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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning, everyone. We're going to get started. Thank you all for being here today.

We have established our quorum, so we will move to our invocation.

And to give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Akolla of Saint John -- I'm sorry; Father of Saint John Evangelistic Roman Catholic Church. He is here today as the guest of Councilman Squilla.

I would ask all members, guests, and visitors please rise.

(Councilmembers, guests, and visitors rise.)

FATHER ETUGE: Please let's be silent and be present to one another as we call upon God and this assembled body.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, amen.

Almighty, ever-living God, God of creation and God of love, in your hands, oh, Lord God, are the rights of

humility and trust that you would use our
work today to bring lasting prosperity in
this city, lasting peace in this city.

Lastly, oh, Lord God, we ask
you to protect all those who are gathered
here today from all harm, and may they
see the fruits of your labors, and may
peace reign in our city.

of your son who lives with you, who
reigns with you, and rules with you in
the power of the Holy Spirit.

appreciate you being here today.

Council will be at ease.

(Council at ease.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Again, Father, thank you so much for
being here today.

Our next order of business is
the approval of the Journal of the
meeting of Thursday, May 4, 2023, and the
Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
Mr. President. I move that the Journal
of the meeting of Thursday, May 4, 2023
be approved.

(Duly seconded.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you. It's been moved and properly
seconded that the Journal of the meeting

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of Thursday, May 4, 2023 stand approved.
All in favor indicate by saying
aye.

(Aye.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
ayes have it, and our Journal is
approved.

And our next order of business
is requests for leave of absence, and the
Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
Mr. President. On behalf of the members
of Council, there is a request for leave
of absence from Member Thomas, and let us
all put him in our prayers.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Absolutely. Absolutely. Let the record
reflect that the leave shall be granted
for Councilman Thomas.

And our next order of business
is our Sunshine Act motion, and the Chair

2 recognizes Councilman Squilla for a
3 motion concerning certain legislative
4 matters that may arise during the course
5 of today's Council session that were not
6 listed prior to the circulation of our
7 Calendar.

8 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. I move that any of the
10 following matters, if considered today,
11 may be added to the agenda for this
12 session of Council and, as required by
13 law, subsequently published on an amended
14 agenda after the consideration of those
15 matters: resolutions authorizing
16 hearings, amendments to bills on first
17 reading, the reconsideration of a bill
18 vetoed by or re-called from the Mayor,
19 amendments to bills re-called from the
20 Mayor, resolutions taking substantive
21 action to be voted on in this session, a
22 motion to withdraw a bill or resolution
23 that is not on the Calendar, and a motion
24 placing a bill or resolution on or
25 returning a bill or resolution from the

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Suspension Calendar that is not listed on today's Calendar.

The purpose of this motion is to provide the public with notice concerning possible actions by Council that arose too late to be included on the Calendar that was published prior to today's session.

(Duly seconded.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. It has been moved and properly seconded that the legislative matters stated by Councilman Squilla may be added to the agenda for today, should those matters arise during the course of today's Council session.

All in favor indicate by saying aye.

(Aye.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have it, and the motion carries.

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And our next order of business is communications, and the Chair recognizes the Clerk to read the messages from the Mayor or any other communications that he may have in his possession.

CHIEF CLERK: I have no communications today, Mr. President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Okay. Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

And our next order of business is the introduction of bills and resolutions, and I would ask the Clerk to please read the titles of the legislation that's being offered by our members today.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Phillips offers an ordinance amending Section 2 of an Ordinance (Bill No. 180560) authorizing the revision of lines and grades on a portion of City Plan No. 250 by striking from the City Plan and vacating the legally open portion of Montour Street from Adams Avenue to

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Foulkrod Street, by extending the period for compliance with the terms and conditions stated therein.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The Chair recognizes -- you want it for this one, Councilman?

COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: The next one.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The next one?

COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Yeah, yeah.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to committee.

CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged resolution calling on the Administration and School District of Philadelphia to address and expand financial literacy education in the City of Philadelphia.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The Chair recognizes Councilman Phillips.

COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank you, Council President.

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When I -- prior to City Council, I was a youth development leader in the City and I helped young people go to college for free.

I remember at the time during a very busy season of helping students go to college, I was busy doing advising sessions, I was running Saturday classes, giving simulations to students on what college classes look like. I was also visiting schools and so forth. I mean, it was a hectic season.

I remember at the time, my then-supervisor Tatiana Poladko, she had said, Anthony, I want you to make sure that all 300 of our students who are in our program apply to this very competitive summer program. And, you know, at the time, I thought the feat was very difficult, but I said, you know what, I'm going to get a few.

The application deadline came, and at the time, we probably only got about 70 students to apply. At the

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meeting, she met with me after the deadline and she says, Anthony, I asked you to make sure that every student apply to this incredible study abroad program and you didn't get it done.

And I said, well, Tatiana, I was running around doing advising sessions. I was helping students in the classroom with the college classes. I was visiting schools and parents and doing all this outreach.

And she says, I understand that, but if you'd have organized your time and your resources better, you could have did all of that and more.

It was that time in my young age that I recognized something, that even when you work your hardest, there's still more to be done, because what she said to me is that those students that I asked you to apply for that program did not get that opportunity to apply this year and they'll never have the opportunity again as a result of you not

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pushing to make sure all of them apply.

So as a result of that conversation, I've always been about the fact that you have 24 hours a day and there's ways to get things done and there's no need for excuses.

I'm here today to tell you that the School District of Philadelphia has made a lot of excuses for our children, and it's time for them to be able to walk and chew gum at the same time.

In many meetings we've had with the School District of Philadelphia, they've said things like, well, we got to focus on the curriculum first before we focus on our school buildings. Then they'll say, well, we also got to focus on making sure our kids get career education before we focus on them getting going to college.

There's always a sense of one thing first, one thing second. There's no reason with the thousands of employees in the City of Philadelphia that our

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children are suffering in the way that they are.

So I say to you today, today I'm introducing a resolution calling on the Administration and School District to better address financial literacy. Yes, we are focusing on the schools and the betterment of them, finding ways to get assessments and rid them from lead and so forth, but we also have too many Philadelphia children who have a hard time managing their finances.

This lack of economic education creates the school-to-poverty pipeline, and every day neighbors call my office because they struggle to pay their bills, acquire assets, and maintain housing. Much of this boils down not to just jobs but it boils down to lack of financial literacy, which schools should provide before students graduate.

Currently, what we have is a system that prepares students to do everything but lead a successful and

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2 productive life as an adult, and
3 neglecting to teach students basic
4 financial medicine sets them up for
5 failure.

6 We should expect better of our
7 schools, and it is incumbent upon this
8 legislative body to ensure every City
9 entity, including the School District,
10 addresses the need of every
11 Philadelphian. As such, it is necessary
12 to examine the extent to which the School
13 District is addressing the lack of
14 financial literacy and how their efforts
15 can improve.

16 I'm grateful for my colleagues'
17 support on this, including our
18 co-sponsors, Councilmember Driscoll,
19 Bass, Squilla, Gauthier, Harrity, Lozada,
20 Vaughn, Gilmore Richardson, and also our
21 Chairman Thomas, who has been a great
22 advocate of this. I hope to see this
23 issue addressed by the Administration and
24 School District.

25 And I just want to say, you can

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walk and chew gum at the same time,
School District. Let's get it all done
for our children, because there's not
another year that they can wait, because
that year that they wait again, another
kid misses an opportunity for what they
deserve.

Thank you, Council President.

The Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Good morning, Council President, and good morning, colleagues. I am so pleased to offer this resolution honoring the legendary Reverend Louise Williams Bishop on the occasion of her retirement after 65 years in radio.

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(Applause.)

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COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: She is affectionately known as Queen of the Airwaves. Reverend Bishop began her career at WHAT Radio as the youngest voice in radio, and I know all the young people may not remember WHAT, but I grew up on the side of WHAT.

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2 She later hosted the Louise
3 Bishop Program on WDAS AM for more than
4 49 years. Her program was consistently
5 ranked as one of the highest rated
6 programs at the station and was an
7 institution in Philadelphia's media
8 market. Who else remembers her with
9 those morning prayers before we went to
10 school?

11 Reverend Bishop consistently
12 used her platform to inform and unite
13 people around social, civic, and
14 religious issues.

15 Her advocacy did not stop with
16 her groundbreaking work in media. In
17 1978, she was called to the ministry and
18 became an ordained evangelist by the
19 Pennsylvania Baptist Association. She
20 recalls feeling God moving her to devote
21 her time to minister in addition to
22 records on her gospel program.

23 And in 1988, she became a
24 triple threat after being elected to
25 serve in the Pennsylvania House of

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Representatives in my former legislative district, the 192nd Legislative District, which is now represented by our Philadelphia Delegation Chair Representative Morgan Cephas.

Most recently you could hear Reverend Bishop on WURD Radio 900 AM, 96.1 FM on Sundays for Gospel Times from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. She is a true inspiration and a constant reminder that we must be guided by faith and not by sight.

So, colleagues, please join me in congratulating the Reverend Louise Williams Bishop on the occasion of her retirement after 65 years in radio in the City of Philadelphia.

Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
you, Council President.

I am proud to introduce a
resolution recognizing the second week of
May as Children's Mental Health Week in
Philadelphia. Young people across
Philadelphia are under siege from various
life adversities - gun violence, sudden
school closures, a lack of safe public
places, housing insecurity. All these
injustices and more inflict trauma on our
young people, which in many instances
lead to mental illnesses.

Nationwide one in six young
people have been diagnosed with a mental
health disorder, and if we look at
disadvantaged youth who face racial
discrimination or other adverse life
experience, this number jumps
significantly.

The early identification and

1
2 treatment of mental health disorders
3 helps our young people lead successful
4 and healthy lives. So it cannot be more
5 important for the future of our city to
6 ensure young people know how to handle
7 mental health challenges and that they
8 receive the resources they need to
9 thrive.

10 To all the young people and
11 families experiencing mental health
12 challenges, know that we are here to be a
13 source of strength, love, and support.

14 The City of Philadelphia offers
15 a wide range of resources for residents
16 enduring mental health challenges,
17 including the Department of Behavioral
18 Health and Intellectual disAbility
19 Services, the Office of Children and
20 Families, and the Department of Human
21 Services. If you or someone you know
22 needs assistance, I encourage you to
23 reach out to the City or to a healthcare
24 provider.

25 Philadelphia is the City of

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Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection. I encourage all of us to live up to this moniker by always extending a hand to young people and all our neighbors struggling with mental health issues.

5 Commerce; Nazari Meeni (ph), Haitian Flag
6 Day Committee volunteer member.

7 All of you, will you please
8 stand up so that we can honor you.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I am
13 honored to introduce this resolution
14 recognizing Haitian Heritage Month
15 alongside my colleague Councilmember
16 Anthony Phillips.

17 Haitians, like all immigrants,
18 make Philadelphia stronger and better,
19 and we need to make sure that we are
20 clear about the fact that Philadelphia
21 values the contributions of immigrants
22 and that we embrace them as our
23 neighbors, because the Haitian community
24 is an essential piece of our city's
25 fabric. They are small business owners,

1
2 educators, public servants, police
3 officers, health professionals, artists,
4 faith leaders, and much, much more.

5 Haitians bring innovative ideas
6 and new perspectives to our businesses,
7 cultural organizations, and classrooms.
8 Their heritage of sense, intelligence,
9 and bold creativity is unmatched and an
10 asset that uplifts the entire City.

11 As a daughter of a Caribbean
12 immigrant, I'm proud to represent a
13 robust immigrant constituency that
14 includes Haitians and Haitian Americans,
15 and I look forward to celebrating Haitian
16 Flag Day with many of you next Thursday.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

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Driscoll offers one bill and one resolution, entitled "An ordinance amending Title 12 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Traffic Code,' by providing for prohibitions relating to Nuisance Vehicles, and for penalties and enforcement."

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Referred to committee.

CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged resolution proclaiming May 2023 as Jewish American Heritage Month in Philadelphia to pay tribute to the rich history and significant contributions made by generations of Jewish Americans to our Country, Commonwealth, and City.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The Chair recognizes Councilman Driscoll.

COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank you, Mr. President.

I'd like to thank Councilman Squilla and the leadership of the Philadelphia Police Department for helping me draft this legislation, which

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will enforce strict measures on nuisance vehicles, those that amplify sound at a distance greater than 100 feet from the vehicle.

Under the proposed ordinance, violators face a \$2,000 penalty and risk forfeiture of the vehicle. The legislation aims to curb boom parties, which have been happening for years. The parties include large groups of people who gather along the Delaware River and blast music from cars that are equipped with massive speakers. The vibrations and sound are loud enough to carry across the water to impact neighbors on both sides of the river.

Residents along the river and indeed other areas of the City have endured the excessive noise long enough at all hours of the day and night. We need to take strict enforcement measures and signal that we're not going to tolerate it anymore. It's a quality of life issue that has escalated in recent

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years, and enough is enough.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

Next week's Calendar.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

Squilla offers two bills, entitled "An ordinance amending Section 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Designation of Bicycle Lanes,' to authorize a bicycle lane on East Market Street from 2nd Street to 6th Street; and making associated changes to parking regulations within the same limits."

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Referred to committee.

CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance amending Section 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Designation of Bicycle Lanes,' to authorize a bicycle lane, in the southbound direction, on North 2nd Street from Race Street to Market Street.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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Referred to committee.

CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Bass offers two bills, entitled "An ordinance amending Chapter 19-1300 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Real Estate Taxes,' by requiring advertising in community papers, the availability of tax relief programs, residential foreclosure diversion programs, housing counseling assistance and installment payment agreements, to help neighborhood residents manage financial hardships"; and

An ordinance amending Chapter 19-1301 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Real Estate Taxes," to require notices of property assessed value and real estate tax liability, include information on the availability and application process for Income-based payment agreements, Homestead, Tax exemption for Long-time Owner Occupants and other tax relief programs.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

Councilman, did you want to --
Councilman Johnson, did you want to say
something?

COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes, after
you.

COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Okay.

Thank you, Mr. President. I'm
pleased to introduce a pair of bills
today because they are aimed at
proactively providing Philadelphia
taxpayers with clear information about
tax relief programs, homeowner
assistance, and their rights to these and
similar programs.

As you may remember, during the
most recent property reassessment period
in 2022, for example, the valuations of
many homeowners' properties skyrocketed
and, consequently, their property taxes
did as well. In some cases,
reassessments increased as much as
50 percent or even higher.

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2 They not only caught property
3 owners by surprise but left them feeling
4 hopeless. Well, one of these bills
5 amends Chapter 19-1300 of the
6 Philadelphia Real Estate Tax Code and it
7 will require the City to advertise in
8 community papers the availability of tax
9 relief programs, residential foreclosure
10 diversion programs, housing counseling
11 assistance, and installment payment
12 agreements to help community residents
13 manage financial hardships.

14 Applicable City departments
15 will be further required to share with
16 taxpayers how to apply for payment
17 arrangements and other programs and the
18 contact information for these programs.

19 The other bill will amend
20 Chapter 19-1301 of the Real Estate Tax
21 Code and will require the Office of
22 Property Assessment and the Department of
23 Revenue to include tax relief information
24 in all property assessed value and real
25 estate tax liability notices that they

1
2 send to taxpayers. The information must
3 include how to apply for a homestead
4 exclusion, deferral, the Longtime Owner
5 Occupied exemption program known as LOOP,
6 and senior citizen low-income special tax
7 provisions.

8 These bills I'm introducing
9 will ensure taxpayers will not be in the
10 dark about the City's many resources.
11 There are so many property tax relief
12 programs that can help with reducing tax
13 bills or assisting with payment options
14 that they might be unaware of.

15 So I urge my colleagues to join
16 me in ensuring that Philadelphia
17 taxpayers are informed about these
18 resources by voting yes on these bills
19 when the time comes. And I'm honored to
20 say that we have significant support from
21 my colleagues including Councilmembers
22 Driscoll, Phillips, Squilla, O'Neill,
23 Vaughn, Thomas, Harrity, Lozada, Gilmore
24 Richardson, and Johnson.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilwoman.

Councilman Johnson, did you need to be recognized?

COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yeah.

Thank you, Council President.

I just want to commend my colleague for these introduction of bills that goes to the heart of how we address the issue of housing inequality here in the City of Philadelphia, particularly around making sure that people who are most vulnerable of becoming homeless, people who are most vulnerable who live in gentrified neighborhoods have the necessary information that's needed to allow them to make decisions to help them stay inside their homes.

This is another example of the City Council body leading on some of the most critical issues that are facing the most vulnerable population of individuals here in the City of Philadelphia.

In the past, we have done robo

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calls to our constituents around this particular issue. In the past, we have done billboards to our constituents around this particular issue.

And so I just want to thank my colleague for saying, you know what, let's cement from a policy standpoint this particular issue as it relates to making sure that people who are most in need, particularly around the issue of housing, have the necessary resources that they need to stay inside their homes.

And so thank you very much, and I will be definitely voting aye on all of these bills at the appropriate time.

Thank you, Councilwoman Cindy Bass.

Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you, Councilman.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you, Councilman. And not to mention tangled title that puts you in a

1
2 position to take advantage of these
3 programs. I want to thank the
4 Councilmembers for their diligent support
5 in making sure that that money is in
6 place to actually get that done. Thank
7 you.

8 Those two bills will be
9 referred to the appropriate committee.

10 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
11 other bills or resolutions being offered
12 today by the members, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you very much.

15 That concludes our introduction
16 of bills and resolutions, and our next
17 order of business is reports from
18 committee.

19 And the Chair recognizes
20 Councilman Squilla for a report from the
21 Committee on Commerce and Economic
22 Development.

23 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. The Committee on Commerce
25 and Economic Development reports one bill

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with a favorable recommendation.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

Mr. Decker, please read that report.

CHIEF CLERK: To the President and members of the Council of the City of Philadelphia, the Committee on Commerce and Economic Development, to which was referred Bill No. 230152, entitled "An ordinance amending Section 9-1132 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Cashless Retail Prohibition,' by providing an exemption for gym membership transactions, under certain terms and conditions," respectfully reports it has considered the same and returns the attached bill to Council with a favorable recommendation.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

The Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

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Mr. President. I move that the rules of Council be suspended as to permit the first reading this day of Bill No. 230152.

(Duly seconded.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. It has been moved and properly seconded that the rules of Council be suspended so as to permit first reading this day of Bill No. 230152.

All in favor indicate by saying aye.

(Aye.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have it, and the bill will be placed on our First Reading Calendar today.

Councilman Johnson.

COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes, Council President. I would like to be excused for Council business, and I would

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like to be recorded as voting aye on all bills and resolutions.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman.

Leave shall be granted. The record shall reflect that Councilman Johnson is voting aye on all bills and resolutions and amendments.

I believe that concludes our reports from committee, and our next order of business is the consideration of the Calendar.

I note that the bill just reported from committee with a suspension of the rules has been deemed to have had its first reading. It will be placed on our Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar at our next session of Council.

As there are no additional bills on the First Reading Calendar, the Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the purpose of calling up bills and resolutions on our Final Reading Passage today.

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. The following bills and
4 resolutions are being brought up from
5 Second Reading to Final Passage Calendars
6 today: Nos. 230365, 230370, 230372,
7 230373, 230374, 230375, 230376, 230377,
8 230378, 230379, 230380, and 230251. All
9 other resolutions and bills are being
10 held.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 Before we proceed with the
14 bills and resolutions on our Calendar
15 today, we will have our public comment
16 session. It will go as follows:

17 Your public comment must
18 concern matters on the Second Reading and
19 Final Passage Calendar at our session
20 today. All speakers must sign up in
21 order to testify. If you have not
22 already done so, you may sign up at the
23 table outside of the Council Chambers
24 with the Sergeant-at-Arms.

25 Once you have signed up, your

1
2 name will be called in the order for
3 which you signed. You will be called to
4 go to the podium. On that podium there's
5 a device. When the light turns green on
6 that device, it will be your time to
7 speak. When the light turns yellow, you
8 will have 30 seconds to conclude your
9 remarks, and when the light turns red,
10 I'd ask that you please adhere to our
11 guidelines and conclude your remarks and
12 make room for the next speaker today.

13 Today we will have three
14 minutes, so please adjust your testimony
15 to reflect a three-minute time limit. I
16 would like to thank you very much for
17 your cooperation but, more importantly,
18 for your interest in your government in
19 action.

20 Mr. Decker, please call the
21 first name on -- hold on.

22 Councilwoman Brooks, did you
23 need to be recognized? I'm sorry.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes.
25 Thank you, Council President. I need to

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be excused for official Council business
and I want to vote aye on all bills and
resolutions.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilwoman.

Let the record reflect that
Councilwoman is voting aye on all bills
and resolutions and amendments, and leave
shall be granted. Thank you.

Mr. Decker, please call the
first name on the list.

CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
today, Mr. President, is Dr. Benita
Tillman, commenting on 230433.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

DR. TILLMAN: Good morning. My
name is Dr. Benita Tillman. Today I
stand before you not as Dr. Tillman but
as Benita, the mother of a 17-year-old
boy who is afraid to go outside because
he's afraid of being shot. I come before
you as Ms. Tillman, who taught students

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who was already struggling in the face of
a pandemic. As a concerned
Philadelphian, I come before you as I
watch schools close due to asbestos.

Our children's mental health
suffer is a result of their exposure to
violence, conflict, and bad relations
between law enforcement and communities.
The social, economic, and physical
circumstances of which children live have
a significant impact on their mental
health and many common mental disorders.

Taking action to enhance
everyday living situations during early
childhood, school-age, and
(unintelligible) give chances to both
improve children's mental health and
lower the likelihood of mental disorders
connected with their living environments.

So where do we begin? We begin
with organizations like Children's Crisis
Treatment Center, a place where parents
may learn about their children's mental
health through workshops planned with

1
2 their peer support groups, a location
3 where they serve and educate the entire
4 family, not just the client, the child.

5 May is Mental Health Awareness
6 Month, a period dedicated to increase
7 awareness and reducing the stigma
8 associated with mental health. Children
9 Mental Health Awareness Week is May 7
10 through May 13, 2023. This week is an
11 excellent chance for us to communicate
12 together and make a difference for the
13 children of Philadelphia.

14 Thank you for allowing me to
15 speak.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony. We
21 appreciate it.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Rhonda Holloway, commenting on 230370.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

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morning.

MS. HOLLOWAY: Good morning.
My name is Rhonda Holloway and I am the
President of the National Council of
Negro Women, Incorporated, Philadelphia
section.

Philadelphia section, please
stand.

On behalf of NCNW, we would
like to thank Councilmember Vaughn and
her legislative director, Mr. Duwayne
Terry, for their help in commemorating
our 75th anniversary.

Since the signing of our
charter in 1948 in the City of
Philadelphia, the National Council of
Women has advocated for women of African
American descent, their families, and
communities.

Our Four for the Future
initiative focuses on economic
empowerment, education, health equity,
and social justice programs. Our
national program, Good Health Wins, is a

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five-year collaboration with the CDC in response to COVID-19 and current vaccines to support good health across the United States.

I know that our founder, Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, is smiling down on us today as we look forward to continuing her legacy in the City of Philadelphia.

Thank you all for this acknowledgment.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you. Thank you for your testimony. We appreciate it.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker is Samaya Brown, commenting on 230372.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

MS. BROWN: Good morning. My name is Samaya Brown. I'm here to

1
2 congratulate Nehemiah Davis. It is a
3 well-deserved honor and demonstrates that
4 the Council knows how to rename streets.

5 Council President Clarke, your
6 refusal to allow City Council to move
7 forward with the renaming of Taney Street
8 is a blatant disregard for the voices of
9 the people you represent.

10 The name Taney Street is a
11 painful reminder of the legacy of Chief
12 Justice Roger B. Taney who authored the
13 infamous Dred Scott decision, which
14 declared that African Americans were not
15 citizens and had no rights.

16 In essence, your refusal to put
17 our bill on the Council's agenda is
18 indeed denying me, an African American
19 and Philadelphia citizen, my voice and my
20 opinion.

21 We have overwhelmingly
22 demonstrated that the people of
23 Philadelphia as well as the residents of
24 Taney Street agree that the name of the
25 street should be changed and that it

1
2 should be changed to honor another
3 venerated Philadelphian like Nehemiah
4 Davis, an author, an educator, and a
5 civil right activist, Caroline Le Count,
6 who is Philadelphia's Rosa Parks, despite
7 the efforts of concerned citizens such as
8 myself, after three years of doing
9 door-to-door engagement, overwhelming
10 support of dozens of RCOs and 94 percent
11 of North Taney Street residents surveyed
12 being in favor and City Council has
13 already changed the name once before in
14 1858.

15 As those men were celebrating
16 the infamous Dred Scott decision, they
17 chose to honor that ill-begotten Justice
18 Taney. You all, City Council, have the
19 final and complete authority to change
20 the street name again.

21 You should understand progress
22 towards true equality is multi-faceted,
23 and no action is insignificant, even
24 changing a street name. It's as Dr. King
25 said, an injustice anywhere is injustice

1
2 everywhere.

3 As a city, we have a
4 responsibility to promote inclusivity,
5 equality, and justice for all of our
6 citizens. Renaming Taney Street is a
7 step in the right direction. It sends a
8 clear message that we as a city are
9 committed to addressing the wrongs of the
10 past and working towards a more equitable
11 future.

12 As City Council and Council
13 President, you are our representatives
14 and we stand here today having missed
15 work, left children, and inconvenienced
16 every supporter here to implore you to do
17 your job to represent our interests and
18 our intents and to allow the democratic
19 process to proceed with a vote to rename
20 Taney Street. By doing so, you will
21 demonstrate our commitment to the values
22 of justice, equality, and progress that
23 the City should embody. So we are here
24 to ask, who do you want to stand with?

25 Thank you.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

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(Applause.)

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CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
Lynn Landes, founder of wildfoodies.org.
I'm speaking on behalf of Resolution
210913 authorizing City Council to retain
legal counsel to file a lawsuit to
require the Administration to enforce the
Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces Act, whose
aim is to end the use of toxic pesticides
in our parks and on public grounds.

It is not enough for City
Council to pass laws. They must also
ensure that its laws are being enforced.
It's been three years since the act was
passed, and the Mayor still has not

1
2 enforced it. What is City Council
3 waiting for? You are essentially
4 violating your own oath of office by
5 letting the Mayor behave like a dictator.

6 And this is not an isolated
7 occurrence. Two nights ago many of you
8 were on stage at the public hearing in
9 Kensington listening to the horrific
10 stories of children and adults trying to
11 survive the living hell of lawlessness
12 that has enveloped their neighborhood.
13 Why is this happening? We have state and
14 local laws on the books that would put a
15 stop to it, but too often those laws are
16 not enforced, particularly not in that
17 neighborhood. That is itself illegal.

18 Kensington residents do not
19 need a clean needle program or safe
20 injection sites that serve only to enable
21 addiction and illegal activity. What
22 they need is for City Council to sue the
23 Administration and the District Attorney
24 for failure to enforce the law. In fact,
25 there's a prominent attorney in

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Philadelphia, George Bochetto, many of whom you know, who has offered to do just that.

Do you know how the Delaware River and Schuylkill Rivers were cleaned up over four decades ago? An older gentleman named Raymond Proffitt, who lived in Levittown, Bucks County, successfully sued federal, state, and local governments for failure to enforce the Clean Water Act, and that set a legal precedent for the nation's waterways.

The lesson is this: City Council must promptly take the Administration to court whenever it fails to enforce the law. Otherwise, we don't have a democracy. We have a dictatorship.

Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony.

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(Applause.)

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CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Tasha Herdeman.

(Witnesses approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MS. COOPER: Good morning.
Good morning, Council President,
Councilmembers, and everyone. My name is
Rameriah Cooper. We're from Philadelphia
Job Corps' Student Government
Association. We're all grateful to
attend City Council's meetings.

We would like to thank
Councilman Jim Harrity and all members
who supported this resolution, our
program and continue to do so so that my
peers and I can find high-quality
training and work in support for
ourselves and future students of
Philadelphia Job Corps.

Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you for your testimony.

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(Applause.)

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CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Rameriah Cooper, commenting on 230431.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
was -- okay. That was you, Ms. Cooper.
Okay.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Linda Katz, commenting on 230372.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MS. KATZ: Good morning. My
name is Linda Katz and I'm here to speak
about No. 230372.

It's a great thing when a city
like Philadelphia takes time to honor
someone like Nehemiah Davis, but it's not
such a great thing when we honor somebody
like Judge -- Supreme Court Judge Taney.

I just want to mention that if
Richmond, Virginia could remove the
statue of Robert E. Lee, how could
Philadelphia not remove the name of Judge

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Taney from our map?

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(Applause.)

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MS. KATZ: Thank you for
considering my views.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Abe Levy, commenting on 230372.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MR. LEVY: My name is Abe Levy
and I'm here to speak on a related matter
on the renaming of Taney Street.

I cannot understand how every
Councilmember here could go to sleep
tonight not ashamed and disgraced that
there is a street in this great City of
Philadelphia that is named for the
Supreme Court justice who coordinated a
ruling that slavery is legal. How can
that be a thing? How can it take years

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of painful effort, which have been thus
far ignored, to rename -- this should be
the easiest decision this Council has
ever made.

Thank you for listening.

(Applause.)

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
We appreciate it.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
is Kala J. West.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MS. WEST: Good morning. My
name is Kala J. West and I am standing in
agreement of the resolution for Reverend
Louise Williams Bishop.

For over 60 years, Reverend
Louise has blessed the airwaves of
Philadelphia and our tri-state area. Now
at almost 90 years young, she has decided

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to relax and spend more time with her family.

Reverend Louise is a trailblazer who has opened the doors for women in ministry, women in government, and of course women in media. I stand here today honored to not only have worked with her in this leg of her life but honored to continue her legacy as I take over her tremendous radio show Gospel Times on WURD.

I am in agreement with this resolution to honor the one, the only, Reverend Louise Williams Bishop for her outstanding impact on Philadelphia.

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(Applause.)

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony. Appreciate it.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 220865.
(Witness approached podium.)

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

MR. HAGINS: Great morning. My name is Ogbonna Hagins, H-A-G-I-N-S. I'm speaking on an ordinance amending Title 18 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Commerce," by adding a new Chapter, entitled "Workforce Development Activity and Reporting."

Council President, with all due respect, what exactly is this? You are on your way out, and this ordinance seems to be something that is just something to -- something that just sounds good, but what exactly is this, workforce development activity and reporting to promote workforce development activity and to require the Department of Commerce to report to Council contains [sic] aggregate information regarding employment rates and training opportunities, and to report on assessments of the economic impact of the City's workforce development.

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Let me tell you, during the past year of campaigning, I have spoken to thousands of people throughout the entire City of Philadelphia. They are hurting from the lack of work and support.

Once the Department of Commerce reports this info, what's next? Are there enough wealth gap decreasing work in the City?

We need economic development and reparations in this city. I have mentioned many times in this Chamber that there is a need to decrease the economic wealth gap in regards to Afro Americans. Not only have I said this, but the President of the United States, Joe Biden, said that this is the most pressing issue in this country, decreasing the economic wealth gap.

I never hear of bills from this body for this. Never hear anything about reparations from this body.

So with this in mind, I want to

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remind everyone who is listening that Election Day is May the 16th and that the people have the power to change the obvious lack of leadership on this issue of decreasing poverty in this city.

Again, my name is Ogbonna Hagins, and we got to change what's happening in this body.

Thanks.

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(Applause.)

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

The Chair recognizes Councilman Phillips.

COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: I just want to mention that our Councilmember Gauthier presented a resolution to study the wealth gap and also look at reparations in the City of Philadelphia for a lot of residents who deserve them. So it has been brought up, so I just want to mention that.

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(Mr. Hagins talking without
microphone.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Mr. Hagins, you're all right.
Councilmember is talking to the Chair. I
got you. I got you.

CHIEF CLERK: The final
speaker, Mr. President, is Yolanda
Taylor, commenting on 210913.

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
morning.

MS. TAYLOR: Hello. Good
morning, everyone. My name is Yolanda
Taylor, the Black family advocate against
DHS.

Today I will be opposing Bill
210913 introduced by Council Bass. It
states, "Resolution authorizing City
Council to retain legal counsel to file a
lawsuit to require the Administration to
implement and enforce Bill 200425,"
although I am not opposed to Bill 200425,
which is the Healthy Outdoor Space to

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eliminate pesticides. I am opposing City Council retaining legal counsel.

I feel that power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely. I feel that -- I want to use a couple of catch phrases that were used by you guys earlier.

Philadelphia is known as the City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection. Unfortunately when I look around this city, we no longer carry that. Okay? This city is also known as Filthadelphia.

So I, in my good consciousness, if we can't clean up our streets, why should you guys be able to have the power to obtain counsel for pesticides? There's a process. The City has to be clean before we do that. As well as I feel that at this given time, City Council, if you did want to have counsel -- and I'm going to use a catch phrase that Mr. Drexel [sic] used, quality of life issues. I feel that it

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is frivolous uses that you guys want to do renaming streets and so forth.

City Council is supposed to represent the body and the voice of the City. I don't feel that you guys do, or we would not be here asking you to not -- excuse me; something as simple as a street name.

What I personally would like to see is City Council address issues like DHS. For example, I am holding an investigation paper in my hand. I've always heard DHS kidnap kids. That's a real thing. Okay? And unfortunately no one is listening. You got parents going in the street doing drugs.

For example, I want to just do this. This is a call that a child was taken, and I got the copy from the state, and it clearly says that this referral was conferenced in in DHS's case and screened out and will not be accepted for investigation. Therefore, it shouldn't have been investigated. The child should

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have remained in the home. They came and took the child out the house anyway. The parent yelled, screamed. No one is listening.

So that's the things that I would love to see you guys obtain legal counsel for and help the people fight for important issues of quality of life such as our children not being lost to these streets.

Also, for everyone, what I would also like to see as you were saying about kids, I would love to have a vigilant [sic] on May 15th at Love Park, 6:30, for everybody that has lost a child either to DHS or the street violence, because that is the day before the preliminary. So maybe if we come out as a whole and they see lit candles, they'll know that, listen, we want change in the City.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you.

MS. TAYLOR: And we'll stand up

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for it.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you, Ms. Taylor. Thank you for your testimony. We appreciate it.

Heritage Month in Philadelphia to pay
tribute to the rich history and
significant contributions made by
generations of Jewish Americans to our
Country, Commonwealth, and City,
introduced today by Councilman Driscoll.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
Chair recognizes Councilman Driscoll.

COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:
Mr. President, I move for the adoption of
the resolution.

(Duly seconded.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
been moved and properly seconded.

All in favor indicate by saying

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aye.

(Aye.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Those opposed?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
ayes have it, and that resolution is
adopted.

CHIEF CLERK: There are no
other resolutions on the Final Passage
Calendar, Mr. President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you very much.

That concludes our Calendar for
today, and we will now have our speeches.

On behalf of the minority?

(No response.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

There being none, speeches on behalf of
the majority?

The Chair recognizes Councilman
Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: I yield

to --

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Yield?

COUNCILMAN JONES: -- Member
Lozada and then come back to me.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
Chair recognizes Councilwoman Vaughn.

COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: Thank
you, Council President.

Earlier this week we witnessed
a flagrant deterioration of
accountability following the escape on
Sunday of two individuals, Ameen Hurst
and Nasir Grant, from the Philadelphia
Industrial Correction Center, also known
as PICC. One of them is accused of
killing four people and injuring two
others in three separate shootings.

Police are now looking for them
and asking us, the public, for help. How
is it that such a systematic failure like
this could occur and make it possible for
two inmates to go undetected for almost a
whole day, even reportedly after multiple
inmate counts were conducted?

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How is it that prison administrators didn't find out about the escape until Monday afternoon, only after other inmates told them?

How is it that these men passed two unmanned security posts and left through a hole in the fence and nobody saw them?

This was a predictable crisis waiting to happen. This is why COs and Local 159 of AFSCME DC33 took a vote of no confidence against Commissioner Carney, which was upheld unanimously.

While it is very worrisome that such issues as chronic staffing shortages, deplorable conditions for inmates, and unsafe working environments for COs, one of them who happens to be my brother, have played a role in getting us to this point, it's even more concerning that the leadership has not done more to prioritize these issues given the more than 800 vacancies that currently stand.

Between Fiscal Year '17, which

1
2 is Mayor Kenney's first proposed budget,
3 and Fiscal Year '24, the Department of
4 Prisons has seen about 11 percent
5 increase, that's about \$29 million, in
6 its budget. Yet filled positions have
7 decreased by 40 percent.

8 In Fiscal Year '17, 2,331
9 positions were filled, with only 2,325
10 budgeted. Today in Fiscal Year '24,
11 1,318 positions are filled, with 2,186
12 budgeted. This is unacceptable.
13 Somebody has some 'splaining to do, as my
14 eight-year-old grandson would say.

15 The lack of leadership in this
16 city is absolutely exhausting. That is
17 why I introduced a resolution calling for
18 hearings on the dangerous failings of our
19 penal system in the City of Philadelphia
20 to help us understand exactly how we got
21 here.

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you, Councilwoman.

The Chair recognizes
Councilwoman Lozada.

COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
you, Council President.

Two things I want to speak
about today. I'm honored to recognize
the Allied Health Professionals during
National Hospital Week May 7th through
the 13th. That started as a day of
recognition in 1921 and turned into a
week in 1953. These are the men and
women who treat critical patients under
extreme circumstances but are not always
recognized. Thank you to them, to all of
them, to all of our Allied Health
Professionals for your service in our
communities and for keeping us safe and
healthy.

This week, our Public Safety
Committee held a committee hearing in
Conwell Elementary School in the
Kensington community. We heard about

1
2 everyday life from community members,
3 community-based organizations, and
4 principals, but the most important
5 testimony came from our young students.
6 Yes, young children, who every day
7 witness through the lens of their eyes
8 the crisis that plagues their community
9 every day, how they're impacted by it
10 all.

11 Our children are struggling
12 through this health crisis. And, yes,
13 they're resilient, but they should not
14 be, they should not be going through and
15 witnessing what this crisis is causing
16 them every day. This should not be just
17 another day in the neighborhood.

18 They are afraid, they are sad,
19 and they're tired. They deserve better.
20 They deserve to be able to play in green
21 and safe spaces.

22 During the COVID pandemic,
23 every single department in this city got
24 in here and did what they needed to do to
25 protect residents from that health

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crisis. And although sometimes we missed the mark as we went through the process, we adjusted and kept pushing to ensure that every Philadelphian was safe.

COVID proved that we as a city are faced -- when we are faced with a health crisis, we can come together and we can find resources and we can protect communities.

The Kensington community has been begging for help for many years. The children are now standing up and asking us to send help. Will we continue to stand silent? Will we continue to allow the concentration and the occupation of that community to continue? Or will we finally do something to help bring resolution to this community? Will we do what is right?

Yes, it may be difficult, but it is extremely necessary, and it is our responsibility to improve the quality of life in the Kensington community.

I'd like to thank Chairman

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Jones and every single Committee member who attended the Committee hearing in the Kensington community to hear directly from that community how impacted they are and what they experience every day.

We have to do something. We have to change what we are doing. We have to find the necessary resources to bring a better quality of life, the quality of life that every single resident in that community deserves.

5 the facilities represented across
6 government and also recognize the
7 presence of Local 159 President, David
8 Robinson, who is with us today.

12 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
13 you for your work and for your advocacy.

14 And, lastly, Council President,
15 since 2020, we've been visiting churches
16 and religious institutions across the
17 City every single Sunday and bringing
18 needed City resources to our residents,
19 and I wanted to recognize one of our
20 partners in that effort who has joined us
21 every single Sunday since 2020 and just
22 helping us get as much information out as
23 possible. She was with the Revenue
24 Department and is now transferring over
25 to the Philadelphia Water Department. So

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I wanted to say thank you very, very much to Michelle Bailey for all of her service and for sacrificing so many Sundays to join us to help our Philadelphia residents. Thank you very much.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you, Councilwoman.
The Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you, Mr. President.

As you all know, in Philadelphia over 20 percent of the population is food insecure, and in some neighborhoods the number is even higher. With that in mind, last week we helped launch Philadelphia's Grubhub Servicing the City program at the Key School and Southwark School in my district.

With the help of Grubhub, SEAMAAC, Los Gallos, and the People's

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Kitchen, we were able to give out close to 300 meals to children and families from those two schools.

Grubhub Servicing the City program was created to address food insecurity issues as well as support local independent restaurants. Launched in New York in July of '22, this initiative has now served more than 20,000 meals to food insecure families in New York, and it's my hope that we exceed that number as we partner and grow in Philadelphia.

Grubhub will be partnering with Councilmembers, purchasing up to 500 hot, pre-packaged, culturally appropriate meals directly through restaurants and hosting on-site meal distribution events at Housing Authority, senior centers, veterans organizations, and other community-based organizations.

I look forward to working with my colleagues here in Council in the coming months to help bring the program

1
2 to their Council districts and to Council
3 and the City as a whole. I want to thank
4 the Grubhub team of Josh Bosin, Brett
5 Swanson, as well as Andrew Zalenski and
6 Aren Platt from DiCicco Associates for
7 helping bring this to Philadelphia and
8 allow me to kick off the program and help
9 those in need most.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Phillips.

18 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: I just
19 wanted to say really quickly Happy
20 Mother's Day to all the mothers this
21 coming Sunday. I'm without my mother,
22 but we have a lot of wonderful mothers
23 that are here today, including
24 Councilwoman Vaughn, Councilwoman Lozada,
25 and also Councilwoman Cindy Bass and

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Gilmore Richardson and Gauthier and
Kendra Brooks. So I just want to say
Happy Mother's Day to everyone.

A mother is a precious thing.
My mom is not here with me and I still
think about her every day and I wish
there was ways that she can see that the
fruit of her labor is still going on, and
I hope I'm making her proud, but there's
also members even this week who are going
through some things.

So I'm just wishing that
everyone has a wonderful Mother's Days.
God bless.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.
The Chair recognizes Councilman
Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I just want to recognize Member

1
2 Lozada, Member Squilla, Member Harrity,
3 Member Vaughn, Member Driscoll for coming
4 out to Kensington. One of the things
5 that you've always proposed is that we
6 can't be afraid of the people, that we
7 have to go to the people. They are our
8 employers.

9 And in that tradition, my
10 colleagues went out and we heard and we
11 listened. It was a listening session,
12 but if you have a heart, your heart was
13 broken. And Member Phillips always says
14 from the African proverb, how are the
15 children. I remember that. And we heard
16 from the children of Kensington, and it
17 broke our heart.

18 The things that they have to
19 put up with, whether it's watching people
20 shoot up in their extremities that I will
21 not mention, whether they wind up seeing
22 someone OD on the steps of their school,
23 having to navigate in between drug deals
24 and transactions on their way to try to
25 get an education, and the valiant

1
2 principals and administrators that every
3 day keep a smile on their face and
4 positive attitude to help the children
5 through their day. Whether it is
6 watching a park that should be for places
7 where kids play safely that there was
8 encampments there made up of tents, and
9 right across the street an entire row of
10 businesses that were closed due to the
11 conditions of Kensington, all while this
12 is allowed in a sense of, oh, well, it's
13 just Kensington.

14 Well, as we next week elect the
15 100th Mayor of the City of Philadelphia
16 and the 19th City Council here in -- who
17 did I forget? Did I forget somebody?
18 Gauthier.

19 No, this is not your day.
20 Everybody is forgetting you.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Yes.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: She was
23 there. I'll put it on the record, she
24 was there.

25 But as we decide on the 100th

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2 Mayor on Tuesday, please come out and
3 vote. Whoever you vote for, we will hold
4 them accountable for Kensington. You're
5 not going to get to kick the can down the
6 road. We will have you address the
7 Marshall Plan that is needed to make
8 Kensington right. Because if Kensington
9 is not safe, no neighborhood in
10 Philadelphia is safe.

11 I will say this, that it's
12 not -- it was not a question -- and I was
13 proud of you of this. Nobody went like
14 this, pointing at each other, but what we
15 hope to do is point to solutions to solve
16 it, and I look forward to the work. I
17 look forward to work.

18 On another note, we cannot
19 ignore what happened at that prison, and
20 I'm thankful that my colleague, Member
21 Vaughn, is pulling together a hearing to
22 examine all of what happened and hold
23 people accountable, because, again, that
24 young man who was only like 18 years old
25 had four homicides. He had shot and

1
2 killed somebody on the grounds of the
3 prison that was getting out. He pulled
4 up and allegedly shot him dead. So that
5 kind of -- twice this individual said, I
6 don't care about the prisons, I don't
7 care about the system, I'm a bandit and
8 I'm going to do what I want to do, and
9 then escaped, proving that, you know, he
10 felt he was bigger than the law.

11 So we have to fix this, and we
12 will fix this, and I look forward to the
13 discovery. I look forward to making a
14 decision and applying the resources.

15 Eight hundred vacancies is a
16 state of emergency. We've walked those
17 tiers up in those pods and we've seen the
18 dangerous conditions often female
19 correction officers have to operate in.
20 It's not safe for the inmates. It's not
21 safe for the corrections officers, and as
22 the escape proved, it's not safe for the
23 citizens outside of the walls and the
24 fences.

25 So thank you, Mr. President.

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We got work to do.

we do.

The Chair recognizes
Councilwoman Gauthier.

COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
you, Council President.

I wanted to take a moment to
send our love and condolences to
Councilmember Thomas, who lost his mom a
few days ago. I think that's one of the
most devastating things that can happen
to a person and, you know, especially
leading up to Mother's Day. So just
wanted to send him our love and just let
him know that we are thinking about him
and his family in this hard time.

I also wanted to thank
Councilmember Vaughn for the really
important resolution on what's going on

1
2 in the prisons. I will say that, you
3 know, as a member of the Public Safety
4 Committee, we've had meetings on meetings
5 on meetings on meetings with the
6 leadership at the Prisons and with the
7 Administration to talk about the crisis,
8 the crisis that's been playing out in the
9 prisons for over the entire pandemic, and
10 it feels like we don't get anywhere. It
11 feels like just sort of defensiveness and
12 the lack of a real plan.

13 And so I hope -- and I'm
14 willing to be a part of the team that
15 allows us to come into this hearing in a
16 different way and hopefully to get more
17 answers and to get to resolution. But
18 this is something that Council has pushed
19 on, I would say, you know, for the entire
20 pandemic, and I hope we can get to a
21 different place through this hearing, but
22 I do think it's a very important
23 discussion to have.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

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The Chair recognizes Councilman
Harrity.

COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank you,
President, colleagues.

You know, I'm so glad that
Councilman Jones chaired the meeting the
other day, the Public Safety meeting, and
Quetcy Lozada, I commend you for taking
the initiative to actually bring the kids
in, because it just proved what I've been
telling everybody all along, is that the
kids in my neighborhood are good kids.
They're not asking for anything extra.
They just want the same as every other
community's kids want. And you guys got
to see firsthand how articulate and
resilient they are. They learn under
circumstances that no child should have
to go through in order to learn.

They push through streets that
are littered with trash and dirt and
needles and walk past people doing things
that just are not right in public. And
I'm just so happy that for once,

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everybody got to see what I see on a daily basis when I talk to the kids in my neighborhood, that all they're asking for is a chance to be a kid. And, you know, I believe it's our job to allow that and to give back to them. They learn in spite of us and what we're doing.

I'm happy that everybody came out, and I know now that what my colleagues seen was what I see every day, and I hope now that we're all on the same page, we can work to make a difference over there for those kids, because they deserve it.
