25 At this time, I'd just like for

8 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
9 you, Council President.

10 Good morning, everyone. I
11 wanted to take a moment to discuss one of
12 the resolutions that I introduced today
13 which expresses support and concern for
14 the residents of St. Vincent and the
15 Grenadines, who are currently living
16 through an environmental emergency. The
17 La Soufriere volcano, which had been
18 dormant for 40 years, began showing signs
19 of activity back in December. On Friday
20 of last week, it erupted and has been
21 erupting regularly since, releasing
22 massive amounts of smoke and ash into the
23 air.

24 Experts warn that these
25 explosions could continue for days and

2 possibly weeks. This is creating massive
3 challenges for the country. Crops are
4 being wiped out, which leads to both
5 economic and food availability concerns.
6 Electricity is limited. Water and
7 medical supplies are running low. At a
8 time when hospitals are already straining
9 from the burden of COVID-19, they are now
10 also receiving an influx of patients who
11 are suffering from the effects of smoke
12 and ash inhalation.

13 This is personal for me and my
14 family. My mother and her siblings were
15 born and raised in St. Vincent and
16 immigrated to the U.S. as teenagers and
17 young adults. This is also personal for
18 the over 74,000 Caribbean immigrants
19 living in Philadelphia today. All of us
20 are concerned about our relatives and
21 loved ones in our home countries, and we
22 want to see them remain healthy and safe.

23 Government officials have been
24 working hard to evacuate residents from
25 the most dangerous areas surrounding the

3 thousands of people who remain at risk.
4 Neighboring countries and international
5 entities like the World Bank have stepped
6 up and stepped in to support the relief
7 effort. And I also want to let
8 Philadelphians know that there are a
9 variety of ways that you can support too,
10 whether by donating money, sending
11 supplies, or sharing information on this
12 disaster with family and friends through
13 your networks. Please visit me at
14 CouncilmemberJG on Facebook, Twitter, and
15 Instagram to find out more or about how
16 you can assist.

17 This is a very tragic
18 situation, and I hope and pray that St.
19 Vincent and all of its people come out of
20 this healthy and safe.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes,
14 Mr. President. With the addition of
15 Resolution No. 210303.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you.

18 Before we proceed with the
19 consideration of the public comment,
20 we're going to take a brief five minutes
21 to allow our technology professionals to
22 connect with our individuals who wish to
23 testify today.

24 So we'll take a brief five- to
25 ten-minute recess.

19 When you call, we will take

19 this. Once your allotted time has
20 passed, you will be asked to conclude
21 your remarks, and shortly thereafter you
22 will be muted and disconnected from the
23 remote meeting.

24 I also reserve the right to
25 limit the number of speakers where

19 is Tiffany Green, commenting on 210078-A.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning, and state your name for the
22 record and please proceed with your
23 testimony.

24 MS. GREEN: Good morning. Good
25 morning. Tiffany Green. Can you hear

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
4 we can.

5 MS. GREEN: Okay. Great. I
6 want to oppose Bill 210078, this 30-page
7 zoning bill. I'm asking for the
8 residents that I have worked with and
9 represent that we be exempt from this
10 bill. This is a removal of our rights.
11 This is a rezoning bill that's had no
12 community meetings, no community
13 information on the effects of this bill,
14 which we feel will have a detrimental
15 impact on our community.

16 This rezoning turns into a
17 by-right, which means the developer can
18 bypass the community. That means there's
19 no community process, and we feel as
20 though this is totally cutting out the
21 community.

22 Although this bill only touches
23 on the Ninth District and the Fifth
24 District and the Eighth District, I have
25 called some of my colleagues in the Fifth

2 District. They know nothing about this
3 bill.

4 And in the RSA-5 district in
5 this bill, and I'm saying to City
6 Council, how can you do this to
7 Philadelphia citizens? You're saying
8 that if someone has a 1,440 square foot
9 property, that you're allowing developers
10 to put two dwellings on one property.
11 That means the developer will charge --
12 they've already done it in our area
13 once -- \$400,000 for one building and
14 \$400,000 for another building. That's
15 \$800,000. That will increase the rents
16 in the area. It will increase the tax
17 assessments. It will take away the
18 character of the block.

19 Philadelphia citizens have the
20 right to have a community process and
21 have a say. By using this in the Ninth,
22 Fifth, and Eighth District -- and I'm
23 sure -- I'm not sure if it's in our
24 district, because the bill was confusing,
25 but you're saying to us that we should

2 not have a community process and a vote
3 on this.

4 Also, you have in here about
5 the setback from 8 feet to 5 feet and
6 also about the solar. We're saying at
7 this particular point, that this rezoning
8 bill is turning into a Jim Crow type of
9 bill. You're putting us on the back of
10 the bus and you're taking us and you're
11 saying that we don't count, and because
12 of that, we can no longer continue on to
13 have you rezoning these bills and
14 removing the community process.

15 We are entitled to a vote and a
16 community process. And City Council, for
17 a majority of African Americans, how can
18 you do this to the Black community? How
19 can you sit up there and put us on the
20 back of the bus and say we should not
21 have a vote and have a developer come
22 into our community and vote on the
23 process?

24 If you vote on this bill, you
25 are removing the rights of Philadelphia

2 citizens. That means healthcare workers,
3 retail workers, hotel workers, the
4 working poor people. You're saying they
5 don't have a right to come to the table
6 on vote on the development in their
7 community.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you.

10 MS. GREEN: Do the right thing
11 and don't vote this bill through.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Ms. Green. Thank you for your
14 testimony. We appreciate it.

15 Mr. Decker, next speaker.

16 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
17 is Joseph Pierce, commenting on 210303.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning. Please state your name for the
20 record and proceed with your testimony.

21 MR. PIERCE: Good morning. My
22 name is Joseph Pierce. Thank you,
23 Council President. I'm Director of
24 Government Relations and Advocacy for
25 Mental Health Partnerships based in

9 Philadelphia area.

10 In the span of our 70-year
11 history, Mental Health Partnerships has
12 touched and transformed the lives of over

15 challenges in the City. Not only
16 individuals but families have been
17 touched. Not only families but
18 communities have been affected.

19 Our staff are amazingly
20 dedicated people that are passionate
21 about the work and about our
22 participants. We thank City Council, the
23 Administration, and the hard-working
24 folks at DBH for your unwavering support
25 of our efforts as we continue to meet the

16 Mr. Decker, next name.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
18 is Jenaye Johns, commenting on 210296.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning. Please state your name for the
21 record and proceed with your testimony.

22 MS. JOHNS: Good morning. My
23 name is Jenaye Johns, President and
24 founder of Once Upon a Preemie Academy.
25 I'm calling in this morning in full

3 adoption of Philadelphia's Black Maternal

5 As the mother of a pre-term
6 infant and the founder of the Health and

9 believe it is our civic and professional
10 duty to support the lives of Black
11 working women in the City of
12 Philadelphia.

13 We know that Black women are
14 2.5 more times likely to die after
15 pregnancy-related complications, and
16 African American women such as myself are
17 50 percent more likely to deliver their
18 babies prematurely compared to their
19 white counterparts. These alarming
20 disparities based on race and ethnicity
21 are completely avoidable and preventable.

22 I would like to thank City
23 Council President and the co-sponsors of
24 this resolution and hope that we are able
25 to adopt it to protect the lives of Black

16 is Porsha Holland, commenting on 210296.

20 MS. HOLLAND: Yes. Good
21 morning. My name is Porsha Holland. I
22 am the founder and CEO of Reclaim Black
23 Motherhood, a birth doula, a lactation
24 counselor, birth worker trainer and
25 mentor here in the City of Philadelphia.

2 I'm the mother of a three-year-old child.

3 I experienced a traumatic birth

4 experience and was prompted to do this

5 work to respond to the Black maternal

6 health crisis that Black women face

7 nationwide and particularly here in the

9 It's no question, it's no

10 wonder about the statistics and the data

11 that 0.2, the ill treatment, and the

12 horrific birth and postpartum outcomes

13 that Black women face in this country and

14 here in the City of Philadelphia include

15 it.

16 It is a privilege and a right

17 to be able to birth and build your family

18 without the concern of death, of racist

19 practices, and of being treated with harm

20 and neglect while having the most

21 beautiful experience that one should

22 have.

23 So I stand in full support of

24 not only recognition but financial

25 support, movement-building around Black

2 Maternal Health Week so birth workers can
3 be placed in positions to support Black
4 families through this process, so that
5 families can have the financial right and
6 obligation to quality healthcare from
7 Black providers, and also so that those

10 racism in this city and nationwide.

11 Thank you so much.

20 MS. GONZALEZ: Good morning.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MS. GONZALEZ: Good morning.

24 My name is Elisha Gonzalez. I am
25 responding in support to Resolution

2 210296. I am a birth doula and
3 postpartum doula, and I am in full
4 support due to the consistent needs that
5 are in the Black community, especially
6 Black moms. We have the right to have
7 the support that is needed. We have the
8 right to be heard.

9 In a lot of the medical
10 facilities, we see a lack there with
11 communication and with the right to have
12 all of the support that we need, all of
13 the resources that we need in our
14 community. Even to the extent of
15 postpartum, there's a lot of need, and I
16 feel that supporting this will be
17 beneficial to the community and the moms
18 that are present.

19 That's all.

21 Thank you. Thank you so much for your

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

15 President of the Bella Vista Neighbors
16 Association, and I apologize for going
17 out of order. I couldn't get on earlier.

18 I'm here to testify in support
19 of Bill No. 210135. Aside from a few
20 pop-up performances in our parks, the
21 curb nodes remain largely closed on our
22 arts and entertainment sector, which is
23 continuing to suffer one of the more
24 prolonged impacts of this pandemic.
25 We've heard time and time again from

9 lifeline to additional sectors, help
10 restaurants attract patrons and provide a
11 much-needed cultural experience to our
12 residents, which can enrich and uplift us
13 during this difficult time.

14 Here in Bella Vista in the 9th
15 Street Market, we have some great
16 interest already among local artists,
17 such as Michelle Angela Ortiz, to produce
18 our markets, our multi-layer performance
19 with classical music and images of
20 immigrants in the market and honoring
21 those who have passed away due to COVID,
22 and performances like this are only
23 possible thanks to having space be
24 available and having this be available to
25 additional sectors as well.

9 and direction to encourage the safe
10 return to Philadelphia for work and play
11 as vaccines roll out. Thank you for the
12 opportunity to speak with you today on
13 behalf of restaurants and businesses in
14 the downtown core, which continue to
15 struggle as a result of the pandemic.

16 The future of many of the
17 restaurants rely on people coming back to
18 the City, and part of Ready.Set.Philly!'s
19 role is to identify ways to attract
20 workers back to their Philadelphia
21 workplaces.

22 So we are in support of Bill
23 No. 210135 because we believe the City
24 should keep streeteries and enhanced
25 outdoor dining as long-term features.

2 Outdoor dining will continue to be
3 essential to the financial viability of
4 restaurants. Reducing restrictions and
5 fast-tracking permitting on sidewalk
6 cafes, streeteries, and outdoor dining

9 outdoor attractions and entertainment
10 create buzz, drawing residents, those
11 thinking of transitioning back to the
12 workplace, and visitors to the City.

13 Before the pandemic, our food
14 theme was Having a Moment. We were named
15 among the best in GQ, Forbes, Food and
16 Wine, Travel and Leisure, Esquire. As we
17 start to rebuild, we believe that your
18 initiatives like those outlined in the
19 outdoor entertainment bill, businesses
20 and elected leaders can work together to
21 ensure the City's restaurants redeem
22 their roles in our vibrant community and
23 serve as a catalyst to help jump-start
24 commerce. We want the City to become
25 more livable for residents and more

14 MR. NEWMUS: Thank you. My
15 name is Michael Newmus, Chief of Staff at
16 Visit Philadelphia. On behalf of Visit
17 Philadelphia, I'm so pleased to support
18 the outdoor entertainment bill, 210135.
19 This bill will help our restaurant
20 industry recover from the economic
21 crisis. This creative solution will
22 empower restaurants, drive sales, and
23 support jobs for Philadelphians.

24 Prior to COVID, Philadelphia
25 had more than 54,000 workers employed by

3 fact, in January of 2020, more than 6,000
4 residents in each Council district held
5 family-sustaining leisure and tourism and
6 hospitality jobs. This measure will also

9 traffic, supporting nearby retail shops,
10 attractions, and other adjacent
11 neighborhood businesses throughout
12 commercial corridors in each of our
13 neighborhoods.

14 Philadelphia's hospitality
15 industry continues to be one of the
16 hardest hit sectors by the pandemic. We
17 want to thank Councilmember Richardson
18 and others for their vision and
19 introducing this bill. And Council
20 President Clarke and members of Council,
21 we all thank you for your time and your

13 appreciate her mentorship and leadership,
14 and I look forward to supporting her in
15 whatever next steps that she takes,
16 because I know it will benefit us as a
17 city.

21 Awareness Month, and one of the

22 outstanding initiatives that Mental

23 Health Partnerships has helped to steer

24 is the Community Autism Peer Specialist

25 Program. It's a program that allows

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2 those on the autism spectrum to actually
3 earn a wage and income at the same time
4 mentoring younger people on the autism
5 spectrum. And Mental Health Partnerships
6 has been able to partner with the
7 Philadelphia Autism Project, Community
8 Behavioral Health, and our city's
9 Department of Behavioral Health and
10 Intellectual disAbility Services.

11 So this CAPS program has been a
12 phenomenal program. It's now becoming an
13 international model for a number of
14 different jurisdictions looking at how
15 they can provide real opportunities for
16 those on the autism spectrum not only to
17 receive gainful employment but also to
18 help the next generation of those on the
19 autism spectrum to become self-advocates.
20 And I think this is a very outstanding
21 example of the great work that Mental
22 Health Partnerships has done over their
23 70 years.

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson?

5 Councilwoman.

6 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:

7 Mr. President, I move for the adoption of
8 this resolution.

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
11 been moved and properly seconded.

12 All in favor --

13 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Can
14 you hear me?

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
16 have you now, Councilwoman.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: We can
18 hear you now, Council Lady.

19 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: I
20 move for the adoption of the resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
24 seconded.

25 All in favor indicate by saying

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it, and that resolution is
9 adopted.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
11 authorizing the Committee on Housing,
12 Neighborhood Development and the Homeless
13 to hold hearings to determine how the
14 City of Philadelphia should best use the
15 one-time opportunity to create permanent
16 solutions to homelessness arising as a
17 result of Philadelphia's allocation of
18 \$42 million through the American Rescue
19 Plan in support of affordable housing and
20 homelessness assistance, introduced by
21 Councilwoman Gauthier on behalf of
22 Council President Clarke.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank

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2 you, Council President. I move for the
3 adoption of the resolution.

4 (Duly seconded.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
6 been moved and properly seconded.

7 All those in favor indicate by
8 saying aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and that resolution is
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
17 other resolutions on the Final Passage
18 Calendar, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

21 That completes our Calendar for
22 today. I just want to say that we have a
23 special presentation today. The time has
24 come for --

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

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2 Mr. President, the sound went on mute.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can
4 you hear me now?

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: I can't
6 hear you now, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'll
8 try it again.

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: I'm not
10 sure if our colleagues, if they're
11 hearing and I am not, but -- you can?
12 Okay.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can
14 you hear me?

15 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: I can hear
16 you, Council President.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: We can hear
18 you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
20 right. We have a little drama today.
21 All kinds of --

22 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Sometimes
23 you go in and out.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
25 right. We're good now. Okay.

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2 The time has come for us to
3 consider the Mayor's presentation of his
4 annual budget message. The Philadelphia
5 Home Rule Charter states that the Mayor
6 shall submit to Council, no later than
7 90 days before the end of the fiscal
8 year, his Operating Budget message and
9 Proposed Operating Budget ordinance for
10 the ensuing fiscal year. At the same
11 time, the Mayor shall submit to Council
12 the Recommended Capital Program and
13 Capital Budget as received from the City
14 Planning Commission, to the extent
15 approved by the Mayor.

16 I will now ask for a brief
17 recess to give our technology
18 professionals time to cue up the Mayor's
19 budget message.

20 (Brief pause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. Thank you for allowing us to
23 have that brief as we cue the Mayor's
24 budget address.

25 We will now consider the

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2 Mayor's budget address.

3 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you,
4 Council President Clarke and members of
5 City Council, for inviting me to speak to
6 you today.

7 As surreal as it is to be
8 joining you virtually and not in Council
9 Chambers, I am pleased to present our
10 sixth proposed Five Year Financial Plan,
11 covering Fiscal Years 2022 through 2026.

12 Unlike the previous five, this
13 Plan comes in the wake of what many
14 consider the most challenging year in
15 Philadelphia's history.

16 The combination of a global
17 pandemic, a tumultuous presidential
18 election, a worsening gun violence
19 epidemic, and long overdue demands for
20 racial justice have tested the resolve
21 and resilience of every single
22 Philadelphian.

23 We've experienced a great deal
24 of loss. We lost loved ones, many lost
25 their jobs, and others lost businesses

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2 they worked years to build.

3 But I, for one, have never lost
4 hope - hope for our City's ability to
5 rebound, hope for our capacity to
6 overcome, and hope for an eventual return
7 to all that makes Philadelphia great.

8 I base this optimism on the
9 strength and dedication I witnessed from
10 the thousands of first responders and
11 City of Philadelphia employees over the
12 last year.

13 We fed students and residents
14 at hundreds of meal sites. We
15 distributed PPE to frontline and
16 essential workers. We kept residents
17 from losing their homes. We opened our
18 parks for record use of safe recreation.
19 We supported local businesses with a
20 focus on equity. We saved lives by
21 following the science and working from
22 home. And along with many partners, we
23 have administered a million doses of
24 vaccine at over 250 sites citywide.

25 I am incredibly proud that

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2 throughout the pandemic, our workforce
3 responded with the tenacity and grace of
4 true public servants, working incredibly
5 hard to meet the changing needs of our
6 residents.

7 This Plan builds on all of
8 these efforts so that Philadelphians in
9 every neighborhood can benefit from a
10 strong, inclusive recovery.

11 Over the next five years, we
12 will move Philadelphia forward by
13 providing core services that people
14 depend on, accelerating inclusive
15 economic growth, maintaining the City's
16 long-term fiscal health, and reducing
17 racial disparities.

18 As you can imagine, a
19 significant part of our Five Year Plan is
20 dependent on the estimated \$1.4 billion
21 in Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery
22 Funds we're slated to receive from the
23 Biden Administration's American Rescue
24 Plan.

25 This one-time federal relief

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2 will help ease the effects of projected
3 revenue declines for business closures
4 and changes to workplace occupancy that
5 were necessary to slow the spread of the
6 virus.

7 To date, we have received over
8 \$800 million in federal, state, and local
9 recovery funding to assist with new costs
10 arising from the pandemic.

11 And in addition to the
12 \$1.4 billion, we're anticipating that we
13 will receive over 100 million more in
14 targeted support through the American
15 Rescue Plan, the only funding source that
16 can be used to help with the revenue
17 losses that we have sustained as a result
18 of the pandemic.

19 The American Rescue Plan will
20 help fill a gap this fiscal year and our
21 projected budget deficit resulting from
22 the pandemic for the first four years of
23 the Plan.

24 Equally important, it allows us
25 to act on the harsh lessons from this

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2 crisis. For example, we know now more
3 than ever that we must plan for future
4 disruptions and build a resilient fund
5 balance.

6 This Plan puts us on that path.
7 And while \$1.4 billion sounds like and is
8 substantial, it by no means fully meets
9 our long-term and recurring needs.

10 The actual need over five years
11 is well over 1.5 billion in order to
12 restore core services to pre-pandemic
13 levels, have funds for ongoing pandemic
14 response, meet new service needs and
15 priorities, and set us up for ongoing
16 fiscal stability.

17 The American Rescue Plan funds
18 will certainly have a positive impact
19 when jump-starting Philadelphia's
20 economy, but I think we can agree that
21 it's not enough to simply recover. We
22 need to rebuild equitably while ensuring
23 growth that benefits all.

24 Every industry has felt the
25 brunt of the pandemic, and far too many

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2 of our businesses are still struggling to
3 survive. So it's time to safely reopen,
4 support business growth, and create
5 economic security for all Philadelphians.

6 I'm proud to report that this
7 Plan proposes no tax or fee increases.
8 In fact, we'll help businesses and
9 residents by providing tax relief.

10 We'll enact wage tax reductions
11 to the lowest level in 50 years and
12 achieve the biggest wage tax rate cut in
13 more than a decade, with a deeper cut
14 than was even included in the
15 pre-pandemic plan for Fiscal Year 22.
16 This cut will help jump-start our economy
17 and provide relief to workers.

18 We'll also restore previously
19 planned reductions to business tax rates,
20 and the parking tax rate will return to
21 pre-pandemic levels.

22 I understand that people may
23 want us to tax wealthy corporations or
24 wealthy individuals, but as we're all
25 aware, because of the Uniformity Cause of

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2 the Pennsylvania Constitution, we're
3 required to have the same tax rate for
4 our small businesses as our largest
5 corporations and the same wage tax rate
6 for our essential workers and the highest
7 earning workers.

8 We must continue to work
9 together to lobby Harrisburg for changes,
10 while continuing to improve what's within
11 our control to support local business.

12 To help our commercial
13 corridors, we will provide \$300,000 in
14 increased funding for storefront
15 improvement and security grants and
16 \$450,000 for PHL Taking Care of Business
17 Corridor Cleaning Program. This follows
18 a \$10 million investment last year for
19 services in FY21 and FY22.

20 This initiative, championed by
21 Councilmember Parker, helps keep
22 neighborhood corridors attractive places,
23 while providing accessible job
24 opportunities.

25 We'll also continue to find

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2 ways to make it easier to do business
3 with the City by improving operations,
4 investing in staff for a Business
5 Response Team, and helping get more
6 minority businesses certified so they can
7 compete for City and other contracts.

8 We're committed to closing the
9 opportunity gap experienced by minority,
10 immigrant, and women-owned businesses
11 that have been disproportionately
12 impacted by COVID-19.

13 For instance, we'll increase
14 opportunities for entrepreneurs by
15 engaging minority, women, and
16 disabled-owned business in significant
17 business with the City; investing in
18 technical assistance and capacity
19 building to help businesses grow;
20 actively advancing public and private
21 sector procurement reform; and by
22 establishing an Entrepreneur Industry
23 Partnership.

24 And to increase opportunities
25 for small business, the City, thanks to

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2 the leadership of Councilmember Green,
3 streamlined the application process for
4 small contracts. The Local Business
5 Procurement Initiative raised the
6 threshold requiring formal bids for City
7 contracts from 34,000 to 75,000, and to
8 100,000 for local businesses. This will
9 make it faster and easier for small
10 businesses to compete for contracts.

11 While we focus on business, we
12 cannot forget our workforce. We include
13 \$3 million to the Office of Workforce
14 Development; \$2 million for a
15 Transitional Jobs Program; \$150,000 for
16 the Color Me Back Same Day Pay program;
17 almost \$1.5 million in adult education
18 programs; and \$170,000 for digital equity
19 initiatives.

20 Together these investments in
21 our Black and Brown entrepreneurs and
22 workforce better position Philadelphia to
23 be more adaptable and agile to the future
24 of work. It will help us stay ahead and
25 reap the benefits from rapid changes in

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2 technology, e-commerce, remote work, and
3 automation, which have been accelerated
4 by the pandemic.

5 Additionally, in the Capital
6 Program, we've earmarked \$20 million
7 towards economic development projects
8 like the I-95 Cap, Schuylkill River
9 Development Corporation's Christian to
10 Crescent, and East Market and
11 Neighborhood Commercial Center
12 improvement projects.

13 Fortunately, the American
14 Rescue Plan is not just helping relieve
15 pressure on the City budget. It will do
16 the same on household budgets and bring
17 federally funded benefits to more than a
18 million Philadelphians.

19 The stimulus payments, the
20 expansion of Earned Income Tax Credit,
21 and expanded child tax credit will
22 provide critical cash support to
23 Philadelphians who need it. We estimate
24 that together the EITC and child tax
25 credit will help move more than 75,000

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2 Philadelphians out of poverty this year,
3 and could cut the rate of children in
4 deep poverty in Philadelphia this year by
5 half.

6 But to make the promise of
7 these new benefits a reality,
8 Philadelphians will have to take action
9 and file tax returns, even if they have
10 not done so in prior years or do not owe
11 any taxes, so we are committed to
12 connecting Philadelphians with the tax
13 refunds they are entitled to.

14 And we will be urging Congress
15 to make these one-year changes permanent,
16 so that our families get out and stay out
17 of poverty for good.

18 Over the last few years, we
19 have worked to reverse old practices of
20 balancing our budget based on fines and
21 fees that mostly impact those who can
22 least afford to pay. So I am pleased to
23 continue our elimination of the fines and
24 fees that disproportionately burden Black
25 and Brown Philadelphians.

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2 With our partners, we've
3 eliminated bail fees, library fines, and
4 now we will eliminate fees that burden
5 families with individuals incarcerated in
6 our prisons.

7 These investments, and more,
8 aim to spur economic recovery and growth,
9 reduce poverty, and create inclusive and
10 thriving neighborhoods, as we've been
11 working to do over the last five years.

12 These investments also
13 complement the ones we've made with
14 recovery grants we received, which are
15 allowing us to invest over \$170 million
16 to help people afford to stay in their
17 homes and another \$140 million to support
18 non-profits and small businesses impacted
19 by the pandemic.

20 We'll work hard to keep even
21 more residents from losing their homes by
22 investing hundreds of millions of dollars
23 over five years for home repairs, rental
24 assistance, eviction and mortgage
25 diversion, support for people

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2 experiencing homelessness, and affordable
3 housing development.

4 I'm proud that Philadelphia is
5 a national model receiving deserved
6 attention for our work on housing and
7 eviction and creating a rental assistance
8 infrastructure ready to serve thousands
9 of residents in need.

10 I know this is a shared
11 priority of Council President Clarke who
12 launched the Neighborhood Preservation
13 Initiative last year with the same
14 mission.

15 And because Councilmembers
16 Brooks, Gauthier, and Gym came together
17 with a bold package of legislation, the
18 Emergency Housing Protection Act
19 stabilized rents, created an eviction
20 diversion program, and ensured that
21 Philadelphians were able to stay in their
22 homes during an uncertain time.

23 I'm pleased to also increase
24 funding for the arts by \$1.35 million,
25 including doubling the Cultural Fund.

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2 Not only is the arts community part of
3 the fabric that makes our city great, but
4 we also view the creative economy as a
5 core sector for recovery, one whose
6 reinvestment will pay dividends in the
7 future.

8 I am pleased to continue
9 investments in our shared public spaces,
10 including \$2.9 million to restore
11 five-day service, after-school programs,
12 and other services at the libraries, and
13 \$6.9 million to restore recreation
14 programs and reopen pools.

15 Summer 2021 will be exciting
16 and enriching, full of opportunities for
17 learning and fun for youth of all ages.
18 We have our School District Partnership
19 for summer academic and enrichment camps,
20 Playstreets, Parks and Rec summer camps,
21 City Out-of-School Time summer camps in
22 the community, as well as summer
23 WorkReady for older youth.

24 We know that these types of
25 activities are lifelines for our kids,

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2 and believe that keeping children and
3 youth engaged in dynamic summer
4 experiences will help keep them safe and
5 reduce community violence.

6 We will also dedicate another
7 \$10 million in Fiscal Year 22 and
8 \$50 million over the six-year Capital
9 Program to the FDR Park Master Plan,
10 which will support building and site
11 improvements for this transformational
12 project that's near and dear to
13 Councilmember Johnson and myself.

14 We know what the Lakes meant to
15 us as kids and what it has meant to
16 residents during the pandemic, and we
17 want to continue this legacy for our own
18 kids.

19 The Capital Program includes an
20 historic \$317 million over six years in
21 street paving and ADA curb ramps. With
22 132 million in Fiscal Year 22, this is
23 the largest single-year investment in the
24 City's history. It will help workers,
25 residents, and visitors access

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2 destinations reliably and safely,
3 something I know that's important to
4 Councilmember Thomas.

5 Finally, to foster clean and
6 safe communities, we'll invest
7 \$62 million over five years to expand
8 mechanical street sweeping, with a focus
9 on Black and Brown communities that are
10 often hit the hardest by illegal dumping.

11 And, yes, like I mentioned
12 during last year's budget address before
13 the pandemic struck, we will be asking
14 residents to move their cars to sweep our
15 streets.

16 We know now more than ever
17 creating a thriving city truly depends on
18 the health of all communities.

19 We must work to eliminate
20 health disparities and safeguard
21 residents from threats that cause disease
22 and injury. Therefore, we're investing
23 \$250,000 to build on existing efforts to
24 produce a plan to improve racial equity
25 in health outcomes.

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2 This includes preventing
3 chronic health conditions like diabetes
4 and heart disease that disproportionately
5 affect people of color. We have to
6 ensure all children and families have
7 access to nutritious foods, decreased use
8 of addictive and toxic products, and
9 access to safe, green spaces.

10 We'll also invest \$1 million
11 for air management to improve air
12 pollution oversight. Air pollution, like
13 that emitted by boilers and generators,
14 contributes to health problems like heart
15 disease, asthma, lung disease, and
16 respiratory tract infections. The
17 concern is greatest amongst adults with
18 other health problems, children, and the
19 elderly and results in significant racial
20 disparities.

21 Because our fight against
22 COVID-19 is far from over, the Plan sets
23 aside \$50 million for COVID containment
24 as part of a \$75 million Reopening and
25 Recession Reserve. This is in addition

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2 to over 220 million in targeted grant
3 funding we received to support our public
4 health response to the pandemic and in
5 addition to over \$60 million that we are
6 projecting to receive from the American
7 Rescue Plan for vaccine activities and
8 testing for the School District.

9 We must continue to provide our
10 Department of Public Health, Office of
11 Emergency Management, and other agencies
12 with the resources required to
13 effectively combat COVID-19. To date, we
14 have deployed over \$140 million to the
15 public health and safety response to
16 purchase PPE, establish a surge medical
17 hospital, distribute meals to vulnerable
18 populations across the City, stand up
19 hotels where people can safely quarantine
20 and isolate, improve the safety of our
21 shelter system, and much more.

22 We must continue to prioritize
23 addressing mental health, including
24 concerns exacerbated by the pandemic,
25 through a system of care in which

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2 professional treatment, along with
3 family, individual, and other resources,
4 allow people to manage their own
5 conditions and build self-resilience.

6 In fact, across all the funds
7 we administer, investments in the
8 Department of Behavioral Health and
9 Intellectual disAbility Services are more
10 than \$1.6 billion in Philadelphia, more
11 than double the Police Department's
12 budget.

13 We also make a strong
14 commitment to fighting the opioid crisis.
15 Significant progress has been made in
16 saving lives by reducing overdose deaths,
17 but since March of last year, COVID-19
18 has prompted an increase in fatal drug
19 overdoses, particularly in Black and
20 Brown communities.

21 The supply chains for help and
22 support have been broken. Drug-related
23 violence has soared.

24 Equally important, this past
25 year demonstrated a vital need to center

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2 racial and social equity in our opioid
3 response.

4 So the Plan allocates \$400,000
5 for opioid treatment and \$500,000 for the
6 Opioid Response Unit, our
7 multi-departmental effort to address the
8 opioid epidemic.

9 And later this month, the
10 Opioid Response Unit will unveil its new
11 Action Plan, an overview of both how far
12 Philadelphia has come and how far we
13 still must go in the fight against opioid
14 use disorder.

15 I'm incredibly proud of the
16 work being done, but these are just the
17 first steps of many. Our efforts will
18 not end until once again there is a
19 healthy population and safe and thriving
20 communities, untainted by the scourge of
21 opioids.

22 While containing the pandemic
23 is among our most pressing priorities, we
24 know that in some ways it pales in
25 comparison to our other longstanding

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2 public health crisis - gun violence.

3 In 2020, Philadelphia lost 402
4 people to gun violence, the most
5 gun-related homicides in 30 years. With
6 more than 140 people killed since the
7 start of this year, 2021 is on track to
8 be the worst year on record. Solutions
9 must expand to match the scale of the
10 problem.

11 As a result, a total of
12 \$18.7 million of additional funding in
13 FY22 on anti-violence efforts for a total
14 of 35.5 million of investment. Over the
15 life of the FY22 through FY26 Five Year
16 Plan, this is an additional investment of
17 \$70 million.

18 This includes new investments
19 such as 1.3 million to expand proven
20 violence interruption programs like
21 Community Crisis Intervention programs
22 and Group Violence Intervention; \$2
23 million in the transitional jobs program
24 I mentioned earlier; \$500,000 for
25 expansion of Targeted Community

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2 Investment Grants for violence prevention
3 programs run by our community partners;
4 and 1.35 million for community
5 improvements, including graffiti cleanup,
6 vacant lot remediation, clean and seal
7 efforts, and improve lighting and
8 visibility in key neighborhoods.

9 We must stem the tide of gun
10 violence while also addressing the
11 systemic racism in policing that impacts
12 Black and Brown Philadelphians.

13 We've heard from the public and
14 leaders in our communities that we must
15 reimagine our approach to policing to
16 create the safety all Philadelphians have
17 a right to.

18 To improve police response to
19 people calling 911 and behavioral health
20 crises, the Plan funds a \$6 million
21 investment for improvements to the
22 process of triaging 911 calls and
23 expansion of the pilot co-responder
24 teams.

25 Another \$7.2 million expansion

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2 of behavioral health mobile crisis units
3 and a crisis hotline will improve how
4 emergency mental health services are
5 delivered in crisis situations.

6 Working with you all, and
7 especially with the leadership of
8 Councilmember Jones, we are launching a
9 new \$1.9 million Citizen Police Oversight
10 Commission to restore public confidence,
11 to review residents' complaints, and to
12 create better police-community
13 interactions.

14 The Plan also allocates
15 \$750,000 for expanded training for the
16 Police Department so our officers have
17 the tools and skills to make good
18 decisions when put in difficult
19 situations.

20 And another \$400,000 is
21 earmarked for its Early Intervention
22 System, a critical piece of the
23 Department's reform plan which uses
24 technology to help identify and reward
25 positive police behaviors as well as

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2 intervene before an officer is in a
3 situation that warrants formal
4 redirection.

5 To ensure the Philadelphia
6 Police Department has the tools they need
7 to solve crimes, we'll commit \$2 million
8 for the upgrades in the Office of
9 Forensic Science.

10 And while we will do everything
11 we can alongside our criminal justice
12 partners to reduce violence and hold
13 violent offenders accountable, we must
14 continue to call on the Pennsylvania
15 legislature to let us meet Philadelphia's
16 unique needs.

17 Until we address the
18 availability and access to firearms, we
19 will always be fighting an uphill battle.
20 We need the ability to adopt proven gun
21 policies that will save lives.

22 We know from firsthand
23 experience how invaluable local control
24 can be. We saw it over the least year
25 when it comes to our public education

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2 system. The City's close partnership and
3 alignment with the School District during
4 the pandemic are how we were able to step
5 up to serve our students' most pressing
6 needs over the last year.

7 Our historic investment in
8 education is the right approach for the
9 long-term benefit of our city. Our
10 economic growth and recovery depend on
11 it.

12 As in the past, we are
13 investing in our future to improve the
14 long-term outcomes of Philadelphians.

15 The Five Year Plan envisions a
16 return of teachers and students to
17 classrooms, with \$1.38 billion in funding
18 for the School District of Philadelphia
19 over the Plan. This is on top of the
20 1.3 billion that the District will
21 receive through the American Rescue Plan.

22 And we'll invest a quarter of a
23 billion dollars in the Community College
24 of Philadelphia, with \$54 million
25 dedicated to the Octavius Catto

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2 Scholarship. This initiative will enable
3 5,000 first-time students to attend
4 college tuition-free, and with the
5 supports they need like food, books, and
6 transportation stipends to successfully
7 earn their degree.

8 I had the opportunity to meet
9 some of our Catto Scholars earlier this
10 year and cannot understate how inspiring
11 they are.

12 Students like Chelsea Hammond
13 of Holmesburg who previously struggled
14 with addiction is now on the path to
15 becoming a paralegal. Or Darrell
16 Claiborn of Germantown, aims to provide a
17 better life for his two sons by earning
18 his Associate's Degree at CCP, then
19 continuing his nursing studies at Temple.

20 These are just two examples of
21 how this transformational program will
22 improve Philadelphians' lives.

23 On a macro level, we know that
24 CCP is an economic driver for our city.
25 Increasing the number of Philadelphians

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2 with two- and four-year degrees is a key
3 component of our inclusive growth
4 strategy.

5 And we're even using the Catto
6 Scholarship as a catalyst to advance our
7 other equity and labor-related goals.

8 For example, we'll work with
9 CCP to implement a targeted recruitment
10 plan for Black men, which are currently
11 underrepresented in enrollment at the
12 college. And we'll leverage the
13 scholarship to increase our City's
14 teachers of color.

15 In partnership with our public
16 schools and regional higher education
17 institutions, we will create a seamless
18 pipeline that recruit, mentor, and retain
19 emerging teachers of color to educate our
20 children.

21 In addition, PHLpreK will grow
22 with 700 new slots and we'll add case
23 management to support Community Schools.

24 We're committed to funding
25 education from pre-K to college because

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2 it's the key to lifting Philadelphians
3 out of poverty. It's the key to our
4 long-term growth. It's how we'll
5 ultimately attract enterprise, because
6 we'll have the homegrown talent ready for
7 the future of work.

8 This Plan represents our vision
9 to move Philadelphia forward, but we also
10 had to make some tough choices in the
11 spirit of fiscal stability.

12 But make no mistake, creating a
13 diverse, efficient, and effective
14 government remains our priority.

15 We recognize the importance of
16 modernizing service delivery, so we're
17 investing \$5 million for the Operations
18 Transformation Fund to redesign City
19 operations and services to efficiently
20 serve businesses and residents.

21 And we'll invest in major tools
22 needed to deliver City services,
23 including IT systems, trash trucks, and
24 major infrastructure investments.

25 And across every investment in

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2 this Plan, we will target our dollars and
3 our policy change to reverse the impacts
4 of structural racism and to make concrete
5 improvements in the lives of Black and
6 Brown Philadelphians, in their safety,
7 their health, and their economic
8 well-being.

9 Our Office of Diversity, Equity
10 and Inclusion is helping departments
11 complete racial equity assessment and
12 action plans to reduce racial disparities
13 across many indicators for success -
14 education, criminal justice, jobs,
15 housing, health, and more.

16 I'm proud that we can avoid
17 layoffs in Fiscal Year 22, but we had to
18 enact five percent budget cuts to most
19 back-office functions.

20 The Fiscal Year 2022 budget
21 represents 5.25 billion General Fund
22 revenues and \$5.17 billion in General
23 Fund expenditures.

24 This leaves us with a General
25 Fund balance of \$109 million, which is

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2 two percent of revenues, far below
3 national standards of 17 percent or
4 two months of spending. Cities with that
5 level of fund balance didn't have to make
6 the painful choices we did in the face of
7 the pandemic. They had reserves to draw
8 on. Philadelphia must build back towards
9 fiscal resilience and be able to support
10 and serve residents through the next
11 disruption, whatever that may be.

12 Yes, I've covered a lot today
13 and there's even more in these budget
14 documents. In hundreds of pages of
15 numbers, prose and charts, the Operating
16 Budget, Capital Program, and Five Year
17 Plan serve as blueprints for the City's
18 reopening in the wake of the pandemic.

19 This framework also represents
20 what we've heard from the community.
21 This year we established a multi-lingual
22 online survey and held a dozen focus
23 groups and meetings, which gave 13,000
24 people a way to share their
25 recommendations on the City's revenue

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2 sources and spending decisions.

3 This is just a start. We will
4 make improvements on this engagement
5 process year to year until it's truly
6 representative and inclusive.

7 I look forward to further
8 engagement through hearings and
9 discussions with all City Councilmembers
10 as you fulfill your vital responsibility
11 to debate and vote on the proposals in
12 the coming weeks.

13 As you review, please know that
14 this budget was created with one guiding
15 vision - that Philadelphians in every
16 neighborhood can and must benefit for
17 what I believe will be a strong recovery.
18 Every neighborhood.

19 That vision is what guides me
20 every single day and what keeps me going.
21 It's a vision I wrote about last April in
22 an open letter to all Philadelphians.

23 I looked ahead to a time when
24 the pandemic would be past history, and I
25 predicted when that day comes, we will

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2 watch our children head off to school,
3 play on the sidewalks, and even share
4 snacks and hugs. And we'll know that
5 when it mattered most, we stepped up, we
6 cared for one another, and we did what
7 was right, and we endured.

8 A year later, I have seen
9 firsthand how we have stepped up, how we
10 have cared for each other, and how we
11 have endured. And of course we are not
12 there yet.

13 Restrictions remain in place,
14 masks are still part of everyday life,
15 there are many yet to be vaccinated, and
16 residents are still tragically succumbing
17 to the virus.

18 But I see that day on the
19 horizon, and I am more confident than
20 ever that with your continued hard work
21 and dedication, we will get there soon.

22 From crowded festivals on South
23 Street and concerts at the Dell, sell-out
24 crowds at the Phillies, and tourists
25 watching fireworks at Penn's Landing, to

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2 neighbors in North Philly gathering once
3 again for our beloved block parties, the
4 children rushing into classrooms to greet
5 their teachers, not through a screen, but
6 with a hug. That vision soon enough will
7 become reality. And all of this, all of
8 what we knew and loved before the virus
9 arrived, will be ours once again.

10 Thank you, and God bless.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning. Okay. We're going to get back.
13 That concludes the Mayor's speech, and we
14 have our work to do.

15 We will be sending out our
16 budget schedule shortly and we will start
17 doing business for the people of the City
18 of Philadelphia with an extremely, as
19 best as possible, transparent process.
20 We'll probably be doing it a little bit
21 differently this time around, having a
22 little more remote public hearings, so to
23 speak, but we'll talk to you all about
24 that process as we move ahead.

25 Time to tee up speeches, our

2 speeches. Are there any speeches on
3 behalf of the minority?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Okay. Speeches on behalf of the
7 majority?

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Jones.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. And I want to thank the
12 Mayor for giving his vision of the budget
13 for the upcoming fiscal year. I want to
14 thank the federal government for sending
15 much-needed resources to the City of
16 Philadelphia so that we can meet our
17 obligation to the citizens of
18 Philadelphia.

19 I want to transition and say
20 that a lot of that relief is going to go
21 to the Philadelphia School District. A
22 lot of that relief is going to help our
23 children learn.

24 I want to say that throughout
25 my adult life, Mr. President and

2 colleagues, I have fought discrimination,
3 whether as a student activist at the
4 Philadelphia Student Union or as the
5 Director of the Minority Business
6 Enterprise Council, now OEO, and now more
7 recently as a member of the Pennsylvania
8 Human Relations Commission where we
9 ferret out discrimination throughout the
10 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

11 I rise today out of concern,
12 Mr. President, out of concern for a
13 disparate impact that I believe developed
14 around African American, minority-owned
15 charter schools. I'm going to give three
16 definitions and then I'm going to stop
17 talking.

18 Disparate impact is whether or
19 not you intend to be racist or intend to
20 do harm to a group of people, but by your
21 actions, by the result of those actions,
22 it has a disparate disproportionate
23 impact on a race or group of people.

24 I cite that when I say that out
25 of the 19 percent minority charter

2 schools, 85 percent have been impacted
3 through non-renewal - 19 percent of the
4 population, 85 percent of the negative
5 actions. And do I believe that maybe the
6 School District is racist? Not
7 necessarily. Do I believe that the
8 impact has racist impact? Absolutely.

9 The second definition that I'd
10 like to bring forth is arbitrary and
11 capricious. My lawyer colleague
12 Councilman Green knows what this is, but
13 I'll give you a common-sense definition.
14 Arbitrary and capricious, when I'm
15 sitting at the dinner table with all my
16 kids and one of them gets to go out and
17 do their thing after curfew and the other
18 does not get to do it and they said,
19 well, wait a minute, you just let my
20 brother, my sister go out. And it might
21 be because they have better grades, it
22 may be because they clean their room, but
23 there is no factual relationship to my
24 decision. It is arbitrary and
25 capricious, unless I put the intent of

2 why I made the decision.

3 Often, too often, the decisions
4 that are made to close charter schools,
5 many of them in my district -- that's why
6 I rise today -- are arbitrary and
7 capricious and do not have an apples to
8 apples comparison of why you choose one
9 school not to renew versus others, other
10 than possibly race.

11 It bothers me to say it, but
12 I'm going to call it like I see it.

13 And the final issue, I used to
14 tell my kids when I made those arbitrary
15 and capricious rulings, I said, because I
16 said so. But that doesn't get it when
17 you are dealing with the education of our
18 children that I believe has risen to the
19 occasion of a civil rights issue.

20 The mis-education of our
21 children leads to the school-to-prison
22 pipeline and outcomes that impact them
23 their entire lives, and to be able to
24 have a full range of educational options
25 is very important.

2 So I raise these issues today
3 out of caution, out of concern, and to
4 say that me and my colleagues during this
5 budget process will be looking and we
6 will be watching, and we would recommend
7 that you take no further action until we
8 figure out whether or not this system is
9 unfair to minorities.

10 And so without that
11 transparency, I would be reluctant to
12 want to support anything that has that
13 kind of disparate impact among a group of
14 individuals that are trying to educate
15 our children.

16 Thank you, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
22 Council President. I just want to
23 provide a level of brief remarks
24 regarding this upcoming budget process,
25 and I want to start off by thanking and

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2 giving credit to Mayor Jim Kenney for
3 making core budget priorities out of gun
4 violence and police reform.

5 COVID-19 is not the only public
6 crisis that has swept across our city
7 over the past year. Thousands of
8 Philadelphians have been shot at work, at
9 school, at rec centers, at bus stops, and
10 even in their homes. Hundreds have died.
11 They include elders, pregnant women, and
12 children. Just last night, a
13 six-year-old was shot and his father was
14 murdered in Southwest Philadelphia. Our
15 communities are bloody, our communities
16 are traumatized, our communities feel
17 hopeless.

18 In recent weeks, I have been in
19 the streets calling for Philadelphians to
20 call to action, but as we ask our
21 communities to step up, we in government
22 must also step up. We must do for gun
23 violence what we have done for COVID-19.
24 We must be bolder and more aggressive.
25 We must move quickly and decisively. We

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2 have agreed that this is a crisis, but
3 our actions must match our words.

4 For that reason, I will
5 continue to be laser focused during this
6 budget season on gun violence, as I have
7 been in the past. I will push to make
8 sure that we put our money where our
9 mouth is. We have at least 1.5 trillion
10 in federal relief dollars on the table.
11 Yes, our revenue is down and, yes, our
12 economic recovery will be long, but as
13 long as gun violence remains out of
14 control, our economic recovery will be
15 weak and slow.

16 Gun violence prevention is not
17 just a moral necessity, it is an economic
18 necessity. We must invest now in a
19 safer, more equitable city. We have a
20 once-in-a-lifetime in this generation of
21 opportunity to do so.

22 This is my mission. As all of
23 us continuously address this issue as
24 members of City Council, I look forward
25 to working closely with all my

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2 Councilmembers as well as your
3 leadership, Council President, to make
4 sure we consistently make sure that gun
5 violence and gun violence prevention is
6 the key priority as we embark upon this
7 upcoming budget discussion.

8 Thank you very much, Council
9 President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
12 your continued presence in this issue.

13 Councilman Green.

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
15 Council President. I want to say happy
16 Ramadan to Councilmember Jones and all of
17 the Muslim brothers and sisters in the
18 City of Philadelphia.

19 We just have come through both
20 Passover and Easter, and for those of us
21 in the Christian faith, Easter is a
22 period of Lent, and you go through Lent
23 for a period of time. Many of us fast
24 and we go through a period of challenge.

25 And I think when I think about

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2 Ramadan, Passover, and Easter, we as a
3 globe have gone through a Lenten season.
4 For well over a year, we've been dealing
5 with this pandemic. And now it seems
6 just like Ramadan comes to an end,
7 Passover comes to an end, and Easter
8 comes to an end and we have this relief
9 and joy, we're starting to get that same
10 feeling now.

11 With vaccines coming and being
12 available for many more people, things
13 are starting to open up, it's springtime,
14 and we're getting the sense that we are
15 coming out of this Lenten season.

16 And we know last year as a
17 city, we had a very challenging budget
18 process where we had to fill a
19 \$750 million hole, and this year we
20 thought we were going to have to deal
21 with a \$450 million budget deficit on our
22 own, but we all worked and used our
23 platforms, and as President of Democratic
24 Municipal Officials and also as President
25 of the Pennsylvania Municipal League, I

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2 want to thank all my colleagues in
3 Council for using your platform to push
4 for the passage of the American Rescue
5 Plan.

6 This is something that's going
7 to benefit cities all around this nation.
8 And here in the City of Philadelphia,
9 we're going to receive \$1.4 billion, 700
10 million in a few weeks and then another
11 700 million next year, which must be
12 spent by the end of 2024.

13 So with this new infusion --
14 and I've been around City Council for a
15 little while. I don't think I've seen in
16 my time in this building this type of
17 infusion of new money.

18 So with that, I was being very
19 hopeful for today's budget address from
20 the Mayor. I want to thank the Mayor for
21 his remarks and laying out a lot of
22 information and dollars regarding his
23 perspective and his vision for our city,
24 but as I think about what Councilmember
25 Johnson said and think about what we've

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2 been going through for the past year, the
3 Mayor's vision is a good start, but I'm
4 going to say what I think all of us are
5 thinking and I think many people around
6 the City are thinking, we need a bolder
7 vision on how we're going to use these
8 dollars.

9 And when I think about vision,
10 I have to reflect on a conversation we
11 had last week in City Council. We were
12 talking about the Philadelphia movie
13 Concrete Cowboy, and hopefully many of us
14 had a chance to watch this film either
15 over Easter or through Passover or as now
16 those of our Muslim brethren are going
17 through and sisters are going through
18 Ramadan. And in that film, I'm not going
19 to focus on the main character, but there
20 was a character in that film and his name
21 was Smush. And this is a young man that
22 I think really represents a lot of young
23 people here in the City of Philadelphia.

24 Unfortunately, he got caught up
25 in the drug game and lost his life to gun

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2 violence. But what we learned in the
3 movie, that Smush had a vision for a
4 better day. He was saving his money from
5 the drug game to get into a legitimate
6 business opportunity and use that as seed
7 capital.

8 We also know that he at one
9 point was very involved with the Fletcher
10 Street Cowboys, but somehow got pulled
11 away from that positive activity into a
12 negative activity, which was the drug
13 game, and thinking that was the only way
14 he could produce dollars and revenue to
15 do a legitimate business and build up
16 that seed capital.

17 And so when we think about this
18 \$1.4 billion coming into the City of
19 Philadelphia, and I think the Mayor
20 provided a good start, but we got to have
21 a much bolder thought process and bolder
22 vision for the City of Philadelphia.

23 In the budget, the Mayor talks
24 about targeted investment in community
25 grants, and we've got to do things

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2 differently. How can we expand much more
3 money for some of the grassroots,
4 community-based organizations that are
5 helping young people like Smush not get
6 involved in the gang activity?

7 How can we spend more money not
8 just on certification -- and I know the
9 Mayor talked a lot about different
10 investments for minority businesses, but
11 how do we help those businesses to truly
12 grow and so young people in our city like
13 Smush can see they don't have to get in
14 the gang activity to raise seed capital
15 to start a business? They can see
16 entrepreneurs in our city, Black and
17 Brown entrepreneurs who are growing their
18 businesses and being successful.

19 So we need to have a bolder
20 vision for our city. And when we think
21 about the fact that we had 499 homicides
22 last year, we're on a pace that is going
23 to clearly eclipse that this year. The
24 fact that six percent of the businesses
25 in the City with employees are owned by

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2 African Americans. Only four percent of
3 the businesses with employees are owned
4 by our Latin brothers and sisters. We
5 got to do something different.

6 And so I need to challenge
7 myself. I think we all need to challenge
8 ourselves and also challenge the Mayor to
9 work together to have a bolder vision for
10 our city.

11 I think today's address was a
12 good start. We have a lot of work to do.
13 I think we have a sense that we need to
14 do more with this, what I would say,
15 once-in-a-lifetime investment of
16 \$1.4 billion into our local economy.

17 So I'm going to have to press
18 myself to do more. I think we're all
19 going to press ourselves to do more and
20 also work with the Administration to do
21 more to have a bolder vision for our
22 city. Because we don't want to be in a
23 situation come 2025 or 2026 and we say,
24 what happened to that \$1.4 billion, did
25 we really make investments to really take

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2 that vision that the Mayor laid out and
3 make it even bolder for the future of our
4 city so we don't have more young people
5 like the character Smush in Concrete
6 Cowboys lose their life to gun violence.

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

10 Councilwoman Parker.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

12 you, Mr. President. I join you,
13 Mr. President, in your comments in noting
14 that I anxiously await the opportunity
15 for us to be engaged in our budget
16 process. Thank the Mayor for his
17 introduction today, a summary of where he
18 has proposed we as a city make
19 investments, and I look forward to us
20 working in partnership with the
21 Administration to negotiate, to
22 negotiate, Mr. President, where those
23 investments will be, and that's the
24 process that we go through.

25 But in addition to that,

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2 Mr. President, I wanted to just, one,
3 from a scheduling perspective, I needed
4 to give some updates, because we've been
5 getting the calls in my office and I want
6 to make sure the public is clear.

7 Folks know that last week I
8 introduced a resolution that was
9 unanimously passed by this Council
10 authorizing the Committee on Law and
11 Government to hold hearings examining the
12 decision to permanently move sheriff
13 sales online and to further explore the
14 ramifications and any unintended
15 consequences that may arise from this
16 decision.

17 During that meeting, I let
18 folks know that the hearing for the
19 resolution in the Law and Government
20 Committee was scheduled for April
21 the 21st at 1 o'clock and to reach out to
22 my office if they were interested in
23 testifying. Several of you, members of
24 the public, did, and we want to say thank
25 you, but I do need to let you know that

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2 we have a time change. I want to let
3 people know that the hearing has been
4 pushed back by 24 hours to Thursday,
5 April 22nd at 1:00 p.m. Again, that's
6 Thursday, April 22nd at 1:00 p.m.

7 If you look at Council's
8 Calendar on our website, it will look to
9 you like Law and Government is beginning
10 on April 21st at 10:00 a.m., and our plan
11 is to hear two bills during that morning,
12 but we're going to recess the hearing
13 until April 22nd after we finish with
14 those bills to 1:00 p.m., and then that's
15 when we will have our hearing on the
16 sheriff sales.

17 If you are still interested in
18 testifying at the hearing, again, please
19 reach out to our office at 215-686-3454.
20 Again, that's 215-686-3454.

21 The next scheduling issue,
22 Mr. President, is that another one of my
23 resolutions is being heard in the
24 Committee on Housing, Neighborhood
25 Development and the Homeless on Monday,

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2 April 26th at 10:00 a.m. Now, that
3 hearing is going to examine the race gap
4 in home appraisals and its impact on
5 homeownership and wealth accumulation
6 here in Philadelphia.

7 The hearing is going to look at
8 how race impacts home appraisals from
9 three particular angles. The first is
10 how the race of the homeowner impacts the
11 appraisal. The second is how the overall
12 race of the neighborhood impacts the
13 appraisal and the health of the
14 neighborhood impacts the appraisal. And,
15 finally, how the race of the appraiser
16 actually impacts the appraisal.

17 And if you are, again,
18 interested in testifying at that hearing,
19 I want you to reach out to my office
20 again at 215-686-3454.

21 Finally, Mr. President, I want
22 to say to members of the Ninth District
23 who participated with me in a
24 conversation yesterday about what we
25 should be focusing on when we start

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2 negotiations during this budget process,
3 I want to say to them that I heard you
4 loud and clear, that when we are talking
5 about tax cuts in any kind, your message
6 to me was, Cherelle, those tax cuts need
7 to be able to bring about measurable new
8 net jobs or either bringing people back
9 to work who are no longer working, like
10 those low-wage workers who have been in
11 our parking industry, and how do we get
12 people back traveling into the City.

13 So any tax cut being proposed
14 is going to have to, Mr. President, have
15 to do with bringing people back to work,
16 and if you can't tangibly measure that
17 for me, we'll have some issues during
18 that discussion.

19 In addition to that, our
20 existing housing stock, while we hear a
21 lot of discussion and it is a major issue
22 in our city, I will continue,
23 Mr. President, to remain laser focused on
24 how we are being as innovative as we
25 possibly can to do what you describe is

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2 preserving the most affordable housing
3 that we have, and is that the building of
4 new? No. It's preserving and
5 modernizing our existing housing stock.
6 So we're going to be very focused on
7 that. In addition, its ownership,
8 homeownership, homeownership.

9 Housing is a human right, and
10 we want to make sure that every
11 Philadelphian, no matter their race,
12 class, socioeconomic status, or zip code,
13 has access to housing. But I will remain
14 unapologetic in saying that ownership,
15 ownership is the path to self-sufficiency
16 and it's the way people like my
17 grandparents made it to the working class
18 by owning the property that they moved
19 to, and that was their first home.

20 So I want to say thank you to
21 Mr. President, you and the rest of my
22 colleagues, and I really look forward to
23 us having a conversation about how we put
24 Philadelphians on the path to
25 self-sufficiency and not allow those

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2 people who have simply attempted to
3 encourage us to focus in one particular
4 area. We can walk and chew gum at the
5 same time and put people on the path to
6 self-sufficiency.

7 So thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you very
10 much.

11 Councilman Thomas.

12 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
13 Council President. And like many of my
14 colleagues, I want to thank the Mayor for
15 the budget address today. It's a process
16 that we know is going to be very tedious
17 and very engaging over the next several
18 weeks, really couple months, but I do
19 want to echo the sentiments of some of my
20 colleagues. I'll start with
21 Councilmember Johnson.

22 I agree with Councilmember
23 Johnson when he talks about this issue of
24 gun violence, and I also agree with
25 Councilmember Green when he talks about

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2 us needing to be bolder and to take
3 things a step further, and I think,
4 again, a lot of my colleagues on Council,
5 I look forward to working with you as we
6 engage this issue.

7 But I do want to reference
8 something that Councilmember Jones talked
9 about earlier, and what he talked about
10 around Black institutions, I think it's
11 an important issue that's not getting the
12 attention that it deserved.

13 A little while back we
14 introduced a resolution to hold hearings
15 around this issue and some of the
16 practices, and since that resolution has
17 been introduced, we've been actively
18 working, along with the Chair of the
19 Education Committee, Councilmember
20 Sanchez, to try our best to put us in a
21 position to be able to address this
22 issue, and unfortunately right now I just
23 don't feel like we're trending in the
24 direction -- and I'm not going to
25 communicate it as eloquently as

2 Councilmember Jones did, but I just don't
3 feel like we're trending in the direction
4 where we're being consistent in saying
5 that these, I guess you could say, bad
6 practices have happened in the past, but
7 then simultaneously keeping those same
8 measures in place when making, I guess
9 what you can say, executive decisions, to
10 paraphrase what Councilmember Jones
11 talked about, as it relates to how we
12 operate and how we decide and ended up
13 with 85 percent of those institutions
14 that have been closed by this city, all
15 being Black- and Brown-led institutions.

16 So I'm going to continue to
17 raise the bells and whistles when it
18 comes to this particular issue, because
19 when we're talking about the racial
20 disparities that exist, whether we're
21 talking about it in the form of criminal
22 justice reform, like we spoke about
23 earlier, whether we're talking about it
24 in the form of jobs and equity as far as
25 what Councilmember Parker talked about

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2 earlier, or if we're talking about it
3 through the lens of education, we have to
4 be consistent in our advocacy, and I
5 think right now we're seeing some levels
6 of inconsistency.

7 It's very difficult to continue
8 to scream various phrases and to say we
9 want to advocate for people of color, but
10 then at the same time not do things that
11 are within our control to be able to be
12 reflective of that same feeling.

13 So thank you, Councilmember
14 Jones, for your support, for highlighting
15 this issue. I know that some of the
16 institutions that are in question are in
17 your district and some of the
18 institutions that have been closed are in
19 your district, and I look forward to
20 continuing engaging all parties as we
21 figure out what are we going to do about
22 this problem that's disproportionately
23 impacting Black people in Philadelphia.

24 Thank you, Council President.
25 I appreciate the opportunity to give

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2 remarks.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you so
5 much.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Bass.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. Today I introduced a
10 resolution calling on the National
11 Collegiate Athletic Association to
12 reevaluate its policies and practices to
13 support gender equity in sports.

14 A few weeks ago, Sedona Prince,
15 an Oregon Women's Basketball forward,
16 posted a video exposing the evident
17 differences in weight-training facilities
18 between the men's and women's basketball
19 teams competing in the NCAA
20 Championships. Not only was the women's
21 weight room essentially empty of all
22 equipment, but the women's teams also
23 received significantly less March Madness
24 branding, food options, COVID-19 testing,
25 media coverage, swag bags, and worse

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2 playing conditions.

3 These differences in resources
4 between the men's and women's teams were
5 not addressed by the NCAA until Sedona
6 Prince's video, who caught the attention
7 of millions of people and well-known NBA
8 players. Only then did the NCAA
9 apologize and publicly work towards
10 gender equity.

11 At an interview on Monday,
12 Prince emphasized the importance of
13 supporting other student athletes in
14 joining together as a united front
15 against gender inequality.

16 While building a weight room
17 for the women's teams was a step for the
18 NCAA, Prince mentioned that she wanted to
19 ensure that gender inequities did not
20 happen again. These recent events are
21 not new to the NCAA and are in fact
22 deeply engrained in basketball culture.

23 In 2013, the Division I
24 basketball women's White Paper was
25 compiled by Val Ackerman reporting gender

2 disparity concerns and recommendations
3 about women's basketball in the NCAA.
4 Unfortunately, the NCAA failed to address
5 any of those concerns and, to this day,
6 leaves the Women's Basketball Coaches
7 Association, a group focused on Title IX,
8 out of important decisions.

9 This week, the NCAA again
10 presented poor playing conditions and
11 media coverage of its women's volleyball
12 championship tournament that is set to
13 take place this week. ESPN originally
14 planned streaming matches in silence,
15 without play-by-play announcers or
16 analysts, which downplays the importance
17 of the national tournament and the
18 efforts of the athletes.

19 Only after many coaches
20 criticized this setup did ESPN change
21 their plans to broadcast the first two
22 rounds of the tournament.

23 The NCAA also provided practice
24 courts placed over cement flooring, which
25 is very high risk for athletes and is

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2 likely to cause injury.

3 Additionally, COVID-19
4 protocols closed all locker rooms, taking
5 away a private space for female athletes
6 to change in uniform after warmups. For
7 these issues to take place a month after
8 the women's basketball gender disparity
9 issues came to light means that the NCAA
10 has not dedicated enough time into
11 reevaluating their role in gender
12 inequality and maximizing the importance
13 of women in sports.

14 I am calling on the NCAA to
15 reevaluate its deep-rooted practices of
16 gender inequality and to take more steps
17 towards gender equity in all sports and
18 divisions. These issues have been left
19 unaddressed for far too long, and it is
20 necessary to ensure fair treatment among
21 women and men in sports. And I am
22 hopeful that they will hear us as a
23 region in this country that has a
24 significant number of universities that
25 vie competitively for the sports during

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2 the different tournaments, including
3 Drexel University and Temple and Penn and
4 Villanova and so many others, who are
5 very active with the NCAA.

6 We certainly hope that they
7 will hear us on that, and this will not
8 be the last that we speak on this
9 particular issue.

10 I also wanted to just take a
11 moment out on the Goldman Sachs One
12 Million Black Women initiative, and
13 that's another resolution that I
14 introduced today, Mr. President,
15 recognizing One Million Black women
16 initiative launched by Goldman Sachs,
17 Black women's organizations, and other
18 partners to invest in Black women and
19 advance racial equity and economic
20 opportunity.

21 Black women are reported to
22 face a 90 percent wealth gap, are less
23 likely to own or inherent high-return
24 assets, are under-banked, and have poor
25 health and shorter lives than those of

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2 White women.

3 By investing in Black women and
4 reducing the earnings gap, it is
5 predicted that Black women can create 1.2
6 to 1.7 million jobs in the United States.
7 Additionally, Black women would help
8 increase the GDP of the U.S. by \$300 to
9 \$450 billion. This initiative commits
10 \$10 billion in direct investment capital
11 and an additional \$100 million in
12 philanthropic support to address the
13 gender and racial biases Black women have
14 historically faced.

15 The initiative aims to
16 ultimately narrow opportunity gaps and
17 positively impact the lives of at least
18 one million Black women by 2030.

19 We must continue to support
20 initiatives like this and Black Girl
21 Freedom Week, an initiative celebrated in
22 February that called for a \$1 billion
23 investment in Black girls and their
24 futures, and that will serve Black women
25 and transform communities across our

2 country.

3 And so I thank you for your
4 time today, for everyone listening, but I
5 really felt very strongly that these
6 women's issues really needed to be
7 highlighted and brought up, and they
8 won't be the last that I speak on these
9 issues.

10 Thank you so much to my
11 colleagues and to you, Mr. President.
12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilwoman. I'm sure it
15 won't be the last time.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Maybe on
17 City Council Sports Talk we'll hear
18 something about women's basketball,
19 women's volleyball.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
21 have a slot. We have a slot. It will be
22 filled, believe me.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Domb.

25 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,

2 Council President. I wanted to join the
3 voices of Councilmember Kenyatta Johnson,
4 Councilmember Green, and my other
5 colleagues in support of the gun
6 violence, more investment, and support of
7 being bolder. You know, Winston
8 Churchill had a great quote: Never waste
9 a good crisis. And I think we do need to
10 be more strategic, bolder.

11 This is a tremendous
12 opportunity, it will probably be once in
13 our lifetime, to change the direction of
14 this city.

15 I'm going to point to one
16 statistic that's a fact. It's the Pew
17 report that came out recently, and it
18 shows the City's projected General Fund
19 budget shortfalls for 2021 and compares
20 Philadelphia to about ten other cities.
21 The only city that had a bigger shortfall
22 than Philadelphia was Detroit -
23 17 percent shortfall in Detroit,
24 14.7 percent shortfall in Philadelphia.
25 Baltimore was 5.4. Boston was 1.9.

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2 Kansas City was 9.2, and everyone else
3 was far lower than Philadelphia.

4 To me, this indicates that what
5 we've been doing in the past has not
6 worked really well and we need to
7 dramatically change what we should be
8 doing going forward, in reopening the
9 economy and allowing more equity across
10 the board. It's just not working.

11 Many of my colleagues and I
12 heard many different ideas this week in
13 the Fiscal Committee meeting. It was, I
14 think it was, two days ago, where we
15 heard about how Black and Brown
16 entrepreneurs, yes, they're getting jobs,
17 but they're not creating wealth, and that
18 is so important.

19 So those are just some of the
20 things I wanted to talk about. And I
21 also wanted to just briefly mention --
22 I'm going to talk about it next week. I
23 wanted to extend -- and I want to do this
24 on behalf of all of my colleagues and the
25 Administration -- our deepest sympathies

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2 to the Rubin family, Ron Rubin, who
3 passed away earlier this week, who was a
4 Philadelphia icon, 89 years old. He did
5 the Gallery, he did The Bellevue, he was
6 involved with Mellon Bank Center. His
7 imprint was all over the City, including
8 he was the founder of the Center City
9 District.

10 And we'll talk more about it
11 next week, but I just did not want this
12 moment to go by without recognizing that
13 and extending our condolences to his
14 family and friends.

15 Thank you, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you very
18 much.

19 It appears that that concludes
20 the speeches. Just real quick, I want to
21 say that I know we all have our vision on
22 the future of the City of Philadelphia
23 and we will work in a very, very
24 aggressive process in laying it out and
25 hopefully implementing it, and this thing

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2 called COVID-19 put an abrupt stop on
3 that, but the reality is it's time to
4 recover, it's time to move forward, and
5 we will be adopting all of those great
6 ideas and vision that City Council has
7 had over a number of years.

8 So we look forward to our
9 budget process, and I appreciate you all
10 so much for your continued due diligence
11 and your commitment to the City.

12 So with that, I want to
13 recognize Councilman Jones for a motion
14 to adjourn.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
17 adjourned until Thursday, April 22nd,
18 2021 at 10:00 a.m.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. It's been moved and seconded
