12 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
13 you so much, Council President.

14 In advance of the 104th
15 Founders' Day for Zeta Phi Beta Sorority,
16 Incorporated and the 110th Founders' Day
17 for Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity,
18 Incorporated, we wanted to take the
19 opportunity to acknowledge both
20 organizations here in Philadelphia City
21 Council, as we are not in session during
22 the actual Founders' Day.

23 You all know that I am a very
24 proud life member of Zeta Phi Beta
25 Sorority, Incorporated. We were founded

3 Howard University in Washington, DC by
4 five undergraduates by the name of
5 Arizona Leedonia Clever Stemons, Myrtle

8 We are the sister organizations of Phi
9 Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated, also
10 founded at Howard University in
11 Washington, DC on January 9th, 1914.
12 We will celebrate our Founders'
13 Day, but you all remember in 2022 we had
14 the privilege of having our international
15 convention here in the City of
16 Philadelphia with more than 6,000
17 members, a \$6.5 million economic impact
18 here in the City of Philadelphia, and we
19 look forward to continuing to provide
20 sisterhood, scholarship, service, and
21 finer womanhood, brotherhood scholarships
22 and service to the great City of
23 Philadelphia.
24 We acknowledge the presence of
25 our members, Archbishop Mary Floyd

4 Today's Calendar.

5 CHIEF CLERK: And a

9 athletic eligibility and team

10 classification caused by the placement

11 formula known as the "Competitive Balance

12 Rule."

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

14 Chair recognizes Councilman Thomas.

15 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Good

16 morning, Council President.

17 Good morning, colleagues.

18 Good news first. For those who

19 don't know, members of City Council get

20 the opportunity to appoint young people

21 to a youth commission that advises the

22 Mayor, works with Council and, more

23 importantly, is the voice of young people

24 in government. And for a significant

25 amount of time, Jeanette has been the

2 Executive Director of the Office of Youth
3 Engagement.

4 This resolution actually wasn't
5 my idea. She's been such an effective
6 leader and she's been so good at her job,
7 she doesn't even notice, but the
8 Commissioners came to me and asked me to
9 make her a Champion of the Week because
10 they appreciate her leadership, they
11 appreciate her service, and I think, most
12 importantly, they appreciate her as a
13 mentor and they see her as somebody that
14 they can go to throughout the course of
15 their journey through life.

16 So just a little bit about her.
17 Born and raised in the Northwest section
18 of the City of Philadelphia. You hear
19 that, Councilmember Phillips,
20 Councilmember Bass. Daughter of a
21 teacher, 35-year career, always has been
22 a mentor, a tutor. She was a cohort of
23 young women during the 2016 election who
24 registered hundreds of voters and
25 canvassed and phone banks across the City

2 of Philadelphia, and of course the youth
3 engagement side in her work with the
4 Youth Commission as well as the
5 Millennial Advisory Commission.

6 Can we take a moment to have
7 Jeanette stand up. And her mom is here
8 in Council today as well too, and give
9 her round of applause.

13 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: We're so
14 proud of you. Thank you so much for your
15 service and it's very much appreciated.

16 On a different tone, my
17 resolution today -- and I don't call on
18 Harrisburg much, because most of the time
19 I just call them, but today we're calling
20 on Harrisburg to really look at something
21 that I've been talking about, which is
22 blatant discrimination, and it
23 specifically hurts students in the City
24 of Philadelphia.

25 The PIAA is the Pennsylvania

2 Interscholastic Athletic Association and
3 governs high school sports. There was a
4 rule that was created called Competitive
5 Balance Rule, and this rule when it was
6 introduced only applied to football and
7 basketball, only football and basketball,
8 no other sport.

9 The rule basically punishes
10 students for switching schools. I don't
11 know about you guys, but here in the City
12 of Philadelphia we're dealing with a
13 number of issues, from poverty,
14 homelessness, addiction. These issues
15 force young people to essentially be
16 transient. Sometimes they live in
17 Councilmember Johnson's district and they
18 move to Councilman Jones' district and
19 they might end up graduating from
20 Councilmember Driscoll's district, and at
21 the end of the day, you know, as somebody
22 who lives at the top of the City, that's
23 a tough commute if I were to remain at
24 one school.

25 You're talking about young

2 people being forced to travel in some
3 cases an hour, an hour and a half if they
4 were forced to have to stay at a school
5 if they move or if they live with a
6 different parent.

7 And at the end of the day, not
8 only do I believe this rule is
9 discriminatory against young people of
10 color, because that's who it
11 disproportionately impacted when it was
12 introduced, I also think it hurt
13 Philadelphians, because we understand
14 that our young people have a lot of
15 things going on that put them in a lot of
16 different neighborhoods at different
17 times.

18 The punishment for the rule
19 says that the smaller schools have to
20 move up a classification. The problem
21 with that is is if I'm a bigger school
22 and there's no classification to move up,
23 I can take or get rid of as many students
24 as I want to with no actual consequence.

25 So I'm asking Harrisburg to

2 look at this specific rule. We're going
3 to be asking the Governor and his team to
4 look at this rule, because we feel like
5 not only is the rule discriminatory
6 against young people of color, especially
7 those in Philadelphia, it's a rule that's
8 unconstitutional.

9 Thank you, Council President.

10 Thank you, colleagues. I
11 appreciate your support and your
12 co-sponsorship on this resolution, and I
13 look forward to being able to resolve
14 this conflict that's hurting students all
15 across the City of Philadelphia.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman.

21 That concludes our reports from

22 committee, and our next order of business

23 is consideration of the Calendar.

24 I note that the bills just

25 reported from committee with a suspension

2 of the rules have been deemed to have had
3 a first reading. They will be placed on
4 our Second Reading and Final Passage
5 Calendar at our next session of Council.

6 There are no additional bills
7 on the First Reading Calendar, so the
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the
9 purpose of calling up bills and
10 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar
11 today.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. The following bills and
14 resolutions are being brought up from
15 Second Reading to Final Passage Calendars
16 today: Nos. 230903, 230904, 230905,
17 230906, 230907, 230908, and 230910. All
18 other bills and resolutions are being
19 held.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. Thank
22 you.

23 Before we consider the bills
24 and resolutions on our Calendar today, we
25 will have our public comment session.

1 12/7/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Our public comment session will go as
3 follows:

4 If you have not already signed
5 up to testify today, you may do so now at
6 the table outside of the Council Chambers
7 with the Sergeant-of-Arms. When your
8 name is called, you will be called in the
9 order of which you signed up. Your
10 public comment must pertain to the
11 resolution or bill that is on today's
12 Calendar for Final Passage Calendar.

13 When your name is called, you
14 will go to the podium in the middle of
15 the Chamber. There's a device on that
16 podium. When the light turns green, it
17 will be your time to speak. When the
18 light turns yellow, you will have
19 30 seconds to conclude your remarks, and
20 when the light turns red, we'd ask that
21 you please adhere to our guidelines and
22 conclude your remarks. You will have
23 three minutes to speak today.

24 I want to thank you very much
25 for your willingness to participate in

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2 your government in action. We thank you
3 so much for being here.

4 Mr. Decker, please call the
5 first name on the list.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
7 today, Mr. President, is Bridget Powell,
8 commenting on 210913.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MS. POWELL: Good morning,
13 everyone. Thank you. Good morning.
14 Thank you for allowing me to testify.

15 I'm here to testify for Bill
16 210913, and I know it was about lawsuits
17 and it was talking about COVID, but let's
18 talk about lawsuits affecting families,
19 and you know where I'm going. I want to
20 talk about the quality of care that's
21 just not happening in DHS and CUA.

22 Pre-COVID, in 2015, CUAs were
23 implemented to improve the outcome for
24 children and families. Four of the ten
25 CUAs we know now are no longer servicing

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2 families because of skyrocketing
3 insurance premiums due to their
4 negligence with large payouts of
5 lawsuits, including the six million one
6 for returning three children to their
7 rapist father.

8 We as families have experienced
9 and endured long-term effects of the
10 disservice of DHS and CUA. The question
11 is, how much more disservice will City
12 Council allow their constituents to
13 endure with CUA and DHS?

14 I have petitions circulating
15 asking people to get rid of CUAs and
16 let's put all this back under DHS as it
17 was prior to 2015. Many of you know I've
18 personally endured enough as a foster
19 parent retaliating against through CUA
20 and DHS, and many of you heard my
21 15-year-old nephew come here and testify
22 in 2019 of how DHS impacted his family.

23 I thank you, and I hope that
24 you will look into this and terminate the
25 services of CUA and return everything

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2 under DHS, because our children and
3 families deserve to live, thrive, and do
4 better in the City of Philadelphia.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you for your testimony. We
8 appreciate it.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Michael Smith.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 MR. SMITH: How you doing? My
13 name is Michael Smith.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MR. SMITH: Michael Smith. I'm
17 a party leader for the party. I've been
18 a party leader for 20 years. I'm a
19 political consultant. I worked for this
20 party for 20 years.

21 The bill I'm opposing is
22 230664. This the bill that's about the
23 police officer -- the situation with the
24 guy killing the guy in Kensington.

25 Now, me myself, I had

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2 situations over the years with police. I
3 was also a candidate in the mayoral race,
4 but y'all didn't know, most of all. I
5 got status like most of y'all, but
6 y'all -- how many times I call all your
7 offices and y'all keep defying Michael
8 Smith?

9 I put work in for this team,
10 man. I was the (unintelligible) prison
11 in 1985. You know what I'm saying? I
12 call the prison. Mr. Robinson, he run
13 that prison right now. He don't even
14 listen. He did the same thing back in
15 1985. When Mayor Goode cried, as Goode
16 cried (unintelligible), we had to come to
17 jail. Same thing when I was upstate.
18 They called me Mike Corleone.

19 I'm trying to get funding right
20 now for motivation. I asked Mr. Clarke,
21 all these different people, to give me
22 some funding to help me. Everybody just
23 keep playing games, man.

24 My church trying to make a
25 statement. My dad know about history of

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2 Philly. There's too much racism
3 constantly going on, and the thing about
4 leadership, no disrespect, some of y'all,
5 it's y'all fault. Listen, the kids are
6 following what y'all doing, man.

7 How many times I talk to the
8 kids every day in the street, man? You
9 know what I'm saying? Trying to help. I
10 don't got no funding, man, but I got the
11 Lord, though, so I got it. I keep
12 telling y'all I'm gonna beat y'all, man.
13 I'm not trying to be smart. I'm not here
14 to fight any of y'all, man.

15 (Unintelligible) Chapter 4; 3.
16 That's what I'm here for, man. I did the
17 same thing, add a little
18 (unintelligible), add (unintelligible).
19 I was in also all the races, man. I'm
20 the guy -- the main -- I'm the main guy
21 for this team. I came at
22 (unintelligible). I'm in a photo opp
23 with Rendell years ago when Street ran
24 for election. Y'all don't know me.
25 Y'all know me by numbers. I got numbers

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2 every day when I did the campaign stuff.

3 I mean, they called me -- matter of fact,

4 1985, when I governed that jail, they

5 called me Mike the Mayor. Ask all -- all

6 you gotta do is ask the king.

7 I saw Mr. Curtis Jones a couple

8 times, West Philly, everything,

9 Mr. Clarke. I don't want to put y'all on

10 the spot, man, but I came at y'all every

11 which way, man, and I call your offices.

12 I called your office yesterday. The lady

13 managed -- they keep disrespecting me,

14 man. I don't want to fight none of these

15 people. I'm talking about policy.

16 Mr. Thomas -- I came out last

17 week. Mr. Thomas talking about he going

18 to get me a lawyer. When y'all going to

19 help me, man? I been on this team a long

20 time, man. I'm trying to get funding.

21 I'm trying to help y'all, man.

22 Same with Cherelle Parker. I

23 live in her district, man. I met her

24 (unintelligible), you know what I'm

25 saying, at the church. She had

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2 itinerary, and I asked, I said, look,
3 y'all have no phone numbers on the
4 itinerary. You know what I'm saying?
5 Heather, Michele, your chief of staff,
6 Michele. What's her name?
7 (Unintelligible).

8 I know about games, man. I'm
9 an expert Mayor in his programs. That's
10 what we did upstate, man. Know what I'm
11 saying? Mike Corleone. Fought for 800
12 out there. I can't even get a map down
13 on Broad Street. I was a star, man, even
14 at the rec. I played football,
15 basketball, baseball with Kobe Bryant.
16 He played with us. He only played
17 basketball.

18 I've been a star, but y'all
19 don't know it because some of y'all so up
20 here.

21 I praise the Lord. See, I'm
22 not worried about it. I'm not chasing
23 you now. Y'all going to listen. So this
24 is what I teach my kids. My grand-kid is
25 a rap artist. People stealing their

2 music. I'm trying to get y'all to help
3 me. Nobody will help me.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 MR. SMITH: I call -- how many
7 time I call different numbers to help
8 y'all?

9 God bless y'all.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Dellise Williams, commenting on
14 230906.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MS. WILLIAMS: Good morning to
19 Council President Clarke and to the
20 Councilmembers and others. I come before
21 with the resolution of 230906.

22 I am for any program that would
23 restrict for the gun violence behavior in
24 the City of Philadelphia, but I also
25 believe that it must be carried out

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2 correctly and consistent.

3 The St. Louis consent-to-search
4 involving officers knocking on doors in
5 the high-crime area, I don't believe that
6 it would bid well in Philadelphia. I
7 don't think it will be welcomed for
8 someone to knock on someone's door and
9 say they want to come in and get
10 permission to search the house for guns.

11 Most high-crime neighborhood
12 residents will not participate in a buy
13 back program or a consent-to-search,
14 because sometimes these guns have a crime
15 attached to it and they may not trust the
16 police to even go and surrender these
17 guns. And the ones that are in high
18 residence areas, they may participate in
19 this program because it might be guns
20 that are not functioning or they don't
21 like them or they just can't use them, so
22 they'll trade them in and go buy a
23 cheaper new one.

24 I believe that the guns that
25 are illegal out here, they will be kept

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2 because it protects some of these people
3 that are not doing the right thing. And
4 I believe that these automatic weapons
5 are ripping our neighborhoods apart. It
6 must stop.

7 Someone is living in a house
8 today with someone that has robbed and
9 killed someone with a gun and they will
10 not report them or turn them in. We have
11 over 400 million guns in the United
12 States. It's more guns than people. Our
13 children are dying like it's normal, and
14 we must fight for that.

15 I believe in my partner as we
16 partner with landlords, tenants, housing
17 authorities, and other apartment
18 complexes in the City of Philadelphia to
19 help and agree to ban guns for being in
20 their privately owned rental property and
21 have it written in their lease
22 agreements. I believe this will be one
23 step towards stopping illegal guns
24 trafficking from being housed in the
25 rental property, and this will help

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2 guns -- keep guns out of the hands of our
3 young people.

4 Home base is a big issue, and
5 we must start tackling and going after
6 this. I believe that if you consider
7 living in one of these places and you
8 have violated the rules of the laws or
9 your lease, I believe that you will be
10 processed into being evicted out of these
11 homes.

12 Yesterday there was another
13 shooting in the University of Nevada in
14 Las Vegas. And so we have to begin to
15 understand this is a real deal, this is
16 the truth, and that we have to protect
17 each other. Whatever happens with the
18 gun program should be for the safety of
19 all the citizens of Philadelphia.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Lynn Landes, commenting on 210913.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

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2 MS. LANDES: Good morning. I'm
3 Lynn Landes, founder of wildfoodies.org
4 and safestreetsPhilly.org.

5 I support Resolution 210913
6 authorizing City Council to retain legal
7 counsel to file a lawsuit to require the
8 Administration to implement and enforce
9 the Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces Act,
10 which was designed to end the use of
11 pesticides on City property.

12 The problem with
13 non-enforcement of local laws applies to
14 other issues as well. Last week two
15 Macy's security guards were attacked by a
16 knife-wielding long-time criminal. One
17 of them tragically died. Many believe
18 that this horror was entirely avoidable
19 if the District Attorney had done his job
20 and enforced the law. Instead, he gave
21 the green light to rampant retail theft
22 and other criminal behavior by refusing
23 to enforce entire sections of the
24 criminal code. Meanwhile, our Mayor
25 refuses to enforce federal immigration

2 laws, which gave the green light to
3 international drug and human traffickers.

4 Both the Mayor and District
5 Attorney are violating their oath of
6 office when they refuse to enforce the
7 law.

8 As criminals run amuck in our
9 city, the Philadelphia Inquirer recently
10 published a story about how average
11 citizens are now arming themselves, and
12 that's actually a good thing, because
13 people should be armed anyway. There are
14 not enough police in the world to
15 adequately protect every citizen. In
16 fact, America won its independence in
17 large part because the citizenry was
18 armed. People who are not armed are
19 sitting ducks for attack, as Israeli
20 citizens have recently learned and Macy's
21 employees were tragically affected.

22 So the message on this day, the
23 anniversary of the Japanese attack on
24 Pearl Harbor, December 7th, 1941, is for
25 citizens to be prepared to protect

2 themselves and their loved ones from both
3 foreign and domestic threats, but also to
4 demand that their public officials do
5 their job, which is to keep the peace by
6 enforcing the law, and if they don't,
7 then City Council should take them to
8 court.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Adrianna Torres-Garcia, commenting on
14 230649.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MS. TORRES-GARCIA: Good
19 afternoon, Council President and
20 Councilmembers. My name is Adrianna
21 Torres-Garcia and I'm in support of Bill
22 No. 230649.

23 We know that patient dumping is
24 a problem in the U.S. Our healthcare
25 system does not work for people without

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2 insurance, but there's another layer for
3 non-citizen patients. Sometimes the
4 hospital administration decides that it's
5 better to pay thousands of dollars to
6 send the patient hundreds or thousands of
7 miles away from their loved ones to
8 places where they cannot access the care
9 they need to survive and recover.

10 Leaving the U.S. can have heavy
11 consequences for non-citizens, whether
12 they have papers or not. Many
13 non-citizens face harsh penalties for
14 leaving the country for any reason.
15 There are not just physical barriers to
16 coming back to the U.S. There are also
17 legal barriers as well. Many will face a
18 ban of ten years or more, and many others
19 will never be able to return to the U.S.,
20 even some who have permission from the
21 government to stay here legally,
22 effectively separating themselves from
23 their support networks and from community
24 at a vulnerable time.

25 Medical deportation is

1 12/7/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 typically not in the patient's best
3 interest and can result in serious injury
4 or even death. Those who do survive may
5 later pass away or face permanent
6 disability or illness due to lack of
7 care.

8 Make no mistake, when hospitals
9 deport non-citizen patients, they are
10 separating families just as ICE does. No
11 child should have to wonder whether their
12 parent will come home from the hospital
13 or be sent out of the country to die. No
14 spouse should have to worry if they will
15 see their life partner again if they're
16 deported. And no patient should fear for
17 their child's health and safety if they
18 need to go to the emergency room.

19 As a resident of Philadelphia
20 and as a representative of advocates for
21 the immigrant community, I ask our City
22 Council members to fight to keep families
23 together and to fight against family
24 separation by supporting this bill.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 - - -

5 (Applause.)

6 - - -

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Jasmine Rivera, commenting on 230649.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MS. RIVERA: Buenos dias.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Buenos dias.

15 (Microphone not working.)

16 MS. RIVERA: There we go.

17 Buenos dias. My name is
18 Jasmine Rivera. I am here to say thank
19 you. I am here to talk about the end
20 medical deportation bill and thank all of
21 the Councilpeople who have shown so much
22 support for this issue.

23 I want to give a special thank
24 you to Councilman Harrity. From the very
25 beginning, you have been a champion on

2 this bill, and it's wonderful to be
3 working with you and work with everyone
4 in Council.

5 You heard from my colleague how
6 this separates families. We are talking
7 about people in extreme conditions of
8 harm who need care, and instead of being
9 received and getting care, instead they
10 are being forced and coerced to be put on
11 a private plane and sent home, home,
12 right? Their country of origin. But
13 home is where your family is. And if
14 your family is here and your family is
15 saying, no, I do not consent to you
16 taking my loved one off of needed
17 machines, off a feeding tube, then that
18 should not happen. That should not
19 happen to any human being regardless of
20 their immigration status, because at the
21 end of the day, we are all humans who
22 deserve care, who deserve justice.

23 In June of 2020, many of you
24 are in the Health Committee, you heard
25 from an amazing woman, Gloria, who fought

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2 to stop the deportation of her uncle. In
3 June of 2020, she actually called on us
4 at Free Migration Project to join her and
5 to stop this, and we showed up at the
6 hospital, in the ambulance bay, ready, if
7 we needed to, to lay down in front of
8 those tires so that they could not take
9 that man.

10 We were successful. Did not
11 have to lay down in front of any tires,
12 but we were successful in stopping that
13 deportation. This is a man who was hit
14 while walking by a motorcycle. He had
15 extreme brain injury. He was on a
16 feeding tube.

17 We were joined by leaders in
18 the immigrant community. We were joined
19 by medical students. When those medical
20 students went up and visited him and they
21 saw his condition, they told us straight
22 out he would have died before ever
23 landing in Guatemala where they were
24 trying to deport him to.

25 That man is alive today because

2 of the work of Free Migration Project
3 that I sit on the Board of and is alive
4 today because of his niece who fought
5 tooth and nail to save his life.

6 And this bill is going to save
7 lives, and it's going to set a precedent
8 for the country. This is going to be the
9 first bill in the nation to ever
10 establish a protocol to oversee medical
11 repatriation, and we are already hearing
12 from other states about how excited they
13 are about bringing it to their locale.

14 So, once again, thank you.
15 Thank you for your support on this bill.
16 I cannot wait until it's officially a
17 law, and I cannot wait bringing this to
18 other locales.

19 Gracias.

16 So I see that you all have some
17 issues where you're going to give land to
18 PHA, and I'm asking you all to please
19 consider where these lands, these
20 properties are coming from.

21 In the Land Bank a lot of them
22 are because of tangled titles, people
23 couldn't pay their taxes, and that's why
24 those properties are there. It would be
25 very nice if City Council could find a

2 way to give the family members who lost
3 these properties -- and we understand not
4 writing a will is a bad thing and it gets
5 a lot of issues going, but if we could
6 come up with a program that would give
7 the family members a second chance at
8 earning or getting the properties that

10 earned, that's generational wealth.

11 Nothing is more important than
12 generational wealth. We're the number
13 one poorest big city. We know that.
14 We've been on that list for 30 years.
15 Generational wealth can elevate an entire
16 family, one property, one grandmother's
17 house.

18 And so many of these properties
19 are lost this way, and before we start
20 giving them to PHA to then rebuild to
21 then sell back to us again to have
22 another 30-year mortgage, it would be
23 nice that we give the families a chance
24 to get these properties back first,
25 because that is also part of the

2 displacement that's going on in
3 Philadelphia, and that's very important.
4 If we're all about getting affordable
5 housing, nothing is more affordable than
6 the house you already have and your
7 family has already worked for.

10 Colleagues, today I rise to say
11 that the work that collectively we have
12 all done on public safety cumulated in
13 the Crime Summit Report. This report
14 will be released sometime next week, and
15 shamelessly I've incorporated,
16 plagiarized, and utilized a lot of the
17 work that members have done, everything
18 from conflict resolution in schools to
19 what do you do when the shooter lives
20 with you, to the work that Member Johnson
21 does with the Anti-Gun Violence
22 Committee, all of it.

23 Particularly today I talk about
24 the Kensington Marshall Plan done by the
25 Kensington Caucus. Why do I point that

2 out today? That when you look at those
3 recommendations, one of them deals with
4 retail theft. That idea came from those
5 hearings.

6 I point to you to say that Eric
7 Harrison was a security guard at Macy's.
8 Next month he was to take the policeman's
9 examination. He was doing the right
10 thing, going to work every day at a
11 thankless job, trying to make ends meet,
12 and due to the theft of hats, someone
13 elevated that crime to murder.

14 So what I say to you in this
15 recommendation is that we have to pay
16 attention to the small things, the
17 details, so that they don't become big
18 things.

19 Ironically, the perpetrator got
20 on the El and was on his way back to
21 Kensington. Fortunately, SEPTA, which is
22 another recommendation, SEPTA, the
23 Police, and University Police got
24 together and caught this individual.

25 Give them a round of applause,

2 because that will save future lives.

7 coordination is what one of the
8 recommendations recommends.

9 Linda Richardson of SEPTA
10 talked about the facts versus the fear,
11 that less than one percent of violent
12 crimes happen on SEPTA's rails, on their
13 trolleys and buses, but the facts are
14 also that when people get off at those
15 stops and walk into those neighborhoods,
16 they're in peril and at risk.
17 Coordination has to happen, like it did
18 to apprehend that individual who
19 committed that heinous crime.

20 So I look forward to sharing
21 with my colleagues next week the over 140
22 recommendations that came up. I want to
23 thank Police Commissioner, the District
24 Attorney, members of credible messengers
25 from boots on the ground who took the

2 time to weigh in on what they thought
3 should be a blueprint, not for, as the
4 next Mayor says, excellent articulation
5 of the problem, which kills me, but to
6 point to solutions so that that document
7 serves as a guide for them going forward.

10 recommendations, and will give each of
11 you a chance to review, input. Things
12 like license plate readers to avoid live
13 stops, all of that is in there.

14 So thank you, Mr. President.

25 what was occurring. So today he decided

10 preparing to celebrate the end of the
