21 And our next order of business
22 is communications, and I would ask the

3 CHIEF CLERK: From the Mayor to
4 the President and members of the Council
5 of the City of Philadelphia, pursuant to
6 Sections 4-604 and 2-307 of the Home Rule
7 Charter, I am today transmitting to the
8 Council the recommendation of the City
9 Planning Commission on the following
10 bills: Bill Nos. 220005 and 220052.

11 And I am pleased to advise you
12 that on February 25, 2022, I signed the
13 following bills which were passed by
14 Council at its session on February 24,
15 2022: Bill Nos. 220001, 220002, and
16 220077.

17 And I am transmitting for the
18 consideration of your honorable body a
19 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
20 Land Bank to assign 2032 East Lehigh
21 Avenue located in the First Councilmanic
22 District; and

23 A resolution authorizing the
24 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority to
25 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia

2 Land Bank deeds conveying title to 2609
3 through 27 Sears Street, 3014 through 26

9 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
10 Land Bank deeds conveying title to
11 various properties located in the Third
12 Councilmanic District, including on the
13 following streets: Brandywine Street,
14 Olive Street, Melon Street, North
15 Shedwick Street, Wallace Street, North
16 33rd Street, and North 35th Street; and

17 A resolution authorizing the
18 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority to
19 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
20 Land Bank deeds conveying title to

22 Councilmanic District, including on the
23 following streets: Monument Street,
24 North Sydenham Street, and North 31st
25 Street; and

3 amendment to The Philadelphia Home Rule
4 Charter to create the Department of
5 Aviation, to transfer the functions of
6 certain City agencies with respect to the

10 and

11 An ordinance providing for the
12 submission to the qualified electors of
13 the City of Philadelphia of an amendment
14 to The Philadelphia Home Rule Charter to
15 create the Department of Aviation, to
16 transfer the functions of certain City
17 agencies with respect to the operations
18 of the City's airports to the
19 newly-created Department and to provide
20 for additional duties of the Department,
21 as approved by Resolution of the City
22 Council; fixing the date of a special
23 election for such purpose; prescribing
24 the form of ballot question to be voted
25 on; and, authorizing the appropriate

10 costs incurred in reviewing plans for and
11 constructing ADA-compliant sidewalks, all
12 under certain terms and conditions.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.
15 Appreciate it.

16 And our next order of business
17 is the introduction of bills and
18 resolutions. And by way of a reminder,
19 we are asking that all resolutions,
20 including privileged resolutions, be
21 placed on the Final Passage Calendar for
22 the next session of Council, unless they
23 are being referred to committee. In our
24 current remote environment, this
25 procedure will provide an appropriate

2 opportunity for the public comment.

3 I'd like to thank you in
4 advance for your anticipated cooperation.

5 Mr. Decker, please read the
6 titles of the legislation that is being
7 offered today by our members.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Yes,
9 Mr. President.

10 Councilwoman Parker offers one
11 bill and three resolutions. On behalf of
12 Council President Clarke, an ordinance
13 amending Chapter 21-1100 of The
14 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Community
15 Development," by adding new provisions
16 related to workforce housing programs,
17 amending the applicability period, and
18 making other technical changes.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Referred to committee.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And on her own
22 behalf, a resolution congratulating Judge
23 Ketanji Brown Jackson on her historic
24 nomination to the Supreme Court of the
25 United States and urging the U.S. Senate

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
4 week's Calendar.

5 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
6 commending the City of Philadelphia Board
7 of Pensions and Retirement for their
8 prudent actions over the years to
9 increase the Pension Fund's actuarial
10 funding ratio.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
12 week's Calendar.

13 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
14 calling on Mayor James F. Kenney and his
15 administration to conduct an annual
16 review of how the City's elimination of
17 the Rule of Two has impacted workforce
18 diversity in both hiring and promotion.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
20 week's Calendar.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President,
22 Councilwoman Parker would like to be
23 recognized on the bills and resolutions.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker for

2 all of her resolutions that she
3 introduced today.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
5 so very much, Mr. President.

6 First, on Ketanji Brown Jackson
7 being nominated to the Supreme Court, it
8 is a high honor to congratulate Ketanji
9 Brown Jackson on being nominated to the
10 highest court of the land, the Supreme
11 Court.

12 One of my favorite rulings of
13 hers, Mr. President, is the 2018 American
14 Federation of Government Employees, the
15 AFL-CIO ruling, where Jackson invalidated
16 provisions of three executive orders that
17 would have limited the time federal
18 employee labor union officials could
19 spend with union members, the issues that
20 unions could bargain over negotiations,
21 and the rights of disciplined workers to
22 appeal disciplinary actions.

23 Judge Jackson concluded that
24 the executive orders violated the right
25 of federal employees to collectively

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2 bargain and guaranteed by the Federal
3 Service-Labor Management Relations
4 Statute.

5 Judge Jackson is the real deal.
6 She is the most qualified person for the
7 job. She attended Harvard and Harvard
8 Law and was the editor of the Harvard Law
9 Review. She has come up through the
10 ranks and would be the first Justice who
11 has served as a Public Defender. Even
12 more notable if confirmed, she will be
13 the first Black woman to serve on the
14 Supreme Court, and it's about time we had
15 such representation in such an esteemed
16 position.

17 The Philadelphia City Council
18 congratulates her on her nomination and,
19 of course, urges a speedy confirmation.

20 I want to note for the record,
21 Mr. President, that this resolution is
22 sponsored by all of the women of
23 Council - Gauthier, Sanchez, Bass,
24 Brooks, Gilmore Richardson, and Gym,
25 yourself, Mr. President, and

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2 Councilmembers Squilla, Johnson, Jones,
3 O'Neill, Domb, Green, and Thomas.

4 Thank you, colleagues.

5 Next, Mr. President, is the
6 Rule of Two. In November of 2021, a
7 majority of the voters in Philadelphia
8 voted to eliminate the Rule of Two.

9 Now, data shows that
10 standardized testing of all kinds is
11 skewed out to favor for test-takers of
12 diverse backgrounds. That is why I
13 introduced the ballot question to
14 eliminate the Rule of Two, which stated
15 that for City hiring and promotions, HR
16 managers can only choose from the first
17 or second top-scoring candidates. The
18 Rule of Two practice did not take into
19 account a person's years of experience,
20 their expertise, their training, or their
21 passion for their role.

22 Other cities don't use a Rule
23 of Two. In a 2017 comparison with 35
24 other peer cities, it was found that no
25 other municipality adhered to a Rule of

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2 Two. All had more expansive rules like a
3 Rule of Five or a Rule of Ten. And
4 approximately 20 percent used the varying
5 rule, which is what Philadelphia chose to
6 do by eliminating the Rule of Two.

7 Eliminating the Rule of Two
8 will help correct a barrier that
9 prevented many Black and Brown and women
10 civil service workers from being hired or
11 moving up the chain as it relates to City
12 jobs.

13 However, what we do need to do
14 now is analyze the data around the new
15 hiring and promotion processes and see,
16 let's measure whether or not they are
17 working.

18 So this is why today,
19 Mr. President, I've introduced this
20 resolution calling on Mayor Kenney and
21 his administration to conduct an annual
22 review of how the City's elimination of
23 the Rule of Two has impacted workforce
24 diversity in both hiring and promotions.
25 With this resolution, I am asking the

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2 Administration to run a report on the
3 numbers. They should tell us how many
4 people of color and women were hired
5 since the Rule of Two was eliminated, how
6 many employees of color and women were
7 promoted since the Rule of Two was
8 eliminated, and how do these figures
9 compare to when the Rule of Two was still
10 in place. Finally, are there any
11 adjustments that need to be made to help
12 level the playing field when it comes to
13 putting the right people in positions
14 regardless of their standardized
15 test-taking skills.

16 While we know it is our duty to
17 combat institutional racism wherever it
18 occurs and I've heard from multiple
19 people, they've demanded, as Chair of
20 Council's Committee on Labor and Civil
21 Service, that they want a city government
22 that is reflective of the population and
23 they want fairness in pay. Let's prove
24 to them that eliminating the Rule of Two
25 is a step towards equity.

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2 Now, Mr. President, the final
3 resolution, the Pension Board - a 29
4 percent return in FY21; an actuarial
5 funding ratio increase from 44.8 percent
6 in 2016 to 55.2 percent for the fiscal
7 year ending June 30th of 2021; a market
8 value funding ratio to 61.1 percent.
9 That's how much it increased, the highest
10 market value for the Pension Fund in over
11 20 years. A reduction in investment
12 fees, saving over \$90 million; long-term
13 stability; the 2020 Government Finance
14 Officers Association Award for
15 Excellence. And they're on track to
16 reach 80 percent funding by 2028 and
17 100 percent funding by 2031.

18 The Pension Fund has achieved
19 all of this because of the leadership of
20 the City of Philadelphia Board of
21 Pensions and Retirement, along with the
22 combined efforts -- truly an
23 intergovernmental effort -- the City
24 Administration, Philadelphia municipal
25 unions, our City Council, Mr. President,

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2 under your leadership, and the State
3 Legislature, some members who are no
4 longer elected, and all other interested
5 parties.

6 This is why today I am proud to
7 have introduced a resolution commending
8 the City of Philadelphia Board of
9 Pensions and Retirement for their prudent
10 actions over the years to increase the
11 Pension Fund's actuarial funding ratio.

12 For the record, Philadelphia,
13 this resolution is co-sponsored by our
14 Council President, Darrell Clarke, and
15 Councilmembers Squilla, Johnson, Jones,
16 Bass, O'Neill, Brooks, Domb, Gilmore
17 Richardson, Green, Gym, and Thomas.

18 According to the Pew Charitable
19 Trust in 2019, the collaborative efforts
20 to shore up our Pension Fund have proved
21 that improved funding of a municipal
22 pension system is attainable. These
23 extraordinary and prudent efforts benefit
24 City retirees, current City workers,
25 taxpayers, and the City's operating

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2 budget, and it will likely improve the
3 City's credit rating.

4 I want to give some credit to
5 some folks - Fran Bielli and James C. I
6 called you that because I didn't want to
7 chop up your name, James. Treasurer
8 Jackie Dunn; Rob Dubow; Roosevelt Poplar;
9 Tumar Alexander; Diana Cortes; Rebecca
10 Rhyhart; Carol Stukes-Baylor, the first
11 Black woman to ever be elected Vice Chair
12 of that Board; Brian Coughlin; Paul Reed;
13 Mike Zaccagni; Sade, who is no longer

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it, and these bills will be
20 placed on our First Reading Calendar
21 today.

22 That concludes our reports from
23 committee, and our next order of business
24 is consideration of the Calendar.

25 I note that the bills just

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good

14 MS. HAIRSTON: Good morning,

15 Madam Chair. Yes, I am.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you

17 so very much. Please state your name for

18 the record and proceed with your

19 testimony.

20 MS. HAIRSTON: My name is

21 Regina A. Hairston, President and CEO of

22 the African American Chamber of Commerce

23 of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and

24 Delaware. Good morning, Madam Chair,

25 members of Philadelphia City Council. I

2 am also the representative of the Diverse
3 Chambers Coalition of Philadelphia, which
4 was formed by the AACC, Asian American
5 Chamber of Commerce of Greater
6 Philadelphia, Greater Philadelphia
7 Hispanic Chamber of Commerce,
8 Independence Business Alliance, and the
9 LGBTQ+ Chamber for Greater Philadelphia,
10 and I'm here to provide public comment on
11 Bill 220051-A.

12 I thank the sponsor of this
13 iteration of the bill, Councilmember
14 Brooks, for instructing this Council to
15 further examine an issue that continues
16 to plague our city. I understand that
17 this Council cares deeply about the
18 safety of our communities and the impact
19 that COVID-19 has had on our small
20 business environment in Philadelphia.
21 Therefore, it is imperative that we delay
22 a final vote on this bill until a more
23 effective and efficient strategy is
24 established in order to provide further
25 participation of small businesses.

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2 At a time when COVID-19
3 restrictions are being scaled back, our
4 focus needs to be helping small
5 businesses recover. Our small businesses
6 are the backbone of our economy, and we
7 must continue to reinvest and support
8 them during this time of recovery.

9 As the Diverse Chambers
10 Coalition of Philadelphia stated before
11 during the February 14th hearing, there
12 has not been an adequate nor meaningful
13 opportunity for those small businesses
14 affected by this measure to discuss the
15 impact that COVID-19 leaves on its
16 recovery.

17 Even with the latest amendment,
18 which raises the threshold to those with
19 25 to 49 employees, would affect nearly
20 2,800 local businesses that would now
21 have another regulation, which would act
22 as a hurdle to surviving this recovery.
23 As such, approximately 60 businesses met
24 with Councilmember Brooks earlier this
25 week urging her to rescind this bill.

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2 Our businesses hardest hit by
3 the pandemic cannot afford another
4 barrier to doing business effectively in
5 the City of Philadelphia. The goal
6 should be centered on efforts to develop
7 initiatives and legislation that will
8 protect our workers but will also leave
9 the businesses that employ them in the
10 best shape to scale and survive this
11 recovery period.

12 Hundreds of business owners
13 have entrusted the organizations that
14 make up the Diverse Chambers Coalition to
15 be their voice. Our members constitute
16 the backbone of the City's commercial
17 corridors, (unintelligible) of our
18 economy, and they are a source of jobs
19 and wealth creation in the neighborhoods
20 that need it most. Failing to hear their
21 voices to meet their needs undermines the
22 strong and equitable inclusive recovery
23 that we all seek to achieve.

24 With this in mind, I
25 respectfully ask the Council to delay

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2 taking a vote on this Bill 220051-A until
3 the small business community has a chance
4 to have meaningful input in the process.

5 Thank you for your time and
6 consideration.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
8 for your testimony, Ms. Hairston.

9 Will the Clerk please read the
10 name of our next speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
12 Madam Chair, is Queen Judith Robinson,
13 commenting on 210848 and 210170.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
15 morning, Queen. Are you connected and
16 ready to proceed?

17 QUEEN ROBINSON: Yes.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
19 you. Please state your name for the
20 record and proceed with your comments.

21 QUEEN ROBINSON: Good morning.
22 Good morning. Queen Judith Robinson
23 testifying on 200170 [sic].

24 If I could be so bodacious on
25 Women History Month, I'm going to give

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2 myself an award today, Queen of
3 Citizenship. Yes. Judith Robinson,
4 Queen of Citizenship.

5 There is no citizen that has
6 testified to this body more than Judith
7 Robinson in the history of City Council.
8 I'm going to call it modern history of
9 City Council.

10 So I'm going to give myself an
11 award, citation, bigger props, all that,
12 because it's Women History Month and
13 we're celebrating women, and I just want
14 to make myself very distinct in that
15 manner.

16 So Queen of Citizenship to
17 Judith Robinson of North Philadelphia.
18 Yeah. Welcome.

19 In addition, another queen of
20 the Fifth District in North Central
21 Philadelphia, Dianna Montague. Black
22 history, she's the owner of Iron Ladies
23 Enterprise. You're talking about
24 untraditional careers. She is the first
25 woman ironworker in the history of

2 ironworkers to graduate as a union
3 ironworker in Philadelphia's 100-year
4 history. Say her name. Dianna Montague.
5 Happy Women's History, y'all.
6 Let's get the history straight.
7 Thank you very much.

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
9 you, Queen Judith Robinson, for your
10 comments.

11 Would the Clerk please read the
12 name of our next speaker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Susan Windle, commenting on 210956.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
16 morning, Susan Windle. Are you connected
17 and ready to proceed?

18 MS. WINDLE: I am indeed.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Please
20 state your name for the record and
21 proceed with your comments.

22 MS. WINDLE: Good morning. My
23 name is Susan Windle and I'm testifying
24 in support of Bill No. 210956, which
25 would establish a Philadelphia Public

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2 Financial Authority, the first step to
3 creating a Philadelphia public bank.

4 I am Chair of the Philadelphia
5 Public Banking Coalition, and in this
6 Coalition, I represent POWER Interfaith
7 as well as Philadelphia Neighborhood
8 Networks. And as a poet as well as
9 Chair, I'm in charge of the poetry of
10 public banking. So I'd like to offer a
11 poem as my testimony today.

12 The Poetry of Public Banking -
13 the poetry of public banking, the way the
14 words kiss, public and banking, it is not
15 what you expect, this joining, this
16 yoking together of seemingly separate,
17 seemingly disparate things, public
18 banking.

19 Here is a compound beauty, a
20 deep underlying truth, public and
21 banking, people and profits. Why not let
22 the bankers belong to the people and the
23 people the bankers in holy union.

24 Here, the heart sings a
25 unifying song. Here, the profits

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2 themselves rejoice and a new light beams,
3 and a new light beams from the City of
4 love.

5 Councilmembers, please pass
6 this bill by unanimous consent. Help
7 Philadelphia grow into the beacon of love
8 and justice that is in her good name.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
11 so very much for your comments.

12 Would the Chief Clerk please
13 read the name of our next speaker.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is David Backer, commenting on 210956.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
17 morning, David Backer. Are you connected
18 and ready to proceed?

19 MR. BACKER: Yes, I am. Can
20 you hear me?

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, I
22 can hear you. Just please state your
23 name for the record and proceed with your
24 testimony -- your comments rather.

25 MR. BACKER: Thank you. Yes.

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2 My name is David Backer. I'm a Professor
3 of Education Policy at West Chester
4 University. I live in West Philly. I'm
5 a member of Philly DSA and I'm a parent
6 of a two-year-old who will attend Philly
7 public schools.

8 As a scholar of school finance
9 and a parent, I'm thrilled to support the
10 creation of a Philadelphia Public Finance
11 Authority. The connection between school
12 finance and this authority might be a
13 little obscure, so my testimony tries to
14 make this clear.

15 Philadelphia school buildings
16 are in dire need of transformative
17 financing. A public finance authority
18 such as the one considered today would
19 help. How?

20 When the District does large
21 projects in schools, it has to take out
22 loans through a for-profit market called
23 the municipal bond market. Getting one
24 of these loans is like going to a big
25 party. There's a lot of people there.

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2 There's the District, who needs money for
3 things like school HVAC systems, but
4 there are investors who might front money
5 for this loan. There are consultants,
6 lawyers, rating agencies, institutions
7 helping make sure the deal is kosher, and
8 the bank, who is like the party's host.

9 At this municipal bond market
10 party, everyone is there to make money,
11 except the School District. Investors
12 are there to make money on the loan's
13 interest. Private banks are making bank,
14 consultants and lawyers charging high
15 fees. Even the credit rating agencies
16 charge for their services. The District
17 is like a nerd at a football team rager.

18 School districts gets taken
19 advantage of in these situations. On
20 average, municipal bonds are rated worse
21 and incur higher fees than private ones,
22 because Securities and Exchange efforts
23 don't see public financial deals like
24 school bonds as real business. They're
25 not wrong. Education is a public good.

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2 It's supposed to serve everyone, not make
3 the rich richer.

4 So the School District gets
5 ripped off by bullies and maybe the host.
6 The bank notices this, but she's got all
7 kinds of things going on, saying hi to
8 everyone, not really looking out for the
9 District.

10 Now imagine the District has a
11 wing person at this party. This friend
12 is like a nerdy football player who has
13 the respect of everyone but is there to
14 advocate and protect the District. This
15 person's goal is to make sure the nerd
16 doesn't stand out and doesn't get ripped
17 off. That friend is the Philadelphia
18 Public Finance Authority.

19 So I am excited about this
20 Authority coming into existence in
21 Philly, a city that's been pushed around
22 and bullied enough when it comes to
23 (unintelligible).

24 Also, passing this legislation
25 (unintelligible) creating a public bank,

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2 which should be like the School District
3 going to a party hosted by their wing
4 person, which would be amazing.

5 I urge you all to vote in favor
6 of that legislation.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
8 you, Mr. Backer, for your comments.

9 Would the Chief Clerk please
10 read the name of our next speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Jumping to the
12 top of the list, Madam Chair, we have
13 Glen Bryan, commenting on 200155 [sic].

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
15 you. Good morning, Glen Bryan. Are you
16 connected and ready to proceed?

17 MR. BRYAN: Yes, I am. Yes, I
18 am.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
20 so very much. Just state your name for
21 the record and proceed with your
22 comments.

23 MR. BRYAN: Okay. My name is
24 Glen Bryan and I am here to just provide
25 testimony for the late, great Elsie Wise,

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2 community leader, and I'm really here to
3 really echo previous comments and
4 commendations regarding the tireless work
5 on the ground by our late, great,
6 terrific community leader, Elsie Wise.

7 I worked with her for about
8 three decades almost, and we applaud at
9 the University of Pennsylvania her
10 work -- and all of West Philadelphia, her
11 work to provide quality of life
12 improvements in a community and work with
13 the youth that started the West Powelton
14 Steppers, which are now the Sixers Drum
15 Team. I'm not quite sure of the title of
16 them, but the success of her work
17 bringing youth in her community into
18 productive activities was immeasurable.

19 So I'd like to -- the family, I
20 wish the family, you know, continued
21 prayers, and she will always be
22 remembered and have a place in our heart
23 and has made an indelible impression for
24 so many in West Philadelphia.

25 That concludes my remarks.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
3 so very much for your comments,
4 Mr. Bryan.

5 Are there any other speakers,
6 Mr. Decker?

7 CHIEF CLERK: Many, Madam
8 Chair.

9 The next speaker is William
10 Carter, commenting on 200051-A [sic].

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
12 morning, Mr. Carter. Are you connected
13 and ready to proceed?

14 MR. CARTER: I am connected.
15 Can you hear me?

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, we
17 can. Just state your name for the record
18 and proceed with your comments.

19 MR. CARTER: William Carter,
20 Vice President of Local Government
21 Affairs for the Chamber of Commerce.

22 Thank you, Madam Chair Parker
23 and members of Council, for allowing me
24 to testify regarding Bill 220051.

25 Let me first say, Regina A.

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2 Hairston of the African American Chamber
3 hit the nail on the head. She was very
4 succinct and eloquent when she testified,
5 and I just have to give kudos to her on
6 that.

7 Although we appreciate the
8 sponsor's commitment to the safety of our
9 community, I have been getting steady
10 e-mails and calls that as recently
11 amended, this bill would still have a
12 damaging impact on 3,000 hard-working
13 small business owners and the jobs that
14 comes with them.

15 As most of these businesses
16 have been justifiably exempted from prior
17 versions passed during the height of the
18 pandemic, this bill, although I'm sure
19 very well meaning, has issues. But the
20 primary one is the sponsor's lack of due
21 diligence in this regard.

22 In just over a month from
23 introduction to hearing to now, the
24 sponsor has raced this bill to final
25 passage with extremely little

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2 conversation with stakeholders, extremely
3 little consideration of the actual
4 ramifications on the City as a whole, and
5 with very little diligence.

6 Speaking for the Chamber, who
7 represents 1,700 businesses, the majority
8 of which are small and mid-sized
9 businesses, we were afforded two short
10 Zoom calls, one on the Friday before the
11 hearing with really no back and forth and
12 another with the Diverse Chambers and
13 PRLA, and even those meetings were held
14 at the behest of our organizations in the
15 short amount of time provided. You know,
16 that's simply not diligence.

17 As far as the bill as amended,
18 it still adversely affects approximately
19 3,000 small businesses still affected
20 between 25 and 50 employees. Many have
21 more than one location or more than one
22 type of business, and it's clear this is
23 not the same bill from 2020 that was
24 enacted during the height of the
25 emergency.

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2 Prior iterations of this policy
3 either exempted small businesses of this
4 size or acknowledged federal acts as a
5 tax credit that helped cover the costs.
6 This legislation does neither.

7 You can go up and down any
8 commercial corridor in the City, like I
9 have and I do on a weekly basis, and see
10 which vibrant storefronts closed down.
11 Each of those boarded-up or empty
12 establishments represent a number, any
13 number, of jobs.

14 I've heard the stories from
15 prior (unintelligible) locations after
16 doing two years of unimaginable hardship
17 due to the pandemic. They are hopeful
18 that with the rising vaccination counts
19 and decreasing counts of infected people
20 that people will even come back and
21 patronize them so they can recover, grow,
22 and hire more employees.

23 Particularly during this
24 recovery period in order to grow our
25 economy, reduce poverty, maintain quality

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2 services, and make our city safer, many
3 of you know we have to grow jobs and
4 businesses in Philadelphia.

5 So we're once again thankful
6 for Council's commitment to the safety of
7 our community. Please know that this is
8 only the (unintelligible) community and
9 going through great lengths to ensure
10 customer safety and confidence. However,
11 Philadelphia's hard-working business
12 owners are asking for your consideration
13 and understanding of the current state of
14 the city. Too many are leaving and
15 taking the jobs with them.

16 I worked at City Council
17 16 years and can admit that I used to
18 think that a lot of them were crying
19 wolf, but I can assure you this is not
20 the case. Therefore, we and other
21 business chambers and organizations are
22 kindly asking that this legislation
23 either be tabled or omitted to effect
24 these very real circumstances.

25 Thank you, Madam Chair.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
3 you, Mr. Carter.

4 Would the Chief Clerk please
5 read the name of our next speaker.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
7 is Nicole Levy, commenting 210956.

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
9 morning.

10 MS. LEVY: Hello, everyone.
11 Good morning.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
13 morning. You are connected. Just state
14 your name for the record and proceed with
15 your comments.

16 MS. LEVY: Great. Thank you.

17 Good morning, everyone. My
18 name is Nicole Levy. I'm in
19 Councilmember Gauthier's district. I'd
20 like to thank Derek Green for his
21 leadership and vision. I support the
22 bill to create a Philadelphia Public
23 Financial Authority to serve as a
24 platform to the City as it reclaims
25 ownership of its financial well-being.

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2 The Fair Housing Act was passed
3 in 1968, the first in a wave of financial
4 civil rights legislation, which included
5 the Equal Credit Opportunity Act, the
6 Home Mortgage Disclosure Act, and the
7 Community Reinvestment Act. Yet the
8 racial wealth divide in this country has
9 not budged an inch over the past
10 50 years. The financial system is
11 broken. It is flawed. It is stacked
12 against our communities.

13 For the past 50 years, the
14 financial system has focused exclusively
15 on its own dumb biggering. Industry
16 talks about the legacy of redlining while
17 redlining huge swaths of our city every
18 year. If Black home loan applicants were
19 approved at the same rate as White home
20 loan applicants, Philadelphia would have
21 received an additional 62 million in home
22 loan investment in 2020 alone. The
23 numbers are even worse for small business
24 lending.

25 We must reclaim control over

2 our own financial wellbeing, because
3 here's what we need to realize: We may
4 be tagged as America's poorest large
5 city, but we are also wealthy beyond our
6 imagination. Quarterly data published by
7 the FDIC shows that we in Philadelphia
8 have 607 billion, billion dollars sitting
9 in the bank right now. At least
10 85 percent of that money is held by
11 corporate entities that are not local to
12 our city and are not the least bit aware
13 of or concerned with our community needs.

14 The business of banking is
15 simple - take money in and lend it out at
16 interest to cover costs and earn profit.
17 With our 607 billion, banks have invested
18 just 17 billion in home lending and a
19 negligible 308 million in small business
20 loans in 2020. That is not prudent
21 financial planning for our city.

22 As a city, we've given our
23 purse and our entire bank over to
24 outsiders who have no vested interest in
25 seeing us thrive. Reclaiming control

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2 over our finances, actually holding some
3 of these numbers in our hand to take
4 account of this city and its vast wealth,
5 this is the starting point, the first
6 step towards imagining and then realizing
7 a prosperous future for all of
8 Philadelphia's neighborhoods.

9 Thank you for voting today to
10 approve the Philadelphia Public Financial
11 Authority.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
14 you, Ms. Levy, for your comments.

15 Chief Clerk, please read the
16 name of our next speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
18 Madam Chair, is Erendira Zamacona Solano.
19 Translating for Ms. Solano is Carly
20 Pourzand.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
22 so very much. Good morning. Are you
23 connected and ready to proceed?

24 MS. POURZAND: Hi. I'm Carly
25 Pourzand. Eren is going to be reading

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2 her testimony in Spanish and I'll share
3 her testimony in English afterwards.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.
5 Thank you. Just please state her name
6 for the record and proceed with the
7 comments.

8 MS. POURZAND: Thank you.
9 (Reading in Spanish.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
11 you.

12 MS. POURZAND: I can read it in
13 English.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes,
15 please.

16 And just for the benefit of the
17 viewing public along with our colleagues,
18 because translation support was needed,
19 we will sort of measure this as two
20 commenters relative to time. So thank
21 you all for your patience as it relates
22 to the leeway being provided here.

23 Please proceed.

24 MS. POURZAND: Okay. Thanks.

25 Hello. Good morning. My name

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2 is Erendira Zamacona. I'm a member of El
3 Comite de Trabajadorxs and an organizer
4 with 215 People's Alliance. I am the
5 mother of three beautiful children and I
6 was a restaurant worker for 14 years.

7 Today I represent all essential
8 workers in the restaurant industry and
9 ask you, dear Councilmembers, to pass
10 emergency paid sick leave, Bill No.
11 220051.

12 I have had to work several
13 times when I was sick. I was never able
14 to have paid sick days, but I was
15 wrongfully fired by my boss. I remember
16 when one of my children was sick, I
17 couldn't send them to school. I asked my
18 boss for permission to be absent and take
19 care of my sick son, and I clearly
20 remember the owner saying, I don't care
21 about your personal problems, the
22 business can't stop just because of your
23 absence. If you don't show up for work,
24 you don't have a job anymore.

25 I still haven't forgotten my

2 boss's words.

3 I also heard from my comrades
4 at El Comite who have experienced the
5 same thing. For us immigrants, we do not
6 have benefits or medical insurance. We
7 have to survive with a minimum payment of
8 \$7.25. We need two jobs, because the
9 bills don't stop.

10 If you, my dear councilors,
11 support us and approve this bill, we will
12 feel protected, valued, and respected as
13 workers and as human beings, and we will
14 be worthy of working safely, and together
15 we can take care of this beautiful City
16 of Philadelphia.

17 You as human beings are as
18 valuable as we are as essential workers,
19 and I trust in you and in God and I put a
20 lot of faith that you will not turn your
21 back on us and you will support us.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
24 so very much for your comments.

25 Will the Chief Clerk please

2 read the name of our next speaker.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Bennett Warker,
4 commenting on 220051.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
6 morning, Bennett. Are you connected and
7 ready to proceed?

8 MR. WARKER: Yes, I am. Can
9 you hear me?

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.
11 Please state your name for the record and
12 proceed with your comments.

13 MR. WARKER: Great. My name is
14 Bennett Warker. I'm speaking in support
15 of the COVID-19 paid sick leave Bill No.
16 220051.

17 I'm a restaurant worker in the
18 City of Philadelphia and I was very, very
19 excited to hear about the upcoming vote
20 on Councilmember Brooks' paid sick leave
21 bill in the City Council.

22 So I'm coming from a place
23 where one of my co-workers contracted
24 COVID-19 during beginning of the Omicron
25 surge, and during this time, she did the

2 right thing and she contacted our fellow
3 workers, management, told everyone that
4 she had tested positive and that she had
5 exposed a bunch of our co-workers.
6 Management was completely indifferent to
7 this and told everyone that they were
8 supposed to come in, even though this was
9 before Christmas and they knew that many
10 of us were about to go see our family,
11 many of them elderly, many of them
12 immunocompromised at various points of
13 risk. And without comprehensive sick
14 leave, we were unable to avoid the
15 workplace for fear of losing our jobs
16 entirely.

17 Predictably, many employees
18 came to work and later tested positive
19 and the virus ripped through our
20 restaurant, at one point infecting nearly
21 every manager at the same time.

22 This bill is extremely
23 important to me and my co-workers for a
24 multitude of reasons. First, workers are
25 human beings. I cannot believe that

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2 we've spent years talking about us as
3 essential workers, as heroes, as this and
4 that, and we are going to turn our backs
5 on workers and deny them one of the most
6 important crucial things, paid sick
7 leave. How are we going to go through
8 two years of a pandemic and not award
9 workers one of the most rudimentary
10 benefits and protections against this
11 virus?

12 Secondly, sick leave is
13 extremely important in restaurants
14 specifically. We work in very small
15 spaces. We don't want to be spreading
16 germs and illness through the food that
17 we serve to our customers or fellow
18 co-workers. We should not have to choose
19 between spreading sickness or our
20 paychecks.

21 Third, and most importantly,
22 this bill is coming just in time when the
23 vaccine mask mandates have been lifted,
24 without input from workers, who just last
25 month were dealing with extremely high

2 levels of a wildly contagious pathogen.

3 This pandemic is still not
4 over, and paid sick leave is one of the
5 most effective ways that we can finally
6 bring this pandemic to an end. It will
7 make a world of difference to workers
8 across the City. We are all expectantly
9 watching these votes.

10 Regardless of how the pandemic
11 is forming and how it's moving, this
12 pandemic has shown a light on the fact
13 that workers need comprehensive paid sick
14 leave. We need this very, very badly.

15 Thank you to Councilmember
16 Brooks for listening to the voices of
17 workers across the City.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
19 so very much for your comments.

20 Will the Chief Clerk please
21 read the name of our next speaker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Charlie Simpson,
23 commenting on 220051.

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:
25 Mr. Simpson, are you connected and ready

3 MR. SIMPSON: I am. Hi.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
5 so very much. Just state your name for
6 the record and proceed with your
7 comments.

8 MR. SIMPSON: Hi. My name is
9 Charlie Simpson and I'm speaking in
10 support of the COVID-19 paid sick leave
11 Bill No. 220051.

12 I'm a restaurant worker in the
13 City of Philadelphia. I was excited to
14 hear about the upcoming vote on
15 Councilmember Brooks' paid sick leave
16 bill in the City Council.

17 In January, I was sick with
18 COVID and I notified my co-workers and
19 managers on the same day that I tested
20 positive, and I, of course, had to take
21 over a week off of work, and at my
22 restaurant, sick leave benefits are
23 difficult to quality for. My restaurant
24 workers -- many restaurant workers cannot
25 afford to lose that amount of income.

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2 Predictably, many employees
3 came into work and later tested positive
4 around the same time, and a significant
5 portion of the staff was infected.

6 Working in the food industry is
7 one of the most common jobs in
8 Philadelphia, and this bill could help us
9 on the front lines of COVID tremendously.

10 Everyone gets sick. We deserve
11 to have the support we need to afford
12 life in a pandemic. Sick leave is
13 extremely important in restaurants
14 specifically. We handle food and things
15 that everyone touches. We don't want to
16 be spreading germs and illness to the
17 food that we serve to customers or our
18 fellow co-workers. We should not have to
19 choose between getting sick or spreading
20 sickness or getting paid.

21 This bill is coming just in
22 time when the vaccine mask and mandates
23 have been lifted. The pandemic is still
24 not over, and paid sick leave would make
25 a world of difference to workers across

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2 the City, and we're all watching the
3 votes.

4 Thank you, Councilmember
5 Brooks, for listening to the voices of
6 the workers in the City.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
8 so very much for your comments.

9 Chief Clerk, can you please
10 read the name of our next speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Sarah Johnson,
12 commenting on 220051.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Sarah
14 Johnson, good morning. Are you -- okay.
15 You are connected and ready to proceed.
16 So please just state your name for the
17 record and proceed with your comments.

18 MS. JOHNSON: Hello. My name
19 is Sarah Johnson and I was working within
20 a Philadelphia restaurant until
21 December 2021. I'm speaking on behalf of
22 the COVID-19 paid sick leave Bill No.
23 220051. And this is imperative during
24 the time that we're living in.

25 While working at the

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2 restaurant, I saw so many examples of how
3 workers' health, safety, and wellbeing
4 were put at risk, both in relation to
5 COVID and otherwise.

6 In late December, our staff was
7 hit with a wave a COVID that affected
8 nearly everyone, most likely as a result
9 of the company holiday parties. And
10 despite large numbers of the attendees
11 testing positive, management was not
12 empathetic. They were barely willing to
13 accept that people need to quarantine.
14 They were willing to cut corners in order
15 to remain fully staffed over the
16 holidays. And they did not tell us to
17 get tested and they did not prioritize
18 the health of workers or guests as a
19 result.

20 Besides COVID-related risks,
21 the restaurant made it clear that they
22 did not care about our needs or our
23 safety or otherwise. One of my
24 co-workers was in a car accident last
25 year right at the beginning of his shift,

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2 and despite all of our co-workers
3 pressing for him to be able to stay home
4 and get rest, management forced him to
5 come to work that day.

6 Later that year, we had a flood
7 in the restaurant where sewage backed up,
8 and the main floor was flooding and the
9 kitchen was flooding and they did not
10 tell the guests, and workers still had to
11 work through sewage conditions, and they
12 were not willing to close down
13 (unintelligible) following that event
14 despite the serious health hazards and
15 consequences.

16 Other than that, they were
17 always very irresponsible in terms of
18 staffing. They made workers who were
19 part time working work full-time hours.
20 They were antagonistic when we weren't
21 willing to work double shifts just
22 because they weren't responsible
23 (unintelligible).

24 Restaurants make it clear that
25 they only care about profit, even at the

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2 expense of the health and safety of their
3 employees and their patrons. Emotions
4 like that of the paid sick leave bill are
5 the only way to ensure that
6 establishments are held accountable for
7 treating their workers right.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
10 so very much for your comments.

11 Can you please read the name of
12 our next speaker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Jackie Wiggins.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
16 morning. Are you connected and ready to
17 proceed, Jackie Wiggins?

18 MS. WIGGINS: I'm ready to
19 proceed.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
21 you. Just state your name for the record
22 and proceed with your comments.

23 MS. WIGGINS: Okay. My name is
24 Jacqueline Wiggins. I'm a senior
25 citizen, community activist, and Stadium

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2 Stomper. I am providing testimony
3 referencing Bill 220051 having to do with
4 businesses providing paid sick leave for
5 full- and part-time workers.

6 First of all, the COVID
7 pandemic has not halted. People are
8 still coming down with COVID even though
9 some people based on their health status
10 may experience less severity. COVID
11 cannot be treated lightly.

12 The bill must pass, even though
13 it has moved from providing paid leave to
14 employers with 10 employees to 25 or
15 more, to assist an employee with
16 self-care, care for family members
17 suffering from COVID and must
18 self-isolate, or provide care for a child
19 or children if a school should close and
20 there is no available childcare, et
21 cetera.

22 This pandemic has dealt a
23 crushing blow to every human being in
24 this city and beyond. Those who have
25 experienced COVID are human beings who

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2 come from families, and this includes
3 business owners. Adjustments have to be
4 made in families when a crisis or tragedy
5 occurs. So too, with one of the
6 foundations of our city and nation's
7 economy, those in businesses. But no one
8 understands this. Business owners come
9 from families too.

10 Imagine having a sick worker
11 who may or may not know his or her status
12 with respect to COVID encountering a
13 senior citizen in the workplace like
14 myself. I am vulnerable to that worker's
15 unknown, possibly untreated, recovering
16 inefficiently COVID situation. I need
17 some assurances from business owners that
18 my health will not be compromised nor
19 endangered from a sick staff member.

20 I understand that our City of
21 Philadelphia (unintelligible) poverty.

22 Can I continue?

23 Could some of that poverty
24 exist because of limited visioning on the
25 part of our elected officials? What is

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2 the dilemma?

3 If the usual statement is going
4 to be that people don't understand
5 business, news flash, the people who make
6 business work are people like myself and
7 every other everyday taxpaying resident
8 who purchase the goods and services for
9 what they want and need, because we, the
10 people, make businesses work. Not
11 providing paid sick leave to vulnerable
12 employees is (unintelligible) 220051.

13 Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: You're on mute,
15 Madam Chair.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
17 so very much for your comments.

18 Would the Chief Clerk please
19 read the next name of our next speaker.

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Tureka Dixon, commenting on 220170.

22 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Tureka
23 Dixon, are you connected and ready to
24 proceed?

25 MS. DIXON: Yes, I am.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.

3 Just state your name for the record and
4 proceed with your comments.

5 MS. DIXON: Yes. My name is
6 Tureka Dixon and I am here to support
7 Women's History Month and its Resolution
8 220171.

9 I am a glazer at District
10 Council 21. I'm also a member of Women
11 in Nontraditional Trades, WINC, Steering
12 Committee, and I am here just to speak on
13 behalf of women being underrepresented in
14 nontraditional careers, and I am here to
15 just put the word out there and to let
16 everyone know that we have to continue to
17 get the word out there. We have to
18 continue to support programs such as
19 MALWIC (ph) and WIC, who are trying to
20 get the message out there to get more
21 women into nontraditional trades. And
22 I'm just committed and wanted to do
23 whatever I can to increase the
24 advancement of women in nontraditional
25 careers.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
3 so very much. Tureka, that didn't
4 conclude your comments, did it?

5 MS. DIXON: Yes.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.
7 All right. I wasn't sure. I heard a
8 pregnant pause. Okay. Thank you so very
9 much for your comments.

10 Would the Chief Clerk please
11 read the name of our next speaker.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Nicole Fuller, commenting on 220170.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
15 you, Nicole Fuller.

16 MS. FULLER: Good morning.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.
18 Thank you. You are connected. Just
19 state your name for the record and
20 proceed with your testimony -- comments.

21 MS. FULLER: My name is Nicole
22 Fuller. I'm the Executive Director of
23 the Philadelphia Area Project on
24 Occupational Safety and Health, better
25 known as PhilaPOSH. First, let me say

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2 good morning to Councilmembers and a
3 special thank you to Councilmembers
4 Gilmore Richardson, Quinones-Sanchez, and
5 Council Chair Parker.

6 I'm speaking in support of
7 Resolution 220170 to recognize March 6th
8 through the 13th of this year as Women in
9 Construction Week and honoring Women in
10 Nontraditional Careers, better known as
11 WINC. As one of the founding members of
12 WINC, I am very proud of the work that we
13 are doing in the City.

14 Folks may not be aware that
15 women represent just a small percentage
16 of employees in industries such as
17 construction, manufacturing, and transit.
18 You have 3 percent of women in
19 construction, 29 percent in
20 manufacturing, but those jobs are usually
21 the low paid assembly work, and 2 percent
22 in SEPTA, which is our transit agency.

23 These career pathways pay well
24 and they can provide financial security
25 and a way for workers to take care of

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2 their families. Women are not given a
3 fair share of these opportunities. These
4 industries have made progress in their
5 outreach to women, but still these career
6 pathways are often out of sight and out
7 of reach and out of mind.

8 WINC has a very diverse
9 Steering Committee that's very important
10 to us. It includes global tradeswomen
11 from SEPTA and the building trades, a
12 manufacturing apprenticeship
13 intermediary, a representative from the
14 local Philadelphia AFL-CIO Council,
15 Insulators Union, workforce board and
16 staff.

17 Like I said, I'm very proud of
18 us. We have accomplished a lot since
19 2018 when we were founded. You can find
20 resources at our website,
21 WINCproject.org. We are very active on
22 social media where we highlight local
23 tradeswomen in the City of Philadelphia.

24 I want to thank you this
25 morning for allowing me to speak and

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2 appreciate every consideration you are
3 affording adopting our -- in adopting
4 this resolution.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
7 so very much, Nicole Fuller, for your
8 comments.

9 Will our Chief Clerk please
10 read the name of our next speaker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Karen Masino,
12 commenting on 220170.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Karen
14 Masino, are you connected and ready to
15 proceed? Good morning.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: She just dropped
18 off the line, Madam Chair.

19 The next speaker is Tanjan
20 Hebron, commenting on 220170.

21 MS. HEBRON: Hello.

22 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Tanjan,
23 good morning. Are you connected and
24 ready to proceed?

25 MS. HEBRON: Can you hear me?

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2 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, I
3 can hear you. Please state your name for
4 the record and proceed with your
5 comments.

6 MS. HEBRON: Yes. Good
7 morning. My name is Tanja Hebron. I am
8 a first-class construction equipment
9 operator with SEPTA for 28 and a half
10 years. I'm also involved in the
11 tradeswomen of SEPTA and I'm on the
12 committee, Steering Committee, of WINC,
13 W-I-N-C, which stands for Women in
14 Nontraditional Careers.

15 So I'm calling you for support
16 of Resolution 220170, and I believe that,
17 like Nicole Fuller said, we make up a
18 small percentage when it comes to
19 nontraditional careers and we're trying
20 to change that. We need more women,
21 because we can do the work. We do it
22 well, and we look good doing it.

23 We need more support as far as
24 training and programs. So I hope that
25 with this bill -- this resolution, it

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2 will put it out there that we need more
3 women in nontraditional careers.

4 And that concludes my comments.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
6 so very much, Tanja, for your comments.

7 Will the Chief Clerk please
8 read the name of our next speaker.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Sue Hoffman,
10 commenting on 220171.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
12 morning, Sue Hoffman. Are you connected
13 and ready proceed?

14 MS. HOFFMAN: I am, yes.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: All
16 right. State your name for the record
17 and proceed with your comments.

18 MS. HOFFMAN: Good morning. My
19 name is Sue Hoffman. I'm the Project
20 Manager for Women in Nontraditional
21 Careers, WINC, at Philadelphia Works, and
22 I'm speaking in favor of Resolution
23 220170. I want to thank Councilmember
24 Gilmore Richardson and the other sponsors
25 for recognizing and honoring WINC through

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2 this resolution.

3 Let me share with Council why
4 Philadelphia Works agreed to incubate and
5 grow WINC.

6 As the City's workforce board,
7 Philadelphia Works invests in training
8 and partnerships that create pathways to
9 family-sustaining careers, especially for
10 folks who have been unemployed and
11 underemployed, and this also meets the
12 talents of local businesses. So when
13 tradeswomen and advocates came to
14 Philadelphia Works with the idea of what
15 became WINC in 2018, Philadelphia Works
16 saw the potential and said yes.

17 So over the past three years,
18 Philadelphia Works has provided the
19 staffing and the federal grant support to
20 power WINC, but Philadelphia Works can't
21 do it alone. Like Tureka, Nicole, and
22 Tanja have also talked about, we have a
23 diverse Steering Committee. We have a
24 partnership among unions, employers,
25 non-profits, trainers, tradeswomen, which

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2 is also noted in the resolution. And as
3 we grow and try to sustain our impact,
4 WINC needs additional funding, additional
5 partners, and additional -- getting the
6 word out, additional outreach, to make
7 sure that even more women are able to
8 thrive in a trades career.

9 So I encourage everybody to
10 find out more about WINC and how to get
11 involved. You can visit our website at
12 WINCproject.org. That's WINC with a C,
13 W-I-N-C, project.org. And we appreciate
14 the opportunity to be honored in this way
15 during Women in Construction Week and
16 Women's History Month.

17 Thank you so much.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
19 you, Sue Hoffman, for your comments.

20 Will the Chief Clerk please
21 read the name of our next speaker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Michele Paxton,
23 commenting on 220171.

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Michele
25 Paxton, good morning. Are you connected

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2 and ready to proceed?

3 MS. PAXTON: Yes, I am. Thank
4 you, Madam Chair.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: State
6 your name for the record and proceed with
7 your comments.

8 MS. PAXTON: Good morning,
9 everybody. My name is Michele Paxton. I
10 am the Vice President of the National
11 Association of Women in Construction here
12 in Philadelphia, Chapter No. 145, and I
13 am also the Corporate Safety Director for
14 Binsky and Snyder in Piscataway, New
15 Jersey.

16 So good morning,
17 Councilmembers, and thank you for
18 allowing me to speak in favor of
19 Resolution 220170, which recognizes March
20 6th through the 13th, 2022 as Women in
21 Construction Week and to honor the Women
22 in Nontraditional Careers.

23 Promoting women in
24 nontraditional careers is extremely
25 important for the future of the trades

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2 within our great City of Philadelphia.
3 We need more women and we need more
4 support within the industry, as we are
5 still unfortunately grossly
6 underrepresented in all aspects of
7 construction, transit, and other
8 nontraditional careers.

9 So I want to thank you,
10 Councilmembers and the sponsors of this
11 resolution, for your consideration.

12 And this concludes my comments.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
14 so very much, Michele Paxton.

15 Will you please read the name
16 of our next speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Eric Jenkins,
18 commenting on 220176.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
20 morning, Eric Jenkins. Are you connected
21 and ready to proceed?

22 MR. JENKINS: Yes.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Just
24 state your name for the record and
25 proceed with your comments.

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2 MR. JENKINS: Okay. My name is
3 Eric Jenkins. I'm a member of Socialist
4 Alternative and I am here to support
5 Resolution 220176.

6 Starbucks workers and any
7 barista workers attempt to unionize and
8 (unintelligible) workplace actions have
9 my support.

10 In Memphis, Tennessee, seven
11 Starbucks workers who were leading a
12 unionization drive in their store were
13 fired in retaliation for fighting back.
14 Many of these workers who were fired were
15 Black, and we shouldn't be surprised by
16 this.

17 Many corporations like
18 Starbucks test out their union busing
19 tactics on Black and Brown working people
20 first, because they know they can get
21 away with it. These seven Starbucks
22 workers in Memphis, the Memphis Seven,
23 still don't have their jobs back.
24 Already we are seeing Starbucks export
25 their tactics of unjustly firing leading

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2 Starbucks organizers from stores who
3 declare that they're unionizing.

4 Recently a Starbucks
5 unionization leader in Buffalo, New York
6 was fired abruptly. We will definitely
7 see more Starbucks stores try to fire
8 more leading workers because they can
9 afford to take measly pennies from the
10 NLRB and want to stop any movement toward
11 building a union. This is an indictment
12 of capitalist institutions and are always
13 geared to covering for the bosses,
14 because even if workers get their jobs
15 back, it usually takes years after the
16 fact and the unionization drive has been
17 severely weakened or crushed.

18 Starbucks workers cannot rely
19 on these institutions, because --- but
20 they can use their own power as workers
21 in conjunction with the larger
22 Philadelphia working class.

23 We know Philly is a union town,
24 who are predominantly Black of our
25 population, and we know that Black people

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2 are the most unionized racial demographic
3 in the United States. The question is
4 how City Council can support workers
5 fighting back against union busing in a
6 city that knows Black liberation is tied
7 to a revitalized labor movement.

8 This resolution is a great
9 first step. However, to have resolve, we
10 also need concrete actions. We cannot
11 wait until Philadelphia Starbucks workers
12 face the de-funding of unionizing or
13 losing their jobs. We must be prepared
14 when Starbucks or any company bring their
15 racist union busing tactics to this city,
16 and we should be clear, it will be
17 devastating not only for all Black and
18 Brown workers but for all workers.

19 We need community mobilizations
20 led by unions, socialist organizations,
21 (unintelligible) politicians and can
22 empower Starbucks workers to lead a
23 movement to win and build a dynamic labor
24 movement that can launch unionization
25 drives in every negative corporation in

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2 this city, including Comcast.

3 Thank you so much.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
5 you, Eric Jenkins, for your comments.

6 Can we please read the name of
7 our next speaker.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Tony Abata,
9 commenting on 220176.

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
11 morning, Tony Abata. Are you connected
12 and ready to proceed?

13 MR. ABATA: Yes, I am.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: State
15 your name for the record and feel free to
16 proceed with your comments.

17 MR. ABATA: My name is Tony
18 Abata. I'm here to support Resolution
19 No. 220176.

20 I support Starbucks and barista
21 workers organizing for a union here in
22 Philly and across the world. I am a
23 union member and a rank and file shop
24 steward for District 1199C. I'm here in
25 a personal capacity and as a member of

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2 Socialist Alternative.

3 The struggle of Starbucks
4 workers and other barista workers is a
5 struggle of all low-wage workers and
6 part-time workers today, just like Eric
7 just highlighted. Corporations like
8 Starbucks make billions in profit right
9 here in Philadelphia, while us workers
10 struggle to keep up with rising rents,
11 spiraling healthcare, and a lack of safe
12 employment.

13 Together, Starbucks and other
14 industry workers can raise pay and also
15 raise expectations about what work means
16 today. These workers got together, they
17 presented their demands, and they filed
18 for a union vote.

19 But let's be totally clear.
20 This is only the beginning of the
21 struggle. Starbucks will not voluntarily
22 give up millions in profit. We saw the
23 brutal and illegal union busing tactics
24 used against our siblings organizing at
25 Amazon in Bessemer, Alabama and in New

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2 York and, as Eric just highlighted, the
3 firing of seven Starbucks workers in
4 Memphis.

5 So the question really is, how
6 do we win against these mega corporations
7 with unlimited resources? We need a mass
8 movement. We have to rely on our own
9 power as workers. We have to share and
10 take up winning tactics and strategy
11 whenever possible. We have to expand the
12 struggle to bring in our communities into
13 this fight back, including our elected
14 officials and the existing union
15 movement.

16 This is an incredibly important
17 first step, this resolution, but it's
18 only a beginning. We need our elected
19 officials to do more to actively build
20 support and bring a spotlight to
21 retaliation against workers seeking a
22 voice in the workplace.

23 A win for Starbucks workers is
24 a win for the working class here across
25 Philadelphia.

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2 We know a rising tide lifts all
3 boats. It's time to lift up the
4 struggling Starbucks workers today and
5 support this resolution.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
7 you, Tony Abata, for your comments.

8 Can the Chief Clerk please read
9 the name of our next speaker.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Lou O'Reilly,
11 commenting on 220176.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
13 morning, Lou O'Reilly. Are you connected
14 and ready to proceed?

15 MR. O'REILLY: Yes, I am. Lou
16 O'Reilly, speaking on Resolution 220176.
17 Oh, sorry.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: No.
19 You're fine. State your name for the
20 record and just proceed. Yes.

21 MR. O'REILLY: Okay. I am a
22 Starbucks barista working currently at
23 9th and South Street. We have over the
24 last two days been having a series of
25 captive audience sessions that can at

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2 best be described as anti-union
3 conversations and at worst be described
4 as a forced listening to anti-union
5 propaganda that in most cases is
6 misleading, at most generous.

7 These sessions are frankly
8 exhausting for the employees who are
9 constantly having facts that we know and
10 laws that we know we are supported by
11 being outright lied about or misconstrued
12 by Starbucks corporate.

13 These union efforts have been
14 led by our employees. It has been from
15 the get-go by the workers, because we
16 have realized the flaws evident in
17 Starbucks and our need to have a larger
18 position at the bargaining table, and
19 these intimidation tactics are a malice
20 effort to attempt to dissolve our union
21 before it's even begun.

22 We are thankful for City
23 Council for proposing a resolution to
24 reinforce the backing that we know we
25 have through our labor laws and hope for

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2 continued support from Council in the
3 case that Starbucks permits any more
4 further actions of blatant anti-union
5 behavior.

6 Thank you for your time,
7 Chairman.

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
9 you, Lou O'Reilly, for your comments
10 today.

11 Can we please read the name of
12 our next speaker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Sarah Giskin, commenting on 220176.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Sarah,
16 good afternoon.

17 MS. GISKIN: Hi. Can you hear
18 me?

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, we
20 can hear you. You are connected. Just
21 state your name for the record and
22 proceed with your comments, Sarah.

23 MS. GISKIN: Okay. Thank you.

24 My name is Sarah Giskin and I'm
25 here to support Resolution No. 220176 to

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2 stand in solidarity with Starbucks
3 workers organizing to form a union. I am
4 a rank and file member of AFSCME DC47 and
5 also a member of Socialist Alternative.
6 I'm speaking in a personal capacity
7 today.

8 The last year Starbucks made 5
9 billion in practice and also raised their
10 CEO's total compensation to over
11 \$20 million, all the while workers who
12 roast the beans, brew the coffee, work
13 the register, interact with customers
14 during a deadly pandemic, and do so much
15 more have been struggling to make ends
16 meet. Their schedules are unpredictable,
17 their wages stagnant, their healthcare
18 coverage is expensive and insufficient,
19 and for some reason, they are not allowed
20 to receive tips from credit card
21 transactions.

22 There are now over 100
23 Starbucks locations nationwide, including
24 four in Philadelphia, that have publicly
25 announced that they are joining the

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2 union, and it's awesome to have just
3 heard from one of those workers today.
4 Solidarity.

5 And as a union member, I can
6 say that this wave of organizing at
7 Starbucks is the most significant
8 development in the labor movement right
9 now. There is huge energy in the
10 working-class rank and file across the
11 country and potential to rebuild the
12 strength of the labor movement and raise
13 our collective expectations for what we
14 can win beyond the limited vision of many
15 labor leaders.

16 If Starbucks workers win big,
17 the impact will be electric across U.S.
18 labor. All workers have a stake in this
19 in every industry in every part of the
20 country, and that's why Starbucks will
21 ramp up their union busing relentlessly,
22 anti-union propaganda, captive audience
23 meetings, and even illegal retaliatory
24 firings like have happened in Memphis.
25 So we must not underestimate them.

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2 That's why City Council must
3 stand unequivocally with these workers in
4 their fight to make their work
5 sustainable, dignified, and fairly
6 compensated. Any elected official
7 anywhere who claims to be pro worker or
8 pro labor needs to do the same. It's a
9 simple question: Which side are you on?

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you
11 very much, Sarah, for your comments
12 today.

13 Mr. President?

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
15 Madam Leader.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. Pass the reins back
18 to the Prez.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Duly
20 accepted. Thank you, Madam Leader.

21 Mr. Decker, please read the
22 next name.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Mary Adamson, commenting on 220176.

3 MS. ADAMSON: Good afternoon.

9 My name is Mary Adamson. I'm
10 the President of the Temple University
11 Hospital Nurses Association. We're a
12 local of PASNAP in North Philadelphia,
13 and we stand in solidarity with the
14 workers who are fighting against
15 Starbucks.

16 Nurses are no strangers to the
17 barista. We know them well. This is how
18 we get through some of our long shifts,
19 but we're in solidarity with these
20 workers, particularly the ones that were
21 fired in Memphis for organizing. We've
22 passed a resolution at our local to stand
23 in solidarity with Starbucks workers, and
24 we also sent money to them to help with
25 the workers that were fired.

3 labor movement in Philadelphia to do the
4 same, and we ask City Council to pass
5 this resolution to show Starbucks and the

9 Currently at Temple Hospital, we're
10 dealing with the same thing, and we've
11 had a longstanding union for many years.

12 The Starbucks workers union
13 drive has the potential to be the next
14 best step toward rebuilding a fighting
15 labor movement in Philly and across the
16 country. So we all have a huge stake in
17 the success of the Starbucks workers.

18 So please pass this resolution
19 and stand with the workers of
20 Philadelphia and across the country.

21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
24 appreciate it.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Gail Loney,

22 Women's History Month where she stands
23 alongside people such as Ruth Wilson and
24 Dr. Ethel Allen.

25 She is a walking, talking

activist leader who inspires and aspires us all and is the voice of Black history, Black pride, Black women, and Black people. Jackie can tell you about the history of the country, the City, the neighborhoods, and especially North Philadelphia. She's a business woman who does tours through Wiggins Tours. She's a storyteller and a volunteer at Johnson House in Germantown where she does programming for young people to learn about the Underground Railroad to be forever connected to their history.

She's a mentor to many, even though she may not know or realize, and donates to causes for youth. She volunteers her time and experience, her knowledge and her skill.

She's a dynamic woman whose DNA is about teaching and learning in and outside the classroom. And I want to thank Kendra Brooks for lifting up Ms. Jackie at a time when Black women need to be lifted up, when Black women

2 have not always been shown in the best
3 light.

4 I'd like to thank Kendra for

4 For decades, Evelyn Graves
5 Ministries Church has provided a place
6 for people to gather as a community, and
7 the almost 40 faith-based programs
8 founded by Dr. Graves have created a rich
9 legacy of activism, empowerment,
10 creativity, and mentorship. These
11 outputs have provided spiritual
12 enrichment, arts, education, childcare,
13 and employment opportunities to more than
14 half a million underserved families and
15 will continue to do so for decades to
16 come.

17 This is not the first time
18 Dr. Graves has been honored by this
19 Council body for her lifetime of
20 achievement and service to our city. In
21 2015, 5400 Chester Avenue and the 1400
22 and 1500 blocks of South 55th Street were
23 named as Dr. Evelyn Graves Way as a token
24 of recognition for her service, and it is
25 my honor to introduce this resolution in

2 honor of the legacy she leaves behind.

3 Dr. Graves' death marks the
4 passing of a spiritual giant and
5 humanitarian, for her lifetime of work is
6 truly a gift that will continue to enrich
7 the residents of our city for many years
8 to come.

9 My dearest condolences go out
10 to Dr. Graves' family. We are all so
11 grateful for all of the incredible work
12 she's done to better our city.

13 And with that, I move for the
14 adoption of the resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All in favor of the resolution
19 indicate by saying aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it, and that resolution is

3 Mr. Decker, please read the
4 title of Bill No. 210956-A.

5 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
6 signifying the intention of the City of
7 Philadelphia to organize the Philadelphia
8 Public Financial Authority pursuant to
9 authority established under state law,
10 and amending Chapters 20-600 ("Standards
11 of Conduct and Ethics"), 20-1200
12 ("Lobbying"), and 17-1400
13 ("Non-Competitively Bid Contracts;
14 Financial Assistance") of The
15 Philadelphia Code to address ethics,
16 contractual and other requirements
17 applicable to the Philadelphia Public
18 Financial Authority.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
20 bill having been read on two different
21 days, the question now is shall the bill
22 pass finally.

23 Mr. Decker, call the roll.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
25 Bass.

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Aye.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Nay.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

5 Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

8 Quinones-Sanchez.

9 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Aye.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

11 Squilla is voting aye.

12 Councilman Thomas.

13 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Aye.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Council President

15 Clarke.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

17 The ayes are 15; the nays are

18 one. A majority of all members present

19 having voted in the affirmative, the bill

20 passes.

21 Mr. Decker, please read the

22 title of Bill No. 220051-A.

23 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance

24 amending Section 9-4116 of The

25 Philadelphia Code, entitled "2021 Public

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Health Emergency Leave," to establish
3 additional leave time under certain
4 circumstance, modify existing provisions
5 concerning the paid sick leave, and make
6 technical changes.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
10 President?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair --

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I have a
14 point of information.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Okay. The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Green.

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
19 Council President.

20 First, I would like to thank
21 the sponsor, Councilmember Brooks, who
22 joined me and Councilmember Domb on
23 Tuesday, I believe, where we were with
24 the SBA Administrator, Isabella Guzman,
25 as well as Marc Morial and Andrea Custis,

2 both from the Urban League, and we
3 learned some interesting data in
4 reference to small businesses, the fact
5 that 40 percent of small businesses,
6 especially in the --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Councilman, can you hold on one second.
9 So you wanted a point of information, but
10 Councilwoman Brooks and Domb wanted to
11 speak on the bill. I just want to make
12 sure --

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I
14 understand. I'm about to give my content
15 for my point of information.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
17 right. Thank you, Councilman.

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I
19 understand.

20 And so we learned that a number
21 of businesses, and I was saying
22 40 percent across the nation and
23 41 percent here in the City of
24 Philadelphia, African American businesses
25 were lost during the pandemic.

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 In the space and that context,
3 I wanted to follow up on my point from
4 last week where Councilmember Brooks
5 stated in this body she would meet with
6 small business owners and also provide
7 data in reference to how she came up with
8 the 25 employee threshold.

9 My understanding is she met
10 with some small businesses, and I want to
11 get some perspective on that and I also
12 have a question about the data.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes
16 Councilwoman Brooks for a response and
17 then subsequently to speak on behalf of
18 the bill as earlier referenced.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: So after
20 the hearing, I did take a deep dive with
21 small businesses, with a particular focus
22 on small Black- and Brown-owned
23 businesses in the City.

24 So I amended the bill last week
25 to increase the employer size to

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 businesses to 25 or more employees for
3 the following reasons:

4 According to our own Commerce
5 Department data, which was pulled from
6 the U.S. Bureau Census 2019 County
7 Business Pattern report, approximately
8 85 percent of Philadelphia's businesses
9 have 25 fewer -- 25 employees -- fewer
10 than 25 employees and are exempt from the
11 COVID-19 leave legislation.

12 Additionally, the average business size
13 citywide is 22 employees and would be
14 excluded under this amended definition.
15 And if we were to increase the threshold
16 to businesses with 50 or more employees,
17 a mere 6 percent of Philadelphia
18 businesses would be covered by this
19 legislation.

20 And then back on the data
21 around Black and owned businesses, I
22 evaluated the data that was available,
23 and on average, Black and Brown-owned
24 businesses in the City would be excluded
25 from this legislation based on the

2 current 25 or more employee threshold.

3 In Philadelphia, Black-owned
4 businesses employ 10.3 employees on
5 average, Asian-owned businesses employ
6 5.1 employees, Hispanic-owned businesses
7 employ 7.6 employees, and this
8 information came from the 2017 Bureau of
9 Labor Statistics data presented to the
10 Committee on Commerce and Economic
11 Development on October 6th of 2020 by
12 Center City District. And based on that
13 data, the average Black and Brown-owned
14 businesses would be excluded under the
15 original bill, but I am willing to amend
16 the bill further, out of the abundance of
17 caution, to encompass more small Black
18 and owned businesses. And for weeks now,
19 I've been hearing from businesses about
20 their concerns, and my team and I have
21 consulted with business owners, the
22 Diverse Chambers, and available data, and
23 I'm confident that this bill, as amended,
24 will not adversely impact Philadelphia
25 businesses.

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 But we cannot make policy
3 decisions based on the desire for just
4 one group of stakeholders. And I also
5 talked to dozens of workers, union
6 members, advocates who were adversely
7 affected by previous iterations of this
8 bill lasting during the dire periods of
9 the pandemic, and I feel like we can't
10 leave workers out in the cold again. And
11 that's why I'm confident that this bill
12 balances the need to protect workers and
13 create reasonable expectation for
14 businesses.

15 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
16 President, I have a follow-up question on
17 my point of information.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

20 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Yes. I
21 guess my question was, I did receive some
22 additional data last night at 7:00
23 p.m. --

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: No, no,
25 no. You got the information at 11:53

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 a.m. yesterday. It was sent to both you
3 and Councilmember Domb.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: If I could
5 finish what I was saying.

6 I said I received some
7 additional information regarding the
8 question that Councilwoman Sanchez had in
9 reference to the data in reference to the
10 3,000 businesses that are concerned
11 asking about data by sector, and in that
12 additional information I received at 7:00
13 p.m., for those 3,000 businesses, 642 are
14 in hospitality and food services, 520 are
15 in healthcare and social areas, as well
16 as 418 in retail trade.

17 I guess my question is, did
18 this information go to all
19 Councilmembers, especially District
20 Councilmembers who have a lot of small
21 businesses on their commercial corridors?
22 Because that was one of the things that
23 was stated last week, you would provide
24 the data regarding this information.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: The

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 individual data was sent originally to
3 the Councilmembers that requested it by
4 information. The additional information
5 was followed up and sent to other
6 Councilmembers last evening.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Okay. So I
8 just had a question, because last week
9 you said you would meet with a small
10 business group, which sounds like you did
11 on Tuesday, but then you also would not
12 call this up until you provided the data.
13 I just wanted to make sure that all
14 members of Council received the data.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: All
16 members of Council that specifically
17 requested the data received it earlier
18 than the other members of Council that
19 were included in this vote, and everyone
20 received it last night.

21 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Okay. Thank
22 you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 Councilwoman, did you -- you

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 had earlier requested to be able to
3 speak?

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes, I
5 did. Thank you, Council President.

6 You know, I want to thank my
7 colleagues and the many workers and labor
8 leaders and business owners, the Diverse
9 Chamber of Commerce for their feedback
10 and collaboration on this bill. I'm
11 confident that this bill in its current
12 form represents the best interests of
13 workers and business owners alike and
14 will allow our city to move forward into
15 the next phase of living safely in this
16 pandemic together.

17 And I want to acknowledge that
18 the pandemic is unpredictable. Two
19 previous iterations of this bill provided
20 critical protections for workers.
21 However, each of them lapsed, leaving
22 workers vulnerable to the spikes of the
23 highly contagious Delta and Omnicrom
24 variants.

25 With the City dropping the

1 3/3/22 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 vaccine and mask mandates, the onus is on
3 us now to protect our workers, their
4 families, and the public from the spread
5 of COVID-19. Reestablishing adequate
6 paid sick leave is a key strategy to
7 giving workers the confidence they need
8 to continue to come to work every day,
9 and it's critical in giving the public a
10 peace of mind that sick workers aren't
11 coming in because they can't afford to
12 stay home.

13 And, again, I want to thank the
14 many people who provided their input on
15 this bill, and I want to thank my Council
16 colleagues for co-sponsoring this
17 legislation, Councilmembers Parker,
18 Squilla, Bass, Gauthier, Gilmore
19 Richardson, Gym, and Thomas.

20 Thank you, Council President,
21 for your time.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Domb.

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2 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
3 Council President.

4 And I want to explain my vote
5 on this bill. Yesterday the City of
6 Philadelphia linked its mask mandate --
7 lifted its mask mandate, which really
8 signals the pandemic has subsided and
9 conditions have improved dramatically.
10 So with regards to Bill No. 220051-A, the
11 Public Health Emergency bill, I want to
12 express my sincere gratitude to you,
13 Councilmember Kendra Brooks, for the
14 spirit of this legislation and its
15 positive impact during the hardest
16 moments of this pandemic.

17 I'm in favor of providing leave
18 options for employees managing COVID for
19 a while longer, but it's the technical
20 aspects of this bill that make it
21 extremely difficult for small,
22 medium-sized businesses, non-profits, who
23 have already barely survived this
24 pandemic, to recover fully. Many of them
25 have loans they've taken out and will be

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2 paying back for two to five years.

3 When this legislation was
4 originally enacted, there was PPE money
5 available and there was federal tax
6 credits available to help small
7 businesses and the non-profits stay alive
8 and continue to employ many of our
9 residents in the City of Philadelphia.

10 Right now as we consider this
11 legislation's extension to not the end of
12 this year but December 31 of 2023, almost
13 two years from now, we are expecting
14 these same small businesses and
15 non-profits, who have had no time to
16 fully recover, to manage a large cost
17 burden without any federal, state, or
18 local financial supports.

19 As I've expressed to the bill
20 sponsor, I'm willing to compromise, but I
21 will not put our small businesses and
22 non-profits in such a precarious
23 financial situation as this bill does in
24 its current form.

25 I've requested we apply this

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2 legislation to employers with greater
3 than 50 employees and allow it to sunset
4 the end of this year. Should we see
5 spikes in our COVID cases or new variants
6 come this fall, I'm sure this legislative
7 body is willing to reassess the situation
8 then.

9 And speaking with our local
10 small businesses and non-profits who
11 employ so many of our local residents and
12 speaking with the Diverse Chambers
13 Coalition made up of all of our minority
14 Chambers of Commerce, they all have
15 concerns and oppose this bill.

16 Philadelphia is on the brink of
17 recovery, the brink, and this legislation
18 will be yet another reason why employers
19 will choose to either leave the City or
20 locate elsewhere.

21 I've said it many times in this
22 body. Philadelphia does not exist on an
23 island, and the more we head in that
24 direction, the more our local economy
25 will suffer and our residents in the long

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2 run will suffer from a lack of
3 opportunity.

4 For all these reasons, Council
5 President, I'll be voting no on this
6 bill.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Oh.

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
13 much, Council President.

14 I have heard from the four
15 Diverse Chamber of Commerce. Today one
16 spoke on their behalf. I have received
17 the letters. I suppose other
18 Councilmembers have. But the other
19 Chambers of Commerce are very clear that
20 they oppose this bill any less than 50
21 and anything in terms of timing that is
22 not corresponding to the state's
23 determination and certainly not more than
24 a year.

25 I think when I look at the fact

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2 that the national average for job loss is
3 2.6 percent compared to Philadelphia,
4 which is 7.6 percent, and the fact that
5 it mainly affects lower wage jobs, which
6 is down 37 percent, and in 2020, this
7 city lost 62,800 jobs, and it appears
8 that between 11,000 and 19,000 jobs will
9 not come back because these are remote
10 workers, they're not coming back to the
11 City. This is from the Pew report that
12 has been referenced by this body on a
13 number of occasions.

14 One of the problems that we're
15 facing, and I know that this problem
16 about paid sick leave is a very important
17 problem as well, but one is the lack of
18 employers and the lack of employers that
19 start their own businesses in the
20 communities where there is a lack of
21 opportunity. It is the fact that they
22 have an ability to be their own boss, to
23 hire their family and friends and
24 neighbors, to hope to not only feed their
25 families but to expand and hopefully one

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2 day be prosperous. That has been on
3 decline in this city since the 1960s.

4 There are less and less
5 independently owned, particularly African
6 American, businesses in this city, and I
7 believe that the voice of those
8 representatives of the small business
9 community is very important.

10 When I'm in doubt about things,
11 I consider who testified for the bill and
12 who testified against the bill, and
13 sometimes no one testifies against the
14 bill that I actually, quite frankly, am
15 not clear that I would support, but no
16 one testified against it. This is a
17 different matter. I found, quite
18 frankly, that oftentimes business does
19 not speak up.

20 So the fact that these four
21 business chambers and others have been
22 very clear in their opposition I find a
23 very important consideration, and for
24 that reason, I too will vote against the
25 bill.

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2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 The Chair recognizes --

6 Councilman Green, you referenced a point
7 of information again or you just want to
8 tee up to speak?

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Well, it is
10 a point of information to Councilmember
11 Brooks.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Okay. Go ahead.

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
15 Council President.

16 I guess my last point of
17 information for Councilmember Brooks is
18 that in your meeting, which I think was
19 about 47 small businesses that met with
20 you this week, and based on the data that
21 you provided to myself and some
22 Councilmembers, about 2,800
23 establishments will be impacted by this
24 legislation, and I just want to get an
25 understanding that your thought is that

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2 by meeting with that group this week,
3 that's an adequate outreach to businesses
4 that will be impacted by this
5 legislation?

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Well, the
7 meeting I had this week, I actually
8 requested the meeting based on the
9 conversation that we had with the
10 Chamber. It was their responsibility to
11 bring small businesses to that table.

12 My staff took detailed notes
13 and information around the data that we
14 received, both in the chat and in the
15 conversation, and we also followed up
16 individually with each business owner
17 that was on that call.

18 Based on the data that I
19 received and the questions that I asked
20 in relation to this bill, I still felt it
21 was important for me to move forward as
22 is, as amended, today on this bill.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
24 Council President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Bass.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I just had a quick
7 question. My question was to the
8 sponsor.

9 Thank you for all your work on
10 this. I know you've really been out here
11 working hard on it, but I do have a
12 concern that just came up.

13 Does every member of Council
14 have the same information, the same
15 updated information about this bill?

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: They
17 should. Everyone received the
18 information yesterday.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Okay. So
20 everyone has the same information?

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: All right.
23 Thank you. No further questions.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you, Councilwoman.

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2 Councilman Jones, did you
3 still -- would you still like to speak?

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Jones.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

7 I'm joined by out-of-town
8 students, so they're getting the
9 opportunity to hear and experience
10 democracy at its best.

11 I just want to put on the
12 record a couple of things put in context,
13 and then I'm going to tell you how I'm
14 going to vote on this bill, not that it
15 will determine the outcome one way or the
16 other, but I want it on the record.

17 That there are certain
18 corridors in the City of Philadelphia
19 that have not recovered from the
20 pandemic, have not recovered from the
21 civil unrest. I can ride down those
22 corridors and 20 or so percent, Council
23 President, we always talk about have not
24 come back and are not coming back. They
25 either took that money from the insurance

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2 and ran or they just were underinsured
3 and couldn't build back.

4 I want us to remember this,
5 because all too often as we start to move
6 forward with good intentions as a body,
7 we don't understand the impact or we
8 aren't feeling the impact of some of the
9 people that represent the small business
10 community, particularly Black and Brown
11 businesses.

12 We this week, Mr. President,
13 instituted a \$2,000 assessment on
14 businesses so that they could continue
15 outdoor eateries, \$2,000 on top of. And
16 one of my businesses said to me, well,
17 you know, it's like we went through the
18 plague, we went through flooding with the
19 hurricanes, and here you go again. And I
20 looked them in the face, and it's hard
21 sometimes to say that we don't come off
22 as anti-small business.

23 I'm going to tell you now,
24 because my colleagues is right next door
25 and I'm -- I'm going to vote for this

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2 bill. I'm going to say it again. I'm
3 going to vote for this bill, but what I'm
4 going to require is that in upcoming
5 legislation and opportunities, that we
6 fight just as hard, just as hard for
7 small businesses as we do for their
8 workers, because one without the other
9 just doesn't work. If you give the
10 worker all these opportunities but the
11 business closes its doors, what's the
12 point?

13 And so I remember going back to
14 paid sick leave with people like former
15 Councilmember Greenlee who fought for
16 these kinds of things. He was one of the
17 original folk that fought for these kinds
18 of things, but we as a body have to do
19 things with balance. We got to
20 understand that there's an intended and
21 unintended consequences to our action.

22 So I'm going to err on the side
23 of this bill and pushing it forward, but
24 believe this, I'm going to speak out in
25 the future when we disproportionately

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2 impact stakeholders that are vital to the
3 infrastructure of our city.

4 So thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilwoman Gauthier.

9 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I

10 wanted to thank the bill sponsor for her
11 hard work, not only on this version of
12 the bill but on staying on this issue
13 throughout the pandemic, which is now
14 going into the third year, and making
15 sure that workers are protected, and I
16 want to echo Councilmember Jones's point.
17 He was the first person in this
18 conversation that I heard make the point
19 that there are two sides to this, right?
20 There are businesses, small businesses,
21 and there are workers, and for much of
22 this conversation, we've been talking
23 about our concern for the business
24 community, which I understand, without
25 any mention that businesses do not exist

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2 in a vacuum. Businesses need people to
3 drive them forward, and if those people
4 cannot keep themselves and their families
5 safe, then businesses will not prosper.

6 And so that needs to be always
7 just as -- we talk a lot about the
8 Chamber. We've talked a lot about the
9 Diverse Chamber. I understand their
10 place in this conversation, but the
11 people, many of them who are also Black
12 and Brown, matter. And I would
13 challenge -- Councilmember Brooks, she's
14 been challenged a lot during this
15 discussion on the importance of her
16 meeting with the Chamber and the
17 businesses, and I would just ask anyone
18 who is voting no to consider is it also
19 important to meet with workers? Is it
20 also important to have conversations with
21 people who are directly impacted? Do you
22 all think that that's just as important
23 as meeting with the business community?
24 Because I do, because I think that their
25 voices deserve to be heard in this

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2 discussion too. And I would just say
3 again that many of those people are also
4 Black and Brown.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Green.

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
10 Council President. I wasn't going to
11 speak again, but I thought it was
12 important based on the fact that there
13 was assumption that just because I talk
14 up for small businesses, I don't also
15 talk for workers.

16 I have voted for every paid
17 sick leave bill that has come up in this
18 body, even though that was concerning to
19 some in the business community. My
20 concern is this bill at this level, when
21 the African American Chamber, Hispanic
22 Chamber, and the Asian Chamber step up
23 and say their members are saying this is
24 impacting them and I know that they are
25 business owners but also they have

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2 relationships with their employees.

3 They're concerned not only about the
4 future of their business, they're also
5 concerned about their employees and
6 having a business to employ them.

7 So I understand the issue and
8 the concern making sure that everyone is
9 safe, but we also need to make sure, as
10 Councilmember Jones, as I've often
11 stated, because I talk to both small
12 business owners and individuals, that we
13 need to make sure that we're looking at
14 this in a collective perspective.

15 And so the assumption that
16 because I articulate issues regarding
17 Black and Brown businesses and I'm not
18 talking specifically about individuals is
19 too often that the African American
20 businesses are not spoken up for, because
21 many of them are running their business
22 and don't have the chance to come to a
23 Council meeting or testify in Stated
24 Meetings. So that's why I speak up for
25 those who are not being spoken up for,

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2 which has often happened in this
3 conversation and a lot of conversations
4 in the public sector.

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: To be
7 clear, I didn't make an assumption. I
8 talked about what I heard.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Okay. Let's not make it personal.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Oh.

13 COUNCILMAN OH: Yeah. Thank
14 you very much, Council President, and I
15 don't take it personally. I think it's a
16 very legitimate question, where is, you
17 know, the consideration of workers, and
18 the consideration is there. And I will
19 say that their place of employment, many
20 of them have closed and they don't have a
21 job and they can't go to some of the
22 other places and get a job. Employment
23 in the neighborhood, in the community or
24 an opportunity downtown, it's very
25 important. And so I think, as was said,

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2 they go hand in hand.

3 There needs to be an
4 opportunity for small businesses to get
5 started, to grow, to provide services in
6 the community where often services are
7 lacking, with an understanding of the
8 needs of the community by people from the
9 community or who employ people in the
10 community. I think that's important.

11 I will also note, as Councilman
12 Derek Green noted, that I introduced a
13 bill and it was passed by this Council
14 and signed by the Mayor at the outbreak
15 of COVID to protect healthcare workers in
16 a manner that does not sunset, that does
17 protect them. And in the past Council
18 sessions, we have fought for the
19 employment of workers and union members
20 in the healthcare industry, in the
21 manufacturing industry, and continue to
22 do so and with Councilmember Curtis
23 Jones, with his efforts and international
24 investment and opportunities, long
25 history, and particularly on my part, for

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2 those interested in the creative arts
3 economy and how important that is.

4 But there's a point where those
5 efforts have to turn into a sustainable
6 method of employment. They want to
7 create a business. They want to see it
8 grow. They need to hire people, and they
9 need to be prosperous in order to do
10 that.

11 So I think that is the balance,
12 and I think that is there. I will say
13 again I do think that this is a bad time
14 to do it for the reasons that I stated in
15 terms of the numbers, and I think that is
16 a balancing act. And so that issue of
17 the workers is very important and I want
18 to ensure that they have jobs and they
19 may one day themselves start their own
20 business after having that experience.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 The Chair recognizes
25 Councilwoman Bass.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
3 Mr. President.

4 I just wanted to make a
5 suggestion. I did reach out to the bill
6 sponsor and asked if it was a
7 possibility, particularly on the sunset
8 provision, if it was possible that if
9 numbers continue to drop at a rate in
10 which they're dropping right now in terms
11 of COVID and the need for having this
12 piece of legislation, if there was a
13 willingness to basically do another bill
14 to address ending the sunset a whole lot
15 sooner than what is being suggested now,
16 and the bill sponsor, Councilwoman
17 Brooks, from my understanding from our
18 conversation, our dialogue, is certainly
19 willing to do that.

20 So I just really wanted to
21 thank her for being open and willing to
22 compromise.

23 I really do like to always give
24 all of my colleagues the benefit of the
25 doubt that we can always try to work

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2 something out. One of the problems I
3 think with government is where we see
4 something is not working or it's not
5 working as intended and we don't address
6 it, we don't step in, we don't use the
7 tools that we have to make things better
8 when we can, and I think that her
9 willingness to make the change regarding
10 the sunset is a big step forward and I
11 really do appreciate that.

12 So I just wanted to publicly
13 acknowledge her willingness to compromise
14 in this matter and thank her for that
15 effort.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 Councilwoman Brooks, did you --
20 you're good? Okay.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: I'm good.
22 I'm good.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
24 right. The Chair recognizes Councilwoman
25 Quinones-Sanchez.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
3 you, Council President, and actually
4 Councilwoman Bass covered a little bit
5 around -- you know, legislation is always
6 fluid, this notion that what we do today
7 can't be modified or amended as we move
8 forward, you know, and I appreciate that
9 she highlighted that the bill sponsor is
10 willing to entertain that.

11 You know, I strongly advocated
12 to the bill sponsor to go to 25,
13 understanding the reality of immigrant
14 businesses in some of the commercial
15 corridors and also understanding that
16 you're not going to cover everyone. You
17 know, would the bill be better at 50?
18 Probably for many folks, especially the
19 2,800 businesses. Would it be better at
20 2022? Yes. But what we do in this
21 legislative body, and we did it when we
22 first did sick leave back, as
23 Councilmember Jones was talking about,
24 with Greenlee, that was very tough. It
25 took us several years to get to a

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2 consensus around that, and it wasn't a
3 consensus that everybody was happy about.

4 So I appreciate my colleagues,
5 the ones who are voting no, because they
6 stand by their conviction and their
7 position, and I appreciate the colleagues
8 who may not be comfortable with this
9 compromise and are voting yes.

10 But what we're doing today is
11 not the end of a conversation about how
12 we treat workers and how we treat
13 businesses. It's an ongoing conversation
14 and a constant push and pull, and so we
15 should continue to have these
16 discussions. It's going to come up in
17 our budget, how we support both of these
18 sectors, and I want everybody to be as
19 passionate in that conversation as we
20 move forward and hope that, again, as we
21 recover, if things change, as data
22 analysis change, that this bill sponsor
23 and other bills that we have on the
24 table, whether it's the streetery debate
25 that we'll have and some others, that we

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2 weigh both of those options and try to
3 make the best decision with the
4 information we have when we make those
5 decisions.

6 So thank you, everyone. Again,
7 as someone who has been in constant
8 communication with the bill sponsor and
9 some of my colleagues, I'll be voting yes
10 for this bill, and hopefully we'll
11 continue to do the advocacy, particularly
12 with the ethnic Chambers of Commerce who
13 we work with every day.

14 Thank you. Thank you,
15 Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Domb.

20 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
21 Council President. I'll be brief.

22 When Councilman Jones mentioned
23 a business in his district, the gentleman
24 I think who has a restaurant, I thought
25 of the fact that it's unfortunate we

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2 can't categorize these bills by industry,
3 because clearly technology and law and
4 other life sciences did very well during
5 the pandemic, but the industries that got
6 crushed were hospitality. They got
7 crushed, restaurants, hotels. And I can
8 tell you that I'm aware of three
9 restaurants in the City right now, one
10 has one location, one has four locations,
11 another one has three, all seeking loans
12 from 200,000 to a million dollars to keep
13 their businesses going.

14 And I'm just going to say that
15 this is just a tough time for
16 hospitality. It's a shame we can't
17 separate it on the hospitality side.
18 They've been crushed by this pandemic.

19 Thank you, Council President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 Councilman Oh, did you wish to
23 be recognized again?

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Yeah. I'm
25 sorry. I mean, we're ready to vote. I

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2 think we have all made up our minds. I'm
3 simply going to state that when a bill
4 passes, when it's signed, people make
5 decisions. They may not be here six
6 months later or a year later when
7 something is amended or reintroduced.

8 The law that is passed today is
9 what causes people to make decisions
10 about tomorrow, and that is the issue
11 that we're facing right now.

12 But I appreciate the
13 discussion. I think everybody has.
14 There are reasons, and we are going to
15 take a vote. As is said often, that's
16 democracy in action.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 Okay. Mr. Decker, just read
21 the title again since it's been a while
22 and people may forget what we're going to
23 vote on.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Bill No.

25 220051-A, an ordinance amending Section

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2 9-4116 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
3 "2021 Public Health Emergency Leave," to
4 establish additional leave time under
5 certain circumstance, modify existing
6 provisions concerning the paid sick
7 leave, and making technical changes.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 This bill having been read on
11 two different days, the question now is
12 shall the bill pass finally.

13 Mr. Decker, can you please call
14 the roll.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
16 Bass.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
19 Brooks.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Aye.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb.

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Nay.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
24 Gauthier.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Aye.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

3 Gilmore Richardson.

4 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Aye.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green.

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Nay.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym.

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

10 Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Nay.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

17 O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Nay.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

20 Parker.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

23 Quinones-Sanchez.

24 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Aye.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

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2 Squilla is voting aye.

3 Councilman Thomas.

4 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Aye.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Council President
6 Clarke.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

8 The ayes are 12; the nays are
9 four. A majority of members present
10 voting in the affirmative, the bill
11 passes.

12 Mr. Decker, do you have any
13 additional resolutions?

14 CHIEF CLERK: I do,
15 Mr. President.

16 A resolution authorizing
17 Council's Committee on Streets and
18 Services and Committee on Global
19 Opportunities and the Creative/Innovative
20 Economy to hold hearings on the
21 Administration's plan for public electric
22 vehicle charging, introduced today by
23 Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

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2 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes, Council
3 President. May I be heard on this
4 resolution before we do the motion?

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
6 sir.

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
8 much.

9 Council President, we had
10 extensive hearings on this. It was very
11 controversial. We had a lot of
12 testimony, several bills introduced, and
13 then we were working with the
14 Administration. The Administration was
15 very good about meeting all sides.

16 At the end of it all, we were
17 supposed to have a plan for public access
18 high-speed charging, and we were in that,
19 and it has been a while, perhaps it's
20 COVID, but I am not aware of any effort
21 to implement a plan and I'd like to see
22 where we are, as my co-sponsor Councilman
23 Mark Squilla.

24 It's a lot of effort, a lot of
25 bills dealing with a system that everyone

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2 agreed was not sustainable, well almost
3 everyone, just a few people. And so we
4 need a sustainable system. We need
5 public access. We need the bills and
6 authorizations to make this happen.

7 And so I look forward to having
8 this hearing so we can see where we are,
9 and I will note that this has now
10 become -- at the time, it was an
11 unpopular thing we were doing, but now it
12 has become a very popular thing, with
13 even the President in his Address talking
14 about the need for this infrastructure.

15 So with that, I move for the
16 adoption of the resolution.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
20 seconded.

21 All in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

4 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
5 other resolutions on the Final Passage
6 Calendar, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you very much.

9 That completes our Calendar for
10 today. I see a note here that says we're
11 not having any speeches today.

12 Can't get away with that, huh?
13 Okay.

14 Any speeches on behalf of the
15 minority?

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: I'll keep
17 it short.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
19 real quick, just for the record.

20 For the record, at this time we
21 will use the Chat feature available in
22 Microsoft Teams to allow members to
23 signify that they wish to be recognized.
24 In order to comply with the Sunshine Act,
25 that Chat feature must be only used for

2 that particular purpose.

3 Now with that said, speeches on
4 behalf of the minority?

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
6 you, Council President.

7 I first want to thank
8 Councilmember Gym for co-introducing the
9 resolution with me expressing firm
10 support for the Starbucks stores in
11 Philadelphia attempting to organize a
12 union.

13 Philly is a union town, and we
14 know that workers coming together for the
15 collective good is the only way that we
16 can sustain equitable dignified
17 workplaces.

18 I am so impressed with the many
19 young people who are coming together to
20 build power and organize their workplaces
21 and demand fair treatment, and I urge
22 Starbucks to refrain from retaliation and
23 to accept card check neutrality.

24 As a person who came into
25 politics out of organizing my community,

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2 these young people are an inspiration,
3 and City Council stands in solidarity
4 with you.

5 Today Council voted to pass my
6 final installation in my Black History
7 Month series honoring prolific Black
8 Philadelphia women, and I'm so proud to
9 honor my friend, community member, and
10 trailblazer, Ms. Jackie Wiggins, honoring
11 Jackie, especially to me, because I've
12 seen firsthand how she lifts up other
13 Black women and strengthened communities
14 and pushes the narrative forward. You
15 can see this with her activism around the
16 Stadium Stompers, which helped prevent
17 further encroachment of a football
18 stadium by Temple University into North
19 Philadelphia, and you can see this with
20 her work to create enrichment programs
21 called The Underground Railroad Camps for
22 children, youth, and families. And you
23 can see this in the way that she called
24 today, not to take credit for her work
25 but to advocate for workers who are in

2 need of paid sick leave.

3 For decades, she has been a
4 relentless advocate for Philadelphia
5 Black communities, and she does not work
6 for fame or credit but because she
7 believes in doing the right thing.

8 And I also want to thank Ms.
9 Gail Loney for her beautiful and powerful
10 testimony highlighting Jackie's legacy
11 and ongoing leadership.

12 So today we recognize her for
13 her dedication to serving, teaching, and
14 advocating for marginalized populations.

15 Thank you so much, Ms. Jackie.

16 And I want to give a shout-out
17 to the Twin Sister Docs, my doctor
18 specifically, Dr. Delana Wardlaw, and her
19 sister, Elana McDonald.

20 Thank you, colleagues, and
21 thank you, Council President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 Speeches on behalf of the
25 majority?

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Thomas.

4 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
5 Council President. At this point, good
6 afternoon.

7 I just wanted to take a moment
8 to acknowledge the fact that today is the
9 day that the driving equality law will
10 essentially be implemented, and for us as
11 members of Council, I think this is
12 something that we should be extremely
13 proud of.

14 We do all know that there is a
15 lawsuit that's pending that's taking
16 place. I'm not going to talk too much
17 about that, because we don't want to have
18 that type of public quarrel. That's what
19 the courts are for. But we are
20 optimistic that we will be able to
21 withstand that lawsuit.

22 For me and for my colleagues
23 who can relate to what it means to drive
24 around the City of Philadelphia and
25 experience some of the different things

2 that take place when you're just trying
3 to get from one place to another and
4 you're a law-abiding citizen, sometimes
5 those things don't always go our way as
6 men of color when we are pulled over by
7 law enforcement.

8 It was an honor for me to wake
9 up today to text messages from folks all
10 across the City of Philadelphia, but I
11 think what resonated with me the most was
12 hearing from the English teacher at
13 Frankford High School who has been
14 teaching driving equality to his class
15 and talking to them about me being an
16 alumni of Frankford High School and the
17 work that we've been doing in this
18 legislative body, not just representing
19 Frankford High School but the entire City
20 of Philadelphia.

21 So it's an honor to be able to
22 see this day. In 2020, people literally
23 set this city on fire and set other
24 cities all across the country on fire
25 because they wanted to see some level of

2 change as it relates to how communities
3 of color were policed and the
4 relationships between communities of
5 color and law enforcement.

6 I'm honored to be a part of the
7 process that is spearheading that
8 conversation where as though today in
9 Philadelphia we've answered that call.

10 So thank you, colleagues.
11 Thank you, Council President, for
12 allowing me to make some brief remarks
13 today, and thank you to the young people
14 all across the City of Philadelphia but
15 especially the young people at Frankford
16 High School who are studying driving
17 equality and who are looking to explore
18 this legislation and ensure that it is a
19 part of their academic journey.

20 Thank you, colleagues.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Green.

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,

2 Council President.

3 Earlier in Council I mentioned
4 a panel that occurred on Monday with the
5 SBA Administrator, Isabella Guzman, as
6 well as Marc Morial, former Mayor of New
7 Orleans, current presidency of the
8 National Urban League, as well as Andrea
9 Custis from the Urban League of
10 Philadelphia. I was joined by
11 Councilmembers Domb and Brooks, and it
12 was focusing on the Community Navigator
13 Pilot Program to help small businesses,
14 especially Black and Brown businesses, in
15 the City of Philadelphia and around the
16 country.

17 During that panel, there were a
18 number of African American business
19 owners that were there, and the
20 consistent issue that we heard from those
21 business owners and also reiterated by
22 both Andrea Custis and Marc Morial and
23 SBA Administrator Guzman is that the lack
24 of access to credit has been an issue and
25 why they have not been able to grow.

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2 We know in our city with a
3 44 percent African American population
4 that only 6 percent of the businesses
5 with employees in our city are owned by
6 African Americans. And from the Latin
7 diaspora, 15 percent population, but only
8 4 percent of the businesses with
9 employees are owned by our brothers and
10 sisters in the Latin diaspora. And we
11 know this is an issue in our city,
12 especially during the pandemic, how the
13 fact that the economic calamity of
14 COVID-19 decimated Black and Brown
15 businesses. Not only have they had the
16 challenge to stay alive, but they've had
17 the challenge to thrive because of the
18 lack of access to credit.

19 And it's based on that issue,
20 plus my past experience from working with
21 my former boss, Councilmember Marian
22 Tasco, on the anti-predatory lending
23 bill, to my first job as a small business
24 lender with Meridian Bank at Broad and
25 Glenwood, why I moved forward on this

2 idea of a public banking initiative and
3 with the first step of that initiative,
4 which was the legislation that was passed
5 today, the Philadelphia Public Financial
6 Authority.

7 I want to thank all of my
8 colleagues who attended a number of
9 hearings, received a lot of e-mails and
10 information regarding this issue over the
11 years. This has been a large coalition
12 that have helped all of us get to this
13 point, and I just want to thank some of
14 the members of that coalition.

15 From the Philadelphia Banking
16 Coalition, Stan Shapiro, Peter Winslow,
17 Susan Windle, Tim Brown, Vanessa Lowe,
18 and all of the members of that Coalition;
19 Andrea Schlesinger from HR&A and all of
20 her team who helped us from the very
21 beginning on the first study regarding
22 public banking some years ago; my staff,
23 Frank Iannuzzi, Kyra Harris, Duwayne
24 Terry, and all of my staff who have
25 really been involved in helping us to get

2 to this point; the team from Holland and
3 Knight, Kwamina Williford, Len Bernstein,
4 Charlie Stutts, Kara Ward, and all the
5 attorneys at Holland and Knight who have
6 been our outside counsel helping us to
7 get to this point; the City Law
8 Department, from Dan Cantu-Hertzler,
9 Valerie Robinson, Lewis Rosman;
10 Treasurer's Office from Treasurer Jackie
11 Dunn and all of the staff in both the Law
12 and all the Treasurer's Office that have
13 helped us in this legislation, as well as
14 others from the Pennsylvania Public
15 Banking Coalition and the National Public
16 Banking Institute.

17 I just want to thank all of
18 them for working and spending a lot of
19 time, a lot of hours, a lot of treasure
20 to help us get to this point, this first
21 step.

22 Now as we go into the budget
23 process, I will call on the Mayor to make
24 the appointments for this new Authority
25 and also fund this new Authority so we

2 can move forward and provide access to
3 credit for the many businesses that we
4 need to grow and thrive in our city, so
5 that way, we can reduce the 25 percent
6 poverty rate, which also impacts the
7 public safety that we have in the City,
8 to allow those small businesses to
9 provide jobs, to make our city more safe
10 and have a more thriving and growing
11 city.

12 Thank you, Council President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Jones.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
18 Mr. President.

19 The State Court ruled against
20 our lost and stolen gun law. Three-panel
21 judge stood up and said that this law,
22 our ordinance, would impede upon the
23 Second Amendment rights of
24 Pennsylvanians.

25 When you sent me up there,

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2 Mr. President, to represent City
3 Council -- and I want to thank the City
4 Solicitor's Office for valiantly
5 representing our position -- I could tell
6 when I left that court what that verdict
7 was going to be, because the view of the
8 world that they have is not the world
9 that you and I have to experience every
10 day in neighborhoods in Philadelphia.

11 Lost and stolen guns, if you
12 lose a cell phone, you report it. If you
13 lose -- or a car is stolen, you report
14 it. But yet when it comes to firearms,
15 which are potentially fatal, that's doing
16 too much.

17 The other day tragically a
18 12-year-old was shot dead by a
19 Philadelphia police officer. I'm not
20 going to weigh into who, whether -- you
21 know, how that happened, but the one fact
22 that I do know is that gun that that
23 young man had was stolen.

24 When we look at the 100 Shooter
25 Review, we realize that many of the

2 people that are pulling those triggers do
3 so with stolen guns, straw purchased
4 guns.

5 The person that the court case
6 for lost and stolen appealed admitted
7 that he had purchased five guns, straw
8 purchased, gave them to other people.
9 Two of them wound up in shootings in
10 Philadelphia. Lost and stolen.

11 My colleagues and I - Member
12 Johnson, Member Isaiah Thomas, Member
13 Gauthier, Member Brooks - all of us went
14 down to the Crime Lab, and from ceiling
15 to floor, there was nothing but in five
16 rooms guns that were used in the
17 commission of a crime, many of whom were
18 stolen.

19 It is wrong for members at the
20 Commonwealth level to look at
21 Philadelphia, point the finger and say,
22 tsk, tsk, tsk, look what's going on in
23 Philly with all these murders. Yet when
24 it comes to commonsense gun legislation,
25 they fight. When it comes to looking at

2 the location where crimes occur and
3 illegal gambling machines, no, can't do
4 that.

5 So it's like fighting a fight
6 with your hands tied behind your back and
7 then being accused of not doing enough by
8 the people that tied your hands.

9 So we're going to keep
10 fighting, we're going to keep getting
11 sued, and we're going to keep trying to
12 protect the citizens of Philadelphia.
13 But I am perplexed how they can confuse
14 the protecting the rights of hunters
15 versus safeguarding the citizens from
16 people that are hunting them.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman. And, again, thank
20 you for going to Harrisburg to represent
21 Council in an extremely uphill battle,
22 but at the end of the day, like the
23 citizens of Ukraine where they won't give
24 up, we won't give up. Thank you,
25 Councilman.

2 The Chair recognizes

3 Councilwoman Gym.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
5 much, Council President and colleagues.

6 You know, obviously as we
7 witness the horrors of war on the
8 international stage, we are all held to
9 account for the horrors happening here in
10 our own city.

11 Yesterday our colleague
12 Councilmember Johnson held a key hearing
13 in the Special Committee on Gun Violence
14 on the state of mental health of children
15 and young people here in the City of
16 Philadelphia, and there's no question
17 that the testimony that we're hearing
18 indicates that we have to change the way
19 we work and allocate resources here in
20 the City, the levels of young people
21 suffering from depression, the levels of
22 young people not only contemplating but
23 acting on suicidal ideation, the
24 percentages of children, Black and Brown
25 girls and boys, whose statistics are

2 literally through the roof on crises of
3 isolation, of fears, of deprivation, and
4 of institutions falling apart.

5 You know, last year the
6 Council -- our Committee on Children and
7 Youth released a youth-powered
8 anti-violence agenda that listed a number
9 of priorities around mental health
10 responses that were desperately needed
11 with regard to gun violence prevention
12 and intervention, and these came directly
13 from the perspectives and recommendations
14 that were put forward by young people
15 themselves who had been directly involved
16 in addressing gun violence.

17 And I will say again, as we
18 know, at every roundtable discussion, in
19 every meeting that we have with young
20 leaders, and at every town hall that we
21 hosted, the lack of access to
22 trauma-focused therapeutic services was
23 always one of the highest priorities, and
24 the absolute kind of collapsing of what
25 used to be standard institutions,

2 including our public schools, has been
3 felt extremely deeply.

4 I can't underscore enough the
5 damage that is happening when we have
6 over 300 teacher vacancies currently in
7 the School District of Philadelphia.
8 Those are empty seats right now, and that
9 on top of that gets layered your common
10 absences, people calling out because
11 they're sick or they've got other things
12 that have to be dealt with in an
13 emergency. There are almost 1,000
14 substitute calls every single day in the
15 School District of Philadelphia. That is
16 thousands and thousands of children who
17 do not have a teacher in the classroom.

18 I talked to one individual who
19 is doing substituting, because that's one
20 of the requirements that 440 has, and
21 landed at an elementary school in the
22 Northeast where the children have not had
23 a teacher since November, and there will
24 be a substitute every single day for that
25 eighth grade class until the end of the

2 year.

3 We are missing counselors and
4 nurses, social workers. We're talking
5 about a crisis within our pipeline.

6 So I say all of this because we
7 have choices that we have to make with
8 this budget session. We have a library
9 system where the majority of libraries
10 aren't even open five days a week, and
11 none are open on the weekends, not a
12 single one.

13 We've got parks and rec centers
14 are still below their budgeted allocated
15 amounts. We've got children -- and at
16 the other end of it, I'll never forget,
17 you know, in August before the school
18 year started, they held summer schools,
19 entirely voluntary for high school
20 students. You didn't have to go. It was
21 not mandated. And I went up to Fels High
22 School to visit one of these summer
23 schools. Do you know how many children
24 showed up on that very first day?
25 Seventeen hundred high school students

2 showed up voluntarily for a four- to
3 six-week program to get them back.

4 Our children want supports.

5 They are ready and hungry for action, and
6 we have to deliver. We have to deliver
7 more than we ever thought that we had to
8 do. And this is not a temporary thing,
9 because I do believe the gun violence
10 numbers ultimately will go down. But
11 it's not what happens when the numbers go
12 down. It is that we have to
13 fundamentally shift our resources into
14 healing and, you know, like almost
15 repenting for what we have done to a
16 generation of children for years to come
17 that we cannot ever fall down on delivery
18 of resources to our schools, to
19 supporting programs, sports leagues,
20 after-school opportunities, guaranteed
21 employment for young people for years
22 going forward, if we're even ever going
23 to have a shot at overcoming what has
24 happened over the last two years and
25 potentially for this year as well.

2 So I look forward to doing that
3 with us. I'm obviously wrecked by, you
4 know, a 12-year-old and just constantly
5 hearing news of shootings outside of
6 schools and children desperately asking
7 for help.

8 But, you know, my commitment is
9 for what we can do for this budget
10 session and beyond and keeping our city
11 deeply committed to a generation of young
12 people who watch every single step that
13 we do and ask every single day whether
14 they will ever be seen or heard.

15 So thank you, Council
16 President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 That appears to be all of the
20 speeches on behalf of the minority and
21 the majority, so at this point, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilman Jones for a motion
23 to adjourn.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
