11 bills with a favorable recommendation.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you.

14 Mr. Decker, please read that
15 report.

16 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
17 and members of the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, the Committee on Licenses
19 and Inspections, to which was referred
20 Bill No. 220638, entitled "An ordinance
21 amending Title 4 of The Philadelphia
22 Code, entitled 'The Philadelphia Building
23 Construction and Occupancy Code,' by
24 adopting the 2018 edition of the
25 'International Residential Code' as

1 12/1/22 - STATED - REPORTS

2 published by the International Code
3 Council, including maintenance of
4 previously adopted amendments to the 2015
5 International Residential Code, as
6 adopted under the Pennsylvania Uniform
7 Construction Code Act"; and

8 Bill No. 220666, entitled "An
9 ordinance amending Chapter 9-3300 of The
10 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Use and
11 Inspection of Tower and Mobile Cranes in
12 Construction,' to require breaks for
13 operators," respectfully reports it has
14 considered the same and returns the
15 attached bills to Council with a
16 favorable recommendation.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 The Chair again recognizes
20 Councilman Driscoll.

21 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move that the
23 rules of Council be suspended so as to
24 permit first reading this day of Bills
25 No. 220638 and 220666.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and these bills will be
17 placed on our First Reading Calendar
18 today.

19 That concludes our reports from
20 committee, and our next order of business
21 is consideration of the Calendar.

22 I note that the bills just
23 reported from committee with suspension
24 of the rules have been deemed to have had
25 a first reading. They will be on our

4 As there are no additional
5 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. The following bills and
12 resolutions are being called up from

20 say a couple of things with respect to
21 your public comment.

22 It must concern matters on the
23 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar
24 today. All speakers must sign up in
25 order to testify. If you have not

19 when there are 30 seconds remaining to
20 your time, the light on the podium will
21 turn yellow, and when it turns red, we
22 ask that you please comply with our
23 guidelines and conclude your remarks.

24 We also reserve the right
25 pursuant to our rules of Council to limit

4 Mr. Decker, I would ask for you

7 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
8 today, Mr. President, is Patricia Wilson
9 Aden.

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
12 Aden?

13 MS. ADEN: I'm coming.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
15 there you go. Okay.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
17 220869.

18 (Speaker approached podium.)

19 MS. ADEN: I get confused this
20 morning.

21 Thank you so much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MS. ADEN: My name is Patricia
25 Wilson Aden and I'm President and CEO of

2 the Greater Philadelphia Cultural
3 Alliance.

4 Last May, the arts and culture
5 community rallied outside City Hall
6 calling on Mayor Jim Kenney and City
7 Council to increase arts funding in the
8 2023 City budget.

9 Using our diverse, passionate
10 voice, we spoke to how increased public
11 funding would allow the Philadelphia
12 Cultural Fund to maximize its impact on
13 our neighborhoods. We also spoke to the
14 necessity of the City living up to its
15 responsibility of supporting City-owned
16 arts and cultural institutions,
17 especially those that reside in and serve
18 Black and brown communities.

19 In the proposed 2022 midyear
20 transfer, Mayor Kenney and City Council
21 have done exactly that by appropriating
22 more than \$20 million for arts and
23 culture. This is unprecedented.

24 And so today I come before you
25 to simply say thank you. Thank you for

2 investing in arts and culture as the
3 invaluable asset it is to the City of
4 Philadelphia. Thank you for
5 acknowledging arts and culture as an
6 essential economic driver. Thank you for
7 recognizing the power of our collective
8 voice.

9 With this midyear transfer, the
10 Philadelphia Cultural Fund is now slated
11 to be funded at 5.5 million, benefiting
12 hundreds of arts organizations across the
13 City.

14 - - -

15 (Applause.)

16 - - -

17 MS. ADEN: And ensuring
18 critical equity within the arts.

19 City institutions, including
20 the African American Museum in
21 Philadelphia, the Mann Center, Mural Arts
22 Philadelphia, Please Touch Museum, and
23 the Dell will receive infusions of
24 significant support, and visionary
25 projects like Calder Gardens will be

2 heralded with further support in the
3 midyear transfer.

4 The Cultural Alliance has
5 always believed that the arts in
6 Philadelphia are an undervalued and
7 underleveraged asset that deserves
8 investment. This midyear transfer shows
9 that Mayor Kenney and City Council
10 believe that too.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you so much. It was our pleasure.

18 is Jane Golden, commenting on 220869.

19 (Speaker approached podium.)

20 MS. GOLDEN: My name is Jane
21 Golden and I'm the Executive Director of
22 the Mural Arts Program. Good morning,
23 everybody. Yay arts. Go arts.

24 Thank you, Patty.

25 So my name is Jane Golden and

2 I'm Executive Director of Mural Arts and
3 I'm here today to express my deep
4 gratitude for the additional funding
5 Mural Arts will receive in the midyear
6 transfer ordinance. I'm so excited.

7 Mural Arts has served
8 Philadelphia for 35 years, beautifying
9 our neighborhoods, over 4,300 murals,
10 everybody, and engaging communities
11 through meaningful programming rooted in
12 human dignity and social justice.

13 Our city is always changing and
14 evolving, and we at Mural Arts have
15 continued to be on the move as well.
16 Why? So we can constantly respond to
17 whatever the needs of the City are. We
18 want to offer our creative and
19 organizational resources in the service
20 of citizens across Philadelphia.

21 Yet, in spite of this movement
22 and evolution, we remain steadfast about
23 our mission. That has remained
24 unchanged. Public art has the power to
25 inspire and ignite change. This is why

2 I'm so excited to be here today with my
3 esteemed colleagues from the arts --
4 yay -- to say thank you. Thank you for
5 investing in Mural Arts.

6 With this additional
7 investment, we will expand the work of
8 the Guild, a paid apprenticeship program
9 that gives justice-impacted young people
10 18 to 26 the opportunity to develop
11 marketable job skills and reconnect with
12 their communities, and our Restorative
13 Justice Program. We work at SCI Phoenix,
14 the county jail, and with people coming
15 home as well as those on probation.

16 We have a guild program, a
17 women's reentry program, and the
18 foundational Guild Program. We serve 150
19 young people a year and we have an
20 astonishingly low recidivism rate of
21 8 percent. Yes.

22 These invaluable funds will
23 help us continue our Advanced Guild
24 Program and will allow us to build our
25 program out so we can teach additional

2 skills, certifications, and continue to
3 prepare young people so they can take
4 these skills that they're learning at
5 Mural Arts to jobs with the City of
6 Philadelphia and far beyond.

7 There is genius everywhere.
8 It's our job to find it and channel it.

9 I'd like to thank Councilman
10 Thomas for his vision, leadership, and
11 support of this important work.

12 Additionally, additionally,
13 we're so excited to start two new public
14 art projects at the Chew Playground and
15 at Martin Luther King Rec Center. Thank
16 you to Council President Clarke and
17 Councilmember Johnson for the opportunity
18 to create beautiful public spaces that
19 will activate communities, represent
20 people through public art for many years
21 to come. These will be beacons.

22 In closing, I want you to know
23 we never, ever take the support from the
24 City and City Council for granted. I am
25 grateful to each and every one of the

2 members of City Council and Mayor Kenney
3 for this support. You inherently, and I
4 mean this from the bottom of my heart,
5 you inherently understand the catalytic
6 power of art and beauty, and that is
7 huge.

8 Please know we stand by your

10 partner, ready to respond. I am
11 confident that together we will continue
12 to ignite change and make our city more
13 beautiful, more resilient, more hopeful
14 for years to come.

20 Thank you, Ms. Golden. It's good to see
21 your patented hop in person. We missed
22 that when we were virtual. We really
23 needed to see it in person to get the
24 real effect. Thank you.

25 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker

2 is Michael Newmius, commenting on 220869.

3 (Speaker approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MR. NEWMIOUS: Thank you. I'm
7 Michael Newmius of Visit Philadelphia and
8 today I too am honored to speak on this
9 year's midyear transfer.

10 You know, I first stepped foot
11 in this Chamber nearly a decade ago. I
12 was living in West Philly at the time and
13 working as an assistant downtown in the
14 tourism and hospitality industry. If you
15 had told me then that I would build a
16 career and develop myself from an
17 assistant to a top leader in my field
18 through tourism and hospitality, I
19 wouldn't have believed you, but it
20 happened to me and it's happened to
21 countless other Philadelphia residents
22 whose livelihoods are currently supported
23 by tourism and hospitality.

24 In fact, in every single
25 Council district, more than 6,000

2 Philadelphia residents worked in our
3 industry pre-pandemic, accounting for
4 more than 10 percent of jobs held by
5 residents in every Council district.

6 Now, that data is so
7 significant. That data shows us that it
8 doesn't take one to see a hotel in your
9 neighborhood to know that, like me, one
10 in ten of your neighbors are likely
11 supported by tourism and hospitality.

12 The pandemic's blow to our
13 industry has been significant, but
14 through partnerships with the City of
15 Philadelphia and others, Philadelphia's
16 hospitality sector has actually gone from
17 being down 62 percent of jobs lost to
18 13 percent today.

19 While that may sound
20 impressive, we're still 10,000 jobs short
21 and, importantly, the jobs that we have
22 recovered still require constant visitor
23 spending and support to remain viable.

24 You know, at Visit
25 Philadelphia, research shows that there's

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still potential to recover and grow our visitation to restore robust demand. So we are so thankful today to the City of Philadelphia for your leadership and your vision and your support and including funding for destination marketing initiatives in this year's midyear transfer, as it will support jobs for residents across every Council district.

I want to give a special thank you to Councilmember Katherine Gilmore Richardson for your continued vision and support, Councilmember O'Neill, and to every member of Council, because each of your offices have worked with us in different ways and supported us during what has been the most difficult time for the tourism and hospitality industry over the past two years.

We are so grateful for this critical investment. We will continue to forge innovative, research-driven marketing initiatives to support diverse markets, including Black and brown,

2 Latinx, Asian arts and culture
3 attractions, commercial corridors, and
4 connect jobseekers with incredible
5 careers and livelihoods in the

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Ogbonna Hagins, commenting on 220654.

16 (Speaker approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MR. HAGINS: Good morning.
20 Ogbonna Hagins.

21 Youth curfews may be looked at
22 as a solution by this body, but it will
23 not make headway in reducing youth crime
24 and violence.

25 The causes of youth violence is

2 the structural characteristics of the
3 American economy, racism and the
4 pathology of White supremacy.

5 Asking each household with
6 children to lock their doors at a
7 prescribed time is ignoring the
8 structural sources of youth violence.

9 Is there a political and public
10 interest in our youth getting murdered
11 during the day rather than at night?

12 There are substantial
13 differences in living arrangements of
14 children by race and ethnicity. Most
15 White and Asian children are raised by
16 two married parents, 72 and 82 percent,
17 respectively. Fifty-five percent of
18 Latino children are raised by two
19 parents, but in sharp contrast, only
20 31 percent of Afro American children are
21 raised by two parents. More than half
22 are being raised by a single parent.
23 That's according to the Pew 2015
24 research.

25 Had this body done any economic

2 analysis of the impact that a curfew will
3 have on the Afro American single-parent
4 household and if this curfew provides
5 equal protection under the law?

6 Decreasing youth violence will
7 require a major redistribution of wealth
8 or policy to build Afro American wealth
9 through reparations. The elephant in the
10 room is the inability of this body to
11 properly assess the problem.

12 Anyone and everyone who can
13 read knows that youth curfews don't work.
14 It is merely a colorful way to get people
15 to accept sundown laws.

16 Anyone who has read the
17 newspapers in the past ten years knows
18 that stop and frisk is a fugitive slave
19 law and it is unconstitutional, and yet
20 these are the solutions this body is
21 offering.

22 Dr. King said, "Only when it's
23 dark enough can you see the stars." We
24 as people have seen and conquered bigger
25 obstacles. We must rise up and be more

2 strategic with our actions. We must
3 simultaneously engage an inside fight
4 against hopelessness and an outside fight
5 by forces that block access to
6 opportunities.

7 Philly youth have an
8 inalienable right to be governed by
9 competent policy. They have an
10 inalienable right not to be subjected to
11 old, antiquated, racist, and prejudice
12 solutions.

13 I know you don't want to, but
14 it's time to develop a stomach for
15 empowering the Afro American communities
16 in real terms. Nothing else will
17 decrease violence.

18 - - -

24 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
25 is Reverend Jay Broadnax.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
4 morning.

5 REVEREND BROADNAX: Good
6 morning. My name is Reverend Jay
7 Broadnax and I want to offer testimony in
8 support of the Phi Beta Sigma Founders'
9 Day resolution offered by Councilmember
10 Sorer Katherine Gilmore Richardson.

11 I stand to offer testimony in
12 recognition of one of the most
13 progressive, dynamic, and
14 service-oriented organizations in
15 existence, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, as
16 a representative of its Philadelphia
17 Chapter, historic Nu Sigma Chapter.

18 Phi Beta Sigma was founded by
19 three serious-minded and innovative
20 African American students on the campus
21 of Howard University on January 9th,
22 1914. Abram Langston Taylor, an
23 innovator, visionary, and entrepreneur;
24 Leonard F. Morse, a scholar, religious
25 leader, and educator; and Charles

2 Ignatius Brown, a networker and activist,
3 came together to establish an
4 organization that would be inclusive
5 rather than exclusive, an innovative
6 fraternity for its time that from its
7 beginnings would not judge candidates
8 based upon social status, skin tone, or
9 family background, but upon a quality
10 such as integrity, character, and wisdom.

11 These three founders of Phi
12 Beta Sigma's wondrous band through the
13 principles of brotherhood, scholarship,
14 and service they espoused and through the
15 progress-oriented actions that they
16 undertook and modeled spawned an
17 international movement of Sigma men
18 numbered in the hundreds of thousands
19 throughout its history. Among those who
20 have made the decision to embrace Phi
21 Beta Sigma's progressive, dynamic vision
22 for change and activism are Kwame
23 Nkrumah, former President of Ghana; James
24 Weldon Johnson, composer of Lift Every
25 Voice and Sing; labor leader A. Philip

2 Randolph; Black Panther activist Huey P.
3 Newton; good trouble Congressman, John
4 Lewis; and entertainers Harry Belafonte
5 and Ben Vereen.

6 These are but a few of those
7 who have worked to make Phi Beta Sigma
8 one of the greatest organizations for
9 social justice and community uplift ever
10 conceived.

11 Right here in Philadelphia,
12 since the establishment of its Epsilon
13 undergraduate chapter on the campus of
14 Temple University in 1919 and its
15 citywide graduate chapter, Nu Sigma
16 Chapter in 1922, Phi Beta Sigma has been
17 serving Philadelphia and its vicinity
18 through innovative youth programming and
19 ongoing activism through our anchor
20 programs, bigger and better business,
21 education, and social action.

22 Phi Beta Sigma continues to
23 deliver committed service to this city
24 and region. In the words of our
25 fraternity hymn, our cause speeds on its

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2 way until all violence ceases. Our cause
3 speeds on its way until every child is
4 educated. Our cause speeds on its way
5 until poverty is eradicated.

6 I ask that you support the
7 establishment of the day January 9th as
8 Phi Beta Sigma Founder Day in the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 Thank you very much.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
13 testimony. We appreciate it.

24 For 109 years, Phi Beta Sigma
25 Fraternity, Incorporated has been serving

3 and service for humanity. With over 500
4 chapters across America and overseas, we
5 have been living by the motto and living
6 by our principles, brotherhood,

10 chapter, Nu Sigma Chapter of Phi Beta
11 Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated who is
12 celebrating this year, and we've been
13 celebrating all year, 100 years of
14 service to this city in Philadelphia,
15 Pennsylvania, I stand in support of the
16 resolution presented by our sorer,
17 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
18 Richardson, to recognize and celebrate
19 our Founders' Day on January 9th.

20 Thank you.

25 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
3 is Howard Sid Lucas.

4 (Speaker approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MR. LUCAS: Three for the
8 founders.

9 Good morning. What a moment.
10 I am Howard Sid Lucas, the 40th President
11 of Nu Sigma Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma
12 Fraternity, Incorporated.

13 I was educated in this great
14 city and this magnanimous state from
15 Retta's Elementary, which is now The
16 Phoenix, Vaux Junior High School, which
17 is now a high school, an academic leader
18 in Central High School with its first
19 ever female principal, the blue and gold
20 of the University of Pittsburgh, hail to
21 Pitt, and the resounding steadfast
22 leadership of being a Temple University
23 graduate alumni.

24 On behalf of Phi Beta Sigma
25 Fraternity, Incorporated and the 48th

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President of Nu Sigma Chapter, David Richardson, this moment would not be this moment without the mention of three great women and one sister whose names need no further introduction than their names, great Dame Marian Tasco, Councilmember at-large Blondell Reynolds Brown, the next phoenix of City government, Cherelle L. Parker, and the sister who brings this moment full circle, Councilmember at-large Katherine Gilmore Richardson. A hearty thank you for your continued support.

Among the short of 109 years of commendation for our founders and the institution known as Howard University, the Honorable Abram Langston Taylor, the Honorable Leonard Francis Morse, the Honorable Charles Ignatius Brown, there would be no brotherhood, scholarship, or service. There would be no culture for service and service to humanity. And there would be no 1914 leadership by them for us.

14 Nu Sigma Chapter in Philadelphia. And
15 you know, look out, because we're coming
16 through. We gonna represent magnificent
17 blue.

18 Thank you for this honor.
19 Thank you for this moment. Thank you.

11 Philadelphia graduate chapter of Zeta Phi
12 Beta Sorority, Incorporated where I serve
13 as President, and I come before you today
14 in support of this ordinance which
15 celebrates the 103rd founding of Zeta Phi
16 Beta Sorority, Incorporated, but it also
17 solidifies the partnership between Zeta
18 Phi Beta, Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity,
19 Incorporated, and the City of
20 Philadelphia.

21 The City of Philadelphia is the
22 home and final resting place of not only
23 our triumphant founder, Arizona Cleaver
24 Stemons, who resided at 1915 Federal
25 Street, and her final resting place is at

2 Eden's Cemetery, but it is also the final
3 resting place for a founder, the
4 Honorable Brother Charles I. Brown of Phi
5 Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated. You
6 see, these two organizations truly
7 represent the City of Brotherly Love and
8 Sisterly Affection by solidifying our
9 bond of blue and white.

10 We continually together honor
11 our principles in Zeta's scholarship.
12 The Beta Delta Zeta Chapter awards
13 \$15,000 annually, and we are the first
14 and only organization that actually has
15 an autism scholarship.

16 We honor service by what we do
17 with the March of Dimes. Currently we
18 have adopted the NICU at Thomas Jefferson
19 University Hospital.

20 Final womanhood is demonstrated
21 every day by not only our members who are
22 educators, attorneys, and Councilwomen,
23 but the sisterly love we show each other
24 in supporting all of our Divine Nine
25 sisters and our brothers.

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2 You see, this ordinance is a
3 celebration of each and every one of us.
4 It shows the bond of brotherly and
5 sisterly love. We ask that you support
6 it, and we appreciate everything that you
7 do in Council not only through
8 Councilwoman Gilmore Richardson, my
9 soror, but also Councilman Kenyatta
10 Johnson, who is the Councilman of the
11 home of our founder, which we currently
12 own and assisted us in the renaming of
13 Federal Street.

14 I ask that you support it, and
15 I thank you for your support, and we look
16 forward to continuing to embrace the
17 extraordinary as we were here in July and
18 were happy to assist the economy as we
19 painted the City royal blue and white,
20 and we will continue to do it with our
21 brothers when they are in the City of
22 Philadelphia, making sure that we
23 maintain the economy and we support our
24 communities.

6 Thank you for your testimony. We
7 appreciate it.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Peter Winslow,
9 commenting on 220869.

10 (Speaker approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MR. WINSLOW: Good morning. My
14 name is Peter Winslow. I speak to you
15 today -- first of all, I'm a Philadelphia
16 resident, and I speak to you today as
17 President of A Smart Collaboration LLC
18 and as a candidate that City Council
19 recommended to Mayor Kenney for
20 appointment to the initial Board of
21 Directors of the Philadelphia Public
22 Financial Authority.

23 Special greetings and welcome
24 to the new members of Council.

25 Thank you, President Clarke and

2 members of Council, for this opportunity
3 to speak today in opposition to the
4 transfer ordinance, Bill No. 220869.

5 I join with the previous
6 speakers in celebrating the collaboration
7 that exists, the ongoing collaboration
8 that exists, between City Council and the
9 active citizens in this community.

10 I also applaud and thank
11 Councilmember Jones and the
12 Appropriations Committee for the things
13 that are in the transfer ordinance, the
14 support for the Mural Arts Program and
15 for performing arts and for tourism, all
16 things that I support as well.

17 Nevertheless, I urge you not to
18 pass this bill until you make one further
19 amendment, the refusal of Mayor Kenney to
20 implement the ordinance that you passed
21 and became law, Ordinance No. 210956, to
22 form the Philadelphia Public Financial
23 Authority. That refusal, the refusal to
24 honor his oath of office, to engage in a
25 dialogue about the issues, all of these

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2 things are very disappointing, and it
3 will also be disappointing that City
4 Council were just to walk away and ignore
5 the law that is put on the books and the
6 existence of this opportunity to improve
7 the City.

8 So I urge that you make an
9 amendment to this bill and that that
10 amendment be to allocate one dollar. So
11 it's not about the amount. It's a matter
12 of principle. One dollar allocate from
13 Line 2.5, funds going to the Mayor, to
14 Line 2.1, funds retained by City Council
15 for this purpose. And to get you
16 started, I'll leave my dollar on the
17 public comment podium for Mr. Decker.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony. We
21 appreciate it.

2 is Ebony Gardner, commenting on World
3 AIDS Day, Councilwoman Bass's resolution
4 introduced today.

5 (Speakers approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MS. GARDNER: Good morning. My
9 name is Ebony Gardner and I'm here with
10 Serilda Jones and Troy.

11 Thank you, Council, for
12 listening today. My name is Ebony
13 Gardner, Clinical Director of One Day At
14 A Time. I ask you today to tune in to
15 this moment of reflection. World AIDS
16 Day is an opportunity to slow down the
17 hustle and bustle of routine and pay
18 specific remembrance of where we have
19 come from and where we're going.

20 Today is a celebration. We
21 have prepped for high-risk negatives,
22 life-sustaining medication for
23 individuals who tested positive for HIV,
24 access to services for low or no income
25 individuals. We no longer have to see

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2 our family and friends suffer.

3 World AIDS Day helps us to
4 remember. While we have come a long way,
5 we have further to go. Our leaders at
6 the AIDS Activities Coordinating Office
7 help provide us in the City and tri-state
8 like One Day At A Time to forge a path to
9 ending the epidemic here in the City.

10 On this day and every day, we
11 must continue to be intentional about our
12 services and care and education for
13 minority women, men who have sex with
14 men, and persons who use intravenous
15 drugs, as the numbers here are still
16 growing in these communities.

17 Our four pillars of focus are
18 diagnose, treat, prevent, respond,
19 diagnosing all Philadelphians with HIV as
20 early as possible, treating people with
21 HIV quickly and effectively, preventing
22 new transmissions by promoting PrEP,
23 in-pep (ph), and syringe services, and
24 responding quickly to HIV outbreaks.

25 We may have won some battles,

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2 but not the war. Our small team at ODAAT
3 has collectively over 30 years, educating
4 interns, staff, clients that come in and
5 out of our doors. We have been trained
6 in multiple evidence-based practices. We
7 continue to evolve and meet our
8 community.

9 Here today is Serilda Jones,
10 one of our staff, here to give a little
11 testimony of hers.

12 MS. JONES: Good morning. Good
13 morning, everyone. Good morning,
14 Councilman, everyone that's in their
15 respective places. I'm Serilda Jones.
16 I'm one of the neutral testers at One Day
17 At A Time, and I continue to be an
18 advocate for the people that have no
19 support system, that actually are still
20 dealing with adversity and the different
21 things that's going on with the HIV.

22 People are still continuing to
23 contract. I also came across a couple of
24 new positives and the stigma that they're
25 dealing with not having the family and

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2 friends and the support. So here I am
3 with One Day At A Time. I'm the support
4 system, their advocate, and I pretty much
5 encourage them and try to help them with
6 their viral and continue on helping the
7 community with this fight.

8 I have one -- I don't know --
9 young man that I've been working with,
10 and he wanted to pretty much tell -- if
11 you don't mind me saying your story, he
12 is one that I found as a new person that
13 just maybe a week ago, and it was such a
14 devastating thing that he wanted to --
15 I'm his support system. He has no
16 family, no friends.

17 So what do we do with the
18 people that are still struggling with
19 this stigma, struggling with, oh, I don't
20 want you eating off my fork, I won't want
21 you using my bathroom because of this.
22 But I'm here to encourage him and to let
23 him know and be empathetic to his
24 well-being.

25 So if you would like to -- is

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2 it okay for him to...

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. Yeah. Next.

5 MS. JONES: Thank you.

6 MR. THOMAS: Hello, everyone,
7 Councilpeople, City of Philadelphia. I
8 came here before y'all not lost but a
9 living man living with a disease from
10 which there's no known cure. But three
11 weeks ago I was facing a dilemma where I
12 felt like I didn't want to live no more,
13 and people reached out for me, and
14 especially with Ms. Ebony and
15 Ms. Serilda. Through they work and they
16 program, within two weeks, within two
17 weeks turned my whole life around.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 MR. THOMAS: I come before
22 y'all not scared to admit my disease or
23 not, but I come to y'all to admit the
24 good that's in people heart and stuff
25 that's still out there with ODAAT

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2 organization. It tremendously like did a
3 390 on me.

4 So I would like to give them
5 praise. I mean, really.

6 But then there's people still
7 out there that's living with what I'm
8 living with and still in denial. But on
9 the same token, they in so much denial
10 because they have no support system or
11 nothing, whereas this thing they carrying
12 around, it can be carried on to any and
13 everybody, you know, and I don't think
14 that's right, because I got a conscience.

15 But through they help and
16 effort in my life, like I'm still going
17 on. I'm strong through God eyes first.
18 But here and now, like I don't have a
19 mother, father, sister, brother, nothing.
20 She did so much for me. I would like to
21 say --

22 - - -

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Is

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2 that Mr. Thomas?

3 MR. THOMAS: Yes.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

5 Just state your name for the record. I
6 just want to make sure we have you.

7 MR. THOMAS: Troy Thomas.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your
10 testimony.

11 - - -

12 (Applause.)

13 - - -

14 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
15 is Sabrina Tate.

16 (Speaker approached podium.)

17 MS. TATE: Good morning.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MS. TATE: I am following up --
21 my name is Sabrina Tate. I am the
22 Executive Director of Bebash Transition
23 for Hope. We are an organization that
24 was burst of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in
25 1995. We continue to service people who

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2 are identified as HIV positive, but we
3 work for people like the gentleman who
4 just spoke.

5 We know that there are tens of
6 thousands of people who are impacted by
7 HIV/AIDS in Philadelphia. They continue
8 to be infected. The number of people
9 that we are testing that test positive is
10 increasing.

11 Despite the fact that we have a
12 pandemic that says that we are supposed
13 to socially distance and cover our faces,
14 we are not educating at the rate that we
15 used to about protecting ourselves
16 sexually and also identifying that we are
17 contracting this through this opioid
18 epidemic, right?

19 So I am here in support of
20 Councilmember Bass's resolution to
21 declare today, December 1st, as World
22 AIDS Day. It is a reminder for many to
23 annually be checked, to be tested, and to
24 make sure that they are educating others
25 about how to remain safe.

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2 It seems really simplistic. It
3 doesn't take much, but it means a lot to
4 many.

5 So thank you for the
6 opportunity to speak.

14 speaker, Mr. President, is Sue Slawson,
15 commenting on 220869.

16 (Speaker approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MS. SLAWSON: Good morning.
20 Good morning. Susan Slawson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
22 morning, Susan.

23 MS. SLAWSON: Good morning.

24 I'm making comment on Ordinance
25 220869, Mr. President, members of City

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2 Council, and the Mayor in his absence,
3 and of course Parks and Recreation
4 Commissioner Kathryn Ott Lovell.

5 I'm standing here today to say
6 thank you for including Parks and
7 Recreation. I want to thank Patricia
8 Aden Wilson as well for advocating on our
9 behalf.

10 The Dell Music Center was built
11 in 1924, so we're coming up on 100 years.
12 It serves the City of Philadelphia, not
13 just North Philadelphia, although it's
14 housed there. It serves the tri-state.
15 As a matter of fact, it has grown to
16 serve the country, because people come
17 from all over now to enjoy the Dell Music
18 Center, and as a result of your
19 support -- and I think this is just a
20 great opportunity for me to say -- and I
21 won't call your names, but I will say,
22 Mr. President, because I've gone to a
23 number of you on different occasions when
24 we needed money over and over again, and
25 you've never said no, and I want to say

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2 thank you for those moments where we were
3 in need and you were willing to say yes.

4 I want to say thank you to
5 those of you that settled that
6 appropriation. I got the call,
7 Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Katherine
8 Gilmore Richardson, Councilmember Isaiah
9 Thomas, those of you that stood up and
10 said we need to make sure that, as you
11 call it, the Grand Old Lady is
12 represented in these numbers.

13 You stood for us. We'll
14 continue to stand for the citizens of
15 Philadelphia, because that's what the
16 Dell Music Center is about. It is about
17 excellence. It is about ensuring that we
18 serve our community and our citizens in
19 the best way possible with the best
20 music, with the best customer service.
21 You know why? Because we represent the
22 City of Philadelphia.

23 So I say thank you, thank you,
24 thank you for your willingness to ensure
25 that we were included in this

2 appropriation and that we will continue
3 to be included.

23 North Howard Street) in the seventh
24 Councilmanic District.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

9 All in favor indicate by saying
10 aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and that resolution is
17 adopted.

18 Mr. Decker, please read the
19 title of 220930.

20 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution also
21 naming the 1500 block of Wharton Street
22 "James Mtume Way" to honor the life and
23 legacy of renowned musician, activist,
24 and Philadelphia native James Mtume.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 Chair again recognizes Councilman Johnson
3 for a motion.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
5 Council President. I move for the
6 adoption of the resolution.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
9 been moved and properly seconded.

10 All in favor indicate by saying
11 aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 Mr. Decker, 220931.

20 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
21 approving the redevelopment contract and
22 the ground lease agreement of the
23 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for
24 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a
25 portion of the South Central Urban

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2 Renewal Area, identified by house number
3 and street address as 614 through 626
4 South Thirteenth Street (including 1306
5 through 1310 Kater Street and 1309
6 through 1313 Bainbridge Street).

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson for a
9 motion.

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
11 Council President. I move for the
12 adoption of the resolution.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
15 been moved and properly seconded.

16 All in favor indicate by saying
17 aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and that resolution is
24 adopted.

25 Mr. Decker, 220932.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
3 unequivocally condemning the rise in
4 antisemitism and all forms of hate in the
5 City of Philadelphia, the Commonwealth of
6 Pennsylvania, the United States of
7 America, and across the globe.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Driscoll.

10 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
11 you, Mr. President.

12 An attack on one faith is an
13 attack on all faiths. According to the
14 Anti-Defamation League, in 2021, 2,717
15 incidents of harassment, vandalism, or
16 violence targeting Jews. This is the
17 most since the Anti-Defamation League
18 began tracking, and the current CEO,
19 Jonathan Greenblatt, does not see any
20 meaningful change in this trend.

21 Four years ago, the Tree of
22 Life in Pittsburgh, it was the worst
23 anti-Semitic attack in American history,
24 took place right here in our
25 Commonwealth, claiming the lives of 11 of

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2 our Jewish brethren.

3 My colleague in the House of
4 Representatives, Dan Frankel, and I wept
5 that day, and we wept for the 11
6 casualties, we wept for the members of
7 that congregation, and we wept for
8 humanity.

9 And recently the republican
10 party nominated a candidate for governor
11 actively recruited supporters from the
12 same far right extremist social media
13 platform used by the Tree of Life
14 attacker.

15 Never again is supposed to be
16 never again, but many people, young and
17 old, do not know what the Holocaust was.
18 People do not usually acknowledge that
19 Hitler came to power through democratic
20 means until he dismantled the government
21 and became a totalitarian autocratic
22 genocidal maniac.

23 The attempted erasure of Jewish
24 people began with the boycotting of shops
25 and abandoning of books. Within years,

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2 it devolved into the mass imprisonment
3 and extermination of Jewish and other
4 marginalized groups, with the goal to
5 leave one pure White race.

6 We must never forget hatred and
7 evil. When allowed to boil, it can
8 explode.

9 And so, Mr. President, with
10 that, I move for the adoption of this
11 resolution.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. It's been moved and seconded
15 the resolution be adopted.

16 All in favor indicate by saying
17 aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and that resolution is
24 definitely adopted. Thank you.

25 Mr. Decker, please read the

2 title of Bill No. 220654-A.

3 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
4 amending Chapter 10-300, entitled
5 "Minors," to revise the evening curfew
6 hours.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
8 bill having been read on two different
9 days, the question now is shall the bill
10 pass finally.

11 Mr. Decker, call the roll.

12 Councilwoman, I'm sorry.

13 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON:
14 That's okay. Thank you so much, Council
15 President. I just wanted to provide
16 additional clarification prior to the
17 vote on Bill No. 220654-A.

18 I wanted to clarify some of the
19 amendments that were passed by this body
20 last week, including in Chapter 10-303,
21 which further clarifies some of the
22 provisions in the bill around youth who
23 are engaged in gainful, lawful employment
24 at the time of the curfew, that those
25 youth would not be penalized in any way

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2 because of them going to and from work.

3 In addition to that, we did
4 meet with the Juvenile Law Center, and we
5 wanted to make additional clarification
6 around there being no penalties for
7 homeless youth who are out after curfew,
8 because many of them need connection to
9 resources and additional services.

10 And also we added reporting
11 requirements to the legislation that
12 would begin on January 1, 2023, which is
13 an additional Section 10-306, which would
14 provide for quarterly reporting to City
15 Council from the Philadelphia Police
16 Department and the Department of Human
17 Services so that we are receiving
18 additional information on the back end
19 around implementation and enforcement,
20 particularly around connecting the young
21 people to the Community Evening Resource
22 Centers now that we have four and we're
23 working towards having six, one in every
24 police division in the City of
25 Philadelphia.

2 So I wanted to get that on the
3 record for the benefit of this body and
4 also for those who are listening to this
5 session.

6 Thank you, Council President.
7 And with that, I turn it over to you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Phillips.

12 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: Council
13 President, I just wanted to rise to echo
14 my support of this particular bill,
15 220654. As one who has worked with
16 students in Philadelphia, I understand
17 the importance of children not being on
18 the street to have a better life, and I
19 believe this bill increases their
20 likelihood of success and life.

21 One of the things that I just
22 want to mention about this bill is that
23 at a time when it seems there's no outer
24 limit of senseless whirlwind of violence
25 facing teens and young people, I think

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2 we're taking a temporary emergency step
3 in the absence of a cure at all. So
4 really in huge support of it.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

7 Mr. Decker, let's read the
8 title over again. We'll start from the
9 beginning.

15 me, and I think I have no other way to

19 The great failure of our city
20 we see in gun violence and murder, wanton
21 crime, failure in education, failure in
22 jobs, failure in so many ways, but
23 addressing them as we do, contained in
24 this transfer ordinance is \$500,000 and
25 \$500,000, this body, with the cooperation

2 of the Mayor, the support of the Mayor.

3 Upon learning that innocent
4 persons, mothers of children, were being
5 targeted for retribution simply because
6 they're the mothers of children, that
7 someone unable to get to someone they
8 want to kill starts shooting at that
9 person's mother, sister, and brother, why
10 those people identified to us are not
11 being protected, why they cannot be
12 afforded an ability to live without
13 getting shot at, assaulted, attacked is a
14 great failure.

15 The District Attorney's Office
16 has a function. It is not to relocate
17 these people. They do relocate witnesses
18 who are going to testify. That is a
19 temporary location, put them in a hotel,
20 put them in a motel. After the trial is
21 over, they go back home.

22 We are talking about vulnerable
23 people who cannot remain at home, and
24 that is a failure.

25 So this \$500,000 that we

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appropriated was for the immediate relocation of the mothers and their children as young as eight years old who were being literally shot at. It is just a matter of time before they're killed.

A year later, after another year previous that they had not been relocated, they are still not moved, and then we learned at a recent hearing that the department that we asked to be responsible for this money, to give that money to a non-profit that can move them immediately, Every Murder Is Real, EMIR, and other organizations like that received not one penny. Nobody has been moved. This was since October of 2021. Nobody has moved.

Now we learn the money was moved to a non-profit organization, not to move people but for various costs. The Administration in a letter says the money is still sitting there, but then they are moving another \$500,000 to an organization, a department of our city,

6 Administration says part of the \$500,000

11 one person has been moved.

12 One of the persons who's
13 testified is 23 years old, very well
14 known by Councilmember Majority Leader,
15 Chair of Public Safety, Curtis Jones, who
16 has talked about her and has helped her
17 and her family. She's 23 years old. She
18 has two children. Riding in a car,
19 someone shot into the car and she lost
20 her eye. She has headaches. She has
21 pain. She can't function in the morning.
22 She takes her medication. She can't
23 function after that.

24 A month or two later, the
25 father of her children was murdered, and

2 she is harassed and attacked, and she
3 cannot receive protection.

4 \$7,000 she paid in medical
5 bills, and beyond that, she still has
6 medical bills. She has been denied
7 disability. She doesn't have any funds.

8 One million dollars. Not a
9 penny to help these people. Not a penny
10 to move these people.

11 The woman who testified or who
12 went forward to the news trying to keep
13 her identity unknown was on television,
14 in the newspaper, the neighborhood knew
15 who she was. And it is not surprising
16 she got a gun after being beaten and shot
17 at, her children running away, unsafe.
18 She got a gun. Well, that gun was used
19 in two murders, so now she's in prison
20 facing murder charges.

21 Two years of not relocating
22 people, a million dollars, that is a
23 failure, and a letter. It's
24 unacceptable. Unacceptable.

25 We have a hearing. There was

2 notice. You have to come in, let us know
3 what happened to the money, what is it
4 being used for. We get a letter. That's
5 not satisfactory.

6 That money must be returned.
7 The money must be used to relocate these
8 people, pay for their injuries, their
9 harm. That money represents our city's
10 will to address violent, deadly
11 retribution against innocent people.
12 We're not built for this, but we better
13 get built.

14 My thing is, it is unacceptable
15 to me that this Administration, with the
16 wonderful things it does and all the
17 money it has, cannot tell us what
18 happened to \$500,000.

19 How many times are we going to
20 do this? It's two years, it's a year.
21 Move the people. Put their kids in
22 school. Don't put them in a motel/hotel,
23 PHA housing where everybody knows where
24 they are. Move them to safety. Maybe
25 you will find that people will have some

2 confidence in our city, will be
3 witnesses, will testify, will cooperate.

4 We know who the shooters are.
5 We know who terrorize these people. They
6 must be apprehended. They must be
7 prosecuted. It is inexcusable. It is
8 not anything but murder waiting to
9 happen.

10 This city has to account for
11 the \$500,000.

12 With that, I will make a motion
13 to table this vote.

14 Thank you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 There's been a motion to table.

18 - - -

19 (Applause.)

20 - - -

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Is
22 there a second?

23 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I second that
24 motion.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You

2 need to be on this side of the rail to do
3 that. Sorry. I appreciate your
4 sentiment, though.

5 No second?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Councilman, there is not a second, so
9 your motion to table is denied.

10 Okay. Mr. Decker, let's start
11 again with the title.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Mr.
13 President?

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
17 Mr. President.

18 You know, I think that the
19 Councilman made some very valid points
20 and they need to be explored. And so
21 while there is not a second for the
22 motion, I think that there needs to be I
23 think a commitment from this body to
24 follow through on the concerns that we
25 all have that have just been brought

2 forward from Councilman Oh under your
3 leadership.

4 So I think that we all want to
5 address this. It needs to be addressed
6 right away. It's not something that can
7 wait. And so even though there wasn't a
8 second for the motion, the issue still
9 stands and needs to be addressed by this
10 body.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
12 concur, Councilwoman. This is clearly
13 something that needs to be addressed.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Thomas.

16 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
17 Council President.

18 I just wanted to echo the
19 sentiments of my colleague Councilmember
20 Bass, and I was going to save it for my
21 speech of the majority, but I guess that
22 speech will be cut a little bit short.

23 Not only have we allocated
24 money for witnesses and witnesses to be
25 relocated, when we're putting on our hat

2 around this issue of crime and violence
3 in the City, we've also allocated money
4 for cameras that have not been purchased,
5 that have not been put up, and we're
6 still fighting for that.

7 We've also allocated money for
8 hit-and-run technology. Captain Otherwise
9 and his team came before the Public
10 Safety Committee as well as the Streets
11 Department two years ago when we were in
12 the middle of a hit-and-run epidemic,
13 which we're still a part of right now, to
14 ask for technology instead of continuing
15 to use tape measures and rulers and
16 things of that capacity in the year 2020,
17 and that's ridiculous.

18 The reason I bring those things
19 up, because I do agree with Councilmember
20 Oh's concern, but one of the reasons I
21 didn't second it is because it's the
22 responsibility of this legislative body
23 to put ourself in a position to be able
24 to make votes and decide where funds
25 should go, not to spend the money.

2 So while I agree with his
3 concern that the money needs to be spent
4 on the right thing, I agree with his
5 concern that we need to advocate and make
6 sure that we're fighting for those who
7 cannot necessarily fight for themselves,
8 I agree with the sense of urgency and the
9 sense of emergency that we need as it
10 relates to the crime in the City of
11 Philadelphia, we have to continue to do
12 our job, to put money in places and in
13 spaces that we know will improve the City
14 of Philadelphia, and we have to continue
15 to push the Administration to spend the
16 money.

17 So I appreciate Councilmember
18 Oh's speech. I agree with Councilmember
19 Bass, but I also wanted to add those two
20 things to the list as well too, because
21 we feel like those things, along with,
22 I'm sure, many others, will improve the
23 issues around public safety and crime in
24 the City of Philadelphia.

25 Thank you, Council President.

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes. Thank
7 you, Council President.

8 I know that it is a concern to
9 every member of this body. It is a
10 concern to everyone in our city and to
11 the Administration as well. There are
12 different approaches to how this will be
13 resolved.

14 I echo the concerns of
15 Councilmember Thomas in the sense that we
16 do appropriate money, and when the
17 Administration does not use that money as
18 it was specifically appropriated, we
19 continue to appropriate and appropriate
20 and appropriate. There comes a point in
21 time where the only thing we can do is
22 withhold.

23 I understand my colleagues. As
24 I said, there's a lot of good things in
25 this bill. There's a lot of things that

2 need to be funded.

3 I do want to also thank
4 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore
5 Richardson for her leadership on this
6 issue. Her advocacy has been very strong
7 with the Administration, and I think if
8 nothing else, the Administration, I hope,
9 will take this as a very serious warning
10 on my part, you know. I will not give
11 them another penny, me personally if I
12 could, but government must function, so
13 we have different views.

14 But they need to come into some
15 level of compliance with what they say
16 they will do and blatantly do not do on
17 something as important as people's lives.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gilmore

3 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
4 you, Council President. I apologize. I
5 was seeking to be recognized as well and
6 wanted to thank Councilmember Oh for his
7 advocacy and for the hearing that was
8 held last week, but I also want to thank
9 Councilmember Jones, our new Chair of
10 Appropriations, who has really guided us
11 through this process and the very
12 detailed work.

13 But I wanted to again thank
14 Councilmember Oh, because on the
15 Wednesday before Thanksgiving, I sent a
16 communication directly to the
17 Administration, copied Councilmember Oh
18 and our colleagues, regarding the
19 questioning at the hearing, the Public
20 Safety hearing, about the relocation of
21 the witnesses. And we in this body have
22 done our part to allocate the funds to
23 ensure that those individuals could be
24 moved. However, the Administration has
25 yet to spend that allocation.

2 That is happening all too
3 frequent with a number of matters that we
4 have faced with a sense of urgency in
5 this body. So I am respectfully
6 requesting that as we move forward in our
7 budget process for next fiscal year, that
8 the Administration take notice, and if
9 they are not going to move forward with
10 the issues and the agenda of the day from
11 this body, that we will take that as a
12 note as we move forward in the budget
13 process next year.

14 Thank you, Council President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
20 Mr. President.

21 This is not my first transfer
22 ordinance, but I can tell you that our
23 Chairman, his first transfer ordinance is
24 the best process and the best result that
25 I've ever seen. And discussions were

2 made, and Councilman Jones made it clear
3 that all the concerns that have been
4 mentioned will be taken seriously. It's
5 not going to be a repeat performance
6 every time a bill gets signed by the
7 Mayor agreeing to everything that's in it

9 gets ignored.

10 So I want to thank Councilman
11 Jones and the whole Committee, because
12 this really was a landmark transfer
13 ordinance.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Good thing Councilwoman
17 Sanchez is not still here, sir. It was
18 definitely one of the best. That's all
19 I'll say. Always a diplomat.

20 Thank you. Thank you,
21 Councilman. Councilman, I understand.
22 Thank you.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilwoman Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, thank

2 you, Mr. President, but really briefly I
3 just wanted to follow up on Councilwoman
4 Kathy Gilmore Richardson's comments
5 regarding the upcoming budget, the next
6 budget season and as we send a message to
7 the Administration. I would say that not
8 just waiting until we get to the budget
9 cycle to making sure that the
10 Administration hears us, but I think that
11 if we really want to do something about
12 the concerns expressed by Councilman Oh,
13 then we need to do something before we
14 get to the budget cycle.

15 I think that's what you meant,
16 but I just wanted to clarify, like that
17 we not wait until we get to the actual
18 budget to take some action, because these
19 are very important issues. You know,
20 crime is at -- it's at the top of
21 everybody's list of something that needs
22 to be addressed in the City of
23 Philadelphia, and, you know, like if we
24 don't do something to protect our
25 witnesses, this is going to continue,

2 what we have now is going to continue.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Absolutely.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
6 Mr. President.

9 Okay. No. I understand. I
10 can't speak from the podium, as not to
11 influence the vote, but the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: No. I
14 just want to echo the sentiments of my
15 colleagues, but particularly around --
16 and I participated in some of the hearing
17 last week regarding the relocation of
18 witnesses, and the response was totally
19 unacceptable. And it's actually
20 embarrassing because when we talk about
21 reaching close to 500 homicides here in
22 the City of Philadelphia and we taking a
23 position that addressing the issue of gun
24 violence is our number one priority, then
25 we shouldn't even be talking about the

2 allocation of funding and how witnesses
3 are being relocated.

4 You can't solve a homicide if
5 you don't have witnesses coming forward.
6 So if you have witnesses being shot at,
7 if you have witnesses being murdered,
8 then we'll have this revolving cycle of
9 homicides.

10 And so I want to specifically
11 echo what Councilwoman Bass talked about,
12 that we don't have time to wait at the
13 end of the day. Like we're not going to
14 wrap up and go home for the holiday and
15 still not deal with this issue.

16 And so I'm all in. We can meet
17 after Council. We can get together and
18 we can address the Administration and
19 figure out how we're addressing this
20 issue, because at the end of the day, it
21 totally is unacceptable.

22 All the other issues that we
23 supported, it's great, but the issue of
24 people losing their lives day in and day
25 out, people being frightened to come

2 forward, you know, is definitely totally
3 unacceptable.

4 So I'm all in, and I want to
5 get with my colleagues after this and we
6 can move forward and go from there.

16 celebrating, honoring, and recognizing
17 Sereena Quick on being selected as the
18 operator of the new 4040 City Ave
19 Chick-fil-A, introduced today by
20 Councilman Jones.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
25 and lunch.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
4 should have brought a sample, sir.

5 Can we get a second?

9 All in favor indicate by saying
10 aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and that resolution is
17 adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
19 honoring Wallo267 and Gillie Da King for
20 their community-oriented activism and
21 philanthropy, including four million
22 dollars in grants for minority led
23 businesses and social service
24 organizations, introduced today by
25 Councilman Johnson.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

9 been moved and properly seconded.

10 All in favor indicate by saying
11 aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
20 declaring December as World AIDS Day in
21 Philadelphia, introduced today by
22 Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

2 Mr. President.

3 Before we call for the adoption
4 of the resolution, I wanted to thank the
5 folks who came down today during public
6 comment from ODAAT, One Day At A Time,
7 also Mr. Troy Thomas who told his
8 personal story, as well as Ms. Sabrina
9 Tate who was here from Bebashí. I wanted
10 to thank all of them for coming down
11 today, and just as a reminder, that we
12 need to do this because people still die
13 from AIDS. Thirteen thousand people die
14 in the United States annually still from
15 HIV and AIDS.

16 So this is a day to remember
17 those that we have lost over the many,
18 many years that AIDS has been around and
19 also to do the preventive work so that we
20 can stop the numbers from increasing,
21 particularly here in the City of
22 Philadelphia, to do what we can around
23 AIDS prevention.

24 And with all that being said,
25 Mr. President, I move for the adoption of

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
5 been moved and properly seconded.

6 All in favor indicate by saying
7 aye.

8 (Aye.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and that resolution is
14 adopted.

15 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
16 other resolutions on the Final Passage
17 Calendar, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

20 We will now move to our
21 speeches.

22 Any speeches on behalf of the
23 minority?

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
3 much, Council President.

4 I wanted to just give my
5 condolences to the City workers and
6 municipal-related workers who have lost
7 their lives.

8 Recently I saw, and perhaps
9 many people saw, the shocking video of a
10 Parking Authority worker simply doing his
11 job and without provocation was walked up
12 from behind and shot in the back of the
13 head. The only identifying thing that I
14 can see is he was wearing a uniform.

15 Prior to that, we had a
16 sanitation worker who was in the midst of
17 doing his job, working, picking up the
18 trash, and he was shot and killed.

19 And unfortunately over the
20 summer, people firing multiple, multiple
21 bullets into a recreation center with
22 children and people, hit one of our
23 workers.

24 These are critical functions
25 for our city. It is very problematic and

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troubling, but it's also very sad. We are, despite whatever differences we have in our opinions, a family of people who serve the public interest, and we must do something about that. No one should fear that they will be harmed because of the uniform or enitia or logo they wear representing the City of Philadelphia and its functions.

Beyond that, my condolences to all family, friends, and loved ones, and it certainly is additional reason that we have to step up.

Thank you, Council President.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman.

Speeches on behalf of the majority?

The Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you, Mr. President.

Last night I had the honor and privilege of representing this body on

2 the celebration of the House of Umoja.
3 Sister Falaka Fattah, a 90-year-old young
4 activist, still packs a punch when it
5 comes to the issue of our babies, gun
6 violence prevention and what to do about
7 it.

8 I was in the African American
9 Museum with a crowd of individuals who
10 were both 70's related and millennial and
11 Gen Z recognizing her contribution to
12 this effort.

13 Some of them encouraged her to
14 teach. Some of them encouraged her to
15 come out of retirement to get back
16 involved, but all of them supported her.

17 But the star of the panel of
18 which I was on was a young man, teenager,
19 somewhat shy and reserved, but his words
20 were piercing. So when he was asked the
21 direct question about how to end gun
22 violence, he looked back and said, it's
23 not going to end. And everybody gasped
24 and said, well, tell us what to do. And
25 so he mentioned a couple of things, but

2 pretty much what was the answer was that
3 we have to not be afraid of the things we
4 say we love. We have to talk to these
5 young people.

6 Coach, I look at you, because
7 you do it every day.

8 And we talk at them, but
9 sometimes we don't listen to them. We
10 have to do more listening to them to get
11 the answers from them, not what we think
12 they should do and what we want them to
13 do. We have to really pay attention.

14 The second thing that I took
15 from that celebration and recognition was
16 that more and more people were saying
17 what Member Oh was talking about. Like
18 we appropriated -- and I talked to my
19 colleague -- over \$300 million over the
20 last two years. We have done our part,
21 but we have to get more accountability
22 about those dollars, because if it ain't
23 working, we need to rethink what we are
24 doing.

25 Finally, one of the things that

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came out of that discussion was that some of the activists there want to hold parents more accountable for what happens in their home. Member Bass always talks about what do you do when the shooter lives with you. And I was talking to a young person and an old head, which I hate to be called, but they said that there is a game being played now with Pooh Shiesties. And what a Pooh Shiesty is is a mask that covers most of your identifying features. It is a mask that came from a rapper who did videos who stuck people up with this mask.

Now, they told me you should introduce a law banning this. I will not. I have my share of hoodies at home. I respect our ability to choose what we wear, to not limit our children. But if they think this is dressing for success, they are wrong.

They played a game where they jump out on an old head at a convenience store and run up on him to scare him.

2 They didn't have guns, so, you know, they
3 weren't a threat. And it was funny until
4 the old head pulled out his gun. Ain't
5 no fun hunting when the rabbit get the
6 gun.

7 So we have to teach our kids
8 better. We have to show them how to
9 dress for success. We have to give them
10 a reason to want to grow older, to be a
11 part of society. But I say to them, no,
12 we won't introduce the law, but I
13 remember coming up if you had a crowbar
14 in your car or on your person, that was a
15 tool to do burglaries.

16 This is not a tool to get a
17 job, to go to school, and particularly
18 when it's 80 degrees out. We have to --
19 parents, you got to look into your rooms.
20 If you see these kind of gloves and this
21 kind of hat, you need to raise that
22 question with your children as to why
23 they need that.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Thomas.

8 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
9 Council President, and thank you,
10 Majority Leader Jones. That was a
11 phenomenal speech, and I think he made a
12 great point.

13 I just want to take a moment
14 to, first and foremost, welcome our new
15 colleagues into Council. Council
16 President, I know you did that earlier,
17 but I wanted to welcome you here. The
18 other day was a great ceremony, but it's
19 nothing like being on the actual Council
20 floor. So welcome to the team.

21 I also wanted to offer my
22 condolences to Mr. Milton Street and the
23 entire Street family. I agree with you,
24 Council President, when you talk about
25 advocacy and his history in the City. He

2 sure made his presence known and made
3 advocacy a part of his DNA.

4 Thank our colleague
5 Councilmember Bass for her leadership
6 around today being World AIDS Day and
7 recognizing the important work that must
8 continue to happen.

9 Earlier in Council I had the
10 privilege of welcoming and introducing
11 Asil Greer, who again we recognized in
12 June as one of our Champions of the Week,
13 and the reason why I bring him up is
14 similar to what Councilmember Jones
15 talked about. When we do this work on a
16 consistent basis, we're thinking about
17 the youth and the young people in the
18 City of Philadelphia. One of the things
19 they often challenge us to is how do we
20 treat our children here in the City, what
21 are we doing to inspire them and to make
22 them feel like there is hope.

23 It's imperative that we give
24 young people a platform to be able to
25 show off their skills and to be able to

2 let us know and the City know what it is
3 they're doing. But it's also important
4 that we follow that up with action.

5 And I think today, not just
6 with the introduction of the NPI bill,
7 thinking about what Councilmember Oh
8 talked about around City employees. NPI
9 is going to be something that's going to
10 benefit City employees in a great way.
11 We know we have to step up and do more to
12 protect them and citizens across the City
13 of Philadelphia.

14 One of the things that I did a
15 little while back was I had a press
16 conference that Councilmember Clarke and
17 Squilla, Driscoll, Johnson, Gilmore
18 Richardson, and you, Council President,
19 all supported, and in that press
20 conference, we talked about things that
21 we need to do to be able to address the
22 crime and the gun violence in the City of
23 Philadelphia, and today I'm very proud of
24 what we were able to accomplish as it
25 relates to this transfer ordinance.

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We're blessed to be in a position as a city to have the surplus that we have. We may never see this surplus again. So to be able to sit here today and to know that we put money into things that we advocated for earlier this year around cleaning up the City, Councilmember Oh is exactly right, around witness and victim protection, one of the things that we know, 42 percent of the time a case is dismissed or thrown out in the City of Philadelphia that's related to guns and crimes is because a witness or police officer didn't show up.

So what are we doing as a legislative body to do our part to allocate funds and resources to address that number, because that percentage is extremely alarming.

So while we do have a number of concerns and the work will continue, I am here today to what I would like to call a victory lap as it relates to the spending and the dollars that are being allocated

2 for the arts and for prevention-based
3 initiatives.

4 A lot of times young men that
5 Councilmember Jones talked about who are
6 wearing those masks, who are involved in
7 negative activities, the narrative is
8 very similar. It starts because they're
9 bored. It starts because they don't have
10 anything to do. It starts because in the
11 City of Philadelphia right now, we don't
12 have very many options as it relates to
13 free programming for our teenagers if
14 you're not involved in extracurricular
15 activity within your school.

16 So it's our responsibility to
17 step up and come up with innovative ideas
18 and resources for those young people.
19 And at the end of the day, today was a
20 step in the right direction as it relates
21 to filling that gap.

22 Thank you, Council President,
23 and thank you, colleagues, for the work
24 that was done, and I agree with
25 Councilmember O'Neill, we appreciate the

3 Appropriations Chair.

4 Thank you, colleagues.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

11 Thank you.

12 The Chair recognizes
13 Councilwoman Gauthier.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER: Thank
15 you, Council President.

16 I wanted to take this
17 opportunity to thank my colleagues for
18 voting yes on \$3 million that will be
19 allocated to fix the Sayre pool in Cobbs
20 Creek. I want to especially thank our
21 Majority Leader Jones, who is now
22 chairing the Appropriations Committee,
23 all my colleagues on the Appropriations
24 Committee, and I also want to thank the
25 Mayor and his Administration for

2 supporting this appropriation too. I
3 don't know that I can express how
4 meaningful this is to me and to my
5 community.

6 The Sayre pool issue was
7 something that was brought to me pretty
8 early on after I started in 2020.
9 Community members came to me and they
10 were telling me about this pool that had
11 been shut down for a few years and how
12 they needed it to be opened back up for
13 the community. And, you know, hearing
14 this issue, I don't think I had an
15 adequate picture of what it was that they
16 were talking about and the asset that the
17 community was losing out on, and it
18 wasn't until I visited the pool that I
19 really got it.

20 And, you know, I learned that
21 this was a huge Olympic-sized pool that
22 was just sitting there unused, not able
23 to be accessed by our community, and it
24 seemed to me like such a waste. Why
25 would we let an asset like that just be

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2 closed off to our community members?

3 And so together with the
4 community, we started advocating, right?
5 I mean, we were advocating at that time
6 to the School District, who owns the
7 pool.

8 And I should also say that the
9 Sayre pool prior to its closure had been
10 open for over 50 years servicing the
11 community, and scores and scores of Black
12 children in particular learned to swim at
13 that pool. It's even the focus of a
14 movie called Pride based on how important
15 it was to the City of Philadelphia and to
16 Black children learning how to swim
17 there. And so the loss of the pool was
18 huge.

19 It also took away a place where
20 Parks and Recreation would train our
21 lifeguards in West Philadelphia, and it
22 left us with virtually no space to
23 adequately train lifeguards in our
24 section, in the West section of the City,
25 and it contributed to us not being able

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2 to fully open pools every single summer,
3 because we don't have adequate places to
4 train lifeguards.

5 And so it was a huge loss, not
6 only to the Cobbs Creek community but to
7 the City at large.

8 And so we began advocating to
9 the School District of Philadelphia and,
10 you know, maybe after several months, the
11 board voted down a recommendation to make
12 a \$10 million investment in the
13 restoration of the pool. And so that
14 was, you know, really disappointing for
15 the community, for me. And I think the
16 District at that time or the School Board
17 at that time voted down the motion
18 because they saw that \$10 million as a
19 huge amount, as a huge price tag,
20 especially given all their other
21 responsibilities throughout the School
22 District. But to the community, this
23 asset was priceless.

24 I remember going to a rally
25 shortly after that vote where the

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community was outside the center and they're advocating for the pool's reopening, and when I got to the rally, in the middle of the street there's a casket, and the casket was a symbol of what we were losing by not opening that pool, because the community gets that if we don't have safe outlets for our young people, that that contributes to violence in our city, right?

And so this is not just a pool. This is a way that we can keep young people productive, having fun and on the right path.

And so at that point, you know, I began advocating to my colleagues, right, about the importance of investing in this pool, which resulted in this appropriation in the transfer ordinance.

And so I'm hopeful that now that we collectively have virtually cut the price tag in half for the School District. With the \$3 million we voted on today and with another million from my

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own capital budget and from Rep
McClinton's capital budget, I hope to
work in partnership with the School
District to find another 4 million ASAP
to get this asset open for the Cobbs
Creek community and the City at large.

And we've talked a lot today
about the things that we don't want young
people to do, and I'm a participant in
that, a full participant in that
conversation, right? We don't want them
to engage in certain activities. We just
voted on a curfew bill. But what are we
willing to invest in young people, right?
Alongside all of the things that we are
telling them we don't want them to do,
what are we willing to invest? And I
think this is a good example of how we
should also be willing to invest and not
skimp on things that will allow our young
people to have a healthy and productive
future.

And so thank you so much. And
I also just want to say, you know, I've

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2 learned a lot over these past three years
3 being in Council, but one thing that
4 makes me so proud about this particular
5 issue is that it's an example of even
6 with all of the things that are going on
7 in my district and across the City, from
8 our positions on Council, if we focus and
9 if we are determined, we can make really
10 big and cool things happen for our
11 communities, and that's really powerful.

12 So thanks again to all of you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 - - -

19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Vaughn.

20 You like the way that sounds,
21 huh?

22 COUNCILWOMAN VAUGHN: I do. I
23 chuckle every time I hear it.

24 I want to thank this body for
25 making me feel welcome, and I too want to

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2 send my condolences to the Street family
3 on the loss of Milton.

4 When I was a little younger
5 here, Milton made politics exciting to
6 me. He was here on the floor fighting
7 for the rights of the people, and I used
8 to look forward to just catching him down
9 here, along with his brother, John
10 Street, and, you know, you just never
11 knew what to expect from him, and to me
12 that made Council exciting, jumping over
13 the rails, fighting, rumbling in the
14 floor, cussing folks out. I fell in love
15 with it after that. I guess I like
16 drama.

17 The other thing is, a long-term
18 person, Marion Johnson, who worked for
19 decades for Councilwoman Marian Tasco,
20 left us this week, and I wanted to just
21 have her name mentioned on the floor here
22 today and possibly just ask you all to
23 keep her family in prayer.

24 Ms. Johnson was the zoning
25 specialist of Philadelphia. If you ever

2 wanted to get something done or passed in
3 zoning, you went to her. And she didn't
4 have a hard time telling you to keep
5 quiet and let her explain to you how it
6 was done, and that I admire her.

7 I want to thank her family for
8 sharing her with us for all those
9 decades. I want to let everyone know
10 that I'm sure the Logan family is -- the
11 Logan part of the City is mourning her
12 loss, because we just named a street
13 after her not too long ago, and just
14 remember that her tenacious and
15 contagious personality, it will be
16 something that we'll always remember.
17 Marion Johnson is a force that we will
18 never forget.

19 Thank you.

25 An awesome lady. Thank you. Absolutely.

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2 The Chair recognizes

3 Councilwoman Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
5 Mr. President.

6 She was an awesome lady. She
7 was very special.

8 I also wanted to offer
9 condolences as well to the family of T.
10 Milton Street. You know, as a young
11 person growing up in North Philadelphia
12 in the '70s and '80s, you know, ear
13 hustling to grown folks' conversation,
14 you would hear the conversation about the
15 Streets and what they were doing and the
16 impact that it was having on the lives of
17 African Americans. And I think that it
18 was so different, because many of the
19 elected officials who had -- many of the
20 African American elected officials who
21 held seats at that time were sort of
22 hand-picked, and they weren't hand-picked
23 by other African Americans. They were
24 holding seats, but they weren't really
25 the designee necessarily, I would say, of

2 the people that they were representing.

3 And so Milton Street and his
4 brother, John Street, really brought
5 something different in terms of
6 representation to the table. And so his
7 voice will be missed, and he was just
8 such a spitfire. He will really be
9 missed in all aspects of government.

10 I also wanted to just mention
11 really quickly around the support for
12 City workers, as was mentioned earlier,
13 and the losses that we've had. It's a
14 segue into a hearing that we're going to
15 be having this afternoon. I want to
16 remind the members of a hearing that
17 we're having for Parks and Recreation in
18 which time we're going to be renaming the
19 Mill Creek Playground, I believe it is,
20 into the Tiffany Fletcher Playground,
21 which was done by Councilwoman Gauthier.
22 That's Bill No. 220907. We'll be hearing
23 that today, and so we ask folks to be on
24 at 1:30 for the mic check, for a
25 2 o'clock start for that hearing.

11 our new colleagues to Philadelphia City
12 Council on the occasion of your very
13 first Council session.

14 I offer my condolences to the
15 families of T. Milton Street and Ms.
16 Marion Johnson, who taught us all so much
17 here in the halls of City Hall, and
18 remind our colleagues to please come by
19 and say hello to the girls from Girls'
20 High, who will be in the Caucus Room
21 learning more about how our government
22 functions. So please come by and say
23 hello to the girls.

24 Thank you.

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
9 Council President.

10 I do want to also welcome my
11 new colleagues to your first day of
12 Council, and look forward to continuously
13 moving the City of Philadelphia forward
14 with all of you.

15 I wanted to take a moment also
16 to acknowledge the family of Mr. Milton
17 T. Street. You know, as a young man
18 growing up in South Philadelphia, my
19 immediate family wasn't actively involved
20 in politics, but I had an aunt who was
21 very, very Afro centric. And so I
22 remember talking to her about wanting to
23 get involved in politics, and at the
24 time, I thought John Street was like the
25 man, right? And my aunt was like, well,

2 let me give you the history, right? And
3 she talked about Milton Street and she
4 talked about how when you see
5 homelessness in the streets of
6 Philadelphia, they were taking the boards
7 off of these homes in the City and
8 placing the homeless people inside these
9 homes, right, to make sure that they had
10 a safe place to stay, as well as
11 providing them food to take care of
12 themselves.

13 I remember as I got older and
14 got involved in politics, I always
15 watched how he always challenged the
16 status quo and pushed the envelope for
17 elected officials to do things
18 differently.

19 I remember he had a bill, a
20 casino gaming bill concept, right, where
21 the proceeds from that bill in the Senate
22 will go towards job training and
23 development, helping our young people,
24 right? And a lot of folks probably
25 didn't take the concept seriously, but I

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1 paid attention to the policy aspect of
2 it, because the reality is if we're
3 passing bills for big business, why
4 aren't we taking the same approach to
5 take care of those who are the least of
6 us and making sure we're carving out and
7 supporting those who need to be
8 supported.
9

10 And so to the family of
11 Mr. Milton Street and to the Street
12 family, I just want to personally send my
13 condolences, because at the end of the
14 day, he did a lot of good work here in
15 the City of Philadelphia advocating.

16 You know, when you advocate for
17 those who are most in need, that's not
18 the sexy issue. A lot of times people
19 like to shine light on the things that
20 don't take a lot of fight and advocacy
21 around, but not really look at when
22 you're really rolling up your sleeves and
23 speaking truth to power, and that comes
24 with a price when you're fighting the
25 good fight.

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2 And so we thank the Street
3 family, but particularly the life and
4 legacy of Mr. Milton Street.

5 Thank you, Council President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Lozada.

10 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
11 you, Council President.

12 First, I'd like to say thank
13 you to all of my colleagues for all of
14 the support and the -- offering their
15 support and direction as I learn to
16 navigate in this capacity. I'm grateful
17 for that.

18 But I'd also like to say that I
19 am happy to hear all of the concerns
20 expressed here around including young
21 people in different conversations. I
22 come from Esperanza, where I had the
23 privilege of working with young people,
24 and often times they always felt excluded
25 from conversations.

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2 We held a series called Power
3 Talks on a monthly basis where we brought
4 community leaders and put them in what we
5 called the hot seat to talk to them about
6 what their profession was and how young
7 people could make their jobs better.

8 Young folks don't get that
9 opportunity often. And so I encourage
10 all of you to have a power talk or have
11 some type of youth talk in your
12 communities. And as we think about
13 strategies, as we think about how to
14 change gun violence, as we think about
15 how to make quality of life in different
16 neighborhoods better, let's think about
17 making sure that young people's voices
18 are at the table and that they are the
19 priority, because they are tomorrow's
20 leaders.

21 So, again, thank you so much
22 for all of your well-wishes and all of
23 the support and understanding how
24 important a role young people play in our
25 city.

6 Thank you. Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Harrity.

9 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: Yes. I'd
10 like to also thank my colleagues for
11 welcoming me here to the Chamber, and I'd
12 also like to rise to recognize T. Milton
13 Street.

14 It's no secret that me and
15 Senator Street have been friends for a
16 mighty long time, going back to high
17 school track days, and, you know, we're
18 very upset that Milton has passed, but I
19 wanted to just share a little thing that
20 Milton told to me and Street.

21 He said, you know, when I die,
22 people are going to say that cancer got
23 me, but I want you to know that five
24 years ago, they gave him five months to
25 live, and he lasted five years. The

2 other day they gave him five hours to
3 live and he lasted five days.

4 T. Milton Street was a tough
5 man. What he told us is that he wanted
6 people to know that T. Milton Street
7 kicked cancer's butt for five years.

13 Thank you. Thank you so much,
14 Councilman. He was a guy.

15 Real quick, I'm listening to
16 this. I just remember briefly -- I had a
17 little kind of relationship with the
18 Street family.

19 T. Milton Street was like a
20 person that was like kind of before his
21 time. You know, you think about -- I
22 heard you reference, Councilman Johnson,
23 about the abandoned buildings, and people
24 said, what is he doing, and it morphed
25 into the Gift Property Program. So the

2 government stole what he was doing and
3 formalized it and took credit for it.
4 You know what I'm talking about?

5 He talked about how we got to
6 come up with this bipartisanship, you
7 know, because to get things done, you
8 know. Getting Councilman Oh and
9 Councilman O'Neill, we do that all the
10 time here, but back when Milton Street
11 did it to get stuff for his district up
12 in the Capitol, they raked him over the
13 coals, because he said, well, look, the
14 republicans were in charge, I had a needy
15 district. Guess what? I got to go over
16 there and get money for my district. And
17 he pulled that off, right? And they were
18 like lambasting him.

19 He talked about legalizing
20 weed, and at that time, it was called
21 marijuana, right, you know. And that's
22 actually what got him kicked out of
23 office. They went out and got Roxanne
24 Jones. And people were, oh, my God,
25 legalizing marijuana. Right? And now

2 what is it, like 30, 40 states, right,
3 that have like legalized marijuana,
4 right, what they called at the time.

5 So he was clearly a person that
6 was way before his time, and he set the
7 template, as I said earlier, not only for
8 activism, but he set the template for
9 policy. And he will be missed, but, you
10 know, there are so many of us,
11 particularly his family members -- again,
12 I had a little relationship with them
13 guys -- they will continue that work, and
14 it's our responsibility to continue that
15 level of activism and that level of work
16 to speak for those people that don't have
17 the voice and the platform to speak for
18 themselves.

19 So, guys, with that, thank you.
20 He will be missed.

21 And I would like to recognize
22 Councilman Squilla for a motion to
23 adjourn.

24 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
