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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
Thank you. Good morning, everyone.
(Good morning.)
COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
We're going to start now. We have a
quorum. I'd ask all guests and visitors
to retire behind the rail. The members
have taken their seats, and we will
begin.
Sorry for the tardiness. We
had some matters that we had to take on.
And sorry for the heat. We didn't
anticipate these summery days so soon.
To give our invocation this
morning, the Chair recognizes Father
Robert Lucas of St. Cecilia's Catholic
Church. He is here today as the guest of
Councilman Brian O'Neill.
I'd ask all guests and visitors
to please rise.
(Members and guests rise.)
FATHER LUCAS: Mighty God, we
give you thanks for the wonderful weather
we have been experiencing in our fair

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2 city. We ask that you watch over and
3 protect our residents as they enjoy this
4 weather and emerge from their homes after
5 a long winter. May they be considerate
6 of each other and remain safe in their
7 activities.

8 And as this Council gathers
9 here assembled to conduct the business of
10 City government, we ask that they be
11 guided by the principles of establishing
12 the common good of the people they
13 represent. May they work to ensure the
14 health, prosperity, and well-being of the
15 residents of our city. And may you, oh
16 Lord, in your great mercy and love,
17 graciously bestow your abundant blessing
18 upon our nation, our Commonwealth and our
19 City.

20 May God bless the United
21 States, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
22 and our beloved City of Philadelphia.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much, Father.

25 Council will be at ease.

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2 (Council at ease.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you so much.

5 Before we proceed with the
6 Council session, I would like to ask for
7 a moment of silence for our fallen hero,
8 Officer Wilson, and his family. If we
9 can just have a moment of silence,
10 please.

11 (Moment of silence.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much.

14 Before we move ahead, I'd just
15 ask one favor of anyone who may have a
16 cell phone or any other electronic device
17 that makes any noise, if you can just
18 turn it off or turn it on silent. Thank
19 you so much for your cooperation.

20 At this time, we will have the
21 approval of the Journal, and the Chair
22 requests that Councilman Greenlee give us
23 an approval of the Journal of Thursday,
24 March 5th, 2015.

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

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2 you, Mr. President. I move that the
3 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March
4 5th, 2015 be approved.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you. It has been moved and
8 properly seconded that the Journal of
9 Thursday, March 5th, 2015 stand approved.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and the Journal is
17 approved. Thank you very much.

18 That sounds like that was one
19 of those devices that I just asked
20 someone to turn off. Thank you.

21 The next order of business is
22 requests for leaves of absence, and the
23 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. On behalf of the

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2 majority, there are no requests for
3 leaves of absence today.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Oh for request of leave of absence.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
9 much, Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 minority, there are no requests for
11 leaves of absence.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much. The Chair thanks the
14 gentleman.

15 At this time, I would like to
16 dispense with the regular order of
17 business and I would like to welcome and
18 thank everyone who has taken time out of
19 their busy day to come down to witness
20 their government in action. We really
21 appreciate you coming down. We hope that
22 your stay here is a pleasurable one, so
23 much so that you come back again. Again,
24 thank you so much for your participation.

25 At this time, the Chair

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2 recognizes Councilman Henon, who will
3 present a resolution honoring the
4 Commodore John Barry Club, more commonly
5 known as Philadelphia's Irish Center.
6 Would Sean McMenamin and those
7 accompanying him please join the
8 Councilman at the podium.

9 And joining Councilman Henon,
10 we have Councilman Greenlee, Councilman
11 O'Brien, and Councilman Neilson.

12 (Councilmembers and guests
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Until
15 everybody gets up here, good morning to
16 everybody here today. A little point of
17 personal privilege, if I may, Council
18 President, before we start the
19 resolution. I want to wish everybody a
20 happy St. Patrick's Day, and as a
21 reminder, because we have a lot of good,
22 hardworking people who live by the Irish
23 culture and principles every day of their
24 lives, they transcend many different
25 boards and they are joining us here

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2 today.

3 Today we have behind me, who
4 also is a part of the Commodore Barry
5 Club, is the St. Patrick's Day Observance
6 Committee. We have our President, Chris
7 Phillips, and our Vice President, Mary
8 Frances Fogg, AKA Frasse, as we all know
9 as Vice President.

10 We just wanted to remind
11 everybody that the St. Patrick's Day
12 Parade is this Sunday, March 15th. It
13 kicks off at 16th and JFK at 12:30. It
14 airs on CW57. It airs 1:00 to 4:00, and
15 it is the oldest, oldest -- second oldest
16 parade, 245th Anniversary, and this year
17 is very special. We have a Grand Marshal
18 that has been voted on with an incredible
19 theme of the World Meeting of Families
20 and the first woman Grand Marshal of the
21 parade history, Kathy McGee Burns. So
22 it's a pleasure and an honor to be a part
23 of that parade this year.

24 And special thanks to a lot of
25 partners, which I will speak about in the

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majority. But this resolution today honors the Commodore Barry Club. I'd also like to mention Councilman Jones, who happens to be a proud graduate of the Commodore Barry Elementary School, so I want to recognize that publicly.

But the resolution is a celebration of a larger influence of the Irish culture and how both Philadelphia and this body share similar cultural values, values like loyalty, courage, justice, and again loyalty. This City Council has time and time again stood together in a cohesive unit on behalf of the constituents that sent us here. For that, I want to thank each and every one of you and all my colleagues in this Chamber.

So in honor of the Commodore Barry Club:

Whereas, in 1958, the Commodore Barry Club, more commonly known as Philadelphia's Irish Center, was founded by the Irish Community. They purchased a

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large building formerly known as the
"Ross House" in West Mount Airy, at
Carpenter and Emlen Streets, that housed
several bars, restaurant facilities,
meeting rooms and auditoriums;

COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: And

whereas, when the Irish Center opened, it
had a non-political mission which was to
provide a common Irish social facility
where county societies could hold large
fundraising balls, meetings, concerts and
other events; and

Whereas, the Commodore John
Barry Club quickly grew with a regular
bar patronage -- surprising -- a calendar
of meetings and a steady yearly cycle of
Irish society balls and dances. Since
its inception, the Irish Center has
allowed a growing number of Irish-born
and Irish Americans to mingle together on
a regular basis in a warm, inviting
place; and

COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

during the Bicentennial years, Billy

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Brennan, member of the Commodore Barry Club and of the Heritage Council of the Federation of Irish American Societies of the Delaware Valley, spearheaded the founding of the Irish Center's Library. The library has grown to house a large collection of historic books, rare photographs, society charters, and memorabilia which celebrate Ireland's history and its rich cultural heritage; and

COUNCILMAN NEILSON: And whereas, for 57 years, the Irish Center has promoted Irish culture attracting an enlivened Irish American community seeking out their Irish roots. It has fostered the growth of Philadelphia Ceili Group -- right?

MR. McMENAMIN: Ceili.

COUNCILMAN NEILSON: Ceili Group. See, my Irish isn't that good.

The Ceili Group --

COUNCILMAN HENON: That's because you're Scottish.

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2 COUNCILMAN NEILSON: That hurt.

3 Okay. They pulled out the Scotchman on
4 me. I wore my green tie for you, Bobby.

5 Which has promoted traditional
6 Ceili Group --

7 MR. McMENAMIN: Ceili.

8 COUNCILMAN NEILSON: Say it
9 right, will you?

10 MR. McMENAMIN: It's called the
11 Ceili.

12 COUNCILMAN NEILSON: See, Bobby
13 gave me the good one.

14 And set dancing for generations
15 of Philadelphians; and

16 Whereas, currently, the Irish
17 Center's Board, championed by President
18 Vincent Gallagher and long-time member
19 Sean McMenamin, has spearheaded a highly
20 successful fundraising effort to keep the
21 Irish Center functioning well into the
22 new millennium; now, therefore

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved, by
24 the City Council of Philadelphia, that we
25 hereby honor and recognize the Commodore

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2 Barry -- the John Barry Club, more
3 commonly known as the Irish Center.

4 Resolved further, that an
5 engrossed copy of this resolution be
6 presented to Sean McMenamin, further
7 evidencing the respect and admiration of
8 this legislative body.

9 Thank you very much.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Mr. McMenamin for
13 remarks.

14 MR. McMENAMIN: I don't sing,
15 and I might dance.

16 On behalf of Vince Gallagher
17 and our Board of Directors, I'd like to
18 thank Councilman Clarke, also Councilman
19 Henon, and our representative,
20 Councilwoman Cindy Bass. She's our
21 Councilwoman at Mount Airy.

22 Again, just real quick, the
23 Commodore Barry Club, which we have now
24 evolved into more of a community, and I
25 believe one of the evolutions has been

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that we're now just not just the Irish Center, but we are part of a greater community of Philadelphia with many different cultural events that go on there during the year. So I think that's our future.

I have been involved since 1966. It was originally formed in 1958. You are all welcome to stop by there, and I know that we have quite a few people that have been there. It's in a great revived area of the City called the West Mount Airy, and you can see the revival that's been going on in that area thanks to the Council.

We just -- I'm not going to get into our problems that we've had, but we are always, let's say, cash flow, and I think that can refer to us all around here. We've had a rough year, but our people have responded, the tax implications, and, again, we are working through that to get ourselves the proper classification so that we can meet some

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2 of the maybe non-profit status.

3 Again, thanks, City Council and
4 our President, Councilman Henon, and
5 Councilwoman Cindy Bass. Again, you're
6 always welcome at 6815 Emlen Street, and
7 it's not just St. Patrick's Day. We're
8 there 365 days a year. And if you -- as
9 I said, we cover a lot of our cultural
10 areas there now where we've expanded, and
11 it's called the Ceili, which means it's
12 Irish dancing and music. So you're all
13 invited, and thanks again.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you.

17 Council will be at ease.

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you so much.

21 At this time, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will
23 present a resolution declaring March 25,
24 2015 as National Social Work Month.
25 Would DHS Commissioner Vanessa Garrett

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2 Harley and those accompanying her please
3 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

4 And joining Councilwoman Bass,
5 we have Councilman Neilson and Councilman
6 Jones.

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
10 morning.

11 Good morning.

12 (Good morning.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So March is
14 National Social Work Month and we wanted
15 to get together this morning and just
16 recognize the people who really make a
17 difference and who step in when there's
18 crisis. And being a social worker is a
19 very, very challenging job, and I would
20 say that at this point it's probably more
21 challenging than at any other time
22 particularly in our city's history, and I
23 wanted to say thank you so much for all
24 of the work that you all do, because you
25 step in at a time when people are in need

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2 of help and in need of healing.

3 And so it's very appropriate
4 that we offer this resolution this
5 morning recognizing March 2015 as
6 National Social Work Month and
7 recognizing the dedication and commitment
8 of social workers in Philadelphia's
9 Department of Human Services and
10 Community Umbrella Agencies.

11 And so the resolution reads:

12 Whereas, social workers help
13 people in every stage of life function
14 better in their environments, improve
15 their relationships with others and solve
16 personal and family problems; and

17 COUNCILMAN NEILSON: And
18 whereas, social workers in Philadelphia's
19 Department of Human Services and
20 Community Umbrella Agencies create
21 support circles for the youth and their
22 families to enhance their well-being and
23 meeting the needs of the vulnerable
24 children. Together they work to devise
25 plans for the reunification and permanent

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2 housing; and

3 Whereas, one in three families
4 in Philadelphia is involved with the
5 child welfare system at some point in
6 their child's life; and

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
8 social workers support diverse families
9 in every community, understanding that
10 individuals and communities can come
11 together to improve outcomes for all
12 children and families;

13 Whereas, Philadelphia social
14 workers and families work together using
15 the Improved Outcomes for Children
16 Program to build comprehensive plans that
17 families can follow to reduce the number
18 of children in the system and bring
19 families together while still ensuring
20 children's safety; now, therefore, be it

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Now,
22 therefore, be it resolved, by the Council
23 of the City of Philadelphia, that it
24 declares March 2015 as National Social
25 Worker Month and in particular

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recognizing the dedication and commitment
of social workers in Philadelphia's
Department of Human Services and
Community Umbrella Agencies.

And further resolved, that an
engrossed copy of this resolution be
presented to the Department of Human
Services and Commissioner Vanessa Garrett
Harley as evidence of the sincere respect
and admiration of this legislative body.

Congratulations.

(Applause.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
Chair recognizes Commissioner Harley for
remarks.

COMMISSIONER HARLEY: Good
morning. I just want to say thank you on
behalf of those very hardworking and
dedicated staff at the Philadelphia
Department of Human Services as well as
our ten Community Umbrella Agencies.

I'm going to ask if any of the
social work staff is here from either DHS
or any of the CUAs if you would stand.

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2 Now, the majority of our staff are out in
3 the field servicing kids and families,
4 but I see a few in the back that I just
5 wanted to recognize.

6 (Applause.)

7 COMMISSIONER HARLEY: I'd like
8 to say a special thank you to
9 Councilwoman Bass, who has proven to be a
10 great friend to the Department and really
11 someone who cares about kids, as well as
12 Councilman Jones and Councilman Neilson.
13 We definitely need all the help that we
14 can get. We certainly believe in that
15 old adage, it takes a village to raise a
16 child, and also to Councilwoman Blondell
17 Reynolds I see in the audience, who has
18 helped us a lot, as well as Councilwoman
19 Sanchez.

20 And so we want to thank all of
21 you. And Councilwoman Tasco who heads up
22 our Health and Human Services Committee,
23 and really all of City Council has been
24 very helpful to us. We appreciate that
25 and we thank you. And, Councilman

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2 Clarke, thank you very much.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you so
9 very much.

10 At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Oh, who will
12 present a resolution recognizing the 2014
13 winners of Philly LIVE Center Stage.
14 Would Recreation Commissioner Slawson,
15 Sue Slawson, and those accompanying her
16 join the Councilman at the podium.

17 I also see Councilman Greenlee,
18 Councilman Oh, and Councilman Squilla,
19 also Councilwoman Bass and Councilwoman
20 Sanchez.

21 (Councilmembers and guests
22 approached podium.)

23 COUNCILMAN OH: So I would
24 ask --

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Also

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2 Councilwoman Tasco.

3 COUNCILMAN OH: -- Chief

4 Cultural Officer Helen Haynes and all the
5 guests of PHL LIVE Center Stage would you
6 come up and join us, but would the
7 winners please stand in the front.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Can we have
9 some quiet in the Chambers, please.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: I'd ask the
11 winners to stand in front of us and all
12 the judges and hosts to join us on stage.
13 And while they're approaching, I'd like
14 to just let you know a couple of numbers.

15 The 2013 numbers for Nashville,
16 population of 609,000 and we're a city of
17 1.5 million. The economic impact, annual
18 economic impact, of music in Nashville is
19 \$10 billion. The labor income that is
20 produced annually in Nashville is \$3.2
21 billion, and the number of jobs that
22 music produces in Nashville is 56,000
23 jobs above the national average on the
24 income side.

25 And so let me just say that

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every week we are joined with some really outstanding people, and today is no exception. The only addition is, outstanding people are not always celebrated, and so we have some celebrities with us. And let me say that in addition to Commissioner Susan Slawson, our Deputy Commissioner of Parks and Recs who runs the Dell Music Center, and Helen Haynes, our Chief Cultural Officer, we have two-time Grammy Award winner and 18-time Grammy-nominated producer, songwriter, hit-maker with 80 million records sold, Carvin Haggins. We have Brent Porche from WMMR; Shelly Easton, Program Director of the Year with WXTU; Bex from Wired 96.5; Bennett from Wired 96.5; Joe Vettese from WXPB and The Key, 88.5; Lovett Hines from the Philadelphia Clef Club; Erik Sabo, Project Manager at the Art Institute of Philadelphia. And we are joined by four of Philadelphia's star musicians - Chill Moody, GoGoMorrow, Carol Riddick, and

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Cedric Napoleon. And standing in front of us are the winners of the 2014 PHL LIVE Center Stage, and we're going to recognize them in our resolution, and I'd ask the winners just to give a shout-out when your name is called.

And so let me say this is a resolution recognizing and honoring the 2014 winners of PHL LIVE Center Stage.

COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I want to thank Councilman Oh, who became a producer as well as a Councilman for this wonderful, wonderful event.

Whereas, Philly LIVE Center Stage is a music initiative established by Councilman David Oh as Chairman of the Committee on Global Opportunities and the Creative and Innovative Economy; and

Whereas, Philly LIVE Center Stage provides local musicians with an exciting opportunity to be discovered, to be promoted and to achieve success here in Philadelphia;

COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

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PHL LIVE Center Stage's performances and Award Show is structured across 10 different genres of music, bringing diverse musicians together. The 10 different genres include Rock, Hip-Hop, Jazz, Classical, Gospel, Country/Folk, World, Pop, R&B and DJ. In addition, a "People's Choice" Award is selected in the 11th category; and

COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: And whereas, the finalists perform live in prominent local venues such as World Cafe Live, Milkboy, Relish, Underground Arts, St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral, Silk City, Time and Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church; and

Whereas, the final winners for each genre are decided at an ultimate performance at the Award Show by judges who are considered experts in the industry in December at the Trocadero; and

COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas, the "People's Choice" Award is voted by

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2 the audience at the Award Show; and

3 Whereas, the winning artists
4 from each genre receive top prizes such
5 as "sharing" the stage of the Dell Music
6 Center with a world-class performer,
7 \$1,000 cash, studio recording time, music
8 videos, documentaries and opening at
9 major concerts; and

10 Whereas, the 2014 winner of the
11 Rock category is Kid Felix;

12 (Yay.)

13 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
14 the 2014 winner of the Hip-Hop category
15 is Aime;

16 (Yay.)

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
18 the 2014 winner of the Jazz category is
19 the Vibe Plus Five;

20 (Yay.)

21 COUNCILMAN GOODE: And whereas,
22 the 2014 winner of the Classical category
23 is Abigail Hong;

24 (Yay.)

25 COUNCILMAN GOODE: And whereas,

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2 the 2014 winner of the Gospel category is
3 Donielle Rodwell;

4 (Yay.)

5 COUNCILMAN GOODE: And whereas,
6 the 2014 winner of the Country/Folk
7 category is the Alfred James Band; and

8 (Yay.)

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
10 whereas, the 2014 winner of the World
11 category is The Underwater Sounds;

12 (Yay.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
14 whereas, the 2014 winner of the Pop
15 category is Emma Cullen;

16 (Yay.)

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
18 whereas, the 2014 winner of the R&B
19 category is Aaron Parnell Brown; and

20 (Yay.)

21 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the
22 2014 winner of the DJ category is DJ
23 Ricochet;

24 (Yay.)

25 COUNCILMAN OH: And the 2014

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2 winner of the "People's Choice" category
3 is The Voices of Fellowship;

4 (Yay.)

5 COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by
6 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
7 that it hereby recognizes and honors the
8 2014 winners of PHL LIVE Center Stage.
9 And we are presenting the resolutions to
10 Deputy Commissioner Susan Slawson, who on
11 her own offered up the stage of the Dell
12 to the winners, and to Helen Haynes, our
13 Chief Cultural Officer, who on her own
14 came up with half the prize money. And
15 let me say -- thank you. They deserve
16 applause.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN OH: And I see David
19 Ivory, Grammy-nominated producer,
20 standing right back there as well. So
21 thank you for being here. And I'll ask
22 Susan Slawson and Helen Haynes to come
23 up.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: The Chair
25 recognizes Commissioner Slawson.

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2 COMMISSIONER SLAWSON: Good
3 morning. I am really excited to see all
4 these winners, but I'm even more excited
5 that you're going to be on the stage at
6 the Dell Music Center. It's going to be
7 a wonderful, wonderful time.

8 But I want to just acknowledge
9 Councilman Oh for coming up with this
10 idea, because we have so much wonderful
11 local talent here in Philadelphia and
12 this is an opportunity for us to open up
13 our doors to show Philadelphians and the
14 tri-state what we can produce right here
15 in Philadelphia. So I'm excited about
16 that.

17 But I also want to acknowledge
18 the Councilmembers, this Administration,
19 because in 2008 when there was not enough
20 funds, I went to a few Councilmembers and
21 I asked for additional funds. And I
22 asked for a lot of money.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
24 you did.

25 COMMISSIONER SLAWSON: I

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expected Council President Clarke to say that. He was the first one that I went to, and he said yes. Councilwoman Tasco, Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman Jones, and former Councilwoman Donna Reed Miller, I went to all of them because we were short on funds, because this wouldn't happen and we wouldn't be able to stand here today and say that you'll be performing on this stage without these Councilmembers. And so I want to say thank you to you for believing that we could raise up again and that Dell Music Center could be the force that it is right in North Philadelphia. So thank you so much, Councilmembers.

And, Councilman Oh, what a wonderful job you've done bringing together all of these musicians so we can enjoy them right at the Dell Music Center.

Thank you so much.

(Applause.)

MS. HAYNES: I just want to say

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that I'm glad that Councilman Oh brought up the Nashville, because Nashville brands itself as Music City, but there's no more of a music city than Philadelphia. It has a great music tradition that goes back -- that goes way back and in many genres. And so we have some of -- raised some of the greatest artists in the country right here in Philadelphia, and we still do. So when Councilman Oh approached us about this idea for PHL LIVE, we were happy to support it as a part of the mission of the Office of Arts, Culture and Creative Economy, to support local musicians as well as local venues that feature these artists and keep that whole area going in music. Also, we stand ready to support cultural organizations within the community that act as platforms for these performances. And we're doing programs and performances in public places. We're going to be supporting 16 different locations around the City that support

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2 local artists. And we're all about the
3 local artist.

4 So we're very happy to be a
5 part of that. We stand ready to work
6 with any Councilmember who has such a
7 wonderful idea to continue to support
8 their organizations in their community as
9 well as their artists.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 Well, after this presentation.

15 MR. HAGGINS: Good morning.

16 Good morning. So just to talk about the
17 PHL LIVE event and how it all came about
18 was surprising to me just to get an inbox

24 was on board because most of the
25 producers and writers that are right now

Philadelphia.

And you spoke of the legacy and
what Philadelphia stands for. This is a
music mecca. This is a sole music mecca,
from Bon Jovi to Chubby Checker to Patti

this day we have Will Smith and the
up-and-coming Chill Moody and GoGoMorrow.
And what Philadelphia stands for is
creating and bringing great music to the
world. This music is loved worldwide,
but the great part about it is that the
income it can accumulate, the income it
could make for the City for tax revenue.
So we look at this business right now and
there was a court proceeding recently
where 7.3 million was awarded to Marvin
Gaye's family. That's great to know, but
there were actually \$28 million made for
that actual record. Now, imagine if that
artist or those writers lived in this
city. Then that taxable income would be
coming to this city.

22 on this important resolution, a
23 resolution that will provide urgently
24 needed action to protect Philadelphia
25 from the trains carrying highly volatile

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and flammable Bakken crude through the City, right up against our neighborhoods and schools and hospitals, businesses, parks, historic landmarks, transportation corridors, along both our rivers, over old bridges and over our water supplies. Even City Hall could be affected if a train derailed and exploded on City tracks.

Fortunately, Philadelphia escaped disaster when two train car derailments that occurred here in January 2014 and 2015 did not end in catastrophe, but it is only a matter of time unless something is done.

The first step is to remove the currently used tank cars, a main objective of this resolution. Not only the older DOT-111's designed originally to carry corn syrup and wholly inadequate to transport the Bakken crude with its high dissolved gas content makes it explode and catch fire when punctured, but also the CPC-1232 tank car, which

exploded in the most recent train
derailments in West Virginia and
Mississippi. These cars puncture easily
due to the thin single walls of the
tanks.

DOT-111's puncture at speeds in
excess of 8 miles per hour, and even the
tougher cars being proposed by U.S. DOT
puncture at 18 miles per hour, which is
why the resolution's insistence that the
federal government require tank cars
designed to the highest safety standards
is absolutely key.

In fact, tank cars in use
today, none of them are designed to
safely transport this oil, and this
resolution rightly calls on the federal
government to prohibit their use now.

U.S. DOT themselves predict an
average of ten derailments of trains
hauling crude oil or ethanol per year
over the next two decades, costing
hundreds of lives and more than \$4
billion in damages to our nation. But if

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a fiery derailment were to happen in the City, hundreds of thousands of people would be in the blast zone and people simply wouldn't be able to get away. This is the nightmare that's keeping people awake at night. This is why we are asking you, we are asking City Council to pass this resolution. Stand up for people's safety, save lives, and support the public health and avoid untold millions in damages that would occur should the City and our water supplies be harmed.

The resolution's directive to Philadelphia OEM will directly help Philadelphians get the vital information and understanding they need so they can get some sleep at night. The public has a right to know the basic information about train traffic and what is in those mile-long trains that course through past their homes to Philadelphia Energy Solutions two to three times a day. The City needs to have these community forums

2 where people can learn this information.

3 Philadelphia Energy Solutions
4 is the largest single customer for Bakken
5 crude in the U.S. They operate the
6 highest crude-by-rail yard in the nation,
7 and they are the largest oil refinery
8 complex in the eastern seaboard, and they
9 are expanding their production. This
10 means more oil train traffic. That makes
11 this resolution absolutely urgent. They
12 continue to use these substandard cars,
13 as does their carrier, CSX. And
14 presently those companies that are
15 benefiting from this enormous and rapid
16 increase in oil trains here in Philly
17 have no limits placed on them at all.
18 But the truth is, they don't --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Ma'am.

21 MS. CARLUCCIO: -- consult the
22 public. You have to, and thank you for
23 doing that. We greatly appreciate your
24 support for this resolution.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Before you sit down, please state your
3 name for the record.

4 MS. CARLUCCIO: Tracey
5 Carluccio, Deputy Director, Delaware
6 Riverkeeper Network.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 morning.

13 MS. CLEMENTS: Hi. My name is
14 Tamara Clements and I work with the
15 Philadelphia Fossil Fuel Transportation
16 Group.

17 Council, first of all, thank
18 you for introducing this resolution. I
19 am actually reading a letter for Dr. Ryan
20 McCormick.

21 Dear Council, I am a Bella
22 Vista resident, family doctor, and father
23 who's very concerned about what has been
24 going on in Philadelphia in regards to
25 the fossil fuel industry. I'm speaking

for other healthcare workers, neighbors,
and concerned Philadelphians.

There have been several oil
train derailments in the country already
this year, the most devastating in West
Virginia this month, ruining the water
supply. Furthermore, there have been
several black smoke fires at the
Philadelphia Energy Solutions refinery,
which released toxins, causing short-term
cardiovascular and respiratory problems,
which include the risk of asthma and
heart attacks as well as long-term
increased risks of cancer.

We are also furious that some
members of the Philadelphia political
leadership have been entertaining the
idea of allowing us to become a fossil
fuel energy hub. This is morally,
environmentally, and socially
irresponsible and will literally derail
the ongoing rebirth of our great city.

Philadelphia is already a
polluted mess, and to increase this would

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cause droves of families to leave the area, creating a brain drain and disproportionate exodus of those with financial resources who would otherwise have a lot to offer the City. Those without the resources to pick up and leave will predictably suffer ill consequences.

On a larger scale, I fear for the continued undermining of the progress Philadelphia has made in terms of leading the country redefining itself as a green city. To go back on this promise and make Philadelphia a fossil fuel energy hub is to continue to allow PES to pollute our environment, waterways, and air, and it betrays the promise made to all Philadelphia. Frankly, we should stand up for ourselves and work to close this refinery, which should never have been allowed to exist.

My family and families like mine will certainly leave this region if it keeps going down these polluting

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paths. As an idealistic family physician who trained at Jefferson, I have become increasingly alarmed by young patients of mine with new diagnosis of cancer. Of course, cancer is multifactorial, but we should do all we can to reduce the chance of another 18-year-old about to go off to Brown University finding a tennis ball sized lymphoma in his neck or an 18-year-old inner City black male who survived his violent neighborhood, only to be told he has metastatic lung cancer.

I could go on, but I digress. Please contact me if there's anything I can do to help you. Dr. Ryan McCormick, M.D. from South Warnock Street.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony.

(Applause.)

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good afternoon.

MS. DIXON: Hello. Ann Dixon, Protecting Our Waters.

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Thank you, Councilman Johnson,
for proposing to let those living along
the train tracks know about evacuation
plans in the likely case of an oil train
explosion. After all, there have been
many explosions. In fact, there have
been five major incidents on a recent
three-week period:

February 14th, a train carrying
tar sands oil from Alberta exploded in
Ontario.

February 16th, a crude oil
train derailed along the Kanawha River in
West Virginia upstream of Charleston.
Residents fled for their lives in the
cold. A water treatment plant downstream
was closed since oil spilled from the
train into the river. It took four days
for all the fires to be extinguished.

March 16th, cars derailed and
burned outside Galena, Illinois. These
cars were retrofitted with protective
shields to meet a higher safety standard
than federal law requires.

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March 5th, derailments blocked
Canadian National Railway's main line in
Northern Ontario.

March 7th, a 94-car oil train
derailed about three miles outside the
northern Ontario town of Gogama and
destroyed a bridge. Five tank cars
landed in a water, some on fire. So five
incidences in three weeks.

For many urgent reasons, we
need to rapidly transition to renewable
energy. I am deeply disturbed and
opposed to City Council's Special
Committee on Energy Opportunities. The
proposed fossil fuel energy hub will
destroy our health and ultimately our
economy.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony.

(Applause.)

(Witness approached podium.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
afternoon.

MS. ISER: Good afternoon. My

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name is Lynne Iser and I speak to you
this morning as an elder. I turned 65
yesterday. I am a citizen, I am a
mother, and I'm a Philadelphian, and I'm
proud of all those things. I'm a woman
who is concerned about our city and the
precious world in which we live, and I
want to add my words to the words that
you have heard previously from people
that have offered you statistics and
information about the dangers of these
fossil fuel trains.

I want to thank Councilman
Johnson who introduced this resolution
and to the Council for holding these
hearings. In our opening prayer, we
asked that this Council be guided in your
deliberations so as to achieve the common
good. The passage of these fossil fuel
trains through our city, through many
neighborhoods does not provide for the
common good of the people, but represents
a true threat to our health and our
safety of our citizens.

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Over 700,000 Philadelphians live within the evacuation zone of these oil trains' passage, and you have heard about how unsafe these oil trains are and of the previous accidents that have been occurring regularly and in our city as well. It is said that we have dodged the bullet. We have been fortunate up to now.

It is easy to only hear about the benefits and supposed money and jobs that will come to our city through this fossil fuel energy hub, this booming commerce, but that story is not the full story. It does not clearly represent the dangers posed by the transportation of fossil fuels and the money that goes to the many multi-national corporations that will profit by these fossil fuel trains. But our city will not, and they don't talk about the true cost. Our citizens will not benefit.

We hear about the jobs that will be created, but the truth is that

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2 through green energy industry jobs create
3 five times the number of fossil fuel
4 jobs. We don't hear that. We are not
5 hearing the full story.

6 It is your moral responsibility
7 as leaders in our city, as
8 Councilmembers, to protect our city and
9 provide for our well-being and our common
10 good. It is my responsibility as a
11 citizen to speak up.

12 I'm grateful that you're
13 holdings these hearings, and I urge you
14 to pass this resolution.

15 Thank you very much.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 afternoon.

22 MR. ROLES: Good afternoon. My
23 name is Michael Roles and I'm the Program
24 Organizer with Clean Water Action here in
25 Philadelphia. Clean Water Action is a

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one million-member national organization of diverse people and groups joined together to protect our environment, public health, economic well-being, and quality of life. Here in Southeastern Pennsylvania, we represent roughly 40,000 members, and on behalf of our members, volunteers, and the dozens of concerned neighbors from whom we've heard, I want to thank Councilman Johnson and this City Council for standing up for the health and safety of our communities through this resolution, 150129-A.

Clean Water Action renews its call for the Office of Emergency Management to engage communities who are most impacted by crude by rail. And as the resolution calls for, we want to see the United States Department of Transportation move aggressively to replace all tank cars that do not meet the highest safety standards and that have demonstrated a failure to transport Bakken crude safely.

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For more than a year, Clean Water Action has been examining the risks, activities, and oversight involved in crude oil being transported along our railroads and in our neighborhoods. In February, we hosted a series of listening meetings with residents who live in impacted communities, and we continue to schedule many more sessions. Here I have 400 signatures of Philadelphians who support this resolution.

After learning the facts of crude by rail, the natural reaction from any is to share concern and ask a myriad of questions about how best to prepare and protect themselves, their families, and their communities. Unfortunately, the transparency is lacking, especially by the Office of Emergency Management, and people are only left to hope that a crude-by-rail emergency does not occur in their community. Indeed, the facts behind this issue shed light on some distressing truths.

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In Philadelphia, the risks run high, as the City is the country's largest receiver of crude by rail and sees more than 20 oil trains per week, potentially impacting almost every Councilor's district. Seven hundred thousand Philadelphians reside within an impact zone, and oil trains are traveling along our two major rivers, which provide the drinking water for virtually the entire City.

Recently the U.S. DOT projected that fuel-hauling trains will derail nationally at an average of ten times per year over the next 20 years, causing more than \$4 billion in damage and possibly killing hundreds of people if an accident occurs in a densely populated area. That's from the U.S. DOT.

In light of this, it is imperative that agencies and officials at every level of government come together to ensure that these startling predictions are effectively mitigated and

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never become a reality. This means that comprehensive risk assessments, updated plans for oil train incidents, and disclosure of critical information are undertaken so that every first responder and every resident of every impacted community knows exactly how to prepare and respond should an incident occur. It also means holding all responsible parties accountable, including the federal government and the industry. The petroleum and rail shipping industries need to come forward publicly and explain their plans to protect our neighbors and ensure that accidents never occur.

Additionally, the U.S. DOT must finalize the strongest safeguards possible, which should include specifications for tank cars that meet the highest safety standards, as well as stringent preventative protocols for the transportation of crude oil.

This body's leadership on this matter is a critical first step to

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protecting every member of our community.
Real change happens from the bottom up,
and today's resolution on crude by rail
sends a strong message to the public, key
decision-makers, and the industry that
Philadelphia City Council refuses to
allow the City to become a cautionary
tale.

Moving forward, I look forward
to working with you to ensure that our
communities receive the protection that
we deserve.

Thank you to Councilman Johnson
for leading us to this moment, and thank
you to the entire City Council for your
support. This is a tremendous step
forward.

(Applause.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony.

(Witness approached podium.)

MS. POST: My name is Janet
Post. I live in Germantown and I'm a
member of the Socialist Workers Party.

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I agree with the
representatives of the environmental
organizations here today who have pointed
out the seriousness of these train
derailments around the world.

Unfortunately, in the case of the Quebec
derailment, the railroad companies are
trying to frame up the engineer who was
running that train, and I support him in
his fight against this frame-up.

The railroad bosses are pushing
to impose a one-person crew, with only an
engineer on freight trains across the
United States. These trains have grown
longer. Some now exceed two miles, and
the amount of highly volatile crude oil
being transported daily has skyrocketed.

The bosses press railroad
workers to run longer trains and work on
smaller crews with less rest. The answer
is not to eliminate trains, but to demand
100 percent railroad workers union
control over their working conditions,
including an eight-hour day, which we won

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many, many years ago, double the crew size, and reduce the length of the train to 50 cars, in addition to the recommendations by the environmental groups on the durability of the cars themselves and reduce the length of these trains.

Fights like the battle by the railroad workers and their union against the one-person crew are part of the broader fight for working conditions on the job. At this time, oil workers at 15 refineries in seven states are picketing 24 hours a day in the strike by the United Steel Workers Union for safety conditions at the refineries. These strikers are supported by refinery workers here in Philadelphia at Philadelphia Energy Solutions and Monroe Energy in Trainer. These workers are not our enemies. We are part of these workers who are fighting in support of the workers on strike as they stand up for safe working conditions in both

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2 refineries and on the railroads.

3 As we struggle together to
4 fight for safe working conditions and a
5 safe environment for all workers, we need
6 to remember that we start with the world,
7 where in many countries workers have very
8 little access to fuel, electricity, food,
9 and other necessities of life. In my
10 opinion, we need a labor party in the
11 United States that can fight in the
12 interest of working people for our
13 ability to create energy safely, which is
14 not just a question of science but a
15 political question that workers and
16 farmers can fight to solve.

17 These are not issues that are
18 beyond our ability to resolve, but we can
19 and must join in solidarity with those
20 who are now in struggle, be it in support
21 of the oil workers on strike or railroad
22 workers fighting for safe working
23 conditions on the railroads.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 (Applause.)

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MS. WARD: Two or three times a
6 day --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Ma'am, state your name for the record.

9 MS. WARD: Carol Ward, member
10 of Food and Water Watch.

11 Two or three times a day, as
12 you've heard already, freight trains with
13 cars carrying three million gallons of
14 unrefined crude oil go through our city.
15 This is a city that I'm very fond of.
16 I've been here 38 and a half years
17 working in the City and then retired more
18 than that almost.

19 There have been two near
20 disasters already, one January 20th, 2014
21 when an oil tank car hung over the
22 Schuylkill River for days. There is a
23 very graphic picture that some of us have
24 been showing you of that thing suspended
25 over the Schuylkill Expressway it looked

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like, and if these type of accidents occur, we will be losing a lot of tourism, and that is very important for the City's financial future.

The other incident happened January 31st, very recently, when 11 tank cars derailed in the CSX rail yard between Route 95 and Delaware River. If either of these accidents had not been resolved, we would have had an explosion, fire that could have mounted right up to the sky, and then also or an oil spill. It would have ruined the quality of our water perhaps for all time. We think that accidents in the water can be resolved easily. They can't.

With the density of our population in the City, many people would have been killed in this accident and the drinking water ruined. We have only to remember the incident in Quebec where 47 people died when there was an explosion in the railroad area there. So these highly flammable chemicals contain so

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2 much material that's dangerous.

3 Some people call these freight
4 cars bomb cars, and I know that this is a
5 terrible risk that we're taking. I know
6 that you all are very intelligent people
7 in City Council and know that these
8 things are very risky.

9 So I urge City Council to pass
10 the oil train resolution, 150129, in
11 which the best regulations will occur to
12 keep these cars as safe as possible.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. PLATT: My name is Robby
19 Platt. I'm with many organizations, but
20 I represent Food and Water Watch today.

21 I agree with all my colleagues
22 preceding on the issue of oil trains,
23 especially traveling through the City,
24 and I also believe that the oil that is
25 being carried should stay in the ground,

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2 because it is foolish or foolhardy to
3 transport it.

4 I also believe that there is --
5 oh, I want to thank Council for its
6 proposed bill and urge them to pass it,
7 but consider this only a responsible
8 start. The issue of the car safety is
9 only part of the problem. The
10 infrastructure is the other. The tracks
11 are not designed to carry the weight that
12 these trains are transporting. They're
13 much heavier today than they used to be,
14 and Council should be asking Conrail to
15 upgrade or inspect these rails going
16 through the City to protect its people.

17 Thank you very much.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. WINSLOW: My name is Peter
23 Winslow speaking on behalf of the
24 Pennsylvania Interfaith Power and Light.

25 I'd like to thank Councilman

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Johnson in absentia and urge the Council as a whole to adopt this resolution. A year ago the Pennsylvania Chapter of Philadelphia Interfaith Power and Light, along with our colleagues at Clean Water Action and Clean Air Council and others, formally presented our position to the Council regarding the clear and present danger that we see is posed to the citizens, the property, and the environment of Philadelphia by the transport of Bakken oil by rail. Only the willfully ignorant or callous can sleep and rest easy while this condition persists.

So I applaud the Council for taking this action. I realize and we realize that there is a limit to what the Council is able to do because so much of the regulation of these trains is out of the hands of the Council and is in the control of the federal government. But there is much that can be done to make the citizens of Philadelphia safer and

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2 protected from the potential danger of
3 these trains.

4 So thank you for this action,
5 and I hope and we hope that you will
6 continue on this road to make the City
7 safe from this clear and present danger.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Charles Goodwin,
13 commenting on 140906.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MR. GOODWIN: Good afternoon,
18 Mr. President, distinguished members. My
19 name is Charles Goodwin. I come on
20 behalf of the Center City Residents
21 Association, where I am a Vice President.
22 We speak against Bill No. 140906 and 0907
23 as well, its companion. These are the
24 bills concerning the so-called Urban
25 Experiential Displays.

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Opposition to the proposed displays has been uniform in our organization. We are the oldest civic group in this city. Our purpose for over 60 years has been to preserve and enhance the quality of life in our neighborhood. These signs neither preserve nor enhance the quality of life in our neighborhood or anyone's. These signs might have a place where people don't really live - the sports complex, a casino parking lot, on top of an Essington Avenue strip club - but not in a real neighborhood where people live.

Philadelphia is a beautiful city. These displays as proposed are both enormous and ugly. The comparisons to Times Square in Las Vegas are demeaning to Times Square in Las Vegas. The sign proposed for Broad Street is nothing but dime store Mardi Gras. There's nothing about a three-story tall, electric blue or mustard yellow treble clef that speaks Philadelphia or its

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2 heritage.

3 You saw earlier today with the
4 musicians you honored some of the great
5 artists who are coming up in our city,
6 and this so-called Avenue of the Arts
7 billboard has nothing to do with that.
8 The hand erupting through the sidewalk
9 with the globe looks like something that
10 should go on the cover of an Ayn Rand
11 novel, not on the sidewalks of
12 Philadelphia. What's it got to do with
13 Reading Terminal? Nothing.

14 While it's easy and fun to mock
15 the ugliness of these displays, the
16 important thing is to recognize the real
17 and negative impact that they will have
18 on the community and its well-being.
19 These ill-thought displays will suppress
20 economic activity in their vicinity.
21 That's what outdoor advertising does.
22 The City will lose - less property tax,
23 less sales tax, less wage tax - as these
24 signs put a drag on economic activity in
25 their vicinity. These signs will benefit

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their owners at the expense of everyone else, including the City as a whole.

CCRA also opposes the overlays proposed. We don't see how the City can say no to the next proposal if it says yes to these first three billboards, especially at the time when the Lit Brothers signs are being used to justify these signs, even as they're being criticized on the editorial page of the Inquirer and by the nearby residents.

We are glad that one of our two Councilmembers representing our area has exercised his prerogative to exclude these signs. Thank you, President Clarke. We are disappointed that our other Councilman has not so acted.

In conclusion, we strongly urge the Council to do what is right and to vote down these bills.

Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony.

(Applause.)

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2 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
3 other speakers on the public comment
4 list, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

7 At this time, we will move to
8 our Calendar. Mr. Decker, if you can
9 please read the title of -- I'm sorry.
10 Councilman Johnson, did you want to
11 speak?

12 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I want to
13 speak about --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: At
15 the time?

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: At the
17 time on my resolution.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
19 you want to do it now? You say at the
20 time of the vote? You want to wait? I'm
21 just responding to your --

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: No. I
23 would like to -- when we call up my bill,
24 I wanted to speak on my bill before we
25 actually take the vote.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Okay. Thank you.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You're
5 welcome.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Mr.
7 Decker, 150129-A.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 urging Congress and the United States
10 Department of Transportation to release
11 specifications for tank car design and
12 for Philadelphia rail companies to
13 rapidly upgrade and replace crude oil
14 tank cars.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
18 Council President, and I want to thank
19 all the advocates who are here today
20 expressing their support for this
21 resolution.

22 During last winter there was a
23 derailment in my district along the
24 Schuylkill River in the Southwest Center
25 City part of my district, which alarmed a

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2 number of my constituents and myself. I
3 held hearings with the rail company, CSX,
4 to discuss safety measures which were
5 being taken to assure that rail safety is
6 a top priority. About a month ago, a
7 minor derailment occurred in South
8 Philadelphia and a catastrophic
9 derailment occurred in West Virginia.

10 I introduced a resolution
11 urging the U.S. Department of
12 Transportation and members of Congress to
13 release federal specifications for new
14 tank cars designed to be safer for
15 carrying crude oil. The resolution also
16 urges the Philadelphia Office of
17 Emergency Management to coordinate with
18 all governmental agencies and to provide
19 the most possible information to
20 residents about what materials are moving
21 throughout their neighborhoods.

22 In addition, I will be working
23 in partnership with the Administration
24 and the Office of Emergency Management to
25 begin looking at doing neighborhood

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forums on evacuation plans and how we could protect ourselves in the event that a catastrophe happens as a result of a train tanker derailment.

The federal government is still in the process of forming the new tank car standards. There is a proceeding underway with the Department of Transportation, the U.S. Department of Transportation, but it has not yet issued binding regulations. We need the federal government to make this a priority and release new standards for tank cars that carry hazardous waste.

In the meantime, trains are carrying hazardous materials through our cities in cars that do not protect against catastrophic explosions. With the increase in train traffic in Philadelphia, we are flirting with disaster, and the most frustrating part is that the local government does not have the authority to legislate train standards, so we are stuck waiting for

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2 the federal government to react.

3 Recently we reached out to the
4 office of U.S. Senator Bob Casey, who
5 sent a letter urging the Department of
6 Transportation to issue these new
7 regulations. So there is a reason to be
8 cautiously optimistic.

9 I would like to ask all of my
10 colleagues for an affirmative vote on
11 this resolution, but I would also like to
12 highlight that this is only the beginning
13 of the conversation. Our federal
14 government must act to ensure that the
15 train cars traveling through the City of
16 Philadelphia are safe so we can prevent

18 and thank you, Councilman O'Neill and
19 Councilman Henon, for these lovely
20 shamrock flowers. It's St. Patrick's
21 Day. For some of the jocks in here, the
22 beginning of March Madness and the
23 basketball tournaments.

24 Isn't that right, Councilman
25 Greenlee?

3 Former jocks, sir.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Former jock,
5 got it.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Former jocks.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: But it's
9 primarily known for Women's History
10 Month. And some of the strong women that
11 we've recognized over the course of this
12 month, particularly in my life - my
13 mother, my wife, my daughters, and my
14 female colleagues in here - have made me
15 the man that I am today and many of us
16 the men that we are. However, no one
17 woman not related to me has mattered more
18 to me in my life than Queen Mother Falaka
19 Fattah of the House of Umoja.

20 As a young punk in the '70s, I
21 was a member of the 54th Street Gang.
22 And she held a breakfast that brought
23 hundreds of young men in and started
24 talking to them about the value of life.
25 Evolved today, all life matters, but back

then particularly inner City young men's lives. And when she spoke, we began to hear her and the no gang war in '74, stay alive in '75, gang campaigns started.

Today, Queen Mother Fattah and her husband, Dave Fattah, still are going on educating us about inner City issues and things like that. But I wanted to thank her publicly for, at 84, still being a part of the solution and guiding young men.

There are men that used to be members of the Morocco's, Haines Street, the Valley, Zulu Nation, 49th and Hoops -- and I see you shaking your head because you remember those times -- that are now having AARP cards, are valued members of their families as grandfathers, and are taxi drivers, bus drivers. And for them it's a monumental achievement, because they were projected not to be here today.

So I wanted to thank Queen Mother Moore -- Queen Mother Fattah. She

goes down with Queen Mother Moore as a great one, but thank her for being a part of my life and the thousands of young men that would have otherwise been in jail or in a grave that are here today to be able to be a part of society.

So we want to encourage all women to be strong like her and to provide guidance to guys like us.

Thank you, Councilman.

The Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you, Mr. President. Today I rise to speak out and join the millions of citizens across the country who witnessed and opted to denounce the hateful, crude, and ignorant language that came out of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity at the University of Oklahoma on a bus on their way to Oklahoma City Golf and Country Club. As we watched that, we also celebrated last

week the 50th Anniversary of Selma.

Today we are discussing the actions of Alpha Sigma Epsilon. The hateful words singing racial slurs targeting blacks sung by a chorus of young freshmen further underscore that we have so much work to do. And parenthetically, kudos to the President, who took swift, decisive action disbanding the fraternity and making it clear it will never ever exist on his campus as long as he's President.

As a parent, I fully believe that hate is a learned behavior. I read a book when my daughter was quite young saying Children Live What They Learn. They do not come out of the womb with hate in their hearts. This is a learned behavior that starts in the home.

So there are many parents in our community and clearly in Oklahoma -- those particular students were from Texas -- that are teaching their young people that diversity is to be feared.

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In my office hangs an excerpt from that book, Children Live What They Learn, and two of those passages say, If children live with fairness, they learn justice. If children live with acceptance and friendship, they learn to find love in the world.

To those parents out there, I submit the following, that teaching tolerance, you not only do society harm, but you do your children harm as well.

The fact is that we live in a very diverse world. Millennials are flocking to cities like Philadelphia because of diversity. They're flocking to cities like Philadelphia because of our rich culture. They're flocking to cities like Philadelphia because there's much to do.

As Maya Angelou said to Oprah Winfrey, her mentor one time, when adults are saying anything that offends you, simply tell them stop it. We must get out of this constant pattern as a nation

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where we take two steps forward and then
four steps back.

As a member of a sorority that
I love dearly, along with my colleague
Councilwoman Marian Tasco, Delta Sigma
Theta Sorority Incorporated, I want the
world to know that fraternities and
sororities like Delta Sigma Theta are
dedicated to making a positive difference
in the world and are built on the
foundation stone "service." In fact,
most of the mainstream media remain quite
unaware of the fraternities and
sororities of the Panhellenic Council
that exist right here in the City of
Philadelphia. Nine historically African
American Greek letter fraternities and
sororities are dedicated to camaraderie,
academic excellence is the standard, and
the expectation is service. Those
organizations are not founded on hate.

Given this ugly episode at
Oklahoma University, I invite all those
listening to join my office on Monday,

12:00 noon in Love Park, along with the fraternities and sororities of the Panhellenic Council where we invite all of those, sorority-connected or not, to show us your true colors. There we will stand in solidarity calling for a new commitment of service and acceptance to those who are unlike us. We're asking all to wear your fraternity and sorority colors. Come with an open heart and a positive spirit. Join us as we show the City and the world that fraternities and sororities of the Panhellenic Council, again, are built on a foundation of sisterhood, brotherhood, and service.

Thank you, Mr. President.

I learned from my mentor, the late State Senator and State Representative Hardy Williams, that the greatest participation that I can participate in as it relates to changing my community is through the democratic political process and through community organizing and never to take our right to vote for granted.

And so I just want to acknowledge the recent movement toward getting as many young people involved in the political process but, most importantly, never taking our right to vote for granted, because a lot of people sacrificed for us to have the opportunity to participate in this process, and I know whose shoulders that I stand on as

an elected official.

This evening at 6:30 at Galdo's Banquet Facility in South Philadelphia, I will be honored by the South Philadelphia Business Association as -- and I will be receiving their Man of the Year Award.

So I just want to invite as many of my colleagues as possible to come out to participate. And I'm truly honored and privileged to have the opportunity to be awarded as the Man of the Year for the South Philadelphia Business Association for the work that we have done in City Council supporting small businesses throughout the City of Philadelphia. So I just wanted to put that out for individuals to know, and welcome all of you to come and participate.

14 a forum by which to call out folks for
15 what they are and to present not only our
16 challenges that we continue to face as a
17 society when we have ignorance and
18 bigotry in this country. It's sad that
19 it's 2015 and we're still having these
20 discussions, but as elected officials,
21 we've got to confront those head-on and
22 continue to use our forums to do so.

23 I want to take a moment to
24 thank our Education Chair, Councilwoman
25 Blackwell, and Majority Leader Curtis

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Jones for joining me on Monday at a hearing held by the House Democratic Policy Committee on school funding in my district at Harding. There the three of us represented what we believe to be the interest of Council and talking about how encouraged we are by the bold proposal by Governor Wolf, but the challenges we face as local elected officials around school funding.

Notwithstanding all of our commitments to public education, these are tough times, and we not only recognize the challenges that the House has, but we also thank them for the work that they've been doing with you, Council President, and with our Mayor in giving us tools to be able to confront our crisis.

It was important that that hearing be held early on because it means that, like us, the House of Representatives is trying to be as proactive in engaging the community

2 around this education crisis that we all
3 have to step up to the plate and continue
