12 Good morning, colleagues.

13 I just want to take a moment to
14 acknowledge the fact that last week, this
15 City Council body passed a resolution
16 naming the month of May as Public Servant
17 Month as we look to recognize the
18 different workers in City government and
19 let them know that they're very much
20 appreciated.

21 The people that we are
22 recognizing today are all amazing people
23 who have done great work for the City of
24 Philadelphia and we want to give them
25 their flowers while they can still smell

3 I also want to take a moment to
4 recognize our former DC Council
5 President. I know that resolution is
6 going to happen a little later today, but
7 unfortunately I won't be able to be here.

7 Council President. I just want to take a
8 moment as you introduce the next
9 resolution honoring and recognizing Meeka
10 Outlaw for the heroism and bravery she
11 exhibited while providing aid to a
12 three-year-old child injured by gunfire
13 this past Sunday on April the 30th of
14 2023 in Grays Ferry, South Philadelphia.

15 Meeka Outlaw, who is a local
16 resident in Grays Ferry, was unloading
17 groceries out of her car when she noticed
18 a mother and child in distress and the
19 child was hit by gunfire. Ms. Outlaw
20 drove the child and mother to the
21 Philadelphia Fire Department Engine 47 on
22 Grays Ferry Avenue while alerting first
23 responders. The first responders
24 immediately jumped in and stabilized the
25 boy and rushed him to Children Hospital's

2 of Philadelphia, where he is now in a
3 stable condition.

4 So I wanted to take a moment.
5 I have known Ms. Meeka Outlaw for several
6 years as a community leader. She's also
7 a teacher. She's also a graduate of my
8 alma mater, Mansfield University. But,
9 most importantly, it's acts of bravery
10 and heroism such as this that all
11 Philadelphians should take notice of when
12 we see incidents of gun violence taking
13 place in the City of Philadelphia,
14 particularly impacting our young people,
15 and as opposed to videotaping the
16 incidents taking place, actually getting
17 involved and trying to save the life of a
18 young person.

19 So could we just take a moment
20 and acknowledge this young lady, Meeka
21 Outlaw.

25 Ms. Scott took an active role

3 key leadership positions. Ms. Scott has
4 been a tenuous advocate for union labor
5 and City employees and in 2007 became the
6 first female President of District

9 for workers. Ms. Scott serves as the
10 Vice President of the Philadelphia
11 AFL-CIO and is a member of the
12 Philadelphia Coalition of Labor Union
13 Women, formerly serving as the executive
14 board member.

15 Ms. Scott also served on the
16 Pennsylvania AFL-CIO Work and Family
17 Committee and has been a delegate to the
18 Pennsylvania AFL-CIO Conventions, the
19 District Council 47 Delegate Assembly,
20 and AFSCME International Conventions.

21 Catherine Scott has dedicated
22 her professional life to advocating for
23 the rights of workers throughout
24 Philadelphia and beyond, and her policies
25 have achieved tangible results which have

16 is Cathy Scott, commenting on a
17 resolution introduced today by Councilman
18 Harrity.

19 (Witnesses approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. SCOTT: Good morning,
23 Council President Clarke. My name is
24 Catherine Scott, formerly -- recently
25 retired President of AFSCME District

2 Council 47. I want to thank City Council
3 for honoring me today with the resolution
4 that is before you.

5 As all successful union leaders
6 know, any successful career is a team
7 effort. I have been fortunate to have
8 been supported by wonderful officers and
9 staff, some of whom have been able to
10 join me here today, Yvonne Harris, Robert
11 Harris, David Wilson, and I know that
12 there are other people in the audience
13 supporting me, and April Gigetts, who is
14 the -- I didn't see her on the other
15 side -- the President of District Council
16 47.

17 Our attorneys at Willig,
18 Williams and Davidson have been
19 invaluable to me in their advocacy on our
20 union's behalf, but most of all, I have
21 to have the support of the members first
22 of Local 2187 and later the locals of
23 District Council 47, and of course I have
24 always been supported by my family.
25 Without this incredible team effort, I

2 would not be receiving this recognition
3 today.

4 I have seen our union grow over
5 many years of involvement in the labor
6 movement, but the new-found energy in
7 organizing and fighting for workers'
8 rights and basic human rights is a joy
9 for me to see.

10 Our newest members, cultural
11 workers working for wealthy non-profits,
12 have had to fight for the rights just to
13 be in a union. As Frederick Douglass
14 said, power concedes nothing without a
15 demand. It never did and it never will.

16 I can enjoy my retirement now
17 knowing that District Council 47 is in
18 good hands with its new leadership. And,
19 again, I want to thank City Council for
20 acknowledging me today. I have had a
21 wonderful career and I've worked with
22 many of you, and it has been a joy to
23 work with City Council too. So thank you
24 very much.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: So my
5 comment was covered by the Senate. I
6 would be remiss if I did not recognize
7 District Council 47's contribution to
8 Senator Hughes. That's where he came
9 from and how much he was grounded in the
10 labor movement based on that experience.

11 So congratulations on your
12 retirement. I doubt if you stay retired,
13 but thank you for the contributions to
14 Philadelphia. Thank you so much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you.

17 - - -

19 - - -

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you very much, and
22 thank you for your commitment and your
23 contribution to the City of Philadelphia.

24 Mr. Decker, next name.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MS. LANDES: Good morning. My
7 name is Lynn Landes, founder of
8 wildfoodies.org and
9 healthalertphilly.org. I'm speaking on
10 behalf of Resolution 210913, authorizing
11 City Council to retain legal counsel to
12 file a lawsuit to require the
13 Administration to implement and enforce
14 the Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces Act.
15 Its aim is to end the use of toxic
16 pesticides in public parks and on public
17 grounds.

18 Besides the issue of the
19 Mayor's non-enforcement of laws that City
20 Council has passed, which I addressed
21 last week, there are two other challenges
22 facing Parks and Rec on this issue, cost
23 and staffing.

24 Some say that these toxic
25 pesticides are cheaper and easier to use

2 than manual and mechanized landscaping.
3 That may be true, but it is not an excuse
4 to poison people and the planet, plus
5 contaminate our drinking water.

6 Secondly, staffing has reached
7 a crisis point, not just for Parks and
8 Rec but also for many other City
9 departments. The situation is so dire
10 that the Mayor has provided in his budget
11 \$1.9 million to the Office of Human
12 Resources, and City Council has created a
13 Special Committee on Retention and
14 Recruitment for Municipal Workers to help
15 alleviate the crisis.

16 I would like to offer a few
17 suggestions to the Mayor and City Council
18 on this matter.

19 Please end any remaining COVID
20 mandates. Hire back the workers that the
21 City fired because of these ill-conceived
22 mandates, and then promise the public to
23 never again engage in such behavior as to
24 not listen to the many doctors,
25 scientists, and activists who warned

2 early on in this pandemic against the
3 mandates in general but particularly
4 against the vaccines.

5 Hold hearings on lessons
6 learned from the COVID disaster and
7 promise current and potential City
8 employees and the public that the City
9 government of Philadelphia has learned
10 from the COVID disaster and will now and
11 forever support free speech and medical
12 freedom, not censorship and medical
13 tyranny.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony. We
17 appreciate it.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
22 is Mama Gail Clouden, commenting on
23 221015.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. CLOUDEN: I am Mama Gail --

3 morning.

4 MS. CLOUDEN: Good day. I am
5 Mama Gail Stewart Clouden. I say my
6 maiden name in honor of my ancestors.

7 And, lady, thank you. Miss who
8 came before me, hello, hello, thank you,
9 thank you, thank you, because it's people
10 like you that kept, kept, kept, kept
11 coming that got these people jobs.
12 That's why they're able to sit here,
13 because people like you that people felt
14 were agitators. That's why they're
15 sitting here now.

16 No more abatements at the
17 detriment of the poorest populus of
18 Philadelphia. I stand here on this day
19 of our Lord, May 4th, 2023, to declare,
20 to decree, and I claim in honor of our
21 ancestors that the poorest of the poor of
22 our people in this city should not be
23 taken advantage of.

24 I've been standing for many,
25 many years for those that don't speak for

2 themselves, those that can't, and those
3 that won't.

4 In 2015, the United Nations
5 declared that this is the decade of the
6 descendents. This is reparations time.
7 How dare this be continued? It has to
8 stop, that the people that were supposed
9 to be freed have not been freed because
10 of those that kept coming and holding
11 them back.

12 How do you have the time and
13 period when people said it's your time,
14 you're free, and then the slave master
15 get paid as a result of losing his
16 workforce?

17 That time is over, and I'm
18 standing to declare, claim, and decree
19 it's over. Enough is enough.

20 That bill that you want to keep
21 giving people abatements has to stop.
22 When we're not getting what we're
23 supposed to get and you all keep saying
24 we don't have enough money, if you charge
25 people what they should be paying, you

2 would have enough money. If the School
3 District stopped wasting money, they
4 would have enough money.

5 I don't have a lot to say,
6 because I know that karma is real, and I
7 want you to have the day that you all
8 deserve, and that's what the young people
9 are saying. Have the day that you
10 deserve each and every day. Stand up and
11 do right because it's the right thing to
12 do. Stand up for those that can't speak
13 for themselves, and stop saying yes to
14 stuff that don't make sense. It's not
15 fair.

16 Equity is real. Equality is
17 real, and it's time for that. We're in a
18 city that stopped the whole city as a
19 result of a Black woman saying eight
20 Black men should have a job that's not
21 back-breaking, and the whole city, unions
22 all over, they went on strike. The
23 President of the United States -- the
24 United States -- the President of the
25 United States had to say either you go

2 back to work or you go to war.

3 Stop this.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 MS. CLOUDEN: Because it's the
7 right thing to do.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

10 - - -

11 (Applause.)

12 - - -

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Horace Clouden, commenting on 221015.

15 MS. CLOUDEN: That's my husband
16 and her father.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. CLOUDEN: Good morning.

21 Horace Clouden, member of the Parent
22 Community Advisory Council to the Board
23 of Education, member of Mama Gail's
24 Community Education Network.

25 I also come here to say no to

2 that Bill 221015, because here again, if
3 you say yes, then there won't be any
4 money going to the School District.

5 Now, since I'm talking about
6 the School District, I'm not asking for
7 money for the School District to open the
8 five indoor pools owned by the School
9 District, because they have the money.
10 They have the staff. We're asking the
11 District to bring back swimming as a
12 curriculum. To do that, they need all
13 seven pools, to come under Sayre Aquatic
14 Center responsible for programming and
15 oversight, and there has been a proposal
16 that has been submitted.

17 All pools, all seven pools, are
18 training facilities, and five of the
19 seven can provide springboard training.
20 Here we have pools that not one of the
21 City's 71 pools can provide this type of
22 service.

23 We ask all City Council to
24 provide the pressure to make this happen.
25 This is a benefit to the entire city.

2 My comment is this: You know,
3 for those who was in the Education
4 Committee and talked to the
5 Superintendent the other day, all your
6 concerns have already been said to the
7 Superintendent through his listening
8 sessions. You know, you're not saying --
9 you haven't said anything new that no one
10 else has brought to the attention of the
11 Superintendent.

12 One of the examples was zero
13 percent -- there was one school that had
14 zero percent in student achievement or
15 what they said zero percent in math and
16 seven percent in English. But can you
17 imagine back in 2018-2019 there was 24
18 high schools out of 52 high schools that
19 had zero percent? The ninth graders
20 tested in at zero percent in student
21 achievement.

22 So then from 2018-2019, then we
23 had COVID, then we had virtual learning.
24 And guess what? That number probably is
25 true today, because what the School

2 District is saying today is that they
3 have no data.

4 You know, so when we talk about
5 or when you talk about or everybody talks
6 about asbestos in the schools and they
7 want to close a school and then put them
8 into virtual learning, well, guess what?
9 Virtual learning isn't -- how can I say
10 it? You can't demand virtual learning on
11 the households of the students.

12 What the District has to do is
13 provide another brick and mortar facility
14 to have virtual learning if they're going
15 to teach virtual learning. I mean, this
16 has been presented to the Board. They
17 have it, how you say it, Policy 520.1.
18 If you look it up, it states it right
19 there.

20 So we're just saying that --
21 I'm just saying that the School District
22 is doing things that are illegal. You
23 get caught up in the narratives. Oh, we
24 got asbestos. We always had these
25 things.

3 Okay.

4 MR. CLOUDEN: Open up the five
5 pools.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your
8 testimony. We appreciate it.

11 - - -

12 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
13 is Leah Clouden, commenting on 221015.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MS. LEAH CLOUDEN: Leah
18 Clouden. Good morning.

19 So I'm going to second and
20 third the things that both my parents
21 were saying. You know, this city has
22 totally failed the residents, and I'm
23 going to say the Black residents
24 especially.

25 You know, you talk about in the

2 name of deteriorated properties and
3 dilapidated communities and whatever for
4 this abatement, but it is the own city
5 that did not do their due diligence and
6 go after those people with those
7 properties. Those people could afford
8 it. I'm not talking about just those
9 single homes that were, you know, people
10 passed away, but you have -- I even have
11 a property next to my own property where
12 the bank owns it. The people passed away
13 30 years ago, mother and son, 30 years
14 ago. The building was torn down. We
15 have been taking care of that property
16 for over 30 years, just cleaning the
17 yard. The only time we called the City
18 was to pick up from the people dumping.

19 You know, I think about all
20 those things that the City did not do
21 their due diligence, and because of that,
22 the residents have to pay double and
23 triple property tax.

24 You got all these people coming
25 in that are building almost skyscrapers

1 5/4/23 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 in residential neighborhoods. It's not
3 right. And they get abatements. Also,
4 they purchase those properties for a
5 dollar. I've been on that list to see
6 how much people are paying for these
7 properties. They're building strip
8 malls. This is ridiculous.

9 You got to do what's right.
10 They need to pay their way.

11 Also, the School District has
12 failed since Dr. Hite was here. That man
13 had took this School District down to
14 zero -- to eight percent away from total
15 failure, eight percent. You got another
16 man that has come in and now for almost
17 two years it's conversation. There's no
18 movement. They can say, oh, we made
19 improvement, but that's still an F. It's
20 still an F. We're still being failed,
21 and the children are crying out. They
22 are in the street losing their minds
23 because they don't have adults to step up
24 and do the right thing.

25 They don't need money. They

2 need accountability. Everybody needs to
3 be held accountable.

4 I called about my trash. I
5 still can't get my trash picked up. It's
6 still sitting out there. I've been going
7 through this for three years. They cut
8 the grass across from -- the park across
9 from our house and the only thing they do
10 is push -- they use the blowers and they
11 push all the trash in a pile and leave it
12 in the park, and then they take the
13 outside after they're finished cutting
14 and they push it into the street. So
15 that's why we have these trifling streets
16 that we have.

17 Then you got the poles outside.
18 Did they even do a test study to see if
19 they can mess with your brain, all these
20 little white poles and yellow poles.

21 You got -- there has to be some
22 accountability. The City is not doing
23 right by its residents.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 230332.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. HAGINS: Ogbonna Hagins,
12 H-A-G-I-N-S. I'm speaking on this
13 resolution calling for Pennsylvania House
14 of Representatives to pass House Bill
15 338, 714, 731. Basically it's addressing
16 reasonable firearm restrictions.

17 Firearm restrictions are not
18 the answer for reducing gun violence.
19 There was a report written in the New
20 York Times titled "Childhood's Greatest
21 Danger: The Data on Kids and Gun
22 Violence." I suggest that you read this
23 and other data on youth and gun violence.

24 Based on these resolutions that
25 you are introducing, I can tell that you

2 are not communicating with the people of
3 this city and especially the youth.

4 Not only the New York Times
5 article as well as other data indicate
6 that poverty is one of the -- that
7 poverty is one of the major reasons for
8 youth gun violence and youth crime. The
9 thousands of youth who I have personally
10 spoken with over the past few months also
11 indicate that fact. They are telling me
12 that they are involved in the street
13 culture because of economics, because
14 they don't have any money.

15 It is obvious to me that there
16 needs to be leadership change in this
17 body. Not only are you not listening to
18 the people, you are not studying the data
19 that clearly indicates that crime and
20 violence is a result of poverty, and
21 there is nothing that this body has done
22 to solve this issue.

23 As you know, I published a
24 hip-hop magazine. How many of you
25 listened to hip-hop to listen to what the

2 youth are actually saying? They are
3 crying out. What are you doing to
4 decrease the economic wealth gap? It's
5 poverty, y'all.

6 Let me tell you what this
7 violence is all about. The youth are
8 lashing out. You know the saying, hurt
9 people hurt people. So all I'm asking
10 you to do is understand those who are
11 hurting and do something about it.

12 The gun restriction, yeah, that
13 might help a little bit, but the reality
14 is it's not going to stop, because crime
15 and violence is a result of poverty.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 - - -
19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
22 is David Gibson.

23 (Witnesses approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MR. GIBSON: Good morning.
3 David Gibson. I'm with -- can you hear
4 me?

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
6 we can.

7 MR. GIBSON: I'm with Peace
8 Justice Sustainability Now. We are an
9 associate group of national Peace Action,
10 and we're here to thank Councilman
11 Squilla and the Council for passing the
12 citation honoring the Golden Rule.

13 The Golden Rule is a 34-foot
14 wooden catch whose first voyage was an
15 attempt to prevent U.S. nuclear bomb
16 testing in the Marshall Islands, and it
17 was the inspiration for all the other
18 ships that went out and did that. It
19 really kind of got Greenpeace going on
20 the whole thing, and it was the beginning
21 of a series of grassroots efforts in the
22 United States and around the world to end
23 the scourge of nuclear weapons.

24 At one point we had 70,000,
25 70,000 nuclear weapons armed and ready to

2 go on first strike warning. We reduced
3 that now, thanks to the efforts of many,
4 many people, including the folks in the
5 Golden Rule, to a little over 7,000.
6 That's way too many, but it's much better
7 than what we had before.

8 So we need to keep moving in
9 the right direction, and the Golden
10 Rule's trip right now is to educate
11 people and raise up the awareness of the
12 fact that thanks to the passage in the UN
13 of the Treaty on the Prohibition of
14 Nuclear Weapons, nuclear weapons are now
15 illegal. They are illegal around the
16 world. But all the countries that have
17 nuclear weapons, including the United
18 States, have not yet signed on to this
19 treaty. My partner, my brother here is
20 going to talk about that in a minute.

21 So the Golden Rule will be
22 here. It will be arriving at Penns
23 Landing around 4 o'clock on the 9th.
24 It'll be here until the 13th. Actually
25 they'll leave the morning of the 14th,

2 and there's going to be a series of
3 events around the City where people can
4 attend to find out about the history of
5 the Golden Rule, which is deep and broad,
6 and what people can do to get the United
7 States to sign on to the Treaty for the
8 Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

9 So I'm going to leave it at
10 that. Thank you again, Councilman
11 Squilla, and I'm going to also introduce
12 my brother here, Wilson Spronell.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you.

15 MR. GIBSON: He's with Veterans
16 for Peace, by the way, who are the people
17 who brought this ship to Philly.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.
20 Next speaker.

21 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
22 is Wilson Spronell.

23 MR. SPRONELL: Good morning.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MR. SPRONELL: My name is
3 Wilson Spronell. My story is pretty
4 short. I want to thank the City Council
5 for their resolution supporting the
6 Golden Rule.

7 When I was 17 years old back in
8 1964, I joined the United States Army,
9 just maybe a year before we got involved
10 in Vietnam, and my training, I went
11 through two months of basic training, two
12 months of artillery crewman training, and
13 then they sent me to a special school. I
14 was 17 years old. The special school was
15 tactical nuclear weapons assembly.

16 Our practice materials were
17 made out of depleted uranium rather than
18 actual visible uranium. When I came home
19 from that training, a friend of mine
20 said, you know, the FBI was just here
21 investigating you. I missed him by one
22 day. I went to tactical nuclear weapons
23 school without anybody having
24 investigated my background, and I have no
25 doubt that there's thousands of men in a

2 similar position to mine.

3 I'm scared to death. The
4 Russians threatened to use tactical
5 nuclear weapons in the Ukraine, and
6 that's a really bad road to go down,
7 because it just gets worse. And maybe
8 those tactical nuclear weapons get used
9 and bigger weapons, and I'm scared to
10 death for that. I have children,
11 grandchildren, and a great-grandson who
12 is going to be 12 years old in August.
13 And that's just my kids personally, and
14 I'm scared to death for them.

15 The United Nations last year
16 put this Treaty for the Prohibition of
17 Nuclear Weapons. It was passed last
18 year, and it has become international
19 law, but like Dave said, none of the
20 major countries holding all these weapons
21 have signed on to it.

22 The City Council passed a
23 resolution to encourage the United States
24 to sign on. All the other big countries
25 with nukes are waiting on the United

2 States to do something. And City
3 Council, again, I thank you. You passed
4 a resolution encouraging the federal
5 government to do that. City Council
6 passed a resolution making Philadelphia a
7 nuclear-free zone.

8 That's all of my comments. I
9 just encourage you to come down and
10 support the Golden Rule. It's a peace
11 mission. It's a non-proliferation
12 mission, and it will be in Philadelphia,
13 as Dave said, between May the 9th and May
14 the 13th.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Yolanda Taylor, commenting on 230332.

4 morning.

5 MS. TAYLOR: Hello and good
6 morning. My name is Yolanda Taylor, also
7 known in communities as the Black Family
8 Ambassador.

9 I'm here -- I would like to
10 address, not coincidentally, also gun
11 restriction, but hopefully on a
12 three-minute span time what I have heard
13 from others that spoke today.

14 Guns definitely have bullets to
15 kill people, but I feel that people kill
16 people. As an active member of NRA, I
17 don't believe that the restriction will
18 alleviate the problem, because the
19 problem lies in the individual,
20 especially our youth, and there are
21 multiple reasons why.

22 One, there's no structure. I'm
23 still trying to understand in the City
24 what 8,000 non-profit organizations, why
25 is it on a daily, whether I'm in North

2 Philly, South, whatever, in these
3 communities I can't see one program that
4 gives our children an alternative other
5 than standing on the street, and some of
6 them don't want to stand on the street.
7 We have to understand where our kids come
8 from. Some of them are on the street
9 because inside their home, it's that bad.
10 You know what I'm saying?

11 We're running programs
12 unfortunately for 14, 15 year olds
13 teaching them how to use Narcan, God
14 forbid, for their parents. So I feel
15 that the problem lies with either us not
16 really understanding what the needs of
17 our community is, which are these kids.

18 My personal fight is DHS. I
19 feel that they have too much power and
20 they're not governed by any party, and
21 they are taking some kids out of
22 structure instead of leaving them where
23 they are getting love and structure,
24 because a lot of these kids are
25 traumatized and feel that their own

2 family turned their backs on them.

3 As far as the school system,
4 let me just touch up on that real quick.
5 Worked for the school system, quit the
6 school system. I have a problem with the
7 people within the school system. One,
8 they don't look like our brown and Black
9 kids. That's first of all. They don't
10 even live in our communities. They show
11 up just for a paycheck. They have no
12 concern. They don't want our kids to
13 learn, and I'mma tell the truth and shame
14 the devil up in here today. So that's
15 half the problem. When I walk down in
16 the school and all I see is YouTube, all
17 that is is a daycare for our children.

18 As far as a budget, they have a
19 budget, but I'm just going to play devil
20 advocate real quickly. Okay? You have a
21 budget. You have a room down there of,
22 let's say, 20,000 books. Because of how
23 the books were bought, instead of going
24 and putting them on the curb outside so
25 our kids can learn how to read and

2 parents walk by and pick those same books
3 up that you're going to trash so our
4 children can learn to read, if you as
5 their parent willing to do that or
6 someone else, those books go in the
7 garbage because of how they were paid.
8 They were paid by by the School Board,
9 but they're not being implemented in the
10 school, nor are you given the alternative
11 to give those books to our community.

12 And that's pretty much what I
13 got right now. Also, I just also have to
14 say this in all truthness. The problem
15 does lie in the body sitting in front of
16 me. This is my first meeting. I feel
17 that you guys are chosen by your
18 community to represent your community,
19 and you guys have far-fetched gone from
20 your community. It's my understanding,
21 you know, in most communities throughout
22 this state, the median that you make in
23 City Council is 45 percent of what the
24 median is in the City and that -- there's
25 an uneven proportion and you guys aren't

2 visible in your community.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

11 Briefly, gun violence is not
12 the result of one thing. It is the
13 result of many things colliding together
14 causing a catastrophe that we have on our
15 streets in Philadelphia. But in order to
16 address gun violence, you have to not
17 swallow it whole. You have to take it
18 apart piece by piece, whether it's
19 poverty, whether it's the lack of
20 education, whether it is lack of, as
21 Katherine Gilmore Richardson puts it,
22 intervention, teaching non-violent
23 intervention and the tools to be able to
24 de-escalate that are not being taught
25 sometimes at home.

2 So we can either just look at
3 the problem, curse at it through the
4 windows or we can take one step at a time
5 to resolve it, and what I'm proud about
6 this organization is that we didn't just
7 wake up and realize there was a problem.
8 From the time you first introduced a bill
9 that was common sense gun laws, we've
10 been sued, we've been threatened, but we
11 keep on fighting, and I'm proud of us for
12 that.

13 With that, I move for the
14 adoption of the resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All in favor indicate by saying

22 housing properties in Philadelphia.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gauthier.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank

2 you, Council President.

3 Before we consider Bill 221017,
4 I would like to take a few moments to
5 discuss the significance of the
6 legislation.

7 A few weeks ago, the City and I
8 announced a settlement with a property
9 owner that opted out of their
10 affordability contract. I am incredibly
11 proud and consider the settlement a
12 victory, but the outcome was far from
13 equitable. Seventy families will still
14 be displaced from their homes.

15 And while I am relieved that
16 the UC Townhomes residents will receive
17 the financial support they need to
18 relocate to a neighborhood of their
19 choosing safely and successfully, nothing
20 can make up for the home and community
21 they have lost.

22 So if we learn nothing else
23 from the UC Townhomes saga, it is that
24 the City must take a bolder and more
25 proactive approach to affordable housing

2 preservation, because the UC Townhomes
3 are the very tip of the iceberg. If we
4 do not change course now, over 12,000
5 families could also be kicked out of
6 their homes.

7 For too long, government has
8 not lived up to its responsibility to
9 preserve government subsidized affordable
10 housing. And while the City cannot keep
11 every development online on its own, we
12 can do much more to push back against the
13 housing affordability crisis that is
14 growing worse by the day.

15 This is a critical moment in
16 Philadelphia's history, and we must make
17 a choice. Will we lack economic forces,
18 discard working-class Black and brown
19 residents from the neighborhoods they
20 have built and stewarded or will we wrap
21 our arms around the 12,000 families
22 facing the impending doom of
23 displacement?

24 The People's Preservation
25 Package is a balanced, earnest step in

2 the right direction that many other
3 municipalities have successfully employed
4 for years. It will help us to be better
5 prepared to face the tidal wave of
6 affordability opt-outs and give the
7 City's affordable housing providers an
8 opportunity to preserve affordable

10 the market.

11 With so much at stake, inaction
12 is not an option, and I urge all of you
13 to join me in voting to adopt the
14 People's Preservation Package into law.

6 congratulate the Administration, the City
7 Treasurer, the Finance team led by Rob
8 Dubow, and our own Council guru, Bob
9 McDermott, and his team, Ami as well, for
10 all of the work that they have done on
11 the rating upgrade from Moody's and our
12 positive outlook change from S&P Global
13 Ratings.

14 Our credit rating is now
15 upgraded from an A2 to A1, and Moody's
16 particularly noted that our fund balance
17 and our liquidity has improved over the
18 last three years. So I wanted to notate
19 that for this body.

20 They also stated that the City
21 continues to demonstrate prudent budget
22 controls and fiscal governance, hallmarks
23 of its improved financial performance
24 over the past several years.

25 The City projects substantial

5/4/23 - STATED - SPEECHES

deposits to its Budget Stabilization Reserve, which we call BSR, from its General Fund over the next three years, which will further support fiscal controls by requiring formal certification from the City's Director of Finance before monies can be transferred out of the BSR.

The movement of monies into a more formal reserve fund eliminates potential political noise around the City's financial health going forward and further strengthens governance controls, another core aspect of the City's credit profile.

So I also wanted to thank you, Council President, our leadership team, and all the colleagues here who voted in support of the legislation that I have offered around our Budget Stabilization Reserve to ensure that we make more regular annual deposits into our BSR. And I know because of the Moody's report that that legislation has made a

2 difference to ensure that our credit
3 rating can be upgraded from Moody's from
4 an A2 now to an A1, which is our best
5 financial outlook I'd say over the last
6 40 years.

7 So I just wanted to say thank
8 you, congratulations, and I look forward
9 to continuing to do this work with all of
10 you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you, Councilwoman. Very, very
13 important part of what we do here,
14 stability, stability, stability fiscally.
15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Phillips.

17 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
18 you, Council President.

19 I want to begin by saying how
20 excited I am that Ziehler Recreation
21 Center will be having a groundbreaking,
22 and I want to thank my colleague
23 Councilwoman Sharon Vaughn, who is
24 extremely excited right now about this,
25 and all of those who are from the Olney

2 area, because what I've noticed is that
3 our city -- and I want to say
4 Councilwoman Vaughn has been really a big
5 advocate making sure it's happened. I
6 want to thank the entire Rebuild team for
7 that support and what's about to come.

8 What I've noticed in my walks
9 and talks in neighborhoods throughout the
10 past month is that there is a serious
11 desire for infrastructure improvement in
12 our city. It is our hope as a body, and
13 particularly myself as the representative
14 of the Ninth District, that we work
15 collaboratively together to make
16 infrastructure a major priority in this
17 budget season but certainly when we are
18 able to elect our next Mayor of the City
19 of Philadelphia, from driveways to
20 retaining walls to simply, you know,
21 street damage that's happening across our
22 city, infrastructure and also most
23 recently our schools and Building 21,
24 among many schools in the City.

25 It is -- research says that

2 quality of life, if we take care of
3 quality of life in the City of
4 Philadelphia, that is a great violence
5 prevention measure. And so when we have
6 decent neighborhoods and decent
7 infrastructure, we will see crime go
8 down.

10 and I'm going to -- just putting the City
11 on alert that, you know, this
12 Councilmember and hopefully among
13 everyone else I work with collaboratively
14 in the City to make sure that we are
15 going to prioritize infrastructure in our
16 funding and so forth, because many of our
17 residents cannot afford what is said to
18 be owned by the resident. We have to
19 begin to think deeply about what it is
20 that our city can do to help our
21 residents support their infrastructure.

22 And I want to thank Council
23 President Clarke for also engaging on
24 this conversation with me and others
25 daily and weekly and monthly, because

2 this is really important. So I just want
3 to say infrastructure is going to be a
4 major priority going forward.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. That
7 visit to your district last week and
8 looking at that crumbling driveway where
9 you literally had little small lakes in
10 the driveway is a clear example of what
11 we need to do in our community. So thank
12 you for taking us up there to look at
13 that, and I guarantee you that's going to
14 be one of the first ones we address
15 during our infrastructure strategy.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President.

20 I rise today to acknowledge my
21 colleagues Lozada, Harrity, Vaughn,
22 Squilla for the participation in the
23 Kensington listening tour for the Marshal
24 Plan.

25 We as a body have different

3 Street to Market Street. I've been down
4 Point Breeze. I've been up to Chestnut

10 with the Public Safety Committee at the
11 leadership of Member Lozada is to listen,
12 is to hear from the people and the
13 stakeholders in Kensington and bring in
14 toward most of the departments that have a
15 role to play in its revival. Whether
16 you're talking about SEPTA, to the
17 Police, to DHS, to mental health, all of
18 them will listen to what the residents of
19 the Seventh District have had to go
20 through and endure.

21 So I look forward to all of our
22 participation in this.

23 If you paid attention to the
24 budget, it doesn't take long for Member
25 Harrity, who is at-large but is a

2 resident of Kensington, to come back to
3 his roots and say what are we doing about
4 these aspects of the problem, what are
5 the solutions.

6 Member Lozada is on the cutting
7 edge of pulling together a plan. It's
8 not -- you know, being in someone's
9 thoughts and prayers are one thing, but
10 when you're done praying, you need to
11 start thinking about what to do to solve
12 the problem.

13 So I look forward to the
14 hearing. It is Tuesday at Conwell Middle
15 School in the Seventh District, but it is
16 a part of the entire City.

17 Until Kensington is safe and
18 dealt with, no neighborhood in
19 Philadelphia can be considered safe and
20 dealt with.

10 Councilman Phillips is helping me
11 improve. I started lobbying about seven
12 years ago, asking the past Councilperson
13 to improve that recreation center that
14 was in deplorable state.

15 I went out and painted the
16 grounds. I hung new nets myself just to
17 give the kids a better place to play.
18 And we often get criticized as a body,
19 but I want to say there is a lot of
20 tremendous and wonderful things being
21 done by the people that sit on the floor
22 of this Council on a daily basis, and
23 often times we are not recognized by
24 those things. And it's important that we
25 remain solid, keep our heads up, and

3 This is helping this community
4 not deal with prostitution, dumping, and
5 it's a classic example of putting the
6 people first, and that is our job here.

8 9:00 a.m. on Monday we will be having the
9 Philadelphia Water Department proposed
10 rate increase, and I know a lot of
11 members pulled me to the side and
12 particularly Councilman Katherine Gilmore
13 Richardson in terms of the rate increase,
14 the impact it will have on our
15 constituents and why we aren't using the
16 funds from the federal government to kind
17 of supplement the building of the
18 infrastructure that needs to be done as
19 opposed to raising rates and coming out
20 of the pandemic.

21 So we wanted to make sure that
22 this process is transparent, separate
23 from the hearings that -- the public
24 hearings that they had, but it wasn't the
25 same as having it with members of

3 So I just wanted make that
4 acknowledgment for -- announcement for
5 Monday 9:00 a.m. the rate increase,
6 Philadelphia Water Department hearings.

10 The Chair recognizes
11 Councilwoman Lozada.

12 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
13 you, Council President.

14 I just want to say thank you to
15 all of my colleagues, Councilman Jones
16 specifically, because when I met with
17 him, I said to him that I needed
18 Kensington to be as important to him as
19 it is to me and to the residents who live
20 there.

21 I've met with many of you since
22 I arrived in November, and all of you
23 have been willing to listen and to hear
24 from me what my constituency shares with
25 me on a daily basis. And so I'm

2 extremely grateful.

3 I know that there have been
4 many conversations. There's been a lot
5 of talk across the board about the
6 Kensington-Harrowgate community, but it's
7 different when you walk through it. It's
8 different when you live in it. It's

10 in it and you have to just deal with it,
11 right, because it's part of their
12 everyday. And our children struggle.
13 Our families struggle. They deserve an
14 opportunity.

15 I have had the opportunity to
16 walk and visit the recreation centers,
17 which I've been in many times as a
18 resident, but when you're there as a
19 representative of the district, you tend
20 to see things in a different way. You
21 see the negligence that's there.

22 And the sad reality is that
23 those who work there who are responsible
24 for maintaining those spaces, the
25 businesses that are there that are

2 struggling to just survive there and who
3 know that they can do something too but
4 don't feel supported is really difficult.

5 And so I hope that in these
6 hearings, we come in with open minds of
7 what can we do different than what we've
8 been doing in the past. We have to do
9 something different. It is our
10 responsibility. Twenty years from now,
11 we want young people to say that we had
12 an opportunity to make a difference in
13 their lives and that we stood up for
14 them. I want to be able to do that. I
15 want to be able to go to bed at night and
16 say that every day I show up and give
17 150 percent to my community, and I hope
18 that that is what you all want as well.

19 Thank you very much.
