2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started. Thank you
7 for your patience.

8 We've established our quorum,
9 so we're going to have our invocation,
10 and to give our invocation this morning,
11 the Chair recognizes Bishop Luke Zhoba of
12 the Ukrainian Orthodox Church. He is

7 CHIEF CLERK: From the Mayor to
8 the President and members of the Council

10 to advise you that on March 15, 2023, I
11 signed all of the bills which were passed
12 by Council at its session on March 2,
13 2023, except Bill No. 220244, which I am
14 returning without my signature.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair thanks the Chief Clerk.

17 At this time, the Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Thomas.

19 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good
20 morning, Council President. Good
21 morning, colleagues. Good morning to the
22 public.

23 I just wanted to take a moment
24 to acknowledge some very special young
25 people that are here in City Council

2 today, a lot of them here for the first
3 time being in City Hall.

4 The first group of young people
5 I would like to recognize is the
6 basketball team as well as the coach and
7 athletic director at Roman Catholic.

13 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I want to
14 take a moment to congratulate Roman
15 Catholic, not just the current team
16 that's here today for winning the
17 Catholic League Championship, they had a
18 very tough win in overtime last night
19 representing the City of Philadelphia in
20 the PIAA state playoffs, but overall this
21 is the team that was 17th in the entire
22 country. They were ranked No. 17, the
23 17th best team in the entire country this
24 year.

5 arguably one of the greatest basketball
6 programs in the history of the City of

11 2010, and they could not have done it
12 without their coach, Coach McNesby, as
13 well as their AD Brian Haas.

20 to the young men of Roman Catholic, and
21 please continue to represent the City of
22 Philadelphia well.

23 Another guest that we have here
24 today that I would like to recognize is

19 40 years to come from a Philadelphia
20 Public League school and to earn a full

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

17 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman
18 Johnson offers one bill and two
19 resolutions, entitled "An ordinance
20 establishing parking regulations in the
21 vicinity of: Chadwick Street and
22 Washington Avenue; South 26th Street and
23 Bainbridge Street."

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Referred to committee.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
7 week's Calendar.

8 CHIEF CLERK: And a
9 non-privileged resolution urging the
10 Pennsylvania General Assembly to act on
11 Governor Shapiro's call, in his 2023
12 budget address, to raise the state's
13 minimum wage to \$15 and to deliver a
14 living wage for workers in the
15 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
19 Council President. I just want to speak
20 briefly on the resolution that I
21 introduced.

22 President Clarke and
23 colleagues, today I'm introducing this
24 resolution supporting Governor Josh
25 Shapiro's call to raise the state's

2 minimum wage from \$7.25 an hour to \$15 an
3 hour. It is totally long overdue.

4 - - -
5 (Applause.)

6 - - -

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: As of this
8 moment, Pennsylvania is one of 20 states
9 nationwide where the minimum wage is no
10 higher than the federal minimum wage of
11 \$7.25 per hour, which was set 14 years
12 ago in 2009.

13 Every state that borders
14 Pennsylvania has already raised its
15 minimum wage. The minimum wage in West
16 Virginia is \$8.25. It is \$10.10 in Ohio.
17 It's \$11.75 in Delaware, \$13.25 in
18 Maryland, \$14.13 in New Jersey, and
19 \$14.20 in New York.

20 All of those states - Delaware,
21 Maryland, New Jersey, and New York - have
22 plans in place to continue gradually
23 raising their minimum wages until they
24 reach \$15 per hour in the coming years.

25 According to a report by the

2 Pennsylvania Department of Labor and
3 Industry, two percent of Pennsylvania
4 hourly wage workers were paid at or below
5 the federal minimum wage in 2022, while
6 nearly 13 percent were paid between \$7.25
7 per hour and \$12 per hour.

8 The bottom line is that nearly
9 one million people in Pennsylvania make
10 less than \$15 per hour last year, and
11 that is one million too many, in my view.

12 According to the Pennsylvania
13 Department of Labor and Industry, nearly
14 half of Pennsylvania minimum wage workers
15 last year were in the food and drink
16 industry. People who are employed in the
17 retail trade and educational services
18 also make up a significant share of
19 minimum wage workers in Pennsylvania.

20 Here in Philadelphia those
21 working below minimum wage are our
22 friends and neighbors.

23 Philadelphia is the poorest big
24 city in America. It's time for us to
25 move the needle in poverty and eliminate

2 the stigma of carrying this title.

3 The move by --

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: This move
8 by Governor Josh Shapiro is the right
9 thing to do, and I call on the General
10 Assembly to approve legislation for a \$15
11 an hour minimum wage.

12 Thank you very much, Council

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you very much, Councilman. I think
19 we concur.

20 That will be on next week's

24 Philadelphia Code by adding a new section
25 prohibiting the parking or maintaining of

9 the community, and for her exemplary work
10 throughout the City of Philadelphia, and
11 outstanding leadership among women.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

16 2800 block of North 22nd Street to

10 reports three bills with a favorable
11 recommendation.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you.

14 Mr. Decker, please read the
15 report.

16 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
17 and members of the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, the Committee on Finance,
19 to which was referred Bill No. 230079,
20 entitled "An ordinance constituting the
21 Twenty-Seventh Supplemental Ordinance to
22 the Restated General Water and Wastewater
23 Revenue Bond Ordinance of 1989, as
24 supplemented; authorizing the Bond
25 Committee to issue and sell one or more

2 series or subseries of tax-exempt or
3 taxable water and wastewater revenue
4 bonds and revenue refunding bonds;
5 authorizing agreements to provide credit
6 enhancement or payment or liquidity

9 such Bonds shall bear interest at fixed
10 or variable rates; and determining the
11 sufficiency of pledged Project Revenues";
12 and

13 Bill No. 230104, entitled "An
14 ordinance approving the amendment of the
15 Fiscal Year 2023 Capital Budget providing
16 for expenditures for the capital purposes
17 of the Philadelphia Gas Works, including
18 the supplying of funds in connection
19 therewith, and acknowledging the receipt
20 of the Revised Forecast of Capital
21 Budgets for Fiscal Years 2024 through
22 2028"; and

23 Bill No. 230105, entitled "An
24 ordinance authorizing the extension of
25 the program authorized by Bill No. 181043

2 under which advance approval is given to
3 the Philadelphia Facilities Management
4 Corporation to enter into certain
5 contracts and transactions arising
6 thereunder for the purchase, storage,

10 Works," respectfully reports it has
11 considered the same and returns the
12 attached bills to Council with a
13 favorable recommendation.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 The Chair again recognizes
17 Councilman Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I move that the rules of
20 Council be suspended as to permit the
21 first reading this day of Bill Nos.
22 230079, 230104, and 230105.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. It has been moved and

2 properly seconded that the rules of
3 Council be suspended so as to permit

6 All those in favor indicate by
7 saying aye.

8 (Aye.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and these bills will be
14 placed on our First Reading Calendar
15 today.

16 The Chair now recognizes
17 Councilwoman Bass for a report from the
18 Committee on Parks, Recreation and
19 Cultural Affairs.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. The Committee on Parks,
22 Recreation and Cultural Affairs reports
23 two bills with a favorable
24 recommendation.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/16/23 - STATED - REPORTS

2 Thank you.

3 Mr. Decker, please read that
4 report.

5 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on
6 Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs,
7 to which was referred Bill No. 220914,
8 entitled "An ordinance renaming and
9 designating the property commonly
10 referred to as the Hillside Recreation
11 Center, located at 201 Fountain Street,
12 as the 'Lonnie Cohen Recreation Center'
13 in the City of Philadelphia"; and

14 Bill No. 220972, entitled "An
15 ordinance amending an Ordinance (Bill No.
16 877), approved September 16, 1994, by
17 amending an exhibit thereto, in order to
18 increase the limit of the amount of
19 funding any entity may receive in any
20 fiscal year from the Philadelphia
21 Activities Fund," respectfully reports it
22 has considered the same and returns the
23 attached bills to Council with a
24 favorable recommendation.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/16/23 - STATED - REPORTS

2 Thank you.

3 The Chair again recognizes
4 Councilwoman Bass.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I move that the rules of
7 Council be suspended so as to permit
8 first reading this day of Bills No.
9 220914 and 220972.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you. It has been moved and
13 properly seconded that the rules of
14 Council be suspended so as to permit
15 first reading this day of Bills No.
16 220914 and 220972.

17 All in favor indicate by saying
18 aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it, and these bills will be
25 placed on our First Reading Calendar

1 3/16/23 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING
2 today.

3 That concludes our reports from
4 committee, and the next order of business
5 is the consideration of the Calendar.

6 I note that the bills just
7 reported from committee with a suspension
8 of the rules have been deemed to have had
9 their first reading. They will be placed
10 on our Second Reading and Final Passage
11 Calendar at our next session of Council.

12 As there are no additional
13 bills on our First Reading Calendar, the
14 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the
15 purpose of calling up bills on the Second
16 Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. The following bills and
19 resolutions are being brought up from
20 Second Reading and Final Passage
21 Calendars today: Nos. 230193, 230194,
22 230199, and 220517-AA. All other bills
23 are being, and resolutions, are being
24 held.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/16/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you so much, Councilman.

3 Before we consider the
4 resolutions and bills, we will have our
5 public comment session. Your public
6 comment session will go as follows:

7 Your comment must concern
8 matters on the Second Reading and Final
9 Passage Calendar for possible action in
10 today's session.

11 All speakers must sign up in
12 order to testify. If you have not
13 already done so, you may sign up at the
14 table outside of the Council Chambers
15 with the Sergeant-At-Arms.

16 Once you have signed up, you
17 will be called in the order in which your
18 name appears on the sign-up sheet. Today
19 it looks like we have decent
20 circumstances. You will have three
21 minutes to testify. So please adjust
22 your testimony to reflect a two-minute
23 [sic] time limit.

24 When your name is called, you
25 will go to the podium in the middle of

2 the Council Chambers. There's a device
3 on that podium. When the light turns
4 green on the podium, it will be your time
5 to speak. When the light turns yellow,
6 you will have 30 seconds to conclude your
7 remarks. And when the light turns red,
8 we'd ask that you please adhere to our
9 guidelines and conclude your remarks.

10 We appreciate your anticipated
11 cooperation with the guidelines
12 surrounding the public comment.

13 I must say for the record in
14 the event that there is repetitious
15 comment on the same subject matter, we do
16 have the right within the guidelines of
17 our rules to limit that repetitious
18 comment. It doesn't appear to be the
19 case today.

20 So with that being said,
21 Mr. Decker, will you please call the
22 first name on the list.

23 And as always, we really
24 appreciate your willingness to come down
25 to participate in your government in

2 action. Thank you so much.

3 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
4 today, Mr. President, is Abdul Muhammad.
5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Mr. Muhammad, Abdul Muhammad?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Move
10 on to the next name.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Kate Parker, commenting on 230194.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning. Please proceed.

16 MS. PARKER: My name is Kate
17 Parker. Thank you, and thank you,
18 Council President and members of City
19 Council, for the opportunity to be here
20 today to comment on Resolution 230194.

21 My name is Kate Parker. I've
22 had the great pleasure of working with
23 and knowing some of you. I work at the
24 Defender Association of Philadelphia and
25 I serve as the Policy Director there.

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2 It's a very real privilege to work at an
3 organization that actually pre-dates the
4 passage of Gideon.

5 Our office has been
6 representing indigent people charged with
7 crimes two years prior to the federal
8 case in 1938 that established the right
9 to counsel in federal cases. And so it's
10 with that long legacy and history that
11 I'm here today on behalf of our Chief
12 Defender, Keisha Hudson, who offers both
13 her regrets that she can't be here, she's
14 at another Gideon event representing our
15 office, and so she asked me to come here
16 today to both thank you for your generous
17 recognition of the value of our work and
18 your ongoing recognition of the role we
19 play in the legal system and in
20 protecting some of the most fundamental
21 rights of democracy for the City of
22 Philadelphia.

23 We also thank you for your
24 financial investment in our office. The
25 right to counsel is meaningless if

2 counsel cannot adequately represent the
3 people who are standing in front and
4 charged with crimes every day.

5 More importantly, we also thank
6 you for the opportunity for meaningful
7 partnership with this body, for inviting
8 us to join in task forces, to seek our
9 input in interventions that address some
10 of the root causes of community crime and
11 violence, and in allowing us to really
12 support the work that some of you are
13 doing that has national implications, the
14 local policy work that has ramifications
15 across the nation and helps improve the
16 quality of justice for all
17 Philadelphians.

18 It's hard to imagine a world
19 without Gideon. It's hard to imagine
20 that anybody would be asked to navigate
21 the criminal justice system without a
22 professional attorney appointed to
23 represent them, and we thank you for
24 recognizing the important and fundamental
25 role that we play.

2 Obviously an adequate defense
3 is not a luxury, particularly now,
4 particularly when the stakes are so very
5 high for so many people, and the
6 collateral consequences of the conviction
7 have ripple effects for generations and
8 impact not just individuals, not just
9 their families but entire blocks and
10 neighborhoods throughout this city.

11 There was no guarantee, this
12 was not like a historical inevitability,
13 right? What's important to remember
14 about Gideon is like within the last five
15 years, it's already been challenged by
16 two seated Supreme Court justices. There
17 was no historical inevitability.

18 And so thank you for your time.
19 Into every era there's an opportunity to
20 improve the law for the betterment of
21 mankind, and we're proud to share this
22 day with our hubs.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

25 - - -

2 (Appause.)

3 - - -

4 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
5 is Mike Morak.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
8 morning.

9 MR. MORAK: Good morning,
10 everybody. I have the honor of speaking
11 to you about the accomplishments of Miss
12 Candy. You guys call her Viola Owens. I
13 call her Miss Candy out here. I really
14 appreciate you guys just taking the time
15 to honor a wonderful woman that has meant
16 a lot to me in my lifespan.

17 Her work has made a significant
18 impact on the City of Philadelphia, and
19 I'm thrilled to share a few of her
20 achievements.

21 She embodies what it means to
22 take care of your community and
23 neighborhood and the countless hours
24 making an impact when no one is looking.
25 After founding the Daniel Eric Rumph II

2 Foundation in 2005, she's been a pillar
3 in the neighborhood being a "go to"
4 person, focusing on heartstrings for
5 young athletes, providing AEDs for local
6 organizations and sports teams, clothing
7 and feeding thousands annually,
8 transporting those in need to doctor's
9 appointments, to feed them, to pick up
10 food, making sure that she's a community
11 organizer as well as a community impact
12 leader.

13 And one of the best
14 descriptions that I can give her is a
15 neighborhood mom, you know, somebody that
16 anybody can call for anything that they
17 need.

18 As you guys know on City
19 Council, this can be a frustrating
20 process for many people in Philadelphia
21 that don't understand the inner workings.
22 You know, she's one of those people that
23 walks down here, waits in line, and makes
24 sure that things get done for people that
25 get frustrated with the process and don't

2 understand how City Council may work or
3 the City of Philadelphia works.

4 So as I like to call her as a
5 second mom to me, who is somebody that
6 I've known for 25-plus years, you know,
7 she's an incredible woman and she
8 exemplifies everything that a
9 Philadelphian really is. So a mom to
10 many, and she's also a major resource to
11 the City.

12 Thank you, Councilperson Bass,
13 and also City Council just for
14 recognizing her today, you know,
15 acknowledging all of her work that she
16 has done in the shadows. You know, it's
17 an honor for me to stand here and support
18 her and helping her save the next bright
19 star.

20 Thank you.

21 - - -

22 (Applause.)

23 - - -

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony. We

2 appreciate it.

3 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
4 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
9 Lynn Landes of [ProtocolsforDemocracy.org](https://www.protocolsfordemocracy.org).

10 In a functioning democracy, the
11 public must be allowed to speak on and
12 hear all sides of any debate. This is
13 not the case in the United States and
14 particularly not in Philadelphia.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Excuse me. Ms. Landes, are you talking
17 about the Land Bank bill?

18 MS. LANDES: No. Are you
19 stopping me from speaking?

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
21 indicated that you're going to talk about
22 the Land Bank bill.

23 MS. LANDES: Yes, but I'm
24 talking about this as well.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Ms. Landes, I know we go through this
3 drill every week where you come up and
4 just purposely don't adhere to the
5 guidelines.

6 MS. LANDES: Yes, and what I
7 said is --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
9 can you do us a favor, at least start out
10 talking about what you indicated you're
11 going to talk about.

12 MS. LANDES: Yes. I support
13 Cindy Bass's bill to sue the Mayor's
14 Office for not enforcing the law you
15 passed.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Okay.

18 MS. LANDES: Yes.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you.

21 MS. LANDES: Okay. What we
22 have in Philadelphia and in this country
23 in general is a systemic censorship where
24 free speech is being actively suppressed,
25 if not outright banned by much of the

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2 news media, social media platforms, and
3 cable companies, which is why the City
4 should install online comment sections
5 for the home pages of the Mayor's Office,
6 City departments, City Council, and
7 Council committees. Those who comment
8 should be required to post their name,
9 address, and contact information, which
10 would allow others to contact them, but
11 also discourage bots and trolls.

12 In a similar manner, the City
13 should also erect freely accessible
14 public comment bulletin boards in
15 neighborhoods across the City in order to
16 encourage free speech and discussion.

17 In compliance with the spirit
18 and intent of the Pennsylvania Sunshine
19 Act, all City Council committees and City
20 departments should be required to hold
21 regularly scheduled meetings, and City
22 officials should stop advising speakers
23 to restrict their comments to agenda
24 items only.

25 In addition, those who make

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2 public comments should expect response.
3 After all, the First Amendment guarantees
4 the citizen's right, quote, to petition
5 the government for a redress of
6 grievances, unquote.

7 However, too often there is no
8 redress nor any response at all from City
9 departments or City Councilmembers. In
10 fact, at City Council meetings, speakers
11 are not even asked to give any contact
12 information when they sign up to speak,
13 which gives City Councilmembers no way to
14 follow up with the speakers.

15 Lastly, City Council appears to
16 have plenty of time to celebrate
17 individuals, groups, and events, which is
18 good, but not enough time to address the
19 serious concerns of the public, which is
20 not good. We can do better.

21 Philadelphia is the birthplace
22 of the Bill of Rights and should lead the
23 way in the promotion of meaningful and
24 effective free speech for the nation and
25 the world.

1 3/16/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you.

5 - - -

6 (Applause.)

7 - - -

8 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
9 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 210913.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. HAGINS: Great morning,
14 Council and everyone who is here today.
15 My name is Ogbonna Hagins, H-A-G-I-N-S.

16 You want to hire legal counsel
17 to file a lawsuit to require the
18 Administration to implement and enforce
19 Bill No. 220425. This bill provides
20 healthy outdoor spaces to promote a
21 healthy environment that protects the
22 public from risk of toxic herbicides by
23 prohibiting these poisons from being used
24 on City-owned and public grounds.

25 As you know, I'm known as

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2 Philly Green Man. I'm an environmental
3 advocate, and I definitely am in
4 agreement with not having toxic
5 herbicides in public spaces, but at the
6 same time that I agree with this bill,
7 this body has an indoor environmental
8 issue that is affecting our children in
9 the School District of Philadelphia.

10 In May of 2022, this body
11 approved additional regulations and
12 procedures for inspecting asbestos in old
13 school buildings where there's an
14 oversight. Okay? The body requires more
15 inspection. And on March 13th of this
16 year, this Council said that you will
17 deny funding if the School District
18 doesn't have a concrete plan to deal with
19 this asbestos issue.

20 This asbestos issue has been a
21 problem for decades and decades. Even
22 when I was a teacher at Dobbins starting
23 in 1989, there was an asbestos problem.
24 What has this body done since then? Why
25 is there these regulations and these

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2 issues today when you knew about these
3 issues for decades?

4 So what I'm saying is basically
5 we got to look out for our kids, and
6 right now it doesn't seem like we're
7 looking out for our children in the
8 School District of Philadelphia.

9 Yes, the environment has to be
10 taken care of immediately, but don't
11 forget that our children are not learning
12 at a proficient level. Six out of ten
13 children who graduate from public schools
14 cannot read, write, or do math. This
15 body has to do something about that.
16 This body has to lead on the issue.
17 Because guess what? The crime and the
18 violence is as a result of education and
19 a deficiency of education.

20 So at the same time that you
21 guys are talking about decreasing crime
22 and having all of these problems with
23 violence, what are you doing about the
24 education of our children? What's being
25 done?

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2 It's no urgency. I see people
3 on their cell phones while I'm talking.
4 It's like what's the deal?

5 - - -

6 (Applause.)

7 - - -

8 MR. HAGINS: How -- look, let
9 me tell you something. When I'm up here
10 speaking --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
12 you got to wrap it up.

13 MR. HAGINS: -- I'm speaking on
14 behalf of the people. It's not just me.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
16 understand.

17 MR. HAGINS: The people tell me
18 these issues.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
20 understand, but I need you to --

21 MR. HAGINS: So let's get it
22 together, Council, and I look forward to
23 you doing something about it.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you.

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2 MR. HAGINS: Have a great day.

3 - - -

4 (Applause.)

5 - - -

6 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
7 is Marvin Robinson, commenting on 221015.
8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. ROBINSON: First of all,
12 good morning. My name is Marvin
13 Robinson. Good morning, President
14 Clarke --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MR. ROBINSON: -- and City
18 Council. I haven't been here in a while,
19 so it kind of feels good to sit up here
20 and testify on a bill that I'm a little
21 concerned about.

22 When that bill says about
23 developers getting tax exempt, I would
24 like to see more where it go, what they
25 going to do with the money, is it going

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2 to help the community. Because the way I
3 see it and I know for a fact when
4 developers come to my neighborhood, they
5 develop, but our community don't gets
6 nothing out of it. They really don't.
7 They barely gets jobs. They barely get
8 homes.

9 So if we're going to make sure
10 developers -- because they the one makes
11 all the money in our community, and then
12 when they make the money, they leave our
13 community, and then we stuck with what?

14 So my concern there is, it's
15 not so much giving developers a way out,
16 what about the people that needs the way
17 in? And that's my concern. And I would
18 like to see this bill get more -- added
19 more service for the people more than
20 service for corporate that's
21 millionaires. Because I know for a fact
22 when it comes to zoning and stuff in your
23 community, the Councilpeople has to zone
24 it, and a lot of y'all got paid off from
25 these developers and the community got

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2 nothing.

3 And I know y'all don't like
4 what I'm saying, but if the truth is the
5 light, then the light going to come to
6 the truth. And I have no problem sitting
7 here telling the world the truth what
8 goes in my community, and I know for a
9 fact, because I go to the zonings.

10 So if we're going to do
11 something, stop giving developers and
12 give to us, the neighbors, the people
13 that pay they taxes.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you.

19 MR. ROBINSON: So y'all look at
20 this bill, because I'm going to be on
21 this, and start adding more for the
22 people and not for the developers.

23 So that's all I have to say,
24 and I think that's a really valid
25 concern. Between education and housing,

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2 that's why our community has a bunch of
3 guns in our community, because y'all
4 letting these developers taking our life
5 from us because we can't live right. We
6 can't live in the homes that they're
7 building, because it's too damn much.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you.

10 MR. ROBINSON: Costs too much.
11 So, please, start -- if you're
12 going to give a tax exempt, give it to
13 the people, we, the people. Thank you.

14 I don't need like -- tell me to
15 sit down. Thank you very much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 Councilman Thomas, did you --
19 you're good? Okay.

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Gail Clouden, commenting on 221015.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. GAIL CLOUDEN: I am --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

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2 MS. GAIL CLOUDEN: I am Mama
3 Gail. The name that my mom gave me is
4 Gail. It was Stewart. It's now Clouden
5 for 47 years.

6 I'm here because I got a call.
7 For those of you that know me knows that
8 I advocate and have been advocating for
9 children in the Philadelphia School
10 District for over 30 years. And I got a
11 call a couple of days ago about this
12 bill.

13 A lot of times I have to step
14 back because so much is going on and I
15 have to stay focused, but this caught my
16 attention and I had to stop, and I didn't
17 really understand it. I still haven't
18 had time to really digest it, let alone
19 read it. And so one of the things that
20 was asked of me was to ask that this bill
21 be held or withdrawn due to inadequate
22 public comment.

23 I'm thinking -- I'm not sure
24 how many people in Philadelphia know
25 about this bill or what it means to our

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2 community, but I can tell you from
3 sitting at the School District for many,
4 many years, and I'll just use the last
5 10, 11 years, as I have sat, as I've
6 stood letting people know how I feel, my
7 biggest concern is the abatements that
8 are given to corporate America and no
9 oversight. Who is watching how the money
10 is being spent?

11 I'm going to give just one
12 example. Having been around a long time
13 and having been -- I'm married to a man
14 that was an engineer, a man that almost
15 died as the result of carbon monoxide
16 poisoning in a school in Philadelphia not
17 that long ago. So standing here, I'm
18 just going to use the example of
19 asbestos.

20 I have to use that example
21 because I've talked to several men that
22 were building engineers and they talked
23 to me and my husband about how much
24 asbestos was removed from the School
25 District buildings many years ago, and

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2 the joke is did it grow back? That's the
3 joke. Did it grow back?

4 Who removed it when people were
5 being paid to remove it? Who had the
6 oversight responsibility to know that it
7 was removed? How do we have so much
8 asbestos? I'm just using that as an
9 example.

10 So when I hear about rebates, I
11 think in terms of the schools and the
12 people that have gotten all kinds of
13 contracts and they get abatements. Many
14 people have gotten abatements on the back
15 of our children.

16 And I'm just going to sit down
17 after saying enough is enough. Our
18 children deserve everything they're
19 supposed to get, and I'm saying to you
20 lawmakers, you people who sit here, you
21 knew people who are just getting these
22 positions, find out what's really going
23 on. Stop this voting, as I watched them
24 do at the School District, voting and
25 voting and voting, without knowing what

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2 they're voting on or for.

3 God bless you. Peace and love.

4 Don't forget, enough is enough.

5 - - -

6 (Applause.)

7 - - -

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. For the record, the bill will
10 be held today. It was not on the
11 schedule to be voted on today. So if
12 there needs to be any additional
13 follow-up from any individual who has an
14 interest, you obviously can reach out and
15 talk to us about the specifics, but thank
16 you.

17 - - -

18 (Applause.)

19 - - -

20 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
21 is Leah Clouden, commenting on 221015.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MS. LEAH CLOUDEN: Good

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2 morning. My name is Leah Clouden. Hi.
3 I'm speaking on the same bill that my
4 mother was speaking on.

5 To me, these abatements are
6 insane. You have overtaxed the actual
7 residents more than half -- more than
8 double. You have more than doubled the
9 property tax because of the abatements
10 that you give everybody else, and you're
11 always using the children. It's always
12 in the name of a child.

13 Our School District is
14 eight percent away from total failure.
15 That means 92 percent of the schools are
16 at an F academically. I don't care how
17 much money you think you're throwing at
18 them, they're still not improving. This
19 is absurd. And to tax the people when
20 these people -- when you have
21 universities that are spreading like
22 wildfire, you have apartments going up
23 and all they offer is a couple of units,
24 how many houses do we need for affordable
25 housing? How many people need affordable

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2 housing? Because when do you stop? When
3 do you stop taking for the people that
4 have the least?

5 You have to stop these
6 abatements. This is too taxing on the
7 residents, and if you continue to do
8 that, that means you don't want any more
9 residents in Philadelphia.

10 That's it. Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

19 is Jon McKay, commenting on 221015.

23 MR. MCKAY: Good morning.

24 Congratulations. Thank you for your
25 service, Mr. President. Give him a round

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2 of applause.

8 MR. MCKAY: My name is Jon
9 McKay. As it relates to this bill and
10 the abatement, I'm here to let you know
11 that, you know, for a long time, the City
12 of Philadelphia and its majority hasn't
13 been organized when it comes to voting,
14 and I'm here to let you know that that
15 time has changed.

16 Moving forward, we're going to
17 give the break to the people, because
18 we're down on the ground organizing. No,
19 it's not on Fox. It's not on the news.
20 You understand, it's not getting
21 broadcast, because we already know that
22 story.

23 But I want to let you know I'm
24 glad everything is being held up and, you
25 know, it's a pleasure to be down here

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2 with you guys, because what we're going
3 to do moving forward is, we're going to
4 sit down and we're going to plan this
5 city together and we're going to move it
6 together. You understand what I'm
7 talking about?

8 The people who haven't been
9 down here and chiming in because we live
10 in this system that was created and a
11 history already know why our people are
12 scrambling trying to make it through day
13 to day. You understand? And we're not
14 just talking about the people at the
15 bottom. We're talking about everybody,
16 the whole middle class.

17 We already know the country,
18 the City is broken down into two classes,
19 the two percent and the 98 percent, and
20 I'm telling you that the 98 percent been
21 organizing. We got it together.

22 So I hope you guys take these
23 comments, because a lot of people been
24 coming down here venting and giving you
25 comments, but I want to let you know that

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2 we got plans and we're going to come down
3 here and we're going to bring our plans,
4 and the people that we pay are going to
5 back our plans or they're going to plan
6 to find a new job.

7 Have a blessed day, in Jesus'
8 name.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Good morning, everyone. My name is
25 Jacqueline Wiggins and I am a resident

3 I'm talking in terms of Bill 221015.

4 I would just like a point of
5 clarification, Council President. Are
6 you saying this bill is being withdrawn
7 or held?

9 The bill is being held today.

10 MS. WIGGINS: It's being held?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

12 MS. WIGGINS: Okay. So I'm
13 opposed to this bill to incentivize
14 affordable housing development, et
15 cetera. This bill must be held. All
16 right?

17 To give developers the
18 opportunity to construct affordable
19 housing may make sense, but at what cost
20 to the people with respect to the market
21 rate percentage and that affordable
22 housing percentage?

23 But a greater importance is
24 when and how did this come about without
25 genuine community, citywide, ward by

2 ward, division by division, block by
3 block, community input by the people?
4 How can that happen?

5 Well, it can happen in terms of
6 people knowing about these bills if there
7 is the will, and we have to have the will
8 to do as what has been said before me.

9 The people's voices must be
10 heard regarding these tax exemptions that
11 are stealing things from the services
12 that our people need, and that's it
13 throughout this entire city. Our
14 schools, our services, all of that, we
15 need those funds. Those tax exemptions
16 must change.

6 Thank you all for having me here today.
7 My name is Steven Austin and I'm
8 commenting on 230194, participatory
9 defense. And I'm not sure that all of
10 you are aware of it. I hope that you
11 are. We've been in the City now for five
12 years, and we're grateful that you have
13 given us this recognition, along with our
14 partners, the Public Defenders
15 Association.

16 We will continue to do the type
17 of work that we have been doing in
18 organizing our communities and getting
19 our communities to have a better
20 understanding of the law and their
21 processes, and we will continue to do
22 that.

23 And I wanted to thank you for
24 having us here. There's still a lot of
25 work to be done. We understand the

2 elections that are coming up regarding
3 judges, and we're also deeply involved in
4 that, and we'd like to get that
5 information out there so that folks will
6 understand what it is that they're voting
7 for.

8 I understand that there were a
9 lot of comments today that were of
10 interest to me regarding voting, and I
11 think that voting is very important, but
12 we also think that you have to have
13 information. And we're grateful that
14 you've given this recognition through
15 this resolution, along with our friends
16 and partners at the Public Defenders
17 Association, and I thank you for having
18 me here to say these few words.

19 We will continue to be visible
20 in the City. We have seven hubs in the
21 City now, and as I said, this is our
22 fifth year anniversary. We look forward
23 to continuing to work with you and our
24 partners throughout the City and trying
25 to educate folks on the criminal legal

2 system and to have them understand
3 exactly what they're facing.

4 The system that we have is so
5 big, it's so huge, and it has so much
6 weight on folks who come before them.
7 People who are charged with a crime or
8 find themselves up against our system,
9 period, are overwhelmed. And most of the
10 people we talk to are poor. They can't
11 afford attorneys. They can't help
12 themselves. They don't know what's next.
13 They don't know what they're going to do.
14 And so what we try to do is bridge that
15 gap and give them that assistance.
16 Sometimes the attorneys won't even talk
17 to them.

18 So there's a lot of stress and
19 anxiety and frustration over facing the
20 system that we have, and we hope to be
21 able to continue to have some influence
22 in this area and help people understand
23 what their rights are and what they're
24 facing.

25 Thank you for having me.

16 about the ability to redirect tax
17 abatements so that people can live,
18 whether you talk about the ability to
19 produce more affordable housing so that
20 we don't have the disparities between the
21 two percent and the 98 percent.

22 So we are -- and I'm speaking
23 for myself, but my colleagues that I get
24 to talk to -- listening, and what that
25 does is puts the wind to our backs so

2 that we can push forward to talk to this
3 Administration, the state, and the
4 federal government to give our residents
5 what they need.

6 I rise today, though, to talk
7 about the Defenders Association and
8 participatory defense, a subcomponent of
9 what we face.

10 I thank the Defenders
11 Association for being a part of the 100
12 Shooter Review that took a deep dive to
13 look at why people are pulling triggers
14 and how did the gun get to the location
15 and if that person does this more than
16 one time, where did we fail them to help
17 them to a better way.

18 What we discovered at the
19 Defenders Association, and we're taking a
20 trip over there, is that some of these
21 individuals as adults that they defend,
22 we saw, we saw before in schools, we saw
23 before in custody battles, we saw before
24 when they at the Defenders Association
25 had to represent these kids as their

2 advocates and they raised their hand and
3 said, I'm in trouble, I'm in distress, I
4 need your help, and many times systems
5 and departments ignored them. And so
6 they go along through the continuum of
7 their life finding these struggles,
8 double bookbags, not being in safe
9 environments in school and wind up "will
10 the defendant please rise."

11 And what I'm telling you when
12 you go over there, one of the statistics
13 that is so shocking is that 30 percent of
14 the folk on the children's end wind up
15 being the defendants at the adult end.
16 That's number one.

17 Number two, when it comes to
18 participatory defense, I don't care who
19 you are. I don't care how tough you
20 think you are. When you walk into that
21 courtroom, you are intimidated. You
22 don't know the language. You don't know
23 the process. You are sitting there kind
24 of at the mercy of the system. And what
25 they do is in that participatory defense,

2 Speight is one of those individuals that
3 teaches, it teaches them how to defend
4 themselves, how to stand up in the
5 courtroom and present their case. Not so
6 much in the legal language, but I'm not
7 this bad person. This is what I do with
8 my kids. This is what I do at my job.
9 This is what I do in my community, so
10 that that judge has a total picture of
11 who that person is and they don't just
12 wind up in a meat grinder, in a vortex
13 that sends them every which way but
14 right.

15 So this is an important part of
16 justice. So today we recognize the
17 Defenders today. We recognize
18 participatory defense, because it's an
19 essential part of justice.

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 don't check your heart. And if anybody
8 knows the story of Danny Rumph and a few
9 other athletes who had unfortunate
10 situations take place based on heart
11 conditions, this work is immeasurable.

12 So thank you, Councilmember
13 Bass, for introducing this resolution.

14 Thank you, Mama Candy. We
15 appreciate you. We love you.

23 every place that needed a defibrillator
24 got a defibrillator.

20 enormous giveaways.

21 And so we want to say thank you
22 so much for really dedicating yourself to
23 the community, for doing so much for so
24 many who might not know you, might not
25 know your name, and you do it, as they
