5 So may we please have a moment
6 of silence.

7 (Moment of silence.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you.

10 And to further recognize the
11 challenging times that we find ourself
12 in, we just would like to acknowledge
13 everything that's going on. We have been
14 full participants in all aspects of it.

15 To our citizens, to all of
16 those who are watching us that have been
17 involved in whatever way you have, we
18 would like to at this time, we're going
19 to take a knee, and we're going to take a
20 knee obviously to recognize what we're
21 going through as a nation, as a city, but
22 we want to take a knee to recognize the
23 memory of George Floyd. The individual,
24 until this particular time, was pretty
25 much anonymous to us all, but now we

2 recognize as the symbol of all of the
3 things that could be wrong in this
4 country.

5 I think the most important
6 aspect of what happened as a result of
7 that is that we come out of this
8 stronger, better, more unified to move
9 forward all of the things to right as
10 much as possible the wrongs that have
11 been done. I think that if we don't do
12 that, the memory of George Floyd will be
13 lost. I'm just very concerned about the
14 direction that we could conceivably go
15 in.

16 But today, this morning, I'm
17 going to ask all members to please take a
18 knee in this virtual format, so as we
19 speak.

20 Can we all please take a knee
21 in the memory of George Floyd and his
22 unfortunate death.

23 (Councilmembers pause to take a
24 knee.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Incorporated for the operation,
17 maintenance and expansion of a bicycle

22 behalf of the City, to acquire fee simple
23 title, or a lesser interest in real
24 estate, by purchase, dedication,
25 donation, condemnation, agreement in lieu

10 Our next order of business is
11 the introduction of bills and
12 resolutions, and the Clerk will please

15 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
16 Parker offers one bill, entitled "An
17 ordinance amending Title 9 of The
18 Philadelphia Code to create a new Chapter
19 9-5000, entitled 'Food Delivery
20 Services,' to regulate third-party food
21 delivery services, require certain
22 disclosures to consumers, and provide for
23 a limitation on certain fees charged to
24 consumers."

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

10 sourcing COVID-19 related equipment,
11 supplies, and services from local
12 businesses and suppliers in response to

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. Mr. Decker, did you say that
16 was privileged?

17 CHIEF CLERK: That's a
18 non-privileged resolution, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Non-privileged, okay. Thank you.

21 This will be placed on the
22 Final Passage Calendar at our next
23 session of Council.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon

19 56th Street, Arch Street, Conestoga
20 Street, and Market Street.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
22 bill will be referred to the appropriate
23 committee.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
25 Johnson offers two bills, entitled "An

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you. These bills will be referred
19 to the appropriate committees.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
21 Sanchez offers two bills, entitled "An
22 ordinance amending Title 14 of The
23 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Zoning and
24 Planning,' to amend certain provisions of
25 Chapter 14-500, entitled 'Overlay Zoning

4 An ordinance amending the

9 Street, and 3rd Street; and amending
10 Title 14 of The Philadelphia Code,
11 entitled "Zoning and Planning," to amend
12 certain provisions of Chapter 14-500,

14 creating the "/BNA Berks and American
15 Overlay District."

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. Those bills will be referred
18 to the appropriate committee.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

20 Quinones-Sanchez also offers a privileged
21 resolution authorizing City Council's
22 Committees on Public Health and Human
23 Services and Commerce and Economic
24 Development to consider the City of
25 Philadelphia's revenue collection and

3 property owners to support economic

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
6 will be on today's Calendar.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb
8 offers two bills, entitled "An ordinance
9 authorizing the operation of sidewalk
10 cafes during the COVID-19 emergency until
11 December 31, 2020 in areas of the City
12 where such activity currently must be
13 otherwise authorized by special
14 ordinance, and allowing expanded activity
15 by currently licensed sidewalk cafe
16 operations"; and

17 An ordinance amending Chapter
18 11-100 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
19 "General Provisions," to authorize the
20 Streets Department to permit closure of
21 the public right-of-way, including on
22 street parking spaces, for public health,
23 welfare and safety purposes during the
24 COVID-19 public health emergency until
25 December 31, 2020, including expansion of

2 business uses that cannot operate in
3 indoor environments or have limited
4 indoor capacity and/or service due to the
5 COVID-19 emergency.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you. Those will be referred to the
8 appropriate committee.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Thomas
10 offers one bill, entitled "An ordinance
11 amending Section 17-109 of The
12 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Local
13 Bidding Preferences,' to amend reporting
14 requirements to require the establishment
15 of local business usage goals and
16 reporting on reaching such goals as a way
17 to assist community businesses recover
18 from the COVID-19 pandemic."

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
20 bill will be referred to the appropriate
21 committee.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
23 Squilla offers two bills, entitled "An
24 ordinance authorizing the Commissioner of
25 Public Property, on behalf of the City of

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh
5 offers one privileged resolution,
6 entitled a "Resolution recognizing May
7 2020 as Asian American and Pacific
8 Islander Heritage Month in Philadelphia
9 to commemorate the proud heritage of
10 Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and
11 their vital contributions that continue
12 to enhance the City's culture, economy,
13 and the founding ideals of independence
14 and democracy."

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
16 will be on today's Calendar.

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
18 other bills or resolutions being offered
19 by the members today, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

22 We have no reports from
23 committee today. Let me quickly
24 recognize today's introduction of bills.
25 This particular session was targeted for

1 6/4/20 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING
2 legislation or resolutions that will help
3 facilitate the opening of the economy to
4 provide opportunities for much-needed
5 jobs. So we have focused on that today
6 in this Council session.

7 The following session we will
8 be addressing a number of issues,
9 particularly issues that relate to some
10 of the current environment, but today
11 we'll be focusing on things that will
12 help us deal with this particular
13 economy. We anticipate having a
14 significant number of issues addressed in
15 our next session of Council. Very, very
16 important issue.

17 Our next order of business is
18 the consideration of the Calendar. I
19 note there are no bills on the First
20 Reading Calendar, but today we are only
21 considering those legislative matters on
22 the Second Reading and Final Passage
23 Calendar that directly pertain to the
24 COVID-19 crisis.

25 A reminder that we are still in

2 the pandemic. There are two such matters
3 on the Calendar. The prime sponsors of
4 those matters have already communicated
5 their desire to have those matters
6 considered today.

7 I, therefore, recognize
8 Councilwoman Parker for the purpose of
9 calling up those matters from the Second
10 Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. The following
13 resolutions are being called up from the
14 Second Reading and Final Passage
15 Calendars today. They are Nos. 200332
16 and 200337. All other resolutions and
17 bills are being held.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20 Before considering these
21 resolutions, we will consider public
22 comment. It will go as follows:

23 Under normal circumstances,
24 public comment must concern matters on
25 the Second Reading and Final Passage

2 Calendars for possible action at a
3 session of Council.

4 A speaker on any of those
5 matters must sign up in order to testify.
6 You must call 215-686-3406 by 5:00 p.m.
7 the day before the session to sign up for
8 public comment.

9 When you call, we will take
10 your number and your name and the number
11 of your legislative item you are
12 commenting on and whether you are in
13 support of or against the legislation
14 that you add to your list. We will
15 telephone each person on the list during
16 Council session and invite them to our
17 remote meetings, and under ideal
18 circumstances, they will have -- we will
19 have two minutes to speak given the
20 timeframe and the challenges that we have
21 before us.

22 In order to be fair to all
23 those wishing to speak, we're going to
24 please ask for individuals to please
25 adhere to the time limit. We have

2 consistently had a lot of individuals
3 that have indicated an interest in
4 testifying, and we encourage that, but we
5 do want to make sure that everybody has
6 an opportunity. So there will be a timer
7 that will monitor your time. When you
8 hear a ringing of a bell, maybe a little
9 slight, the first ring will indicate that
10 you have 30 seconds to conclude your
11 remarks. When you hear the longer ring,
12 that will mean that your two minutes are
13 up.

14 Thank you so much for your
15 participation and thank you so much for
16 your adherence to the guidelines that we
17 have been appointed.

18 So you're going to be muted and
19 disconnected from the remote meeting
20 after you conclude your testimony. Thank
21 you very much.

22 So, again, comment is limited
23 to the matters called up by Councilwoman
24 Parker, Resolutions No. 200332 and
25 200337. Thank you very much.

1 6/4/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Mr. Decker.

3 CHIEF CLERK: William Elder.

4 There will be a brief pause as

5 public commenters are connected,

6 Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Okay.

9 MR. ELDER: Hello.

10 CHIEF CLERK: William Elder.

11 MR. ELDER: Yes.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

13 morning, sir.

14 MR. ELDER: Good morning.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Please proceed.

17 MR. ELDER: Thank you. Hello.

18 My name is William Elder. I'm a resident

19 of Philadelphia's Second District. Thank

20 you for taking my comment today.

21 While I support the spirit of

22 Resolution 200267 to the fullest, I'm

23 calling today because I find the

24 proposition that it could be implemented

25 in any meaningful way completely

2 farcible.

3 The events of the last week
4 have reminded us once again that too many
5 law enforcement officials across the
6 country are unable to use their own
7 fists, elbows, and knees in a manner that
8 does not infringe on individuals' civil
9 liberties, more often than not African
10 American citizens.

11 Providing the Police Department
12 with more military-grade technology than
13 they amplified will simply just give
14 cover to such biases, is dangerous, and
15 unnecessary, and a toothless resolution
16 will not prevent its abuse in a police
17 culture that too often views itself as
18 above the law, particularly when policing
19 minority communities.

20 Rather than adopt this
21 resolution, I call on the City Council to
22 stand together against the police union
23 in order to demilitarize the City's
24 Police Department, to substantially
25 reduce the Department's budget, to ban

2 the use of facial recognition technology
3 in any capacity, and to bring about real
4 reform in our Police Department before we
5 have another George Floyd-like tragedy in
6 Philadelphia rather than waiting until
7 it's too late.

8 The NAACP and social activists
9 both offered bullet point police reform
10 recommendations that I encourage Council
11 to consider.

12 In closing, black lives matter.
13 John McNesby is trash.

14 I yield the rest of my time.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you very much for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: William Simpton.

18 MR. SIMPTON: Hello.

19 CHIEF CLERK: William Simpton.

20 MR. SIMPTON: Yes.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

22 Hello.

23 MR. SIMPTON: Yes. This is

24 William Simpton. Can you hear me?

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

2 You're commenting on what resolution or
3 bill? I just want to clarify.

4 MR. SIMPTON: Resolution
5 200267.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Okay. All right. So we actually are
8 only calling up for public comment for
9 200332, 200337, but you are on now, so
10 please proceed.

11 MR. SIMPTON: Oh, okay. Is
12 this not --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 problem is -- but just proceed. We're
15 only calling up a couple of matters on
16 the Calendar given the current
17 COVID-related situation. So we're only
18 calling up certain bills for public
19 comment session, but you're already on,
20 so just please proceed.

21 MR. SIMPTON: Okay. May I ask
22 who is listening to the testimony?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Everyone watching Channel 64.

25 MR. SIMPTON: Wonderful. Cool.

2 So I was under the impression that I was
3 going to speak on Resolution 200267,
4 Councilmember Jones's resolution on --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
6 sir, I just said just go ahead. Just go
7 ahead, because you're taking up your
8 time.

9 MR. SIMPTON: Oh, sorry about
10 that.

11 I was calling to express
12 opposition to the resolution, but only
13 because I believe that the terrain has
14 shifted. I deeply respect the foresight
15 of Councilmember Jones and the concerns
16 that others share for our civil
17 liberties, but this resolution was
18 introduced in March, and although
19 everyone who is listening to this call is
20 in different parts of the City, I think
21 if you look outside, you'll see that the
22 terrain has shifted.

23 The resolution speaks
24 intelligently and perceptively to the
25 automation of law enforcement tactics and

2 is rightfully suspicious of the
3 underlying framework in which facial
4 recognition technology is being placed,
5 idea that it only lacks confidence.

6 I think that Philadelphia is a
7 city of forward-thinkers and activists
8 and heirs to luminaires like Du Bois, and
9 we should withdraw this resolution and
10 reintroduce another as soon as possible
11 to call for a moratorium on facial
12 recognition usage by law enforcement
13 until such a time as regulations are
14 written by a civilian-led body and
15 implemented first. We should write the
16 rule book before we play the game. We
17 wouldn't be the first to do this. San
18 Francisco has and four towns outside of
19 Boston have as well. Portland and Boston
20 themselves are considering these bans
21 right now, and Philadelphia has an
22 opportunity to join them.

23 A moratorium is a moderate
24 assertion given what is going on and
25 given the conduct that we have seen.

2 People are paying attention, and people
3 want to know that you'll protect us. We
4 can't be laissez-faire. This issue
5 touches all aspects of our lives, and to
6 vest this regulation in the Roundhouse
7 and in federal LEOs is not something that
8 this Council with the leaders that it has
9 should allow. Algorithms that run
10 through the City should be made to work
11 for the people, should be controlled by
12 the people. You can't eliminate bias in
13 code because someone has the code, but
14 you can control bias, and you can lay a
15 foundation that is bias for us.

16 I urge the Council only to
17 withdraw this resolution and to return
18 quickly with a stronger stance on facial
19 recognition to make Philadelphia a light
20 and to start working with the people who
21 are out in the street to show us a way
22 forward from a lot of the distrust and a
23 lot of the dishonesty that we have seen.

24 Thank you for your time.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you.

3 Before we go to the next
4 speaker, I just wanted to go over
5 something briefly that I omitted earlier.
6 I just want to say to the individuals
7 that are going to be speaking, this is a
8 public meeting, and the public meeting is
9 being recorded. So because the meeting
10 is public, participants and viewers have
11 no reasonable expectation of privacy. So
12 by continuing to be in the meeting, you
13 are consenting to be recorded.

14 So, Mr. Decker, please proceed
15 with the next witness.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President, I
17 apologize to the body. There are no
18 speakers on the resolutions you
19 indicated, 200332 and 200337. The
20 remaining speakers are all on Resolution
21 No. 200267. Shall I continue calling
22 those names, Mr. President?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Yeah. I mean, it's a relevant issue. We
25 didn't call it up until people called in

2 to sign up for that. So just let the
3 individuals state their position on that
4 particular resolution.

5 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker,
6 Mr. President, is Hannah Sassaman.

7 MS. SASSAMAN: Hello.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Hello. How are you?

10 MS. SASSAMAN: Fine. How are
11 you?

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Good. Just state your name for the
14 record and please proceed with your
15 testimony.

16 MS. SASSAMAN: Hi. My name is
17 Hannah Sassaman. I am the Policy
18 Director at Movement Alliance Project and
19 I was hoping to speak on the facial
20 recognition resolution as well, but I can
21 also speak on 332.

22 At this moment in history, it
23 is extremely important for all of the
24 members of Council who have a deep
25 commitment to their communities and a

2 deep commitment to all of the rioting of
3 the City of Philadelphia to understand
4 that both the rhetoric that we are seeing
5 all over the City that Councilmember Gym
6 spoke about in her resolution and the
7 complications of facial recognition and
8 the bias that it can potentially embed
9 that Councilman Jones put forward in his
10 are deeply tied to the hundreds of years
11 of racial oppression that black
12 communities are rising up against right
13 now.

14 The City Council has one moment
15 with this budget session to listen to the
16 call from the streets to de-fund the
17 Police, to take that \$14 million excess
18 that they were granted in the budget and
19 to put it into Office of Workforce
20 Development, housing, into rec centers,
21 and the community supports and services
22 that truly help us thrive in the poorest
23 big city in America with vibrant black
24 and brown communities.

25 We are supporting you in trying

2 to take that brave stand right now and
3 thinking deeply about your commitment to
4 your neighborhoods and how coming out of
5 this extraordinary moment in history and
6 this crisis we can transform them by
7 doing what the City of Los Angeles did
8 last night and taking money that is
9 earmarked for the Police and putting it
10 instead into our communities. Even
11 though some of the resources are tied up
12 in contracts, there are over \$700 million
13 extra in that budget that are not
14 necessarily tied up in contracts that can
15 be reinvested as the movement for black
16 lives and as thousands upon thousands of
17 people and millions nationwide are
18 saying.

19 I'm grateful for this
20 opportunity to speak. I know you will be
21 hearing from many more people.

22 And, finally, I would say that
23 the budget session for public testimony
24 that you have open on June 9th is already
25 full. It is absolutely incumbent upon

2 Council to open up at least one, if not
3 more than one, session for the people in
4 the streets who are saying invest in our
5 communities and divest from policing,
6 from technology for policing are able to
7 speak to you.

8 I am grateful very much, and I
9 yield the rest of my time.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you very much for your
12 testimony.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Point of
14 information, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I truly appreciate the
19 comments and insights of the public about
20 the resolution dealing with the use of
21 facial recognition, but what that intent
22 of that resolution is not to promote and
23 further the use of facial recognition
24 technology, but to discover if we are
25 indeed utilizing it and how.

2 So if there is a
3 misunderstanding on how, we are having a
4 hearing to open up to the public, to be
5 transparent about City resources being
6 used for that. I wanted to put that on
7 the record, Mr. President.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 Mr. Decker.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Greg Allbright.

13 MR. ALLBRIGHT: Hello.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Hello. How are you?

16 MR. ALLBRIGHT: I'm doing well.

17 Hello.

18 Hello? Are you there?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
20 was my fault. Can you hear me?

21 MR. ALLBRIGHT: Yes, I can hear
22 you now.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
24 state your name for the record and
25 proceed with your testimony.

2 MR. ALLBRIGHT: Absolutely. My
3 name is Gregory Allbright. I'm a Ph.D.
4 student at Drexel University. I have
5 worked with some colleagues in the STS,
6 Science Technology Studies Department,
7 talking about issues of surveillance and
8 facial recognition, and all of the
9 literature I've read and what I've seen
10 shows that this technology once it's
11 used, it's really hard to roll back. It
12 leads to lots of civil rights issues,
13 lots of things that just create more
14 problems than is solved. So I would
15 encourage the Council to vote against
16 this bill.

17 Thank you very much.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

20 MR. ALLBRIGHT: Absolutely.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Nikki Grant.

22 MS. GRANT: Hello.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning. Ms. Grant, can you speak up a
25 little. It's hard for us to hear you.

2 MS. GRANT: Yes.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

4 Good morning.

5 MS. GRANT: Good morning.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Could you speak a little louder. We're
8 having difficulty hearing you. And just
9 state your name for the record.

10 MS. GRANT: Okay. Can you hear
11 me now?

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.
13 It's a little better. Can you just state
14 your name for the record and proceed with
15 your testimony.

16 MS. GRANT: My name is Nikki
17 Grant. I'm an attorney with Amistad Law
18 Project and a resident of West
19 Philadelphia in the Third District. I'm
20 here to testify in favor of Resolution
21 200267.

22 For decades, we have seen
23 police forces across the country gather
24 more resources and tools, often with
25 little to no accountability. The

2 evolution of SWAT, the SWAT team, is one
3 example. Try looking for police units
4 that will effect the military reform of
5 1960. You won't find them. SWAT was
6 created in the '60s largely in response
7 to uprising of black people across the
8 country calling for justice. SWAT
9 radically transformed police forces
10 across the country, turning local police
11 into the military.

12 On Sunday, I watched in horror
13 just blocks away from my house as a man,
14 clad in military gear, shot tear gas into
15 my neighborhood at black youth who are
16 fed up at being criminalized and killed
17 by police. But that's not all. Not only
18 do these militarized units harass people
19 in my community, their insatiable hunger
20 for new toys (inaudible) away from things
21 my community needs.

22 And so I turn to facial
23 recognition software, or FRS. Just like
24 SWAT before it, this technology and the
25 police units and practices that it will

2 create around it will radically transform
3 the police once again to our communities'
4 detriment. If we allow the police to add
5 FRS to their arsenal, they will become
6 big brother. So since we have normalized
7 the (inaudible) of police, soon we will
8 normalize the common presence of police
9 surveillance on the entire populus.

10 Not only do I support setting
11 clear boundaries and transparent policies
12 around the use of FRS, I completely
13 oppose the City, the State or the federal
14 government sending any money already
15 sourced for technologies that will
16 heighten its motivation of everyday life
17 for black people.

18 The issue is twofold. Not only
19 is this a concern about how FRS chills
20 (inaudible) speech and props up mass
21 incarceration, there's also a concern
22 about how these technologies drain
23 resources from our communities and
24 siphons away tax dollars.

25 In addition to asserting

2 boundaries and clear practices around
3 FRS, City Council can take action with
4 our poorer communities who are clamoring
5 for justice by rejecting the \$14 million
6 increase to the Police budget.

7 Twenty-five thousand Philadelphians have
8 signed a petition with Amistad Law
9 Project, started working a week ago,
10 calling for just that.

11 So I call on City Council to
12 (inaudible) Resolution 200267 and I call
13 on City Council to reject any increase in
14 funding for the Police.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Devren
19 Washington.

20 MR. WASHINGTON: Hello.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. WASHINGTON: Good morning.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
25 please state your name for the record and

1 6/4/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 proceed with your testimony.

3 MR. WASHINGTON: Hello. My
4 name is Devren Washington and -- I'm
5 sorry. I'm testifying right now?

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

7 MR. WASHINGTON: Okay. I'm
8 sorry. Yes. My name is Devren
9 Washington and I am testifying regarding
10 the bill -- or regarding the resolution
11 on facial recognition, and I just want to
12 extend a thank you for holding this space
13 in order for the public to testify
14 regarding this resolution.

15 I've been advocating against
16 the use of facial recognition technology
17 for some time, and now is the time for
18 the community and our elected officials
19 to be having that conversation.

20 As an organizer and as an
21 organizer with Black Lives Matter, I
22 understand that we are in a deeply
23 principled struggle for the soul of our
24 city, and the technological capabilities
25 of those in power is of paramount concern

2 to me and my fellow organizers more
3 broadly. And so this technology,
4 especially where it's going, where
5 cameras are able to track the movements
6 of people and where this is a use in
7 which you are forcing people to basically
8 hold their identification, hold their ID
9 like on their face, right, it really just
10 does not serve the public and it
11 endangers marginalized communities,
12 because it allows for racist police
13 officers to be able to track people
14 almost with impunity.

15 I understand that the use of
16 facial recognition technology right now
17 is not widely known, and that is also
18 very concerning to me, but I think right
19 now Council is in a great position to use
20 this resolution to call on the Mayor to
21 actually just ban its use throughout the
22 City of Philadelphia, because in reality,
23 we are asking for the City -- I mean, for
24 the State and for the federal government
25 to provide the policy on facial

2 recognition technology. I feel like that
3 only legitimizes its use, and we don't
4 need to be parsing -- we don't need to be
5 figuring out like how it can be used
6 safely. We need to just ban it
7 indefinitely so that we can protect our
8 First Amendment rights, right? Because
9 if you look at Ferguson, everything
10 coming out of Ferguson -- and as of right
11 now, six people, six organizers that were
12 present in the Ferguson uprising had been
13 murdered. And so we know that there's a
14 long history of police surveillance of
15 black movements and of black people, and
16 so if Council wants to show solidarity
17 for the moment that we are in nationally,
18 they should use this moment to be on the
19 right side of history and do the right
20 thing in this moment, which is calling on
21 the Mayor to ban the use of facial
22 recognition by executive order.

23 So thank you so much for
24 hearing my testimony, and I hope Council
25 can make the right decision.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Kara Cloud.

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Next.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Phil Mayfair.

10 MR. MAYFAIR: Hi. This is

11 Phil.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

13 morning.

14 MR. MAYFAIR: Good morning.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

16 morning.

17 MR. MAYFAIR: Is this the call

18 from City Council?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

20 You're actually in the public meeting, so

21 if you can just state your name and

22 proceed with your testimony.

23 MR. MAYFAIR: Great. Thank

24 you. My name is Phil Mayfair. I'm

25 calling to object to Bill 200267 and the

1 6/4/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 use in funding of facial recognition
3 technology by the Philadelphia Police.

4 I am pretty afraid that such
5 technology will negatively affect
6 vulnerable populations, especially black
7 men and women, especially after how
8 horribly the police have acted last week
9 in response to protests.

10 I also oppose this bill since
11 it would seem to pull resources away from
12 areas like education and public health.

13 Thank you for your time.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you so much for your testimony.

16 MR. MAYFAIR: Thanks. Bye.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Enny Ibomian.

18 MR. MAYFAIR: I'm sorry?

19 CHIEF CLERK: You're released,
20 sir.

21 The next speaker is Enny
22 Ibomian.

23 MS. IBOMIAN: Yes.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MS. IBOMIAN: Good morning.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning. Just please state your name for
5 the record and proceed with your
6 testimony. And can you make your voice a
7 little louder.

8 MS. IBOMIAN: Okay. And we
9 know what this is regarding, right?

10 My name is Enny Ibomian and I'm
11 basically speaking about facial
12 recognition, passing that bill. And so
13 in a time where we lack policing reform,
14 we do not need to add fuel to the fire of
15 police brutality against people's color,
16 especially black and brown communities.

17 In addition, I think a facial
18 recognition tool will be used to violate
19 our First Amendment rights, even if it's
20 done inadvertently. No matter how clear
21 boundaries and transparent policies --
22 how many clear boundaries and transparent
23 policies you try to establish regarding
24 the use of facial recognition technology,
25 you can't overcome the bigotry and racism

2 that lies in the human heart.

3 This is not the time to
4 implement this policy, and doing this
5 will only guarantee a state-endorsed
6 genocide of black and brown people in our
7 community and in our city.

8 Thanks.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you so much for your testimony.

11 MS. IBOMIAN: Thank you. Bye.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Oliver Harris.

14 DR. HARRIS: Good morning.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 DR. HARRIS: Good morning. Can
18 you say it one more time?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
20 state your name for the record and
21 proceed with your testimony. If you
22 could lift your voice a little higher.
23 It's difficult to hear you.

24 DR. HARRIS: How is this? Is
25 this loud enough?

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 That's fine. Thank you.

4 DR. HARRIS: Great. Thank you.

5 My name is Dr. Oliver Harris. I'm a
6 resident of Fishtown and I hold a
7 doctorate in chemical and biological
8 engineering from Drexel University.

9 I am against any resolution
10 that allows for the use of facial
11 recognition software by the Philadelphia
12 Police or any other department within the
13 Philadelphia City structure.

14 We all have a lot to do today
15 to take care of our fellow
16 Philadelphians, so I'll make this as
17 quick as I can. You've already heard
18 from many other concerned Philadelphians
19 about all of the various inadequacies in
20 any sort of regulation of this software,
21 so I'm only going to highlight what I
22 think is salient here.

23 Every single First Amendment
24 advocacy group, civil rights group, civil
25 liberties group is immanently opposed to

2 using this technology by the Police
3 Department. You should consider the
4 already published positions by the
5 Electronic Frontier Foundation and the
6 American Civil Liberties, ACLU.

7 You've already heard that
8 fellow cities have already banned its
9 use, including Cambridge, Massachusetts
10 and San Francisco. And, in fact, I want
11 to draw attention to the specific
12 technology being considered here,
13 Clearview AI that Philly PD piloted in
14 November. New Jersey as a state has
15 already banned this technology from being
16 used by its Police Department.

17 So now I want to focus on this
18 current moment. Other Philadelphians
19 have already told you surveillance
20 technologies exacerbate pre-existing
21 racial biases in policing. News outlets
22 like Wired, Gizmodo, Fox, and BuzzFeed
23 have all documented that these
24 technologies fail to distinguish between
25 facial features of black people, which

2 invariably leads to disproportionately
3 high false positives for black people.
4 Even the Department of Homeland Security
5 and the National Institute of Standards
6 and Technology, NIST, have published
7 results documenting the abject failure of
8 this technology to be equitable.

9 Additionally, in this time
10 where everyone is wearing masks to
11 protect public health, we are going to
12 undoubtedly see spikes in
13 misidentifications from this technology's
14 use.

15 Finally, I submit that the
16 entire enterprise of predictive policing
17 has been wisely denounced as an
18 inherently racist approach to public
19 safety and must be dismantled to ensure
20 the safety of the people of this city.

21 Now I want to focus on the
22 specific department in question. Last
23 year we learned that hundreds of officers
24 within Philly PD were active members and
25 racist Facebookers. Two Jewish former

2 officers are suing the Department over
3 the discrimination they faced, and
4 there's even an officer who was rehired
5 by the Department, Officer Lickterman,
6 who has a visible Nazi tattoo that
7 continues to go viral worldwide week
8 after week. So do you honestly believe
9 that Philadelphians are going to feel
10 safe with these same racist officers
11 getting unfettered access to even more
12 invasive tools to terrorize our
13 communities?

14 At a time when trust between
15 the people and the police is at the
16 lowest point in anyone's living memory
17 and when every Philadelphian is hurting
18 for real change, you all have an
19 opportunity here to do the right thing.
20 Right now this very same department is
21 being documented every day infringing on
22 civil liberties, breaking international
23 laws governing use of chemical weapons on
24 civilians, and showing blatant disregard
25 for the life and safety of

2 Philadelphians. Is this the legacy that
3 you want to be known for, enabling more
4 of this?

5 You can get out in front of
6 this. You can lead cities nationwide in
7 defending your constituents from the
8 inherent violence of facial technician
9 software or you can cower to the police,
10 who already face no accountability for
11 their wrongdoings and likely would never
12 face any consequences if their violence
13 can be blamed on a simple algorithm
14 malfunction.

15 To be clear, anything less than
16 an outright ban is enabling the next
17 George Floyd to happen here, and we
18 cannot allow that. Black lives matter.
19 Act now or stand down.

20 I yield my time.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you very much for your testimony.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Candice Qwen.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES:

1 6/4/20 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Mr. President?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Two things.
6 One, so that if people feel that the
7 intent of that resolution, not a bill,
8 was to further facial recognition, that
9 is not the case. So we will withdraw the
10 resolution to provide greater clarity.

11 The intention of the resolution
12 was to find out where they are actually
13 using that technology unbeknownst to City
14 Council, and I appreciate the advocates
15 who are bringing this strong opposition
16 to our attention. But, again, for
17 further clarification, that was not our
18 intention. We want to be informed about
19 when and where this type of technology is
20 being used in the City of Philadelphia
21 and for what purpose.

22 So going forward, we can make a
23 motion after public comment to withdraw
24 that resolution to find out where this is
25 being used and we'll figure out a way to

2 get that through the budget process.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. We will recognize
5 you at the appropriate time in this
6 session to take action on that particular
7 resolution. Thank you.

8 Mr. Decker, please continue.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Candice Qwen.

11 MS. QWEN: Hello.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 morning. If you can please just state
14 your name for the record and proceed with
15 your testimony, and speak a little louder
16 to make sure that all can hear you.

17 MS. QWEN: Is this for -- is
18 this the hearing for the bill?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.
20 This is the Council meeting.

21 MS. QWEN: Oh, okay.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
23 this is the public comment session, which
24 you have signed up for.

25 MS. QWEN: Okay. Sure.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 it's a resolution, not a bill.

4 Please proceed.

5 MS. QWEN: Sure. My name is
6 Candice Qwen. I called yesterday in
7 opposition to this bill, because I feel
8 that Philadelphia's funds should not be
9 used any more for the police funding. We
10 should -- seeing as Mayor Kenney proposed
11 so many tax cuts for social services, I
12 feel that our funding should be used for
13 especially for the libraries, the
14 community centers, et cetera. And, yeah,
15 I do feel that using facial recognition
16 technology is incredibly dangerous and
17 should not be funded at all with City
18 money.

19 So, yeah. Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony,
22 ma'am.

23 MS. QWEN: Take care.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Germain Lloyd.

2 MR. LLOYD: Hello.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 MR. LLOYD: Good morning.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

8 the record and proceed with your
9 testimony.

10 MR. LLOYD: Yes, sir. So I
11 spoke with my organizer earlier.
12 Actually, I won't be testifying on this
13 go-round, unfortunately, so...

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Okay.

16 MR. LLOYD: All right then?

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
20 is Howard Fisher.

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
23 person, Mr. Decker.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Margerie Layesfall.

2 MS. FOUST: Hello.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 MS. FOUST: Good morning. Who
6 is calling?

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 We're calling from the City Council
9 meeting. You had indicated an interest
10 in testifying in public comment?

11 MS. FOUST: Hello.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Hello. Did you want to testify in public
14 comment in the City Council session?

15 MS. FOUST: Yes. Absolutely.
16 Absolutely. Hi. My name is Leah and I'm
17 a member of One Pennsylvania.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Okay.

20 MS. FOUST: Yes. My name a --

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hold on,
22 Leah. They didn't put us in yet. When
23 he gives us the go-ahead, then you can
24 go.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Mr. Decker, call the name again who is
3 supposed to testify.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Margerie
5 Layesfall.

6 MS. FOUST: Hello.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.
8 Is this Margerie?

9 MS. FOUST: No. This is Leah
10 Foust.

11 CHIEF CLERK: That's the next
12 speaker on the list, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Okay. Since we have her on, why don't we
15 proceed with her.

16 If you can just state your name
17 for the record and proceed with your
18 testimony.

19 MS. FOUST: My name is Leah
20 Foust and I'm a member of One
21 Pennsylvania. I am testifying on
22 Resolution 200267.

23 Our city is on fire. Our
24 people are hurting, and in the midst of a
25 pandemic, black communities are crying

2 out for help and safety, for housing, for
3 education, for employment, for respect.
4 We can't afford to keep funding weapons
5 and technology for our police to be able
6 to use on black lives.

7 The police have been
8 traumatizing our community for too long.
9 It is shameful to be investing in
10 technology for the police while we are
11 being asked to fight over crumbs.

12 Mayor Jim Kenney's \$14 million
13 increase in the Philadelphia Police
14 Department's weapons is wrong. Using or
15 giving the police more military-style
16 weapons is wrong. The crisis facing our
17 city is housing, addiction, hunger,
18 poverty, and unemployment. How can we
19 justify this continued increase in police
20 power and inflated spending?

21 Well, let me tell you a story
22 about the people who will use this
23 technology. Are you listening? I'm
24 going to tell you right now who it is.

25 I was on the bus with my kids

2 coming from grocery shopping. We all had
3 on our masks, but my son had a lollipop
4 in his mouth. But you know kids. They
5 want they candy, so it was hard to keep
6 his mask on. The bus driver stopped and
7 called the cops on us. I was extremely
8 hurt and didn't know what to do. We were
9 far from home, and when the cops came, I
10 didn't want any trouble. I expressed my
11 honest feelings and told the police
12 officers I thought the bus driver was
13 being mean and kind of racist. As soon
14 as I said that, two of the cops, he
15 grabbed me and started to choke me by my
16 neck and slammed me in the ground right
17 in front of my kids. That's not what our
18 youth is supposed to see. And the other
19 cops also watched as well while people on
20 the bus watched as well.

21 I felt fear and humiliated. I
22 just felt like before the cops even
23 arrived, he had planned on hitting me
24 anyway.

25 When he slammed me on the

2 ground, my face was in the concrete. I
3 felt like a freaking animal or something
4 or not even human, something that
5 belonged in the damn zoo. I'm a human
6 being. And then he finally put handcuffs
7 on me and he going to put me in the car
8 and ask me what happened.

9 He talked about how I needed to
10 calm down. I was only expressing my
11 feelings. He needed to calm down. He
12 needed some type of more training or
13 something, not no more funding in his
14 Police Department.

15 I told him what happened about
16 the lollipop. Then he had the nerve to
17 say, wow, that's why the bus driver
18 called us? I felt like he could have
19 killed me by mistake.

20 The solution to our problems is
21 to invest in housing, jobs, resources for
22 our youth. The City does not need to put
23 more funding into the Police Department.
24 We need resources for housing, the youth,
25 and addressing addiction and mental

2 health issues in our community.

3 Homelessness is permanently linked with
4 the criminal and juvenile justice system
5 already. Almost 50,000 people a year
6 enter the homeless shelter immediately
7 after exiting incarceration, and people
8 returning from jail or prison face
9 barriers to find stable housing,
10 employment due to legal restrictions
11 because discrimination against those with
12 criminal records. That's why I'm calling
13 you to use City resources to pass the
14 Emergency Housing Recovery Act. Fund the
15 Housing Trust and protect the Mayor's
16 Office of Labor. Pass the Emergency
17 Housing Act tomorrow.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Ma'am?

20 MS. FOUST: Do not increase the
21 Police budget next week.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Okay. Ma'am, can I ask you a question?
24 Is it okay if we follow up this with a
25 call to you so we can get more detail and

2 do a follow-up on the incident that you
3 had? I just didn't want to take it upon
4 ourselves to call you without you being
5 okay with that. Okay?

6 MS. FOUST: As long as y'all
7 don't try to take my identity or
8 something or try to take my identity and
9 they try and do something else with that.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.
11 This is me. Okay? I just want to make
12 sure that your issue gets adjusted. This
13 will be a very confidential phone
14 conversation. Okay?

15 MS. FOUST: Oh, yeah,
16 absolutely.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Okay. Thank you, ma'am. Thank you for
19 your testimony.

20 MS. FOUST: All right.

21 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
22 other speakers on the public comment
23 list, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

2 Okay. I want to proceed.

3 Okay. We will now consider the
4 resolutions on the Second Reading and
5 Final Passage Calendar.

6 Mr. Decker, if you can please
7 read the title of Resolution No. 200332.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 condemning any and all racist and
10 xenophobic rhetoric against Asian and
11 Asian American communities amid the rise
12 of COVID-19, and expressing appreciation
13 for the resilience, support, and
14 contributions of the City of
15 Philadelphia's Asian American and Chinese
16 American communities.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Oh.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Introduced by
22 Councilwoman Gym.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
24 Gym. I'm sorry. I'm getting these text
25 messages from individuals.

1 6/4/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Okay. I'm sorry. Apologies.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman Gym.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I move for
5 the adoption of the resolution.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
8 been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 ayes have it, and that resolution is
16 adopted.

17 I think, Councilwoman Gauthier,
18 you wanted to be recognized?

19 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: No.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Okay. People are sending me text
22 messages.

23 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Sorry
24 about that.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 6/4/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 That's okay. I'm sorry. A remote
3 environment can be very challenging.

4 We will now move to Resolution
5 200327.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
7 calling on the Mayor of Philadelphia to
8 formally appoint a provisional Chief
9 Recovery Officer position in the
10 Department of Finance responsible for the
11 management and administration of all
12 federal and state grants, or otherwise
13 categorized COVID-19 financial recovery
14 dollars, to the City of Philadelphia
15 until the Mayor and City Council do so
16 jointly determine that the position shall
17 be dissolved, introduced by Councilman
18 Domb.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
23 of the resolution.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 6/4/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Thank you. It's been moved and seconded
3 that the resolution be adopted.

4 All in favor say aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it, and the resolution is
11 adopted. Thank you.

12 Mr. Decker, do you have any
13 additional resolutions on today's
14 Calendar.

15 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
16 authorizing City Council's Committees on
17 Public Health and Human Services and
18 Commerce and Economic Development to
19 consider the City of Philadelphia's
20 revenue collection and regulatory
21 policies for businesses and property
22 owners to support economic recovery from
23 the COVID-19 crisis, introduced by
24 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
3 Quinones-Sanchez.

4 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
5 you, Council President. Before I call
6 for a motion to move, I just want to
7 thank the Administration and the Revenue
8 Commissioner for working with our office
9 around what does the smart restart
10 collection strategy look like and how do
11 we help our small businesses to make
12 decisions about reopening and payment
13 plans. This is especially important as
14 we weigh in on all of the decisions over
15 the next few weeks and particularly
16 tomorrow as we talk about renters and
17 landlords.

18 The ability of folks to get on
19 a payment plan with no interest, no
20 penalty, no deposit is huge. It could be
21 the difference between me deciding to
22 open up my business or not. So I want to
23 thank the Administration for working with
24 us on this and look forward to the
25 hearings as we help our small businesses

2 not only recover but thrive post the
3 pandemic.

4 Thank you. I move for the
5 motion.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
8 been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor?

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 ayes have it, and that resolution is
16 adopted.

17 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
18 recognizing May 2020 as Asian American
19 and Pacific Islander Heritage Month in
20 Philadelphia to commemorate the proud
21 heritage of Asian Americans and Pacific
22 Islanders and their vital contributions
23 that continue to enhance the City's
24 culture, economy, and the founding ideals
25 of independence and democracy, introduced

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

5 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
6 much, Council President. I move for the
7 adoption of the resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President,
20 does Councilman Jones want to be
21 recognized?

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes, he
23 does.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Councilman, before you go, can we

2 actually ask our technicians please try
3 to correct the feedback. There's a lot
4 of significant feedback and it's making
5 it difficult to hear members and I'm also
6 having challenges.

7 The Chair again recognizes
8 Councilman Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to
10 thank all of the advocates that weighed
11 in on Resolution No. 200217 [sic]. It's
12 important in today's climate that we at
13 least listen and hear each other's
14 concerns. Facts, not fiction or fears,
15 should rule public policy.

16 So I want to say that this
17 resolution's intention was to look at
18 where we are currently using this type of
19 technology, whether it's at airports when
20 people are going through terminals to be
21 identified, whether it is at our DVIC
22 down in South Philly where they are
23 maybe, maybe using it to identify people
24 on our streets. The point of the
25 resolution was we don't know how they are

2 using it, and we wanted to clarify how it
3 is being used. But I would like to offer
4 the withdrawal of Resolution No. 200217,
5 because we should hear advocacy.

6 I will simply ask these
7 questions during budget hearings to ask
8 the Commissioner in the Police Department
9 how we are using this type of technology
10 and if we should be using it at all.

11 So with that, I move for the
12 withdrawal of Resolution 200217.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Mr. President,
14 should I read the title?

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.
16 I think I have 267.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: It is 67,
18 sir.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you.

21 Yes, please read the title.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Resolution
23 200267, entitled a "Resolution calling on
24 the Philadelphia Police Department, as
25 well as state and federal law enforcement

2 officials, to establish clear boundaries
3 and issue transparent policies regarding
4 the use of facial recognition technology
5 to ensure that this technology does not
6 lead to racial biases in policing
7 practices and outcomes or infringe on

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 There's been a motion by
12 Councilman Jones to withdraw. Can I get
13 a second?

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
16 those in favor of the motion say aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Those opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCILMAN JONES:

22 Mr. President, may I be recognized after
23 the vote?

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
25 right. The motion to withdraw Resolution

1 6/4/20 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 No. 200267 has been approved. It is
3 approved, and 200267 will be withdrawn.

4 The Chair again recognizes
5 Councilman Jones.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to
7 thank my colleagues for their patience.
8 We're going through a whole lot today,
9 but I've learned in the last ten days
10 that being loud doesn't mean right. You
11 have to listen more than you talk, and at
12 the end of the day, if we communicate
13 with each other, we can create greater
14 understanding. So with that spirit, we
15 withdrew that bill. I'm going to simply
16 ask the question in the hearings for
17 Police to find out what the boundaries
18 are and whether that technology should be
19 used.

20 So I'm thankful for the
21 advocates to express themselves, but it's
22 better for us to communicate to get
23 better understanding of each other's
24 intentions.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 Mr. Decker, are there any
6 additional resolutions?

7 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

11 Thank you very much.

12 We concluded that. Prior to
13 recognizing members regarding speeches, I
14 will note for the record at this time
15 that we will use the chat feature
16 available in Microsoft Teams to allow the
17 members to signify that they wish to be
18 recognized. In order to comply with the
19 Sunshine Act, the chat feature must only
20 be used for this purpose.

21 This said, are there any
22 speeches on the part of the minority?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Any
25 speeches on the part of the majority?

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Oh. Oh.

4 Oh.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
8 much, Council President, and thank you,
9 Majority Leader.

10 Just briefly. Understood.
11 Nothing speaks louder than the video of
12 George Floyd. That video has been seen
13 around the world. That was a bad police
14 officer surrounded by other negligent and
15 other bad police officers. That was in
16 Minneapolis.

17 We have our issues in
18 Philadelphia, and no one knows that
19 better than all of us here and those in
20 our law enforcement community. We need
21 good police.

22 There are 158 murders as of
23 today. The murder rate in Philadelphia
24 is up 21 percent. Attempted murder,
25 possible murder through aggravated

assault is up 20 percent. So, yes, some very important issues have been raised about better policing and addressing inequality and police brutality. All of that is important, but the people on the front line and, yes, education, jobs, but right now, right today, we have been dealing with, and especially our District Council people, have been dealing with the epidemic of murder in our city, and that has to be dealt with, and we do deal with that and people need to be protected. So the people in the trenches, on the front line putting themselves at risk are our law enforcement and our first responders and people like Malik Aziz and Terry Starks, and OG Law and others who go right in there and intervene.

So I want people to understand that it's not simply a matter of reducing the effectiveness or ability of the police. It is a matter of ensuring good policing, responsive, respectful, within

2 the law, but we also have to deal with
3 these issues as well.

4 Thank you, Council President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 I believe next up we have
8 Councilman Jones. Did you want to be
9 recognized?

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. We've all been through a
12 lot. I want to recognize two of our
13 members. All of us have been through a
14 lot but two that I've got an opportunity
15 to look at up close and personal and in
16 crisis, and pressure will either bust
17 pipes or make diamonds. Two diamonds I
18 want to recognize are Councilmember
19 Gauthier and Councilmember Katherine
20 Gilmore Richardson.

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Hear, hear.

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Both of
23 them -- I'm used to this. I'm used to
24 people being so wrong that they've
25 convinced themselves they're right, but

they are new to this from this way. And I've watched bravery from Member Gauthier down at 52nd and Market Street where she was dealing with tear gas. I know she did not sign up for that, but you faced it down. You represented the community well, and I have to put that on the record.

Katherine Gilmore Richardson we all know from her staffing days, but in the heat of it, in the darkest moments of some of the looting, she called me up and asked me, Councilman, you ready to go ride out to two businesses on Haverford Avenue? We're going to stand in front of the businesses and stop the looters.

Mr. President, I said, no, we not, and she was disappointed that we didn't get to go, but the very next day she had called on her sorority and fraternity brothers to come out, where you joined us and other members of Council joined us at 52nd and Parkside where that mall had been decimated and

2 had her broom and was cleaning up.

3 I was proud of all of our
4 members that showed up for that, but I
5 was very proud of our new members that
6 stepped up to the plate in a time of
7 crisis, did not break, and were credits
8 to this body.

9 So I wanted to recognize them
10 publicly. I expect that from you,
11 President Clarke. I expect that from
12 leadership and members that are seasoned
13 veterans, but when the new class steps up
14 like that, I want to recognize that and
15 thank you publicly for being members.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Green.

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Councilman Green, are you still with us?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If

5 somebody can reach out. I know he's

6 having challenges with his technology

7 today. In the meantime, I'll go to

8 Councilwoman Gauthier.

9 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank

10 you so much for the recognition,

11 Councilmember Jones. It's been a rough

12 couple of days. Thank you.

13 I'm sorry.

14 I wanted to say -- I wanted to

15 thank all of the advocates who called in

16 today and also all of the people who have

17 been making their voices heard across the

18 City on this conversation about policing

19 and what it looks like in Philadelphia

20 and across the country. I think the

21 removal of the Rizzo statue, the removal

22 of the Rizzo mural were great symbolic

23 gestures. They're signals that we're

24 listening, but I think we need to go

25 deeper than that to really get at the

root of the anger and the pain that's been displayed over the past few days in this city. And what's at the root is structural racism. And it's never been more obvious to me that at this moment in time, we need to prioritize investment in our black communities and we need to devote resources to the things beyond policing that keep people safe and thriving, and that's investments in our schools, investments in safe, affordable housing, our parks, our recreation centers, our libraries. Those are the things that keep people out of the criminal justice system.

I think we've been taking a very narrow view of what public safety means in this city, and I hope we can -- I hope that this is a time to expand that view.

And so I just want to commend everyone that made their voices heard today, and I want to say to my colleagues that now is the time for us to ask

2 ourselves if it is equitable for us to be
3 increasing the Police budget by \$14
4 million while we're cutting many, many
5 things that can really help black and
6 brown people in this city.

7 I think I've been -- I think
8 most folks would know my answer to that,
9 and my answer to that is no, but I look
10 forward to having a discussion with my
11 colleagues as this budget cycle goes on.

12 And thank you so much. Thank
13 you for the recognition. You caught me a
14 little bit off guard and made me tear up
15 over here. Thanks.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you, Councilwoman. It's always
18 good to see the human side of every
19 individual.

20 Did we connect with Councilman
21 Green yet?

22 Councilman Green, we're trying
23 to...

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: We still
25 can't hear you, Derek.

3 Okay. All right. Before I call on
4 Councilman Jones, my colleagues, as you
5 all know, we have a lot of work to do.
6 The pace of our work obviously is
7 accelerated by --

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thomas.
9 Thomas. Isaiah Thomas.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Okay.

12 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I'm here.
13 Can I be recognized?

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Councilman, I'm sorry. I'm not -- for
16 whatever reason, today this is not
17 working.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:
19 Councilwoman Bass, Mr. President, and
20 Isaiah Thomas are in queue.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Okay. Thank you. For some reason I'm
23 not getting it on my phone. I don't know
24 why, but, Councilwoman, who is next?
25 I'll ask you.

3 Councilwoman Bass is next.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Councilwoman Bass.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 Thank you, Councilwoman Parker.

9 I just wanted to make comments.

10 It's been quite a week here in
11 Philadelphia and there's been a lot
12 that's been said. There's been a lot
13 that's been done. I think we all woke up
14 on Monday or over the weekend, but
15 culminating really on Monday and woke up
16 as if, what just happened here? What
17 just happened in this city? What
18 happened in our city? And as a lifelong
19 Philadelphian, I remember back in the
20 day, as they say, when my mother told me
21 about Ridge Avenue, and she talked about
22 the civil rights movement in Philadelphia
23 and the damage that was done to Ridge
24 Avenue, which was a lot of African
25 American shops and businesses, and the

damage that was done that has never been repaired to this day, never been repaired.

And so I am just glad that we recognize that people are frustrated, people are upset. There's never an excuse for looting or vandalism or damage to property, but I actually really wanted to speak on a headline that was in the Philadelphia Inquirer on Tuesday, which said Buildings Matter Too, and it was a discussion on the importance of the buildings and architecture that was damaged as a result of the riots. And let me be absolutely clear. I never want to see damage done, because as I said about Ridge Avenue, it takes a long time, especially when you're in our neighborhood, it takes a long time for us to get those properties back online. Hopefully we'll be able to get them online sooner rather than later. We're all working really hard on that, but at the same time, to suggest that a building

2 matters as much as a human matters I just
3 found so inappropriate, so divisive, so
4 racially insensitive, not just along race
5 lines, along class lines as well. I just
6 think that that's something that never
7 should have been printed in the first
8 place. And I understand that there was
9 an apology, but the apology is after the
10 fact and, again, after the fact that the
11 damage is done in terms of where you
12 really stand on this issue.

13 Buildings don't matter too when
14 it comes to lives. Lives matter first,
15 and you have to get your priorities
16 straight.

17 So I just wanted to speak out
18 on that, Mr. President. Thank you very
19 much.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 I believe we have Councilman
23 Thomas next.

24 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Can you
25 hear me, Council President?

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

3 Okay.

4 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: That's not
5 my background, but I first want to start
6 by also recognizing my colleagues.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Councilman, can you speak a little
9 louder.

10 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Can you
11 hear me better now?

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 That's much better.

14 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I want to
15 start by recognizing my colleagues and
16 folks in Council who I've been on the
17 ground with the last couple days, and
18 everybody -- you know, when you're doing
19 this work, there's not a lot of time to
20 post on social media and to communicate
21 to the public what's going on. So I know
22 myself and Councilmember Parker as well
23 as Councilmember Brooks, we spent
24 multiple days cleaning up areas and also
25 helping to avoid confrontations.

2 Councilmember Parker knows exactly what
3 I'm talking about, and I appreciate her
4 being so courageous, as well as
5 Councilmember Derek Green, who has been
6 out there with us cleaning and taking
7 care of the Northwest section of the
8 City, as well as Councilmember Bass, who
9 I've worked with and I've been in the
10 streets with delivering food and helping
11 people in their time of need.

12 So I appreciate all of you
13 guys, and as a freshman member of
14 Council, I think that it's important that
15 I take a minute to say that -- and I want
16 to take my Council hat off for a second
17 and just put on my humanity hat. You
18 know, I came into Council as a person who
19 is very proactive, literally and
20 figuratively. So when I think about what
21 I'm -- I'm like, man, I'm going to come
22 into Council and we're going to really
23 wreck things and I'm going to make sure
24 that the black agenda is there.

25 I have been overwhelmed and

overjoyed by my colleagues and their
advocacy for black folks and black people
before Coronavirus, during Coronavirus,
before the unfortunate tragedy that we're
facing right now with Brother Jones and
even during this time right now. And,
again, I'm taking my Council hat off, and
I'm one of the few people on Council who
fit the description. When I see these
images and I see things that happen, I
see myself in that, and I hear the pain
from my colleagues who also not only some
of them see themselves, but see their
children, their grandchildren, their
aunts, their uncles, their cousins. We
feel that pain, and we've been doing that
advocacy before it was the cool thing to
do. Prior to all to this stuff
happening, Council had already talked
about what police reform looks like. Now
we have an opportunity to really move on
some of those things.

So I just wanted to put that
out there, because I know there are a lot

of people who are questioning the integrity of members of Council. I know there are a lot of people who are questioning whether or not we are really for people of color or whether or not we really want to see change in Philadelphia for people of color.

As a young black man who has been pulled over by police, who knows what it feels like to have your hands put down your pants, who you know firsthand, Council President, I had to call you last year to help me out with an incident involving police, and he was right there to help me out. We understand the issue and we recognize that this is an opportunity for police reforms, and we're going to advocate for that like we have been doing.

I'm sorry, Council President. I know I was a little longer than I normally am, but there's a lot of rumors out there and misinformation that's been communicated that's not accurate and

reflective of the work that this body has been doing. And for me, I know that I'm in pain when I see them images, but imagine how much more the pain is when people tell us that we not for this, when we've been fighting for this. Imagine my pain when I got to deal with not just the images, but now people saying that -- people telling us what we not about, when I ran for this issue. This is why I'm here at the table, is to be able to have a chance to fight for this issue and communicate our concern, and I know that there are people on City Council who are just as passionate, if not more passionate, as me as well as the people who are marching in the streets. The folks who are in the streets, you're doing it your way, and we respect that, but there cannot be change without change in legislation, and we are all sacrificing to be here to make sure that that legislative change can take place.

I'm done. Thank you, Council

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. Thank
5 you for your commitment before and after
6 your tenure, and I know you're going to
7 be one of those voices for a long, long
8 time to come in the City Council of
9 Philadelphia, and we appreciate you.

10 I believe that Councilwoman
11 Quinones-Sanchez is up next.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

13 Councilman Green, Mr. President.
14 Councilmember Green.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Okay. So is Councilwoman Sanchez not
17 teed up?

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: She was
19 commenting on a comment that Councilman
20 Jones was making. She didn't request to
21 speak.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Okay. Councilman Green.

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Council
25 President, can you hear me?

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
3 sir.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Okay. Thank
5 you.

6 We've had a very difficult week
7 here in this city, in our state, in our
8 nation, and I received a number of calls
9 from people and text messages asking, how
10 can I help? What can I do to help deal
11 with this issue? And so I took a moment
12 to think about that question, and my
13 response to that question is, are you
14 committed to making lasting change in the
15 African American community?

16 But, Derek, I marched, I
17 protest regarding the senseless killing
18 of George Floyd and the concern regarding
19 Breonna Taylor and Ahmaud Arbery. And I
20 thank you for that, but my question again
21 is, are you committed to making lasting
22 change in the African American community?

23 And people say, Derek, well, I
24 joined others to call for the removal of
25 the Rizzo statue and I sent e-mails

regarding the Mayor's budget proposal.

And I thank you for the advocacy, but are you committed to making lasting change in the African American community?

But, Derek -- and this came up in Councilmember Bass, and I thank her for making our point. People said to me, I called the Inquirer regarding the insensitive article entitled Buildings Matter Too. Thank you for that, but are you committed to making lasting change in the African American community?

And when we reflect on the killing of George Floyd and we think about Breonna Taylor and Ahmaud Arbery, we must remember with the George Floyd situation, this tragedy started with a man just trying to make a purchase. When we think about the disparate impact of COVID-19 on the black and brown communities and the heroic work of the Black Doctors COVID-19 Consortium, we know that people of color do not have access to adequate healthcare.

2 All of these issues are
3 connected to poverty and the historic
4 economic injustice and inequities of
5 African Americans. In this city, African
6 Americans make up 44 percent of the
7 population, but we do not represent 44
8 percent of the wealth of this city.

9 As we've seen with Rodney King,
10 Trayvon Martin, and now George Floyd,
11 Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery,
12 protests will go on and rallies will go
13 on, but it will also fade into time.

14 So I ask again, are you
15 committed to making lasting change by
16 making an investment in the African
17 American community? If you represent an
18 organization, are you committed to buying
19 44 percent of your goods and services
20 from the African American community or
21 black doctors, black lawyers, black banks
22 like United Bank?

23 If you are an individual and
24 you've been part of all these protests
25 and rallies, are you committed to buying

2 44 percent of your goods and services
3 from the African American community, from
4 a black contractor, a black realtor, a
5 black insurance agent?

6 Although we have made progress
7 in civil rights, we have not really
8 addressed the historic economic injustice
9 in our city, in our nation.

10 So I ask once again, are you
11 committed to making an investment to make
12 lasting change in the African American
13 community?

14 Thank you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Well said. Thank you so
17 much.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Squilla.

20 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thanks,
21 Council President, and thank you for your
22 leadership during these times, and
23 especially the last week or so, it's been
24 a challenge and -- I'm going to put you
25 on mute one second, Council President.

2 (Pause.)

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

4 There was a lot of background noise
5 there. I apologize.

6 We know as we work through this
7 together, we still have so much to learn,
8 and I think sometimes when you're an
9 elected official, you think you know
10 everything and you're out there making
11 decisions and doing things, and obviously
12 we have to start by listening.

13 I think one thing we do
14 sometimes is, we react and we say things
15 and do things without listening, and I
16 think if we learn anything from what
17 happened over the last week, is to take
18 our time, listen to people, see what
19 hurts, see what challenges those are, and
20 then work together with them and us to
21 come together to make effective change
22 that will last forever. And little
23 tokens of we hear you and we did this and
24 then we can move on, it's not going to
25 work. It doesn't work, and then all what

happens is we end up at the same place again.

And so I think if we could come up together with ways that we can make an announcement to say these are the things we're going to do to effectuate change in our system, in the City of Philadelphia, and we're going to commit to these things as a body, we could really make this happen. And we can make it happen, and people could see it and they can hold us accountable for that and may be able to go to those ballot boxes and they could vote. And I think that's the most important thing. If we don't do that, then they should vote for somebody else and they should hold us accountable for all our decisions. And whether it's affordable housing, is it money for our Housing Trust Fund, is it access to jobs, is it raising minimum wage, all the things that we can do as City Council to bring -- to lift people up so that they become self-sufficient is something we

2 need to do.

3 And sometimes, you know, we
4 talk a lot and we don't listen, and maybe
5 we should be quiet for a little while and
6 continue to listen and then come up with
7 a plan that really works, and I believe
8 if we do that, we'll get through this
9 together and we'll be stronger and we'll
10 be a better city.

11 So thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman. Well said.

14 Councilwoman Parker, I believe.

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes.

16 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President.

17 Mr. President, let me just start in just
18 noting that there's an international
19 author and activist by the name of Wael
20 Ghonim, and he reminds the world of a
21 phrase that he often states and he says,
22 "The power of the people is greater than
23 the people in power." The power of the
24 people is greater than the people in
25 power. And as we've seen the activity

taking place across the nation with people from all walks of life expressing their outrage and concern regarding the deaths and murders -- and we're going to call it what it is, the murders -- of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor -- and just for the record, all of those names are people who we don't know because their stories did not make it into the mainstream media -- we see that activity.

But I have to say this for the record. Councilman Green, thank you so very much for your argument about the economic impact, because I want to say specifically to the black community, the African American community, I am pleased to see so many people from all walks of life in our nation and particularly our city stand up to talk about the police reforms that we need, and I do think we will achieve them. But even more than that, if we're truly interested in closing the gap between the have's and

the have not's and giving African American people, black people and other brown people access to what Councilman Squilla called the opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency, we can't do that without our willingness to share a piece of the economic pie.

So I hope that I hear people as committed and persistent when it comes to talking about who are the firms that are benefiting from doing business with the City of Philadelphia, who is getting contracts, and has historically, to do business in the City of Philadelphia. I hope I hear the same fervor and passion when we talk about boards and commissions that this Council has been talking about for years and the need for diversity and inclusion, because sometimes around some social issues, we will get a groundswell of support and unity, but when it comes time to talk about dividing the economic pie, sometimes the voices dwindle.

So I'm looking forward to

2 working with each and every one of you,
3 my colleagues, to do what we do in our
4 space, and that is to proffer legislative
5 initiatives that will help us do exactly
6 what we just described. And each and
7 every one of you -- and I mean this from
8 the bottom of my heart -- all 17 of you
9 are doing your best and continue to move
10 forward to make sure that we provide
11 access to opportunities for all
12 Philadelphians, and I'm damn proud to
13 serve as a part of this body with each
14 and every one of you and I look forward
15 to us delivering results and not jargon
16 for the benefit of the people.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20 I think that is all the
21 members, so I'll say a couple of words,
22 although I'm not supposed to speak from
23 the podium, the podium as it is today,
24 but we are in a new normal.

25 I just want to say how proud I

am to serve with all of you. Like Councilwoman Parker said, I know firsthand what all of you do and the passion that you bring to this job, the commitment, the dedication, be it industry, in City Hall, in your neighborhood, but the simple reality is is that members of Council are expected to wear multiple hats, and that's a good thing, because you need to have a perspective of all people, all communities, all aspects of what it is that's going on in the world today, and sometimes that pace quickens and it slows down. The simple reality is is that Councilmembers are -- people want to see us be involved in things that may just be symbolic for the sole purpose of giving people symbolism, because in some instances, symbolism is a good thing. It shows people what you're about. Some instances being involved in action, be it a protest, is a good thing, and members do get involved in those issues, but as

2 elected officials, we're charged with
3 something else, and we're charged with
4 ensuring that everything, all these
5 Councilmembers talked about today, is
6 delivering the resources to the people
7 that need.

8 We have to make difficult
9 decisions in this particular time given
10 our fiscal situation, but at the end of
11 the day, as those difficult decisions get
12 made, we can't forget what we're about,
13 and we move forward on a number of very
14 important initiatives that would have
15 addressed those people before the COVID
16 hit us, but we can't give up on that
17 particular issue. We've got to proceed.

18 Tomorrow, tomorrow -- and it
19 will be some sort of an announcement
20 today put out -- we will be laying out a
21 program that addresses, in a substantive
22 way, an initiative that we think will be
23 a down payment, so to speak, on what we
24 will be doing, tangible commitments as it
25 relates to making sure that we address

the ills. Some will be legislative, some will be budgetary, some will be laying out leadership in terms of moving forward. There will be a conversation and a partnership with all members of government, because the City of Philadelphia can't do it alone, right? There are several branches of government, both executive and legislative. We got to work together, and what I don't want us to see -- please, do not let people divide us. We already have one person that's doing that, and that's the strategy and it's all political, but we cannot let people divide us. Unified we can go to wherever we want to go. And I genuinely believe that as a person and a member that's been around through a lot of different administrations, a lot of different challenges, if we work together, we stay together, we stay focused on the prize, and the prize is making sure that everybody has an opportunity. And I mean everybody,

2 right? I don't care what your background
3 was or how much you were prepared or
4 where you just got released from, you
5 should still have an opportunity.

6 So tomorrow we will be rolling
7 out what I believe and the members of
8 Council believe to be some substantive

10 move this city forward in a meaningful
11 way.

12 So, again, I want to thank all
13 of you all so much for your continued
14 commitment. I love you all, even when
15 every now and then I get a little mad at
16 one of you all, and I don't show it to
17 you, because I'm the Council President,
18 I'm not supposed to show emotion. I get
19 that, right? But the reality is that I
20 really do genuinely love you all. You
21 are my Council family. I see you all way
22 more, particularly in these times, than I
23 see my real family.

24 So with that, I want to
25 recognize Councilman Jones for a motion

2 to adjourn.

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
5 adjourned until Thursday, June 11th, 2020

9 Thank you. It has been moved and
10 properly seconded that Council stand
11 adjourned until Thursday, June 11th, 2020
12 at 10:00 a.m.

13 All those in favor say aye.

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it. The motion carries.

20 Thank you all very much. God
21 bless you and I love you.
