payroll checks weekly,
5 which erodes the public trust and the
6 trust of its employees.

7 Philadelphia government for too
8 long has been spending millions of
9 dollars on ineffective IT systems and we
10 need to fix it now. Our taxpayers
11 deserve answers, and we are long overdue
12 for an effective solution.

13 Thank you.

10 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Real Estate
11 Taxes," by providing for a tax credit
12 against real estate taxes for
13 grandparents serving as the primary
14 caretaker for their grandchildren; and

15 An ordinance amending Chapter
16 19-1500 of The Philadelphia Code,
17 entitled "Wage and Net Profits Tax," by
18 adding a new definition to Section
19 19-1501 and adding a new Section 19-1507,
20 entitled "Working Grandparent Tax
21 Credit"; and

22 An ordinance amending Chapter
23 19-1300 of The Philadelphia Code,
24 entitled "Real Estate Taxes," by
25 providing for a tax credit against real

2 estate taxes for parents serving as the
3 primary caretaker for their children; and

4 An ordinance amending Chapter
5 19-1500 of The Philadelphia Code,

9 entitled "Working Parent Tax Credit"; all
10 under certain terms and conditions.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

13 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
14 you, Council President. We live in
15 economically challenging times. By and
16 large, wages have not kept pace with
17 inflation, leaving many Philadelphians,
18 especially those with children at home,
19 struggling to make ends meet. Today I'm
20 introducing ordinances that are intended
21 to give Philadelphians with children a
22 meaningful tax break on their real estate
23 taxes.

24 The first ordinance I am
25 introducing titled "Grandparents

1 10/17/19 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 Childcare Tax Credit" is specifically
3 intended to give grandparents who are
4 serving as the primary caretakers for
5 their biological or legal grandchildren a
6 much-needed annual tax break. I hear
7 from our city's senior citizens all the
8 time just how difficult it is for them to
9 remain in the City and still make ends
10 meet.

11 Unfortunately, the number of
12 grandparents who serve as the primary
13 caretakers for their grandchildren
14 continues to grow. Here in Philadelphia
15 and across the nation there are numerous
16 societal issues that are behind this
17 growing trend - joblessness, poverty,
18 addiction, mental illness, and much more.
19 The parents often have no choice but to
20 place their children in the care of the
21 children's grandparents, many of whom are
22 on fixed income.

23 The Grandparents Child Tax
24 Credit I am proposing would provide an
25 annual tax credit of 80 percent of the

2 grandparents' annual real estate taxes,
3 with a maximum credit of \$3,800 per year.
4 Any unused real estate tax credit in any
5 given year could be carried over to the
6 next year. Only one grandparent could
7 claim the grandchild or grandchildren as
8 dependents in any given tax year.
9 Grandparents would apply for the
10 Grandparent Childcare Tax Credit by
11 completing a form by the City Department
12 of Revenue.

13 The second ordinance I'm
14 introducing today is called the Working
15 Grandparent Tax Credit, and it would
16 provide an annual real estate tax credit
17 for any grandparent who can reasonably
18 demonstrate that they are the primary
19 caretaker for their biological or legal
20 grandchildren's well-being and is also
21 still in the workforce.

22 This ordinance is in response
23 to the growing number of grandparents who
24 must continue to work beyond and must
25 consider to be in retirement age in order

2 to make ends meet and who also serve as
3 the primary caretaker for their children.

4 Grandparents who qualify for
5 the Grandparents Child Tax Credit and the
6 Working Grandparent Tax Credit may apply
7 for both, but can only receive the
8 maximum real estate tax credit of \$3,800.

9 The third ordinance I'm
10 introducing today is intended to give
11 working parents who have to place their
12 child or children in daycare a break on
13 their real estate taxes. The Parent
14 Childcare Real Estate Tax Credit, like
15 the Grandparent Tax Credit Ordinance
16 previously discussed, would provide an
17 annual tax credit equal to 80 percent of
18 the parents' annual real estate taxes
19 with a major -- with a maximum credit of
20 \$3,800.

21 The fourth and final ordinance
22 I'm introducing today is the Parent
23 Childcare Wage Tax Credit designed to
24 help families who are working parents who
25 have children in daycare and childcare.

2 This ordinance would provide an annual
3 tax credit equal to 80 percent of the
4 parents' annual city wage tax, with a
5 maximum credit of \$3,800 per tax year.

6 Many Philadelphians who have no
7 choice but to have both the father and
8 mother working in order to make ends
9 meet, those who are young and often have
10 no choice but to place their children in
11 daycare would and can experience this
12 proposition. They too deserve a break on
13 their taxes.

14 These four ordinances address
15 financial inequalities that adversely
16 impact our seniors and working families.
17 I respectfully request the support of my
18 colleagues on these important issues and
19 would provide much-needed tax relief for
20 these people.

21 Thank you very much. And in
22 closing, children are priceless.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 Our next order of business is
9 reports from committees, and the Chair
10 recognizes Councilman Greenlee for a
11 report from the Committee on Rules.

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
13 you, Mr. President. The Committee on
14 Rules reports ten bills with a favorable
15 recommendation.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 Mr. Decker, please read that
19 report.

20 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
21 and members of the Council of the City of
22 Philadelphia, the Committee on Rules, to
23 which was referred Bill No. 190506,
24 entitled "An ordinance amending Section
25 14-303 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled

Thank you, Mr. Decker.

The Chair again recognizes
Councilman Greenlee.

COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
you, Mr. President. I move that the
rules of Council be suspended so as to
permit the first reading this day of the

4 (Duly seconded.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. It has been moved and
7 properly seconded that the rules of
8 Council be suspended so as to permit
9 first reading this day of the ten bills
10 just read into the record by the Chief
11 Clerk.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it. These bills will be placed
19 on our First Reading Calendar today.

20 Our next order of business is
21 the consideration of the Calendar. I
22 note that the bills just reported from
23 committee with a suspension of the rules
24 have been deemed to have had a first
25 reading. These bills will be placed on

4 As there are no additional
5 bills on our First Reading Calendar, the
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
7 purpose of calling up bills and
8 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar
9 today.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. The following resolutions
12 and bills are being called up for Second
13 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
14 today. They are Bill Nos. 170408,
15 190723, 190779, 190790, 180729, 190606,
16 190707, 190712, 190562, 190658, 190509,
17 and 190706. All other bills and
18 resolutions are being held.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 Prior to us proceeding with our
22 consideration of bills and resolutions,
23 we'll have our public comment session.
24 It will go as follows:

25 If you have an interest in

6 When your name is called, you

10 green on that device, it will be your
11 time to speak. When the light turns
12 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
13 conclude your remarks. When the light
14 turns red, we'd ask that you please
15 adhere to our guidelines and conclude
16 your remarks. You will be given three
17 minutes to testify for a bill or
18 resolution that is on the Final Passage
19 Calendar today.

20 Mr. Decker, please call the
21 first name.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Heizel Guevara,
23 commenting on 170408.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. GUEVARA: Hi. I'm here to

2 talk with the case of 170408.

3 Hi. My name is Heizel Guevara.

4 I'm a current student in Olney Charter

5 High School. I have been in Olney since

6 9th grade. Now I'm in 11th grade.

7 Let me tell you all what Olney

8 is. Olney is a school that gives many

9 opportunities and help, not just its

10 students but its community as well. Our

11 school has bad and good things, just like

12 any school does, but it's nothing that

13 cannot be solved.

14 I've been in Olney for three

15 years now and I personally think that

16 Olney is a good school that had helped

17 many kids, not just academically but also

18 it had helped them grow as individuals.

19 In Olney, what stand out the

20 most is the staff, the teachers, the

21 security guards, everyone. Every teacher

22 in Olney lives and work on their

23 students. They are always there to help

24 in any situation. If they can help, they

25 will do it no matter what, and that's

2 very important to have in each school.

3 They all come in with their
4 work and care about their students'
5 education, which is very important as
6 well. They inspire students to achieve
7 their dreams and to never give up on
8 them. They are very supportive, which
9 bring me is very important to have
10 someone that supports you and that
11 believes in you.

12 Some students don't have that
13 at home and it's great that in our school
14 they can find that. Olney show us that
15 we are not alone and that everyone in the
16 school is there for us.

17 Olney has great programs that
18 can help students in many ways. For
19 example, we have college access. College
20 access helps students that want to attend
21 college. It helps them find the best one
22 for them. Also, college access helps
23 students get a scholarship. With this
24 program, students have left Olney with an
25 almost full scholarship. With this

2 program, students find the best college
3 for them also.

4 We have peer mediation. Peer
5 mediation is where students help other
6 students solve problems between them.
7 Peer mediation had helped many students,
8 not just students but teachers as well.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr. Decker,
13 our next speaker, please.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
15 commenting on 190723, 190712, 190707, and
16 190606.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.
19 This is an official decree of the people
20 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
21 such, requires immediate action and
22 remedy.

23 Every week, Council, Mayor,
24 Governor, and others transfer private
25 property to the government, probably

2 unlawfully.

3 I respect public servants that
4 obey their oath, Constitution, and law.
5 Constituents do not require their public
6 servants to kneel and blow smoke up the
7 people's butt. To abolish the monumental
8 corruption that exists, public servants
9 must first get up off their knees and
10 take steps to enforce and prosecute
11 existing constitutions and laws instead
12 of unlawfully restricting public
13 testimony at public meetings.

14 The constitutions require
15 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
16 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
17 duty. Your oath of office requires you
18 to act or face prison.

19 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
20 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
21 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
22 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
23 711, 712, 713, 716, 902, and other laws
24 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
25 14-4056 appear violated.

2 I call on the federal and
3 Commonwealth governments to perform their
4 constitutional obligations to investigate
5 and prosecute all involved in the theft
6 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
7 1038 West Wyoming Avenue.

8 The denial of God-given 42 USC
9 1982 properties rights for 25 years is
10 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
11 and requires immediate remedy.

12 A just government must obey the
13 rule of law. This color of law
14 government must have its Charter to
15 govern revoked until a constitutionally
16 compliant government is installed.

17 Public servants cannot refuse
18 their sworn duty to act any more than a
19 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
20 sovereign people require oath,
21 Constitution, and laws be enforced, and
22 jail is required for all who violate
23 oath, Constitution, or law.

24 I remind Council, it takes a
25 lot of cooperation to create and allow

2 this monumental corruption.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

5 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
6 please.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,
8 commenting on 190640.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. LANDES: Hi. My name is
11 Lynn Landes of safeststreetsphilly.org.
12 I'm here to support Bill 190640. Just as
13 we have four-way stop signs to enhance
14 pedestrian safety, we also have Title 10
15 to deter prohibited conduct.

16 My husband and I were walking
17 to the Reading Terminal Market last week
18 when we came across a woman in her 60's
19 sitting like a two-year-old on a busy
20 sidewalk at the corner of 12th and Market
21 Streets. A homeless outreach team was
22 talking to her, but she refused their
23 offer of assistance, so they walked away.
24 We approached the team and asked if they
25 were simply going to leave her there in

2 the middle of the sidewalk, and they said
3 yes, that it was her constitutional right
4 to be there.

5 Actually, it isn't. No court
6 anywhere has ruled that people have the
7 unfettered right to sit on the sidewalk,
8 sleep on the street, or panhandle. All
9 of these activities are conditional and
10 can be regulated and are regulated
11 locally under Philadelphia Code Title 10.

12 That said, for the most part,
13 these laws are not being enforced. It
14 should be noted that recent Federal Court
15 decisions supporting panhandling as free
16 speech have not been challenged in the
17 Supreme Court, which could take a much
18 different view of the matter.

19 Most of the time the homeless
20 and panhandlers will leave an area
21 willingly, but more and more often they
22 will not. They are blatantly ignoring
23 the police and refusing offers of
24 assistance from homeless outreach teams.
25 This cannot continue. The homeless

2 outreach teams and police cannot continue
3 to walk away, leaving these people on the
4 street in violation of federal, state,
5 and local laws governing health, safety,
6 and sanitation.

7 The foundation of any civilized
8 society contains some semblance of law
9 and order. That foundation cracks when
10 citizens and enforcement officials alike
11 ignore law and regulations designed to
12 protect us all.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

15 Mr. Decker, our next speaker,
16 please.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Dan La Salle,
18 commenting on 180669.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. La SALLE: Good morning,
21 City Council. I'm here to speak about
22 Resolution 180409 on the unethical
23 banking practices of Wells Fargo. I was
24 here last week making a similar argument.
25 If you were very concerned about

2 unethical banking practice, financial
3 literacy needs to be your number one
4 priority.

5 I'm going to link again to the
6 closing, suggested closing, of Olney
7 Charter High School. We have one of the
8 most -- excuse me; the most innovative
9 financial literacy program in the
10 country, as listed by MarketWatch. Even
11 one of the presidential candidates for
12 president who was on the debate stage
13 yesterday -- or excuse; two days ago
14 called us to get advice on how to copy
15 that.

16 If our school is not renewed,
17 you are closing a light on so many
18 innovative programs. Take a look at our
19 debate team. We are number two in the
20 City. Do you know what it's like when
21 the School Board of Philadelphia
22 recommends us for closing and we are able
23 to go in there and say, oh, we're going
24 against Central High, don't worry about
25 them, they're easy, the coach writes all

2 their arguments, you'll be fine. And
3 it's true, and we take second place.

4 A week ago I was here because a
5 committee meeting was getting ready for
6 the board meeting that is occurring
7 tonight where they are likely going to
8 recommend us not for renewal. Whatever
9 you can, City Council, in the next few
10 hours, can you please not let this
11 happen. We are not asking for indefinite
12 life. We are not asking this forever.
13 Give us five years, or whatever the
14 normal grace period is, in order for the
15 next renewal hearing in order to make the
16 argument.

17 We are a minority-led charter
18 school. Even the School District of
19 Philadelphia released a report on March
20 29th, 2019 where they disproportionately
21 close schools that are led by
22 minority-led charter school executives.

23 This is so important, because
24 the students, the community, and our
25 teachers love the school. In five years,

2 we -- please put the pressure on us to be
3 able to negotiate a fair agreement with
4 our union, be able to make the students
5 college and career ready, and to make
6 sure that we continue to reach academic
7 levels that are similar, if not better,
8 to the rest of the schools in the City.

9 If you can, whatever you can
10 do, before the meeting tonight, please
11 look into this issue. If you allow our
12 school to continue and speak with the
13 School Board, you will remove this monkey
14 off of our shoulders. For the last
15 several years, they have been
16 recommending closing and it's taken so
17 much time and energy away from students
18 and teachers and parents and
19 administrators.

20 If you give us the normal
21 period in order for the next renewal, we
22 will be able to truly prove to the City
23 that we deserve to have our doors open.
24 I do not think that this is an
25 unreasonable expectation given the amount

2 of innovation that we have had in the
3 City.

4 Thank you for your time.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you for your testimony.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Dermot

9 Delude-Dix, commenting on 190712.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MR. DELUDE-DIX: Good morning.

12 My name is Dermot Delude-Dix. I'm with
13 Unite Here Local 274. I'm here to
14 testify in opposition to Bill No. 190712.

15 Bill No. 190712 states that the
16 City of Philadelphia is, quote, hereby
17 authorized to convey to the Philadelphia
18 Industrial Development Corporation some
19 or all of the parcels of land located in
20 and about the area bounded by Lombard
21 Street, South Broad Street, South Street,
22 and 15th Street. The site is currently a
23 City health center at the corner of Broad
24 and Lombard. According to an article in
25 the Philadelphia Inquirer, this would

2 give a developer, the Goldenberg Group,
3 quote, near control of a full City block
4 in one of Philadelphia's most active real
5 estate markets.

6 The non-profit Philadelphia
7 Industrial Development Corporation is
8 handling the property's sale on the
9 City's behalf. The deal was announced
10 less than a month ago and may be
11 authorized today. I reached out to all
12 three RCOs which cover this area, and I'm
13 not aware of any public meetings having
14 taken place since the Goldenberg Group
15 was announced as the winning bidder by
16 PIDC a few weeks ago.

17 Unite Here Local 274 is opposed
18 to the bill as written. The Philadelphia
19 Industrial Development Corporation should
20 not be an intermediary for the sale of
21 public land to a private developer. PIDC
22 is a non-profit corporation governed by
23 the trustees appointed by the City of
24 Philadelphia and the Chamber of Commerce.
25 The Chamber of Commerce has greater

2 control over the composition of the Board
3 of PIDC than the City, effectively giving
4 private interests an upper hand in
5 matters of public policy. It would be
6 best if the City, rather than a
7 corporation which is not accountable to
8 the public interest, retain control of
9 the parcels mentioned in Bill No. 190712
10 until the sale to the developer is ready
11 to occur rather than conveying the land
12 to PIDC for what is reportedly expected
13 to be a period of a year or more.

14 Although many claim that PIDC
15 is best prepared to handle such
16 transactions, the sale of the City-owned
17 Family Court building at 1801 Vine was
18 approved by Council in 2014 and the
19 promised development has yet to occur
20 despite PIDC's involvement in the
21 development process.

22 We urge Council to vote no on
23 Bill 190712.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Madeline

5 Shikomba, commenting on 190712.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 afternoon.

9 MS. SHIKOMBA: Can you hear me?

10 Hi. My name is Madeline

11 Shikomba, President of the North of

12 Washington Avenue Coalition. I'm here to

13 oppose Bill 190712. This bill is a

14 travesty. It is a backdoor of selling

15 valuable City property to a developer for

16 pittance.

17 I was aware of this, because I
18 thought this was simply a transaction
19 from one City department to another, only
20 to find out that the Philadelphia
21 Authority for Industrial Development is
22 nothing but a shell company and that
23 they're going to transfer the property to
24 PIDC, which is nothing but a non-profit,
25 who in turn has already gotten bids to

2 sell this land for \$15 million. This is
3 a drop in the bucket. \$15 million to a
4 developer who plans to put condos,
5 multi-million-dollar condos on this land,
6 and then who -- are we going to get any
7 money from it? No. \$15 million and lose
8 billions of dollars in taxes because you
9 choose to pass the tax abatement bill,
10 which is 180750 that you keep holding up
11 in committee. So we're going to lose
12 millions of dollars because we're not
13 going to collect any taxes on this
14 property.

15 Please do not let this go. I'm
16 asking Councilman Johnson, because I
17 don't know if he's aware of this or not,
18 but I don't think he is. I like to think
19 that he isn't aware of it, that he should
20 not let this bill be passed. I'm asking
21 all of you not to pass this bill. You're
22 sinking the City of Philadelphia without
23 any money.

24 Our schools, our
25 infrastructure, and City properties are

2 suffering because you are taking pittance
3 for nothing. This property is worth at
4 least \$150 million if you develop it
5 yourself. It's worth that amount of
6 money.

7 Please don't give it away.
8 Okay? I intend -- the sale of this
9 property, like I said, will lose the City
10 billions of dollars in future taxes. And
11 I mean billions. Please don't give it to
12 this developer.

13 I am really upset. I can't
14 tell you how much upset I am about this.
15 Please, I ask the City Councilmembers
16 don't vote for this bill. You're giving
17 away our property. \$15 million for
18 somebody who is going to build multi
19 million dollars on it. Please don't do
20 that. I ask you to vote against this.
21 \$15 million is not going to last the City
22 one day. You go through that money like
23 that.

24 Please, I beg you, do not sell
25 this land to the developer. It's the

2 Goldenberg Group that's buying this land.
3 They already own half the block already
4 in which the land is at, and we're giving
5 away -- I'm so upset. We cannot do this.
6 Please don't do this. We need a health
7 bank and we don't even have that. We
8 have one health center left in
9 Philadelphia -- in South Philadelphia
10 that's going to cater to 200,000 people.
11 Please don't do that.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you for your testimony.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Hasanah Bennett,
16 commenting on 190779.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 afternoon.

20 MS. BENNETT: Thanks for
21 letting me say something. I'm a mother
22 and I have lots of advocates. I'm trying
