5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 ayes have it, and the Journal is

8 The next order of business is

9 the request for leaves of absence.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman

11 Jones.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: On behalf of

13 the majority, no requests for leaves of

14 absence today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair now recognizes

18 Councilman O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

20 Mr. President. On behalf of the

21 republicans, there are no requests for

22 leave of absence.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much, Councilman.

25 At this time, I would like to

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2 dispense with the regular order of
3 business. I would like to thank all the
4 guests and visitors that have come here
5 today. We welcome you so much. We
6 really appreciate the fact that you have
7 taken time out of your busy day to come
8 down and witness your government in
9 action. We hope you enjoy yourself so
10 much that you come back again. So thank
11 you all very much.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Kenney, who will
14 present a resolution honoring Andrea
15 Green and Teresa Maebori. Would
16 Ms. Green and Ms. Maebori join the
17 Councilman at the podium.

18 And also joining the Councilman
19 we have Councilwoman Blackwell,
20 Councilwoman, I believe, Bass.

21 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Councilman
22 Oh.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 we also have Councilman Oh, Councilwoman
25 Bass.

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2 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: And
3 Councilman O'Brien is supposed to be
4 here.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
6 Councilman O'Brien, when he comes in the
7 room.

8 Please proceed, Councilman.

9 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. This is a resolution
11 honoring the inspiring partnership of two
12 Philadelphia educators, Andrea Green and
13 Teresa A. Maebori, who are celebrating
14 the 30th year of "On the Other Side of
15 the Fence," a musical created to break
16 down barriers between students from the
17 HMS School for Children with Cerebral
18 Palsy in West Philadelphia and elementary
19 students from Germantown Friends School.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
21 Whereas, Andrea Green is a playwright,
22 composer, lyricist, musical director,
23 professional jazz pianist/vocalist and
24 musical therapist. She is nationally
25 known for her work creating musicals for

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2 children and family audiences. A
3 musically-talented but shy teenager who
4 was always in the chorus in the musicals
5 at her huge suburban Philadelphia high
6 school, it was in the intimate setting of
7 a patient's room that Green uncovered her
8 flair for spontaneously composing tunes
9 that both entertained and encouraged; and

10 Whereas, the positive response
11 she experienced gratified and motivated
12 Green in return, and launched her toward
13 her life's work in music therapy, which
14 she studied in a masters program at
15 Hahnemann Medical School here in
16 Philadelphia. Ms. Green has written
17 fourteen upbeat Broadway-style musicals
18 for children and families characterized
19 by heartfelt messages on themes of
20 tolerance and understanding. She should
21 be applauded for her creativity in the
22 staging of productions that showcase the
23 joyous capabilities of children with
24 cerebral palsy; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

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2 Teresa A. Maebori is an insightful and
3 extraordinary Philadelphia educator who
4 deserves gratitude and respect, as she
5 prepares to retire, for her profound
6 commitment to character education and the
7 message of inclusion and tolerance
8 embedded within her classroom and musical
9 "On the Other Side of the Fence" which
10 has proven durable across three
11 generations of Germantown Friends School
12 students and their families; and

13 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Whereas, I
14 am happy to be here with my friends from
15 HMS;

16 Whereas, "On the Other Side of
17 the Fence" was an immediate success with
18 performers and audiences, and
19 productions -- oh, I read the --

20 Whereas, "On the Other Side of
21 the Fence" is a tuneful show set in two
22 barnyards, side by side and with the
23 theme of "taking down the fence" of
24 misunderstanding between the animals in
25 two barnyards. The show was initially

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2 conceived as a way to forge an emotional
3 connection between students at a
4 mainstream school - Germantown Friends
5 School - with those at a special services
6 school for children with cerebral palsy,
7 HMS School in West Philadelphia; and

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, "On
9 the Other Side of the Fence" was an
10 immediate success with performers and
11 audiences, and productions of the show
12 continue to be staged throughout the USA
13 as a celebration of breaking down
14 barriers of all kinds - not only physical
15 challenges, but also students who are
16 economically and socially distanced. It
17 also launched the model Green would apply
18 in the creation of many more shows, each
19 with original songs, pro-social themes
20 that children understand and their
21 teachers and families appreciate; and

22 Whereas, anti-bullying programs
23 are recognized as essential components of
24 character formation in our schools, and
25 musicals have the ability to make more of

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2 an impact than lecturing to kids. When
3 children carry the message of tolerance
4 themselves, through song, there's a
5 chance they'll internalize it; now,
6 therefore, be it

7 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Resolved,
8 by the Council of the City of
9 Philadelphia, that Council does hereby
10 recognize, honor, and thank Andrea Green
11 and Teresa Maebori in their inspired
12 mission to break down walls, build
13 bridges and create open minds among
14 countless young Philadelphians.

15 Further resolved, that an
16 engrossed copy of this resolution be
17 presented to Andrea Green and Teresa A.
18 Maebori as evidence of sincere sentiments
19 of this legislative body.

20 Thank you and congratulations.
21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Ms. Green and
24 Ms. Maebori for remarks.

25 MS. MAEBORI: Thank you very

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2 much. My name is Teresa Maebori and I am
3 so pleased to be here today to thank the
4 Council for giving us this resolution and
5 especially to Councilman Kenney.

6 This project started over 30
7 years ago, and it's impacted hundreds of
8 children from Germantown Friends School
9 and hundreds of children from HMS School.
10 Not only that, but it has impacted
11 families and friends and thousands of
12 people who have come to see these
13 productions.

14 I was thinking back about what
15 has made this such a lasting production
16 and why did it impact us so profoundly,
17 and what I came away with is that we
18 broke down barriers and the children
19 became friends. And once the audience
20 could see the joy on the children's
21 faces, the smiles and sometimes the
22 tears, you couldn't help but know that
23 something was really happening between
24 these two groups of children, who
25 communicated and connected through the

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2 magic of the songs that Andrea wrote, the

3 magic of the metaphors that they acted.

4 And through it all, at the end, their

5 friendship was so strong, they kept

6 asking me when do we go back, when can we

7 go back, when can we see our friends.

8 And I think it's the joy of the music,

9 the movement, and the words, the acting,

10 that made a true impact. It has carried

11 through for years. And, in fact, back

12 here we have one of the participants who

13 was in our first play 30 years ago.

14 She's now a professor at University of

15 Pennsylvania. So we're very happy to

16 have Johanna here with us today.

17 I want to say too that what the

18 children discovered was the voice within,

19 the voice that revealed their common

20 humanity, that they all wanted to be

21 discovered for -- they wanted to be

22 known, they wanted to be appreciated, and

23 they wanted to be loved, and I think this

24 project really emphasized that and for

25 years and years. People still come to me

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2 and say that was the most important thing
3 that I did when I was in elementary
4 school.

5 The lessons that were instilled
6 are long-lasting, but this production
7 could not happen without the tireless
8 efforts of so many people. Many of the
9 teachers that are with us today helped in
10 movement. It was Mary Duffy in art
11 therapy. It was Aiko Phan and many, many
12 other people, parents. And I especially
13 wanted to thank the maintenance people at
14 our school, who built a ramp every year
15 to the stage so that the children could
16 perform. Those are the people that are
17 behind the scenes, but really deserve
18 recognition as well.

19 So I want to thank you again
20 for this honor, and may we all remember
21 what these projects do and the music, to
22 break down these barriers of
23 misunderstanding and, in the words of
24 Andrea Green, to break them down so that
25 we know people from the other side of the

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2 fence.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Ms. Green.

7 MS. GREEN: Thank you. I'm
8 really moved and honored to be here
9 today. I think it's only natural for me
10 to start with a little bit of a song,
11 because that's where I'm most
12 comfortable, and I have all these
13 wonderful children here today hopefully
14 that will remember some of the words to
15 the beginning of "On the Other Side of
16 the Fence."

17 Are you going to help me? Are
18 you ready?

19 (Song sung.)

20 MS. GREEN: Okay. That's the
21 beginning.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. GREEN: In 1982 -- and I
24 was 29 years old then -- I created the
25 musical "On the Other Side of the Fence"

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2 to provide the framework for the children
3 from the HMS School for Children with
4 Cerebral Palsy and Germantown Friends
5 School to come together as partners.
6 Through the metaphor in the music, I
7 attempted to create a vehicle for the
8 children from both schools, from both
9 sides of the fence, to come to see and
10 understand each other as fellow human
11 beings who are different and yet in many
12 ways so much the same.

13 The musical is constructed in a
14 specific way to feature every child, but
15 always with the group being supportive
16 throughout the entire piece. The musical
17 has built into it a flexibility to allow
18 for spontaneity, change, surprises, and
19 contributions from the children.

20 Over the years, I created a
21 series of musicals, all with the purpose
22 of teaching tolerance. Whether animals
23 were on two sides of the fence, different
24 fabrics on shelves, fish in the sea,
25 Haliens from Halley's Comet, the musical

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2 project grew and grew dramatically, with
3 input and interest coming in from every
4 person and every department from both
5 schools. I have worked closely with so
6 many amazing people, teachers,
7 therapists, staffs from both schools who
8 have brought their expertise and talent
9 to this unique program. And many of the
10 core group from HMS are here today,
11 people that have been with this project
12 from the very beginning and who I love
13 very much.

14 Chris Coy is not here. Mindy
15 Olimpi, who -- I have to tell you about
16 Mindy. Mindy is right here. Mindy, you
17 have to orchestrate the scheduling, the
18 buses, the support staff. A child needs
19 to be fed. All of the really difficult
20 backstage kind of work, Mindy has been
21 doing this for all these years, just an
22 amazing, amazing person.

23 Mary Duffy, choreographer,
24 movement specialist. Aiko Phan, who you
25 might know. She does a yearly art show

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2 at the HMS School that you should really
3 come over to the HMS School and see what
4 kind of work she does with the students
5 from HMS.

6 Annie Oberfield, thank you for
7 being here today. Charlie Harris, and
8 Diane Gallagher, the principal from the
9 HMS School, who has embraced our efforts
10 to maintain this project year after year.

11 Teresa Maebori, who when I
12 first sat down with her in 1982 at the
13 piano and I sang the song "Good Friends,"
14 we never knew that, my goodness, we would
15 be here 30 years later with the same
16 project, along with other teachers and
17 staff and principals from Germantown
18 Friends School, Audrey Berman, the lower
19 school principal, Kim Lewis, and Dick
20 Wade, the Head Master of GFS was here.
21 It was wonderful for him to be here
22 today.

23 There are children here today
24 from HMS School and Germantown Friends
25 School representing all the children who

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2 have participated in the musicals over 30
3 years.

4 Johanna Greeson, thank you so
5 much for being here. She's representing
6 the first production in 1982 of "On the
7 Other Side of the Fence."

8 A documentary is now in
9 development called "On the Other Side of
10 the Fence," led by award-winning producer
11 Henry Nevison, who is over there, and
12 MiND-TV of Philadelphia. And this film
13 will look at the musical as a
14 tolerance-teaching vehicle, and it will
15 feature the HMS and GFS children as they
16 experience the musical process while
17 getting to know each other. And the film
18 will also look at how this musical has
19 begun to reach out to thousands of
20 children across the country with similar
21 objectives.

22 Our project is really the
23 model. It's the example that hopefully
24 everyone else will be able to utilize so
25 that we can bring more diverse groups

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2 together and there can be more
3 understanding and more friendship.

4 Thank you so much for this
5 honor and for recognizing the importance
6 of this musical and teaching tolerance
7 project. And I just want to end with a
8 little music, the first verse of "Good
9 Friends," and of course, how appropriate,
10 Germantown Friends School, this is for
11 everyone.

12 You guys ready?

13 (Song sung.)

14 MS. GREEN: Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Council will be at ease.

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you very much.

21 At this time, I would like to
22 recognize Councilman O'Neill, who will
23 present a resolution honoring Ed McBride.
24 Would Mr. McBride and those accompanying
25 him please join the Councilman at the

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2 podium.

3 And also joining Councilman
4 O'Neill we have Councilwoman Brown and
5 Councilwoman Tasco.

6 Please proceed, Councilman.

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
8 Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
10 on one second, Councilman.

11 Folks, can we ask you to please
12 lower your voices, please. Thank you.

13 Please proceed, Councilman.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. The resolution that's
16 being presented to Ed McBride from PECO,
17 first of all, is a surprise to him. PECO
18 arranged that and thought up the
19 surprise, and they were very successful,
20 as you can tell. It's the first time
21 I've ever seen Ed in City Council without
22 a tie. And I understand Councilwoman
23 Sanchez had a part in this. Ed thought
24 he was going to a meeting in her office,
25 and apparently she doesn't have a dress

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2 code like we have in here.

3 So we understand, Ed.

4 And the other nice thing is
5 that Ed has been here for 20 years. If
6 any Councilmember and their staffs were
7 dependent on Ed so much, call any time of
8 the day, it didn't matter what it was.

9 And we're very happy, in addition to
10 everyone else, to have his former boss
11 and now his boss but not the first
12 report, Dennis O'Brien, who was promoted
13 also to CEO of Exelon Utilities from the
14 head of PECO, and Ed's replacement in the
15 Philadelphia County job at PECO, Melanie
16 Lassiter, who hit the ground running as a
17 result, I'm sure, of mentoring by Ed and
18 others, because Melanie was very active
19 during Hurricane Sandy. She wasn't on
20 the job very long at that time, and she
21 was terrific. So she had been mentored
22 very, very well.

23 But, Ed, I also have a surprise
24 towards the end, because this one is
25 being framed. It's been framed, I should

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2 say. This resolution will be for your
3 office. And resolutions have a way of
4 making it into a drawer instead of
5 somewhere else, but the one place I want
6 to make sure it always is is in your
7 home, so your family sees it when people
8 come in. They know how much you meant to
9 us, and those employees at PECO, like
10 Melanie, who are in the counties that
11 you're now supervising are very fortunate
12 that you're still around to help them the
13 way you've been helping us for so many
14 years.

15 So this is a resolution
16 honoring and congratulating Edward
17 McBride on the occasion of his promotion
18 to the position of Manager of Local
19 Government Affairs at PECO and for his
20 years of dedicated service to the City
21 Council of Philadelphia.

22 Whereas, the Council of the
23 City of Philadelphia is pleased and proud
24 to join with PECO, family, and friends in
25 honoring and congratulating Edward

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2 McBride on the great occasion of his
3 promotion to the position of Manager of
4 Local Government Affairs for PECO; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
6 Ed McBride's early life was spent in West
7 Philadelphia and at the age of 12 his
8 family moved to the Mayfair section of
9 the City. He is the eldest of five
10 children. He and his wife, Cathy, now
11 reside in Wayne, Pennsylvania. They have
12 been blessed with three adult children
13 and eight grandchildren; and

14 Whereas, Ed McBride joined PECO
15 in 1969 as a mechanic's helper and
16 quickly advanced to the position of
17 mechanic first class. Over the years, he
18 held numerous positions throughout the
19 company, including President of the
20 company's Credit Union from 18 -- forgive
21 me; from 1989, correction, including
22 President of the company's Credit Union
23 from 1989 through 1991; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: And
25 whereas, in 1992, Mr. McBride joined

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2 PECO's Community Affairs department where
3 he was responsible for managing the
4 company's relationship with the City of
5 Philadelphia. Mr. McBride was External
6 Affairs Manager for Philadelphia County
7 before his recent promotion to Manager of
8 Local Government Affairs for the PECO
9 service territory;

10 Whereas, Mr. McBride currently
11 serves on the board of Nazareth Hospital,
12 as President and Chairman of the Variety
13 Club of the Delaware Valley, and as
14 Director and Chair of the Audit Committee
15 of IGA Federal Savings Bank and First
16 Penn Bank. He has served as Chairman of
17 the Upper Merion Township Zoning Board,
18 is a founding Board Member of the South
19 Street Headhouse District, Director and
20 Chairman of the Greater Northeast
21 Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, and was
22 elected Township Supervisor and Chairman
23 of the Board of Upper Merion Township;
24 now therefore, be it

25 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Resolved,

2 by the Council of the City of
3 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and
4 congratulate Edward McBride on the
5 occasion of his promotion to the position
6 of Manager of Local Government Affairs at
7 PECO and for his years of dedicated
8 service to the City Council of
9 Philadelphia.

10 Further resolved, that -- this
11 goes off script a little bit -- that a
12 framed engrossed copy of this resolution
13 be presented to Mr. Edward McBride as
14 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
15 this legislative body. And it's a
16 certification this is a true and correct
17 copy of the original resolution, adopted
18 by the Council of City of Philadelphia on
19 the 9th of May 2013. Signed by the
20 President of City Council, co-sponsored
21 by every member of Council.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Mr. McBride for remarks.

25 MR. McBRIDE: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President, the sponsors of the
3 resolution, and all my friends on City
4 Council. Well, it's easy to confirm
5 that, as was said earlier, they really
6 surprised me, because I left the house
7 this morning and I said to my wife, I'm
8 heading for City Council to a meeting,
9 and she never said a word. She never let
10 on that I should have a tie on.

11 I want to thank our Senior
12 Executive Vice President, Dennis O'Brien;
13 our President at PECO, Craig Adams; my
14 boss, Liz Murphy, who is behind me; and
15 all of my family and friends that are
16 here today and especially my wife, Cathy,
17 my partner in crime.

18 As Brian was reading some of
19 those things, I thought I couldn't do any
20 of those things without the support of my
21 family, and they've always been in my
22 corner.

23 Outsiders that aren't intimate
24 with this relationship in City Council of
25 you all and what you do every day, day

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2 in, day out and for the City of
3 Philadelphia don't understand that each
4 and every one of you have your heart in
5 the place of the City for the quality of
6 the life, to improve the quality of life,
7 to improve the lot of the citizens you
8 represent. A number of times you get the
9 wrong impression through the media, and
10 as somebody that's been here 20 years and
11 with other Councilmembers before you, I
12 just want to say I was always proud to be
13 a part of what was going on here, whether
14 it be individually or the Council on the
15 whole. It's always been my pleasure to
16 work with you and especially worked a lot
17 with your staffs, and it's always been a
18 source of pride for me.

19 And I also would like to
20 comment that at every turn in my life, in
21 my life down here, PECO and Exelon were
22 always in my corner. I didn't have to
23 worry is the company going to back what I
24 say or what I do. They were always in my
25 corner.

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2 So thank you very much for
3 this. I don't think you're going to get
4 me out of the region. So you're going to
5 be seeing me for a while off and on,
6 which will be my pleasure, but it's
7 also -- let me just close by saying it's
8 been my pleasure to work with everybody
9 in this body, and thank you for this
10 recognition.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you.

17 At this time, the Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Jones.

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. I'd like to briefly
21 acknowledge some visitors here today.
22 Mathen Bella (ph), who is from Swaziland.
23 She's here with her parents. She is an
24 intern at Team Clean, a company, esteemed
25 company, in the City of Philadelphia.

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2 She is also the guest of Donna Allie, who
3 is the President and CEO, and Aqil Sabur,

14 Mr. Decker, please read that

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

2 morning.

3 MS. DIETRICH: Good morning,
4 Mr. President. My name is Sharon
5 Dietrich. I'm with Community Legal
6 Services here in Philadelphia. I'm a
7 managing attorney for employment and
8 public benefits and, of course, we
9 represent Philadelphia residents from
10 throughout the City.

11 I'm speaking today about Bill
12 120054, and the main point that I wanted
13 to make is that many Philadelphians would
14 be more able to pay their delinquent real
15 estate taxes if their criminal records
16 were expunged, thereby removing a barrier
17 to employment.

18 According to United States
19 Attorney General Holder's Reentry
20 Council, about one in three Americans
21 have criminal records, and the percentage
22 in Philadelphia is probably higher.
23 According to the Society of Human
24 Resources Management, 90 percent of
25 employers in this country do background

2 checking. The result is that for people
3 with criminal records, they have a severe
4 barrier to employment that limits their
5 income.

6 Some cases can be expunged,
7 most notably arrests, summary
8 convictions, and maybe more, as the
9 General Assembly considers bills to allow
10 some misdemeanor convictions to be
11 expunged.

12 We urge City Council to fund
13 CLS to handle expungement cases, and we
14 believe that an investment of \$100,000
15 would generate a \$6 million annual
16 savings in tax revenue, with a return of
17 \$60 for \$1 expended in that purpose, as
18 well as to improve the lives of
19 Philadelphia residents.

20 I will be conducting a Council
21 briefing tomorrow sponsored by Councilman
22 Jones on expungements in the Caucus Room
23 at 11:30, and I invite all members of
24 Council to attend.

25 Thank you very much.

20 of Philadelphia Gas Works.

21 I am here to protest the sale

22 of Philadelphia Gas Works. It would be

23 an unfortunate decision to sell since it

24 is a great science driver economic

25 platform that can bring the hydrogen

2 economy to Philadelphia.

3 These unfortunate sales of
4 public assets throughout the United
5 States is the result of usury and
6 speculation in the finance of government.
7 Right now we have a LIBOR scandal and we
8 have a debt swap interest scandal
9 investigation going on, and I ask that
10 the City of Philadelphia investigate its
11 finance contracts.

12 We have a national scourge
13 going on throughout the nation where
14 states, cities, counties, towns or
15 whatever are subject to IMS
16 conditionalities. We are closing down
17 schools and selling off assets in order
18 to pay debt services.

19 I would like to once again
20 propose that the City Council consider
21 the Philadelphia public bank as a way to
22 protect the City's assets, to protect the
23 government itself and, most of all, the
24 population; to consider a transaction tax
25 at the Philadelphia Stock Exchange on

2 commodities, stocks, currency options and
3 derivatives.

4 I would like to inform the City
5 Council that an international call exists
6 imploring, demanding the stabilization of
7 the United States through the
8 reinstatement of Glass-Steagall standard
9 in U.S. banking. This statement should
10 inform Philadelphia political decisions
11 for now on.

12 Thanks so much. I appreciate
13 your patience.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you again for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Maxine Bailey.

17 (Witnesses approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MS. CLARICE BAILEY: Good
21 morning. Good morning to the President
22 and members of City Council. My name is
23 Clarice Bailey. Maxine Bailey is my big
24 sister, and she is here. We are
25 co-founders of the Girls Justice League.

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2 I serve as the Chair of the Coalition on
3 the Project that is Working to Understand
4 the Status of Girls and Young Women in
5 Philadelphia.

6 In November of 2012, a group of
7 25 women from around the City sat down
8 and answered -- tried to answer the
9 question, really wanted to grapple with
10 the question of, What do we need to do to
11 be providing the right services, the
12 right funding, the right policies,
13 practice for girls and young women in our
14 city. As a result of that initial
15 conversation, these women formed a
16 coalition, and that coalition has taken
17 up the effort to really understand
18 through quantitative, administrative data
19 as well as the voices of girls what the
20 needs are, what the concerns are of girls
21 in our city from the ages of 12 to 24.
22 And so that is the resolution that we are
23 just absolutely smitten and honored that
24 Councilwoman Brown is introducing to you.
25 I'd like to share my time with

2 two of the coalition members, first
3 Jennifer Leith from Women's Way.

4 MS. LEITH: Thank you, Clarice.

5 Representing a grant maker that
6 is focused on women and girls in the
7 Philadelphia region, I can say that
8 funders often struggle with making
9 decisions without quality or consistent
10 data or knowing where their dollars are
11 most needed. This project will provide a
12 roadmap on where public and private
13 dollars could be allocated in new ways to
14 address the needs of girls and young
15 women. An exciting and key part of the
16 rationale for this project is to launch
17 conversations on how those dollars are
18 used, a novel approach, so that funding
19 decisions are not made in a vacuum.

20 Research in the philanthropic
21 community indicates that developing a
22 funding focus that incorporates gender
23 analysis is most effective in creating
24 positive social change. We need to
25 figure out the trajectory of young women

2 in our city so that the philanthropic
3 community can respond and support
4 programs and services that ensure an
5 upward trajectory for all girls and young
6 women in Philadelphia. That is what this
7 project and coalition seeks to do.

8 It's my pleasure to introduce
9 Gwen Bailey.

10 MS. GWEN BAILEY: Good
11 afternoon. I'm Gwen Bailey, Executive
12 Director of Youth Service, Incorporated
13 and also representing the National
14 Crittenton Foundation.

15 A powerful element of this
16 coalition is the inclusion of girls'
17 voices in decisions that impact their
18 lives. This is a different approach, one
19 that is not adult centered. Girls of all
20 backgrounds and communities continue to
21 emphasize that their voices be heard and
22 that they be included as full partners
23 where discussions about them are taking
24 place.

25 We know that girls who enter

2 the child welfare and juvenile justice
3 systems are more likely to report that
4 their lives have been impacted by
5 interpersonal violence, abuse, and
6 trauma. We must begin to look at how
7 policy, practice, and funding improves or
8 impedes our ability to serve girls.

9 Girls' and young women's
10 concerns and issues are often not seen
11 through a gender lens and, therefore,
12 solutions are not necessarily targeted
13 toward the right problems or needs.
14 Services, while they may be gender
15 specific, are certainly not gender
16 responsive. Services must take into
17 account needs identified by girls.

18 The Coalition on the Status of
19 Young Girls and Women is an opportunity
20 for girls' voices to be heard.

21 Thank you for supporting this
22 resolution.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much for your testimony.

25 MS. CLARICE BAILEY: We're

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
15 much, Council President. I just wanted
16 to alert everyone that I have passed out
17 flyers to each of the Councilmembers that
18 we have a distinguished delegation of six
19 Councilmembers coming from our sister
20 city Incheon, South Korea along with six
21 administrators visiting us. They're
22 going through New York, Washington, but
23 made a special trip to visit us here in
24 Philadelphia on the occasion of our 30th
25 Anniversary as a sister city.

10 Philadelphia. So that will be at 2:15 to

11 3:15 in the Caucus Room. And this is

12 being hosted by IVC and our Sister Cities

13 program.

14 Thank you very much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman

18 Kenney.

19 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,

20 Mr. President. In keeping with the

21 resolution we just passed with

22 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown

23 about young girls and women, I would like

24 to make an announcement that we will be

25 conducting a lacrosse clinic June 8th,

1 5/16/13 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 which is Saturday, in South Philadelphia
3 from 10:00 a.m. to noon. You can sign up
4 for the clinic by logging on to
5 phillygirlsinnmotion.org. And this is a
6 continuing series of bringing lacrosse,
7 women's lacrosse, to the inner city.

8 As you know, in the suburbs
9 lacrosse is a major sport in most of our
10 elementary schools and high schools
11 giving young women the opportunity to
12 attend college under Title IX. In the
13 inner city, however, and in many parts of
14 all of our city, lacrosse is pretty much
15 an unknown sport.

16 We are hosting the 2013 Men's
17 NCAA Lacrosse Finals this coming Memorial
18 Day weekend. So I -- and also the clinic
19 will be conducted by the Big Six
20 universities' women's lacrosse teams and
21 their coaches. So not only will the
22 young ladies be exposed to a sport and
23 learn the rules, you don't need to bring
24 equipment. We will provide sticks, head
25 gear, teeth protection, mouth guards.

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2 And the women conducting the clinic will
3 all be Division 1 players from our Big
4 City Six, along with their fabulous
5 coaches. So in addition to learning the
6 sport, they'll have exposure to young,
7 strong women athletes who are serving in
8 our community.

9 It's wonderful. We did it
10 indoors during the winter. We had about
11 150 young ladies who were being exposed
12 to the sport. June 8th on a Saturday
13 we're moving outside to the two fields
14 down at the Edward O'Malley Athletic
15 Association at 144 Moore Street in South
16 Philly. It's free. Come on down, have a
17 good time in South Philly for two hours
18 of learning lacrosse and meeting young
19 women athletes.

20 So thank you, Mr. President,
21 for allowing me to announce that.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you so much.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 O'Brien.

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2 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. Councilman Kenney's
4 resolution gave me cause to remember and
5 celebrate my longstanding relationship
6 and friendship with HMS. They were
7 present to demonstrate their advocacy at
8 my very first rally for individuals with
9 disabilities in Harrisburg, and a few
10 weeks ago I had the occasion to visit HMS
11 and engage in a very robust question and
12 answer period. There was one question
13 and answer that I'd like to share with my
14 colleagues today.

15 Councilman, do you have any
16 talents other than being a politician, to
17 which I proceeded to sing "Life is Just a
18 Bowl of Cherries." And I understand that
19 a review will be forthcoming in a
20 newsletter. However, I'm not optimistic
21 that I'll get more than one star out of
22 five.

23 Last week, Mr. President, there
24 were 358 violent crimes that were
25 reported to the Philadelphia Police

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2 Department. This number includes five
3 homicides, 81 gun robberies, 53
4 aggravated assaults with a gun. Since
5 January 1st, we've had 89 families lose a
6 loved one to violence in our city. As I
7 said last week, the good news is that our
8 numbers are trending downward from this
9 time last year, but we must do better.

10 A trend does not bring someone
11 back to their family. A trend does not
12 give a victim a feeling of safety, and a
13 trend does not make a community whole.
14 In 2012, Anthony Braga, Criminal Justice
15 Policy and Management Senior Research
16 Fellow at Harvard University, and David
17 Weisburd, the Director of the Center of
18 Evidence-Based Crime Policy at George
19 Mason University, published the scholarly
20 work entitled "The Effects of Pulling
21 Levers - Focused Deterrence Strategies on
22 Crime." Braga and Weisburd found their
23 jurisdictions -- that jurisdictions
24 suffering from gun violence over drug
25 markets and repeat offender problems

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2 should add focused deterrence strategies
3 to their existing portfolio of prevention
4 and crime strategies and interventions.

5 The existing evidence suggests
6 that these new approaches to crime
7 prevention and control generate
8 noteworthy reductions in crime. I
9 believe we should be pulling the levers
10 of focused deterrence strategy here in
11 Philadelphia, because empirical data
12 shows it's effective in reducing violent
13 crime.

14 Thank you, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilwoman Blackwell.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. This is a reminder
21 that immediately following Council there
22 is a briefing by AmeriHealth Mercy and
23 their family companies in the Caucus Room
24 where they will be providing a briefing
25 of their Keystone VIP Choice program.

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2 All of us know Maria Battle. She's been
3 involved certainly in the planning of
4 this. John Backus, President of
5 Medicare, a specialist in his field, as
6 well as Maya Stewart, Community Relations
7 Program Director, will be making the
8 presentation. They have really prepared
9 a formal lunch for Councilmembers. We
10 hope that you will come. If you can't
11 come, please assign a staffer, because
12 they really worked hard to prepare a
13 wonderful lunch for us.

14 Thank you, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Johnson.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
20 Council President. Just a couple brief
21 statements before we wrap up this day.
22 First and foremost, I want to echo the
23 sentiments of the former Speaker of the
24 House of Pennsylvania, my new colleague,
25 Councilman Denny O'Brien, regarding

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2 making sure that we utilize the effective
3 strategy of focused deterrence and really
4 going after gangs and groups of
5 individuals who commit the most heinous
6 and violent crimes through gun violence
7 throughout the City of Philadelphia. And
8 the initiative thus far as a pilot has
9 been introduced in the 17th Police
10 District as well as in Councilman Mark
11 Squilla's 3rd Police District, and we
12 have had several call-out sessions thus
13 far where -- and a call-out session is
14 where you organize those individuals who
15 are on probation and parole who are
16 responsible for doing more than 90
17 percent of the gun violence and violent
18 crimes, specifically in the South
19 Philadelphia part of my district.

20 And so I want to commend my
21 colleague as well as be supportive that
22 as we move forward, we really take a look
23 at the effectiveness of this strategy,
24 which has proven results throughout the
25 country.

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2 Second, on this Saturday at
3 25th and Spruce, which is the Schuylkill
4 River Dog Park, I will be hosting my
5 first Doggie Ball. And so if you're a
6 dog lover, a pet lover, I want to
7 encourage you to bring out your pet
8 during that day. The proceeds are going
9 towards PAWS, which is the Philadelphia
10 Animal Welfare program, and it's all in
11 an effort of having a good day and
12 bringing out your pets. I have a Blue
13 Cane Corso, who is kind of sick right
14 now, so I haven't been having a good day.
15 But nevertheless, hopefully she'll be
16 fine by Saturday. And I just wanted to
17 put that out there, starting from 10:00
18 a.m. ending at 12:00.

19 Today, along with the support
20 of my colleague Councilwoman Maria
21 Quinones-Sanchez, we redefined a hardship
22 deferral bill which will serve as a
23 safety net in extraordinary cases where
24 homeowners cannot afford to pay their
25 increased real estate tax bills as it

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2 relates to AVI. And so as we debate
3 the -- as we move forward and we debate
4 AVI and we come up with different relief
5 measures as well as the tax rate, this is
6 a measure that we believe is targeted for
7 those who face losing their homes because
8 they cannot afford to pay for their homes
9 anymore as a result of their tax bills.
10 And this specific bill, the eligibility
11 requirements are narrowly tailored so
12 that it will have no meaningful impact on
13 the overall tax rate.

14 To this day, I still remain
15 very concerned about the accuracy of the
16 property assessments put forth by OPA and
17 I still believe that the AVI process is
18 flawed and nevertheless rushed, but in
19 the event that we do move forward, I want
20 to make sure that those who are most
21 vulnerable and those who will be impacted
22 as we move forward with this new system
23 have some level of protection, some level
24 of relief. I want to make sure that to
25 the best of my ability, we don't have an

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2 exodus of individuals leaving throughout
3 the 2nd Councilmanic District and
4 actually reversing the progress that we
5 have been making as it relates to housing
6 development and new homeownership
7 throughout the 2nd Councilmanic District.
8 And that's not only new residents, but
9 we're talking about old residents, we're
10 talking about market-rate housing down to
11 those who homes are low income and
12 subsidized as well who will be impacted
13 by us going to AVI.

14 And so I just want to state
15 that for the record, and I want to be
16 very consistent on my position as we move
17 forward.

18 Thank you, Council President
19 Clarke.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman. I understand you
22 continued concern.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilwoman Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President. Earlier today I
3 introduced a resolution along with
4 Councilwoman Tasco regarding the Medicaid
5 expansion resolution, and I just wanted
6 to make a few notes on that.

7 With funding crises popping up
8 on a seemingly weekly basis, Pennsylvania
9 and the City of Philadelphia cannot
10 afford for Governor Corbett and Senate
11 republicans to pass up an opportunity to
12 receive a \$4 billion infusion of federal
13 funds. Therefore, the State Senate must
14 cease its delay and call for Senate Bill
15 12 for a fair up or down vote on the
16 floor, and I commend Senator Vincent
17 Hughes for filing this Discharge
18 Resolution.

19 Medicaid expansion will provide
20 health insurance to more than 500,000
21 Pennsylvanians and, according to a
22 non-partisan independent fiscal office,
23 the expansion would also generate 154
24 million in savings for the state budget
25 in the first fiscal year. While

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2 Philadelphia public schools and members
3 of this body are desperately trying to
4 bridge a drastic budget gap, Governor
5 Corbett and Senate republicans are
6 refusing to participate in a program
7 that, according to an economic impact
8 report released by the Pennsylvania
9 Economy League, would create over 10,000
10 jobs in Southeast Pennsylvania and
11 generate nearly \$2 billion in economic
12 activity. That's money that could be
13 freed up to go to our schools and to our
14 social safety net.

15 So to the State Senate, please
16 adopt this resolution and bring up Senate
17 Bill 12 for a vote.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Green.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I want to associate
25 myself with Councilmember Bass' comments,

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2 and before I talk on the topic of
3 education, I want to stress that the fact
4 of the matter is that have the funding
5 been maintained from the previous
6 governor through today, the School
7 District would have a balanced budget
8 this year. And so that is the main cause
9 of the crisis we find ourselves in with
10 respect to education in terms of just
11 purely dollars.

12 There was an administration in
13 the early 1980s that said its hallmark
14 was giving people bad news before the
15 good, or said another way, telling them
16 the truth. The fact of the matter is --
17 well, frankly, I'm reminded of a, I guess
18 you'd call it, a parable where --
19 everybody is familiar with it, where the
20 man is drowning and prays to God for
21 help, and a boat comes by and says, Hop
22 in.

23 He says, No. God will save me.
24 And then a rope is thrown from the bridge
25 and the person says, No, no, thank you.

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2 God will save me. And he, of course,
3 drowns and goes to heaven and says, What
4 happened? I prayed for you to save me.

5 And God says, Yeah. I sent a
6 boat and a person with a rope.

7 The School District is a
8 drowning man in terms of its performance
9 and in terms of its monetary funding, and
10 with all the news and press conference
11 today about the \$95 million in potential
12 funding, the rope won't reach the
13 drowning man and the boat will run out of
14 gas before it gets to the drowning man.
15 So the School District is living on a
16 prayer. And while I support the Mayor's
17 revenue proposals for schools, they are
18 unlikely to pass the General Assembly
19 and, frankly, miss the point. Even if
20 they do, there is no more help coming
21 from the General Assembly, so there will
22 be a \$200 million gap. The City is
23 simply not capable of filling the gap for
24 the current failing system by itself.

25 The issue today is far more

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2 complicated than throwing money at the
3 School District. The question is, as I
4 asked in my most recent position paper on
5 schools, is whether the District is too
6 big to succeed.

7 The District continues to
8 propose marginal and incremental change
9 that condemns tens of thousands of
10 students every year to a system that
11 produces proficiency below 40 percent in
12 most neighborhood schools. No case for
13 transformative change has been made to
14 significantly improve outcomes for the
15 students in our system.

16 When they focus on presenting a
17 realistic budget that balances income and
18 expenditures and provides transformative
19 change, we should help. That's the
20 debate we need to have, because what we
21 have now doesn't work and we will be back
22 here every single year if we have the
23 same SRC, the same School District, and
24 the same system that is producing
25 unacceptable results and making only

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2 marginal changes.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman

7 Jones.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

9 Mr. President. We've heard a number of

10 opinions today. All of them come from a

11 place of careful consideration and logic

12 and conviction by all members, whether

13 it's an announcement about a cause or

14 announcement about a budget or

15 announcement about an issue that they

16 hold dear to their hearts.

17 I want to remind everyone

18 within the sound of my voice that there

19 is no such thing as an off-year election.

20 That's a misnomer. All elections are

21 important. And we are coming up on one

22 Tuesday, May 21st. I encourage

23 everybody, whether you are an R or a D,

24 whether you think you're from a red state

25 or a blue state, to come out and make

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2 your particular position known by your
3 vote. All else is air. Everybody has an
4 opinion, but until you come out and
5 participate in the democratic process,
6 that's when your opinion has a voice and
7 it is heard through the ballot box. So
8 whether you're voting for coming out for
9 the judges or the controller or the
10 district attorney, come out and
11 participate, and remember that the
12 proponents of voter ID are still lurking
13 out there. So if we can get ID, let's
14 get them, but if not, don't be dissuaded.
15 They cannot disqualify you this election
16 for not having a photo ID. And come out.
17 Your vote is your voice. Say something.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 And the Chair recognizes
21 Councilman Oh.

22 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
23 much, Mr. President. I actually speak on
24 behalf of the Council President in
25 inviting everyone to the Veterans

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2 Advisory Commission's 2013 Veterans
3 Resource Fair, which will be held on
4 Wednesday, May 22nd from 11:00 a.m. to
5 3:00 p.m. in the City Hall Courtyard.
6 And for the second year in a row, under
7 the leadership of the Council President
8 and the Veterans Advisory Commission,
9 there will be a free series of
10 activities, including 25 vendors that
11 will support and help veterans from
12 everything from health screenings to
13 federal assistance from city, state,
14 federal agencies, as well as food and
15 entertainment. So if everyone can come
16 out. We have 80,000 veterans in
17 Philadelphia, with 14,000 expected to
18 return.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 There being no other speeches,
23 at this time I would like to recognize
24 Councilwoman Brown for a motion to
25 adjourn.

1 5/16/13 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT

2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. I move that City Council
