11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
14 you, Mr. President.

15 Mr. President, today along with 00:12:57
16 ten members of City Council, specifically
17 Councilmembers Jamie Gauthier, Jones,
18 Henon, Sanchez, Bass, Brooks, Domb,
19 Gilmore Richardson, Green, and Gym, I am
20 honored to be introducing legislation 00:13:17
21 that will increase diversity in municipal
22 hiring by changing the City Charter to
23 eliminate the Rule of Two.

24 For those of you who may not
25 know, under current law when filling 00:13:30

2 single position vacancies for civil
3 service jobs, only the two highest
4 ranking candidates on the eligible list
5 are submitted to the requesting

6 department for an interview. The
7 department then selects one of the two
8 candidates to fill the position.

9 The elimination of the Rule of
10 Two will give the City significantly more
11 flexibility to address recruitment and
12 diversity challenges and will have two
13 major impacts on the City's recruitment
14 and selection process.

00:13:56

15 First, it will increase the
16 diversity of candidate pools.

00:14:10

17 Second, it will allow the City
18 to leverage the use of alternate
19 selection tools, like training and
20 experience, as opposed to traditional pen
21 and paper a/k/a standardized tests and
22 assessments.

23 This legislative change is a
24 long time coming. As some of you may
25 remember, our former colleague

2 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown
3 introduced a resolution authorizing
4 Philadelphia City Council's Committee on
5 Labor and Civil Service to conduct public 00:14:48
6 hearings to examine Philadelphia's civil
7 service Rule of Two. That resolution she
8 introduced was co-sponsored by myself,
9 along with Councilmembers Sanchez and
10 Gym. 00:15:03

11 Part of Councilwoman Reynolds
12 Brown's inspiration to introduce the
13 resolution was a September 2015 article
14 in the Inquirer by Tom Ferrick, and in
15 this article he wrote that if 00:15:17
16 Philadelphia's leadership wanted to get
17 serious about having a City workforce
18 that reflects the City, those leaders
19 were going to have to tackle what is
20 called the Rule of Two. 00:15:31

21 Ferrick's article, it went on
22 to detail how our local government
23 workforce, it doesn't reflect the City of
24 today. He wrote, and I quote, "Blacks,
25 Latinos, and Asians are underrepresented 00:15:43

2 when it comes to local government jobs.

3 Women of all races and ethnic origins are
4 as well."

5 His analysis, Mr. President, 00:15:54

6 found that for the 4,000-plus City

7 employees who earn \$70,000 a year or

8 more, 64 percent of them were White and

9 72 percent were male. And for the 4,000

10 or so City employees who earned \$35,000 a 00:16:12

11 year or less, 67 percent were Black and

12 55 percent were male.

13 Ferrick went on to say that he

14 found that the average salary of a White

15 worker, at that time it was \$60,107, that 00:16:27

16 it was about \$10,642 more than the

17 average salary for a Black employee,

18 which at that time earned \$49,465.

19 He also cited examples such as

20 a police commissioner, for instance, may 00:16:51

21 want to hire someone who speaks Mandarin

22 for the police force, but if that

23 applicant isn't among the top two scores,

24 he or she is out of the running. And he

25 also pointed out the obvious, that when 00:17:06

2 it comes to promotions, because the
3 pipeline is usually filled with White
4 males in many of the departments, the
5 odds favor them taking the next step up 00:17:19
6 that ladder.

7 And I don't have to tell my
8 colleagues that we know that not much has
9 changed since 2015. Since becoming a
10 Councilperson in 2016 and Chair of the 00:17:30
11 Labor and Civil Service Committee, I have
12 heard confidentially from numerous City
13 employees, almost all of whom are
14 employees of color who feel they have
15 been disadvantaged by the current system, 00:17:45
16 these include employees in Parks and
17 Recreation, the Water Department, the
18 Fire Department, and the Police
19 Department, among others.

20 I am of the firm belief that it 00:17:57
21 is one thing for an employer to say that
22 Black lives matter and an entirely
23 different thing for an employer to make
24 real substantive changes that ensure
25 diversity, equity, and inclusion. 00:18:10

2 Our municipal government is one
3 of the largest employers in the City of
4 Philadelphia, and for too long, the Rule
5 of Two has held back Black and Brown 00:18:21
6 employees, either from obtaining the
7 entry-level job or from getting that
8 promotion to move up the ranks.

9 Now, for the record, this
10 legislation is, by no means, a silver 00:18:32
11 bullet to making our city's workforce and
12 particularly our city's upper management
13 more reflective of Philadelphia's
14 demographics, but it is a necessary and
15 important step. 00:18:45

16 In 2017, when compared to 35
17 other peer cities, it was found that no
18 other municipality adhered to for Rule of

24 Council President.

18 activity far too often, and we need to
