2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, folks. We're going to get
4 started. Sorry for the delay. Thank
5 you.

6 Everybody is seated. We're
7 going to get started. We've established
8 our quorum, so we're going to start out
9 with our invocation today.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, the Chair recognizes Imam Farid
12 W. Rasool, Amir and President of Majlis
13 Ash-Shura of the Philadelphia and
14 Delaware Valley and Imam of Masjid
15 As-Sabiqun. He is here today as the
16 guest of Councilwoman Gauthier.

17 I would ask all members and
18 guests to please rise.

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 rise.)

21 IMAM RASOOL: Peace be unto
22 you. As-salamu alaikum.

23 I'd like to say to all of you
24 in remembrance of our Mayor. So today is
25 actually the one-year anniversary of us

2 burying him last year, and to be here
3 today is a great honor.

4 But before I say the prayer,
5 I'd like to say this to you. I'd like to
6 tell you something to think about while
7 we're praying and, that is, there was a
8 little boy who was an only child, and his
9 parents were doing very well and he moved
10 out into the suburbs. And so when he got
11 out to the suburbs, he had a big driveway
12 and a swimming pool and everything in the
13 back. And at the same time, he had the
14 basketball court to play with, but he had
15 nobody to play with. So he was always
16 playing catch by hisself, catch by
17 hisself, throw the ball, try to run and
18 catch it. And after a while, he got
19 tired.

20 So when his daddy came home in
21 the driveway, he ran up to the car and
22 said, daddy, daddy, daddy, daddy, daddy,
23 daddy, please play catch with me, please
24 play catch with me.

25 So the daddy had all his work

2 from the office. He said, son, I can't
3 do it right now, but I promise you
4 tomorrow when daddy comes home, daddy
5 promise you he'll play catch with you.

6 And so the next day the little
7 boy was out there waiting for daddy to
8 come to the driveway, and when daddy came
9 up to the driveway and pulled up, he ran
10 to the car and said, daddy, daddy, daddy,
11 daddy, I'm ready, I'm ready, I'm ready,
12 I'm ready. And the father forgot that he
13 promised him to play catch. So he said,
14 oh, yeah, we supposed to play catch
15 today. He said, okay, well, walk here in
16 the office with me so I can take my
17 briefcase in the office, son, and then
18 we'll go play catch.

19 He said, okay, okay, daddy.
20 Okay, daddy.

21 So the father was trying to
22 figure out how can I buy some more time,
23 because I need to get this work done for
24 the office. And so then the little boy
25 said, dad, dad, are you ready?

2 And the father said -- he holds
3 his briefcase up and blew all the papers
4 out. He said, well, listen, listen,
5 daddy got to just put these papers
6 together, and when daddy put these papers
7 together, while he's doing that -- there
8 was a map of the world on the desk, and
9 he took the map of the world up and he
10 tore it up in all these pieces, and gave
11 them to the boy and said, while daddy is
12 putting these papers together, you put
13 these papers back together, you put this
14 map back together, and then we'll go play
15 catch.

16 He said, okay, daddy. Okay,
17 okay.

18 So the little boy came back
19 15 minutes later saying, daddy, daddy,
20 daddy, I got it, I'm ready. Let's go
21 play catch.

22 And he said, son, you can't be
23 ready yet. So he walked in the other
24 room and looked, and the map was put
25 together. He looked at his son. He

2 said, I didn't know I had a genius.

3 Looked back at the map, said, it's really
4 put together. Then he said, son, how in
5 the world did you put that map together?

6 He said, daddy, there was a
7 picture of a man on the back of it, so I
8 figured if I put the man together, the
9 world would be in place.

10 So today I'd like to offer this
11 prayer and invocation based upon us
12 trying to make the world be in place and
13 know that we can only do that by helping
14 every man put himself together.

15 I will first say the prayer in
16 Arabic and then I will say it in English
17 so you know what I've said.

18 (Prayer said in Arabic.)

19 Oh, Lord, we pray that you
20 would bless this body of assembly. We
21 pray that you will fortify their hearts
22 and swell their hearts with purity of
23 intent. We pray that the goodness that
24 will come from them by the way of the
25 duty for which that they do to others

2 will actually shine as a brightness in
3 the eyesight of your view.

4 We pray that you will make them
5 have the courage to stand for truth in
6 the presence of falsehood. We pray that
7 you will have them to -- give them the
8 courage that they would knock their
9 brains out of falsehood with the truth
10 that they hold.

11 And we pray that their
12 footsteps will be fortified in the way
13 that is beneficial to humanity and
14 pleases thee and make all of them
15 successful in the way that pleases thee
16 and make them successful in this life as
17 well as the hereafter and make them die
18 like (unintelligible) of willful
19 submission to you.

20 Ameen.

21 (Amen.)

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good
20 morning, Council President. Good
21 morning, colleagues. I wanted to take a
22 moment to welcome Marvin Dutton of MES
23 Services and congratulate them on ten
24 years of service.

25 As this is the first Council

3 thought it would be important to
4 recognize a Black business that's not
5 only thriving here in the City of
6 Philadelphia but also offering free
7 programming and free services to young
8 people all across the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 Can we take a moment to just
11 ask all of the young people who have
12 benefited from Marvin's Education
13 Services that's here in City Council
14 today just to stand up and welcome them
15 to our Council session.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Please stand up. Thank you.

11 And welcome and
12 congratulations. Thank you guys.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones
14 offers one bill and four resolutions. On
15 behalf of Council President Clarke, an
16 ordinance authorizing the construction,
17 installation, ownership, use and
18 maintenance of a sidewalk cafe at 425
19 through 449 Spring Garden Street.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
21 week.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. The resolutions that are
3 being offered today, particularly
4 centered around education, are inspired
5 by our Chair of Education, Member Isaiah
6 Thomas, who Herculeanly had a hearing, a
7 marathon hearing, diving deep into some
8 of the issues centered around education,
9 public education in the City of
10 Philadelphia.

11 What he allowed us to recognize
12 is that all of us support the School
13 District, support our education, but we
14 do have questions as to when and how
15 things are done and holding people
16 accountable, and sometimes we have to ask
17 uncomfortable questions to get to a place
18 where we get comfortable solutions.

19 So I want to thank him for
20 co-introducing these resolutions today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones
24 offers a privileged resolution
25 authorizing the City Council Committee on

2 Education to hold public hearings
3 examining the levels of learning loss as
4 well as attendance trends as a result of
5 the COVID-19 Pandemic, and to understand
6 how the School District of Philadelphia
7 plans to address these issues.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
9 week's Calendar.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
11 resolution authorizing the City Council
12 Committee on Education to hold public
13 hearings to examine the top performing
14 magnet schools in Philadelphia,
15 understand their strengths in
16 relationship to underperforming schools,
17 and to develop strategies for future
18 success.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

13 reduction.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
15 week's Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
17 Johnson offers two resolutions, a
18 privileged resolution authorizing the
19 Committee on Transportation and Public
20 Utilities to hold hearings to examine the
21 Philadelphia Water Department request to
22 increase water, sewer and stormwater
23 rates and charges and its impact on the
24 citizens of Philadelphia.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

4 non-privileged resolution urging the U.S.
5 Congress to pass House Resolution 1280,
6 the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act
7 of 2021.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
11 Council President. I just want to make
12 brief remarks on my resolution I
13 introduced.

14 Council President, I want to
15 thank you and my colleagues for
16 supporting and co-sponsoring the
17 resolution I sponsored today calling on
18 both the U.S. House and Senate to approve
19 the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act.

20 The U.S. House approved the
21 bill last year, but it was never approved
22 by the U.S. Senate. The drafting of the
23 federal legislation was preceded by a
24 series of protests against the deaths of
25 numerous African Americans at the hands

2 of police officers, including the 2020
3 deaths of George Floyd in Minneapolis and
4 Breonna Taylor in Louisville, Kentucky.

5 The passage of the George Floyd
6 Justice in Policing Act would address a
7 wide range of policies and issues
8 regarding policing practices and law
9 enforcement accountability, including
10 combatting excessive force and racial
11 bias in policing.

12 The bill increases
13 accountability for law enforcement
14 misconduct, restricts the use of certain
15 policing practices, enhances transparency
16 and data collection, and establishes best
17 practices in training requirements.

18 It would limit qualified
19 immunity as a defense to liability in a
20 private civil action against a law
21 enforcement officer. It would establish
22 a framework to prevent any remedy racial
23 profiling by law enforcement to federal,
24 state, and local levels. It also limits
25 the unnecessary use of force and

2 restricts the use of no-knock warrants
3 and chokeholds.

4 As Vice Chairman of the City
5 Council Public Safety Committee, I
6 support the hard work of our Philadelphia
7 Police Department. It understands it is
8 necessary to have -- I understand it's
9 necessary to have police officers, but I
10 would never support any law enforcement
11 officer that abuses their power.

12 According to the non-profit
13 organization Mapping Police Violence, at
14 least 1,176 people were killed by law
15 enforcement officers in the United States
16 in 2022, the most of any year since at
17 least 2013. That is an average of more
18 than three people a day or nearly 100
19 people every month last year, according
20 to Mapping Police Violence. These are
21 reported deaths at the hands of law
22 enforcement, including people fatally
23 shot, beaten, restrained, and tasered.

24 One of the latest incidents
25 happened three weeks ago when 29-year-old

2 Tyre Nichols was brutally beaten by
3 Memphis, Tennessee police officers. The
4 graphic video of the beating shows the
5 officers punching, kicking, and beating
6 Nichols, even after he lay helpless
7 laying on the ground.

8 I want to praise the Memphis
9 Police Chief, Cerelyn "C.J." Davis, for
10 her decisive action so far in this case.
11 The five police officers have been fired
12 and charged with murder. Their
13 specialized unit has disbanded. Two more
14 officers have been suspended. Two
15 Memphis Fire Department emergency medical
16 workers and a lieutenant was also fired,
17 and more discipline is expected to happen
18 in the future.

19 At Mr. Nichols' funeral, he was
20 remembered by family and friends. It was
21 a celebration of his life, but there were
22 also calls for police reform, not just in
23 Memphis but throughout the nation. Our
24 Vice President, Kamala Harris, attended
25 the funeral and delivered an impassioned

2 speech calling on Congress to approve the
3 George Floyd Justice in Policing Act.

4 Even Tyre Nichols' mother,
5 Ms. RowVaughn Wells, called for reform as
6 she fought back tears and spoke lovingly
7 of her son. She said, and I quote, "We
8 need to take some action, because there
9 should be no other child that should
10 suffer the way my son and all the other
11 parents have lost their children. We
12 need to get that bill passed, because if
13 we don't, that blood, the next child that
14 dies, that blood is going to be on their
15 hands. The only thing that keeps me
16 going is that I truly believe that my son
17 was sent here on assignment from God, and
18 I guess now his assignment is done. He's
19 going home," end quote.

20 Tyre Nichols joins a long list
21 of Black men and women that have been
22 killed by law enforcement nationwide.
23 There are the names you know, George
24 Floyd in Minneapolis, Breonna Taylor,
25 Tamir Rice, Eric Garner, Philando

2 Castile, Freddie Gray, Michael Brown and
3 others.

4 Philadelphia and the Greater
5 Delaware Valley region is not free from
6 people losing their lives due to actions
7 by law enforcement. In June of 2017, we
8 saw that 30-year-old David Jones was shot
9 three times in the back by then Officer
10 Ryan Pownall as Jones was fleeing during
11 a traffic routine stop.

12 Since the death of George
13 Floyd, Philadelphia has lost Walter
14 Wallace, Jr., Terrell Mitchell, Stanley
15 Cochran, and James Alexander at the hands
16 of law enforcement officials. Let's say
17 their names and never forget their names.

18 Again, as Vice Chairman of the
19 City Council's Public Safety Committee, I
20 support the hard work of the Philadelphia
21 Police Department every day. I
22 understand it is necessary to have police
23 officers protecting and serving, but I
24 would never support any law enforcement
25 entity that abuses their power.

12 service of Betsy "Ms. Betty" Beaufort,
13 whose determined advocacy on behalf of
14 her South Philadelphia community has
15 strengthened her neighborhood, as well as
16 the City of Philadelphia.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
18 week's Calendar.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
20 Driscoll offers a privileged resolution
21 honoring and celebrating the 2023 Saint
22 Patrick's Day Parade.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
24 week's Calendar.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Also

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Bass

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
11 week's Calendar.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

15 High School on its 25th Birthday.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
17 week's Calendar.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
19 resolution honoring the Philadelphia
20 Tennis Club for being the second oldest
21 Black-owned tennis club in the country.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
23 week's Calendar.

24 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
25 resolution honoring the Woodford Tennis

2 Club for being the oldest Black-owned
3 tennis club in the country.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Also
5 this week's Calendar.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh
7 offers a privileged resolution
8 recognizing and honoring Rodney Little
9 for his exemplary and outstanding service
10 as a dedicated public servant, police
11 officer, union leader and military
12 veteran.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
14 week's Calendar.

15 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
16 other bills or resolutions being offered
17 today by the members, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

20 That concludes our introduction
21 of bills and resolutions by our members,
22 and our next order of business is reports
23 from committee.

24 And the Chair recognizes
25 Councilman Jones for a report from the

10 District," respectfully reports it has

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 The Chair again recognizes
17 Councilman Jones.

18 Excuse me. Resolution No --
19 never mind, Councilman. It's on me.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's all
21 right.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Resolution No. 220689, Resolution No.
24 220690, Resolution 221036, 221037, and
25 221038 will be placed on our Final

2 Passage Calendar at our next session of
3 Council.

4 And that concludes our reports
5 from committee, and our next order of
6 business is the consideration of the
7 Calendar.

8 As there are no additional
9 bills on our First Reading Calendar, the
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the
11 purpose of calling up resolutions and
12 bills on our Second Reading and Final
13 Passage Calendar today.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. The following resolutions
16 and bills are being called up from Second
17 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
18 today: Nos. 210434, 230039, 230044,
19 230045, 230046, and 220918. All other
20 bills and resolutions are being held.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you very
23 much.

24 Before we consider these
25 resolutions and bills, we will consider

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 public comment. Your public comment must
3 concern matters on the Second Reading and
4 Final Passage Calendar for possible
5 action today.

6 All speakers must sign up in
7 order to testify. If you have not
8 already signed up for today's session,
9 you may do so now at the table outside of
10 the Council Chambers with the
11 Sergeant-at-Arms.

12 Once you have signed up, you
13 will be called in the order in which your
14 name appears on the sign-up sheet, and
15 under ideal circumstances, which we
16 apparently do not have today, we have a
17 significant list, today's time limit will
18 be two minutes, but we want to make sure
19 that everybody has an opportunity to
20 testify. So I'd ask that you please
21 adjust your testimony to reflect a
22 two-minute time limit.

23 In order to be fair to all
24 those wishing to speak, we intend to hold
25 faithfully to the established time limit

2 when you begin speaking. When you go to
3 the podium, you will see a green light.

12 We also reserve the right

15 subject matter. We actually do have that
16 today, but because of the issue relating
17 to the significant testimony on 18, we
18 will hopefully try to get everyone in in
19 their testimony.

20 If we're ready, Mr. Decker, can
21 you please call the first name on the
22 list.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
24 today, Mr. President, is Rachel Kemp
25 offering comment on behalf of Stacey

2 Phillips, commenting on 220918.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MS. KEMP: Good morning. Sorry
7 about that.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No
9 problem.

10 MS. KEMP: My name is Rachel
11 Kemp. I am here on behalf of
12 Dr. Phillips, the CEO over at WPACS. I
13 have been working there for about two
14 years now and I've lived in the West
15 Philadelphia community for 20-plus years.

16 WPACS is very excited about the
17 Cobbs Creek Foundation and what they're
18 doing in the community, the Cobbs Creek
19 Golf Course and what that means for our
20 community so that our students and
21 families will have a place where it will
22 be safe.

23 For the first time in decades,
24 this historical landmark is being
25 revitalized, and it deserves the

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 recognition.

3 Even though the actual
4 educational center will not open until
5 2024, their educational team volunteers
6 have been running excellent programs
7 within WPACS, which is known as the West
8 Philadelphia Achievement Charter School.
9 I'm sorry, you guys, if I didn't state
10 that. These programs have been
11 supporting our children and families.
12 Our children have been doing math
13 tutoring programs, which they love.

14 Also, the Cobbs Creek
15 Foundation has been coming in to donate
16 different baskets and stuff for the
17 holidays, like Thanksgiving and
18 Christmas. Also, they've been doing
19 social-emotional program learning with
20 our students as well, and the
21 educational -- the staff, I'm sorry, the
22 staff from the education center have been
23 working closely with the school to ensure
24 that programs reflect the needs of our
25 community.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you. I see there's a red
3 light, so I'm going to end and just say
4 that we are greatly appreciative of the
5 Cobbs Creek Foundation and I look forward
6 to many more.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

10 Mr. Decker, hold on one second.
11 Before we proceed, the Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. Just really briefly,
15 during the part of our program in which
16 we recognize or actually when Mr. Decker
17 was reading the bills and resolutions
18 introduced today, I did want to make
19 mention that we have in our presence
20 Imhotep Charter School, which is
21 celebrating its 25th anniversary, and we
22 have some folks here, if they could
23 stand, from Imhotep Charter School. All
24 right. And so we want to --

25 - - -

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: We want to
5 recognize their achievement in
6 excellence.

7 I remember when Imhotep started
8 and they started in lots, actually in
9 module units, we'll call them, on lots in
10 Northwest Philadelphia. And so here we
11 are 25 years later, and it's a wonderful
12 example of excellence.

13 And I also wanted to just very
14 briefly recognize the Woodford and
15 Philadelphia Tennis Clubs as being in the
16 8th District and also the first and
17 second oldest Black tennis clubs in the
18 nation, and we wanted to just recognize
19 that we have that distinguished
20 organization within the City of
21 Philadelphia.

22 Thank you, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Awesome. Thank you. Thank you,
25 Councilwoman.

6 Thank you.

7 Mr. Decker, please proceed.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Asmeret Easley, commenting on 220918.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MS. EASLEY: Asmeret Easley.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 morning.

14 MS. EASLEY: Hi, everyone. My
15 name is Asmeret Easley. I'm a proud
16 native of Philadelphia, which encouraged
17 me to aim to be where I am today. I am
18 one of the proud principals at Overbrook
19 Educational Center, also known as OEC,
20 here in the School District of
21 Philadelphia in Overbrook. We are a K to
22 8 school that serves one-third of
23 visually impaired students in our
24 district. Thank you to City Council for
25 listening and ensuring access to share my

2 viewpoints as an educational leader in
3 the community.

4 Every generation leaves behind
5 a legacy. What will the legacy be is
6 determined by the people of that
7 generation. What legacy do you want to
8 leave behind?

9 I'm in support of Bill 220918
10 because of the relationships that have
11 been built with my students through the
12 Cobbs Creek Foundation community. My
13 students will attend a safe,
14 state-of-the-art educational facility
15 that promotes self-esteem and positive
16 racial identity.

17 The relationships have been
18 built, from supports from funding for 8th
19 graders, volunteering and providing
20 support for graduations, weekly academic
21 after-school clubs, and monthly Saturday
22 programs, and I can't forget our
23 mentoring programs with our middle
24 schoolers.

25 Investing in the revitalization

2 is an investment in the community. Many
3 students have a vision with their own
4 eyes that their community is worth an
5 investment now. Why should I have to
6 search for the exposure for my students
7 outside of Philadelphia for an example to
8 experience golf or safe havens to take
9 part in hobbies that they deserve?

10 I recall one of my third
11 graders saying to me one day, noticing
12 contractors and backhoes, are we getting
13 something new across the street from our
14 school? I shared, this is our hope. He
15 smiled and said, we can do it.

16 The current climate in
17 Philadelphia is deserving of this.
18 Children deserve to be safe, especially
19 with the gun violence in our city that we
20 experience, and have access to beautiful,
21 brand new space. The project will create
22 hundreds of job opportunities for
23 residents and boost local economic values
24 and partnerships and small local
25 businesses to collaborate with the

2 exposure.

3 Think about what I said, the
4 legacy. The legacy starts here.

5 As I close today, consider what
6 we stand by at OEC. We need to do what
7 is best for children, not what is best
8 for adults.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony. We
12 appreciate it.

13 - - -

14 (Applause.)

15 - - -

16 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
17 is Blain Stoddart, commenting on 220918.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning.

21 MR. STODDART: Good morning,
22 Mr. Chairman and to the Honorable City
23 Council. My name is Blain Stoddart. I
24 run BFW Group, which is a construction
25 project management company. I am here to

2 support the Cobbs Creek Foundation and
3 the Cobbs Creek Golf Course.

4 It is formerly an abandoned
5 350-acre site that has been abandoned for
6 almost 50 years, and the Cobbs Creek
7 Foundation has come into the City to help
8 to revitalize that property, working in
9 tandem with the City Recreation
10 Department.

11 It is a public golf course, not
12 a private golf course, and they will
13 begin, Mr. Chairman, Mr. President, to
14 take our kids off the street and build an
15 education center so that our kids can do
16 non-traditional sports and so that our
17 kids can get educational enhancement.

18 Some trees have been cut down,
19 Mr. Chairman, but the trees should not
20 have been there in the first place
21 because it is a golf course. And so they
22 will be replanting 1,500 trees and 15,000
23 native plants back on this property.

24 Last, but not least, I'm going
25 to say this: I got involved because, as

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 you know, for 30 years, long before
3 George Floyd, I was advocating for Black
4 and brown businesses to get work, and we
5 are working with 200 Black and brown and
6 Latino businesses, construction-related
7 businesses, architects and professional
8 services and contractors in the City to
9 get work, and Cobbs Creek was kind enough
10 to call me, because I'm an advocate for
11 Black and brown businesses to get work on
12 construction projects. And so the fact
13 that they called me got me excited,
14 because most times developers and
15 non-profits don't even call us back when
16 we are trying to get work.

17 So I could go on and on and on.
18 Some people said that it's going to
19 affect the environment and cause sickness
20 in the community, but it's a golf course.

21 This is the last thing I'm
22 going to say. Nice neighborhoods get
23 golf courses, like Bryn Mawr and Ardmore
24 and Bala Cynwyd. And so to have a public
25 golf course in our neighborhood is a good

2 thing and adds value to our neighbors and
3 takes the kids off the street and helps
4 us against gun violence.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you.

7 MR. STODDART: Now, I know
8 there's some objectors --

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Mr. Stoddart, your time is up.

11 MR. STODDART: Thank you, sir.
12 I was getting excited, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
14 understand.

15 - - -
16 (Applause.)

17 - - -

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
19 I appreciate everyone's passion, but we
20 have a significant list of people on the
21 list today and we really want to be able
22 to get everybody in to testify. So
23 please limit your conversation. When you
24 see the red light come on, please
25 conclude your remarks.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
4 is Radee Hammett.

5 (No response.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Radee Hammett.

7 (No response.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Shawmar Pitts,
9 commenting on 220918.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. PITTS: Good morning. My
14 name is Shawmar Pitts and I'm a
15 co-manager director at Philly Thrive, and
16 I'm here to speak about the golf course
17 and Cobbs Creek.

18 So now, first and foremost, I
19 would like to applaud the Cobbs Creek
20 Foundation for any good work that they
21 have done to help our community as people
22 has just testified to, and at the same
23 time, my opposition to the golf course is
24 the way it's been done.

25 As the gentleman has just

2 spoke, this has been abandoned for a long
3 time. He said over 50 years. So now
4 when we come to the City and we ask for
5 pieces of land or anything of monetary
6 substance to support the community and
7 the youth in our community to stop the
8 gun violence, we don't get any tread-way,
9 right? But when -- and this is not just
10 the Cobbs Creek Foundation. This is all
11 over the City, because there's
12 redevelopment and development going on
13 all over the City.

14 So I am opposed to it, because
15 when people from outside the City come in
16 the City, they are able to get the monies
17 needed and the support needed for their
18 projects. But when we, African American
19 men, who have been in Philadelphia our
20 whole lives, when we come and we ask for
21 grants and stuff like that, we get met
22 with things like we got reimbursement
23 grants, right? You got to pay the
24 money -- you got to bring your receipts
25 for the money you spent.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Did the Cobbs Creek Foundation
3 have to get reimbursement grants or did
4 they get money in the City's budget? I
5 think they got \$3 million from Parks and
6 Rec and a \$3.4 million grant from the
7 state. We ain't never got \$6 million for
8 nothing we tried to do.

9 So I'm not against a golf
10 course and diversity and things like
11 that, but I'm for the youth. I'm for
12 them. We've been cut out from the
13 economics since I was their age, before I
14 was their age, and we're going to be cut
15 in.

16 So when they came in, now they
17 got a \$60 million project going on. When
18 they going to spend \$6 million on them?
19 When they going to spend \$6 million and
20 spend it on them?

21 That's why I'm opposing it.
22 I'm not opposing it just because it's a
23 golf course. I'm opposing it because
24 when you have like Hilco, for instance,
25 you have Hilco, they in our community

2 right now.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. Wind it up.

5 MR. PITTS: They in our
6 community right now. Right now they're
7 in our community. And they come and they
8 get to make policy. When we come to the
9 policymakers, we don't get to make no
10 policy. How they get to make policy to
11 push us around?

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Okay.

14 MR. PITTS: We ain't got no
15 community involvement in every
16 development every time we sat in person
17 meeting, in person meeting. Ain't never
18 showed up.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
20 got you.

21 MR. PITTS: They got every
22 excuse in the book.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 MR. PITTS: And they push us to

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the side.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
4 Thank you.

5 MR. PITTS: All right. One
6 second. One second.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Well, you keep saying one second. We got
9 a lot of people that want to talk today.

10 MR. PITTS: I understand. I
11 understand. I'm sorry, but I'm just
12 saying. They get to push us around and
13 we've been here our whole lives. They've
14 been here for two years.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
16 got you. Okay.

17 MR. PITTS: Come on, man. Come
18 on, man.

19 - - -

20 (Applause.)

21 - - -

22 MR. PITTS: Come on, man. That
23 ain't right.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Okay.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. PITTS: And City Council --
3 I ain't never seen a City Council that
4 represented African Americans the way we
5 got now. Look how many African Americans
6 we got.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
8 sir, you got to -- really, you got to
9 like --

10 MR. PITTS: I understand.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
12 keep saying that. You keep talking. I'm
13 trying to be respectful. But we can
14 follow up. All right? You can't go on
15 and on. I'm trying to be respectful.
16 All right?

17 MR. PITTS: All right.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 We'll follow up. We'll follow up.

20 MR. PITTS: Please, listen to
21 us, man. Please. Thank you.
22 Sorry for going over time.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, sir. We'll follow up. Thank
25 you.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Next name.

3 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
4 is Fred Stirre, commenting on 220918.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MR. STINE: Thank you. It's
9 Fred Stine, S-T-I-N-E. Thank you. And
10 for over ten years now, I've been a Board
11 member with the Eastwick Friends and
12 Neighbors Coalition, and for over
13 30 years I've worked with the Delaware
14 Riverkeeper Network, which is a
15 non-profit environmental organization
16 where I help design, plant, and maintain
17 urban forests and riparian buffers.

18 For the friends and neighbors
19 and the Delaware Riverkeeper, I urge
20 Council to vote no against this bill,
21 220918. Cutting down more trees and
22 clearing the land of natural vegetation
23 could contribute worsening flooding,
24 could contribute worsening air pollution,
25 worsening heat island effect, and other

2 public health impacts to all City
3 residents but particularly residents of
4 Overbrook, Cobbs Creek, and Eastwick.

5 According to Philadelphia's own
6 Tree Philly, trees are one of the best
7 investments we can make in the future of
8 our city. When properly cared for, urban
9 trees provide valuable and vital
10 services, like clean air, increased
11 property values, peaceful neighborhoods.
12 Planting and maintaining trees addresses
13 all three of the pillars of
14 sustainability, environment, economics,
15 and society.

16 The Cobbs Creek Foundation is
17 not replacing the public health and
18 environmental value of the trees they're
19 cutting down. They are cutting and
20 clearing thousands of mature plants,
21 trees, including the 500 mature heritage
22 trees already cut down. They're not
23 replacing them at a one-to-one. They're
24 cutting down 24-inch diameter trees and
25 planting two-inch caliber replacement.

2 It's not a one-to-one.

3 In the presentation of the Arts
4 Commission, the developer shows that on
5 the driving range and youth golf area
6 alone, just in that one area, which is
7 about 13 acres, which is part of the bill
8 in the steep slope area, they will be
9 cutting 150 heritage trees, and the
10 heritage tree is 24 inches in diameter.
11 According to their plan, they will be
12 replanting 62 trees.

13 They're cutting down 150 large
14 trees, which provide all these benefits
15 that Tree Philly has advocated for, and
16 they're planting 62.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
18 you can wrap it up, please.

19 MR. STINE: Thank you. And my
20 last comment will be, they anticipate
21 it's going to take 20 years for those new
22 little trees to grow to provide the same
23 ecological and economic value that the
24 trees they're cutting down.

25 We urge everyone -- on balance,

2 this is going to benefit wealthy
3 outsiders more than it will benefit the
4 residents of Philadelphia.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you.

7 MR. STINE: Thank you.

8 - - -
9 (Applause.)

10 - - -

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is George Guy, commenting on a resolution
13 that is introduced and will be adopted
14 today by Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MR. GUY: Good morning.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MR. GUY: I'm George Guy and
20 I'm here on behalf of Philadelphia Tennis
21 Club. I'm here to thank Councilwoman
22 Bass for this resolution that she
23 sponsored. I'd also like to thank you
24 personally for the help that you and
25 former Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds

2 gave us a few years ago. We were in dire
3 need of your assistance, and you came
4 through for us. We appreciate it.

5 But I'd also like to thank
6 Katherine Gilmore Richardson, and our
7 club is in your district.

8 Now, for the sake of full
9 disclosure, at Philadelphia Tennis Club
10 we've always considered to be the oldest
11 Black tennis club in America, because we
12 actually own the land as opposed to our
13 esteemed friends and colleagues at
14 Woodford, that land is owned by the City.

15 Anyway, PTC was founded by
16 people of color so they had a place that
17 they considered their own. We are in
18 historic Germantown.

19 Tennis is a great game, and our
20 goal is to promote tennis for underserved
21 inner city youth, and that's our goal and
22 our primary mission. We have seven
23 well-maintained, beautiful clay courts.
24 Now, clay is different than hard courts.
25 It's great for the body. It's softer.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 And it's a great facility and a great
3 place for youth, young and old. As a
4 matter of fact, I think all of you should
5 take up tennis. If you still play, you
6 should come join us, and if you're
7 thinking about taking up tennis, you
8 should come around and see.

9 So I look forward to have all
10 of you visit us in Germantown. It's a
11 great club, and I'd like to thank City
12 Council and Councilwoman Bass one more
13 time for this resolution.

14 Thank you very much.

15 - - -

16 (Applause.)

17 - - -

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Alexa Ross, commenting on 220918.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MS. ROSS: Good morning,

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 everybody. My name is Alexa Ross.

3 Hearing that there is a cap of
4 five speakers for and against, I want to
5 give a chance to anyone that is opposed
6 to the Cobbs Creek overlay bill, if you
7 want to stand up or raise your hand,
8 because I know a lot of speakers were
9 turned away, just a moment to show those
10 who were turned away.

11 (Some audience members
12 standing.)

13 MS. ROSS: I'm with Philly
14 Thrive. I've also been on the Board of
15 Eastwick Friends and Neighbors from 2013
16 to 2015.

17 I'm here today to talk about
18 the fact that corporate profits are at an
19 all-time high, right? So in the last --
20 the third quarter of 2022, corporate
21 profits were \$2 trillion. Meanwhile,
22 inflation for the everyday person is at a
23 40-year high, right? And so when we look
24 at the Maguire family, billionaires who
25 are part of the Cobbs Creek Foundation,

2 who the City allows to lease a
3 \$90 million property. So this land is
4 valued at \$90 million, and they lease it
5 for \$1 for 70 years.

6 So clearly things are severely
7 out of balance, and I implore the City
8 Council leadership to help restore the
9 balance, because the flooding that's
10 going to come as a result of all this
11 tree loss and the way that these old
12 growth trees actually provide a kind of
13 support for erosion that new trees cannot
14 provide, right?

15 And we have to just stop
16 handing out corporate -- you know, giving
17 corporations tax breaks. Also Hilco
18 Redevelopment Partners got a tax break.
19 The first thing they came to Philly and
20 did was get their taxes waived, their
21 city taxes that would go to the School
22 District waived as part of a Keystone
23 Opportunity Zone.

24 So an economy where we keep
25 giving billionaires major tax breaks and

2 write them into city budgets, meanwhile
3 Philadelphians are facing double the
4 prices at the grocery store for food,
5 makes no sense whatsoever, and the burden
6 really is not on us to make an argument
7 as to why this makes no sense, but the
8 burden is really on you all to explain
9 under what economy, under what city where
10 we care about children and we care about
11 the betterment of everybody does it make
12 sense to be cutting this much money for
13 billionaires and corporations.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

17 - - -

18 (Applause.)

19 - - -

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Linda Smith.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. COLWELL-SMITH: Good
24 morning. My name is Linda Colwell-Smith.
25 I'm Interim Co-Chair of the Friends of

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Free Library of Philadelphia. We
3 work to support the Free Library with our
4 advocacy and efforts in the community.
5 And I'm up here today to thank
6 Councilmember Brooks and City Council for
7 honoring one of our own, our own Ms.
8 Betty Beaufort.

9 - - -

10 (Applause.)

11 - - -

12 MS. COLWELL-SMITH: She's been
13 a member of the Friends and she's one of
14 our Board members. She's a longtime
15 community advocate, and she's had at
16 least 25 years with us fighting for her
17 beloved Queen Memorial branch. And I've
18 had the honor of working with her to keep
19 our entire library system open in 2005,
20 2008, 2011, and we're still fighting to
21 this day.

22 One of Betty's biggest
23 strengths is, she speaks truth to power,
24 and she's not afraid to talk. And she
25 saw -- for instance, she saw a need in

2 her community for a place for teens to go
3 safely to talk and to recreate and just
4 to socialize in good fellowship. So she
5 founded one of the first teen centers in
6 a Free Library of Philadelphia branch in
7 the City, and it opened the day before
8 the pandemic shut the library system
9 down. But I'm happy to report it's back
10 open and she's fighting for it again.

11 - - -

12 (Applause.)

13 - - -

14 MS. COLWELL-SMITH: I mean,
15 Betty is an inspiration to us all. She
16 recognizes that Queen Memorial branch,
17 every single branch of the Free Library,
18 they're the heart and the soul of their
19 communities. They're a safe place for
20 seniors, for families, for kids and that
21 they're worth fighting for.

22 I'm honored to be standing
23 beside her. I hope to do it for many
24 more years to come, and I know our group
25 feels the same way.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Again, thank you, Councilmember
3 Brooks. Thank you, City Council, for
4 honoring our Ms. Betty.

5 - - -

6 (Applause.)

7 - - -

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony.

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
11 is Enrique Hervada, commenting on 220918.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. HERVADA: Thank you. Good
16 morning. My name is Enrique Hervada.
17 I'm the COO of the Cobbs Creek
18 Foundation. I thank you for the
19 opportunity to address.

20 As I stated before, we're not a
21 corporation. We're not a developer.
22 We're a 501(c)(3) non-profit working in
23 partnership with the City of
24 Philadelphia, Parks and Recreation, the
25 Philadelphia Water Department, and I'm

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 here to address the bill today regarding
3 the overlay district for Cobbs Creek.

4 The ordinance is essential for
5 moving our project forward. Its minor
6 steep slope disruption is required for
7 the creek restoration plan. Restoring
8 the failing creek is a requirement for
9 our lease with the City and will not only
10 benefit the golf course and surrounding
11 community, it will provide no increase in
12 downstream flooding.

13 As previously stated, we have
14 followed every applicable agency's
15 requirements, including, but not limited
16 to, the Army Corps of Engineers, the
17 Department of Environmental Protection,
18 Philadelphia Arts Commission, Planning
19 Commission, and Water Department, and
20 will continue to do so.

21 The Philadelphia Planning
22 Commission unanimously approved moving
23 forward with this ordinance at their
24 meeting on January 19th. We submitted a
25 letter recently from Patrick Patterson

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 that shows the effects of the project.

3 Recently seven amendments were
4 added to the bill, and they're all
5 environmental amendments that were
6 required from talking to the neighbors
7 and things that they wanted, and we
8 agreed to all seven of those amendments
9 to the bill.

10 Thank you for your time.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Lawrence Szmulowicz, commenting on
15 220918.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. SZMULOWICZ: Hello. My
18 name is Lawrence Szmulowicz. I'm a
19 volunteer with the Cobbs Creek
20 Environmental Justice. I live downstream
21 from the golf course in the Cobbs Creek
22 neighborhood where I organize trash
23 clean-ups and bird walks.

24 First of all, we welcome the
25 amendments. They are a step in the right

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 direction. Unfortunately, the amendments
3 do not resolve the core problem with the
4 bill. The bill still gives the developer
5 free rein to cut down trees on any steep
6 slope within the 350-acre premises.

7 The new time limit on the
8 exemption has no practical value. The
9 developer will cut down all the trees
10 that it wants long before the exemption
11 ends in July 2024.

12 Moreover, the amendments do not
13 address the fundamental lack of
14 transparency. We still do not know basic
15 details about the developer's plans. How
16 many trees do they plan to cut down? Do
17 they include any heritage trees? How
18 will they prevent erosion, landslides,
19 and sediment pollution in our waterways
20 after they cut down the trees, whose
21 roots literally hold the earth in place?

22 We do not have these answers,
23 because the community has not had the
24 opportunity to pose those questions.
25 Normally a developer who wants to cut

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 down trees on steep slopes must apply for
3 a zoning variance. As part of that
4 process, the developer must meet with the
5 community at the local RCO, explain their
6 plans, and answer the tough questions.

7 There is no reason why the
8 developer can't apply for a zoning
9 variance here. In fact, they originally
10 did apply for one, but they withdrew it
11 in March 2022 before they met with the
12 local RCO.

13 When the Planning Commission
14 asked the developer why they didn't
15 proceed with a zoning variance, their
16 chief operating officer replied, because
17 our attorney told us that a legislative
18 exemption is cleaner.

19 Well, the developer's attorney
20 is right. It is cleaner to get a
21 legislative exemption than meet with the
22 community, explain your plans, and answer
23 tough questions. It is cleaner to bypass
24 community input, because democracy is
25 messy.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 But whether it's convenient for
3 a developer or not, the community has a
4 right to give input and be heard on the
5 issue -- on the use and development of
6 our public lands, especially when the
7 development potentially threatens our
8 environment, health, and safety.

9 City Council should not get
10 into the business of enabling developers
11 to avoid community input by carving out
12 special exemptions to our local
13 environmental protections.

14 So we respectfully ask you to
15 remove the steep slope exemption and let
16 the developer apply for a zoning
17 variance, as they should have in the
18 first place. At the very least, do not
19 vote on this bill until the developer
20 does what they should have done in the
21 first place, go to the Overbrook Park
22 Civic Association RCO, bring your
23 blueprints, bring your environmental
24 assessments that you said you have, and
25 please answer the community's questions.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

4 - - -

5 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:

8 Mr. Decker, please read the next person
9 to testify.

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
11 is Edison Frazer, commenting on 220918.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MR. FRAZER: My name Edison
14 Frazer. I'm with Philly Thrive. I
15 oppose this bill, 220918.

16 This is my whole thing. I keep
17 on hearing everybody talk about education
18 and stuff like that but the park own
19 Cobbs Creek. First of all, most of them
20 kids that's doing the shooting ain't even
21 in school. You go out there right now
22 and they out there right now.

23 So our program is to get to the
24 kids and change they thinking. Like we
25 keep on coming to these meetings.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Gauthier office, she reached out to me,
3 her secretary want to talk to me, but
4 ain't nobody get back to me yet.

5 My program is, what we trying
6 to do is save the youth and stuff like
7 that. By cutting down the trees, what is
8 you doing? And I can talk to you, Jones.
9 What is you doing?

10 When you cut down the trees,
11 you blocking the shade. So our gas and
12 our electric bill going to go up. And
13 somebody just got shot around there last
14 night too.

15 I live right down the street,
16 and the population is 30,000, and 80
17 percent is Black. They didn't go around
18 the neighborhood, Enrique, and tell when
19 y'all put this golf course up, y'all
20 going to -- pesticides and all that stuff
21 going to lead to our community and stuff
22 like that.

23 I came to you, Jones. So I'm
24 asking you, can I have a meeting with you
25 so I can put my program on the other

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 side? All them dirt bikes that's on the
3 street, we want to get them on the field
4 like that. It's nowhere for them to
5 ride. And the reason why we took the
6 sign down, because they already said they
7 was in the park already.

8 So we keep on coming to the --
9 I oppose this bill because, I mean, y'all
10 cut down trees and it wasn't legal, and
11 then last week you said that you was
12 going to held up on the bill. Now it's
13 like -- come on, Jones.

14 I live right down the street
15 from this community, man. I live right
16 down the street from this community.
17 They want to come in here. Golf is for
18 rich people. Golf is for rich. Is it
19 free to play golf? Is it free? I want
20 to know if it's free, because I'm gonna
21 sign up right now if it's free.

22 So I'm asking you, Jones. I'm
23 asking you, Gauthier.

24 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Please
25 conclude.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. FRAZER: I'm saying, you
3 reached out to me. You said -- you
4 reached out to me. I got the checks
5 right here. Call me to your office.
6 Let's talk. Let's talk. Let's talk,
7 Jones.

8 All right. If we --

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you
10 for your testimony.

11 MR. FRAZER: Hold up. If we
12 going to coincide, I'm on the other side,
13 Jones. You know what I get. You gave me
14 money to do my thing.

15 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

16 MR. FRAZER: You gave me money.
17 I want to help the youth. You know what
18 I'm saying? I want to help the youth.
19 You gave me money. I'm tired of seeing
20 these Black kids dying and all this
21 stuff. These corporations and stuff is
22 coming in here.

23 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Please
24 conclude.

25 MR. FRAZER: You know what I'm

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 saying? So I want to know, can I have a
3 meeting with you, Jones?

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Please
5 have respect for everybody who wants to
6 speak.

7 MR. FRAZER: Come on, call me,
8 Jones, like you call me, man. I ain't
9 trying to put you on the table or nothing
10 like that. Come on, man. You gave me
11 money to do my program, but I ain't get
12 all of it. They got \$6 million to do
13 nothing, man. Come on, y'all.

14 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.
15 Thank you so much for your testimony.

16 Councilmember Gauthier, did you
17 want to...

18 - - -
19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I want
22 to thank Edison for his comments. I'm
23 always willing to meet with any
24 constituent, but not those that come to
25 the office in a threatening manner,

2 particularly with female staff.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
4 Councilmember.

5 Mr. Clerk, can you please read
6 the next person to testify.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Erica Zurer.

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Is Erica
10 here?

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MS. ZURER: Hi. My name is
13 Erica Zurer. I'm a member of the
14 citywide Friends of the Free Library.
15 Linda introduced the group. Most of you
16 know the Friends of the Free Library, but
17 I came up to speak on a little bit of a
18 personal note.

19 I want to say I'm kind of new
20 to Philadelphia. I haven't been here
21 that many years. I want to say that
22 Betty is Philadelphia. I found that out.
23 She is definitely Philadelphia. She's a
24 crown in the jewel of Philadelphia.

25 When I came here, I was lucky

2 enough to meet her not that long after
3 through the Friends of the Free Library.
4 I want to say she's a mentor. I want to
5 say that Philadelphia City Council and
6 the Mayor know, you'd better listen to
7 Betty.

8 Thank you, Betty.

9 - - -

10 (Applause.)

11 - - -

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you
13 for your testimony.

14 Mr. Clerk, please read the next
15 person to testify.

16 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
17 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
20 Lynn Landes, Founder of
21 HealthAlertPhilly.org.

22 I support Resolution 210913,
23 but today I'm here to talk about
24 vaccines.

25 For all FDA-approved vaccines,

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 including COVID shots, there is a Section
3 13 to the manufacturer's package insert
4 which admits that the vaccine has not
5 been evaluated for its potential to cause
6 cancer, damage DNA, or impair fertility.
7 Yet despite this lack of minimal testing,
8 our federal health authorities continue
9 to maintain that these vaccines are safe
10 and effective.

11 Many people got the vaccine,
12 the COVID vaccine, thinking that they
13 were FDA approved, but it appears that
14 those approved vaccines were not made
15 available to the public. What the public
16 got and is still getting are experimental
17 vaccines under an emergency use
18 authorization, meaning little effective
19 safety testing was conducted.

20 To date, the COVID shots are
21 the most harmful and deadly vaccines in
22 the history of the CDC, with soaring
23 numbers of people suffering from blood
24 clots, strokes, heart attacks, and other
25 sudden illnesses.

2 The public is becoming
3 increasingly aware the vaccines in
4 general are resulting in widespread harm
5 and death. Countless books have been
6 written and studies published that offer
7 overwhelming evidence the vaccines did
8 not stop the deadly contagions of the
9 past. Instead, new sewer systems, water
10 treatment facilities, and better
11 nutrition did that.

12 Even polio was most likely
13 caused by DDT, a paralyzing insecticide,
14 not by a virus. When DDT was phased out,
15 polio subsided. In fact, the leading
16 cause of polio today is the polio vaccine
17 itself.

18 And that's what many people
19 don't understand about vaccines. Some
20 can spread the very illnesses they claim
21 to prevent. It's called vaccine
22 shedding. So is Big Pharma spreading
23 illnesses through vaccines rather than
24 preventing them? It certainly looks that
25 way.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 You can learn more at

8 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you
9 for your testimony.

10 Mr. Clerk, the next person to
11 testify.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Christopher Gladstone.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MR. GLADSTONE BOOTH: Good
16 morning. Good morning, President Clarke,
17 Councilwoman Cindy Bass, my
18 Councilperson, Councilwoman Kathy Gilmore
19 Richardson, and the rest of City Council.
20 My name is Christopher Gladstone Booth,
21 and I want to thank you for allowing me
22 to speak on behalf of the Woodford Tennis
23 Club.

24 Woodford Tennis Club was
25 founded during the Civil Rights era in

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 1958 by eight working-class people who
3 decided not to wait for inclusion but to
4 actively seek a place that they could
5 call their home.

6 Divine intervention is what
7 many of us believe sent George Logan, a
8 police officer in the 14th Precinct and
9 one of Woodford's founding members, to
10 drive up a driveway in Fairmount Park to
11 find an overgrown piece of property that
12 vaguely resembled tennis courts. Upon
13 Officer Logan's inquiry, he did discover
14 that it had been abandoned by the City
15 some 20 years before and it was a part of
16 Fairmount Park.

17 Royal Sims, who is currently
18 the President of the Veterans
19 Administration here in Philadelphia and
20 one of our founding members, cut a deal
21 with the City. The City agreed to lease
22 that abandoned, discarded property to the
23 Tennis Club for \$1 a year for 50 years,
24 and needless to say, we are well into our
25 second lease. It was a part -- at that

2 point, the members bought the house and
3 the joining property to the tennis courts
4 in 1958.

5 What is Woodford? Woodford is
6 legacy. My father was a founder. I'm a
7 Board member. My daughter is currently a
8 member. Woodford has turned out a number
9 of nationally ranked players, including
10 my daughter, and it continues to support
11 players with professional aspirations.

12 Woodford is home, home to
13 countless years of youth tennis programs
14 exposing African American children to the
15 game of tennis. And, finally, Woodford
16 is history. It truly is apropos on this
17 2nd day of February to recognize Woodford
18 and its contributions to African American
19 history.

20 But let it not go unrecognized
21 that Woodford also is an integral part --
22 was and is an integral part of
23 Philadelphia history.

24 When you look up little known
25 history facts --

2 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Please
3 conclude.

4 MR. GLADSTONE BOOTH: -- about
5 the City of Philadelphia, there is a
6 possibility you'll see a picture of 424
7 East Wister Street, better known as the
8 Woodford Tennis Club.

9 Thank you, Council folks, for
10 this resolution. It is deeply
11 appreciated.

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you
13 for your testimony.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Mr. Clerk,
18 please read the next person.

19 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
20 is Nasir Williams.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning.

23 My name is Nasir Williams. I'm currently
24 a sophomore at Sankofa Freedom Academy
25 Charter School, and I'm here to speak on

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 my experience with MES, Marvin's
3 Educational Services.

4 I've been around since the very
5 beginning of MES. I've enjoyed
6 participating in MES as a student-athlete
7 and someone who always wanted better for
8 myself. MES helped shape myself and my
9 peers into better students and helped us
10 excel in the classroom. Marvin made sure
11 I got help with any of my work whenever I
12 needed it, and he started to train myself
13 and a few other students in basketball
14 while still tutoring us.

15 MES kept us off the streets and
16 motivated to be great men and influences
17 in our communities.

18 Marvin, I appreciate everything
19 you do for us and being a mentor in our
20 community.

21 Thank you.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 so much for your testimony.

3 Mr. Clerk.

4 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
5 is George Lane.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. LANE: Good morning. My
8 name is George Lane. I'm currently a
9 sophomore at Sankofa Freedom Academy
10 Charter School. I'm here today to speak
11 on my experience of growing through MES.

12 When asked what MES is exactly,
13 I always have to include it is more than
14 an organization, business, or a team.
15 It's a family.

16 Through MES, I gained a lot of
17 lifelong connections with my other fellow
18 teammates or brothers that grew through
19 MES as well. We had the opportunity to
20 be a mentor by two amazing male role
21 models, Brother Marvin and Brother Ryan,
22 who still got us in a positive direction
23 today.

24 Being completely honest, I
25 wouldn't be the student or young brother

2 I am today without the help of MES.

3 Year in and year out, I can
4 probably say that I have been on honor
5 roll with straight A's every semester
6 since I was first introduced to Brother
7 Marvin, which is when I was a first
8 grader. In addition, my brothers present
9 today are honor students just as well as
10 me.

11 Since day one, Brother Marvin
12 is always attempting to give so much
13 attention to the value of education, the
14 reason being the importance of how much
15 as asset an educated minority male can
16 be.

17 As stated before, I'm proudly
18 grateful to say I grew through MES.
19 Without MES, I wouldn't be who I am
20 today. I dedicate every accomplishment
21 to MES and Brother Marvin. He been
22 around since ground zero, and this
23 recognition can't even sum up how much
24 thankful I am for him today.

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

5 Thank you.

6 Mr. Clerk, please read the next
7 person to speak.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next person
9 to speak, Mr. Chairman, is Marvin Dutton.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MR. DUTTON: I feel like I'm
12 back at a basketball game, I'm being
13 called out for the starting lineup,
14 Marvin Dutton.

15 My name is Marvin Dutton. I'm
16 the CEO of Marvin's Education Services.
17 If you hear me, clap once.

18 (Audience members clapped
19 once.)

20 MR. DUTTON: If you hear me,
21 clap twice.

22 (Audience members clapped
23 twice.)

24 MR. DUTTON: That's something
25 that we do in the classroom just to kind

2 of get your attention.

3 There's an African proverb that
4 says you can't thank the person that
5 crossed the bridge without thanking the
6 people that built the bridge. So I'm
7 very thankful for my family. I'm very
8 thankful for my students.

9 Can we all give them a round of
10 applause again, please.

14 MR. DUTTON: Thank you to
15 Councilman Isaiah Thomas and City Council
16 for honoring MES as we celebrate our
17 ten-year anniversary, ten years of hard
18 work, ten years of commitment, ten years
19 of sacrifice.

20 It's my honor to give back to
21 the community, to impact the life of a
22 child, to impact a family, to positively
23 impact the community. And so I'm
24 extremely thankful.

25 There's a saying that goes

2 like, when spiders unite, they can tie up
3 a lion. So together we can do some
4 amazing things.

5 So, again, thank you, City
6 Council. I really appreciate you,
7 everyone.

12 Thank you.

13 Chief Clerk, please read the
14 name of our next speaker.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
16 is Valerie Susan.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MS. McLOYD: Good morning. My
19 name is Valerie Susan McLoyd. First, I
20 want to thank my Councilman, Kenyatta
21 Johnson, for the resolution on urging the
22 United States Congress to pass HR 1280,
23 the George Floyd Justice and Policy Act.

24 But I'm here this morning to
25 stand with the rest of -- if everyone can

2 just stand up who is here for Ms. Betty
3 Beaufort.

4 (Some audience members
5 standing.)

6 - - -
7 (Applause.)

8 - - -

9 MS. McLOYD: So I want to thank
10 Councilwoman Brooks for honoring
11 Ms. Betty. Betty is my neighbor for the
12 1300 block of Garnet Street. We met
13 about 15 years ago. I was serving as the
14 block captain for about 20 years. And
15 every time it was time to go out and
16 work, Ms. Betty was there. I could
17 always depend on her.

18 So I wanted to come out and
19 just honor her for her passion for the
20 community, because that's what we need,
21 more people who are passionate about the
22 community, passionate about the work and
23 determined to get the work done.

24 So thank you, Ms. Betty.

25 - - -

2 (Applause.)

3 - - -

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.
5 Chief Clerk, can you please
6 read the next person to speak.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Maria Ortiz.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. ORTIZ: Good afternoon,
11 everyone. My name is Marie Ortiz. I'm
12 here to honor Betty Beaufort. She is the
13 only one in our community that stands up
14 for us, fights for us, whether the person
15 like their opinion or not.

16 One thing I can say, Betty, you
17 are phenomenal. Don't let nobody take
18 that from you. You are a phenomenal
19 woman, a woman that speaks the truth, a
20 woman that knows what the community
21 needs. And more leadership in our
22 community need to listen what our
23 community needs. Like Betty Beaufort,
24 she always there to help the people less
25 fortunate.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I was in a situation a couple
3 years ago. Betty came to my aid. You
4 know, it's funny when you have leadership
5 in the community, they don't even help
6 you, but you have people like Betty
7 Beaufort that's willing to help you.

8 Betty is there for me now. I
9 might have struggled staying still with
10 my daughter. She has cancer, double
11 mastectomy, been to service four times,
12 but Betty has always been there for me
13 through the right and the wrong and the
14 indifferent.

15 Betty, thank you for being a
16 friend, thank you for being a leader in
17 the community, and thank you for speaking
18 and upholding on what you stand for and
19 what you say. Thank you, Ms. Beaufort.

20 - - -

21 (Applause.)

22 - - -

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 230044.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MR. HAGINS: Good morning.
7 Good morning, everyone. Ogbonna Hagins.
8 I'm going to be speaking about the Bill
9 230044.

10 Even though I understand the
11 sentiments of wanting to condemn the
12 Union League for giving the honor to the
13 Governor of Florida, I think there are
14 far more institutions and organizations
15 and people that should be condemned in
16 the City of Philadelphia.

17 We have a School District that
18 has consistently failed our children, and
19 the education data shows that six of ten
20 children who graduate cannot read, write,
21 or do math on a high school level.

22 Eighteen years ago Dr. Ed
23 Robinson was consulted by the School
24 District of Philadelphia to infuse
25 African history into 17 books that were

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 used by the students in the District.

3 And why is this relevant? It is relevant
4 because the infusion had been proven to
5 teach not only African American students
6 about their history but all students of
7 the greatness of African culture, which
8 is rarely done today.

9 It was also proven that when
10 African American children learned their
11 history, they are far less likely to be
12 violent, and their overall grades
13 improve.

14 If this infusion of African
15 history was infused into the curriculum,
16 it is very likely that the violence that
17 we see in our city would not be
18 occurring.

19 So, yes, condemn the Union
20 League, but also condemn the School
21 District of Philadelphia, which, by the
22 way, is the only district in the state
23 that does not have an elected school
24 board. And I was just given a text
25 today, because I made a post on Facebook,

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 that Philadelphia has not had an elected
3 school board since 1867.

4 So I'm saying to you condemn
5 the Urban League, but let's do right by
6 our children in Philadelphia.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

10 - - -

11 (Applause.)

12 - - -

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Jonathan Leibovic, commenting on
15 230044.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MR. LEIBOVIC: Good afternoon.
20 My name is Jonathan Leibovic and, yeah,
21 absolutely, condemn the Union League for
22 sure.

23 This is a song that's
24 definitely about that bill number that
25 you just said.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (Witness singing his testimony
3 below.)

4 MR. LEIBOVIC: They cut down
5 the trees and they put up a golfing
6 course. And the billionaires behind it
7 showed no remorse.

8 Don't it always seem to go that
9 you got to be a rich white man to get
10 anything done in this town. They cut
11 down our trees and they put up a golfing
12 course.

13 They want to cut corners,
14 bypass the RCOs, but the people won't
15 stand for that, oh, no, no, no, no.

16 Don't it always seem to go that
17 the developers get millions of dollars in
18 tax breaks. They cut down our trees and
19 they put up a golfing course.

20 Hey, Curtis Jones, quit hanging
21 with CCF. They pay a dollar and grant to
22 the City double UTF.

23 Yeah, don't it always seem to
24 go that you got to make thousands of
25 dollars in legal campaign contributions

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to get your zoning permits approved.
3 They cut down our trees and they put up a
4 golfing course.

5 Late last night, I heard an
6 awful sound, and a big yellow tractor
7 tore all our trees to the ground.

8 Now, don't it always seem to go
9 that backroom deals are how business is
10 done. They cut down our trees and they
11 put up a golfing course.

12 And I'm going to keep on
13 singing about it until my voice is
14 hoarse, because the billionaires behind
15 it show no remorse.

16 Most the people showed up
17 today, we came out in force to say you
18 got to prepare if you want your golfing
19 course.

20 Thank you.

21 - - -

22 (Applause.)

23 - - -

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Okay. So for your information, in the

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 event you want to use it as an audition
3 tape, Channel 64 runs this over and over.
4 But thank you for your testimony, sir.

5 Next speaker.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
7 is --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
9 on, Mr. Decker.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Johnson.

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
13 Council President.

14 I want to also just take a
15 moment of personal privilege to
16 acknowledge my colleague Councilwoman
17 Kendra Brooks for acknowledging and
18 honoring a longtime Point Breeze legend,
19 community hero, Ms. Betty Beaufort.

20 Ms. Beaufort, can you stand.

21 - - -

22 (Applause.)

23 - - -

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Ms.
25 Beaufort is a part of the Concerned

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Citizens of Point Breeze as well as the
3 Queen Memorial -- Friends of the Queen
4 Memorial Library.

5 Most of you in this body know
6 I'm born and raised in Point Breeze South
7 Philadelphia like all my life. And so I
8 know Ms. Beaufort growing up as a young
9 man in South Philadelphia.

10 And so I just want to commend
11 her for her hard work and her dedication
12 to improving the quality of life of the
13 residents in Point Breeze. And she has
14 no problem speaking truth to power and
15 always speaks with a sense of passion and
16 commitment for doing what's right on
17 behalf of the people in Point Breeze
18 South Philadelphia.

19 So I wanted to give you your
20 flowers as well today as a co-sponsor,
21 Ms. Betty, and tell you to keep up the
22 good work and God bless.

23 - - -

24 (Applause.)

25 - - -

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
3 Council President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 Mr. Decker.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Melissa Robbins, commenting on 230044.
9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MS. ROBBINS: Good afternoon,
13 Council President, members of Council,
14 and taxpayers. My name is Melissa
15 Robbins. I'll be commenting on
16 Resolution 230044 sponsored by
17 Councilwoman Sharon Vaughn and
18 Councilmember Kenyatta Johnson.

19 I'd like to say thank you for
20 everyone who participated in the press
21 conference last Tuesday denouncing the
22 honoring of Governor Ron DeSantis as well
23 as the protest.

24 What many of you do not know is
25 he left there and then was honored by one

2 John McNesby, President of FOP Lodge.

3 What does the Union League of
4 Philadelphia and the FOP leader president
5 have in common? A history of continued
6 white supremacy and public
7 anti-blackness.

8 Most of you don't know that on
9 Election Day, the people who voted over
10 there by the FOP that sits close to
11 Councilmember Brian O'Neill's office, the
12 Black people that voted over there heard
13 the N word, monkey word, gorilla word.

14 I'm here to say Governor
15 DeSantis represents a part of American
16 history that is behind us, and anyone who
17 agrees with that way of thinking or
18 submits to that way of thinking, you are
19 a racist, you are anti-blackness, and the
20 days of subjugating Black people are
21 over.

22 - - -

23 (Applause.)

24 - - -

25 MS. ROBBINS: Our city is

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 44 percent Black people. Just like the
3 gentleman said, we have awful graduation
4 rates, awful matriculation rates here in
5 the City of Philadelphia, eds and meds.
6 Why are our kids not in those classrooms?
7 Why are our schools not fully funded?
8 How long do you intend to beat a dead
9 horse in order to continue the life of
10 white supremacy that requires a continued
11 subjugation and oppression of Black
12 people?

13 We see it. We feel it. Our
14 poverty is us. Our children, our
15 inability to own a home, start a
16 business, be educated, travel while being
17 Black.

18 You get your golf courses. You
19 get your special clubs. We get nothing.
20 You criminalize our Black males as they
21 die in the streets, but there's enough
22 land for a dirt bike park so they can
23 ride free, generate money, perform.
24 They're excellent. They're brilliant.

25 How many more years must Black

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 people suffer? How many? How many?

3 I don't prepare to do it
4 anymore. So for the Black people who
5 want to pay it off, let me tell you
6 something. It's a whole lot of people
7 like Melissa Robbins. I ain't for sale.
8 You sold my ancestors. Stop taking money
9 to benefit in the moment while your
10 people suffer.

11 Look around the City. Look at
12 Atlanta. Get up off your butts, work
13 together, and bring Black people up. We
14 want money. We don't want your apology.
15 We don't want your scholarships. We
16 don't want your meals. We don't want
17 your hamburgers, and we don't want your
18 goddamn pictures.

19 Invest into our communities.
20 Give us access to the money. What was
21 the American Rescue Plan, the Inflation
22 Reduction Act, Build Back Better, where
23 are those millions of dollars?
24 Harrisburg is sitting on 12 billion.
25 Give that money to Black people. We

2 earned it. We deserve it. Our ancestors
3 built this country on our backs and we're
4 tired of anti-blackness and racism.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Okay. Thank you.

7 - - -

8 (Applause.)

9 - - -

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Ms. Robbins.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Tiffany Green, commenting on 230064.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. GREEN: They already warned
18 me, this is her day, so I won't start
19 anything.

20 Tiffany Green. I'm here to
21 honor Betty "Betsy" Beaufort. I want to
22 talk about her real quick, because she is
23 the quintessential activist. An activist
24 is a person who campaigns to bring about
25 political and social change or to hold

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 elected officials accountable, which many
3 who are here today, and I want to say I
4 give thanks to all of you.

5 But the point of it is, an
6 activist has to be about purpose,
7 passion, a love for people, and pressing
8 forward and committed.

9 Talk about purpose. I met
10 Betty through a long-term activist, Mamie
11 Nichols, 90 years old. Mamie called me,
12 said that she going up against a billion
13 dollar company, can you do the
14 groundwork. When I came there, she
15 introduced me to Betty, and Betty said
16 she wanted to help out, and we went
17 forward. We won that campaign.

18 After that, Betty was there.
19 They wanted to close down the libraries.
20 Betty came out. We went over there. We
21 found out. We've been at that campaign.

22 At that campaign, one day we
23 were supposed to have outdoors around
24 City Hall have a protest. Not too many
25 showed up because it was raining

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 terribly. Betty called me and said,
3 Tiffany, you ready?

4 I said, it's raining.

5 She said, a little water won't
6 melt you.

7 I said, I don't know.

8 She said, be down there.

9 So I come down there. She's
10 standing out there with her grandson with
11 the sign. There was only about ten of us
12 at that point, because people didn't show
13 up. We going around and around and
14 around. The major media show up. All
15 the sudden Stan and his wife said, we
16 gonna take a gift up to Mayor Michael
17 Nutter. At that point, Betty -- he said,
18 who with me? Betty stands up and said,
19 I'm with you, Stan. I'm going with you.

20 So they go up to Michael
21 Nutter's office and take him this coal to
22 represent if he close down the library.
23 At that point, that story ran on Channel
24 6.

25 I just want to say Betty has

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 been there from the beginning. If it's
3 snowing, she's there with her boots. If
4 it's raining, she's there with her
5 umbrella.

6 And I want to say it's been a
7 pleasure to serve with Betty Beaufort.
8 When they tried to close the recreation
9 centers, she was there. When they tried
10 to close -- when they closed down Smith,
11 she was there.

12 We are activists, and we do
13 what we do. And I want to say that I'm
14 glad we're honoring her while she's
15 living at this point so she can hear from
16 all of us that we really appreciate Betty
17 Beaufort.

18 And I want to say that I think
19 a vote today for that resolution is a
20 vote for someone you know who has given
21 themselves freely, voluntarily, and
22 that's what we all need to be about at
23 this particular point.

24 And, Betty, I took a chance
25 down here with all this high-risk

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 COVID -- and you know I did -- for you,
3 and I want to say thank you for your
4 support.

5 And also I just want to say,
6 can we reinstate the virtual option for
7 people who are high risk and do not want
8 to come down here to City Council? We
9 deserve to have that alternative to still
10 put forth our right, and you should
11 provide that to us, because as long as
12 COVID is out here, we should not have to
13 risk our lives to come down here for a
14 three-minute comment.

15 Thank you very much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Ms. Green.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 CHIEF CLERK: The final
22 speaker, Mr. President, is Catherine
23 Hicks, commenting on 230044.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 afternoon.

3 MS. HICKS: Good afternoon.
4 I'm Catherine Hicks and I'm here
5 representing the Philadelphia branch of
6 the NAACP on behalf of the Resolution
7 230044. Thank you, Council President,
8 Council, and the public for allowing me
9 to be here today to speak on this.

10 I am here because we stood in
11 front of the Union League more than a
12 week ago in protest of the Florida
13 Governor, Ron DeSantis, being honored
14 with the highest honor that that league
15 could give. We are in total disbelief
16 and appalled that he who disrespected us
17 as the Black and brown community was
18 taking out Black history studies in our
19 schools.

20 He is known for being a racist.
21 He has brought out the woke, stay woke
22 now on looking at Blacks and browns as
23 not being good enough for us to teach in
24 schools, for us to have that type of
25 curriculum. I denounce that. We, the

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia branch NAACP, denounce that.
3 Those who stood with us denounce that.

4 I am in support of this
5 resolution, and I feel that we have to
6 stand up and say that this is not
7 something that we are going to have
8 happen in our city. We are not going to
9 allow our city to be smeared by
10 somebody -- the Florida Governor DeSantis
11 who comes here and then we acknowledge
12 him with an award.

13 So I feel that we all, we all
14 should stand and denounce this, ask the
15 Union League -- we have demanded that
16 they rescind that, and I'm asking that
17 they rescind that honor, because he does
18 not deserve it.

19 Our students have the right to
20 know their history. Our Black and brown
21 children in schools deserve to know their
22 history.

23 And so I am in total support of
24 this resolution, and I ask everyone who
25 stood with us that day, which included

1 2/2/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Black Women's Leadership Council, the
3 Black Clergy, NOW, and a number of
4 organizations and the community, the
5 large crowd that stood out there, we ask
6 that you all hear this and that you do
7 continue with this resolution.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you.

11 - - -

12 (Applause.)

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 Is that it, Mr. Decker?

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
18 other speakers, Mr. President.

20 Thank you very much.

21 That concludes our public
22 comment session for today.

23 We will now consider the bills
24 and resolutions on the Second Reading and
25 Final Passage Calendar.

2 Mr. Decker, please read the
3 title of Resolution No. 210434.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
5 calling on the City of Philadelphia to
6 implement minimum force training for all
7 law enforcement officers.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh for a
10 motion on the resolution.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
12 Council President. I move that
13 Resolution No. 210434 be taken from the
14 table.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All in favor of removing from
19 the table?

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it. Resolution No. 210434 is

1 2/2/23 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 now -- Councilman Oh, are you going to
3 call it up for a vote now?

4 COUNCILMAN OH: No, Council
5 President. I'll wait until next week.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Okay. Thank you.

8 Mr. Decker, 230039.

9 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
10 urging the United --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
12 on. Mr. Decker, hold on one second.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

15 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
16 you. Thank you, Council President. I
17 wanted to ask the sponsor of Resolution
18 210434, Councilmember Oh, if he could
19 just give us an explanation. He said he
20 was going to wait until next week, so
21 that we understand what he's seeking to
22 accomplish.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you.

1 2/2/23 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
5 much, Council President.

6 This was brought up before and
7 I think it has sat for a while. I think
8 the Tyre Nichols case once again raises
9 the issue of training.

10 We authorize police officers.
11 We train them. We give them lethal
12 force. They are able and trained to use
13 maximum force. They should be trained to
14 use minimum force. People think that
15 comes naturally. It does not. And I'll
16 just give a quick example.

17 If you and I are engaged in a
18 physical confrontation and we are of
19 equal strength, you give 100 percent, I
20 give 100 percent, but when it is unequal,
21 when my 50 percent is too much for you, I
22 may feel that I am not using much force
23 on you, but you may feel it's quite
24 different.

25 When people are excited, when

2 their adrenalin is going, it does take
3 training. People also naturally when
4 they feel their life is in danger, they
5 get a lot of adrenalin. Their blood
6 sugars rush. That is what's supposed to
7 happen. And so the measurement of the
8 danger is always enhanced, and it does
9 take training to understand and to
10 measure what the danger actually is.
11 That's true of anyone who does any type
12 of combat sport, from wrestling to boxing
13 to kickboxing. You learn that over a
14 period of time.

15 However, when you are using
16 100 percent of your strength and I'm
17 using 60 percent but there are five of
18 me, when there's five people using
19 60 percent on one person, I may just
20 think I'm holding your arm, another
21 person may think they're just holding
22 your leg, but the other three people are
23 doing things we don't know. Maybe
24 someone accidentally hits you in the
25 throat. Maybe someone has a knee in your

2 solar plexus.

3 Just even without the force
4 itself, the excitement that occurs, the
5 adrenalin, the stress, the anxiety, if
6 you have any type of situation, you could
7 be seriously injured from there.

8 It is the responsibility of the
9 City to properly train those it
10 authorizes to use deadly force, maximum
11 force, and other types of force. It is
12 good for the officers. It's good for the
13 public.

14 The failing of what happened in
15 Memphis is the responsibility of each one
16 of those five police officers and
17 everyone who is watching, but the other
18 failure is the failure of the City of
19 Memphis and its police department in not
20 training those it holds responsible.

21 Now they are arrested, they
22 have been fired, and they will face
23 murder charges.

24 This happens time and time
25 again, and there should be training. It

2 just -- it happens in many police
3 departments around the world and in this
4 country. There is no reason not to train
5 people. They should be trained. It does
6 not come naturally. So I put this
7 forward once again in response to what
8 happens.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
11 you good, Councilwoman?

12 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank

23 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
24 urging the United States Congress to pass
25 the "Gun Records Restoration and

2 Preservation Act," introduced last
3 session by U.S. Senator Bob Menendez and
4 Congresswoman Barbara Lee, which would
5 repeal the Tiahrt Amendments, whose
6 provisions have hampered efforts to
7 address gun trafficking by, among other
8 things, identifying and holding
9 accountable irresponsible gun dealers and
10 owners.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
14 President, I want to commend you for
15 offering this resolution, because often
16 times when we talk about the issue of gun
17 violence, we never get answers to the
18 question where the gun is coming from.
19 So many young people in the City of
20 Philadelphia and all throughout this
21 nation, particularly in urban
22 neighborhoods, have access to illegal
23 guns.

24 And so I just want to commend
25 you for sponsoring this resolution,

1 2/2/23 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 because this also goes to the heart of
3 how we address the issue of gun violence,
4 and that's access to illegal guns.

5 And with that being said, I
6 move for the adoption of the resolution.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
9 been moved and properly seconded.

10 All in favor indicate by saying
11 aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 Mr. Decker, 230044.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
22 condemning the Union League of
23 Philadelphia for bestowing its highest
24 honor, the Gold Metal, upon Florida
25 Governor Ron DeSantis.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Vaughn.

4 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank
5 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
6 of the resolution.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
9 been moved and properly seconded.

10 All in favor indicate by saying
11 aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 to introduce legislation allowing Cities
12 and Counties of the First Class to set
13 their own minimum wage laws.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Harrity for a
16 motion.

17 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
19 of the resolution.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

9 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
10 authorizing the Philadelphia Land Bank to
11 dispose of 3001 Martha Street located in
12 the 1st Councilmanic District.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

15 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
17 of the resolution.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
20 been moved and properly seconded.

21 All in favor indicate by saying
22 aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Those opposed?

6 Mr. Decker, please read the
7 title of Bill No. 220918-AA.

8 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
9 amending Chapter 14-500 of the
10 Philadelphia Zoning Code, entitled
11 "Overlay Zoning Districts," by creating a
12 new subsection, entitled "Cobbs Creek
13 Golf Course Overlay District."

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President and colleagues. Thank you
18 for your patience. Thank you for your
19 understanding. Thank you for putting me
20 in touch with the proper organizations to
21 seek guidance about environmental
22 justice. It is not a perfect thing, but
23 it is an overall good thing for the
24 benefit of the community.

25 We are talking about in

1 2/2/23 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 context -- and for the record, people
3 have a right to speak, but they don't
4 have a right to the facts.

5 There is a golf course in Cobbs
6 Creek that was abandoned pretty much for
7 15 years. We've had deceased bodies
8 taken out of there. We've had missile
9 silos installed in there. We've had
10 homeless encampments when people need
11 places to stay. But none of these
12 environmental folk were a part of those
13 discussions. Freedom to speak but not
14 freedom of the facts.

15 Not one dollar of government
16 money from this city is going into the
17 restoration of that golf course. That's
18 60 million plus that we can count, raised
19 by people who care about the historic
20 nature of the first integrated golf
21 course in the City of Philadelphia.

22 I don't know where these people
23 were when I first was elected and we
24 walked through the neighborhoods and
25 collected golf balls, because of the

2 broken fences, that were in people's
3 windshields and in their homes.

4 I don't know where these people
5 were when we went through infestations of
6 lantern flies, infestation of possums and
7 raccoons in the community adjacent,
8 Overbrook Park, Overbrook, Carroll Park.

9 But it is important to know
10 that we, in spite of that, are willing to
11 continue the dialogue. I learned a lot
12 about environmental justice. Thank you,
13 colleagues. Thank you. And I'm
14 committed to making sure that that
15 process continues in spite of this vote.

16 But in context, Mr. President,
17 we've been doing this for ten years. We
18 started this under the Nutter
19 Administration, because we realized then
20 that for all of our collective golf
21 courses, the City of Philadelphia only
22 received \$15,000 annually in revenue, had
23 exceeding expenses to keep these public
24 golf courses open. And so now we have an
25 opportunity to get three teams financed

2 within, you know, the golf course's area.
3 Golf teams, you have a commitment from
4 them to do dozens of kids every year that
5 will learn golf course management, which
6 leads to careers, pathways out of
7 poverty.

8 So you have to weigh the good
9 with the bad, and the good far exceeds
10 the bad.

11 I have brought for you -- and
12 Councilman Squilla was excited to finally
13 see -- e-mails supporting the golf
14 course. Many a people in Overbrook Park
15 can't come down here. Why? Because
16 they're at work. But I'd like to submit
17 this as a part of the record to show that
18 there is substantial support. And we
19 have had dozens of meetings, and we know
20 what my district needs. And I respect
21 everybody downstream, going to speak to
22 everybody downstream, but charity begins
23 at home in the 4th Councilmanic District,
24 and I would call for the support and
25 passage of this bill, looking at the

2 greater good for the City of
3 Philadelphia, and trust the fact that I
4 will not stop talking to environmental
5 groups.

6 This has two amendments already
7 because of things we've heard, things
8 we've agreed upon, things we've
9 considered a part of the legislation.
10 That won't stop after today.

11 So I thank you, Member Johnson.
12 I thank you, Member Richardson. I thank
13 you, Member Gauthier, and all members of
14 Council for asking the tough questions
15 and making us find the right answers.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Economic Development to hold hearings
12 examining the COVID-19 pandemic's impacts
13 on Black-owned businesses and the
14 disparity in rates of closure, introduced
15 today by Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

16 resolution. I remember when the pandemic
17 first hit the City of Philadelphia and we
18 were getting bombarded by calls from
19 Black and brown small businesses here in
20 the City of Philadelphia who needed a
21 lifeline of support to help their
22 businesses continue to stay afloat. And
23 even though we're slowly coming out of
24 the pandemic, we need to make sure that
25 we do not forget that they still

3 their businesses back up and running
4 based upon the impact that COVID has had
5 on their business structure, their

11 Philadelphia keeps us afloat. We may
12 think it's the large corporations, but at
13 end of the day, it's small businesses
14 that hire the most amount of employees in
15 our economy regionally.

16 So thank you very much for
17 allowing me to acknowledge her for her
18 laser like focus on this particular
19 issue.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 is not coming but an industry that's here
15 and still coming, and we want to make
16 sure that our career and technical

18 curriculum standpoint so that we can
19 ensure our young people can go directly
20 into those career opportunities.

21 So I know that we need to
22 create this type of school for our young
23 people that's state-of-the-art so that
24 they have additional opportunities,
25 because I learned as a former teacher

3 to college, but they should be college or
4 career ready at graduation, and that's
5 what we need to continue to do.

22 I just want to also -- I got a
23 lot going on today, but it should be duly
24 noted I want to acknowledge Councilman
25 Isaiah Thomas for taking the time to

3 I've known Marvin -- probably
4 he first started his program was around
5 the time my son was born back in -- some
6 time ago. My son is eight now. So I met
7 Marvin about two years before then, but I
8 was always impressed, because he took one
9 of the key issues that we have to address
10 here in the City of Philadelphia, and
11 that's making sure our young people are
12 educated, right?

13 Education is the passport for
14 all of us out of poverty. So for him to
15 create his own tutorial program, right,
16 that supplements the education our young
17 people are receiving in the Philadelphia
18 public school system and our charter
19 school system as well as our private and
20 parochial system is a mission that I
21 believe is worthy of the honor that he's
22 receiving today.

23 And so I wasn't able to be with
24 him during his ten-year celebration last
25 weekend because I was out of town, but he

2 did give me a call and just asked for my
3 support, and I just want to let him know
4 that I will continuously support him as
5 he moves forward.

6 We partnered on other
7 initiatives that he provided services to,
8 and I just want to hope that all the
9 people in this body, if you're looking
10 for a person to partner with in your
11 district to teach young people around
12 achievement and education, achievement
13 with math, then I would ask you to
14 consider working with this young man and
15 this particular initiative, and just want
16 to personally publicly acknowledge him
17 and thank Councilman Thomas for bringing
18 him to this body. And that's one of his,
19 I guess, part of Team Thomas. So thank
20 you for your hard work.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

14 Clarena Tolson is someone that
15 is near and dear to my heart. I love
16 Mrs. Tolson. She is not only -- she is
17 known to you as Commissioner Tolson, but
18 for me when my mother passed away
19 13 years ago, a friend of mine named
20 Laurena Tolson came into my life and
21 said, I heard that your mom passed away,
22 and I wanted to invite you to our family
23 dinner. At the time, I did not -- for
24 Christmas. At the time, I did not know
25 that Mrs. Tolson was the City

2 Commissioner for Streets. I just knew
3 that her mother was a great cook and that
4 she needed someone -- she wanted to
5 invite me over to dinner.

6 Ever since then, Mrs. Tolson
7 and the Tolson family has been there
8 every step of the way in anything that I
9 needed. This family has provided me
10 mentorship. They provided me with
11 support emotionally and, most
12 importantly, they provided me with a lot
13 of love, and Mrs. Tolson has always been
14 at the helm of that.

15 One of the things I'll tell you
16 about Mrs. Tolson is that a lot of people
17 don't know in the City of Philadelphia, I
18 did mention that she's an excellent cook
19 for sure, but she's full of laughter,
20 full of love, and she's also a person who
21 is just really good with connecting her
22 friends to opportunities and supporting
23 them to be excellent individuals.

24 So I was very happy when
25 Councilmember Squilla helped to

2 co-introduce this -- asked me to
3 co-introduce this particular resolution,
4 because I really love Mrs. Tolson, and I
5 want to thank her for her 40 years of
6 service to the City of Philadelphia under
7 six different mayors.

8 As the Streets Commissioner,
9 she was one of the most innovative people
10 ever. She helped us really energize our
11 recycling program. And one of the
12 stories that her husband said, and I'll
13 stop here, her husband made mention of
14 the fact that -- and the blizzard of 1996
15 occurred and there was six men that came
16 to their door to literally shovel her
17 out, and when they shoveled her out, she
18 said, I'll be back, and she never came
19 back many -- until days later. That
20 shows her dedication to the City of
21 Philadelphia.

22 So I just want to say I'm just
23 so happy that we're honoring her for all
24 of the service that she's done to the
25 City.

10 Tolson. She's a 4th District resident,
11 but as Streets Commissioner when I first
12 got elected, we kind of wanted to take a
13 deeper dive into departments and I made
14 the mistake of challenging her that I
15 could throw more trash than she could.
16 Well, after one block of throwing trash,
17 it was over, and she kept going and kept
18 going and was an amazing leader of that
19 department.

20 I further remember as an
21 elected official a great snowstorm. I
22 can't remember what year it was, but
23 Wynnefield --

24 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: '96.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: '96? Well,

2 this is after I was elected. So this one
3 I remember because I was getting so many
4 calls. I was overwhelmed, President
5 Clarke, with calls about small streets
6 and we couldn't get people out, and it
7 was so bad that the EMS people had to
8 take people out on sleds, and I'll never
9 forget her sending the troops, the plows
10 through Wynnefield, and I just
11 couldn't -- I recorded it. I still have
12 it. And people were clapping just to see
13 that kind of basic City service that for
14 40 years she provided.

15 And so she went on to the
16 Parking Authority, but, you know, I hope
17 that the next Mayor will be smart enough
18 to bring her back somehow, some way as a
19 consultant, because when it comes to
20 basic services, she knows her stuff.

21 So thank you, Member Phillips,
22 for recognizing her.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes

8 occasion of her retirement.

9 I too wanted to give her kudos,
10 and on the occasion of the 175th
11 anniversary of the Philadelphia High
12 School for Girls, I just wanted to
13 mention that she too is a Girls' High
14 graduate, our 222nd graduating class of
15 the Philadelphia High School for Girls,
16 my neighbor in the 4th Council District,
17 and a tremendous public servant who
18 really embodies the intangible spirit of
19 the Philadelphia High School for Girls.

20 So kudos and congratulations to
21 Clarena Tolson.

22 Thank you, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
4 Council President. I also too rise to
5 acknowledge the dedication, the public
6 service, and the work of Ms. Clarena
7 Tolson as we honor her today.

8 Most people may or may not know
9 that she hails from South Philadelphia.
10 Her dad was the former State
11 Representative of the Ceda (ph) Hill of
12 the 186th Legislative District by the
13 name of State Representative Ed Wiggins.
14 He was also the protege of the late
15 Congressman Bill Barrett, who was the
16 powerhouse in South Philadelphia.
17 Clarena Tolson is his daughter.

18 So she comes from a long line
19 of public servants and has always
20 remained committed to improving the
21 quality of life of not only all
22 Philadelphians but also her late -- also
23 her home neighborhood of South
24 Philadelphia, still being a member of
25 Union Baptist Church at 19th and

2 Fitzwater.

3 So when I saw the introduction,
4 I said it's only very fitting to
5 acknowledge her, but also the very
6 heartfelt words that Councilman Phillips
7 shared regarding his relationship, that's
8 Clarena Tolson. That's always been her
9 character and how she carried herself.

10 And so with that being said, I
11 wanted to add my words of support as
12 she's being acknowledged on this day.

13 Thank you, Council President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I was here when Clarena
20 Tolson started, and I'm proud to say I
21 was because I'm witness to how she
22 started. She started in a new position
23 helping City Councilmembers with
24 constituent services. I'm not even sure
25 the position exists anymore. But she

3 she started.

4 She would be in my office and
5 I'm sure my colleagues' offices, but I
6 know in mine, at least once a week. And

11 started at the bottom and worked her way
12 up and became the top dog in the
13 department, she was that. She started at
14 the lowest level and rose to the highest
15 level, and it's deserving. And while her
16 hair may be a little grayer, she looks

18 early '80s.

19 And she's always happy too,
20 which has been mentioned. Never seen
21 Clarena upset, no matter what you were --
22 not yelling but trying to get done. She
23 always just knew what she was doing. And
24 now that I know her background, it
25 explains why someone was so mature in the

2 area of public service at such a young
3 age and continued to grow.

4 But I'm glad I got to mention
5 that. I'm glad I got to know her from
6 the beginning.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

13 sentiments of my colleagues. Clarena

18 departments in which she worked in. She
19 just had a real spirit of excellence.

20 And so I just wanted to join
21 the chorus of my colleagues and salute
22 her as someone who was always wanting to
23 be helpful to each and every one of us,
24 no matter what department you're in, who
25 you represent. Clarena was a real

15 Beaufort, who many of you know for her
16 years of dedication and service in her
17 South Philadelphia community.

18 As we enter Black History
19 Month, this is the first in my series of
20 resolutions honoring Black women for
21 their essential contributions to our
22 city.

23 I knew Ms. Betty well and I've
24 seen her strength as an organizer
25 firsthand. She and I organized together

in support of public education, against predatory development, and I've always been in awe of her integrity. And I thought it was important, I think my colleague Councilmember Johnson mentioned, to give people their flowers while they're living, and too often as Black women, we're not honored until the end. So I thought it was important that we honor folks who paved the way for my advocacy and my organizing.

She taught me so much when I just started out as a young organizer. It was the three amigos, Ms. Betty, Ms. Wilma, and Ms. Maria. She was here too. Oh, she had to leave. And I just want to make sure that I honored them now.

Ms. Betty has been an integral member of several neighborhood-based campaigns, including the Coalition to Save Libraries in 2008 and 2009, the Coalition to Abolish the Undemocratic School Reform Commission, the group of Point Breeze neighbors that organized an

2 attempt to prevent the sale of Smith
3 Elementary School to be turned into
4 luxury apartments.

5 Ms. Betty has never been afraid
6 to stand up to powerful interests,
7 whether it be fighting against
8 multi-national corporations attempting to
9 interfere in our neighborhood or a local
10 developer threatened retaliatory measures
11 when Ms. Betty joined the lawsuit against
12 them.

13 Ms. Betty's passion and
14 devotion is in every campaign she's
15 worked on. Her work in the Coalition to
16 Save Libraries led to being named the
17 President of the Friends of Queen
18 Memorial Library in Point Breeze in 2009,
19 which is the position she continues to
20 hold today.

21 And at the time when our young
22 people need investment and support and
23 robust programming more than ever,
24 Ms. Betty's passion for education,
25 community advocacy, libraries reminds us

2 all that we need funds for these City
3 services.

4 And I know there are many
5 people in the Council Chambers today who
6 showed up to celebrate Ms. Betty, some
7 have left, because of her work that she
8 has been doing for years and for others.

11 I'm so proud to honor her with this
12 resolution today.

5 corruption within law enforcement.

6 As I'm sure many of us were, I
7 was sickened and horrified by the footage
8 released last week of Tyre Nichols'
9 arrest and savage treatment at the hands
10 of the members of the Memphis Police
11 Department. My immediate thoughts were
12 what if it was my son, what about my
13 inability to protect him if, God forbid,
14 something like this were to happen to him
15 in DC, especially with him being so far
16 away from anyone else in his family
17 and/or village.

18 My subsequent thoughts were of
19 the heartache that too many Black mothers
20 have been forced to endure because of
21 cowards and monsters who hide behind
22 badges as well as an oath to serve and
23 protect our communities. This is what
24 creates the mistrust that runs so deep
25 within the Black and brown communities,

2 and it is what leads me to the recent
3 news of the Philadelphia Police
4 Department's 22nd District captain,
5 Nashid Akil, who's accused of paying
6 himself with an anti-violence grant meant
7 for a youth boxing program called Guns
8 Down, Gloves Up that he started.

9 He, like the former Memphis
10 police officers, betrayed our trust of
11 their communities. Maybe not the same
12 way, but it's betrayal nonetheless, and
13 Captain Akil should be terminated for his
14 actions.

15 Behavior like this must have
16 consequences. Behavior like this is
17 exactly why so many people, particularly
18 our youth, struggle to have faith in
19 those who claim to stand for justice and
20 reform.

21 Behavior like this is what
22 overshadows the good, honest deeds of the
23 law enforcement officers who really do
24 care and have the best interest of all
25 our citizens at heart.

2 This body has done some
3 outstanding work around police reform.
4 Consider the fact that the traffic stop
5 that led to Tyre's death might not have
6 happened in the first place if he were
7 driving here in Philadelphia, thanks to
8 Councilman Thomas's driving equality
9 bills. And through Councilmember Jones's
10 hard work, the establishment of our brand
11 new Citizens Police Oversight Commission
12 gives us hope that we can build a just
13 system built on community trust. And we
14 can't build that trust unless we can hold
15 police accountable when people in their
16 custody are injured and killed.

17 We must and will always demand
18 better for those who we rely on to
19 protect us.

10 this body does. So just pass the buck
11 and we'll take it.
