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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning,
3 everyone. We are going to get started.

4 I understand that the State Law
5 currently requires that the following
6 announcement be made at the beginning of every
7 remote Council Session.

9 emergency, City Council is currently meeting
10 remotely. We are using Microsoft Teams to make
11 this remote meeting possible. Instructions for
12 how the public may view the meeting and offer

16 the meeting and can also be found on phl.com.

17 I now note that the hour has come. I
18 will ask the Clerk, please, call the roll to
19 take attendance. Members that are in

12 We have status for a quorum. We will
13 now come to order. So, despite the great need,
14 there will be no invocation today. We will,
15 however, observe a very brief moment of silent
16 prayer for our City, leaders and citizens during
17 the current public health crisis. Just, please,
18 observe a moment of silence.

19 (Moment of Silence.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
21 Thank you very much.

22 Our next order of business is the
23 Approval of the Journal of the meeting of
24 Thursday, February 4, 2021.

25 And the Chair recognizes Councilman

1 Squilla.

2 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
3 Mr. President.

4 I move that the Journal of the meeting
5 of Thursday, February 4, 2021 be approved.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
8 It's been moved and properly seconded that the
9 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, February 4,
10 2021 stand approved.

11 All those in favor, indicate by saying
12 aye.

13 (Ayes.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
15 opposed.

16 (No opposition.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
18 And that Journal is Approved.

19 And our next order of business is
20 request for leave of absence.

21 And the Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Jones.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
24 Mr. President.

25 On behalf of the Members of Council,

1 there are no request for leaves of absence
2 today.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
4 the gentleman.

5 And our next order of business is
6 communications.

7 And, Mr. Decker, will you please read
8 the messages from the Mayor and any other
9 communications that you may have in your
10 possession.

11 CHIEF CLERK: From the Mayor to the
12 President to the Members of this Council to the
13 City of Philadelphia.

14 I am submitting herewith at the
15 consideration of your honorable body an
16 ordinance authorizing transfers in
17 appropriations for Fiscal Year 2021, from the
18 Grants Revenue Fund, Director of Finance -
19 Provision for other Grants, to the General Fund,
20 the Managing Director, all under certain terms
21 and conditions.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
23 Mr. Decker.

24 And our next order of business is the
25 introduction of bills and resolutions. And by

1 way of reminder, we are asking that all
2 resolutions, including privileged resolutions,
3 be placed on the final passage calendar for the
4 next session of Council unless they are being
5 referred to committee. In our current remote
6 environment, this procedure will provide an
7 appropriate opportunity for public comment. So,
8 I want to thank you very much in advance for
9 your anticipated cooperation.

10 Mr. Decker, can you, please, read the
11 titles of the legislation that is being offered
12 today by the Members.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Parker offers
14 two resolutions, entitled "A resolution honoring
15 Dr. Ala Stanford and the Black Doctors COVID-19
16 Consortium for their contribution to health and
17 equity during the COVID-19 pandemic."

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Be on next
19 week's Calendar.

20 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
21 commending Dr. Brenda A. Allen for being named
22 one of the Ten Most Dominant Historically Black
23 College leaders for 2021, and congratulating
24 Lincoln University for earning the historic gift
25 of \$20 million from Philanthropist MacKenzie

1 Scott.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's
3 Calendar.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gilmore
5 Richardson offers one resolution, entitled "A
6 resolution recognizing February 2021 as
7 Environmental Justice Month in the City of
8 Philadelphia."

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's
10 Calendar.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym offers
12 one resolution, entitled "A resolution
13 authorizing the Committee on Children and Youth
14 to hold hearings concerning recommendations to
15 establish an independent youth services
16 ombudsman person -- ombudsperson office to
17 receive, investigate and report on concerns from
18 youth and families about safety with services
19 for young people in congregate care, secure or
20 other forms of detention or any institutional
21 facility."

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
23 recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

24 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
25 Council President.

1 First of all, I would like to thank my
2 cosponsors, especially the Members of the
3 Children and Youth Committee -- Councilmembers
4 Thomas, Brooks, Gauthier, Johnson as well as
5 Councilmembers Henon, Gilmore Richardson, Domb,
6 Squilla and Bass.

7 This hearing has -- has been a journey.
8 Overall, when we first came into City Council or
9 when I first came into City Council in 2015, I
10 want to thank the Council President for
11 establishing a Committee on Children and Youth
12 that would take a look specifically at issues
13 that impacted them. And one of the areas that
14 we took on as a committee very seriously is the
15 issue of thousands of Philadelphia children who
16 are mandated to live in state-operated or
17 private-residential placements either by the
18 courts or through the Department of Human
19 Services.

20 These facilities annually cost the City
21 and the School District over \$175 million in
22 public funding every year. That number was
23 significantly higher when we first started.

24 Youth -- the City of Philadelphia has
25 made significant strides in strengthening its

1 oversight and reducing the use of congregate and
2 institutional facilities for children over the
3 past five years in particular. Residential
4 placement rates have dropped by 71 percent since
5 2015. And there has been a longstanding
6 commitment to see further reductions and to
7 improve the quality and safety of residential
8 placements across all these systems.

9 That being said, though, the Youth
10 Residential Placement Task Force was established
11 in 2018 by this Council body in partnership with
12 Mayor Kenney's Administration to address many of
13 the systemic abuses within these programs, to
14 prioritize youth safety and well being, and to
15 develop a plan to ensure that youth and their
16 families had a place where their health and well
17 being would be centered, and that we would
18 continue to reduce the number of them.

19 And since the task force's final report
20 was released in 2019, we have made really
21 significant strides. There have been short-term
22 recommendations such as guides that are now
23 available to youth and families that include
24 information about their rights. We are
25 publishing -- the City is publishing the first

1 summary assessment of congregate care
2 facilities. There is more proactive training
3 that's been provided to our providers on
4 evidence-based strategies. Governor Wolf has
5 signed an executive order to establish a Council
6 on Reform, so the work has gone statewide.

7 There is now a Child Advocate position
8 at the state level. And there is a Pennsylvania
9 Juvenile Justice Task Force which I serve on as
10 well as several members of -- from the City of
11 Philadelphia; Senator Tony Williams, Kevin
12 Bethel at the School District and Cynthia
13 Figueroa at Office of Children, Youth and
14 Families. But this will also see some
15 significant changes. It feels like now is a
16 good time to come back to Council to establish
17 what's been done and what still yet needs to be
18 done.

19 In the final Task Force Report that was
20 released, there was a recommendation to create a
21 Youth Services Ombudsperson as a centralized,
22 accessible and independent means to investigate
23 concerns from youth and families about safety
24 and services while they are in these facilities.
25 This recommendation was driven from the voices

1 of young people themselves who said that they
2 did not feel safe to report mistreatment while
3 in placement. And there was a recognition that
4 there isn't really a single point of contact
5 with the resources even at the state level to
6 address multiple concerns about services for
7 youth and residential placement across multiple
8 systems across regulators.

9 We have young people who are paid
10 pennies on the dollar that are forced to work to
11 repay mandatory fines and fees or restitution.
12 They are kept in placement facilities longer.
13 These are things that are of great concern. And
14 of course, many of us on this Council body have
15 been deeply active and -- and vocal on the
16 abuses that have been suffered, whether it was
17 David Hess at Wordsworth in 2016, which has
18 driven my work personally as well as other
19 transformation I think we have seen City wide.
20 Whether it was what happened at Glen Mills or
21 more recently as Deveraux.

22 Our hope is that this hearing will allow
23 us to show this Council body and the public
24 great strides that the City has achieved and the
25 significant needs that we have going forward.

1 Forty-two other states have youth ombudspersons
2 offices. The City -- the municipality of DC
3 also has a Youth Ombudsperson Office. It feels
4 like the time is now. And I look forward to
5 that hearing.

6 Thank you very much, Council President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
8 Councilwoman. That will be on Today's Calendar.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon offers
10 one bill and one resolution, entitled "An
11 ordinance amending Chapter 9-3700 of the
12 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Bouncers,' by
13 revising the definitions of covered
14 establishments and personnel."

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to
16 committee.

17 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution honoring
18 and recognizing Russell Collins for his
19 dedication to Philadelphia through his extensive
20 work in security and risk management, and for
21 his efforts to improve the safety and security
22 of Philadelphia's bars, restaurants and night
23 clubs through advocacy and training.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's

1 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Johnson offers
2 two bills, entitled "An ordinance establishing

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to

1 General Fund, the Council to the General Fund,
2 certain or all City offices, departments, boards
3 and commissions; and thereby, implementing
4 Council's 'New Normal Jobs Initiative.'"

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to
6 committee.

7 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
8 authorizing transfer in appropriations for
9 Fiscal Year 2021 from the Grants Revenue Fund,
10 the Director of Finance - Provision for Other
11 Grants, to the General Fund, the Managing
12 Director.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Referred to

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes, I am. Thank

17 The Committee of the Whole reports out
18 five resolutions with a favorable
19 recommendation.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
21 Mr. Decker, please read that report.

22 CHIEF CLERK: To the President, the
23 Members of the Council of the City of
24 Philadelphia, the Committee of the Whole to
25 which is referred Resolution No. 200715,

1 entitled "The resolution appointing James Aros,
2 Jr. to the position of Chief Assessment Officer
3 of the Office of Property Assessment;" and

4 Resolution 200716, entitled "A
5 resolution confirming the appointment of Diana
6 P. Cortes, Esquire as the City Solicitor;" and

7 Resolution No. 210031, entitled "A
8 resolution confirming the appointment of Cecilia
9 Thompson to the Board of Education of the School
10 District of Philadelphia;" and

11 Resolution No. 210023, entitled "A
12 resolution confirming the appointment of Lisa
13 Salley to the Board of Education of the School
14 District of Philadelphia;" and

15 Resolution No. 210033, entitled "A

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

2 Chair now recognizes Councilman Green
3 for a report from the Committee on Finance.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. The Committee on Finance reports
6 out two bills with favorable recommendations.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
8 Councilman Green.

9 Mr. Decker, will please read the report.

10 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on Finance
11 to which are heard Bill No. 210004, entitled "An
12 ordinance authorizing and approving the
13 execution and delivery of a Service Agreement
14 between the City of Philadelphia and the
15 Philadelphia Authority for Industrial
16 Development relating to the refunding of certain
17 bonds previously issued to finance and/or
18 refinance Alternative Funding Mechanisms for a
19 portion of the unfunded actuarial accrued
20 liability of the City of Philadelphia Retirement
21 System implemented pursuant to the Municipal
22 Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act;
23 approving the issuance by the Philadelphia
24 Authority for Industrial Development of bonds,
25 notes or other evidences of indebtedness in one

1 or more series, to refund such bonds;
2 authorizing and approving the City's obligation
3 to pay in full when due the Service Fee and
4 other amounts payable under the Service

12 in Santander Bank, National Association,"
13 respectfully reports it has considered the same
14 and returns the attached Bills to Council with a
15 favorable recommendation.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
17 Mr. Decker.

14 (Ayes.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
16 opposed?

17 (No opposition.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
19 And these bills will be placed on our First
20 Reading Calendar for today.

21 Chair now recognizes Councilman Henon
22 for a report from the Committee on Public
23 Property and Public Works.

24 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
25 Mr. President.

1 The Committee of Public Property and
2 Public Works reports out one bill with a
3 favorable recommendation.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

5 Mr. Decker, please, read the report.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on Public
7 Property and Public Works, to which is referred
8 Bill No. 200656, entitled "An ordinance
9 authorizing the Commissioner of Public Property,
10 on behalf of the City, to acquire fee simple
11 title, or a lesser interest in real estate, by
12 purchase, dedication, donation, condemnation,
13 agreement in lieu of condemnation, or otherwise,
14 in parcels of land along the Schuylkill River
15 and the Wissahickon Creek for public
16 recreational purposes," respectfully reports it
17 has considered the same and returns the attached
18 Bill to Council with a favorable recommendation.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

20 Chair, again, recognizes Councilman
21 Henon.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Mr. President.

24 I move that the Rules of Council be
25 suspended so as to permit the first reading of

1 this day of Bill No. 200656.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

4 It's been moved and properly seconded that the
5 Rules of Council be suspended so as to permit
6 first reading this day of Bill 200656.

7 All in favor will indicate by saying
8 aye.

9 (Ayes.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
11 opposed?

12 (No opposition.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
14 And this bill will be placed on our First
15 Reading Calendar today.

16 That concludes our Reports from
17 committee. And our next order of business is
18 consideration of the Calendar.

19 I will note that the bills just reported
20 from committee with suspension of the rules have
21 been deemed to have had a first reading. These
22 bills will be placed on a Second Reading and
23 Final Passage Calendar for the next session of
24 Council.

25 As there are no additional bills on the

1 First Reading Calendar, the Chair recognizes
2 Councilwoman Parker for the purpose of calling
3 up resolutions and bills on the second reading
4 and final passage calendar.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
6 Mr. President.

7 The following resolutions and bills are
8 being called up from the Second Reading and
9 Final Passage Calendars today.

10 They are Nos. 200580, 210084, 210086,
11 210087, 210088, 210092, 210093, 210094, 210096,
12 210097, 210104, 210105 and 210106.

13 Mr. President, all other resolutions and
14 bills are being held.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
16 Councilwoman.

17 We will now -- before we proceed with
18 the consideration of these bills and
19 resolutions, we will have our Public Comment
20 session. We are going to take a couple of
21 minutes to give our technology professional some
22 time to connect the speakers. And then, we will
23 come back for our Public Comment session.

24 (Brief pause in proceedings.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

1 Thank you. Now that everyone is
2 connected to the meeting and before considering
3 the resolutions and bills before us today, we
4 will consider the public comment. And it will
5 go as follows.

6 Public comment must concern matters on
7 the Second Reading and Final Passage Calendars
8 for possible action at a session of Council. A
9 speaker on any of those matters must sign up in
10 order to testify. You must call (215)686-3406
11 by 3:00 p.m. the day before the session to sign
12 up for public comment.

13 When you call, we will take your name,
14 your phone number, the number of the legislative
15 item you are commenting on and whether you are
16 in support or against the legislation and add
17 you to our list. We will telephone each person
18 on the list during the Council Session and
19 invite them to our remote meeting.

20 Under ideal circumstances, you will have
21 three minutes to speak. And today it appears to
22 be an ideal circumstance. So, you will have
23 three minutes to speak. In order to be fair, I
24 just want to say for the record, all those
25 wishing to speak, I intend to held them

1 faithfully to the established time limit. Once
2 invited to the meeting and asked to begin your
3 testimony, timing will be started. We will
4 monitor your remaining time throughout your
5 testimony. And when there are 30 seconds
6 remaining for your time, you will be reminded of
7 this. Once your allotted time has passed, you
8 will be asked to conclude your remarks. And
9 shortly thereafter, you will be muted and
10 disconnected from the remote meeting.

11 I, also, reserve the right to limit the
12 number of speakers where repetitious comments
13 are being made on the same matter, and to limit
14 the scope of testimony to only certain items on
15 the agenda during the emergency which could
16 affect callbacks for the public comment on the
17 meeting.

18 Please be aware, just for the record,
19 that you -- this is a public meeting, and it's
20 being recorded. Because the meeting is public,
21 participants and viewers have no reasonable
22 expectation of privacy. So by continuing to be
23 in the meeting, you are consenting to being
24 recorded.

25 I would ask -- now ask Mr. Decker to,

1 please, read the name of our first speaker.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Sandra Calhoun.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

4 MS. CALHOUN: Good morning to -- good
5 morning to you President, City Council and all
6 Members of City Council. I am speaking today in
7 reference to Resolution Bill 210010. And I want
8 to respect and appreciate this bill being
9 offered by Gilmore Richardson adopting an
10 environmental social governance criteria and
11 disclose climate risk information from all
12 relevant parties.

13 So, I'm going to identify myself as one
14 of the relevant parties. And disclosing the
15 climate risk that's overwhelming the West
16 Philadelphia community and the South -- the
17 Southwest Philadelphia community as it relates
18 to tires.

19 Our communities in West Philadelphia and
20 Southwest is oversaturated with tires, which is
21 no -- which is no friend to the environment.
22 These tires are found -- will be -- can be seen
23 in lots, streets -- on the street curbs, all
24 over the City of West and Southwest. Not to
25 say, negating the other cities, but I deal with

1 where I live and what I know. And the tires is
2 a very serious environmental problem. And it
3 currently -- it appears to be unregulated.
4 Because if it was regulated, and the regulations
5 are being followed, I would not see this
6 oversaturation of the tires all throughout West
7 and West Philadelphia. Which these tires just
8 present a risk to the environment.

9 The sitting tires in these lots, the
10 waste of those tires send off methane gas into
11 the air. Carcinogens into the air that we
12 breathe. And I am trying to understand --
13 although I appreciate this bill, but writing
14 this bill, what are you going to do disclosing
15 the climate risk? I want you to write a bill on
16 how we are going to actively remove the
17 environmental cli -- climate risk from our
18 community.

19 The rubber from the tires is -- in these
20 here dump sites mitigates the damages of
21 environmental effects of rotting tires, rubber
22 from the tires into our water, our soil and our
23 plants.

24 So, I am a party disclosing one of
25 the -- just one of the climate risk in our

1 community oversaturated with these tires and the
2 tire business. Tire business right next door to
3 the housing that people live in. If that's not
4 a climate and a risk, nothing else is. There
5 should -- I want there to be, which I am
6 searching for, a policy or law that speaks on a
7 tire business being right next door set up to a
8 residential house and community.

9 I am real tired of 44th and Belmont and
10 Girard of the tire business there that I am now
11 walking out in the street because of all the
12 tires that's on the pavement. They had cords
13 running from the inside of the business out to
14 the curb, and I am stepping over. That's a
15 safety hazard. It's a safety, health and
16 environmental risk.

17 Another business -- what's it called --
18 New To You or whatever, his business is set up
19 right next to a residential home. We have to
20 walk out in the street on Belmont Avenue because
21 all the trucks are on the pavement extended all
22 the way back to con -- to storage. This is not
23 a good look.

24 And this environment in West
25 Philadelphia and Southwest Philadelphia is

1 totally environmentally polluted. It's like a
2 unflushed toilet overflowing with trash, litter
3 and toxins, and that's an environmental risk.

4 Help me with this.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

6 MS. CALHOUN: I have all kind of reports
7 to 311. Help me to clean up the environment.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Okay.

9 Ms. Calhoun, can you just, please, say
10 your name for the record?

11 MS. CALHOUN: My name is Sandra,
12 S-a-n-d-r-a, Calhoun, C-a-l-h-o-u-n.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
14 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am. Appreciate
15 you.

16 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Is it okay to
17 say something?

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm sorry.
19 Who is that? Councilwoman Gauthier.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I just wanted to
21 recognize Ms. Sandra in all of her work. And
22 just say that I'm committed to working together
23 on this issue. And thank you for your advocacy
24 and all of your hard work on behalf of the
25 community.

1 MS. CALHOUN: Thank you. I am going to
2 follow through up with this --

3 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I know.

4 MS. CALHOUN: -- Councilwoman Gauthier.

5 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank you so
6 much.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

8 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you,
9 Ms. Calhoun.

10 Mr. Decker.

11 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other
12 speakers in the Public Comment list,
13 Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
15 That concludes our Public Comment.

16 We will now consider the bills and
17 resolutions on the Second Reading and Final
18 Passage Calendar.

19 Mr. Decker, if you can, can you please
20 read the title of Resolution No. 200580.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution calling on
22 the Pennsylvania General Assembly to adopt House
23 Bill 526, ending the use of taxpayer funds to
24 pay for cyber charter education when local
25 school districts offer their own full-time cyber

1 school programs.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

3 Chair recognizes Councilman Gym for a
4 motion on --

5 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you, Council
6 President. I -- I move that -- excuse me. Just
7 double checking -- I move that the -- that
8 this --

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Resolution 200580,
10 Council Lady.

11 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Yes. We are moving
12 it to the -- I move that 200 --

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: 580.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: -- 580 be moved to
15 the suspension calendar.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
18 It's been moved and properly seconded that the
19 Resolution No. 200580 be placed on the
20 suspension calendar.

21 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.

22 (Ayes.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
24 opposed?

25 (No opposition.)

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it,
2 and motion carries. It will be placed on the
3 suspension calendar.

4 Mr. Decker, please read the title of
5 Resolution No. 210084.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution commending
7 the Philadelphia 76ers in creating the Buy Black
8 Program to support Black-owned small businesses.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
10 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
17 It's been moved and properly seconded that the
18 resolution be adopted.

19 All those in favor, indicate by saying
20 aye.

21 (Ayes.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
23 opposed?

24 (No opposition.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have

1 it. And the resolution is adopted.

2 Mr. Decker, please, read the title of
3 Resolution No. 210086.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution honoring and
5 congratulating Philadelphia natives Sincere
6 Harris and Erin Wilson for their new positions
7 as White House Liaison for the Environmental
8 Protection Agency and Special Assistant to the
9 President and Deputy Director for the White
10 House Office of Political Affairs and Strategy.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
12 recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

13 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank you,
14 Mr. President.

15 I move the adoption of the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All right.
18 It has been moved and properly seconded that the
19 resolution be adopted.

20 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.

21 (Ayes.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
23 opposed?

24 (No opposition.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

1 And the resolution is adopted.

2 Mr. Decker, please, read the title of
3 the Resolution No. 210087.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution recognizing
5 February 2021 as Career and Technical Education
6 (CTE) Awareness Month in Philadelphia.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

8 Chair, again, recognizes Councilwoman
9 Gilmore Richardson for a motion.

10 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 I move the adoption of the resolution.
13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
15 It's been moved and seconded that the resolution
16 be adopted.

17 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.
18 (Ayes.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
20 opposed?

21 (No opposition.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it,
23 and that resolution is adopted.

24 Mr. Decker, please, read the title of
25 Resolution No. 210088.

1 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution commemorating
2 the life and legacy of community activist
3 Russell Meddin, whose tireless advocacy for
4 vibrant public space and public bike share led
5 to millions of Philadelphians enjoying and
6 celebrating the City of Philadelphia's public
7 trails and provided a powerful model of civic
8 engagement for the nation and the world.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Absolutely.
10 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym for a
11 motion on the resolution.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
13 Council President.

14 As you and I both know, Russell
15 Meddin -- and many others -- Russell Meddin was
16 a wonderful citizen. He was a friend. He was a
17 neighbor of the highest degree. It was an honor
18 to be able to know him.

19 I met him first when he was taking care
20 of his beloved Coxe Park in the Logan Square
21 neighborhood. He knew the name of every child,
22 of every parent. He welcomed them. He
23 celebrated Philadelphia. He contributed
24 mightily.

25 Took on CXX when they threatened to

1 close off access to Schuylkill River Park along
2 with many others within the communities and
3 neighborhoods. He led a campaign to ensure that
4 there would be pedestrian access to the two
5 Schuylkill banks. And today Schuylkill banks is
6 a testimony to what neighborhoods and
7 communities can do to revitalize our waterways
8 to create life and vitality and a place for
9 community.

10 He's gone and done so much more, whether
11 it's been Philadelphia Bike Share and his
12 commitment to that, to just celebrating what it
13 means to be a neighbor of the highest degree.

14 So, present this -- with you, Council
15 President, to my colleagues, and move for the
16 adoption of the resolution.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

19 It's been moved and seconded that the
20 resolution be adopted.

21 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.

22 (Ayes.)

9 American Jewish Committee in Philadelphia for
10 her distinguished legal career.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you, Council
14 President.

15 I move for the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
18 It's been moved and seconded that the resolution
19 be adopted.

20 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.

21 (Ayes.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
23 opposed?

24 (No opposition.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it,

1 and that resolution is adopted.

2 Mr. Decker, please, read the title of
3 Resolution No. 210093.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution recognizing
5 the work of William R. Sasso upon his transition
6 from his role as Chairman of Stradley Ronon
7 Stevens and Young to Chairman Emeritus.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair again

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

23 All in favor, indicate by saying aye.

24 (Ayes.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those

1 opposed?

2 (No opposition.)

5 Mr. Decker, do you any additional
6 resolutions?

19 with coming up with the ADA Transition Plan.
20 This is an issue that we have needed to do for
21 some time. And the Administration has shown
22 leadership on getting us to this point, but we
23 have so much more work to do.

24 So, this hearing is opportunity to
25 provide additional information regarding

1 transition plan to address some of the ableist
2 issues that we have in our society and really
3 make the City of Philadelphia a city that's
4 going to be open to all people regardless of
5 your physical, learning difference.

6 I look forward to working with the
7 Administration on this transition plan in
8 educating more people in the City of
9 Philadelphia about what we need to do to make
10 the City the most welcoming City that it can be.

11 With that, I move for the adoption of
12 the resolution.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
15 moved and properly seconded.

16 All those in favor, indicate by saying
17 aye.

18 (Ayes.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
20 opposed?

21 (No opposition.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it,
23 and that resolution is adopted.

24 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other
25 resolutions on Final Passage Calendar,

1 Mr. President.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
3 very much, Mr. Decker.

4 Prior to recognizing Members regarding
5 speeches, I will note for the record at this
6 time that we will use the Chat feature available
7 in Microsoft Teams to allow Members to signify
8 that they wish to be recognized. In order to
9 comply with the Sunshine Act, the Chat feature
10 must only be used for that particular purpose.

11 With that said, are there speeches on
12 behalf of the Minority?

13 And the Chair recognizes Councilmember
14 Brooks.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank you so much,
16 Council President. I want to take a moment to
17 thank the eleven cosponsors of my 2021 Public
18 Health Emergency Leave Bill that I introduced
19 today. This bill reinstates many of the
20 protections from last year's Public Health
21 Emergency Leave Bill and makes some improvements
22 to the law.

23 As we approach the one-year anniversary
24 of the pandemic, the cumulative effect of
25 inconsistent work, food scarcity, isolation,

1 trauma --

2 (Councilwoman Parker sneezes.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: -- loss, it is
4 being felt by our communities.

5 (Laughter.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Sorry. Sorry.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: God bless
8 you.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: God bless you.

10 As families grapple with this severe
11 financial strain, we must continue to provide
12 them with the protections they need to keep
13 themselves, their families and our City safe.
14 Though, there are hopeful signs as COVID-19
15 cases decline and as cities and states work
16 swiftly to evacuate the public. We must remain
17 vigilant.

18 With the new strain of COVID-19
19 circulating and with the opening of indoor
20 dining, we cannot let our guards down. Adequate
21 pace remains one of the best tools in stopping
22 the spread and protecting our most vulnerable
23 community members, who may not be able to afford
24 to miss a day of work if they are exposed to
25 COVID-19 or need to stay home to care for a sick

1 family member.

2 So, I want to thank my colleagues for
3 their strong support and clear dedication to
4 this issue. And I want to thank all our
5 healthcare professionals, nursing home aides,
6 gig economy workers, food service workers,
7 sanitation workers, grocery store employees and
8 all others who continue to keep our community
9 safe and our City running.

10 Thank you so much, Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilwoman. Thank you for your support for
13 those very, very deserving individuals.

14 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much,
16 Council President.

17 I wanted to just recognize the passing
18 of former State Senator Stewart Greenleaf. We,
19 in this body, presented him with a resolution
20 recognizing his many years of work in criminal
21 justice reform. He was doing that before it was
22 popular, before it was cool. He was very much
23 chastised and took a lot of heat for what he
24 did. He changed the laws at the state level.

25 If DNA evidence proves that you are not

1 the person, you can thank Stewart Greenleaf.
2 Seems like it makes sense, right, DNA evidence.
3 But it has to be a state law. It has to be
4 presented and adopted.

5 I met him because of the Eric Riddick
6 case. And we, in this body, have urged the
7 State to do something about that. And not just
8 in Eric Riddick's case, but in all cases of the
9 Post-Conviction Relief Act. That in any
10 circumstance where substantial evidence, in this
11 case, scientific evidence proves that the crime
12 was not committed in the way it was described,
13 that a Judge be able to hear the case so that a
14 person not do life in prison while there is
15 scientific evidence that they did not commit the
16 crime.

17 This is an ongoing battle. But when I
18 went to meet Stewart Greenleaf, I was not sure
19 what to expect. He was the Chair of the Senate
20 Judiciary Committee. I did a quick review after
21 I got that appointment. And to my amazement,
22 found that all the work he had done, twenty
23 bills. Twenty bills he had done. And he said
24 to me right away, he will help and work on this.
25 And he did.

1 Unfortunately for me, and I think for a
2 lot of people, he had already announced that he
3 was not running for reelection. And I wish he
4 had run for reelection. He would have been
5 reelected and he could work on this. But after
6 he retired, we did recognize him.

7 And I just wanted to say that he was
8 a -- he was a person who initially started out
9 as a very tough on crime person. And I,
10 personally, don't have a problem with tough on
11 crime. But I do have a problem with being
12 unjust, unfair and discriminatory. And he was a
13 champion of changing that in the system.

14 So, I thank him. My condolences to his
15 family and his loved ones.

16 Thank you, Council President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
18 Councilman.

19 On behalf of the Majority, Chair
20 recognizes Councilman Domb.

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you, Council
22 President. I have a bit of a long speech today.

23 Three years ago, the Philadelphia Eagles
24 showed the world how teamwork, leadership,
25 imagination could overcome insurmountable odds

1 and make history. A running back takes the
2 snap, a tight end becomes a quarterback, a
3 quarterback becomes a wide receiver, and the
4 Eagles defeat Tom Brady to win the Superbowl.
5 It's amazing. Teamwork, leadership and
6 imagination. I have chills in my body right now
7 even just thinking about that. It was just
8 amazing.

9 So imagine this. Johnson and Johnson
10 has announced they are going to have millions of
11 vaccines. They have released their new vaccine.
12 It's a single-shot dose. And Philadelphia now
13 has 50,000 vaccines coming in per week to
14 contribute.

15 Picture this -- a football stadium
16 parking lot, labor parking lots, black church
17 parking lots, outdoor music venue parking lots
18 transforming into mass vaccination sites;
19 doctors, nurses and health professionals
20 mobilizing outside of their bricks-and-mortar
21 settings to administer thousands of vaccines a
22 day in parking lots around the City; the
23 National Guard activates not to defend the
24 Capitol against domestic terror but to combat a
25 deadly virus in coordination with community

1 leaders; our Health Department, 311 Center and
2 the Office of Innovation and Technology working
3 together, all managing an online tool and
4 telephone hotline that allows every
5 Philadelphian to register for their vaccination
6 and get an appointment or be placed on a waiting
7 list in a CDC-designed priority order; SEPTA
8 running subway service to the Linc and bus
9 service to all the parking lots and churches and
10 the Mann Music Center.

11 Just imagine that. Operation Philly
12 Special is the playbook that brings all of the
13 City's assets to bear to fight a deadly virus.

14 As all of you know yesterday, I and a
15 few of my colleagues on Council called upon the
16 Mayor to get behind Operation Philly Special.
17 Councilmembers Bass, Gilmore Richardson, Green,
18 Squilla stood in solidarity with me on behalf of
19 our residents. Councilman Johnson and Oh were
20 also supportive. Before I address the Mayor's
21 public response to Operation Philly Special, let
22 me first address his private response.

23 Within hours of my releasing a press
24 advisory naming the Members of City Council and
25 labor leaders who would stand with me in support

1 of mass vaccination sites, I begin getting phone
2 calls that the Mayor and his team were making
3 calls to shut our efforts down and quiet our
4 message, that we need a plan to vaccinate
5 thousands of people a day efficiently and
6 effectively. I asked the Mayor to join us
7 yesterday. Congressman Brady asked the Mayor to
8 join. We want to work with the Mayor and his
9 office, but I heard nothing back.

10 The Mayor's public response to our plan
11 was equally spiteful. He accused our supporters
12 of trying to give Philly vaccines to residents
13 of the suburbs.

14 This is what the Mayor said: Are you
15 deliberately trying to ensure that white,
16 privileged suburban residents of other counties
17 and states are prioritized for vaccination over
18 black and brown taxpayers of Philadelphia?

19 I don't know whether I'm more offended
20 or saddened by that statement. Does our Mayor
21 really think so little of us as to believe that
22 we would let out-of-state and out-of-county
23 residents come in and deplete our supply of
24 life-saving vaccines for Philadelphians?

25 I have asked Senator Sharif Street to

1 lead the effort to provide a National Guard
2 staffing at each one of our mass vaccination
3 sites to ensure that only Philadelphia residents
4 get Philadelphia vaccines. It's my
5 understanding that the Governor is fast-tracking
6 HB326 to allow the National Guard to do just
7 this. And that is how we will deal with the
8 Mayor's words: White privileged suburban
9 residents.

10 And as a point of clarification, I asked
11 this. What current vaccination program in
12 either a hospital, health system or pharmacy
13 does not ask for identification?

14 Former Mayor John Street was right
15 yesterday when he said these responses were
16 nothing more than red herrings designed to
17 deflect the public's attention away from this
18 Administration's lack of a willingness to pull
19 our amazing City partners together to develop
20 and then execute a mass vaccination distribution
21 plan when the supplies appear.

22 So, let me now address what happened
23 last week when Health Committee Chair Cindy Bass
24 called a hearing to investigate the Philly
25 Fighting COVID debacle. Last week I listened to

1 the testimony for five hours about the City's
2 plan for vaccine distribution. I have read all
3 ten pages of the plan.

4 To Members of City Council, the plan was
5 to outsource vaccine distribution to all of the
6 pre-pandemic vaccine distribution channels
7 without any real control of the vaccines once
8 they left the Administration's hands. And if
9 you are going to outsource vaccine distributions
10 through pre-pandemic channels and place all of
11 your trust in these for-profit institutions to
12 equitably distribute these public vaccines so
13 that communities of color are not left behind,
14 then you must first set up a unified information
15 platform across all these distribution channels
16 to register and schedule vaccination
17 appointments. And you must create a unified
18 information platform to track who gets these
19 vaccines.

20 You do it this way so the Health
21 Department knows, the Mayor knows, this body
22 knows. And so, the general public is confident
23 we are doing this the right way. We do this so
24 we are able to target who we need to target. We
25 do this so we see problems, we can move fast

1 enough to address them. And now is the time to
2 be transparent, inclusive, honest and
3 determined. We now -- we know right now that
4 over 54 percent, according to the website, of
5 the men and women receiving vaccines are white.
6 We can do better by controlling these things
7 through large sites like Lincoln Financial Field
8 with the right scheduling application in place.

9 When you don't centrally control where
10 these vaccines go, 22 year olds can hijack four
11 doses of vaccines for friends. And that is why
12 PHMC can offer to distribute its Philadelphia
13 doses to employees regardless of eligibility or
14 residency. We are discovering these problems
15 because conscientious citizens who saw these
16 diversions stepped up and sounded the alarm. We
17 can do better with more people at the table.

18 Up until last week, we had no real plan
19 to deal with teachers and reopen schools safely.
20 We have a stunning failure here to plan in a
21 collaborative manner.

22 Finally, when you fail to build equity
23 into your distribution plan on the front end and
24 you choose to outsource it to primarily
25 white-owned channels without controls, you have

1 lost the battle for equity on the front end and
2 now forced to scramble to get it on the back
3 end. And that is precisely what the City has
4 done and is doing. That's why Dr. Ala Stanford,
5 who is doing a phenomenal job, desperately calls
6 a press conference yesterday begging, begging
7 white citizens not to take vaccines distributed
8 in black neighborhoods because the City didn't
9 build an equity into its distribution plan on
10 the front end.

11 Mr. President, tremendous respect for
12 you. Yet time and again, your leadership has
13 pulled us all together. To move the City
14 forward, you've taught us all how to work with
15 this Mayor to achieve our goals. But at this
16 moment, our Mayor is fighting against us and not
17 with us. We need him with us.

18 We are on the verge of receiving massive
19 quantities of vaccines, perhaps 50,000 doses per
20 week or more. And we are told by the Mayor that
21 we do not need mass vaccination sites because
22 the system they have set up, a system that can
23 barely handle the doses we do have, can do the
24 job. What the Mayor calls his mass vaccination
25 sites in the report are, in reality, the gym of

1 a charter school, two small churches, the common
2 room of an adult care center, and a building on
3 the campus of one university building. What
4 Operation Philly calls mass vaccination sites
5 are the Linc, the Mann Center, four massive
6 parking lots and the largest black churches
7 throughout the City of Philadelphia.

8 The City's current mass vaccination plan
9 is the equivalent of vaccinating to a handful of,
10 like, mom-and-pop shops. Operation Philly's
11 plan is the equivalent of vaccinating through
12 super centers with controls in place to ensure
13 equitable and transparent distribution goals.

14 Mr. President, today I call upon this
15 Council and the citizens of Philadelphia to
16 speak with one voice and tell the Mayor this.
17 We can do so much more. We must do so much
18 more. And if we -- if you don't recognize this,
19 Mr. Mayor, then get out of the way and we will
20 do it ourselves.

21 I have spent the past week privately and
22 publicly begging the Administration, begging to
23 do the right thing, to join with us in preparing
24 to make mass vaccination sites a reality. And
25 all I have gotten in response is accusations

1 that I am motivated by something the Mayor calls
2 white privilege. Even after having my motives
3 questioned, I continue to stay for his support
4 and collaboration. So, let me be as clear as I
5 can be today.

6 The time to act is right now.

7 Mr. President, as you know, I sent a
8 letter to Commissioner Farley asking for mass
9 vaccination plan incorporating these ideas by
10 February 12. That's tomorrow. I, also,
11 intended to introduce a resolution today calling
12 on the Mayor to get behind Operation Philly
13 Special and direct the Health Department to
14 begin bringing these mass vaccination sites
15 online. Today, at your request, I'm holding off
16 on the resolution, holding off for a week, but I
17 have four requests from the Mayor.

18 First, direct the Health Commissioner to
19 immediately begin working with Councilmember
20 Bass and her committee and Members of Council
21 and Dr. Stanford to put Operation Philly Special
22 into action with the goal of putting vaccines in
23 the arms of the most -- of most Philadelphians
24 in the fastest timetable possible with built-in
25 systems to ensure the equitable distribution of

1 our vaccines.

2 Two, direct the Office of Information
3 Technology to begin working with Council and
4 community stakeholders to build a web-based and
5 phone-based platform that asks as a one-stop
6 shop to register and schedule all Philadelphians
7 to receive their vaccinations at the Philly
8 Special mass vaccination sites and track all
9 distributions from the City from vaccination
10 into their arm.

11 Third, make a commitment, a public
12 commitment to the citizens of Philadelphia, to
13 every citizen that registers and schedules an
14 appointment through our website will receive a
15 vaccination.

16 Fourth, call on Governor Wolf to
17 mobilize, if necessary, the National Guard to
18 the Philly Special mass vaccination sites to
19 ensure that Philadelphia vaccines only go into
20 the arms of Philadelphians.

21 Mr. Mayor, please, work with us. Take
22 these steps in the next seven days to make these
23 mass vaccination sites a reality. Philadelphia
24 lives depend on it. We need to do this.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
2 Councilman. Thank you so much.

3 As always, I reference myself as being
4 the uncle -- kind of joked about being
5 potentially the crazy uncle. But I understand
6 my role has grown into a person that tries to
7 bring people together. We are all focused on
8 getting vaccines in people's arms. And I am
9 just a firm believer as a glass half full kind
10 of guy.

11 We can work together and we can get this
12 done. I mean, we have to get this done. I
13 mean, the eyes are on us across the nation as a
14 result of some missteps that happened earlier in
15 this whole process. And I just -- we got to
16 figure this out one way or another. Because we
17 got -- there is too many people. I don't think
18 there's a person on this call or watching this
19 broadcast that doesn't know somebody, obviously,
20 that has had the vaccine for -- somebody that
21 has died, I'm sorry, from the COVID-19 disease.

22 I mean, this is -- this is the real
23 deal. So, we will take a few days to try and
24 pull this together. And I'm just believe that
25 like-minded people -- we are all like-minded

1 people on this particular incident/issue. We
2 will get it together. I know there are some
3 things in the work on all sides, but we got to
4 stay focused. We cannot -- this is not about
5 any of us on the screen. It's not about me, the
6 Mayor, any of the Council people. This is about
7 the citizens of the City of Philadelphia and
8 making sure they're safe.

9 So, Councilman, thank you. Thank you
10 for your offering engagement.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Council President, I
12 have a point of order. Could I be recognized?

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yeah. I was
14 just kind of waiting. I didn't want to
15 interrupt.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: No, thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Speeches are
18 a little different than a Council Session.

19 Councilman -- Councilman Oh, you had a
20 point of order.

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Yeah. Yeah, I do. And
22 I will be disruptive.

23 You know, talk is cheap. And we have
24 been talking and talking and talking about this,
25 but we have powers that we have to use. And I

1 have a bill, and the bill is that the Health
2 Department cannot continue to simply act on its
3 own without the oversight of Council. They are
4 restricted -- Law Department is saying they are
5 not. That is not my reading of the Code. I
6 have spoken to the state, but they are saying
7 they are not restricted by this Council, but
8 they are.

9 But to be clear, I have introduced a
10 bill that they have 60 days of emergency power.
11 And they have to come before this body to
12 justify and explain in detail what they're
13 doing, to answer our questions, to do all of
14 that or they shall be shut down. And this is
15 ridiculous. And it is beyond ridiculous that
16 this body tolerates this nonsense.

17 And I'm sorry, Councilman Domb, but you
18 voted against a resolution that I introduced
19 calling on the Mayor to work more closely with
20 Council. Perhaps at the time we were trying to
21 work with the Mayor and encourage him, that time
22 has passed. What is another resolution? What
23 is another speech and calling on? This
24 atrocious.

25 Dr. Fauci just announced that by April,

1 it's going to be open vaccinations. Everybody
2 is going to walk in. And the Federal Government
3 is saying, these are our vaccines, so you City
4 of Philadelphia, you can't decide who gets them
5 and not, it's open.

6 But we are not ready. And if we don't
7 get a grip and a handle on this and exercise
8 some oversight over this Health Department, it's
9 our fault when people are not able to go in and
10 get vaccinated, no more phasing. Just open
11 vaccinations.

12 And of course, how ridiculous is this
13 thing with the teachers knowing that they're
14 going back to work and everyone in the schools?

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilman?

16 COUNCILMAN OH: That's what I got to
17 say. Thank you, Council President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You're going
19 a little beyond the point of order. Thank you,
20 sir. You kind of jumping the line in the
21 speeches. Thank you. Thanks both of you,
22 Councilmembers.

23 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Wow. Thank you.
25 Thank you, Mr. President.

1 You know, this is a -- this brings us to
2 an interesting point. Because I think that what
3 we need to do here is, as Councilman Domb said,
4 you know, let's try to work with the
5 Administration. But I think as Councilman Oh
6 said, that if they don't, then we need to use
7 the powers that we have as Members of Council.
8 Because I am just continually appalled and
9 disturbed by information that is coming out
10 about the way vaccines have been distributed.

11 Just right after the hearing, we heard
12 about PHMC and the debacle that, you know,
13 allowed them to be able to send out an email to
14 their 3,000 employees offering the vaccine
15 regardless of whether you, you know, were at
16 risk, regardless of whether you were, you know,
17 in touch with patients or in a other
18 compromising situation that will put you in
19 closer line to being possibly infected with
20 COVID. You know, these are the kind of things
21 that we just can't happen, and they continue to
22 happen over and over and over again.

23 You know like I said, right before that,
24 we had just finished the hearing, a six-hour
25 hearing on Philly Fighting COVID. And the lack

1 of information, the lack of transparency was
2 really just outrageous. And so, while I always
3 want to work with the Administration first and
4 foremost, I think we have got to move on at some
5 point. Hopefully, they will hear our plea, hear
6 our cry and -- and decide to work together.

7 This is not the only solution. This is
8 one of multiple solutions that was posed to the
9 Administration. There is no reason why we can't
10 do this, why we can't work together. The
11 vaccine plan that -- if you want to call it a
12 plan that has been offered by the
13 Administration, I just think it's very
14 confusing. People still don't know where to go,
15 what to do, how to sign up, how to get access.
16 Some of the very basics of information are
17 missing.

18 Just last night, I was speaking to a
19 friend of mine who lives in Montgomery County
20 who told me about how she signed up for a
21 vaccine in Montgomery County. And all of the
22 information, the level of detail that was
23 provided in terms of what she would expect, when
24 she would expect to hear it, how she would be
25 contacted, all those things.

1 This is not rocket science. This is
2 something that should be easily figured out.
3 And you know, maybe they figured if they put it
4 in the hand of, you know, a group of kids
5 from -- recent graduates from Drexel University,
6 maybe they figure, you know, that was the best
7 way to do it. Obviously, we have some serious
8 doubts and concerns about their ideology around
9 how to get this done.

10 But you know, what we have right now in
11 Philadelphia is pretty much a national
12 embarrassment. A national embarrassment. And
13 so, we have to move forward and figure out what
14 it is that we are going to do. Because as all
15 of us know, people are dying. We all know
16 people who have died. I know people close to me
17 who have passed away from COVID.

18 You know, I'm outraged that, you know,
19 people still won't wear a mask. I still go by
20 people in some neighborhoods who still aren't
21 wearing masks, still not doing what we are
22 supposed to do. And even though the numbers are
23 starting to look better, we can see that things
24 are -- you know, we are just getting ready to
25 see a light at the end of the tunnel. We are

1 not there yet, so we still have work to do.

2 So, that's what I would like to say on
3 the vaccine.

4 I, also, really wanted to thank my
5 colleagues, Mr. President, for their support of
6 our resolutions on National Gun Violence
7 Survivors Week and also National Black HIV and
8 AIDS Awareness Day.

9 And a gun survivor -- just in case
10 anyone doesn't know, but I'm sure we are very
11 familiar. But a survivor of gun violence is
12 anyone whose life has been impacted by gun
13 violence, whether it's something they have
14 witnessed or threatened or wounded by a gunshot
15 themselves or were caring for someone who fell
16 victim to a gunshot.

17 Of these adult survivors, 68 percent are
18 Black and Latino. And what's even more
19 concerning is the fact that gun violence is the
20 leading cause for death for Black children and
21 teens in this country. Last year our City lost
22 nearly 500 Philadelphians to gun violence. And
23 over 2000 Philadelphians were injured due to gun
24 violence.

25 As the end of Jan -- as of the end of

1 January of this year, we already have recorded
2 38 fatal and 144 non-fatal victims. That was
3 just at the end of January. You know,
4 obviously, that number is significantly higher
5 now.

6 We as a City still have much work to do
7 as we continue to battle this public health
8 crisis. Last week was National Gun Violence
9 Survivors Week, but every day we should be
10 highlighting and supporting gun violence
11 survivors who, despite their painful experience,
12 continuous advocate -- continuously advocate for
13 change through support groups, community and
14 political organizing and even film making where
15 they continue to share their stories. We must
16 honor our survivors and work harder to reduce
17 gun violence to keep our residents safe and
18 healthy.

19 This past Sunday was also National Black
20 HIV/AIDS Awareness Day. And despite efforts in
21 medicine to treat HIV and AIDS, there is still
22 no cure which leaves our people vulnerable.
23 Almost 30,000 people living in the Greater
24 Philadelphia region have been diagnosed with
25 HIV. Black Americans are disproportionately

1 diagnosed with HIV. And black women in the
2 northeast particularly, are nearly 22 times more
3 likely than white women to be diagnosed. And
4 that's the northeast portion of the US. HIV
5 diagnosis among black, gay and bisexual men has
6 also increased by over 12 percent.

7 Bebashi - Transition to Hope was founded
8 as the first African-American organization in
9 the US to address the AIDS crisis. Since 1985,
10 this organization has focused on providing
11 quality healthcare, education and social
12 services, especially to low income people of
13 color. Bebashi serves as one of Philadelphia's
14 largest HIV and AIDS education and service
15 provider as a source of free healthcare, food
16 throughout the food first -- first food pantry,
17 and a safe space for the LGBTQIA community
18 through their HYPE Program.

19 Bebashi was certified in 2020 as a
20 champion in action in their category of
21 inclusion and equality. Every day, Bebashi
22 works to uplift low income and minority
23 communities by improving their access to quality
24 resources, which weren't in their reach before.
25 Today this body officially honors the work of

1 Bebashi and raising awareness of black HIV and
2 AIDS and the services they provide to address
3 the disparity in HIV and AIDS.

4 So, we want to give them a big shout out
5 and thank you for all of the work that they do.
6 Because just like COVID, AIDS is rampant,
7 obviously, in the African-American community.
8 We all know someone who is suffering or who
9 is -- we may have lost or who is dealing with
10 the AIDS and HIV within themselves or within
11 their family or their circle. So, big shout ut
12 to Bebashhi for all of the work that they have
13 done for the City of Philadelphia for many, many
14 years now.

15 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
17 Councilwoman. Thank you for your great work on
18 that.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
21 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
23 you to my colleagues and all that passion this
24 morning. Thank all of you.

25 I put my parents on seven lists. I got

1 a call that maybe today they will access to a
2 COVID vaccine. This is urgent. It is
3 necessary. And so, I want to be as helpful to
4 my colleges in this work.

5 Council President, today I want to talk
6 a little bit about the charge that you gave to
7 me through the co-chairmanship of the Special
8 Committee on Poverty Reduction. You know, for
9 the last two years, we have done a lot of work
10 around the poverty action plan. And you know,
11 we have three focus areas. One of them being
12 education and job training.

13 Through that work I got an opportunity
14 to spend a lot of time with a lot of subject
15 experts, but in particular with Dr. Generals and
16 Dr. Hite. It was clear to me that Community
17 College of Philadelphia is an underutilized
18 asset in the City of Philadelphia. It is clear
19 to me that Community College of Philadelphia
20 needs to be at the very center of our strategy
21 for workforce development and educational
22 attainment in the City of Philadelphia.

23 It is clear to me that Community College
24 should give every single high school kid in the
25 City of Philadelphia a clear and easy pathway to

1 dual enrollment opportunities, expanded
2 community CTE programming and career development
3 opportunities. Community College should be the
4 training arm for all our City departments as we
5 advocated for the pre-K program and still has
6 not happened in providing the providers and
7 their staff with an opportunity to get their
8 associates degree.

9 All things we know will help with their
10 upward mobility, will help with their access to
11 more income and opportunities. The Catto
12 Scholarship is a step in the right direction,
13 but we got to be bolder than that.

14 Today I want to publicly thank our First
15 Lady, Dr. Jill Biden in her call for Community
16 College for all. Every student in Philadelphia
17 should be able to go to Community College for
18 free. I urge Mayor Kenney and all the
19 stakeholders to join together and prepare a bold
20 plan. We need to be ready so that Philadelphia
21 can be on the front lines of this federal
22 opportunity. Community College has outlined
23 this in their strategic plan. Let's embrace it.
24 Let's make it happen.

25 We need to advocate for higher education

1 act reform that includes allowing students to
2 use Pel and Federal grants for essential
3 non-credit courses, for job training and
4 retraining and to support 21st century jobs
5 including advanced manufacturing. CCP's West
6 Philadelphia Campus is absolutely a step in that
7 direction.

8 I know, Council President, you've been a
9 strong advocate of expanding Community College's
10 footprint and access throughout the City. I
11 have talked to Alumni Congressman Dwight Evans
12 whom wholeheartedly supports how we support
13 Community College.

14 We also need to align many of our
15 existing programs to ensure that CCP can work
16 and could collaborate with the Philadelphia
17 Workforce Development Corporation, Philadelphia
18 Youth Network and, again, school-based CTE
19 programs throughout the City. With COVID safety
20 protocols, Council President, we need to go back
21 to our discussions about how do we make
22 school-based access programs to Community
23 College as in the case of Dobbins with
24 tremendous renovations and opportunities so that
25 the parents of those young people have access to

1 that kind of training.

2 Council President Clarke, I know you
3 support this. We got to make this happen. We
4 need to expand language access programs, high
5 school equivalency, GED and ESL instruction. In
6 my former life when I was at ASPIRA, I ran the
7 school at Edison in the evening for 300 adults.
8 Sometimes moving forward is about going back to
9 basics and doing some of the work that we know
10 has been effective. We all need to advocated
11 and support the diversity at Community College
12 of Philadelphia, its faculty and its
13 administration.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good?

15 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: We
16 need -- I'm sorry, Council President.

17 We need to especially make sure that
18 Community College, through its current board of
19 vacancies, has an opportunity to bring in
20 leaders from education and the business
21 community to help them with this work. Council
22 should also be at the table in these
23 discussions. We need our State government to
24 drive more support for State funding to pay the
25 State's fair share of Community College funding,

1 and to ensure workforce development
2 opportunities and funding.

3 As we look at our tough budget season, I
4 want us all, to urge us, to reimagine the
5 challenges we face and the opportunities that
6 these challenges create for us. Incremental
7 steps are a good start, but it's about bold
8 action and working together. Philadelphia
9 students should be able to go to Community
10 College for free. Their parents should also
11 have access. And it's our job to make it
12 happen.

13 As Chair of Education, I call on all of
14 us to make it happen.

15 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
17 Thank you, Councilwoman, so much. Very, very
18 much on point today. We will continue to stay
19 focused. In fact, education is the key for all
20 of us.

21 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
23 President.

24 A few weeks ago, I talked about the fact
25 that we can ask hard questions, but also work

1 together in a collaborative fashion. We have
2 been dealing with this issue of the pandemic
3 since last March. And it's been an issue that
4 has impacted every facet of our lives. And a
5 number of us have been doing all that we can to
6 address this issue.

7 Many people in this body know and others
8 that I serve in some different role and
9 capacities in addition to being a Member of City
10 Council. So when I learned about what was
11 happening in Detroit where they were doing mass
12 vaccinations, I reached out to our former
13 President of Democratic, Official Scott Benson,
14 about what steps Detroit was taking in order to
15 do mass vaccinations. And then, when my
16 Colleague Councilmember Domb talked about the
17 initiative that he was working on with others, I
18 thought I would join that effort. Because want
19 the opportunity to bring all the resources
20 together to try to help as many people in the
21 City get vaccinated.

22 Now, I was at the press conference
23 yesterday. The spirit and tenor of the press
24 conference was here is an additional idea or
25 suggestion to try to help as many people get

1 vaccinated as possible. Throughout the press
2 conference, the tenor was, we support and thank
3 the Administration for the work they are doing.
4 And here is an additional idea that can help
5 this initiative to get as many people vaccinated
6 as possible.

7 The passion I think that you heard in
8 today's Council Session came out of fact of a
9 statement that was made that, as a African
10 American Member of Council, and more importantly
11 as a black man who was born black and will die
12 black, was very offensive. But I'm going to
13 take the high road because it's important that
14 even though what's happened in the past, that we
15 work together to address this issue.

16 I am hoping that coming out of today's
17 session is not going to be additional attacks
18 from one side or the other. Let's just come
19 together and try to bring all the resources that
20 we have from no matter what background or
21 perspective, to try to get as many people in the
22 City of Philadelphia vaccinated. It's not about
23 Allan Domb's perspective or Cindy Bass or Derek
24 Green. We are all the City of Philadelphia.
25 It's not Mayor Kenney. It's not Dr. Farley.

1 It's not Members of Council. We all are the
2 City of Philadelphia.

3 So, I am hoping that coming out of this
4 conversation, we are going to move forward in a
5 collective way of working together, meaning
6 briefing strategies on how we are moving
7 forward. And it's not that I have the best way
8 versus your way. It's about how we all can come
9 together.

10 And so, I'm hoping that coming out of
11 today's conversation, we are going to have that.
12 We are not going to have additional attacks in
13 the media about what this person said or what
14 that person said. We are going to move forward.

15 This is a pandemic, as I have said and
16 we have all said, that we have never seen
17 before. People are afraid, they are fearful of
18 losing additional loved ones, losing their jobs,
19 losing their business. So, let's work going
20 forward to address this issue. And we have a
21 lot of other major issues that we have got to
22 work on.

23 We just came out of a year where we had
24 499 homicides. We are already 55 percent higher
25 than that now. We have got to work on a

1 pandemic, this homicide issue. We are going to
2 have a very challenging budget process. So, we
3 have to work together. And that was the spirit
4 out of yesterday's press conference. And for
5 me, that's been the spirit of this body, trying
6 to work together and not making it us verse them
7 because we are all the City of Philadelphia.

8 Thank you, Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
10 Councilman. Thank you so much. Appreciate you.

11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank you,
13 Council President. And good morning, everyone.

14 Earlier this week in a span of less than
15 24 hours, we lost seven Philadelphians to gun
16 violence. That is not just seven lives brought
17 to an untimely end, including a 15-year-old boy
18 who had his entire life ahead of him. It is not
19 just seven families grieving the sudden loss of
20 a loved one. It's entire communities
21 traumatized by the constant gun fire in their
22 street. It's kids distracted from their school
23 work. It's adults afraid to go to and from
24 their jobs. It's small business owners whose
25 work is impeded by the presence of violent

1 crime.

2 And unfortunately, this day wasn't an
3 aberration, far from it. Less than two months
4 into 2021, there have been 63 homicides in
5 Philadelphia. And that's a 51 percent increase
6 from the same time last year.

7 Let's be clear about what that means.
8 We are currently on track to have 50 percent
9 more homicides than we had in 2020, the second
10 most violent year in our City's modern history.
11 And this violence is concentrated in black and
12 brown neighborhoods. It's a reflection of the
13 systematic disinvestment, discrimination and
14 disadvantages that have been forced upon our
15 communities of color for generations.

16 Clearly, we must devote more resources
17 towards reducing gun violence. Our neighbors
18 living with the reality of this violence day in
19 and day out need relief right now. And that's
20 why today, along with my cosponsors and longtime
21 champions of combating gun violence
22 Councilmember Jones and Councilmember Johnson
23 introduced a resolution calling on President Joe
24 Biden and the United States Congress to
25 implement the President's proposal to end the

1 gun violence epidemic.

2 President Biden campaigned on an
3 ambitious plan to address gun violence,
4 including a \$900 million initiative to fund
5 evidence-based, violence intervention. And the
6 City's experiencing the highest number of
7 homicides per capita. This funding will save a
8 tremendous number of lives. It will fund the
9 expansion of existing gun violence prevention
10 programs and provide necessary resources to
11 launch new efforts.

12 President Biden's plan also calls for
13 reforming -- sorry. President Biden's plan also
14 calls for reforming federal programs that serve
15 communities affected by violence to address
16 trauma, increasing federal funding for
17 trauma-informed and culturally responsive care
18 and creating a network of trauma care centers
19 for survivors of violence. I am deeply
20 supportive of all these ideas, but it's time to
21 act.

22 In the week since Inauguration Day,
23 there have already been more than a thousand
24 lives lost to gun violence across our country.
25 So today, we are asking President Biden to move

1 quick in implementing this plan, and to
2 prioritize the parts of it that aim to end the
3 current gun violence emergency in black and
4 brown communities, both here in Philadelphia and
5 cities across the country. But I want to be
6 very clear. This does not absolve our City
7 government from gun violence reduction a top
8 priority.

9 Back in September, fourteen members of
10 this body cosponsored -- supported my resolution
11 urging Mayor Kenney to declare gun violence a
12 Citywide emergency. Five months later, 1,200
13 Philadelphians and counting have signed a
14 petition calling on Mayor Kenney to move forward
15 with these actions. Philadelphians know what an
16 emergency is. Gun violence is an emergency.
17 People dying on our streets every day is an
18 emergency. People feeling like their cries for
19 help are going unanswered is an emergency.

20 So today while we are calling on the
21 President to take action, that doesn't let us
22 off the hook as a City to do more to bring peace
23 and justice to our communities. The most urgent
24 and fundamental human need is to be safe, to be
25 free from the dangers that might suddenly end

1 our lives. If people aren't safe, nothing else
2 matters. And that's why we need action now to
3 address this violence head on.

4 Thank you so much.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
6 Thank you, Councilwoman. Keep up that -- that
7 fight. It's so, so significant.

8 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
10 Mr. President.

11 Mr. President, I simply want to make an
12 announcement for those Philadelphians who live
13 in ZIP codes 19150 and 19138 -- again, 19150 and
14 19138, I want to invite you to attend our Mount
15 Airy Community Council Virtual Meeting on
16 Thursday, February 18 at 6:00 p.m. Thursday,
17 February 18 at 6:00 p.m.

18 If you have an interest in youth
19 activities, any community-based activities, land
20 use activities regarding the RCO, town watch,
21 our vote squad and/or ward structures, we invite
22 you to participate in this meeting. And the
23 reason is -- and I need to say this for the
24 record to some community-based leaders who I met
25 with earlier this week, Mr. President, who were

1 talking about having received an influx of
2 invitations, and I don't know how they are --
3 sort of folks are, you know, acquiring this
4 information. But the residents have said, like,
5 well, we don't -- we have never heard of these
6 groups before, but they are sort of calling on
7 us, asking us to participate in different
8 activities but sort of we don't know who they
9 are.

10 With that being said, I want to remind
11 those of you who are in ZIP codes 19150 and
12 19138, that all of the organizations that will
13 be participating in this meeting on Thursday,
14 February 18 are organized and run by people who
15 live in these communities. The -- the agendas,
16 the strategies, the methods being employed to
17 address issues in the communities are not being
18 decided by people who don't live there.

19 For residents in my 20 and 26 and other
20 ZIP codes, we're coming. You just -- it's taken
21 us some time. But as soon as we get through
22 this Mount Airy Community Council Meeting, you
23 know we will be moving forward. Their website

7 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
9 Councilwoman.

10 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore
11 Richardson.

12 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank you, Mr.
13 President.

14 I wanted to provide a quick update
15 regarding our ongoing Police Reform Work. As
16 you know, we held a historic hearing last fall
17 in accordance with Bill 2003648-A and Resolution
18 200546. The hearing went on for seven hours,
19 and we heard from nearly 100 members of the
20 public about what they want to see in the new
21 police contract. This was the first time the
22 public was ever able to offer comment on this
23 crucial contract, which dictates nearly
24 15 percent of our City's budget.

25 Following the hearing, my team compiled

1 a report summarizing all of the testimony that
2 was offered, both during the hearing and in
3 writing. And I wanted to stop and thank my team
4 for their diligent work -- Taylor, Eliza,
5 Santos, Darnell and Sean. We then used those
6 findings to develop additional recommendations
7 for further action on police reform at the City,
8 state and federal levels.

9 As a member of the Police Reform Working
10 Group, I look forward to our continued work on
11 police reform in the City of Philadelphia.
12 Today I am publicly releasing the report. It
13 was important to me to layout very clearly what
14 we heard from the public, and to offer
15 recommendations based on their testimony.

16 This report has been shared with our
17 Deputy Mayor Rich Lazer. And I want to thank
18 him and his team for participating in the
19 process. I truly appreciate how our Deputy
20 Mayor always answers when we call. And he works
21 to be responsive so we can be responsive to our
22 constituents. So, thank you Deputy Mayor Lazer
23 for being a shining example of how to work
24 together with the legislative branch of
25 government.

1 The report is available on our Council

4 And lastly, Mr. President, I also wanted
5 to rise in support of my colleagues call to work
6 together with the Administration to ensure we do
7 all we can to get as many Philadelphians
8 vaccinated as possible. And that we speak with
9 one voice for one Philadelphia. I recognize
10 that this is not about Council or the
11 Administration. This is about saving lives and
12 protecting the health and safety of the people
13 we serve. So, I look forward to the work we
14 will do together.

15 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
17 Councilwoman. That appears to be the last
18 speech on behalf of Minority and Majority.
19 Before I call for an adjournment, just want to
20 say one quick thing.

21 We will figure this out, okay? When
22 it's time to step up, City Council always steps
23 up, all right? And I fully anticipate that we
24 will step up in a most meaningful way. We are
25 going to work together one way or another. But

1 the reality is, we all represent the City of
2 Philadelphia. We're the 18 board of directors
3 for the City. So, this doesn't happen unless we
4 get engaged and we figure this out. So, we will
5 be reaching out shortly. There is some
6 information that should be forthcoming about
7 what is happening as relates to the relationship
8 with the Federal Government.

9 So, we will reach out shortly. And
10 hopefully, we can start this process so we can
11 only have one silo, not these multiple silos
12 across the government. Got to thank you --
13 thank you, as always, so much for your passion
14 and your hard work and your commitment to the
15 City of Philadelphia.

16 Again, I know I say this every -- every
17 term. It's the best City Council that I have
18 ever worked with, right? So, I'm going to say
19 it again.

20 With that, Chair, would like to
21 recognize Councilman Jones for a motion to
22 adjourn.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I just -- the number one call my
25 office should be getting right now this time of

1 year should be potholes. It is: Where do I get
2 my vaccination? Which is so different.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Correct.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: And tomorrow we will
5 be at 57th and Vine with the testing van between
6 ten and twelve. All people are welcome to come
7 get tested until they can come get vaccinated.

8 And with that, Mr. President, I move
9 that Council stand adjourned until Thursday,
10 February 18, 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
13 It's been moved and seconded that Council stand
14 adjourned until Thursday, February 18, 2021 at
15 10:00 a.m.

16 All in favor, will indicate by saying
17 aye.

18 (Ayes.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those opposed
20 to?

21 (No opposition.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
23 Thank you all very much. Talk to you guys
24 shortly. Thank you and God bless you.
