6 submit for the consideration of your
7 honorable body a resolution authorizing
8 the Commissioner of Public Property to
9 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
10 Redevelopment Authority deeds conveying
11 fee simple title to certain City-owned
12 lots or pieces of ground with the
13 buildings and improvements thereon
14 situate in the First Councilmanic
15 District of the City of Philadelphia and
16 further authorizing the Philadelphia
17 Redevelopment Authority to transfer to
18 the Philadelphia Land Bank fee simple
19 title to such properties pursuant to
20 Section 16-405 of The Philadelphia Code,
21 all under certain terms and conditions.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 We will now move to the

11 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

16 certain City-owned lots or pieces of
17 ground with the buildings and
18 improvements thereon situate in the First

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
10 week's Calendar.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh
12 offers one resolution recognizing and
13 celebrating the second annual Latin
14 American Book Fair in Philadelphia for
15 its work in highlighting local
16 Latin-American authors, literature, and
17 culture.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
19 week's Calendar.

20 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
21 other bills or resolutions being offered
22 by the members today, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

25 We have no reports from

1 10/1/20 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING
2 committee today, so we will proceed with
3 the consideration of the public comment.
4 We will actually now take a brief five-
5 to ten-minute recess to give our
6 technology professionals some time to
7 connect the speakers we have for today to
8 the meeting. Hopefully this will be a
9 little more efficient than what we've
10 been doing in the past, so we can tee
11 people up and have them go on, not to
12 mention the fact that we want to make
13 sure that they hear the guidelines
14 associated with the public comment.

15 So we'll just take a five- to
16 ten-minutes recess.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

18 Mr. President, would you mind if we
19 called up the resolutions and bills that
20 are on Second Reading and Final Passage
21 first?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
23 necessarily don't have a problem with
24 that.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Okay.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm

4 sorry. Yeah. I'm sorry. I got you.

5 We'll call up the next order of
6 business.

7 There being no bills on the
8 First Reading Calendar, the Chair
9 recognizes Councilwoman Parker for the
10 purpose of calling up resolutions and
11 bills on the Second Reading and Final
12 Passage Calendar.

13 Thank you, Councilwoman Parker.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: No
15 problem, Mr. President.

16 Thank you, Mr. President. The
17 following resolutions and bills are being
18 called up from the Second Reading and
19 Final Passage Calendars today: Nos.
20 200491, 200501, 200502, 200503, 200504,
21 200505, 200506, 200507, 200508, 200509,
22 200510, 200511, 200512, 200018, 200094,
23 200095, 200144, 200160, 200161, and
24 200260. All other bills and resolutions
25 are being held, Mr. President.

1 10/1/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you so much, Councilwoman. Again,
4 thank you for that catch.

5 I'll go through this again.

6 Before we proceed with the public
7 comment, we'll take a brief five- to
8 ten-minute recess to give our technology
9 professionals some time to connect the
10 speakers we have for our meeting today.
11 This will allow them to hear the
12 guidelines that have been established for
13 public comment. So we'll come back in
14 about five to ten minutes. Thank you.

15 (Brief recess.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. We will proceed with our
18 public comment process. Now that
19 everyone is connected to the meeting and
20 before considering the resolutions and
21 bills we have before us today, we will
22 consider the public comment, and it will
23 go as follows:

24 Your public comment must
25 concern matters on the Second Reading and

1 10/1/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Final Passage Calendar for possible
3 action at a session of Council. A
4 speaker on any of those matters must sign
5 up in order to testify. You must call
6 215-686-3406 by 5:00 p.m. the day before
7 the session to sign up for public
8 comment.

9 When you call, we will take
10 your name, phone number, the number of
11 the legislative item you are commenting
12 on, and whether you are in support or
13 against the legislation, and we will add
14 you to the list. We will telephone each
15 person of the list during the Council
16 session and invite them to our remote
17 meeting. We will have three minutes to
18 speak today. So we ask that you state
19 your name for the record and you move
20 directly to your testimony.

21 A timer will be started and we
22 will monitor your remaining time
23 throughout your testimony. When 30
24 seconds remain to your time, we will
25 remind you of this. Once your allotted

3 conclude your remarks. Shortly
4 thereafter you will be muted and

6 So, Mr. Decker -- I want people
7 to also understand and be aware that the
8 public meeting is being recorded.
9 Because the meeting is public,
10 participants and viewers have no
11 reasonable expectation of privacy. So by
12 continuing to be in the meeting, you are
13 consenting to being recorded.

14 I want to now ask the Chief
15 Clerk to please read the name of our
16 first speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Aaron Bauman,
18 commenting on 200094.

19 (No response.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Aaron Bauman.

21 MR. BAUMAN: Can you hear me?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Yeah. Good morning. Good morning.
24 Please state your name for the record and
25 proceed with your testimony.

2 MR. BAUMAN: Good morning.

3 Thank you. My name is Aaron Bauman and I
4 am a volunteer with 5th Square PAC and I
5 am here to urge Council to vote against
6 the exclusionary zoning overlay for
7 Society Hill, Bill No. 200094.

8 This proposal is antithetical
9 to the City's housing goals,
10 environmental goals, and racial justice
11 goals. Society Hill is a neighborhood
12 built on a history of urban renewal and
13 displacement of working-class residents.
14 Today, Society Hill is one of the richest
15 and whitest neighborhoods in the City and
16 already enjoys several special exemptions
17 to citywide zoning rules, so I don't
18 doubt Council's intentions aren't
19 explicitly racist. Creating a carveout
20 to limit housing development in a rich,
21 white neighborhood will necessarily have
22 racist outcomes. Imposing arbitrary
23 height limits and eliminating historic
24 building bonuses won't stop luxury
25 development and displacement, but will

2 force development outward to more
3 vulnerable, poorer, and more diverse
4 neighborhoods south, north, and west of
5 Center City.

6 Society Hill is a core
7 neighborhood of Center City Philadelphia,
8 as much as some residents might like to
9 imagine otherwise. Tightening the
10 exclusivity in Society Hill and refusing
11 to absorb their fair share of housing is
12 the wrong choice for our city.

13 And with regard to councilmanic
14 prerogative, the choices we make in
15 Society Hill and elsewhere in the First
16 District have impacts for all of
17 Philadelphia.

18 Please, Councilmembers, I urge
19 you to vote no on this bill.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Benjamin She, commenting on 200094.

25 MR. SHE: Hello.

17 introduce an exclusionary zoning overlay
18 for Society Hill. Imposing a 45-foot
19 height limit on the blocks closest to Old
20 City and requiring parking and use
21 restrictions for historically certified
22 properties, the bill will stifle new
23 housing in the transit and jobless
24 section of Center City and place future
25 adaptive reuse efforts for historical

2 buildings in jeopardy.

3 Having known Society Hill was a
4 neighborhood radically altered in the
5 1960s through City-led urban renewal,
6 hundreds of working-class and minority
7 residents were displaced through
8 wholesale demolition, directly leading to
9 an upscale gentrification of the
10 neighborhood where row houses easily sell
11 for well over \$1 million today.

12 Multiple mid-rises on Walnut
13 Street were expressly demolished in a
14 wanton act of architectural purification,
15 buildings that would be barred from being
16 rebuilt with this overlay.

17 As architectural historical
18 historian Starr Herr-Cardillo puts it,
19 Society Hill as we know it today is much
20 more a product of 1960s urban renewal
21 than 18th century Philadelphia.

22 Letting a handful of residents
23 define Society Hill's urban context while
24 ignoring its history of wanton urban
25 renewal that it demolished non-conforming

2 new rises is the epitome of hypocrisy and
3 the opposite of good preservation policy.

4 Secondly, it is wholly
5 inequitable and unjust that City Council
6 would take up zoning code legislation
7 developed through a single private
8 organization, the Society Hill Civic
9 organization, without so much as even
10 consulting proper channels through the
11 City.

12 The Society Hill neighborhood
13 plan was not developed in coordination
14 with the City Planning Commission and
15 thus never received the proper level of
16 public engagement and feedback that a
17 typical neighborhood plan would expect.
18 Indeed, PCPC Director Anne Fadullon had
19 expressed her opposition for the overlay.

20 The consequences and the
21 planning in Society Hill don't just
22 affect Society Hill. There are secondary
23 effects and ramifications throughout the
24 City.

25 What no other neighborhood in

Center City has, this district is highlighted for its commercial zones. Society Hill is tying their exclusivity and refusing to absorb underlying demand for high-end housing. This will only send housing pressure outward to vulnerable neighborhoods in South, North, and West Philadelphia and accelerate displacement and housing pressure outward.

Society Hill was and always will be a part of Center City and exactly where we should be providing abundant housing for all income levels for maximum opportunity and minimum risk of displacements.

5th Square has shared a petition that collected over 240 signatures in just three days. If this bill goes through, your actions could be (inaudible) for other affluent neighborhoods to follow throughout the City, and Philadelphia could very soon become a city facing a dire

19 height limit, and that's to protect the
20 park and to protect the Mercantile
21 Exchange Building that's there. And
22 really what the height limit does there
23 is, it will make it a variance for people
24 who want to go above that height. We've
25 had some projects that were looking to

2 develop in that area, and a lot of those
3 projects are multi-million-dollar condo
4 projects, where we felt that if they
5 wanted to do that, they would have to set
6 it back and do certain things to protect
7 the historic nature of that area.

10 other neighborhoods and also racist in a
11 way that would make the neighborhood more
12 white is not true. I mean, this was --
13 we've looked at this for a long period of
14 time. We went along the historic
15 boundaries of Society Hill. We pushed
16 back on them and compromised with them.
17 They didn't get everything they wanted as
18 far as this. It was a bigger area. We
19 narrowed it down just to historic where
20 it meets the park and the Mercantile
21 Exchange Building. And then there was
22 another area at Headhouse Square on two
23 CMX-2 buildings that would go from 55 to
24 45 feet.

25 So the people who are

3 the whole Society Hill neighborhood
4 that's being affected, and it's really
5 only a small area.

6 So we did this along with the

11 through and manage the community needs,
12 the historic needs, the affordability
13 needs, and so we think we did the best we
14 can to make this overlay possible. And
15 it was a lot of hard work, and I want to
16 thank the Planning Commission for all
17 their work and drafting this legislation.

18 Chair again recognizes Councilman Henon.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
21 of the resolution.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 All those in favor say aye.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and that resolution is
8 adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
10 authorizing the Committees on Gun
11 Violence Prevention and Children and
12 Youth to conduct joint hearings to
13 examine the need for universal access to
14 trauma counseling for Philadelphia's
15 youth, introduced by Councilman Johnson.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
19 Council President. Before I call for the
20 adoption of the resolution, I just want
21 to acknowledge my colleague Councilwoman
22 Helen Gym. We have been discussing as it
23 relates to this issue of gun violence and
24 the impact it's having on children here
25 in the City of Philadelphia.

2 We know that hurt children hurt
3 children. We know that hurt people hurt
4 people. And so initially we looked at
5 only focusing on the Philadelphia School
6 District, but after talking to my
7 colleague Councilwoman Helen Gym as well
8 as Councilwoman Kendra Brooks, the focus
9 should be on all children here in the
10 City of Philadelphia and how we're
11 providing a level of resources to support
12 not only the children but also our
13 communities that are suffering as it
14 relates to the gun violence that we're
15 seeing here in the City of Philadelphia.

16 So I ask for the adoption of
17 the resolution, Council President.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
21 seconded.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 ayes have it, and that resolution is
5 adopted.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
7 authorizing the Committee on Parks,
8 Recreation and Cultural Affairs to hold
9 hearings regarding the governance of the
10 Free Library of Philadelphia, introduced
11 by Councilman (inaudible).

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
13 sorry. By who?

14 CHIEF CLERK: Introduced by
15 Councilman Green, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
19 Council President. I move for the
20 adoption of the resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
24 seconded.

25 All those in favor indicate by

2 saying aye.

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it, and that resolution is
9 adopted.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
11 authorizing the Committee on People with
12 Disabilities & Special Needs to hold
13 hearings regarding the consequences of
14 potential additional cuts by the
15 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania General
16 Assembly to mental health services,
17 especially those offered in the City of
18 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilman
19 Green.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair again recognizes Councilman Green.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
23 Council President. I just wanted to
24 remind my colleagues about eight years
25 ago when the state was dealing with a

2 very significant economic issue due to
3 the recession, about \$84 million was cut
4 from the mental health budget, and when
5 you think about that time, the
6 Commonwealth was dealing with a \$700
7 million deficit. And I don't need to
8 remind colleagues the challenging budget
9 season that we had this year where we
10 went from a \$649 million deficit to a
11 \$749 million deficit. And when you think
12 about the fact that the Commonwealth by
13 June of next year may be having a \$5
14 billion deficit, that raises some very
15 significant concerns about what will
16 happen at the state level.

17 Many of the people on this call
18 know I've been advocating for state and
19 local reimbursement at the federal level
20 to help us deal with the deficits that
21 the Commonwealth and the City of
22 Philadelphia received due to COVID, but
23 when you have this major deficit that the
24 Commonwealth has and the fact that we as
25 a city receive hundreds of millions of

2 dollars in grant funding from the
3 Commonwealth to provide for behavioral
4 health and in this period of COVID, this
5 creates a very big concern for a number
6 of agencies.

7 I've been talking throughout
8 the summer and the spring with a number
9 of organizations, from the Alliance of
10 Community Service Providers that are a
11 lot of the umbrella organizations that
12 provide behavioral health services, as
13 well as the Coalition of Culturally
14 Competent Providers, and many of the
15 organizations had some very significant
16 challenges in the beginning of COVID in
17 how to provide services remotely. We
18 were able to work with our interim
19 Director of Community of Behavioral
20 Health, Donna Bailey, and were able to
21 provide those services in a distant way,
22 but having a child on the autism spectrum
23 and knowing the challenges of not being
24 able to have a therapeutic support
25 service person come into your household

2 and not being able to be in the
3 classroom, a lot of these concerns and
4 issues will be very grave. And the fact
5 that we as a city have already been
6 reduced in a lot of the resources that we
7 have just trying to get through this
8 budget, the fact that next year's budget
9 will be equally challenging, and the fact
10 that the Commonwealth has a potential \$5
11 billion deficit, that's going to put some
12 additional strains on their budget and
13 can have very dire impact and effect on
14 the City of Philadelphia, especially for
15 those who are most vulnerable that have
16 some type of learning or physical
17 difference.

18 So based on that information, I
19 move for the adoption of the resolution.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
22 been moved and properly seconded.

23 All those in favor indicate by
24 saying aye.

25 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

13 We will now move to our
14 speeches.

15 Prior to recognizing members
16 regarding speeches, I will note for the
17 record at this time we will use the Chat
18 feature available in Microsoft Teams to
19 allow members to signify that they wish
20 to be recognized. In order to comply
21 with the Sunshine Act, the Chat feature
22 must only be used for this purpose.

23 With that said, are there any
24 speeches on behalf of the minority?

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

2 Oh.

3 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
4 much, Council President. I just wanted
5 to recognize on behalf of really
6 everybody on City Council the wonderful
7 work of Malik Aziz. It is really
8 unfortunate that we've lost a number of
9 leaders who in the heyday of
10 Philadelphia's gang war violence really
11 went out there on their own and took
12 control of the situation, with the vision
13 and the foresight and the courage, and
14 it's a great loss to Philadelphia. We've
15 lost Bennie Swans from the House of
16 Umoja, David Fattah. We're looking at
17 right now Malik Aziz. These are people
18 that they have not been replaced, quite
19 frankly.

20 There are people out there
21 doing the work, OG Laws, Samad (ph), and
22 other people out there, but the impact
23 that they've had and what they've done to
24 really kind of reconfigure and readjust
25 society in terms of how we deal with

2 people who have found themselves in these
3 very difficult and challenging
4 situations, dealing with violence
5 themselves, and trying to react to a
6 violent environment and what they do, and
7 I'm looking at Councilman Curtis Jones,
8 who was in the thick of it and is a model
9 of someone who has come out of that and
10 contributed to society and, well, you
11 know, we owe them a debt of gratitude and
12 they're very missed. And I just wanted
13 to say on behalf of all of us, I'm sure,
14 to his family and to his friends and
15 loved ones, thank you and God bless his
16 soul.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. Hear,
19 hear.

20 Speeches on behalf of the
21 majority?

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Gauthier.

24 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
25 you, Council President, and good morning,

everyone. I have spoken before this body regularly over the last several months about the urgent need to address gun violence in our city. For many people, this can feel like a distant issue, so I wanted to share a recent experience that I hope will shed some light on what our communities are struggling through on a daily basis.

The other night I went to a location in my district where a homicide had just taken place. A young man had been shot multiple times. His body laid under a sheet while police processed the scene. The young man's mother was stunned and inconsolable. A young woman lay on the ground immobilized by grief. Family members comforted both of them and one another. The young man's friends were there too, keeping to themselves and looking stern.

Neighbors stood outside their homes shaking their heads in disbelief, and I asked one young woman how she was

2 feeling. I'll never forget what she said
3 to me then: It doesn't matter what I
4 say. Nothing will ever change here.

5 I couldn't find the words to
6 console her. There was nothing I could
7 say in response that would matter. And
8 in that moment, I realized how much was
9 missing in the way our City showed up to
10 support this community in the aftermath
11 of this horrific event.

12 There were police on the scene
13 diligently completing their
14 investigation, but as far as I could
15 tell, there wasn't anyone sent there
16 specifically to attend to the needs of
17 the people left traumatized by this young
18 man's untimely death. No one was there
19 to treat these people like people. And
20 so it's no wonder the young woman I spoke
21 to had so little hope. It felt like this
22 death was becoming a statistic before my
23 eyes.

24 I am not sharing this story as
25 a way of saying that I know all of the

2 answers. I am not sharing this story as
3 a way to dismiss the hard work of public
4 servants who have devoted their careers
5 to making a safer and more peaceful city
6 for all of us. But based on what I
7 witnessed, the needs of the community are
8 not being met, and I honestly do feel
9 that this is important to call out.

10 A murder scene is not a
11 transaction to be addressed with
12 impersonal efficiency. It's a moment in
13 which people, our neighbors, our
14 citizens, are experiencing what literally
15 may be the worst moment of their lives.
16 It's a moment when people are worrying
17 about their safety and the safety of
18 their families and whether they could be
19 next. It's a moment where hurt, angry
20 young people may be planning retaliation
21 and revenge. But it's also a moment in
22 which we can show up and show our
23 humanity as a city.

24 When I say that we need urgency
25 and that we should be prioritizing this

2 crisis, that means showing up
3 differently. I would have wanted to see
4 experienced crisis workers addressing the
5 trauma. I would have wanted to see
6 mediators and violence intervention teams
7 working to prevent a retaliatory
8 incident. And I would have wanted us to
9 act sooner.

10 The loss of this young man is
11 the latest in a spate of shootings in the
12 area over a few months in the span of
13 just a few blocks. Urgency would mean
14 working with these young people, heading
15 off these conflicts and not just watching
16 them happen and providing a bare bones
17 response when they do.

18 I showed up at this scene in my
19 district the other night because it's my
20 firm belief that I have to know the worst
21 of what my constituents are experiencing
22 to feel the full duty of bringing a
23 solution.

24 And so I hope my words in some
25 small way can convey this sense of duty

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2 that I feel to protect my constituents
3 and advocate for peace, justice, and
4 attention to this grave issue.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Green.

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
11 Council President. You know, you have a
12 thought process of where you're going
13 with a speech to bring up issues and then
14 my erstwhile colleagues change your
15 perspective in the moment. And so I want
16 to thank Councilmember Gauthier for her
17 presentation this morning, her speech
18 this morning, and her call for a sense of
19 urgency to address the gun violence in
20 our city. And I also want to thank both
21 Councilmember Oh and Councilmember
22 Johnson for taking life-saving action to
23 recognize heroes in our city that lived
24 up to that sense of urgency. When you
25 think about the names of David Fattah,

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2 Malik Aziz, Bennie Swans, those are
3 individuals that saw the need for urgency
4 at the time that they started to do the
5 work that they did, and it's this call
6 for urgency which will bring about the
7 next generation of David Fattahs and
8 Bennie Swans and Malik Aziz to help us to
9 get out of this gun violence issue that
10 we're dealing with.

11 We all recall -- some of us
12 recall more than others -- the issues in
13 the '70s of No Gang War in '74 and how
14 things were impacting our neighborhoods,
15 from the crack epidemic and the amount of
16 violence that we've had, and we've had a
17 chance to bring that down and it's now
18 going back up.

19 So I believe with this sense of
20 urgency a level of despair but also a
21 level of hope, because we have come out
22 of this issue in the past and it's the
23 urgency that Councilmember Gauthier calls
24 for, and I think this body will demand,
25 in our upcoming budget that will allow us

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2 to create that next generation of leaders
3 that Councilmember Oh and Johnson saluted
4 in their resolutions today.

5 I also want to remind my
6 colleagues that on Monday, October 5th at
7 1 o'clock, we'll be having hearings on
8 public banking concept here in the City
9 of Philadelphia. This is an issue that I
10 started with in my first term. Many of
11 you in this body know that I started as a
12 banker, Meridian Bank at Broad and
13 Glenwood right across from Joe Frazier's
14 gym, Government Square section of North
15 Philadelphia. I actually had some hair
16 then. I know it's hard for some to
17 believe.

18 But we've been looking at this
19 issue for some time. We're able to
20 identify resources in the City budget, in
21 the legislative initiative line item in
22 the Finance Department. We engaged a
23 consultant, HR&A, that's done these type
24 of reports around the country for those
25 other cities that have been looking at

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2 public banking. We've been working with
3 the Philadelphia Public Banking Working
4 Group on this issue for some time.

5 This week, HR&A released their
6 public banking study. We'll have a
7 conversation with them on Monday at 1
8 o'clock and continue to delve into this
9 concept of public banking and how we can
10 replicate some of the benefits that we've
11 seen in other parts of the country. For
12 example, the Bank of North Dakota and
13 other cities are looking into this
14 concept, especially in this time of
15 economic crisis.

16 And I will close with a little
17 bit more positive perspective. October
18 is a time of season of fall. It's
19 festive with a lot of colors. It's also
20 a time period when we have our annual
21 autism walk, and I've been a long-term
22 supporter of Autism Speaks. That's an
23 entity that has helped provide resources,
24 especially in reference to research for
25 those families who have a child on the

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autism spectrum. Various years my wife
has chaired the local Autism Speaks walk.
This year due to COVID, we can't do the
walk like we normally would do at
Citizens Bank Park where we walk around
the park and have a number of families
come together celebrating their children
that have achieved in this issue of
autism.

So I will do a little bit of
supporting the autism walk this weekend.
I'll put up my Light It Up Blue banner.
So I hope everyone can support the autism
walk this weekend. You can go to
autismspeaks.org to support the virtual
autism walk this Saturday.

Thank you, Council President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman.

The Chair recognizes Councilman
Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
Mr. President. I rise today to, first of
all, thank my colleagues, all of you, for

2 your intense, laser-like focus on the
3 issue of gun violence and to join the
4 chorus of people who are taking
5 exception, not allowing this to be the
6 new normal or somehow acceptable in the
7 City of Philadelphia, that this level of
8 fratricide, homicide, suicide happen in
9 our community unchecked.

10 So I want to thank Member
11 Gauthier, Member Johnson, and you,
12 Mr. President, and all of you for your
13 continued effort to deal with this. I
14 think maybe later on you're going to have
15 an announcement that may contribute to
16 some of this. You're not allowed to say
17 those things, but I'm just going to tease
18 Philadelphia to say that you are
19 contributing to the solution to some of
20 this.

21 But I was asked and it led to a
22 vigorous debate, which my members may
23 find interesting. There was a recent
24 study in Philadelphia that said African
25 American men, men of color, were

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disengaged with the upcoming presidential election, that even some of them on social media were touting Trump, saying silliness like Trump gave us money through the CARES Act and, you know, so what he's a racist. All of elected officials in the democratic party in particular are racist. I'm reading these kinds of comments. And that debate turned into a vigorous debate within my own circle, and I had to remember that we have to speak to each and every constituency, including black males, and it's not like we in this Council or that the Biden-Harris team won't address black male issues, but sometimes you have to kind of underscore, highlight what in particular we're going to do for them as they sit in that barber shop.

One in every three African American men is in jail, probation or parole. So an issue like dealing with a ten-year no contact with the law expungement policy might be something

2 they would hear. Closing the
3 school-to-prison pipeline and opening a
4 school-to-paycheck pipeline might be
5 something that would resonate in their
6 ear.

7 Looking at what we did
8 yesterday, and I thank my members for
9 joining, looking at the 100 known
10 shooters that now is being translated
11 into the last 1,000 Philadelphia
12 shooters, to look at how in the world did
13 they wind up in that crime scene, how did
14 the gun wind up at that crime scene, and
15 if it was their first, second or third
16 criminal act, why were they allowed to go
17 that many times.

18 So if you start to look at what
19 black men want, it's what every American
20 wants - an opportunity to be free, an
21 opportunity to work and support their
22 family, and an opportunity to be relevant
23 in the thoughts of the presidential
24 campaign.

25 So if we start sharpening our

2 pencils and our messaging, hopefully, God
3 willing, they will hear.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much, Councilman.

7 That concludes our speeches
8 today on behalf of the minority and the
9 majority, and with that, I recognize
10 Councilman Jones for a motion to adjourn.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
13 adjourned until Thursday, October 8th,
14 2020 at 10:00 a.m.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. It has been moved and
18 seconded that Council stand adjourned

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
