2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

3 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: I note that the hour has
7 come and a quorum of the Council is
8 present. This City Council session
9 is officially called to order.

10 Before proceeding, I will ask all
11 those present to please set your
12 cell phones on silent or vibrate
13 and please take all sidebar
14 conversations out of the Council
15 chambers.

16 To give our invocation
17 this morning, the Chair recognizes
18 Pastor Maryta Fields-Powell of
19 Congregation Koach-Bethel. She is
20 here today as the guest of
21 Councilmember Kendra Brooks. I
22 will ask all members and guests to
23 please rise.

24 (Councilmembers, guests

3 PASTOR FIELDS-POWELL:

4 Good morning. Our Father and our

5 God, we thank you for this

6 opportunity to even be alive. We

7 thank you for your grace, your

16 heart be acceptable in thy sight,
17 O Lord, my strength and my
18 redeemer.

19 The Lord is our shepherd
20 and we shall not want for anything.
21 It is in Jesus name that I pray.
22 May we all say Amen.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

14 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: It has been moved and

21 properly seconded that the Journal

5 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
9 Journal is approved.

10 The next order of
11 business is request for leaves of
12 absence. And the Chair recognizes
13 Majority Leader Katherine Gilmore
14 Richardson.

15 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

16 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
17 Mr. President.

18 On behalf of the
19 Majority, there are no requests for
20 leave of absence today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

22 JOHNSON: The Chair thanks the
23 Councilmember.

24 The Chair recognizes

1 5/1/25 - STATED - MOTION REGARDING CALENDAR

2 Minority Leader Councilmember

3 Brooks.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

5 And I have a one privileged

6 resolution -- wrong thing. I'm

7 sorry. We have no requests for

8 leaves of absence today.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: Thank you. The Chair

11 thanks the Councilmember.

12 The Chair now recognizes

13 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson

14 for a motion concerning certain

15 legislative matters that may arise

16 during the course of today's

17 session of Council that were not

18 listed on the Calendar circulated

19 prior to today's Council session.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

21 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

22 Mr. President.

23 I move that any of the

24 following matters, if considered

2 today, may be added to the agenda
3 for this session of Council, and as
4 required by law, subsequently
5 published on an amended agenda
6 after the consideration of those
7 matters: resolutions authorizing

10 of a bill vetoed by or re-called
11 from the Mayor, amendments to bills
12 re-called from the Mayor,
13 resolutions taking substantive
14 action to be voted on in this

19 a bill or resolution from the
20 Suspension Calendar that is not

22 The purpose of this
23 motion is to provide the public

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: It has been moved and
9 properly seconded that the
10 legislative matters stated by
11 Councilmember Majority Leader
12 Gilmore Richardson may be added to
13 the agenda for today should those
14 matters arise during the course of
15 this session of Council.

16 All those in favor will
17 signify by saying aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: The ayes have it and the
24 motion carries.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - GUESTS

2 The Chair will dispense
3 with the regular order of business
4 to recognize the guests and
5 visitors joining us in chambers
6 this morning.

7 On behalf of all members
8 of City Council, I welcome you to
9 our Council session. We appreciate
10 you taking your time to join us as
11 we attend the legislative affairs
12 of this great city. We certainly
13 invite you to come again.

14 On the balcony on behalf
15 of Councilmember Minority Whip
16 Nicolas O'Rourke, we have students
17 from the PhillyBOLT program, an
18 academic year fellowship partnering
19 directly with the schools to bring
20 leadership development to the
21 classroom. They train young
22 leaders referred to as coaches.
23 These 10th grade and above students
24 receive comprehensive leadership

2 training and then mentor their
3 peers in civic classrooms, creating
4 ripple effect of empowerment and
5 skill building within their school
6 communities. I'm going to
7 acknowledge Councilmember Nicolas
8 O'Rourke to introduce his guests.

9 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 And good morning to the
12 Philadelphians, all as has already
13 been articulated we are joined
14 today and I am thankful for all the
15 students of PhillyBOLT for joining
16 us.

17 It is truly inspiring I
18 should say to see so many young
19 people just dedicating themselves
20 to leadership, to mentorship and to
21 community transformation, something
22 I believe every city could use more
23 of. And thanks to PhillyBOLT, we
24 have them in spades this morning.

2 I also want to extend
3 deep gratitude to the PhillyBOLT
4 staff for their vision, their care
5 and their tireless commitment that
6 they bring to this work every day.
7 Thank you for building power where
8 it belongs, which is right here in
9 our communities. Can they stand
10 and can we also give them a round
11 of applause today.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

14 These students, Mr. President, are
15 a part of what's called the BOLT
16 Academic Year Fellowship Program,
17 which trains Philly high school
18 students to become coaches for
19 their peers, promoting leadership.
20 They're promoting civic engagement
21 and they're promoting skill-
22 building across schools.

23 We got folks from West
24 Philly High School, Academy of

2 Palumbo, Olney High School, Sayre
3 High School. So again, let's clap
4 it up for them and for their
5 leadership in helping us become a
6 better city.

7 Thank you,
8 Mr. President.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Thank you very much,
12 Member O'Rourke.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson.

15 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

16 RICHARDSON: Thank you, Council
17 President.

18 First, I'd like to just
19 acknowledge and I'm sure you have
20 this, but she's my State
21 Representative and I'd like to
22 acknowledge her presence here in
23 the chambers, Representative Ronnie
24 Green. We welcome you to our City

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

5 RICHARDSON: We thank you for your
6 work and for your advocacy,
7 particularly in the union space.
8 But today, Council President, I am
9 so pleased that on behalf of my
10 dear colleague Councilmember Brian
11 O'Neill, who represents the 10th
12 Council District, and myself, we
13 are welcoming Mrs. Marks, the
14 Social Science and African American
15 History teacher at Swenson Arts &
16 Technology High School along with
17 28 of her students.

18 They have joined us here
19 in Philadelphia City Council
20 chambers to learn more about the
21 operations of Philadelphia City
22 Council and more about the work
23 that we do each and every day. I
24 had the opportunity to visit

2 Swenson during our budget season,
3 so I was there very early in the
4 morning and had an opportunity to
5 talk with a number of young people
6 about our Apprenticeship guidebook
7 and about all the
8 pre-apprenticeship and
9 apprenticeship programs available
10 in the city.

11 So let's please welcome
12 Mrs. Marks and all the students
13 from Swenson Arts & Technology High
14 School.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
18 Councilmember Dr. Anthony Phillips.

19 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

20 Thank you, Council President.

21 I just want to briefly
22 recognize another organization
23 that's doing great youth work in
24 the city of Philadelphia. It is a

2 citywide organization. They are
3 known as Summer Search
4 Philadelphia. Their Executive
5 Director and their staff are here
6 today and would like to recognize
7 them. If you all could stand,
8 Summer Search Philadelphia.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS: In
11 10 seconds I just want to say they
12 do incredible year-round
13 mentorship, support, college access
14 as well as summer experiences that
15 provide social, emotional learning
16 for young people throughout the
17 city of Philadelphia. I happened
18 to be a fellow intern with them
19 many years ago and I'm so grateful
20 that the organization is still
21 making an impact here in the city
22 of Philadelphia. So thank you for
23 being a great engine of success for
24 young people in the city of

2 Philadelphia. Thank you, Summer

3 Search Philadelphia. Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

5 JOHNSON: Thank you. We also have

6 joining us today leader of the

7 labor movement, shoulders we stand

8 on, we're advocating on all things

9 labor, former head of the AFL-CIO,

10 Mr. Pat Eiding. Could you please

11 stand, sir?

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: And as mentioned by my

15 Majority Leader, I want to also

16 thank the young lady who's fighting

17 in Harrisburg to raise the wage to

18 \$15.00 an hour, State

19 Representative Ronnie Green. Thank

20 you for joining us.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: At this time, the Chair

24 recognizes Councilmember Jamie

2 Gauthier, who will present a
3 resolution hiring and recognizing
4 and congratulating the first class
5 of the West Philadelphia Zoo
6 Scholars. Will Alexis Brown, Chief
7 People Officer and those
8 accompanying her, please join
9 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier at the
10 podium.

11 Joining Councilmember
12 Gauthier will be Councilmember
13 Landau, Councilmember Dr. Nina
14 Ahmad, Majority Leader Katherine
15 Gilmore Richardson, Minority Whip
16 Councilmember Nicolas Nic O'Rourke,
17 Majority Deputy Whip Councilmember
18 Cindy Bass, leader of the
19 Kensington Caucus Councilmember
20 Quetcy Lozada, Councilmember
21 Dr. Anthony Phillips and Minority
22 Leader Councilmember Kendra Brooks.
23 I think I just saw a snake though.
24 I'll stand up here.

2 (Councilmembers and
3 guests approached podium.)

4 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

5 Good morning, everyone. I want to
6 start by welcoming our guests from
7 the Philadelphia Zoo, especially
8 the inaugural class of the West
9 Philadelphia Zoo Scholars which
10 includes students from KIPP DuBois
11 Collegiate Academy, Belmont Charter
12 High School, Saul, George
13 Washington Carver, School of the
14 Future, Masterman and my alma mater
15 Central High School 255. We are
16 also joined by a very special VIP,
17 one of the animals that lives at
18 the zoo, a prehensile-tailed skink
19 named Bili.

20 I know the snake that we
21 brought last year made some
22 members, who shall not be singled
23 out, a little bit uneasy so we
24 opted for something with legs this

2 time. The Philadelphia Zoo is
3 actually the first to successfully
4 breed a second generation of
5 skinks, improving the genetic
6 diversity of the species with the
7 hope of returning and repopulating
8 them in the wild. This is just one
9 example of how for the past
10 century-and-a-half the Philadelphia
11 Zoo has been making a difference
12 around the world.

13 They recently received
14 international praise for hatching
15 four critically-endangered Western
16 Santa Cruz Galapagos tortoises,
17 which Philadelphians voted to name
18 after the Golden Girls, Dorothy,
19 Rose, Blanche and Sophia, and I
20 can't think of anything more
21 appropriate. Even as they make big
22 strides on the world stage, I
23 commend the Philadelphia Zoo for
24 never losing sight of its

2 obligation to uplift the
3 community's closest to home.

4 Through programs like
5 the West Philadelphia Zoo Scholars
6 and many others, the neighborhoods
7 around the zoo's perimeter have
8 developed a fruitful and loving
9 relationship with the institution.
10 Yes, the Philadelphia Zoo provides
11 connections to animals,
12 conservation programs and a deeper
13 learning of our planet, but it is
14 also an urban oasis, a magical
15 escape and safe and green space
16 where Philadelphians can connect
17 with nature and each other.

18 I commend the zoo's
19 newest President, Dr. Jo-Elle
20 Mogerman for making sure the zoo
21 does as much for our city as it
22 does for the world. The
23 Philadelphia Zoo is a zoo of first,
24 so I would be remiss if I did not

2 mention that Dr. Mogerman is its
3 first Black and first woman leader.
4 Let's give a hand for Dr. Mogerman.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:
7 As someone who knows what it's like
8 to be the first Black woman leader
9 of a major nonprofit organization
10 in this city, I know how important
11 it is that we support her in
12 carrying out the zoo's mission.
13 2026 is only months away. It is
14 imperative that we set up our zoo
15 for success. It is as much a part
16 of Philadelphia's history as
17 Independence Hall or the Liberty
18 Bell, and programs like the West
19 Philadelphia Zoo Scholars prove
20 just how important the Philadelphia
21 Zoo is for our future as well.

22 So thank you to the
23 Philadelphia Zoo for recognizing
24 that an investment in our young

2 people is always a good investment
3 to make. And congratulations to
4 the inaugural class of Scholars on
5 making a difference while setting
6 yourself up for success as you move
7 into adulthood. We are all so
8 proud of you. Let's give them a
9 round of applause.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

12 And with that, my colleagues will
13 join me in reading the resolution:

14 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

15 Whereas, Philadelphia Zoo,
16 America's first zoo, is renowned
17 for innovation in animal care and
18 unwavering commitment to wildlife.
19 A zoo of firsts, Philadelphia Zoo
20 has been a leader since opening its
21 historic gates on July 1, 1874.
22 Responsible for the first
23 successful orangutan and chimpanzee
24 births in the U.S., being the first

2 zoo in the world to build an onsite
3 animal care center, developing the
4 first specialty formulated foods
5 for zoo animals, and opening the
6 first Children's Zoo in the U.S.,
7 Philadelphia Zoo has always been an
8 industry leader, setting standards
9 for animal care and guest
10 experiences; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:
12 Whereas, the West Philadelphia Zoo
13 Scholars Program is a
14 groundbreaking initiative by the
15 Philadelphia Zoo in partnership
16 with local schools and community
17 stakeholders, designed to cultivate
18 the next generation of conservation
19 leaders by providing high school
20 students from West Philadelphia
21 with immersive hands-on experiences
22 in zoological sciences, veterinary
23 medicine, environmental education
24 and wildlife conservation. And my

2 two daughters went to the camp; and

3 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

4 RICHARDSON: Whereas, the program

5 offers a unique opportunity for

6 students to engage in professional

7 development, mentorship and

8 experiential learning at the

9 nation's first zoo, building skills

10 in public speaking, scientific

11 inquiry and community engagement;

12 and

13 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

14 Whereas, the inaugural cohort of

15 Zoo Scholars has demonstrated

16 resilience, intellectual curiosity

17 and an unwavering commitment to

18 protecting wildlife and the natural

19 world, while also serving as

20 ambassadors for conservation within

21 their schools and neighborhoods;

22 and

23 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

24 Whereas, these students have

2 participated in a rigorous multi-
3 year program that included field
4 research, animal care,
5 environmental justice projects and
6 leadership training, all while
7 balancing the demands of high
8 school and other extra-curricular
9 responsibilities; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

11 Whereas, the Philadelphia Zoo's
12 investment in these students
13 reflects the broader commitment to
14 equity, conservation, education and
15 demonstrates the transformative
16 power of civic institutions
17 partnering with local communities
18 to expand opportunities and inspire
19 future leaders; and

20 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

21 Whereas, the graduation of the
22 first cohort of West Philadelphia
23 Zoo Scholars marks a significant
24 milestone in the zoo's legacy and a

2 proud achievement for the city of
3 Philadelphia, showcasing the
4 brilliance, talent and promise of
5 our city's youth; now, therefore,
6 be it

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

8 Resolved, by the Council of the
9 City of Philadelphia, Hereby honors
10 and congratulates the first
11 graduating class of the West
12 Philadelphia Zoo Scholars program
13 for their outstanding
14 accomplishment, leadership and
15 dedication to the values of
16 conservation, community and
17 lifelong learning.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

20 I would now like to invite up
21 Alexis Brown, Chief People Officer
22 at the Zoo, to say a few words.

23 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

24 Thank you, and hello. I would like

2 to first say good morning to
3 Council President Johnson,
4 Councilmembers Gauthier and Jones
5 and members of City Council. It is
6 indeed a pleasure to be here. I'm
7 here on behalf of Dr. Mogerman.
8 She gave me the honor to be here
9 with our special visitor, which you
10 will see in a few minutes.

11 But this is a special
12 day, right. This is a grand day,
13 another first for the Philadelphia
14 Zoo and partnership with City
15 Council that we're here to
16 recognize the first scholars
17 graduating time period at the zoo.

18 So we have many
19 talented, many talented students
20 and have worked with a lot of youth
21 over our rich history. But the zoo
22 recognizes and really, really leans
23 in to support our youth. And
24 still -- yes, we have some special

2 guests, at least one --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: There we go.

5 MS. BROWN: -- and

6 recognize that we are really

7 instrumental with your support to

8 provide the services that are

9 needed to these youth. So what is

10 the Zoo Scholar Program and what do

11 the Zoo Scholars do --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Shhh.

14 MS. BROWN: I know it's

15 hard to concentrate, right. I

16 know. I understand. No problem.

17 So what we do is we give local high

18 school students who live in

19 Philadelphia, in West Philadelphia

20 or attend West Philadelphia High,

21 and connect with science

22 conservation and career pathways

23 that they may not all otherwise

24 have access to. It's not a

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2 one-time opportunity.

3 We work with sophomores,
4 juniors and seniors. And then as
5 they matriculate into college, we
6 also have internship opportunities.
7 So they get hands-on, really
8 intense mentorship from the staff
9 and they have the opportunity to
10 work and engage with the public,
11 which we know is such an important
12 skill.

13 I'm the Chief People
14 Officer at the zoo and I can tell
15 you when you learn those
16 professional skills, they carry you
17 through life. I wanted to bring
18 just a short testimonial. My
19 daughter also participated in a
20 similar program many years ago when
21 I was a much younger mom -- we
22 won't get into that age -- but she
23 participated in a program and can I
24 tell you it was transformational.

2 She went from being a
3 shy individual to learning how to
4 engage with the public even when it
5 was uncomfortable. To witness
6 these young people and what they're
7 doing on a daily basis at the zoo,
8 they wear a zoo uniform. They're
9 part of our community. They engage
10 and they teach the public. They
11 engage with some of the activities
12 to help with their own education
13 and learning as they are really
14 figuring out what career do I want
15 to go into, what do I want to do
16 with my life, and we help them
17 through mentorship with staff
18 support in order to figure that out
19 for themselves. They are
20 introduced to careers that they may
21 not have even thought of. So I
22 wanted to just make that point.

23 Why is it unique? And
24 you've heard from Councilmember

2 Gauthier why it is unique. But I
3 just wanted to emphasize that
4 they're not volunteers, right.
5 They're not paid, but they are
6 trained and they're mentored and
7 they're part -- they are mentored
8 as part of the zoo team. And they
9 learn how to engage and be seen and
10 also how they treat and work with
11 the public.

12 I'm sure you understand
13 there are challenges that come with
14 working with some of our wonderful
15 citizens, right. Sometimes people
16 come and they're not always the
17 most pleasant to deal with, so
18 learning how to do that and deal
19 with that is really important.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: I know that's right.

22 MS. BROWN: What's
23 making it successful? It's a
24 design to close the gap. So we're

2 taking students from Philadelphia,
3 from West Philadelphia in

23 every time that they come.

20 leave their neighborhoods to access
21 world-class opportunities. They
22 should be able to find these things
23 right there at their home and
24 thanks to programs like that,

10 Licenses and Inspections reports
11 out two bills with a favorable
12 recommendation.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

15 Will the Chief Clerk
16 please read the report.

17 CHIEF CLERK: The
18 Committee on Licenses and
19 Inspections to which were referred
20 the following bills: Bill No.
21 250123, an ordinance amending
22 Section 6-503 of The Philadelphia
23 Code, entitled "Licenses and
24 Permits," to provide for the

2 suspension of licenses for
3 businesses not in compliance with
4 applicable state regulations and/or
5 whose physical layout significantly
6 differs from the original approved
7 floor plan, all under certain terms
8 and conditions.

9 And Bill No. 250151, an
10 ordinance amending Title 9 of The
11 Philadelphia Code, entitled
12 "Regulation of Businesses, Trades
13 and Professions," by revising
14 Chapter 9-4400, entitled
15 "Responsible Business Operations,"
16 to add the sale of tobacco in
17 violation of 18 Pa. C.S. § 6305 to
18 the list of nuisance behaviors,
19 under certain terms and conditions,
20 respectfully reports it has
21 considered and amended the same and
22 returns the attached bills to
23 Council with a favorable
24 recommendation.

2 There are no further
3 bills to report out from the
4 Committee on Licenses and
5 Inspections, Council President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Thank you.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Mike Driscoll for a
10 motion.

11 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

12 Thank you, Mr. President.

13 I move that the rules of
14 Council be suspended to permit
15 first reading this day of the bills
16 just read into the record by the
17 Chief Clerk.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: It has been moved and
21 properly seconded that the rules of

3 All those in favor of

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: The ayes have it. The
12 motion carries and these bills will
13 be placed on our First Reading
14 Calendar for today.

15 The next order of
16 business is the consideration of
17 the Calendar. I note that the
18 bills just read and reported from
19 committee with the suspension of
20 the rules have been deemed to have
21 had a first reading. These bills
22 will be placed on the Second
23 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
24 for the next session of Council.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING

2 As there are no
3 additional bills on the First
4 Reading Calendar, the Chair
5 recognizes Majority Leader Gilmore
6 Richardson for a motion concerning
7 the resolutions on the Final

9 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

10 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 I move that the rules of
13 Council be suspended as to permit
14 the use of a consent agenda to
15 consider the following resolutions

17 today: Nos. 250385, 250392,

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

24 JOHNSON: It has been moved and

7 All in favor will
8 signify by saying aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

14 JOHNSON: The ayes have it. The
15 motion carries. We will consider
16 the resolution consent agenda
17 shortly.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Majority Leader Gilmore Richardson
20 for a motion concerning the bills
21 on the Second Reading and Final
22 Passage Calendars.

23 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

24 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

2 Mr. President.

3 The following bills are
4 being called up from the Second
5 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
6 today: Nos. 250207, 250242,
7 250243, 250244, 250204, 250205 and
8 250206.

9 The following bills on
10 the Calendar are being held:
11 250266 and 250267. 240665-A is
12 being amended.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
14 JOHNSON: Thank you. Before
15 considering these bills and
16 resolutions, we will consider
17 public comment as follows: Your
18 public comment must concern matters
19 on the Second Reading and Final
20 Passage Calendars for possible
21 action at today's Council session.

22 Under ideal
23 circumstances, public commenters
24 each will have three minutes to

2 speak. However, this time limit

3 may vary from session-to-session.

4 Today the time limit will be one

5 minute to our extremely repetitious

6 public comment list.

7 In order to be fair to

8 all those wishing to speak, I

9 intend to hold faithfully to the

10 one-minute limit. When you begin

11 speaking, you will see a green

12 light on the podium. When there

13 are 30 seconds remaining to your

14 time, the light will turn yellow

15 which is your reminder to conclude

16 your remarks.

17 Once one minute has

18 passed, the light will turn red and

19 the Sergeant-at-Arms will

20 disconnect the microphone. At that

21 point, please yield the podium to

22 the next speaker if you have not

23 done so already. I also reserve

24 the right pursuant to our rules of

2 City Council to limit repetitious
3 comments on the same subject
4 matter.

5 I will now ask the Chief
6 Clerk to please read the name of
7 our first speaker.

8 CHIEF CLERK:

9 Representative Ronnie Green. May
10 Amala Anthony, Maciah Billard,
11 Faustine Gultom, Gretta Rogan,
12 Jaiden Thompson and Rahmier
13 Thompson also make their way to the
14 podium.

15 (Witnesses approached
16 podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

18 JOHNSON: Thank you,
19 Representative. The floor is
20 yours.

21 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

22 GREEN: Good morning, everyone. I
23 would like to thank Council
24 President Johnson and all City

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Councilmembers for this opportunity
3 to testify with regard to raising
4 the wage in Pennsylvania to a
5 sustainable living wage.

6 I would also like to
7 recognize --

8 (Applause.)

9 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

10 GREEN: I would like to also
11 recognize my very own
12 Councilmembers, Katherine Gilmore,
13 Richardson, Curtis Jones, Cindy
14 Bass Jeffrey Young, Isaiah Thomas,
15 Kendra Brooks and Jamie Gauthier,
16 thank you so much. Your leadership
17 in the 190th Legislative District
18 is impeccable. In working
19 together, state and city, we can
20 absolutely exemplify what we can
21 accomplish.

22 Thank you all who
23 attended the rally on Tuesday right
24 outside this building. Your

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 continued service and willingness
3 to end this injustice, raising the
4 minimum wage, is exactly what we
5 need, moving the needle towards
6 correcting a systemic injustice for
7 decades.

8 I am State
9 Representative Ronnie Green, a
10 champion and advocate for raising
11 the wage in the House of
12 Representatives in Pennsylvania. A
13 reporter asked me on Tuesday why am
14 I so passionate about this issue.
15 It's because I remember, I remember
16 when. I too was a single mom
17 living not paycheck-to-paycheck
18 because the money ran out before my
19 next pay check came.

20 I remember not being
21 eligible for SNAP benefits or
22 childcare benefits because I made
23 too much money, but I couldn't make
24 ends meet. I remember making

2 choices about which kid I could
3 take to the doctor and when because
4 I didn't have the co-pay.

5 I remember picture day
6 and class trips for my children and
7 not being able to participate or
8 send them on trips. I could have
9 coined the phrase robbing Peter to
10 pay Paul because I truly mastered
11 it for. Those who are too young to
12 remember Peter or Paul, consider
13 yourself blessed. We can talk
14 about it later.

15 What I quickly knew was
16 that I needed another job, forcing
17 me away from my children, my
18 siblings and nieces and nephews
19 that I raised, losing both parents
20 by 17. I knew God would take care
21 of us and he did just that. I
22 worked two jobs most of my adult
23 life, while working for the
24 Department of Public Welfare over

2 20 years determining eligibility
3 for cash, medical and food stamps,
4 the very benefits that I needed for
5 myself.

6 I didn't say all that to
7 the reporter, but surely I was
8 thinking it. In speaking with my
9 constituents, working families in
10 Pennsylvania, family members and
11 friends, I hear the same stories
12 right now and I say why. Why 20,
13 30, 40 years later people are still
14 struggling, living through the same
15 challenges, same systemic social
16 economic conditions we are in and
17 remain in a crisis. We must raise
18 the damn wage.

19 As a 37-year member of
20 SEIU AFL-CIO, we work endlessly to
21 increase wages for working families
22 in Pennsylvania. All hail to the
23 Labor movement for fighting and
24 remaining to fight the good fight.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 We know that raising wages would
3 impact over 2 million low-wage
4 workers.

5 We know that raising the
6 wage of Pennsylvania would generate
7 over \$100 million in revenue. We
8 know that wages have not been
9 raised in over 15 years, with the
10 exception of a dime in 2012. We
11 know when the campaign Fight for 15
12 started back in 2010 to increase
13 fast-food workers salaries to \$15,
14 people thought the unions were
15 insane. Not only were the salaries
16 increased, California just raised
17 their fast-food workers to \$20 an
18 hour.

19 We know that a living
20 wage should be 18, 20, 24 and
21 higher. We know at 7.25, you need
22 to work two hours to buy a dozen of
23 eggs. We know that every state,
24 New York, New Jersey, Delaware,

2 Ohio, West Virginia and Maryland
3 all have a higher wage that borders
4 Pennsylvania and they have a lesser
5 population.

6 Each of these states
7 found a way to take care of their
8 labor force by creating a pathway
9 to a living wage. We also know
10 that 32 other states in this
11 country in 2025 passed legislation
12 to raise their wage to a living
13 wage. And guess who was not on the
14 list? You're right, Pennsylvania.

15 We know that small
16 businesses and nonprofit
17 organizations will not go under
18 because other states have small
19 businesses and nonprofits. If
20 Pennsylvania doesn't know how to do
21 it, they should visit other states
22 and learn. We also know that
23 legislators get a raise every year.
24 We work hard, but we don't work any

2 harder than those who have a job,
3 go to work every day trying to take
4 care of their families and being
5 forced to work two and three jobs.
6 All work has dignity. They deserve
7 a raise as well. One job must be
8 enough.

9 (Applause.)

10 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

11 GREEN: We know my first bill
12 introduced in 2020 was a bill for
13 \$15 increase and nothing was done.
14 We know when I returned in '22 a
15 bill for \$18 was introduced hoping
16 the higher wage would be used as a
17 bargaining chip to get to 15. The
18 House passed the bill increasing
19 the minimum wage to \$15 by 2026 and
20 the majority Republican Senate
21 refused to pass it.

22 While the Dems were
23 rejoicing over a Republican-led
24 bill, they forgot that it had to be

2 passed out of both chambers and
3 ordered to deliver for the people.
4 Now, here we go again. I have
5 introduced House Bill 1150 for \$15
6 for the third time. And guess
7 what? We all must do something.
8 No more games, no more excuses in
9 Harrisburg. We must raise the damn
10 wage.

11 (Applause.)

12 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

13 GREEN: He's telling me to continue
14 this. This is a call for action.
15 We are demanding action. A \$15
16 living wage with the cost of living
17 adjustment will prevent us from
18 revisiting this again or we must
19 lift the preemption and allow
20 Philadelphia and the other 66
21 municipalities to negotiate their
22 own wage, free local wage.

23 I support the resolution
24 introduced by Council President

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Johnson to lift the preemption and
3 to free legal wage. We know that
4 workers cannot be told that the
5 minimum wage will not be increased
6 to a living wage and you can't go
7 get it yourself. We are working
8 hard and we need your help to make
9 it happen.

10 Let's be clear, there
11 are politicians, yes, here in
12 Pennsylvania that do not want this
13 to happen. They are blocking every
14 step of this process basically
15 telling workers to go to hell.
16 Well, our response must be simple,
17 raise the damn wage. Here's
18 the action --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
20 JOHNSON: Thank you,
21 Representative. I appreciate your
22 support. Thank you very much.
23 Let's give her a round of applause.
24 (Applause.)

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

3 JOHNSON: I want to take a moment
4 of why I allowed the extreme
5 latitude for the Representative,
6 because this is an issue that we
7 have been advocating for and she's
8 leading the charge in Harrisburg
9 working in partnership with our
10 Governor Josh Shapiro. So,
11 Representative Ronnie Green, can we
12 give her a round of applause. We
13 thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

16 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
17 Councilmember Rue Landau.

18 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

19 Thank you, Council President.

20 I need to leave for an
21 unexpected leave of absence. I
22 just wanted to remind everybody
23 that we have a briefing this
24 afternoon. Tech Week is next week.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 A briefing from One Philadelphia,
3 the tech collaborative. I hope you
4 can all join us and thank you so
5 much.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

7 JOHNSON: Would you like to be
8 voted aye on all bills and
9 resolutions?

10 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

11 Yes.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you. Leave is
14 granted.

15 Will the Chief Clerk
16 please call the next person to
17 testify.

18 CHIEF CLERK: We have
19 Amala Anthony. Then Maciah
20 Billard, Faustine Gultom, Gretta
21 Rogan, Jaiden Thompson and Rahmier
22 Thompson. May Sam Pheifer, Aileen
23 Callaghan and Rev. Philip Geliebter
24 also make their way to the podium.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (Witnesses approached
3 podium.)

4 MS. BILLARD: Good
5 morning, everyone. My name is
6 Maciah Billard, and I'm a 10th
7 grade student and a PhillyBOLT
8 fellow at William L. Sayre High
9 School. As a fellow, my peers
10 created a theory of change which is
11 to make school better for current
12 and future scholars. Recently
13 we've completed our goal which
14 involved restrooms and Sayre High
15 School not having hygiene products
16 and students' lack of awareness
17 regarding unsanitary bathroom
18 spaces. We've taught them it's
19 best to take action on change you
20 want to see.

21 The issue we come to you
22 with today are lunches. From being
23 in Philadelphia most of my life,
24 the lunches have been important to

2 me. A healthy meal provides the
3 nutrients and support for enhanced
4 learning. There are students who
5 don't have decent homes to go to or
6 won't always have warm food on a
7 plate. Some students rely on
8 school lunches.

9 My experience with
10 school lunch has not been the best.
11 The lunches are always cold and
12 sometimes raw. For example, we're
13 provided the same pizza and some
14 (inaudible) cheese sticks. Just
15 like many others, I'm lactose
16 intolerant so I can't eat it nor
17 would I trust it. A resolution we
18 should like for you is to raise
19 funding for USDA Food and Nutrition
20 Services for more health and
21 optional food choices. This will
22 dramatically increase healthier
23 options for students.

24 Students will fill their

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 stomachs and minds with food and
3 knowledge throughout the day.
4 Students, teachers, parents in our
5 community will win. It's in our
6 hands to make it known but yours to
7 make it happen. So what we are
8 asking from you is to work with the
9 School Board, use your voice and
10 funding appropriately to SDP to
11 advocate for better school lunches
12 for younger people across the city
13 of Philadelphia, young people like
14 me and all my friends here from
15 Philly Bolt.

16 I urge you to consider
17 our testimony today. Thank you,
18 Councilman O'Rourke, for hosting us
19 and the entire body. Have a good
20 day.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. GULTOM: Good
23 morning. My name is Faustine and I
24 am a PhillyBOLT fellow from the

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Academy at Palumbo. I am here to
3 speak on the many low-income
4 residents, renters and homeowners
5 of Philadelphia who are being left
6 behind. I followed the Sixers
7 proposal closely and I was
8 disappointed in the many
9 Councilmembers choosing
10 displacement over preservation.

11 As someone who rallies,
12 sat through hearings with my peers,
13 directly wrote to Council President
14 regarding my concerns and never got
15 a response. Witnessing the
16 (inaudible) the Chinatown community
17 faced just to protect their culture
18 and homes from billionaire
19 developers truly opened my eyes to
20 the deeper issues in the city. It
21 showed me how easily this body can
22 overlook the voices of residents
23 and how much effort it takes for
24 Philadelphians to be heard.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 It is necessary for the
3 people of Philadelphia to know that
4 their Councilmembers support the
5 stability of their homes over
6 profit. When will this body learn
7 from their mistakes? This is why I
8 refuse to stay silent about the
9 H.O.M.E. Initiative Plan that
10 claims to tackle the housing
11 crisis. While I stand for
12 affordable housing, this does not
13 center the people who need help the
14 most. Do not leave out low-income
15 residents living in unsafe
16 conditions, struggling just to make
17 ends meet. Just avoid pitting the
18 have-nots against those who have
19 just a little. Ignoring the people
20 with the greatest need for balance
21 is not equality but solely neglect.

22 The Mayor now wants to
23 raise the income limit for the
24 Basic Systems Repair Program.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 These are neighbors who have been
3 promised help and this continues to
4 push them out again. These
5 neighbors deserve to have access to
6 these resources just like anyone
7 else. They have dignity. There
8 are 7000 people currently on the
9 waitlist for this program, and
10 raising the income level would just
11 raise this higher.

12 We're calling on the
13 City Council to invest in housing,
14 specifically the Safe Healthy Homes
15 Act which I fully support, because
16 this is what demonstrates real
17 equity. Although I've been
18 disappointed in this governing body
19 before, I'm here because I still
20 believe that you all can consider
21 my public testimony and make better
22 governing decisions on behalf of
23 all Philadelphians. I urge you to
24 prioritize affordable housing over

2 corporate development. People over
3 profit. Thank you, Councilmembers
4 and Council President, for your
5 time.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. ROGAN: My name is
8 Gretta. I am a PhillyBOLT fellow
9 and I am a senior attending the
10 Academy at Palumbo. On Thursday of
11 last week, my classmate and I
12 attended the School District of
13 Philadelphia's general meeting to
14 testify our concerns on the funding
15 of our school and other public
16 schools in the District.

17 We raised concerns on
18 bathroom and facility conditions,
19 cleanliness, physical and emotional
20 support and resource management
21 after spending much of the year
22 focused on an Action Project
23 surrounding our concerns. My class
24 while bringing these problems to

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the attention of the school board
3 as a vital step in our path to
4 adapting the fund system of
5 Philadelphia's School District, but
6 when I was told I would have the
7 opportunity to testify for City
8 Council, I thought it best to
9 continue and showcase the efforts
10 of my class here.

11 During my time at
12 Palumbo, I have experienced
13 sickening bathroom conditions.
14 I've stepped into serous liquid
15 going to the bathroom and I've
16 waited in line for stalls because
17 only one out of five was working.
18 My senior presentation was
19 interrupted by a mouse skittering
20 in front of me and the days where
21 the school had to wait outside for
22 hours when our facilities crumbled
23 above and beneath us.

24 Our community at

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 schools, our closest network, is
3 where we spend the majority of our
4 day and it's district-wide. We
5 testified for the School Board to
6 make them aware of our position,
7 but I testify now to ask you to
8 invest in students. The 10-year
9 tax abatement has taken money away
10 from schools, money we desperately
11 need.

12 Mayor Parker's proposal
13 to expand the program serves to
14 take more. I am sincere in my
15 belief that any addition to the
16 program would harm school
17 district's funding tremendously
18 while we are fighting to keep our
19 necessities. Thank you.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

22 Thank you.

23 MR. THOMPSON: Good
24 morning.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
3 morning.

4 MR. THOMPSON: My name
5 is Jaiden Thompson. I'm a fellow
6 at PhillyBOLT and I go to West
7 Philadelphia High School. One of
8 the most common -- one of the most
9 common, sorry. One of the most
10 common problems I see here in
11 Philadelphia is a problem of buying
12 or renting a house or an apartment.
13 They don't have enough money. They
14 don't get paid enough. Houses are
15 way too expensive so that forces
16 them to live in very poor living
17 conditions such as myself. I
18 can -- my living conditions are
19 poor. I can barely use my own
20 kitchen to eat, forcing me to waste
21 more and more money.

22 And so, I ask for all of
23 you to do to -- to -- sorry.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: It's

2 all right. Take your time.

3 MR. THOMPSON: I support

4 low-income people in Philadelphia,

5 to support any program trying to

6 raise the wage in Philadelphia and

7 to make it so low-income people in

8 Philadelphia can finally start to

9 live in better living conditions

10 because they deserve to. Thank

11 you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

14 Thank you.

15 MR. THOMPSON: Good

16 morning, members of Philadelphia

17 City Council. My name is Rahmier

18 Thompson, a fellow PhillyBOLT

19 member at West Philadelphia High

20 School. Thank you for the

21 opportunity to speak today. The

22 Mayor's housing plan is a crucial

23 step towards addressing the City's

24 affordable housing crisis. It

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 demonstrates a commitment to
3 ensuring that more Philadelphians
4 have access to stable homes.

5 However, while
6 increasing housing availability is
7 essential, we must also ensure that
8 these homes are safe and healthy
9 for residents. Too many families
10 in Philadelphia live in conditions
11 that expose them to hazards like
12 lead, paint, mold and poor
13 ventilation, which can have
14 devastating effects on their health
15 and well-being.

16 A Safe Healthy Home
17 campaign will complete the Mayor's
18 plan by prioritizing the safety and
19 livability of both in new existing
20 housing. Advocates for the help
21 for the Safe Healthy Home campaign
22 have highlighted the need for
23 protective, mindful measures to
24 address housing-related health

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 risk. This includes ensuring
3 building codes, providing funding
4 for repairs and education programs
5 to help residents identify and
6 address unsafe conditions. By
7 investing in these initiatives, the
8 City can prevent illnesses caused
9 by unhealthy living and homes will
10 strengthen neighborhoods, improve
11 the quality of life for families
12 across Philadelphia. Thank you for
13 your time and consideration.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have
18 Sam Pheifer, Aileen Callaghan,
19 Reverend Phillip Geliebter. May
20 Naroen Chhin, Pheng Seng and Kosuke
21 Chujo also make their way to the
22 podium.

23 (Witnesses approached
24 podium.)

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 REVEREND GELIEBTER: My
3 name is Reverend Philip Geliebter.
4 I'm the Arch Deacon for the
5 Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania
6 and a member of the Clare Project,
7 which is an outreach ministry of
8 the Diocese within Kensington.

9 It is difficult to
10 address the mobile services
11 provider bill in one minute. The
12 fact that it's been restricted to
13 one minute and we have 50 people
14 signed up to speak goes to the
15 difficulty of such. It is hard to
16 address the bill without knowing
17 the amendment changes that have
18 been made.

19 As written, we feel that
20 it does not address the root
21 problems and what it is doing is
22 making leopards of the unhoused
23 siblings that live in Philadelphia,
24 specifically in Kensington, by

2 reducing and eliminating care and
3 services to those unhoused
4 siblings. So I ask you to have
5 mercy on our brothers and sisters
6 in the street and put forward a
7 bill that we can work with and is
8 just to those living on the street.
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

12 Thank you.

13 MR. CHHIN: First off, I
14 come before this Council body today
15 as just a regular community member
16 here in the outstanding city of
17 Philadelphia. I just want to
18 recognize and thank you so much,
19 Councilmember Nina Ahmad, for your
20 championing for underserved
21 community and also immigrants'
22 rights as well and recognizing
23 Asian American Heritage Month today
24 through your resolution.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Good morning, Council
3 and the City of Philadelphia. My
4 name is Naroen Chhin. I'm a
5 Cambodian American refugee and a
6 child of refugees and also
7 returning citizen. I'm an
8 entrepreneur and also a union shop
9 steward and also One Love Movement
10 organizer that fought for the
11 Sanctuary City policy here in the
12 city of Philadelphia for all the
13 immigrant unity network here in the
14 city.

15 I wanted to recognize
16 also that as former Vice-president
17 of the Southeast Asian market at
18 FDR Park I was part of the shaping
19 of the vibrant of economic
20 contribution of this great city
21 through the vendors and we
22 generated almost close to millions
23 of economic impact and hundreds of
24 jobs at the same time protecting

2 and preserving the vendors so that
3 way they are equitable and also
4 contribute to the economy here in
5 the city of Philadelphia.

6 I want to let you know
7 that as a janitor of Temple
8 University and also shop steward as
9 well and also the University of
10 Pennsylvania, I substantially serve
11 our city through many commissions
12 for the city of Philadelphia,
13 Mayor's Commission on Asian
14 American Affairs and also the
15 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
16 Governor as well too. I stand
17 before you today that there are
18 unsung heroes in the community that
19 we need to recognize too. They can
20 be janitors, teachers, police
21 officers that do amazing work for
22 our city of Philadelphia. Thank
23 you so much. Thank you,
24 Councilmember (inaudible) and the

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: We have
5 Pheng Seng, Kosuke Chujo. May Will
6 Tung, Kelly Gilson, Catherine
7 Freeland and Alan Lindy also make
8 their way to the podium.

9 (Witnesses approached
10 podium.)

11 MR. CHUJO: Hello. My
12 name is Kosuke and wife Tomomi
13 Chujo, come from Tokyo, Japan.
14 Thank you for giving me such a
15 wonderful opportunity. As
16 Ambassador to Philadelphia, I would
17 like continue communicating about
18 Philadelphia to customers around
19 the world through cheesesteak.
20 Thank you, Philadelphia. I love
21 you.

22 MS. CHUJO: And go
23 Birds.

24 MR. CHUJO: Yes, go

2 birds.

3 MS. CHUJO: Thank you.

4 Thank you very much.

5 MR. TUNG: Hello. Good
6 morning. My name is Will Tung.
7 I'm a resident of Southwest Philly
8 and here as a husband and father
9 raising a child in this city and as
10 a personal victim of traffic
11 violence. I'm speaking in support
12 of Bills 250266, 250267, which will
13 make 47th Street safer for all
14 roadway users, especially for
15 pedestrians who are the most
16 vulnerable.

17 Commenters last week
18 brought up concerns that adding a
19 bike lane will lead to bicyclists
20 hitting pedestrians, but we should
21 not lose sight of the real threat.
22 In 2023, Philadelphia saw 126
23 traffic deaths. Nearly half were
24 pedestrians and every single fatal

2 crash involved a motor vehicle. In
3 2020, my family and I nearly joined
4 this statistic while crossing 48th
5 and Springfield Avenue. My entire
6 family, including our then 6-year-
7 old daughter was struck by a
8 careless driver.

9 Since our crash, my
10 District Councilmember Jamie
11 Gauthier worked to reconfigure 48th
12 Street with a parking protected
13 bike lane. As a pedestrian, this
14 makes crossing so much safer. It
15 shortens the distance we are
16 exposed to moving vehicles and cars
17 drive slower. 47th Street deserves
18 the same treatment. It is among
19 the most dangerous streets in our
20 city and I'm proud of Councilmember
21 Gauthier's steadfast commitment to
22 roadway safety. And in her tenure,
23 she has led the way to tame
24 historically dangerous corridors

2 all throughout the 3rd District.

3 We already had a year
4 and a half of community engagement
5 on 47th. Now is the time for
6 action. Let's not miss this
7 opportunity to prevent injuries and
8 save lives. Let's wipe 47th Street
9 off the High Injury Network map and
10 let's get these bills passed this
11 Council session. Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: We have
14 Kelly Gilson, Catherine Freeland,
15 Alan Lindy. May Kate Perez, Paul
16 Birdsong and Lynn Landes also make
17 their way to the podium.

18 (Witnesses approached
19 podium.)

20 MS. PHEIFER: Good
21 morning. My name is Sam and I'm
22 here representing Positive Women's
23 Network and other individuals who
24 are concerned about Bill 240665,

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 the mobile service providers bill
3 from Councilwoman Lozada's office.
4 While I absolutely understand the
5 desire to address quality-of-life
6 issues in the 7th District, it's so
7 important to me and the
8 Councilwoman, this legislation
9 would create some significant
10 barriers for mobile service
11 providers, many of whom who are
12 offering lifesaving care to the
13 city's most vulnerable residents.
14 The bill introduces some
15 really steep permitting
16 requirements that I would love to
17 see altered or amended in some way
18 because the fines go up to \$1,000
19 and there are severe restrictions
20 on when and where the services can
21 be provided. Adding a third or
22 fourth location could really help
23 being able to distribute more
24 services in a meaningful way.

2 Under this bill,

3 providers could be fined simply for

4 offering wound care or distributing

5 basic necessities outside of the

6 hours and the locations and these

7 services are really critical during

8 an overdose crisis and a housing

9 emergency. We urge Council and

10 Councilwoman's office to consider

11 the unintended consequences. This

12 bill will not reduce harm. It will

13 increase it as it is now. I

14 understand there's two more

15 amendments that came out. I'm

16 excited to look at them. I have

17 not seen them yet and I ask you all

18 to consider the folks who are being

19 pushed most into the shadows and

20 uplift them. Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. CALLAGHAN: My name

23 is Aileen. I am a single mother of

24 an elementary school child. I was

2 a homeless teenager that drank to
3 black out so I could fall asleep
4 without food and shelter. I became
5 sober when I learned that I was
6 pregnant. I am now a proud
7 homeowner at Allegheny and Jasper
8 and I'm committed to loving and
9 honoring my neighbors, whether they
10 live in a home or not.

11 My homeownership journey
12 wouldn't be possible if it weren't
13 for the progressive movement
14 fighting for legislation and
15 programs that fight to restore
16 dignity to workers and families.
17 We can use city dollars, city
18 worker labor and civic engagement
19 to create a Philadelphia that
20 embodies our claimed sentiment, the
21 City of Brotherly Love, Sisterly
22 Affection and neighborly care.

23 As it is written now,
24 Bill 240665, understood as the

2 Mobile Services Ban bill, will
3 block wound care mobile services
4 traveling onto residential blocks.
5 The workers that operate wound care
6 vehicles are the first line of
7 defense for the most vulnerable of
8 our city.

9 The current Philly dope
10 supply causes festering wounds and
11 creates temporary symptoms of
12 paralysis and sedation to
13 unconsciousness and potentially
14 fatal withdrawal. My 11-year-old
15 son sees this every day. It is not
16 realistic to expect people living
17 with the above-mentioned symptoms
18 to travel to one defined location
19 for services.

20 Today and every day my
21 son sees people that he cannot tell
22 if they are alive or dead. I am
23 committed to working with any
24 member of government on any issue

2 ever to make sure that as few

3 people die as possible on Philly

4 streets. Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 MS. GILSON: Good

7 afternoon, everybody. My name is

8 Kelly or more commonly known as

9 Scout Gilson. But Hello, City

10 Councilmembers, constituents,

11 neighbors. I'm here today to give

12 public comment in regards to

13 proposed Bill No. 240665 and

14 implore you to vote nay on

15 enactment of this legislation as it

16 currently stands that we have been

17 shown.

18 His Holiness the Pope

19 Francis asked the question that I

20 believe you almost asked yourselves

21 now, every man, every woman who has

22 to take up the service of

23 government must ask themselves two

24 questions, do I love my people in

2 order to serve them better, am I
3 humble and do I listen to
4 everybody, to diverse opinions in
5 order to choose the best path.

6 If one were to ask
7 themselves this question and answer
8 it in truth with a yes, that person

10 current form. This bill in which
11 sharing necessary resources for
12 sustaining life would become a
13 crime. As a resident of the 5th
14 District represented by Councilman
15 Young, I have been shown time and
16 time again and done my best in kind
17 to honor what Philadelphians have
18 shown me, being a good neighbor,
19 uplifting one another by assisting
20 their fellow in need.

21 As a person of faith, I
22 have been given a commandment that
23 would be criminalized by this bill,
24 to love thy neighbor. As a person

2 who has been thirsty and as a
3 person who has spent many hours in
4 Councilwoman Lozada's District
5 serving her constituents, vital
6 resources, reducing the burden of
7 the city's first responders as well
8 as the trauma of residents by

10 these in her District die
11 preventable deaths in the street, I
12 cannot in good conscience allow my
13 voice to go unheard on this matter.
14 This bill is a danger not just to
15 those in need but to those who
16 choose to give.

17 Criminalizing
18 compassion, kindness and the first
19 thing we all learned in
20 kindergarten, sharing, leads me to
21 believe that we have not considered
22 the effects this would have on not
23 only her District but all of
24 Philadelphia. I leave you with a

2 piece of wisdom from James Baldwin.

3 We have yet to understand that if I

4 am starving, you are in danger. If

5 people think that my danger makes

6 them safe, we are in trouble.

7 Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: We have

10 Catherine Freeland, Alan Lindy,

11 Kate Perez, Paul Birdsong and Lynn

12 Landes. May Valerie Bai and Ivan

13 Vivar also make their way to the

14 podium.

15 (Witnesses approached

16 podium.)

17 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez.

18 With this bill we show that

19 international affairs are relevant,

20 influenced by our money and this

21 Council has the power to take

22 action in divesting from states

23 that act outside of the law.

24 We were quick to divest

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 from Russia. Now, El Salvador, and
3 I must mention that since March 2nd
4 our sister city has blocked all aid
5 from entering the Gaza strip. Then
6 on the 31st the World Food Program
7 Bakery shut down as fuel and flour
8 ran out, and they have since
9 depleted all food rations.

10 There's more than
11 116,000 tons of food assistance
12 sitting right outside of the border
13 and our sister city is blocking
14 aid. On financial stability we've
15 seen a sharp decrease in foreign
16 investments and exports falling as
17 more and more countries cut
18 diplomatic ties with Israel.

19 Stacy Garrity threw 56
20 million into a failing investment
21 and no amount of return can wash
22 the blood off our hands. The City
23 wants divestment to the point where
24 Swarthmore students relaunched

2 their solidarity encampment

3 yesterday with the clear goals of

4 full divestment and material

5 protections for its most vulnerable

6 community members.

7 Last month right after

8 having all criminal charges

9 dismissed, a PPD officer walked a

10 man right out of the courthouse and

11 right into ICE. Divest now. Free

12 Palestine.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. BIRDSONG: I'm Paul

15 Birdsong. In question is Bill

16 250206 from the general fund over

17 \$400,000 for personal services,

18 from the Civil Service Commission

19 over 35 million for advances and

20 other miscellaneous payments, from

21 the Director of Finance provision

22 and other grants and other advances

23 and other miscellaneous payments in

24 excess of \$211 million.

2 Last night an 18 year
3 old was shot twice in South Philly.
4 Tuesday the Panther Party searched
5 Strawberry Mansion for Swede, a
6 missing 13-year-old whose mother
7 Drew(ph) was desperately trying to
8 find him. My point is there's a
9 storm coming. 64-year-old shot in
10 the back. 77-year-old killed.
11 Mother shot 11 times in the car
12 with her son. The summer shootings
13 in Center City, Queens Village and
14 Society Hill. The Muslim Eid
15 celebration shot up two years in a
16 row.

17 Where is the bill to use
18 the city's resources to address
19 this because the shooting has
20 started already and summer hasn't.
21 The Panthers are out here
22 addressing this but where is
23 everyone else, because there was an
24 Amber Alert out for that young boy

2 the other day that we were looking
3 for? But when we were out
4 searching for them, there were no
5 police officers in the whole
6 neighborhood looking at all, but
7 they're getting paid to do that.
8 We don't get no resources, but
9 we're out here. Where are y'all?
10 I'm calling all police
11 officers and nonprofits that are
12 receiving funding due to the help
13 of this City Council and the Mayor
14 to come outside and help us save
15 the city or else, what are you
16 getting paid for. All power to the
17 people.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. LANDES: Good
20 morning. I'm Lynn Landes,
21 safestreetsphilly.org and I'm also
22 a registered Republican. I
23 strongly support Council
24 President's resolution denouncing

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 all forms of political violence.
3 And to that end, I ask that City
4 Council also denounce District
5 Attorney Larry Krasner, who in a
6 March 25th interview, said that
7 Republicans are "fundamentally
8 fascist and it will not do us any
9 good to try to appease them. They
10 are bullies who need to be punched
11 in the face as hard as possible."

12 In my opinion, what
13 Krasner said is a federal crime
14 under Title 18, Section 373, but
15 Krasner is not alone. It is a
16 deliberate strategy of the Democrat
17 party leadership to incite their
18 members to violence against
19 Republicans, and that is why I'm
20 requesting that the police
21 commissioner post additional police
22 at the polls on Election Day May
23 20th to protect Republicans such as
24 myself who will be handing out

2 party literature outside the polls
3 on Election day. And I sincerely
4 hope my fellow Republicans will

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

15 Please refrain from booing. We
16 want to make sure that everyone
17 gets the opportunity to be heard,
18 everyone.

19 MR. LINDY: Alan Lindy.
20 Councilwoman Bass, City
21 Councilmembers, I am here as one of
22 two very proud brothers of Elaine
23 Lindy, our sister, who has
24 initiated and put together the

2 Fiesta Schoolyards, which is being
3 honored today and thank you for
4 doing so with it.

5 I wanted to share a
6 little history how this came to be.
7 Elaine had been in a conversation
8 with a young man in high school and
9 asking what he does. It was
10 through an anti-bullying program we
11 were supporting. And he mentioned,
12 there's really nothing to do. And
13 she asked him more about it. And
14 turned out in conversation that
15 they didn't have a schoolyard or
16 playground where he was attending,
17 which really took her back.

18 And she looked at it
19 further and she investigated it and
20 found out that of the 150 public
21 elementary schools in Philadelphia,
22 100 of them did not have a play
23 yard, which is a pretty
24 extraordinary concept, sending kids

2 to school and not having a place to
3 play.

4 And although I'm not
5 sure how she made this decision to
6 ensure that there is this play yard
7 in every single public elementary
8 school in Philadelphia with it,
9 which entailed again 100 out of 150
10 of them and she had to be involved,
11 not just raising the funds to do
12 so, but in coordinating with the
13 School District, with the
14 principals, with all the
15 stakeholders. And each one was its
16 own individual project.

17 At this point, she will
18 accepted to be completed 50 of the
19 100 by the end of this year with
20 it, which is an extraordinary
21 accomplishment. So I just wanted
22 to give you a quick introduction.
23 You'll get to hear from me later
24 on, and thank you again for your

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: We have

7 Valerie Bai, Ivan Vivar. May

8 Virginia Hogben, Baijah Barret,

9 Nicole Somers, Danica Kuncio,

10 Amanda Burch and Robert Landy also

11 make their way to the podium.

12 (Witnesses approached

13 podium.)

14 MS. BAI: Good morning,

15 Council. My name is Valerie Bai.

16 I'm a nurse in the city and I'm

17 strongly opposed to Bill 240665.

18 I'm a nurse who's cared for many

19 Philadelphians with substance use

20 disorder in my career and I'm

21 appalled that our city resources

22 going towards criminalizing

23 services that help keep people

24 alive.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Time and energy spent
3 attempting to ban the distribution
4 of water, food and health care in
5 Kensington is time and energy not
6 spent on what actually keeps people
7 safe, healthy and housed. Why are
8 we using valuable city resources on
9 policing volunteers and houseless
10 people and harassing people who use
11 drugs or lack a safe place to
12 sleep. Why not use these resources
13 to fund accessible housing and
14 food, syringe exchanges and
15 low-barrier treatment for substance
16 use disorders, anything that people
17 have talked about needing today.

18 This legislation will
19 increase cases of Hepatitis C, HIV
20 and overdose deaths. It is
21 shameful and deadly and it
22 deliberately ignores
23 recommendations from public health
24 experts and people who have been

2 involved in harm reduction. I urge
3 Council to vote no on this bill.
4 (Applause.)
5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:
6 Thank you.
7 MR. VIVAR: Good
8 afternoon. My name is Ivan Vivar.
9 I'm here to oppose Bill 240665-A.
10 I want to first thank
11 Councilmembers Kendra Brooks,
12 Nicolas O'Rourke and Rue Landau for
13 their opposition of this. As a
14 humble soccer coach in Philadelphia
15 in the 7th District for the last
16 eight years, I find this bill will
17 just lead to more preventable
18 deaths. We've already had thanks
19 to the Kensington Caucus four
20 deaths in prison. I could see
21 these measures leading to more
22 deaths in the street that would in
23 a way increase litter. So this is
24 kind of backwards to what the bills

2 were trying to achieve in the first
3 place.

4 The lack of compassion
5 for others is appalling as we sit
6 here and speak about faith. This
7 is the most anti-religious kind of
8 bills I'd seen, that Jesus care who
9 he gave fish or bread at that time.

10 I'm not a spiritual
11 person, but this all just makes
12 sense to me. If you want to remove
13 undesirables from your communities,
14 this is one way to do it, harm the
15 others who are trying to prevent
16 their deaths. We have stagnant
17 wages and rising house cost. That
18 leads more houselessness. This
19 bill will not address that fact.

20 People who are already
21 suffering from domestic violence or
22 intimate partner violence will be
23 further under the microscope trying
24 to find places to get these

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 resources they can no longer get at
3 home or from mutual aid providers.
4 What -- okay. Well, I just want to
5 say if we want to find better use
6 to keep our cities clean, we should
7 turn our civil services to actually
8 keeping those streets clean and not
9 policing our residents who already
10 have nothing.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. HOGBEN: I'm Lynn
13 Hogben, a resident of the 4700
14 block of Windsor Avenue speaking in
15 opposition to Bills 250266 and
16 250267. In addition to these bills
17 interfering with access to two
18 residential streets, the protected
19 bike lane on 47th Street will
20 create a safety hazard, a new blind
21 intersection.

22 The 48th Street bike
23 lane demonstrated the safety hazard
24 of the intersection of 48th Street

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and Windsor with cars coming from
3 Windsor unable to see through
4 traffic before entering the travel
5 lane. The protected bike lane on
6 47th Street will create the same
7 blind intersection in danger of
8 two-car collisions and either
9 Warrington or Regent as neither of
10 these intersections is fully
11 controlled and they are on opposite
12 sides of 47th Street.

13 For over seven months
14 nothing has been done by OTIS to
15 remedy the blind intersection that
16 they created on 48th Street despite
17 repeated complaints. Yet they are
18 seeking to create the same
19 additional safety hazard on 47th
20 Street with no solution that has
21 been disclosed to the community.
22 This problem cannot be solved by
23 merely barring parking in the
24 immediate area of the intersection.

2 Major removal of parking

3 is not an acceptable solution

4 because the consequence was never

5 disclosed to the community. Major

6 reductions in parking create their

7 own safety issues by forcing

8 residents to park blocks away from

9 their houses late at night and

10 adversely affect the quality of

11 life. Residents at a minimum are

12 intended to be heard on these

13 issues.

14 In addition, it's

15 unclear the protected bike lane

16 will increase safety. I understand

17 that last week on 48th Street,

18 which was not a High Injury Network

19 street, had an accident between a

20 motorized scooter going the wrong

21 way in the protected bike lane and

22 a turning car. Thank you for

23 hearing me.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: We have
5 Baijah Barret, Nicole Somers,
6 Danica Kuncio, Amanda Burch, Robert
7 Landy. May Sam Stern, Kelsey Leon
8 and Micael Navarro-Lopez also make
9 their way to the podium.

10 (Witnesses approached
11 podium.)

12 MS. KUNCIO: Good
13 morning. My name is Danica Kuncio.
14 I am the Viral Hepatitis Program
15 Manager at the Philadelphia
16 Department of Public Health. Thank
17 you for the opportunity to
18 recognize May as Viral Hepatitis
19 Awareness Month in Philadelphia.

20 An estimated 50,000
21 Philadelphians are living with
22 chronic Hepatitis B or chronic
23 Hepatitis C, serious, often silent
24 infections, that damage the liver

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and can lead to cancer and
3 premature death. Fortunately, we
4 have proven tools that have saved
5 lives. Hepatitis B is preventable
6 through vaccination. Hepatitis C
7 is curable and screening tests
8 allow access to lifesaving
9 treatment.

10 Yet many residents face
11 persistent barriers to care, from
12 lacking resources to attend medical
13 appointments to navigating
14 substance use and other complex
15 challenges. Despite this,
16 Philadelphia's health care and
17 community partners have built a
18 strong infrastructure leading to
19 the cure of over half of those
20 diagnosed with Hepatitis C in the
21 last decade. This progress must
22 continue. We remain committed at
23 the Health Department and with our
24 stakeholders to expanding public

2 awareness using evidence-based
3 approaches and improving access to
4 testing, vaccination and treatment.
5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

8 Thank you.

9 MS. BURCH: Hello. My
10 name is Amanda Burch. Good
11 morning. I really appreciate this
12 opportunity to speak before Council
13 this morning and to voice my strong
14 opposition to Bill 240665, which
15 criminalizes compassion, promotes
16 policing over care and only creates
17 new barriers that will leave our
18 most vulnerable and marginalized
19 neighbors without the support they
20 need.

21 My neighborhood is
22 affected by the sweeps that the
23 City has been conducting, as many
24 unhoused neighbors are displaced to

2 my street. And I know that if this
3 bill is passed, it will not improve
4 the quality of life for my housed
5 or unhoused neighbors. As it is
6 written, it will only create
7 further harm and exacerbate
8 existing public health crises. It
9 will make it impossibly difficult
10 for people to access basic care and
11 it will set a dangerous precedent
12 for criminalizing people helping
13 each other. Philadelphians, housed
14 and unhoused, deserve better than
15 this. I urge Council to vote no on
16 this bill. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. LANDY: Good
19 morning, everyone. My name is
20 Robert Landy. I'm the Director of
21 the Eastern Atlantic States
22 Carpenters Technical Centers and
23 I'm here to speak on the National
24 Apprenticeship Week resolution. I

2 would like to thank Council

3 President Johnson for the

4 opportunity to speak and thank

5 Councilmembers Thomas and Gilmore

6 Richardson for introducing the

7 resolution.

8 Today I'm proud to share

9 with you the incredible tuition-

10 free opportunities offered by union

11 apprenticeship programs. These

12 programs are a gateway to a

13 rewarding career in the building

14 trades, providing a comprehensive

15 four-year apprenticeship that

16 combines on-the-job training with

17 hands-on school work.

18 Apprentices are immersed

19 in all aspects of the trades,

20 ensuring they are well-prepared for

21 a successful career. One of the

22 most compelling aspects of

23 apprenticeship programs is the

24 ability for apprentices to earn

2 while they learn. Participants
3 receive a high wage along with
4 medical and retirement benefits and
5 even have the opportunity to earn
6 college credits. This ensures that
7 our apprentices are not only
8 gaining invaluable skills but are
9 also securing their financial
10 future.

11 We are proud to foster a
12 brotherhood and sisterhood
13 environment where every apprentice
14 is given the tools and support
15 needed to thrive. Union
16 apprenticeship is more than just
17 training. It is a community
18 dedicated to building the next
19 generation of skilled trades
20 people. Thank you for your time
21 and I encourage anyone interested
22 in fulfilling a career in the
23 trades to consider joining the
24 apprenticeship programs. Together

2 we can build this city. Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. STERN: Good

5 afternoon. Thank you,

6 Councilmembers, for the opportunity

7 to speak today. My name is Sam

8 Stern. I am a physician with

9 Temple's mobile medical clinic

10 called Begin the Turn, although my

11 remarks represent my own, not my

12 institution.

13 I'm concerned that Bill

14 240665 as written will constrain

15 our ability to provide lifesaving

16 medical care to people in

17 Kensington and will ultimately harm

18 our patients. We are living

19 through a historic local and

20 national overdose crisis and the

21 people most likely to die during

22 this crisis and in need of life

23 saving treatment have had most

24 difficulty accessing health care in

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 traditional health care spaces.

3 Over the past year our
4 program has cared for more than
5 1000 people, 13% of whom have since
6 died, over half an overdose. The
7 proposed legislation would force
8 these people to leave our mobile
9 providers to leave areas and
10 greatest native outreach and
11 services effectively isolating an
12 already marginalized population.
13 I'm exceedingly concerned about the
14 incompletely defined process
15 mandated in the bill and the broad
16 restriction on legal locations for
17 operating.

18 I'm specifically
19 concerned that since the permitting
20 process is not yet in place we will
21 effectively have a ban on operating
22 in Kensington and not be able to
23 provide care. At the very least, I
24 would urge you to consider delaying

2 the implementation of the bill
3 until after the permitting process
4 is established and operating so we
5 can assure our patients safety. As
6 requested, we have provided formal
7 evidence of an organizational
8 structure and help draft a document
9 related to best practices. I
10 respectfully ask for assurance that
11 we will be able to continue to
12 provide critical health care
13 services without interruption in
14 mutually, beneficial and agreed-
15 upon locations. Thank you for your
16 time.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: We have
19 Kelsey Leon, Micael Navarro-Lopez.
20 May Gary Merryman, Theo Fountain,
21 Leslie Devore, Rodney Davis and
22 Justin Roig also make their way to
23 the podium.

24 MS. LEON: Good morning,

2 City council. My name is Kelsey

3 Leon and I'm a harm reductionist.

4 Before I begin my public comment, I

5 want to lift up the students who

6 came in today and showed so much

7 courage and bravery and compassion

8 for each other. Can we give them a

9 round of applause again?

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. LEON: They

12 demonstrated that you can do hard

13 things when you do them together

14 with other people. I think we all

15 saw that and that is the heart of

16 what mutual aid is, and that is the

17 heart of what's under attack with

18 Bill 240665.

19 Bill 240665 would render

20 street medicine efforts in

21 Kensington ineffectual by

22 restricting services to a single

23 and accessible parking lot and

24 criminalize religious expression of

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 sharing tangible goods necessary
3 for survival with any of our
4 neighbors. As a discipline, street
5 medicine immersed as a practice to
6 reach unhoused people who use
7 drugs, recognizing that these
8 populations have been historically
9 stigmatized, harmed and
10 inadequately helped by traditional
11 brick-and-mortar health care
12 institutions.

13 My grandfather Jorge
14 Leon was an immigrant from Ecuador
15 and a doctor. His graduate
16 dissertation examined how
17 brucellosis was being spread from
18 herd animals to the humans even in
19 a city like Quito. To understand
20 transmission, he went to Quito's
21 slaughterhouses and discovered that
22 workers were holding butcher knives
23 between their teeth as they rotated
24 the hanging carcasses, which was a

2 vector of transmission.

3 He inspired me to take
4 up the same spirit and meet people
5 in their environments to understand
6 their health challenges. When
7 street medicine providers can see
8 the environments their patients are
9 living in, they can work
10 collaboratively with patients to
11 promote healthy outcomes.

12 Restricting street medicine to a
13 single parking lot is comparable to
14 taking away an operating room from
15 a surgeon. Please vote no on this
16 bill, which would prevent medical
17 providers from providing
18 compassionate, holistic care to
19 people who need it the most.

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. NAVARRO-LOPEZ: Good
22 morning. My name is Micael
23 Navarro-Lopez. I've lived in West
24 Philly for 12 years and I'm a

2 School District grant writer and a
3 proud union member of PFT. I speak
4 for myself in response to the call
5 to action by School Board leaders
6 on March 27th when the District
7 presented its two-year preliminary
8 budget.

9 I'm speaking in
10 opposition to Ordinance 250206.
11 The general fund and revenues
12 outlined in the 2026 operating
13 budget are too meager to sustain a
14 city of 1.6 million Philly
15 residents and it's unacceptable.
16 Philly has been in a tight spot for
17 decades. But not everyone is
18 suffering equally in these
19 conditions.

20 Philadelphia's largest
21 private employer and landowner, the
22 University of Pennsylvania and its
23 health system are logging financial
24 banner years with their endowment

2 reaching \$22.3 billion this past
3 year. When everyone else is taking
4 a haircut, Penn must strike a new
5 course in paying real, meaningful
6 contributions to our city, not just
7 occasional pilots.

8 At its massive scale,
9 Penn has used extensively our
10 city's resources and I brought
11 their chart from their financial
12 report. You can see how well
13 they're doing financially. I ask
14 you please, City Council, to
15 restart these conversations with
16 Penn about how they contribute to
17 the structural support of our city.
18 Thank you very much.

19 (Applause.)

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Good
21 morning. My name is Francesca
22 Williams and I was born and raised
23 in Kensington. I lost my mother to
24 addiction, not because she didn't

2 want help but because it wasn't
3 there when she needed it.

4 I'm here against Bill
5 240665, which targets mobile
6 services and the people bringing
7 lifesaving aid, food, compassion to
8 people in the city like long left
9 behind. Councilmember Lozada, you
10 say that this is about public
11 safety. But removing outreach vans
12 is not about safety, it's cruelty.
13 You are punishing people for being
14 poor and for being addicted and for
15 being human.

16 Every preventable
17 overdose that happens because of
18 your desire to criminalize people
19 for helping is on you. If you are
20 not here to fight for our city's
21 most vulnerable, then what are you
22 doing in office and of all places
23 why Kensington. Thank you so much
24 for your time.

3 MR. MERRYMAN: Good

4 afternoon. My name is Gary

5 Merryman and I'm a social scientist

6 and harm reduction specialist

7 living here in Philadelphia. I'm

8 here to speak in firm opposition of

9 Bill 240665. This bill does not

10 protect Philadelphia. It abandons

11 it.

12 I live here and see the

13 serious necessity of these

14 services, but I also work in harm

15 reduction just across the river in

16 Camden, New Jersey, serving people

17 who use drugs, who are unhoused and

18 have been pushed to society's

19 margins.

20 Mobile service providers

21 provide crucial connections to

22 lifesaving care, sterile supplies,

23 food, water, but most importantly,

24 dignity and love. These services

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 aren't a nuisance. They are
3 essential. They save lives and
4 this bill will steal hope and
5 decency from our unhoused siblings.
6 This bill strips away that care and
7 compassion and offers nothing
8 substantial in return. No real
9 plan, no feasible alternatives.
10 Just punishment, confusion and
11 cruelty.

12 I saw it firsthand
13 during the Kensington sweeps,
14 people continuing to be wrongfully
15 incarcerated, some who have died in
16 Philadelphia's prisons. Displaced
17 people crossing to Camden desperate
18 for help, the harm didn't end. It
19 just spread. This bill will deepen
20 that suffering, not just here in
21 Kensington and in Philadelphia but
22 all across the region.

23 It violently targets our
24 most vulnerable populations and

2 pretends that erasure is the
3 solution. Let's choose compassion
4 over cruelty, connection over
5 control and life over death. Thank
6 you.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. DAVIS: Good
9 morning. My name is Rodney Davis.
10 I'd like to thank Council President
11 Johnson, Councilmember Bass and my
12 very dear friend Councilmember and
13 Majority Leader Katherine Gilmore
14 Richardson. I'm here to speak on
15 National Apprentice Week.

16 I'm going to speak on it
17 from a different level. Because
18 apprentice -- Philadelphia is known
19 as the poorest big city in America.
20 We can use these apprentice
21 programs to address some of the
22 poverty that's facing our city but
23 more importantly, I look and focus
24 on youth.

2 Young kids coming from
3 financially challenged families
4 have limited options as they grow
5 up. They don't have people telling
6 them often times the right thing to
7 do. They live in homes sometimes
8 that don't have food for dinner or
9 heat during the winter.

10 I'm sure you guys can
11 relate to that because I can
12 especially relate to that because
13 that's how I grew up. I grew up in
14 Chester, Pennsylvania in a very
15 financially-challenged situation.
16 I was fortunate to go to college
17 first generational, but the skilled
18 labor apprentice programs can
19 provide young people with a
20 financially-stable career and it
21 changes for generations.

22 I know families that you
23 go back five generations no one in
24 that family owned a car, never went

2 on vacation. The apprentice
3 programs can prepare people to
4 change the lives of not only them,
5 but also their children and
6 grandchildren. Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

9 Thank you.

10 MS. DEVORE: Good
11 morning. My name is Leslie Devore.
12 I am here as the voice from my
13 brother who cannot be here today
14 due to his death on December 12th
15 when he was picked up and held in
16 police custody.

17 I am also a voice for
18 many Kensington residents who have
19 family who are surviving out on the
20 street and that people out there
21 are deeply loved. My tears last
22 time I was here have now turned
23 into anger. I was swept off the
24 floor to meet Mr. Christmas

2 thinking our story mattered. My
3 brother did matter, to me, my
4 family, my poor mother and everyone
5 who knew him.

6 In my head I thought I
7 was going to get help after
8 Councilman Johnson stopped and made
9 a big deal to get my information.
10 Do you remember that? I do. I
11 truthfully believe it was done due
12 to the large presence in this room
13 because of the multi-million dollar
14 playground. How did that work out?

15 If we pointed our focus
16 on what was important like my
17 brother's life, we would not be
18 asking -- I would not be here
19 speaking of this today. A big
20 reason I am here is to talk about
21 mobile services. These are
22 services my brother benefited from
23 and I want people suffering -- I
24 don't want people suffering the way

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 he did, to continue getting the
3 medical and community support they
4 rely on.

5 Having access to these
6 services is heavily relied on. And
7 without them, people will continue
8 to die. My heart hurts. I have to
9 hear of two others who have passed
10 since my brother. As my family
11 stood up here, we felt
12 accomplished. We felt we were
13 heard, but it was all a dream. I
14 felt disregarded after
15 Mr. Christmas interrogated me and
16 my family for two hours or more.
17 He said he would follow up. Four
18 months later I'm in disbelief how
19 unprofessional this was.

20 He knew nothing about my
21 story when he called me, asking me
22 how do I think my brother died.
23 Asking me how my brother died? I
24 don't know. I ask the staff. I

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 told you in December you would see
3 me again and here I am. Four
4 months later and we're still
5 waiting on answers.

6 Drugs does not
7 discriminate which means my brother
8 may not mean much to you, but one
9 day you may find someone in your
10 life that does. I hope everyone
11 who is looking at me right now
12 never has that horrific knock on
13 the door that I'm sorry for your
14 loss and we can't give you much
15 more information. That's why my
16 family was left with my poor
17 brother walked himself into that
18 building, spoke during his intake
19 and was wheeled out on a gurney
20 without a heartbeat. And we want
21 to know why. We want to know why.
22 I don't think I -- I can't even
23 thank anyone but thank you.

24 (Applause.)

3 Chair recognizes Councilmember

4 Kathy Gilmore Richardson.

5 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

6 RICHARDSON: Thank you very much,

7 Madam Chair. And I'm very, very

8 sorry for your loss. I wanted to

9 just actually be recognized

10 previously, but I wanted to thank

11 some of the public commenters that

12 had come in regarding the National

13 Apprenticeship Week because some of

14 them had to leave. They could not

15 stay.

16 So I apologize, but I

17 just wanted to again thank Monica

18 Robinson from the AFL-CIO, Rodney

19 Davis who you heard from, Erin

20 O'Brien-Hofmann from the Finishing

21 Trades; Matt, the Apprentice

22 Director from the bricklayers; Bob

23 Landing, who you heard from the

24 Carpenters, Mary Brooks from We

2 Love Philly. And we had a total of
3 21 folks here, including the Pat
4 Eiding and Layla Bibby and many
5 more to join us for this day. So
6 thank you very much. I just wanted
7 to recognize them. They had to
8 leave.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

11 Thank you. Thank you, Madam
12 Majority Leader.

13 CHIEF CLERK: We have
14 Justin Roig. May Elaine Lindy,
15 Katerie Andricoe, Katherine Abrams,
16 Ben Cocchiaro and Francesca
17 Williams also make their way to the
18 podium.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MR. ROIG: My name is
22 Justin Roig. I am a member of
23 PhillyBoricuas, a local grassroots
24 organization that works in

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Kensington with the Puerto Rican
3 community. We oppose Bill 240665.
4 Because if enacted, it will result
5 in the callous and preventable
6 deaths of countless vulnerable
7 Philadelphians. This bill is
8 performative. It will not actually
9 stop the distribution of critical
10 aid in Kensington. It will only
11 complicate and criminalize it
12 further, prohibiting necessary
13 services that many local
14 organizations are providing.

15 Four people have died as
16 a result the Kensington Caucus'
17 harmful policies to mass arrest
18 drug users and deny them health
19 care. This bill, which is an
20 extension of these cruel policies,
21 will continue to reduce lifesaving
22 services and impede the ability of
23 harm reduction workers are
24 able to -- prevent the amount of

2 aid they're able to provide.

3 Whether you like it or

4 not, drug users are part of our

5 community. They are people and

6 their health is of concern to all

7 of us. They need access to more

8 health care and more resources, not

9 less. Councilmembers are creating

10 policy off of the callous impulses

11 of a vocal minority which does not

12 represent the diverse voices of the

13 7th Council District. For these

14 reasons, I ask you to vote no as

15 the bill currently exists to all

16 Councilmembers of conscience.

17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. LINDY: Hello. My

20 name is Elaine Lindy. It's a

21 privilege to be here. Thank you

22 very much. And in particular,

23 thanks to Councilmember Bass and

24 Councilmember Thomas who submitted

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 a resolution today acknowledging
3 our hard work with Fiesta
4 Schoolyards and transforming the
5 schoolyards of Philadelphia one by
6 one, 10 per year. 37 done of our
7 goal of 100.

8 I wanted to just take my
9 time just to thank the members of
10 our team, some of which had to
11 leave. In particular, my two
12 brothers, Alan, who you heard from
13 before, and Frank who in
14 conversation spawned this concept
15 and grew with support from Lindy
16 Communities, our family real estate
17 business, and our CEO Lev Kovinski
18 was here previously, Brian Kroger
19 may still be here, I'm not sure,
20 but is carried out by our
21 exceptional team, Dr. Skipworth who
22 had to leave and Gwen Varola who
23 may not be here, and our GC1
24 (inaudible) of MGA who just had to

3 But all of them,

4 exceptional, hard-working,

5 dedicated, fabulous team bringing

6 to the hardscapes of Philadelphia

7 basketball courts, running tracks,

10 murals, color, engagement,

11 vitality. It matters to our kids.

12 It matters to us all. Thank you so

13 much.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you. Thank you for your

17 work.

18 CHIEF CLERK: So we have

19 Kateri Andricoe, Katherine Abrams,

20 Matthew Schanbacher, Ben Cocchiaro

21 and Francesca Williams and Jeremy

22 Blatstein also make their way to

23 the podium.

24 (Witnesses approached

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 podium.)

3 MS. ANDRICOE: My name
4 is Kateri Lee Andricoe and I'm here
5 to speak in opposition of the
6 mobile services bill. I am a
7 street medic, a community organizer
8 and a person in recovery.

9 Philadelphia calls itself the City
10 of Brotherly Love and I believe we
11 should all strive to love our
12 neighbors.

13 Despite our differences,
14 we're all human beings and we all
15 need food and water to survive.
16 When people face barriers trying to
17 access these necessities, mobile
18 service providers are often the
19 ones who step in to meet these
20 needs. The punitive language used
21 in the bill as it was initially
22 proposed and the amendments that
23 have been adopted do not align with
24 the values that Philadelphians hold

2 dear.

3 The bill criminalizes
4 being a good Samaritan, a good
5 neighbor and a good citizen. It
6 completely undermines what
7 Philadelphia purports to be. In
8 plain language, if I give three of
9 my neighbors a bottle of water and
10 a fourth neighbor walks up, this
11 bill would bar me from giving that
12 person a fourth bottle of water. I
13 think that that was not what we
14 should be spending our time or
15 focus on. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. SCHANBACHER: Hello.
18 My name is Matthew Schanbacher and
19 I'm here to speak about National
20 Apprenticeship Week and why it's so
21 important to our city. But first,
22 I'd like to thank Councilmembers
23 Thomas and Gilmore Richardson for
24 introducing the resolution.

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Apprentice week is
3 important to me because I'm the
4 apprentice coordinator and training
5 director for the Bricklayers Allied
6 Craftworkers Philadelphia, Local 1,
7 Pennsylvania and Delaware -- yeah,
8 Pennsylvania and Delaware. Every
9 day I interact with apprentices and
10 see their struggles to become the
11 next generation of skilled craft
12 workers.

13 Registered
14 Apprenticeship is also important to
15 me because I started my career as a
16 registered apprentice program of
17 the bricklayers and allied craft
18 workers and it changed my life and
19 the life of my family forever.

20 I am going to go over
21 some of the opportunities that it
22 presented to me. I joined the
23 Local right in '99 when I graduated
24 high school. By the time I was 24,

2 I was able to buy a duplex and
3 (inaudible) home and move my
4 parents and younger siblings to get
5 them out of my old neighborhood. I
6 started running work and was
7 Foreman when I was 26.

8 I became a trade
9 instructor, an OSHA outreach
10 trainer when I was 32. I was also
11 main safety director of a company I
12 worked for. I got to go to my
13 International Training Center to go
14 through our international training
15 certification program, and I've
16 recently been made apprentice
17 coordinator. The reason I'm
18 sharing this isn't because I'm
19 special. These are opportunities
20 that exist for all registered
21 apprentices. I have seen people
22 come to presidents of Locals,
23 superintendents and company owners,
24 all fostered by the training they

2 received through their registered
3 apprenticeship program. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: We have
6 Katherine Abrams, Ben Chociar --
7 excuse me, Cocchiaro, Francesca
8 Williams, Jeremy Blatstein. May
9 Rosalyn Pichardo, Pat Eiding, Erin
10 Hofmann and Mary Brooks also make
11 their way to the podium.

12 (Witnesses approached
13 podium.)

14 MS. ABRAMS: Hi. Good
15 afternoon. My name is Katherine
16 Abrams. I'm the program
17 coordinator for the Substance Use
18 Response Guidance and Education
19 program. My program is funded by
20 the Substance Use Prevention and
21 Harm Reduction Division of
22 Philadelphia Department of Public.
23 health.

24 I've been coordinating

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 mobile teams meetings since
3 December of 2021 and we meet to
4 discuss practice issues surrounding
5 the provision of medical services
6 to people who use drugs. Our group
7 has been involved in discussions
8 with Councilmember Lozada since
9 December. She hosted two provider
10 roundtables in which we identified
11 some shared issues. The things
12 that were shared were really about
13 quality, and our group began
14 looking at that a little bit more
15 closely and developed a code of
16 conduct. Since then though, the
17 idea of two locations was only
18 proposed as an idea if quality did
19 not improve. However, we learned
20 that two locations would happen as
21 of two weeks ago.

22 Permitting may help with
23 that quality. We hope that can
24 happen. But at this point, groups

2 have not been involved in
3 conversations about how to use the
4 parking lot at 265 East Lehigh.
5 That might be helpful. And there's
6 little information to guide groups
7 about what's going to happen once
8 things go into effect. People
9 don't know what to tell their
10 patients, how to find them, where
11 to go. So people might have to get
12 lucky. And thank you for listening
13 to me.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

16 Thank you.

17 DR. COCCHIARO: Hello.
18 I'm Ben Cocchiaro. I'm a family
19 doctor who's worked in Kensington
20 for more than a decade. In 2016 I
21 served on the Mayor's Task Force to
22 combat the overdose epidemic. In
23 2018 I worked on the first mobile
24 addiction medicine clinic in the

2 city.

3 I'm not here to speak on
4 behalf of any of my employers, nor
5 do I represent them. I'm here
6 today as a private citizen and a
7 resident of Kensington for over 12
8 years. In that time, I've
9 witnessed a procession of mayors
10 and Councilpeople, each promising
11 to end the crisis but none
12 ultimately affecting more than an
13 increase to the police budget and
14 the overdose death rate.

15 Our current one,
16 emboldened by the Supreme Court,
17 has gone all in on defunding
18 services on the Avenue,
19 incarceration and compulsory
20 treatment, despite ample evidence
21 that this strategy is ineffective
22 and deadly, as evinced by Andrew
23 Drury and Amanda Cahill, who died
24 in overcrowded and understaffed

2 facilities, denied the lifesaving
3 medical treatment that it was your
4 legal obligation to guarantee.

5 The legislation before
6 us will maximize harm to my
7 neighbors by banning mobile
8 services and removing folks last
9 lifeline of water, clothing and
10 lifesaving medical care. The
11 choice that Mark Squilla, Mike
12 Driscoll, Quetcy Lozada and Jim
13 Harrity want to offer my neighbors
14 is this, die on the street or die
15 in jail.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. PICHARDO: Good
18 morning. My name is Roz Pichardo,
19 founder and Executive Director of
20 Operation Save Our City. I also
21 run a center called the Sunshine
22 House. I do not believe that Bill
23 No. 240665 does not represent the
24 needs of Kensington.

2 As a resident and a
3 business owner in Kensington, I
4 believe it will cause more harm and
5 I believe it will cause a lot more
6 amputations as services are needed
7 in my community. Knowing that the
8 services are about to be pulled is
9 devastating. We've already seen so
10 many amputations and so many lives
11 lost in Kensington, and reducing
12 some of our services will be
13 deadly. And again, I pray that all
14 City Council will vote no on this
15 crazy, unethical bill. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. EIDING: Good
18 afternoon. My name is Pat Eiding.
19 I am the President Emeritus of the
20 Philadelphia AFL-CIO. I'm the
21 Secretary Treasurer of Philadelphia
22 Building Trades and a proud member
23 of the Insulators Local 14. And
24 I'm here to thank the Council for

2 their recognition of the apprentice
3 programs in the city of
4 Philadelphia.

5 I know this is
6 Apprentice Week, and I'm proud to
7 stand here to tell you that
8 Apprentice Week in Philadelphia
9 runs for 365 days. It never goes
10 away because it's a career-
11 sustaining world. That's what we
12 do with apprentice programs.

13 I have to say that it
14 wouldn't happen without the efforts
15 of Councilwoman Richardson, Monica
16 Robinson from the AFL-CIO that's
17 out there every day talking to
18 schools. What we do on career days
19 in the school districts is
20 fantastic. We have a lot of other
21 businesses represented by union
22 that are doing that same thing to
23 make sure that we have young people
24 have a career, a family-sustaining

2 career.

3 And to say at the end, I
4 would like to have a request to our
5 City Council folks, to reach out to
6 your employers in your area for
7 internships and maybe some new
8 apprenticeships. We need more. We
9 have a lot of kids and a lot of
10 folks that need jobs. Thank you
11 for this opportunity.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

14 Thanks, Pat.

15 MS. O'BRIEN-HOFMANN:

16 Good afternoon. Thank you,
17 Councilmembers. My name is Erin
18 O'Brien-Hofmann. I am the Director
19 of Member Engagement for DC21
20 Painters Union, Glazers and Drywall
21 Finishers, and also the coordinator
22 for WINC, Women in Non-Traditional
23 Careers Trades Readiness Program.

24 I'm honored to stand

2 before you today and celebrate
3 National Apprenticeship Week, a
4 moment to recognize the power of
5 hands-on training, workforce
6 development and the future that
7 we're building right here in
8 Philadelphia. I'm here today
9 though to speak about the vital
10 importance of women in the
11 Philadelphia Union Building Trades.
12 For far too long the
13 face of the trades has been
14 overwhelmingly male, but in recent
15 years Philadelphia has begun to
16 reshape that image and its
17 apprenticeships that are making
18 that possible. Apprenticeship
19 programs are more than a pathway to
20 a career. They're a vehicle of
21 equity, dignity and opportunity.
22 And when we open these doors to
23 women, we're not only addressing
24 workforce shortages, we're creating

2 access to family-sustaining wages,
3 health benefits and retirement
4 security for women and their
5 families.

6 In Philadelphia we've
7 seen firsthand what happens when
8 women are given a chance to rebuild
9 from our bridges to our schools,
10 high-rises to hospitals, women in
11 the trades are laying the
12 foundation, both literally and
13 figuratively for our city's growth.

14 I want to recognize the
15 tireless efforts of our local
16 unions and pre-apprenticeship
17 programs like WINC, Staten Sr.
18 Pre-apprenticeship Program and CARP
19 that have committed to recruiting,
20 training and retaining women in
21 these fields. But there's still
22 work to be done and we continue
23 breaking down barriers, ensuring
24 safe and inclusive job sites and

2 expanding outreach to young women
3 across our neighborhoods. Thank
4 you.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

7 Thank you.

8 CHIEF CLERK: We have
9 Francesca Williams, Jeremy
10 Blatstein. May Ernest Wiley,
11 Timothy Freeman, Leah Shepard, Beth
12 Hollingshead and David Alexander
13 Jenkins also make their way to the
14 podium.

15 (Witnesses approached
16 podium.)

17 MS. BROOKS: Good
18 afternoon, everyone. My name is
19 Mary Brooks. I'm honored to speak
20 with you today in celebration of
21 the National Apprenticeship Week
22 resolution. First, I'll give honor
23 to my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,
24 giving a great thanks to President

2 Johnson for this opportunity and
3 Thomas, Gilmore Richardson for
4 introducing the resolution.

5 In 2023 I was blessed to
6 become a pre-apprentice at a
7 nonprofit called We Love Philly
8 founded by Carlos Aponte in 2019.
9 As soon as he found the
10 organization, I found him. But all
11 jokes to the side, We Love Philly
12 has truly changed my life from day
13 one. I knew God aligned me with
14 something special. But when the
15 program offered college-level
16 education and hands on-marketing
17 tools, that's when life really
18 started to shift for me.

19 I've been in a better
20 place financially to help provide
21 for my family. While just a few
22 months ago, my husband and I were
23 out doing Amazon Flex with two
24 babies under 2 trying to stay ahead

2 of the repo man and keep a roof
3 over our head. Now, rent isn't too
4 much of a struggle and things are
5 starting to finally turn around for
6 us. I get paid to learn, I get
7 paid to grow and surrounded by
8 people that is patient enough to
9 teach me.

10 Programs like We Love
11 Philly are needed. Apprenticeships
12 are needed. Not everyone has
13 access to a full ride or
14 traditional college path, but
15 everyone deserves a shot at
16 success. If Philly wants to
17 thrive, we need to equip
18 Philadelphians to thrive. I'm
19 grateful for this opportunity and
20 for We Love Philly, my We Love
21 Philly family who have truly helped
22 and changed my life. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you.

3 MS. SHEPHARD: Good

4 afternoon. My name is Leah

5 Shephard. I am a parent and

6 homeowner living in Kensington,

7 Council District 7. I'm opposing

8 Bill 240665, which is deeply

9 personal to me.

10 Our family has lost two

11 close friends to overdose. They

12 were both fathers who loved their

13 children immensely. Now, we are

14 struggling to do everything we can

15 to fill the void their absence has

16 left in their children's lives.

17 This bill will limit access to

18 life-sustaining resources like

19 Narcan, leading to more overdose

20 deaths.

21 I have also personally

22 given out hot food, sandwiches,

23 coffee, water, toiletries, clean

24 clothes and blankets to my

2 neighbors in need who are children,
3 adults and elderly, both housed and
4 unhoused. This bill criminalizes
5 the act of providing care for basic
6 life needs.

7 I also personally had to
8 tell a woman who could not afford
9 her mortgage after choosing to pay
10 for life-sustaining breast cancer
11 treatment that we tried everything
12 but couldn't help her keep her
13 home. There are so many of us just
14 a medical bill away from being
15 houseless. This bill criminalizes
16 need rather than supporting
17 vulnerable people. Harm reduction
18 is safer, evidence-based and
19 successfully used across the globe.
20 Thanks.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

23 Thank you.

24 REVEREND HOLLINGSHEAD:

1 5/1/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Good afternoon. My name is

3 Reverend Beth Hollingshead. I am a

4 Deacon in the Episcopal Diocese of

5 Pennsylvania and I want to speak in

6 opposition to Bill 240665. In

7 addition to being a deacon, I am

8 also a social worker. I studied

9 sociology in undergrad. And so, I

10 believe this serves as a foundation

11 for how I feel about this bill.

12 While I agree that

13 safety of the community is

14 important, including the safety of

15 children, public health is also

16 important. Homelessness is a

17 public health issue and this bill

18 serves to just increase policing of

19 those who are already oppressed and

20 disenfranchised and it ignores and

21 refuses to acknowledge the trauma

22 of those living on the street and

23 treats those with this issue as a

24 symptom -- I'm sorry, as they're

2 treating the symptom as the problem
3 instead of being solution-focused.

4 We need to act as though
5 we really Are the City of Brotherly
6 Love and Sisterly Affection by
7 treating those on the margins with
8 the same dignity and respect that
9 you would any other citizen. Thank
10 you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

13 Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: We have
15 David Alexander Jenkins. May
16 Blessen Mathew, Shane Kiefer, Aaron
17 Cookman and Paige Tweedy also make
18 their way to the podium.

19 (Witnesses approached
20 podium.)

21 MR. WILEY: Good
22 afternoon. My name is Ernest
23 Wiley. I am a first responder
24 responding to the current economic

2 crisis and multi-crisis situations.
3 These emergency response protocols
4 I'm sharing will stabilize all the
5 cities in all countries. All
6 mayors in all countries will look
7 at their 2023 revenues that was
8 collected. Then they will multiply
9 that amount by two. They will then
10 place that amount into their city
11 treasury accounts.

12 Do not worry about
13 selling municipal bonds. I
14 invented a day-rate savings account
15 and over time cities and the budget
16 management committee will properly
17 set up the accounts to withdraw
18 funds from this new account. After
19 the money is created into the
20 city's treasury, I need 100 new
21 police vehicles in each city across
22 America and all countries to work
23 with the police department,
24 dispatch and highway patrol.

2 These vehicles will
3 escort truck and trailers 10 at a
4 time through red lights at
5 nighttime. Truck and trailers are
6 now considered emergency response
7 vehicles to perform rapid
8 production logistics. This
9 emergency management operation will
10 create 10 to 20 million new jobs
11 across the United States over the
12 next 30 days if carried out
13 immediately.

14 I am a registered
15 Democrat. This is my democratic
16 rescue operation. All of my rescue
17 operation protocols was completed
18 and ready to go while Biden and
19 Harris was in office. The proper
20 credit goes to the Biden and Harris
21 Administration. Thank you.

22 MR. JENKINS: Madam
23 Chair, members and guests, Dave
24 Alexander Jenkins and I rise pro

2 the President Johnson's resolution.
3 250396, I came to dance. We know
4 the truth tells self-evident that
5 creates equal the we, the people of
6 the United States of America.

7 The truth endows us with
8 inalienable rights to life, liberty
9 and the pursuit of happiness. And
10 I am resolved to know that this
11 chamber and all within it stand to
12 protect and uphold those rights.
13 None of which can be fully
14 recognized or realized when the
15 people whom we are sworn to protect
16 are shackled by poverty.

17 Obliterating the pursuit
18 of happiness with a minimum wage of
19 \$7.25 per hour or roughly \$15,000
20 per year is shameful, if not
21 criminal. Our 5th and 14th
22 Amendment might suggest that it
23 meets the standard of entrapment,
24 as it is grossly negligent in

2 addressing the needs which we know
3 to be nearly \$23.26 per hour just
4 to meet the standard of a living
5 wage, thusly inviting the behaviors
6 of impropriety focused on those
7 whose wages lead to actions that

9 do strip them of liberty.

10 With such a low wage, we
11 have created the populist living in
12 survival mode and with it the
13 criminality such a life demands to
14 survive. As the heart of this
15 Commonwealth and the cultural core
16 and its economic engine, let us
17 rise with the moral clarity and
18 practical urgency standard behind
19 the Representative Green, as she
20 champions the fight in Harrisburg
21 to correct its injustice,
22 protecting the dignity of our
23 neighbors by unshackling their feet
24 so they too can dance. Raise the

2 damn wage.

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. MATTHEW: Good

5 afternoon, Council President,

6 Councilmembers and everyone

7 present. My name is Blessen

8 Mathew. I'm incredibly honored and

9 humbled to be here today. I want

10 to sincerely thank Councilmember

11 Dr. Nina Ahmad and her team for

12 this meaningful recognition and for

13 highlighting stories from our

14 vibrant and diverse communities

15 during Asian American and Pacific

16 Islander Heritage Month.

17 I was born and raised in

18 South India. And like many

19 immigrants, I came to this country

20 with the hopes of building a better

21 life and making a difference. I

22 started my journey working in a

23 mailing company and a laundromat

24 helper, cashier and a pharmacy

2 technician. Then I served the
3 corrections before becoming a
4 police officer, a real step into a
5 public service.

6 Since then, I had the
7 honor to becoming the first South
8 Indian Corporal and then a Sergeant
9 in the Philadelphia Police
10 Department. Today I also serve as
11 the President of the Pennsylvania
12 Asian American Law Enforcement
13 Association, PAALEA where we
14 support Asian American officials
15 and work to strengthen the
16 relationship between law
17 enforcement and our communities.

18 There were many moments
19 along this journey when I felt like
20 people from backgrounds like mine,
21 who work hard, are passionate about
22 making change often go unnoticed,
23 but today proves otherwise. This
24 recognition reminds us that our

2 work matters, our voice matters and
3 our representation matters.

4 And one code that always
5 has stayed with me from the Mahatma
6 Gandhi, be the change you wish to
7 see in this world and it is more
8 than just words. It is daily
9 challenge for me, that man stepping
10 forward, serving with heart and
11 opening the door wider for those
12 who come after me. If my journey
13 can inspire just one person to
14 believe in their dream and that has
15 all been worth it.

16 And finally, I want to
17 congratulate all today's honorees.
18 Your stories and your contributions
19 are powerful. And I am proud to
20 stand beside you as we celebrate
21 the impact of our communities
22 continue to make and thank you
23 again for this incredible honor.
24 Thank you, everyone.

3 MR. KEIFER: Hello. I
4 am Shane Kiefer. I am a resident
5 of District 7 and I am a
6 constituent of Quetcy Lozada, and I
7 am here to speak in opposition to
8 240665-A, as it is written
9 currently. I understand that there
10 are amendments that have not been
11 shared with us yet.

12 It is egregious,
13 disgusting, cruel. We are living
14 in a time of a constitutional
15 crisis where people's rights are
16 being stripped from them. And we
17 should not be -- we should not
18 be -- we should not be pursuing
19 bills that strip people of their
20 rights, such as life, liberty and
21 the pursuit of happiness in the
22 Constitution.

23 I also volunteer with
24 the Clare Project in Kensington and

2 I've been homeless myself multiple
3 times. And so, I just have a deep
4 passion for seeing people who are
5 suffering. And as (inaudible) said
6 earlier, do not make these people
7 look (inaudible). Thank you.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: We have
10 Aaron Cookman, Paige Tweedy, Peter
11 Winslow. May Queen Judith Robinson
12 and Ogbonna Hagins also make their
13 way to the podium.

14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:
15 It would be cruel to pass Bill
16 240665, which bans mobile services
17 in Philadelphia. This bill sends a
18 message that kindness needs to be
19 commodified and that any act of
20 supplying somebody with what they
21 need to survive is criminal and
22 should be punished by fines and
23 jail time. We can do better.
24 People Deserve kindness.

2 Criminalizing the
3 distribution of supplies does not
4 solve homelessness or poverty. It
5 does not make affordable housing
6 more readily available. It does
7 not contend with inflation or
8 respond to mental health crisis in
9 a meaningful and compassionate way.

10 It takes local
11 municipalities being willing to
12 vote against initiatives like this
13 to help change the landscape that
14 we're currently facing. This bill
15 sets the precedent that people need
16 permission to lend a helping hand.
17 I see this as gross government
18 overreach. I interpret this as
19 micromanaging the general public
20 and I cannot quite decipher to what
21 end.

22 Passing a bill like this
23 will put increasing hardships on
24 our city's most vulnerable

2 populations. Our community needs
3 our support. Do not deny them
4 that. If this City Council
5 supports the passing of this bill,
6 I ask what message does the City
7 Council intend to send, that
8 certain people deserve our kindness
9 while others deserve our scrutiny,
10 that you need the government's
11 permission before you can help out?

12 We must promote
13 autonomy. We must encourage
14 community. Regardless of your
15 vote, we will continue to help our
16 neighbors. You do not own the
17 rights to our kindness.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. TWEEDY: My name is
20 Paige Tweedy. I'm a licensed
21 social worker and I work closely
22 with unhoused people who use drugs
23 throughout my career. I'm here to
24 testify against Bill 240665. In my

2 experiences with unhoused people
3 and people who use drugs, they are
4 motivated and capable of caring for
5 each other and us in community and
6 for their own well-being, just as
7 all of us are.

8 The way to address the
9 housing and fentanyl crises is more
10 support, not less, right. And as
11 federal funding faces increasing
12 cuts and we're entering a period of
13 increasing economic instability, we
14 need to be nimble. Permitting is
15 not so nimble.

16 We've seen permitted
17 providers do incredible work, but
18 they respond late in the process,
19 right. Wound care, assumes someone
20 already has a wound, providing
21 socks to my neighbor can cut that
22 entire cycle out and prevent
23 someone from needing those services
24 in the first place. We can do this

2 for our neighbors. We should do
3 this for our neighbors.

4 Instead of restricting
5 services as this bill would, let us
6 live up to the promise of brotherly
7 love and encourage our neighbors to
8 continue to care for each other.
9 Vote nay.

11 MR. WINSLOW: Happy
12 beautiful May Day, everybody. My
13 name is Peter Winslow. I'm a
14 Philadelphia resident. Thank you,
15 President Johnson and members of
16 Council for providing this
17 opportunity for me to speak in
18 support of the resolution of
19 Councilmember Bass as my District
20 Councilmember, directing the
21 Philadelphia Board of Pensions and
22 Retirement to consider its
23 investment policy with respect to
24 El Salvador.

2 And we're anticipating a
3 similar directive initiated by
4 Councilman Squilla directing the
5 Philadelphia Board of Pensions and
6 Retirement to consider its
7 investment policy in regard to the
8 production of nuclear weapons. And
9 similar direction from
10 Councilmember Brooks to direct the
11 Philadelphia Board of Pension
12 Retirement to consider its
13 investment policy with regard to
14 local economically targeted
15 investments and to adopt the
16 principles and the policy, the
17 practice of fiscal mutualism, which
18 is the way Philadelphia and every
19 other city in this country used to
20 finance itself by having its
21 pension fund invest in city bonds.

22 That brings us, if I
23 may, to the support for
24 Councilmember Harrity's directive

2 or request that the City implement
3 the Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces
4 ordinance that was passed and
5 introduced initially by
6 Councilmember Bass, and
7 Councilmember Young is asking for
8 the same kind of implementation of
9 the laws of the City of
10 Philadelphia passed by this Council
11 with respect to the establishment
12 of the bill of Philadelphia Public
13 Financial Authority. If we use the
14 Philadelphia Public Financial
15 Authority instead of general
16 obligation bonds, you could have
17 cost savings of \$1.7 billion.
18 Thank you.

19 MS. ROBINSON: Good
20 afternoon. Queen Judith Robinson
21 here. Bear with me you all as I
22 try to knit together three bills on
23 the calendar today. The Land Bank
24 bill, as you all move properties,

2 city-owned, through this process
3 claiming affordable housing, I want
4 you all to think of the fact that
5 the minimum wage is still \$7.25,
6 okay, please keep that in mind.

7 And in addition, as you
8 increase density in our communities
9 and talk about bike lanes, that's
10 all good and well. A small
11 percentage of people take bikes to
12 work, et cetera. But people are
13 now literally parking on the
14 sidewalk, parking on the pavement.
15 So as you move forward with making
16 Philadelphia safe, it's illegal to
17 park on the sidewalk. And I would
18 like for you all to pay attention
19 to the fact that people are now
20 literally parking on the sidewalks.
21 Maybe we need to reduce density or
22 come up with a solution. Thank
23 you.

24 (Applause.)

2 MR. HAGINS: Ogbonna

3 Hagins, fourth generation chattel
4 slavery survivor. El Salvador has
5 done what most American cities only
6 talk about. They've arrested over
7 78,000 gang members, dropped
8 homicide rates dramatically and
9 restored safety to communities that
10 were once completely off limits.

11 People in El Salvador
12 are walking freely in places they
13 used to fear. Meanwhile we can't
14 get folk to walk two blocks without
15 worrying about getting shot.

16 El Salvador has a tourism boom,
17 attracted billions in investments
18 and launched 46 major
19 infrastructure projects, all while
20 we're still debating whether or not
21 to fix our streets or pick up the
22 trash.

23 I hope this is what your
24 resolution is about. I hope this

12 President, there are no further
13 resolutions in my possession.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.
16 That completes our Calendar for
17 today.

18 Any brief speeches on
19 behalf of the Minority?

20 Chair recognizes
21 Councilmember Kendra Brooks.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS:

23 Thank you, Council President.

24 First, I want to thank

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 all my colleagues on the Committee
3 of Law and Government. The
4 Majority Leader mentioned it
5 earlier. And I also want to thank
6 my colleague Harrity --
7 Councilmember Harrity and
8 Councilmember O'Rourke for
9 participating in last Friday's
10 hearing on the POWER Act.
11 Hundreds of people,
12 domestic workers, restaurant
13 workers, gig workers and labor
14 leaders came to City Hall to fight
15 for new worker protections. And
16 even though the national landscape
17 looks very bleak right now with
18 escalating attacks against
19 immigrants and working families, we
20 filled this room with joy of a
21 major win for Philly workers. And
22 I'm so proud that our city is
23 leading the way in strengthening
24 workers rights at the local level.

2 I also want to thank

3 Pastor Maryta Fields-Powell of

4 Congregation Koach-Bethel for

5 leading the invocation today. And

6 finally, I want to honor and

7 acknowledge the members of Hep B

8 United Philadelphia and Hep C

9 Allies of Philadelphia who joined

10 us to recognize May as Hepatitis

11 Awareness Month in Philadelphia.

12 Thanks to the work of

13 these local organizations thousands

14 of Philadelphians have access to

15 information, testing and treatment

16 that saves the lives in

17 Philadelphia every day.

18 Thank you so much,

19 Council President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Thank you.

22 Chair recognizes

23 Councilmember Nicolas Nic O'Rourke.

24 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 As we already honored
4 the young leaders of PhillyBOLT
5 today, students are already driving
6 change in their schools and
7 communities. I got a stack of
8 letters that I have to read from
9 them already. We're also reminded
10 that the realization of justice is
11 actually deeply intergenerational.
12 Angela Davis actually said freedom
13 is a constant struggle. I think
14 that's in part because it ain't
15 just in one place.

16 And on this May Day,
17 International Workers Day, we carry
18 forward that spirit of collective
19 struggle by standing in solidarity
20 with workers across our city and
21 across the globe. On this May Day,
22 we uplift the power of collective
23 action and honor the generations of
24 workers, both past and present, who

2 have organized, who have marched
3 and sacrificed to build a more just
4 and equitable society.

5 Our city continues to be
6 a beacon of worker resilience and
7 solidarity, and I'm glad to take
8 that next step when we pass the
9 Power Act next week. I'm grateful
10 to Madam Leader for her work on
11 that front and because we know that
12 we are in a tradition of struggle,
13 and therefore the struggle for
14 freedom is constant. We need
15 solidarity and we need it forever.

16 Thank you,
17 Mr. President.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Thank you. Good job,
21 Member Brooks.

22 The Chair recognizes for
23 speeches on behalf of the Majority
24 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

2 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

3 Thank you, Council President.

4 I just want to continue
5 with what I was saying earlier, and
6 that is that we can't ask for
7 certain things in certain
8 neighborhoods. We are here to
9 fight for every neighborhood. I'm
10 here to fight for the constituents
11 that elected me to be their voice
12 here in city government.

13 We've been sitting in
14 hearings or committee hearings for
15 the last several weeks where we've
16 heard from different departments
17 about the work that they're doing.
18 We've heard from different
19 individuals who have come in and
20 have shared what they want to see
21 in their city.

22 I hear it every day. I
23 see it every day. We can't talk
24 about education if we're not

2 remembering the kids in communities
3 like mine that are impacted by what
4 they see going and coming from
5 school every day. We can't talk
6 about education when my kids are
7 sitting in buildings where bullets
8 fly through windows.

9 We can't talk about
10 education when my kids have to walk
11 over people who are living on our
12 streets because they are suffering
13 from substance abuse. We can't
14 talk about safe corridors if we
15 have mobile providers who are
16 invading those spaces.

17 We can't talk about
18 business growth and opportunities
19 if we're not remembering that those
20 businesses in the Kensington
21 Harrowgate community are being
22 impacted as a result of people
23 living and laying in front of their
24 doors.

2 We can't talk about gun
3 violence. We can't talk about
4 losing lives to gun violence if we
5 are not taking into consideration
6 the fact that we're losing lives
7 because we fail to respond to
8 people who are living in addiction
9 on the streets of Kensington Avenue
10 and in the Harrowgate community.

11 The amount of energy
12 that is spent on people fighting us
13 to help these people come out of
14 addiction to me is astonishing.
15 There was a report that just came
16 out by the Health Department that
17 says that overdoses have declined
18 since 2023. That is a direct
19 result of the work that we are
20 doing. They are difficult
21 decisions that we are making, but
22 we are having an impact and the
23 impact is going in the right
24 direction.

2 We don't expect everyone
3 to agree with how we're doing
4 things, but we have to continue to
5 do and make the difficult decisions
6 in order for the constituents in
7 the 7th Council District and the
8 surrounding Districts to have
9 quality of life. That is our
10 responsibility. That is our
11 responsibility.

12 The people who are dying
13 on the streets of Kensington are
14 someone's children. You cannot sit
15 here and tell me that you are okay
16 with people's children having their
17 faces stuck to the cement. You
18 can't tell me that you're okay with
19 people's children living with
20 wounds where they're losing their
21 limbs and be okay with that.

22 You can't tell me that
23 you're okay with the conditions of
24 Kensington Avenue, because if

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 you're okay with that, then you
3 need to look at yourself in the
4 mirror and figure out what you're
5 doing in this space, what are you
6 doing on this legislative floor.
7 You can't say that you are okay
8 with what is happening there and
9 then talk about all of these things
10 that I just mentioned. You can't.
11 You can't tell me that
12 you're a provider and that you are
13 working day and night to ensure
14 that people are coming off of
15 substance abuse and think that it's
16 okay for us not to do anything.
17 It's impossible. My kids deserve
18 joy. They deserve compassion too.
19 They deserve opportunity. They
20 deserve opportunity and we are not
21 giving them opportunity if we
22 continue to fold our hands and not
23 do anything about this shit. We
24 can't.

2 What the Mayor is doing
3 is new, is different. This is not
4 her bill. This is a bill that my
5 staff has worked day and night on
6 with people, with people's
7 interests, with people who live
8 there first. How dare you. How
9 dare you organize and tell people
10 lies, stand up there and tell lies
11 without reading the damn bill. How
12 dare you. How dare you be a
13 provider and accept money from the
14 federal and state and city and then
15 not do the work. Because if you
16 were doing the work, we wouldn't
17 have people dying on our streets.

18 This bill provides
19 people opportunity 24 hours a day.
20 This bill will coordinate services
21 in a space that will not deplore
22 quality of life. This bill will
23 continue to connect people with
24 their loved ones because they have

2 to be a part of their process.

3 This bill will take

4 people off of people's sidewalks.

5 I have seniors who are living with

6 people who are unsheltered under

7 porches and threatened by those

8 individuals if they call police on

9 them. Would you allow that in your

10 house? Would you allow that on

11 your property? Hell no, hell no.

12 And so, why should my residents?

13 Why should my residents do that?

14 Each one of you has

15 traveled Kensington Avenue. You

16 all have traveled Harrowgate. You

17 see the conditions of my community.

18 Shame on you if you think that we

19 have to continue to do nothing.

20 Shame on you.

21 But while I'm in this

22 chamber, while I'm in this seat I'm

23 going to continue to make those

24 difficult decisions. I don't care

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 if I stand alone. I will make
3 those decisions because my people
4 deserve it, because my children in
5 the 7th Council District deserve
6 the same opportunities that all of
7 the children in your communities
8 deserve.

9 Thank you, Council
10 President.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes
14 Councilmember Dr. Anthony Phillips.

15 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

16 I'm going to say something on that
17 really briefly too, but I just want
18 to say that, colleagues, I'm proud
19 to stand in support of legislation
20 that I've introduced to improve
21 public signage across the city of
22 Philadelphia.

23 In neighborhoods like
24 the 9th District where too many

2 roads are unsafe, streets like
3 (inaudible) Pike, Rising Sun
4 Avenue, Ogontz Avenue have long
5 been areas of concern when it comes
6 to speeding, confusion and unsafe
7 conditions for drivers and
8 pedestrians alike.

9 The legislation supports
10 the goals of Vision Zero, which is
11 already making strong progress in
12 reducing traffic assets and
13 fatalities, but I'm advocating
14 intensely that we need clear and
15 consistent signage that will show
16 high traffic areas in the city of
17 Philadelphia, high accident areas,
18 excuse me, in the city of
19 Philadelphia.

20 When you're driving by,
21 you're going to see a -- you need
22 to see a sign that says high
23 accident area so you can think
24 twice about your speeding. It is

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 time that we stop just focusing on
3 speed cushions. Let's do some
4 other things as well. Let people
5 know where high accidents are
6 happening. Put a sign there in
7 terms of what those accidents have
8 looked like and so forth, how many
9 on it and more.

10 Lastly, a big shout-out
11 to Summer Search Philadelphia, an
12 organization that continues to
13 shape young leaders and I'm looking
14 forward to continue to spotlight
15 young people in the city of
16 Philadelphia. And I also want to
17 express my support of Mayor Parker,
18 Councilwoman Lozada and the
19 Kensington Caucus in their bold and
20 compassionate efforts to address
21 this deeply-rooted issue in
22 Kensington.

23 I am utterly happy and
24 excited that Councilwoman Lozada is

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 doing this particular work.

3 Kensington deserves dignity, it

4 deserves investment and it deserves

5 a future. This bill is making some

6 incredible changes. It will

7 require these services to comply

8 with state laws just like any other

9 medical provider would be expected

10 to. Because when someone is need a

11 medical attention whether on a

12 street corner in a hospital, they

13 deserve to be treated with

14 professionalism, but it's also

15 protecting the most vulnerable,

16 making sure that people are safe

17 and their neighborhoods are clean

18 and making sure residents do not

19 have to see and deal with this on a

20 daily basis.

21 I actually just want to

22 quickly add I think Councilwoman

23 Lozada is being extremely

24 compassionate. She's being

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 extremely thoughtful. Because if
3 this was in the 9th District, I
4 know for sure this wouldn't even
5 happen at all. So I actually am
6 impressed that you're even finding
7 ways to appease these people who
8 are doing these services because if
9 it was in the 9th District, they
10 would say take a brick-and-mortar
11 and do this somewhere else.

12 So the fact that you're
13 okay with mobile services, that's
14 you listening to people. And I
15 think that is only fear that they
16 stop these attacks that's going on
17 against you and what you're doing,
18 because I don't get it. There's no
19 way in the world someone is going
20 to be doing that to work near my
21 porch. And none of the
22 Councilmembers would allow that
23 either so we all need to stop that.
24 We know that's the truth. So I

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 just want to say thank you so much
3 and I'm looking forward to seeing
4 this bill pass.

5 Thank you, Council
6 President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Thank you.

9 Majority Leader Gilmore
10 Richardson.

11 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

12 RICHARDSON: Thank you, Council
13 President. Thank you for the
14 acknowledgement.

15 You know that I rarely,
16 rarely give speeches on behalf of
17 the Majority, but I needed to let
18 Councilmember Lozada know that I
19 heard you say that even if you have
20 to stand alone. You don't have to
21 stand alone in this fight.

22 I will tell you that
23 I'll never forget touring
24 Kensington with you, Councilmember

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Lozada, and our colleagues last
3 spring. And we had the opportunity
4 to hear both from residents, from
5 the business owners and from
6 outreach workers about many
7 individuals who were ready to enter
8 treatment. And when they were
9 ready, they weren't able to find
10 services. And the willingness may
11 have been there, but the access
12 wasn't there, right. And that is
13 changing, and that is what I
14 believe you are seeking to address
15 in this legislation.

16 So I just want you to
17 know that I appreciate and I see
18 and value the work that you are
19 doing, that you have been doing on
20 240665-A, and I will never forget
21 the stories of the residents,
22 particularly the senior who talked
23 about the fact that someone who was
24 unhoused lived on her porch with

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 open wounds who threatened her if
3 she would contact the police to try
4 to have the person removed from her
5 own property.

6 And what I recognize
7 about what you're seeking to do,
8 which is further outside of the
9 auspices of this legislation, is
10 that you're seeking to create a
11 process, a process by which mobile
12 service providers are able to
13 provide service in the community,
14 desperately-needed services for
15 unhoused residents, and you're
16 strictly saying, for everything
17 that I've read, that you want to
18 create a process that also will
19 extend to hours that we typically
20 don't have services available. And
21 so, that's increasing services for
22 individuals, which I think is what
23 we need to do because they need
24 additional service. When

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 individuals are ready to come out
3 of addiction or looking for help,
4 they should be able to receive that
5 help even if it's in the midnight
6 hour.

7 So I just want to
8 commend the work that you are
9 doing, seeking to find that
10 delicate balance with the mobile
11 service providers, with the
12 community, with the residents, with
13 the business owners, with the
14 Administration. This is not easy
15 work and it takes all of us to do
16 this together.

17 But what I will say is
18 it's very easy to say that you're
19 against something when you don't
20 have stake in that community and in
21 that area. So I think it's
22 important that we invite people who
23 want to be a part of this process
24 to really be stakeholders as a part

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 of this process and join the work
3 to move the community forward and
4 not be in a space of ready to
5 fight, denigrate people and put
6 folks down because you simply
7 disagree.

8 We can agree to
9 disagree, but we have to do that in
10 a respectful manner and in a way
11 that we're ready, willing and able
12 to work together for the betterment
13 of the community. And I just
14 wanted to put that on the record.
15 So thank you, Councilmember Lozada,
16 for your work.

17 And thank you, Council
18 President, for this opportunity.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Thank you.

21 Chair recognizes
22 Councilmember Jones.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: I had
24 a whole other speech for the

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Majority. I wanted to tell you
3 about the 15th Annual Block
4 Captain's Boot Camp Saturday up at
5 St Joe's. I wanted to tell you
6 Sunday, led by captain of the team
7 Charlita Davis, they'll be running
8 the Broad Street Run, but I'm going
9 to cut that to say, you ain't never
10 alone, right.

11 And until Kensington is
12 safe, there's no neighborhood in
13 the city of Philadelphia safe. And
14 I say that based on parts of my
15 District. There's a secret going
16 on and a lot of the folk from that
17 area travel to yours.

18 And if you have not
19 lived down there, what you talking
20 about. If you have not had to move
21 around -- I forget who it is. We
22 were going down the avenue and
23 every one of the businesses were
24 closed because they had tents in

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 front of them and every one of the
3 consumers had to go somewhere else
4 because there was no place to shop.

5 Now, say what you want.

6 Until you stood ten toes down to
7 say I'm changing this, it didn't
8 change. So when we banded together
9 to do the Kensington Marshall Plan,
10 I had no idea you was going to
11 catch this much hell. But don't
12 ever think that you alone. All
13 right? Because the 4th District
14 just like the 9th District is with
15 you.

16 Thank you,
17 Mr. President,

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: Thank you, Member Jones.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

22 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

23 Thank you, my brother.

24 Quets, you know, I

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 support my District Councilwoman
3 from here to eternity. Not only am
4 I a resident of the 7th
5 Councilmanic District, but I'm also
6 an addict, okay. And for people to
7 come in here and try to say that we
8 on the Kensington Caucus don't care
9 it's utterly ridiculous.

10 My whole life has been
11 put or at least the last 14 years
12 of helping people succeed in
13 recovery, in sobriety through my
14 learned, lived life experience
15 because I was there, but also I
16 lived there along with hundreds of
17 thousands of residents who have
18 been putting with this for so long
19 where my man Councilman Anthony
20 Phillips is absolutely right. This
21 would not happen in any other
22 neighborhood.

23 This did not happen in
24 South Philly when I lived there. I

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 could tell you right now they would
3 have ran this out a long time ago.
4 We care. I care. We care about
5 these people, but I also care about
6 my residents who when I walk home
7 every night, I live in that
8 neighborhood.

9 Every night when I get
10 home I have a list of people
11 standing outside my house to tell
12 me what's going on, what happened.
13 I got children, they have to get
14 HIV tests every six months for the
15 next seven years because they
16 stepped on a needle trying to play
17 outside their house. That's not
18 right.

19 So you know what, I'm
20 going to hold my tongue because you
21 know how I can get.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: Thank you, sir.

24 COUNCILMAN HARRITY: But

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 I'll tell you right now I'm with my
3 Councilmember now and through this
4 whole situation. Because guess
5 what, she's the only one that
6 stepped up to do anything. I've
7 been there. I lived there almost
8 20 years. Nobody has done shit
9 since I've been there except her,
10 okay, except her.

11 We might not always be
12 right, but damn it we're trying.
13 And I'm tired of this. I care.
14 That's why I ran. I didn't have to
15 run. I live in that neighborhood.
16 I ran because of that neighborhood.

17 Thank you, Council
18 President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Chair recognizes
21 Councilman Dr. Nina Ahmad.

22 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

23 Thank you, Council President.

24 And I echo the support

2 for Councilmember Quetcy Lozada,
3 her courage to take on a very
4 difficult problem and to be so
5 thoughtfully working through it.

6 I'm today also proud to
7 recognize the beginning of Asian
8 American and Pacific Islander
9 Heritage Month, an opportunity to
10 honor the extraordinary
11 contributions of the AAPI community
12 to our city, to our nation and our
13 shared future.

14 As the first South Asian
15 woman elected to this legislative
16 body and an immigrant myself, I
17 know firsthand that our stories of
18 resilience, of entrepreneurship, of
19 public service are woven in the
20 very fabric of Philadelphia.

21 This year I am thrilled
22 that City Council is honoring 11
23 individuals and businesses who are
24 unsung heroes in our city. And I

2 took this time an opportunity to
3 think and highlight people you
4 might not normally hear about who
5 do the work and never get seen.
6 So I wanted to just
7 quickly put into the record the
8 names of these folks. And I want
9 to begin with Thu Pham, the
10 Vietnamese American co-founder and
11 CEO of Càphê Roasters,
12 Philadelphia's first Vietnamese
13 specialty coffee roastery, who
14 started her business not only to
15 bring bold coffee and community
16 together but also pour into the
17 next generation, donating a portion
18 of her profits to 12+, a nonprofit
19 that supports Philly high
20 schoolers. She even hires students
21 from those schools to gain real-
22 world skill. And this year her
23 shop was named a James Beard Award
24 Semifinalist for its beverage

2 program.

3 Next, we recognize Ky
4 and Rick Cao, Chinese Vietnamese
5 American brothers and co-owners of
6 P&O, a beloved South Street apparel
7 shop. You know, I'm just going to
8 minimize all my comments, but I
9 wanted to highlight that they did a
10 campaign called Fight the Virus,
11 Not the People, using their
12 platform to denounce the hate and
13 uplift Asian American voices during
14 the COVID crisis. They donated
15 proceeds to the Philadelphia Suns
16 youth group in Chinatown, showing
17 that fashion can indeed be
18 political and powerful.

19 We heard from Sergeant
20 Blessen Mathew, the first South
21 Asian Indian American promoted to
22 Sergeant in the 150-year history of
23 Philadelphia Police Department.
24 And he serves as a mentor, a role

2 model and a daily reminder that
3 representation matters.

4 Next honorees are Nary
5 and Saroeun Kith co-founded Kiths
6 Integrated and targeted Human
7 Services, an organization built
8 from their personal experience as
9 Cambodian refugees. They turned
10 their family's survival story into
11 a mission to serve others, offering
12 mental health counseling, legal
13 navigation and adult education and
14 a culturally grounded food pantry.
15 Through Kiths, they have empowered
16 thousands of immigrants and
17 refugees to thrive.

18 Pheng Seng, owner of
19 Unrivaled Screen Printing, is a
20 story of redemption and
21 reinvention, a Cambodian American
22 who turned his life around after
23 incarceration. Pheng co-founded
24 Philly's first Cambodian-owned

2 unionized print shop in South
3 Philly. He hires returning
4 citizens, pays union wages and
5 partners with the community groups
6 to support youth and host public
7 events.

8 We also celebrate Danny
9 Ros and Benjamin Albano,
10 co-founders of Philadelphia
11 Southeast Asian Entertainment
12 Group. These South Philly natives
13 have brought Southeast Asian pop
14 culture to Philly stages, from
15 traditional Khmer dance to
16 Cambodian pop culture at live. I
17 was just there and saw the enormous
18 number of people who attended,
19 putting revenue into our coffers.

20 One of the artists I
21 wanted to highlight was Chef Phila
22 Lorne, the visionary behind Mawn
23 Restaurant and a 2025 James Beard
24 emerging chef semifinalist, a proud

2 Cambodian American whose name
3 honors Philadelphia itself. His
4 parents named him Philadelphia.
5 Chef Loren is reclaiming a cuisine
6 almost lost to genocide and
7 bringing it to life in South
8 Philly.

9 And finally, we
10 recognize Nareon Chhin, a community
11 organizer and entrepreneur whose
12 advocacy helped Philadelphia become
13 a sanctuary city. A returning
14 citizen who once faced many odds,
15 Naroen has turned pain into
16 purpose. He has organized immigrant
17 justice-led anti-deportation
18 campaigns and now uplifts the
19 Southeast Asian community through
20 cultural festivals and is an
21 entrepreneur himself doing business
22 in the city of Philadelphia and
23 paying taxes.

24 So to all our honorees,

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 your work, your voices and your
3 courage help shape a Philadelphia
4 where everyone belongs. On behalf
5 of this body, we honor you, we
6 celebrate you and we commit to
7 standing with you not just this
8 month, but every month. Thank you
9 and happy AAPI Heritage Month.

10 Thank you, Council
11 President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Thank you.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Deputy Whip Councilmember Cindy
16 Bass.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 So just a couple of
20 things that I wanted to say, but I
21 wanted to obviously start with
22 supporting my colleague
23 Councilwoman Quetcy Lozada for her
24 hard work.

2 And one of the things
3 that I heard over and over again as
4 folks were speaking was you're
5 doing too much, don't do anything,
6 stop doing what you are doing, and
7 that's not an option here. It's
8 not an option to do less. It's not
9 an option to just be okay with the
10 status quo. These are not options
11 that are acceptable to the entire
12 community.

13 And I have to say,
14 Councilwoman Lozada is looking out
15 for everyone. She's trying to
16 figure out a solution that works
17 for everyone, not just one group
18 who is in need because other groups
19 are in need as well. And so, I
20 just want to applaud her, support
21 her, let her know that we all have
22 her back because many of us have
23 buried loved ones, people we have
24 raised, know, love, care about,

2 friends. We've lost them to
3 addiction. We are not immune to
4 what is happening in our
5 communities.

6 I buried a few years ago
7 my 26-year-old niece, who was the
8 mother of a newborn baby, lost to
9 addiction. Where is any of this
10 right to think that we somehow have
11 a different perspective, don't
12 care, you know, are thoughtless
13 about people who are in the throes
14 of addiction. Nothing could be
15 further from the truth.

16 And so, I just really
17 wanted to say that I want to
18 support my colleague. She's a
19 quiet storm because I've never seen
20 her turn up quite like that. But I
21 think that that's exactly what this
22 moment called for. And I thank you
23 for all that you're doing, for all
24 that you're trying to accomplish

2 and know that we have your back.

3 You do not stand alone at any time.

4 And one last thing on

5 that is that somehow we become

6 accustomed to the louder the voice

7 somehow it's more validated or the

8 argument holds more weight or

9 they're speaking for everyone.

10 You're not speaking for everyone.

11 And I have to tell you a lot of us

12 feel that if someone was sleeping

13 on our porch and said you better

14 not call the police in a lot of our

15 neighborhoods, it would be handled

16 a different way. We'd be dealing

17 with a whole other set of

18 situations.

19 It's totally

20 unacceptable to think it's okay to

21 do nothing, that what Councilwoman

22 Lozada is doing is somehow

23 unacceptable. We applaud you. We

24 applaud your work.

2 I wanted to say some

3 other things, but I just want to

4 say two things really quickly.

5 One, I wanted to thank my

6 colleagues who supported the

7 critical step we took today to

8 safeguard the fiscal integrity of

9 our pension fund and uphold the

10 values that define our city by

11 passing the resolution asking the

12 City Pension Fund Board to review

13 investments tied to El Salvador.

14 It's so important,

15 especially in light of the

16 developments that have happened

17 that call into question the rule of

18 law in that nation. So I just

19 wanted to thank all of my

20 colleagues for supporting that

21 effort.

22 And also, I wanted to

23 further acknowledge the Lindy

24 Foundation, which has transformed

2 37 schoolyards, benefiting over
3 14,000 students and families. We
4 want to thank them for their work,
5 for making Philadelphia better and
6 being part of the solution and not
7 the problem.

8 Thank you,
9 Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Thank you.

12 Chair recognizes
13 Councilmember Jeffrey Jay Young.

14 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
15 you, Mr. President.

16 This morning I attended
17 the State of Center City hosted by
18 the Center City District, and they
19 highlighted that Center City foot
20 traffic is up almost 90% to
21 pre-pandemic levels and also that
22 Part 1 serious crimes are lower
23 than 2019 pre-pandemic levels in
24 Center City.

2 So for those who are out
3 there that believe that our city is
4 dangerous and it's not open for
5 business, you are completely wrong.
6 Center City is open, is thriving.
7 It is a safe place to be. Trophy
8 office space and Class A office
9 space is strong. We do know that
10 there are some issues with some of
11 our older stock of office spaces,
12 but as a city we have to think of
13 strategies that incentivize this
14 reinvestment in our aging office
15 properties to suit the 21st century
16 needs of businesses today and also
17 to allow for strategies to help
18 easily redevelop those properties
19 into residential or hotel use. And
20 our nightlife is strong in Center
21 City as well.

22 And so again, for those
23 who are a little weary about coming
24 to Center City, it is safe. It is

2 safer than it has been in years.

3 And so, we encourage you to come

4 down to live, work, shop, play,

5 spend all your money here in the

6 city of Philadelphia. We welcome

7 all visitors.

8 I want to thank my

9 colleagues today for passing the

10 resolution honoring International

11 Workers Day also known as May Day

12 today. This is the day where we

13 remember and celebrate the

14 accomplishments of workers and our

15 labor unions. And as the

16 resolution reads, today as

17 inequality grows and workers face

18 new attempts to undermine labor

19 protections, unions play an ever

20 more significant role in

21 safeguarding the rights of all of

22 us here. So again, I want to thank

23 my colleagues for passing that

24 resolution honoring May Day today.

2 Also, thank you for
3 passing a resolution to hold
4 hearings on the Philadelphia Public
5 Financial Authority. In 2022, this
6 body passed legislation to create
7 the Philadelphia Public Financial
8 Authority to pave the way for a
9 public bank.

10 And as someone mentioned
11 during public testimony today, this
12 type of entity could save our city
13 millions of dollars, particularly
14 in interest payments. And this
15 authority could be a real public-
16 private partnership that will
17 enable access to capital for
18 thousands of Philadelphia who have
19 traditionally been locked out of
20 capital markets. A public bank
21 could essentially uplift our city,
22 providing the necessary resources
23 to lift folks out of poverty, to
24 lift folks to have new housing

2 opportunities and other things that
3 those that are disadvantaged
4 particularly face in those capital
5 markets.

6 And last but certainly
7 not least, I want to let all those
8 who are listening know that on May
9 10th our office will be holding our
10 Youth and Young Adult Job and
11 Education Fair at Community College
12 of Philadelphia located at 1700
13 Spring Garden Street.

14 This event is a
15 partnership event with a number of
16 organizations, including Community
17 College of Philadelphia, Connect --
18 C2L-PHL and the National Center for
19 Urban Solutions. We want to be
20 able to provide opportunities for
21 our young people to upskill and for
22 our young folks to find employment
23 opportunities.

24 And so, if you are an

2 employer, if you have a workforce
3 development program, if you are an
4 educational institution, there are
5 still spots available for you to
6 come to our fair and to let the
7 community know about your services.

8 If you're a young
9 person, we are targeting between
10 the ages of 16 to 24 but anyone is
11 able to come to this job fair and
12 education fair to help you do
13 better in life. You can always
14 reach out to my office for more
15 questions. You can reach out to my
16 neighborhood office at
17 215-685-2633. Again, that is my
18 neighborhood district office,
19 215-685-2633, and we look forward
20 to seeing you all on May 10th.

21 Thank you,
22 Mr. President.

24 JOHNSON: Thank you.

2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilmember Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS:

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 I've neglected to make
7 mention that tonight there's going
8 to be one of our budget town halls.
9 We want to make sure that people
10 know, are informed and come out and
11 share your thoughts. It's tonight
12 from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. hosted by
13 our very own Council President
14 Kenyatta Johnson and also
15 Dr. Anthony Phillips.

16 It's at the Oak Lane
17 Presbyterian Church, 6637 North
18 11th Street which is right outside
19 of the 8th Council District but
20 it's actually in the 9th. And so,
21 we wanted to make sure that people
22 knew, were aware and come out. And
23 we want to hear from you as to what
24 your priorities are, what your

2 thoughts are. Members of Council
3 will be there and we certainly hope
4 to see you there as well.

5 And also, I know that
6 there's going to be a free Record
7 Review and Expungement Clinic and
8 Resource Fair hosted by our very
9 own Council President this coming
10 Saturday, May 3rd at 10:00 a.m.
11 It's at the Grand Yesha Ballroom at
12 23rd -- 2308 Snyder, 23rd and
13 Snyder. And so, you should come
14 out.

15 There's free food,
16 there's a whole lot of community
17 resources and it's an expungement
18 clinic and resource fair. So we
19 really want folks to take advantage
20 of these great opportunities, to
21 connect with the Council President
22 and members of Council but also to
23 get access to resources that are
24 much needed.

5 JOHNSON: Thank you. Let's give
6 all these young people that just
7 stormed our Council chambers a
8 round of applause.

9 (Applause.)

11 JOHNSON: Young people in the right
12 place at the right time. They're
13 actually from Palumbo High School
14 of the 2nd Councilmanic District.
15 Give them a round of applause,
16 y'all.

17 (Applause.)

19 JOHNSON: Okay. The Chair
20 recognizes Majority Whip
21 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas.

22 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

23 Thank you, Council President.

24 A couple things. First

2 of all, I just want to offer
3 thoughts and prayers to our
4 colleague Councilmember Landau.
5 She had an emergency that forced
6 her to leave early, so definitely
7 want to make sure that she knows
8 that she's in our thoughts and
9 we're praying for her and her
10 family.

11 Because Councilmember
12 Landau had to leave early, in
13 collaboration with Council running
14 a little longer than what it
15 normally does, there was supposed
16 to be a briefing after Council
17 today with Coded by Kids.
18 Unfortunately, that briefing is not
19 going to happen. But Danae, if you
20 can stand up, Danae Mobley is here.
21 She's one of the leaders of Coded
22 by Kids. She's still available for
23 any questions that folks may have,
24 and she's been gracious enough to

2 make sure that there are a few
3 snacks in the Caucus room for
4 anybody who's still interested in
5 learning about this very important
6 work that she's doing.

7 We talk all the time
8 about investing in a creative
9 economy and Coded by Kids is
10 leading in charge as it relates to
11 the tech space. They'll also be
12 having a briefing on May 6th at
13 Billy Penn Studios at 4:30, so
14 anybody who wanted to be at the
15 briefing today, you can still go
16 there and do that and that's an
17 option.

18 I also wanted to take a
19 moment to say thank you to Prince
20 Edward, the Duke of Edinburgh, who
21 is here in Philadelphia this past
22 week. The Mayor I know had lunch
23 with him. Some other leaders had
24 dinner with him. And that's a part

2 of our effort to kind of ramp up
3 for 2026, so definitely want to say
4 thank you for that --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: We want William and Kate,
7 man.

8 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Say
9 it again, Council President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: We want William and Kate.
12 Talking about some Edwards, you
13 know what I mean.

14 Member Thomas, the floor
15 is yours.

16 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

17 Thank you, Council, President.

18 And as I close out, you
19 know, I'm listening to a lot of the
20 testimony as well as the comments
21 from my colleagues and Council.
22 And I've been there. I've been
23 there. I know how you feel. I
24 definitely do. And I'll say two

2 things.

3 Number one, this moment
4 reminds me of a quote from Dr. King
5 where he said, "Change does not
6 roll in on the wheels of
7 inevitability but comes through
8 continuous struggle." And when you
9 are as passionate as my colleagues
10 and friends that I'm sitting with
11 on City Council and you deal with
12 as much trauma as we do on a
13 consistent basis, there are going
14 to be times when the rubber meets
15 road and that passion is going to
16 display itself.

17 And we know as a
18 legislative body, sometimes we'll
19 agree, sometimes we'll disagree.
20 I'm no veteran like Councilmember
21 O'Neill and some of the folks
22 that's been here a lot longer than
23 me, but I know for a fact that the
24 person who I disagree with today, I

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 might need their vote tomorrow.

3 And at the end of the day, no

4 matter how angry or passionate

5 folks get, we're always going to

6 respect the fact that we care about

7 this city, we work around a clock

8 for this city and we're going to

9 get it right.

10 I hear Councilmember

11 Lozada saying that she's by

12 herself. You're never by yourself.

13 And if you thought you were, you

14 see that right now. We hear all of

15 the public comment from so many

16 people who care, and we're not

17 questioning whether or not folks

18 care.

19 But I will say this,

20 Council President. I wouldn't mind

21 a new rule that says if we have to

22 sit and listen to public comment,

23 which we do, even when we're not in

24 here we're still listening, at some

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 point folks have to listen to us
3 too.

4 And I don't think it's
5 fair that folks can come in -- and
6 they do it to all of us, we all get
7 it. Call us names and say all type
8 of things about us that's not true,
9 but then we never get the
10 opportunity to kind of communicate
11 our perspective.

12 So you heard some of
13 that passion here today because at
14 the end of the day as elected
15 officials, we're people. We tie
16 our shoes just like everybody else
17 and we have children and we care.
18 We're people. And after a while,
19 when people are constantly accusing
20 you of things that you just know
21 are not reflective of your
22 character, eventually it gets to
23 you.

24 So whether you agree

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 with Councilmember Lozada or other
3 testimony or anything like that, I
4 think the important thing to note
5 here today is the quote from
6 Dr. King, whenever you're trying to
7 make change there's always going to
8 be a struggle. And at the end of
9 the day, we're not questioning
10 anybody's motives or intentions,
11 but we're going to make sure that
12 by the time this product is
13 finished, and that's this entire
14 legislative body and the work that
15 we're doing under your leadership,
16 Council President, we're going to
17 make sure that we have the product
18 that's the best for the
19 constituents in the city of
20 Philadelphia. From Kensington to
21 Uptown, from South Philly to West
22 Philly we're going to get it right
23 and I truly believe that.

24 So with that being said,

1 5/1/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 thank you, Council President. And
3 thank you, colleagues, for all of
4 your passionate comments today, for
5 all of the work that you do, for
6 all of the great work that your
7 staff do and to the entire Council
8 family. Because at the end of the
9 day, we're in this together.
10 Whether we like it or not, we're in
11 this together.

12 Thank you, Council
13 President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

15 JOHNSON: Thank you. Democracy in
16 action. Just no cursing. As I
17 wrap up, Little Big Sis, profile
18 and courage, continue to keep
19 fighting the good fight.

20 With that being said,
21 the Chair calls on Councilmember
22 and Majority Leader -- Deputy --
23 the Chair calls on Councilmember
24 Isaiah Thomas, Whip of the Majority
