21 I've had a chance to
22 work with a variety of different
23 members of the faith-based
24 community and it's truly an honor

10 JOHNSON: If anybody has any
11 sidebar conversations, if you're a
12 guest or you're even part of this
13 body, we're going to ask for you to
14 either quiet it down or please step
15 out and have your conversation
16 outside the chambers. It may seem
17 like it's not noisy, but up here
18 you hear everything that drowns out
19 when members are trying to talk.

20 And so, I just want to ask you just
21 to respect the body and take your

3 Thank you again, Council President.

4 Good morning, everybody.

5 Today it's my honor and
6 privilege to introduce a special
7 guest who we're actually honoring
8 in a resolution today. Today I
9 have somebody who I consider a
10 friend, somebody who grew up in the
11 same church as myself and
12 Councilmember Brooks and
13 Councilmember Phillips, which is
14 Triumph Baptist Church, one of my
15 high school teammates, somebody who
16 got a full scholarship, full
17 academic scholarship to Bloomsburg
18 University where he played football
19 from 2002 to 2005.

20 In 2006, he was a fourth
21 round pick by the New Orleans
22 Saints and he went on to play for
23 the Saints, representing the City
24 of Philadelphia still. Wound up

3 time, First Team All Pro; Second

9 contract at that time to be the
10 highest paid offensive lineman in
11 NFL history. And right now, he
12 currently coaches with the New
13 Orleans Saints, and his wife, who
14 we can't forget, is a graduate of
15 Girls High School. So if I didn't
16 say that, Councilmember Gilmore
17 Richardson will probably indict me.

18 Jahri is here today with
19 his agent Jerrold Colton. And last
20 but not least, my personal favorite
21 is that he is the younger brother
22 of my labor liaison Carmella Green.
23 Our special guest in City Council
24 today is none other than Jahri

9 to improve the lives of our city's
10 hard-working and well-deserving
11 residents.

12 Speaking of hard-working
13 residents, there was a lot of AMI
14 talk yesterday and Turn the Key is
15 a phenomenal program that goes up
16 to 100% AMI. And if you have two
17 people who are city workers that
18 make \$45,000, that would be above
19 or just below the 60% AMI and would
20 still be below the 80% AMI. So
21 going up to 100% AMI is important,
22 so we should not change that,
23 right. That's the whole thing,
24 that you have two hard-working

2 people, a teacher making 60,000 and
3 a sanitation worker making 40 that
4 would be above the AMI limit,
5 right, and they would not qualify.
6 So let's just keep that in mind.
7 And last but not least,
8 we're talking about SEPTA.
9 Unfortunately, it wasn't funded in
10 the budget yesterday for the third
11 year in a row. SEPTA is crucial to
12 the city of Philadelphia. Fund
13 SEPTA. Ride the ride. And sorry.
14 Last but not least, I need to shout
15 out my guys, John Solomon and
16 Hakeem, who are doing work.
17 Councilman O'Rourke mentioned them
18 last week for SNAP. They have a
19 food giveaway today in North
20 Philadelphia at 4:00 p.m. on
21 Clearfield. That's endangered.
22 Wow, what's his Instagram, I'm
23 blanking right now. But John
24 Solomon. It's great what they're

2 doing. Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

5 Next speaker, please
6 take the podium.

7 MR. IPPOLITI: Hi. My
8 name is Michael Ippoliti and I'd
9 like to thank Councilmember Landau
10 for recognizing my friend Pierre --

12 JOHNSON: Can you speak into the
13 microphone, Michael?

14 MR. IPPOLITI: Okay. On
15 behalf of Pierre's siblings, Renee,
16 Clarice and Susan, I'm deeply
17 honored to accept this resolution
18 in his memory. Though born in the
19 Bay area of California, Pierre
20 spent most of his life and truly
21 found his home here in
22 Philadelphia. He was known for his
23 easy-going, free-spirited nature.
24 But beneath that calm exterior was

2 real grit and conviction.

3 It was this spirit that
4 helped him connect authentically
5 with his fellow Philadelphians,
6 whom he warmly called good citizens
7 over the airwaves. Pierre cared
8 deeply about people, about

10 everyone to live a full and
11 meaningful life. He treated
12 everyone he met with kindness,
13 respect and dignity and we are all
14 better people, and Philly is a
15 better city for having known him.
16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: We have
20 Selena McNeil, Katia Perez, Hannah
21 Kahler. May Hannah Hedge, Ananya
22 Rocco Palan, Sarah Scully and
23 Marissa Zarnazuski also make their
24 way to the podium.

4 MS. PEREZ: Good
5 morning, everyone. My name is
6 Katia Perez. I serve as the
7 Interim Executive Director at the
8 Abortion Liberation Fund of
9 Pennsylvania. I am here today to
10 speak in support of Councilmember
11 Brooks' resolution recognizing
12 abortion access as a human right
13 here in Philadelphia.

14 Funding cuts at the
15 federal and city levels have
16 deepened longstanding gaps in our
17 public health infrastructure. When
18 affordable health care becomes
19 harder to access, low-income
20 mothers are the ones who bear the
21 cost. Mothers like Sarita, a
22 28-year-old single mom from Philly
23 trying to make ends meet for
24 herself, her son who has autism and

2 her seven-month-old baby, while
3 scraping by with the support of
4 SNAP, was tough enough.

5 Losing access this past
6 month has been catastrophic and she
7 is using her limited funds to try
8 to keep her family fed after
9 discovering an unexpected
10 pregnancy. Sarita reached out to
11 the Abortion Liberation Fund of
12 Pennsylvania and we were able to
13 help cover the cost to help her
14 with \$400 she needed to access
15 abortion care. As someone who grew
16 up with a single mother of three, I
17 know all too well the difference
18 that \$400, \$300 or even \$200 can
19 make in a low-income household.

20 Back in September, City
21 Council authorized a hearing on the
22 state of reproductive health care
23 in Philadelphia. Now, more than
24 two months later that hearing still

2 has not been scheduled. We need
3 that hearing, not as a symbolic
4 gesture but to understand the
5 impact of massive funding cuts and
6 to identify concrete ways to
7 protect access to care for
8 Philadelphians.

9 With the federal
10 government's growing overreach and
11 reproductive autonomy, its
12 propaganda and misinformation about
13 abortion care and even its
14 restrictions on funding for birth
15 control, it is urgent that our city
16 government, Mayor Parker's
17 Administration and City Council
18 step up. We need local leadership
19 to safeguard our communities from
20 harm scapegoating and attacks
21 coming from federal policies that
22 target low-income Black, immigrant,
23 Latina and other vulnerable
24 communities.

2 At the Abortion

3 Liberation Fund of PA, we know that
4 the people who reach out to our
5 helpline are the true experts in
6 their own lives. They know what's
7 best for them, their families and
8 their future. Protecting abortion
9 access and reproductive health care
10 is not just a federal issue. It's
11 everyone's issue.

12 I urge the City to hold
13 the hearing on reproductive health
14 care without further delay and to
15 take meaningful action to fund and
16 protect access to basic health care
17 for all Philadelphians. Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: I want to take a moment
20 to acknowledge the students from
21 Thomas Mifflin Elementary School
22 from the 4th Councilmanic District.
23 Let's give all these young people a
24 real big round of applause as they

3 hopefully look forward to all of
4 you replacing all of us in this

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: The floor is yours.

9 MS. ROCCO PALAN: Good
10 morning, everyone. Thank you to
11 the Council for the opportunity to
12 share a few words. My name is
13 Ananya and I'm here today as a
14 concerned Philadelphia resident.
15 As you know, Planned Parenthood is
16 now no longer part of the Medicaid
17 program and continues to face
18 relentless attacks from the Trump
19 Administration.

20 Despite Planned
21 Parenthood no longer being able to
22 receive Medicaid reimbursements for
23 their care, they are continuing to
24 see Medicaid patients and covering

2 the cost themselves. This is not
3 sustainable, which is why your
4 support in moving forward with the
5 public hearing and allocating
6 funded funding to them is critical.

7 I'm currently a Ph.D.
8 student at the University of
9 Pennsylvania and my research
10 focuses on using biomedical data to
11 improve the prediction and
12 prevention of a variety of women's
13 health conditions. If there's one
14 resounding takeaway from the work
15 that I've done so far, it's that
16 given how historically understudied
17 and underserved these conditions
18 are, every dollar matters.

19 Planned Parenthood has
20 been committed to doing the real
21 on-the-ground work of serving
22 20,000 patients a year and
23 providing essential health care to
24 them. None of the cutting edge

2 research on better treatments and
3 diagnostic tools matters if there
4 isn't public health infrastructure
5 in place to support communities
6 directly.

7 Philadelphia has a real
8 opportunity to join cities like New
9 York, Atlanta, Baltimore, Columbus
10 and St. Louis in standing up for
11 its residents by directing local
12 funds to Planned Parenthood and
13 ensuring access to essential health
14 care services for the people who
15 need them most.

16 I'd like to emphasize
17 two key asks from the Council. The
18 first being to please move forward
19 with the public hearing initiated
20 two months ago, and the second
21 being to allocate local funding to
22 support Planned Parenthood
23 services. Thank you for your time
24 and consideration.

9 MS. SCULLY: Good
10 morning. Thank you, Council, for
11 allowing me to share a few words.
12 My name is Sarah Scully. I am a
13 program assistant with Planned
14 Parenthood Southeastern
15 Pennsylvania. Unfortunately, Signe
16 Espinoza, our Vice President of
17 Advocacy and Public Policy, could
18 not be here today so I am
19 delivering her remarks.

20 As a Philadelphia
21 resident, a Planned Parenthood
22 patient and someone on the front
23 lines of this work for over 12
24 years, I share her deep concerns.

2 I am here in support of
3 Councilmember Brooks' resolution
4 recognizing abortion access as a
5 human right.

6 On September 18, City
7 Council authorized a hearing on the
8 state of sexual and reproductive
9 health care in Philadelphia. More
10 than two months later that hearing
11 has still not been scheduled. As
12 you know, Planned Parenthood was
13 officially defunded. Meaning, we
14 are no longer being reimbursed for
15 the care we provide through the
16 Medicaid program. This is an
17 unsustainable model and we need
18 your help.

19 Despite relentless
20 attacks from the Trump
21 Administration, Planned Parenthood
22 remains steadfast in serving
23 thousands of Philadelphians who
24 have nowhere else to turn. I urge

2 you to stand with Planned

3 Parenthood, the same organization

4 that has stood with the city for

5 decades.

6 Please move forward with

7 holding a public hearing so we can

8 continue this critical conversation

9 and confront the very real public

10 health crisis before us. And if

11 there is an opportunity for a

12 midyear transfer, we ask you to

13 follow the lead of cities like

14 New York, Atlanta, Baltimore,

15 Columbus and St. Louis, cities that

16 have taken bold action to protect

17 their residents by directing local

18 funds to Planned Parenthood and

19 ensuring access to essential health

20 care for those who need it most.

21 This is an urgent moment

22 and we need our leaders to step in

23 and step up. Thank you for your

24 time and consideration.

2 MS. JONES-PUGH: I think

3 it's still good morning. Good

4 morning, City Council. Thank you.

5 My name is Nereda Jones-Pugh. I'm

6 here as a member of Family for Safe

7 Streets and a Vision Zero

8 ambassador with the City of

9 Philadelphia, just here to

10 appreciate and thank Councilmember

11 Landau for the resolution for World

12 Day of Remembrance for traffic

13 victims here in Philadelphia.

14 My son was killed on his

15 bike in 2022 by a hit-and-run tow

16 truck driver. Clearly, it is very

17 challenging. We just appreciate

18 being able to engage with the

19 community, tell people about

20 slowing down, how it saves lives,

21 how important it is. Though you

22 know all lives matter, it really

23 does. It matters to us. It

24 matters to me and hoping that it

2 matters to everyone, everybody

3 else. So we're just asking you to

4 slow down again be careful, leave

5 early, care about each other.

6 Thank you so much.

7 INTERPRETER: We're

8 going to do this in Spanish and

9 English so be patient. We're going

10 get to it.

11 MS. HERNANDEZ

12 BUSTAMANTE: (Spanish translation).

13 INTERPRETER: Good

14 morning. My name is (inaudible)

15 Hernandez Bustamante and I am a

16 member of the Restaurant Worker

17 Committee. I am here to stand in

18 support of Councilmember Brooks'

19 resolution recognizing Human Rights

20 Day and celebrating abortion access

21 as a human right. I am a Mexican

22 migrant for seven years. I am a

23 mom of two kids, wife, student and

24 worker.

2 When I was 19, life
3 spoke to me through a positive
4 pregnancy test. At that time, I
5 had what many college students had,
6 a head full of dreams and pockets
7 almost empty, as empty as the
8 certainty of what was to come. I
9 was overcome with fear, anguish and
10 uncertainty, but also with a deep
11 intuition that this news will mark
12 the beginning of a transformation,
13 that although I did not know it
14 then, it will make me stronger.

15 (Inaudible) told me,
16 don't say anything. The law told
17 me it's a crime. The community
18 told me you are shameful. So
19 without any access to anything
20 safe, I got some pills to treat
21 stomach ulcers. I followed a
22 YouTube video and locked myself
23 away. It took 12 endless hours, 12
24 hours of blood, tears and absolute

2 loneliness.

3 I woke up empty. No one
4 saw me. No one held me. No one
5 said you are safe. But I got up.
6 I got up with my hands still
7 shaking my heart in knots. I
8 learned not to punish myself
9 anymore, to turn my grief into a
10 beacon to serve my Latina, Black
11 and migrant sisters who today walk
12 the same desert of fear.

13 The resolution of
14 Councilmember Brooks' confirmed
15 women's rights to access abortion
16 safely now and in the future. It
17 is an affirmation of women's
18 commitment to live their lives at
19 making their own choices, not
20 having the choices imposed on them
21 by their governments. I survive,
22 but I don't want others just to
23 survive. I want everyone to lead.
24 We need you to vote yes on the

2 resolution to continue to allow
3 access to abortion rights now and
4 forever. Thank you.

5 REVEREND EVANS: My name
6 is Reverend Stephanie Evans. I
7 stand here on behalf of the
8 Families for Safer Streets of
9 Philadelphia, also for the Bicycle
10 Coalition and also in reference to
11 Vision Zero. We stand here today
12 in homage and memorandum to also
13 Latonya Bird, who worked tirelessly
14 behind the scenes.

15 We thank this
16 Administration for the 25 miles per
17 hour on Broad Street. We thank you
18 for the speed cameras. My son
19 Robert was killed five years ago
20 outside the 35th District. He was
21 mangled and they wanted to close
22 the casket. As some of you know my
23 story, but today we triumph again
24 and again for the City of Brotherly

2 Love and Sisterhood of Affection.

3 I just cannot thank you all enough

4 for those who worked tirelessly

5 behind the scenes, the unsung

6 heroes that passed the bill, that

7 did the legislation.

8 So for the World Day of

9 Remembrance, we also pay homage to

10 Landau for just keep thinking of

11 us. We won't stop. We can't stop.

12 But remember, you need to stop at

13 every light. The life you save

14 might be your own. Those speed

15 bumps, those cameras have our loved

16 ones' blood on them, so remember

17 the life you save may be your own.

18 MS. HOFFMAN: Hello,

19 everyone. Hello, City

20 Councilmembers. I would like to

21 thank Councilmember Rue Landau. My

22 name is Jasmine Hoffman, and some

23 of you may know I am the founder of

24 Bill No. HB 988. It's called Jay's

2 Alerts. It's a hit-and-run
3 notification system for pedestrians
4 and cyclists in PA in honor of my
5 8-year old niece Jayanna Powell,
6 who was walking home from school in
7 2016 when she was struck by a car

9 We've been working with
10 Senator Williams for nine years and
11 Representative Morgan Cephas to get
12 this bill passed. World Day of
13 Remembrance is worldwide across
14 different states of celebrations of
15 victims' lives that's no longer
16 here due to getting hit by a
17 vehicle.

18 World Day Remembrance
19 let families like myself get
20 together and celebrate and give
21 updates, be around love and others
22 that can relate, giving mental
23 support and encouragement to take
24 it day by day as we advocate to

2 make the streets safer. Thank you
3 and thank you everyone. Have a
4 good one.

5 CHIEF CLERK: We have
6 Catherine Kennedy, Nikki Grant.
7 May David Alexander Jenkins, Daniel
8 Mosher, Maritza Padua, Joelle
9 Scoffield and Vivian Chang also
10 make their way to the podium.

11 (Witnesses approached
12 witness table.)

13 MS. GRANT: Good
14 morning, Councilmembers. My name
15 is Nikki Grant and I am the
16 Co-chair of the Abortion Liberation
17 Fund of Pennsylvania, whose board I
18 have been proud to be a member of
19 for the past five years. As we all
20 know, we are living in a dark
21 timeline where we are increasingly
22 under threat from our own federal
23 government.

24 We are facing disastrous

2 cuts that will impact access to
3 education, food and health care.

4 In particular, reproductive health
5 care is under constant threat, with
6 as recently as this weekend, Senate
7 Republicans attempting to hold the
8 ACA hostage in order to implement
9 more abortion restrictions.

10 I'm here today because I
11 believe the City of Philadelphia
12 can and should be the first line of
13 defense for its residents in the
14 face of these federal threats. An
15 attack on affordable reproductive
16 health care is an attack on the
17 most vulnerable Philadelphians,
18 including low-income mothers,
19 people who are housing insecure,
20 people who are food insecure and
21 justice-impacted people.

22 It is the responsibility
23 of this city to protect its
24 vulnerable residents. We can start

2 by holding a hearing on the state
3 of reproductive health care in
4 Philadelphia as soon as possible so
5 that we can better understand the
6 impact of the cuts and prepare for
7 this impending public health crisis
8 in the city that we love.

9 I also urge Council to
10 direct funding to the Abortion
11 Liberation Fund so that we can
12 continue to assist low-income
13 residents in accessing abortion
14 care. Thank you to Councilmember
15 Brooks for introducing the
16 resolution to recognizing abortion
17 access as a human right and thank
18 you all for your time.

19 MS. KENNEDY: Catherine
20 Kennedy. Good morning. Thank you.
21 Thank you, Council, for allowing me
22 to share my perspective as a
23 provider of sexual and reproductive
24 health care in Philadelphia. My

2 name is Catherine Kennedy and I'm a
3 lead clinician with Planned
4 Parenthood Southeastern
5 Pennsylvania.

6 I've worked at Planned
7 Parenthood for over six years
8 across two affiliates and I'm so
9 honored to be able to provide this
10 care for our Philadelphia
11 community. Every day I choose to
12 work at Planned Parenthood because
13 our health care model is both
14 evidence-based and patient-
15 centered, which results in high
16 quality and safe care and because
17 I've seen the impact and difference
18 Planned Parenthood care makes for
19 the city and community of
20 Philadelphia.

21 I recently cared for a
22 patient who had an abnormal Pap
23 smear during a routine annual exam.
24 She came to us for a colposcopy, a

2 procedure used to diagnose
3 precancerous and cancerous cervical
4 cells, because all other providers
5 were prohibitively costly. Without
6 Planned Parenthood, she wouldn't
7 have been able to afford a
8 colposcopy and her cervical cancer
9 would have gone undiagnosed.

10 Our affordable and
11 timely care allowed her to start
12 her treatment as early as possible.
13 Unfortunately, this patient's story
14 is not unique. I've cared for many
15 patients who receive life-altering
16 diagnoses and they choose Planned
17 Parenthood because they can get an
18 appointment much sooner than other
19 providers, even same-day
20 appointments.

21 Planned Parenthood's
22 dedication to our patients extends
23 beyond our provision of health
24 care. As many of you know, in

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 September Planned Parenthood was
3 defunded, blocking Medicaid funds
4 to Planned Parenthood, but we've
5 been shielding patients from harm
6 by covering the cost of Medicaid to
7 ensure our community has access to
8 lifesaving care. But this is
9 unsustainable and the consequences
10 for patients will worsen over time
11 across the country.

12 This means covering an
13 estimated \$45 million and care at
14 no cost to patients. These options
15 are frankly unacceptable and
16 Philadelphians deserve better.
17 Philadelphia has an opportunity to
18 join cities in standing up for its
19 residents by directing local funds
20 to Planned Parenthood and ensuring
21 access to essential health care
22 services for all that need them
23 most.

24 I urge you to move

2 forward with holding a political
3 hearing so we can continue this
4 critical conversation and confront
5 the very real public health crisis
6 we're facing and to support Planned
7 Parenthood so that we can continue
8 to provide essential care for
9 thousands of Philadelphians who
10 rely on us. Thank you for your
11 time.

12 MR. JENKINS: Good
13 morning Madam Chair, members and
14 guests. David Alexander Jenkins.
15 And I rise to address Resolution
16 250967. We say that we are
17 committed to a vision of
18 Philadelphia where home is not just
19 a roof over one's head but a
20 foundation for dignity, possibility
21 and belonging.

22 Yet every week we convey
23 fee (inaudible) here to the
24 Philadelphia Land Bank. Of the

2 roughly 8000 properties placed
3 under the Land Bank's purview when
4 it was created in 2013 as of April
5 this year, only one thousand of
6 those has been redeveloped. This
7 is unacceptable and the time is now
8 to convert idle public assets into
9 public goods now to direct the
10 Philadelphia Redevelopment
11 Authority to unlock those lots
12 which are shells of potential,
13 creating real affordability,
14 sustainable homes for the 5191
15 souls counted on your rosters
16 amongst us who are homeless and in
17 aid of the shortage of over 64,500
18 housing units.

19 Today, beloved, I stand
20 in a kind of ponderance weighing
21 not only the numbers
22 aforementioned, but the lives
23 represented in each one of them. I
24 remind you this is a city not

2 marked by the skyline, but by whom

3 it shelters and whom it leaves

4 trembling at the edge of the night,

5 in a city with a name that requires

6 us to enter into a covenant of love

7 as a command we have so to do.

8 I beg you to prove it,

9 brothers and sisters. It is said,

10 if you love me, feed my people.

11 That is not poetry. Breathing

12 breathes into the obligations of

13 man. By scripture, you know this.

14 It means feed my people. Feed them

15 with opportunity, feed them with

16 sustainability, feed them with

17 housing that they can afford. Feed

18 them with a dignity that comes from

19 knowing that they will not be

20 priced out of their own lives. And

21 feed them now.

22 Members, I pray the

23 affordability must go to those most

24 in need, houses and households at

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 the bottom of the income ladder,
3 families who are not just one
4 maintenance emergency or one hike
5 away from being homeless. Pray,
6 preserve existing houses, first,
7 repairing, adapting, safeguarding
8 homes where folks already live.

9 Pray public land and
10 public investment must serve public
11 purpose. No more idle lots left as
12 wasted potentials for families.
13 Wait for a place to call home. If
14 we accomplish this, brothers and
15 sisters, we will not merely have
16 adopted units to the housing stock
17 currently held in the Land Bank,
18 but we will have reaffirmed at a
19 time most dire in need, that in
20 Philadelphia belonging and
21 affordability go hand in hand.
22 Thank you.

23 MR. MOSHER: Good
24 morning, everyone. My name is

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Daniel Mosher. I'm the Deputy

3 Director of State Strategies.

4 Above all, we are an abortion-

5 forward reproductive justice

6 organization that envisions a world

7 where all people, regardless of

8 their socioeconomic status, race,

9 religion, sexual orientation,

10 gender identity or geographic

11 location have complete autonomy

12 over their reproductive health.

13 It is to that end that

14 I'm here today to loudly voice our

15 support for Councilmember Brooks'

16 resolution commemorating Human

17 Rights Day and stating

18 unequivocally that abortion rights

19 are human rights. The United

20 States is party to several

21 international treaties that call

22 for the protection of access to

23 abortion care services.

24 These include the

2 International Covenant on Civil and
3 Political Rights, the International
4 Convention on the Elimination of
5 All Forms of Racial Discrimination,
6 the Convention Against Torture and
7 other cruel inhuman or degrading
8 treatment or punishment. These
9 treaties are considered the supreme
10 law of the land under Article VI of
11 the United States Constitution, and
12 it's the responsibility of each
13 level of government to ensure that
14 they are adhered to.

15 However, in an attempt
16 to avoid international
17 accountability, the federal
18 government is withdrawing from the
19 United Nations Universal Periodic
20 Review process to avoid scrutiny
21 over the long string of human
22 rights violations they're forcing
23 onto this country, whether that is
24 through cruel abortion bans that

2 exacerbate maternal morbidity or
3 the inhumane treatment of our
4 immigrant neighbors who are being
5 snatched off the streets without
6 due process.

7 Above all, I applaud the
8 leadership of this Council,
9 including Councilmember Brooks as
10 well as the work of Philly attorney
11 District Attorney Larry Krasner,
12 who's been vocal about the human
13 rights violations being brought on
14 our immigration system and traveled
15 to Geneva last week to speak out on
16 the U.S.'s non-participation in the
17 UPR process. As we commemorate
18 World Human Rights Day, let me say
19 once again that every single level
20 of government has the obligation in
21 this moment to stand up and speak
22 loudly in defense of our human
23 rights. I appreciate the bold
24 leaders in this room today, both

2 elected and advocates, stepping up
3 to do just that. Thank you.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Maritza
5 Padua, Joelle Scoffield, Vivian
6 Chang. May Nicole Fisher, Sixx
7 King and Juanita Metzger also make
8 their way to the podium.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 witness table.)

11 MS. PADUA: Good
12 morning. My name is Maritza Padua.
13 I am the Vice-President of Policy
14 and Strategic Initiatives at Women
15 Against Abuse, and today I am
16 speaking in support of
17 Councilmember Brooks' resolution
18 recognizing abortion access as a
19 human right.

20 As Philadelphia's
21 comprehensive domestic violence
22 service provider, Women Against
23 Abuse serves people whose rights to
24 make decisions about their own

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 bodies has been stripped away by an
3 abusive partner. Some are
4 compelled to carry pregnancies
5 resulting from rape or birth
6 control sabotage. Others remain
7 trapped in dangerous relationships
8 because pregnancy deepens financial
9 dependency on their abuser. When
10 reproductive health care becomes
11 harder to access, it strengthens an
12 abuser's control and leaves
13 survivors with fewer choices and
14 greater risk.

15 For our clients,
16 abortion access is not an abstract
17 policy issue. It's a matter of
18 safety and autonomy and survival.
19 That's why we stand in strong
20 support of Councilmember Brooks'
21 resolution recognizing abortion
22 access as a human right. Because
23 for survivors of domestic violence,
24 control over one's body is the

2 first step toward freedom from
3 abuse.

4 Unfortunately, recent
5 federal and local funding cuts have
6 left major gaps in Philadelphia's
7 public health infrastructure.
8 Affordable reproductive health
9 services are disappearing,
10 especially in low-income
11 communities and communities of
12 color. When care becomes scarce,
13 it is survivors of domestic
14 violence, predominantly women
15 isolated from their support
16 networks who pay the highest price.

17 City Council authorized
18 a hearing on the state of
19 reproductive health care back in
20 September. Two months later it
21 still hasn't been scheduled. I
22 urge this body to move forward
23 quickly to protect some of
24 Philadelphia's most vulnerable

2 members. Abortion access is a
3 human right and for many survivors
4 of domestic violence, it is a
5 lifeline. Thank you so much.

6 MS. SCOFFIELD: Hi. My
7 name is Joelle Scoffield. I'm an
8 access counselor and I'm
9 representing the Abortion
10 Liberation Fund of PA. Today I'm
11 speaking on Councilmember Brooks'
12 resolution to recognize abortion as
13 a human access, as a human right.

14 As an access counselor,
15 it is my job to assess someone's
16 circumstances and to help them
17 access funds to get the abortion
18 that they need. We also found
19 working-class mothers who don't
20 qualify for assistance struggling
21 to make ends meet with the rising
22 cost of living. Most recently,
23 federal funding for programs like
24 SNAP have been withheld. The very

2 program designated to feed families
3 and millions of children is being
4 used as a political weapon.

5 This is forced
6 starvation and should be considered
7 a human rights violation. One of
8 the core values of reproductive
9 justice is that parents have the
10 right to raise children in a safe
11 and healthy environment. It's a
12 country where forced starvation can
13 occur safe. Surely abortion should
14 be considered a human right when
15 the very food meant to keep a child
16 alive can be taken. It is why now
17 more than ever we should declare
18 abortion access as a human right.

19 Let Philadelphia be a
20 safe haven for people seeking
21 lifesaving care. Please consider
22 funding the Abortion Liberation
23 Fund in our city budget every year.
24 I'm asking City Councilmembers to

2 stand with conviction and to
3 recognize access to abortion as a
4 human right because it is a matter
5 of life and death. Thank you.

6 MS. CHANG: Good
7 morning, everyone. My name is
8 Vivian Chang, Executive Director of
9 Asian Americans United, and I rise
10 in support of Councilmember
11 Landau's resolution celebrating
12 Asian Americans United's 40th
13 anniversary. I just want to share
14 a little bit about our history and
15 talk about what's facing us today.

16 So when we were founded
17 in 1985, some of the first issues
18 as an organization we fought for
19 quality public education and now
20 unfortunately the district is
21 planning to close schools again.
22 So we see that even as we rise
23 above and we are able to uplift
24 children and families out of these

2 issues, that doesn't mean they end
3 so we keep going.

4 Another issue that we
5 faced in our early years was
6 fighting against substandard
7 housing. A lot of folks,
8 especially Southeast Asian
9 refugees, were being resettled into
10 housing that was not livable, and
11 today we see that renters are being
12 crushed by an affordability crisis.
13 And so, many people in our city are
14 forced to live in dirty, broken-
15 down housing. We cannot live this
16 way.

17 Throughout our years
18 we've also worked, fought against
19 fare hikes for SEPTA youth cards.
20 SEPTA is in crisis. We've
21 supported Southeast Asian refugees
22 coming to Philadelphia and seeking
23 safety and now these same folks are
24 being kidnapped and disappeared by

2 ICE.

3 I don't mean to be a bit
4 of a downer, but as I was
5 reflecting on our history today I
6 realized there's a lot to celebrate
7 and there's a lot more to go. So
8 we appreciate the celebration and
9 we want to revel in it, and we know
10 that these are unfortunately
11 historic times.

12 I hate living historic
13 times. And history does repeat
14 itself, but we can also break the
15 cycle. So many of the issues we
16 talked about in these chambers and
17 in our communities are things that
18 people just like us every day are
19 fighting for. So it is beautiful
20 to be here.

21 Some of the youth, we
22 are just reflecting on our history.
23 We've interviewed some of the kids
24 from our very first summer camp 40

2 years ago who are now creating
3 schools in Cambodia and becoming
4 principals and teachers. And it's
5 just really, really lovely. So I
6 want to thank Councilmember Landau
7 and the chambers for celebrating.
8 Thank you.

9 MS. PEREZ: I'm Kate
10 Perez. Our legal system is built
11 on the premise of due process. The
12 Juvenile Justice Center is trying
13 alternative ways to rehabilitate
14 children who have been accused of
15 crimes and awaiting trial. This is
16 a completely different tactic than
17 what our sister city Tel Aviv
18 implements.

19 Like most apartheid
20 states, there are two different
21 legal systems where settlers are
22 subject to civil law and the native
23 Palestinians are subject to
24 military law in courts that are ran

2 by IOF soldiers, who practice
3 administrative detention, a system
4 where our sister city allows armed
5 militants to arrest and
6 indefinitely detain any Palestinian
7 on the possibility that they might
8 possibly one day maybe commit a
9 crime, holding them without charge,
10 evidence or trial in torture camps
11 with recently released hostages
12 sharing stories of being hung from
13 the ceiling electric torture, the
14 release of dogs into their cells,
15 being forced to watch videos of
16 Gaza's destruction, some being lied
17 to that their families were killed
18 and some being released to find
19 that their entire families actually
20 were slaughtered during their
21 wrongful imprisonment.

22 The same apartheid court
23 system has now passed the first
24 reading of a bill to allow for the

2 execution of Palestinian hostages,
3 making any one of the more than
4 9000 hostages targets for
5 execution, creating formalized
6 concentration camps. If we want to
7 keep our children out of prison,
8 how can we normalize and facilitate
9 the exchanges of politicians, PPD
10 and class trips with the only state
11 in the world putting children
12 through military court holding at
13 least 900 children that would be up
14 for execution.

15 If this bill passes,
16 getting used to a genocide is the
17 quickest way to ensure its
18 completion and Philadelphia's
19 partnerships only help to normalize
20 and facilitate colonization. The
21 Juvenile Justice Center is
22 connected to our school district
23 because the right to education is a
24 universal right of a child,

2 something our sister city has
3 stripped away as they bombed every
4 school left in Palestine. And now
5 instead of going to classes,
6 children wait in line at soup
7 kitchens and have been blown up by
8 explosives disguised as food.

9 Today the Occupation is
10 still impeding aid flow and we have
11 Philadelphians leaving as soon as
12 next week to active protective
13 presence in the West Bank, a place
14 where settler violence is
15 increasing. How will we ensure
16 that the bombs we send don't kill
17 our citizens? We need an arms
18 embargo now. Free Palestine.

19 CHIEF CLERK: We have
20 Nicole Fisher. Nicole Fisher, Sixx
21 King, Juanita Metzker. May Kelly
22 Flanney, Marco Gorini and Cole
23 Appleman also make their way to the
24 podium.

4 MS. METZKER: My name is
5 Juanita Metzker. I'm here today to
6 ask for a hearing on sexual and
7 reproductive health and to ask that
8 the City help to fill the gap in
9 our funding left by the extreme
10 cuts to Medicaid that passed this
11 year. I first came to Philly
12 Planned Parenthood after my barrier
13 protection failed. I wanted a
14 prescription for the medications
15 that prevent HIV and syphilis after
16 possible exposure.

17 They got me in on an
18 emergency basis because they
19 understood that those medications
20 have a 72-hour window for efficacy.
21 I encountered protesters, but
22 escort volunteers got me safely
23 past them. The doctor didn't judge
24 or belittle me. She simply

2 listened and discussed my options.

3 Planned Parenthood is on

4 the front lines of helping to

5 prevent people from contracting

6 potentially lifelong illnesses

7 which weaken society by reducing

8 the productivity and health of the

9 population. Cities that don't

10 budget for prevention will pay

11 several times over when its

12 citizens become ill.

13 I continue to return to

14 that location for my STI testing

15 now. I volunteer as a clinic

16 escort so many different kinds of

17 people walk through our doors, men,

18 women, couples, mothers with their

19 teenage daughters. Maybe they've

20 come for cancer screening, for

21 testing, for protection or for

22 prescription for necessary

23 medication.

24 For a few, they're

2 making an incredibly difficult
3 decision, one which only those
4 individuals are qualified to make
5 for themselves. Most people who
6 pass by nod, some thank us for
7 being there and a few ask how they
8 can help. Many tell us that our
9 services are vital to the
10 community. Occasionally, someone
11 will come up and tentatively ask if
12 we treat everyone, if we offer
13 testing, if we do more than
14 abortions. The answer to all three
15 questions is yes.

16 A surprising number of
17 people don't realize we offer
18 cancer screening and STI testing as
19 well as birth control and
20 abortions. Many men in particular
21 ask this of us and they're always
22 thankful to hear they're welcome at
23 Planned Parenthood. Many go
24 straight in to make appointments.

2 Everyone I've met who works at
3 Planned Parenthood in any capacity
4 has been kind, compassionate,
5 passionate and committed to the
6 principle that human beings have a
7 basic right to make our own
8 decisions about our health care and
9 to expect to be given the
10 information necessary to do that.
11 We are grateful that we can provide
12 that service to our fellow
13 Philadelphians.

14 MR. KING: Good morning,
15 everyone. My name is Sixx King and
16 I am CEO of Six Degrees of Media.
17 And I'm here today this morning to
18 honor the resolution of Councilman
19 Isaiah Thomas, the Philadelphia
20 Juvenile Justice Service Center
21 School on the celebration of its
22 20th anniversary of carpe diem.

23 The resolution
24 highlights and commemorates all

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 judges, students and participants
3 who contribute to the longstanding,
4 impactful education and
5 rehabilitative program within the
6 juvenile justice system. Carpe
7 diem is fundamentally about the
8 changing of the trajectory of
9 court-involved youth through
10 education, mentorship, structure
11 and positive adult engagement.

12 In the words of my
13 grandmother, when you're born, you
14 look like your parents, but when
15 you die, you look like your
16 decision. And whether it was my
17 decision to bring some of the
18 biggest Hollywood productions here
19 so that young people can see a
20 different trajectory or whether it
21 was my decision to spark the reform
22 movement to free rapper Meek Mill
23 so that we move forward and how
24 probation is wielded among people

2 across the nation of America or
3 whether it was my decision to open
4 a safe space and Manny Young where
5 in the '60s, my grandmother was
6 assaulted for civil rights, I was
7 able, along with my brother Angelo
8 Parker, to open up an establishment
9 where we were not wanted during the
10 Civil Rights Movement, so that
11 young people that we work with have
12 a safe space to come to work, to
13 have the American Dream that we all
14 dream of. This is our decisions as
15 people.

16 Thank you, Councilmember
17 Thomas. And remember when you're
18 born, you look like your parents.
19 But when you die, you look like
20 your decisions. It is up to all of
21 us to make those decisions that
22 will grant our youth a brighter
23 future and make sure you come to
24 best kept secret down in Manayunk.

3 JOHNSON: Sixx King, I want to
4 thank Member Jones for taking the
5 moment to acknowledge you, to give
6 you your flowers because often
7 times we know the leaders are out
8 there actually doing the work and
9 not looking for praise. And so,
10 congratulations on receiving the
11 Nelson Mandela Award, but also just
12 commend you for all the work that
13 you're doing on behalf of inspiring
14 our young people to be great here
15 in the city of Philadelphia. You
16 keep up the good work as well.

17 MR. KING: Thank you.

18 Thank you so much.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: But could you talk about
22 how you was on a jet ski with a
23 tuxedo on? But keep up the good
24 work though, young man.

4 take this moment to thank you,

5 Council President. Thank you,

6 thank you, thank you, thank you.

7 Thank you, Councilman Jones. Thank

9 during my time sparking the Reform

10 Movement that freed rapper Meek

11 Mill and that whole trajectory.

12 A lot of times when we

13 are doing the work, we're not

14 coming up front to participate in

15 the accolades. And so, I'm one of

16 those people that we're doing the

17 work to make sure that we have a

18 better future for our youth. So

19 thank you for encouraging me to

20 come forward.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: Thank you.

23 Okay, Nicole.

24 MS. FISHER: Good

2 morning, everyone. My name is
3 Nicole Fisher. Good morning,
4 Councilwoman Cindy Bass, the 8th
5 District and all the members of the
6 City Council, community partners
7 and every supporter who is here
8 today. First and foremost, I want
9 to thank God, because once without
10 God's guidance, strength,
11 protection and alignment, we
12 wouldn't be standing here receiving
13 this incredible honor.

14 We want to thank our
15 family, our children who are our
16 motivation every single day, and
17 especially my husband, my coach, my
18 number one supporter and my partner
19 in every mission we take on. You
20 stood here with me every high,
21 every low, every training session,
22 every setback and every
23 breakthrough. Your belief in us
24 helped carry us through, through

2 this moment to our entire
3 community. The people who watched
4 us grow supported the dream and are
5 here today to witness this honor.
6 Thank you.

7 Everything we do is for
8 you and because of you. Knockout
9 Gun Violence was created with one
10 purpose, to give our youth a
11 fighting chance at life. Our
12 program uses boxing as a vehicle,
13 not just to build champions in the
14 rain but champions in their own
15 lives. Through discipline,
16 mentorship, structure and love, we
17 opened our doors to youth who are
18 at risk of slipping through the
19 cracks, youth who needed a safe
20 place and youth who needed someone
21 to believe in them at Happy Hollow
22 Recreation Center.

23 Knockout Gun Violence
24 became more than just a boxing

2 program. It became a family. It
3 became an outlet. It became hope,
4 and not just for the boys but for
5 the young ladies too, who stepped
6 into that gym ready to work, ready
7 to learn and ready to prove that
8 strength comes in many forms. They
9 showed us with courage and we gave
10 them a place to grow, to feel seen
11 and to feel powerful.

12 This mission means
13 everything to us. It's not just
14 about punching bags and gloves.
15 It's about showing our youth that
16 they can fight for their future and
17 win. If life has taught us
18 anything is that the journey is
19 bigger than boxing. This is about
20 giving back, pouring into our
21 children, creating a safe, positive
22 environment where dreams are
23 protected, not destroyed. It's
24 about teaching discipline,

1 11/13/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 confidence, leadership and hard
3 work. It's about reminding our
4 kids that no matter what and where
5 they are, where they come from,
6 they deserve a future filled with
7 possibilities. We always tell our
8 kids you don't have to fight in the
9 streets, you can fight for a better
10 life.

11 This resolution today is
12 not just honoring our work. It's
13 honoring their courage, their
14 effort and their hope. When I won
15 my first Women's championship, most
16 people didn't know the truth behind
17 the scenes. While training for
18 that title, while preparing
19 mentally, spiritually and
20 physically, I was still showing up
21 for the community. I was still
22 running sessions with the kids. I
23 was still mentoring, still training
24 them, still pouring into them, even

2 when I was tired, even when the
3 pressure was high.

4 There was days I could
5 go from work to training to the gym
6 to the youth and then home to make
7 sure my family and I had what they
8 needed. It was a lot to carry but
9 love carried me through the
10 process. Purpose carried me
11 through it all. We also coached
12 other fighters, including our twin
13 boys, and their very first ones
14 through Knockout Gun Violence at
15 the Happy Hollow Recreation Center,
16 watching those kids, especially our
17 sons, step into that ring and
18 courage come through.

19 Victories showed us
20 exactly why this work matters.
21 Their victories were proof that
22 when you pour into the youth, they
23 rise, they win, they transform.
24 Because we knew if we wanted to let

2 them, if we wanted them to keep
3 fighting for their future, we had
4 to keep fighting for ours. We
5 believed that everything would work
6 out for their good, and it did.

7 That championship wasn't
8 just a win, it was our win, the
9 community win and the kids win and
10 the cities win. This honor doesn't
11 just belong to us. It belongs to
12 every child who walked into our
13 program and all those who
14 volunteered and stepped in, every
15 parent who trusted us and every
16 supporter who believed change was
17 possible. Thank you for seeing the
18 value of what we do. Thank you for
19 acknowledging the impact and thank
20 you for standing with us and we
21 will continue this mission to build
22 safer, stronger and more empowered
23 communities. We don't just fight
24 in the rain. We fight for our

2 city, our youth and our future.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: Can I see them belts?

6 Can you raise them belts?

7 MR. WILSON: Good

8 morning, Councilmembers and

9 everyone else. My name is Darrell

10 Wilson. I'm one of the coaches at

11 the Happy Hollow Boxing Gym. I'm

12 here to bring forth comments about

13 Nicole Fisher. You see, I was

14 blessed with five brothers and no

15 sisters.

16 And so, the real

17 blessing out of that is that I come

18 from a strong mother. She not only

19 showed me, but taught me how to

20 look for the attributes of a strong

21 woman in leadership. And as I

22 observed during my time at the gym,

23 I really do see the strength and

24 the patience and the persistent,

2 not to mention her drive is

3 impeccable.

4 The one most important

5 thing that really concerns me is

6 how she cared for the children.

7 Care means so much. If I can be

8 perfectly honest, parents really

9 don't care how much you know until

10 they know how much you really care

11 about their children. Thank you.

12 MR. MILLER: Good

13 morning, Council. Thank you for

14 inviting me down. My name is Nate.

15 Good morning, Council. Thank you

16 for inviting me down. My name is

17 Nate Miller, former WBA

18 Cruiserweight champ for the world,

19 95 the 18th greatest of all time.

20 You can put my name in and pictures

21 and everything pop up.

22 But basically, I'm here

23 to tell you never give up on your

24 dream. If you set out to achieve

2 something, if you believe you can
3 achieve, never give up. Never stay
4 around them, negative people. A
5 lot of people told me, oh man, you
6 wouldn't be a world champion, but I
7 fooled them. You can do it too.
8 Thank you, Council. Thank you for
9 the building that is that they are
10 putting up in the spring. Thank
11 you very much.

12 CHIEF CLERK: We have
13 Darryl Schuler, Kelly Flannery,
14 Marco Gorini, Cole Appleman and
15 Ogbonna Hagins also make their way
16 to the podium.

17 (Witnesses approached
18 witness table.)

19 MR. SCHULER: Good
20 morning, City Council. I'm here
21 today speaking on behalf of Nicole
22 Fisher and our program at the Happy
23 Hollow Gym. I'm 100% in support of
24 that. Me, myself, a former fighter

2 myself, boxer, coming from a boxing
3 family, we had the honor of having
4 a boxing gym out in West Philly,
5 James Memorial Boxing Gym named
6 after my brother.

7 And today I just wanted
8 to stand here to tell you all that
9 the young lady's program, these
10 programs mean so much in our city
11 in terms of even with intervention.
12 It teaches you discipline. It's a
13 home away from home. And so, I
14 encourage City Council, this
15 program that she has there, to
16 please support this program for
17 her.

18 And I want to salute
19 everybody out here, especially my
20 president, City Council President,
21 because I know he's something
22 funny. But nevertheless, thank you
23 everybody here. Thank you, my
24 sister Cindy Bass. I love you, sis

2 and everybody else too.

4 JOHNSON: Thank you to Nicole

5 Fisher. We just want to say keep

6 up the good work keeping our young

7 people off the streets and using

10 encouraged. And a lot of times

11 it's an alternative for them

12 picking up guns.

13 And so, we want to thank

14 you for your hard work. And also,

15 just let Clarissa Shields know if

16 she's watching that we have our own

17 boxer, female boxer, who could take

18 her to task. And so, let's give

19 her a round of applause. And good

20 job, Cindy Bass.

21 I got to talk to

22 Sergeant-at-Arms on how Darryl

23 Schuler was allowed to come and

24 speak today, but we'll have a

2 conversation about that offline.
3 But again, thank you for your hard
4 work, all of you for your
5 dedication and keeping our young
6 people safe because that's what
7 it's all about.

8 MS. FLANNERY: Hi. My
9 name is Kelly Flannery. And first,
10 I want to thank the Council for the
11 opportunity to share my thoughts.
12 I'm the Policy Director at Positive
13 Women's Network, a national network
14 of cis and trans women and gender-
15 diverse people living with HIV.

16 Our Pennsylvania Chapter
17 has been organizing in Philadelphia
18 for reproductive justice and harm
19 reduction for over 15 years. I am
20 here in support of Councilmember
21 Brooks' resolution recognizing
22 abortion access as a human right.
23 On September 18, City Council
24 authorized a hearing on the state

2 of reproductive health care in
3 Philadelphia. Over two months
4 later, this hearing still has not
5 been scheduled. When affordable
6 reproductive health services become
7 scarce, poor and working-class
8 families are the ones who pay the
9 price.

10 We need to hold this
11 hearing in order to understand the
12 impact of massive funding cuts and
13 identify ways to protect access to
14 care for Philadelphians under the
15 Trump regime. Our public health
16 infrastructure has been decimated,
17 pushing basic health care further
18 out of reach for many
19 Philadelphians.

20 In the spring, Trump
21 signed the largest Medicaid cuts in
22 U.S. history into law, which will
23 kick about 300,000 Pennsylvanians
24 off the program. The bill also

2 included vicious attacks on
3 abortion providers. Since Trump
4 took office, over 40 Planned
5 Parenthood clinics have closed
6 nationwide, which will lead to
7 higher rates of HIV as well as
8 pregnancy-related deaths.

9 Moreover, Republicans in
10 the U.S. House are trying to add
11 anti-abortion (inaudible), defund
12 the Title 10 program and zero out
13 HIV prevention and ongoing budget
14 negotiations, further demonstrating
15 the ongoing force of their anti-
16 abortion and anti-health vitriol.

17 When we fail to fund
18 comprehensive, affordable sexual
19 and reproductive health care, we
20 leave pregnant people vulnerable to
21 predatory tactics of fake clinics
22 staffed by anti-abortion activists.
23 These fake clinics often share
24 false or misleading information and

3 standards. It's essential that we
4 are all able to access
5 comprehensive, affirming sexual and
6 reproductive health care and
7 medically accurate information to
8 make informed choices about our
9 health, abortion.

10 Health care is a human
11 right. The public health crisis is
12 not coming. It is not looming. It
13 is here. We applaud Councilmember
14 Brooks' leadership and urge the
15 Chair of the Committee on Public
16 Health to schedule a hearing so we
17 can begin to understand how to
18 address the crisis and protect
19 reproductive health care access.
20 Thank you.

21 MR. GORINI: Good
22 morning. My name is Marco Gorini.
23 I'm the Vision Zero Program Manager
24 for the Office of Transportation

11 prepared to learn, and tomorrow
12 students at Edmonds School will
13 complete a peace walk as part of
14 Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day to
15 commemorate Ruby Bridges and her
16 bravery integrating her New Orleans
17 school.

18 I want to thank Council
19 for honoring this event and
20 supporting our efforts to teach
21 Philadelphia students about the
22 value of walking and rolling to
23 school. This work is part of the
24 Mayor's Vision Zero goals,

3 teaching all students in
4 Philadelphia about traffic safety.

5 I also want to take a
6 moment to thank Councilmember
7 Landau for recognizing World Day of
8 Remembrance on Sunday. It is an

10 event that reminds us why zero is
11 the only acceptable number of
12 traffic deaths. Thank you.

13 MR. APPLEMAN: Good
14 morning, everybody. My name is
15 Cole Appleman. I'm also here from
16 the Office of Transportation
17 Infrastructure Systems to thank
18 Councilmember Bass for sponsoring
19 this resolution acknowledging Ruby
20 Bridges Day. For those of you who
21 are not familiar, Ruby Bridges Day
22 marks the anniversary of Ruby's
23 first day at her new elementary
24 school in New Orleans in 1960. She

2 was the only Black student enrolled
3 after her school recently
4 integrated.

5 Every single day she had
6 to be escorted in and out of school
7 by law enforcement, subject to

11 mark the day by walking by having
12 their students gather and walk to
13 school, not just here in
14 Philadelphia but across the
15 country.

16 Ruby Bridges Day sits at
17 the intersection of the ongoing
18 fight for civil rights, the
19 protection of our youth and
20 gathering in community to learn and
21 rejoice. Safe Routes Philadelphia,
22 as my coworker Marco acknowledged,
23 is Vision Zero's youth and student
24 outreach branch. They keep our

2 students safe through education and
3 events like Ruby Bridges Day.

4 Safe Routes also

5 organizes events like Walk and Bike
6 to School Day, which happens every
7 year, as well as organizing walking

11 students safe, it improves their
12 mental health, physical health, and
13 very importantly, their grades.

14 This program is one of
15 many hard-working folks --
16 represents a lot of many hard-
17 working folks behind the scenes for
18 our children's well-being. And I'd
19 like to stand here today and give
20 them their flowers as well as thank
21 Councilmember Bass once again for
22 introducing this legislation or,
23 excuse me, resolution. Thank you
24 very much.

13 Today I brought forth a
14 resolution recognizing abortion
15 access as a human right. For
16 decades the United States has
17 participated in the U.N. Human
18 Rights Council Periodic Review, the
19 UPR --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Member Brooks?

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:
23 Yes.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

2 JOHNSON: Council will be at ease
3 for a minute. Can't hear you so I
4 got to wait for everything to kind
5 of quiet down for a second.

6 (Council at ease.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Member Brooks, proceed.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

10 Let me find my space. I lost
11 track. Okay. The UPR is a regular
12 assessment of a country's
13 compliance with various
14 international human rights
15 treaties. Bans on abortion care
16 have routinely been deemed by the
17 Human Rights Council as violating
18 several treaties to which the U.S.
19 has signed and ratified. Abortion
20 is one of the driving factors of
21 the Administration's decision to
22 withdraw this process in August.

23 In response, All Above
24 All and cities across the country

1 11/13/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 are organizing to uphold our human
3 rights to reproductive health care.
4 Similar resolutions have been
5 passed in Chapel Hill, Baltimore,
6 Austin and other cities. Folks
7 will be gathering in D.C. in
8 December to take this message
9 directly to the Trump
10 Administration.

11 Thank you to All Above
12 All for your work on this issue. I
13 know the vast majority of
14 Philadelphians support reproductive
15 health care. And right now, the
16 Trump Administration is carrying
17 out one of the most anti-public
18 health agendas that our country has
19 seen. It's no surprise Donald
20 Trump is refusing to acknowledge
21 the damage his policies have
22 caused, attempting to hide it from
23 the world.

24 But I expect better in

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2 Philadelphia. Over two months ago,
3 the City Council voted to authorize
4 a hearing on the impact of massive
5 funding cuts on abortion health --
6 oh, I'm sorry, reproductive health
7 care. That hearing has still not
8 been scheduled. When I say massive
9 funding cuts, I'm referring to both
10 federal cuts and local cuts.

11 The federal cuts to
12 Title X and Medicaid will be
13 devastating effects to working
14 families, but the local cuts were
15 an unexpected blow to providers,
16 patients and advocates who make up
17 the Reproductive Freedom Task
18 Force. Every year since Roe v.
19 Wade was overturned, Philadelphia
20 has provided at least a half a
21 million dollars in direct funding
22 to reproductive health
23 organizations.

24 This was a central issue

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2 during my last campaign. But in
3 the FY26 budget, our city cut
4 funding to zero. The current
5 situation is not sustainable.
6 Clinics are closing.
7 Misinformation is spreading. After
8 years of progress, the maternal
9 mortality rate is rising.

10 Thank you to the
11 providers and advocates who are
12 doing the work every day to uphold
13 our rights and that testified
14 today. I will fight alongside you
15 to make sure that we get this
16 hearing scheduled and funding
17 restored.

18 Thank you so much,
19 Council President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

22 Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Nicolas O'Rourke.

24 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

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2 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 Veterans Day was I guess
4 this past week on Tuesday, cold
5 day. I intentionally took the time
6 out to ask my team to lighten the
7 load so that I can spend some time
8 on a cold day with my son. My wife
9 also was off from work. And so,
10 she had him at home and I got a
11 chance to laugh at him and look at
12 him and let him cough on me.

13 I also took that time
14 because I took it slow, to watch a
15 little YouTube, catch up on what
16 was going on on YouTube. And two
17 things that I got a chance to look
18 at, one, were videos of old Council
19 sessions back in, if you believe it
20 or not, it's 2025, 2015, 2014 was a
21 decade ago. I saw --

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: (Inaudible).

24 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

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2 No, I'm gonna talk about it,
3 doctor, because I saw you walk
4 across here looking all baby-
5 faced --

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Yes, it was.

8 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: --

9 across the whale of the chamber. I
10 saw Member Jones sitting at this
11 desk right here giving commentary.
12 I saw Member Reynolds Brown, I
13 think she stepped out. She was
14 over here talking. Member Squilla,
15 sitting exactly where he's sitting
16 now. Yes, indeed. So many folks.
17 Member Goode I think was sitting at
18 this desk often giving commentary.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Yes.

21 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: It
22 was really interesting watching it
23 and it made me realize that there
24 really is no reason to believe that

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2 much of what we do here will be
3 remembered by anyone but us long
4 after we're gone. That's not to be
5 negative. I think it's just
6 realistic. People not in the orbit
7 of the political bubble that we
8 work in don't watch sessions back
9 every week like some or like I did
10 on Tuesday. So let us remember all
11 the minutia and the busyness that
12 we take the time out for.

13 The other thing that I
14 watched that really grounded me was
15 a brief VICE documentary on how
16 U.S. nuclear testing continues to
17 haunt the Marshall Islands. There
18 was a whole era in the beginning of
19 arms production where the United
20 States government was dropping
21 nuclear bombs, hydrogen bombs, on a
22 little small chain of islands in
23 the South Pacific Ocean. And the
24 continuing impact on the people

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2 that live there, the displacement,
3 the health challenges that they
4 still live with to this day was
5 something that this brief about
6 15-minute documentary really caught
7 my attention.

8 The VICE video calls me
9 to reflect on past decisions and
10 how those past decisions affect the
11 present. President Trump recently
12 declared that the United States
13 would restart testing nuclear
14 weapons for the first time in 30
15 years, continuing the nuclear arms
16 race and increasing the threat of
17 global nuclear war.

18 He also in that spirit
19 recently granted permission for a
20 nuclear submarine to be built right
21 here at the Navy Yard in
22 Philadelphia. The United States,
23 as a point of fact, holds over 5000
24 nuclear weapons, most of which are

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2 more powerful than the U.S. atomic
3 bombs that destroyed Hiroshima and
4 Nagasaki, and which pose a
5 devastating and existential threat
6 to humanity ongoing, as those who
7 live on the Marshall Islands know.

8 Detonation of even a
9 small fraction of nuclear weapons
10 would cause large-scale climate and
11 agricultural disruption, such that
12 the lives and the food security of
13 more than 2 billion people could be
14 at risk. Governments have a moral
15 obligation to use public resources
16 for the common good.

17 Moral societies I
18 believe owe duties to future
19 generations, not just what we do in
20 the present moment. And investing
21 in potential instruments of mass
22 destruction rather than human
23 flourishing reflects a moral
24 failure in stewardship and

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2 priorities.

3 Nuclear weapons create
4 long-term environmental, genetic
5 and political risks that extend far
6 beyond current generations, their
7 maintenance and potential use
8 burden the future with a threat of
9 extinction or ecological collapse.

10 Investing in them violates the
11 moral responsibility to protect the
12 well-being of those who come after
13 us.

14 Leonard Boff is a noted
15 theologian, I mentioned this to
16 Member Bass earlier, but he said
17 that spirituality, not even
18 religion, is about that attitude
19 which puts life at the center and
20 defends and promotes life against
21 all the mechanisms of death,
22 desiccation or stagnation.

23 And so, in that spirit I
24 think it's important to know that

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2 public investment in nuclear
3 weapons is morally indefensible
4 because it violates the sanctity of
5 life. It misuses collective
6 resources, perpetuates injustice
7 across generations and conditions
8 peace on the threat of mass death.

9 It is a moral obligation
10 for the City of Philadelphia to
11 invest in what our residents need,
12 such as safe and healthy homes,
13 affordable transit, working
14 utilities, child care and more, and
15 divest I believe from weapons that
16 threaten life on our planet,
17 investing not in the power to
18 destroy humanity, but in the means
19 to preserve it, which is the reason
20 why I introduced my resolution
21 today.

22 And I hope as we think
23 back on Council sessions gone by
24 and how what we do, whether we

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2 remember it or not, actually
3 affects the future, that we're
4 mindful about the decisions that we
5 make and the investments that we
6 make and make sure that they are
7 towards the common good and not
8 taking away from life. Enough on
9 that.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

12 Thank you. The only other thing I
13 wanted to mention was that the
14 first Starbucks Union formed in
15 2021, speaking of past actions, and
16 over 600 stores have since joined
17 the Union, but they're still
18 fighting for their first contract.
19 This year alone the company has
20 committed over 400 labor law
21 violations and over 125 ULP
22 charges.

23 To that end, Starbucks
24 workers around the country are

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2 going on strike. That's 14,000
3 workers exercising their hard-won
4 right to strike. Philly will be
5 one of the main sites organizing,
6 and that's because there's such a
7 strong base of local coffee shops
8 being organized as we speak.

9 Huge shout-out to
10 Workers United. They're probably
11 not in the room now, but maybe if
12 they look back on this video
13 they'll know that I shouted their
14 name out. Colleagues, I invite you
15 to join me at the North Apron today
16 at 4:00 p.m. because Philly is the
17 face of this national strike.

18 And if you can't do
19 that, I understand we got busy
20 schedules, but I am going to ask
21 that you do what I'm asking
22 everybody else, which is for as
23 long as these workers are on
24 strike, you ditch the red Starbucks

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2 cups. Yeah, let them go. You
3 can't get the little teddy bear
4 with the cap. I think them are all
5 sold out anyway. So ditch the
6 Starbucks cups. No contract, no
7 coffee from Starbucks. Dunkin' is
8 better anyway. We already know
9 that.

10 Thank you, Council
11 President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you. I think the
14 corner store coffee in the
15 neighborhood is better than all of
16 them.

17 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

18 And it's cheaper.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: We done got cute. Now,
21 we drinking Starbucks. I'm going
22 to the corner store. Let me stop.

23 Any speeches on behalf

11 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:
12 Yes, sir.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: Amen.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES:
16 Mr. President, colleagues,
17 listening audience, today I rise to
18 acknowledge some entity within our
19 city that often seems invisible,
20 that often seems ignored but is a
21 backbone of our city, and the
22 United Way has dubbed them as
23 ALICE. And they are called ALICE
24 because they are limited -- what is

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2 it. They are asset limited. I got
3 it now, Asset Limited, Income
4 Constrained but Employed.

5 Access -- long session. ALICE.

6 And the reason they're
7 called that is because they often
8 earn too much to get the safety
9 nets that we talked about in these
10 chambers the other day. They don't
11 get the day care. They don't get
12 the rent rebate. They don't get
13 the subsidies for day care and
14 transportation. But above them,
15 they don't get the access to the
16 upper class.

17 They don't see the
18 mobility that many people
19 (inaudible). This represents about
20 40% of the Commonwealth of
21 Pennsylvania. 300 households in
22 the city -- 300,000 households in
23 the city of Philadelphia are ALICE
24 and they're not invisible people.

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2 They're Lopez. They're Griselda
3 in my office that does my
4 scheduling. They don't qualify for
5 what we do in this chamber, but
6 they see the benefits going to
7 others.

8 And I'm going to tell
9 you, you want to meet them, go to
10 Aisle 6 at Shop Rite and they are
11 resentful. They're resentful
12 because they don't get the benefits
13 of being super poor and they don't
14 have the access to being super
15 rich. So they get by every year on
16 credit card debt, not for lavish
17 vacations but to pay their grocery
18 bills, and their hopes are dashed
19 by the interest rates they pay just
20 to maintain.

21 We had a hearing here
22 the other day talking about who
23 should get more when. I should say
24 it shouldn't be or. It should be

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2 and. And these people are
3 important too. Because if you
4 penalize them for going to work,
5 they can't come down here and talk
6 about public comment because they
7 have to work. They have to finance
8 their way from Wednesday to pay
9 day. They can't come down here to
10 express themselves.

11 But trust me when I tell
12 you, you go to Aisle 6 in Shop
13 Rite, they will tell you how they
14 feel about all of this. And
15 they're your voters. Those are the
16 people that come out. And when
17 they don't vote, it is because they
18 don't feel that we are speaking to
19 their needs. And they will tell
20 you privately or they will tell you
21 publicly when they don't vote.

22 I would say to you that
23 this chamber should be their
24 bastion of hope that the American

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2 Dream is still alive and that it
3 applies to them and that these
4 programs are also, also, also for
5 them. ALICE should not be ignored.
6 They should be promoted. Because
7 when you lose ALICE, you lose the
8 middle class. You get the haves
9 and the have-nots, and the
10 have-a-littles shouldn't be
11 penalized.

12 So I support what the
13 H.O.M.E. program -- I'll say it
14 again. I support what the H.O.M.E.
15 program wants to do for both the
16 poor and that struggling middle
17 class. Because in my district, I
18 represent a whole lot of them. In
19 Phillips' District, you represent a
20 whole lot of them. In Cindy Bass'
21 District, you represent a whole
22 bunch of those working people that
23 go about their business. They
24 don't complain. They just pay

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2 their taxes. They raise their
3 kids. They do what we all hope
4 that every good person can do and
5 we want the poor to be able to do,
6 and we need to find pathways for
7 them to be that middle class.

8 So I don't want Dennis
9 the Menace in Washington -- because
10 if you ever look at Dennis the
11 Menace, Donald Trump is what he
12 looks like when he's grown up -- to
13 put us against each other in these
14 programs because we are trying to
15 figure out how to make \$1 out of
16 \$0.50. So I thank the Mayor. I
17 thank the Mayor and her team for
18 making sure that the ALICES among
19 us don't get left behind.

20 Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: Thank you.

24 Chair recognizes

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2 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

3 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
4 you, Mr. President.

5 I want to thank
6 community members in the 5th
7 District for showing up to a town
8 hall that we held last week at the
9 Free Library Central branch, where
10 we were able to speak to residents
11 about quality-of-life issues in
12 their neighborhood. We talked
13 about homelessness, we talked about
14 nuisance businesses, and they were
15 able to give us their feedback on
16 how to improve their life,
17 particularly here in the city.

18 I also want to thank
19 community residents and most
20 importantly, the family of LGP
21 Qua. His legacy will forever be
22 memorialized at 9th and Clearfield.
23 This weekend we had the opportunity
24 to have a street renaming ceremony

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2 there. And I hope that street sign
3 serves as an inspiration to the
4 youth of that community who feel
5 like they can't be successful when
6 they try to be themselves.

7 Qua stood for being
8 positive and always being your
9 authentic self no matter what. And
10 hopefully that sign serves as
11 inspiration again to young people
12 to be who you are and don't be
13 afraid of being who you are,
14 because success can come from just
15 being just that, doing you.

16 And last night, our
17 office along with Councilman Thomas
18 hosted a 2026 Preparedness meeting
19 for residents of the 5th Council
20 District to make them aware of
21 what's coming next year and how
22 they can participate in almost the
23 \$1 billion of economic impact
24 that's expected for our region.

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2 So I want to thank our
3 host Girard College and Mr. Tumar
4 Alexander; Jonathan Todd from
5 Philly Soccer 2026; Tyrone Dixon
6 from the Mayor's Office of 2026,
7 Ms. Jennifer Nagle, Philadelphia
8 Convention and Visitors Bureau;
9 Patrick Sherlock from Park to Broad
10 Arts and Business District; and
11 Melissa Williams from the Commerce
12 Department.

13 As we look ahead to
14 2026, it's important that every
15 neighborhood feels included in
16 Philadelphia's moment on the world
17 stage. And I am focused on making
18 sure that residents and small
19 businesses in the 5th District have
20 the tools and connections they need
21 to benefit from this special
22 occasion that we'll have in our
23 city.

24 On the legislative

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2 front, today I introduced a bill
3 that would limit hours of certain
4 businesses along Girard Avenue and
5 Fairmount Avenue and the
6 Brewerytown, Fairmount and Spring
7 Garden communities. This bill
8 would also require a special
9 exception for certain types of
10 stores opening up in these
11 communities, giving the community a
12 voice in the process.

13 As we all know, our
14 communities have been inundated
15 with nuisance stores where they're
16 actually selling illegal narcotics,
17 and I look forward to having this
18 conversation how we can continue to
19 improve the quality of life for
20 residents in the 5th Council
21 District with this legislation.

22 And finally to those
23 watching and listening, our office
24 has partnered with the National

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2 Center for Urban Solutions and
3 Temple University to host a job
4 fair, which is going on right now
5 as we speak until 3:00 p.m. at the
6 Liacouras Center. We have close to
7 100 employers there who are
8 actually hiring.

9 So if you're looking to
10 change your life, to improve your
11 life, looking for that next
12 opportunity, this job fair is for
13 you. Again, it's happening right
14 now at the Liacouras Center at
15 Broad and Cecil B. Moore until
16 3:00 p.m. I hope that everyone can
17 meet me there. I'm on my way there
18 now.

19 So thank you,
20 Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

23 Chair recognizes

24 Councilmember Curtis Jones.

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
3 you, Mr. President.

4 I'd like leave of
5 absence to attend to 30-plus
6 Mifflin students sitting in my
7 office.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Leave is granted, sir.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
11 you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

14 Chair recognizes
15 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad.

16 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:
17 Thank you, Council President.

18 Today marks an important
19 milestone in our City's ongoing
20 fight against human trafficking, a
21 fight that demands both compassion
22 and courage. For the first time,
23 this Council is introducing a bill
24 that directly addresses the rights

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2 and dignity of survivors of human
3 trafficking.

4 Our legislation amends
5 Philadelphia's fair practices
6 ordinance to ensure that no one is
7 denied employment or treated
8 unfairly at work because they are a
9 survivor of trafficking. Too often
10 survivors face barriers when they
11 try to rebuild their lives, gaps in
12 employment history, trauma-related
13 challenges or stigma that follows
14 them long after they have escaped
15 exploitation.

16 While existing laws
17 punish traffickers, they have not
18 always protected survivors once
19 they are free. This bill fills
20 that gap. It ensures that human
21 trafficking victim status is
22 recognized as a protected class
23 under our City's anti-
24 discrimination law, giving

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2 survivors the same rights and
3 opportunities as everybody else.

4 In tandem with this
5 local action, I'm also introducing
6 a non-privileged resolution calling
7 on the General Assembly of
8 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to
9 take swift and decisive action to
10 pass House Bill 1286. That
11 legislation championed by
12 Representative Young would
13 strengthen statewide prevention
14 efforts by requiring human
15 trafficking awareness training for
16 employees of hotels, motels and
17 short-term rental operators.

18 It is a thoughtful
19 bipartisan measure that bears
20 education with accountability,
21 ensuring that those most likely to
22 encounter trafficking victims know
23 how to recognize and report it.
24 Our local and state efforts are

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2 deeply connected. Philadelphia
3 City Council has already invested
4 500,000 to launch a citywide Human
5 Trafficking Awareness and
6 Prevention campaign.

7 Next Tuesday we will
8 host a press conference and
9 stakeholder convening at the
10 Independence Visitor Center to
11 announce this partnership, bringing
12 together the Office of Public
13 Safety, Stop the Traffick and many
14 other stakeholders. This convening
15 will serve as the foundation for a
16 unified citywide strategy to
17 protect vulnerable people, uplift
18 survivors and build an informed
19 public that refuses to look away.

20 Before I close, I also
21 want to share that during Monday's
22 Public Health and Human Services
23 Committee meeting, the committee
24 reported out a favorable

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2 recommendation of my legislation to
3 amend the fair practices ordinance
4 to protect workers from
5 discrimination based on menopause,
6 perimenopause or menstruation.

7 And let me be frank
8 about why these protections matter.
9 In WHYY's coverage on November 12,
10 2025, which reported on the bill's
11 advancement, the online comment
12 section was flooded with sexist
13 remarks, many from men, mocking the
14 idea that menopause or menstruation
15 deserve workplace protection.

16 That response itself
17 underscores exactly why this
18 legislation is necessary. It
19 shines a light on how stigma and
20 ignorance continue to shape our
21 culture and why we must ensure that
22 no worker is marginalized or
23 dismissed for a natural, biological
24 experience. This measure would

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2 make Philadelphia one of the first
3 municipalities in the nation to
4 codify explicit protections for
5 workers navigating menopause and
6 related health transitions. And we
7 are doing it because respect,
8 inclusion and equity should not
9 depend on gender or age. They are
10 human rights.

11 Taken together, these
12 legislative actions on menopause
13 protections and human trafficking
14 underscore what this body can
15 achieve when we legislate with
16 empathy and purpose. We are saying
17 clearly every person in our city
18 deserves safety, respect and the
19 chance to thrive.

20 Thank you, Council
21 President and colleagues, for your
22 partnership in this work.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

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2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilmember Cindy Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 Today I introduced a
7 bill calling for a temporary
8 commonsense pause on backyard
9 breeding in Philadelphia. Right
10 now healthy and adoptable dogs are
11 being euthanized in our shelter
12 simply because there's no space.
13 And a DNA study by ACCT, which is
14 the city's Animal Care and Control
15 Team, found that nearly 60%, nearly
16 half of 60 Huskies in the shelter
17 were close relatives, which is a
18 clear sign that unregulated
19 backyard breeding is fueling the
20 overpopulation that we see today.

21 This pause protects
22 public health, preventing the
23 spread of disease like parvovirus
24 and rabies. It protects public

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2 safety, reducing the risk of
3 attacks and the link between
4 unlicensed breeders and criminal
5 activity, and it protects consumers
6 and taxpayers, shielding families
7 from fraud and heartbreak while
8 easing the strain on city services.

9 Every litter means more
10 dogs in our shelter, more cost for
11 taxpayers and more suffering that
12 we can prevent. This isn't about
13 punishment. It's about compassion
14 and responsibility and giving our
15 community time to stabilize and
16 heal. If you want to learn more
17 about how our city manages our dog
18 population, we'll be having a
19 lunch-and-learn in the near future
20 with ACCT and we'll keep you
21 apprised as to the date.

22 I also wanted to go over
23 just a couple of key points on
24 backyard breeding in Philadelphia.

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2 And this gets real. Now, we want
3 you to know that this is a
4 temporary pause and it's a breeding
5 moratorium. This is a commonsense
6 measure and is trying to get to the
7 root causes of being healthy and
8 adoptable dogs who are dying at our
9 local shelter because they must
10 make room for more dogs who are
11 coming into the shelter.

12 The temporary pause on
13 backyard breeding and sales
14 protects consumers from fraud and
15 disease and emotional distress,
16 while also saving lives and
17 preventing the killing of adoptable
18 and healthy dogs at the shelter.
19 Nearly half, again 47%, of dogs
20 share more than 25% of the same
21 DNA, meaning that they are close
22 relatives, most DNA overlap for the
23 60 Huskies over a two-year period.
24 Most DNA overlap was between 30% to

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2 40% indicating that they were
3 parents, offspring, half siblings
4 and cousins.

5 This level of
6 relatedness is four times higher
7 than what we've seen in typical
8 urban shelter populations. Typical
9 open intake or urban stray dog
10 populations usually show less than
11 10% of individuals sharing more
12 than 25% of genetic relatedness.
13 And by contrast, in the ACCT Philly
14 Husky sample, again more than 47%
15 share the same DNA, genetic
16 evidence of unregulated backyard
17 breeding contributing to shelter
18 intake and overpopulation.

19 Every litter means more
20 dogs in our shelter, higher costs
21 for taxpayers and more stress on
22 already stretched city services.
23 Too many backyard-bred dogs end up
24 sick, unsocialized or on the

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2 streets which puts everyone at
3 risk. Temporary restrictions help
4 weed out these exploitive backyard
5 operations that profit while others
6 shoulder the burden. And this
7 isn't about criminalizing people.
8 It's about protecting pets and
9 giving our community time to
10 stabilize and heal.

11 Puppies who are not
12 given appropriate preventive care,
13 like free prevention deworming and
14 vaccines, spread illness in our
15 community. One unvaccinated puppy
16 that hasn't been dewormed, several
17 times can spread parasites in our
18 community, which both people and
19 dogs can catch.

20 Puppies and dogs who
21 have not received a minimum of two
22 vaccines can catch parvovirus, a
23 serious and often fatal virus that
24 attacks the intestinal tract and

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2 bone marrow. It can live in the
3 environment, outside or inside for
4 up to six months, continuing to
5 make dogs sick whose owners aren't
6 even aware of the risk.

7 Now, in terms of public
8 safety we want you to know that
9 there are all kinds of examples of
10 the harms that uncontrolled
11 breeding and unregulated large dog
12 breeds can contribute. As an
13 example, in May of 2024 a 52-year-
14 old woman was attacked by three pit
15 bulls being walked by an alleged
16 backyard breeder. An off-duty
17 police officer shot the dogs,
18 killing one and injuring another
19 and likely saving this woman's
20 life.

21 In October 2023, Antonio
22 Shaw, a nonverbal after a series of
23 several strokes 62-year-old man
24 walked into the wrong backyard

2 where five dogs badly attacked him.

3 In May of 2024, a man was attacked

4 by four dogs at the corner off of

5 Fairmount Avenue. Police shot and

6 killed one dog and injured another

7 as they ran off. Three of the dogs

8 looked very similar and were likely

9 related.

10 There's a number of

11 other issues in terms of dog

12 breeders where mother dogs are

13 being dumped, being found that

14 they've clearly had too many

15 litters and no longer able to

16 produce large litters. Commonly,

17 backyard-bred dogs are being found

18 as strays with conditions such as

19 prolapses that occur as a result of

20 forced separation during mating or

21 from a complicated birth, very

22 often in these breeds as the

23 puppies heads are often too wide to

24 pass through the birth canal,

2 requiring a C-section. I could go
3 on and on. But we all get the
4 point. We have to do something and
5 we have to do something now. And
6 so, I certainly hope that we'll
7 have the support of this body in
8 passing this bill.

9 I also very briefly
10 wanted to mention we had Nicole
11 Fisher, who's a devoted wife,
12 mother, mentor and champion both in
13 and out of the boxing ring here
14 today. Congratulations to her for
15 all of her hard work and her
16 accomplishments.

17 And also again, we're
18 recognizing November 14th as the
19 Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day in
20 Philadelphia and we encourage you
21 to take note and to walk your child
22 to school.

23 Thank you,
24 Mr. President.

4 Chair recognizes

5 Councilman Dr. Anthony Phillips.

6 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 Good afternoon,

9 colleagues, and most importantly,
10 good afternoon to our neighbors
11 here in Philadelphia. Before I
12 begin, I want to announce that this
13 past Saturday I joined the Scott
14 family as they laid Kada Scott to
15 rest. It was a beautiful tribute,
16 a very beautiful tribute. And
17 throughout this tragedy, I've
18 reiterated that people of the city
19 deserve systems that protect them,
20 support them and remain accountable
21 to them, and that is where I want
22 to focus our attention today, on
23 accountability.

24 I've heard from our

2 neighbors and RCOs across the 9th
3 District about absentee landlords
4 and about the lack of a responsive
5 and frankly responsible person here
6 when issues arise at their
7 property. So today I introduced a
8 non-residential, non-resident
9 landlord accountability ordinance.
10 I want to be clear that we are
11 talking about landlords that are
12 irresponsible.

13 We're not talking about
14 every landlord because many our
15 neighbors who live in our
16 communities are great landlords,
17 but there are others, irresponsible
18 landlords, who neglect has led to
19 blight and vacant properties across
20 our neighborhoods, creating
21 nuisances that hurt everyone.

22 Over the last five
23 years, Licenses and Inspections has
24 reported more than 62,000 housing

2 code violations, many involving
3 owners who are unresponsive or
4 unreachable. That is not okay. It
5 is unacceptable. It's unfair to
6 the tenants and our neighbors to
7 get calls every day about nuisance
8 properties and about neighbors or
9 tenants that people,
10 Councilmembers, advocates are not
11 able to reach the owners.

12 This legislation changes
13 that. It requires verifiable
14 contact information for every
15 licensed rental property and
16 mandates a local agent or
17 individual within Philadelphia for
18 any landlord who does not live in
19 Philadelphia to be here, to be a
20 point of contact.

21 This is about
22 accountability for our
23 neighborhoods. It's the same
24 accountability and responsiveness I

2 spoke about a few weeks ago, and
3 how important being responsive is.

4 I want to again express
5 my concerns about the ongoing
6 issues that I've been having and
7 our neighbors have been having with
8 the Philadelphia Water Department's
9 responsiveness to maintenance
10 across the 9th District. Can you
11 believe even since that speech that
12 I gave several weeks ago they're
13 still not done the issue, they
14 still have not completed the task.

15 These concerns have been
16 escalating repeatedly and continued
17 delays are unacceptable. Neighbors
18 across the 9th district have raised
19 ongoing concerns about the
20 Philadelphia Water Department's
21 slow and incomplete restoration of
22 water main pipe repairs, confusion
23 of who is responsible for repairing
24 streets and sidewalks and a growing

2 perception that the Philadelphia
3 Water Department is slow to
4 respond.

5 It lacks proactive
6 communication and struggles to
7 resolve issues efficiently. This
8 does not reflect the hard-working
9 crews and customer service teams at
10 the Water Department, the men and
11 women who do the work day-in and
12 day-out. However, it reflects the
13 poor leadership of the Water
14 Department, starting with its
15 Commissioner.

16 This is a call for
17 better systems as a whole. Given
18 the magnitude of these challenges
19 and the frustration felt by our
20 neighbors, the nerve of the Water
21 Department to ask for me to
22 introduce an ordinance to change
23 zoning to help them with some sort
24 of improvement that they see that

2 needs to be done.

3 Today I'm not
4 introducing those ordinances until
5 they see to it that they're going
6 to be committed to helping our
7 neighbors in the 9th District
8 return the service that they're
9 supposed -- receive the service
10 that they're supposed to receive.

11 I'm asking the
12 Philadelphia Water Department to
13 address these issues immediately,
14 especially in East Oak Lane and
15 Olney and to provide a clear path
16 for improvement. Our office stands
17 ready to work with the Water
18 Department, but I cannot and will
19 not advance additional zoning
20 legislation for a water department
21 that does not assure service to our
22 neighborhoods.

23 And I don't mind -- the
24 last thing I'll say is this on the

2 Water Department. I don't mind
3 making the Water Department an
4 example of how we should hold
5 people accountable during budget
6 season. I think they need to be
7 the first example of how well we do
8 that. They have a couple more
9 months to prove us differently.

10 Thank you so much. The
11 Commissioner heard me.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member
14 Dr. Anthony Phillips. I think I
15 just saw the mic drop.

16 Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Rue Landau.

18 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

19 Thank you. That's a tough act to
20 follow, Councilman Phillips. Thank
21 you, Council President.

22 First, congratulations
23 to Asian Americans United for 40
24 years of amazing advocacy and

2 organizing for the city's AAPI
3 community. City Council was proud
4 to honor this milestone today with
5 an honorary resolution.

6 For four decades, AAU
7 has participated in initiatives
8 around improving education,
9 providing youth leadership,
10 combating anti-Asian violence,
11 neighborhood development, cultural
12 preservation and much more. And I
13 have been proud to work with AAU
14 for 30 of those 40 years. Cheers
15 to 40 years of important service
16 and unwavering dedication to
17 Philadelphia. We can't wait to see
18 what's in store for the next 40.

19 I also introduced a
20 resolution honoring and celebrating
21 the life and legacy of Pierre
22 Robert, the beloved WMMR Radio host
23 and a champion of Philadelphia's
24 rock music scene for over 44 years.

2 Every weekday Pierre lit up the
3 airwaves with his love of music,
4 his energy, his self-deprecating
5 humor and his lasting genuine
6 connection with his audience.

7 Known for championing local
8 musicians and bands, he also had a
9 steadfast commitment to his
10 Philadelphia LGBTQ+ community and
11 to support those living with HIV
12 and AIDS, using his influence to
13 not just celebrate but to educate
14 listeners. We will miss him deeply
15 here in Philadelphia, but we know
16 that his impact will be with us
17 forever.

18 I also introduced a
19 resolution recognizing November
20 16th as World Day of Remembrance
21 for Road Traffic Victims in the
22 City of Philadelphia. I also
23 introduced this resolution this
24 time last year and it's very sad to

2 continue having to do it because
3 traffic deaths are a leading cause
4 of preventable deaths,
5 disproportionately harming people
6 who are walking and biking.

7 This year's World Day of
8 Remembrance is organized around the
9 theme of remember, support, act.
10 We must remember those we lost to
11 traffic violence, support the
12 victims and their families as well
13 as emergency services that help and
14 act to prevent and stop further
15 road traffic deaths and injuries.
16 Thank you to the Bicycle Coalition
17 of Greater Philadelphia, Families
18 for Safe Streets Greater
19 Philadelphia and other partners for
20 speaking in favor of this
21 resolution today.

22 And before I end, I just
23 wanted to take one moment to
24 respond to Councilmember Jones and

2 his explanation of what happened
3 yesterday with our H.O.M.E.
4 hearing. In my opinion, many of us
5 who are advocating for a
6 prioritization of this first
7 tranche of funding are not talking
8 about pitting the have-nots with
9 the have-a-littles.

10 In fact, we know there's
11 plenty of money for all. We're not
12 also, as he's saying, making \$1 out
13 of \$0.50. We have \$800 million to
14 spend in Philadelphia to make sure
15 that every single person who needs
16 safe, affordable, accessible
17 housing has it. We just need to
18 make sure that, especially on the
19 front end, that we are prioritizing
20 where that money is going in the
21 beginning.

22 We have a
23 transformational opportunity here
24 in Philadelphia to absolutely build

3 sure that our lowest-income

4 Philadelphians who need affordable

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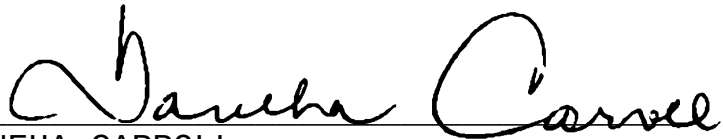
