2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started, if
4 members will take their seats, and any
5 visitors please retire behind the rail.
6 And if I can please ask you to hold your
7 voices down.

8 To give our invocation this
9 morning, the Chair recognizes the
10 Reverend Richard Dent, Pastor of First
11 African Baptist Church of Darby Township.
12 He is here today as the guest of
13 Councilman Green.

14 I would ask all members,
15 guests, and visitors to please rise.

16 (Councilmembers, guests, and
17 visitors rise.)

18 REVEREND DENT: Shall we bow
19 and shall we look to him who is able to
20 do for us what we cannot do for
21 ourselves.

22 First of all, Lord, we thank
23 you for this day. Every day that we see
24 means that you haven't given up on us,
25 and we thank you for that.

2 We thank you for the
3 opportunity for these men and these women
4 to serve this great City of Philadelphia,
5 and we ask that you would continue to
6 give them a servant's heart, to be able
7 to help the marginalized and those who
8 are on the other side of the tracks.

9 We also ask that you give us
10 what we need in order to make this city a
11 great city, as it has been over the
12 years.

13 Thank you for the leadership,
14 President Clarke, and the women and men
15 who consider it not robbery to give up
16 their time and their service. The
17 essence of life is service that we give
18 to others, and we are in rhythm with him
19 who is our savior, who said, I came not
20 to be served but to serve.

21 And we ask this in the name of
22 the Father and of the Son, and of the
23 Holy Spirit.

9 so much for those inspiring words.

10 Before we start, I'd like to
11 ask anyone who has a cell phone or any

16 Our next order of business is

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move that the
23 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
24 September 26th, 2019 be approved.

3 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
4 seconded that the Journal of the meeting

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and our Journal is
14 approved.

15 Our next order of business is
16 requests for leave of absence, and the
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the
20 majority, a leave of absence is requested
21 for Councilmember Green.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman

4 minority, there are no requests for leave
5 of absence.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 Chair thanks the gentleman.

8 At this time, I would like to
9 dispense with the regular order of
10 business and I would like to thank
11 everyone who has taken time out of their
12 busy day to come down to witness their
13 government in action. We genuinely
14 appreciate you being here. We hope your
15 stay here today is a pleasurable one and
16 a knowledgeable one. So, again, thank
17 you so much for being here.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will
20 present a resolution on my behalf to J.
21 Russell Peltz. Would Mr. Peltz and those
22 accompany him please join the Councilman
23 at the podium.

24 Prior to that, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
3 you very much. I would like to thank
4 you. I would like to do just a special
5 introduction to one of the civil rights
6 fighters of all time. He counseled the
7 Little Rock Nine, held many workshops for
8 SCLC, SNCC, CORE, and many others in the
9 Freedom Movement.

10 It is with great pleasure that
11 I present to City Council the Reverend
12 James Lawson.

13 (Standing ovation.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, and thank you for being here
16 today.

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
19 you.

20 (Councilmembers and guests
21 approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 we will be honoring one of Philadelphia's
24 own, a legend, Mr. Peltz. And
25 accompanying Councilman Greenlee, we have

2 Councilwoman Bass, Councilwoman Parker,
3 Councilman Domb, and Councilwoman
4 Blackwell, who I believe actually has a
5 pair of boxing gloves hanging up in her
6 office, and Councilman Squilla.

7 Please proceed.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. I think you said it
10 all. Definitely a legend.

11 This is a resolution
12 celebrating J. Russell Peltz and the 50th
13 Anniversary of Peltz Boxing Promotions,
14 Incorporated.

15 Whereas, October 4, 2019 marks
16 the 50th Anniversary of Peltz Boxing
17 Promotions, Incorporated. This
18 Anniversary celebrates the contributions
19 of J. Russell Peltz, President of Peltz
20 Boxing Promotions, Incorporated, native
21 Philadelphian, and legendary boxing
22 matchmaker; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
24 J. Russell Peltz, "The Boy Wonder,"
25 promoted his first boxing match on

2 September 30th, 1969 and sold out the
3 Blue Horizon, a historic 1,300-seat
4 boxing center on North Broad Street.
5 Over the course of his distinguished
6 career, J. Russell Peltz earned numerous
7 awards including the James J. Walker
8 Award from the Boxing Writers Association
9 of America in 1999 for his "long and
10 meritorious service to boxing," the
11 Career Achievement Award from the
12 Philadelphia Sportswriters Association in
13 2000, and induction into the World Boxing
14 Hall of Fame in 2000; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, J.
16 Russell Peltz is a graduate of Temple
17 University, where he received a B.S. in
18 Journalism in 1968. That year, he was
19 also named the winner of the Sigma Delta
20 Chi Award, honoring him as the
21 Outstanding Male Graduate in Journalism.
22 Throughout his time at Temple, J. Russell
23 Peltz progressed from Assistant Sports
24 Editor as a freshman, to City Editor as a
25 junior. By the time he was a senior at

2 Temple, J. Russell Peltz worked full time
3 on the sports desk of the Evening
4 Bulletin where he would stay until he
5 promoted his first boxing match; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

7 Whereas, J. Russell Peltz is the
8 President of Peltz Boxing Promotions,
9 Inc., one of Philadelphia's leading
10 professional boxing organizations since
11 1969. Over the years, Peltz has promoted
12 boxing matches in Philadelphia and
13 beyond, including the Arts Palace at
14 Broad and Pine Streets, the arena in my
15 area of 46th and Market Streets, and in
16 nearly every casino in Atlantic City. By
17 1997, Peltz facilitated the first-ever
18 world boxing championship fight in
19 Philadelphia where it was hosted at the
20 legendary Blue Horizon.

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Over the
22 course of his career, Peltz has both
23 promoted and co-promoted over 40 world
24 championship contests. His matches have
25 been televised on ESPN, USA, HBO, and

2 Showtime. In 2002, the Boxing News
3 described Peltz as "arguably the greatest
4 of his era" and a matchmaker with "few
5 rivals"; and

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
7 the City is grateful for the
8 contributions of J. Russell Peltz and the
9 Peltz Boxing Promotions, Inc. and hopes
10 that the next generation of

11 Philadelphians follow in the footsteps of
12 J. Russell Peltz and continues our proud
13 boxing tradition; now, therefore, be it

14 Resolved, by the Council of the
15 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
16 recognizes and celebrates J. Russell
17 Peltz and the 50th Anniversary of the
18 Peltz Boxing Promotions, Inc.

19 Further resolved, that an
20 engrossed copy of this resolution be
21 presented to J. Russell Peltz as evidence
22 of the sincere sentiments of this
23 legislative body.

24 Congratulations.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
3 the Chair recognizes Mr. Peltz for
4 remarks.

5 MR. PELTZ: Just as an aside, I
6 had a fighter fight for the world
7 championship in 2006 in Little Rock,
8 Arkansas, Reverend Lawson, and it was my
9 honor, my privilege, my duty. I visited
10 Central High School, because I remember
11 as a kid in 1957 what went on, and I read
12 the book by, I think it was, Big Girls
13 Don't Cry or something about Ms. Beals at
14 Little Rock High School. So it's an
15 honor to see you here today. Thank you.

16 As far as my career, I'm
17 humbled to be honored by the City,
18 because when you really think about it,
19 the only thing I've done for the last 50
20 years is start fights that other people
21 finish.

22 But I've been privileged to
23 have grown up in the greatest fight city
24 in the world. Some of the greatest
25 fighters of all time have fought for me,

2 Hall of Fame fighters, beginning with my
3 first love, Bennie Briscoe in 1969 and
4 going all the way up through one of my
5 fighters who won a world title in
6 Beijing, China a couple years ago by the
7 name of Jason Sosa.

8 When I was a kid and I was
9 outside playing cowboys and Indians,
10 which is what we did in the '50s, and I
11 would see my father come home from work
12 with his blueprints. He was in the
13 plumbing, heating, and air conditioning
14 business. And I'd say to myself,
15 wouldn't it be great if when I grew up I
16 could still play cowboys and Indians and
17 never have to go to work, and honestly,
18 that's what my career has been like.

19 So thank you very much for this
20 honor.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you.

24 Council will be at ease.

3 Thank you. Thank you so much.

4 At this time, the Chair
5 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

6 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
7 you, Council President. I too rise to
8 recognize one of Puerto Rico's most
9 famous and coveted artists, Samuel Lind.
10 Samuel Lind is a cultural ambassador,
11 artist, and activist in the town of
12 Loiza, which is the adopted town of
13 Councilman Jones, Curtis Jones, and makes
14 his work that brings awareness to issues
15 regarding racial justice, spirituality,
16 cultural legacy, and gentrification.

17 Reared and based in the
18 majority Afro-Latino town, Lind and
19 Afro-Caribbean artists created in his
20 house and studio a cultural depository
21 and safe space for the people to
22 celebrate and preserve their heritage in
23 the face of climate and economic
24 disruptions.

25 Lind's most recent paintings,

2 sculptures, and silk screens print often
3 represent these individuals of nature and
4 challenge the norms of spiritual
5 sanctification.

6 He will be opening up his
7 exhibit this Friday, October 4th, 2019 at
8 Taller Puertorriqueno, which all of you
9 know is the renowned Puerto Rican museum
10 in North Philadelphia.

11 Please all of you join me in
12 welcoming Samuel Lind to the Philadelphia
13 City Council.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: He is
16 joined by no other than former Councilman
17 Angel Ortiz.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Councilman.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you. Thank you for being here.

23 Councilman, we needed you a
24 little earlier to make a quorum. How you
25 doing? Good. Thank you for being here.

3 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
4 will present a resolution recognizing
5 Pastor A. Dent. Would Pastor Dent and
6 those accompanying him please join the
7 Councilwoman at the podium.

8 (Councilmembers and guests
9 approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 joining the Councilwoman, we have
12 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Oh,
13 Councilwoman Blackwell, and Councilwoman
14 Reynolds Brown, Councilman Johnson,
15 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, and
16 Councilman Jones.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
18 you, Mr. President. We note that Derek
19 Green is also listed, but as we all know,
20 he is out of town, and so we acknowledge
21 him in his absence and thank him.

22 Certainly I've known the Dents,
23 he and his brother, all our lives. We
24 grew up together, and so it gives me a
25 special pleasure to be here to join with

2 my colleagues certainly in honoring him.

3 Recognizing and honoring
4 Reverend Richard A. Dent, as he steps
5 down as pastor of First African Baptist
6 Church of Darby Township.

7 Whereas, for more than three
8 decades, Reverend Richard A. Dent has
9 served as pastor of the First African
10 Baptist Church of Darby Township in
11 Sharon Hill, building a legacy of
12 leadership that members describe as both
13 spiritual and hands-on; and.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
15 First African Baptist Church was Reverend
16 Dent's first pastorate after graduating
17 from Eastern Baptist Theological
18 Seminary, and as his relationship with
19 the congregation has deepened over time,
20 he has become more and more certain that
21 the Lord intended for him to be present
22 in that place at that time; and

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
24 under the stewardship of Reverend Dent,
25 First African Baptist grew its outreach

2 ministries, enhanced its relationships
3 with the community and ordained its first
4 woman minister, and built a brand new
5 church facility; and

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
7 Reverend Dent is a living example of
8 prioritizing God and the ministry, and
9 the members of First African Baptist have
10 reflected this approach in their own
11 lives by hosting an after-school center,
12 operating an emergency food cupboard,
13 visiting hospitalized people, and hosting
14 a special annual event for teachers at
15 the start of each school year; and

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
17 Reverend Dent is highly regarded by the
18 congregation for his accessibility,
19 approachability, and hands-on approach,
20 and they know they can call him at any
21 hour and receive a return call. He also
22 calls each member on their birthday; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
24 upon stepping down at the end of
25 December, Reverend Dent will hold the

2 title of Pastor Emeritus, leaving the
3 church in excellent condition for the
4 next pastor, whom he will help identify.
5 He will have the opportunity for some
6 well-deserved rest, yet will continue to
7 be a familiar face at First African
8 Baptist; now, therefore, be it

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by
10 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
11 that Council does hereby recognize and
12 honor Reverend Richard A. Dent, as he
13 steps down as pastor of First African
14 Baptist Church of Darby Township.

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Further
16 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
17 resolution be presented to Reverend
18 Richard A. Dent, evidencing the sincere
19 admiration and respect of this
20 legislative body.

21 And we would like to say
22 congratulations.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Pastor Dent for remarks.

2 REVEREND DENT: This is where
3 we take up an offering.

4 Thank you, Councilwomen and
5 Councilmen, and thank you also, Council
6 President Clarke and to all of you. I
7 just wish to say I am deeply moved and
8 deeply grateful and surprised. I thought
9 you all were holding me back so I can get
10 a certificate to Del Frisco's, but it
11 didn't work out that way.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you.

15 Council will be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. Thank you.

19 At this time, the Chair
20 recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will
21 present a resolution for Domestic
22 Violence Awareness Month. Would Jeannine
23 Lisitski and those accompanying her
24 please join the Councilman at the podium.

25 (Councilmembers and guests

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 joining Councilman Greenlee, we have
5 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown,
6 Councilman Johnson, Councilman Jones.

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
8 you, Mr. President.

9 In a perfect world, we wouldn't
10 have to do this every year because the
11 issue of domestic violence would have
12 faded, but unfortunately, as we know, in
13 our city and in our nation, in our world
14 it is still a scourge that we have to
15 certainly keep people aware of, but also
16 congratulate those people who are out
17 there 24/7 dealing with this important
18 issue.

19 So I'm pleased to present a
20 resolution declaring October as "Domestic
21 Violence Awareness Month."

22 Whereas, "Domestic Violence
23 Awareness Month" is being sponsored
24 locally by Women Against Abuse and,
25 through their sponsorship, they are

2 encouraging everyone to help to increase
3 the awareness of domestic violence in our
4 homes and communities and decrease its
5 negative impact on Philadelphia; and

6 COUNCILMAN JONES:

7 Mr. President, if you indulge me. This
8 may be the last time this young man
9 introduces this resolution, and I want to
10 acknowledge that from the time I got here
11 until now, you've been on the forefront
12 of this issue, along with Councilman
13 Johnson who in his first year, you and
14 him put in for 300 new beds for shelters,
15 and I'll never forget that and I don't
16 want anyone to ever forget that.

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
18 you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
21 each year the Philadelphia Police
22 Department responds to more than 100,000
23 domestic-related calls, and domestic
24 violence is not just a local problem but
25 a national issue where every minute 24

2 people are victimized by physical
3 violence, rape or stalking by an intimate
4 partner in the United States, more than
5 12 million people over the course of a
6 year and resulting in the loss of life of
7 more than three individuals each day; and

8 Whereas, founded in 1976, the
9 mission of Women Against Abuse is to
10 provide quality and compassionate
11 services, in a manner that fosters
12 self-respect and independence in persons
13 experiencing intimate partner violence
14 and to lead the struggle to end domestic
15 violence through advocacy and community
16 education; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
18 whereas, Women Against Abuse, in
19 partnership with Congreso de Latinos
20 Unidos, Lutheran Settlement House's
21 Bilingual Domestic Violence Program and
22 Women in Transition, the Philadelphia
23 Domestic Violence Collaborative, provides
24 a comprehensive continuum of services to
25 survivors of domestic violence and their

2 families here in our city, which includes
3 safe housing, legal aid, counseling,
4 medical advocacy and behavioral health
5 services; and

6 Whereas, the Philadelphia
7 Domestic Violence Collaborative, while on
8 the front line 29 days of the week,
9 provides education and training to the
10 community about domestic violence issues
11 and resources and has partnered with the
12 City of Philadelphia to operate the
13 Philadelphia Domestic Violence Hotline
14 and, in Fiscal Year 2019, more than
15 13,000 calls were answered through that
16 Hotline;

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
18 to ensure a more holistic approach to
19 addressing violence in our community,
20 Women Against Abuse and its sister
21 agencies are partnering with the City
22 Administration's Office of Domestic
23 Violence Strategies and over 70 different
24 community stakeholders to implement
25 Shared Safety: Philadelphia's Response

2 to Relational Violence, a citywide plan
3 to respond to domestic violence in
4 Philadelphia; and

5 Whereas, to support a
6 coordinated community response to
7 domestic violence, the Philadelphia
8 Domestic Violence Collaborative
9 organizations will hold events throughout
10 the month of October to promote awareness
11 about domestic violence and to build
12 community support so that all
13 Philadelphians will take a stand against
14 violence; now, therefore, be it

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Resolved,
16 that the Council of the City of
17 Philadelphia, declares and recognizes
18 October as "Domestic Violence Awareness
19 Month."

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to representatives of Women
23 Against Abuse as a sincere expression of
24 City Council's gratitude, appreciation,
25 and commendation for raising the public's

2 awareness regarding domestic violence.

3 Everyone, thank you for
4 everything you do every day.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
7 the Chair recognizes Ms. Lisitski for
8 remarks.

9 MS. LISITSKI: Thank you,
10 Councilmembers Greenlee, Reynolds Brown,
11 Jones, Green, all of the members here
12 today. We're honored to be here again
13 with you to proclaim October as "Domestic
14 Violence Awareness Month" in
15 Philadelphia.

16 As the Executive Director of
17 Women Against Abuse, I'm grateful for
18 this moment with our sister agencies,
19 Lutheran Settlement House, Congreso, and
20 Women in Transition, and with all of you,
21 because while Domestic Violence Awareness
22 Month marks another year in our progress
23 in Philadelphia's response, it's also a
24 time to reflect and prepare for the work
25 that remains ahead of us.

2 Last year, Council lost a dear
3 friend and colleague in Linda Rios. Her
4 death sent shock waves through this body
5 and through our community. It seemed
6 impossible that such a supportive and
7 respected colleague could experience the
8 unthinkable.

9 Linda was one of 27 people
10 killed at the hands of their abuser last
11 year in Philadelphia. The truth is,
12 domestic violence is happening all around
13 us all the time, right under our noses,
14 and to more people than we can imagine.
15 It's one in four women, one in ten men,
16 44 percent of Lesbians, a quarter of gay
17 men, more than half of transgender
18 individuals, one in three young girls.

19 Think about the number of
20 people in this room and do the simple
21 math. Then add in all the children that
22 are witnesses and also often abused
23 directly. These are not small numbers,
24 and these are our colleagues, our
25 friends, our family members, and maybe

2 ourselves.

3 Each year as a community we
4 designate this month to remember and
5 honor those who are experiencing domestic
6 violence and to generate awareness of the
7 impact of the epidemic of this on our
8 community. We use this opportunity to
9 raise our voices against violence,
10 because sometimes those we're fighting
11 for cannot.

12 It's time to reinvigorate
13 ourselves to take action. It's also a
14 time for reflection, and I challenge you
15 with the same question that I've been
16 challenging myself with lately and, that
17 is, what have you done over this past
18 year since domestic violence hit so close
19 to home for this body and what will you
20 do next year? It's not enough to honor
21 the legacy of those who have passed. We
22 will never have them back. We must do
23 more for those who are survivors, those
24 who are still in the horror of it, and
25 those who might find themselves in a

2 similar situation if we don't do anything
3 to prevent it.

4 So we have a heavy charge here,
5 but there's solutions, and we're in it
6 together. We can teach young people
7 about healthy relationships and what they
8 look like. We can take guns away from
9 people who are abusive. We can believe
10 survivors when they courageously come
11 forward with their stories. And we can
12 make sure that all conversations about
13 violence prevention in our City include
14 conversations about domestic violence.
15 Because we will never stop street
16 violence if we don't address original
17 violence, violence in the home where it's
18 learned.

19 We can do more and we can do
20 better, and we must for Linda and for
21 many, many others for the very health of
22 our community. I challenge all of us be
23 the advocates, be the champions, be the
24 voices, and be the change.

25 Thank you very much.

19 I don't know anyone who doesn't
20 know Tony Monteiro. This gives me such a
21 great pleasure. It shows how much we
22 respect our leaders and our history to
23 make this honor today, and I want to
24 thank Tony Monteiro for bringing this to
25 us. And we have a day filled. We're

5 Resolution recognizing October
6 2nd, 2019 as the 150th Anniversary of the

9 Gandhi in the month of October and unite
10 in mutual love to achieve peace and
11 justice.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
13 October 2nd, 2019 marks the 150th
14 Anniversary of the birth of Mahatma
15 Gandhi. Gandhi brought life and movement
16 to an India that was suffocated under
17 colonial rule and choked by ancient and
18 decaying structure and ideas; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
20 Gandhi was a political genius, that saw
21 the masses of people as the makers of
22 history and the agents of change. He
23 went to the vast Indian peasantry, lived
24 among them, lived as they lived and
25 learned from them. They thus grew to

2 trust him in ways that few leaders in
3 history have been trusted; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
5 Gandhi based his struggles on the concept
6 of ahimsa: non-violence and satyagraha:
7 insistence on the truth and truth-force.
8 These were ancient concepts, drawn from
9 Jain and Hindu traditions, and can found
10 in one form or another in all religious
11 traditions. They uphold the concept that
12 all human life has virtue and that truth,
13 and hence freedom, can be reached.

14 Gandhi converted these concepts into a
15 concrete social force. He put into
16 practice a strategy for collective
17 liberation through resistance to evil;
18 and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
20 the freedom of India and the defeat of
21 the British empire spiraled into a
22 worldwide anti-colonial and anti-racist
23 struggle. It inspired the struggle
24 against apartheid in South Africa. It
25 inspired the black freedom struggle in

2 America as part of the worldwide struggle
3 against racial oppression; and

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, in
5 celebrating Gandhi, we celebrate Martin
6 Luther King, Jr., the greatest
7 interpreter of Gandhi. Martin Luther
8 King showed that non-violent resistance
9 is an act of extreme courage. He showed
10 that love can be a powerful social force
11 capable of changing society; and

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,
13 Gandhi's legacy teaches us how to stand
14 for peace, justice, love and truth, and
15 how to believe in the oneness of humanity
16 and fight for unity in the midst of evil
17 systems and ideologies that work to
18 divide us. Long live Gandhi and the
19 struggle for peace and freedom;

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Now,
21 therefore, be it resolved, that the
22 Council of the City of Philadelphia,
23 hereby recognizes October 2nd, 2019 as
24 the 150th Anniversary of the birth of
25 Mahatma Gandhi and calling upon all

2 Philadelphians to honor the legacy of
3 Gandhi in the month of October and to
4 unite in mutual love to achieve peace and
5 justice.

6 Further resolved, that an
7 engrossed copy of this resolution be made
8 as a sincere expression of the Council of
9 the City of Philadelphia's gratitude,
10 admiration and recognition.

11 Congratulations.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 the Chair recognizes Dr. Monteiro.

15 DR. MONTEIRO: Thank you very
16 much, Council President Darrell Clarke
17 and my beloved sister, Councilwoman
18 Mrs. Jannie Blackwell, and to the Council
19 as a whole. On behalf of the year of
20 Gandhi, the Saturday Free School, and our
21 cooperating organizations and on my own
22 behalf, please accept our heartfelt
23 thanks.

24 I count myself among those
25 dissatisfied and often angry citizens of

2 this city who are regularly critical of
3 this Council for what we often perceive
4 as it's not doing enough for ordinary
5 citizens. However, upon more sober
6 reflection, we must acknowledge the
7 problems of this city are much bigger
8 than the Council or even City government,
9 and what is needed in the end is an
10 awakened and active citizenry in this
11 city and around the nation to solve these
12 problems.

13 But today the Council has
14 stamped its mark upon history by adopting
15 this resolution commemorating the 150th
16 Anniversary of the birth of Mahatma,
17 meaning the great soul, Gandhi. In doing
18 so, you have recognized that Gandhi
19 neither belongs to one nation, one
20 religion, or even a single civilization.
21 Indeed, he belongs to humanity and to the
22 ages.

23 In taking this action, Council
24 is saying that you want the City to be on
25 the right side of history. You, by

2 taking a stance, are an example to our
3 citizenry and to other elected bodies in
4 the nation.

5 And, finally, you do this not
6 because it is popular or because it will
7 bring you political or individual

11 words of that other great Mahatma, Martin
12 Luther King, Jr., who said we refuse to
13 accept the view that mankind is so
14 tragically bound to the starless midnight
15 of racism and war and that the bright
16 daybreak of peace and brotherhood can
17 never become a reality. We believe that
18 unarmed truth and unconditional love will
19 have the final word, end quote.

20 I cannot end without expressing
21 something very personal. It is indeed
22 hard to imagine this Council, this City
23 government, or this City without the
24 presence of Councilwoman Blackwell in
25 this Chamber. Her not being here is for

3 beloved sister, you have served well and

9 actions today hasten the day when peace
10 and justice will run down like waters and
11 righteousness like a mighty stream.

12 Thank you very much.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 ayes have it, and these bills will be
6 placed on our First Reading Calendar
7 today.

8 Our next order of business is
9 the consideration of the Calendar. I
10 note that the bills just reported from
11 committee with a suspension of the rules
12 have been deemed to have had their first
13 reading. They will be on our Second
14 Reading and Final Passage Calendar at our
15 next session of Council.

16 As there are no additional
17 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
18 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee for
19 the purpose of calling up resolutions and
20 bills on the Second Reading and Final
21 Passage Calendar today.

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. The following
24 resolutions and bills are being called up

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 Before we consider the bills
13 and resolutions that are on the Final
14 Passage Calendar today, as I indicated
15 earlier, I've asked those individuals to
16 sign up for different legislation. I
17 understand that there will probably be a
18 lot of segueing today, because people
19 want to talk about something that's not
20 on the Calendar. I'd ask that you guys
21 humor us and start the discussion about
22 the bill that you have actually signed up
23 for before you segue into whatever issue
24 it is that you would like to do.

25 We do have an extremely lengthy

2 list of people today, so I'm going to ask
3 you to alter your comment today to two
4 minutes so we can accommodate everyone on
5 the list.

6 So, Mr. Decker, can you please
7 call the first name on the list.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Taleah Taylor,
9 commenting on 170408.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 afternoon.

13 MS. TAYLOR: Good afternoon,
14 everyone. My name is Sister Taleah
15 Taylor. I am President of the City of
16 Dreams Coalition. Everyone knows me from
17 doing a lot of youth work around the
18 City. A lot of you guys don't know why.

19 The truth is, I am a product of
20 a failed system, mainly because nobody
21 would listen. As I grew up and been
22 passed around from foster home to foster
23 home all my life, nobody has ever
24 listened, even as a straight A student in
25 sixth grade. I was a straight A student

2 in sixth grade, taking special academic
3 classes, college classes in Temple, and
4 nobody still would listen.

5 I had 12 scholarships from out
6 of Fourth District. My first award was
7 actually right here for academic
8 excellence for beating 133,000 kids for
9 the first scholarship, and still nobody,
10 no judge, nobody would listen to the
11 abuse, the physical abuse and sexual
12 abuse, that I went through as a child.
13 So that's why it disturbs me that this
14 bill has not been passed unanimously to
15 try to change DHS and certain things in
16 the system.

17 It's taking a lot for me to
18 speak, as you all know me and see me as a
19 public figure.

20 In court on my birthday when I
21 was 13, I begged the judge not to send me
22 home, and he still did. I told him how I
23 was being abused, how I would go hungry
24 for days. He still sent me home, because
25 they do not listen to the children and

2 what they go through. And that's why
3 that part of this bill means so much to
4 me. Even though a lot of kids, you can't
5 listen to everything, but if you can't
6 depict the ones that want to do better,
7 the ones that want to exceed, then you
8 need to learn how to.

9 I went hungry for three days
10 after he sent me home. My father didn't
11 even come home for a few days. After
12 that, I grabbed my suitcase and wound up
13 hitting the streets again, wound up
14 having to go to Girls' High, finish out
15 Beeber, living in a room, selling weed at
16 night. I shouldn't have to have gone
17 through that. My education was taken
18 from me. I only imagine what I could
19 have been.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
21 you can wrap it up.

22 MS. TAYLOR: Also, only because
23 the system failed me again.

24 The most important part of
25 changing DHS is giving the children an

2 opportunity to speak. Only then you will
3 be able to distinguish which children
4 want to do better and should be placed in
5 independent living. If you don't know
6 how to separate, you need to learn how to
7 distinguish those children.

8 The system has failed me my
9 whole life. It's time to stop the
10 turning tables.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 MS. TAYLOR: Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Bridget Powell,
18 commenting on 170408.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 afternoon.

22 MS. POWELL: Good afternoon.
23 Thank you for giving me the opportunity
24 to speak.

25 As a school nurse for 23 years

2 and a school nurse at an elementary
3 school, Powel in West Philadelphia for 13
4 years, I would like to say that
5 suspensions aren't taken lightly. So
6 this is why I'm not for suspending
7 students. I feel like we need to address
8 the root of the problem. And on Friday,
9 my nephew may be suspended, and it's only
10 because he wants to go see his sister,
11 but DHS has decided to change the
12 visitation time to school hours. So he
13 has only seen his sister four times since
14 July 1st, and he has to make a decision
15 whether to stay in school or whether to
16 go see his sister, whose visit has been
17 changed from Wednesday at 3:30 when he's
18 out of school at 1:30 to now a school
19 that -- while he's in school.

20 So I just think that we need to
21 address the root of the problem, because
22 on Friday, most likely my nephew will be
23 suspended because he wants to go see his
24 sister he's only seen four times since
25 July 1st.

9 You didn't hear?

10 CHIEF CLERK: Brianna Donahue.

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Next.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Miltreda Kress.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MS. KRESS: Good morning.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MS. KRESS: I'm here today to
20 give public comment on Resolution No.
21 170408.

22 On February 12th, 2019 and May
23 16th, 2019, City Council held hearings
24 regarding Councilman David Oh's
25 Resolution No. 190347 in which over 50

2 families, including children that were
3 illegally and unnecessarily removed from
4 their homes, came out to testify about
5 the illegal practices of Philadelphia's
6 Department of Human Services.

7 I have been told on many
8 different occasions by many different DHS
9 workers, CUA workers, staff members from
10 the DHS Commissioner's office that, and I
11 quote, every social worker is different.
12 We all have our own views and opinions.

13 Social workers removing
14 children due to their own personal
15 feelings is absolutely illegal. It is a
16 parent's fundamental and constitutional
17 right to parent their children as they
18 see fit as long as there is no child
19 abuse or child neglect.

20 In order to remove children
21 from their homes, according to state and
22 federal child welfare laws, there must be
23 physical evidence that the child or
24 children are in imminent danger. And
25 that don't mean the word of an improperly

2 trained social worker that has not met a
3 family for more than five minutes and has
4 no degree and training in law or law
5 enforcement.

6 Councilman David Oh's
7 Resolution 190346, if passed, would
8 create a very much needed task force that
9 would bring transparency and
10 accountability over an agency that
11 currently has absolutely no oversight
12 whatsoever.

13 The fact that the Police
14 Department uses body cams and has
15 Internal Affairs overseeing them, judges
16 have a judicial conduct board overseeing
17 them, and attorneys have a disciplinary
18 board in the Bar Association overseeing
19 them as well, but yet DHS continues to
20 operate without oversight regardless of
21 how many children have been abused,
22 neglected, and murdered while in their
23 care is absolutely outrageous.

24 If DHS is operating within
25 state laws, then why are they so opposed

2 to transparency and accountability when
3 families speak out over DHS? DHS
4 petitions the court for an emergency
5 listing just to have the Dependency Court
6 judges to place an illegal gag order on
7 them.

8 On May 16 --

10 Ma'am, all right. So I'm going to ask
11 you all one more time.

12 MR. KRESS: I was getting to
13 the --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Your
15 time is up.

16 I'm going to ask you all one
17 more time. When you come up, you're not
18 going to speak about -- there's no
19 intention to speak about what's on the
20 Calendar today. I'm going to ask that
21 you start out speaking about what you
22 signed up for, because I will have to cut
23 you off. All right? I'm trying to
24 accommodate everybody by allowing you to
25 segue into it, but you just can't just

13 as you already stated, Vanessa Leary. My
14 son might be possible for suspension at
15 the age of six, first grade, due to his
16 school report, yelling bad things,
17 kicking, screaming, hearing voices
18 telling him to do bad things to his
19 teachers, calling people "fat head."
20 Apparently this voice in his head is
21 telling him that his brain has two arms,
22 two legs, and a face.

23 But he wasn't always like this.

24 Two years ago he was never like this.

25 This is my son. See this? He came to a

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 visit. This is scarlet fever. How does
3 a kid come to a visit with scarlet fever?

4 See that? I have your
5 attention now? Scarlet fever, five years
6 old.

7 This is an 18-month-old baby.
8 Well, at the time, 14-month-old. See the
9 bumps on his face? This is supposed to
10 be heat rash that was caused by -- see
11 the blisters, pus coming from his head?

12 See this? This is cradle cap
13 that became abscessed, an abscess that
14 had to be cut open and drained. But this
15 is my imagination.

16 See this? Do I have your
17 attention now? Then you sit there and
18 say we have a limited time? A limited
19 time? Do you have a limited time on a
20 kid's life?

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, ma'am. Thank you for your
23 testimony.

24 MS. LEARY: This is why this
25 resolution needs to be passed. So don't

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 tell me you don't have time to give us
3 this much of respect. You have
4 Councilmembers going outside, having
5 sidebar conversations. You have other
6 members that don't care. We have too
7 much heart for this.

8 (Applause.)

9 MS. LEARY: All we ask --

10 (Microphone turned off.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Ma'am, thank you.

13 (Ms. Leary talking without
14 microphone.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Okay, ma'am. You have other people that
17 want to testify.

18 (Ms. Leary talking without
19 microphone.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Okay. But you have other people that
22 want to testify, ma'am. You got to let
23 other people testify.

24 Next name.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Ryshee Shaw,

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 commenting on 170408.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. WRIGHT: Good morning.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 afternoon.

7 MS. WRIGHT: Good afternoon.

8 Actually, I'm not Ryshee Shaw. I'm
9 Ryshee Shaw's mom. He's 14 years old and
10 we have court today.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
12 sorry. Hold on.

13 MS. WRIGHT: So he had to go to
14 court today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Slow
16 down. What did you say? You said you're
17 not?

18 MS. WRIGHT: I said I'm not
19 Ryshee Shaw. Ryshee Shaw was here, but
20 he had to go over to court today because
21 we have court with DHS.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Okay. Go ahead.

24 MS. WRIGHT: On my last court
25 date, I tried to explain to the judge

2 that Turning Points were not meeting any
3 of my son's needs --

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 You're testifying on what? What are you
6 testifying on?

7 MS. WRIGHT: What do you want
8 me to testify on? The five times that
9 he's been suspended from school?

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Ma'am, you got to sign up for something
12 that's on the Calendar. You can't just
13 come up and speak.

14 MS. WRIGHT: Okay. Well, this
15 is my first time being here, so I'm
16 unsure of what to do.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
18 right. I'll tell you what, do me a
19 favor.

20 MS. WRIGHT: What is the bill
21 about school suspension?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
23 on. Hold on. We got to have some order
24 here.

25 MS. WRIGHT: 180729?

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
3 you know what that is?

4 MS. WRIGHT: This is what
5 they're pointing to.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Because you can't just get up and just
8 decide to talk without signing up. You
9 got to sign up for a particular issue
10 that's on the Calendar.

11 MS. WRIGHT: And I tried to
12 explain to you that Ryshee Shaw is the
13 one that signed up.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
15 understand that, ma'am.

16 MS. WRIGHT: He had to go to
17 court.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Ma'am, we have certain guidelines in the
20 Council Chambers and I'm trying to be as
21 fair as possible, and I'm asking
22 people -- but people just can't get up
23 and just start talking about things that
24 are not on the Calendar. So when you
25 come up, talk about what you signed up

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 for. And if you didn't sign up, you can
3 sign up, but you can't just like somebody
4 was here and left and you decide to take
5 their place. That's not how it works.

6 MS. WRIGHT: Well, I'm here
7 to --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 I know this is an emotional issue, but
10 you got to have some guidelines here.

11 MS. WRIGHT: I'm here to speak
12 about Bill 170408. My name is Rasheedah
13 Wright. I'm here to speak about
14 suspensions and the Philadelphia School
15 District.

16 I signed -- Ryshee Shaw in
17 seventh grade revealed some personal
18 information to one of his teachers. It
19 got around the whole school. He was
20 bullied. He was suspended five times for
21 five days. That's 25 days that he was
22 suspended for from school and missed 25
23 days from his seventh grade.

24 In eighth grade they said that
25 he was going to go to another school. We

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 picked another school for him to go to,
3 and things didn't work out at that other
4 school. So that's the part about the
5 School District and suspension.

6 I was a parent who was in
7 crisis, so I reached out to DHS to get
8 help, because I was having some issues
9 with my son and issues with myself.
10 Instead of DHS providing me with help,
11 they treated me as if I wasn't even a
12 human being and told me, we at DHS, we're
13 not in the business of taking care of
14 children because you no longer want to be
15 a mother.

16 I told her it wasn't that I no
17 longer wanted to be a mother. I was
18 suffering from PTSD and depression and my
19 mom was in the hospital dying and my son
20 needed therapy, and I didn't know what to
21 do or who to reach out.

22 Here it's a year later, my son
23 still hasn't received any therapy. He's
24 supposed to be enjoying his first days of
25 ninth grade. DHS hasn't helped him to

2 get in any school, and the judge, when I
3 complained to him, told me to take it up
4 with my legislator. So that's why I'm
5 here, to take it up with my legislator,
6 to let you know that DHS is failing
7 kids --

8 (Appause.)

9 MS. WRIGHT: -- and you have
10 parents who are taxpayers who are going
11 through crisis.

12 I have PTSD, not because this
13 is something that I wanted. Because
14 numerous family members -- because
15 Ryshee's father was murdered and I see
16 him laying there with his brains blown
17 out. So this is what parents are going
18 through through the City of Philadelphia,
19 and no one is giving us any assistance or
20 any help.

21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you. Thank you.

24 (Appause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: April McBride,

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 commenting on 170408.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 afternoon.

6 MS. McBRIDE: Good afternoon.

7 I'm here to speak on 170408. I feel that
8 children should not be suspended from
9 school. A lot of children, they depend
10 on school for their meals, because a lot
11 of them are in foster care.

12 Philadelphia DHS system is
13 taking children at an alarming rate, the
14 highest in the United States. There's an
15 emergent need for this resolution that
16 Councilman Oh and Councilwoman Cindy Bass
17 is looking to pass.

18 There are children that are in
19 loving homes that have been taken care of
20 by their parents very well, no signs of
21 abuse or neglect. They are removed from
22 their parents because of another regular
23 human being, a/k/a social workers, Family
24 Court judges, et cetera, feel the need to
25 use their so-called gut feeling or

2 financial come-up for Title IV federal
3 funds and bonus check tactics to remove
4 children without proper city, state,
5 federal guidelines being followed.

6 Most of the time these families
7 have been targeted by their zip code in
8 which they reside, family size, and
9 income levels. This type of judgment on
10 families is clearly an act of gross
11 discrimination and cruel intent
12 targeting. Such acts as unlawful removal
13 of children and parental alienation and
14 stripping parents of their God-given
15 rights only to bring heartache and pain
16 to the victimized families.

17 The purpose of DHS CPS agents
18 are to help and not harm and which their
19 forbidden practices bring various trauma
20 to children, parents, and those who love
21 them. These agencies and the "powers
22 that be" feel that they can tweak the
23 system for their own personal benefits
24 and agendas. Because this practice has
25 been going on for years, the agencies and

2 et cetera feel that the targeted families
3 do not have the financial resources to
4 retain private representation, that
5 parents don't know their rights, so the
6 agency workers take advantage of their
7 positions and continuously practice on
8 violating parents' rights as well as
9 children's rights, banking on the fact
10 that they can get away with it because of
11 immunity protections.

12 It's time to break their status
13 quo and implement more concrete laws to
14 protect parents and children from the
15 horrible business from DHS.

16 I'm asking all you City
17 Councilmembers that's hearing our voices
18 today, that we voted you in. So please
19 vote for this new resolution that
20 Councilman Oh and Councilwoman Cindy Bass
21 to get our children away from these evils
22 from the DHS and Family Court system.

23 It's been exposed to you all
24 that Councilwoman Helen Gym has lied to
25 you and all of us. We have proof. We

2 have e-mails. We went to her office. So
3 this I'm asking you to please help our
4 children, help our families so we could
5 have a better future in Philadelphia.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Yolanda Bryant,
10 commenting on 170408.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 afternoon.

14 MS. BRYANT: Good afternoon.
15 I'm speaking on Bill No. 170408.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Speak into the mic. We can't hear you.

18 MS. BRYANT: The Philadelphia
19 school system is failing our children.
20 Our children is not getting the education
21 that's needed, because our children are
22 not focused due to child separation by
23 DHS. Many of our children in first grade
24 is in foster homes. This is why it is
25 very important for our children not to be

2 suspended.

3 Children that age sometimes
4 does not speak out to tell the teachers
5 why they are behaving or misbehaving,
6 whatever the reason why the child was
7 suspended in the first place. This leads
8 into reform schools like Glen Mills,
9 because after a certain age and a certain
10 amount of suspensions, the children are
11 referred and they parents to DHS.

12 Councilwoman Gym established a
13 youth resident placement. The task force
14 that has been meeting since the fall of
15 recommendations for Shift Institute into
16 (unintelligible) towards meaning for
17 healthy outcomes. Well, Helen Gym, I
18 wish I could say that about the foster
19 care system. But because of that, our
20 children are still suffering.

21 Helen Gym has made an R. Kelly
22 resolution. This resolution has said
23 that yet we are focused -- this is what
24 Jenice Armstrong from the Inquirer said.
25 She said that Helen Gym is focused on a

2 resolution that's introduced and passed.

3 She's focusing on that and saying about

4 young black kids being raped. My

5 granddaughter, as I showed y'all, is

6 raped. This is my grand-kids in DHS,

7 which they trying to blame on us, as

8 happy. This is the baby that they took

9 from me that I had from birth, and they

10 said that the baby wasn't being taken

11 care of, and this baby was.

12 I'm holding here documents from

13 the hospital that indicate the real

14 rapist, that show everything what the

15 kids say, and no one still did anything.

16 Councilman Clarke, you said

17 yourself that this is important. How

18 come you haven't addressed this

19 resolution yet? Our children lives

20 matter.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. BRYANT: Our children is

23 being raped, they being beaten, and no

24 one did nothing about this yet.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Okay. I understand --

3 MS. BRYANT: Somebody needs to
4 do something.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Okay, ma'am. I understand there will be
7 another resolution introduced.

8 MS. BRYANT: Because everybody
9 is held accountable and there will be a
10 civil lawsuit against all them.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you.

13 Next name.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Jaquon Craig.

15 (Applause.)

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MR. CRAIG: I'm speaking on
20 Resolution 170408 and children being
21 suspended in school. I was a child
22 suspended in the Philadelphia school
23 system. I'm a part of the Philadelphia
24 School District. Of course I'm now in
25 college, and I did a presentation on the

2 school-to-prison pipeline yesterday. I
3 feel like the DHS system helps perpetuate
4 that, as well as rules in terms of
5 parenting.

6 I don't believe there is such a
7 thing as a perfect parent. No one here I
8 can consider had a perfect parent.

9 Parenting is a difficult task. I feel
10 like we should focus more on a
11 community-based ideology and just trying
12 more so to actually communicate with
13 parents and communicate with children
14 that's put in bad situations.

15 As my mom said, I have a niece
16 that was raped and the DHS system helped
17 her rapist get her back in his custody.
18 So it's difficult actually trusting the
19 system as a young person that doesn't
20 have kids yet.

21 I don't believe you guys
22 actually care about the system set in
23 place for us. It's difficult to talk
24 about, honestly, but the reality is like
25 we should not be celebrating things in

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the beginning of City Council meetings.
3 Like our future is the children. We
4 should focus on the children. We should
5 focus on education and the system set
6 forth for us.

7 That's all I have to say.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Velda Wilson.

12 (No response.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Velda Wilson.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Clinton Lewis,
16 commenting on 170408.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. LEWIS: I'm speaking on
19 170408. As you know, my child was in DHS
20 for seven years. Cost me 37,000 in legal
21 fees. My child was kidnapped, my both
22 children kidnapped from Philadelphia and
23 put in foster care.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
25 on. Are you talking about -- are you

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 testifying on what?

3 MR. LEWIS: On the school --

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 School suspension?

6 MR. LEWIS: Since they've been

7 home. Okay? They're going to school

8 now.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So

10 they got suspended from school, then

11 they -- all right.

12 MR. LEWIS: Since they've been

13 home.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm

15 asking you all to humor me. All right?

16 Just kind of go through --

17 MR. LEWIS: What happened was,

18 they put them on psychotic drugs and they

19 not functioning well in school right now.

20 These psychotic drugs that they put these

21 children on, they out of mind and they --

22 this is a travesty of justice. Okay?

23 This is like robbing children of their

24 lives in order to give them a criminal

25 record saying that they have ADHD and all

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 that and nothing being done.

3 DHS needs to be cleaned up.

4 Okay? This is a cesspool for children.

5 It's a mess. It's not DHS; it's DH Mess,
6 and this needs to stop, because they keep
7 doing it and getting away with it. Who
8 is going to stop them? Nobody is there
9 to stop them.

10 I seen children getting killed
11 in there and they give the family the
12 ashes of the baby. Okay? Everybody turn
13 a blind eye. This is not -- I got beat
14 up in court and my shoulder broken, and
15 nobody did nothing, because they paid all
16 people under the table.

17 When is this going to stop?

18 I'm asking you, City Council, please take
19 an end and a stand to this and let people
20 know what is going on. If you do not,
21 I'm going to broadcast them over the
22 radio, because I seen DHS having people
23 on drugs working in that office. Okay?
24 And nobody doing nothing about it.

25 So I'm going to do something.

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I'm going to blast them on the radio,
3 start blasting them. And I'm writing a
4 book called Seven Years A Nightmare and
5 Foster Care A Crime, and I want you all
6 to read my book when I'm finished,
7 because it's about the system. It's
8 going to Hollywood.

9 Thank you very much.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Candice

14 Valentine.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MS. VALENTINE: Good afternoon.

19 I guess I'm speaking on 170408 about the
20 kids being suspended from school. As a
21 mother of four, I don't agree with that.
22 But to get started, honestly, I really
23 didn't even want to come down here today.
24 I'm here to support the other moms,
25 because we all fighting for the same

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 cause. Because to me it's pointless.
3 Y'all not listening. Y'all don't pay
4 attention to us, and we not bringing
5 y'all no money for y'all to profit off of
6 us. So we not really being heard.

7 And it's messed up that as
8 parents, that, you know, we really
9 fighting for our children like we did
10 something wrong. I just -- you know,
11 like I said, I'm here to just support
12 these moms, because we all fighting for
13 our kids.

14 I also want to give an amazing
15 shout-out to City Councilman Jones and
16 David Oh, because they are the only ones
17 that's being overlooked, but are fighting
18 for family separations and housing and
19 services and all of that. And it took
20 three years for me to finally get signed
21 a lease for my children, for me to be
22 told now it was too late and I have to
23 accept it. I don't agree with that at
24 all.

25 So I just hope as a unit that

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 we all keep fighting. Mr. Oliver, who is
3 also awesome, part of David Oh, they are
4 amazing and they really, you know, trying
5 to fight for us, but we don't have no
6 money for y'all, so y'all not listening
7 to us, and that's what it takes. We
8 don't have thousands of dollars to be
9 like here, can we get our kids back.

10 We being taken advantage of
11 because we financially don't have it, and
12 that's not cool at all. So our children
13 suffering, and then y'all causing our
14 crazy. DHS is the cause of our crazy. I
15 ain't never had anxiety or PTSD and none
16 of that. Now y'all want to medicate us
17 and make us forget about our kids and
18 what the cause that we fighting for.
19 It's unacceptable, but we have to accept
20 it. And as you can see, we not accepting
21 it. Like it's many of us here, but being
22 as though y'all don't want to hear it.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Okay. Thank you, ma'am.

25 MS. VALENTINE: Thank you.

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes.

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Cox,
8 commenting on 160720.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 afternoon.

12 MR. COX: Thank you. Good
13 afternoon.

14 I am worried about the impact
15 Bill 160720 will have on the most
16 vulnerable citizens and the working
17 class. With so many food deserts, the
18 highest population of disabled citizens,
19 and being the poorest big city, I am
20 confused as to why we would make a bill
21 to get rid of grocery stores.

22 For many city residents, the
23 corner store is their source of food and
24 other essentials. What this bill seems
25 to do, either directly or indirectly, is

2 create more food deserts in our
3 underserved communities by restricting
4 access to family-owned establishments.

5 Bill 190559, it's 2019, we need
6 to be more inclusive to all and start
7 being the change. All bathrooms should
8 be gender-neutral. We all use the
9 bathroom in the same manner regardless of
10 gender. When nature calls, it does not
11 discriminate.

12 I ask City Council to make the
13 public bathrooms more accessible by
14 removing the general hurdle for usage and
15 instead making the few public bathrooms
16 that we do have gender-neutral.

17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 THE CLERK: Clarc King,
22 commenting on 190559.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MR. KING: Good afternoon.
25 Council President, Councilmembers, I

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 appreciate your time. I am referencing
3 190559. That is the ordinance to impose
4 new regulations on gender-neutral
5 bathrooms, and I think we ought to review
6 this before we go any further. I believe
7 that an unnecessary imposition on
8 bathrooms has already occurred. I think
9 we'll find the cost to be unreasonable
10 and costly and will impact the right to
11 privacy. I see no reason to continue
12 this aggressive movement in political
13 correctness, cultural revision that
14 focuses on sex and the men and women,
15 their roles in our society.

16 The political focus needs to be
17 on poverty, homelessness, low wages, the
18 lack of affordable housing, taxes, and
19 debt. Poverty is a national security
20 crisis as a result of the 60-year wealth
21 transference to the one percent
22 facilitated by the Federal Reserve Bank
23 and the Wall Street system impacting our
24 American standard of living and the
25 political system.

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 The one percent net household
3 worth broke the \$100 trillion barrier in
4 2017, and this fact has been ignored.
5 The oligarchical governance of this
6 country is out of control and it needs to
7 be confronted now.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

11 Mr. Decker, would you please
12 read the name of our next speaker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Velma Lippert,
14 commenting on 180409.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MS. LIPPERT: Thank you.

17 Actually I'm here for 170408.

18 In 1990, my son was in school.
19 He was in third grade. He was only eight
20 years old, and he was complaining that
21 the new group of kids from the
22 integration program into the Northeast
23 had attempted to sexually assault the
24 kids, and instead -- some respect,
25 please. Okay? We are talking here about

1 10/3/19 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 children and how the system is failing
3 them. Okay?

4 My granddaughter, she is stage
5 four brain cancer and her father was a
6 no-show. Then he abused my daughter,
7 left her unconscious, and the coward went
8 to get an emergency PFA with eviction to
9 get my daughter out of their lives. Why?
10 Because they are living out of
11 (unintelligible) for my granddaughter and
12 the money goes to buy personal items like
13 cars and electronics.

14 Now, the father was granted
15 custody from Monday through Friday and he
16 is now sexually molesting my
17 granddaughter. Okay? He told them
18 that -- even though Family Court, DHS
19 knew that he likes child-like pornography
20 and is killing and torturing small
21 animals, burning them alive, the
22 detective was very adamant, that
23 (unintelligible) was very adamant to
24 pursue this issue of security -- sexual
25 abuse of my granddaughter. Okay? And he

2 told her that my granddaughter cannot
3 speak.

4 I have a record here of my
5 granddaughter, and tell me if this is not
6 a kid that can't speak.

7 Please. I'm sorry, but I have
8 to play this.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
10 for your testimony.

11 (Playing audio.)

19 repeated denial and deprivation of
20 God-given rights. Why hasn't every
21 official provided immediate remedy, as
22 required by law? In addition to this
23 testimony repeated over 100 times,
24 requires the Attorney Generals and the
25 District Attorney to prosecute.

2 The failure to perform a known
3 duty or task requires armed Sheriff and
4 Police stationed in Council Chambers to
5 arrest all officials involved, as
6 previously testified to.

7 If officials do not want to
8 obey, protect, and defend the

10 reelection? If officials lie to God,
11 violate their oath, how can people trust
12 them?

13 The constitutions require
14 immediate remedy of this breach of law,
15 breach of close, breach of fiduciary
16 duty. Your oath of office requires you
17 to act or face prison.

18 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
19 1987; 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384; PA
20 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
21 through 28; 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
22 711, 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed
23 in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056
24 appear violated.

25 I call on the federal and

9 oath-violating, and requires immediate
10 remedy.

21 lived experiences of Philadelphians, and
22 I want to thank all the community members
23 who came forward to help and advise us in

25 clearly why it matters, including facing

6 I want to thank civil rights

10 organizations demonstrate the best of our
11 City because of their efforts to expand
12 protections locally while our federal
13 government feels like it's bent on
14 erasing and attacking our trans brothers
15 and sisters.

16 I especially want to thank the
17 Law and Government Committee members,
18 Councilman Greenlee, Jones, O'Neill, and
19 Bass, for their affirmative vote to build
20 a truly inclusive city, and I have to
21 thank my own staff member, Christian
22 Lovehall, a true leader and champion for
23 trans rights, who I have been lucky to
24 have on staff. But this work builds on
25 groundbreaking legislation enacted by
