13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

17 The ayes have it and the motion
18 carries.

19 The Chair will dispense
20 with the regular order of business
21 to recognize the guests and
22 visitors joining us in chambers
23 this morning.

24 On behalf of all members of
25 City Council, I welcome you to our

2 Council session. We appreciate
3 your taking the time to join us as
4 we attend to the legislative
5 affairs of our great city. We
6 certainly invite you to come again.

7 At this moment the Chair
8 recognizes Councilmember Kendra
9 Brooks for acknowledgement.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
11 you, Council President and
12 colleagues.

13 I want to recognize
14 Councilmember Valerie Bossman-
15 Quarshie from the City Council of
16 the City of London. She's here to
17 support in advance of this crucial
18 and historic election.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 Could you please stand?

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
23 We welcome you.

24 The Chair also recognizes
25 State Representative Elizabeth

3 today as well.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 At this time the Chair recognizes
7 Councilmember Rue Landau who will
8 present a resolution honoring and
9 recognizing Sunrise Movement
10 Philadelphia for their outstanding
11 work and contributions to the fight
12 to confront climate change and
13 ensure that the generations to come
14 have a sustainable future.

15 Would Erica Brown and those
16 accompanying her please join the
17 Councilmember at the podium. Also
18 joining Councilmember Rue Landau
19 are Jamie Gauthier, Councilwoman
20 Kendra Brooks, Councilwoman Quetcy
21 Lozada, Councilmember O'Rourke,
22 Councilmember Young, Councilmember
23 Phillips. And I would ask our
24 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas to
25 stand in for Councilmember

2 Phillips -- I'm sorry,

4 (Councilmembers and guests
5 approached podium.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: Good
7 morning, everybody. I'm here
8 today, we are honoring and
9 recognizing Sunrise Movement
10 Philadelphia for their outstanding
11 work and contributions to the fight
12 to confront climate change and
13 ensure that the generations to come
14 have a sustainable future.

15 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
16 Whereas, Sunrise Movement is a
17 movement of young people dedicated
18 to ensuring that everyone has
19 access to clean air and water, full
20 pantries of food, affordable
21 housing, free public
22 transportation, good and meaningful
23 jobs, vibrant community centers and
24 lives filled with joy; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

2 Whereas, this work is guided by
3 their founding principles,
4 including growing power through
5 organizing in communities, being
6 rooted in what they're fighting for
7 and continuing the journey to
8 become better organizers, leaders
9 and people.

10 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

11 Whereas, nationally, Sunrise
12 Movement has redefined climate
13 politics, ensured the passage of
14 historic climate legislation and
15 continue to transform communities.
16 Sunrise Movement strives to build a
17 coalition around climate change,
18 which is a vital step in the
19 climate action towards clean
20 energy; and

21 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

22 Whereas, Sunrise Movement
23 Philadelphia, the local chapter of
24 the national movement, is a group
25 of young Philadelphians dedicated

2 to stopping climate change and
3 winning a green new deal that
4 ensures every Philadelphian has
5 access to good jobs, stable
6 housing, clean air and water and
7 green community spaces; and

8 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

9 Whereas, the young people
10 organizing with Sunrise Movement
11 Philadelphia have proven their
12 dedication to equitable,
13 sustainable -- to an equitable and
14 sustainable future by supporting
15 legislative efforts to fund
16 libraries and rec centers, create
17 renewable energy, ensure access to
18 fresh food, build affordable
19 housing, stop gun violence and
20 more. This has led to the growth
21 in the clean energy sector in the
22 addition of quality jobs offering
23 family-sustaining wages; and

24 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

25 Whereas, due to the continued

2 advocacy and education from Sunrise
3 Movement, legislation across the
4 state addressing the climate crisis
5 has gained momentum. Pennsylvania
6 House Bill 103, commonly referred
7 to as Solar for Schools, championed
8 by State Representative Elizabeth
9 Fiedler in partnership with Sunrise
10 Movement Philadelphia will create a
11 grant program to help school
12 districts across Pennsylvania fund
13 and install solar panels on school
14 grounds and;

15 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:
16 Whereas, the future of youth-driven
17 community organizing for
18 neighborhood facilities, fresh
19 food, stable housing, clean air and
20 water, green community spaces and
21 renewable energy sources is bright;
22 now, therefore, be it

23 Resolved that the Council
24 of the City of Philadelphia honors
25 and recognizes Sunrise Movement

2 Philadelphia for their outstanding
3 work and contributions to the fight
4 to confront climate change and
5 ensure that the generations to come
6 have a sustainable future.

7 Be it further resolved,
8 that an Engrossed copy of this
9 resolution be presented to Sunrise
10 Movement Philadelphia as evidence
11 of their sincere sentiments of this
12 legislative body. Congratulations.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 The Chair recognizes State
16 Representative Elizabeth Fiedler
17 and Erica Brown for remarks.

18 STATE REPRESENTATIVE
19 FIEDLER: Good morning, everyone.
20 I am State Representative Elizabeth
21 Fiedler. I represent 65,000
22 constituents in South Philadelphia
23 east of Broad and south of Wharton.
24 Thank you, Councilmember Landau.
25 Thank you to the full Council for

2 having me and inviting me to speak
3 about one of my favorite topics,
4 solar for schools.

5 I'm honored to be here,
6 also to help recognize Sunrise
7 Movement and your amazing climate
8 advocacy. Congratulations again.

9 (Applause.)

10 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

11 FIEDLER: Back in April I was
12 invited to come before this
13 legislative body because
14 Councilmembers Gilmore Richardson
15 and Gauthier were kind enough to
16 introduce a legislation supporting
17 solar for schools. This
18 legislation will create a new state
19 grant program to help K through 12
20 public schools and community
21 colleges install solar panels on
22 the roof of their building or on
23 their grounds.

24 The program will help
25 school districts save tens of

2 thousands of dollars each year
3 eventually adding up to millions of
4 dollars in savings. It will also
5 create good-paying local
6 construction jobs and of course
7 benefit the environment by reducing
8 our reliance on fossil fuels and
9 allowing schools to generate their
10 own electricity.

11 Thank you, City Council,
12 for approving that resolution
13 unanimously back in April. And I
14 am here to say with good news that
15 this legislation passed the State
16 House and the State Senate back in
17 July and now is a \$25 million
18 appropriation.

19 (Applause.)

20 STATE REPRESENTATIVE
21 FIEDLER: The Governor signed the
22 bill into law and applications for
23 the new program start tomorrow,
24 November 1st.

25 (Applause.)

2 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

3 FIEDLER: This round of funding,
4 what we see is a pilot program,
5 should support around 60 Solar for
6 Schools projects statewide and my
7 hope as a Philadelphian certainly
8 is that we will see about half a
9 dozen schools right here with the
10 School District of Philadelphia
11 receiving state funding and putting
12 up solar arrays next year.

13 (Applause.)

14 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

15 FIEDLER: I mean, I'm excited. I
16 am also here of course to support
17 the resolution honoring Sunrise
18 Movement. Sunrise was one of the
19 very first supporters of Solar for
20 Schools. I have the early letter
21 they sent hanging on my wall in my
22 office. Sunrise even joined me on
23 one of the very first tours of a
24 school called Steelton-Highspire.
25 It's near Harrisburg. They took an

2 old landfill, put solar panels on
3 it and now are able to power their
4 school and their electric buses.

5 I was grateful to Sunrise
6 for their early support of Solar
7 for Schools and for all the work
8 that they are doing. Over and over
9 every school I go to, urban,
10 suburban, rural, it is the young
11 people in the crowd who speak up
12 without any hesitation, making
13 clear that climate change is real
14 and that for them, this isn't just
15 a theoretical concept. They know
16 it's their lives.

17 It's my understanding that
18 Sunrise Movement here in
19 Philadelphia would like to see a
20 similar program created for City
21 municipal buildings, solar for rec
22 centers, solar for libraries. I
23 think this is a fantastic idea and
24 anything the state can do to help
25 support the City's endeavor, please

2 count on us. Thank you again for
3 having me and thank you,
4 Councilmember Landau and the
5 Council, for having me.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 The Chair recognizes Erica Brown.

9 MS. BROWN: Thank you. I'm
10 not used to being up here. Thank
11 you, Councilmember Landau, for
12 fighting for rec centers, libraries
13 and renewable energy. I almost
14 wasn't born because my dad was shot
15 on the Market-Frankford Line, so
16 every time we got a news report of
17 a shooting on the TV, he would tell
18 me to stay inside.

19 But when he felt it was
20 safe, we would go to the park and
21 run around, play baseball, throw a
22 frisbee, and he enrolled me in
23 aftercare because he had to work
24 really late. And I was lucky that
25 that aftercare I had so many

2 programs. I learned how to act. I
3 learned how to do magic. I learned
4 how to do arts and crafts. And
5 unfortunately, a lot of people in
6 Philly only know half of that
7 story. They only know the half
8 with violence and fear.

9 And so, when I was 16, I
10 joined the Sunrise Movement because
11 I want my parks to keep existing.
12 I love nature. I love animals. I
13 love fresh air and clean water,
14 right. But, young people, we have
15 to learn at a young age that that's
16 not a guarantee for us. And unless
17 we fight back, it's going to all be
18 gone.

19 And so, starting in 2023 we
20 started the Green Spaces Active
21 Places campaign to make sure every
22 rec center and library in the city
23 gets fully funded, fully staffed
24 and can run on renewable energy.

25 (Applause.)

2 MS. BROWN: And thankfully,
3 I met with a lot of the City
4 Councilmembers standing right
5 behind me and in front of me. And
6 we want to keep working with you.
7 It's been a great opportunity to
8 work with Councilmember Landau.
9 And I went on the City Council
10 website and I saw all the different
11 committees that you chair. And I
12 wrote down how we could work
13 together and we're going to be
14 following up with all your offices
15 right after this to figure out how
16 that could be -- okay. Where to
17 start.

18 Okay. Majority Whip
19 Thomas, Chair of the Education
20 Committee, we can figure out how to
21 make sure that schools and rec
22 centers and libraries are connected
23 so that way librarians can go into
24 schools and schools can come back
25 to rec centers. Also, thank you

2 very much for holding that hearing
3 with the AFSCME Union.

4 Councilmember Squilla,
5 Chair of Appropriations, we can
6 figure out how to make sure that
7 funding goes to these rec centers
8 and libraries so we can actually
9 have the staff. Councilmember
10 Gauthier, Chair of the Environment,
11 want to keep working together so we
12 can make sure that there's
13 beautiful gardens at every rec
14 center and library.

15 Councilmember Jones, Chair
16 of Public Safety, this is the main
17 way we keep each other safe. This
18 is how we replace fear is by
19 creating community and really
20 appreciate you getting money for
21 the Shepard Rec Center this past
22 year. We love that rec center.

23 Councilmember Young, Chair of
24 Streets, to ensure that there
25 aren't potholes and that there can

2 be speed bumps in front of these
3 rec centers so kids don't have to
4 worry about and parents don't have
5 to worry about being hit by cars.
6 That's a big fear in some places.

7 Councilmember Driscoll,
8 Chair of Licensing and Inspections,
9 to make sure that all these
10 buildings are up to code so that
11 there's not mold and there's not
12 paint chipping off these buildings.
13 Councilmember Lozada, Chair of
14 Public Property, right, these are
15 public buildings, that we want to
16 make sure that they get the funding
17 they need, and really appreciate
18 you talking about your tours and
19 how we're seeing that these places
20 can really use some renovations.

21 Councilmember Bass, the
22 Rules Committee, I don't know that
23 much about City Council rules. But
24 I imagine --

25 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 Zoning.

3 MS. BROWN: I'm sure
4 there's a way that we can use that
5 to our benefit. And then,
6 Councilmember Phillips, already met
7 with your legislative staff
8 recently to go on tours and make
9 sure that we can change the
10 staffing rules at these places. We
11 can use the funding that we have.

12 Councilmember Ahmad with
13 public health, this is how -- these
14 are the centers of public health.
15 This is where people can go when we
16 get another text on our phone about
17 the water being contaminated, where
18 if we can have water stations we
19 can have health care right there.
20 Councilmember Harrity, Chair on
21 Labor, we need so many jobs
22 created, so many jobs that we can
23 work with IBEW and all these unions
24 to repair these spaces.

25 And, Minority Leader

2 Brooks, Chair of Special Needs and
3 Aging Affairs, young people love
4 rec centers, old people love rec
5 centers. And so, we can make sure
6 that there's programs. We can make
7 sure that there's ramps so that
8 people can get easy access to these
9 places.

10 And finally or not finally,
11 second to last, Minority Leader
12 O'Rourke, Chair on Global Economy,
13 I really appreciate you introducing
14 the No Fossil Fuel Treaty and want
15 to make sure that we can continue
16 that. And okay, save the best for
17 last. Council President Johnson,
18 we would love for you to coordinate
19 all this.

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. BROWN: So we can get
22 this done, right. Rec centers and
23 libraries are the heart of our city
24 and they're the key to replacing
25 violence and fear with community.

2 And I want to thank again

3 Councilmember Landau for allowing

4 us to --

5 (Applause.)

6 MS. BROWN: There are two

7 more young leaders in the Sunrise

8 Movement who want to quickly speak

9 and share their experience, Aster

10 Chau and Sultan Smalley.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. CHAU: Hi. My name is

13 Aster Chau. I'm a junior at the

14 Academy of Palumbo and I'm also 16

15 years old. I'm here --

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. CHAU: I'm here with

18 the Sunrise Movement, an

19 organization I've been a part of

20 since my freshman year of high

21 school. I'm missing a bit of

22 school to be here today but I felt

23 like I needed to be here. I've

24 been organizing with the Movement

25 since I was 14, and being a part of

2 Sunrise really helped shift my
3 perspective on a lot of things.

4 Today I wanted to share
5 something with the Councilmembers
6 as a reminder but also an
7 affirmation for the youth. Last
8 Thursday I was organizing outside
9 of City Hall and I heard words that
10 I really needed to hear. A fellow
11 organizer told me not to lose hope.
12 As a young person in the city, I
13 can acknowledge that things need to
14 actively change to better our
15 communities that unify the city.

16 I've seen change be made
17 and I still see change being fought
18 for within schools, neighborhoods,
19 across movements and all people.
20 The youth who will live with these
21 decisions that our elected official
22 are making are watching in
23 anticipation. It's something that
24 I carry with me, but Rue Landau
25 heard the cries of the communities

2 asking for rec centers that are
3 actually open, asking for libraries
4 with adequate, well-paid staff that
5 can run programs, advocating for
6 the youth in the city to have these
7 resources in an environmentally
8 friendly way.

9 It is a two-way street.
10 Landau recognizes the efforts of
11 Sunrise Philly and we recognize her
12 for seeing our community. It
13 brings me pride to see an elected
14 official stand alongside a
15 community activating -- oh, sorry,
16 advocating for safe green spaces.
17 When our elected officials hear the
18 people and their actions stand by
19 that, that's democracy and that's
20 what the city needs. Thank you,
21 Rue Landau, and the space offered
22 for me to speak today.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. SMALLEY: Hello. My
25 name is Sultan Smalley and I'm a

3 thank you to Rue Landau for
4 inviting us today. So I joined
5 Sunrise last spring in my senior
6 year of high school. And the first
7 thing I did as a member was bike
8 around the rec centers in my
9 neighborhood with Erica.

10 We did this to hear the
11 perspectives of rec center staff
12 and it was a fruitful endeavor
13 despite the fact that we got caught
14 in the rain, which is not fun when
15 you're biking next to Philly
16 drivers. But the reason it was
17 worth the rain was because I
18 learned a lot about our public
19 spaces and the people who run them
20 day-in and day-out. I learned that
21 Philadelphia only spends about half
22 the amount per person that
23 Pittsburgh and Baltimore spends on
24 Parks & Rec, and I learned about
25 the basketball programming being

2 taught by staff at McIlvain

3 Playground.

4 Despite a lack of funding,

5 hardworking people at our Parks &

6 Rec centers across the city

7 continue to persevere as they build

8 and serve our communities from the

11 organized bloc we have the power to

12 advocate for all these incredible

13 working-class heroes and call for

14 full investment in our public

15 spaces.

16 There's no other way I'd

17 rather use the free time afforded

18 to me as a 19-year-old college

19 student. So once again, thank you

20 to Councilmember Rue Landau and I

21 hope City Council joins us in

22 fighting for working people. Thank

23 you.

14 heard, there were 10 gold medals

15 and countless other awardees as

16 well at this competition.

17 The ACT-SO program, the

18 Afro-Academic Cultural

19 Technological and Scientific

20 Olympics, has a longstanding

21 tradition of uplifting young Black

22 students, guided them to expand

23 their horizons and sharpen their

24 skills to pursue excellence. Was

25 founded by journalist and author

2 Vernon Jarrett in 1978.

3 ACT-SO has provided a

4 platform for thousands of talented

5 young people, encouraging them to

6 achieve academically,

7 scientifically and artistically.

8 It's an initiative that goes beyond

10 empowers youth to believe in

11 themselves and reach their highest

12 potentials.

13 And with that today, I'm

14 going to ask my colleagues to join

15 me in recognizing the young

16 scholars who are here today. But I

17 want to recognize the leadership of

18 Chairperson Ms. Veronica Norris who

19 I've known my entire life, right,

20 and whose commitment to young

21 people has been instrumental in

22 their success.

23 And I can tell you

24 firsthand that she has always been

25 dedicated to young people, to

2 myself and my friends. She has
3 always poured into us to make sure
4 that we achieve greatness. And so,
5 I just want to honor her again

20 for the record, I would like to say
21 that I'm an ACT-SO former
22 participant and --

22 Whereas, with over 30 areas of

23 competition in several major

24 categories, including STEM,

25 Humanities, Performing Arts,

15 winning 10 gold medals at this

16 year's ACT-SO Competition in Las

17 Vegas; and

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

20 Whereas, two local medalists

21 secured double gold highlighting 10

22 Olympians across 12 categories at

23 this year's competition; and

24 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

25 Whereas, under the leadership of

3 Philadelphia branch of the NAACP

9 Bronze for Chemistry/Biochemistry,
10 while Central High School Junior
11 Abdullah Mahmoud won the National
12 Bronze Medal for Mathematics; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD: Just a
14 point of privilege, as a lifetime
15 member of the Philadelphia Chapter
16 of the NAACP, I have watched
17 Ms. Vee and our President here work
18 so hard for all our children. So
19 whereas, Sumriah Mungin, a junior
20 at the Philadelphia High School for
21 Creative Arts won the National
22 Silver Medal for Vocal
23 Contemporary; and

24 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: And
25 whereas, a win at the National

2 NAACP ACT-SO Competition is a win
3 for all branches of NAACP across
4 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania;

11 and sciences; therefore, be it

12 Resolved by the Council of

17 winning 10 gold medals at the
18 National NAACP ACT-SO Competition
19 in Las Vegas. Let's give them a
20 round of applause please.

21 they hear everything I'm saying, so
22 great job. So let me just look
23 back here. As we went to Las
24 Vegas, it was good to represent the
25 city of Philadelphia. A lot of

12 Haggerty and Rhicki Santos also
13 make their way to the podium.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 MR. KNIGHT: All right.
17 Good morning, everybody. My name's
18 Albert Knight.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 Begin, sir.

21 MR. KNIGHT: My name's
22 Albert Knight and I'm here to tell
23 my testimony because we need help.
24 We need help. We need information
25 in the communities about the drugs.

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The Fentanyl is killing everyone.

3 And I have like eight family

4 members and friends that's actually

5 dead because of the Fentanyl.

6 I was blessed to get help,

7 but I couldn't find help. It was

8 hard. It was really hard for me to

9 even get help to fight. We need to

10 knock on people's doors and let

11 them know, you know. We need to

12 like be up close in person and let

13 them know because life is valuable.

14 And I had a speech but I can't get

15 to it. But, yes, we need a lot to

16 help us fight Fentanyl.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Jenny Zhang.

19 Aileen Haggerty, Rhicki Santos and

20 Vivian Chang also make their way to

21 the podium.

22 (Witnesses approached

23 podium.)

24 MS. ZHANG: Thank you.

25 Good morning. My name is Jenny

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Zhang and I live in Chinatown. I'm
3 speaking to oppose Resolution
4 241000 that would create the
5 neighborhood improvement district
6 and start the process of destroying
7 our Chinatown. As a member of the
8 Chinatown community, I was appalled
9 when I first found out about the
10 so-called CBA.

11 I know that this body tried
12 to pass a resolution years ago that
13 said in part that a CBA must be
14 negotiated by communities. It was
15 passed unanimously, which meant
16 that both then Councilmember and
17 now Mayor Cherelle Parker and
18 Councilmember Mark Squilla believed
19 in that bill. It was unfortunately
20 vetoed by Mayor Kenney.

21 Yet you are looking at the
22 beginning of a process where
23 legislation is being pushed forward
24 without the consent or any
25 agreement of the community most

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 affected. Some of you say it is
3 Chinatown's fault for not being at
4 the table to negotiate CBAs. The
5 only table that the city created
6 was for the people who are
7 pro-arena. The only seat we could
8 even get at the table was to say,
9 come take my home.

10 So when CBAs were
11 announced, that included a
12 (inaudible) \$5 million for our
13 community, 1 million in the form of
14 extra cleaning because of the arena
15 that would create -- because of the
16 trash that the arena would create,
17 3 million in the form of a loan for
18 small businesses to offset the
19 damage of the arena that won't
20 begin until 2032 and our businesses
21 will be already killed off by then.
22 Vote no against 241000. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. HAGGERTY: My name is
25 Aileen Haggerty. I live in the

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Whitman neighborhood in South
3 Philadelphia. I'm a library worker
4 and proud member of AFSCME District
5 Council 33, but today I'm here
6 speaking on my own behalf. I
7 oppose Resolution 240999 because
8 TIFs and PILOTs are financial
9 instruments that allow billionaire
10 developers to get away without
11 paying property taxes.

12 They will steal millions of
13 dollars from critical City
14 services. Why is Council giving
15 handouts to billionaires instead of
16 making sure that the City actually
17 benefits? Philadelphia has aging
18 facilities and an underpaid
19 municipal workforce. The result of
20 it closed libraries and understaff
21 rec centers depriving all of us of
22 the necessary spaces that provide
23 safety and security for our City's
24 residents. We heard earlier from
25 Sunrise Movement speakers how

2 important these spaces are.

3 I'm a neighbor of Mifflin

4 Square Park, a park that

5 Councilmember Squilla consistently

6 supports. We are finally getting a

7 new playground that has taken

8 multiple outside grants and a

9 six-year process. Our community is

10 literally jumping the fence to get

11 to enjoy the safe and new space.

12 If a development was

13 threatening our park and

14 neighborhood, we would be out there

15 fighting it and I guarantee you

16 Councilman Squilla would have our

17 backs. This resolution advances

18 the arena and that means it drains

19 money from the pockets of the rich.

20 All of these resolutions benefiting

21 developers or supposedly causing

22 less harm to Chinatown are

23 unnecessary because the solution is

24 right in front of us. Say no to

25 the arena.

2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Rhicki

4 Santos. Vivian Chang and Lorenzo

5 Cannon Umpstead, please also make

6 their way to the podium.

7 MS. CHANG: Hello. My name
8 is Rhicki Santos and I'm a medical
9 student here in Philadelphia. I
10 oppose Resolution 241000. I got
11 into medicine because I knew I
12 wanted to be an advocate. I wanted
13 to stand up for my patients and
14 treat them holistically as opposed
15 to just treating them as a disease
16 or a symptom. And as a medical
17 school student, I stand here today
18 to advocate for them.

19 This resolution rushes the
20 arena through City Council, but we
21 need City Council to put patient
22 and public health over billionaire
23 profits. It's absolutely
24 unthinkable that the City is
25 considering a project that would do

2 so much harm to access to health
3 care in this city.

4 Arena traffic would
5 gridlock vehicles in the exact
6 intersections that ambulances
7 travel through to get patients to
8 the hospital to reach people in
9 emergency. But it isn't just about
10 patients. It's about blood for
11 someone getting surgery. It's
12 about organs for transplants.
13 Organs and blood do not wait and
14 they do not care if there's a
15 basketball game. If the tissue
16 dies, the patient receiving the
17 organ also dies.

18 Big money from one of the
19 same developers building this arena
20 already shut down one hospital in
21 Center City and it made the work in
22 other hospitals even more
23 difficult. It harmed the lives of
24 people seeking medical care in
25 Philadelphia. An arena will

2 certainly harm Chinatown but it
3 will also have a negative impact on
4 nearby hospitals. And I'm urging
5 City Council today, please put
6 patient health over profits.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Vivian Chang.
9 Lorenzo Cannon Umpstead and Debbie
10 Wei, also make their way to their
11 podium.

12 MS. CHANG: Vivian Chang,
13 resident of Chinatown North. I
14 oppose this resolution, right, same
15 as everyone else. This is stealing
16 money from our city, right, trying
17 to give \$400 million in public
18 subsidies even though the arena
19 developers have said they're not
20 going to take any public money.
21 You got to see through the lie.

22 This disgraceful deal does
23 nothing for our city, our youth.
24 We have students who go to schools
25 in Philly, right, Academy of

2 Palumbo, they've experienced
3 multiple floods, electrical fires,
4 gas leaks. It's disgusting. Our
5 schools need \$10 billion in repairs
6 and what is Council considering,
7 giving free money to billionaires.

8 How does this do anything
9 for anyone who really cares about
10 Philly who's actually from here and
11 isn't a billionaire developer who
12 doesn't even live here? So I urge
13 Council to vote no on these two
14 resolutions. Vote no on 240999.
15 Vote no on 241000. Instead give
16 our schools air-conditioning,
17 libraries, playgrounds, invest in
18 our youth.

19 (Applause.)

20 MR. CHANG: That's right.
21 No to the arena. No to this crappy
22 deal. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. CANNON UMPSTEAD: Good
25 morning, Council President, Council

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 guests, Council neighbors and
3 workers of the City of
4 Philadelphia. Good morning. My
5 name is Lorenzo Cannon Umpstead.
6 I'm from 215 People's Alliance. I
7 am a worker, a West Philadelphia
8 native and a resident of West
9 Philadelphia and a member of Black
10 Philadelphia for Chinatown. I
11 oppose Resolution 241000.
12 The proposed Community
13 Benefits Agreement is a joke. It
14 makes a mockery out of what
15 neighborhood improvement actually
16 is and what it should look like in
17 the city of Philadelphia in the
18 year 2024. This process is way too
19 rushed. This process and project
20 is a reactionary response to the
21 years of gross neighborhood
22 negligence of the so-called leaders
23 in the city, and the current
24 Council needs to do is due
25 diligence on this arena issue. Our

2 city should not be pushing to a bad
3 deal that mostly benefits the elite
4 and wealthy developers.

5 David Adelman, one of the
6 Sixers' owners behind the arena has
7 already done damage to our
8 community. He's the CEO of Campus
9 Apartments, which pushed out Black
10 people out of the Black Bottom,
11 which is the community I'm from.
12 Josh Harris, another 76ers Place
13 developer, might I add also the
14 owner of the New Jersey Devils,
15 owns the corporate investment firm
16 that shut down Hahnemann Hospital.

17 This arena will not create
18 good jobs for Black workers. The
19 Building Trades historically are
20 ripe for racism in Philadelphia,
21 and I can tell you that personally
22 by how me and my people was treated
23 outside of this building last
24 Thursday. Okay. 80 percent of
25 steel workers, 77 percent of sheet

2 metal workers and 74 percent of
3 carpet installers in the city are
4 White, but Black people are the
5 majority in our city. But shout-
6 out to the Black guys on union
7 jobs. Representation matters,
8 right.

9 Meanwhile in our city Black
10 people are underrepresented and
11 underpaid or they're
12 overrepresented and underpaid and
13 temporary jobs across the city --
14 I'm about to wrap it up, big man.
15 The work inside the arena at ticket
16 counters and concession stands is
17 highly seasonal and exploits
18 workers by subjecting them to
19 poverty wages, inequity and wage
20 thefts. The kind of jobs that this
21 arena will offer do not lift the
22 people out of poverty. It would
23 keep them trapped in it. My name
24 is Lorenzo. Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Debbie Wei.

3 May Kaia Chau, Jeremy Blatstein and

4 Marissa Johnson-Valenzuela also

5 make their way to the podium.

6 (Witnesses approached

7 podium.)

8 MS. WEI: My name is Debbie

9 Wei. I am an award-winning

10 educator and principal, a lifelong

11 Philadelphian, a community

12 activist, the founder of Asian

13 Americans United and the Folk Arts

14 Cultural Treasures Charter School

15 and a resident of the 2nd

16 Councilmanic District for over 30

17 years.

18 I'm here to ask you to

19 delay any vote on resolutions

20 related to advancing the Sixers

21 Arena. Public hearings on this

22 bill begin in less than two weeks.

23 There is no reason to rush this

24 process with so many questions

25 remain outstanding. If even this

2 reasonable request cannot be made,
3 I ask you to use your vote as your
4 voice and to vote no to both
5 Resolution 240999 and 241000.

6 Last week before I was
7 dragged out of City Council and
8 violently thrown out of City Hall
9 for merely holding up a sign and
10 chanting, I was enraged to hear
11 Council President Johnson claim
12 that there are channels through
13 which you can be heard. For more
14 than two years, we in Chinatown
15 have begged to be heard. Not once
16 have we had even the courtesy of a
17 community meeting with the Mayor
18 and community members.

19 President Johnson, for over
20 two years we requested visits with
21 you. Not once have we had a
22 meeting. Councilmember Squilla
23 publicly promised he would give the
24 community 30 days' notice before
25 submitting legislation to advance

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the arena. Well, he did not give
3 even one day notice on those
4 resolutions or any of the bills he
5 introduced last week, one of which
6 doesn't even have text attached to
7 it. It's blank.

8 It's no surprise -- Council
9 President Johnson, you did not
10 return my call and I am your
11 constituent. I ask for the time to
12 be able to say what happened to me
13 last week. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. WEI: The paper was
16 blank and it is no surprise you
17 have before you an arena deal and a
18 CBA that the public considers a
19 disgrace. Last Thursday
20 counterterrorism police units
21 patrolled your hallways. Building
22 Trade union members harassed,
23 shoved and spewed racial epithets
24 at Asian community members.

25 Up in the balcony young

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 people, including my 22-year-old
3 daughter and members of the public,
4 had signs ripped out of their
5 hands. Is this the people's house?
6 Is this the public process you laud
7 while it is our lives and our
8 communities at stake? I am 67
9 years old. Many of you know me. I
10 stood before you last year as I was
11 honored by this very body for my
12 life's work.

13 But when I came here last
14 week, I was treated as a target.
15 Within a minute of my standing up,
16 Sheriff's deputies yanked me out of
17 my chair causing me to fall and
18 told me it's time for you to go.
19 Even though numerous people were
20 chanting, they targeted no one but
21 me.

22 One deputy even pulled out
23 his baton wielding it in a
24 threatening manner towards someone
25 who was worried for me. You know

2 what they said to me on the
3 elevator? Now, are you going to
4 behave? I don't want to do this,
5 but you need to behave. Do you
6 know how it feels to be a woman of
7 color in a closed isolated space
8 hearing men with power that you
9 need to behave?

10 When we got to the first
11 floor, they dragged me to the door
12 and told security I was not allowed
13 to re-enter the building. Then
14 they shoved me outside and pulled
15 the doors closed. I have never
16 been this disrespected and I have
17 protested in these chambers for
18 decades.

19 As personally hurt as I am
20 by what happened, I feel like this
21 is the way that Chinatown and
22 communities all across this city
23 have been treated, literally thrown
24 out of here while you roll out the
25 red carpet and rush a process you

2 don't understand for a bunch of
3 billionaires who will never live
4 here, never send their kids to our
5 schools and who would take as much
6 as you will give.

7 This morning when I signed
8 in at the northeast entrance,
9 security took my ID and called
10 someone. While I waited outside
11 the northeast entrance, John Fenton
12 came out and asked me if I would
13 behave today. If I didn't say I
14 would, he wouldn't let me in. I
15 asked him how he even knew me or
16 that I was here, and he said he was
17 called. I asked him why I was
18 targeted and he said, Council
19 President Johnson wanted quorum.

20 Yes, this is American
21 democracy at its best, a litany of
22 telling women of color to behave.
23 I was brutalized but not silenced.
24 My community was ignored but not
25 bowed. People are attempting to

2 sell off our city to the lowest
3 possible bidders. Who will you
4 stand for? Don't vote yes today
5 and come up to me afterward
6 apologizing for this shameful and
7 frankly unconstitutional process.
8 Vote no. Bring common sense and
9 some humanity to this body. The
10 city is watching, the resistance is
11 growing and your actions or lack of
12 actions will not be forgotten.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Kaia Chau.
15 And then Jeremy Blatstein, Marissa
16 Johnson-Valenzuela and then Rainah
17 Chambliss also make their way to
18 the podium.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MS. CHAU: My name is Kaia
22 Chau. I am a founder of the Ginger
23 Arts Center, a community youth and
24 arts center in Chinatown. I ask
25 you to use your vote as your voice

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and vote no on both Resolution Nos.
3 240999 and 241000, two bills
4 relating to advancing the Sixers
5 Arena which will start the process
6 of destroying Chinatown.

7 After months of being told
8 by this body that you were waiting
9 for the impact studies, the
10 developer-funded studies came out a
11 year late. The delay was their own
12 fault, and yet there has not been a
13 single hearing, a single briefing
14 or a single question from this body
15 about the findings, not one.

16 Do you even know what the
17 studies say? Do you even care that
18 our 150-year-old community, the
19 only social, cultural, spiritual,
20 linguistically accessible community
21 in the entire region for Asian
22 Americans is being sacrificed for a
23 billionaire land grab?

24 Did you read the community
25 impact study? It said there is

2 evidence for indirect displacement
3 of small businesses and low- and
4 fixed-income individuals through
5 gentrification and loss of cultural
6 identity in Chinatown, and the
7 arena should be considered a
8 significant potential risk to
9 Chinatown's core identity. And
10 Chinatown's core identity could be
11 significantly diminished or lost.
12 You are responsible for
13 ensuring that people can be heard
14 regardless of the language they
15 speak or the color of their skin.
16 You are responsible for performing
17 due diligence and looking deeply at
18 the studies you said were waiting
19 for before legislation can be
20 considered. You are responsible
21 for the fiduciary oversight of
22 projects set to cost the city
23 hundreds of millions of dollars.
24 And, yes, you are responsible if
25 you allow our 150-year-old

2 community to be destroyed.

3 You are responsible if you

4 stifle free speech, trample on

5 protests, refuse to meet with

6 affected communities, choose to

7 support a project that the vast

8 majority of the city opposes. You

9 are responsible to show young

10 people like myself what it means to

11 govern with integrity. Stop this

12 shameful bullying, disguising

13 legislative process and answer our

14 questions before you allow this to

15 continue. Vote no on these

16 resolutions today.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy

19 Blatstein, Marissa Johnson-

20 Valenzuela, Rainah Chambliss and

21 Junior Brainard also make their way

22 to the podium.

23 (Witnesses approached

24 podium.)

25 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello,

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia City Council. Happy
3 belated birthday, Council President
4 Johnson. My name is Jeremy
5 Blatstein and I'm here in support
6 of Bill No. 240978, which will move
7 land out of the Philadelphia Land
8 Bank to build homes through the
9 Turn the Key program.

10 The Turn the Key program is
11 a successful program that is
12 building homes for home ownership.
13 The average person that has a Turn
14 the Key home is paying \$1,300 a
15 month. That means that somebody
16 making \$22 an hour can afford that
17 home. Part of the Turn the Key
18 program is 40 minority developers.
19 This is success.

20 All right. Let's do it.
21 Raise your hand if you wrote SEPTA
22 to City Hall today. Not even you,
23 Councilwoman? Councilwoman
24 Gauthier, did you ride your broom
25 today? No, didn't ride SEPTA today

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 or just posted about it? Okay.
3 Cool. Council President Johnson,
4 we'll put that to another time.
5 Councilman Jones, next week me and
6 you are riding it together and then
7 I'm going one-by-one. We're going
8 to ride it together.

9 The last piece I will say,
10 the arena is good for Philadelphia.
11 The stunt queen over here can say
12 what she wants but that's not what
13 happened. Bill Nos. 240999 and
14 241000 is the next step to really
15 changing Market Street. Market
16 Street around the Fashion District
17 is a failing area and needs to
18 change. The arena is what is going
19 to be the catalyst for this, and I
20 just want to say thank you for
21 supporting this and moving it along
22 through the process. Thank you.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Marissa
24 Johnson-Valenzuela, Rainah
25 Chambliss, Junior Brainard and

2 Hannah Sassaman.

3 (Witnesses approached
4 podium.)

5 MS. JOHNSON-VALENZUELA:

6 Greetings. My name is Marissa
7 Johnson-Valenzuela. I'm the
8 secretary of the Faculty and Staff
9 Union of Community College of
10 Philadelphia. We at AFT 2026 share
11 a vision of a Philadelphia for us
12 all.

13 We support what folks from
14 Sunshine, folks from the Stop the
15 Arena said. We don't think that
16 Philadelphians should be -- anyway
17 should be kept out of this. I'm
18 kind of ad-libbing, but we are
19 actually here though to thank all
20 of you, the City Councilmembers,
21 staffers and citizens for
22 supporting Community College of
23 Philadelphia, the college that
24 educates the most Philadelphians.
25 And our students are the college

2 students in the city who are the
3 most in need and deserving of our
4 support.

5 We thank you for your
6 support on the resolution that's
7 passing today. We thank you, your
8 letters of support which we will
9 take to our bargaining session
10 tomorrow. Like many of you, we
11 share a vision for Community
12 College of Philadelphia for all
13 working conditions, our learning
14 conditions. And after four decades
15 of disinvestment, the time has come
16 to invest in faculty staff and
17 students at Community College of
18 Philadelphia. Again, we are
19 Philly's college. Thank you.

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. CHAMBLISS: Good
22 morning. Rainah Chambliss,
23 Co-president of the Faculty and
24 Staff Federation of Community
25 College of Philadelphia. I'm

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 speaking on behalf of 240974. It's
3 an important resolution that was
4 brought to this floor. With
5 inflation and interest rates still
6 on the rise, it's a wonder how
7 anyone even survives.

8 I will tell you a story.
9 I'll keep it real short. At my
10 previous job, the one I had before,
11 after 12 years I was laid off
12 making 45k and that was before
13 getting my bonus pay. With a high
14 school diploma and not one degree,
15 I found myself temping at CCP. I
16 applied and I landed a permanent
17 spot excited and so glad I gave it
18 a shot.

19 But then came the offer. I
20 lost some of that glow. I could
21 not believe the rate was so low.
22 And when I attempted to have some
23 kind of say, I was told that I
24 could not negotiate pay. So I took
25 it because I really needed a job

2 and I kept the part-time gig I did
3 on the side.

4 I liked the college, the
5 work and I hoped for the best,
6 thinking I'd get promoted like I
7 did before this. If you're
8 wondering what happened thinking
9 how did she do, well, I have an
10 Associate's and a Bachelor's too.
11 As for pay I'll say this and you
12 might be surprised, after 17 years
13 my annual has not hit 45.

14 There's an increase in
15 funding that should increase our
16 wage. There's a whereas it states,
17 it's right on the page. So that is
18 my story, yes, that is my tale.

19 Thank you for making sure 240975 --
20 4 prevails. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Junior
23 Brainard, Hannah Sassaman, Queen
24 Judith Robinson and Ella Bruce also
25 make their way to the podium.

2 (Witnesses approached
3 podium.)

4 MR. BRAINARD: Junior
5 Brainard. Good morning. I'm
6 Junior Brainard. I'm a faculty
7 member at Community College of
8 Philadelphia as well as
9 Co-president of our local union AFT
10 2026, which represents 1200 faculty
11 and staff and I'm here to testify
12 in support of the resolution
13 calling on the Board of Trustees at
14 Community College of Philadelphia
15 for increased wages for all faculty
16 and staff.

17 The working conditions of
18 faculty and staff directly impact
19 student learning conditions. What
20 we want for ourselves is what we
21 want for our students, dignity,
22 respect and wages that allow
23 families to thrive. The City
24 Council of Philadelphia has
25 allocated an additional 5 million

2 in operating funding to CCP for
3 this fiscal year, making the
4 largest single-year increase in
5 operating funding CCP has ever
6 received.

7 CCP is also sitting on an
8 unprecedented \$80 million in
9 reserves. Unfortunately, Community
10 College of Philadelphia's Board of
11 Trustees has not yet directed their
12 bargaining team to agree to any
13 proposals in bargaining to use this
14 money. We need to make CCP a place
15 that can recruit and retain the
16 talented and diverse faculty and
17 staff our students need.

18 Over half of staff at CCP
19 do not make a living wage, which
20 means most of our staff and many of
21 our faculty work second and third
22 jobs to make ends meet or leave the
23 college for better jobs. Our
24 students want to be able to show up
25 and learn, but this is a challenge

2 when their immediate needs for
3 transportation and child care are
4 not met.

5 We need smaller class
6 sizes, smaller caseloads and full
7 staffing so that students get the
8 support and learning conditions
9 they need to graduate and move into
10 their jobs in Philadelphia. And we
11 oppose the arena in Chinatown
12 because good jobs for ourselves and
13 our students lift up rather than
14 destroy communities. It's time for
15 CCP's Board of Trustees to take
16 concrete steps to provide support
17 that our students, faculty and
18 staff need each day by agreeing to
19 three fair contracts.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Hannah
22 Sassaman, Queen Judith Robinson,
23 Ella Bruce and Lynn Landes.

24 (Witnesses approached
25 podium.)

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. SASSAMAN: Hello. My
3 name is Hannah Sassaman. I live in
4 West Philadelphia and I've worked
5 at an office in Chinatown since
6 about 2019. And I'm here in
7 opposition to Resolution 241000.
8 And I want to talk about this a
9 little bit personally. I was
10 hoping that Councilmember Squilla
11 would be here, but I know this will
12 be recorded so hopefully he'll see
13 it too and to all of you.

14 I've talked to a lot of you
15 and a lot of your offices. I know
16 how much you care about serving
17 your constituents. I know how
18 particularly important that is to
19 Councilmember Squilla. He's
20 incredibly responsive on email and
21 really wants to help folks in the
22 neighborhood. And I want to
23 address you from that perspective
24 and the love and care that you have
25 for the city, the things that only

2 you see and know about, like the
3 place in the community where you
4 see the flowers bloom in the
5 spring.

6 When we build an arena in
7 Chinatown, we have a really strong
8 chance of destroying all of those
9 little things that people see and
10 know and love and to create
11 something that people really,
12 really don't want. And I don't
13 want all of the members of Council
14 in 10, 20, 30 years when you're
15 back as a private citizen to think
16 and reflect that something that you
17 cared about, that you loved, that
18 those residents loved was destroyed
19 because you didn't take the time to
20 listen to them, so I hope that you
21 will vote no against this
22 resolution and any other
23 resolutions that would authorize
24 this arena quickly. Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Queen Judith
3 Robinson, Ella Bruce, Lynn Landes
4 and Noelle Foizen.

5 (Witnesses approached
6 podium.)

7 MS. BRUCE: I would like to
8 say -- the gentleman is telling me
9 I -- my name is Ella Bruce. I took
10 off work to be here. I'm getting
11 emotional. I have this one piece
12 of paper to read and I would like
13 to be able to read it without being
14 interrupted.

15 I am in opposition of the
16 Resolution 24000. I want to ask
17 why are we here. Week after week
18 this exercise is repeated. The
19 bills are introduced. The public
20 is allowed to make comments.
21 Council votes. Not only does
22 Council vote, but some members
23 leave the meeting wanting to be
24 recorded as aye on all bills and
25 resolutions.

2 How can you vote aye on
3 anything without truly considering
4 the public comments? Is this body
5 truly listening to the resident
6 voters, constituents? Those of us
7 who live here have to fight for
8 everything. I get the image of
9 someone talking to me and nodding
10 their head while their fingers are
11 crossed behind their back. I am
12 speaking specifically on any bills
13 introduced with regard to the
14 Sixers Arena.

15 As a resident of
16 Philadelphia, more specifically
17 Council President Johnson's
18 District, it seems that
19 transparency is lacking in this
20 process. We're being told that
21 there will be a robust discussion
22 with regard to this arena. And yet
23 this body appears to be doing --
24 what this body appears to be doing
25 is clearing the way to shove this

2 beast down our throats.

3 The word folly comes to
4 mind. Because the Mayor wants to
5 get to yes, sometimes the answer is
6 no. The community of Chinatown
7 trusts this city to do right by
8 them. I was on the Planning
9 Commission's call for this project.

10 And while Chinatown may be the
11 nearest neighbor to propose this
12 arena, many more neighbors will
13 feel the effects of its
14 inappropriate presence.

15 The studies have not been
16 looked at, at a large enough radius
17 within the location that will be
18 affected. Where are the studies
19 that include the more southern
20 surrounding tributaries? Not
21 enough information has been
22 gathered in this regard. How will
23 this affect the cultural community
24 of the city, specifically the
25 theater district?

2 Just because the developers
3 want an arena at 11th and Market
4 does not mean it belongs there.

5 This is a shiny thing being waved
6 around as if it doesn't present the
7 potential for driving people away
8 who already patronize events in
9 Center City. It would create jobs
10 wherever it's built. Will these
11 jobs created be a wash because of
12 the jobs that are lost by those who
13 work at the Fashion District? This
14 arena isn't even fully thought out
15 by the developer. Does
16 Philadelphia have a real plan for
17 this city? It used to be the 2035
18 Plan. We deserve better than a
19 concept of a plan.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,
22 Noelle Foizen. And may Keli McLoyd
23 and Julie Ward Carnegie also make
24 their way to the podium.

25 MS. LANDES: My name is

2 Lynn Landes of
3 safestreetsphilly.org. I support
4 the resolution which asks for state
5 enforcement of laws against the
6 sale of liquor at cornerstore
7 establishments pretending to be
8 restaurants. The language of the
9 bill is impassionate and I quote,
10 "The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
11 must confront the rampant illegal
12 sale of liquor in these
13 establishments with unyielding
14 resolve," which is all well and
15 good. But where I ask is City
16 Council's unyielding resolve when
17 it comes to its own local laws and
18 policies such as its sanctuary city
19 policy that has allowed and
20 encouraged the free flow of illegal
21 immigrants, human child and sex
22 trafficking and fatally addictive
23 drugs into Philadelphia in general
24 and Kensington in particular, a
25 neighborhood I thought had been

2 cleaned up.

3 So last Saturday afternoon

4 my husband and I took a ride on

5 Kensington Avenue and were shocked

6 to see within a span of 10 blocks

7 at least 200 people, addicts

8 sitting and lying on the sidewalk

9 passed out and surrounded by trash

10 with no police in sight. My

11 request today is that City Council

12 apply to itself the same unyielding

13 resolve to enforce the law that it

14 now demands of our state

15 legislators in this resolution.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MS. FOIZEN: Hi. Good

19 morning. Noelle Foizen. I want to

20 thank Councilmember Brooks for

21 sponsoring the resolution for the

22 Door-to-Door Overdose Prevention

23 Campaign, this little program that

24 could. Every fatal overdose is

25 heartbreaking because every

2 overdose is preventable.

3 Today in the city of
4 Philadelphia the most likely person
5 to overdose is a 45-year-old Black
6 male in his home. This is a man
7 who grew up during the war on drugs
8 who may be at least likely to seek
9 help. How do we get him the
10 support he needs?

11 I remember the day Keli,
12 who you're going to hear from in a
13 second, first brought this idea to
14 me. It was so simple yet so
15 perfect, door-to-door canvassing
16 targeting communities with the
17 highest rates of overdose, knocking
18 on every door on a block. No need
19 to raise your hand and say I use
20 drugs or I love someone who uses
21 drugs. The program had the goal of
22 sharing information with everyone
23 on the block to try to get Narcan
24 in every single medicine cabinet
25 like aspirin or Pepto Bismol.

2 We have phenomenal partners
3 at CEO who were all in on day 1 and
4 understood the importance of the
5 moment and fully embrace the
6 opportunity to save lives. CEO has
7 worked tirelessly to get this
8 program up and running in those
9 communities with the highest rates
10 of fatal overdoses. The door-to-
11 door canvassers though are the real
12 heroes of this program. I have no
13 doubt the work they do every day
14 saves lives and reduces the stigma
15 by ensuring our neighbors know we
16 see them, we love them, we care
17 about them and we want them to not
18 only live but thrive.

19 I'm going to ask the CEO
20 team and all the door to-door
21 canvassers to please stand up from
22 Philly Counts so we can give them a
23 round of applause please.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. FOIZEN: Thank you so

2 much. Thank you again for this
3 honor. I'm way over time. Sorry.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Keli McLoyd,
6 Julie Ward Carnegie. And may
7 Melody Wong and Anthony Wyatt make
8 their way to the podium.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 podium.)

11 MS. McLOYD: Hi, everybody.
12 Thank you so much for allowing me
13 to speak. My name is Keli McLoyd.
14 It's Swahili for peppery and
15 persistent. So first, I would like
16 to thank Councilwoman Brooks for
17 sponsoring this resolution. And I
18 want to just remind everybody and
19 echo what my colleagues have
20 stated.

21 First of all, Albert, we
22 are so incredibly proud of you and
23 we know you can keep going. Please
24 keep going. I secondly want to
25 echo Noelle and giving a shout-out

2 to the Philly Counts crew. When
3 this project came together, we had
4 no idea what the reaction would be.
5 When we went into primarily Black
6 and Brown neighborhoods to talk
7 about drugs, we were expecting
8 anger and we were expecting trauma,
9 but what we actually got was
10 welcome, we got heartbreak and we
11 got tears. So much so that we had
12 to re-allot time at the doors
13 because people were so eager to
14 have these conversations.

15 We have a fantastic report
16 here that we are asking everybody
17 to look at. And one more thing
18 that I just want to end with. In
19 the city of Philadelphia as well as
20 nationally we have seen a decrease
21 in overdose deaths. We celebrate
22 that every single day, but I want
23 to remind everybody that this
24 decrease did not apply to Black and
25 Brown folks either throughout the

2 United States or in Philadelphia
3 specifically. We need more support
4 and we need to keep up the
5 attention. And again, Albert, we
6 are so incredibly proud of you.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Julie Ward
9 Carnegie, Melody Wong, Anthony
10 Wyatt and Denise Ross.

11 (Witnesses approached
12 podium.)

13 MS. WARD CARNEGIE: Good
14 day, City Councilmembers, Council
15 Clerk, Mayor Cherelle Parker,
16 Governor Shapiro, Harrisburg
17 Senators, State Representatives and
18 assembly of people present. My
19 comments are in regards to Bill
20 240999. I digress for a moment
21 regarding Bill 240999.

22 Being that it is that the
23 testimony that was heard and the
24 expressions that I saw on
25 Councilmembers as well as Council

2 President's face is an indication
3 that a lot that was stated was not
4 known. And so, with respect to
5 Council and Council President, I'm
6 sure that our Commissioner will
7 probably look into that further
8 regarding what happened to one
9 person as they were on the
10 elevator.

11 Resolution 240992,
12 recognizing the devastating impact
13 acts of Hurricane Helene and Milton
14 calling on Congress to immediately
15 pass sufficient funding for FEMA's
16 Disaster Relief Fund, requesting of
17 Councilmembers to include a budget
18 for Philadelphia that provides
19 additional medic units, vehicles
20 and to the obtainment of records
21 become accessible ASAP as it
22 pertains to complaints regarding
23 uncooperative tenants across county
24 lines of Pennsylvania.

25 I want to mention also the

2 name Paul V. Carnegie and many
3 people knew him as Brother Khalifed
4 Eil(ph), both were legal names,
5 legal binding, who provided a
6 binder of both homeland security
7 and also who provided an overview
8 for the record of Pennsylvania --
9 the records of Pennsylvania also
10 reflect Paul V. Carnegie soared
11 through the FEMA test. And two,
12 the testimony of his nephew David
13 Ewing as well as Town Watch
14 Executive Director Murphy -- cannot
15 think of his first name, Anthony
16 Murphy, thank you, can also provide
17 credence of his testimony.

18 Regarding Resolution --
19 Bill, beg your pardon, 24099,
20 please consider the following:
21 Please review any stipulation that
22 just might be including
23 Philadelphia County in the small
24 print of the Crozer Delaware County
25 receivership. With that having

2 been said, it will probably be
3 necessary to have a combined City
4 Council meeting session with
5 Pittsburgh.

6 And I say that because a
7 lot always falls downhill to
8 Philadelphia and it wouldn't
9 surprise me if because the Crozer
10 Medic Unit is shutting down in
11 Delaware County, that at the last
12 minute they'll come stomping
13 through these doors and saying,
14 well, Philadelphia, you did not
15 consider in that Bill 240999 the
16 fact that medics will be needed.

17 And also lastly to say,
18 that regarding Resolution 240612
19 include review of any highway
20 restrictions conflicting with
21 County line jurisdictions that
22 impose upon Philadelphia residents
23 and to review inadequate
24 transportation options due to
25 canceled lines into staggering

2 timelines. Thank you very much.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Melody Wong,
5 Anthony Wyatt, Denise Ross and
6 Wanda Walker.

7 (Witnesses approached
8 podium.)

9 MS. WONG: Hello. I'm
10 Melody Wong. I live in West
11 Philadelphia. I've been a lifelong
12 Chinatown community member. My
13 parents arrived in Chinatown in the
14 1970s. I've worked, volunteered
15 and have been an active member in
16 the community since. My parents
17 instilled in me we need to remember
18 where we got our start. Therefore,
19 I oppose Resolution 241000.

20 I am a card-carrying Union
21 member and understand the
22 importance of unions and jobs, but
23 an arena built anywhere in the city
24 will still provide union jobs. It
25 doesn't have to come at the cost of

2 a historically and strategically
3 undervalued community. We are
4 witnessing the strategic
5 undervaluing of our community today
6 with a proposal of this arena.
7 Profits over community and profits
8 over people, is that really who we
9 are, Philadelphia?

10 In the regards to the NID,
11 I was once mainstream manager of
12 Chinatown and one of the goals was
13 to form a NID in Chinatown. After
14 talking to property and business
15 owners, the plan did not succeed
16 because the community does not want
17 it. A few years later the NID for
18 north of Vine was proposed, also
19 shot down.

20 Furthermore, why is
21 Chinatown not part of Center City
22 District? Because the community
23 doesn't want it. Something I still
24 remember during those oppositions
25 is the community chanting no

2 taxation without representation.

3 And to many, the NID is a proposal

4 as additional taxation without

5 proper representation.

6 I am just one voice here,

7 but there are many who you have

8 heard that feel exactly the same as

9 me today. I implore you,

10 Councilmembers, consider the

11 people, your constituents. The

12 majority of people don't want this.

13 Thank you for your time.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Anthony

16 Wyatt, Denise Ross, Wanda Walker

17 and Phillip Lockett.

18 (Witnesses approached

19 podium.)

20 MR. WATT: Good morning.

21 I'm Anthony Wyatt, Community

22 Engagement supervisor at CEO,

23 Office of Community Empowerment

24 Opportunity. I along with my

25 Co-supervisor Andre Cheney under

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the direction of Robin Walker, our
3 Deputy Director, we were charged
4 with leading our Philly Counts
5 canvassing team on the Overdose
6 Response Project. We're the team
7 that knocked on over 100,000 doors
8 in the city.

9 (Applause.)

10 MR. WATTS: I know a lot of
11 you came out and walked with us and
12 knocked on some of the doors with
13 us in your areas and some outside
14 of your areas that you are charged
15 with covering, but we're going to
16 keep this effort going. We've
17 gotten some people in recovery,
18 some people would say they're
19 ready, but they're not really
20 ready.

21 We get their information
22 and later we found out that, hey,
23 that person did actually go in, you
24 know. We've had parents tell us
25 that my son, I want y'all to talk

2 to my son, like they did with
3 Denise Ross who's going to speak
4 after me. We doing this work and
5 we definitely need everybody to
6 help. We're going to educate the
7 community on these overdoses that
8 are happening outside of
9 Kensington.

10 People are dying in their
11 homes. They're buying them
12 wherever they're getting them from
13 and they're going home and dying.
14 So we have to get these harm
15 reduction kits in every household.
16 Like it was said earlier, you have
17 these in your household just like
18 you have aspirin or your Tylenol.
19 You don't take it every day, but
20 you use it when you need it.

21 So we have in our home
22 reduction kits, we have Narcan, we
23 have Fentanyl test strips. We have
24 resource material that the City has
25 to offer that a lot of people in

2 our communities don't have access
3 to. So we're going to keep going
4 door-to-door knocking. And when
5 you see us out there, if you want
6 to come out and join us, you can
7 come and contact the Office of
8 Community Empowerment Opportunity.
9 You can come and walk with us and
10 see what it's like.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Denise Ross,
13 Wanda Walker, Phillip Lockett.
14 Then Ogbonna Hagins.

15 (Witnesses approached
16 podium.)

17 MS. ROSS: Good morning.
18 My name is Denise Ross and I'm just
19 piggybacking off of my supervisor
20 Anthony Wyatt. I am a foot
21 soldier. I am one of the people
22 that knocked on over those 100,000
23 doors. Educating people is very
24 important. I go out, every day I
25 knock on doors. I speak to

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 individuals, even those individuals
3 that do not believe that they have
4 family members that have some type
5 of addiction or problem.

6 And it's not about them. I
7 educate them and I school them and
8 let them know that it doesn't have
9 to be a family member, but we all
10 have family members. Maybe you
11 don't know about it, but they are
12 using some form of substance. I
13 educate them. I teach them on how
14 to use the Narcan. I educate them
15 on how to use the Fentanyl test
16 strips, which are very important.
17 Because you can't stop the drug
18 usage, but at least we can stop the
19 dying here in the city of
20 Philadelphia with so many people
21 that are dying from overdosing.

22 So what we're here to do is
23 try to do preventive measurements.
24 And moving forward, just help as
25 many people as possible. We'll

2 continue knocking on those doors.
3 We'll continue speaking to people
4 and we'll continue to get the
5 message out so that we can know to
6 let Philadelphia count.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Wanda Walker,
9 Phillip Lockett, Ogbonna Hagins and
10 David Alexander Jenkins.

11 MS. WALKER: Good morning,
12 beautiful people. My name is Wanda
13 Walker. And I'm going to ask how
14 right before it's time to vote are
15 you all so arrogant and cocky that
16 you're going to tell people they
17 only have one minute to speak? It
18 wouldn't matter if it took until 4
19 or 5 o'clock. You should want to
20 hear your citizens. This is a
21 serious topic and we don't have all
22 the answers and you're trying to
23 shove something down our throat.
24 People, you all need to
25 remember this come election day.

2 It is 17 City Councilpeople in here
3 and 14 of them are Democrats. All
4 you have to do is start voting
5 differently, then they'll listen.
6 That's one way we can do it. Now,
7 I'm going to come here every single
8 Thursday like I said before, don't
9 really want to be here, but we need
10 to talk about our seniors.

11 Philadelphia used to be
12 number one in Black homeownership.
13 Now, we're not. We're the number
14 one poorest big city. We need to
15 stop this. If you can pay a
16 mortgage for 30 years and taxes for
17 30 years, there should be something
18 on the books that says seniors
19 don't have to pay taxes, period.
20 Nobody's property should be getting
21 taken.

22 We should also have a
23 moratorium on all sales until more
24 investigations are done as how
25 these houses are being taken from

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 people. Most of our wealth is held
3 with our seniors so it's very
4 important to protect our seniors,
5 like Ray Johnson at 17th and
6 Christian.

7 This stuff has to stop.
8 These people are saying they don't
9 want something, you're not
10 listening. So we're not going to
11 vote for you come next time it's
12 time to have an election. And this
13 is pretty much all I have to say
14 because this is ridiculous saying
15 the same thing and y'all aren't
16 listening. Like how are so many
17 people getting this upset and then
18 you're limiting how much someone
19 can express themselves.

20 We're paying for parking.
21 We're taking off from work. We're
22 coming down here and y'all really
23 aren't hearing us. Now, it might
24 be a good idea but until you prove
25 it to us, the answer's no

1 10/31/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 overwhelmingly. And as far as
3 properties stop, every single week
4 I come here y'all are giving out 50
5 or more properties to the Land
6 Bank, like make it makes sense.
7 And the taxes are going up. You
8 run on one thing and then do
9 another. We're tired of you.
10 We're going to start voting
11 differently.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Phillip
14 Lockett, Ogbonna Hagins, David
15 Alexander Jenkins.

16 (Witnesses approached
17 podium.)

18 MR. LOCKETT: Good morning,
19 Council President and good morning
20 to Council. My name is Phillip
21 Freedman Lockett. And I'm here to
22 give kudos to my Councilwoman Cindy
23 Bass for Bill 240724. She put some
24 teeth in that bill to help us
25 seniors down here who's fighting to

2 stay in our homes. We got a lot of
3 seniors that's falling by the
4 wayside because the powers that be
5 is overtaking us. And I give her a
6 round of applause for that bill
7 that she introduced.

8 Also, I want to just
9 mention Bill 240992. Councilman
10 O'Rourke went way beyond the call
11 of duty and he called up Congress
12 to recommend immediate money for
13 the hurricane victims down South.
14 Well, he need to do the same thing
15 for the Freedmen. We got
16 devastation all over the place
17 because we're out of our status.

18 And I can't believe that we
19 can get one Councilperson to talk
20 to Congress about a concern Down
21 South but can't get one to pick up
22 the (inaudible) for the Freedmen.
23 So I'm going to ask him again could
24 he help us out to get this powerful
25 legislation on the book so we can

2 get started. And I thank you all
3 for the day and I'm going to leave
4 you alone so y'all can come back
5 next Thursday.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna
7 Hagins and then David Alexander
8 Jenkins.

9 MR. HAGINS: Good morning.
10 Ogbonna Hagins, fourth generation
11 chattel slavery survivor. Ladies
12 and gentlemen, we stand at a
13 crucial critical point. The 2024
14 Presidential election has become a
15 diddy party for big money donors,
16 whether Democrat or Republican. It
17 doesn't matter. American Freedmen
18 will be left behind once again.

19 Neither party is interested
20 in completing the work of
21 reconstruction. There's no urgency
22 to define and outlaw the badges,
23 vestiges and incidents of slavery.
24 Councilmember Bass' Resolution
25 240724 highlights the need for

2 Pennsylvania to strengthen the
3 enforcement against illegal
4 merchants, their activities which
5 devastates our neighborhoods in
6 Philadelphia.

7 Yet both parties are too
8 focused on the interest of the
9 elite to prioritize those urgent
10 issues. Both parties misuse the
11 14th Amendment allowing immigrants
12 to exploit birthright citizenship
13 instead of the children of enslaved
14 mothers. This further marginalized
15 the Freedmen community and neither
16 party will secure reparations we
17 deserve.

18 Today I invite all American
19 Freedmen and those who support the
20 ideals of Charles Sumner to join
21 the new political movement, a new
22 political movement Reconstruction
23 2.0. No more Democrats, no more
24 Republicans. Let us say no to both
25 major parties. Let's focus on our

11 educators. Is anyone else hearing
12 a correlation here? Today we saw
13 the power of what investment in
14 education does with the NAACP's
15 presentation and what the effects

18 less than legal behavior amongst us
19 in a resolution from Councilmember
20 Bass.

21 Our guests from the city of
22 London will recall the words of the
23 great Thomas Moore. If you suffer
24 your people to be ill-educated and
25 corrupt their manners from infancy

12 programs recognize the ongoing fear
13 of the war on drugs instilled in
14 Black and Brown communities. Many
15 people in our communities avoid
16 seeking services because they are
17 afraid of outing themselves as drug
18 users and they don't want to risk
19 arrest, incarceration and family
20 separation.

21 To counter this fear, the
22 canvassing program centers on
23 private nonjudgmental conversation
24 that brings resources and
25 information directly to people's

2 doors. This innovative approach
3 was recently recognized by the
4 White House as a national model for
5 combating the overdose crisis,
6 making Philadelphia a leader in our
7 country's continued effort to save
8 lives and address racial

11 can't continue the same failed
12 policies of the past and expect new
13 or different outcomes. We must
14 address this crisis with
15 innovative, evidence-based
16 solutions that respect people's
17 dignity, humanity and lived
18 experiences.

19 According to recent data,
20 overdose deaths have dropped
21 significantly in the past year.
22 But this good news does not extend
23 to all groups. Among older Black
24 men, fatal overdoses have increased
25 fivefold over the past decade and

3 than the national average. In
4 other words, the same people who
5 were targeted during the war on
6 drugs are now suffering from the

13 Unit for jumping into action when
14 my office reached out for

21 more and more stories like Albert's
22 in the future. He didn't get a

25 democracy on Wednesday to step into

2 our power. And the expectations
3 that have been raised, maybe
4 sometimes framed by media, on Black
5 men would be reciprocated in
6 service to Black men after election
7 day.

8 No matter who wins we have
9 a lot of work to do to build a
10 stronger country, stronger
11 Commonwealth, even a stronger city.
12 Actually on that point, let me just
13 say that today we kickstarted again
14 the arena-sized elephant in the
15 room. And let me just say that
16 we're being asked to kickstart the
17 procedures that bring this body
18 closer to approving an arena that
19 has not had enough public input,
20 that we still have many commonsense
21 questions about some of which were
22 spoken and given voice to over the
23 last two weeks, and that frankly
24 for many folks clearly is a bad
25 deal for the city. And I cannot

2 support that. So that is the
3 reason why I did vote no today.

4 People are as always in our
5 system appealing to democratic
6 consent. That's not just voting.
7 That is the engagement, the civic
8 engagement that gives democracy its
9 full body. In this election season
10 especially we need more of that.
11 And so, I hope that we are learning
12 how to be democratic and remember
13 that this is what democracy looks
14 like.

15 Thank you, Council
16 President.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

19 Thank you very much.

20 Any speeches on behalf of
21 the Majority?

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Harrity.

24 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank
25 you, Council President.

2 Just real quick, happy
3 birthday again to you. But I do
4 not want to get in trouble. Today
5 is my wife's birthday and she is
6 here in the room. So please join
7 me in wishing her a happy birthday.
8 I will not divulge her age. I
9 don't want to tell her I had her
10 three years younger though when I
11 was picking out the candles until I
12 called her daughter who informed me
13 that I missed three years along the
14 line somewhere, but that's just me.
15 Appreciate everybody. And happy
16 birthday, baby.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Okay. Smart man.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

21 Happy birthday, Marnie.

22 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
23 you, Council President.

24 First, I'd like to begin by
25 saying thank you to all of you and

2 to others who have reached out to
3 me along the course of the last
4 several weeks with words of
5 encouragement as I work alongside
6 with many other Latino leaders in
7 the 7th Council District and across
8 the city of Philadelphia to
9 increase Latino voter participation
10 in our city, of Puerto Ricans
11 specifically, right.

12 I want to say thank you.
13 Sometimes this path kind of feels
14 lonely, but I'm grateful to all of
15 you who have reached out and to all
16 of those who are doing extra work
17 during this time to make sure that
18 voter participation increases in
19 our city and across the
20 Commonwealth.

21 Puerto Ricans are here.
22 We're here to stay. And so, Puerto
23 Ricans --

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Our

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 island is a beautiful place to
3 visit. Some amazing people come
4 from our island. And for those of
5 you who think that my island is a
6 garbage can, I'm going to refrain
7 from telling you what I feel and
8 how I feel, but you should know
9 that Puerto Ricans will show up on
10 November 5th.

11 In addition to that, I'd
12 like to invite all of you --

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: And I
15 want to say -- before I move
16 forward, I want to say that there
17 are a lot of people on the other
18 side that I really, really, really
19 respect and have huge admiration
20 for. And so, please don't think
21 that I believe that everyone falls
22 in that same bucket, right. My
23 love for you is still there.

24 I'd like to invite all of
25 you to join me for Justice Day on

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 November 19th. Since I've opened
3 the District Office in the
4 Frankford community, I've had
5 people walk in who are re-entering
6 into society and who have shared
7 with my staff and the challenges
8 that they experience after
9 re-entering into society around
10 homes, finding housing and
11 education and just an opportunity
12 to be able to move forward.

13 And so, we decided that we
14 would have a day where we could
15 partner with our colleagues at the
16 federal and state level and hear
17 from them directly what their
18 challenges are and work together in
19 a real collaborative way to figure
20 out how we connect those who are
21 re-entering a real opportunity.

22 And so, I'd like to thank
23 Councilmember O'Rourke and
24 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas for
25 your partnership on this. And I

2 really look forward to a great
3 discussion, but more so a real
4 opportunity to connect folks with
5 resources. Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Thank you very much.

8 The Chair recognizes

9 Councilmember Rue Landau.

10 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: Thank

11 you, Council President. Happy

12 belated birthday to you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Thank you. Appreciate it.

15 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: I

16 want to thank all of the organizers

17 from the Sunrise Movement

18 Philadelphia for coming out today.

19 It was an honor to recognize them.

20 They're a group that embodies the

21 spirit and hope for a sustainable

22 future.

23 Their work in confronting

24 the climate crisis is an

25 inspiration and today we celebrate

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 their tireless efforts in fighting
3 for a more equitable, sustainable
4 and vibrant city that all
5 Philadelphians can call home.

6 Their advocacy has reshaped how
7 Philadelphia thinks about climate
8 justice and community welfare.

9 This past year Sunrise
10 played a key role in promoting
11 State Representative Fiedler's
12 Solar for Schools bill, which aims
13 to help schools across our state
14 fund solar panel installations.
15 It's a meaningful step forward
16 toward making clean energy
17 accessible to all and a testament
18 to the positive changes that local
19 advocacy can achieve.

20 I also want to just take a
21 second to address the two
22 resolutions around the proposed
23 arena that were put forth today. I
24 do feel like there was a lot of
25 confusion by the public and part of

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 this is the speed at which this is
3 moving. These are significant
4 proposals that are being put forth
5 to us, and I think we need to make
6 sure that there is meaningful time
7 to discuss them.

8 I for one also have not
9 taken a position on the arena yet.
10 But to be clear, I need
11 significantly more information
12 about it to make a final
13 determination and vote. I remain
14 steadfastly committed to ask
15 questions of and get answers from
16 the Parker Administration, the
17 Sixers organization and other
18 stakeholders before making a final
19 decision. We must ensure that
20 vulnerable communities are heard
21 and protected and that they and the
22 larger public have a say in a
23 project that, if approved, would
24 significantly impact the entire
25 city.

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Finally, as I promised last
3 week I want to take a moment to
4 encourage everyone to please vote.
5 The last chance to vote is on
6 Tuesday, November 5th until
7 8:00 p.m. and the voices of
8 Pennsylvanians will make a lasting
9 impact on the whole nation. It's
10 not simply a matter of who is the
11 one leading us but making sure that
12 we exercise our democracy when
13 given the opportunity. Make sure
14 you get out to vote.

15 Final reminder to
16 colleagues, there's a briefing from
17 Habitat for Humanity waiting for us
18 across the hall so we can learn
19 about their great housing work.
20 And to my colleague Quetcy Lozada,
21 Viva Puerto Rico. I'm with you.

22 (Applause.)

24 Thank you very much.

25 The Chair recognizes

3 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank

4 you, Council President. Let me

5 again say publicly happy birthday

6 to you. You are 51 and a day.

7 Aww, man, I put it out there,

8 didn't I. Well, you know it's on

9 Wikipedia too somewhere. All

10 right. I'm done. I'm done. Y'all

11 got me going.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Laughter is good for the soul.

14 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: All

15 right. I just had to say this. I

16 just, you know, this -- I can't

17 even remember what I want to say.

18 All right. This is serious

19 business. All right. So with that

20 being said, I really want folks to

21 know that I represent

22 Philadelphia's 9th District. And

23 having worked in the 9th District,

24 I have observed and read about the

25 history and connected with people

2 like John White, Jr., actually
3 worked with and mentored by Marian
4 Tasco, and many people know that I
5 have worked closely and been
6 supported and mentored by Cherelle
7 Parker.

8 I just want folks to know
9 the following: That there's been
10 conversations around our sanitation
11 workers and our 33 Union, and I
12 want you to know that not only do I
13 understand the importance of
14 working, making sure there's a fair
15 contract for our sanitation
16 workers, our Mayor undoubtedly
17 knows that. And I have full faith,
18 full trust more so than more people
19 than I know in our District who
20 knows her thoroughly.

21 She truly cares about our
22 sanitation workers and our blue
23 collar workers. And I know and I'm
24 confident that a deal is going to
25 get done that everyone's going to

2 be happy about, and she wants it
3 more than anybody else so I'm
4 looking forward to that. And I
5 just want the public to know to
6 have confidence in that and support
7 her in that regard.

8 I also want to note that
9 even on today's resolutions, yes,
10 there will be more conversations.
11 Our Mayor is open to those
12 conversations. Our Council
13 President is open to those
14 conversations because he's been
15 getting some ends on this too for
16 whatever reason.

17 But I just want you to know
18 our Mayor is open to this. And I
19 trust that our Mayor has a strong
20 plan and we're going to get this
21 done right. So for our public
22 workers and also for the arena,
23 we're going to do the right thing
24 regardless when this happens.

25 And just to remember that

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 there was a strong contingency of
3 people who supported her to become
4 Mayor and they still trust her and
5 we do too. So we're going to make
6 sure that we find ways to bring
7 everybody together to make this
8 work, and I'm looking forward to
9 seeing how this comes about.

10 Thank you, Council
11 President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Thank you very much.

14 Jamie, your light was on
15 and went off. Would you like to be
16 acknowledged?

17 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: No.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

19 Okay.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

22 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank
23 you, Council President.

24 I just want to take a
25 moment to thank the colleagues who

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 I was sworn in with, Councilmember
3 Gauthier, Councilmember Gilmore
4 Richardson and Councilmember
5 Brooks. We might have a lot of
6 different things on our plate right
7 now, but every once in a while we
8 still come together for different
9 initiatives. And this morning we
10 came together for something that I
11 think is really important to
12 democracy.

13 A lot of people in the city
14 of Philadelphia are not talking
15 about the fact that we have
16 thousands of people in the city of
17 Philadelphia who think that they've
18 cast their vote in this November's
19 election. And the reality is their
20 vote is flawed. Today we stood
21 together to encourage the citizens
22 of Philadelphia to check the
23 Commissioner's website.

24 We gave a QR code that
25 people can scan. And even if you

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 haven't voted yet, there may be a
3 name on that list that you
4 recognize that you can call to let
5 them know that their ballot is
6 flawed, it needs to be cured and
7 they need to go to the closest
8 satellite office, which also
9 includes City Hall between now and
10 election day to put themselves in a
11 position where their vote will
12 actually count.

13 Black people, people of
14 color are three times more likely
15 to have a flawed ballot than our
16 White counterparts. We've seen the
17 biggest issues as it relates to
18 these ballots that need to be cured
19 being a missing signature and/or a
20 missing date. So something as
21 small as that for those who decided
22 to vote by mail can put people in a
23 position where their vote might not
24 necessarily be counted.

25 We also know based on the

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 number of ballots that were
3 requested through the
4 Commissioner's Office that a lot of
5 them, over 100,000 ballots, have
6 not yet been returned which is
7 significantly lower than our
8 numbers in 2020 this time during
9 that election.

10 So with that being said,
11 Council President, we just want to
12 make sure that people understand
13 the importance of this issue.
14 Please check the City
15 Commissioner's website. Make sure
16 that you make a plan to vote if you
17 haven't voted. And if you did vote
18 by mail, make sure your vote
19 counts. Check the website, check
20 the QR code, put yourself in a
21 position to help further democracy.

22 Thank you, Council
23 President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
25 Thank you very much.

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

4 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
5 you, Mr. President.

6 I want to echo the
7 sentiments of my colleague
8 Councilmember Kendra Brooks in
9 honor of Philly Counts. That
10 initiative that they've -- I want
11 to congratulate them as well. That
12 initiative is something that's very
13 close to me. I've always been
14 public about the drug use in my
15 family. Always been public about
16 the fact that one of my childhood
17 friends, a Black man, 38, overdosed
18 recently this past year.

19 And so, that is a very
20 important issue in the Black
21 community that we must meet head-on
22 and stop trying to run and hide
23 from the fact that it's our
24 community who is dying at
25 disproportionate rates from drug

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 overdoses.

3 I want to echo the
4 sentiments of Councilmember Isaiah
5 Thomas when it comes to the mail-in
6 ballot issue. We received this
7 information, my office has taken
8 upon itself to reach out to
9 individuals that are in the 5th
10 Council District that we received
11 the information that their mail-in
12 ballots has some deficiency. So
13 we've been calling the folks that
14 we have phone numbers for.

15 We're also going to be
16 sending letters out to the folks as
17 well, so we encourage everyone to
18 reach out to the Commissioner's
19 Office if you have filed for a
20 mail-in ballot, to make sure that
21 your mail-in ballot is correct.

22 There are a couple of
23 initiatives tonight. I say Happy
24 Halloween. I have a 6-year-old so
25 we're going trick-or-treating

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 tonight. And so, we're going to
3 have fun in the community tonight.
4 And I just want to put on the
5 record a couple of events in North
6 Philadelphia if you have younger
7 children and you want a safe place
8 to go to trick-or-treat and get
9 candy.

10 The 2,000 block of Ridge
11 Avenue where the grocery outlet is,
12 in that parking lot they're having
13 a trunk-or-treat there. 18th and
14 Girard there's a trunk-or-treat in
15 partnership with St Joe's Prep
16 that's there. On Cecil B. Moore
17 Avenue between Broad and 17th, some
18 of those stores will be
19 participating in trick-or-treating
20 with the help of a Beech Interplex,
21 and also at 23rd and Berks at the
22 Helen Brown Community Center
23 there's also some trick-or-treating
24 events there.

25 I want to stand in

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 solidarity as Chair of the Streets
3 and Services Committee and Vice-
4 Chair of Transportation and Public
5 Utilities, I want to stand in
6 solidarity with AFSCME District
7 Council 33. I'm wearing my AFSCME
8 pin today for their right to seek a
9 fair contract, and also with TWU
10 Local 234 and their right to seek a
11 fair contract as well. Both of
12 those unions play a significant
13 role in keeping our city going and
14 keeping our city moving, so we want
15 to make sure that we are supportive
16 of them and their members.

17 And finally, tomorrow will
18 be a grand opening of my
19 neighborhood satellite office.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Yes,
22 thank you. It's at 2815 Ridge
23 Avenue, which is in the plaza where
24 Dollar General is, Sedgley Plaza.
25 It's just significant for me

1 10/31/24 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 because this office is literally
3 two blocks away from the
4 projects -- well, excuse me, the
5 public housing where my maternal
6 and paternal grandmothers lived,
7 right. And so, it is very
8 important for me to do this for
9 that community, so I hope you all
10 can show out. Tomorrow from
11 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. we'll be at
12 Sedgley Plaza at Ridge and Sedgley.

13 So thank you, Council
14 President.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 Thank you very much.

18 As there are no more
19 speeches, just as we move forward
20 we won't be here next Thursday due
21 to the election so we'll be here
22 the following Thursday. And then
23 we'll actually begin the actual
24 real process of moving forward and
25 having the opportunity to address

2 the proposal regarding the arena.

3 The process is set up

4 similar to how our budget process

5 from 10:00 to 4:00 every day, so I

6 expect for everyone to attend and

11 we have a tech team that if anyone

12 needs any assistance in terms of

13 evaluating the process, actually

14 evaluating the proposal, they are

15 at your disposal to help you and

16 your staff take apart the proposal

17 to answer your issues and address

18 your concerns and to come up with

19 recommendations.

20 Some members have actually

21 did their homework and actually

22 provided recommendations in terms

23 of what they wanted to actually see

24 in terms of this proposal in terms

25 of the actual process. And so, I

1 10/31/24 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT
2 just encourage everyone in terms of
3 the actual process whether you're
4 for or against to do your due
5 diligence in terms of you and your
6 team, but also we have a tech team
7 to help you address your issues and
8 concerns regarding this process.

9 But we expect after
10 vacation to come back with a very,
11 very robust discussion regarding
12 this particular proposal. But this
13 is democracy in action. And thank
14 you for your birthday well wishes.
15 Everyone have a good one.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas for a
18 motion to adjourn.

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank
20 you, Council President.

21 I move that Council stands
22 adjourned until Thursday, November
23 14, 2024 at 10:00 a.m.

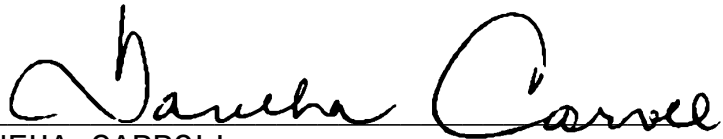

Amending Chapter 12-1100 ("Miscellaneous Regulations and Penalties") and Chapter 12-2800 ("Administrative Adjudication of Parking Violations") of The Philadelphia Code, making revisions to disability parking space standards and procedures, creating an application process for residential disability parking spaces limited for use by a specific person with disability, creating a new administrative hearing process, and amending applicable penalties.

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 12-1117 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Physically Handicapped and Disability or Severely Disability Veteran Parking" is deleted in its entirety and replaced by the following:

§ 12-1117. Designation and use of Disability Parking Spaces.

(1) Definitions.

(a) Disability parking permit. A registration plate or placard issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation as provided in 75 Pa. C.S. § 1338 (relating to person with disability plate and placard) or 75 Pa. C.S. § 1342 (a), (b), or (c) (relating to veteran plate and placard), as amended.

(b) Person with disability. The current and valid holder of a disability parking permit.

(c) Disability parking space. An on-street or off-street parking space reserved for any vehicle bearing or displaying a disability parking permit.

(d) Parking Authority. The Philadelphia Parking Authority.

*(e) Residential disability parking space. An on-street parking space reserved for a specific disability parking ~~permit~~ **permit on the block where the person with disability resides.***

(2) Disability parking spaces - generally.

(a) *Disability parking spaces shall be located as close as practicable to educational institutions, government buildings, hospitals, medical centers, cultural institutions, and recreational facilities.*

(b) *On-street disability parking spaces may not be designated where on-street parking is prohibited by ordinance or by the Vehicle Code.*

(c) *On each side of each hundred block on which there is metered parking, one disability parking space shall be located as close as possible to an accessible curb ramp, marked by signs at both ends of the space showing the international symbol of accessibility. Parking at each disability parking space shall be regulated by a parking meter that has no moving parts, handles or thumb slides and shall be limited to vehicles that are bearing a disability parking permit and being operated by or for the transportation of a person with disability. Such vehicles shall comply with all parking prohibitions, including, but not limited to, snow emergency, street cleaning, or resident parking provisions.*

(d) *When a vehicle identifiable as a wheelchair lift-equipped van is being operated by or for the transportation of a **disabled** disability person, the vehicle may be parked without limitation as to time and without payment of any parking meter fees on streets where parking is limited but not prohibited by ordinance or by the Vehicle Code. Such vehicles shall comply with all parking prohibitions, including, but not limited to, snow emergency, street cleaning, or resident parking provisions.*

(e) *Each disability parking permit shall be prominently displayed on the vehicle so that it is easily observable from the street or sidewalk.*

(f) *A person may not park a vehicle in a disability parking space unless that vehicle lawfully bears a disability parking permit and is being either driven by or used to transport a ~~disability person~~ **person with disability**. A person who parks in violation of this paragraph shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 12-2809.*

(.1) *A person who parks a vehicle bearing or displaying a disability parking permit in a disability parking space when the vehicle is not being driven by or used to transport a disability person does so fraudulently and shall be subject to the enhanced penalties set forth in Section 12-2809.*

(g) *A person may not park a vehicle in a disability parking space while displaying a replica or counterfeit disability parking permit. A person who parks in violation of this paragraph shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 12-2809.*

(h) ~~*Each disability parking space authorized in a residential area before January 1, 2025, will expire two years from the date the original application was approved or December 31, 2027, whichever is first to occur.*~~

~~(i) — An application to reauthorize a disability parking space in a residential area into a residential disability parking space or to reauthorize a residential disability parking space before January 1, 2025, may be submitted to the Parking Authority as provided in this Section not sooner than 90 days prior to the date of expiration or July 1, 2025, whichever is last to occur.~~

~~(j) — Except as provided in subsection (k), the non-refundable application fee for a Disability Parking Space shall be fifty dollars (\$50), unless increased by regulation of the Department of Streets.~~

~~(k) — Notwithstanding the other provisions of this Section, low-income individuals shall not be required to pay the application fee required by this subsection. The Revenue Department shall promulgate regulations to determine the eligibility guidelines for low-income individuals for purposes of this subsection.~~

(3) Residential disability parking spaces.

(a) A person with disability, or their authorized agent, may request a residential disability parking space by submitting an application to the Parking Authority that includes the following information:

- (.1) the nature and use of adjacent buildings;
- (.2) the availability and proximity of off-street parking;
- (.3) proof of the applicant's residence on the subject block;
- (.4) proof that the vehicle to be parked in the requested residential disability parking space is registered to the applicant at the address identified pursuant to subsection 12-1117(3)(a)(.3). The Department of **Streets** may promulgate regulations providing for alternate requirements in the case of applications submitted on behalf of a minor person or a person otherwise unable to own and register a motor vehicle;
- (.5) confirmation that the vehicle to be parked in the requested residential disability parking space displays a current and valid person with disability plate pursuant to 75 Pa. C.S. § 1338 or severely disability veteran plate pursuant to 75 Pa. C.S. § 1342(a);
- (.6) such other information as the Parking Authority, Department of Streets, and/or the Department of Health may require.

(b) Applications will be evaluated based on: the applicant's medical need for a residential disability parking space, including factors identified in 75 Pa. C.S. § 1338(a); feasibility of on-street parking and traffic operations; and compliance with other legal limitations or restrictions. The Department of Streets may promulgate regulations providing for additional need-based factors and the process for review.

(c) Except as provided in subsection (d), the non-refundable application fee for a residential disability parking space shall be fifty dollars (\$50), unless increased by regulation of the Department of Streets. The Department of Streets shall review the application fee every two years to determine an appropriate increase.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Section, an individual determined to be low-income pursuant to eligibility criteria established by regulation of the Revenue Department shall not be required to pay the application fee for a residential disability parking space.

(e) Upon approval of the application, a residential disability parking space shall be designated at the approved location by a parking sign that identifies the Pennsylvania license plate number and disability parking permit number authorized to park and indicates that all other vehicles are prohibited from parking in the designated space.

~~(f)~~ (f) A person may not park a vehicle in a residential disability parking space unless the vehicle lawfully bears the disability parking permit designated for that space. A person who parks in violation of this paragraph shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 12-2809.

~~(g)~~ (g) A person whose application for a residential disability parking space is denied may request a hearing to contest the denial pursuant to subsection (5). If no hearing is requested, the denial is upheld after hearing, or the application is otherwise adjudicated to be denied, the applicant who submitted the denied application for a residential disability parking space may not submit a new application for the same residence for at least one year.

(h) Each disability parking space authorized in a residential area before July 1, 2025, will expire five years from the date the original application was approved and on the date of expiration become eligible for conversion to a residential disability parking space.

(i) An application to convert a disability parking space in a residential area to a residential disability parking space may be submitted to the Parking Authority as provided in this Section not sooner than 90 days prior to the date of expiration.

person with disability person identified in the application ceases to reside at the applicable residence, or residence; the date the person with disability person is no longer qualified for a residential disability parking space, whichever is first to occur. space; or the date the person with disability becomes deceased. The failure of the Parking Authority or Department to remove associated parking signs shall not be deemed to authorize a residential disability parking space that has expired pursuant to this subsection.

(g) (k) An application to reauthorize a residential disability parking space may be submitted to the Parking Authority not sooner than 90 days prior to the date of expiration. A vehicle lawfully bearing the disability parking permit designated for a residential disability parking space may not park in another space on the same unit block, unless, for reasons outside the vehicle owner's control, the designated residential disability parking space is blocked or otherwise unavailable for use. A person who parks in violation of this paragraph shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 12-2809.

(4) Administration.

(a) The Department of Streets may promulgate such rules and regulations as are necessary or desirable to effectuate the purpose of this Section.

(b) The Police Department, in its discretion, may limit or temporarily suspend any of the parking privileges specified in this Section to cover emergencies or special events and may impose any other restriction deemed necessary in the interest of traffic safety and traffic control.

(c) The Parking Authority may initiate an investigation to determine the continuing need for a disability parking space authorized by this Section at any time. Upon determination of a lack of need or other change in circumstances, the Parking Authority shall provide notice of discontinuance of the residential parking space to the address associated with the original application or in the event the original application information is unavailable, the address immediately adjacent to the disability parking space and remove applicable signs.

(5) Request for a Hearing.

(a) This subsection shall apply to residential disability parking space applications submitted to the Parking Authority on or after January 1, 2025.

(b) The Parking Authority is authorized to appoint hearing officers to administratively adjudicate requests for hearings related to this Section. Hearing officers appointed pursuant to this paragraph may adjudicate such other matters related to this Title as may be determined by the Director of Finance.

(e) Upon denial of an application under this Section, the applicant may, within 30 days of the mailing date of the notice, request a hearing to contest the denial by written request submitted to the Parking Authority.
