2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you very much, Councilman.

4 We will now move to our public
5 comment session, but before considering
6 these resolutions and bills, we will
7 consider the public comment session. It
8 will go as follows:

9 Your public comment session
10 must concern matters on the Second
11 Reading and Final Passage Calendars for
12 possible action at today's Council
13 session.

14 All speakers must sign up in
15 order to testify. If you have not
16 already signed up for today's session,
17 please do so now by giving your name to
18 the Sergeant-At-Arms at the table set up
19 for this purpose in the hallway just
20 outside the Council Chambers.

21 Once you have signed up, you
22 will be called in the order in which your
23 name appears on the sign-up sheet.

24 Today I'm going to do three
25 minutes. Yeah. Today we don't have a

2 significant volume of people, so we're
3 going to do three minutes today. So you
4 will each have three minutes to testify.
5 However, the time limit may vary from
6 session to session based on the volume of
7 speakers.

8 In order to be fair to all
9 those wishing to speak, we intend to hold
10 faithfully to the established time limit.
11 So when you begin speaking, you will see
12 a green light on the podium. When there
13 are 30 seconds remaining to your time,
14 the light will turn yellow, which is your
15 reminder to conclude your remarks. So we
16 ask you to get right to your remarks when
17 you step up to the podium.

18 Once three minutes have passed,
19 the light will turn red, and the
20 Sergeant-At-Arms will disconnect the
21 microphone, and at that point, please
22 yield the podium to the next speaker, if
23 you have not already done so.

24 We also reserve the right
25 pursuant to our rules of Council to limit

2 repetitious comments on the same subject
3 matter.

4 So I would ask Mr. Decker, he
5 will start reading the first name. And,
6 again, I want to thank you so much for
7 your willingness and your interest in
8 participating in your government in
9 action. So thank you for your
10 participation today.

11 Mr. Decker, please call the
12 first witness to testify today.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
14 we have today, Mr. President, is
15 Winnifred Taylor, commenting on 220762.

16 (Audience member talking
17 without microphone.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 She's out here? Okay. Just go get her.
20 We'll just do the next name.

21 Mr. Decker, read the next name.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Jerome Moore, commenting on 220762.

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Mr. Moore?

3 (Speaker approached podium.)

4 MR. MOORE: Good morning,
5 everyone.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MR. MOORE: This is my first
9 time here, so I don't know how to
10 establish protocol.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
12 state your name for the record.

13 MR. MOORE: My first name is
14 Jerome L. Moore, Jr., from the Mount
15 Olive Baptist Church. We're speaking on
16 behalf of my pastor, the Reverend Harry
17 Moore, Sr., who has been pastoring at
18 Mount Olive Baptist Church for 28 years.
19 We just celebrated his 28th year at 638
20 North 37th Street where he has been a
21 monstrous leader and the pillar of Mount
22 Olive Baptist Church in West Philly.

23 This man has been a pillar of
24 leadership both inside the walls of Mount
25 Olive as well as outside of the walls of

2 Mount Olive Baptist Church. He has taken
3 the Baptist creed outside in terms of
4 even funeralizing a building on Melon
5 Street, one of the first times we've ever
6 witnessed that in our community.

7 He is a giver, he is a teacher,
8 but most of all he is a man of God who
9 has been steadfast and unmovable in
10 making sure that he undergirds us with
11 our belief as baptized believers in our
12 Lord and our Savior Jesus Christ.

13 We just stand in asking that
14 you consider naming the 600 block of 37th
15 Street in honor of Reverend Harry Moore,
16 Sr., so that while he can do and see the
17 things that he's accomplished yet while
18 he's still yet alive.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
21 testimony. We really appreciate it.
22 Thank you.

23 Is Ms. Taylor -- did Ms. Taylor
24 come in?

25 She did not? Okay.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
3 is Queen Judith Robinson.

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: One
6 more time. Ms. Robinson?

7 CHIEF CLERK: Queen Judith
8 Robinson.

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Okay. Go ahead, Mr. Decker.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Danyel Hilllian, Danyel Hilllian,
14 commenting on 220762.

15 (Speaker approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning. Just state your name for the
18 record and please proceed with your
19 testimony.

20 MS. HILLIAN: Danyel Hilllian.

21 My name is Daniel Hilllian. I
22 am here to represent Mount Olive Baptist
23 Church and the Trustee Ministry.

24 We are in the process -- we
25 would like to name the 638 block of North

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2 37th Street after Pastor Harry Moore, Sr.
3 He does a lot for the community. He does
4 a lot for the people, and not only for
5 the congregation but more than the people
6 that are not members of our church.

7 We are asking that you approve
8 this resolution so that we can honor him
9 and the neighborhood in which the church
10 resides.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
13 testimony. We appreciate you coming in.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 220756.
16 (Speaker approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MR. HAGINS: Great morning to
20 everyone. My name is Ogbonna Hagins.

21 I really want to just concur
22 with the resolution honoring and
23 celebrating the life of Reverend Dr. Leon
24 Sullivan, the Lion of Zion, but I want to
25 just remind people exactly what the

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2 Reverend Sullivan was about.

3 You know, he created the
4 Sullivan Principles, and I really want to
5 ask this body if they're living up to
6 those principles of Reverend Leon
7 Sullivan.

8 It's good to acknowledge him
9 and the hundredth anniversary of his
10 birth, but I just want you to recognize
11 what he actually did and not just say,
12 oh, I'm going to recognize Reverend Leon
13 Sullivan because there's a plaza named
14 after him and all of that.

15 One of the things -- one of his
16 principles or a few of his principles was
17 the equal employment practices, community
18 development, equal pay, which I see that
19 the union here from the Art Museum is
20 here, and they need equal pay.

21 - - -

22 (Applause.)

23 - - -

24 MR. HAGINS: So if we're going
25 to celebrate, if we're going to celebrate

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2 Leon Sullivan, let's research what the
3 Reverend Leon Sullivan was about and
4 let's implement those things in the bills
5 that you present in honor of the -- on
6 behalf of the City.

7 He did this in relationship to
8 apartheid in South Africa, but there's a
9 lot of apartheid or apart-hate happening
10 right here in Philadelphia, and we need
11 to examine that as a body. The City
12 Councilmembers need to examine the
13 separation of people from the way the
14 communities are being gentrified, to our
15 education system. We need to acknowledge
16 that and not just acknowledge Brother
17 Leon Sullivan.

18 Again, my name is Ogbonna
19 Hagins.

20 And one other thing too. He
21 spoke out. He wasn't very quiet. That's
22 why he was called the Lion of Zion,
23 because he spoke out against injustices.
24 And you guys know what the injustice here
25 in Philadelphia is, from the dumping, to

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2 people driving crazy, to there being a
3 lawlessness in the City.

4 So I thank you for listening,
5 and I really expect some action and not
6 just looking at me and acknowledging my
7 presence, but to actually do something
8 about these problems that are happening
9 in Philadelphia.

10 Thank you.

11 - - -

12 (Applause.)

13 - - -

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony. We
16 appreciate you being here today.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Amanda Bok -- I'm sorry. The next
19 speaker is Winnifred Taylor.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
21 Ms. Taylor is here? Okay.

22 (Speaker approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MS. TAYLOR: Good morning. My

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2 name is Winnifred Taylor and I am here on
3 behalf of Mount Olive Baptist Church
4 speaking in reference to my pastor,
5 Reverend Harry Moore, Sr.

6 I have been blessed to work as
7 an administrative assistant to Reverend
8 Harry Moore, Sr., for the past 14 years.
9 During this time, I have been privy to
10 observe him in various situations. I
11 admire who he is, and I'm very proud to
12 call him my pastor.

13 What I have observed is that he
14 is an intelligent, resourceful, and
15 energetic preacher that is respected and
16 accepted by members of all ages as well
17 as co-laborers in the ministry. Also he
18 is a very determined leader who is
19 passionate about serving God's people.

20 I have found Reverend Moore to
21 be faithful, an authentic witness of the
22 gospel of Jesus Christ. He is an
23 enthusiastic Bible scholar when
24 discussing and studying the word of God.

25 Some characteristics in which I

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2 believe speaks volume about him are:
3 Reverend Moore allocates time to study,
4 plan, and prepare his sermon. His
5 sermons are spiritually based, as well as
6 they are creative, focused, but yet
7 relevant and timely enough to meet the
8 needs of God's people.

9 He is a leader with a vision
10 who has the ability to convey his goals
11 to collaborate and is flexible enough to
12 work with his members to achieve them.

13 He possesses a warm,
14 charismatic demeanor, which is evident
15 through his empathetic and humble spirit.

16 He is a lover of people, but
17 also he is loved by his people for his
18 dedication, his devotion, and his
19 unselfishness.

20 He is respectful but also
21 respected by both his members and his
22 community.

23 This is by far not a complete
24 list, but it will provide a snapshot and
25 an insight as to why we believe the

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2 Reverend Harry Moore, Sr., who is our
3 pastor, should receive this prestigious
4 honor of having a street named after him.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
8 testimony today. We appreciate you being
9 here.

10 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
11 is Amanda Bok, commenting on 220599.

12 (Speaker approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MS. BOK: Good morning,
16 Council. My statement today is in
17 reference to Resolution 220599 urging the
18 City of Philadelphia to reconsider the
19 terms of the Atwater Kent Collection's
20 transfer agreement between the City and
21 Drexel University in order to ensure
22 adequate stewardship of the Collection
23 and protect the interests of the citizens
24 of Philadelphia.

25 I speak to you today as a

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2 curator at the Philadelphia Museum of
3 Art, who in the six years I've served in
4 this position understands well the
5 importance of safeguarding cultural
6 objects and making them accessible to the
7 people of Philadelphia and to visitors to
8 the City that we call home and love.

9 Unfortunately, right down the
10 street from Drexel University at the
11 Philadelphia Museum of Art, management is
12 failing to protect the interests of the
13 citizens of Philadelphia by creating
14 untenable working conditions for people
15 like me who are charged with stewarding
16 their collections.

17 They are failing to offer
18 everyone but their top executives
19 competitive salaries, paying their
20 union-eligible workers who join me here
21 today on average 30 percent less than
22 peer institutions pay them.

23 They are failing to provide
24 meaningful salary increases in a hostile
25 economy to a workforce who hasn't seen a

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2 pay increase in over three years. And
3 they are failing to provide a healthcare
4 plan that workers can afford to purchase
5 and to use.

6 I love my job at the Museum and
7 it's why I moved here, but I could walk
8 three blocks down the street and take the
9 same job at the Barnes Foundation for
10 20 percent more pay. My colleagues could
11 do the same at the Barnes, at PAFA, Penn,
12 and elsewhere, and they have been doing
13 so.

14 We've been on strike now for
15 four hard days.

16 Sorry.

17 After two years of solid
18 negotiations and numerous unfair labor
19 practices committed by our employer, we
20 unfortunately were left with little
21 choice.

22 It hurts me to be out on a
23 picket, unpaid, and letting collections
24 sit untended to and stalling out projects
25 I have put my whole heart into, but there

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2 comes a point when the prestige of
3 working at the Philadelphia Museum of Art
4 can't outweigh the financial burden of
5 the soaring cost of living in
6 Philadelphia and stagnant pay.

7 It's time for City Council to
8 please step in and help the working
9 people of Philadelphia win a contract
10 that we deserve.

11 Thank you.

12 - - -

13 (Applause.)

14 - - -

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Zoe Cohen, commenting on 220599.

19 (Speaker approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. COHEN: Thank you, Council.
23 My name is Zoe Cohen. I'm speaking in
24 support of 220599 and the Philadelphia
25 Museum of Art union.

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2 I'm an artist, an educator, an
3 organizer with United Academics of
4 Philadelphia, AFT Local 9608. I've been
5 proud to be a Philadelphian for over
6 20 years.

7 I'm also a former museum
8 educator at the Philadelphia Museum of
9 Art. I taught in almost every type of
10 educational program the Museum offered
11 from around 2001 to 2007.

12 I started working at the Museum
13 less than a month after moving here as a
14 young adult. During that time, I fell in
15 love with the collection and with the
16 City while teaching in the galleries and
17 also working on outreach programs in the
18 neighborhoods of Philadelphia.

19 I learned that the Museum is
20 one of the City's greatest resources,
21 just like the Atwater Kent Collection,
22 and that its staff are dedicated to
23 making it a resource available to all
24 Philadelphians, just as the Atwater Kent
25 Collection should be.

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2 The Philadelphia Museum of Art
3 is one of the greatest gems of
4 Philadelphia, but it is a true stain on
5 the City that some Museum staff are
6 currently making the same hourly wage
7 that I was being paid over 20 years ago.

8 PMA workers, like all workers,
9 deserve the respect and stability of a
10 strong union contract in order to be able
11 to continue to serve Philadelphia.

12 Councilmembers, in addition to
13 reconsidering the terms of transfer of
14 the Atwater Kent Collection, I urge you
15 to support the PMA union and compel the
16 PMA leadership to meet their reasonable
17 demands for sustainable pay and benefits.

18 Thank you.

19 - - -

20 (Applause.)

21 - - -

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony. We
24 appreciate it.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

2 is Adam Rizzo, commenting on 220599.

3 (Speaker approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MR. RIZZO: Good morning. My
7 name is Adam Rizzo and my statement is in
8 reference to Resolution 220599.

9 As a museum educator, I'm glad
10 to hear that City Council shares my
11 commitment to ensuring that public
12 collections continue to be conserved and
13 made accessible to the citizens of
14 Philadelphia.

15 My own employer, the
16 Philadelphia Museum of Art, has made
17 several public statements recently about
18 the importance of serving our community.
19 However, they do not seem to consider
20 those who work at the Museum as part of
21 that community.

22 Workers at the PMA union are
23 currently on strike for a living wage and
24 affordable healthcare. We are the
25 Philadelphians that the management at the

2 Museum have the most power to impact in a
3 positive way, but instead they treat us
4 like we are separate from the communities
5 we serve.

6 They are happy to emphasize the
7 importance of our work, to criticize our
8 choice to strike, but they don't think
9 our work is important enough to pay us a
10 living wage.

11 If City Council believes in the
12 importance of the arts being accessible
13 to Philadelphians, I hope you will help
14 ensure that Philadelphians who work in
15 the arts are treated with dignity and
16 respect.

17 The City and State give the
18 Museum millions of dollars every year. I
19 urge you to make sure that money is used
20 to support rank and file workers at the
21 Museum and not the bloated millionaires
22 in senior management.

23 I'm a museum educator, and I
24 want to get back to work to continue
25 serving the wonderful students of the

2 School District of Philadelphia, but I
3 won't do it until management comes to the
4 table.

5 Thank you.

6 - - -

7 (Applause.)

8 - - -

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
11 Thank you for coming in.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Joseph Hu, commenting on 220599.

14 (Speaker approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MR. HU: Good morning. My name
18 is Joseph Hu. I'm a museum photographer
19 at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

20 My statement is with reference
21 to Resolution 220599 urging the City of
22 Philadelphia to reconsider the terms of
23 the Atwater Kent Collection transfer
24 agreement between the City of
25 Philadelphia and Drexel University in

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2 order to ensure adequate stewardship of
3 the Collection and protect the interests
4 of the citizens of Philadelphia.

5 As a museum worker at the
6 Philadelphia Museum of Art, I know
7 firsthand the enormous and complex
8 responsibility that encompasses the
9 administration and guardianship of a
10 collection of this importance. At the
11 PMA, that responsibility falls on the
12 union members of AFSCME DC47. We're the
13 curators, conservators, photographers,
14 educators, visitor services and retail
15 associates, IT professionals, art
16 handlers, development officers, the list
17 goes on.

18 The point is, we are the ones
19 that take care of the Museum and its
20 collection. And we are fighting at this
21 very moment for better pay and affordable
22 healthcare from the Museum management.
23 We're on strike because the Museum
24 refuses to adequately compensate its
25 highly skilled and knowledgeable staff

2 that takes great care in preserving and
3 sharing its world-class collection with
4 the citizens of Philadelphia and the
5 world.

6 We urge City Council to advise
7 the management and board of the
8 Philadelphia Museum of Art to negotiate
9 with the union in good faith and come to
10 an agreement.

11 Thank you.

12 - - -

13 (Applause.)

14 - - -

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Adrienne Atilas, commenting on 220599.

19 (Speaker approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. ATILES: Good morning. My
23 name is Adrienne Atilas. I am a grants
24 manager at the Philadelphia Museum of Art
25 and I'm here as a proud member of the PMA

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2 union. I thank the City Council for
3 hearing my statement in reference to
4 Resolution 220599 regarding stewardship
5 of the Atwater Kent Collection.

6 It is in the interest of the
7 citizens of Philadelphia that
8 institutions such as Drexel University,
9 who stewards the collection, and the
10 Philadelphia Museum of Art, who stewards
11 other distinguished art collection
12 bequeathed to the City of Philadelphia,
13 the John G. Johnson Collection, among
14 others, take appropriate measures to
15 ensure adequate stewardship.

16 For instance, significant City
17 funds bolster the Philadelphia Museum of
18 Art, yet at this very moment, its
19 workers, including conservators,
20 curators, installers, and registrars, are
21 on strike fighting for fair pay,
22 reasonable healthcare, and our first
23 union contract after two years of
24 negotiations.

25 We are professionals who love

2 our jobs and are committed to making sure
3 such esteemed works of art are accessible
4 to Philadelphia taxpayers. We too are
5 the communities we serve, yet many of us
6 work several jobs, cannot afford
7 healthcare, and are in a housing crisis
8 due to stagnant wages and tone-deaf
9 leadership.

10 The pay disparity within the
11 Museum is staggering, leaving those of us
12 who actually put art on the walls and
13 lead children's programs to have to
14 strike as a last resort. Meanwhile, the
15 City's assets in the form of important
16 collections, such as the Atwater and the
17 Johnson, languish while Museum executives
18 bring home salaries ranging from \$200,000
19 to \$700,000 a year. It's shameful, and
20 Philadelphia taxpayers deserve better.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you.

24 - - -

25 (Applause.)

4 Before we call the next speaker, I just
5 want to let the record reflect that
6 Councilwoman Gym is present.

7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Peter Winslow, commenting on 220692.

10 (Speaker approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. WINSLOW: My name is Peter
14 Winslow. I'm a resident of Philadelphia.
15 I speak to you today as President of A
16 Smart Collaboration and as a candidate
17 that you recommended to Mayor Kenney for
18 appointment to the initial Board of
19 Directors of the Philadelphia Public
20 Financial Authority. Thank you,
21 President Clarke and members of Council,
22 for this opportunity to speak in support
23 of the 12 resolutions that pertain to the
24 acquisitions and dispositions by the
25 Philadelphia Land Bank.

2 If I had time, I would like to
3 give my support to my union colleagues
4 who are fighting for fair treatment by
5 the Philadelphia Museum of Art, because
6 they deserve it.

7 If I had time, I would also
8 like to speak about the shooting in
9 Roxborough, which is near my home, and
10 also about Hurricane Ian and what the
11 implications are for Philadelphia from
12 climate disruption, but I've got three
13 minutes, so I'll talk about the Land
14 Bank.

15 President Clarke, I recall I
16 think it was in 2011 that Rob Stuart and
17 I spoke with you and also, Councilmember
18 Jones, with you at length about the need
19 for a land bank, and thank you very much
20 for now giving us that land bank and how
21 much we appreciate not only the work that
22 the Land Bank does, but that the
23 Philadelphia Housing Development
24 Corporation, the Redevelopment Fund, the
25 Department of Public Property, all of the

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2 agencies do in trying to recycle the
3 properties that we have that are
4 underutilized.

5 Of these properties that are
6 mentioned in the resolutions under
7 consideration today, I counted 260, which
8 is a lot. This takes up a big part of
9 your Calendar and a big part of your
10 mental process here on Council, but
11 remember there are 42,000 properties in
12 Philadelphia that are vacant and we're
13 barely keeping up.

14 So when Mayor Kenney tells us
15 that everything is fine and we don't need
16 any additional help because everything is
17 going along fine with the way things are,
18 I take exception to that, because I think
19 we can do much, much better, and one of
20 the ways that we can do better is with
21 the implementation of the Philadelphia
22 Public Financial Authority.

23 Among other things, the ability
24 to dispose of property, drawing down the
25 inventory provides more funds for

2 additional acquisitions, and the way to
3 do that is to support land trusts.

4 We don't have -- there are 256
5 land trusts in the United States. We
6 have several of them here in
7 Philadelphia, but they're small and they
8 need help. The Financial Authority can
9 provide that kind of help, and I look
10 forward to working with you to find ways
11 in which we can implement that together.

12 Thank you for your attention to
13 this matter once again.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
16 We appreciate it.

21 is Kathryn Casey, commenting on 220599.

22 (Speaker approached podium.)

23 MS. CASEY: Good morning --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MS. CASEY: -- City

3 Councilmembers. Thank you, sir. My name
4 is Kathryn Casey. I'm a resident of
5 Philadelphia, trained as an art
6 historian, with a Ph.D. from Bryn Mawr
7 College. I am here to strongly voice my
8 support in favor of the resolution to
9 reconsider the terms of the Atwater Kent
10 Collection transfer agreement.

11 In reference to the art
12 collections, however, I would like to
13 point out an embarrassment for the City
14 of Philadelphia that is taking place on a
15 world stage. The Philadelphia Museum of
16 Art has a world-class collection of art,
17 and people come from all over the world
18 to view it.

19 As an art historian, I can
20 vouch that the art world is abuzz with
21 news of the recent strike, and it is
22 known in that world that the PMA treats
23 its employees poorly and does not pay
24 them well. I will repeat, this is an
25 embarrassment for the City that is taking

2 place on a world stage.

3 Now, from the news, I learned
4 that the PMA sits on City property, which
5 it leases for a dollar a year, and that
6 all the PMA utility bills are paid for by
7 my tax dollars as allocated in the budget

9 Given this stake, your stake in
10 it, I urge the City Council to take
11 whatever action you can to persuade the
12 Museum to resolve this dispute and enter
13 into a fair contract.

11 particular version of the resolution and
12 introduce a revised version based on some

23 sorry. Yeah.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's been a
25 bad week in the Fourth District. We lost

2 a young man's life. Five people shot,
3 but one fatally in a part of my district
4 that is not used to, nor should any part
5 of my district be used to, gun violence.

6 I want to thank the members of
7 Council that reached out, called and came
8 out to support it, the Chair of
9 Education, Member Thomas, to Kathy
10 Gilmore Richardson, to Helen Gym, to all
11 of the members that showed up and stepped
12 up to the plate about this incident as if
13 it were their individual districts.
14 Didn't matter where it was.

15 But one of the things that in
16 those discussions with the principals,
17 the teachers, and some of the students
18 was the fact -- and Member Thomas brought
19 it to all of our collective attention --
20 that the young man, Nicholas, was shot in
21 Roxborough, he was transported all the
22 way to Einstein, where he perished,
23 passing hospitals along the way that did
24 not have trauma units.

25 This would not be as prevalent

2 if we did not have the high murder rate,
3 the high shooter rate that we have in the
4 City of Philadelphia.

5 So when Member Thomas brought
6 that question up, it just hit us over the
7 top of the head, like why don't we know
8 what hospitals have trauma units and how
9 long does it take to get from this Point
10 A to get to Point B when you're suffering
11 from a gunshot wound.

12 So what we want to do, and we
13 want to do this in conjunction with our
14 partners at the state and federal
15 government, is take a look at the state
16 and condition our hospitals are in and
17 whether or not there is a funding gap
18 that doesn't allow for trauma units to be
19 available to Philadelphians.

20 So we're going to take a look
21 at it and see what it takes, not to point
22 a finger but to point to solutions to
23 this problem, so that we never have to
24 second-guess whether or not that ride was
25 too long and could have saved more lives.

2 So out of every bad thing
3 should come something that points to
4 solutions so that it never ever happens
5 again.

2 magazine focused on the African Diaspora,
3 introduced today by Councilman Oh.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
5 say Councilman Oh?

6 CHIEF CLERK: Yes, Mr.
7 President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes -- Councilwoman, go
10 ahead.

11 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:
12 Mr. President, on Councilmember Oh's
13 behalf, I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you. Thank you for taking
18 Councilwoman Parker's place. We
19 appreciate that. Not only her seat,
20 but -- thank you.

21 It's been moved and properly
22 seconded.

23 All in favor indicate by saying
24 aye.

25 (Aye.)

10 legacy of Jesse Bermudez who is
11 remembered as a "local patriarch of Latin
12 music" for his humility and commitment to
13 uplifting marginalized, multicultural
14 communities through the power of music,
15 introduced today by Councilman Oh.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore
18 Richardson.

19 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. On Councilmember
21 Oh's behalf, I move the adoption of the
22 resolution.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded.

4 (Aye.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Those opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 ayes have it, and that resolution is
10 adopted.

11 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
12 recognizing and honoring the 250th
13 Anniversary of the Society of the Sons of
14 St. George for its longstanding
15 contributions to the English American
16 community in Philadelphia, introduced
17 today by Councilman Oh.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman
20 Gilmore Richardson.

21 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. On Councilmember
23 Oh's behalf, I move the adoption of the
24 resolution.

25 (Duly seconded.)

3 been moved and properly seconded.

4 All in favor indicate by saying
5 aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it, and the resolution is
12 adopted.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym,
14 I see that you're still -- was that from
15 before?

16 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: No.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Okay. All right. Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
20 other resolutions on the Final Passage
21 Calendar, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

24 We will now move to our
25 speeches.

2 Any speeches on behalf of the
3 minority?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Speeches on behalf of the majority?

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilwoman Gym.

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
10 very much, Council President.

11 A great art institution relies
12 not just on the grandeur of its building
13 or the rarity of its collections but
14 actually on the value and the greatness
15 of its staff.

16 I want to recognize and thank
17 all the members of DC47 who are here
18 today as they work on an extended
19 contract with the Philadelphia Museum of
20 Art. I think all of us in this room feel
21 very strongly about our pride in our art
22 institutions, but we also feel very
23 strongly that when they are City
24 institutions, that they exhibit truly a
25 commitment to lifting up the quality of

2 jobs that we have, ensuring good wages
3 and responsible benefits.

4 It's unfortunate that the
5 dispute has gotten protracted, and we
6 continue to urge the Philadelphia Museum
7 of Art to negotiate and to continue to
8 meet with members of DC47 and to meet the
9 needs of its staff, and we will be with
10 them to support them all the way.

11 And then the second thing I
12 wanted to raise was -- I think my
13 colleague Councilmember or Majority
14 Leader Jones expresses the grief of our
15 entire Council body on behalf of the
16 family of Nicholas Elizalde, his parents,
17 the multiple school communities that were
18 impacted by the shooting.

19 There was -- we have had 178
20 children shot this year, and Nicholas was
21 a little more than the two dozenth young
22 person to be killed by gun violence.

23 You know, we had a chance to
24 talk to a number of teachers and staff,
25 and we will continue to do so. We talked

2 to students themselves, and I think we
3 will continue to do so.

4 But we also need to come to a
5 recognition. I think this body
6 definitely has acknowledged that we are
7 not doing enough, that this body has
8 funded programs that are still in their
9 pilot phases or have not yet gotten off
10 the ground. That includes the Key
11 employment program for individuals who
12 are most impacted by gun violence that
13 this body funded in June of 2021 and is
14 going to be starting apparently this
15 fall. The amount of urgency that's
16 needed around this is undeniable.

17 And I particularly want to make
18 a statement about young people. You
19 know, what is happening amongst a number
20 of young people, whether we saw it at
21 Mill Creek, whether we saw it outside of
22 Roxborough, whether we've seen it outside
23 of Bartram High School and in other
24 places, is -- we need a clear and
25 deliberate plan to address these street

2 disputes that are involving so many young
3 people. We need conflict mediation on
4 the ground. We've said that we need
5 violence interrupters on the ground.

6 When 80 percent of our police
7 shootings are going without an arrest,
8 much less a conviction being made, we
9 need a city-community partnership around
10 de-escalation and professional mediation
11 interventions. We've seen programs like
12 this work in other cities, but we need a
13 targeted program for young people.

14 And in particular, I want our
15 Council body to focus on the Juvenile
16 Justice Services Center. These are young
17 people who are at most risk. Many of
18 them are already involved either through
19 DHS or through the justice system
20 already, but we have almost 4,000 young
21 people go through a year, and we do not
22 have a strategic program to work with
23 those who are most at risk, even within
24 that group of young people.

25 You know, we should be talking

2 to our municipal courts. We need to be
3 discussing this with DHS.

4 But it's clear that one of the
5 reasons why many of us supported
6 Councilmember Gauthier's declaration of
7 gun violence as a public health emergency
8 is because it does actually need multiple
9 entities at the table. No one entity can
10 handle this. The School District does
11 not have enough information. Probation
12 does not have enough information. DHS
13 does not have enough information. The
14 Police Department does not have enough
15 information.

16 And this urgent need to gather
17 all these entities together to do
18 something fundamentally different from
19 what we have been doing before, because
20 whatever it is is not working, is one of
21 most glaring holes I think in our
22 anti-violence strategy.

23 So this is not to disparage any
24 work that people are working on or things
25 that are underway, but we have got to get

2 to scale in some way or another, and
3 we've got a whole cohort of young people
4 who are crying out for help who are in
5 our justice system because they are
6 definitely identified as needing help.
7 We need to deliver that for them, and I'm
8 looking forward to working with my
9 colleagues on some serious programming,
10 hopefully in part with some of our
11 courts, to figure out what that may look
12 like.

13 So thank you very much, Council
14 President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Thomas.

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
20 Council President.

21 I want to take a moment to
22 thank my colleagues who stood with me the
23 other day at a press conference as I
24 released my gun report as it relates to
25 recommendations around things we could do

2 right now.

3 When we talk about the issue of
4 crime in the City of Philadelphia,
5 similar to what my colleagues already
6 have done, we know we can't fix crime
7 without addressing the issues of poverty,
8 schools, and things like that. We'll put
9 housing on that list. But at the end of
10 the day, there are some things that we
11 feel like we can do right now, and that
12 was the focus of the report.

13 So I want to thank
14 Councilmembers Bass, Squilla, Driscoll,
15 Clarke, Councilmember Johnson for sending
16 a proxy, Councilmember Gilmore Richardson
17 for her support as well too.

18 At the end of the day, we
19 listened to Councilmember Jones talk
20 about the catastrophe that happened in
21 his district. Councilmember Gym talked
22 about other issues that have plagued the
23 City of Philadelphia. Before Council
24 started, I was talking to Councilmember
25 Driscoll about the incident that happened

at Wawa and some of the things that he's doing as it relates to his leadership to try to address that crisis as well too.

And when we look at these things, we recognize that our city is facing issues that we've never seen before. I say it all the time, the victims as well as the culprits are getting younger and younger, and we have to be innovative as it relates to how we approach these solutions.

So this past summer I spent a lot of time, like I said before, at my camp working with children and young people across the City of Philadelphia, talking to victims, listening to briefings from different criminal justice partners, and I spent a lot of time in Gun Court watching the actual trials or the preliminary hearings as well as talking to judges and other law enforcement folks, and at the end of the day, we came up with a list of things that we feel like we can do right now.

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2 I'm not going to go through the
3 entire list, but there are some things
4 that I want to highlight.

5 We are seeing issues around
6 witnesses showing up, around police
7 officers showing up to court, and those
8 are clerical problems as it relates to
9 communicating things to people as well as
10 issues around trust with government. So
11 one of our recommendations is that we
12 spend \$3 million right now to protect
13 witnesses and victims and to put us in a
14 position where we can restore trust
15 between government and constituents
16 across the City of Philadelphia.

17 We know we have a huge issue as
18 it relates to cleanliness and blight.
19 We're recommending about \$4 million be
20 spent right now on cleaning the City of
21 Philadelphia.

22 We talked about looking at
23 issues as it relates to some of the
24 dollars that we already have spent around
25 gun violence and examining our

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2 effectiveness or ineffectiveness as it
3 relates to how those dollars have been
4 spent.

5 Councilmember Gym, who just
6 spoke right before me, talked about the
7 urgency around spending money now. This
8 Council body has already passed
9 legislation to allocate money to put more
10 cameras in rec centers and places where
11 we know our children are, and those
12 things don't exist yet.

13 So at the end of the day, we do
14 want to see more cameras. We do want to
15 see significant investment. We know we
16 had conservative projections coming out
17 of the budget and we have money that we
18 can spend and will spend right now.

19 The question is is what will we
20 spend that money on, and I'm recommending
21 at least 15 million of that surplus that
22 we know we have right now be spent to
23 address gun violence and address gun
24 violence right now.

25 We're urging the Administration

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2 to put together a 100-day plan. I know
3 we're past the 100-day mark as it relates
4 to the end of the calendar year, but this
5 was put on the Administration's desk
6 before that mark.

7 We want the Administration to
8 look at where we are, and we want to see
9 a full blitz as it relates to resources
10 and we want to see it targeted to areas
11 where we see the most crime at in the
12 City of Philadelphia.

13 We know that 12 percent of our
14 roads produce over 80 percent of our car
15 accidents, but if you look at a map that
16 overlaps those same areas, we'll see a
17 lot of those same areas are also plagued
18 with other criminal behavior, other
19 criminal activity.

20 We passed a body -- we passed a
21 resolution out of this body led by
22 Councilmember Gauthier that spoke to us
23 needing to declare a state of emergency
24 around gun violence, and it's tough for
25 us not just as Councilmembers but as

2 constituents in the City of Philadelphia
3 to feel that sense of urgency when we as
4 legislators cannot get basic answers to
5 questions, cannot see money spent on
6 things we know that need to be spent, and
7 we can't see a collaboration with the
8 party that we know we need to see a
9 collaboration with in order to address
10 this issue.

11 So I'm concerned like the rest
12 of my colleagues, but at the same time,
13 I'm not defeated. I'm going to continue
14 to fight this fight, and I know my
15 colleagues in Council will continue to
16 fight this fight and do everything that
17 we can to address the crime in the City
18 of Philadelphia.

19 Before I close out, I just want
20 to echo the sentiments of my colleague
21 and stand in solidarity with the workers
22 who were here today and echo your
23 sentiments, Council President. We'll do
24 everything in our power to make sure that
25 they get a contract.

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2 Thank you, colleagues, and
3 thank you, Council President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. We
6 will do what we have to do.

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilwoman Bass.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
10 Mr. President.

11 I just want to just say a
12 couple of things. The first is that as
13 the mother of a 13-year-old, the death of
14 a 14-year-old being where they were
15 supposed to be, doing what they were
16 supposed to be doing is just, you know --
17 it's unbelievable. It should not be
18 happening.

19 We have somehow normalized
20 what's happening in a lot of our
21 communities. There is nothing normal
22 about the death of a 14-year-old on the
23 football field or the other 22, 23
24 children, children who have been murdered
25 in the City of Philadelphia through gun

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2 violence this year.

3 So I know that it's highly
4 likely that there were -- well, it was
5 stated that there were five shooters at
6 Roxborough. There are likely five
7 households where these firearms are
8 today, Councilman Jones. And when we
9 talk about, you know, what do you do when
10 a shooter lives with you, you know, it
11 may sound like a catchy little phrase,
12 but that's real, because it's likely that
13 those shooters are living with mom, dad,
14 grand-mom, grand-dad. They're living
15 with someone. And so if you even suspect
16 that a young person in your household was
17 involved, you need to flip that mattress
18 up, go under the bed, go in the closet.
19 You need to run through that room and
20 turn them in.

21 Back in the day when I was
22 coming up, if you had a situation with a
23 young person in your household, you might
24 go to like a Chuck Stone, remember back
25 in the day, or you might go to, you know,

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2 someone to walk your young person in.
3 Whoever you feel like you need to walk
4 them in, they need to come in. Okay?

5 And so this is something that
6 we need to do, our community needs to do.
7 And so I just really want to put the word
8 out, and I want to thank my colleagues
9 for all of their work on gun violence. I
10 thank you, Councilman, for your
11 steadfastness in bringing this resolution
12 forward regarding the number of trauma
13 centers in the City of Philadelphia.

14 We call ourself a city of eds
15 and meds, and if you have to pass that
16 many hospitals to get to a trauma center,
17 then that statement is questionable.
18 It's highly questionable.

19 And so all of the things that
20 we do really need to be reexamined when
21 it comes to saving the lives of our young
22 people and keeping them out of harm's
23 way.

24 And I also wanted to thank
25 Councilmember Thomas for his very

2 thorough report. It was outstanding. I
3 want to encourage the viewing public to
4 get a copy of the report, read it, digest
5 it, and demand it.

6 I think looking for a 100-day
7 plan, now maybe a 90-day plan from this
8 Administration is an easy thing to do.
9 Asking them to do it should be easy. We
10 know we have the funds. We know we have
11 a budget surplus. We should just do it.
12 The City of Philadelphia should just do
13 it.

14 So I just wanted to say that,
15 Mr. President. Thank you for indulging
16 me on that.

17 On a completely different note,
18 I wanted to make sure that folks know
19 that we were still doing our property tax
20 assessment appeals.

21 It's kind of hard to pivot on
22 something like this, but I just wanted to
23 make sure that people knew that we were
24 still doing property tax assessment
25 appeals and that they could call our

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2 office for more information at
3 215-686-3424.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

9 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
10 you, Mr. President.

11 I too just wanted to be
12 recognized today to hold space for the
13 collective grief that I know we all are
14 feeling around the mass shooting that
15 occurred at Roxborough High School this
16 week, and that comes on the heels of just
17 going to the viewing of the Parks and Rec
18 employee, Tiffany Fletcher, this week,
19 also the recent Temple grad,
20 Mr. Beauregard, who was shot and killed
21 in West Philadelphia, and all of the
22 shooting incidents and killings we have
23 seen across the City.

24 As Councilmember Bass stated,
25 we cannot normalize this behavior. It's

2 not normal. Even earlier this summer
3 after losing a cousin to gun violence,
4 when we were first inaugurated here in
5 this body, I lost a 16-year-old cousin to
6 gun violence in July, shot 60 times in
7 North Philadelphia with semiautomatic
8 weapons.

9 And so this is an issue that's
10 deeply personal. As a mother of a
11 teenager who is in high school currently
12 in the City of Philadelphia and two
13 little people, it is just deeply
14 disheartening to see what is happening
15 across our community. And I just wanted
16 to rise in support of the initiatives of
17 my colleagues and commending
18 Councilmember Thomas for a very thorough
19 report with recommendations, and I look
20 forward to working with him on several of
21 those recommendations, including how we
22 as members of the Appropriations
23 Committee can work to ensure that we are
24 adequately funding the measures that need
25 funding in the upcoming mid-year transfer

2 ordinance and also really pushing the
3 Administration on this 90-day plan.

4 We know that in this body we
5 legislate and we appropriate, and it is
6 up to the administrative side of
7 government to spend those dollars in the
8 way that we have intended and to
9 effectuate programming in the way that we
10 have intended. But whatever is happening
11 now, it's not enough. We must continue
12 to do more to address this issue.

13 And so I am also joining my
14 colleagues to call on the Administration
15 to come up with a 90-day plan, not just
16 working with members of Council but all
17 across government with a whole-government
18 approach to this issue.

19 If this was something that was
20 figured out back in 2012 and 2013 under
21 the Nutter Administration when
22 Commissioner Ramsey was our chief and
23 working with the DA's Office, if they
24 could do it then, we can do this now.
25 And so I'm just calling on everyone, you

2 know, to put the individual agendas
3 aside, stop working in silos and come
4 together and really be about the work of
5 the people.

6 None of what we do is about us
7 individually. This is not about us. We
8 are simply here as representatives to
9 represent the people of this great city,
10 and we are here to do their work and
11 their business. So I ask everyone put
12 your egos aside, put your personal
13 agendas aside, put your politics aside so
14 we can get the job done for the people we
15 are elected to represent, and I look
16 forward to continuing to do that work in
17 this body.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 And, finally, I wanted to just
20 remind everyone about the Community
21 Evening Resource Centers that are
22 available for young people in the City of
23 Philadelphia. We have a center at
24 Compassion CDC at 62nd and Cedar. The
25 additional center is at Dixon House at

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2 1920 South 20th Street in South
3 Philadelphia.

4 They are open every single day
5 from 7:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. They have
6 wonderful activities at each of the
7 centers. They just opened a junior
8 barbering academy at the Community
9 Evening Resource Center in South Philly,
10 and we want young people to utilize them
11 as a resource and as a safe space to go
12 to to receive resources for themselves
13 and their families. And the City just
14 announced that two additional locations
15 were selected, one in North Philadelphia
16 that will be around the 2200 block of
17 North Broad Street and the second
18 location which will be in the Germantown
19 area in Councilmember Bass's district.
20 And my hope is that we can expand this
21 model and have a center in every division
22 in the City of Philadelphia. Whether the
23 children go there voluntarily or
24 involuntarily, we have a center there
25 available for them to have a safe space.

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2 And I will say this and I'll
3 leave it at that, that I will never
4 apologize, I will never apologize for
5 doing all that I can on behalf of young
6 people in the City of Philadelphia. I
7 will not apologize for working with the
8 Administration to create Community
9 Evening Resource Centers, I will not
10 apologize for the curfew, and I will not
11 apologize for utilizing every tool that
12 we can in our toolbox to make a
13 difference, but we have to use a
14 multi-pronged approach. It will take all
15 of us, including the community and
16 including parents and families, to get a
17 hold of the young people in this city.

18 So I wanted to just remind
19 everyone about the Community Evening
20 Resource Centers and hope that our young
21 people will utilize them.

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you so much,
25 Councilwoman.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
5 you, Council President.

6 I wanted to start by thanking
7 the community members who came earlier to
8 speak on the street-naming resolution for
9 Reverend Harry Moore. I think it's
10 apparent by listening to their passion
11 and all of the wonderful words they spoke
12 on behalf of Reverend Moore how special a
13 person he is to the Mantua community and
14 to Philadelphia more broadly.

15 Reverend Moore has served at
16 Mount Olive for almost 30 years, and not
17 only has he stewarded and grown his
18 congregation, he's come outside his
19 church walls to really support in
20 particular the community of Mantua with
21 resources and services.

22 He's also a champion for
23 affordable housing. In the time that
24 I've been in Council, it's been a
25 pleasure to partner with him to bring

2 more affordable housing to Mantua.

3 So I just wanted to thank the
4 community for speaking up, but also thank
5 this body for your support of the
6 resolution.

7 I also wanted to thank
8 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson for her
9 resolution recognizing Saleem Chapman and
10 his appointment as the new Director of
11 the Office of Sustainability. Saleem is
12 someone I hired back when I used to run
13 the Sustainable Business Network. He was
14 our first policy person. He really
15 helped SBN to build out a policy agenda
16 that we used to impact local policy for
17 the better. And so I like to think I
18 have -- I had a small, a very small, role
19 in his advancement, and I'm really proud
20 of him and I think he's going to do a
21 great job for the City of Philadelphia.

22 And then, finally, I wanted to
23 join everyone in just expressing
24 condolences for what happened in
25 Roxborough the other day. It's truly

2 horrific. I want to give my deepest
3 condolences to the family of Nicholas,
4 the young man who perished, as well as
5 all of the young people who were injured.

6 And I just think our biggest
7 charge right now as a city if we want to
8 impact this issue of gun violence is
9 figuring out what's going on with our
10 young people, particularly young people
11 that are involved in groups or cliques.
12 It seems that these conflicts between
13 different groups of young people have
14 ratcheted up to a point where young
15 people who have guns are willing to use
16 them at any time of day regardless of who
17 is around, and we just have to delve into
18 that.

19 I do believe that there are
20 people within our communities that are
21 close to young people that know what
22 these conflicts are and that we as a city
23 should be supporting to interrupt these
24 conflicts, interrupt this violence and
25 bring a sense of calm back to our

2 neighborhoods.

3 And I thank all of my
4 colleagues who are doing work in this
5 area, Councilmember Thomas on his report
6 and recommendations that he put out
7 earlier this week, Councilmember Jones on
8 his new resolution in looking at trauma
9 centers but also for his lifelong work in
10 this area, and everyone else in this body
11 that's worked on the issue.

12 I appreciate folks bringing up
13 the emergency declaration resolution that
14 I put forward and we all voted on in
15 2020. I maintain that we need an
16 emergency response to this issue. If
17 this is not an emergency, I'm not sure
18 what an emergency is.

19 I did -- earlier this week, I
20 showed support for the Mayor's Executive
21 Order to ban guns from recreation spaces.
22 I've had a lot of conflict with the
23 Administration over the time I've been in
24 Council over our approach to gun
25 violence, but every day if they're

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willing to show up and do something different, I'm willing to show up to support them in doing something different and additional. I just ask that we be willing to do that every day, right?

I think the Executive Order came on the heels of the murder of Tiffany Fletcher. I really do support showing the community that we're willing to do, and showing our workers that we're willing to do, something more to keep recreational spaces safe, but I think we have to be not taking an episodic approach. I think we have to show up every day, every City agency, every, you know, partner that can provide support to people and neighborhoods in crisis right now to be able to do something additional, something different, and something more.

And I think it's easy for us to feel a sense of hopelessness with the horrible things that are happening across the City, but I maintain that we don't

2 have to be hopeless. Being hopeless as
3 the City of Philadelphia right now is a
4 choice. We can agree to show up every
5 day and put our heads together as a group
6 of civic leaders to bring different
7 solutions to this problem, and I just
8 want to express my ongoing commitment to
9 that effort and thank all of my
10 colleagues for their commitment and their
11 effort as well.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
