15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
18 Council President.

19 As we know, public safety has
20 been an issue here in our city and also
21 around the country. This body has
22 stepped up by providing millions of
23 additional dollars that came out of the
24 American Rescue Plan to help some of
25 those anti-violence initiatives through

2 our grassroots, community-based
3 organizations as a way to address this
4 public safety issue here in Philadelphia.

5 But considering this is a
6 nationwide problem, for the past number
7 of weeks I've been reaching out to
8 colleagues in Democratic Municipal
9 Officials, the National League of Cities
10 to see what they have been doing to also
11 address this issue. And so in doing that
12 research over the past period of time,
13 learned that a number of cities have been
14 using different initiatives like signing
15 bonuses as a way to recruit police
16 officers.

17 Recruiting police officers has
18 been an issue all over this nation.
19 Cities like Baltimore, Newark, Denver,
20 Seattle, Portland, Albuquerque all have
21 been using signing bonuses as a way to
22 bring in police officers into their
23 jurisdictions.

24 In addition, in doing this
25 research, learned that the national

2 average salary for a police officer is
3 about \$60,000. Here in the City of
4 Philadelphia it's less than \$57,000. And
5 recently in our Council hearing with
6 Commissioner Outlaw, we learned that we
7 have budgeted 6,380 police officers, but
8 we only have 5,900 officers on duty. So
9 that's close to 500 officers that have
10 not been appointed that are in our
11 budget.

12 In addition, we learned from
13 her that two of the major issues in
14 recruiting police officers are salary and
15 residency. And so two of the bills that
16 I'm introducing today help to look at
17 that issue and address that issue as we
18 go through not only addressing this
19 public safety issue in our city but also
20 as we look at the budget and how we
21 allocate dollars during this budget
22 season.

23 So I look forward to having a
24 robust conversation regarding these two
25 bills. I know Council as a body will

2 continue to do the work that we've always
3 done to try to come up with new and
4 creative ideas to address the public
5 safety issues in our city.

6 Thank you, Council President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 Those four bills will be
10 referred to the appropriate committee.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman
12 Brooks offers one bill and two
13 resolutions, entitled "An ordinance
14 amending Chapter 19-1100 of The
15 Philadelphia Code, ('Personal Property
16 Taxes') to impose an annual tax on
17 certain intangible personal property."

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes -- Councilwoman, did you
20 want to speak now?

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Yes.
22 Really quick. Yes. Thank you, Council
23 President.

24 As we enter into the third
25 budget season of the pandemic, our city

2 has faced a number of questions - how do
3 we lift up our most vulnerable
4 Philadelphians who face severe financial
5 and personal losses over the past two
6 years and close this racial wealth gap.
7 And how do we heal neighborhoods across
8 the City that are suffering from poverty,
9 austerity, and disinvestment. And how do
10 we support young people in recovering
11 from learning losses, social isolation,
12 and widespread gun violence. And I
13 firmly believe that deep investments in
14 community services, like libraries, parks
15 and recreation, behavioral health
16 services, and not status quo funding are
17 what we need for an equitable recovery.

18 So today I'm officially
19 introducing the Philly wealth tax, which
20 could bring between \$240 and \$280 million
21 to the City to invest back in our
22 communities.

23 For years, the one percent and
24 the ultra rich have not contributed to
25 their fair share, and we know that wealth

2 has not been trickled down. In fact,
3 millionaires have doubled their wealth
4 during the pandemic while working
5 families still struggle to make ends
6 meet. And Black and Brown communities
7 have paid the cost of underfunding long

9 and the one percent to pay what they owe.

10 And I want to thank my
11 co-sponsors, Councilmembers Gym and
12 Gauthier, for supporting this bill, and
13 thank you, Council colleagues, and thank
14 you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, Councilwoman.

17 That bill will be referred to
18 the appropriate committee.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: On behalf

25 That concludes our reports from

4 I note that the bill just

6 of the rules has been deemed to have had

10 As there are no additional

12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker for
13 the purpose of calling up resolutions and
14 bills on the Second Reading and Final
15 Passage Calendar.

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. The following

15 session.

16 So now that everyone is

18 considering the resolutions and bills we
19 have before us today, we will consider
20 our public comment session.

21 Public comment must concern
22 matters on the Second Reading and Final
23 Passage Calendars for possible action at
24 a session of Council. A speaker on any
25 of those matters must sign up in order to

5 When you call, we will take

10 name to the list. We will then telephone
11 each person on the list during the
12 Council session and invite them to our
13 remote meeting.

14 Today we have a relatively
15 significant number of individuals wishing
16 to testify in addition to the Mayor's
17 speech, so we will have two minutes to
18 speak. I would ask you to please adjust
19 your testimony to reflect the two-minute
20 number.

21 In order to be fair to all
22 those wishing to speak, I intend to hold
23 faithfully to the established time limit.
24 So once invited to the meeting and asked
25 to begin your testimony, a timer will be

20 participants and viewers have no
21 reasonable expectation of privacy. So by
22 continuing to be in the meeting, you are
23 consenting to being recorded.

24 I will now ask Mr. Decker
25 please read the first name on our list.

3 we have today, Mr. President, is Tenaja
4 Hammond, commenting on 210848.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning. State your name for the record
7 and please proceed with your testimony.

8 MS. HAMMOND: Yes. Good
9 morning, everyone. My name is Tenaja
10 Hammond. I'm currently enrolled in
11 Habitat for Humanity for the bill for
12 Page Street. I am in support of, one
13 being as though they're providing or
14 trying to provide us, which I've been in
15 the program for three years, trying to
16 provide us affordable housing.

17 It's important for me to become
18 a homeowner, because I'm a mother of five
19 who struggles alone, and currently where
20 I live, I live in the University City
21 Townhomes, and they are closing as of
22 July 8th, 2022, which leaves us an option
23 to go elsewhere. But I'm currently
24 seeking the homeownership program through
25 Habitat. It's a great, awesome program,

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2 which has been on hold.

3 I'm for the bill. I feel as
4 though parking is very important, but
5 having a home to live is way more
6 important. So I'm in support of the
7 bill.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
11 Thank you for your diligence. We're
12 going to make sure you get in that home.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Patrick Grossi, commenting on 220262.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning. State your name for the record
17 and please proceed with your testimony.

18 MR. GROSSI: Good morning,
19 Council President and fellow
20 Councilmembers. My name is Patrick
21 Grossi and I'm speaking today on behalf
22 of the Preservation Alliance for Greater
23 Philadelphia.

24 The Preservation Alliance
25 wishes to express its support for

2 Resolution 220262 and thank Councilmember
3 Katherine Gilmore Richardson and her
4 co-sponsors for urging the Pennsylvania
5 General Assembly to pass the Whole-Home
6 Repairs Act, Senate Bill 1135.

7 Senator Nikil Saval's bill aims
8 to address a dire material need for
9 Philadelphians and their sister residents
10 of the Commonwealth, a need where there
11 is currently limited public or private
12 support.

13 The Preservation Alliance
14 routinely receives calls from
15 owner-occupants of historic row houses
16 seeking help to replace their roof,
17 repair their windows, better insulate
18 their property. If they meet income
19 thresholds, I can at least direct them to
20 some of the programs Philadelphia,
21 Pennsylvania fortunately already has on
22 offer, Basic Systems Repair, Adaptive
23 Modifications, et cetera, but as you all
24 know, the demand and wait list for these
25 programs is likewise great.

2 The Whole-Home Repairs Act
3 essentially bundles all of these
4 assistance programs and creates a central
5 hub for funding, technical assistance,
6 and owner support.

7 The Alliance is a historic
8 preservation advocacy organization. Our
9 mission is dedicated to the recognition
10 and maintenance of historic places and
11 the people who steward them. Simply put,
12 helping people to stay in their homes by
13 making them safe, making them
14 comfortable, making them more energy
15 efficient is one of the best ways we can
16 preserve our historic built environment.

17 Within the Preservation
18 community, it's often asserted that the
19 greenest building is the one that already
20 exists. And among housing advocates,
21 it's similarly asserted that the most
22 affordable home is the one someone
23 already lives in.

24 The Whole-Home Repairs Act
25 takes both of these ideas to heart and

2 puts them into action. It is a sensible,
3 proactive, much-needed program, and the
4 Alliance thanks City Council for
5 recognizing its potential and advancing
6 this resolution today.

7 I thank you for your time.

9 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
10 appreciate it.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Katie Bartolotta, commenting on
13 220262.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning. State your name for the record
16 and please proceed with your testimony.

17 MR. BARTOLOTTA: Good morning,
18 Council President and members of Council.
19 My name is Katie Bartolotta and I'm the
20 Vice President of Policy and Strategic
21 Partnerships with the Philadelphia Energy
22 Authority. It's a pleasure to be here
23 with you all today in support of
24 Resolution 22062 [sic] calling on the
25 Pennsylvania General Assembly to adopt

2 the Whole-Home Repairs Act and thanking
3 Senator Saval for his commitment to
4 creating safe, efficient, resilient
5 housing in the Commonwealth of
6 Pennsylvania.

7 The Philadelphia Energy
8 Authority is a City government entity
9 building a robust and equitable clean
10 energy economy. We have spent the last
11 three years developing and piloting a
12 Whole-Home Repair program here in
13 Philadelphia called Built to Last in wish
14 the Whole-Home Repairs legislation is
15 modeled.

16 Built to Last helps existing
17 home repair programs work together to
18 deliver whole home improvement that not
19 only preserve existing affordable housing
20 but also make homes healthy, safe,
21 comfortable, less expensive to operate,
22 and climate resilient.

23 From Basic System Repairs and
24 Weatherization to electric heat pumps and
25 rooftop solar, Built to Last amplifies

2 the impact of existing programs and fills
3 critical service gaps. This model
4 depends on essential agencies, like the
5 Philadelphia Energy Authority, that can
6 take on the administrative roles of
7 coordinating the many partners that
8 provide participants with full benefit
9 screening, whole home assessment, and
10 stage construction services.

11 As of today, we are halfway
12 into our pilot of the Built to Last
13 program to serve our first 50 homes. In
14 addition to our work with Built to Last,
15 the Philadelphia Energy Authority is
16 working with partners to deliver a
17 complementary workforce training program
18 called Green Retrofit Immersive Training,
19 or GRIT. GRIT ensures that we have a
20 direct pipeline between the residential
21 work created through Built to Last and a
22 well-trained, diverse local workforce.
23 Our second 15-student cohort of GRIT will
24 start their training this May.

25 Dedicated funding for whole

2 home repairs is critical to achieving the
3 Philadelphia Energy Authority's goal of
4 delivering 10,000 holistic home
5 improvements in Philadelphia by 2032 and
6 creating 10,000 clean energy jobs by
7 2026. The Whole-Home Repairs Act will
8 help provide the necessary funding to
9 leverage existing services to deepen and
10 deliver home improvements that will make
11 meaningful long-term impact on families
12 living in poverty and helping to build
13 generational wealth-building assets and
14 ensuring all Philadelphians can
15 participate in the economic opportunities
16 created by this important work.

17 We applaud the bipartisan group
18 of Pennsylvania senators who have already
19 endorsed this legislation, and we applaud
20 the Councilmembers, including Katherine
21 Gilmore Richardson and Cherelle Parker,
22 for their leadership in introducing this
23 resolution to support the passage of the
24 Whole-Home Repairs Act.

25 Again, I thank you for the

3 our support to Resolution 220262.

4 Thank you.

5 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
6 is Natasha Cahill, commenting on 220262.

7 MS. CAHILL: Hi. Good morning,
8 Councilmembers. My name is Natasha
9 Cahill and I'm a staff member in State
10 Senator Nikil Saval's office. Senator
11 Saval was unable to call in today himself
12 and so I'm honored to be adding my voice
13 on his behalf.

14 I called to express our
15 complete support for City Council
16 Resolution 220262 as proposed by
17 Councilmembers Cherelle Parker and
18 Katherine Gilmore Richardson, and I add
19 our gratitude to the Councilmembers for
20 this resolution and to all Councilmembers
21 for considering it.

22 The Whole-Home Repairs Act is a
23 bipartisan bill that creates a one-stop
24 shop for home repairs and weatherization,
25 while building out our local workforce

2 and adding new family-sustaining jobs in
3 a growing field. This bill is the first
4 in the nation, making it so that
5 Pennsylvanians can stay warm, safe, and
6 dry in homes that they can afford.

7 Right now hundreds of thousands
8 of Pennsylvanians are living in homes
9 that are unsafe because they cannot
10 afford to make the needed repairs. The
11 passage of the Whole-Home Repairs Act
12 will let us fight housing scarcity,
13 community displacement, and instability
14 and the deterioration of our homes all at
15 once.

16 This is important for
17 Pennsylvania as a whole, and this is
18 incredibly important for Philadelphia,
19 where low-income households may spend
20 nearly a quarter of their incomes on
21 utilities alone, so just to keep their
22 homes warm, the lights on, and the water
23 running.

24 We help our neighbors here in
25 Philly by helping communities across our

2 Commonwealth, and our office is so
3 grateful to have housing champions like
4 Councilmembers Parker and Gilmore
5 Richardson on our side. Our office is
6 honored by this resolution and so hopeful
7 for what its passage will mean for our
8 constituents, for all Philadelphians, and
9 for all Pennsylvanians who are
10 struggling. We offer our wholehearted
11 support, and we thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much for your testimony. We
14 appreciate it.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
16 is Siarzhuk Shaliga, commenting on
17 220275.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning. State your name for the record
20 and please proceed with your testimony.

21 MR. SHALIGA: Good morning.
22 Dear City Council President Clarke and
23 fellow Councilmembers, my name is
24 Siarzhuk Shaliga and I represent
25 Association of Belarusians in America.

2 People in western countries
3 were feared World War III for decades. I
4 understand the fear, but don't you know
5 that World War III may have already
6 arrived when on February 24th, 2022,
7 foolish Russia started the
8 (unintelligible) war in Ukraine. Since
9 then, Ukraine has been designated to
10 establish a no-fly zone to protect the
11 Ukrainian people from Russian bombs. For
12 years, Ukraine fight just to defend their
13 skies. So far, the answer on both is no.
14 As a result, more than four million
15 refugees have left Ukraine.

16 Establishing a process to
17 swiftly admit displaced Ukrainians into
18 the United States and grant refugee
19 status to Ukrainian citizens is the
20 minimum United States can do to help
21 Ukraine in this humanitarian crisis.
22 Therefore, I support Resolution No.
23 220275.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
5 is Francois Mazur, commenting on 220275.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning. State your name for the record
8 and please proceed.

9 MR. MAZUR: Thank you. Good
10 morning, Councilmembers. My name is
11 Francois Mazur and I'm speaking in
12 support of Resolution No. 220275, and
13 that's urging the White House to
14 establish a process to swiftly admit
15 displaced Ukrainians into the United
16 States and grant refugee status to
17 Ukrainian citizens.

18 Philadelphia as the cradle of
19 liberty is always taking a lead in the
20 United States in welcoming immigrants,
21 and this resolution provides emphasis to
22 this historic attitude and presents an
23 important signal to the White House that
24 bringing Ukrainian refugees as swiftly as
25 possible reinforces the United States'

2 belief in liberty and freedom.

3 Similarly for those with family
4 in the United States who are already in
5 the process of arriving here and for whom
6 visas are already available, the lengthy
7 processing backlogs should be eliminated.
8 I truly hope the City Council will adopt
9 this resolution.

10 Thank you for your time.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony. We
13 appreciate it.

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Eugene Luciw, commenting on 220275.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning. State your name for the record
18 and please proceed with your testimony.

19 MR. LUCIW: Mr. President,
20 members of City Council, my name is
21 Eugene Luciw. I'm President of the
22 Philadelphia branch of the Ukrainian
23 Congress Committee of America, and I
24 speak today in support of Resolution No.
25 220275.

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2 Philadelphia, a beacon of
3 American opportunity and liberty, became
4 home to a good number of displaced
5 Ukrainians post-World War II, not unlike
6 the refugees that are in Europe today,
7 including, of course, my parents and
8 grandparents, my cousins, and some
9 uncles.

10 This immigration refreshed our
11 city and cities throughout America with a
12 significant number of dedicated,
13 hard-working citizens and patriots that
14 contributed greatly to our cultural
15 mosaic, building and establishing
16 wonderful cathedrals, churches, cultural,
17 civic, and charitable fellowships and
18 institutions, and even a highly
19 successful professional soccer team that
20 brought six championships to the City of
21 Philadelphia in the 1960s, the
22 Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals.

23 The humanitarian crisis in
24 Ukraine compels America to respond, to
25 provide displaced persons with a home

2 where they can thrive, where they can
3 prosper, and where they can add greatly
4 to the common good that is the United
5 States of America and this great City of
6 Brotherly Love.

7 Thank you for your attention.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony. We
10 appreciate it.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Roman Petyk, commenting on 220275.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. PETYK: Good morning,
16 Mr. President. My name is Roman Petyk
17 and I speak in support of Resolution No.
18 220275. I am also a Philadelphia native.
19 I'm a child of World War II refugees, and
20 it has been my privilege to support a
21 vibrant and prosperous Ukrainian American
22 community in this city as Board Chair of
23 Ukrainian Self-Reliance Federal Credit
24 Union, which supports 12,000 members and
25 has assets of over \$400 million.

2 We believe that this resolution
3 is critically important, because it
4 speaks to the need for administration
5 action to address the fundamental flaws
6 in the ingracious system as it has been
7 tortured and abused by the xenophobic
8 demagogues that have been in charge of
9 this process in prior administrations.
10 This needs to stop.

11 There is an opportunity here
12 for the administration to act
13 courageously to correct some of these
14 administrative and executive decisions
15 that greatly thwart the opportunities
16 that should otherwise be available to the
17 Ukrainian emigres and the Ukrainian
18 refugees that are now waiting by the
19 millions in Poland and Romania and other
20 countries for an opportunity to live in
21 this land of opportunity.

22 I urge the administration to
23 take the appropriate steps and act
24 courageously, and I strongly support this
25 resolution, particularly those provisions

2 that speak to the issues that were
3 endorsed by the Jewish Federation of
4 North America and the Anti-Defamation
5 League, immediate steps to help Ukrainian
6 civilians settle in the United States
7 with close family ties or other basis for
8 entry.

9 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
10 appreciate the opportunity to speak to
11 this issue.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you for your testimony. We
14 appreciate it.

15 CHIEF CLERK: The final
16 speaker, Mr. President, is Queen Judith
17 Robinson, commenting on 220685 [sic].

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 QUEEN ROBINSON: Yes. Good
21 morning. Queen Judith Robinson here to
22 testify on 220248, 210685.

23 It's Women History Month and I
24 just want to make sure on this last day
25 that we give big props to all of the

2 women who are holding down families in
3 PHA long-term residency. I want to talk
4 about that in the future, so I want to
5 just give a shout-out to Michelle Bailey,
6 a long-term tenant, and Queen Nadine
7 Harris, who is a homeowner in
8 Brewerytown, went from being a tenant to
9 a homeowner. And these long-term tenants
10 have been paying rent for 20, 30,
11 40 years in some cases. We need to
12 recognize them as homeowners as quickly
13 as possible. I'll talk about that in the
14 future, especially as we talk about
15 budget hearings, et cetera.

16 This special certificate of
17 inspection should be extended to PHA
18 residencies. Tenants are in properties
19 24/7 and we should expand that
20 possibility.

21 It's Women History Month. I
22 want to make certain that we keep in mind
23 all of the unsung sisters, sheorins (ph)
24 of -- I'm going to focus in on as
25 committee person 32nd Ward, 13th

3 Thank you for the opportunity.

20 (Duly seconded.)

14 Senator Nikil Saval for his commitment to
15 creating safe, efficient, resilient
16 housing in the Commonwealth of
17 Pennsylvania.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore
20 Richardson.

21 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
22 you, Council President. On behalf of
23 Councilmember Parker and I, I move the
24 adoption of the resolution.

25 (Duly seconded.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
15 declaring March 31, 2022 as International
16 Transgender Day of Visibility in the City
17 of Philadelphia.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
21 very much, Council President.

22 Today on this National Trans
23 Day of Visibility, I want to dedicate
24 this resolution and my remarks to the
25 youth of this city, especially all of our

2 trans, non-binary, and gender
3 non-conforming young people who are
4 transforming our understanding of what it
5 means to be human and inclusive as a
6 society in the City.

7 So as we mark today, I just
8 want to make sure that I invite everybody
9 who is watching and my Council
10 colleagues, along with the Office of LGBT
11 Affairs, for a rally for trans rights at
12 City Hall at noon today. We want to
13 continue to bring voice as well as
14 visibility to this day.

15 So five years ago, we were
16 proud to host the first Trans Day of
17 Visibility out of our Council body. We
18 welcomed a new LGBT Director, and we
19 wanted to show the world that this city
20 would be dedicated not just to disability
21 for trans people but to voice and change.

22 I've been so encouraged in the
23 past five years to see emerging
24 leadership from trans, non-binary, and
25 gender non-conforming leaders who have

2 won new policies through this body,
3 including name and pronoun change
4 policies, bathroom availability and use,
5 gender-neutral language, and access to
6 activities that had previously been
7 arbitrarily segregated by gender.

8 City Council extended those
9 same protections beyond schools,
10 requiring every single youth
11 organization -- every single
12 youth-serving organization to develop or
13 abide by similar policies, and that law
14 will go into effect this summer.

15 Some of these policies were
16 championed by young people themselves. I
17 want to honor and thank Itsella (ph) and
18 Philly Family Pride as well as my own
19 trans staff members, Cam Duran and
20 Christian Lovehall, who made those
21 policies possible.

22 I'm grateful to trans,
23 non-binary, and gender non-conforming
24 teachers, educators, community leaders
25 who have stepped out more boldly than

2 ever to show our youth that a cruel world
3 can and must change.

4 But as much as we strive to
5 make this world a little more loving and
6 kind for trans youth and trans community
7 members, there is no question that as
8 visibility has grown, so has hate and
9 backlash. Legislative bills denying
10 healthcare to tens of thousands of trans
11 youth are moving from state to state. In
12 Texas last month, the Governor signed
13 legislation that deems gender-affirming
14 medical treatments for trans youth to be
15 child abuse in the eyes of the state, and
16 now effectively criminalizes doctors,
17 nurses, and educators and calls upon them
18 to report parents to the state Department
19 of Family and Protective Services.

20 Florida prohibits even the
21 discussion, even the use of books that
22 mention LGBT issues with younger
23 students.

24 Pennsylvania's own state
25 legislature is considering transphobic

2 legislation that denies trans
3 student-athletes the ability to
4 participate in sports, and that has hit
5 here close to home as Penn student Lia
6 Thomas has borne an unimaginable level of
7 toxic anti-trans politics and hate.

8 This heightened political
9 rhetoric is driving open hostility
10 towards trans, queer, and non-binary
11 youth and their allies, whether it's in
12 school board meetings, in classrooms, or
13 in the broader media.

14 So five years later, we enter
15 this Trans Day of Visibility with greater
16 consciousness that the fight in defense
17 of trans lives to uphold trans dignity is
18 more important, more present, and more
19 urgent than ever. We do so because hate
20 translates to violence, especially for
21 Black, Brown, and immigrant trans women.

22 We honor Dominique Rem'mie
23 Fells, Mia Green, Stacy Blahnik, Nizah
24 Morris, Diamond Williams, Kyra Cruz,
25 London Kiki Chanel, Maya Young, Shantee

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2 Tucker, Keisha Jenkins, Tanya Moore, Tina
3 Rodriguez, Michelle Tamika Washington.

4 We say their names. We hold their lives
5 and memories close to our hearts, and we
6 call out the privileged femininity as
7 much as we do the toxic masculinity that
8 enables violence.

9 On this sixth Trans Day of
10 Visibility in this City Council body, I'm
11 proud to have introduced this resolution
12 with the majority support of this Council
13 body once again, and I want to thank my
14 co-sponsors, Councilmembers Gauthier,
15 Gilmore Richardson, Brooks, Squilla,
16 Parker, Quinones-Sanchez, Domb, and
17 Green, and all of my colleagues who over
18 the years have sponsored and consistently
19 voted for recognition and voice.

20 For all of our youth who have
21 endless possibilities and limitless
22 potential, to our trans, non-binary, and
23 gender non-conforming young people
24 wondering whether this world is for you,
25 and to all who love them, this City

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2 Council resolution is for you. We have
3 your back, and we will be sending the
4 signal that our city will always be here
5 for our trans communities.

6 With that, I call for the
7 approval of this resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
11 seconded.

12 All in favor indicate by saying

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
23 honoring and congratulating Women's

25 Masterman Girls Swim Team on the league

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, and that resolution has
21 been adopted.

22 Mr. Decker, please read the
23 title of Bill No. 210685.

24 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
25 amending Subcode "A" (The Philadelphia

2 Administrative Code) of Title 4 (The
3 Philadelphia Building Construction and
4 Occupancy Code) of The Philadelphia Code,
5 by amending Section A-703, entitled

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 the Chair recognizes Councilman Green for
11 an amendment to Bill No. 210685.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
13 Council President. I'd like to offer an
14 amendment to Bill No. 210685. A copy of
15 the amendment has been circulated to all
16 members of Council. I move for the
17 adoption of the amendment.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you. All those in favor of the
21 motion will signify by saying aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

8 Mr. Decker, do you have any
9 additional resolutions?

10 CHIEF CLERK: I do,
11 Mr. President.

12 A resolution authorizing the
13 Committee on Public Safety to hold public
14 hearings examining the use of technology
15 to solve shootings in the neighborhoods
16 surrounding the 57 blocks where 10 or
17 more people have been shot since 2015,
18 introduced today by Councilman Jones.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I'd like to speak to this
23 resolution briefly.

24 Yesterday we had the privilege
25 of working with Member Parker to talk

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2 about a plan, to talk about a public
3 safety plan in and around commercial
4 corridors.

5 I have the dubious distinction
6 of citing that today in my district an
7 eight-year-old brought a handgun to
8 school, which was discharged and caused
9 fortunately no death but it caused all
10 kinds of mayhem in a public charter
11 school that students should be thinking
12 about reading, writing, arithmetic, and
13 the lessons of the day.

14 One of the lessons of the day
15 is that the Inquirer looked at 57 corners
16 in Philadelphia that 10 or more shootings
17 had occurred. That is a roadmap to
18 violence in Philadelphia. Where crimes
19 happen is as important as what crimes
20 happen.

21 So we're going to take a look
22 at that and raise the question of
23 technology, what can we do, whether it's
24 cameras, whether it's lighting, which is
25 a subset of Member Parker's plan to take

2 a look at how we can reduce the instances
3 of violence in those 57 identified
4 corridors. And the Public Safety
5 Committee will take this on with its
6 members as a subset of that plan that was
7 introduced by Member Parker.

8 And with that, I move for the
9 adoption of the resolution.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
13 seconded.

14 All in favor indicate by saying
15 aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

22 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
23 other resolutions on the Final Passage
24 Calendar, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you very much.

3 That concludes our Calendar for
4 today.

5 And now we will have a special
6 presentation with a budget message.

7 We're going to -- the time has come for
8 us to consider the Mayor's presentation
9 of his annual budget message.

10 The Philadelphia Home Rule
11 Charter states that the Mayor shall
12 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
13 before the end of the fiscal year, his
14 operating message, his proposed operating
15 budget ordinance for the ensuing fiscal
16 year. At the same time, the Mayor shall
17 submit to Council the Recommended Capital
18 Program, Capital Budget, as received from
19 the City Planning Commission, to the
20 extent approved by the Mayor.

21 I will now ask for a brief
22 recess to give our technology
23 professionals an opportunity to cue the
24 Mayor's pre-recorded budget message.

25 Technology professionals,

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2 please go to it.

3 (Brief pause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. We will now consider the
6 Mayor's budget address.

7 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you,
8 Council President Clarke and members of
9 City Council for inviting me again to
10 speak today. I'm pleased to present our
11 seventh proposed Five Year Financial Plan
12 covering Fiscal Years 2023 through 2027.

13 As we all know, the past two
14 years have not been easy. The challenge
15 that we faced as a city, including a
16 global pandemic, political turmoil at the
17 national level, and intensified violence,
18 have tested our collective resolve. But
19 with our trademark resilience and
20 determination, we are facing those
21 challenges together.

22 I remember the uncertainty we
23 all felt in the early days of the
24 pandemic when our city shut down and we
25 focused all of our efforts on stopping

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2 the spread of the virus.

3 Each of us has had to make
4 sacrifices while bracing for every
5 worst-case scenario, and we've seen the
6 impacts continue to ripple out into our
7 communities ever since.

8 Here and across the world, we
9 have lost friends and loved ones. People
10 faced uncertain economic futures and
11 isolation. Children and families endured
12 school closures, and business owners
13 everywhere were forced to navigate
14 restrictions and shutdowns.

15 We faced those seismic changes
16 together, and now, thanks to the
17 collective hope and determination, our
18 city never lost, and bolstered by federal
19 financial support, we are well-positioned
20 for recovery in the wake of the pandemic.

21 As I've said before, I never
22 lost hope, hope that our city could and
23 would rebound, and that hope is stronger
24 today than ever.

25 The strength and dedication I

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2 witnessed from the thousands of first
3 responders and City of Philadelphia
4 employees over the past two years has
5 been nothing short of remarkable. And I
6 am proud that the City, along with all of
7 our partner organizations across the
8 region, stepped up to provide
9 unprecedented support for our people at a
10 time of great need.

11 We got vaccinated. Since the
12 life-saving vaccines started rolling out,
13 Philadelphia has become one of the most
14 vaccinated cities in the country. This
15 is thanks to the Department of Public
16 Health's tireless efforts and our
17 incredible healthcare partners.

18 More than 76 percent of
19 Philadelphia adults are now fully
20 vaccinated, and 93 percent of residents
21 12 years and older have received at least
22 one dose.

23 We supported families and
24 children. Over the past two years, we've
25 distributed over 23 million meals and

2 over 41 million pounds of food. The City
3 also established access centers at
4 libraries, recreation centers, and
5 community sites. And this year, we
6 helped more than 1,500 families access
7 \$6 million in direct cash aid through the
8 Child Tax Credit and other federal
9 programs.

10 We helped Philadelphians stay
11 in their homes. Since May 2020, we've
12 helped nearly 40,000 households stay in
13 their homes through PHL Rent Assist,
14 which has disbursed more than \$253
15 million in federal, state, and local
16 funds to support families and
17 individuals.

18 While many municipalities
19 across the country struggled to get this
20 funding to those who needed it most,
21 Philadelphia became a nationally
22 recognized leader in doing just that.

23 We supported local businesses
24 and workers. Since March 2020, more than
25 \$140 million in government,

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2 philanthropic, and private funding has
3 gone to Philadelphia's small businesses
4 and non-profits, including four grant
5 programs stood up by our Department of
6 Commerce, PIDC, and the Commonwealth.
7 Those funds have been lifelines for
8 thousands of local businesses, especially
9 hard hit minority-owned businesses.

10 Our Worker Relief Fund also
11 provided more than \$2.2 million in
12 emergency cash assistance to over 2,800
13 workers left out of federal and state
14 relief programs.

15 We worked to bridge the digital
16 divide. The City worked with a number of
17 partners to launch PHLConnectED, a
18 program that has provided over 21,000
19 free internet connections for student
20 households.

21 I remind everyone of these
22 achievements because each one tells a
23 story about dozens, if not hundreds, of
24 dedicated public servants working around
25 the clock to support our residents during

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2 a time of ever-changing needs. And they
3 tell the story of the remarkable
4 resilience of our residents and what is
5 possible when we all work together to
6 address those needs. That same
7 resilience is what will propel us into
8 the future.

9 Our FY23 budget and Five Year
10 Plan proposed today builds on all of
11 these efforts so that Philadelphians in
12 every neighborhood can benefit from a
13 strong, inclusive recovery.

14 As we prepared this year's
15 budget proposal, I'm proud that we
16 initiated a comprehensive, inclusive
17 public engagement process regarding City
18 spending. We held over 20 community
19 engagement sessions with more than 500
20 residents, business owners, non-profits,
21 arts and culture organizations, and more.
22 This budget was written by Philadelphians
23 for Philadelphians.

24 Building off that input, over
25 the next five years this budget plan will

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2 move Philadelphia forward by enhancing
3 core services that residents depend on,
4 accelerating inclusive economic growth
5 across the City, maintaining the City's
6 long-term fiscal health, and continuing
7 to reduce racial disparities so that race
8 is not a determinant of success and every
9 single person that calls Philadelphia
10 home can thrive.

11 An integral part of our Five
12 Year Plan is the roughly \$1.4 billion
13 we're receiving from the American Rescue
14 Plan. The support from the ARP
15 represented a significant turning point
16 for Philadelphia, not just in the fight
17 against the pandemic but for the future
18 of our great city.

19 This one-time federal relief
20 helps ease the effects of projected
21 revenue declines stemming from the
22 pandemic.

23 Our communities would have
24 absolutely no path to a fair, inclusive,
25 and equitable recovery from the pandemic

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2 without the support. In fact, we were
3 looking at a \$1.5 billion shortfall over
4 the five years without the ARP.

5 The American Rescue Plan has
6 helped fill a gap this current fiscal
7 year and fills projected deficits
8 resulting from the pandemic through
9 Fiscal Year 2025. However, the funding
10 we're receiving from the ARP is less than
11 the actual need over five years in order
12 to fully fund service needs and
13 priorities and keep City finances on a
14 stable, sustainable path.

15 We have to make difficult and
16 strategic choices. We will be prudent
17 and intentional to ensure our resources
18 are best directed to the pressing issues
19 facing Philadelphians today, while at the
20 same time investing in resources that
21 will set our city up for success in the
22 years ahead, and all with a racial equity
23 lens so that every Philadelphian is part
24 of that success.

25 This Five Year Plan embodies

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2 hope, expanding on our vision of how
3 Philadelphians can grow and prosper as we
4 move past the worst of the pandemic.

5 This virus will be with us for
6 the foreseeable future, but we now have
7 knowledge, data, and proven tools to
8 manage it and are learning to move
9 forward together in ways that promote
10 public health and reflect the realities
11 of life and society. I am more confident
12 than ever of the City's ability to meet
13 this challenge.

14 As we continue to navigate the
15 ongoing pandemic, we must continue to
16 advance equitable economic recovery
17 strategies, support business growth, and
18 create economic security for all
19 Philadelphians, ensuring that our city
20 stays competitive in an ever-changing
21 economy.

22 We've made meaningful reforms
23 to City business taxes, which have helped
24 to grow small businesses and jobs, reduce
25 barriers, and make Philadelphia a better

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2 place to do business.

3 Since the beginning of the
4 City's tax reduction program, we've
5 decreased the wage tax by just over
6 20 percent, and since the beginning of
7 our administration, the value of wage tax
8 cuts has totaled nearly \$100 million, and
9 wage tax rates overall are at their
10 lowest level since the 1970s.

11 We've lowered the business
12 income and receipts tax, and before 2016,
13 about 130,000 businesses filed a BIRT
14 return each year. With the City's new
15 \$100,000 BIRT exclusion and changes to
16 filing rules, over 95,000 businesses with
17 Philadelphia sales no longer have a
18 liability or a filing requirement.

19 I am pleased to report that
20 this plan proposes no tax rate increases.
21 We are anticipating new property
22 assessments that reflect significant
23 growth and may affect homeowners, other
24 property owners, and tenants.

25 Growing property values reflect

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2 well in Philadelphia being a place of
3 choice and represent an opportunity to
4 build wealth for some.

5 As we navigate the impacts of
6 potentially increased real estate values,
7 our Administration will continue to work
8 closely with City Council on tax relief
9 and reforms that are scaled to the
10 magnitude of the changes as the data
11 becomes available during the budget
12 process.

13 It's also worth noting that
14 despite the pandemic's impact on the
15 budget, we have been able to put our
16 pension fund on a course to fiscal health
17 through our partnerships with unions,
18 legislators, and the Pension Board.

19 Our plan has us getting to
20 80 percent funded by the end of the
21 decade and 100 percent funded shortly
22 thereafter. I'm happy to report that we
23 are ahead of the original schedule. The
24 fund is now at its highest funding
25 percent since before the Great Recession.

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2 Now, I understand that to raise
3 more revenue and fund more services,
4 people may want us to tax wealthy
5 corporations or wealthy individuals, but
6 as we're all aware, because of the
7 Uniformity Clause of the Pennsylvania
8 Constitution, we're required to have the
9 same tax rate for our small businesses as
10 our largest corporations and the same
11 wage tax rate for all workers, whether
12 they are lawyers, teachers, or janitors.

13 One way we can help our
14 residents is by ensuring that they are
15 aware of any and all tax benefits they
16 may be eligible for, as millions of
17 dollars in tax benefits are left on the
18 table every year.

19 I want to thank Councilmember
20 Domb for his leadership trying to get
21 these much-needed resources in the hands
22 of residents who need it most. We will
23 continue working together to lobby
24 Harrisburg for changes, while doing what
25 we can at the local level to support our

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2 business community, create jobs, and
3 build wealth for all Philadelphians.

4 Our commercial corridors, which
5 are the backbone of our neighborhoods,
6 need continued support as they recover
7 from the pandemic. That's why this plan
8 will provide more than \$13 million for
9 economic stimulus programs, including
10 \$500,000 for a new emergency grant
11 program and \$7 million for the PHL Taking
12 Care of Business Corridor Cleaning
13 program.

14 This initiative, championed by
15 Councilmember Parker, maintains
16 neighborhood corridors as welcoming and
17 attractive places, while providing
18 accessible job opportunities. In 2021,
19 the PHLTCB program collected more than
20 170,000 bags of trash from commercial
21 corridors.

22 Support for neighborhood
23 commercial corridors, housing,
24 infrastructure, and public spaces is
25 essential to driving economic growth.

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2 Through Rebuild, made possible because of
3 the beverage tax, we've committed
4 hundreds of millions of dollars to
5 improve our parks, recreation centers,
6 playgrounds, and libraries.

7 Rebuild has cut the ribbon on
8 nine projects, with another 11 preparing
9 for or in construction, and 40 sites have
10 started community engagement and design.
11 And true to our commitment, 66 percent of
12 Rebuild's contract dollars are going to
13 minority or women-owned businesses.

14 I'm proud that Rebuild will
15 help transform neighborhoods with
16 physical amenities for residents to enjoy
17 for years to come.

18 And with hundreds of millions
19 of dollars going to these projects,
20 Rebuild also represents one of the City's
21 most intentional efforts to promote
22 diversity and economic inclusion in the
23 construction industry ever.

24 Our vision of a thriving
25 economy that provides opportunities to

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2 all its residents and neighborhoods will
3 be further propelled by the
4 implementation of the federal bipartisan
5 infrastructure law. This
6 once-in-a-generation infusion of federal
7 funding should bring more than \$1 billion
8 in funds for roads, bridges, transit,
9 water infrastructure, and broadband
10 access to the City and thousands of new
11 jobs.

12 I want to thank Councilmember
13 Green and Councilmember O'Neill for using
14 their positions with the National League
15 of Cities and National Association of
16 Counties to continually press
17 Philadelphia's interest within those
18 organizations and ensure we get our fair
19 share of resources from Congress.

20 This infrastructure spending
21 gives us an enormous opportunity to
22 mobilize these investments in service of
23 dismantling the structural barriers that
24 excluded Black and Brown business owners
25 and workers from public works projects.

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2 Our plan includes a \$20 million
3 investment, and \$116 million over the
4 Five Year Plan, to prepare for the
5 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law so that
6 Philadelphia can compete successfully for
7 federal dollars and deliver high-quality
8 infrastructure projects.

9 In addition to those operating
10 funds, the FY23 Capital Program includes
11 \$60 million in funding for local matching
12 grants.

13 For too long in our country,
14 government infrastructure projects
15 destroyed or devalued Black and Brown
16 neighborhoods. In partnership with the
17 Biden-Harris administration, we will turn
18 that history around by using this
19 opportunity to positively transform
20 communities and make real the commitment
21 to improving racial equity and growing
22 wealth in Black and Brown neighborhoods,
23 priorities I know are shared by Council,
24 especially Councilmembers Brooks,
25 Gauthier, and Gym.

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2 Over the past six years as
3 Mayor, in the face of so many challenges,
4 one thing has been constant - this
5 Administration's laser focus on investing
6 in and delivering quality education for
7 all Philadelphians. This plan doubles
8 down on our historic support for
9 education, investing almost \$1.4 billion
10 from the General Fund into the School
11 District of Philadelphia over five years.

12 We'll also invest more than
13 \$50 million in the Community College of
14 Philadelphia this year, with 10.8 million
15 dedicated to the Octavius Catto
16 Scholarship. This program enables
17 first-time students to attend college
18 tuition free and with the supports they
19 need, like food, books, and
20 transportation stipends, to successfully
21 earn their degree.

22 It's been two years since we
23 first announced the Catto program. Today
24 over 500 students have enrolled through
25 this opportunity, and CCP and the City

2 recently celebrated Idris Washington, who
3 is the first Octavius Catto Scholar to
4 graduate.

5 We will also continue the
6 expansion of the PHLpreK program
7 supported by revenue from the
8 Philadelphia beverage tax. Since
9 launching in 2017, PHLpreK has benefited
10 more than 10,000 children. We propose
11 funding 300 new slots to be funded this
12 year, for a total of 4,300 slots,
13 providing free and high-quality early
14 learning services that lay a critical
15 foundation for children and families.

16 And we'll continue to expand
17 our Community Schools program. Three new
18 Community Schools in FY23 will bring the
19 total number to 20 schools providing
20 community-based wraparound supports,
21 while serving a wide range of needs for
22 students, families, and communities.

23 The Free Library of
24 Philadelphia also supports learning
25 opportunities for residents across the

2 City, from young to old. Libraries are
3 essential community assets, offering
4 information, connection, and educational
5 programs to all residents. This plan
6 adds \$48 million over five years to our
7 investment in the Free Library, bringing
8 the total five-year investment to 285
9 million.

10 As you know, we recently
11 welcomed Kelly Richards as the new
12 Director of the Free Library, and we are
13 excited to work with him to chart an
14 equitable and inclusive path forward for
15 Philadelphians and visitors.

16 As we continue to navigate the
17 inequities that have been laid bare by
18 the pandemic, we remain committed to
19 expanding digital access and closing the
20 digital divide that can hamper our
21 recovery. That's why we'll build on the
22 success of the PHLConnectED initiative, a
23 true collaboration between many partners,
24 including Councilmember Squilla. Earlier
25 this year, we released a five-year

2 digital equity plan, which lays out our
3 strategies to build on our successes and
4 further improve access and affordability
5 of broadband, internet, and devices.

6 Together, these investments
7 prioritize the quality education of
8 children, youth, and adults to support a
9 more rapid and equitable recovery and to
10 break the intergenerational cycle of
11 poverty.

12 As Mayor, my number one
13 priority is to keep people safe and
14 protect our residents. The surge in gun
15 violence that we've seen across the
16 nation and here in Philadelphia is
17 heartbreaking, it's maddening, and it
18 makes me as outraged as everyone else.

19 We must keep working together
20 to stop it, save lives, and create a
21 safer city for all of us throughout every
22 neighborhood.

23 Our Administration, in
24 partnership with all of our local and
25 federal law enforcement agencies and

2 community organizations across the City,
3 continues to work tirelessly in response
4 to the national crisis. The City has
5 acted swiftly, investing in anti-violence
6 initiatives that address the immediate
7 crisis, while we also tackle the systemic
8 root causes of violence. This plan makes
9 critical investments in the Roadmap for
10 Safer Communities, the City's violence
11 prevention plan.

12 We'll dedicate an additional
13 \$12 million for the Anti-Violence
14 Community Expansion Grant program, which
15 directly funds and supports
16 community-based organizations that are
17 focused on reducing violence through
18 trauma-informed healing and restorative
19 practices in the neighborhoods most
20 affected by violence and championed by
21 Councilmember Jones, Johnson, and Thomas.

22 That brings our total
23 investment in this program alone to more
24 than \$32 million over the last two years.

25 We'll invest an additional

2 \$6 million to expand evidence-based
3 programs that target those most at risk
4 of being a victim or a perpetrator of gun
5 violence and provide connections to
6 services, treatment, and employment.
7 This includes investments for our Group
8 Violence Intervention program, the
9 Community Crisis Intervention program,
10 and the implementation of the local
11 version of READI, Rapid Employment and
12 Development Initiative, that will help
13 decrease shootings among those at highest
14 risk of gun violence.

15 These investments, designed to
16 address the violence in the short and
17 medium term, join the larger set of
18 investments to address the poverty-driven
19 root causes of violence that we've worked
20 to address during the course of our
21 administration. With a full set of
22 violence prevention investments,
23 including long-term investments, we're
24 directing more than \$184 million to help
25 make our communities safer. This is an

2 18.5 percent increase over FY22.

3 And while preventing violence
4 is not a job for police alone, this plan
5 makes strategic investments to strengthen
6 the Police Department's ability to solve
7 violent crime and modernize police tools.
8 It includes more than \$3 million in
9 forensic upgrades and policy mobility,
10 which will facilitate the use of enhanced
11 forensic analysis in every homicide.

12 Last year, we funded a new
13 crisis response tool known as
14 co-responders or CIRT teams for 911
15 callers with behavioral health needs.
16 Building on this work, the Five Year Plan
17 continues to fund this citywide
18 police-behavioral health co-response and
19 significantly invest in additional
20 non-police-behavioral health crises
21 response services.

22 FY23 sustains behavioral health
23 crisis teams that are available to
24 respond to residents with mental health
25 crises citywide 24 hours, seven days a

2 week.

3 Until we address the
4 availability and ease of access to
5 firearms, we will always be fighting an
6 uphill battle. We need the ability to
7 adopt proven gun policies that will save
8 lives, and we'll continue to call on the
9 Pennsylvania legislature to let us meet
10 Philadelphia's unique needs.

11 I can't help to think of all
12 the incredible potential that has been
13 extinguished by this crisis and the loss
14 of life over the past several years.
15 Because our young people can do anything.
16 I see it every time I visit a school, a
17 rec center, or one of our pre-K centers.

18 We as a city and a society must
19 value that life and do everything we can
20 to remind our young people through our
21 words and our actions that they are
22 valued, that they are important, and that
23 their lives matter. We must work
24 together to keep them safe and give them
25 the supports and opportunities that they

2 deserve.

3 We know now more than ever that
4 creating a thriving city truly depends on
5 the health of all communities. We must
6 continue to work to eliminate health
7 disparities and safeguard residents from
8 threats that cause disease and injury.

9 On this front, we're committed
10 to ensuring that COVID-19 prevention and
11 treatment options are available to all
12 City residents, regardless of insurance
13 status or ability to pay.

14 Because we know that the impact
15 of the pandemic has fallen
16 disproportionately on people of color and
17 communities with low wealth, we have and
18 will continue to focus on providing
19 resources to those at highest risk.

20 In FY22, the Office of
21 Sustainability launched the City's first
22 Environmental Justice Advisory
23 Commission, a historic step in the City's
24 commitment to addressing environmental
25 harms in our communities. In FY23, this

2 Commission will steer a community
3 resilience and environmental justice
4 grant program and develop processes to
5 make recommendations to policymakers.
6 This work would not be possible without
7 the tremendous partnership of
8 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson.

9 Finally, we know that safe and
10 stable housing is a critical foundation
11 for health. The plan makes a major
12 investment, \$103 million over five years,
13 in the Housing Trust Fund and continues
14 support for the Neighborhood Preservation
15 Initiative. NPI is a \$400 million
16 program investing in affordable housing
17 and neighborhood services, thanks in
18 large part to the guidance and leadership
19 of Council President Clarke and
20 Councilmember Quinones-Sanchez.

21 In FY23, we will build on
22 innovations we adopted because of the
23 pandemic and invest \$3.2 million to
24 sustain shelter services for seniors and
25 invest \$5.7 million over the Five Year

2 Plan to support our homeless service
3 providers, including wage increases for
4 the staff providing these critical
5 services.

6 For all neighborhoods to
7 thrive, resources are needed to help some
8 of our most vulnerable, those
9 experiencing street homelessness and
10 those affected by the opioid crisis.
11 That's why this budget includes expansion
12 of the successful low-barrier employment
13 programs like Same Day Pay, which
14 supports those experiencing homelessness
15 who are disconnected from the labor
16 market.

17 These investments at the Office
18 of Community Empowerment and Opportunity,
19 the Managing Director's Office, and the
20 Mural Arts Program total more than
21 \$2 million, and \$10 million over five
22 years. This will allow the programs to
23 form a system of accessible employment
24 opportunities with pathways to more
25 permanent employment.

2 We will invest \$5.5 million to
3 maintain low-barrier emergency and
4 permanent housing services for people who
5 have been chronically homeless and have
6 opioid use disorder, and an additional
7 5.1 million to support services and
8 safety in Kensington.

9 This plan represents our vision
10 to move Philadelphia forward, and we will
11 do that in part by creating a diverse,
12 efficient, and effective government while
13 driving change for our residents.

14 Across every investment in this
15 plan, we will target our dollars and our
16 efforts to reverse the impacts of
17 structural racism on our communities and
18 our workforce, and to make concrete
19 improvements in the lives of all
20 residents while also paying close
21 attention to those most marginalized in
22 their past, in their safety, their
23 health, and their economic well-being.

24 By the end of Fiscal Year 2023,
25 every department will have produced a

2 racial equity action plan to improve
3 equity through their budget, procurement,
4 and core services or programs. This work
5 is critical to reduce racial disparities
6 across many indicators for success,
7 education, criminal justice, jobs,
8 housing, health and more.

9 And we will redouble our
10 efforts to use data to address the most
11 challenging problems we face, from
12 poverty to gun violence to substance
13 abuse disorder. The plan includes
14 additional resources to increase the use
15 of data to drive better outcomes for
16 Philadelphians. That's why this week I
17 signed an Executive Order elevating an
18 Office of Integrated Data for Evidence
19 and Action within the Managing Director's
20 Office.

21 And we've continued our work to
22 reform fines and fees that
23 disproportionately burden Black, Brown,
24 and low-income Philadelphians. The FY23
25 budget commits \$600,000 to remove the

2 cost to participate in the Accelerated
3 Misdemeanor Program so that ability to
4 pay does not determine who gets a chance
5 to be diverted out of the criminal
6 justice system.

7 And we're making investments to
8 create an inclusive workplace. We're
9 investing in hiring, training,
10 professional development, and
11 capacity-building for one of our most
12 important assets, our employees. We are
13 committed to ensuring that the City's
14 workforce and culture is diverse,
15 inclusive, and that all City employees
16 are supported and empowered to work to
17 make positive changes in our city.

18 The Fiscal Year 2023 budget
19 represents \$5.51 billion General Fund
20 revenues, and \$5.61 billion in General
21 Fund expenditures. This leaves us with a
22 low General Fund balance of \$153 million,
23 which is lower than we are projecting for
24 this current year. It is not enough to
25 cover City finances in the event of

2 another emergency or unforeseen economic
3 downturn. Philadelphia must build back
4 towards fiscal resilience to be able to
5 support and serve our residents through
6 the next disruption, whatever that may
7 be.

8 As you review the plan, know
9 that every program, policy, and funding
10 priority was made with one thing in
11 mind - how can we move all of
12 Philadelphia forward and spur a fast,
13 equitable recovery in every zip code and
14 every neighborhood in our great city.

15 This budget is the embodiment
16 of hope, and demonstrates the
17 determination to make our city a better
18 place to live, work, and visit.

19 Six years ago after I was sworn
20 in as Mayor, we embarked on a mission to
21 tackle some of Philadelphia's biggest
22 challenges - a struggling public
23 education system, intergenerational
24 poverty, public health crises, gun
25 violence, an inequitable criminal justice

2 system, and much more.

3 The progress we've made since
4 would not have been possible without the
5 support of our City Councilmembers and
6 Administration staff.

7 With more jobs coming back,
8 children learning in person again, local
9 unemployment continuing to decrease,
10 construction booming, tourism on the
11 upswing, and a vaccination rate among the
12 highest in the country, I remain
13 confident that Philadelphia's best days
14 are ahead of us, and the investments laid
15 out in this plan will help us reach our
16 full potential.

17 COVID is by no means over, and
18 we know unforeseen challenges lay ahead
19 of us, but I am so optimistic about the
20 future of Philadelphia, because I know
21 that Philadelphians are strong and
22 resilient.

23 The resiliency of our city and
24 our people never ceases to amaze me. I
25 see it when our school teachers inspire

2 students from all walks of life to reach
3 for their dreams.

4 I see it when our doctors,
5 nurses, and front-line medical workers
6 helped vaccinate more than a million
7 people and counting.

8 I see it when immigrants,
9 families, and businesses choose to forge
10 their future here in our great City of
11 Brotherly and Sisterly Affection.
12 Because after all, for Philadelphia to
13 achieve the promise of its future, it
14 will take our collective will to build
15 the foundation that future generations of
16 Philadelphians deserve.

17 The coming year will be a big
18 moment of challenge and opportunity for
19 our city and region, and the plan laid
20 out today will help us reach that moment.

21 Let's rise to the challenge,
22 because all Philadelphians are counting
23 on us. Let's show the world that our
24 city never backs down, never gives in,
25 and that we are and always will be

2 stronger together.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 thank you. That concludes the Mayor's
6 budget message. A little different than
7 normal, but we have a significant task
8 before us.

9 I want to thank the Mayor and
10 all those who put together his message.

11 We will now move to speeches on
12 behalf of the minority.

13 And the Chair recognizes
14 Councilwoman Brooks.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
16 you, Council President.

17 I want to take a moment to
18 uplift the four resolutions that I am
19 both passing and introducing today that
20 recognize inspirational Philadelphia
21 women.

22 The first resolution,
23 co-introduced with Councilmember
24 Quinones-Sanchez, honors our guest today,
25 Reverend Bonnie Camarda, who we were so

2 lucky to have join us today and provide
3 the invocation. Her years of serving the
4 City as a public interest organization,
5 including the Salvation Army, Esperanza,
6 and others, has empowered the Latinx
7 population across the City and changed
8 Philadelphia for the better.

9 The second resolution,
10 co-introduced with Councilmember Gym,
11 recognizes Ellen Somekawa, a fearless
12 Asian American activist and champion for
13 young people at a time when violence
14 against API community is one on the rise.
15 It is essential that we celebrate the
16 work of legendary organizers like Ellen
17 and stand in solidarity with her
18 relentless fight for social justice.

19 The third resolution honors
20 retired nurse, activist, and current
21 President of Cecil B. Moore Freedom
22 Fighters, Karen Asper Jordan. Her
23 dedication to housing justice, racial
24 equality, and community empowerment in
25 the streets of Philadelphia is unmatched,

2 and our communities are grateful for her
3 lifelong commitment to civil rights.

4 The last resolution celebrates
5 Paula Peebles. Paula's decades of
6 organizing includes coordinating the
7 student walkouts at a young age to
8 protest the lack of Black history being
9 taught in schools and spending years as
10 an active member of the Black Panther
11 party and just a few years ago organizing
12 protests for social justice after the
13 murder of George Floyd, and her lifelong
14 commitment to the social movements has
15 been an inspiration.

16 So many other issues these
17 women fought for are ongoing struggles,
18 and for that reason, it's worth
19 remembering who laid the groundwork for
20 our present-day movements for justice.

21 And on the last day of Women's
22 History Month, I want to express my
23 deepest gratitude and admiration for
24 these women, and along with my fellow
25 women on Council, I commit to paving the

2 way for future generations of
3 Philadelphia women to be leaders in the
4 fight for economic, gender, and racial
5 justice.

6 Thank you so much, Council
7 President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman. With respect to
10 Paula Peebles, you can add her years of
11 pushing the Fifth District
12 Councilmembers, Councilpeople, to
13 continue to thrive towards rebuilding
14 North Philadelphia. Thank you.

15 Speeches on behalf of the
16 majority?

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Green.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
20 Council President. And as you were
21 making reference to Paula Peebles, I also
22 had to reflect on the late Nadir Williams
23 and the work that she did as well. I got
24 to know her when I was a young lawyer,
25 and enjoyed her cooking and her fish as

2 well as talking with her.

3 But, Council President, I
4 wanted to just take a few moments and I
5 want to thank my colleague Councilmember
6 Jones, Chair of the Public Safety
7 Committee. This Tuesday we had a hearing
8 on the work of ManUpPHL, and they did a
9 study. As many people know, ManUpPHL was
10 founded by Solomon Jones, and the Chair
11 of that organization, Dr. Brian Ellis,
12 did a report called Listening to the
13 Streets, and it focused on talking with
14 young men who unfortunately got caught up
15 in the gun violence situation that we see
16 in the City of Philadelphia.

17 Now, we first had a hearing
18 when ManUp was just getting started
19 February 11th of 2020, and at that time,
20 we were concerned about the violence in
21 the City of Philadelphia. In 2019, we
22 had 356 homicides in our city. We all
23 know we had 562 homicides last year, and
24 we're already on a pace to push past
25 that.

2 And so the hearing really
3 talked about some of the solutions and
4 things that they identified talking to
5 young men. It also talked about the
6 sense of urgency that we have to address
7 this public safety issue and crisis in
8 our city.

9 And when I think about the
10 Mayor providing his budget address this
11 afternoon, that sense of urgency in a
12 time is a concern that I have that
13 although there were a number of
14 investments made in our budget, I don't
15 get that sense of urgency in reference to
16 addressing this public safety crisis in
17 our city.

18 Many of us as members of this
19 body have called for that type of urgency
20 to address these issues. This is an
21 issue that's impacting us all across this
22 country, and I just don't get that sense
23 coming out of this budget.

24 I know we've had financial
25 challenges, but when we have and

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receiving \$1.4 billion from the American Rescue Plan, it's this body that's actually created some of those creative ideas where we spent and allocated millions of dollars last year to anti-violence initiatives. When I think about PHL Rent Assist, environmental justice, some of the other initiatives that I heard this afternoon, those are ideas that came from Council.

And so I really hope that as we continue to move forward through this budget process, that we will have that sense of urgency, because I'm concerned about the fact that the City of Philadelphia lost a significant number of people over the past year, about 20,000 people, the biggest drop since 1975. When we looked at the census, we had 30,000 African American families leave the City of Philadelphia. I don't want to go back to 1975. I don't want to go back to the early '90s when, as we all know, when I came out of the University

2 of Virginia, this city after 5:00 p.m.
3 was a ghost town. We had a situation
4 when the City Law Department, from my
5 recollection, was borrowing legal pads
6 from law firms, and the City was on the
7 verge of bankruptcy. I don't want to go
8 back to that time.

9 The most expensive resource we
10 have is time, and the urgency we need to
11 have is now. And I look at the
12 opportunities we have from life sciences
13 and the ability to connect young people
14 who are coming out of our neighborhood
15 schools or coming out of our colleges to
16 go into this growing industry,
17 opportunity here in the City of
18 Philadelphia, where we can be a global
19 leader in life sciences and really help
20 to address the poverty in our city, when
21 I think about the Infrastructure
22 Investment and Jobs Act, which is over a
23 trillion dollars from the federal
24 government, and how we have so many
25 critical investments we need to make here

2 in our city.

3 So I just hope as we continue
4 to work with the Mayor through this
5 budget process, that Council will
6 continue to provide these type of ideas
7 and urgency to move forward our city,
8 because we know time is of the essence
9 and I don't want us to go back to where
10 we were. I want us to build upon what
11 we've already invested in and done as a
12 body so we can move forward for the
13 benefit of our entire city, not only now
14 but into the future.

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson.

20 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
21 you. Thank you so much, Council
22 President, and thank you, colleagues. I
23 look forward to working with each of you
24 to achieve a budget that will provide
25 safety, opportunity, and justice to every

2 Philadelphia.

3 But, Mr. President, I wanted to
4 share a bit of good news as we continue
5 down towards the road of our city's
6 recovery from COVID-19.

7 This morning I extend a warm
8 welcome to the distinguished men of Phi
9 Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated,
10 Mighty Eastern Region, under the
11 leadership of JR Reeves, their Regional
12 Director. I welcome them to the great
13 City of Philadelphia, the City of
14 Brotherly Love and Sisterly
15 Effectiveness, for their Eastern Region
16 Conference, the first in person since the
17 COVID-19 pandemic began.

18 They have over 600 registered
19 attendees and have several thousand
20 members in the region who will be
21 patronizing businesses around this city
22 throughout the remainder of this week and
23 this weekend. We have visiting members
24 from states spanning Virginia up to
25 Maine, including the countries of

2 Germany, U.S. Virgin Islands,
3 Switzerland, Liberia, Nigeria, and Ghana.

4 Mr. President, this is just a
5 preview for things to come, as we will
6 also host the finer women of Zeta Phi
7 Beta Sorority, Incorporated in July and
8 we will have more than 6,000 registered
9 attendees from across the nation and
10 around the world.

11 Earlier this year, this body
12 passed a resolution for the Sigma
13 Founder's Day, which is January 9th,
14 1914, and for this week's Eastern Region
15 Conference.

16 Yesterday at the onset of the
17 conference, the men of Phi Beta Sigma
18 Fraternity, Incorporated volunteered with
19 Philabundance. The men of Sigma will
20 continue with the business of their
21 fraternity with their business sessions
22 in the coming days, and I wanted to take
23 the time out to welcome them and give
24 them a hearty warm welcome to the City of
25 Philadelphia. Have a great weekend, men

10 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
11 you.

12 I also wanted to share some
13 good news and just some really good
14 spirits. You know, I'm going to say that
15 even though March is the end of Women's
16 Month, I assure you, Councilmember Green,
17 that women will continue to uplift each
18 other.

19 And I just wanted to take a
20 special note and thank all of my Council
21 colleagues who held women's events
22 throughout this month, Councilmember
23 Johnson, Councilmember Oh. I want to
24 thank Councilmember Brooks for her
25 highlighting of Reverend Bonnie Camarda,

2 and then of course Councilmember
3 Katherine Gilmore Richardson who every
4 week has reminded us of some of the
5 fabulous women in the City of
6 Philadelphia and her legends reception
7 yesterday.

8 I want to just highlight the
9 fact that the recognition of young women,
10 along with some of the more experienced
11 seasoned women, as Joann Bell, my good
12 friend Joann Bell, Sue Jacobson, and of
13 course Ketsy Losada, my former chief of
14 staff and future political leader here in
15 the City of Philadelphia.

16 I think that this conversation
17 around women and justice even as we look
18 at our budget, I appreciate so much Queen
19 Judith Robinson every week reminding us
20 that women are the ones uplifting this
21 city. So I want to thank her in
22 particular, because she has been
23 consistent in that messaging, and we
24 appreciate it. She reminds us that this
25 community and this city will only be

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better when we continue to support women and the work that they're doing, and part of the work that we do is obviously uplift our men, and I say that as a mother of two boys and a grandmother of two boys. There's no better way for me to improve the world than to ensure that those men are doing what they need to be doing.

So thank you very much, Council President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you so much for your message.

I think that concludes our speeches today. We have our work cut out for us over the next two months. We will aggressively digest the Mayor's budget, and hopefully the outcome will be one that the citizens of the City of Philadelphia will be proud of and this will make a much better place as we plan for the future to enhance our wonderful city here.
