2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Good morning, everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 I note that the hour has come and
10 that a quorum of the Council is
11 present. This Council will now
12 come to order. All members have
13 taken their seats. All visitors
14 have retired to outside the rails
15 before proceeding.

16 I will ask all those
17 present to please set your cell
18 phones to silent or vibrate. Any
19 sidebar conversations I will ask
20 that you take it outside the
21 chambers.

22 To give our invocation this
23 morning, the Chair recognizes Rabbi
24 Ari Lev Fornari of Kol Tzedek
25 Synagogue. He is here today as the

2 guest of our Councilmember Rue

3 Landau.

4 I will ask all members and

5 guests to please rise.

6 (Councilmembers and guests

7 rise.)

8 Rabbi, please join the

9 podium and introduce your guest as

10 well.

11 RABBI FORNARI: Good

12 morning, City Council.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Good morning.

15 RABBI FORNARI: I'm joined

16 here by Rabbi Monica Gomery. We

17 are the Rabbis of Kol Tzedek

18 Synagogue in West Philadelphia.

19 And it's an incredible honor to be

20 here on behalf of our beloved

21 member, Councilmember Landau, to be

22 a member of Councilmember

23 Gauthier's District and to be a

24 colleague and honorary community

25 member with Councilmember Reverend

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2 O'Rourke.

3 You all are lawmakers. And
4 as it turns out we, Jews, do law
5 also. Our law we call Halakhah,
6 and the word Halakhah in Hebrew, it
7 actually means to walk as on a
8 path, to put one foot in front of
9 the other. That's what it is to
10 make law, is to actually put your
11 ideas into practice.

12 And in Jewish tradition,
13 law lives in radical tension. To
14 be strict on one idea is inherently
15 to be lenient on another. This is
16 the inherently imperfect nature of
17 law. We cannot adhere to all of
18 our highest values at once. And
19 so, we must make choices, in this
20 moment in time in our City and in
21 our world, places before us, a very
22 difficult series of choices.

23 On the one hand, Jewish
24 tradition teaches that we are
25 obligated to not say that which

2 cannot yet be heard. We are
3 obligated to not say that which
4 cannot yet be heard. And on the
5 other hand, Jewish tradition
6 teaches that if we see injustice in
7 our own homes, we are obligated to
8 speak out in protest. If we see
9 injustice in our own neighborhoods,
10 we are obligated to speak out in
11 protest.

12 If we see injustice in our
13 City, we are obligated to speak out
14 in protest. If we see injustice in
15 the world, anywhere in the world,
16 we as human beings wherever we find
17 ourselves are obligated to speak
18 out in protest. What is it to be
19 called to be obligated to speak out
20 in protest and to wonder at the
21 same time can it be heard. Can the
22 protest be heard, how can I voice
23 my message. How can we make laws
24 and practices that can be heard in
25 such a way as to change the

2 injustice before us.

3 Now, the Babylonian Talmud
4 which is a piece of ancient wisdom
5 some 2,000 years old, it doesn't
6 just say that we are obligated to
7 speak out against those injustices.

8 It says that anyone who has the
9 ability and chooses not to speak
10 out against injustice, they,
11 themselves, become obligated.
12 They, themselves, become guilty of
13 those injustices. It is upon you
14 to know that you are responsible if
15 you have the ability to speak out.

16 So you as City Council, you
17 as brave civil servants are called
18 to be bold, are called to be bold
19 to speak out about injustices in
20 your neighborhoods, in the
21 Districts that you serve, in the
22 citywide that you serve together,
23 and certainly in the wide world
24 which we are all witnessing grave
25 injustice.

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2 Now, one of the questions
3 is what should those laws sound
4 like, what is the language, what
5 words will most allow our protest
6 to be heard. And it can be
7 difficult to find the right words.
8 It can be difficult to build unity
9 across language, across divisions,
10 across neighborhoods and identities
11 and politics.

12 So I want to encourage you
13 to use your inner wisdom to guide
14 you there. And one of the ways we
15 do that at Kol Tzedek is through
16 song. So we are actually going to
17 take a moment to sing together this
18 morning because in our experience,
19 it's actually the inner quiet and
20 the channeling of song that builds
21 power and unity, such that we
22 cannot speak out against injustice
23 in the singular, but we can do so
24 in the collective which is what is
25 needed in order to bring safety and

2 security and a sense of collective
3 thriving here in the City of
4 Philadelphia, in each of the
5 neighborhoods you serve and
6 certainly in the wide world that we
7 are facing.

8 So I'm honored to invite
9 Rabbi Monica Gomery to lead us in
10 song this morning.

11 RABBI GOMERY: I know this
12 room is going to sing with me. The
13 words to the melody are on the
14 desks of the Councilpeople, and we
15 invite you all to listen and to
16 join in as you are moved.

17 We rise, humbly hearted.
18 Rise, won't be divided. Rise, with
19 spirit to guide us. Rise -- we can
20 get a little bit of a beat -- in
21 hope, in prayer, we find ourselves
22 here. In hope, in prayer, we're
23 right here. In hope, in prayer, we

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2 And we rise. All of the
3 children rise. Elders with wisdom
4 rise. Ancestors around us rise.
5 In hope, in prayer, we find

12 The Chair now recognizes
13 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson

19 circulated prior to today's
20 session.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE
22 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
23 Mr. President.

24 I move that any of the

3 The Chair will dispense
4 with the regular order of business
5 to recognize the guests and
6 visitors joining us in chambers
7 this morning. On behalf of all
8 members of City Council, we welcome
9 you to our Council session. We

11 join us as we attend to the
12 legislative affairs of our city.
13 We certainly invite you to come
14 again.

15 We also have special guests
16 representing the American Ethiopian
17 Public Affairs Committee, our
18 nation's leading Ethiopian Diaspora
19 Group. Their leadership is here
20 today to accept the resolution made
21 by Councilmember Jim Harrity on
22 urging the President of the United
23 States Joe Biden and Congress to
24 re-examine the foreign policy.

25 Joining us today are

5 At this time, the Chair
6 recognizes Councilmember Jim
7 Harrity.

8 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank
9 you, Council President.

10 I would like to thank you
11 also for allowing me to recognize
12 the American Ethiopian Public
13 Affairs Committee and also thank
14 Chris Drumm for setting this up.
15 We did the resolution a little
16 while ago and they just got the
17 chance to come in to receive it.

18 I encourage everyone to
19 stop and say hello to the Bishop.
20 I'm a history guy. I love history.
21 And Ethiopia is so interesting to
22 me. Their history goes back
23 millennia tracing all the way back
24 to Menelik, who we know was the son
25 of the Queen of Sheba and Solomon.

3 fitting that we do a resolution
4 calling on the President to do the
5 right thing, as we always do. We
6 always call people out when we
7 think they're not doing the right
8 thing, and we got to continue on.

11 stand so we can welcome you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Thank
14 you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 You're welcome.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Brian O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank
20 you, Mr. President.

21 I'm going to go a little
22 out of order today because of the
23 importance of the resolution I'm
24 going to be introducing and the
25 person behind it. It's being

3 me. The big airport's in your
4 District. The small airport's in
5 mine.

6 And Jim Tyrrell grew up in
7 your District, but as an adult he's
8 been in my District for a long
9 time. And he didn't want a
10 presentation. Jim is sitting over
11 there with his wife Maryellen, his
12 son Jimmy and his daughter Kelsey.
13 Kelsey's name's very easy to
14 remember now because it's
15 somebody's last name in town.

16 But, Jim, if you could
17 stand with Maryellen and your two
18 children.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Jim
21 has been with the City, with the
22 airport for 37 years. His entire
23 career has been spent there. He
24 knows every job down there. He
25 knows every department. He is so

2 responsive. He's the perfect
3 public servant, especially if
4 you're in a district trying to find
5 something out about an airline,
6 about an airport issue.

7 And you know this well,
8 Mr. President. There's nothing
9 like Jim Tyrrell because he's the
10 first call, first ring answer. And
11 reverse that, you answer him on his
12 first ring too. He's that good and
13 has been a gem for the City, for
14 Northeast Airport, Philly
15 International. And I just can't
16 say enough about him. We're really
17 going to miss him.

18 He stayed an extra year.
19 He was really going to retire last
20 year, but he helped the new
21 Director, and also groomed his
22 successor and mentored her. So Jim
23 is humble, but I wanted to have
24 this standout in his memory and his
25 families and this Council. Okay.

14 will present a resolution honoring
15 and congratulating the National
16 Coalition of 100 Black Women, Inc.
17 Pennsylvania Chapter on their
18 Annual Legislative Day.

19 Will President Nyisha
20 Chapman and those accompanying her
21 please join Councilmember Jones at
22 the podium.

23 Joining Councilman Jones at
24 the podium will be Councilmember
25 Katherine Gilmore Richardson

10 (Councilmembers and guests
11 approached podium.)

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Can we
13 have Blondell Reynolds Brown and
14 Jannie Blackwell to come up with
15 us, former members.

16 Is that all right,
17 Mr. President?

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Absolutely. Once a member always a
20 member.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: There
22 you go. So before we start, I want
23 to just say that these ladies of
24 the Coalition have been breaking
25 glass ceilings since 1970 and

2 unapologetically, as Blondell

3 Reynolds-Brown would say. They

4 have laid the foundation in my

5 opinion for the 100th Mayor of the

6 City of Philadelphia who is also a

7 Coalition member. Please give them

8 a round of applause.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Unlike

11 their name, 100 members, they have

12 142 members so their cup

13 overfloweth in activism. Some of

14 their main issues are breaking the

15 glass ceiling of equal pay,

16 something that Charlita Davis of my

17 office always kicks me about, and

18 making sure that something that

19 Blondell Reynolds has always

20 reminded us about in these

21 chambers, that if you're not at the

22 table, you're on the menu. And she

23 has reminded us, enlightened us

24 male members of Council about the

25 importance of those things.

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2 Today we're looking at
3 beyond the ballot, making a
4 difference beyond the days that we
5 vote so that every day it is a
6 verb, a constant activity so that
7 we keep striving. We don't in May
8 and in November just stop. That
9 activism goes all year. I've had
10 the privilege of knowing this
11 organization and supporting this
12 organization for a long time.

13 And, fellas, whether you're
14 in a fraternity, we got to keep up.
15 They make more -- if you've ever
16 had the opportunity to go to some
17 of their workshops, some of their
18 mission calls, it is
19 groundbreaking. And therefore,
20 today we are honoring the Coalition
21 of 100 Black Women of Pennsylvania
22 for those groundbreaking, ceiling-
23 breaking contributions; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

25 RICHARDSON: Thank you so much to

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 my colleague and District member
3 Councilmember Curtis Jones, Jr. for
4 introducing this resolution on
5 behalf of the National Coalition of
6 100 Black women, Inc., Pennsylvania
7 Chapter. I was honored to become a
8 member of the Coalition following
9 the footsteps of my mentor Blondell
10 Reynolds Brown in 2021. And so,
11 the work yet continues.

12 So today we are honoring
13 and congratulating the National
14 Coalition of 100 Black Women, Inc.,
15 Pennsylvania Chapter on the
16 occasion of our Annual Legislative
17 Day; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
19 Whereas, the Coalition of Black
20 Women was formed in New York City
21 in the winter of 1970 when 24
22 visionary Black women led by Edna
23 Beach met in their homes to discuss
24 the problems, challenges and
25 opportunities during the 1960s.

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2 After founding the
3 Coalition of 100 Black Women, this
4 organization continues to address
5 the root causes of issues that have
6 impacted them. Over the years they
7 mobilized to become a visible force
8 of influence, promoting gender and
9 racial equity; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

11 Whereas, by 1981 the New York
12 Coalition had over 500 members.
13 And as they gained recognition,
14 they duplicated their mission and
15 vision around the country. On
16 October 24th of that year, the
17 National Coalition of 100 Black
18 Women, Inc. was formed, and they
19 selected Jewell Jackson McCabe as
20 their first National President; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

22 Whereas, the National Coalition of
23 100 Black Women, Inc., Pennsylvania
24 Chapter NC100BW-PA was chartered in
25 1981 and 42 progressive women were

2 sworn in in 1982; and

3 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

4 Whereas, this nonprofit

5 organization has been advocating on

6 behalf of Black women and girls for

7 over 40 years in the area of

8 health, education, economic

9 empowerment and leadership

10 development; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

12 Whereas, NC100BW-PA continues to be

13 a voice and force of gender equity

14 and sociopolitical advancement that

15 drives meaningful change to benefit

16 Black women and girls. In

17 addition, NC100BW-PA is

18 instrumental in carrying out the

19 goal of the National Coalition to

20 fulfill their vision of seeking

21 Black women and girls living in a

22 world where social economic

23 inequity does not exist; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

25 Whereas, the members consist of

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2 progressive women of African
3 descent who work as change agents,
4 who have recognized various needs
5 in the Philadelphia community and
6 have contributed in many ways,
7 including advocating for racial and
8 social justice while working
9 towards striving for positive
10 impact in their community.

11 Their commitment to
12 advocacy, empowerment and
13 advancement is commendable and
14 deeply deserving of recognition.
15 Now, therefore, be it --

16 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:
17 Resolved by the Council of the City
18 of Philadelphia that hereby honors
19 and congratulates the National
20 Coalition of 100 Black Women, Inc.,
21 Pennsylvania Chapter on the
22 occasion of their Annual
23 Legislative Day;

24 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE
25 RICHARDSON: And further resolve

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 that an Engrossed copy of this
3 resolution be presented to the
4 National Coalition of 100 Black
5 Women, Inc., Pennsylvania Chapter
6 as a sign of the sincere admiration
7 and respect of this legislative
8 body. Congratulations.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 The Chair recognizes President
11 Nyisha Chapman.

12 MS. CHAPMAN: So I just
13 want to say thank you to all the
14 Councilmembers, especially our
15 member, Councilmember Katherine
16 Gilmore Richardson, my Councilwoman
17 Jamie Gauthier, Councilmember Jones
18 and Council President Johnson on
19 our citation today.

20 We are greatly, deeply
21 appreciative of being the force of
22 advocacy in the City of
23 Philadelphia, advocating on behalf
24 of Black women and girls in the
25 areas of health, education,

2 economic empowerment and leadership
3 development. We are 40 years
4 strong and we're going to continue
5 to advocate beyond today and
6 advocating beyond the ballot.

7 We feel it is important
8 that everyone in this room and
9 everyone in the City of
10 Philadelphia gets out to vote to
11 get your civic engagement done and
12 to make sure that you are making
13 your voice heard. We as the women
14 of 100 Black women will continue to
15 make our voices heard through our
16 programming activity and also
17 through our legislative
18 initiatives. So thank you again,
19 Councilmembers, and thank you again
20 to the members for being here.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: And they
22 might be 40 years old. They don't
23 look a day over 20.

24 MS. CHAPMAN: I'm sorry. I
25 just wanted to also recognize

2 Councilwoman Cindy Bass and Mayor
3 Cherelle Parker who's also a
4 member. And where's Blondell --
5 Blondell Reynolds Brown and Jannie
6 Blackwell also -- oh, there she is.

8 She's hiding.

9 MS. CHAPMAN: I see her.
10 And also, members of the
11 organization. So thank you again.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 At this time, the Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Mike Driscoll who
18 will present a resolution
19 celebrating the students and staff
20 of Lincoln High School for their
21 service in the 2024 Primary
22 Election.

23 Will the students and staff
24 of Lincoln High School please join
25 the Councilmember at the podium.

5 be Commissioner Lisa Deeley,

6 Commissioner Seth Bluestein and

7 Commissioner Omar Sabir.

8 Councilmembers joining Mike

9 Driscoll would be Councilmember

10 Squilla, Councilmember Gilmore

11 Richardson, Councilmember Brooks,

12 Councilmember Phillips,

13 Councilmember Harrity and

14 Councilmember Bass.

15 (Councilmembers and guests

16 approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Chair recognizes Councilmember Mike

19 Driscoll.

20 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Well,

21 thank you, Mr. President.

22 It's a very exciting day

23 for me to welcome the young men and

24 women from Abraham Lincoln High

25 School. I thought it was

10 keep the voting polls open and
11 running smoothly; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

13 RICHARDSON: Whereas, students at
14 Lincoln High School filled most of
15 the Election boards at the seven
16 divisions that voted at Lincoln
17 High School; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

19 Whereas, the students of Lincoln
20 High School demonstrated dedication
21 to their community and
22 understanding of the importance of
23 voting. Now, therefore be it --

24 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

25 Resolved that the Council of the

18 recognize that we have our three
19 City Commissioners right here with
20 us today that took time out of
21 their schedule because they
22 recognize how important the work
23 you did that day, and they're the
24 leaders that are going to go into
25 what might be the most important

3 November.

4 And so, we're counting on
5 the three Commissioners behind me
6 to get it right like they always

13 my campaign chair Nick Custodio,
14 who after we won said we have to go
15 around the country and see how
16 other people are doing things. We
17 went to Chicago and we saw this
18 student poll worker program in
19 action, and I knew that we had to
20 do that in Philadelphia.

21 My former staff member
22 Rodonna, who set the groundwork for
23 this program and recognizing Nate
24 McCoy who's on my current staff who
25 really took it to the next level

2 before we handed it off to the
3 department in this election.

4 A special shout-out to
5 Sarah Caswell.

6 (Applause.)

7 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: She
8 is a force of nature and she has
9 made it her mission to help us
10 coordinate these students at
11 Lincoln High School for election
12 day. We do this program. It's
13 citywide. We have a great
14 partnership with a lot of the
15 schools.

16 I'd like to thank the
17 Chairman again for letting me have
18 this time to speak. And I invite
19 each of you, our Councilmembers.
20 We're happy to come out to high
21 schools in your District. We
22 already do see a lot of you at your
23 high schools, but we want to get in
24 each and every one of them.

25 As has been mentioned, we

18 these spaces accessible and to
19 engage kids in the civic process,
20 it's really important that you
21 engage kids in high school and that
22 you get into those schools and that
23 you meet them and that you make it
24 accessible to them and make them
25 feel like there's a place for them.

10 in our prisons in the City of
11 Philadelphia and the incredible job
12 they do to try to correct the
13 pathways of incarcerated
14 individuals.

15 And we have from District
16 Council 33 here, would you please
17 rise. Let's give them a welcome.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: And, Mr
20 President, thank you for your
21 indulgence.

22 The second one recognizes
23 that there are over 18,000 events
24 in the City of Philadelphia that
25 does not include block parties and

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 The ayes have it. The motion

9 carries.

10 Bill Nos. 240220 and 240281

11 will be placed on our First Reading

12 Calendar for today.

13 The next order of business

14 is the consideration of the

15 Calendar. I note that the bills

16 just reported from committee with

17 the suspension of rules have been

18 deemed to have had a first reading.

19 These bills will be placed on the

20 Second Reading and Final Passage

21 Calendar for the next session of

22 Council.

23 As there are no additional

24 bills on the First Reading

25 Calendar, the Chair recognizes

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you, Council President.

9 The following bills and

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 Thank you very much, Majority

22 Leader Gilmore Richardson.

23 Before considering these

24 bills and resolutions, we will

25 consider public comment as

2 follows -- the Chair recognizes

3 Councilmember Cindy Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank
5 you, Mr. President.

6 My apologies but I have to
7 leave Council chambers, but I would
8 like to be recorded as voting aye
9 on all bills and resolutions.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

11 Leave is granted and your vote is
12 recorded. Thank you very much.

13 Before considering public
14 comment, your public comment must
15 concern matters on the Second
16 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
17 for possible action at today's
18 Council session. All speakers must
19 sign up in order to testify. If
20 you have not already signed up for
21 today's session, please do so now
22 by giving your name to Ms. Hassen
23 at the table outside the rails to
24 my left.

25 I'm just going to ask if

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 you have any sidebar conversations,
3 please take your conversations
4 outside the Council chambers. It
5 makes it difficult for me to hear
6 up here while I'm trying to go
7 through our agenda.

8 All speakers must sign up
9 in order to testify, if you have
10 not already done so as I just
11 mentioned, please see Ms. Hassen at
12 the right -- at the left outside
13 the rails. Once you have signed
14 up, you will be called in the order
15 in which your name appears on the
16 sign-up sheet.

17 Under ideal circumstances,
18 public comments each will have
19 three minutes to speak. However,
20 due to our lengthy, very lengthy
21 agenda for the day, the time limit
22 will be 2 minutes. In order to be
23 fair to all those wishing to speak,
24 I intend to hold faithfully to the
25 two-minute limit. When you begin

3 on the podium.

4 When there are 30 seconds
5 remaining to your time, the light

15 I also reserve the right
16 pursuant to our rules of Council to
17 limit repetitious comments on the
18 same subject matter. I would now
19 like to ask the Chief Clerk to
20 please read the title of our first
21 speaker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Reverend
23 Kevin Haynesworth. Can Patricia
24 Ford, Sharif El-Mekki and Ryan
25 Gittler-Munez also make their way

2 to the podium. Reverend Kevin

3 Haynesworth, Patricia Ford, Sharif

4 El-Mekki, Ryan Gittler-Munez,

5 Destineh Kelly, Charles Black, Paul

7 (Witnesses approached

8 podium.)

9 REVEREND HAYNESWORTH: Good

10 morning, City Council. Thank you

11 for the privilege of being here

12 with you today. I come to speak on

13 behalf of our late Pastor of Christ

14 Community Baptist Church, Reverend

15 Dr. Arthur R. White. We come to

16 ask the Council to approve the

17 renaming of 41st and Parkside in

18 the name of Reverend Dr. Arthur R.

19 White, who served faithfully as

20 pastor of Christ Community Baptist

21 Church from 1981 to year 2000.

22 Pastor White was a faithful

23 servant of the community. He

24 worked with the late Lucien

25 Blackwell, and we thank God Sister

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Jannie Blackwell is here this
3 morning. We worked with John
4 White, Sr., John White Jr., and
5 many of the Councilmembers as well
6 as civic and association leaders.

7 Pastor White was faithful
8 in the East Parkside community for
9 nearly 40 years, not just as Pastor
10 of Christ Community but as a
11 servant of the East Parkside and
12 Mantua community.

13 He Faithfully led an anti-
14 HIV and AIDS march every year
15 throughout East Parkside and Mantua
16 at a time when the 19104 area code
17 was the highest HIV contact area.

18 Pastor White was very dedicated to
19 the community, dedicated to uplift
20 the citizens of the community and a
21 faithful member of the community.

22 And we ask that City Council would
23 approve the resolution to rename
24 41st and Parkside in the name and
25 in the memory of Reverend

2 Dr. Arthur R. White, servant of the
3 community. Thank you very much.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Patricia
6 Ford, Sharif El-Mekki, Ryan
7 Gittler-Munez.

8 MR. EL-MEKKI: Good
9 morning. Thank you, City Council,
10 City Council President, especially
11 Councilmember Rue Landau and our
12 community liaison Tamir Harper for
13 extending the invitation to speak
14 on the day the City of Philadelphia
15 declares May 9, 2024 as Black
16 Teacher Appreciation Day. My name
17 is Sharif El-Mekki. I'm the
18 founder of the Center for Black
19 Educator Development. Our mission
20 is to rebuild our Black teacher
21 pipeline.

22 To show our appreciation to
23 Black teachers, we have a very
24 simple, powerful message to the
25 City, state and nation and, that

2 is, what our students told us, we
3 need Black teachers. But why do we
4 need Black teachers? Because Black
5 teachers save Black students'
6 lives. They expect to help Black
7 students to achieve.

8 They don't overpenalize
9 Black students. They reflect the
10 world of possibilities for Black
11 students. They also reflect a more
12 just society. They counter racism,
13 promote cross-cultural
14 understanding and prepare all
15 students for a complex world. We
16 know Black teachers are good for
17 all students as well as our school
18 system.

19 We know these things to be
20 true, but you know what is false
21 despite what some may claim, that
22 young Black high school and college
23 students do not want to teach,
24 because they do. A few months ago
25 when the Center for Black Educator

2 Development put out our yearly call
3 for Black high school and college
4 youth to serve as our teacher
5 apprentices this summer during
6 Freedom schools, over 300 signed up
7 to work this summer teaching 1st,
8 2nd and 3rd graders. We have too
9 many applicants for our spots.

10 But without our ability to
11 expand our program, we are faced
12 with a nonsensical reality, to turn
13 away highly-qualified and highly-
14 motivated Black high school and
15 college youth who are saying we
16 want to become Black teachers.
17 This includes nearly 100 young
18 Black men who are interested in
19 exploring teaching through a
20 program that has proven its ability
21 to convert their interest into
22 actionable future teachers.

23 City Council, this keeps me
24 up at night and it should keep you
25 up as well. Leaders of

2 Philadelphia, we lost 1200 Black
3 teachers in the City between 2000
4 and 2020, and we need to double the
5 number of Black teachers in Philly
6 to match the number of Black
7 students in our public schools and
8 quadruple the number of Black men
9 teachers to reach parity for Black
10 boys.

11 Shout out to Councilmember
12 Isaiah Thomas for leading the
13 charge to recognize October as
14 Black Male Educator Month. And I
15 want to thank City Council for
16 recognizing this. And as Marian
17 Wright Edelman said, it is harder
18 to be what you can't see. Let's
19 make sure that our students can see
20 us. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. FORD: Good morning.
23 My name is Patricia Ford. And I am
24 here to speak on the resolution of
25 Child Care Appreciation. I wanted

2 to speak because child care is the
3 first thing that most babies see as
4 opposed when they're going to --
5 before they attend actually their
6 education.

7 And the child care worker
8 is the first one to nourish your
9 child, to teach your child about
10 kindness, about camaraderie, about
11 sharing and all of those things
12 seems to get lost in between 6
13 years old and when they start 2nd
14 and 3rd grade.

15 I think it's very important
16 for child care workers to be
17 appreciated just as teachers are
18 because they are teachers. Thank
19 you very much.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 You're welcome.

23 MR. GITTLER-MUNEZ: My name
24 is Ryan Gittler-Munez, and I'm an
25 environmental justice organizer at

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the Public Interest Law Center
3 testifying in support of Resolution
4 240386 appointing Jennifer
5 Greenberg to the board of the
6 Philadelphia Land Bank.

7 The Public Interest Law
8 Center uses high impact legal
9 strategies to advance the civil,
10 social and economic rights of
11 communities in the Philadelphia
12 region, facing discrimination,
13 inequality and poverty. We are
14 also the only organization in
15 Philadelphia that offers pro bono
16 legal representation and organizing
17 to urban farmers and gardeners
18 through our Garden Justice Legal
19 Initiative.

20 We are proud to call Jenny
21 Greenberg a critical partner in our
22 work to preserve Philadelphia
23 community green space, and we
24 commend Council President Johnson
25 for putting forward an appointee

2 for the Land Bank Board with a
3 demonstrated commitment to
4 supporting urban agriculture.

5 Jenny leads Neighborhood
6 Gardens Trust, the largest
7 nonprofit Land Trust focused on
8 securing, protecting and supporting
9 community gardens and community-
10 managed spaces in Philadelphia.

11 NGT has preserved 53
12 community gardens, an incredible
13 accomplishment given that there are
14 roughly 450 growing spaces in the
15 City according to the Philadelphia
16 Urban Agriculture Plan. At the Law
17 Center we work closely with Jenny
18 and NGT on a host of land policy
19 issues over the past 10 years,
20 including a stormwater fee
21 exemption for gardens and
22 improvements to the Land Bank's
23 green space policies.

24 Through her work with NGT
25 as well as personal relationships

2 developed from working alongside
3 many of the City's community
4 gardeners, Jenny has firsthand
5 experience of the opportunities and
6 challenges that exist today for
7 nonprofits and community members
8 trying to work with the Land Bank
9 and with a background in urban
10 planning, she also understands the
11 importance of balancing new
12 development and green space to
13 foster healthy livable
14 neighborhoods.

15 I want to close with a
16 highlight from yesterday's urban
17 agriculture hearing where over 100
18 gardeners and advocates packed this
19 chamber. When Jenny was called up
20 to testify and Councilmembers
21 Gauthier and Brooks congratulated
22 her on her pending Board
23 appointment, the room erupted in
24 applause. It's obvious that the
25 urban agriculture community

2 supports Jenny's nomination to the
3 Land Bank Board. She is a trusted
4 advocate for community gardeners
5 and has a successful track record
6 of preserving gardens and green
7 spaces.

8 Her deep understanding of
9 the complexity of assembling and
10 preserving land will make her an
11 asset to the Board and further our
12 collective efforts to shape a
13 cleaner, greener and safer city.
14 The Law Center urges City Council
15 to swiftly approve her appointment
16 to the Land Bank Board. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Destineh
19 Kelly, Charles Black and then Paul
20 Birdsong.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 podium.)

23 MS. KELLY: Good morning.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
25 Good morning.

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MS. KELLY: My name is
3 Destineh Kelly. On behalf of
4 O'Shae Sibley, our family would
5 like to say thank you for
6 recognizing and honoring his life.
7 That's all. Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Charles
12 Black, Paul Birdsong. May Sharon
13 Neilson, Laverne Cheeseboro and
14 Makayla Myers also make their way
15 to the podium.

16 (Witnesses approached
17 podium.)

18 MR. BLACK: President
19 Johnson and Council, my name is
20 Charles Black. I live in Center
21 City. I'm a person with a speech
22 impediment and I am here to speak
23 in favor of Councilwoman Ahmad's
24 resolution on TEDx. This weekend
25 12 amazing people will present

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 their TEDx talks, which are local
3 versions of the global TED talks.

4 There has been some
5 confusion about this being in a
6 park, but this is just what TEDx
7 says, our event will take place at
8 City Winery in (inaudible). I ask
9 your support of this as this
10 conference is putting Philly back
11 on the global TEDx platform. We
12 have sold out our conference and we
13 have people coming from Chicago,
14 North Carolina and many other
15 places who are staying in City
16 hotels, spending their money here
17 and are seeing all that Philly has
18 to offer.

19 This is the first year of
20 our event but we'll keep growing
21 and making a great event. I would
22 like to thank Councilmember Ahmad
23 for this resolution, the Majority
24 Leader for proposing it and for
25 your support of TEDx. Thank you.

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (Applause.)

3 CHIEF CLERK: Paul

4 Birdsong, Sharon Neilson, Laverne
5 Cheeseboro and then Makayla Myers.

6 MS. BIRDSONG: So since
7 we're doing honorable mentions
8 today, I want to mention the
9 original Panther Party, the Los
10 Angeles chapter that we're under.
11 So I want to mention Comrades
12 General Aubron, General Degon,
13 Field Marshal Masego, General K&G
14 Chief Rumir and Musa. I want to
15 mention them because those are
16 honorable revolutionaries that are
17 actually in the community fighting
18 for the defense of the Black man,
19 woman and child and are willing to
20 see about that by any means
21 necessary.

22 I also want to mention the
23 brothers and sisters that are
24 behind me that are from the streets
25 of Philadelphia that live there

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 every day and that are affected by
3 the rules and policies that are
4 decided upon right here right now.

5 I want to say on behalf of
6 everybody here that we feel spit in
7 the face. The reason we feel spit
8 in the face is because we sitting
9 in here and kumbaya --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
11 Paul. Excuse me, Paul --

12 MR. BIRDSONG: We talking
13 about naming streets --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Paul, just quick. I'm just asking
16 you to stick to the legislation.

17 MR. BIRDSONG: I'm about
18 to. Let me finish.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 Okay.

21 MR. BIRDSONG: 4100
22 Parkside Avenue, y'all want to
23 rename that but that's within the
24 mile of the Clara Muhammad
25 shooting. That's within two miles

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 of 53rd and Chancellor where three
3 people were shot and you don't know
4 who did it yet. That's within 2
5 miles of 50th and Osage.

6 All these shootings
7 happened there within a couple
8 weeks and nothing has been done
9 except with the 53rd and Chancellor
10 one and the 50th and Osage, but we
11 worried about renaming streets.
12 That's not what the people -- these
13 people live in that community.
14 They're not concerned about you
15 renaming the street. They're
16 concerned about it being safe for
17 their children.

18 They're concerned about you
19 getting that forensics lab together
20 so that you can solve the crimes
21 because these people done lost
22 people and they don't know who
23 killed their people because you
24 don't got a -- you got an obsolete
25 police force, right. So I heard

2 you interrupt me, right.

3 I'm interrupting all of

4 y'all got going on to say that

5 these people need justice. These

6 people need closure. These people

7 need safety. We don't care about

8 no street names. We care about

9 being safe. That's what we care

10 about. Give us a forensics lab

11 that can actually solve crimes.

12 Give us a force of people from our

13 community that can actually deal

14 with us.

15 Give us officers that are

16 trained to deal with people with

17 mental issues instead of slamming

18 them or shooting them. Give us

19 that. Otherwise we don't want to

20 hear it because when we hear

21 everything but what we are

22 concerned about and we vote for

23 y'all, we call bullshit. All power

24 to the people.

25 (All the power to the

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 people.)

3 MR. BIRDSONG: Only the

4 people.

5 (Only the people.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 With all due respect, good brother,

8 right, just respect the chamber.

9 You can talk to me when we get

10 finished, but all we asking is

11 democracy. Just respect the

12 chamber. That's all.

13 MR. BIRDSONG: Democracy is

14 free speech.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

16 That's all. That's all I'm saying,

17 good brother. But thank you.

18 MR. BIRDSONG: Okay. Well,

19 we just spoke. You want to talk

20 about respect. Talk about how your

21 man's over there, when we came up

22 to the school, he tried to stop us

23 from coming in and reached out and

24 almost grabbed the sister's breast.

25 And when I told him to back up, he

2 want to have a little argument with
3 me, right. So we talking about
4 respect, get your people's.

5 Where'd he go --

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 We'll address it, Paul, but thank
8 you. We'll address it. Thank you,
9 Paul.

10 Will the Clerk please read
11 the title of the next person
12 please.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Sharon
14 Neilsen and Laverne Cheeseboro and
15 Makayla Myers. Laverne Cheeseboro,
16 Michaela Myers --

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
18 Welcome, Sharon. Please begin your
19 testimony.

20 MS. CHEESEBORO: Thank you.
21 Thank you, City Councilmembers
22 Brooks and Landau, for presenting
23 the Child Care Awareness resolution
24 and thank the other Councilmembers.
25 I want to say a special shout-out

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to one of my partners in advocating
3 and elevating the voices of
4 Philadelphia's children and
5 families, the Honorable City
6 Council President Johnson formerly
7 known as State Rep. Johnson.

8 As my colleagues would
9 state, child care is an essential
10 service. But not only in the
11 support of Philadelphia's Working
12 Force, we are also our early care
13 and education facilities or
14 services. We support families in
15 their need for self-sufficiency.
16 We partner with families to help
17 them remove barriers that will
18 hinder their child's future
19 success.

20 Child care is the only
21 setting that I know that helps
22 eliminate tomorrow's problems
23 today. Studies after studies have
24 proven that quality early care and
25 learning impacts families

2 dependency on social services,
3 decreases or eliminates early
4 intervention services needed in
5 kindergarten, decreases teen
6 pregnancy, high school Dropout
7 rates, unemployment or
8 underemployment and crime rates,
9 but we need more.

10 We need pay equity so that
11 child care teachers with similar
12 credentials and experience are paid
13 the same salary and benefits as
14 their K through 12 colleagues. We
15 need an equitable reimbursement
16 rate for care that actually covers
17 the total cost of child care, and
18 those rates should be based on the
19 child and not based on the child's
20 setting, whether they're receiving
21 quality care in a home, group or
22 center.

23 Support for Children and
24 experiencing trauma due to the
25 challenging behaviors or due to

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 COVID and those who need early
3 intervention services, we need a
4 clear consistent and accessible
5 path for getting services. And
6 finally, while we are proud on this
7 historic journey with the first
8 woman Mayor, let's pledge to make a
9 few more historical
10 accomplishments.

11 We need to give families
12 direct access to early care and
13 learning opportunities that will
14 support them in reaching their
15 fullest potential by proclaiming
16 early childhood education and human
17 rights for every child in
18 Philadelphia.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Laverne
21 Cheeseboro.

22 (Witnesses approached
23 podium.)

24 MS. CHEESEBORO: Greetings,
25 Councilmember President Kenyatta

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Johnson, Councilmembers and
3 Councilmember Larsandu(ph). Can
4 you hear me -- okay. Thank you for
5 your acknowledgement and resolution
6 on this day. I am the owner of
7 Heavenly Made Creations in
8 Southwest Philadelphia. I am the
9 director, the teacher, cook, nurse,
10 nurturer, janitor and all things
11 child care. We are understanding
12 the priority and sense of urgency
13 on the major matters of this City.
14 We must remember child care.

15 As early childhood
16 educators, we are the first
17 responders of children from birth
18 to 5 and remain a part of the
19 village in our communities. The
20 service we provide is very unique
21 and not a one-size-fits-all. A
22 work day for us would not succeed
23 without child care for anybody in
24 here. In addition to remembering
25 us on Teacher Appreciation Week,

2 when mentioning K to 12, please
3 remember early childhood education.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Next I want to call up Executive
7 Director of the Mayor's Office of
8 Youth Engagement and hailing from
9 South Philadelphia. I want to
10 start off first with Ms. Shania
11 Bennett.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. BENNETT: Good morning,
14 everyone. My name is Shania
15 Bennett. I'm Executive Director of
16 the Mayor's Office of Youth
17 Engagement, and I'm glad to testify
18 before Council today supporting
19 Councilmember Thomas' resolution
20 recognizing Youth Apprenticeship
21 Week.

22 Too often our young people
23 are not included in the
24 conversation around economic
25 activity, but when Mayor Parker

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 says economic opportunity for all,
3 she means young people will be
4 included in that.

5 You don't even have to take
6 my word for it. Look at the new
7 City College for Municipal
8 Employment in partnership with the
9 Community College of Philadelphia.
10 Mayor Parker knows that employment
11 with the City of Philadelphia can
12 set an individual up for a lifetime
13 of economic stability, and that's
14 what the Mayor Parker's
15 Administration is all about.

16 I will also like to
17 highlight the apprenticeship
18 programs that are happening right
19 here in the City of Philadelphia,
20 the Philadelphia Water Department
21 has placed 73 percent of its
22 apprenticeship participants into
23 permanent civil service
24 opportunities as well as nine
25 individuals from the Department of

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Fleet Services will land permanent
3 civil service opportunities for
4 their futures and future
5 opportunities for them to have
6 substantial opportunities moving
7 forward.

8 These apprenticeships will
9 change these apprentices' lives and
10 that's what Mayor Parker's
11 Administration is all about, in
12 which Mayor Parker is committed to
13 with the Office of Youth Engagement
14 and labor unions and other
15 apprenticeship organizations that
16 offer pre-apprenticeships and
17 apprenticeship opportunities for
18 workforce development.

19 So again, I just want to
20 thank you for allowing me to
21 testify. I have my youth
22 commissioners here. You'll hear
23 from them and other young people.
24 And we just want to say thank you
25 for allowing and recognizing

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Thank you.

7 MS. MYERS: Good morning,

8 Council and my fellow

9 Philadelphians. My name is Makayla

10 Myers, and I'm a member of the

11 Philadelphia Youth Commission. I

12 am testifying on Majority Whip

13 Isaiah Thomas' resolution

14 recognizing Youth Apprenticeship

15 Week.

16 Thank you, Councilmember

17 Thomas, for sponsoring this

18 legislation and thank you for

19 recognizing the important role

20 apprenticeships play in ushering

21 young people across this City into

22 economic stability. Youth

23 apprenticeships give young people

24 the skills they need to grow into

25 productive, financially stable

2 adults.

3 When you give people
4 pathways to economic opportunity
5 early in their lives, it sets them
6 on the school-to-paycheck pipeline,
7 as Councilmember Jones would say.
8 Too often young people are depicted
9 as agents of chaos and disorder,
10 but it doesn't have to be that way.
11 I believe the people in this
12 building under the leadership of
13 Council President Johnson and Mayor
14 Parker can pave the way for a
15 better quality of life for all
16 Philadelphians, especially as young
17 Philadelphians. And it starts with
18 ensuring we have the skills to
19 thrive in this increasingly
20 competitive job market, which is
21 why youth apprenticeship is so
22 vital.

23 So thank you again,
24 Councilmember Thomas, for
25 celebrating Youth Apprenticeship

2 Week and thank you for the
3 opportunity to testify today. I do
4 want to make a reminder that we've
5 seen so many young brilliant minds
6 come through these chambers, and I
7 want you guys to think about that
8 when Final Passage comes along.
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. BOONE: Hey, how you
12 doing. My name is P. Michael
13 Boone. And I just want to thank
14 Council President Johnson for
15 allowing Joseph to speak and also
16 Councilmembers Thomas and Gilmore
17 Richardson. Thank you so much.
18 And here's Joseph Taylor.

19 MR. TAYLOR: Hello. My
20 name is Joseph. I'm 10 years old
21 and I'm representing the Junior
22 Barber Academy. Since I've been --
23 since I've been cutting hair, I've
24 been feeling good and I like
25 cutting hair because you would

2 never know what somebody going
3 through and stuff. And I feel like
4 if I cut hair and give them a good
5 haircut, I can change their day.

6 And also, since I've been
7 in the Junior Barber Academy, I've
8 been gaining new friends and new

10 membership.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 I think we're going to declare
14 today City Council Youth Day. So
15 that's what it's about.

16 Will the Clerk please call
17 the next person please.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Anton Moore.

19 Can Talyla Kent, Alia Reed and
20 Andreina Perez Hein also make their
21 way to the podium. Anton Moore.

22 (No response.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Talyla Kent.

24 (Witnesses approached
25 podium.)

2 MS. KENT: Thank you. Good
3 afternoon, everyone. My name is
4 Talyla Kent and I'll be speaking on
5 behalf of the Youth Apprenticeship
6 Week. I just want to talk from a
7 more personal standpoint of someone
8 who has been in the
9 pre-apprenticeship program and who
10 is now an apprentice.

11 I want to start by thanking
12 Council President Johnson for the
13 opportunity to speak, and thank
14 you, Councilmembers Thomas and
15 Gilmore Richardson, for introducing
16 the resolution. Youth
17 Apprenticeship Week is designed to
18 increase awareness of registered
19 apprenticeship programs and to
20 highlight the benefits of
21 apprenticeships as a career path.

22 For me personally, I know
23 that I came out of high school
24 thinking that college was the only
25 route because I was not told about

2 the options that I had as a student
3 who didn't really want to go to
4 college. And now, after being
5 thousands of dollars in debt, after
6 only doing about two and a half to
7 three years of college, I was able
8 to attend and graduate from the
9 Sammy Stanten and Senior
10 Pre-apprenticeship Program created
11 by Sammy Stanten, Jr. And now, I
12 am proud to be an apprentice of the
13 IBEW Local 98.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. KENT: Thank you. And
16 I did all of that with no prior
17 construction experience, no long
18 years of schooling and no college
19 diploma. And I know for a fact
20 that I'm getting a unique
21 opportunity to make more than I
22 would have if I had finished
23 college with the major that I plan
24 to pursue. And as someone else
25 said, these students are our

2 future. And I hope that they get
3 the opportunity to say that they
4 were told about all of their
5 options and say that they were able
6 to make a career for themselves
7 without a college diploma and
8 without going into debt. Thank
9 you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Alia Reed,
12 Andreina Perez Hein and Monica
13 Robinson.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 You can begin.

18 MS. REED: Hello. Good
19 morning. My name is Alia Reed and
20 I am here speaking on Youth
21 Apprenticeship Week. First, I want
22 to thank Council President Johnson
23 for the opportunity to speak and a
24 thank you to Councilmembers Gilmore
25 Richardson and Thomas for

2 introducing the resolution.

3 It's an astounding

4 privilege that I stand in this room

5 today. I am here in front of you

6 all because of WINC. What is WINC,

7 Women in Nontraditional Careers.

8 It is a pre-apprenticeship program

9 that will guide you through the

10 basic requirements to gain entry

11 into an apprenticeship of your

12 choice.

13 As a graduate of WINC and a

14 minority, I am comfortable and

15 confident to walk into any union

16 hall and deposit an application for

17 entry. This is a glass-breaker for

18 me, my son and the other 26 women

19 who graduated with me. The

20 potential opportunities that are

21 available to me and others like me

22 through apprenticeships is

23 potentially life-altering. And I

24 want to thank you for having those

25 programs around to change lives,

2 not just of mine but of my son and
3 the women who graduated with me.
4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 Thank you.

8 MS. PEREZ HEIN: Good
9 morning. My name is Andreina Perez
10 Hein and I am speaking in support
11 of Councilmembers Thomas and
12 Gilmore Richardson's resolution
13 recognizing Youth Apprenticeship
14 Week in Philadelphia. Thank you to
15 the Councilmembers for introducing
16 this resolution and to Council
17 President Johnson for the
18 opportunity to speak here once
19 again.

20 I speak before you as a
21 resident of the 2nd District of
22 Philadelphia as the Executive
23 Director of the nonprofit Everybody
24 Builds, but most importantly as a
25 mother. Today I am joined by my

2 7-year-old daughter Annabelle and
3 my 6-year-old daughter Lola who are
4 young Philadelphians. They are 1st
5 grade and kindergarten students at
6 Southwark School's Two-Way Spanish
7 English Immersion Program, a hidden
8 gem in our Philadelphia public
9 school system, and we assume this
10 counts as an excused absence.

11 You may recognize them from
12 the Carpenters MLK Day of Service
13 or the NAWIC Block Kids
14 Competition. I make it a point to
15 expose them to experiences like
16 these because my own exposure to
17 the construction industry at a
18 young age is what put me on the
19 path to where I am today.

20 Annabelle and Lola love to
21 hear about what I do at work and
22 are always asking why I work so
23 much. So I brought them here today
24 so they could see for themselves
25 and they could hear the passion,

2 commitment and support our City's
3 leaders, citizens and their own mom
4 have for supporting youth like
5 them, the future of our City and
6 our workforce.

7 The economic growth of
8 Philadelphia will be driven by
9 expanding opportunities for our
10 young people. This is even more
11 crucial when thinking about our
12 historically underserved
13 communities. Providing youth with
14 meaningful engagement and
15 structured activities and programs
16 such as apprenticeship coupled with
17 positive inspiring role models is a
18 pillar for violence prevention.

19 Youth apprenticeship
20 programs play a pivotal role in
21 guiding our children away from the
22 streets and towards pathways into
23 skilled careers and lifelong
24 success. These programs are
25 critical in the construction

2 industry for helping to build the
3 next generation of skilled
4 workforce in the trades. This is
5 why Everybody Builds is proud to
6 support union building trades
7 apprenticeship and
8 pre-apprenticeship programs like
9 CARP, Rosie's Girls, Sam Staten,
10 YDC's CAP and MyWIC.

11 Together programs like
12 these working in partnership with
13 our City government, CTE schools
14 and labor unions play a critical
15 role in advancing youth into
16 construction careers and building
17 the next generation of skilled
18 trades workforce, but it takes a
19 village.

20 We all need to come
21 together to support, encourage and
22 celebrate our youth and youth
23 apprenticeship programs. Thank you
24 to our City Councilmembers for
25 commemorating the importance of

2 Youth apprenticeship week for our
3 city. On behalf of Annabelle and
4 Lola, they thank you for the future
5 career opportunities they will have
6 through youth apprenticeship and
7 pre-apprenticeship programs.

8 MS. L. PEREZ HEIN:

9 Gracias.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you very much.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Monica
14 Robinson. May Marilyn Pitt, Regina
15 Brown and Nadira Griffin also make
16 their way to the podium.

17 (Witnesses approached
18 podium.)

19 MS. ROBINSON: Good
20 morning.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 Good morning.

23 MS. ROBINSON: My name is
24 Monica Robinson and I'm also
25 speaking in favor of the resolution

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 for Youth Apprenticeship Week. I
3 know I can't say much more than
4 what's already been said, but I do
5 want to thank you, Council
6 President, for allowing us all to
7 speak today. And I want to thank
8 you Councilmembers Thomas and
9 Gilmore Richardson for
10 co-sponsoring this resolution.

11 I currently serve as the
12 Director of Community Engagement at
13 the Philadelphia AFL-CIO. Now we
14 are a federation of over 100 unions
15 in the building and construction
16 trades, public and private sector
17 industries in Philadelphia. We
18 fight for social and economic
19 justice.

20 The inaugural Youth
21 Apprenticeship Week celebrated May
22 5th through the 11th supports our
23 fight by increasing awareness of
24 registered apprenticeship programs
25 among youth, parents, educators and

2 many more. Registered
3 apprenticeship programs provide a
4 pathway to good-paying, family-
5 sustaining careers which allow
6 apprentices to earn while they
7 learn.

8 We all know that youth are
9 the present and future of our
10 workforce. We also know that
11 Philadelphia is the biggest,
12 poorest city in the nation. We
13 must be intentional and ensure
14 youth and young adults, especially
15 those who have been historically
16 underserved and marginalized, have
17 access to opportunities in
18 registered apprenticeship programs.
19 Thank you.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Marilyn Pitt.

22 MS. PITT: Good morning.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Good morning.

25 MS. PITT: My name is

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Marilyn Pitt and I've lived in
3 Councilman Young's District for the
4 last 53 years. Prior to my
5 retirement, I worked as a reading
6 specialist in Philadelphia for 40
7 years and after retirement I
8 volunteered as a reading tutor at
9 Hackett Elementary School in
10 Kensington, my local school.
11 I'm here to testify on Bill
12 240369, which asks the Council --
13 which asks the City Controller to
14 conduct a permanent audit of the
15 funds distributed in Kensington.
16 As a longtime neighbor in this
17 area, I'm invested in making sure
18 the kids in Kensington succeed. I
19 believe the best way for City
20 Council to ensure quality education
21 for kids in Kensington and for
22 every child in Philadelphia is to
23 increase the share of property
24 taxes going to the School District,
25 providing the schools with \$100

2 million of recurring local revenue.

3 The District is currently

4 underfunded by \$1.4 million. The

5 City's share of funding for the

6 schools is \$100 million below the

7 funding levels in 2008. We

8 desperately need increases in

9 funding that would allow the

10 District to lower class size below

11 the current ratio of 1 teacher for

12 30 students in kindergarten through

13 3rd grade classrooms, especially

14 since this is the critical period

15 when children are learning to read.

16 The School District is

17 scheduled to launch a new reading

18 curriculum this fall. The

19 curriculum is based on science of

20 reading principles that have had

21 dramatic reading gains in other

22 urban districts, but a new high-

23 quality curriculum is not enough.

24 We need smaller class sizes and we

25 need teacher training and coaching

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 along with the books and the
3 materials the curriculum requires.
4 Most of all we don't want to be in
5 the position of providing yet
6 another inadequately-funded and
7 poorly-implemented reading program
8 in the Philadelphia schools.

9 If we do this, we are
10 dooming our children to continue to
11 fail in the acquisition of
12 foundational reading skills.
13 That's why I'm here today asking
14 Council to invest \$100 million in
15 our School District. Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Regina Brown,
17 Nadira Griffin and Jeremy
18 Blatstein.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MS. BROWN: Good morning,
22 City Council.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
24 Good morning.

25 MS. BROWN: My name is

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Regina Brown. I'm a mother of 13
3 children. I live in the West
4 Philadelphia area. I'm here to
5 testify on Bill 240369, which asks
6 the City Controller to conduct a
7 performance audit of the
8 escalations --

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
10 Regina, just one second.

11 Sergeant-at-Arms, please
12 close the door.

13 Ms. Regina, you can
14 proceed.

15 MS. BROWN: Of the funding
16 distributed to the Kensington area.
17 This bill is intended to make sure
18 the families in the Kensington
19 neighborhood have the resources to
20 thrive. Councilmembers, please
21 look at the flyer on your desk.
22 Now is the time. I want to remind
23 City Council that one way to help
24 families thrive is by expanding PHL
25 PreK by 250 seats in this year's

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 budget.

3 As you can see, 58 percent
4 of kids of Philadelphia are not in
5 PreK. 45 percent of the kids in
6 District 7, which includes
7 Kensington, are not in PreK. That
8 means 58 percent of the kids in
9 Philadelphia and 45 percent of kids
10 in District 7 are not getting the
11 resources that my kids have
12 experienced.

13 All of my kids have gone
14 through the PHLpreK and I cannot
15 tell you the level of support that
16 I have received because of it. My
17 5 and 6-year-old are my most recent
18 PHLpreK students. My 6-year-old is
19 going into 1st grade this year.
20 Because of PHLpreK, I have more
21 confidence that they are prepared
22 for school.

23 Both my 5 and 6-year-olds
24 were diagnosed with learning
25 disabilities. Because they were

2 enrolled in PHLpreK, both of my
3 children are able to get the
4 services they need to make sure
5 they're not falling behind. They
6 received speech and occupational
7 therapy.

8 For my rising 1st grader,
9 PHLpreK helped him develop good
10 social and emotional skills. He's
11 able to play with age-appropriate
12 toys. He's able to play with his
13 peers. He's able to communicate
14 his needs and wants better. He's
15 able to retain information. The
16 PHLpreK team is able to set goals
17 for him and work with him until he
18 reaches these goals.

19 In fact, they don't just
20 work with him. They work with the
21 whole family so that we are able to
22 support him as well. This year
23 when he enters a new school I know
24 that he is more prepared. I feel
25 more confident because I have

2 already gotten support through

3 PHLpreK and I'm confident he's

4 better able to get continued

5 support in 1st grade.

6 PHLpreK has been an

7 invaluable resource to me and my

8 children. This is why I wanted to

9 share my experience with you. City

10 Council, when you're thinking of

11 ways to support families in

12 neighborhoods like Kensington and

13 across the City, please think of

14 investing in early child education.

15 Expand PHLpreK by 250 seats in this

16 year's budget. Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Nadira

21 Griffin, Jeremy Blatstein, then

22 Ogbonna Hagins.

23 (Witnesses approached

24 podium.)

25 MS. GRIFFIN: Good morning,

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Councilmen and women. My name is
3 Nadira Griffin. I am the
4 Philadelphia's community ambassador
5 for all 10 District City Council
6 Districts. I am here on behalf
7 speaking on the Resolutions 240386,
8 240387, 240388, 240389, 240390. I
9 am in support of the bills -- of
10 the resolution, and I want to thank
11 Councilman -- all of you for the
12 courageous job that you are doing.
13 This is a difficult job to
14 represent the people, so I thank
15 you for that.

16 But what I'm also
17 advocating as well as the community
18 is that I be appointed one of the
19 Board of Directors for the Land
20 Bank. We need someone in the
21 community that's appointed on that
22 board to make sure that we advocate
23 for the people, and not a person
24 that is elected or appointed by
25 Council or any other party. So we

2 are advocating for that.

3 As a former teacher of the
4 Philadelphia School District, as a
5 product and graduate of a
6 vocational technical high school of
7 the School District of
8 Philadelphia, we're advocating that
9 no more land is distributed or
10 built until we start building
11 schools for our children. The
12 School District of Philadelphia has
13 schools that are dusty, dingy,
14 dull, dilapidated and we need to
15 redirect this. We need to -- we're
16 in desperate disrepair, so this is
17 beyond -- the schools are beyond a
18 band-aid. We need surgery.

19 So we're advocating that we
20 start building schools where our
21 children can thrive, where our
22 children can go there, feel safe
23 and to focus. We have trash around
24 our schools. We need to clean the
25 schools and the trash up around our

2 schools because this creates mental
3 health issues.

4 When we go to our schools
5 and we see the condition that they
6 are in, we want justice, inclusion
7 and equality in our urban schools.
8 We need to build schools that have
9 STEM, classes and trade programs in
10 our schools. So we need new
11 buildings that's bright so our
12 children can go there and feel good
13 about themselves, and that will
14 stop the pipeline to prison when we
15 have quality education for our
16 children. Thank you. And we can
17 do more and we will do more. And
18 I'm asking Council, all 17 of you,
19 when will you do more.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
21 Blatstein, Ogbonna Hagins and then
22 Faheem Alexander.

23 MR. BLATSTEIN: Good
24 morning. My name is Jeremy
25 Blatstein. Raise your hand if you

2 know when the Philadelphia Land
3 Bank holds their monthly meeting.
4 You don't know? Well, over the
5 last year plenty of the current
6 Land Bank Board members didn't know
7 either, which prevented the board
8 from having quorum which prevented
9 properties from being moved out of
10 the Land Bank.

11 I mean, it's the third
12 Wednesday of every month, right?
13 Nope, just seeing who's paying
14 attention. The Philadelphia Land
15 Bank holds monthly meetings on the
16 second Tuesday of every month.
17 Each board member should block off
18 that second Tuesday to make
19 themselves available.

20 But what is the
21 Philadelphia Land Bank? The
22 Philadelphia Land Bank is a public
23 agency with the mission of
24 reactivating vacant land. It has
25 the legal authority to acquire

2 vacant land and tax-delinquent

3 properties to repurpose them.

4 The Land Bank develops land

5 disposition policies that it and

6 other City land-holding agencies

7 follow. It has a strategic plan

8 that informs future use of

9 currently vacant land. The last

10 strategic plan was done in 2019,

11 but unfortunately that plan is as

12 useful as the Mixed Income

13 Neighborhood Overlay graphics

14 produced by Land Bank Board

15 members. Not useful at all. Why?

16 Councilmanic prerogative.

17 City Council has legislated

18 a disposition policy based on each

19 individual District. That has led

20 to a broken system that is

21 inefficient, ineffective and

22 inequitable. But the Land Bank is

23 only one piece of the puzzle if

24 Philadelphia is going to accomplish

25 Mayor Parker's goal of 30,000 units

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 in her first term.

3 The process needs to be
4 streamlined. We need to hold Land
5 Bank Board members accountable. We
6 need to question their motives and
7 there needs to be a citywide
8 housing plan. Without that
9 citywide housing plan, nobody will
10 want to put the units in their
11 District. And of course, and
12 Councilmanic prerogative. Thank
13 you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Ogbonna
17 Hagins, Faheem Alexander, then Kate
18 Perez.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MR. HAGINS: Good morning.
22 Ogbonna Hagins, fourth generation
23 chattel slavery survivor. I'm
24 speaking on the appointment of
25 people to the commissions or

2 whatever it is. But I think there
3 needs to be a new commission, an
4 economic safety net commission.

5 People of emancipated
6 ancestry, American Freedmen have
7 been encouraged and left to solve
8 genocidal problems, i.e.,
9 redlining, mass incarceration,
10 poverty --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 Mr. Ogbonna Hagins, how you doing,
13 good brother.

14 MR. HAGINS: What's up,
15 man?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 The resolution is specifically
18 about the Land Bank appointments,
19 so tailor your comments --

20 MR. HAGINS: What I'm
21 saying is I'm agreeing that these
22 people are appointed, but I'm also
23 saying that there needs to be
24 something else for someone to be
25 appoint --

3 Land-related, okay. Proceed, sir.

4 MR. HAGINS: So I'm tying

5 it all in. So instead of a

6 reparative infrastructure that's

7 enunciated in the 39th Congress in

8 1865, without institutional

9 infrastructure backed by government

10 appropriations, American Freedmen

11 remain vulnerable to

12 impossibilities fashioned and fed

13 as solutions.

14 The Institute for Policy

15 Studies determined that American

16 Freedmen will fall to zero wealth

17 in America by 2053. There is no

18 form of education being taught in

19 Philadelphia schools to eliminate

20 the wealth gap or prevent Freedmen

21 children from experiencing zero

22 wealth by the Year 2053.

23 David G. Blanchflower of

24 MIT's research into business credit

25 market concluded that the levels of

1 5/9/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 capital required to start business
3 structurally exclude non-wealthy
4 individuals regardless of their
5 entrepreneurial talents. American
6 Freedmen simply do not have access
7 to the necessary resources to build
8 corporations that the main players
9 for the global economy.

10 The 1862 Homestead Act
11 granted more than 270 million acres
12 of land to private White citizens.
13 The wealth of more than 46 million
14 adults today can trace their wealth
15 back to that. So educational
16 attainment, financial literacy,
17 hard work and buying Black efforts
18 that harness our spending power
19 alone will never prevent the
20 continuation of economic fall of
21 the American Freedman.

22 What we must have is wealth
23 transfer policies rooted in the
24 promise of the 13th Amendment, the
25 13th Amendment that freed the

20 your barber license, to get your
21 cosmetology license, get your
22 SafeServ license. It's a lot of

11 RICHARDSON: Thank you, Council
12 President.

13 On behalf of Councilmember
14 Bass, I move for the adoption of
15 the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 It has been moved and properly
19 seconded that the resolution be
20 adopted.

21 All those in favor will
22 signify by saying aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

25 Those opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 The ayes have it and the resolution
5 is adopted.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Council

7 President, there are no further
8 resolutions in my possession.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 Thank you very much. That
11 completes our Calendar for today.

12 Got them speeches popping.

13 On behalf of the Minority, are
14 there any speeches?

15 The Chair recognizes
16 Councilmember Kendra Brooks.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank
18 you, Council President.

19 I'm introducing the
20 resolution to honor O'Shae Sibley,
21 who was born and raised here in
22 Philadelphia, attended Philadelphia
23 schools, trained with Philadelphia
24 dance companies before moving to
25 New York. My office created a

2 citation for O'Shae last fall, and
3 I'm glad that his family is able to
4 join us today so that we can honor
5 him as a full Council body.

6 Can they please stand?

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: With
9 us today for today's session are
10 O'Shae's parents, Onisa Sibley,
11 Jake Kelly as well as his sisters
12 Destineh and Desira Kelly. Today
13 we join them in mourning a
14 beautiful and beloved young Black
15 man, a talented dancer and
16 choreographer and a powerful force
17 for love and liberation.

18 O'Shae was known for his
19 ability to turn any floor into a
20 dance floor, a place to share joy,
21 embrace self love and celebrate the
22 beauty and energy that defines the
23 vogue movement in Black queer
24 spaces. He used dance to promote
25 social change to transform our

2 world into a place that welcomes
3 and affirms all of us.

4 That change did not come
5 soon enough. Not for O'Shae and
6 not for countless Black queer youth
7 who cannot escape the homophobia
8 and racism that continue to poison
9 our society. We owe it to O'Shae
10 Sibley and his family and loved
11 ones to continue building a world
12 that values and protects Black
13 queer youth.

14 I am co-introducing a
15 resolution with Rue Landau to
16 declare tomorrow, May 10th, Child
17 Care Provider Appreciation Day in
18 Philadelphia. I'm a mother of four
19 children. I've worked as a child
20 care provider when I was younger
21 and I also have several family
22 members and loved ones who work and
23 own child care centers here in
24 Philadelphia.

25 The work of child care is

2 something that we all depend on and
3 the people who do the work that
4 have immense responsibility in
5 shaping the minds, bodies and
6 hearts of the next generations, and
7 yet childcare workers are majority
8 women of color, undervalued and
9 severely underpaid. Just like
10 teachers, they deserve so much more
11 appreciation.

12 They deserve higher pay,
13 better working conditions and
14 necessary resources and supports to
15 do their job. With this
16 resolution, we recognize the true
17 value of the work that child care
18 providers do and we commit to
19 making that work more sustainable
20 in the future.

21 Thank you so much, Council
22 President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 You're welcome. Congratulations.

25 The Chair recognizes

3 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: Thank
4 you, Council President.

5 And good afternoon to my
6 colleagues, our guests that have
7 been here today and the viewing
8 public. I'd also like to thank the
9 many guests we had in this space
10 yesterday morning. Any and
11 everyone who came out to the
12 Committee on the Environment's
13 hearing on urban agriculture in
14 Philadelphia.

15 My fellow Committee members
16 and I learned so much about urban
17 green spaces, how they build
18 community health and unity and how
19 we need to support the community
20 stewards of these spaces.
21 Testifiers lifted up the need for
22 more dollars to flow into the
23 Department of Health's Food Justice
24 Initiative, which purchases seeds,
25 tools and soil and many, many more

2 things for urban gardeners.

3 They also stress the
4 importance of land ownership and
5 sovereignty, not just access,
6 something that we're going to have
7 to address as we work to reform the
8 Land Bank. Those were the action
9 items our neighbors working in this
10 space gave us. So it behooves us
11 to figure out what we can make
12 shape for them as well as us really
13 because it benefits all of us.

14 Thanks to everyone who worked to
15 make the hearing, well-attended,
16 informative and resourceful.
17 There's that.

18 Secondly today's business,
19 want to send a huge shout out to
20 the Graduate employees at Penn
21 University who won their union
22 certification vote last week by an
23 overwhelming margin. The final
24 tally was 1887 in favor, 97
25 opposed. That to me is a clear

2 mandate. The fight isn't over just
3 yet though.

4 Unfortunately, Penn, our
5 city's largest employer, isn't
6 always so keen on their workers
7 organizing, so we need to hold the
8 University accountable to acting in
9 good faith, as a contract is, in
10 fact, negotiated. Besides Penn
11 should be used to this by now.
12 This latest win for Penn workers is
13 the cresting of a wave, the result
14 of years of organizing.

15 Here's a quick rundown: In
16 August 2021, over 30 cultural
17 workers at the Penn Museum
18 affiliated with D.C. 47 and won
19 their Union. Despite about two
20 years of stalling tactics, Penn
21 Museum workers won their first
22 contract last year. That's worthy
23 of acknowledgement. Last May
24 almost a year to the day, over
25 1,000 medical residents and fellows

2 affiliated with CIR-SEIU broke new
3 ground and won their union.
4 They're working out their first
5 contract right now. We have the
6 benefit of going down and standing
7 with them a few days ago.

8 In September, the RAs at
9 Penn got in on the act, forming the
10 first Residential Assistant Union
11 in Philadelphia and RAs at
12 Swarthmore and at Drexel have since
13 followed their lead as well. So
14 now we've reached this point. And
15 the success of graduate workers has
16 not come overnight. This is the
17 high point of a 20-year campaign
18 among graduate workers at Penn, and
19 their union is now the largest
20 private sector union in the history
21 of Philadelphia, which is amazing.

22 So that little timeline
23 shows that thousands of Penn
24 employees have unionized in the
25 last five years and it certifies

2 something that we already should
3 know, that unions belong at Penn.
4 A unionized workforce at the city's
5 largest employer is not only
6 beneficial to the workers at Penn,
7 it raises labor standards and
8 conditions across the entire City.

9 We will see positive ripple
10 effects because of the organizing
11 on campus. And as a body that
12 makes law, more than a duty we all
13 probably have a desire to see the
14 law that we make actually upheld
15 and to ensure the right to
16 collectively bargain is honored,
17 not delayed or denied. When that
18 happens, it's on us to say
19 something and to remind employers
20 of the expectation that they
21 acknowledge and honor the law that
22 is made.

23 Congratulations again to
24 graduate workers at Penn along with
25 the host of freshly unionized

1 5/9/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 workers on campus. And thank you
3 to my colleagues who co-sponsored
4 this resolution and have signed
5 letters supporting Penn workers.

6 Thirdly, I'm also glad to
7 have the chance to honor the
8 students and staff who power the
9 Mustang Barbershop at Murrell
10 Dobbins Career and Technical
11 Education High School, who you
12 might have seen recently on Good
13 Morning America and who you heard
14 from a little bit today.

15 Dobbins has 12 CTE
16 programs, but the Mustang
17 barbershop course prepares students
18 to pass the Commonwealth's
19 barbering license exam and passes
20 on key entrepreneurial advice and
21 strategy for students intent on
22 making a career as a hairstylist
23 among other cosmetic professions.

24 To instructors Faheem
25 Alexander and Angela Miller, they

2 did have to leave to get back
3 before 2 o'clock, thank you for the
4 work that you do with our young
5 people. This kind of culturally
6 relevant education is a key element
7 of what helps to make Philadelphia
8 a better city. Again, thank you to
9 my colleagues who co-sponsored that
10 resolution with me, and thank you
11 to everyone from Dobbins who made
12 it out this morning to join us.

13 Finally, this last thing, I
14 just want to thank our Minority
15 Leader the Honorable Kendra Brooks
16 for introducing a resolution
17 honoring O'Shae Sibley. I spoke
18 his name into the record as we
19 honored Sapphira Cristál, and it's
20 a privilege to do so again today.

21 I also had the honor of
22 being with a number of my
23 colleagues and friends from the
24 queer community as we did, in fact,
25 go to the celebration of his life

2 down at the Met. We need to
3 remember his story and his legacy
4 of resistance as we continue to
5 support the Black queer community
6 in this City. May his memory be a
7 blessing to those who knew and love
8 him. Thank you very much.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 You're welcome.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Speeches on behalf of the Majority
14 the Chair recognizes Councilmember
15 Phillips.

16 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Good
17 afternoon, Council President. I'll
18 be brief.

19 I simply wanted to pay
20 tribute to an incredible teacher
21 this week who passed away due to
22 gun violence, domestic violence,
23 Ondria Glaze was a very good friend
24 of a very good friend of mine,
25 Lorina Zeller, and they went to

2 CAPA High School together and CAPA
3 High School graduates are very
4 tight.

5 And what I know about her,
6 she was an Olney High School
7 teacher and she filled the room
8 with joy and excitement. And the
9 individuals that knew her,
10 including her students, said that
11 Ms. Glaze is one of the best
12 teachers in their lives. So I just
13 wanted to see if we could have a
14 moment of silence for Ms. Ondria
15 Glaze in spite of standing, a
16 moment of silence.

17 (Moment of silence.)

18 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Thank
19 you. In addition to Ms. Ondria
20 Glaze, who her tribute will be on
21 Monday if anyone is interested in
22 doing a vigil, participating in her
23 vigil, it's going be at 6 o'clock
24 at Olney High School, also,
25 Councilman Nicolas O'Rourke will be

2 co-introducing a -- well, putting
3 together a citation for her
4 together as well with his office.
5 So we're looking forward to that.
6 Wadsworth Day is back in
7 the 9th District Saturday, June
8 29th from 12:00 to 7:00 p.m. If
9 you visit my Instagram and
10 Facebook, there's a commercial,
11 video, so phillipsdst9 to learn
12 more about that Wadsworth Day
13 event. Also, this week we
14 introduced a curfew bill that would
15 help us regulate businesses in the
16 9th District, particularly making
17 sure that some areas in West Oak
18 Lane and Mt. Airy do not have
19 inappropriate businesses in our
20 area. And I want to thank our
21 Councilwoman Lozada for helping to
22 inspire some of the work that we're
23 trying to do in the 9th District
24 through her bill that she did
25 several months ago. So I'm looking

2 forward to seeing how that plays
3 out.

4 It came from the residents
5 of the District. Every meeting I
6 go to I always get some new
7 information from residents in how
8 we can make our District better.
9 And I just want to thank all the
10 residents of 9th District for
11 holding us accountable so we can do
12 the work of the Lord.

13 And lastly, I just have to
14 say this. I know it's going to be
15 up for final passage next week.
16 But, Council President, under your
17 leadership I just want to really
18 say that this body of Council is
19 truly doing its best and hardest to
20 work together. We don't bicker.
21 We don't cuss at each other. We
22 don't hold grudges. We are finding
23 ways to -- we are finding ways even
24 when we disagree to really come
25 together for the City of

2 Philadelphia. And I just want to
3 say that I'm really happy to see
4 that among all of us.

5 I mean, Councilmember
6 Rue -- this is really inspired by
7 Councilmember Rue Landau. She's
8 had a really, really good interest
9 in this tax preparation bill. And
10 we found ways to work together to
11 really, really put this together so
12 it can be really good for the City
13 of Philadelphia.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: So
16 she really inspired me to say that
17 comment today. And I just want to
18 say that that is how I know that we
19 are all going to be able to get
20 some of our things together for our
21 city and just not be like, you
22 know. I don't know what we used to
23 do or how we did things, but I'm
24 just happy that we're all here
25 together. And I want to thank you

2 for bringing us together.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 You're welcome. Thank you. Good
5 job, Rue Landau.

6 And the Chair recognizes
7 Councilmember Curtis Jones.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Well, I
9 just want to say I don't want to be
10 dubbed the Kendrick Lamar nor the
11 Drake of Council.

12 (Laughter.)

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: But
14 they're not like us, and I'm just
15 going to keep it plain. I was
16 inspired by Rabbi Fornari today who
17 said that when you hear things, see
18 things, it is your obligation to
19 speak to them. And in that
20 tradition, if we all agree that
21 lives lost, humanity lost anywhere
22 is a problem. Whether it's Jews,
23 whether it's Muslims, whether it's
24 Christians, we want it to stop.

25 And since this war in Gaza,

2 there's been 35,000 deaths. So
3 much so that even people who
4 traditionally were kind of laissez-
5 faire about it, including our
6 President, including Speakers of
7 the House have spoke and risen to
8 say enough is enough. And I pray
9 for peace.

10 I do not subscribe to who
11 started it. That has to be dealt
12 with, but I always -- when I first
13 heard of this, I said if assailants
14 who were in public housing went in
15 the neighborhood and shot somebody,
16 then ran into projects, would we
17 destroy the projects, getting at
18 them? No, we wouldn't. We'd have
19 to play by the Marquess of
20 Queensberry rules to apprehend
21 them, and that's all I want. And
22 again, I don't want to be the Mack
23 10 or anything like that, but y'all
24 not like us.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 You're welcome, Councilmember

4 Jones.

5 The Chair recognizes

6 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier.

7 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: I

8 don't feel like the Councilmember

9 specified which one was Drake, but

10 I'm going to let it go. Today we

11 renamed the 4100 block of Parkside

12 Avenue "Rev. Dr. Arthur White Way"

13 in honor of the life and memory of

14 Rev. Dr. Arthur R. White.

15 If you grew up in East

16 Parkside or Mantua, chances are you

17 knew Dr. White. Throughout his

18 pastorate, the East Parkside

19 community knew they had a friend in

20 Dr. White and the Christ Community

21 Baptist Church. He always taught

22 that the church existed to serve

23 the community. Dr. White pastored

24 Christ Community Baptist Church

25 from October 1981 until March 2020,

2 a tenure during which he was a
3 tremendous blessing to CCBC, the
4 East Parkside community and the
5 church at-large community.

6 Dr. White served as
7 President of the Baptist Pastors
8 and Ministers Conference of
9 Philadelphia in its vicinity as
10 well as two terms as President of
11 the PA Baptist State Convention and
12 Dean of Christian Education for the
13 National Baptist Convention USA,
14 Inc.

15 Under Dr. White's effective
16 and faithful leadership, CCBC
17 housed a homeless shelter for men,
18 faithfully and consistently fed and
19 clothed the less fortunate and
20 championed AIDS awareness,
21 education and prevention throughout
22 East Parkside and Mantua
23 communities. During Dr. White's
24 ecclesial tenure, many ministers
25 were licensed, ordained and trained

2 for the ministry.

3 Dr. White has many sons and
4 daughters throughout the City and
5 nation. Dr. White's life, legacy
6 and ministry exemplifies selfless
7 and sacrificial service in
8 ministry, community and family.

9 I'm proud to rename the 4100 block
10 of Parkside Avenue after such a
11 dedicated and prolific community
12 leader and pastor.

13 I also want to thank some
14 of Pastor White's family members
15 and community who joined us today,
16 Reverend Kevin L. Haynesworth, Sr.,
17 Sister Cassandra Tart, Trustee
18 Laverne Brockington and everyone
19 from the Christ Community Baptist
20 Church, East Parkside and Mantua
21 who joined us to celebrate. Thank
22 you so much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 You're welcome.

25 The Chair recognizes

2 Councilmember Lozada.

3 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
4 you, Council President.

5 I'd like to just begin by
6 giving gratitude to some of my
7 colleagues I had the pleasure of
8 having Councilmember Majority
9 Leader Gilmore Richardson, Phillips
10 and O'Rour --

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 And O'Rourke.

13 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Nic
14 O'Rourke toured the District with
15 me last Friday, and we had an
16 opportunity to talk to businesses,
17 students, some of those who are
18 living unsheltered. And just
19 wanted to say thank you to them for
20 taking the time out of their day to
21 just come to see what our community
22 residents face every day, and I'm
23 looking forward to touring the
24 District with my other colleagues
25 who have also accepted the

2 invitation to come visit with me.

3 I'd also like to thank

4 Councilmember Gilmore Richardson

5 for always being so thoughtful.

6 She makes sure that whether it's

7 Father's Day, Christmas, whatever

8 holiday it is, that we get a

9 special token from her. And so,

10 thank you so much for your

11 thoughtfulness.

12 Today we were able to pass

13 a resolution auditing the

14 Department of DBHIDS. Last week we

15 passed the formation of the Special

16 Committee on Kensington. And I

17 just want to -- today or this week,

18 I don't know what it is. I'm just

19 feeling really grateful for all of

20 you.

21 We had an encampment

22 resolution yesterday. It's just

23 difficult, right. Sometimes we

24 think that throwing money at people

25 or at places or things is going to

2 bring a resolution to the
3 situation, and we have seen in the
4 Kensington community how doing so
5 has done nothing for them.

6 There was a lot that I
7 expected to see as a result of the
8 encampment resolution yesterday.

9 And I don't know if it was a
10 blessing or a curse that Mother
11 Nature decided to bring a downpour
12 before the encampment resolution
13 started, and folks picked up their
14 belongings and left.

15 I find it really
16 frustrating that there are some out
17 there that want to tell the story
18 differently than what it was. We
19 have to be proud of the people who
20 work for us as colleagues across
21 City departments. And I know it's
22 not easy. Departments like DBHIDS,
23 departments like OHS, departments
24 like the Philadelphia Police
25 Department, the Managing Director's

2 Office, Streets and Sanitation, our
3 partners on the ground like Rock
4 Ministries, all of those folks were
5 ready to provide services to
6 connect people to an opportunity to
7 live and choose recovery and
8 prevention services.

9 Folks were ready to provide
10 housing opportunities. And before
11 they could get there, Mother Nature
12 decided to downpour and folks left.
13 And the story is being told
14 differently. The story is being
15 told that police were not friendly,
16 that police harassed people, that
17 outreach workers were not able to
18 connect with people. And that is
19 false. That is false.

20 Yes, people were not there
21 when the service providers arrived,
22 but that doesn't mean that people
23 didn't get services because our
24 outreach workers, many outreach
25 workers did what they were trained

2 to do and went to find people.

3 They went to connect people with

4 Services because there was a

5 commitment by all of us on the

6 ground to go connect people with

7 services and provide them with

8 opportunities.

9 As a result of that, in the

10 last 30 days 2,231 people were

11 connected with. Yes, some of those

12 people were connected multiple

13 times, but we all know that it

14 takes multiple times before people

15 accept resources. 280 people were

16 brought off the street yesterday.

17 They went into treatment. They

18 went into detox. They went into

19 shelter. They went and got wound

20 care. 280 people, 280 families

21 were able to sleep better last

22 night because they knew that their

23 loved ones were in a safer place

24 than on the street. Why can't we

25 talk about that story? Why do we

1 5/9/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 focus on creating shit that is
3 wrong, that is false?

4 I'm grateful for this
5 Administration, and we may not
6 agree with everything that the
7 Mayor is proposing, right. But I'm
8 grateful for the fact that she has
9 made Kensington a priority beyond
10 just throwing money at it. I'm
11 grateful because all of you voted
12 to support a committee that will
13 allow us to continue to figure out
14 where is that money, who's
15 providing the service, who's
16 receiving the service and what is
17 wrong, who's wrong, who are the bad
18 players in all of this because
19 there are some. And regardless of
20 who those people are connected to,
21 you may not get those contracts
22 again and we all have to be okay
23 with it.

24 But we have to understand
25 that or we have to accept that what

2 we've been doing in the Kensington
3 community thus far has not worked
4 and we need to do things
5 differently. And so, I'm grateful.
6 Today I'm feeling grateful. It may
7 not have been how I wanted to see
8 it. It may not have been how the
9 community wanted to see it. It may
10 not have been the ideal situation.
11 Folks still may be in the
12 surrounding areas, but we responded
13 and outreach workers stayed out
14 there throughout the night, making
15 sure that they went to the side
16 streets and continued to connect
17 with people.

18 And so, I'm hopeful that
19 the residents of Kensington, that
20 this Administration, that all of
21 you stay committed to fighting for
22 a better quality of life for the
23 children and families of that
24 community.

25 Thank you, Council

4 Thank you, Member Lozada, for your
5 leadership.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
8 Richardson.

9 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

10 RICHARDSON: Thank you. Thank you
11 so much, Council President, and
12 thank you to my colleague, our 7th
13 District Councilmember Quetcy
14 Lozada for her continued commitment
15 to the 7th Council District, not
16 just now as a member but previously
17 as a Chief of Staff in Council and
18 working on the ground throughout
19 community organizations, really
20 learning and knowing that community
21 and understanding the very nuanced
22 needs of the 7th Council District.

23 I was really honored to
24 join you and our colleagues
25 Councilmember Phillips and

2 Councilmember O'Rourke last Friday.

3 And I will tell you I've been to

4 Kensington all my life. I was born

5 and raised here in the City. My

6 mother used to take us shopping

7 back when the Salvation Army was

8 down under the El, and she would

9 purchase our washer and dryers and

10 refrigerators under the El in

11 Kensington when I was growing up.

12 But going down there last

13 Friday, it was really tough. And I

14 didn't realize it until I got home

15 and really had an opportunity to

16 think about all the information we

17 heard and everything we saw. And

18 we had the opportunity to meet with

19 students at one of the local

20 elementary schools and really

21 listen directly to them and their

22 thoughts about what's happening in

23 their community, in and around

24 their community, and a meeting with

25 the principal who talked about all

1 5/9/24 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 the measures they had to take as a
3 school community just to ensure
4 that the teachers and the staff
5 could get in and out of the
6 building safely.

7 But in addition to that,
8 listening to the young people talk
9 about what they experience on their
10 walk to school and what they see on
11 their walk home. And I just can't
12 imagine now as a mother and as a
13 parent having my children live
14 through that environment every
15 single day, and that's what these
16 families and community members have
17 been facing.

18 It just broke my heart.
19 One of the students in particular
20 that we met at the school, once we
21 got to the avenue, on the 3100
22 block of Kensington Avenue, in
23 specific she got out of her vehicle
24 with her aunt and her aunt was
25 taking her and her brother to go

2 get haircuts, and we were in the
3 middle of tents, individuals using
4 and it was just so disheartening on
5 both sides, but it was really,
6 really hard to see and she was
7 happy and living right there in
8 that environment.

9 And just going home and
10 picking up my children afterwards
11 from school, I literally was
12 exacerbated. I did not go anywhere
13 else that day. I stayed home that
14 evening and I actually went to bed
15 early because it was a lot to take
16 in. So I just want to thank you,
17 colleague, for your continued
18 commitment and for all the work
19 that all the City departments did
20 in seeking to bring some level of
21 resolution for the community on
22 this issue. And I too did thank
23 those departments yesterday
24 individually for their service and
25 look forward to the continued work

2 that we must do together, not only
3 for the community but for the
4 individuals who desperately,
5 desperately need help and
6 assistance to move on from the
7 throes of addiction.

8 Council President, I also
9 wanted to just recognize our
10 colleague and our resident Pastor
11 and Reverend Councilmember
12 O'Rourke. We were out on the
13 Avenue last week and we met quite a
14 few individuals. And we met a
15 lady, I won't share her name, but
16 it was her 67th birthday on Monday,
17 this past Monday. And she said, my
18 birthday is on Monday, I'm turning
19 67, does anyone have a bible that
20 you can give me.

21 And I said, oh, I'm so
22 sorry, we don't have a bible. She
23 said, well, can you pray for us.
24 And I said, well, we actually have
25 a pastor here. And so, our

2 colleague prayed with this young
3 woman in advance of her 67th
4 birthday, and I know it made all
5 the difference for her that day and
6 I just want to uplift what he did.
7 It was so powerful. And thank you
8 very, very much, colleague, for
9 that prayer for that young woman on
10 the avenue.

11 And finally, I just wanted
12 to thank my colleague Councilmember
13 Isaiah Thomas who introduced a
14 resolution in support of Youth
15 Apprenticeship Week that I
16 co-introduced with him today. I
17 want to thank all of our partners
18 who joined us to support this work.

19 And in honor of that work,
20 I want to formally announce the
21 release of my 2024 Apprenticeship
22 Guidebook for the City of
23 Philadelphia. This is the most
24 updated version of our
25 Apprenticeship Guidebook, and we

2 now have nine pre-apprenticeship
3 programs and 31 apprenticeship
4 programs across the City of
5 Philadelphia.

6 This book is a one-stop
7 shop for everything you need to
8 know about these programs, all the
9 prerequisites, all the
10 requirements, everything you may
11 need to join the local union or
12 pre-apprenticeship program. And I
13 just want to thank some of our
14 colleagues who work with us.

15 You know that I partner
16 with State Representative Joe
17 Hohenstein up in the 177th. We do
18 all of this work together,
19 including all the labor fairs
20 across schools in the City of
21 Philadelphia. And it's four people
22 in particular -- and you did hear
23 from Monica Robinson from the
24 Philadelphia AFL-CIO, but it's four
25 people who have been with us from

2 the very beginning and helped us
3 with putting the book together.
4 And that would be Ryan M. Boyer,
5 Business Manager of Labor District
6 Council of Metropolitan Area
7 Philadelphia and Vicinity and

10 Building Trades Council; Danny
11 Bauder, President of Philadelphia
12 AFL-CIO; Pat Eiding, President
13 Emeritus of Philadelphia Council
14 AFL-CIO; Koren M. Parker who's the
15 Chapter President of the
16 Philadelphia Coalition of Labor
17 Union Women.
18 And special, special thanks
19 to my team, Council President, who
20 helps to compile all of this
21 information each year and to your
22 team who helps us put it together
23 and makes this information look
24 lovely. It's a QR code on the
25 front. And so, you can take a copy

2 of the QR code and share it with a
3 young person in your life.

4 To date, we've given out
5 more than 6,000 apprenticeship
6 guidebooks in the City of
7 Philadelphia working with our CTE
8 teachers and others, and we will
9 give out at least 5,000 copies of
10 this guidebook. So I just wanted
11 to say thank you all of your
12 continued commitment to uplifting
13 our young people, helping connect
14 them with family-supporting and
15 sustaining opportunities in our
16 City, and certainly the journey
17 continues.

18 Thank you, Council

4 and colleagues.

5 First of all, Councilmember
6 Lozada, I know Councilmember Ahmad
7 and I are very excited for our tour
8 of the Kensington area with you
9 which is tomorrow. It's been hard
10 for us to schedule this, but we
11 look forward to going through the
12 neighborhood with you and sharing
13 this experience.

14 I wanted to take a minute
15 to just thank Rabbi Ari Fornari and
16 Rabbi Monica Gomery of my synagogue
17 Kol Tzedek for joining us in City
18 Council today and for their
19 invocation and song. Your presence
20 here today was deeply appreciated
21 and underscores the importance of
22 community solidarity in a time of
23 division and our obligation to
24 speak out against injustices. So
25 thank you for being here. And as

2 Councilman Jones said, let's all
3 pray for peace.

4 Today I was also pleased to
5 present a resolution alongside
6 Councilmember Thomas declaring May
7 9, 2024 Black Teacher Appreciation
8 Day in the City of Philadelphia.

9 This day serves as a celebration of
10 the remarkable contributions made
11 by Black teachers throughout our
12 city, but it also highlights our
13 desperate need for more Black
14 educators.

15 In 40 percent of all public
16 schools nationwide, there are no
17 teachers of color. In urban high
18 poverty areas, the disparity and
19 teacher diversity is even worse.
20 While there's great need, there's
21 also great opportunities to change
22 the historic systemic removal of
23 Black men and women from the
24 national teacher pipeline. So I
25 want to thank the Center for Black

2 Educator Development for your work
3 and for your sharing public comment
4 today on this important issue.

5 Secondly, I was honored to
6 introduce a resolution alongside
7 Councilmember Brooks designating
8 May 10, 2024 as Child Care Provider
9 Appreciation Day in the City of
10 Philadelphia. This day serves as a
11 tribute to the essential role that
12 child care providers play in our
13 community. They're the pillars of
14 support for our families, nurturing
15 our children and enabling parents
16 to work while knowing their
17 children are safe and cared for.

18 Child care programs are
19 mostly small businesses run by
20 women, mostly women of color, and
21 they're still coming back from the
22 financial hits of the pandemic. So
23 as they grow and try to get
24 stronger and care for more
25 families, we're so happy to lift up

2 their work. Their tireless efforts
3 in shaping the early years of our
4 children's lives deserve our utmost
5 recognition and appreciation.

6 And finally, a quick
7 reminder that I'm holding a lunch
8 briefing today at 1:30 with Federal
9 Housing Lending Bank Pittsburgh,
10 our FHL Bank Pittsburgh today is at
11 1:30. It's in the caucus room and
12 learn about over \$100 million in
13 community investment funding
14 available this year, partnership
15 opportunities and other FHL Bank
16 Pittsburgh initiatives that can
17 help our entire city. Thank you so
18 much. I hope you and your staff
19 can be there today. Thank you.

21 Thank you very much, Rue.

22 And the Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

24 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
25 you, Mr. President.

2 First and foremost, I just
3 want to say and wish Happy Mother's
4 Day to my colleagues who are
5 mothers, give a shout-out to my
6 mom, she's probably watching, my
7 soon-to-be mother-in-law and my
8 fiancee as well, my sister, Happy
9 Mother's Day.

10 I want to thank
11 Councilwoman Brooks for honoring
12 O'Shae Sibley. I had the pleasure
13 of knowing O'Shae as a child, as a
14 student at Girard College. His
15 brother Darius was in my class at
16 Girard College, so it really
17 touched home for me. And I want to
18 show my continued support for the
19 Black queer community in this City
20 and across the country because, you
21 know, something got to give.
22 People should be free to express
23 themselves to be their authentic
24 selves without fear of violence or
25 death.

2 The youth that were here
3 today kind of inspired me. I want
4 to give a special shout-out to the
5 Youth Commission, the youth
6 commissioners that were here. I
7 was on the first cohort of the
8 Philadelphia Youth Commission. I
9 was the very first youth
10 commissioner for the 5th Council
11 District. So to those youth
12 commissioners, your dreams can come
13 true. You just keep going and keep
14 moving forward.

15 I also introduced a
16 resolution today naming this week
17 as Well-Being in Law Week. This a
18 national -- this is a week that's
19 celebrated nationally for attorneys
20 and lawyers across the country.
21 Lawyers are eighth in suicide rates
22 in the country. While 7 percent of
23 the folks are diagnosed with
24 depression, that number is 28
25 percent for lawyers.

2 Lawyers are reportedly 19
3 percent of those with anxiety, 21
4 percent of those with alcohol
5 addiction and 11 percent with drug
6 addiction. As attorneys we take on
7 other people's problems,
8 internalize them, but we don't
9 really take care of ourselves at
10 the same rate. And so, I just want
11 to give a special shout-out to all
12 the lawyers. Remember to take care
13 of ourselves because we deal with
14 other people's problems every
15 single day.

16 I wasn't here last week to
17 give a special shout-out or offer
18 my condolences to the family of
19 Jean Hackney. She's the founder of
20 Grands as Parents, and a proud
21 North Philadelphia resident. So I
22 want to offer her family my
23 condolences.

24 Now, to the good part. So
25 first and foremost, I want to let

2 my constituents know that I will
3 always, always, always, always
4 fight for the 5th District. That
5 will not change. So according to
6 an RFP issued by the City on May
7 3rd by the Managing Director's
8 Office, the City has identified
9 several locations for consideration
10 for the design of triage treatment
11 and recovery facilities for
12 individuals with histories of
13 substance abuse disorders and
14 homelessness.

15 Now, these facilities are
16 set out to handle pre-triage,
17 emergency triage, residential
18 Services, high-intensity
19 residential services, impatient
20 Services, recovery housing,
21 temporary housing, permanent
22 independent living, the spectrum.
23 The City put out an RFP for
24 consulting for these types of
25 matters, for properties that have

2 been identified, right.

3 But I'm just going to read
4 the statement that I issued last
5 week on this. So throughout the
6 budget process, I have been
7 concerned about the lack of
8 transparency from the Parker
9 Administration on the proposed plan
10 for triage centers to combat the
11 addiction crisis in Kensington.

12 Of course, we all know by
13 now there was an article that came
14 out that a proposed location for a
15 facility will be in the 5th
16 District at 2100 West Girard
17 Avenue, a facility that's owned by
18 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
19 It's deeply troubling because there
20 has been no engagement with my
21 office, with the Fairmount
22 community and with the surrounding
23 neighborhoods. This proposed
24 location is currently zoned RM-1,
25 which does not allow any hospitals

2 or medical facilities without
3 approval of the Zoning Board of
4 Adjustment.

5 So let's be clear, I do not
6 support a triage center at this
7 location without undergoing a
8 thorough review and discussion with
9 the community to address potential
10 implications. This facility is in
11 close proximity to four schools,
12 including my alma mater Girard
13 College which is right across the
14 street.

15 It is unacceptable to
16 undertake such a significant
17 project without consulting the
18 communities and stakeholders who
19 will be most affected. While I
20 appreciate the Parker's
21 Administration's efforts to combat
22 the opioid crisis in Kensington, we
23 must focus on solutions that meet
24 people where they are to provide
25 immediate, critical medical care

2 they desperately need. So I look
3 forward to continuing to work with
4 the Parker Administration on
5 finding solutions to these issues
6 in figuring out how we as a
7 community can work together to
8 solve these problems.

9 But essentially, none of
10 our questions have been answered by
11 the Administration and it's very
12 frustrating because we're the
13 ones -- I'm the one who has to get
14 all the phone calls from residents
15 who are upset about their
16 neighborhood potentially housing
17 400 individuals dealing with opioid
18 addiction, right.

19 And so, I'm looking forward
20 to the transparency. I'm looking
21 forward to answers as we continue
22 to work together to solve this
23 crisis.

24 So thank you,
25 Mr. President.

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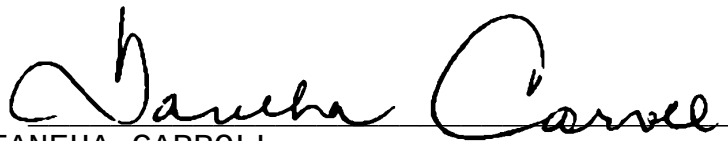
