hour has come and we've established a

quorum.

I ask all visitors and guests

Councilmembers take their seats as we

will come to order.

To give our invocation this

morning, the Chair recognizes the

Reverend Christopher Neilson, Pastor of

15

the Living Church. The Reverend is also

16

a Fiscal Officer of the Mayor's

17

Commission on Aging.

18

Reverend, we may need you for

He is here today as the guest

I would ask all members and

guests to please rise.

2 (Members and guests rise.)

3 REVEREND NEILSON: I just want
4 to read to you two verses from the Book
5 of Proverbs, the 31st Chapter, Verses 8
6 and 9. King Lemuel shares with us advice
7 that his mother passed on to him.

8 Speak up for those who cannot
9 speak for themselves, for the rights of
10 all who are destitute. Speak up and
11 judge fairly. Defend the rights of the
12 poor and needy.

13 Let us pray.

14 Almighty God, source of all
15 that is good, ground of our being,
16 creator, sustainer, provider, in whom we
17 live and move and have our being, we
18 thank you for this day. It is a day that
19 you have made.

20 May our lives be lived in such
21 a manner that we rejoice and are glad
22 that they're in. We thank you for the
23 opportunity that we have to do good, the
24 opportunity to right that which is wrong,
25 the opportunity to help those who need to

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Council will please be at ease.

25 The Chair thanks the Reverend

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you so much, Reverend.

6 The next order of business is

7 the approval of the Journal of the

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. I move that the
13 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March
14 22nd, 2012 be approved.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 Those in favor?

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those in favor?

25 (Aye.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 ayes have it. The Journal of the meeting
7 of Thursday, March 22nd, 2012 stands
8 approved.

9 The next order of business is
10 requests for leaves of absence.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. On behalf of the
15 majority, a leave of absence is requested
16 for Councilwoman Sanchez.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, sir. Leave will be granted.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 O'Neill.

21 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:
22 Mr. President, on behalf of the
23 republicans, there are no requests for
24 leave of absence.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 Chair thanks the gentleman.

3 The Chair will currently
4 dispense with the regular order of
5 business. I would just like to thank
6 everybody for coming here today. We hope
7 you have a pleasurable visit. We hope
8 that you find the visit so pleasurable
9 that you come back again. Sometimes we
10 can get a little out of hand, but we will
11 be on our best behavior today. So,
12 folks, thank you for coming. We look
13 forward to a wonderful session.

14 At this time, I'd like to
15 recognize Councilman Greenlee, on behalf
16 of myself, and Councilwoman Tasco, who
17 will present a resolution honoring and
18 congratulating the Reverend Canon Thomas
19 Wilson Stearly Logan, Sr.

20 Would Reverend Logan and those
21 accompanying him please join the Council.

22 And, Reverend, before you
23 speak, I would just like to thank you for
24 those encouraging words you gave me
25 earlier.

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2 (Guests approach podium.)

3 REVEREND LOGAN: Can I have my
4 Pastor Shaw, my sister come on up, my
5 wife --

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
7 you've been here for a hundred years, you
8 can have whoever you want up here.

9 REVEREND LOGAN: Most
10 Worshipful Grand Master come, Dr. Shore.
11 Thank you for being first.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Absolutely. Please proceed.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President.

16 I'm proud to read a resolution
17 honoring and congratulating the Reverend
18 Canon Thomas Wilson Stearly Logan, Sr.
19 for over 73 years of devoted service to
20 the Episcopal Church, and on the great
21 occasion of his 100th birthday.

22 Whereas, the Reverend Logan was
23 born in Philadelphia --

24 (Standing ovation.)

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

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2 Councilwoman Tasco asked if she was going
3 to be here when she was 100, too. I said
4 absolutely.

5 Whereas, the Reverend Logan was
6 born in Philadelphia on March 19th, 1912,
7 the son of a minister and a teacher. He
8 graduated from Lincoln University in
9 1935, and three years later, he earned
10 his Bachelor of Sacred Theology from
11 General Theological Seminary; and

12 Whereas, in 1941, the Reverend
13 Logan received his Master of Sacred
14 Theology from Philadelphia Divinity
15 School, and later received five honorary
16 doctorates and went on to complete
17 doctorates in divinity and theology. He
18 was one of eight siblings to finish
19 college, which education and
20 accomplishment were a priority in the
21 Logan family; and

22 Whereas, the Reverend Logan was
23 ordained in the diaconate in 1938, and to
24 the priesthood the following year. Upon
25 his ordination, he pastored churches in

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2 Yonkers, New York City and his hometown
3 of Philadelphia. In addition, he served
4 as interim priest at the African
5 Episcopal Church of St. Thomas and
6 Chaplain for the Philadelphia
7 Presbyterian Hospital and the
8 Philadelphia Police Department; and

9 Whereas, during his tenure, the
10 Reverend Logan spent his dedicated
11 ministry serving on numerous commissions
12 and community groups as well as in
13 parochial leadership. He served the
14 church and society in a number of
15 leadership roles including Diocesan
16 Council and the Brotherhood of St.
17 Andrew, President of Hampton University
18 Ministers' Conference, the President of
19 the Homeless Fund and National Church
20 Workers Conference USA, and many, many
21 more; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: Whereas,
23 the Reverend Logan was one of the
24 Founders of the National Conference of
25 Black Episcopalians and is a lifelong

2 member of the Union of Black
3 Episcopalians, and a lifelong member and
4 former board member of the NAACP for
5 Philadelphia and Darby, Pennsylvania; and

6 Whereas, the Reverend Logan is
7 the longest serving and the oldest member
8 of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. He
9 has also been a leader in a number of
10 fraternal and civic organizations, such
11 as Past President of the Tribune
12 Charities, and one of the Founders of the
13 Afro-American Museum; and

14 Whereas, upon his retirement in
15 1984, the Reverend Logan received the
16 title Rector Emeritus of Calvary Northern
17 Liberties Church in Philadelphia where he
18 served since 1945. He has been
19 recognized by the church and community
20 for his many accomplishments and has been
21 a recipient of numerous awards; and

22 Whereas, the Reverend Logan and
23 his wife of 68 years, Hermione --

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: I'm sorry.

2 They said 74 years. We won't take a year
3 away from you.

4 -- (continued) are the proud
5 parents of one son, Thomas W.S. Logan,
6 Jr., and proud grandparents of five
7 grandchildren.

8 Resolved, by the Council of the
9 City of Philadelphia, that we recognize
10 and honor the Reverend Logan who has led
11 a long and distinguished career as one of
12 Philadelphia's most prominent Episcopal
13 ministers, most notably as longtime
14 Rector of the historic Calvary Northern
15 Liberties Church. We also congratulate
16 him on the great occasion of his 100th
17 birthday. At present, he is the oldest
18 serving African American priest in the
19 Episcopal Church, USA.

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to the Reverend Canon Thomas
23 Wilson Stearly Logan, Sr. as evidence of
24 the sincere sentiments of this
25 legislative body.

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2 Thank you and congratulations.

3 (Standing ovation.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair now recognizes Reverend Logan for
6 remarks.

7 The mike is yours, sir.

8 REVEREND LOGAN: Mr. President
9 and members of Council and all good
10 friends of Philadelphia, I am happy to be
11 here. I do not know many persons, men,
12 who arrived at 100 years old and having
13 most of their faculties with them.

14 (Applause.)

15 REVEREND LOGAN: I know that
16 the longest living men are the postal men
17 who serve the mail. The longest living
18 women are five years older than men, and
19 they are the ministers' wives. So I'm
20 happy to be here with my wife, who is 101
21 years old.

22 (Applause.)

23 REVEREND LOGAN: She robbed the
24 cradle.

25 And I'm happy with my pastor,

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2 Dr. Shore, and another pastor -- slipping
3 me on my mind. And where's the Grand
4 Master?

5 GRAND MASTER: Right here, sir.

6 REVEREND LOGAN: The Grand
7 Master Prince Hall Masons. Over 25,000
8 men and women are in the Diocese of
9 Pennsylvania and elsewhere are masons.
10 And we have all of these good persons
11 here with you in my mind.

12 God has been blessed to me. I
13 have baptized 1,400 babies and women. I
14 have married 800, buried 1,400 and had a
15 long ministry serving people. I'm happy
16 to be here honored by you. I do not know
17 many. I'm in a nursing home, and I'm
18 going to three or four of them trying to
19 find men who are 100 years old. It's
20 hard to find them, hard to find them.

21 So I'm happy to be here with my
22 family and all those with me.

23 Grand, I want you to say a word
24 just to me as you feel. We've been very
25 close together.

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2 GRAND MASTER: Yes, sir. Well,
3 Father Logan and to all here assembled,
4 Father Logan has been active as a priest,
5 but his legacy doesn't stop there. He's
6 a family man, he's a community activist
7 and he's a master mason.

8 In 1815, Absalom Jones became
9 our first Most Worshipful Grand Master in
10 Pennsylvania. In 1967, Father Logan
11 became our 78th Most Worshipful Grand
12 Master in Pennsylvania. And I'm the
13 100th Most Worshipful Grand Master. We
14 are following in the footsteps of Absalom
15 Jones, who was a community activist, who
16 was a priest and who was a master mason.
17 And so you have all of that to share with
18 all of us, and we appreciate you for who
19 you are.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 REVEREND LOGAN: Come on,
23 Darrell. Darrell is my chairman.

24 MR. TILLER: Members of
25 Council, my name is Darrell Tiller. I'm

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2 President of Rho Chapter of Alpha Phi
3 Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, where
4 Father Logan is a member and has been a
5 member. Actually, he's the oldest living
6 member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity in
7 the world, and all I can say is happy
8 birthday, we love you, and we appreciate
9 you.

10 REVEREND LOGAN: Thank you,
11 Darrell.

12 (Applause.)

13 REVEREND SHAW: I am the
14 Reverend Martini Shaw, the Rector of St.
15 Thomas Episcopal Church here in
16 Philadelphia. St. Thomas has the
17 distinction of being the oldest African
18 American Episcopal church in the nation,
19 and it is with great joy and honor that I
20 stand here as the Pastor of the oldest
21 priest in the Episcopal Church of USA.

22 God bless you, Papa Logan.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

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2 Council will be at ease.

3 REVEREND LOGAN: Let

4 Mrs. Logan -- is the microphone here? I
5 want Mrs. Logan to raise her voice and
6 tell us The Teacher. Dr. Hill, her
7 father, President of Cheyney, wrote The
8 Teacher, and it goes all around the
9 world. Mrs. Logan is 101 years old,
10 older than me.

11 MRS. LOGAN: Lord, who am I to
12 teach the way to little children day by
13 day, so prone myself to go astray.

14 I teach them knowledge, but I
15 know how faint they flicker and how low
16 the candles of my knowledge go.

17 I teach them love for all
18 mankind and all God's children, but I
19 find my love comes lagging far behind.

20 Lord, if their guide I still
21 must be, oh let the little children see
22 their teacher leaning hard on thee.

23 REVEREND LOGAN: 101 years old.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Council shall be at ease, please.

3 MR. HAIGMY: My name is William
4 Haigmy (ph). I am the nephew of Father
5 Logan, and I just want you to know that
6 he went to the doctor's because he has a
7 pacemaker, and they said his battery is
8 good for three and a half more years. So
9 he will be back here in 2015.

10 (Applause.)

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will
16 present a resolution recognizing the
17 Northwest Raiders Athletic Association.

18 Would Coach Duane Watson,
19 Ms. Renee Tarpley and those accompanying
20 them please join the Councilwoman at the
21 podium.

22 We also have Councilmember
23 Johnson, Councilman Oh and Councilman
24 Jones, Councilman Greenlee, Councilman
25 Henon and Councilman Kenney. We almost

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2 have enough for a team.

3 (Guests approach podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Folks, can we please have quiet, please.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good

8 morning. Nothing is more important than
9 our young people, and at a time when in
10 any city, in any place we can send our
11 people out, they can go out and never
12 come back through our doors, they are in
13 severe distress. And so it is at any
14 time like this that it is even more
15 important that we recognize our young
16 people when they are doing great things,
17 when they have wonderful activities and
18 opportunities available to them, and in
19 particular, the adults who take the time
20 out of their own very busy schedules and
21 make sure that these opportunities exist.

22 And so it is with that said
23 that we want to recognize today the
24 Northwest Raiders Athletic Association in
25 my district, in the 8th District, in

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2 Northwest Philadelphia. Gentlemen.

3 And so we want to present this
4 resolution, and it begins recognizing,
5 honoring and celebrating the Northwest
6 Raiders Athletic Association on 40 years
7 of providing positive youth development
8 and community service for children, youth
9 and residents of Northwest Philadelphia.

10 Whereas, the Northwest Raiders
11 Athletic Association was established in
12 the Northwest section of Philadelphia,
13 Pennsylvania in 1971 by a group of
14 concerned adults who sought dynamic ways
15 to engage in positive interaction with
16 children and youth living in various
17 neighborhoods throughout Northwest
18 Philadelphia;

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
20 Northwest Raiders Athletic Association
21 provides outstanding service to the
22 community by training children and youth
23 in various athletic programs such as
24 football, cheerleading, baseball,
25 basketball, along with track and field;

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And

3 whereas, the Northwest Raiders Athletic
4 Association is an organization focusing
5 on youth between the ages of 5 to 18
6 years, with a mission to establish and
7 maintain an organized program consisting
8 of rewarding intellectual and athletic
9 experiences that stress the
10 character-building qualities of
11 sportsmanship, healthy competition, grace
12 in defeat, and pride in hard-fought
13 accomplishments;

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And

15 whereas, through their sports programming
16 and mentoring initiatives, the Northwest
17 Raiders Athletic Association has helped
18 usher thousands of children through tough
19 inner city life and into productive and
20 prosperous adults, including Temple
21 University and Philadelphia 76er
22 Basketball Star Aaron McKie, current
23 University of Pennsylvania Head Coach
24 Jerome Allen, and Mississippi Valley
25 State University Basketball Star Kevin

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2 Burwell; and

3 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Whereas,

4 on December 10th, 2011, in Orlando,

5 Florida, the 2011 Northwest Raiders

6 Midget Football Team ("Raiders")

7 represented Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

8 and the Eastern Region in the Pop

9 Warner's National Championship Super Bowl

10 Game;

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

12 led by Head Coach Duane Watson, along

13 with Assistant Coaches Richard Williams,

14 Lamont Ragsdale, Cyril Woodland, Gerald

15 Berry, Andrea Drummond, Edward Blake,

16 Kenny McClutchin, Aaron Josey and Elliott

17 Eldridge, the Raiders had a spectacular

18 season that consisted of 10 wins, 1 loss

19 and 1 tie, and defeated teams from

20 Pennsylvania, Texas, North Carolina,

21 Washington, DC and New Jersey on their

22 road to the 2011 Regional Championship

23 and the 2011 National Championship Game;

24 Whereas, led by cheerleading

25 coordinator --

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2 COUNCILWOMAN TASC0: I got to
3 take credit for these kids who are in my
4 district, too.

5 Whereas, led by Head Coach
6 Duane -- I'm sorry.

7 Whereas, led by Cheerleading
8 Coordinator, Kim Guyton, along with Cheer
9 Coaches Adris Guyton (Midget Squad),
10 Beverly Williams-Bey (Junior Midget
11 Squad), Lynia Tarpley (Pee Wee Squad) and
12 Alicia Williams-Bey (Junior Pee Wee
13 Squad) in 2011, the Raiders cheerleading
14 squad of the Liberty League competed in
15 the South Qualifier held in October 2011
16 and placed 1st in local competitions
17 (Junior Pee Wee Squad, Pee Wee Squad and
18 Junior Midget Squad). The Junior Midgets
19 advanced to and competed in the Regional
20 Championships in November 2011;

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: And whereas,
22 the Northwest Raiders Athletic
23 Association has a vested interest in the
24 growth and development of each member, as
25 they traverse the community, on and off

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2 of the field, helping them see the
3 futility in engaging in negative,
4 non-productive behavior and the benefits
5 of participating in organized and
6 productive athletic experience which
7 promotes healthy lifestyles, prevents
8 childhood obesity and prevents
9 health-related illnesses;

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the
11 Northwest Raiders Athletic Association is
12 organized to develop and operate a
13 football league in affiliation with Pop
14 Warner Little Scholars, Incorporated,
15 which is a non-profit corporation
16 (founded in 1929) that provides youth
17 football and cheerleading programs for
18 approximately 400,000 young people
19 ranging in ages from 5 to 16 years old in
20 42 states and several countries around
21 the world; now, therefore be it

22 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Resolved,
23 by the Council of the City of
24 Philadelphia, that we hereby recognize,
25 honor and celebrate the Northwest Raiders

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2 Athletic Association on their continued
3 efforts to uplift the community by
4 providing structured and positive
5 activities for the youth of Northwest
6 Philadelphia.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Resolved,
8 that we congratulate Head Coach Duane
9 Watson, the Assistant Coaches,
10 Cheerleading Coordinators and the entire
11 Northwest Raiders Athletic Association
12 team on their impressive accomplishment
13 and for serving as outstanding
14 ambassadors for the City of Philadelphia
15 and being a source of pride for all of
16 its citizens.

17 Further resolved, that an
18 engrossed copy of this resolution be
19 presented to the Northwest Raiders
20 Athletic Association as evidence of the
21 sincere sentiments of this legislative
22 body and a demonstration of its
23 unwavering support for the Northwest
24 Raiders Athletic Association and its
25 community involvement.

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2 Congratulations.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 The Chair recognizes Ms. Renee

7 Tarpley for remarks.

8 MS. TARPLEY: Thank you.

9 Good morning, everyone.

10 (Good morning.)

11 MS. TARPLEY: Well, I had

12 something prepared, but I think

13 everything was covered, and I really do

14 appreciate it on behalf of the Northwest

15 Raiders. Yes, we have been in existence

16 for over 40 years, and we most definitely

17 strive to work with our youth in the

18 community to make sure they're productive

19 citizens in the future. Our motto is

20 "Our turf has no boundaries," because we

21 want our children to realize if they set

22 their limits, there will be no limits if

23 they work at it.

24 So at this particular time, I

25 would like to thank most of our Board

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2 members who are up here and our coaches
3 for all the work they do and the time
4 they take with our children in the
5 community. And we just want to thank for
6 sure Council President Clarke and most
7 definitely Councilwoman Bass for all of
8 her support as we go forward for our next
9 goal, which is hopefully to try to obtain
10 a playing field.

11 Thanks again.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Council will be at ease.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you.

20 At this time, the Chair
21 recognizes Councilman Oh, who will
22 present a resolution recognizing March
23 30th as Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day
24 and October 2012 as the 25th Anniversary
25 of the dedication of the Philadelphia

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2 Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Penn's
3 Landing.

4 Would Terry Williamson and
5 those accompanying him please join the
6 Councilman at the podium.

7 Joining the Councilman, we have
8 Councilman Green, Councilman Squilla,
9 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman O'Neill,
10 Councilwoman Blackwell and Councilman
11 Jones.

12 (Guests approach podium.)

13 COUNCILMAN OH: I would ask
14 officers of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial
15 Society and Vietnam Veterans Memorial
16 Fund to step forward and join us on the
17 stage, as well as the Chairman of Chapter
18 64, Special Forces Association.

19 Before we begin, I'd ask all
20 veterans to rise, and if everybody, we
21 would give them a round of applause in
22 appreciation.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
25 much.

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2 Well, we've heard the sayings,
3 you hear it many times, freedom isn't
4 free. We as a nation are forever
5 grateful. We as a nation will never
6 forget.

7 I remember as a young teenager
8 watching television as my father and
9 mother were watching broadcasts of the
10 Vietnam War and just the very sad visuals
11 that I saw of young people wounded,
12 injured, bleeding, and I thought to
13 myself who are these people that bear
14 this burden for our nation. And I would
15 see the pictures of the soldiers and
16 sailors and Marines and airmen coming
17 home, being greeted by boos and protests.
18 And I think it is fitting that since
19 1974, March 30th has been recognized as
20 Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day. This
21 is a special year as well, because it is
22 the 25th year of the anniversary of the
23 Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Penn's
24 Landing, which was established by the
25 people that are standing here. They

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2 raised the money in recognition of those
3 who had served, those who did not come
4 home and those who came home and bore the
5 burdens of war.

6 And so this is a resolution
7 recognizing March 30th as Welcome Home
8 Vietnam Veterans Day and October 2012 as
9 the 25th Anniversary of the dedication of
10 the Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans
11 Memorial at Penn's Landing.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
13 United States Congress annually
14 recognizes March 30th as Welcome Home
15 Vietnam Veterans Day; and

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,
17 the Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans
18 Memorial was dedicated in October 1987 to
19 honor the sacrifice of 646 brave
20 Philadelphians who gave their lives in
21 defense of freedom; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
23 Whereas, for the past 25 years, the
24 Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans Memorial
25 has served as a gathering place for

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2 countless veterans on Memorial Day and
3 Veterans Day to share camaraderie and
4 reflect on all who have served; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
6 the Memorial not only honors the
7 sacrifice of the brave soldiers who gave
8 their lives in service to America, but
9 also as a sanctuary of healing and
10 remembrance for veterans and their
11 families throughout the Greater
12 Philadelphia Region; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
14 Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans Memorial
15 Advisory Fund, Inc. will hold its 25th
16 anniversary commemoration on Friday,
17 October 26th and Saturday, October 27th;
18 therefore be it

19 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Resolved,
20 that the Council of the City of
21 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes March
22 30th as Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day
23 and October 2012 as the 25th Anniversary
24 of the dedication of the Philadelphia
25 Vietnam Veterans Memorial at Penn's

3 because we now have become too accustomed
4 to these news reports.

5 Such in these reports for sure
6 are a woeful reminder that the important

10 move Harrisburg as defeat.

11 The sad and some might -- well,
12 based on what we hear to date, because we
13 know that the news reports continues and
14 every day there's a new release of film,
15 most recently a release of the actual
16 initial arrest of this young man. So the
17 sadness and unavoidable -- well, some
18 might say avoidable tragedy is a woeful
19 reminder that all parents have
20 conversations with their boys. All
21 parents of boys, I would suspect -- I'm a
22 parent of a daughter -- have conversation
23 about the birds and the bees, but parents
24 of African American boys have to have
25 another conversation that I term

3 Existing while black for
4 African American boys means that
5 everywhere they go, they continue to have
6 to be faced with hidden land mines that
7 can go off at any given moment at some

10 injustice anywhere is a threat to justice
11 everywhere.

12 It's my hope, Mr. President,
13 that millions of citizens across this
14 country will look to see justice and hope
15 that justice will prevail in this
16 tragedy.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 This, in tough budget times, in
11 tough budget times, is one of the things
12 of not throwing the baby out with the
13 bath water, to use the life raft that we
14 have, that we created, that we created to
15 continue to save thousands of our fellow
16 taxpayers and citizens that pay the taxes
17 on the real estate that we're
18 considering.

19 So I would urge my colleagues
20 to pass this legislation and, once again,
21 thank Councilwoman Tasco for her
22 foresight and vision in this regard.

19 Mr. President. I offer one privileged
20 resolution.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you.

23 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
24 honoring and congratulating the
25 Pennsylvania School for the Deaf on its

2 192nd Anniversary.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
4 resolution will be placed on today's
5 Final Passage Calendar.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilmember Oh.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. I offer two privileged
10 resolutions.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
14 recognizing, honoring, and celebrating
15 the Academy of National Sciences of
16 Drexel University for its invaluable
17 contributions to the environmental and
18 natural sciences as the oldest natural
19 history museum in the nation on the
20 occasion of the Academy's 200th
21 Anniversary: 1812 through 2012.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
23 resolution will be placed on today's
24 Final Passage Calendar.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

2 resolution recognizing, honoring, and
3 celebrating Sharon Pinkenson on the

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
8 resolution will be placed on today's
9 Final Passage Calendar.

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 That concludes our
12 introduction.

13 We have no reports from
14 committee today, so the next order of
15 business is the consideration of the
16 Calendar.

17 There are no bills on the First
18 Reading Calendar, so the Chair now
19 recognizes Councilman Jones for the
20 purpose of calling up resolutions and
21 bills on the Second Reading and Final
22 Passage Calendar.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. The following resolutions
25 and bills are being called up for Second

3 Nos. 120035, 120233, 120234, 120235,
4 120236, 120237, 120238, 120239, 120242,

7 120112 and 120139. All other resolutions
8 and bills are being held.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 Before we consider the
12 resolutions and bills on today's
13 Calendar, we will have public comment.

14 For the record, your public
15 comment must be relating to bills on the
16 Final Passage or resolutions on the Final
17 Passage Calendar today.

18 We have a podium. On the
19 podium you will see a device. That
20 device will be triggered when you start
21 your speech. You will have three minutes
22 to speak. At two and a half minutes
23 there will be a yellow light. We would
24 ask that you conclude your remarks at the
25 time of the yellow light, and when the

2 red light comes on, the mike will be
3 terminated.

4 Thank you for your cooperation.
5 The purpose of this is to ensure that
6 everyone has an opportunity to speak.
7 Thank you.

8 Will the Clerk please read the
9 name of the first individual who wishes
10 to testify. And I see we have our good
11 friend, the Reverend and State
12 Representative Louise Bishop in the house
13 today.

14 Good morning.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 REPRESENTATIVE BISHOP: Good
17 morning. Thank you very much,
18 Mr. President. To the Council men and
19 women, at large and both in the City, and
20 to all of you ladies and gentlemen, I am
21 delighted to have the opportunity to be
22 here today to just speak a word on the
23 importance of some of this legislation
24 that has been sitting for a long time in
25 Harrisburg, much too long.

1 3/29/12 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 I want to say that Former
3 Speaker of the House, Representative
4 O'Brien and now Councilman O'Brien, and I
5 are joined together at the hip because of
6 certain issues that has taken place to
7 our children.

8 We have fought for legislation
9 for better health. We have fought for
10 legislation for better schools. The one
11 place where we have reached a barrier has
12 been fighting for legislation that will
13 punish those who are child predators.
14 Every time we've introduced legislation,
15 it has laid in committee and has not gone
16 forward.

17 I didn't tell Representative at
18 that time, now Councilman, why I stood
19 with him so hard when we were fighting
20 for children, but a few months ago when
21 we had a meeting, I could not hold it any
22 longer.

23 The importance of legislation
24 that arrest predators, the importance of
25 legislation that allows them to be

2 exposed is critical to our children.

3 Some years ago, more years
4 perhaps than you can imagine, I lived
5 with my mother, stepfather and 11 other
6 sisters and brothers. I was young,
7 didn't really know what was happening to
8 me, didn't understand it, but every time
9 my stepfather had an opportunity to
10 caress me, feel me, bother me in a way
11 that I didn't understand, I didn't know
12 what to do.

13 Finally, when my mother was
14 away one night one weekend, the real
15 thing happened. I woke up one night to
16 find him in bed with me. Not only was he
17 in bed with me, but he was in me. It was
18 a very, very horrifying, difficult
19 experience for me, but because I knew
20 that my grandfather who lived with us
21 would kill him if I said anything and
22 because I knew that it would break my
23 mother's heart and because he was the
24 father of my sisters and brothers, there
25 was absolutely nothing I could do, but

2 hold it within. So the only one that
3 knew about it was me, him and God.

4 I avoided him as much as I
5 could, wrapping myself always around my
6 other sisters and brothers, making sure
7 that he didn't get the opportunity to do
8 that again. And, finally, one day one
9 year, two years, I know not how many
10 years later, I confronted him alone. I
11 don't even know how it happened, but I
12 stood up to him at the age of 12, 13, and
13 I said to him when he came forward, You
14 will never do that again.

15 And he said, But...

16 I said, I will tell my mother.

17 He says, But I will tell them
18 about the time that I did and you said
19 nothing.

20 I said, I was a child. I
21 didn't know how to protect myself. But I
22 know now, and you will never touch me
23 again.

24 Shortly after that, a ticket
25 was put on the train for me to come to

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2 Philadelphia, where I stayed and lived
3 with my secret. The sad part about it
4 is, I had to live with a secret that no
5 one really understood.

6 And I want to say to you today,
7 no one really understands what these
8 young men and women experience unless
9 you've been there. No one understands
10 how to treat them. No one understands
11 what it feels like. And no one is able
12 to help them until a law is put in place
13 that allows them to be able to treat them
14 or send them to jail.

15 I believe if any one of the
16 number of bills that are on this page had
17 been in effect 50 years ago, 60 years
18 ago, we wouldn't have to worry about what
19 we're going to do with Sandusky, because
20 he would have been treated as a child
21 when, no doubt, someone did that to him.

22 So I want to commend you for
23 asking the House of Representative to
24 move forward and to move those bills out
25 which would allow us to identify them, it

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2 will allow us to arrest them, it will
3 allow us to put in place treatment for
4 those young people who will never ever be
5 the same no matter what happens.

6 I counsel almost every day men
7 and women who have been victims of child
8 sex abuse, and let me tell you, none of
9 them, none of them will ever be the same.
10 But we can help. As lawmakers we help
11 put in place things that help them with a
12 better education. Not all it should be,
13 but it's better. We put in place things
14 to help them to be safe, but we've never
15 put in place things to help them overcome
16 sexual abuse.

17 And let me close by saying,
18 sexual abuse in 2012 is alive and it's
19 well. It has not gone away. It's
20 brothers against brothers. It's brothers
21 against nieces and nephews. It's
22 husbands against stepchildren. It is
23 alive. It's friends next door. It's
24 those that you trust your children with
25 because they are the coaches, they are

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2 the athletic. It is alive and well, and
3 until we who are responsible for the
4 lives and safety of our children do
5 something, it will never change.

6 So thank you,
7 Representative/Councilman O'Brien, for
8 just allowing me to be able to come forth
9 with something that I have held and held
10 and lived with for over 60 years. It's
11 time that we move.

12 Thank you. God bless.

13 (Standing ovation.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: God
15 bless you, Representative.

16 Anyone else to speak,
17 Mr. Decker?

18 CHIEF CLERK: John Dodds.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. DODDS: I'd like to speak
21 on the resolution of Councilman Jones and
22 Councilwoman Tasco for the diversion
23 program in the City of Philadelphia, who
24 saved over 5,000 homes in this city.
25 It's been a national model. Nobody can

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2 be foreclosed in Philadelphia before they
3 go into a court and have to negotiate
4 with a bank, have to negotiate with a
5 homeowner to save the property.

6 Seventeen programs around the
7 state have followed our program, and
8 unfortunately, right now there's an
9 attempt to curtail that program and try
10 to speed it along in a way that I don't
11 think that the mortgage industry in this
12 country can deal with.

13 The Federal Reserve has
14 recently done a survey of foreclosure
15 practices in the different mortgage
16 companies, and they found unsafe and
17 unsound processes and practices in
18 residential loan servicing. What that
19 means is, the banks lose your documents,
20 they can't get it together to work out a
21 deal in a rapid manner. If the court
22 wants it to be more rapid, some people in
23 the court -- I think the judge that runs
24 it likes the program the way it is. And
25 we really believe that it's going to cost

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 2 a lot of people their homes if these
 3 changes are made. And we appreciate
 4 Council putting forward this resolution.
 5 We hope that the courts will continue.
 6 It's a very successful program to protect
 7 the homeowners in the City of
 8 Philadelphia.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next
 12 speaker? Is there anyone else who wishes
 13 to testify on a bill or resolution that's
 14 on the Final Passage Calendar today?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
 17 There being none, thank you very much.

18 We will now consider the
 19 resolutions and bills on the Second
 20 Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

21 The Clerk will please read the
 22 title of Resolution No. 120035.

23 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
 24 recognizing April 2012 as Autism
 25 Awareness Month in honor of the

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2 individuals diagnosed and living with
3 autism along with their caregivers and
4 families.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilmember O'Brien.

9 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN:

10 Mr. President, I'd like to be recognized
11 to speak on this resolution.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Please do, Councilman.

14 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN:

15 Mr. President, with your permission, I'd
16 like to rise as I offer my remarks.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Proud tradition in the House. Please do
19 so, sir.

20 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 You're welcome.

24 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: I would
25 like to again thank Reverend Christopher

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2 Neilson for his prayer before City
3 Council today, and I'd like to read it
4 one more time, because it's appropriate
5 for this resolution.

6 Speak up for those who cannot
7 speak for themselves, for the rights of
8 all who are destitute. Speak up and
9 judge fairly. Defend the rights of the
10 poor and the needy.

11 Mr. President, members of
12 Council, all those gathered here and who
13 are within the sound of our voice, it
14 wasn't that long ago in the Commonwealth
15 of Pennsylvania when we were either 49th
16 or 50th in our recognition of autism.
17 I'm proud to say that we've come a long
18 way.

19 And I first would like to
20 acknowledge all the parents and the
21 family members and the advocates and the
22 providers and the educators and the
23 researchers and clinicians for all that
24 they have done to move this conversation
25 forward. Some of those individuals are

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2 here today, and I would like to recognize
3 them.

4 Nina Wall-Cote, who is the
5 Director of the first Bureau of Autism
6 Services in the United States of America,
7 ladies and gentlemen, is also Matthew's
8 mom, is here.

9 Would you please stand to be
10 recognized.

11 We have --

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: -- Karen
14 Smith, who is the Program Manager for
15 Autism Services at SPIN, Special People
16 in the Northeast; Joseph and Melanie
17 McComb, the parents of Dillon, who is a
18 student at SPIN.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Annemarie
21 Clarke, Corporate Officer for Behavioral
22 and Development Services at SPIN; Lindsey
23 Lawler, who is the Eastern Cert Director.

24 Lindsey, would you please stand
25 up.

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2 She is also the Senior Manager
3 of the new Drexel Autism Institute in
4 Philadelphia, which incidentally happens
5 to be the first autism research institute
6 in the United States focused on public
7 health science.

8 I would also recognize Bernice
9 McHale, who is the Director of Community
10 Affairs at SPIN, and Joseph Lukach, who
11 is the CEO for the Center of Autism. I
12 proudly served on their Board for many,
13 many years.

14 I would first like to get some
15 business out of the way and say that I
16 was the proud sponsor of the autism
17 insurance bill in the Commonwealth of
18 Pennsylvania. Very simply, that provided
19 for coverage for diagnosis and treatment
20 of individuals with autism.

21 Act 62 was supposed to generate
22 \$28 million for the Commonwealth of
23 Pennsylvania by pushing those services
24 from medical assistance to private
25 carriers. It's been the law in the

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2 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for three
3 years, but, sadly, the Commonwealth has
4 not received \$80 million, that the
5 coffers erode, so that we continue to
6 expand the wonderful programs we have in
7 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And
8 it's desperately important in these times
9 when we are challenged with budget cuts
10 from that same General Assembly.

11 So my recommendation is that we
12 call upon the Governor of the
13 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to bring the
14 insurance commissioner and DPW secretary
15 together so that we can fully implement
16 Act 62.

17 Second, I would call upon
18 Community Behavioral Health in the City
19 of Philadelphia to ask parents who have
20 children who are covered by private
21 insurance subject to Act 62 to assign
22 their appeal rights to the City so that
23 the City or a law firm hired by the City
24 can go after the insurance companies to
25 make sure they pay for the services Act

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2 62 is supposed to cover.

3 Thirdly, I will introduce to
4 you my new best friends, John Burke, who
5 is a police officer, serves proudly in
6 the City of Philadelphia, and his wife,
7 Suzanne, who also works for the City of
8 Philadelphia. But with the President's
9 permission, my new friend, Anthony, who
10 is an individual living with autism, is
11 fascinated by this microphone.

12 So would you like -- with your
13 permission, would he be allowed just to
14 touch the microphone and say hello.

15 ANTHONY: Hi, everybody. Hi,
16 everyone.

17 (Applause.)

18 ANTHONY: I want to see it.

19 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Well, when
20 I said those that can't speak for
21 themselves, I think Anthony is doing a
22 remarkable job speaking for the
23 individuals living with autism.

24 But I would like to bring
25 everyone's attention to the fact that the

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2 only insurance company in the
3 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania who filed a
4 lawsuit to not implement Act 62 is our
5 own Independence Blue Cross in the City
6 of Philadelphia. And I call upon
7 everyone to contact Independence Blue
8 Cross and ask them to abide by the Common
9 Pleas Court decision by Judge Idee Fox
10 that clearly defines the implementation
11 and the provisions of Act 62 so that
12 individuals like Anthony can continue to
13 receive the services. This is a civil
14 right. They have the right to health
15 services. They have the right to
16 educational services. They have the
17 right to behavioral services, and they
18 have a right to the respect of all of us.
19 So I ask you to continue on that mission.

20 So it is my honor to also tell
21 you that Philadelphia ranks in the top
22 ten cities of the world for individuals
23 living with autism as the most
24 appropriate place to live. We've come a
25 long way. And I'd like to identify

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2 through the Bureau of Autism Services
3 where that journey is.

4 In the beginning, we didn't
5 have the tools. We didn't have the
6 vision. We didn't have the inclination,
7 frankly, to address autism. There was a
8 big mountain. We got to the top of the
9 mountain. But now we can see way into
10 the distance, and we have a long way to
11 go.

12 But in Pennsylvania, we put
13 together in 2004 the Autism Task Force,
14 which still serves as the international
15 blueprint for the autism conversation as
16 we move forward.

17 We have the first two Centers
18 of Excellence in the United States to do
19 the research, University of Pittsburgh
20 and our own Drexel University that's here
21 today.

22 We also created regional
23 centers so that we can take the research,
24 the education, the trainers, parent
25 information on a local, state and

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2 regional basis and focus on the
3 demographics and the programmatic
4 responses so that we could create the
5 most appropriate developmental
6 opportunities for individuals living with
7 autism.

8 We have the first programs for
9 adults with autism in the United States
10 of America. We have two programs. We
11 have the adult waiver and we have an ACAP
12 program. That is a contract with CMS.
13 That is -- it's a contract that embodies
14 thousands of waivers, but it provides the
15 fiscal community and behavioral supports
16 that an individual with autism needs to
17 be successful. That has to be recognized
18 and it has to be expanded.

19 The Bureau of Autism Services
20 under Nina Wall-Cote took a census in
21 Pennsylvania and found that we have
22 25,000 individuals living with autism.
23 For the first time, we know where they
24 live. We know where they are on the
25 spectrum. We know how old they are.

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2 With the excellent services that we've
3 created in Pennsylvania, we can also
4 predict in the short term and long term
5 what the cost of caring for those
6 individuals are.

7 We took that census and we sent
8 out a questionnaire. There were 4,000
9 responses. Statistically, that's an
10 anomaly that doesn't happen. We now know
11 that needs assessment. It's again an
12 illumination of where we have to go in
13 the future.

14 There are many grants. Now,
15 some people may think this is a waste of
16 money, but you have to recognize the
17 families with individuals with autism,
18 they don't get to go to theme parks.
19 They don't get to go on vacation. They
20 rarely get to do anything together. So
21 the mini grants are wonderful.

22 Again, I would like to
23 congratulate and thank President Fry at
24 Drexel University for not only his
25 financial commitment, but the

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2 infrastructure of that whole university
3 to get behind the public health science
4 conversation, which is sorely needed.

5 Again, I would recognize Nina
6 Wall-Cote. She's a Professor at St.
7 Joe's University and has a certification
8 program that's online. So for everybody
9 far and wide, you can enroll in that
10 course.

11 Chestnut Hill four years ago,
12 Ms. Cote went and described a need for an
13 adult service model to be had in
14 Pennsylvania, and they responded with a
15 four-year dialogue that recognized the
16 importance of having educators, nurses
17 and social workers in the conversation.
18 I'm proud to say this past September,
19 they implemented an undergraduate and a
20 graduate program that takes that adult
21 service model, again, that doesn't exist
22 anywhere in the United States of America
23 and they're running with it. That means
24 students from all over the world are
25 going to come here.

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2 Eastern University bought 25
3 acres from Valley Forge Military Academy
4 and created a junior college for
5 individuals with Asperger's, and now
6 they're employing all the behavioral
7 health supports that someone needs to
8 deal with their anxiety and depression
9 issues.

10 Ladies and gentlemen, in these
11 dire times, we can't be deficit thinkers
12 because we have a deficit. We have to
13 get viral. We have to take these
14 opportunities in lean times to say this
15 is the time we get creative.

16 There is no more better steward
17 of the public health and human service
18 dollar than Estelle Richman was in the
19 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. She shaved
20 \$3 billion in growth, but these cuts that
21 may be proposed, nothing is safe. Even
22 though it may be there, nothing is safe.

23 I ask all of you to celebrate
24 the opportunities for individuals living
25 with autism all through this month and

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2 all through the year.

3 There are those, Dr. Wendy
4 Ross, who wants to make Philadelphia the
5 first autism-friendly city on the planet.
6 And that changes the paradigm, because
7 very simply, instead of making an
8 individual ready for the community, we
9 all have to say we're going to make this
10 community, Philadelphia, ready for
11 individuals and families with autism.

12 Mr. President, I thank you, and
13 I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you so much.

21 It's been moved and seconded.

22 Those in favor?

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

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2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

5 The Chair now recognizes
6 Mr. Decker to read the title of
7 Resolution No. 120233.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
10 Property to execute and deliver to the
11 Redevelopment Authority of the City of
12 Philadelphia, without consideration,
13 deeds conveying conditional fee simple
14 title to certain City-owned lots or
15 pieces of ground with the buildings and
16 improvements thereon, situate in the
17 Sixteenth Ward of the City of
18 Philadelphia.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilmember Greenlee.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
23 of the resolution.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

2 been moved and seconded.

3 Those in favor?

4 (Aye.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Those opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 ayes have it. Resolution 120233 is
10 adopted.

11 Mr. Decker, Resolution 120234.

12 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
13 urging the Pennsylvania Legislature to
14 take action on bills to protect victims
15 of childhood sexual abuse.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilmember Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. May I speak very
22 briefly on this.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
24 sir.

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

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2 you.

3 A few weeks ago, along with
4 other elected officials, I was at the
5 Children's Alliance and heard State
6 Representative Louise Williams Bishop
7 speak about the horrible experience she
8 talked about today. I can honestly say
9 during her talk, no one was on their
10 BlackBerries, no one was staring out the
11 window, no one was talking to someone
12 else. There was wrapped attention.

13 Representative Bishop is vivid
14 proof that we need to do as much as
15 possible to help victims, take action
16 against perpetrators who hurt children
17 and, in many cases, scar adults for life.

18 The House bills mentioned in
19 this resolution show that members of the
20 Philadelphia Delegation - Representative
21 Bishop, then Representative, now
22 Councilman O'Brien, Representative Parker
23 and Representative McGeehan - want to
24 assist those victims, and I believe it's
25 appropriate that we support those

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2 efforts. And may I acknowledge the
3 efforts of Councilman O'Brien, both in
4 Harrisburg and in the preparing of this
5 resolution.

6 And, Mr. President, because I
7 think we want to send the strongest
8 message we can on this, I would move for
9 the adoption of the resolution by a roll
10 call vote, please.

11 COUNCILMAN KENNEY:

12 Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Councilmember Kenney.

15 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Quickly,
16 too. There should be no statute of
17 limitations on an issue involving the
18 theft of a person's childhood. And for
19 too long, institutions and individuals in
20 our Commonwealth and our country have
21 tried to wait these people out, all
22 because of money, and what things look
23 like and not what they really are. And
24 if people had taken the bull by the horns
25 when they knew about it, when they knew

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2 about it, we wouldn't in this situation
3 today that we are.

4 How you cannot protect a
5 ten-year-old child from a man who wants
6 to do the things that they do to them, I
7 don't know how you live with yourself.

8 But it is not the time to wait
9 them out. Because they've spiraled to
10 the drug addiction and alcohol and mental
11 problems because their childhoods were
12 stolen doesn't mean we should wait them
13 out. When they have the strength to come
14 forward is when they have the strength to
15 come forward, and we should honor that
16 and at least respect our ability to
17 protect them now when we didn't protect
18 them when they were ten years old.

19 Thank you.

15 civil window are not looking for the
16 money. It's one way of protecting
17 individuals from becoming future victims.

18 For 25 years or more,
19 prosecutors would sit in my office and
20 they were consistent in one theme as we
21 considered those many pieces of
22 legislation, that the instant case wasn't
23 as important as making sure there wasn't
24 a second, a fifth or, I dare say, a 50th
25 victim.

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2 Individuals looking for an
3 opening of the civil window very simply
4 want to make sure that the perpetrator's
5 name appears in the paper. Unless
6 there's a criminal charge or a civil
7 action filed, they feel they can't
8 protect other individuals from the same
9 tragic fate that is visited upon them.

10 I thank my friend Louise Bishop
11 from the bottom of my heart for becoming
12 the face of this most difficult personal
13 issue.

23 what we've heard a lot, "I don't know."

24 We appropriated a lot of money
25 to OPA. A million eight has just been

2 requested to be transferred to the City
3 Solicitor for fighting the STEB
4 challenges. The point here is, that
5 million eight could have been spent over
6 the course of the past year and the year
7 before that in order to put us in a
8 position where we have full information
9 and we can make informed decisions. It
10 seems to me that there was a purposeful
11 delay in getting the necessary
12 information so that it would be available
13 for us as we contemplate this momentous
14 shift, which must be done under state
15 law. And I just want to say that I hope
16 that's not the case.

17 I look forward to continuing
18 our questions of the Administration over
19 the next few weeks and months, but I am
20 very, very skeptical about the situation
21 we find ourselves in, Mr. President.
